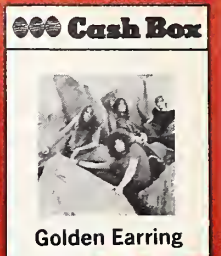

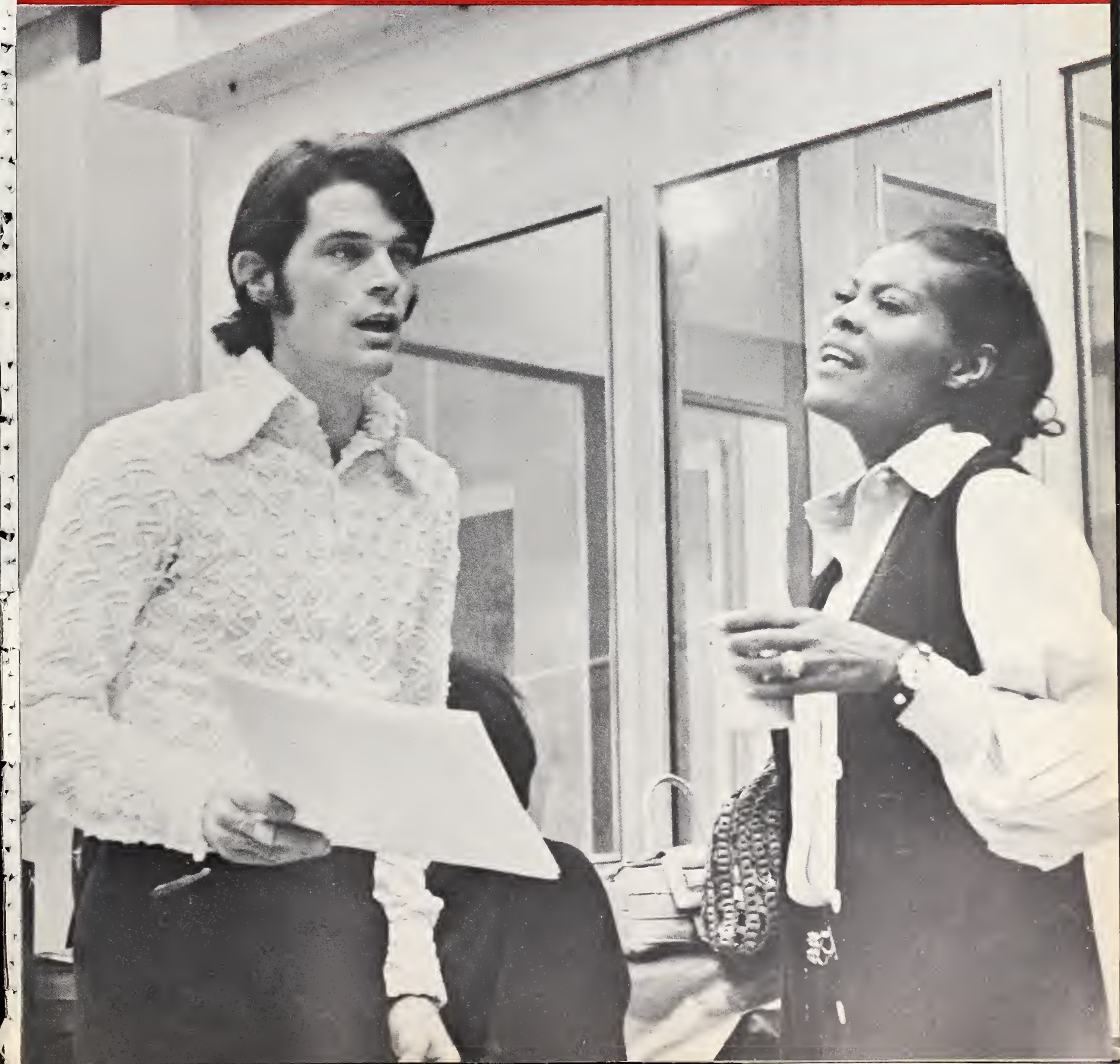

It may be just a matter of taking a few minutes time from the daily grind to reflect on an industry that, to put things in more personal perspective, holds within its strengths and failures many of the things that one values or would like to be realized. For this is a business that is truly unique; all businesses hopefully strive for ethics in the business sense. The music business is different in that its product, more than ever before, mirrors the social and moral condition of the country as a whole, and is broadcast throughout the world for millions to evaluate. If this all sounds awesome, what form of general communication to the public can be regarded as anything less?

With pride and enthusiasm for the music business put on a day-to-day basis and a greater identification of each individual with the rest of the music business community, the industry can cope with its problems more efficiently, insure greater prosperity and stability for all and generate a greater sense of accomplishment in lending a hand to make the world, as the songs says, "a little better place."

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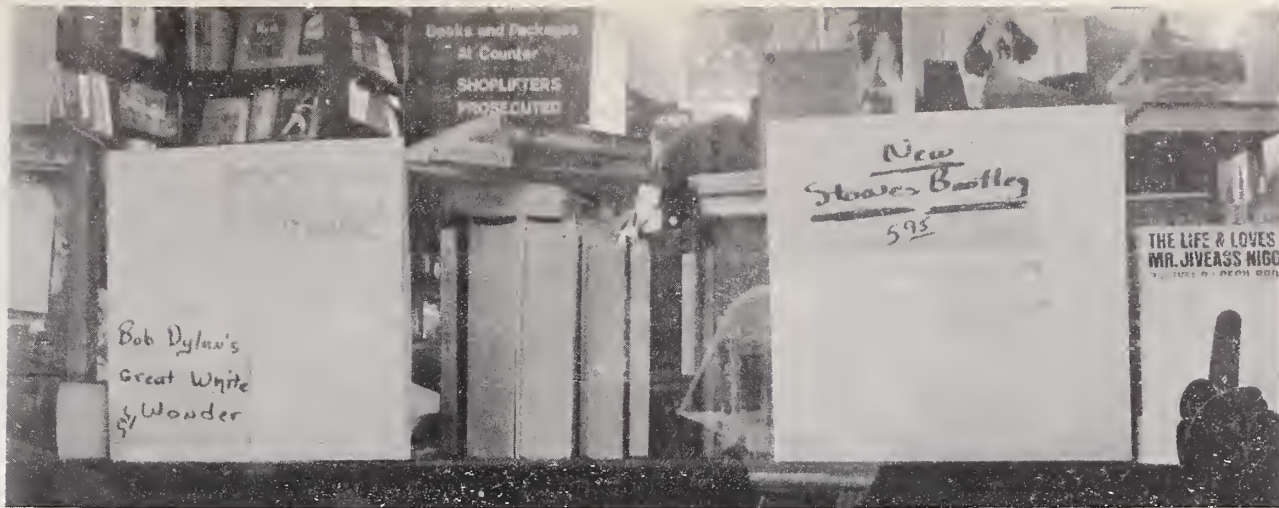

ASCAP's 1969 Shows Top \$68 Mil Income

HOLLYWOOD — ASCAP's income for 1969 reached a new high of \$68,343,800. Income from domestic licensees was up 17%, with total world-wide income up 16%, according to a report from Stanley Adams, president, at last week's west coast meet of the society. Domestic revenues totaled \$58,927,400, compared to \$50,174,417 in 1968.

Up for Grammy awards in the categories of "Best Contemporary Vocal Performance" by male and female artists, B.J. Thomas and Dionne Warwick will be looking to add crowns to their Scepter. The label's sales royalty, D & B.J. will both include their performance nomination songs at the first national convention to be held by Scepter this month (March 18) when the company gathers on the Grand Bahama for a preview of this year's product.

Aiding the label in support of a drive into album power, both B.J. and Dionne have emphasized their influence on the LP scene in addition to reaping million-seller singles (or 2,000,000 in the case of "Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head").

Looking forward also to the Oscar awards, Scepter president Florence Greenberg has affirmed that Thomas will be performing "Raindrops" during the presentation ceremonies for the Academy Awards in which the Bacharach-David composition will be considered for "Best Song" this year.

London Ending Top Fiscal Year; It's Capped With New LP Product

NEW YORK — London Records, nearing the close of the strongest fiscal year (ending March 31) in the company's history, hopes to keep its sales surge going with a new product release, reflecting all areas of the label's coverage of music.

Two pop sets lead off the new product, with new LP's by the Savoy Brown on Parrot and 10 Years After on Deram. Both labels are part of the London complex. The Savoy Brown set, "Raw Sienna", is hitting the market coincidentally with the opening of the group's new U.S. tour, expected to last several months. The tour commenced a fortnight ago and includes the major stops on the cross-country rock circuit as well as key college dates.

The new 10 Years After album, "Cricklewood Green", was officially introduced at a cocktail soiree in honor of the group, held Wednesday evening (25) at the newest New York hip hideaway, The Hippopotamus

Club, on the site of the old Arthur disco. There, on the eve of the group's long-sold-out appearance at Fillmore East, traders and fourth-esters got their first listen (and look) at the new package. The advance Fillmore sellout brought about an unprecedented extra night booking Thursday (26) in addition to the regular week-end schedule.

Classic Sets

On the other end of the repertoire scale, London's classical catalog was increased by 10 new LP's. Lead items in this grouping include Mozart's "Don Giovanni", with Joan Sutherland and the English Chamber Orchestra, batoned by Richard Bonyngue, as well as a complete Bach "Brandenburg Concertos" package, with Benjamin Britten conducting the English Chamber complement.

Larry Newton Shifts To ABC Pics As Veep Of World-Wide Sales Unit

No Successor Named

NEW YORK — Larry Newton is moving out of the disk picture at ABC Records and into ABC's film division as vp of world-wide sales. There are no plans at present to name an overall head of the disk operation, which includes Dunhill Records, under Jay Lasker; Command/Probe, under Joe Carlton. The ABC disk unit is itself under the aegis of Howard Stark.

For the past several years, Newton was closely involved in the acquisitions of companies for the ABC Records & Tape Sales Corp., run by Lou Lavanthal. As for the ABC division, its creative operation shifted to the west coast a year ago, with Stark moving there as its chief.

At the film division, Newton joins Sam Clark, former president of ABC Records, who serves as head of ABC's non-broadcast interests. He was replaced by Newton in 1965. Clark, who announced the Newton appointment, said that "new assignments" with ABC Records will be announced shortly.

Commenting on Newton's appointment, Clark said that the "continued growth and development of ABC Pictures Corporation has made it essential to expand the executive management of that corporation. Larry Newton's success as an aggressive and highly respected negotiator and salesman in the record industry made him the best and most logical choice to head . . . international distribution operations . . ."

Al Klein Production Companies Seek Talent Via 'Communal Farms'

NEW YORK — Al Klein, former Motown Records exec, is out to tap the sounds flowing from the "Communal Farms" youth movement with the formation of two production companies, Buffalo Bill Productions and Ground Sound Productions.

In addition, Klein stated that steps are now being taken to franchise stores throughout the country to market the product of these communes. The shops will be called "Buffalo Bill's 25th Century Trading Post," and a pilot operation is underway in the Dallas area.

Klein feels that with the continued disintegration of the underground movement in the major cities such as New York and San Francisco,

heretofore the main points of finding and developing American groups, the talented youth of today have fled to the rural communes, and have joined into the new ecological revolution. "We underwent an intensive study as to where these communes are located, and however remote they are, we plan to go into them, for we have found that new music forms and groups are being created there. Acid Rock is still in abundance, but the unamplified sounds of Country, Rock, Folk is emerging as a major factor. Already signed with our production company are The Earth Peoples Ensemble, The Jimbo Jingle Joes, The Root Rhythms, The 25th Century Ensemble, Amazing

Arizona Anti-Piracy House Bill Goes To Committee Meetings

NEW YORK — Hearings begin this week before the Commerce & Industry and Judicial Committees of the Arizona House of Representatives to outlaw pirated or counterfeited recordings in that state. Sessions begin this Tuesday (3) before the state committees regarding House Bill 108 which would make the manufacture, distribution or sales of such recordings a criminal misdemeanor.

At present only New York and California have enacted criminal statutes in the area of recording piracy. This Arizona bill is one of two now under consideration, the other being a proposal in Texas. National legislation under an "omnibus bill" is also in the works and being heavily supported by RIAA.

Recording Industry Association of America representatives Henry Brief and Jules Yarnell have flown to Arizona in order to testify before the committees considering the House Bill there this week.

Mechanical Rights Assoc. Established

NEW YORK — The first society established in the United States to represent publishers, authors and composers in licensing the mechanical reproduction of their musical compositions has been formed. Executive manager is Rosalie Miller.

The society, American Mechanical Rights Association (AMRA), 250 West 57th St., New York, is an unincorporated membership association. Miss Miller supervises the business affairs of the society, which, in addition to its domestic membership, represents 17 foreign mechanical rights societies. Recently elected to office were Mil Gabler, president; Paul Evans, vice-president; Suzanne Harris, secretary and Paul Tannen, treasurer. AMRA, originally structured as a corporation, grossed more than a half million dollars in 1969.

Among its domestic members are Charing Cross Music, Inc., Barricade Music, Windfall Music and Chambro Music companies.

Miss Miller stressed the fact that all receipts less only the cost of operating the society are returned to the members. In addition, all American members are afforded the service of direct collection in foreign countries by AMRA's affiliated societies of mechanical royalties earned with respect to their recorded works. These societies include GEMA (Germany), SADIAC (Argentina), AUSTROMECHANICA (Austria) and ACUM (Israel).


Coming Attractions From CU: More Tracks

NEW YORK — RCA Records has entered into an indie production arrangement with Fuqua Three Production Co., operated by Harvey Fuqua, the producer/writer, reports Rocco Laginestra, exec vp of RCA.

The relationship gets underway with a new-concept group, New Birth, who bow with a single, "It's You Or No One" and "Pretty Words Don't Mean A Thing (Lie To Me)," a Fuqua original.

Fuqua has joined five different working acts (comprising 17 talents) who will record for the RCA label and perform in-person as individual artists as well as with the New Birth group. New Birth is made up of eight musicians known as The Nite-Lighters; four female singers, The Mint Juleps; four male singers, The Now Sound; and one male singer, Alan Frye.

For five years, he had served as the exec director of the artists development department for Motown Records, as well as a producer for the label. He produced disks and performing acts of such artists as The Supremes, Temptations, Stevie Wonder, Martha Reeves and the Vandellas, Smokey Robinson and the Miracles, Gladys Knight and the Pips, Willie Tyler and Lester, Marvin Gaye and Tammi Terrell, The Four Tops and Marvin Gaye.

From 1953-1959, Fuqua was signed as a recording artist to Chess Records where he served at the same time as the lead singer of two groups, The Moonglows and The Moonlighters. He was also the writer, producer and manager for both groups. The Moonglows achieved major success with such Fuqua originals as "Most Of All," "Ten Commandments of Love," "See Saw," and "Sincerely," which earned Fuqua a Gold Record for the million-seller achieved by The MacGuire Sisters. The Moonlighters in the meantime made hits out of "Shoo Doo Bee Doo" and "I'm In Love." Along with The Moonglows, Fuqua appeared in three Alan Freed movies, "Rock, Rock, Rock," "Mr. Rock and Roll," and "Go Johnny Go." Fuqua also acted as writer, producer and singer for the duo of Etta (James) and Harvey, and they had success with "If I Can't Have You" and "Spoonful." In 1959, for one year, Fuqua served as the director of A&R for

He was an Oscar nominee for "Love Of Ivy" and "Eyes Of Love."

More Than 1,000 Honor CBS' Davis At ADL Fete; He Quotes Rock Poets

NEW YORK — More than 1000 came to honor Clive Davis, president of Columbia Records, as the 1969 Anti Defamation League's "Human Relations Award" recipient last week (24) at the Waldorf-Astoria.

The award was presented to Davis by this year's fund-raising chairman, Jack Grossman. Grossman, president of Merco Enterprises, Inc., was last year's recipient of this award. "We are honoring Clive Davis," he said, "because he has seen the needs . . . has had the desire . . . and has found the time, in spite of his responsibilities, to devote himself . . . to give so generously of his time and creativity to charitable activities."

Davis Quotes Rock Poets

Davis accepted the award with optimistic words on the subject of the future of human rights. "I believe that the tenets of the Anti-Defamation League will reach more and more sympathetic and understanding ears in the future . . . and for one good reason: Youth has awakened and is shaking the foundations of the past." He spoke of the young poets performing today, whose very lyrics reflect today's deep feeling for brotherhood. Davis quoted excerpts from the songs of Paul Simon, Bob Dylan, Laura Nyro, Phil Ochs and Dino Valenti to show the relevance of contemporary music to the aims of the Anti-Defamation League. "Let us use this knowledge, this experience, this awareness to make much greater progress in the years ahead. The League can use our help. We certainly have the tools . . . indeed they are right in the music that surrounds all of us. As Dino Valenti has written: 'C'mon people now, smile on your brother, everybody get together, try and love one another right now.'"

Ross set the tour following business meetings in Holland with their manager, Cees van Leeuwen, and officials of Dureco Records. Tour will start in New York, with several personal appearances, TV shows and an interview with lead singer Mariska Veres on WMCA's Alex Bennett Show on May 6.

Aaron Russo Sets Kinetic Label Thru Columbia Distribution Net

NEW YORK — Kinetic Records, a new label formed recently by Chicago entrepreneur Aaron Russo, will be distributed nationally by Columbia Records. Mort Hoffman, vice president of sales and distribution for Epic and Custom labels, whose field force will be responsible for the promotion and marketing of Kinetic product, said the label's first release will launch the talents of Chris Moon, a new singer who composes his own material, with a single featuring two Moon originals, "Good" backed with

"Give It To Me." The single will be followed by an album. Both were produced by Beau Ray Fleming, with Moon creating all musical arrangements. A full-scale promotion and advertising campaign is planned to establish Chris Moon as an important new act on the contemporary music scene.

The Kinetic operation will be directed by Russo as president and Wally Meyrowitz, recently appointed vice president and general manager. Meyrowitz served as exec producer on Moon's recordings and he will be deeply involved creatively with all of the new talent Kinetic acquires.

Russo and Meyrowitz will maintain an "open door" policy toward unknown performers and writers. Accordingly, they have made discovery and development of new talent one of Kinetic's major aims.

The group is named after Great Jones Street in the East Village area of New York, where Gershon caught them late last year at the Fillmore East. Their first single, a Bob Dylan song, "I'll Keep It With Mine," produced by Phil Ramone, is due soon, to be followed by an LP.

The label's exec staff is also taking shape, with Dick Corby joining the company as national sales and promo manager, and Karin Grasso stepping in as Gershon's assistant. She has served as exec secretary to Mel Fuhrman general manager of Blue Note and Morris Levy, president of Roulette. Corby, formerly with Commonwealth United Records, is presently lining up a distrib network for the company.

Tonsil is headquartered at 1700 Broadway in New York.

Before founding Mnemotech in 1967, Gershon was associated with the Interpublic group of companies in New York, and Honeywell Int'l in London, where he engaged in research. He began his career with the Russell Sage Foundation as a researcher at the Courant Institute of Mathematics at New York University. He's 28 years old.

MGM Global Distrib Of New Quad Disks From 4 Star Int'l

NEW YORK — MGM Records will distribute Four Star International's newly-formed Quad label. MGM, reports Mike Curb, president, and Alfred Perry, music vp of Four Star Int'l, will handle world-wide distribution, promo, sales and album artwork production.

The new diskery has a projected release sked of 12 singles and three LP's during the year, with two singles and an LP in production.

In another move, Peter Daniels has been named exec producer of Quad, reporting directly to Perry. Daniels will work closely with Fred Benson, vp of FSI's music publishing subsidiaries. Daniels, formerly associated with the careers of Carol Burnett, Barbra Streisand and, most recently, Laine Kazan, will also develop new talent for the company.

Quad's initial singles are "Nellie from the Backwoods" with the Siler Bros. and actor Richard Williams disk debut. Two singles will be followed by Williams' LP, "The First Album."

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Schwartz Brothers, Inc., opened its fourth music retailing subsidi, Harmony Hut in Prince Georges County, Maryland. Located in the Washington area's first enclosed shopping mall, Iverson Mall, the 800-square fast facility will deal primarily in records, 8-track and cassette tape, and a wide variety of related accessory products. Other Harmony Hut retail stores are located in College Park, Maryland, Falls Church, Virginia, and Wayne, New Jersey. The Wayne location is one of the largest retail music centers in the United States.

Schwartz Brother's president Jim Schwartz, noted the "tremendous pulling power" of the Iverson Mall. The Iverson Mall, located just outside the Nation's Capitol, is comprised of some 70 stores, including two major department stores, Woodward & Lothrop and Montgomery Ward.

The opening of the new Harmony Hut carries forward Schwartz Brothers, Inc.'s stated goal of establishing a chain of complete music centers catering to the specific needs of the community.

Kapralik Explains Sly's D.C. Concert

HOLLYWOOD — Dave Kapralik, manager of Sly and the Family Stone, released a detailed explanation of the events surrounding the group's controversial appearance in Washington D. C.'s Constitution Hall on February 15th. Briefly, the group was several hours late in arriving for the D. C. concert and the capacity crowd became extremely restless. As an aftermath of the group's appearance and resulting listener complaints, one D. C. station banned the playing of all SATFS and Stoneflower label product, which ban has allegedly spread to other D. C. and area stations.

Kapralik pointed out that Sly had in fact been hospitalized for treatment of an intestinal condition at the end of January necessitating the cancellation of concert dates at that time. The statement also points out that Sly's two appearances, on Feb. 13th and 14th, in NY and Newark, had been undertaken by the artist against the advice of his New York physician, Alex B. Lukas, M. D. The group's arrival for their D.C. concert was delayed by uncertainty over whether Sly was physically able to perform and the difficulty in making connections between NY and D. C. The Kapralik statement claims that the group went on stage in D. C. close to midnight to play for an audience which had not been informed of the circumstances surrounding the group's delay.

According to the Kapralik statement, the group performed for 45 minutes and were enthusiastically received. At the end of the set, Kapralik states that Sly's intestinal discomfort was so intense that he was unable to return for his "... usual and expected encore." Again, Kapralik alleges, the audience was not informed of the reason why Sly did not return to the stage and "their enthusiasm was turned into frustration." Kapralik's statement goes on to say that, "Because of the lack of communication, members of the audience flooded radio stations with protests and unfounded rumors 'by people of authority' about remarks allegedly made by Sly. . . . It is, in fact, our unequivocal statement that Sly Stone never made any such remarks." However, due to the rumors and the deluge of 'phone calls to radio stations, the said ban on Sly product emerged. Kapralik says that the facts in his statement may be verified and documented at his Hollywood office to any party who may be interested.

In conclusion, the statement says that Sly returned to Los Angeles after the D. C. concert where his doctors have demanded cancellation of all concert dates for at least one month which directions have been carried out.

Mercury Appoints Mampe Classics Head

NEW YORK — Mercury Records has named M. Scott Mampe director of their classical division. Formerly the director of publicity, Miss Mampe replaces Joe Bott, who is exiting the company for another position.

In her new post, she will be involved in the overall supervision of the department and will coordinate A & R activities and selection of product. Classical sales will be handled by Chicago-based Lou Simon, VP for marketing, sales and promotion, and his staff of regional sales mgrs.

Miss Mampe stated that the classical dept. will soon begin releasing Philips classical cassettes, with the first due in late March. She also announced plans to record selected works of the little known 19th century composer Louis Moreau Gottschalk.

Currently Mercury is preparing to release the premiere recording of John Corigliano's 'Concerto For Piano And Orchestra' and the first recording of Gian Carlo Menotti's 'Spoleto Festival.'

Predict Top Showing At 5 Grammy Sites

NEW YORK — The five Record Academy (NARAS) chapters point to all-time attendance highs at the upcoming 12th Annual Grammy Awards on the evening of Wednesday, March 11.

New York reports "great enthusiasm and very brisk tickets sales" for its Lincoln Center awards ceremonies, with an SRO crowd expected at Alice Tully Hall. Los Angeles is contemplating the use of closed circuit TV for the expected 2,000 plus attending its ceremonies at the Century Plaza. Nashville has moved into the Municipal Auditorium to house its expected 1,000-plus attendees. Chicago expects to go over the 500 mark for the first time at the Ambassador West, while Atlanta is preparing for its initial Grammy presentations at the American Motor Hotel.

Kinney Income Gains In 1st Fiscal Quarter

NEW YORK — Kinney National Service, Inc. has reported record net income of \$8,671,000 in its first fiscal quarter ended Dec. 31, 1969 as compared with \$7,075,000 a year ago, a 23% gain.

Its key leisure-time activity is Warner Bros. Pictures, under which fall the Warner Bros. and Atlantic labels and Warner Bros. Music. William V. The figures for the quarter ended December 31, 1968 have been restated to reflect all poolings of interests.

Revenues were \$122,813,000 for the quarter, compared with \$120,482,000 in the similar period a year earlier.

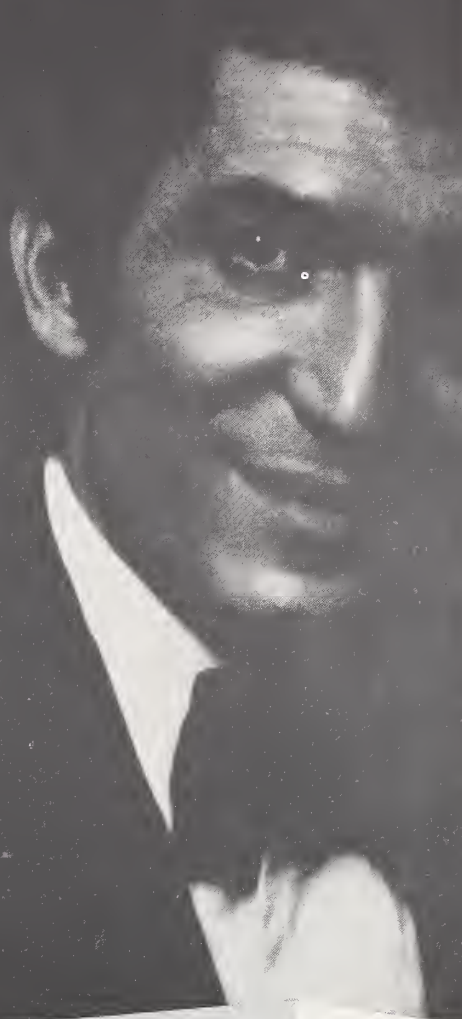

A Big City Sound

"Where The Music Is" is the way the people at WRKO-Boston like to refer to their station. And it seems a good choice of words, since this Top Forty station averages 18-19 singles per hour. Since its inception in March, 1967 when WRKO replaced an all talk station, there has been a steady upward drive rating-wise until now it has outdistanced the competition and maintains a #1 Pulse position in virtually all time periods.

"We work at keeping this thing entertaining," says program director Mel Phillips. "That means we try for a

much cleaner and more professional sound. We think we're succeeding and playing the best music in the city."

In addition to its top 40 format, WRKO prides itself on its promotional record. For example, the station recently sold copies of an oldies album over the phone. During a one month period, more than 53,000 pieces were moved — "a record which has not been equaled for that time period by any other radio station in the country," according to Phillips. Their latest contest, which just swung into high gear, is entitled "Heavy Wheels." Listeners are asked to guess the weight of a 1970 automobile with all the station's deejays aboard along with a certain amount of cash in coin.

From time to time, the station broadcasts editorial comments and these have met with good reaction from the Boston area audience. Recently, on the air they have backed proposals to lower the voting age to 18 and opposed the legalization of marijuana.

WRKO devotes a sizeable amount of programming time each week to public affairs. Among the organizations represented with regular broadcasts are the Salvation Army, Massachusetts Council of Churches, Wayne State University, Ambassador College and the University of Detroit. A two hour show, "The Now Generation," is aired each Sunday evening; it focuses on local topics of discussion and takes live phone calls from listeners.

Over the past New Year's holiday period, WRKO broadcast the Top 100 Hits of the Decade and distributed free two-color poster-type brochures as souvenirs. Each week, throughout the year, the station provides New England record outlets with 22,000 copies of their WRKO Top Thirty chart.

The audience, which is more or less in the 18-34 age range, is not limited to the Boston area. The station can be heard throughout eastern Massachusetts and also includes listeners from the nearby states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Rhode Island and Connecticut.

Bootlegger's Accomplice

There are thousands of good sounding titles in the music business. One or more to fit every job description. Another should be added to the lexicon . . . Bootlegger's Accomplice. This description fits many record store owners.

The unauthorized duplication of recorded work has grown to be one of the major problems of the music industry. The focus of the piracy problem has thus far been concerned with the copying of tape cartridges and cassettes. Last week, in a *Cash Box* article ("RIAA Hits Five Pressure Points to Combat \$100 Mil Tape Piracy," p. 7) it was pointed out that almost 1/3 of the annual tape sales, in all configurations, were pirate or counterfeit product. That's about \$100,000,000 in sales. An amazing figure.

However, that \$100 million did not take into account the pirating or bootlegging of disks. Tapes are obviously much easier to duplicate, package and merchandise and will therefore always represent much more than their fraudulent disk counterparts in terms of lost revenue. But the effect is the same; someone is taking what doesn't belong to him and making a profit on it. Disks have been chosen for comment because recent occurrences have pointed up just how flagrant the merchandising of bootleg product has become.

For example, there is a store in the immediate vicinity of the CB offices which has, on audacious display, three bootleg records for sale. Each of these LPs is packaged in plain sleeves. The titles are "The Great White Wonder," "The Silver Wonder" and "LIVER Than You'll Ever Be." "The Great White Wonder" is a collection of unauthorized Bob Dylan tapes which has been on sale around the country for a couple of months now. "The Silver Wonder" is supposedly a version of the

much delayed Beatles' album "Get Back." The last, "LIVER, etc" is an unauthorized recording of the Stones in concert. The store in question was advertising these 3 albums right out front as "bootleg" versions at \$5.98 each. The storeowner probably felt that honesty was the best policy. Incredible. If you wanted to buy an illegal record, you didn't even have to know a password that would give the shopkeeper the hint that he should get the contraband out from under the counter. Prohibition days must have been much more exciting.

But the situation is not funny at all. Rather, it is very sad that such flagrant abuses are being perpetrated. And that store is not an extreme case. Record stores all over New York City have little handwritten signs in their windows saying something like "Yes, we have 'The Great White Wonder.'" Of course there is a great demand for this kind of product. There are thousands of record collectors who will gobble up anything that artists like Dylan, The Beatles or The Rolling Stones have recorded . . . anytime, anywhere, regardless of the quality of the recording. And, certainly there will be those who are happy to supply that desire. But, why do record stores get involved in this obviously illicit trade? Money, that's why . . . simple answer. That's really discouraging. Somewhere in here, there is space for about 12 paragraphs about the breakdown of American moral fibre, crucifixion upon the cross of gold, things like that. But that's obvious.

And it should be obvious to record store owners. They, above all, should know a hell of a lot better. We can't hope to reform the persons committing the piracy, they are beneath dignity. There is no tie of brotherhood between record companies and retail outlets, but the store owners must realize the

ramifications which these unauthorized sales have, as far as the payment of royalties to copyright owners, performance societies, and the artists themselves are concerned. To knowingly conspire, an overused term since the Chicago "7" trial, with the people who are producing the bootleg product, puts such retailers in a similar despicable category. There is an even more important question than lost revenue to those concerned. In every case, the bootleg product is inferior in quality. If the artists had wanted the performances released, they would have done so themselves. No record store owner has the right to exercise the power to put into release any creation which the artist himself has not sanctioned.

Whenever there is a great deal of fast money to be made, it always seems somewhat useless to lecture anyone, especially the one who stands to make a bundle, on the need for a moral re-examination. With the record business flourishing as it is, there doesn't seem to be the need for retailers to willingly traffic in these illicit disks. This is indeed a shameful situation which demands policing . . . self policing.

EAST COAST GIRL OF THE WEEK: Micki Ackerman once stood precariously on the threshold of fame . . . and fell off. It was a couple of years ago when our ECGW got her shot at stardom, at a Barbara Lewis recording session. Micki was at the session and was pressed into service as one pair

of hands on a clapping track for the disk being cut. After a couple of tries, producer Arif Marden asked Micki to take her hands and get off the clapping squad . . . she wasn't clapping in time. Just as well, Micki's much happier doing what she does at Atlantic Records. Micki is responsible for putting together the eight page Atlantic/Atco/Cotillion weekly bulletin that is so familiar to everyone in the trade. In addition, Micki is the person who makes sure that all of the djs receive the new Atlantic, Atco and Cotillion releases and assists Bob Rolontz, the labels' publicity chief, in all of his publicity work. This story has a very happy ending. Micki is extremely content in her job and is fiercely loyal to the Atlantic family. That's really fortunate. After all, we all know the longevity of career handclappers.

THE SOUND OF NO GUITARS PLAYING: The Modern Rock Quartet, an outfit from Canada, stopped by to say hello this week. The MRQ just completed a gig at the Electric Circus and will be cutting a couple of demos for audition purposes with a couple of interested labels while they're in the city. Unfortunately, we did not get the chance to see them at the Circus, but they received a glowing notice from the New York Times' rock critic who pointed out that this was one of the first rock groups he had ever heard which had no electric guitar playing member. Their sound has been described as one with

Speaking Of Words

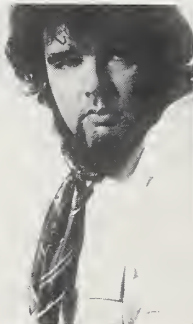
"The trouble with a spoken word series is that you hear a talk album one time, and where do you go from there," said Gary Usher recently. Gary, president of Together Records, has been thinking about spoken word disks quite heavily lately, since the label is planning to launch a contemporary series of conversations with leading figures of our time.

The first disk in the series, to be known as "Together With . . .", was to have featured philosopher Alan Watts, but Watt's album came out so well it is being released on its own. Usher's ideas on spoken word albums call for the proper use of sounds, to make the album more than a book would have been. The sound-on-sound technique, revolving around words, comes from Gary's days of producing the Firesign Theatre (he did their first album), who are masters of sound.

Anyway, Watts' album, "Why Not Now," which is subtitled "Dhyana, The Art Of Meditation," makes good use of sound (and, perhaps more important in this case, of silence) and points to new directions in the use of records for enlightening purposes.

Enlightened and mystical records are in for heavy sales growth, as the new generation looks for something to hang on to as the world floats away, but a record is a record, and has to be given that special quality that makes people want to come back to it again and again.

Producer's Profile



THE TOKENS
Hank, Jay, Mitch, Phil

December 7th is one of the most infamous days in American history. For Hank Medress, Jay Siegel, and Phil and Mitch Margo, December 7th, in 1959, was the day that the four of them, were to borrow a Mel Brooks routine, "looked up in the sky, put their hands on a rock and said . . ." we are a group. And lo, it came to pass that on that unusually warm December day 11 years ago in that modest middle class house in Brighton Beach, Brooklyn, The Tokens were created. Amazingly enough, the group is still together today . . . eleven years later. And they still dig each other.

If there were a graph illustrating the success of The Tokens as recording artists, it would have some very weird configurations. Hank Medress explains it by saying that "every ten years, our records mean something. So, by all rights, we should start preparing soon for our 1979 release." Actually, the time lag hasn't been that long. The group had a number of chart hits. Everybody remembers them: "He's In Town," "I Hear Trumpets Blow," and of course, their two certified monsters, "Portrait Of My Love" and "The Lion Sleeps Tonight," a two million seller. Now, The Tokens have embarked upon their 1st ten-year revival, hitting the charts with "She Lets Her Hair Down" and their current Buddah release, "Don't Worry Baby" which just came on the CB charts this week at 81 with a bullet.

But, wait a minute, this a producer's profile. The period between The Token's recording resurgence was anything but fallow. They were fairly busy. Sometime, right about the time "Lion . . ." was soaring, "Phil and I," Hank said, "got into a 'rap'—only then it was called a conversation—about the longevity of an artist's career. It was right there that we decided to go into production." As a production unit, The Tokens started off with a nice deal with Capitol Records. Capitol provided the guys with a sizeable annual budget which they managed to spend in three weeks.

So much for producing with Capitol. Moving right along from that point, The Tokens got a fairly good break. A friendly secretary referred a group named The Chiffons to them. To flog a dead horse of a cliché once again, the rest is history. The Tokens had four big hits with The Chiffons including "He's So Fine,"

"One Fine Day" and "Sweet Talking Guy," the latter in conjunction with Laurie Records.

At that time as Phil Margo explains it, "We had a one room office with a piano and a dart board. We paid about a dollar-thirty a month in rent and we had five records on the charts at the same time." Those five Tokens produced disks were The Chiffons' "He's So Fine" and the follow-up "One Fine Day," "Denise" by Randy and the Rainbows, "My Block" by The 4 Pennies and their own "Hear The Bells." Three of those records went top 10.

Then, The Tokens founded their own B.T. Puppy. There is a very logical explanation behind the name B.T. Puppy which will not be disclosed for fear of destroying a record industry myth. But, if you have a B.T. Puppy record, take notice that the little dog's eye is mysteriously closed and the animal is in a posture of supplication.

The first group which The Tokens produced for B.T. Puppy was one called The 4 Graduates. Their initial outing was a stone bomb. Hank Medress, relying on a little inbred Hebraic logic, figured that maybe the group would be a success with another name. Hank was right. The 4 Graduates became The Happenings and their first record, "See You In September," well, everybody knows what happened. That song is probably being played on some radio station right this minute. The Happenings followed that with another giant, "Go Away Little Girl."

But there's even more to The Tokens. They also have a great track record in the production of advertising jingles. It all started when an ad exec (which is short for advertising agency executive) asked The Tokens if they could do some jingles using the "teenage lingo." "After correcting the exec by telling him the proper phrase was 'teenage jargon,' we started producing commercials," Hank told us. The Tokens are a self contained commercial production unit. They write, play, arrange, and mix all of the jingles for which they are contracted. They've done commercials for Adams Sour Gum, Dentyne, Pan Am, Schmidt's Beer, Breckset, Cool Whip, Chesterfield's Silly Millimeter Longer campaign, Shake A Puddin', Ideal Toys, Dodge, Emmanee Toys and, lest we forget, the almost legendary Great Shakes commercials. The group also performed on many of these commercials.

The Tokens are now in the process of setting up a jingle production firm. On the record production front, they are producing their own recordings and The Chiffons once again, for Buddah, a writer/performer/commentator named Brute Force, and actor/singer Lou Gossett. Judging from past performances, The Tokens are sure to be adding to their total of 35 chart disks with more than 15,000,000 records sold. On top of this, their ten year recording revival seems to be accelerating which will probably mean a full schedule of personal appearances. With everything happening so fast, we hope that the boys will have time to attend The Tokens' bar mitzvah celebration two years hence.

Decca 'Airport' Promo In Flight

NEW YORK — Decca Records has announced an extensive merchandising and promotion campaign to accompany the release of the original soundtrack album of the Universal film, "Airport." The score was composed by Oscar winner Alfred Newman, who died recently.

Decca's campaign will be geared to the film's world premiere engagement at the Radio City Music Hall on March 5. A special preview was held March 2 at the 1,127 seat Cinerama Theater. Trade and consumer press, record distributors and dealers and disk jockeys were invited. Special invitations simulating boarding passes were designed for the preview. Authentic stewardesses collected and distributed soundtrack albums.

Special mailings to disk jockeys are also scheduled of the Bantam paperback of "Airport," along with TWA luggage tags carrying the TWA

logo and the phrase: "'Airport' Soundtrack on Decca Records." Miniature bottles of liquor, similar to those served in flight, will also be distributed, with special stickers stating: "This Scotch was served on board the Argosy — 'Airport' Soundtrack on Decca Records."

Several radio contests have been arranged, including one with Joe O'Brien on NBC offering 50 albums to winners of O'Brien's "Quickie Quiz" contest. Other stations already set in the New York area include WHN and WNEW, with others to be added.

Several hundred promotional kits have been made available to retailers. The kits include a three-part mobile showing the album covers in full size; a double-easel counter card of the album cover; clean-stick lithos of the album covers; ten 8 x 10 glossies from the film; and ad mats for local advertising. Models dressed as stewardesses will be hired to deliver the soundtrack LP to radio stations around the country.

Capitol's Ford Deck To Nation's Leaders

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol Records is gifting President Nixon, senators, congressmen and governors with copies of "America The Beautiful," the new album by Tennessee Ernie Ford.

The gift album includes a letter from Ford, which reads, in part, "There's a grand old song that goes, 'O say, does that star-spangled banner still wave o'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?' It does, and I know it always will, as long as we all continue to care about that great thing we all have in common: this land we love."

"America the Beautiful," which was released Feb. 16, includes "America," "America, I Love You," "Battle Hymn of the Republic," "God Bless America," "Our Land, O Lord," "The Pledge Of Allegiance," "The Star Spangled Banner," "This Is My Country" and "This Land Is Your Land."

Cite Choral Pageant

VALLEY FORGE, PA — The National Awards Jury of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge announced this week the selection of the choral pageant "Our Country 'Tis Of Thee" and ASCAP writer Ruth Roberts to receive the George Washington Honor Medal for the outstanding program of 1969.

The choral work, a musical history from John Smith to today, was cited for outstanding accomplishment in helping to achieve a better understanding of the American way of life.

Plans are underway for public recognition of the award to be made in three cities, Boston, Providence and New York, with special citations going to the Peter Pan Childrens' Chorus, Scott Paper who produced the visuals, and Michael Brent Publications, Inc., ASCAP, who publish the score.

Bye-Bye Birmingham," written by Delaney Bramlett and Mac Davis and produced by Bones Howe, whose records particularly with The Fifth Dimension, have made him one of the most in-demand producers in the industry.

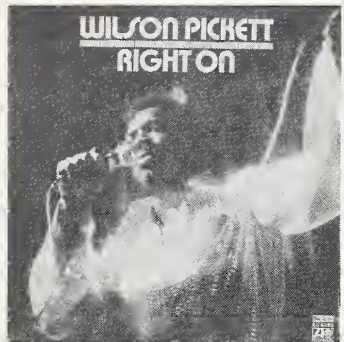
TRAVELIN' — Tommy James and the Shondells — Roulette SR 42044

Currently rising on the Top 100 with their single, "Gotta Get Back To You," Tommy James and the Shondells should be rising on the Top 100 Albums in the near future with their new set, "Travelin'." Set contains the hit single and a host of other funky rock numbers, most of them by James and Bob King. Group seems to have been influenced quite a bit by Creedence Clearwater Revival.



EMPTY ROOMS — John Mayall — Polydor 24-4010

Mayall freaks will be thrilled to see this, the latest contribution from the British bluesman and his band. This is all new material and relies heavily on down home blues and country influences. The LP is soft, quiet and gently rocking, lacking the brashness of the currently charted live LP of old Mayall tapes on the London label. That could be a positive or negative quality depending on how you like to hear your blues. Set has already joined the London album on the charts.



RIGHT ON — Wilson Pickett — Atlantic SD 8250

One of the most together of all black vocalists, Wilson Pickett offers an album that hits home from the hard rocking "You Keep Me Hangin' On" to the jumpy "Groovy Little Woman" to a heavy interpretation of "Hey Joe" to the gospel "Steal Away." Also of note on this LP are the rhythm sections — Cold Grits and the Muscles Shoals Sound Rhythm Section — along with some soulful horn and vocal backgrounds which add the proper excitement to Pickett's natural talent. Pure funk. Should be on the charts soon.



CLIMBING! — Mountain — Windfall 4501

This is the second album from Mountain and it is better. It is cleaner in studio sound reproduction, tighter in its arrangements and simply beautiful rock — loud and heady. There are certain cuts ("To My Friend," "The Laird") that are soft and feature some fine solo guitar work and there are other crashing numbers that soar high above the mountain tops. Take a deep draught of electric air as you look back down through the clouds and remember who helped you up there. Should be a sizeable item.



LIKE IT IS, LIKE IT WAS — The Dells — Cadet 837

This is an R&B/pop deck that devotes side 1 to new material and side 2 to oldies. On side 1, of course, is the Dell's new single release that is in the Top 40 and some other soulful material. Side 2 includes such numbers as "Darling, Dear," "Since I Fell For You," "Nadine," "Long, Lonely Nights" and "Off Shore." The four-part harmony behind the raspy lead voice is accented by the standard R&B brass and strings orchestration. Very faithful to the revival sound. Watch this one.



THE BEST OF MASEKELA — Hugh Masekela — Uni-73051

Trumpet whiz Hugh Masekela, who really clicked with his single of "Grazing In The Grass," delivers that song and some other African-styled goodies on a deck which should prove eminently appetizing for his many fans. Hugh soars on the Miriam Makeba opus, "Bajabula Bonke (The Healing Song)," and on Jim Webb's "Up-Up And Away." Winning set which should find itself a niche on the charts.

Pop Best Bets



GREAT SPECKLED BIRD — Ampex A10103

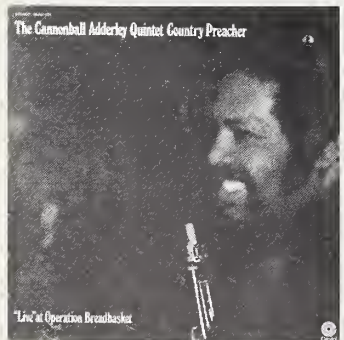
This is the debut album of Ian and Sylvia's new group, Great Speckled Bird. The two Canadian singers lead the six member folk-country-rock ensemble with vocals and some instrumentals and produce an LP that is a blend of the duo's old and new styles. Good-timey and fully enjoyable, the deck combines their exciting voices with some clean instrumental work, especially on guitar and pedal steel. With the backing of their new Ampex label and this album, Ian & Sylvia could really make it up there where they belong.



BABY BOY — Fred Hughes — Brunswick BL 754157

Fred Hughes is an excellent R&B singer, and this album is well worth attention. The artist delivers all his material in a highly professional manner, and his backing is equally professional. Cuts include his single, "Oo Wee Baby I Love You," "The Son Of Hickory Hollow's Tramp," "Georgia On My Mind" and "San Francisco Is A Lonely Town." Could do nicely.

COUNTRY PREACHER — Cannonball Adderley Quintet — Capitol SKAO-404

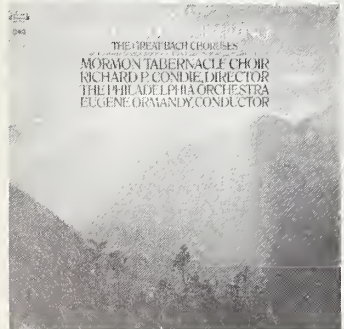
Cannonball Adderley has earned himself a place among the greats of jazz, and this album, recorded live in Chicago, can only serve to enhance his reputation. A fervent spirit and a driving dedication shine through on "Afro-Spanish Omet," a four part track which takes up most of the second side. Other highlights: Nat Adderley's "Hummin'" and the title tune, an exercise in mellow musicianship. This exciting LP could do quite nicely.



THE BEST OF JOHN COLTRANE — Atlantic SD 1541

John Coltrane. His name is spoken with reverence by jazz musicians. His untimely death left a void which has yet to be filled. This album reminds us once more of what a towering talent he was. It has the incredibly beautiful 13-minute-plus track of "My Favorite Things," also "Equinox," "Central Park West," "Naima" and "Cousin Mary." Sidesmen include McCoy Tyner, piano, and Elvin Jones, drums. An outstanding collection of truly great classics.

JESU, JOY OF MAN'S DESIRING-THE GREAT BACH CHORUSES — Mormon Tabernacle Choir/Condie/Philadelphia Orchestra/Ormandy — Columbia MS 7405

The Mormon Tabernacle Choir, Richard Condie, director; and the Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, conductor, have joined forces on other albums, and their recording of Handel's "Messiah" became one of the few classical packages to earn a gold album award. This album contains magnificent performances of a host of Johann Sebastian Bach's greatest choruses and should delight many listeners. Fine set.



HEROLD: LE PREX AUX CLERCS (FROM THE OPERA IN THREE ACTS) — Orchestre Symphonique / Etcheverry / Doria / LeBris/Louvey/Giannotti/Senechal/Legros — Music Guild (ABC) — MS 873

French composer Louis Joseph F. Herold (1791-1833) is known primarily for his often performed "Zampa" Overture. This album of excerpts from his 3-act opera, "Le Prex Aux Clercs," shows that Herold's accomplishments extend beyond one work. The music on this set is tasteful and engaging and deserves to be heard.

Ampex Bin-Loop System High Speed Duplicates Cassettes & Cartridges

REDWOOD CITY, CALIF. — Ampex' professional audio products division has just marketed a master duplicator system for high speed reproduction of both stereo cassettes and cartridges. Designed for use by tape duplication companies producing consumer materials, the system includes a Model BLM-200 bin-loop reproducer and Model 3400 slave assembly. An electronic card rack with assemblies and a bias amplifier can be added to convert the BLM-200 and slave assembly from cassette to cartridge configuration work. The cartridge version can be used for cassette production without rewiring for cables.

Slave units may also be modified to record open reel copies.

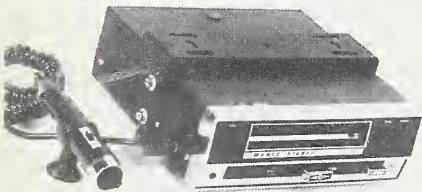
According to division vp & general manager A.A. Sroka, "use of the bin-loop technique greatly improves efficiency in audio tape duplication because no time is lost in rewinding the master tape. Also, tape waste is reduced in the bin-loop unit resulting in user economies."

The bin-loop concept, he explained, uses a single continuous loop of magnetic tape pulled by transport evenly over the reproduce heads. Program material is ready to start again from the beginning immediately upon completion of a program, without rewinding.

Ampex' BLM-200 master duplicator is a self-contained unit equipped with a bin-loop tape transport, reproduce head and preamplifier assembly, reproduce amplifiers, record amplifiers and a bias supply. It is capable of driving up to 10 slave assemblies without further amplification, at 16 times speed of the original recording speed, and provisions are made so that the number of the slaves can be increased up to 20 per master assembly with additional record and bias amplifiers in the master unit.

With the BLM-200, a 1,200-foot length of tape can be duplicated in approximately one and one-half minutes at 120 inches per second, providing six hours of music when played back at 3-3/4 inches per second on a home system.

Muntz Offers First Car Cassette Model



VAN NUYS, CALIF. — Muntz Stereo-Pak has introduced the company's first car cassette unit. The Muntz 9200 is being marketed with a retail tag of \$119.95.

The system features safety interlock system to prevent accidental erasure and recording, operates on 12-volt D.C. power and has a 6-watt output.

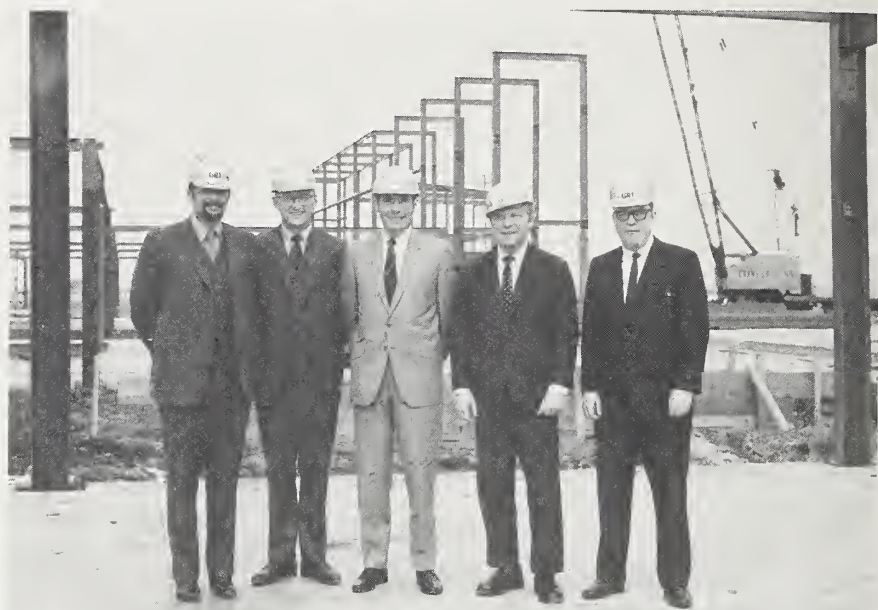
"The agreement will give Ampex the rights to distribute the recorded tapes in the United States and Canada," said Don Hall, Ampex vice president and general manager of AST.

Capitol's Harvest Label Nurtures 'Lively, Legitimate' Underground

HOLLYWOOD — Although the music responsible for the creation of the term 'underground' has surfaced to the pop world, leading to various scholarly discussions of 'underground going pop' similar to the 'jazz is dead' talk that has been going on for more than a decade, there is still a legitimate underground. Consisting of avant-garde experimental music that is not yet ready for vast public acclaim, the underground continues to flourish both here and abroad, waiting for its turn in the pop spotlight.

Working on the philosophy "We're not where it's at, we're where it's going to be," EMI and Capitol Records have set out to establish a new subsid, Harvest, as their own answer to the independent labels that helped nourish the underground music of the early sixties. "We had no illusions about immediate massive breakouts," said Capitol VP and national merchandising manager Rocco Catena about the initial Harvest release of five albums in November, "we're looking to the future. In six months to two years, we hope to have established a strong label identity that will be meaningful to the consumer who's looking for something different. We know our merchandise is only suitable for certain types of dealers, and our people are making a concentrated effort on promoting the line to about 750 key accounts."

The initial release was introduced with a heavy merchandising campaign, and the label's new release is also being accompanied by a strong campaign. "We want everybody to

know that Capitol has made a long term commitment to insure the success of Harvest and that it wasn't just another experiment which would soon disappear. Despite the fact that we weren't aiming at the racks, we've already had good rack acceptance of the two-record set, "Umma-gumma," by Pink Floyd. In England, where Harvest has been in operation a little bit longer, they've already scored with three chart LP's."

No Red Tape

Harvest was originally set up by EMI to overcome the shortcomings of a big label in dealing with and exposing new artists. In a drastic departure from EMI's usual policy, control of the label was placed outside of the usual exec structure in the hands of Malcolm Jones. Jones, together with Andrew King and Peter Jenner of Blackhill Ent. (promoters of the free Hyde Park concerts and a major management and booking office) sought to create a label free of the usual red tape, where the artist would be dealt with on a personal level instead of being shuffled around.

When Capitol decided to handle Harvest here, they followed the same procedure, designating Walter Wanger as merchandising project manager for Harvest. Harvest was meant to be an international label and Wanger has already added two U. S. artists to the label. One, the Fourth Way, is represented by an album in the current releases, which also includes sets by Roy Harper, Chris Spedding's Battered Ornaments, Kevin Ayers and Forest. The other, poet Richard Brautigan, will have his first album out in April.

"All facets of merchandising, promotion and packaging of Harvest product are designed to call attention to the entire line. We're attempting to supply more information on the label and its artists, and we're already being rewarded with the increasing attention given our product by college papers, which has also resulted in the underground papers starting to pick up on the LP's," Wanger said.

"We're recognizing the responsibility that record companies have in supporting the artists that will be creating the trends of the future," said Catena, being very aware that in the music business, the future is just around the corner.

ATI Adds Two Agents In Expansion Thrust

NEW YORK — ATI (formerly Action Talents) has named two new agents to their New York staff. This move is in line with ATI's recent announcements of planned expansion in New York and the forthcoming establishment of offices in three other locations.

Named as agents are Mike Levy and Mike Slobin. Levy's duties will cover the one nighter, rock and New England college areas. Levy will also be forming a jazz department. Levy was formerly with Associated Booking where he was active in the one nighter and jazz departments. Prior to joining ABC he was road manager for the late Wes Montgomery, Ramsey Lewis and Nancy Wilson.

Slobin will be involved in the booking of underground rooms and clubs, colleges and promoters in the mid-West. Slobin, comes to ATI from Zell Enterprises. Prior to that he was Mercury Records as vice president and tour coordinator for the Flying Bear Medicine Show. He has also worked for CMA, as head of the record department, and Ashley Famous, in the concert and night club department.

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Talent On Stage

TEN YEARS AFTER — JOHN HAMMOND

FILMORE EAST, N.Y.C. — Alvin Lee and the boys returned to the Fillmore East stage this weekend and delivered the kind of standout set which has come to be expected (and even demanded by some of the more vocal members of the audience) from this British quartet. The real news of the evening was a couple of new numbers showing that the group is heading deeper into a blues sound and with good results.

"Working on the Road, Part I" made its debut as did a song entitled "50,000 Miles Beneath My Brain." Both benefitted from the strong hard-blues delivery of Alvin and some excellent guitar work by bass player Leo Lyons and Alvin himself.

Then there were the old favorites: "Good Morning, Little School Girl," it seems to get raunchier with the passing of time. And better too. This is really the type of song which Ten Years After can fly on. It is a perfect vehicle for Alvin, who gets into it body and soul, and for the other members of the group, who seem to relish the playing of every note in what has be-

come their classic version. "Goin' Home" had the Fillmore audience dancing in the aisles; it was great to hear that one again too.

"We're going to do one that had our grandparents bopping," announced Alvin introducing the band's encore, "Sweet Little Sixteen." What a stomper this turned out to be. (We all knew it would.) Ten Years After made their exit while the crowd clamored for more. Has it ever been otherwise where they have played? They've got to be one of the most dynamic and visually exciting rock n roll bands in existence.

Atlantic recording artist John Hammond was on hand and he stirred things up considerably. He works with a very tight group consisting of himself on guitar, along with a drummer and a bass guitarist. His country blues was a welcome sound in the halls of Fillmore; his treatment of the Chuck Berry rocker "Brown Eyed Handsome Man" showed that he is a talent of the first order.

CashBox Musical Theatre Review

GEORGY

WINTER GARDEN, N.Y.C. — "With me it's all or nothing" has moved from Ado Annie's chant to the unvoiced slogan of this season's Broadway musicals. And that is most unfortunate, especially for the semi-precious shows that have folded in their first week despite enjoyability.

"Georgy," is thus placed in an awkward position. It is neither "all" nor "nothing"; but rather a finely wrought adaptation of the movie "Georgy Girl" that attempts to be merely entertainment. It is staged for enjoyment without the spectacle to match the major musical hits, or the volume to compete with off-Broadway musicals. And, because it is cute and attractive "Georgy" may find it difficult to support itself on the avenue.

The music by George Bischoff and Carole Bayer is well suited to the niceness that glints in the production, but this leaves the play short of expectations for viewers awaiting a "Georgy Girl." Numbers like the opener "How-

ja Do," the 1st Act finale, and a sentimental "Sweet Memories" stand out and they emphasize the problem of Broadway's all/nothing syndrome for it would be shameful to relegate such material to the cluster of mortality victims amassed by this season's fallen musicals.

The staging characterizations, and performances by nearly the entire cast deserve better than Broadway relegation. Hopefully, "Georgy" can weather its first few days, long enough to build a word-of-mouth reputation that will attract viewers seeking an evening's enjoyment rather than spectacle or social comment.

ASTRUD GILBERTO

RAINBOW GRILL, N. Y. C. —High above Manhattan stood Astrud Gilberto making her first major New York nightclub appearance. In a semi-circle before her sat an audience which was to be captivated by a performance of flawless grace and impeccable delivery.

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EDDY ARNOLD

EMPIRE ROOM — Eddy Arnolds' illustrious career as a performer—including the sale of 60 million records for RCA—had not, unbelievably, included a night club appearance in New York. Carnegie Hall concerts, yes; supper club dates, no. This gross gap in Arnold's career was partially atoned for last week when he opened at the Empire Room, filling this auditorium-sized eatery with uncommon warmth and audience rapport. Arnold is, by his own admission, a "Heinz 57 singer," that is an artist who does not limit his repertoire to a single area of music. He backs up this remark by performing about two dozen songs over the 1 hour, 10 minute span of his act.

Arnold's voice is strong and sure;

it's tailor-made for his basic romanticism and, incidentally, is needed to overcome a robust, if not at times overwhelming, full-blown orchestra backdrop. His repertoire, true to his self-description, runs from folk ("Wreck of the Old 97,") country (his own hits and those of others), "now" pop ("Jean" and "Soul Deep") and old pop favorites ("Sittin' On Top of the World"). Eddy Arnold, in short, is an American institution of song, very much a "living-legend" who, in this era of "sound," continues to contribute a sincere, rich bouquet of sentiment. New York needs to be reminded of this somewhat lost are.

SONNY & CHER

FAIRMONT HOTEL, S.F. — They used to laugh at Sonny Bono for the way he dressed, but now that he's had his nose straightened and is wearing tuxedos, the laughs only come after the jokes that freely flow between Sonny and his wife and partner, Cher. It's a long and seldom travelled road that leads from the Whisky A Go Go to the very plush Venetian Room of the Fairmont Hotel (and next month, to L.A.'s Westside Room), but the Atco Records duo, slightly aged and very experienced, have made the transition smoothly.

Actually, little has changed since those early days, except for the songs. Cher is still providing the real voice, while Sonny gets applause for trying his best. When he sings solo, as he did on "My Way," Sonny substitutes

feeling for precision and remains effective, but the show belongs to Cher's deadpan humor, as she quietly sits on her chair and aims verbal barbs at her pacing husband, hitting him everytime.

Cher's version of "I Believe," which takes a sudden twist at the end, could make a heavy single. She also shines on "Bang Bang," but even though she does an outstanding job on "Danny Boy," the tune just seems lost. Only two old S&C hits were performed, "I Got You Babe" (made popular by Tiny Tim) and "The Beat Goes On" (popularized by Plymouth).

The audience, composed of Fairmont regulars, loved every minute of the show, pointing to a great future for the pair in clubs.

CHARLIE BROWN

BITTER END, N.Y.C. — Say Charlie Brown to people and the weebegone cartoon figure pops into their minds, but that may all be changing. Say the name to anyone who saw the singer-composer-guitarist Charlie Brown at the Bitter End. Yes, this Georgia-born musician is coming to the fore after years of rattling round studios and sitting in at other people's gigs. No doubt about it, he set the Bitter End audience on its ear.

Charlie's got the kind of richly textured voice most would-be-blues singers would trade their whole stack of Robert Johnson records for. It gets into the recesses of a song like "January Sunshine" to evoke the loneliness of wintry days; then Charlie turns it loose on the defiant "I Got" and it's all there.

His set was comprised of a number of songs from his first Polydor album, "Up From Georgia." Most of them are his own compositions. At least one of them, "House By The Sea," held the audience spellbound. It's poignant lyrics, coupled with a sensitive interpretation by Charlie made it a powerful statement which few who heard it will easily forget.

In the song "Up From Georgia," and infectious, hard-picking down-homer, Charlie sings "New York City/Ain't it pretty?/Who'd have thought I'd have to wait so long?" For Charlie, the waiting is over; and for people who dig honest to God talent, well, just say the name Charlie Brown. Remember when you used to think of "Peanuts?"

L. A. CLUBS

Bossa Rio, the new Sergio Mendes-produced group on Blue Thumb, gave a special one-night only show at Donte's, a valley jazz club, to an enthusiastic audience. Although the group uses the basic Brazil rhythm, they are different enough from Mendes' group to make their own place in the MOR market. Use of a male and female vocal team, coupled with increased use of jazz sounds, gives the group a good edge.

Herbie Hancock, a highly-rated jazz pianist, is currently making a bid for the pop market via his new Warner Bros. disk, but for his current stint at Shelly's Manne-Hole, he stays primarily in the jazz bag. Backed by a strong group, which includes Joe Henderson on sax and flute, Hancock lays down some exciting music on both acoustic and electric piano. "Fat Albert Rotunda," from the new LP, does showcase Hancock in a pop vein, and he comes off with full honors. Until he gains pop acceptance, however, Hancock will continue to ride high with the jazz crowd.

Jennifer, one of the original stars of L.A. "Hair," brought her new act into the Troubadour this week. Jennifer has talent, but the problem seems to be to develop it in the right direction. In her opening stint, she toyed with hard-rock, soft ballads, novelty country and psuedo-country and folk. Her best moments came when she turned to humor, specifically her "frog-princess" story. Too many bags spoil the artist.

Roy Harper, a new Harvest artist

from England, showed some talent in his Troubadour debut, but his long (over-long) songs proved too much for the audience. Perhaps with time and understanding, Harper may prove an important solo artist (although the addition of electric backing might not hurt), but he'll have to learn to pick stage material that the 'hurry-up and finish, I've got to be somewhere soon' American audiences can better appreciate. Meanwhile, his English album, now available here, might prove a better introduction to his unique viewpoint and insights.

Ye Little Club in Beverly Hills is exhibiting two personable, attractive, vocally articulate and musical performers. In the rich tradition of Lou Rawls, O.C. Smith and Joe Williams, Richard Williams demonstrates a warm baritone, an expansive range and a fine sense of rhythm. Backed by piano, guitar and drums, he is particularly impressive on ballads. Williams will soon be heard on Quad, Four Star International's new label. First single will be titled "Mary on the Beach."

Betty Rhodes, seen here last at the Playboy several years back, is a former actress turned musical comedy performer (she recently toured with "Jacques Brel is Alive and Well" and will soon return to the show) might now be labeled comedienne-impersonator and songstress. Her forte is the dramatic vignette and she makes the most of Brel's "Carousel" and "Marique" and a medley of "Cabaret" tunes.

L&H Studios to Open, Will Serve Philly

PHILADELPHIA — L&H Recording Studios have been completed and aim at serving the greater Philadelphia area beginning on Mar. 1. The studios are located at 6027 Crescent Blvd., Pennsauken, N.J.

The new sound installation comprises 16-track Ampex MM 1000 recorder and a custom-built console by Electrodyne. It can accommodate virtually any sized group including a full symphony orchestra.

L&H facilities include three separate studios. The dimensions of Studio "A" measure 50 x 60 x 15 feet; Studio "B", which will be utilized for medium-sized requirements, is 25 x 35 x 15 feet, and Studio "C" was designed for "voice-over" recordings.

Gately Electronics, of Havertown, Pa., was selected by L&H to serve both as consultants and to install the equipment.

Bob Lowden, of Philadelphia, who has earned a wide reputation for his talents as a conductor, arranger and composer, will head up the creative staff of the new studios. Bill Hamilton, of Philadelphia, was named general operational manager.

Bagley's 'Re-Visits' Promoted To 'Theatre Conscious' Markets

NEW YORK — Ben Bagley's series of "Re-visits" to top writers of the American musical theatre is receiving strong attention in "theatre conscious" cities.

In New York, for instance, ad programs run in cooperation with Goody's and Korvette's have been so successful that Crewe Records, distributors of four albums in the line, will open campaigns in at least six other cities.

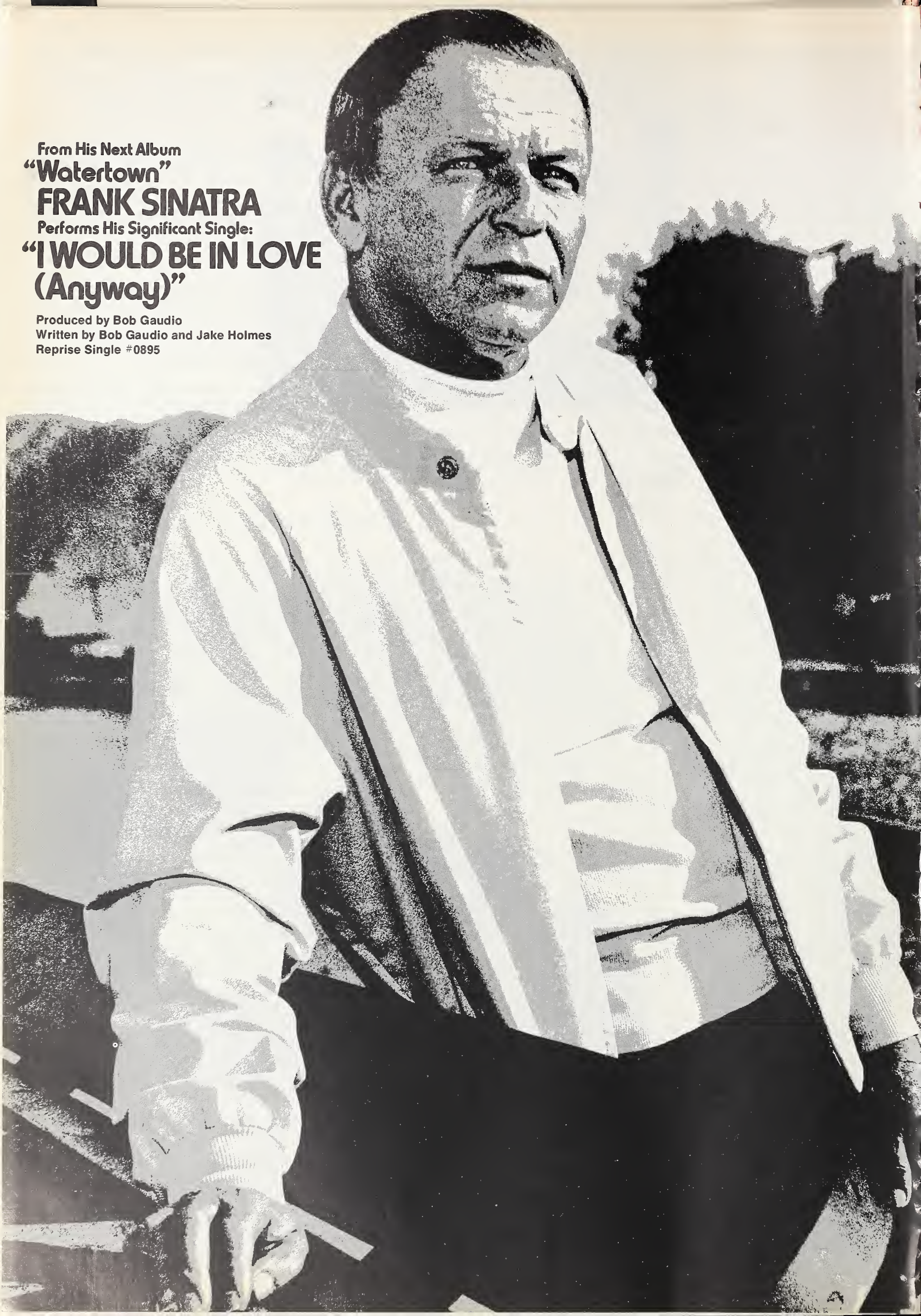

Glickman's firm has exclusive personal management on Golden Earring for the Western hemisphere.

The New Dawn head, also scheduled meetings with Ted Feigen, of White Whale Records, which just acquired the master of a new Dutch group, Ginger Ale, through Glickman, for immediate release. The side, already released in Holland is titled, "The Flood."

Garner, whose past experience has ranged from singer, producer to promotion man, will be working in the sales and promotion capacity at both the R&B and pop music levels.

Disk Acts 'Soft-Sell' Copyright Amendment

NEW YORK — A flow of disk acts to Washington is the soft-sell method by the National Committee for the Recording Arts (NCRA) to make the Williams Amendment a part of the proposed revision of the Copyright Act. This amendment, advanced by Sen. Harrison Williams (D-New Jersey) would provide royalty payments for recording artists, musicians, arrangers and record companies each time their recordings are played for profit.

Stereo Spot Ads For Crewe's Fox LP

NEW YORK — Crewe Records is unveiling a unique FM radio spot campaign on its new British group, The Fox. According to Tom Rogan, national promotion manager, the campaign, to last two weeks, and incorporating over 1,000 individual one-minute spots, has been produced in stereo especially for FM radio use.

Lasting from March 2 to 14, the campaign has been spotted on 10 major FM outlets in eight key markets, including New York, Pittsburgh, Chicago, Detroit, Philadelphia, Boston, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The stereo spots, which make the most of the opportunities available through two-channel showcasing, by almost exclusive use of music from the LP, with a minimum of spoken identification and sell, are being coordinated with a massive promotion at the distributor-dealer level. The merchandising includes quantity copies of the special Fox poster, which is included as a tear-off perforated wrap-around on the album itself, plus Fox calendars. Both are suitable for dealer displays and are available in extra quantities through the Crewe office in New York.

The Fox LP, first in a projected series of new sets produces through an exclusive production deal with Panda Productions in London, is already generating radio air play, with particular interest focussing on "Madame Magical," a 9:38 cut. The entire Fox promo has also included a massive mailing effort on the LP, and posters and calendars to AM, FM and college radio outlets across the country.

Singleton Music Full Steam Ahead

NASHVILLE — Shelby Singleton Music, Inc. is in high gear with several new releases by major artists.

A Mark Charron penning, "Chains of Love," has been recorded by Ronnie Dove and released on the Diamond label. Publication rights are also held by the firm on the Flamingos' Polydor single, "Buffalo Soldier," written by Singleton writers Margaret Lewis and Myra Smith in collaboration with David Barnes.

John Singleton, SS Music V.P., announced that "He Made A Woman Out Of Me" — published through the company's Green Isle Music affiliate — has been recorded by Capitol artist Bobbie Gentry during sessions in Muscle Shoals, Ala.

Friend And Lover With Cadet/Concept

CHICAGO — Friend and Lover (Jim and Kathy Post) have signed an exclusive recording contract with Cadet/Concept Records.

Prior to coming to Cadet/Concept, they recorded with Verve-Forcast where they had a hit single called "Reach Out In The Darkness." Their first single on Cadet/Concept, released last week, is "Hard Lovin'" b/w "Colorado Exile." The single was cut in Chicago and backed by Jim Schwall and Russ Chadwick of the Siegal-Schwall blues band.

Jim Post, known as a record producer, will also be creating product for Cadet/Concept. His first production assignment will be announced shortly.

NCRA, headed by Stan Kenton, has been waging the soft sell battle in Washington by bringing in name recording artists for personal visits with various legislators to express their views. In recent months Nancy Wilson, Guy Lombardo, Jimmy Driftwood, Tex Ritter, Bing Crosby, Mitch Miller, Glen Campbell, Tony Bennett, Peggy Lee, Herb Alpert and Artie Shaw have all taken an afternoon from their schedules for these important visits.

Lined up for near future trips are Billy Daniels, Johnny Mathis, Barbara McNair, Frankie Laine, Jack Jones, Jimmy Dean, Carmen McRae, Kay Starr, Wayne Newton, Freddy Martin, Kay Stevens, Harry James, Archie Campbell, Johnny Cash and Boots Randolph.

According to Kenton, the trips can be made at the artist's convenience, either while they are performing anywhere near the Washington area or have some free time in their schedules. All arrangements can be made through Doug Neal at the NCRA office at 1012 S. Robertson Blvd., Los Angeles, (213) 657-1431. Someone will accompany the artist during this visit with the Senators to field any technical questions regarding the issue. NCRA will take care of any expenses incurred by the artist for these trips.

Yarbrough To Aid Underprivileged Kids

LOS ANGELES — Glenn Yarbrough, Warner Brothers recording artist has fulfilled a life long dream by establishing a school for underprivileged children called SCHOLE. The singer is currently on a national tour interviewing the first group of children and performing concerts, most of the proceeds of which will help support the \$1,000,000 project.

Located in the San Bernardino mountains in California, SCHOLE will institute new educational techniques and will offer the carefully chosen children a unique learning experience with the best available recreational facilities in wholesome surroundings that would not otherwise be available to them. Yarbrough has named Dr. John Sage director of the school, which opens its first class, in September 1970.

Glenn, who planned to retire in 1969, has rescheduled his bookings and intends to perform until the school's goals are met and the school is self-sufficient, at which time he will become a SCHOLE teacher.

Proceeds from many of his Warner Brothers albums as well as concert and club appearances are donated by Yarbrough to SCHOLE for initial financing of the school.

CMA Forms Open Forum Committee

NASHVILLE — The Country Music Association has formed the Nashville Open Forum Committee as a new service to country music. Meetings of the committee will be held weekly on Wednesday mornings at 9:00 am at Chambers Restaurant on 21st Avenue South.

The committee is chaired by Joe Talbot and is composed of the following members: George Broadhead, Danny Davis, Hubert Long, Shelby Singleton, Bill Williams and Lawton Williams. One or more members of the committee will meet with any members of the music industry at the Wednesday morning sessions to answer questions and hold discussions about the Country Music Association, its varied activities and problem areas of mutual interest.

It is hoped that activation of this committee will trigger similar groups across the nation where there is active interest in Country Music. The committee's formation is an attempt to bring the Association activities in closer consonance with the needs of the individual members. Problem areas brought before the committee will be seriously studied and specific actions taken as necessary whenever

possible. The name Open Forum was deliberately selected so that members of the country music industry would recognize that the committee is a sounding board for correction of old ideas and consideration of new ones.

CMA To Seek New Members In Atlanta

NASHVILLE — The Country Music Association will host a luncheon meeting in Atlanta, Georgia on April 13 in the Tudor Room of the Regency-Hyatt House to introduce the values of membership in the CMA to over a hundred music industry businessmen. The meeting will be under the guidance of CMA directors Jack Geldbart and Wade Pepper.

Master of Ceremonies will be Ralph Emery of WSM fame who is also a CMA Director. The businessmen will be presented with a short program to acquaint them with the benefits of CMA membership. This first of a kind meeting will be in coordination with the regular quarterly meeting of the board of directors and officers of the CMA.

Capitol recording artist Merle Haggard received a standing ovation from country music fans recently at the conclusion of his performance at Philadelphia's Convention Hall. The show was recorded by Capitol for an upcoming album and filmed by NBC-TV as part of "First Tuesday". Haggard's chart action single is "The Fightin' Side of Me" . . . SESAC will be "the personal touch" behind the decorations for Nashville's Grammy Awards Show March 11 . . . Jerry Seabolt, national C&W promo chief for the Shelby Singleton Corporation, was on hand last week for KIKK's Valentine Day dance. The Houston-based shindig was billed as the "World's Biggest Dance" . . . Walt Davis, West Coast rep of Hubert Long International has announced completion of a deal with Visual Things, Inc. to manufacture three-by-five foot color posters of David Houston, George Jones, Tammy Wynette and Bill Anderson. Country artists will now be displayed alongside "Top 40", hard rock and psychedelic groups . . .

Exclusive booking-management contracts have been signed recently between Buddy Lee Attractions, Inc. and RCA's Hank Locklin and Lorene Mann and Royal American's Guy Drake . . . Pompeii Music, Inc. president, Pat Morgan, in from Dallas recently searching for new artists and masters, and exchanging material on Music Row . . . Woodland Sound Studios in Music City has recently completed installation of the 16 track recording facilities in Studio A. Approximately \$40,000 was invested which includes extensive modification to the existing mixing console. This provides simultaneous recording of all 16 tracks in addition to 8-4-3-2 and mono. Complete re-mixing facilities for 16 tracks were included in the modification. This makes Woodland Sound Studios one of the few studios in the South with complete 16 track recording . . . 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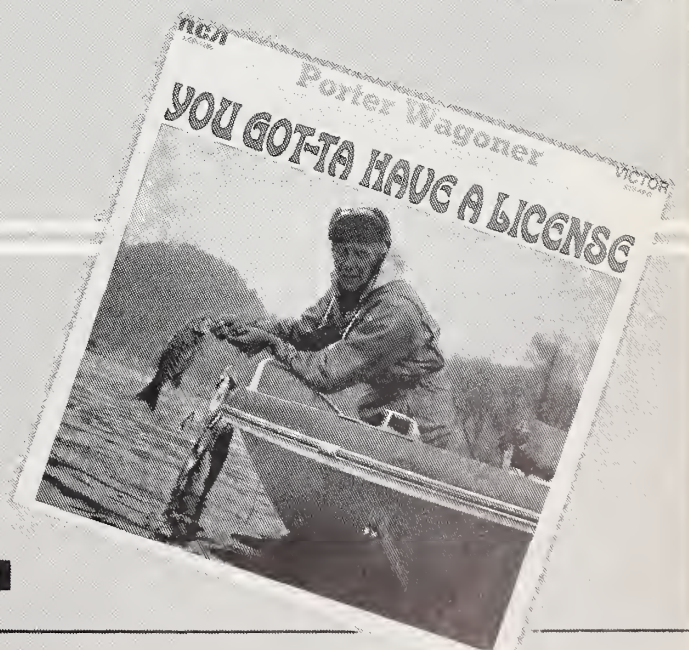

Contracted to Polydor Records, Holland, their disks are issued on Atlantic in the States and Major Minor in the U.K.

The increases in record prices as announced by EMI last week will exert far reaching effects on the British market. EMI's decision has been awaited as a kind of pacemaker for the industry, and the other majors will undoubtedly follow suit with possible differentiation in some areas. There has been swift reaction from all sides of the industry, mostly pessimistic. The increases are seen as another nail in the ultimate coffin of the small disk retailer and also in that of the single record. Although EMI has kept the latter's price unchanged (and it is unlikely that any other major or smaller company will dare to increase the cost of this vulnerable and slumping commodity), retail trade spokesmen opine that dealers now will only stock singles by established hit parade artists in view of the abolition of the five per cent returns allowance. The manufacturing side countered this point swiftly by declaring that most dealers have never stocked singles by unknowns anyway.

The classical sector with its high recording costs and comparatively small market can only view the increase in price with despondency, and the rise in full-price pop album cost will inevitably give a further boost to the booming budget field. EMI's decision to increase the price of its progressive Harvest product by 5/6d (66%) is interesting and will hold considerable significance in coming months. Managing director Ken East said the large rise was necessary because of the packaging cost, but did not preclude a decrease at a later date if sales continued to rise as anticipated, bolstered by American product becoming available under EMI's recent Blue Thumb deal. The new substantial cost of Harvest LP's will be an acid test for the present strength and future prospects of contemporary music of this nature in Britain. Enthusiasts are confident that followers of the trend will willingly part with the extra cash, made necessary mostly by the expensively elaborate artwork on the double-fold sleeves, but others are doubtful on this point. The EMI increases are the first introduced by the company for six years but there have been several rises over that period caused by governmental increases in purchase tax.

CBS Records has full confidence in the future of progressive music as was evidenced at its Feb. 13 London sales conference. A & R executive David Howells introduced a double album sampler which is spear-heading the label's "Fill Your Head With Rock" campaign extension of the original Rock Machine selling scheme. The boost kicks off March 6th, and the double album is being supported by circular posters, mobiles, browser cards, a dealer incentive scheme and extensive advertising. The LP has 23 tracks by CBS stars including Laura Nyro, Blood, Sweat and Tears, Chicago, Byrds, Leonard Cohen, and Santana, and the sleeve contains an eight-page catalogue of all CBS contemporary product. CBS is combining with book publishers Jonathan Cape in April to push Cohen's novel "Beautiful Losers" which is due for publication at that time. Posters and leaflets promoting the novel and his albums will be distributed to bookshops and record outlets throughout the country, and CBS hopes Cohen will be here in person for the campaign and for concert and TV work. Executives from other CBS branches or licensees attending the meet at the Bloomsbury Center Hotel were Swedish CBS managing director Helge Roundqvist, CBS Switzerland general manager Yves Helesenverger, and managing director Haakon Tveten and CBS label manager Hoel Einer from Norsk Phonogram, the Norwegian licensee.

Belwin-Mills Music, the newly named company following the merger of Mills Music London and Belwin, Inc., U.S.A., has gotten off to a good start with the chart success of "United We Stand" by the Brotherhood of Man on Deram. Other potential charters

include "Without You" by Donnie Elbert (Deram) and "Easy Lovin'" by the Troggs on Page One. Belwin-Mills have acquired world rights (except U.S.A. and Canada) of all songs by The Golden Gate, and their first single "Diane" has just been issued on the Bell label. Belwin-Mills have also acquired UK distribution of Music Minus One Records, a series of recordings ranging from pops to classics.

Speculation about the future of Immediate Records was heightened recently by the revelation that the company's London office staff had been advised to seek other jobs. EMI Records, which distributes Immediate product, is continuing to do so with regard to existing repertoire, but a spokesman said that at that time it had been impossible to contact Immediate executives to clarify the position. Immediate chief Andrew Oldham has persistently denied rumors that the label might fold, but is understood to be planning to settle permanently in America. His associate Tony Calder is thought to be in Antigua at the moment, and Tony Stratton-Smith, manager of Immediate group The Nice, is believed to be negotiating with other labels regarding the group's future recording activities.

Sergio Mendes and Brasil '66 flew into London last weekend and were the special guests of A & M Records at a reception at the Washington Hotel. After an appearance on Engelbert Humperdinck's TVer the group left for Amsterdam and the Grand Gala Du Disques. A & M Records are to issue an all-star Stereo Spectacular album, "Introducing Stereo 70," including tracks by Herb Alpert, Sergio Mendes, Burt Bacharach, The Sandpipers, Claudine Longet, Julius Wechter and Baja Marimba Band.

A training officer is to be named to inaugurate an instructional scheme for staff in Britain's disk retail stores. The decision was taken at a recent meeting between the Music Trades Association, representatives of the major record companies, and the Distributive Industries Training Board. An assistant and a secretary will also be appointed, and the initial base will be London. First training plans will center on point-of-sale staff, but later schemes will involve retail outlet managers and proprietors. Training costs will be met at the outset by the DITB, and dealers will have to pay a training levy to that body which they can claim back when they enter an employee for the scheme. This proviso is intended as an incentive for dealers to take advantage of the idea in relation to their staff, and the plan will be extended later to the staff of musical instrument retail outlets.

Carlin Music Corporation chief Freddy Bienstock will activate the group's CMC recording enterprise this summer with its headquarters in London. CMC has been established for some time in name, and its initial activities will center on pop assignments. Bienstock will locate CMC in separate premises with its own staff, but the enterprise will be administered by Carlin's London office at 17, Savile Row. He has negotiated a further five-year deal on a 50-50 basis with Mickie Most's Enquiry Music, which henceforth will be run on a full-time basis by Most's brother David from its own office with copyright and administration handled by Carlin. David Most will name his own promotional staff, and Bienstock has recruited Don Redman from Welbeck Music in a strengthening of Carlin's professional staff subsequent to Most's full-time involvement with Enquiry Music. Enquiry will be built up as a separate, fully competitive company, and Bienstock will be seeking American material in its behalf. New joint companies within the Carlin group are Tarot Music with Manfred Mann, Leon Henry Music with the New Seekers, and Zan Music, a publishing subsidiary of Beacon Records for which Carlin will act in an administrative capacity.

Consequently they are very busy to promote their last releases. **Adamo** was in Italy this week to promote "Felicità," the Italian version of his last French hit, "Petit Bonheur." **Adamo** has registered three personal TV appearances here and a weekly radio program that will last about two months. **Wilson Simonal**, the South American artist who has been invited to San Remo, will also be on Italian TV next week, and will appear again on our screens around mid-March with a special show dedicated to him. **Simonal** will be back in Europe during next April, in Paris at Olympia, and will surely visit Italy again at the same time. **Al Bano**, who is currently on the Italian charts with "Mezzanotte D'amore," is touring the main towns of our country with his fiancée **Romina Powers** and five young EMI artists, presenting his show "Specialissimo '70".

Two months after the end of the solar year and on the eve of San Remo, which marks the beginning of the New Year for our music business, we may consider again how the Italian market is moving. In the last months we have witnessed a remarkable growth in albums' sales and a slight reduction in the singles market. Unfortunately official statistics are not available, but probably starting next year, or even earlier, they will be, for the first time in the history of the Italian record industry, owing to the activity of AFI

(Italian Association of Record Producers) and its president, **Romano Bacchini**. For the moment we can only rely on information received unofficially. The albums sales are around 4,500,000 copies against about 37,000,000 singles. The increase of the album market has been particularly evident in the last few months. The interest for long playing recordings is further demonstrated by the parallel development of the pre-recorded tapes market. Italy is selling both 8-tracks cartridges and musicassettes. Until 10 months ago everybody, but RCA-Italiana, thought only cassettes would sell, and very few were considering the possibility of survival for cartridges in Italy. Now the situation is quite different: all the companies we have contacted stated that two markets exist and that both will increase in the coming year. We have said that albums sales are growing, but, at the same time, we must acknowledge that cassettes and cartridges are exploding. In most cases, they are close to the album figures, and for some companies like Phonogram, reached 50%. The proportion between cassette and cartridge sales is generally assumed to be 85% for cassettes against 15% for cartridges. The proportion, of course, is not the same for everybody, and many companies have just entered the cartridges market. Considering companies which have both cassettes and cartridges we find a range from 75% for cassettes for CGD-CBS, according to **Joe Giannini**, to a 50% split for RCA Italiana, with reference to cassettes and cartridges of the same content released at the same time. We also have to consider the prices: in Milan shops they are \$5.65 for cassettes, \$6.45 for cartridges, if manufactured in Italy, and \$8.45, if imported. The cartridges have a second handicap in the purchasing cost of the equipment. We believe that over 85% of the tape players existing are cassette players. From this we have to deduce that cartridge owners buy more music than cassette owners. But we must bear in mind that many persons buy a cassette recorder with the intention to record more than to buy pre-recorded cassettes.

Jack Robinson, head of Criterion Music in France and president of Mandy Music, has been signing several deals ever since the MIDEM. He has signed the **Fred Neil** Catalogue and the following songs recorded by French artists: "Keep The Light On" (Mandy Music) recorded by **David Christie** (an original song co-written by Jack Robinson), "Leavin' On A Jet Plane" (Criterion) adapted as "Souris-moi, embrasse-moi" (Smile to me and kiss me) for **Gilles Marchal**, "Too Near the Sun" (Mandy Music) for **Gilles Marchal** as well and, **Gilles Marchal** with **Martine Habib** have recorded "Lodi" (Criterion), a former hit by **Creedence Clearwater Revival**, "Down on the Corner" (Criterion) cut in French by **Eddy Mitchell** as "J'aurai sa Fille" (I'll Get His Girl), "This Girl Is a Woman Now" and "Le Vent Tourne" (both Criterion) will be taped by an American new-comer singing in French, **Alex de Goya**.

Mandy Music will publish the songs of a new girl-singer: **Isabelle** (she sings in Italian) co-produced by singer **Nino Ferrer**. Mandy will also publish six of the songs from **I Delfini** an Italian group who are **Salvatore Adamo's** musicians. **Michael Goldsen**, president of Criterion Music, is in France for 3 weeks to have several talks with **Jack Robinson** about the Mandy and Criterion catalogue.

Disques Fleche, the **Claude Francois**-owned record company, has signed a deal with **Jimi Hendrix** productions. First release should be a live LP. **Claude Francois** will be leaving for Canada very shortly. He is to undertake a fifteen days tour.

Alain de Ricou has just been appointed head of **Les Editions Pathe**

Marconi and Eco Music, both publishing companies of the EMI group. **De Ricou** has recently signed the **Chrysalys** catalogue (**Chrysalys** records are released through Philips) with such artists as **Blodwyn Pig** and **Jethro Tull**. Also signed is the **Middle Earth** catalogue.

Bobbie Gentry was in Paris for 24 hours this week to shoot two TV Shows. **The Four Tops** will be doing the same between Feb. 28 and Mar. 1. Booked for the Olympia on May 2nd: **the Band**.

An LP conceived and designed by **Carlos Leresche**, "Faites Parlez Vos Perroquets" (or "How to Make Your Parrots Talk"), will be released in England, Germany, Spain, Italy and Japan within the next few weeks. Spoken lessons for the parrots will be translated in every language.

Richard Anthony has cut "Na na hey hey kiss him goodbye," the Steam hit of several weeks ago, in French. **Jean Michel Garnier** has now joined **Michel Larmand** at Chappell's pop department.

Just one day before his show in Paris **Joe Cocker** cancelled and flew away for a holiday. Advance booking was nearing the S.R.O. limit.

Rene Boyer (Fantasia music) publisher of "Concerto Pour Une Voix," a hit in France, released through **Disc'AZ**, has made deals for the release of this record in the following countries with companies: Italy, RCA; Belgium, Vogue; Holland, Dureco; Spain, Ispavox; Germany, Ariola; England, Major Minor; Mexic, Gamma; Brasil, Philips; and for the rest of Latin America, Fermata. Publishing rights for some of the countries have not been finalized yet.

The winners of the Major Broadcasting Network Australian Record Awards for 1969 were introduced and presented at a black tie dinner held at Menzies Hotel, Sydney, earlier this week. Winners in each category were;

Best Male Vocal Record — Russell Morris for "The Real Thing."

Best Female Vocal Record — Anne Hawker for "Boom Bang-A-Bang."

Best Group Record — Doug Parkinson in Focus for "Dear Prudence."

Best Australian Composition — Johnny Young (composer) for "The Star."

Best Male Album — Kamahl for "Dreams Of Love."

Best Female Album — Pattie for "Beautiful In The Rain."

Best 'Other' Album — Original Australian Cast of "Hair."

Best Country Music Record — Bobby & Laurie for "Carroll County Accident."

Best New Artist of 1969 — Matt Flinders.

Best Instrumental Record — No Award given this year.

The Major Broadcasting Network is one of the biggest and most important commercial networks in Australia, and these annual Awards are highly prized by the record industry and artists. The proceedings from the dinner were taped and broadcast the following night throughout Australia.

Again this year the whole affair was well organized and full credit must go to all participating stations and personnel and, in particular, to Ron Hurst, program manager of station 2UE, who co-ordinated the entire event.

There has been a huge promotional effort on behalf of the new single by Australia's Johnny O'Keefe, released on Festival. It's Johnny's first newly-recorded single track in a few years and features "The Confessions Of A Lonely Man."

Record production figures for the five-month period ended November 1969 show a lift of almost one-million units over the figures for the corresponding period in 1968. The biggest boost is in album production which is really booming in Australia these days with the emphasis on the many low-priced ranges being marketed through regular retail outlets and racks in chain-stores, newsagents, etc.

The New Seekers, the group formed in London by original seeker member Keith Potger, will do a personal appearance tour of Australia next month. It is the first visit to Australia for The New Seekers and it will be interesting to see how they are accepted here in view of the vast popularity here of The Seekers in the past. The new (first) album by The New Seekers will be rush-released by Philips to coincide with the Australian tour.

"Arkansas Grass," the recent hit here for local boys, Axiom, has been issued on the Sire label in the United States and is being distributed nationally by the London group.

The Masters Apprentices have their new "Masterpiece" album released now through E.M.I. on the Columbia label. Billy Green makes his solo disc debut for the same label with an original song, "This Must Be The End." The Flying Circus, another EMI local group have a new E.P. in release called "Frontier." They also have a hot single, "Run, Run, Run."

Other new local records recently include Willpower (Carion/Festival) with "Soul Finger" and "Spinning

Wheel"; Velvet Underground (Festival) with "Somebody To Love" and "She Comes In Colours." Ross D. Wylie has an E.P. on Festival called "Funny Man"; the same label also carries an EP called "Lazy Life" by Heart 'N' Soul. RCA has a new album by Singer/Actor Ed Devereaux tagged "Now And Then."

Australian Record Company Limited held a big trade reception at the Hawaiian Eye in Sydney to welcome Reprise recording star Trini Lopez to Australia for another personal appearance tour. In honour of his visit, the company has issued the album, "The Trini Lopez Show."

Blind American singing star and RCA recording artist, Jose Feliciano is in Australia for a personal appearance season at the Silver Spade room at the Chevron Hotel in Sydney. Jose has run into the same quarantine problems here with his guide dog that he encountered when he visited England. The dog just isn't allowed into our country until it spends six months at our official quarantine station. It is understandable that Jose feels lost without his dog, but that's the way it will be for his entire Australian visit. Jose has been drawing capacity audiences at his shows to date and there is no doubt that the whole season will be a smashing success. RCA have recently issued two Feliciano albums, "The Voice And Guitar Of Jose Feliciano" and "Alive, Alive O!" both of which should be racking up fantastic sales for the label.

The Paul Hamlyn organisation is the subject of an interesting and very informative feature article in a recent edition of "Business Review." On the "Music For Pleasure" label, it reports that the company sold 2½ million albums in a twelve-month period, and that it holds 29% of the album market in Australia. "Music For Pleasure" albums retail at the low Australian figure of \$1.99, and they are rack-sold in thousands of outlets across the nation. A great deal of the material in the "M.F.P." range consists of albums that have been deleted from the various E.M.I. catalogues. Australian singing and EMI record artist Russell Morris has returned home following a brief visit to England where he did some recordings, amongst other things. The first track to be scheduled for release here from the English sessions is "Rachel," but a late flash now indicates that the record might be delayed for a while. Russell Morris will appear in concert at the Sydney Town Hall on February 20th., along with hot local groups, The Flying Circus, and Taman Shud.

Castle Music have placed broadcast restrictions on several of their new titles, including "All Night Long", "Jennifer Tomkins", and "Take Her Back". Off restriction now are "When Julie Comes Around"; "Sally Ann"; "A Brand New Me"; and "Better Homes And Gardens". Recent local singles include Tamam Shud with "Lady Sunshine" on CBS; Free Fall (Festival) with "Maybe Tomorrow" and "The Goofing Song"; Matt Flinders (Astor) with "Where Has All The Love Gone" c/w "Life Is Meant For Living."

English group The Peddlers are now in this country for personal appearances. Their new single "Girlie" is being rush-released on the CBS logo through Australian Record Company Limited.

Canada

London's national sales manager Adrian Bilodeau into Toronto for meetings with branch manager Gilles Aubin and to complete arrangements for the certification of 11 albums and 3 singles for Gold Leaf awards. London has been exceptionally hot and cautious with singles releases and unlike some record companies are not experiencing a disastrous overload of returns. From their Canadian catalogue, The Poppy Family, whose single "Which Way You Goin' Billy" was voted best produced single in a national Canadian poll are chalking up good sales on their album under the same title which was voted best produced middle of the road album in the same poll. They are currently happening on the pop charts with their follow-up single "That's Where I Went Wrong." Another Vancouver group flying the London banner, The Collectors have made important moves up the charts with their deck "I Must Have Been Blind."

The Gamma single "To Love Means To Be Free" by Montrealeers Barry Stagg and Anthony Green has shown a national breakout. Much of this action is due to their cross-Canada promotion tour. This has also added much sales importance to their Gamma album, the first English release for the giant French/Canadian label. Top seller for Gamma is French Canada's first underground act — Charlebois, who recently received high critical acclaim for his recital at Montreal's Place Des Arts. He appeared at London England's Savoy Hotel. Attending opening night performance was Engelbert Humperdinck who records for the same label (Parrot). It's expected that Miss Reno will shortly appear on Humperdinck's television show. Bilodeau reports much interest by international record VIPs in Miss Reno's recently released album which has already scored good sales across Canada and was instrumental in her being voted top female vocalist in a recent national poll of the industry.

Brian Chater, who heads up the Summerlea/Winterlea operation, now a part of Chum Ltd., has just returned from a trip to the UK where he placed several masters and acquired a few hot copyrights. Chater reports their first production "The Right Girl" by The Tote Family is to be released on the Yorkville label, a subsid of Arc Sound. The Blackwood Bros, award winning gospel country group, makes one of their first Canadian appearances at Kingston's Grand Theatre Mar. 6 and at the Shakespearean Theatre, Stratford Mar. 7. Reaction to the Allan Nicholls' deck of "Goin' Down" on Avco Embassy is running high across Ontario. Richards reports good chart action with many stations adding the lid to their playlists. Nicholls was recently in Toronto for a promotional whirl with Richards and repeated this type of promotion with RCA's Montreal promotion manager Yvan Deschenes.

The Irish Rovers have shown good sales action on their Decca lid "Rhymes And Reasons." Compo's promotion field manager Allan Matthews reports top play on MOR and top forty stations. Matthews' promotional activity was given a boost with the Waterloo University appearance of Neil Diamond which has resulted in his single release "Until It's Time For You To Go" showing breakout action to Kitchener and Hamilton. Also giving a hand with boosting disk sales was the Massey Hall appearance of Loretta Lynn and Peggy Sue, both Decca artists. Miss Lynn is currently enjoying good Canadian country chart action with her single "Wings Upon Your Horns" and her album which was recently released. Compo's Lee Armstrong moves from Montreal to take up duties in the new MCA building in Toronto. Barry Paine preceded Armstrong to take over as Compo promotion manager for Ontario.

Liam Mullen moves from Montreal to take over as promotion manager for A&M Records in Toronto. Mullen will be in charge of promotion for the label in Ontario and west to British Columbia. David Brodeur, formerly promotion manager for Quality Records (Quebec) takes over as A&M promotion manager for the Ottawa Valley, Ottawa, and the Province of Quebec. Brodeur will headquarter in London's St. Laurent headquarters. London will distribute A&M product for the province of Quebec and Capitol for Ontario west.

About Seasonal Locations

As the first genuine hints of spring drifted thru the Northern climes last week, thoughts turned to such subjects as the seasonal music and game location. Not that the winter hasn't its own unique seasonal spots (ski lodges, et al), but the thousands of locations which make the bulk of their income during the summer offer more lucrative earnings if handled right. These are the stops which will be opening almost before you know it and the wise operator would do well to chart plans for his particular territory right now.

Seasonal locations, of any variety, have several unique benefits as well as pitfalls which must be reckoned with before the operator sets out any machines. On the plus side, seasonal stops are normally in or near recreational locales, and the folks are attuned to having fun . . . like on amusement games. Seasonal locations can also do well with good used music equipment, rather than brand new machines which the operator would normally reserve for his year-round stops. However, there is still nothing quite as good at pulling top collections as a new machine, anywhere.

On the minus side of the seasonal picture, the operator is often at the mercy of mother nature if he's operating at resorts which depend on transient customer traffic on weekends. Suffer four or five rainy weekends and the whole summer might be wiped out. Also, the operator can make a serious error if he offers too much in an advance or bonus to get some of these locations, without logically figuring how much the place is going to yield before it shuts down. The rules on commissions and minimum guarantees might also have to change toward the operator's favor, if some of these stops are to pay out properly.

Among the factors each operator must weigh before setting machines at seasonal stops are the amount and type of machines each place can logically support. And included in this analysis must be thought given to play-pricing.

Probably at no other time in the brief history of the coin machine business has a program of raising the pricing on music and games benefited the operator as much as today's trend toward the 25¢ chute. Great new games coming out of the factories on 2-25¢ or straight quarter play, as well as great standard games like pins, shuffles and bowlers, deserve the higher play price and the public is willingly paying it. And right here is a singular benefit for seasonal location operators — set out everything you can at the higher play price this summer and figure on a minimum 15% collection gain over last season.

Many of these special quarter novelties are great earners for a couple of months, but slack off afterward and have to be moved. But a couple of months is all you need at a resort, no? And besides these special games, seasonal operators must consider 2-25¢ pric-

Firm Bows New Films, Promos for Quizzers

MILWAUKEE — Theaters advertise their current attractions in big illuminated letters on their marquees—so why not use the same proven technique for boosting interest in single play quiz game machines?

That's the idea behind Instant I.Q., an audio-visual programming company which is now marketing a number of new question-and-answer films. These films and special header conversion kits allow an operator to retitle his machines' panels with attention getting headers like "Wine, Women & Song," "Show Biz," "Love, Sweet Love," and "Strikes and Spares."

George Richard, president of the Milwaukee-based firm, figures the new program idea not only will coax cash out of new and old players, but will make the quiz machines more flexible and increase their current market value.

Richard the films could be bought outright, or rented. Either way, they would be packaged for easy placement in existing machines. He said that conversion of the panel titles takes only minutes and that the kit cost of \$10 was purposely kept low to encourage frequent film rotation.

"Movie houses change their programs regularly—and make sure their customers know about it," he pointed out. "Why not do the same with quiz machines? Some of our titles have a lot of sex appeal, just like many current movies. The questions and answers are all in good taste, however, and can be used in any location."

He said that single topic films reduce the need for thousands of questions on each film. Instant I.Q.'s "Feature Films" (\$60 each) contain about 500 questions and its "Short

Subject" series (\$40 each) about half that number—plenty for many higher traffic locations.

The new programs and kits are available for either the Computer Quiz or I.Q. Computer single play machines.

Richard said his firm, at 4003 W. Capitol Drive, Milwaukee, also prepares custom film quiz programs and conversion kits.

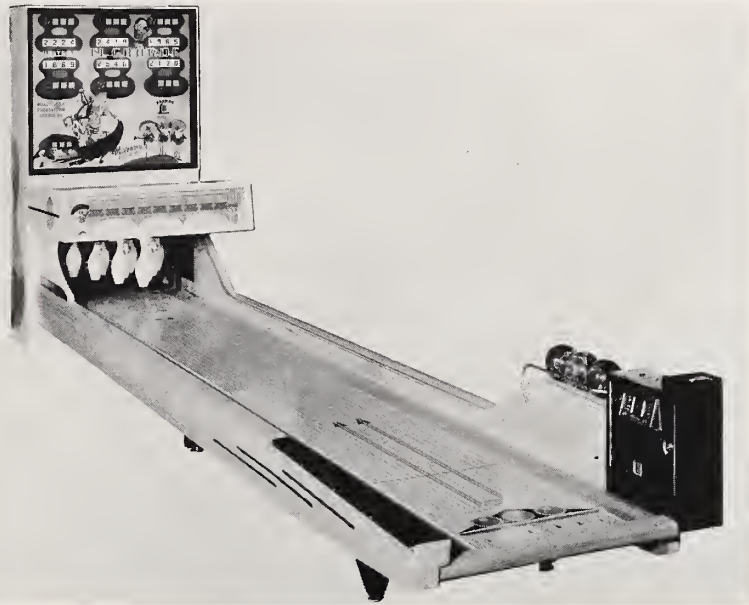

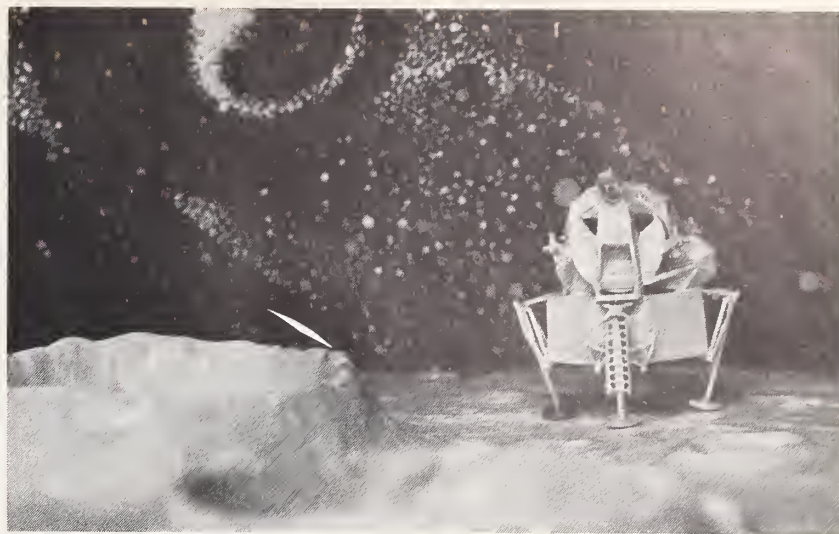

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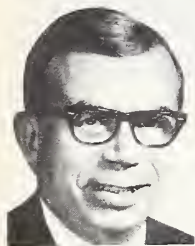

'Statesman' Sessions Warmly Received

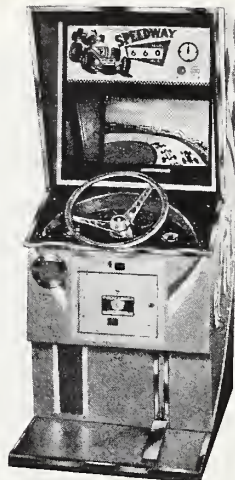

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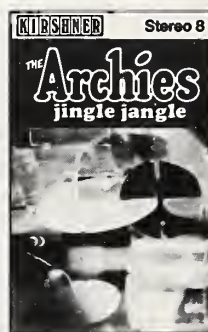
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
