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The Rhythm Method

The refuge for failure is often the cry for change. Nowhere is this more apparent than on the Broadway musical scene. The pattern of success over the past several years has not been encouraging (as if ungualified, yearsin-the-running smashes were ever frequent occurrences). So there's nothing like doldrums of this sort to raise voices against some traditional concepts of the musical theatre. Well and good. As a music trade paper, we are naturally concerned with change that will affect the music in musicals, and leave the scrutiny of what ever evolutions (or revolutions) people have in mind with regard to staging and choreography to the pros in these areas.

Change, of course, is a relative thing. What is more familiar than a fresh breeze that sweeps away the stultifying air of a humid summer's day? This is change---and we are delighted by its appearance. If songs are created in a musical that fall back on more or less traditional values, yet delight us with their freshness and relevance to the book to which they are wedded, are they really out of step with the times? Has the value of melody in pop music changed to such a degree that we can be lured and satisfied, as one theatre critic noted last week, simply on the basis of "feeling rhythm'' rather than being able to hum the tunes? The critic, Clive Barnes, reviewing the opening of "Promises, Promises," indicated that "feeling rhythm'' (or a "modern" beat) was the kind of change that the musical theatre is in desperate need of. It's a shame that he didn't catch and comment on the more melodic nature of Burt Bacharach's score, since he did characterize him as a non-revolutionary who is, nevertheless, capable of keeping his finger on the beat of contemporary sounds.

Surely, change and a reflection of contemporary musical tastes (in consort with a growing sophistication of theatre-goers) have consistently made legitimate demands on the musical theatre — and the true talents have responded to them. We think, however, that many concerned parties have placed too much of a burden, let us say, on the rock idiom as a cure-all. Go rock, they seem to imply, and you're with it. The success of "Hair" and "Your Own Thing" as commercial hits appears to confirm this. But, the truth is that rock works in these musicals because the sound of rock is best suited to what these shows have to say. There are too many story ideas that do not require this kind of approach. Why, then, do many critics belabor the point when they review shows whose flavor cannot be captured by this particular breed of pop music?

Certainly, the rhythm method is not the complete answer. Fortunately, this is proven whenever the musical theatre glows with a "Fiddler on the Roof," where melodic appeal and warmth dramatize the receptivity of audiences (and record fans) to the basics of pop music touched by, excuse the expression, genius. This is what change music is really in desperate need of.

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



Diana, Mary Wilson and Cindy Birdsong looked ravishing in glitter-ing sheath dresses, and filled the second half of each show, accom-panied by the augmented Ralph Dollimore Orchestra. Recaps on their single hits like "The Happening," "Baby Love," and "Stop In The Name Of Love" were mingled with extracts from their Rodgers and Hart and "Baby Love," and "Stop In The Name Of Love" were mingled with extracts from their Rodgers and Hart and Sam Cooke LPs, and Diana gave an amusing account of the "Queen Of The House" parody on "King Of The Road," well supported with patter from the other girls. The finale of the

TALENT ON STAGE Westside Room, Century City, L.A.—In the uncom-plicated era of "once upon a time," pop singing ran an uncomplicated gamut from ballads to novelties. To-day's listeners are much more sophisday's listeners are much more sophis-ticated; so are today's writers. The upgrading of both has had a predic-table effect on present-day singers. One of the most notable to evolve is Dionne Warwick. Ample proof could be heard and seen during her opening at the Century Plaza's posh Westside Room Room.

Drawing on the blues legacy of Dinah Washington and acknowledging the dramatic approach of Nancy Wil-son, Miss Warwick added her own distinctive rock melisma to a hard-driving cross-section of 13 contem-porary tunes and produced a steadily improving study in "soul." Her show began on a tentative note with For began on a tentative note with For Once In My Life—not in volume (in fact, she was too close to the mike), but in depth of understanding. She immediately hyped it with the infectious syncopation of Promises, Promises; became philosophical in Where Am I Going; recreated her circa 1962 debut smash, Don't Make Me Over; and reached the vocal climax with The Look of Love. Among other highlights were: Do You Know other highlights were: Do You Know The Way To San Jose; I Say A Little Prayer and Alfie.

er a well-deserved tribute to Lee After a well-deserved tribute to Lee Valentine, who conducted Al Pelle-grini's sidemen and Miss Warwick's own rhythm section, the Scepter re-cording star launched into a sensitive postscript, What's Good About Good-bye, then bested comic Jack Carter in a brief explanate while intraducing a brief exchange while introducing celebrities. Carter complained: "I came here to see Mel Tormé." (The room's next attraction). Dionne's re-buttal: "If Mel Tormé can do what I've done (patting her tummy be-neath the psychedelic maternity gown) that's show business, baby."

JIMI HENDRIX EXPERIENCE

PHILHARMONIC HALL, N.Y.—I don't think that the builders and planners of Philharmonic Hall, in their wildest flights of imagination, ever thought that someday that con-servative stage would be filled with giant speakers powered by amplifiers turned up full volume, pouring out ecstasy to a capacity crowd. But it came to pass, not once but twice. on Thanksgiving, as the Jimi Hendrix Experience, denied the use of Carnegie Hall, let loose with their usual mind assault. assault.

assault. Perhaps to atone for the desecra-tion of this shrine, the first half of the show was given to Fernando Valenti, a highly regarded classical pianist, and the New York Brass Quintet, a straight chamber ensemble. Experi-ence drummer Mitch Mitchell joined the Quintet for their last number, and if the match did not quite create

a new art form, it was an interesting,

a new art form, it was an interesting, cute segment. With an apologetic "we haven't practiced for a while, so we're just coing to jam a little and see what happens," Hendrix led his crew, which includes Mitchell and bassist Noel Redding, through their paces. The Experience somehow always man-ages to stay on the tasteful side of excessive loudness, and if the lack of practice showed up occasionally, it was compensted for by many moments of sheer beauty. Tunes were mostly stables from the Hendrix repertoire, "Fire," "I Don't Live Today," "Cross-town Traffic"(group's current single). "Foxey Lady" and "Purple Haze," but their instrumental interpretation of "Sunshine Of Your Love," done as a tribute to Cream, was one of those a tribute to Cream, was one of those pleasant surprises that make concert going worthwhile.

INCREDIBLE STRING BAND

FILLMORE EAST, N.Y.-England's FILLMORE EAST, N.Y.—England's Incredible String Band is one of those groups, who, although they may never enjoy a million-seller, will always command a fairly large size group of hard core fans. Although basically a duo, the String Band received some assistance from their girlfriends who

duo, the String Band received some assistance from their girlfriends, who contributed uncomplicated bass and organ lines, plus occasional vocals, to fill out the sound. Using a wide variety of instru-ments, including various string in-struments, flutes, harps, tom-toms, kazoos and countless others, the String Band come on like a mixture of medieval, modern and futuristic minstrels, singing songs of beauty minstrels, singing songs of beauty

and truth about a wide range of subjects. The String Band creates a mood, one which takes the mind from its everyday thoughts and transports

it to a dimension previously unknown. Our only complaint is that the group tended to shatter the mood with group tended to shatter the mood with excessive periods between songs dur-ing which they hunted for instru-ments and tuned up. A small com-plaint in light of the joy the In-credible String Band is spreading throughout the universe. Very few of the songs were announced, but most of them can be found on one of the ICB's three LP's on Elektra, or their fourth, which will be released shortly.

JEFFERSON AIRPLANE **BUDDY GUY**

FILLMORE EAST, N.Y .- Taking a trip on the Jefferson Airplane is a highly risky business, for the machine is very erratic and has been known to is very erratic and has been known to vary in mid-course, never to reach its expected distination. The fourth of six Thanksgiving weekend flights at Bill Graham's Fillmore East not only reached its objective very handily, but went on to take the passengers on a not-to-be missed excursion into the

not-to-be missed excursion into the world of improvisation. Buddy Guy opened the musical por-tion of the evening (first act had been an African dance troupe). Guy's new group is a much smaller and much tighter outfit than the one we'd seen several times previously and should do a lot towards making him as popu-lar as he is outstanding. His guitar work ranks right up there with the two old blues masters, Albert and B. B. King, and his vocal stylings seem to improve with every perfor-mance. A. C. TOWN HALL, N.Y.—Yes Virginia, pure folk music still exists, although the folk are a different breed and the music has a modern feel, but there is a new breed of performer/ writer who just stand on a stage, acoustic guitar in hand, and pour out their feelings on a host of topics. Strangely enough, they all seem to come from Canada. Gordon Lightfoot is not a name which the everyday citizen could iden-tify, but there were certainly enough knowledgeable people in New York to fill Town Hall, and enough nationwide

knowledgeable people in New York to fill Town Hall, and enough nationwide for United Artists to issue a second album. Judging by his performance last Saturday (31) and the audience response, it is quite possible that be-fore the end of next year his name will be easily identifiable. Lightfoot's strength as a songwriter lies in his canability to treat a wide

Lightboot's strength as a songwriter lies in his capability to treat a wide range of subject matter in a highly diverse manner, an art which many monotonous New York-based writers haven't yet learned. As a performer, he has the natural magnetism of

many of his contemporaries, with the added attraction of a listenable voice Lightfoot delivered a 15+ song se of original material, which includes "For Lovin' Me" (a hit for Peter Paul and Mary), "Early Morning Rain" (another well-known tune associated with Ian & Sylvia), "A G Go Girl In Love" (surely the strang est folk song ever written, and a hi for Lightfoot in Canada), "The Las Time I Saw Her," "Bitter Green,"
"Black Day In July" and "Did She Mention My Name."
Perhaps Gordon Lightfoot's materia does not sound like the folk music we used to know, but, as Bob Dylan said the times they are a' changing, and to our ears, its a change for the better.

poet, having written some of the most successful books ever in this idiom, will consistently show-up as the writer of film music and songs and as an attraction on TV. Following his writing assignment for "Joana," and as an attraction on TV. Following his writing assignment for "Joana," for which he wrote 13 themes (now wedded to lyrics), McKuen will be represented with the music for "The Prime of Miss Brodie," due for release next March. For this film, he's pen-ned 20 themes, six of them with lyrics. At present, he's on the coast to collaborate with Henry Mancini on the score for "Me Natalie," star-ring Patty Duke and Martin Balsam. 





ELVIS-TV SPECIAL—Original Soundtrack —RCA Victor LPM 4088 Elvis Presley's NBC-TV Special was aired last week, and the original soundtrack album should begin to sell like hotcakes immedi-ately. On the special, Presley sang a number of his old hits ("Lawdy, Miss Clawdy," "Hound Dog," "Love Me Tender," etc.), some of them in medley form; several spirituals; a Christmas song; his '68 hit, "Big Boss Man"; his new chart item, "If I Can Dream," and assorted other material. Bound to be a hot item. hot item.

CYCLES—Frank Sinatra—Reprise FS 1027 As is always the case with Frank Sinatra albums, "Cycles" is a powerhouse that's bound to see substantial chart action. The set is titled after the ace chanter's recent chart single and includes that song as well as the flip side, "My Way Of Life," which also made the charts. Among the other songs are those famous pop-country hits, "Gentle On My Mind," "By The Time I Get To Phoenix," and "Little Green Apples," as well as the "Moody River" oldie." Big LP.

GENTLE ON MY MIND—Dean Martin— Reprise RS 6330 No dealer has to be told to keep lots of copies of this album on hand. Dean Martin's perennial popularity will remain perennial forever if he keeps on turning out LP's like this. The set includes Dean's recent Top 100 item, "Not Enough Indians," and a host of other potent tunes, among them three pop-country smashes (it's interesting that Frank Sinatra's new album also contains three pop-country hits, two of which, "Gentle On My Mind" and "By The Time I Get To Phoenix," are on this set—Sinatra's third one is "Little Green Apples," Martin's "Honey"). 





The LP includes the group's current chart single, "Kentucky Woman," "Listen, Learn, Read On," "We Can Work It Out," and "River Deep, Mountain High." Deep Purple creates an open, sweeping sound which often reaches thunderous proportions. and the group should sweep up many listeners with this album.







The set includes the group's current single, "Reason To Believe"/ "Nobody Knows;" a humorous tale about the depredations of a monster, entitled "The Biggest Whatever;" a zestful, joyous inter-pretation of "I've Just Seen A Face;" and a haunting, lovely song, "She Sang Hymns Out Of Tune." 25899 The Billy Vaughn Singers render eleven Christmas songs in a smooth, lyrical, and tasteful manner. The selections include "Have Yourself A Merry Little Christmas," "Silver Bells," "It Came Upon A Midnight Clear," and "Deck The Halls." This album could become a catalog item.

SOUL CHRISTMAS—Various Artists— Atco SD 33-269 Christmas is a soulful season on this package which features eight topflight R&B artists. Represented on the disk are Clarence Carter ("Back Door Santa"), Otis Redding ("White Christmas"), Carla Thomas ("Gee Whiz, It's Christmas"), Solomon Burke ("Presents For Christmas"), and King Curtis ("The Christmas Song"). Joe Tex, Booker T. & the MG's, and William Bell are also featured on a set which provides a most festive Christmas gift.

ROOTS—Everly Brothers—Warner Bros.— Seven Arts WS 1752 The Everly Brothers are entering their thirteenth year of performing, and this set, over a year in the works, can be another major milestone in their career. With the emergence of the country music sound in the rock field, the world has caught up with the Brothers once again. Tunes vary from true country tunes, "Mama Tried" and "Less Of Me," to rock-country sides like "Illinois," "Turn Around," and "Venture Boulevard," and the mixture of the two idioms is perfect. Expect heavy FM play.

RAVI SHANKAR'S FESTIVAL FROM INDIA—Various Artists—World Pacific WDS 26201 Ravi Shankar's Festival from India has been presented in various cities throughout America, and this two-record set contains performances by the select group of artists who appear in the Festival. In addition to the master sitarist himself, the following artists are spotlighted: Jiéendra Abhisheki, vocal; Sharad Kumar, shenai; Asish Khan, sarod; Shamim Ahmed, sitar; Shivkumar Sharma, santoor; Lakshmi Shankar, vocal; Sabri Khan, saragni; and Kamal Chakravaty, vocal. Excellent album.

BEST OF THE SOUNTRACKS-Tower ST

BEST OF THE SOURTHACKS 5148 This album contains top selections from the original soundtrack LP's of five Ameri-can International movies: "The Wild Angels," "Devil's Angels," "Born Losers," "Wild In The Streets," and "Psyche Out." Both the "Angels" soundtracks and "Wild In the Streets were charts items ("Wild" was quite successful), and this set might well be, too. Keep an eye on it.



Along with his eight man back-up group (recently changed to a four man outfit), Guy displays his virtuosity on such oldies as "(You Give Me) Fever," and "Knock On Wood," and such originals as "I Had A Dream Last Night" and "You Were Wrong."

CAL TJADER SOUNDS OUT BURT BACH-ARACH-Skye SK-6 Vibist Cal Tjader has come up with an appealing, highly commercial set which may spread the word of his already well-known talents even further. Backed by a strong rhythm, string and horn section, Tjader turns in very tasty instrumental interpreta-tions of eight very well-known pieces, plus a number from "Casino Royale," the non-Connery James Bond flick. Sides include "What The World Needs Now," "I Say A Little Prayer," "Walk On By," and "Any-one Who Had A Heart." Display it well.

SAMBA BLIM—Tamba 4—A&M SP 3013 The bossa nova as a fad has been long played out, but as a legitimate form of musical expression, the Brazilian beat still has plenty of life left in it. Tamba 4 is one of the group's still adding life to the many pretty new bossa nova tunes being turned out. With the help of a 14 man string sec-tion, the quartet interprets such tunes as "Weekend," "Know It All," "Tristeza De Nos Dois" and "Slick." Could go far.





This set should experience its best sales in middle-of-the-road areas.

SHALAKO—Original Motion Picture Sound-track—Philips PHS 600-286 Robert Farnon wrote the score for "Shal-ako," the recently-premiered western star-ring Sean Connery (who of course gained fame playing James Bond) and famed French beauty Brigitte Bardot. Farnon's score is excellently written and well worth listening to apart from the movie. The music is, for the most part, effectively dramatic without being loud and boisterous. Farnon is par-ticularly good at creating and sustaining tension.

This two-record album of the proceedings, which comes with a printed "script," should be o great interest to all those concerned with Seeger and his views.

VIBRATIONS — Rita Graham — Tangerine TRCS 1507

TRCS 1507 There are still many devotees of the full soft and lush sound and once they are properly introduced to Rita Graham, a talented newcomer to the ranks of profes-sional singers, they'll be more than glad to take her home in the form of her debut album. Under the production reins of blues singer Ray Charles, Miss Graham turns ir highly sound performances of "Quiet Nights Of Quiet Stars," "(There Is) No Greater Love," "P.S. I Love You," and "My Cup Runneth Over."

TROUT—MGM SE 4592 Hit songwriter Tony Romeo ("Indian Lake" among others) has joined with Frank Romeo and Cassandra Morgan to form the Trout, a group which combines mountain music with rock. Romeo produced the set and wrote all the songs. All the material seems to exude an atmosphere of clean, fresh air and mountain streams. Tunes on the set include "Carnival Girl," "Worse Day I've Been To," and "Understanding Who I Am." Has potential.

BRAZIL—NEW DIMENSIONS IN SOUND —Lyrio Panicali & His Orchestra—UA In-ternational UNS 15538 Rich, sweeping harmonies characterize this appealing album of Brazilian melodies presented by Lyrio Panicali and His Orches-tra. Bright, festive tunes such as "Upa Negrinho," "Tem Mais Samba" ("All 1 Need Is All I Want"), and "Roda" are balanced by lyrical, serene outings such as "Insensatez," "Dindi," and "Meditacao." This set is likely to achieve considerable good music play.

COSMIC MUSIC—John Coltrane, Alice Col-trane—Impulse AS 9148 This is the first recording released from the late John Coltrane's library of tapes. The album features the artist on tenor and bass clarinet. A highlight track is "Reverend King," which Coltrane wrote in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Coltrane's widow, Alice, solos impressively on piano on "Lord, Help Me To Be" and "The Sun," both of which she wrote. The set is a must for Coltrane's legion of followers.



MICHEL LEGRAND AT SHELLEY'S MANNE-HOLE-Verve V6 8760 Famed as a composer, particularly of film music ("The Umbrellas Of Cherbourg" is his most famous work in this genre), Michel Legrand is also a fine jazz pianist, as this album, recorded at Shelley's Manne-Hole in Hollywood, proves. Assisted by Shelley Manne on drums and Ray Brown on bass, Legrand holds forth at the ivories with a combination of soul and technical skill that numerous jazz fans should appreciate. Four of the compositions on the set are by Le-grand, Brown and Manne.



PERSIAN ROOM, NY-Long, free-flowing strands of wheat-colored hair and a porcelian face of considerable loveliness—the kind of looks that was once termed "All-American"—are the once termed "All-American"—are the striking features of Gloria Loring. She is the singer who has performed on top TV shows (e.g. Dean Martin, Ed Sullivan) and niteries. Atlantic put aside the possibility of the production of a CSG disk for the consumer market and regular LP product for stations, since, the execs contended, this would have put an enormous burden on production facili-tias ties.

See Changeover

But now Atlantic sees a steady changeover to modern equipment by stations, and is planning to go CSG in album product at an early point in 1969. Both Ertegun and Iehly feel that the present compatible disk being marketed by most companies represents a bad compromise in sound and harms to a degree, such disks played on mono phonos. While most companies make a statement of compatibility on their album sleeves, Atlantic makes no such comment, although the label has gone on the allstereo bandwagon.

Actually, Holzer's CSG process has never been put on the shelf at Atlantic. The label has used the system to convert stereo tapes to mono disks for its singles releases. Atlantic also utilizes an earlier Holzer innovation, a driver amplifier for master cutting that is said to produce much cleaner, fairly distortion free disks. Atlantic possesses two such units.

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

JEFF BECK GROUP MOODY BLUES - TEN YEARS AFTER

'HE SHRINE, L.A.-An evening of HE SHRINE, L.A.—An evening of vailing, flailing, hard-rock, frenzied nusic was provided by three English groups, The Jeff Beck Group, The Moody Blues, and Ten Years After. The Shrine, now cooled by sixteen new electric fans, is a mecca for roung, hip, teenyboppers, who come to see the talent of the American and English musicians.

Ind English musicians. Ten Years After, a copy of the dis-banded Cream, played with astound-ng force and indescribable insanity. The drummer, Rick Lee, did a 20-ninute drum solo during "Summer-ime." He was rewarded for his com-plicated and involved counter-beat drumming with wild and uncontroll-uble applause. Chick Churchill on or-gan, Leo Lions on bass, and Alvin Lee, lead guitarist and singer com-bined their obvious musical ability to provoke the stimulated crowd to near madness. madness

Carrying on the tradition of the irst group, the Jeff Beck Group, sur-passed the established pleasure with their hard, hard-rock music, Beck (formally of the Yardbirds) is a true sensual guitarist. He caresses the gui-tar with affection and it seems right tar with affection, and it seems right for the moneymaker to hang from his

EN YEARS AFTER shoulder, enveloped in his muscular arms. He is consumed by his talent, his ability, and he thrives on accom-plishment—and applause. The rest of the group, Rod Stewart, vocalist in the Mick Jagger tradition, Ronnie Wood on bass guitar, Nicky Waller on drums, and Nicky Hopkins on piano, is a collection of excellent musicians and unique personalities who were fortunate to find each other and form a group. The Moody Blues, a group that has remained quiet for awhile, has sud-denly entered the music world once again with "Nights in White Satin." They didn't have the wild appearance and raging, frantic on-stage vitality of the other two groups, but they were accepted by the audience. "Ride My Seesaw" was a highlight by the group which includes Mike Pinder on organ and piano, Ray Thomas on flute, Justin Haywood on lead guitar. John Lodge on bass guitar, and Graeme Edge on drums. Their lyrics are moody and often blue (hence, their name?) and other times they dig deep into the hard-rock bag and pull out a few winning songs. More often they are just quiet, assured musicians with expensive clothes and looks of shadowed certainty.

SERGIO MENDES & BRASIL '66

PHILHARMONIC HALL, N.Y. PHILHARMONIC HALL, N.Y. — When originally conceived, and origin-ally introduced to this country, the bossa nova reflected the calmness of its roots. The Brazillian-beat, Portu-guese-lyric music caught on with the general public as a fad, and with jazz musicians and fans as a major new musical form, but, except for its use in syruppy background music, it has generally been abandoned in pop music. music.

Sergio Mendes, showing a knack for adapting only those few 'right' songs which naturally fit the bossa nova sound, is the exception. He brought his Brasil '66 outfit into Philharmonic Hall for two rare New York appear-ances last Sunday (3), and for this reviewer, it was one of the most pleas-ant sumprise filled two hours ever ant, surprise filled two hours ever experienced.

In person, Mendes doles out bossa nova with a heavy, almost-afro beat, which shatters the complacency normally associated with that sound. The opening segment of the show featured the Washington National Sym-phony performing some light classics, and ended with Mendes and his and ended and ended with Mendes and my rhythm section joining the orchestra for several songs, including "My Favorite Things" and "The Sadness Of Love."

Of Love." The best was saved for last, how-ever, as the second part showcased the Mendes group complete with vocalists Karen Philipp and Lani Hall, certainly two of the heaviest ensemble voices around. In their own way, the winks added a certain amount of soul. voices around. In their own way, the girls added a certain amount of soul, something previously lacking in the Brazilian music. Among the many numbers from the Mendes bag that were featured, almost all were out-standing. Two songs from the Beatle repertoire, "With A Little Help From My Friends" and "Fool On The Hill," totally contrasting numbers, best demonstrated the group's versatility. Other top tunes were "Goin' Out Of My Head," "Look Of Love," "Scar-borough Fair" and "Mas Que Nada," the latter three all big single suc-cesses for Brasil '66.

THE CLANCY BROTHERS

CARNEGIE HALL, N.Y.—If you ever go across the sea to Ireland, and hap-pen to find yourself in the environs of one of those quaint, travelposter pubs, you're quite likely to find your-self surrounded by Clancy Brothers. The real Clancy Brothers, however, will probably be thousands of miles away, standing on a stage such as that at Carnegie Hall, living entice-ments to the Emerald Isle. Visual re-minders of the pungent smell of ale and stout, the feel of plankwood floor and sawdust beneath the feet, the cluk of the darts. And the low mur-mur of voices, now and then jarred by a shout from Mulholland or O'Flaherty.

by a shout from parameters O'Flaherty. And the inevitable songfest that would break out among the clientele at Moriarty's public house in Shan-non. Perhaps beginning, just as the Clancy Brothers do onstage, with the

sentimental tale of "The Wild Col-onial Boy." To be followed by what seems like hundreds of melodies that every voice in the house can imme-diately respond to. (And maybe you feel just a little more the visitor when you realize that yours is the only voice in the crowd that isn't perfectly at home with the lyrics.) But with or without you, the crowd

But, with or without you, the crowd sings on. It's now "The Rising Of The Moon" or "Finnegan's Wake," or the "Wild Rover" or "Brennan On The Moor." And still the crowd sings on.

Then it's over. And you're no long-er seated in an Irish pub, but you're weaving through a jammed Carnegie Hall, making for an exit. And you find yourself humming on the way out the dear. And the pikes must the door. ". . . And the pikes must be together by the rising of the moon.

VAN MORRISON

THE SCENE, N.Y.-When Morrison first hit our shores as a solo act last year, he was, as his music tended to year, he was, as his music tended to reflect, a bitter young man, with lots of sour juice flowing through his sys-tem, waiting to be released. After enjoying brief popularity from his Top 10 "Brown Eyed Girl" single, Morrison disappeared. Apparently Van Morrison has undergone several major transitions and he is now ready to face the world again as a new per-son, a task he began at the Cafe Au Go Go several weeks ago and con-tinued recently at Steve Paul's Scene. As lead singer and writer for the English group, Them, Morrison was noted as a talented blues writer and singer. In the early days of his solo career he employed a blues-oriented backup group to provide the setting for his hard-hitting vocals and harmonica work. The blues group is gone, replaced by a double bass, flute and Morrison's own acoustic guitar. His songs, although as oblique as always, have a soft, tender feel to them, with only a touch of blues. He is fully in control of himself, sitting in a chair delivering his messages with a only a touch of blues. CRTC Reviews Canadian Talent Ruling

OTTAWA: Canadian broadcasters are becoming more and more aware of the knowledgeable Canadian Radio Television Commission as the Com-mission, headed up by Pierre Juneau, baffles the broadcasters with fancy footwork and sometimes embarras-sing questions.

footwork and sometimes embarras-sing questions. Many broadcasters are applying for renewals, and some asking for transmitter moves, licences for FM operations etc., and one of the seem-ingly top priority questions, would seem to be concerned with the amount of Canadian content being aired over Canadian radio stations. Th Commis-sion is thereefore. apparently. re-Canadian radio stations. Th Commis-sion is thererfore, apparently, re-viewing the Canadian content ruling, which doesn't exist for radio, but there are strong indications that the Commission is well aware of the lack of Canadian content on Canadian radio through the many briefs they have received over the past few months, as well as individual organi-zations who have pressured the gov-ernment through their own members of Parliament. of Parliament.

Rumor On Percentages Television, in Canada, must contain 55% Canadian content. There have been no restrictions as to when or what type of content must be used. This is also under review. There have been strong rumors that radio content for domestic productions could be levied at 25% of 100% Canadian con-tent, in prime time. There have been comparisons drawn between the French/Canadian attitude and the English/Canadian lack of sup-port for Considian content. There are

port for Canadian content. There are some radio stations in French/Canada who meet with audience satisfaction (ratings) yet rely on 85 or more per-cent Canadian content. Another comcent Canadian content. Another com-parison between both markets points up the fact that through radio play, a French/Canadian record, produced locally can sell upwards of 150,000 copies and albums can sell over 100,-000. This has made the record indus-try an important part of the economy of the province of Quebec. On the other hand, an English/Canadian pro-duction, no matter where it was pro-duced can sell 30,000, of which there are very few. are very few.





The rules for minimum license should be taken off and the limit on the number of songs on an LP should also be eliminated. 3. According to the industry, the 9% payment for payments received from sources other than the sale of records for instance radio and TV, is unfair. The industry believes that the changing of these rules will give the record business a needed shot in the arm allowing companies to press records tha may not be sold but could be needed to make sure that hit singles and LP's can be delivered in time. It would also allow the industry to be much more gener ous with their sample records to deejays and journalists. These steps are necessary, says the industry, results. It's going to be an interesting battle. Taylor Campbell, vice president, marketing, Capitol Records, took special care to make sure there were no advance copies sent to radio stations across Canada for which many of the broadcasters expressed their thanks. New pro-motion and publicity director at Capitol is Bert Renka. New president of Capitol (Canada) as reported earlier is 27-year old Ronald Plum.

Warner Bros.-Seven Arts have released a full house of Christmas albums including Bing Crosby's "I Wish You A Merry Christmas"; "The Don Ho Christmas Album" and "The Dean Martin Christmas Album." Gordon Edwards, branch manager of Ontario, reports good reaction to the release. Shaping up to be a very large-sized seller is "Roots" by The Everly Brothers. Tiny Tim's "Second Album" is also expected to chalk up heavy sales. Clyde McGregor, national promotion manager for the firm, reports exceptional interest in the just-released Allan Bruce album "My World Of Song." One of the favorites is "Stay" which may be released as a single. Some of the U.S. border radio stations have apparently received a copy of this Canadian release and are leaning on the cut "I've Answered My Country's Call" which was written by Bruce during one of his tours of Vietnam.

The Sweet Somethings who have a single and album release on Melbourne (distributed in Canada by London Records) will be appearing at Toronto's Edison Hotel over the Christmas holiday. Their manager, Ben Kaye, of Mont-real, recently returned from Los Angeles where he apparently met with several record VIPs who are interested in U.S. release for the four gals.

All systems are now GO for Phonodisc in their new headquarters at 30 Malley Road, Scarborough, Ont. Initial release from their new location is the Foundation's single "Build Me Up Buttercup" on Pye which was rush released in view of the chart action the deck is receiving in the UK. Pigmeat Markham should also chalk up good sales with his lid of "Sock It To Em Judge" on Chess which was given the nod by several radio stations. Early indications indicate chart action for the latest James Brown outing of "Goodbye My Love" on Delta.

Lee Farley of Quality Records is finding solid national reaction to the latest Neil Sedaka single "Star Crossed Lovers" which broke in Montreal and is now showing as #29 on the CFOX chart. "Eloise" by Barry Ryan is picking up extensive play across Canada. This single is being watched closely here in view of its success in the UK. Jeannie C. Riley and Wilson Pickett didn't draw too well for their two shows at Toronto's Massey Hall (25), but it gave Quality's John Dee Driscoll the opportunity to whip up added interest in Pickett's just-released lid of "I Found A True Love" as well as his album product. EDITORIAL: Working for a Green Christmas

The holiday season is now upon us . . . a time often viewed by location owners as "open season on the operator's pocketbook," with their unreasonable demands for additional loans and gifts. There's no getting away from the fact that a lot of locations expect "a little help" along about now, as well as a few "good will" gifts for the wife and kiddies. Operators who keep their spots running smoothly during the course of the year have the edge over their less professional colleagues since they enjoy a firmer position from which to tell their locations "there's not enough money in the weekly cash pan to warrant a loan at this time." But, whatever your relations might be with your customers, remember the same rules apply to loans and gifts as during any other time of the year. Just because the holidays might go to your customer's head, don't let it go to yours.

Although this season might create the giveaway tremors, don't neglect to exploit the rare opportunity it offers to our trade for boosting machine collections. Tap rooms and restaurants usually pick up additional customers about this time, with a little extra holiday coinage (unless the wife grabbed it all for Christmas gifts), and the operator with the talent and energy to merchandise his products effectively, can gain an extra bonus or two for himself. How do you make the holidays work for you? Here are a few suggestions.

The most desirable gift any operator can hand his locations is something that will both keep him happy and promote business on the machines. Gifts such as holiday decorations, which can be purchased in quantity and at moderate prices from wholesalers, create an atmosphere at any location that puts the customer in a jolly, money spending frame of mind. Holiday bunting on the pool table gives a cheery appeal and can attract additional play. Backlit Santa Clauses on top of your music machines do the same job. Likewise, a small artificial tree atop the shuffle alley backbox attracts the eye and the coin. A few nice wreaths for the windows also help quite a bit to draw in that transient holiday crowd, looking for some place to eat, or spending those extra days off and end of year bonuses making the rounds of the town's watering places. We hope we don't have to mention holiday record programming. Putting out those ageless copies of 'White Christmas' and Nat Cole's 'Christmas Song' should be standard procedure for all. The idea here is to let your locations know you're pitching in with time and money to dress his spot up for the holidays as a gesture of gratitude for the year's business. You just might stop some loan-hunter short by jumping in first. Instead of worrying how much this guy and that guy's going to want, make sure you merchandise the most collections from your equipment at this lucrative time of year.


