

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
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Economic Reforms: A Feeling Of Hope

If President Nixon's sweeping emergency economic reforms create a much needed better economic climate for the nation, the recording and music industries will also prove the beneficiary. External economic forces over the past year or so have tended to put a severe profit squeeze on the operations of many firms and, perhaps more noteworthy, have eroded confidence among industry personnel, contributing to some degree to the massive upheavals on high management levels.

Although the industry cannot always point to "external" forces as a scapegoat for ills that may be the mechanics of its own policies, there is little doubt that the stagnant economy and the inflationary spiral have helped make the going rough.

The President's new "game plan" —featuring a 90 day wage and price freeze—is directed at breathing new life into consumer and business incentive. As a result of the 10% surcharge on imports, there is a burden of an international scope, one, we feel, that is far outstripped by the positive impact it should have on the American economy. It's true that some labels small in number—do rely on foreign produced and pressed records and tapes for sale here. Yet, the majority of product that comes to these shores arrives in the form of master tapes, which are eventually produced and pressed here. The latter will not be affected by the President's executive order to impose the 10% surcharge on imports. A burden of sorts does, however, fall on record and tape hardware —especially equipment manufactured in Japan.

The overriding purpose of President Nixon's historic decisions is to restore a new confidence in the American economy in concrete terms. In the context of the recording and music industries, some of our friends abroad must realize that our country is making a decisive attempt to stave off a possible economic disaster that would, no doubt, result in the gravest of consequences.

At this early stage of this massive drive to generate a healthier economy, there is one thing in evidence: it's hope, a sense that things are moving on the right track, a factor that can never be discounted in any attempt to make the economy shine. The recording and music industries should welcome this initial sign of hope. CashBox TOP100

A NATRA Plan For 70's Is **Urgent**, Wright Tells Meet

"In 1971, Hannibal's

CHICAGO — "In 1971, Hannibal's army is in Chicago deciding it is time for a plan. Unlike Hannibal's army, we lose if we choose not to fight; as long as we accept 'niggers ain't shit.' Unlike Hannibal's army, we can win— peacefully. By crossing the Alps which only the words of the Romans can prevent us from doing." Former NATRA president Ed Wright, now president of Edward Windsor Wright Corp., a PR firm, delivered these words at the 1971 convention of the organization, held at the O'Hare Hyatt House here. Af-ter tracing the history of the group and of black progress in the media in general, Wright both cited a need for and outlined a plan of action for and outlined a plan of action for 'overdue justice, not a power hungry coup."



Milt Gabler Ends **30 Yr Decca Run: Reviving Commodore**

NEW YORK - Milt Gabler's 30 year NEW YORK — Milt Gabler's 30 year A&R career at Decca Records has come to an end. Gabler, a vp at the company since 1956, said he had de-parted from the firm due to the shift of the parent MCA Records operation to the west coast. He is the last of Decca's veteran A&R execs to leave the company the company.

Among Gabler's plans is a revival of his Commodore label, from which Decca co-founder Jack Kapp pulled him away in 1941 to re-issue jazz recordings. Commodore Records was part of Gabler's famed Commodore Music Shop. Gabler holds 600 mas-ters, and within six to eight weeks plans the marketing of two albums, one on Billie Hol'day and "The Best of Commodore." He is presently ne-gotiating a national distribution deal for the line. Gabler will also engage in indie production and continue his writing career. With Bert Kaempfert, who he is slated to continue to pro-duce for Decca, he penned such hits as duce for Decca, he penned such hits as "Danke Schoen" and "Love."

"Danke Schoen" and "Love." During his 30 year career, Gabler savs he produced disks accounting for sales of 30 million copies. He record-ed such giants as Louis Jordan. LOS ANGELES — Ex-Monkee David Jones has filed a \$2-million damage suit against his former business manager, Lawrence Spector. Filed in Su-perior Court here, the suit charges Mr. Spector and Lawrence Spector Associates of Beverly Hills with im-proper handling of more than \$3-million of Jones' income over a 15-month period 15-month period.

Demanded in the suit is \$1-million in general damages, with applicable interest since January 1, 1969, and another \$1-million in punitive damages.

The period covered by the action is September 22, 1967, when Jones en-gaged Spector, to January 9, 1969, when they mutually terminated. Spector's fee for services began at 5% of Jones' gross earnings and, in mid-'68, doubled to 10%.

During that time, according to the suit, the Spector organization im-properly invested Jones' earnings, failed to keep accurate records, neglected to pay the artist's out-standing .debts and spent money without his knowledge or authoriza-tion. It was during this period, too, that the Monkees was formed and that Jones became a favorite with the group's fans. group's fans.

Since the Monkees disbanded, Jones has concentrated on a solo career. He recently signed to sing the title tune of Paramount Pictures' forthcoming release "Star Spangled Girl."

The William Morris Agency is cur-rently booking all touring per-formances of the work.

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



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

This capability will extend EVR utility to many additional categories of end users. The Dolby "B" system is designed The Dolby "B" system is designed to reduce noise on a cassette by in-creasing the volume of the master tape so that the quietest parts (where the noise is most noticeable) are am-plified; the parts of the music which have been made louder stand out clearly from the noise. Then, during playback, the system automatically reduces the loudness in all the places in which it was increased, reducing the loudness of the noise at the same time. This reportedly eliminates the hissing noise of the tape that can be noticeable in cassettes which often re-sults from slow speeds and narrow sults from slow speeds and narrow widths.





NEW YORK-PROCOL HARUM: LIVING LIFE AS THOUGH IT WERE A BEANSTALK

Central Park in a heat haze; where the oxygen level valiantly fights a losing battle against soot and carbon monoxide. Procol Harum are on stage at Wolman and, from behind his piano, Gary Brooker has been introducing the group members ". . . drums, B. J. Wilson. And of course, you know my name: Procol Harum." It was a new band.

KEITH: At first we went looking for an organist . . . GARY: Yeah. Chris [Copping] wasn't too happy about that. He likes the bass but he really wanted to play the organ full time. KEITH: . . . but we couldn't find one. So we began auditioning bassists and

guitarists

GARY: And Chris was much happier.

KEITH: We must have listened to about thirty. This one guy came in who was the World's Worst guitar player. We said: 'Right. Let's hear a lead.' And he plays an E to D chord change. GARY: And he said he's studied at the feet of Eric Clapton.

EVL: What's interesting about Dave Ball [the group's new guitarist] is that he's so good at laying back and playing ensemble, and then can step out for a beautiful lead.

KEITH: That's right. We found that most guys could either play ensemble or lead; not both. Dave was the exception.

Of the original Procol only Gary, Keith Reid (the group's lyricist), and B. J. Wilson remain. The others, organist Matthew Fisher, and bassist David Knights lasted through three albums: "Procol Harum," "Shine On Brightly," and "Salty Dog." Guitarist Robin Trower has just left the group (Procol's current tour is their first without him), having played with them through the "Broken Barricades" album.

KEITH: When Matthew left, we felt that we didn't want to find a replacement

for him, you know? GARY: We got Chris and the original idea was for him to play a lot more organ than it turned out he did. He, in fact, was on the bass most of the time. So we tightened up, became a more rocking band, if you know what I mean. It culminated in "Broken Barricades" where no organ is used at all. It's all piano and guitar.

The sound is fuller, now. After Robin left, taking with him that totally Americanised guitar that, for me, clashed with Procol's Germanically influenced music, the decision was made to expand the group's sound. Chris took up residence at the organ, full time, and bassist Alan Cartwright and Dave Ball inined

GARY: It's incredible, really, we got Alan just before we came here and on our first gig, he was still sorting the first bass lines out.

EVL: That's fantastic! He's not the sort of plunking bass that's so common.

GARY: He really played some great lines last night, didn't he? EVL: He adds to the group, rather than just sort of lying there. Most bassists are more interested in tempo than they are in playing notes in a melody.

What's this tour been like so far. Has it differed from the last one? GARY: Oh, yeah! I can't believe it; the response has been terrific, even in places we've never played before. You know, the tours have been going so well, and the kids are used to a certain level they know our live music is at, it was kind of scary beginning this tour, with Alan and Dave having hardly any time with us. But it's turned out great; better than any of us could have guessed. EVL: Last night you played "Salty Dog" better than I've ever heard you do it. GARY: That's great, because that was my feeling too. I wasn't too happy doing it, with the smaller group, because Robin was sort of lost during it. (cont'd on page 25)

HOLLYWOOD-FOR DIRTY OLD MEN GETTING THROUGH THE DOG DAYS

It's hard to determine, from the outside at least, just who reads a magazine like "Sexual Behavior." The kids don't: a magazine like this, these days, could not possibly tell them anything they wouldn't already know. The People don't: they have better things to do, and do them better, no doubt, than "Sexual Behavior" might be able to describe in print. The over-50 group would most likely rather pay \$5.00 for a little hard porn, which, according to the Wall Street Journal, has fallen on hard times anyway. Yet "Sexual Behavior," aiming for a somewhat more literate audience than that time-honored journal of opinion, a somewhat more literate audience than that the honored joint of joint of the source o (for five months, now) with a few engaging titles. An article in the current issue, for instance, examines the relationship between "Rock Music and Sex." And

man, there sure is a lot of relationship goin' on there. Written by Herb Goldberg, an associate professor of psychology here at California State, the piece does not really tell us anything we don't know, either, as inside dopesters of the music business. Ever since Ed Sullivan allowed Elvis Presley to appear, to viewers, only from the waist up, and the Beatles stopped singing about holding hands, the tide has turned in rock lyrics and on-stage theatrics to a sometimes alarming degree—alarming, especially, to the nation's elders and protectors of the peace. Goldberg documents all of this, as well as the rise of the groupie and the role of "the female as aggressor" (and as cultural flunky, which the editor offsets with a hefty fem-lib piece culled from the New York Times).

The result of this downgrading and the easy availability of instant sex is what particularly worries Goldberg, however, i.e., the instant alienation: "When attend-ing a rock dance...the sound of the music coming through ten-foot-high speakers is so intense as to be literally unbearable for most adults . . The movements of the dancers, often with their eyes closed, are seemingly private and unrelated to the movements of their partners... A good many of those in attendance are stoned on one drug or another. Through all of this there is little eye contact, little real awareness of any other person." Goldberg goes on, as he has on visits to Cash Box's Hollywood office, to express concern that this de-humanization and its consequences, set this generation up for an authoritarian humanization, and its consequences, set this generation up for an authoritarian (cont'd on page 25)

This is the first tour with the new band. Founding members Gary Brooker (with, of course, lyricist Keith Reid), Barrie Wilson, old member Chris Copping are now joined by bassist Alan Cartwright and guitarist Dave Ball. The big change is Chris moving to organ full time (he had shuttled rather unsuccessfully between bass and organ before) so that the group's musical focus is again (as it was in musical focus is again (as it was in the beginning) the duetting piano

the beginning) the duetting piano (Gary) and organ. The band began briskly with "Shine On Brightly" with very little guitar, and the keyboards leading the way with Gary's voice. The next two num-bers, "In The Wee Small Hours of Sixpence," and "Still There'll Be More." were not as strong as they More," were not as strong as they should have been, mainly due to some

should have been, mainly due to some problems with Gary's vocals. From there it was all uphill, though. "Pilgrim's Progress," "Power Failure" (there was the applause right on cue at the end of B. J.'s short drum solo), "Broken Barri-cades," and especially "Simple Sis-ter," were very powerful. In this num-ber, as well as the closing sections of "In Held Twas I" Dave Ball played completely knockout guitar. He knows when to play ensemble and when to step out for a lead. He gets a marvelously original tone out of his instrument that sounds akin to an ex-tremely gritty violin. He's fascinating tremely gritty violin. He's fascinating to listen to. WHISKY A GO GO, L.A.—This Afri-can/West Indian band, already widely-heralded in England, made their U.S. debut at a special press party hosted by MCA Records president J. K. ("Mike") Maitland. The event, highly touted here for the last few weeks, was well attended and ran smoothly,

was well attended and ran smoothly, contributing to the good reception ac-corded the group. Osibisa, themselves, turned in a nice, professional set—there was no stopping to tune up, the sound system had been checked out before, and the group seemed to be enjoying the op-portunity to play portunity to play. Even with a repertoire that virtual-

ly excludes vocals (except for some occasional chanting and percussive yelling), they managed to get and hold the attention of the assembled press, which is quite a feat at this kind of reception. Their sound is highly rhythmic; at

Their sound is highly rhythmic; at times, five of the members are beating some sort of percussive instrument. The line-up of horns—two saxes (one doublins flute and tenor; one on tenor and baritone), and one each drums, trumpet, bass, guitar and keyboards— isn't very unique. But, on the other hand, they don't sound at all like any of the other currently-popular horn bands. Rather, they sound a bit like the old Ray Charles small band laid over a heavier, polyrhythmic base. These days, it's quite different. It should also be mentioned that the group's sound on their album is identical to that achieved in "live" performance.

David Cassidy GARDEN STATES ART CENTER, HOLMDEL, N. J.—David Cassidy is three times as fortunate as other en-tertainers when he performs live be-cause of the audience he appeals to. Although 17, 18 and 19 year olds dig him, he has tremendous appeal among the 8 through 16 crowd too, and for each one of this age group attending his live concerts, you can expect to see one or two parents and perhaps an accompanied brother as young as 6 or 7. Seeing David Cas-sidy live, (one of the few rock per-formers appealing to the pre-teens) seems to have become a family af-fair. And there were truckloads of families (at a \$7.50 top) here last Saturday afternoon. Both the Satur-day afternoon and the Saturday night shows were sell outs, which means shows were sell outs, which means more than 20,000 people total.

Against a showcase of 6 well am-plified musicians and 3 voices under the direction of Richard Delfi, David the direction of Richard Delfi, David leaps unto the huge stage donned in white. with orange tassels hanging from his sleeves, and tears right into a complete repertorie of Partridge hits. Oh yes, he also brings on "the dreamiest face and bluest eyes ever" as one girl in the fourth row described David.

described David. He moves all over the stage in long strides (all this after a recent gall-bladder operation and doctor's orders to take it easy) and scores best with the singles hits. With his audience primarily an AM Radio crowd, the big hits had the kids screaming. The arrangements are commercial and Da-vid has a warm way with the kids. BITTER END, NYC—No long intros this time; I'm gonna letcha have it right between the eyes, as I got it last night: Ruth Copeland is the most incredible female talent that it has been my privilege to see and hear. But, as the Red Queen said, let's begin at the beginning. One is so used to seeing female artists, Judy Collins, Carole King, Carly Simon, and so on, sitting and playing their music. Which is fine; they're great artists, doing their own act, but at midnight concerts one is just as likely, if one's concerts one is just as likely, if one's had a hard day, to fall out as not. Which is also fine for some people. For me, I've always asked: There must be more.

Now there is. Ruth Copeland is giv-

For me, I've always asked: Inere must be more. Now there is. Ruth Copeland is giv-ing it to us, both barrels, dead cen-ter, right where we live, and it's like nothing else in the world: an earth-quake of motion, a tidalwave of sound (and this is most important) an in-undation of the soul by a presence. The bedrock of Ruth's remarkable strength is mined in her four-piece group and the marvelous rapport she established with them. They begin, Don Hatcher on bass, Donelle Hig-gan on drums, David Case on organ, and Ron Bykowski on guitar, riffing through the beginning of Gray Wright's (ex-Spooky Tooth) "The Wrong Time," and Ruth enters garbed in a two-piece fawn suede outfit, high brown boots—and she sings, and she sings, and all of a sudden it hits you that, if there's any truth in legends, then here's Lorelei in Leather. Like Mick Jagger, and no one else in music, for both sexes, she hits you visually, musically, sexually, viscerally, and finally, in the way that defies defini-tion; that sets the pulses racing, the mind bending. And the kid's got guts, folks, oh my, has she ever! They begin the set, as I've mentioned, with "The Wrong Time," which, any other band than the now defunct Spooky Tooth,

would mean sure death. It's one of those songs made for a certain group, and, to play it, you must be both in-credibly tight (if every group mem-ber isn't right on and pushing his guts out, the song falls apart) and vocally powerful. I never thought I'd hear anyone but Gary pull it off, but Ruth and the band, have done it. Both know the meaning of dynamics: they know the meaning of dynamics: they can be loud, when the energy levels are high and pulsing (yet never ever distort their instruments), and they know, thank God!, the uses of cres-

know, thank God!, the uses of cres-cendo and decrescendo. Ruth, for her part, simply has the finest voice I've ever heard from a rock female throat. Funny thing is, I'm big on wailers, because there's always that area, at the top of their lungs, when musical notes become abrasive sound. But when Ruth wails, throws her head back, eyes squeezed shut, one leg drawn up and body tensed, the notes remain notes, like cream pouring and running in heady rabure. rapture

rapture. They do an improvisational blues number and Ruth plays fine mouth harp at first (I told you she's got guts) before switching to vocals. And harp at first (1 told you she's got guts) before switching to vocals. And she pulls very last ounce out of those twelve bar lines. They do the Stones' "Play With Fire," very slowly, sens-ually deliberate in its presentation with the sone's center filled with a beautiful half-sung, half-spoken spon-taneous vocal from Ruth. And that band cooks! She turns from the audi-ence and they're as mesmerized as we are. She exhorts them, and they be-gin to build, grinning with pleasure. Ruth and the quartet set them-selves the most arduous task of all for the set's finale: "Gimme Shelter" (which also happens to be her new single). Guts, grit, power, and music make Ruth's "Gimme Shelter" the definitive one. She turns the most difficult of all Stones' songs into her own.

BITTER END, NYC-If the thirteenth century was the golden age for troubadours, was Ian Matthews born too late? Maybe. But then so were the audiences which welcomed him during his six night stay at the Bitter End, first stop on his debut American tour.

Actually, although Ian would have functioned comfortably as a lyric poet in a medieval court, he is very much a contemporary artist. And while his own compositions retain a traditional sound, they are garnished with elements of country and rock. His ventures into the catalogs of other songwriters reflect a strong interest in the best and most individualistic of present day composers, men like Paul Siebel and John D. Laudermilk and women like Karen Dalton.

A typical set at the club featured one or two selections from Ian's current album on the Vertigo label. Most consistently effective of these were "Never Ending" and Richard Farina's Never Ending" and Richard Farina's bittersweet nod to "Reno, Nevada." "And Me," complete with some ex-traordinary dulcimer playing by Richard Thompson, was a reminder of Matthews Southern Comfort days and occasional solos by acoustic gui-tarist Andy Roberts, particularly "Ra-dio Lady," a song about discovery in New York, were well received too.

Headlining the bill was Warner Bros. artist Dion. He seems to have found his own level of showmanship to all of us, he updated things like forming. Drawing on the nostalgia strings which are somehow fastened to all of us, he updated things like "Runaround Sue" and "The Wander-er" just enough to also appeal to members of the audience too young to understand that madness. To "Abraham, Martin And John," he brought his usual competence, though his offhand remark that "This one is sure to get to you" might have been an entirely too accurate summation of the deliberateness of his act. Still he is a thoroughgoing professional, whose sets aren't disappointing even when they happen to be predictable.

GASLIGHT II, NYC-This Atco recording team is a musical analogue to that little nursery rhyme girl with the little curl right in the middle of her forehead. When they are good, they are very very good, but when they are bad, they are on the floggy, dog-eared-country side of Crosby, Stills & Nash.

Their voices sound better in harmony than they do solo. The rem-nants of one of the finer, yet virtually unknown chamber psychedelic bands of the late sixties (Mr. Flood's Party), Mike and Jay can still draw their inspiration from their earlier work. "Bittersweet" is such a tune. "Mighty Emerald" is another powerhouse, and features Mike on flute and some fine gospel shouting from Don McCracken, a member of their band.

Jay's acoustic guitar is almost inaudible in live performance; his electric piano technique ("Baltimore La-dies") is quite striking. But the po-tentially strong showing slips back more than a few feet from triumph when the country-rock genre is tack-led. Here they are lyrically and musically bankrupt, and one only hopes that they'll come back to the city where they belong. r.a.

LESLEY DUNCAN: SING LESLEY SING

All my friends are travellers, we don't often

get to meet

But I know they're out there somewhere, and the knowin' keeps me sweet.

Being, up until now, Britain's most highly respected session singer, and having sung on more hits than it's conceivable to count, Lesley Duncan, has a great many friends who are travellers. She has, of course, held a highly esteemed position amongst the music populace of London for many years, but for one reason or another has not, up until now, recorded an album of her own. "Sing Children Sing" irrevocably changes that. The album was released some

weeks ago overseas to rapturous reviews and is due out here, mercifully uncut and unchanged from the original, on Columbia, at the end of September. Lesley's name may be a familiar one to the literal millions who bought Elton John's "Tumbleweed Connection" LP. Her "Love Song" is included there, given a touching and sensitive rendition. Yet that song is only one in a myriad ex-quisite surprises that quietly explode on "Sing Children Sing." For instance, there's "Lullaby," infinitely gentle words encased within a re-markable melody, that contains no sugar or saccharine.

If I have any future, it is within your eyes

each time you smile-my child my child.

The hand of life will rock you I brought you forth and then my task was through

I give to you, this wondrous view

I am but yesterday and you my child---tomorrow. Or "Mr. Rubin," a song composed out of frustration and a desperate need to make people listen:

Plus the boys have widened their spectrum somewhat to take in several gentle, quite hypnotic songs. Guitarist Tony lommi, with three compositions on the set, emerges as a first rate writer of instru-mental themes and Ozzy Osbourne is, as usual, right out front with his vocals. Certainly the high point for many listeners will be "Solitude," a lyrical piece which instantly takes hold, but those who enjoyed the granite-like quality of "Paranoid" etc. will not be disappointed by items such as "Children Of The Grave" and "Into The Void." TRANSITION—Kenny Rogers And The First Edition—Reprise 2039 Although Kenny Rogers and cohorts are known as much for their singles success as for their album achievements, it is in the latter category that they have done most of their really exciting and inventive work. And here they go again, taking that beautifully lyrical Peter Gallway song, "Good L-dy Of Toronto," (first done by the late and lamented Fifth Avenue Band) and breathing new life into it. Same thing with "Poem For My Little Lady," which has to be one of Mac Davis' best efforts. Ten selections are featured.

THE RETURN OF DOUG SALDAÑA—Sir Douglas Quintet—Philips 600—353 Doug Sahm, guiding light of the Sir Douglas Quintet, went home to Texas and cut these ten songs with the help of his Chicano brothers, neighbors and old buddies. It is great rock and roll music, from first track to last. Doug is an old hand at the art of making music but his new material always sounds so fresh and alive. "Preach What You Live, Live What You Preach," "Keep Your Soul" and "Stoned Faces Don't Lie" are three of his fine works. But they're matched by tunes like "Wasted Days, Wasted Nights," composed by Freddy Fender, and given a robust treat-ment by Doug and his friends. You can go home again!

IF 3-Capitol SMAS1820

IF 3—Capitol SMAS1820 At a time when Blood Sweat & Tears imitations flow almost as quickly as those three commodities, If, a seven piece band, has gone about its own way of fusing jazz and rock. Their first two LP's signaled new possibilities and their third set realizes many of them. J. W. Hodkinson is a vocalist with a style all his own and the instrumentalists establish a working balance of brass and rhythm sections (but never at the expense of the music) over a course of eight new numbers, two of which "Forgotten Roads" and "Far Beyond" are particularly worthy of note. This disk should really put If over the top where they belong.

IAN & SYLVIA—Columbia C 30736 The long awaited return of Ian & Sylvia to the recording scene seemed even longer til now, given the popularity of country rock, which this duo has been playing since the fifties. David Wiffen's "More Often Than Not" could be their best singles vehicle, but it is bound to garner FM play too. Program in-cludes a resurfacing of an obscure but beauti-ful "Creators Of Rain" and Bert Jonsch's "Needle Of Death" which anticipated the anti-heroin bandwagon in the mid-sixties. On'y one tune has been recorded by the duo before, "Summer Wages." This summer and sub-sequent fall, winter and spring should put lan & Sylvia back on top where they belong; this LP will do it at last.

ANOTHER TIME, ANOTHER PLACE—Engelbert Humperdinck—Parrot 71048 Hitmaker extraordinaire returns with another set in his patented mold. Title tune, his recent single, is featured along with ten other selec-tions, best of which are "Help Me Make It Through The Night" and a tune called "Nash-ville Lady," on which the singer is heard in a less cluttered setting. For the most part, though, it's big voice coupled with big orches-tral arrangements and, since this is the formu-la which seems to work for Humperdinck, the chart success of this album seems assured if not actually predestined.

SURF'S UP—The Beach Boys—Brother (dist: Reprise) RS 6453 The Beach Boy Renaissance is in full flower with the release of "Surf's Up." Just the fact that this new LP includes the now near-legen-dary title cut (which just happens to turn out to be the BB's best recorded track), is enough to ensure huge sales. But there are also nine other fine songs. Among the highlights of the set, "Long Promised Road," the amusing "Disney Girls (1957)," "Feel Flows" and the other two thirds of the Brian Wilson trilogy, "A Day In the Life Of A Tree," and " 'Til I Die," the product of one of America's true musical geninuses. Beautiful.

HOT PANTS—James Brown—Polydor PD 4054 This is James Brown's first release on the Polydor label and it's a smoker! What more can be said about a J.B. performance except here it is, listen to it. The title track is an eight minute plus version of the popular single. Moving right along, there's "Escape-ism," parts one and two, as well <code>>s</code> "Blues And Pants" and "Can't Stand It." This should be one of the artist's biggest selling LP's.

NEW RIDERS OF THE PURPLE SAGE — Columbia C 30888 Spawned by the amoeba which is the Grateful Dead, the New Riders who are a album of ten numbers, all of which were penned by acoustic guitarist and vocalist John Dawson. "I Don't Know You" and "Dirty Busi-ness" are two of the more appealing tracks but fans of the Dead—those steadfast legions who stretch for as far as the human eye can see—will undoubtedly find the entire album one complete high.

NIGEL OLSSON'S DRUM ORCHESTRA AND CHORUS—Uni 73113 Well. For those thousands who've heard Nigel sing with Elton in concert, this album shouldn't be a surprise. Joining drummer Olsson are the brilliant Caleb Quaye, Mick Graham, BJ Cole, the inimitable and super bassist Mr. Dee Murray, and, if that weren't enough, Kathi McDonald, sings lead on two cuts, "Hummingbird," and "I Can't Go Home Again." Most of the songs were either written or co-written by Nigel and are really fine. Among the best "Sunshine looks like rain," the single "Some Sweet Day," "And I know in my heart," and the softly rippling "China." Throughout, Nigel's drumming cascades like a flowing waterfall. Wow!

VOLUME ONE—ELLOREE—John D. Louder-milk—Warner Bros. WS 1922 The almost legendary singer-songwriter who has been absent far too long from the re-cording scene returns with a rocking-chair-on-the-back-porch set of some of his most famous tunes. Herein lies "Abilene," "The Lament of The Cherokee Reservation Indian" and "The Jones'" as well as his biggest composition, "Tobacco Road." John is kind of guitar-playing Randy Newman, with a great sense of wit steeped in a mellow outlook on the little pleasures of life. Album should have wide appeal for FM rock, MOR and country audi-ences. ences

He was buried last week (11) in the Jewish Cemetery of his home town of Trieste.

Monzillo Dies: **Bourne Editor**

NEW YORK—Costabile Monzillo of Bourne Music is dead after a short illness. Monzillo was associated with Bourne for more than half a century Bourne for more than half a century and was editor emeritus at the time of his death. Munzillo secured his position with Bourne—then known as Irving Berlin Music Corp.—and as an arranger and editor he was respon-sible for the publication of works by many of America's most important composers. When Bourne Co. decided to develop in the area of educational and classical music, Munzillo's wealth of musical experience proved invalua-ble. In 1969, Munzillo's 50th anniver-sary with Bourne was marked by his being awarded status as editor emeri-tus by Mrs. Bonnie Bourne, head of the company. The funeral was held at St. Anastasia's Church in Harri-man, N.Y., last Saturday (14).

Also from the movies are "Cause I Believe In Loving" from "Bananas" and the "Theme From The Music Lovers." Paul Mc-Cartney's "Heart Of The Country" and a very pretty Gordon Lightfoot tune, "Your Loves Return" also get the Williams treatment. Nice and tuneful.

PORTRAIT OF JENNY—Dizzy Gillespie—Per-ception PLP 13 Performer, composer, arranger, conductor and producer. Dizzy Gillespie is all of these on a startlingly beautiful record. Four new songs lock together to make up a composite portrait—one that j:zz fans should want for their colections. Dizzy is an example of a veteran artist who could have rested on his many laurels; instead he has opted for con-tinued advancement and innovation. He has also assembled some really fine musicians for this set, especially Andrew Gonzalez, who con-tributes some remarkable bass work.

PEACHES—Etta James—Chess 2CH 60004 Etta received pop acceptance rather early in her career as a soulstress. Throughout the sixties, she churned out hit after hit and yet never really reached the status of Aretha Franklin or Otis Redding. This is her first all-inclusive greatest hits collection, including her most recent r&b chart success, "Losers Weep-ers." Etta still has the stuff to be recognized on a grand scale, but even if she were never ers." Etta still has the stuff to be recognized on a grand scale, but even if she were never to belt another note, tunes like "At Last," "All I Could Do Was Cry," "Something's Got A Hold On Me" and her biggest, "Pushover," attest to her full-blown talents. As a specially-priced two-record set, this package should do well with her many fans.

GREAT MOTION PICTURE THEMES-Angel S-36813

36813 Although the six pieces on this album are classical, the disk could have a decided pop appeal since all have been heard prominently in recent movies. Among the composers whose works are included: Mahler, Liszt, Chopin, Mo-zart, Tchaikovsky and Strauss. Working off a key-board, drums, bass and lead guitar set-up the group drives home seven numbers. PAULEY PAVILLION, U.C.L.A.—A young, near-capacity crowd at UCLA's Pauley Pavillion proved by their re-actions and applause that the Mothers are definitely not family fare. After a are definitely not family fare. After a three-year excursion into contempor-ary jazz and orchestra motifs, the Mothers are back doing what their fans like the best—extended and often obscene dialogues and songs.

The Mothers began their three-hour set with "Call Any Vegetable," a Zap-pa standard. Zappa seems to have pa standard. Zappa seems to have overcome the ego problem of con-stantly being in the spotlight. Al-though it's obvious that he's very much in control of the group, he has delegated lead roles to Mark Volman and Howard Kaylan, both ex-Turtles.

Also featured in the Mothers con-tinually changing line-up were Ian Underwood, Jim Pons, Bob Harris, Don Preston and drummer Ansley Dunbar, who had previously been playing anonymously with the Moth-ars due to other contraction due to other contractual agreements.

ers due to other contractual agree-ments. A lot of material from the Mothers new Bizarre/Reprise album "Fillmore East. June 1971," including "The Mud Shark," was performed at the U.C.L.A. show. ("The Mud Shark" has been one of the only cuts picked up by progressive FM stations, prob-ably because of the unbroadcastable dialogue on the rest of the album.) "Willie the Pimp," "What Kind of Girl Do You Think We Are," and "Peaches en Regalia" demonstrated Zappa's brilliance in picking up styles and themes from most major rock groups of the Fifties and Sixties. The tunes also demonstrated the Mothers musical expertise in the fields of pop. rock and jazz. Subject to exceptional parody and pointed remarks were Three Dog Night and CSN&Y. Tom Reddin, ex-LA-police-chief-turned-TV-newscaster, was refered to in terms that certainly seemed to border on libel. libel.

The highlight of the evening was a new piece that Zappa introduced as "the story and music for our next movie." The name of the forty-minute work is "Billy the Mountain." 





TOKYO — Nippon Grammophon president Kenichi Morita is to hold a special shareholders' general meeting on Sept. 27 with reference to the change of the company's name either to "Nippon Polydor" or to "Polydor K.K.".

K.K.". According to sources, the Grammo-phon-Philips Group (G.P.G.), the parent company of Nippon Grammo-phon, officially incorporated "Poly-gram," jointly financed by Siemens and Philips. For this reason, Deut-sche Grammophon and Philips Phon-ographie Industry changed their comographic Industry changed their com-pany names to "Polydor Internation-al" and "Phonogram International", respectively.

In other words, Polygram (pres-ident: Cohen Solbert) incorporated both "Polydor International" and "Phonogram International". Since Nippon Grammophon is affiliated with Polydor International, it was desided to adopt a none containing decided to adopt a name containing "Polydor."

But there is to be no change in the names of labels that Nippon Gram-mophon handles: the Grammophon and Polydor labels will remain as the classic and popular/local labels, re-spectively.

Brook Benton So. Africa \$ **Tops For Area**

IOPS FOF AFEA NEW YORK — Brook Benton will reportedly receive the largest guarantee ever offered a recording artist in South Africa when he em-barks on his first tour there in Sep-tember. Al Rosenstein, president of B.N.A. Management Corp., which handles all of the singer's affairs, said the tour will be for four weeks, starting on Sept. 17, and the promo-ter has guaranteed a minimum gross of \$2,500,000, with a potential gross of \$4,000,000. Benton, and his compa-ny, will perform in outdoor arenas, having seating capacities ranging from 10,000 to 60,000. The exact cit-ies, dates and locations are now being set. being set.

being set. Negotiations for the tour were conducted with John Morley, head of Aquarius Productions of South Afri-ca, who is bringing Benton to his country as a result of his popularity stemming from the success of his American recordings there. Ruth Bowen, President of Queen Booking Corp. in New York, joined Rosen-stein in coordinating the negotia-tions. tions.

tions. Benton's company will include an American act, Arlene Smith and her Chantells, if she can obtain release from her previous commitments, several local acts and a 24-piece or-chestra, conducted by Bobby Green, from the United States, and including Michael Silva on drums who will fly in from Germany. Arranger Fred Norman will also join the company, in order to update Benton's reper-toire in the course of the tour, to meet unanticipated demands from the au-diences for songs not originally in-cluded in the show. A live, in-person album of the con-

cluded in the show. A live, in-person album of the con-certs will be produced, for release in the United States, on the Cotillion label. Also, former Time-Life photo-grapher Jim Cummins will film the concerts for the production of a tele-vision special.

Two shows will be presented each day in each arena, with shows sched-uled for 24 out of the 30 days. Each show will be three hours long, Benton to perform solo for the last hour.

Rosenstein is expected to leave for South Africa, accompanied by Ruth Bowen, several weeks in advance of the start of the tour to supervice all final arrangements.

As a tie-in promotion, Benton's re-cent hit recording, "A Rainy Night In Georgia," will be reissued in South Africa, with the new title, "A Rainy Night In Durban." The singer has already recut the original master to include the new lyrics.



EMI Records has set up a special field promotion team to concentrate on college and university campuses in on college and university campuses in the promotion of the group's prog-ressive pop repertoire. The team will be headed by Terry Walker, previous-ly third-party repertoire manager at EMI, and the senior EMI rep in the Birmingham area, Brian Hancox, has been named as the teams operative for the midlands area. Two or three albums a month will be selected, and the team will work with college and university social secretaries, local ra-dio stations and newspapers, plus ardio stations and newspapers, plus arranging special window displays for disk retailers. It will co-ordinate its activities with agencies and managements promoting tours by the acts concerned, and its first assignment is the October trek by The Hollies organized by the Harold Davidson office. Extra copies of the poster being prepared for retailers in connection with the tour will be circulated by the team to universities and colleges, and taped interviews with the groups will be available to radio stations.

Other EMI Records staff realignments include the creation of a new talent post for Dave Croker, formerly manager of the progressive Harvest label. Croker will seek and develop new talent on a world wide basis, with special emphasis on America. which he was due to visit earlier this month. His place on the Harvest label has been taken by Nick Mobbs, who has rejoined the group after an absence of fourteen months. During his previous EMI service, Mobbs selected repertoire from America and thirdparty product. Terry Walkers thirdparty and RAK label management responsibilties have been taken over by Canadian-born Duncan Johnson, who has worked as a disk jockey for pirate radio and BBC. Ronnie Fowler has joined EMI from the Carlin Music exploitation staff to become Tamla Motown label manager in succession to John Reid.

Progressive pop is in line for a big boost on the radio following initial announcements about the BBC's fall schedules. The Corporation is inaugurating a nightly two-hour slot on Radio 1 which will broadcast on VHF as well as the medium wave, and the innovation marks a further step towards stereo programs. The night shows will bear the name of an existing progressive series "Sound Of The Seventies", and disk jockeys named to date for copering stints are John Peel, Alan Black and Bob Harris. The programs will be transmitted from 10 p.m. to midnite, during which time Radio 2 will continue to broadcast the magazine show "Late Night Extra" which hitherto has been carried by both channels. Radio 1 and 2 controller Douglas Muggeridge admitted that progressive pop was a minority interest, but maintained it was "a big and important minority". He is hoping that "Sound Of The Seventies" will attract a million listeners in its new time slot.

The pressing and distribution deal between A&M and Pye has been renewed for a further three years, back dated to April, continuing an association between the two companies which began in 1964 when Pye made the first A&M release under a licensing pact. Under the renewal agreement A&M will arrange its own distribution through racking outlets, record clubs and mail order, and Pye will cease to represent the label in some overseas territories. Pye offered the renewal deal two months before the existing agreement was due to expire, and has reason to be pleased at its acceptance A&M's expanding middle market is far less vulnerable to the whims and caprices affecting the per orientated sector of the music the pop-orientated sector of the music business. The renewal pact follows closely on the similar deal whereby Pye's sister company Precision Tapes continues to hold A&M's tape rights.

A competition organized jointly by Radio Luxembourg and EMI ends on August 29th, and centered on the album by The Temptations called "The Sky's The Limit". The contest consisted simply of listeners sending in the name of LP's producer to Radio Luxembourg's London offices, and the first two correct entries drawn by EMI promotion manager John Howson will have three days holiday in Luxembourg with a companion beginning October 1st and also receive the Temptations album plus the six LP package called the "Motown Story". There will be forty-six copies of the Temptations LP for runner-up in the competition.

Deep Purple managers Tony Edwards and John Coletta have formed Purple Music, and Graham Nolder for the professional manager for the new enterprise, which is the third started by the duo who already have Hec Music and Edwards-Coletta Music administered by Feldman. Nolder joins Purple on September 1st after over three years as professional manager of Lorna Music, preceded by service with EMI and Ardmore and Beechwood. He is succeeded at Lorna by office and royalty manager Peter Pavey.



Chi Coin 'Defender' Is A Sight/Sound **Super Novelty**



C C DEFENDER

CHICAGO-Chicago Dynamic Industries will soon be plopping the game players of the western world into sand-bag gun emplacements to defend their towns against invading bi-planes of World War I vintage when a brand new 'Defenders' rifle hits lo-cations. cations.

Just released to the coin trade, the ChiCoin Defenders is a sight, sound, tactil novelty piece commanding 25ϕ play (although it is adjustable back to 2-25 ϕ). Play action on the machine is as follows: After deposit of coin, a

is as follows: After deposit of coin, a three-dimensional bi-plane appears above a small town (set in an eerie black-lit night setting) and begins to make its pass across the playfield. Player ac-tivates the realistic machine gun by pressing a firing button in the right hand grip. A staccato machine gun fire, accompanied by authentic gun sounds as well as the drone of the plane itself, mount the excitement. A hit visually knocks the plane out of the sky, accompanied by the strick-en plane's siren diving sound. When it strikes the ground, a first class ex-plosion effect is activated. Players' scores depend directly upon the number of planes hit if the time allotted (game is adjustable for one or two minute games). ChiCoin sales manager Chuck Ar-nold advises that one of the game's innovations is its "no nuisance" solid state sound system. "The sound sys-tem's speaker is located in the ma-chine gun itself and while the player hears all the action perfectly, those in the surrounding area hear only muffied noises." Arnold stated. He

the surrounding area hear only muffled noises." Arnold stated. He further advised that the sound is ad-justable by the operator for both tone

and volume. The attacking planes do not fly in any steady pattern, primeing the skill demanded of the player. Some will ride high, some low, others bob and weave, precluding any quick master-ing of the game. All play factors combined, the Defenders is a chal-lenging game, jammed with realism, action and a good deal of artistic ap-peal thru the black-lit 3-dimensional playfield.

EDITORIAL:

Coin biz and the Price Freeze

President Nixon's 90 day wage and price freeze, which struck both commerce and consumer like the Hammer of Thor last Sunday night, had the music and games business buzzing with speculation on exactly how it would affect the operator, the distributor and the manufacturer. Was it good? Would it hurt? Questions, doubtlessly, which were buzzing thru every other major and minor industry in the country.

How it will affect coinbiz remains largely to be seen. Certainly, uppermost on everyone's mind is the price of equipment. All the jukebox factories are gearing to ship their new models by MOA showtime (one, at least, is already shipping). And naturally, all the games factories are in high gear punching out new novelties and new versions of standard pieces for the fall buying season (already underway). Will their prices, like most other prices, be frozen? In all probability they will, but the final judgement rests with each factory's respective legal department who will interpret the letter of the law as it comes from Congress. They may in some instances be able to set a new price when the machine is radically different from past types, or where a price announcement had already been made to distributors before the freeze went into effect. But, as we said, the final outcome rests with the legal people.

Machine and supplies importers, have a double problem, since they have to deal both with a price freeze plus a 10% surcharge on products landed. In addition, coinmen in both the import and export areas are watching the fluctuations of the dollar overseas with close attention, since anything from a de facto dollar devaluation to retaliatory "trade wars" will seri-ously affect their normal sales routine.

On the operating level, for the first time we must advise going easy on pushing music and/or games play up to 2.25c at locations still on 3.25c play. Also, keep attentive to your machine rotation scheduleyou may already have slated a new 2.25¢ shuffle to be moved into Joe's Bar next week. Better reevaluate the idea. In short, the very best rule of thumb for an operator to follow is: don't do anything price-wise at the locations that might arouse a complaint from a customer. Would make for a pretty feature story in the papers if some enterprising reporter found an operator

bouncing play pricing, wouldn't it? Clearly, on the plus side of the ledger, no new permachine, or cigarette, or sales, or whatever new taxes will go into effect these next 90 days. Also, the "skyrocketing" operating costs in general-from employee salaries, to supplies, to gas for the truck and the rest will take a breather for awhile.

So it's status quo in coinland by presidential decree. It's going to be tough for some of the trade, pretty good for the rest. Let's hope over the long haul it helps our tired, inflated old economy and gets some confidence back into Mr. and Mrs. America. Confidence that will put more of that loose change into the jukes, games and pool tables instead of the banks, bursting at the seams with the fattest savings accounts in history. Right or wrong, at least Washington's finally doing something dramatic to break the three-year pall.



Factory deliveries of 'Road Runner' are underway to local Bally Distributors.

"The players' objective is to weave in and out between the three lanes of traffic, while gunning his car to maximum speeds in order to build up maximum mileage on the eye-level mileage register. But the player's job is not merley to pass rival obstacle cars at high speed. He also must manipulate his car to avoid mileageloss collisions with rival cars.
