

With all the time, talent, effort and expense of recording, pressing and marketing a hit single, it's shocking to read all the complaints of poor record quality reported to Cash Box, and to suffer the gripes of distributors and one-stops over the phone saying the scattered deficiencies which traditionally show up in a shipment are getting more numerous. With all the sophisticated technology available to manufacturers today, the complainants are more than puzzled why the problem seems to grow instead of abate.

Chief among the deficiencies cited are: warpage, mislabeling, thin vinyl, poor start-in grooves, noise, and the one that takes the cake-off-center holes. Many labels, majors included, are being put to task for marketing "problem records." Some are even described as "chronic offenders." We bring this issue up here because there's one more complaint the wholesalers have-they claim letters and calls to offending labels are cheerfully

acknowledged and then virtually ignored.

There's no need to mention the numerous burdens poor pressings put on the distributors, one stops, stores, music operators, and, of course, labels themselves, in matters of double handling and shipping, when the bad goods have to be returned and replaced. But perhaps it is the music operator who suffers the most when he's called out on a midnight service call to find that the sensitive mechanism on his jukebox won't abide the eccentricities of a poorly-pressed single.

There's no doubt that the remedy exists, and that remedy is more conscientious quality control. In order for every "offending label" to know the faults of their goods for certain, every wholesaler and operator in the trade who has a sincere complaint should put it in writing and enclose a sample disk to demonstrate the problem to the production head at the label. If the goods are really all that bad, this is the surest way to get positive action.





This leaves it up to the big boys to provide the training ground for future industry leaders.



Non-Broadcast Activities Pace CBS Sales

NEW YORK — In a 1971 financial report, CBS said that 1971 was the first year in which a majority of revenues derived from non-broadcast activities. These include the record division, publishing and direct market-

Vision, publication, according to William The company, according to William S. Paley, chairman, and Dr. Frank Stanton, vice chairman, showed an earnings increase of 37% and sales in-crease of 9% over the 1970 period. CBS 1971 income before extraordinary items and an accounting change was items and an accounting change was \$63,792,000 on net sales of \$1,247,969,-000. Comparable results for 1970 were \$61,246,000 and \$1,210,755,000, respectively. Per share earnings before the extraordinary items and accounting change (adjusted for 1971 stock dividend) were \$2.22 compared with \$2.14 earned in 1970.

earned in 1970. Income before extraordinary items and accounting change for the fourth quarter of 1971 was \$22,593,000 on net sales of \$366,370,000. Comparable results for the fourth quarter of 1970 were \$16,506,000 and \$335,400,000, respectively. Per share earnings before extraor-

for share earlings before extraor-dinary items and accounting change for the fourth quarter of 1971 were 79ϕ compared with 58ϕ earned in the fourth quarter of 1970.

Extraordinary items had a net ne-pative effect in 1971 of 12¢ per share. They include a charge for the previ-ously announced phase-out of CBS's EVR cassette processing operations and an allowance for South American investments. These easts means consid investments. These costs were consid-erably offset by an extraordinary gain from the sale of the majority of CBS's Canadian CATV interests.

The accounting change caused a one-time unfavorable adjustment in 1971 of 5¢ per share. Under the change, CBS has adopted a more con-servative method of amortizing prepublication costs at its Holt, Rinehart and Winston, Inc. subsidiary to better match costs with revenues. Per share earnings in 1971 after extraordinary items and the accoun-ting change were \$2.05 per share.

Commenting on these results, Paley and Dr. Stanton said: "1971 was a remarkable year for CBS, with the Company recording sales and ordi-nary earnings gains despite a first quarter which was severely depressed by the loss of cigarette advertising. Television rebounded strongly by the Television rebounded strongly by the second quarter, but it was our non-broadcast businesses, especially re-corded music publishing and direct marketing which enabled us to report improved results. In fact, 1971 was the first year in CBS history that the majority of our revenues derived from non-broadcast activities. We be-lieve the Company is well postured to lieve the Company is well postured to capitalize on the strong consumer de-mands for goods and services widely predicted for 1972 and beyond."

predicted for 1972 and beyond." The CBS board of directors de-clared last week a cash dividend of 35¢ per share on CBS common stock payable March 10 to shareholders of record at the close of business on Feb. 25. The CBS directors also de-clared a cash dividend of 25¢ per share on CBS preference stock paya-ble March 31 to shareholders of rec-ord at the close of business on Feb. 25.

Net in-come was \$1,186,000, or 25 cents per share, compared to \$1,865,000, or 40 cents per share, during this period a vear earlier

cents per share, during this period a year earlier. For the first six months of fiscal 1972 sales were \$69,490,000, and net income before extraordinary items was \$1,262,000, or 27 cents per share. For the comparable period in fiscal 1971, sales were \$85,042,000, and net income was \$1,056,000, or 23 cents per share. There were 4,599,000 average shares outstanding this year versus 4,631,000 last year. Although sales for the first six

Although sales for the first six months of fiscal 1972 were lower by \$15,552,000 or 18% than the compara-ble period last year, net income before extraordinary items increased by \$206,000, or 20%, reflecting cost con-trol measures taken over the last nine

months. The Capitol earnings report noted that, due to seasonal factors, sales and earnings for the first six months of the fiscal year are ordinarily greater than those of the second six months months

As the company announced in the first quarter, its year-to-date results included two "extraordinary" items. The sale of its investment in Pickwick International stock resulted in an af-ter-tax gain of some \$7 million. A change to an alternatively acceptable accounting practice for product re-turned for exchange resulted in an af-ter-tax extraordinary charge against earnings of \$4,639,000. The net of these extraordinary items is \$2,438-000, or \$.53 per share net income af-ter taxes. This is in addition to the net income before extraordinary items of \$1,262,000, or 27 cents per share,

reported above. Despite the improvement in the company's earnings, in view of the severe loss suffered in the last fiscal year, the board of directors at its meeting last week decided that it was in the best interests of the share-

holders to resume the payment of di-vidends at this time. Capitol Industries, Inc., headquar-tered here, is traded on the American and Pacific Coast stock exchanges.

Ampex Says Music **Div. Adds To Losses** NEW YORK — Ampex Corp. says its estimates of a loss of \$40 million for the fiscal year ended last April 29 would be "substantially" larger than

reported. The company pointed to a "Continung investigation" of its music divi-sion, which had produced new evi-dence indicating that "reserves previ-ously established for that division will prove to be inadequate and result will prove to be inadequate and result in a loss for the corporation for the fiscal year... substantially in excess of the \$40 million..." reported on Jan. 11. A special audit of the music division by Touche, Ross & Co. is expected to give an account of the additional losses.

NMC Plans To Add 13 More W. Coast Outlets

NEW YORK — Stockholders atten-ding the annual meeting of NMC Corp. last week (8) were told the company had achieved a "commanding" position in the rack jobbing of records and tapes on the west coast and would press for a stronger posi-tion among major retailers on the east coast.

east coast. Chairman Jesse Selter said NMC will be adding 13 more major west coast stores representing about \$2 million in rack jobbing revenues to a roster that already includes all 37 White Front units, Zody's, Sage's, Le-onard's, Thearles', the Akron stores and the nine Wallichs Music City stores in California. Also scheduled to be added over the next four weeks, he be added over the next four weeks, he said, are seven large stores in the Philadelphia area and some 25 outlets in and around Detroit. The NMC chief exec noted that the

The NMC chief exec noted that the company could service up to \$50 mil-lion in record and tape volume from existing warehousing facilities. These presently include warehouses in Oceanside, N.Y., Detroit and Gardena and Burlingame, California. "Our only additions," he said, "would be in terms of personnel."







Lighthouse Dion

Di CARNEGIE HALL, NYC — Lighthouse made its break-through to the New York audience last week, firmly establishing itself as a top drawer act and totally turning the tables on the frigid reception the group got on the same Carnegie stage two years ago. Two years ago, Lighthouse had only been together for one per-formance before the group was rushed into Carnegie without even having time for a proper sound check. The results were gloomy, and since that day, Skip Prokop's 11-piece big band has looked at New York as its toughest nut to crack.

big band has looked at New York as its toughest nut to crack. But now, it's two years, two best-selling albums, one hit single and one record label later. Especially the rec-ord label. When Lighthouse switched to Stereo Dimension/Evolution Rec-ords, they received a concentrated drive to capture the potential audi-ence they held in the U.S. and Cana-da. Since the group is based in To-ronto, they didn't have much trouble in Canada and were even presented a gold maple leaf when their "Thoughts Of Movin' On" LP was declared in-

Sammy Davis, Jr.

Sammy Davis, Jr. GROVE LOS ANGELES — Practi-cally every entertainer extant could take a crash course on Sammy Davis, Jr. He breaks a lot of rules (opening with the perennial closer, "Impossible Dream," for example—then closing with the durable opener, "For Once in My Life." He also sports a Brooks Bros. no-no, black tie and button down shirt). Still, for showmanship, Junior has no senior. Brilliant, versa-tile, magnetic—there is no one word to describe the show or the man cur-rently on exhibition at the Grove.

to describe the show or the man cur-rently on exhibition at the Grove. Except maybe "fibber" for his open-night opening remarks. "It's go-ing to be a laid-back affair," he cau-tions, "there ain't but two 'wows' left in me." He then proceeds to tear the room apart with a performance that would vanquish five lesser men. It's unquestionably the most remarkable show seen in these parts since Sammy last played the room. For those interested in repertoire,

last played the room. For those interested in repertoire, he offers several medleys—Beatles, Blood, Sweat and Tears, Newly-Bri-cusse, recent Oscar award titles, along with "You're Nobody etc. etc.," "John, the Baptist" (a show-stopper), "Birth of the Blues," "Bojangles" (another show-stopper). He also lip synchs and struts to the Preston Foster tape of "Ya Got Trouble" (from "Music Man"), vocalizes band instrument riffs—and half a dozen more songs we never got around to noting—we ritts—and half a dozen more songs we never got around to noting—we were too busy cheering. Legendary Masters. WHISKY A GO GO, L.A. — The "Legendary Masters Party" given by United Artists Records here last week turned out to be a kind of a legend in its own right, although not exactly in the way anticipated by label brass. The event, at the Whisky a Go Go, was held to commemorate the issu-ance of the latest in a series of reis-sue albums by the label. Guests were to witness a "sock hop" and live show featuring performances by the Fleet-woods, Ventures, Bobby Vee, Jan & Dean, Del Shannon and Freddie Can-non. All except Cannon contributed to the label's success in the 50's and 60's; Cannon is now with the compa-ny as a promotion man. The festivities proceeded as plan-ned, with disk jockey Jim Pewter playing records from the era, and dancers, many in 50's costume, on the floor. At shortly past 9:00, however, the event took a turn out of schedule. Power lines outside the club, appar-ently in bad repair and perhaps over-loaded, burst, leaving the club in

ently in bad repair and perhaps over-loaded, burst, leaving the club in darkness relieved only by candles and portable lighting supplied by camera crews there to cover the event.

Undaunted, guests and participants attempted to keep the festivities roll-ing. Audience members and members of the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band at variof the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band at vari-ous times sang acapella versions of 50's songs, and the sax section of the pickup band hired for the occasion supplied memorable versions of "Honky Tonk" and "Tequila," among other tunes. At approximately 11:00, UA creative services department rep-resentative Martin Robert Cerf called the evening to a halt explaining that the evening to a halt. explaining that the Department of Water and Power would be unable to repair the damage

Charles Mingus

PHILHARMONIC HALL, NYC — A triumph for jazz and for Charlie Mingus . That's what transpired the nite of Feb. 4 at Lincoln Center's Philharmonic Hall as both vintage and new Mingus works were given inspired treatment by Mingus and his entourage of gifted musicians.

entourage of gifted musicians. Emceed by ardent jazz buff Bill Cosby, the evening's offerings were kicked off in a light vein with "Hon-eysuckle Rose." Cosby "conducted" the band strictly for laffs, and the tone for most of the night was set— relaxed, informal and swinging. Luminaries of this happy musical occasion included these: Gene Am-mons whose blues-playing that night

mons, whose blues-playing that night will long be cherished; bassist Milt Hinton, whose rhythm bass lines gave the band a rock-firm foundation; alto great Lee Konitz; Bobby Jones, tenor man, who absolutely wailed all night long; the peerless baritone sax artis-try of Gerry Mulligan. (Gerry was obviously digging the whole scene and looked about as relaxed as a cat can get) and pianist John Foster can get) and pianist John Foster, whose funky and powerful piano swung mightily throughout the proceedings. In all, over 20 musicians comprised the orchestra.

An added treat: stopping by to say a most welcome musical hello were Dizzy Gillespie, James Moody and Randy Weston. Dizzy was engaging as he and Cosby had fun trading vocal choruses on a bop number. Moody blew everyone's mind with an uptempo, multi-noted solo on flute, and Randy Weston shone also in a brief customarily distinctive piano

Billy Joel Ballinjack

Dallinjack TROUBADOUR, L.A. — Billy Joel may well be the first big discovery of 1972. The singer, formerly with New York group the Hassles, has stepped out on his won and shows a tremen-dous amount of talent and realized potential.

Coming on like a New York streetcoming on like a New York street-punk, with jeans, a leather jacket, paratrooper boots, a stocky build and curly hair, Joel steps to the pianop warms up with a few tinkly bars of "Hooray for Hollywood," and you know you're seeing something spe-cial cial.

know you're seeing something spe-cial. As a pianist, Joel is technically ex-cellent, versatile and fully in com-mand. As a singer, he wavers some-where between Elton John and Don McLean. As a lyricist he's erudite and clever. But the whole is clearly greater than the sum of the parts, because it's as a performer that he's tops. From pleasant ballads like "Got To Begin Again" to socially-aware songs like "Captain Jack Will Get You High," Joel shines through (sample lyric: "You look so Rod Ste-wart . . . but you still pick your nose"). He talks to the audience, he does impressions—and sonething else. He is, for one song, Joe Cocker. It's so good that what he does transcends mimicry. Singing and playing "The Letter" Joel is Joe Cocker and Leon Russell and probably the whole Mad Russell and probably the whole Mad

Dogs troupe. Fantastic. You must see him. Joel records for Family. Top-billed was Ballinjack, a jazzy

r&b group from Seattle. Consisting of a trombonist, a man doubling on reeds and woodwinds, a drummer, guitarist, and lead vocalist doubling bass, the group shows tremendous musicianship that is largely wasted on a set of pedestrian original mate-rial. They bear some idiological resemblance to the Buddy Miles-helmed Electric Flag, but even that group went outside for some songs. Ballin-jack could well consider the same course. They record for Columbia.

outing. (Singer Honey Gordon ap-peared several times during the eve-ning. She has a pleasant and very mu-sical voice, but her style and choice of selections were very dated. Her sing-ing was something to be tolerated while waiting for the band to resume playing.) playing.)

A good portion of new Mingus which was presented in the latter half of the program is available on his new Columbia lp, "Let My Children Hear Music." Of special interest here was a concerto for sax and trumpet. Taking center stage on this number were "Jug" Ammons and 18-year-old trumpeter, John Faddis. (Faddis filled in for ailing trumpet great, Roy Eldridge, for whom Mingus had originally written the piece.) Young Faddis essayed the challenging music generally witt skill and power, but his youth and Philharmonic Hall may have had something to do with some mishandled notes and traces of uncer-tainty Faddis evidenced. He has, how-ever, obvious talent and is particular-lv impressive in the upper register. The trumpet section, for the record, was superfine all night, sounding as crisp, tight and together as the best of Maynard Ferguson's old groups. Ammons, enjoying himself immense-ly, knocked everybody out with his blues choruses. Mingus was his usual powerful presence, and Teo Macero's contagious enthusiasm while conduct-ing was evident. In all, the concert was one of the most exciting and sat-isfying musical events in this fan's memory. The hip and enthralled audi-ence loved it all. Let's have more! d.l. d.|.

Dawson Boys


DR. GENEROSITY, NYC — Since James Taylor has become a super-star, a lot of folks are going to Caro-lina in their minds. When they get there, they'll find the Dawson Boys gone to Carolina since the day they were born, singing and picking back-porch folk music just as nice as could be

be. But since most people who go to Carolina in their minds don't bother to bring their bodies with them, the Dawson Boys trucked up to New York City from their farm in Char-lotte. North Carolina so that they lotte. North Carolina so that they could play for record companies and other interesting New York-type au-diences. Their set at Dr. Generosity was a pleasant reminder to city folk that there are still a few places left where everything hasn't been either paved or plasticized. Ed. the older brother, plays acous-

tic six-string guitar and five-string banjo. Bob plays acoustic 12-string guitar and keyboards. Ed does most guitar and keyboards. Ed does most of the songwriting and lead singing while Bob handles mostly harmonies and the lead guitar-piano work. But both boys know how to switch off to back each other, and are especially fine at blending their voices. Their harmonies grew up together.

The Dawsons write the kind of songs that will never become dated by their style or topics; they will refine and mellow with age. Ed and Bob grew up in a world where both country and rock are their roots, and their songs original show it. "The Only Game In Town" could be done straight country & western by Way-lon Jennings, it could receive a coun-try-rock arrangement from the Everly Bros. or could be given full rock treatment by Creedence Clearwater Revival. "My Compadre" could have been done by Hank Williams or John Sebastian. When Ed dons his banjo for a bluegrass version of the Beat-les' "Hard Days' Night," it sums up the best of two worlds; country and rock as seen from a Carolina backporch. m.p.

'Imagine' Five by John & Yoko

GULF & WESTERN PLAZA, NYC-Imagine five films by John Lennon and Yoko Ono. Two by John, two by Yoko and one by John & Yoko. Alto-gether it spells Joko, the name of John & Yoko's film production com-pany. Joko's newest film, "Imagine," was previewed last week at a screen-ing coordinated by May Pang, John & Yoko's assistant and production aide. The show, which included Yoko's "Fly," and John's "Erection" was a varied format of abstract concept pre-sentation, ranging in structure from sentation, ranging in structure from Haiku cinema to evolved still-life portraits.

John Lennon uses the film media as canvas more than as celluloid. He matches color hues and intensities with the mood and direction of the music. For this reason, it seems as though Lennon will eventually get into the color-sound mixing and fad-ing possible with videotape equipment

"Imagine" (the film) revolves around the "Imagine" LP that John put out on Apple Records last year. Soundtrack albums are usually made Soundtrack albums are usually made with the film in mind, but in this case, the film was made with the album in mind, and many scenes tie in directly to the songs. At one point, Lennon is facing backwards in a row-boat, unsuccessfully trying to push the boat away from the shore with an even In the midt of his structure. the boat away from the shore with an oar. In the midst of his struggle, on comes "How can I go forward if I don't know which way I'm facing?" As the following lines of "How" un-fold, however, John finally gets his bearings and rows downstream with Yoko.

There are also portions of "Imagine" that are total digressions into fantasy and dreams, among them a brilliant animated sequence of a flying Rors-chach inkblot by Carmen Davino. "Imagine" employs Rene Margritte-

Pete Seeger: A Song & A Stone

NEW YORK-This is more than a documentary of a folksinger. It traces the evolution of non-violence from dogma to a more realistic state where self-defense is often its logical outgrowth rather than its closet skeleton.

Pete Seeger has been a fighter all along. His Columbia recordings have been honest and personal reflections, not folk-rock wave-surfers looking for that perfect trend. Years before the word "ecology" was commonly used, he quietly recorded an LP entitled "God Bless The Grass" which deserves much of the credit for the entire "respect nature" movement. Now he has placed himself in front of documentary film cameras and is of documentary film cameras and is free to discuss in prose what often cannot be said in music without be-coming pedantic. What emerges is thoroughly compelling, if not "enter-taining" in the traditional sense. Pete's relationship with Johnny Cash is subtly captured as only cinema variate can and the short score in

verite can, and the short scene in which Don McLean appears singing at a friendly gathering in the Seegers' home is a lot more realistic than the "American Pie" myth which is sprouting up all around the Seeger protege. There are comments in the film which will become as familiar as "Turn, Turn, Turn," "Waist Deep In The Big Muddy" or "Where Have All The Flowers Gone" which are featured among other of his "hits."

Perhaps the idea of a legend such as Seeger "posing" as even a docu-mentary film star will upset the purist in you. The delicacy, honesty and sensibility of the way the project was handled forces you to abandon any such misconception.

marily concerned with depicting their life as art, rather than channelling their energies into the technique of cinematography. John Lennon leads a life that many others dream of—he has placed his dreams on film to en-hance your imagination. m.p.

Cabaret

ZIEGFIELD THEATRE, NYC -Here's a movie that's more like the book than the stage play. There are new additions to the Broadway score and many deletions, arising from the role changes in major characterizations and the overriding idea that the film should be a drama with music rather than a musical.

The transitions will irk Broadway fans no doubt, but much of what has been altered displays the highest cinematic regard behind it. The musical numbers now stem from the Cabaret itself and so we are no longer worried about street people suddenly bursting into song in an otherwise staid/decadent environment. Germans only sing in night clubs or beer halls: realism which doesn't bow to theatricality.

The movie version is most notable for the musical triumphs of Liza Minelli; the ABC/Dunhill soundtrack album will be one of the few recordings on which her talents are truly captured for what they are. Joel Grey recreates his Broadway role as the Cabaret host and though he has recorded before, the impact of the caster will bring his voice to a wider audience than ever. And one of the new numbers, "Maybe This Time" should step out as a future Oscar candidate, with many cover version no doubt in the offing.

The movie, to quote the screenplay, is "devine decadence." The music captures the drama without dominating the pre-WWII German Weltanshauung.

WHISKY A GO GO, L.A. — It could have been a battle of the Kings, I suppose, as these two veteran bluessuppose, as these two veteran blues-ters appeared together for one night at the Whisky, but anybody familiar with the combatants could have pre-dicted the "winner" easily, far in advance.

Freddie is a highly competent per-former, and certainly an adequate guitarist. For his set of material in-cluding "Five Long Years," an El-more James tune or two and, of course, his own "The Stumble," he pulled out all stops to get the packed house off their feet. And they did, as he jumped, twitched, played his guitar behind his back, and otherwise resort-ed to several fairly standard blues performer tricks. He worked well in the club, and he and his excellent band got a traditionally apathetic crowd to give him a well-deserved ovation. Certainly a headliner any Freddie is a highly competent perovation. Certainly a headliner any other night of the week.

But this was B. B. King's night, and he's not called the King of the Blues for nothing. Taking the crowd that Freddie had readied, he proceeded to turn the house upside down. Riffs that his predecessor had played minutes before, B. B. would repeat, only with so much more finesse, you'd wonder what had caused all that reaction to the earlier set. The program included the earlier set. The program included most of the numbers King has been playing live for the last couple of years at least—"How Blue Can You Get," and so on, plus some of his more recent hits. Everything came out fine; everything came out B. B. King. What a set! What a night! t.e.

Carol Hall

Gatol Mall McCARTER THEATRE, PRINCE-TON, N.J.—The air was chill in this college town and bundled people hur-ried along the snowy footpaths. But inside the McCarter it was warm and loose. And on stage doing that much more to make it warmer and looser was Carol Hall, the young singer/ songwriter/pianist from Abilene, Tex-as, whose second album has just been released on the Elektra label. Carol looked so relaxed and assured

released on the Elektra label. Carol looked so relaxed and assured behind her piano that we could as easily have been watching her in her study at home. Her songs too, with their frequent personal touches, did much to enhance this informal mood. For example, "Uncle Malcolm," off the new album, is a tale of a country girl who has gone to the city and later comes home to see the family she left behind. It is autobiography of a sort, yet so artfully crafted by Carol that is takes on a wider mean-ing too.

Carol that is takes on a wider mean-ing too. Her set showed her off on uptempo numbers as well as ballads. Among the finest of the fast-pacers was "Thank You Babe," which is slated to be released as a single in the near future. Soft shoe, finger snaps, special material all add up to a bright, welcome and en-joyable (if somewhat abbreviated) stint. Good patter in between, includ-ing a sham phone call from one of his ing a sham phone call from one of his five children, set a warm, ingratiating

five children, set a warm, ingratiating mood. Avalon may be a ten-handicap golfer. But he's a scratch singer. Eden has obviously worked hard on her bottom half of the show. Lots of extra special material (on such as "Everything's Alright," "You're the Top" and "Smack Dab in the Mid-dle") are well conceived Standouts "Everything's Alright," "You're the Top" and "Smack Dab in the Mid-dle") are well conceived. Standouts include a medley of old fashioned songs dating back to Alice Faye and Betty Grable flicks, "Being Green," that instant new standard from Sesame St., and a volcanic version of "Come Back to Me." Morgana King

RAINBOW GRILL, NYC-Morgana King walked onto the Rainbow Grill stage, her profile strong but her stage, her profile strong but her stride uncertain. Over the years, Miss King has garnered a strong reputation as an innovative and striking song stylist, but her only recent return to the stage did not at first allow her total confidence.

However, the beauty of the set we caught was that this confidence gradually developed as Morgana realized that the audience was there for her, and that she could relax and be informal. Watching the transition of her delivery from nervous probing to self-assured improvisation gave further insight into the style and finesse that Morgana King had to master to harness the soaring vocal dynamics she has trademarked.

Backed by guitarist Joe Puma, bass-ist Mike Moore and drummer Ed Cacavelli, Miss King showcased her voice in many different settings, rang-ing from standards to newer pop tunes such as Leon Russell's "Song For You" and Lennon-McCartney's "Elea-nor Rigby." The latter tune received a new meaning in her haunting ar-rangement, which captured feelings of isolation and alienation in depth. Miss King took special delight in re-filling a request for her Portugese rendition of "Corcovada." rendition of "Corcovada." Morgana King is a landmark among

jazz vocalists. But the taller the landmark, the greater the necessity that it sway with the breeze to prevent its toppling from over-rigidity. Morgana King has let her style bend with winds of change and still stands tall. m.p.

Wilson Pickett **Jackie Moore**

Jackie moore COPACABANA, N.Y.—We knew the moment we saw the three bus loads of mid-western tourists fill the upper tier of the Copa floor that this could never work. These people probably would have flipped for a Lawrence Welk type show. But since most come from areas where there are no soul stations, everything that Wilson Pic-kett was doing they must have been hearing for the very first time. We'd bet that 95% of them never heard of Wilson Pickett before they walked Wilson Pickett before they walked into the Copa. Add to this the beauti-ful Copa timing of having your steak arrive just as Pickett hits the stage, (you get the feeling you're eating against a deadline) and you end up with a handicap that's almost insur-mountable. But Wilson gave it his all in his silver sequin suit. He sang his heart out. "Fire & Water," a whisker-throated soul version of "Never My Love," great screams and ex-citement in "Don't Knock My Love." But the people just didn't under-stand. And since Wilson does ten times as well when he's turned on by an audience, we saw less than the best of Wilson Pickett. At one point Bill Cosby walked out to the mike and put the audience down for not getting with it, but nothing could have helped.

Even Jackie Moore, who has one of the most exciting soul voices to come thru in recent years, and sounded absolutely great opening night, couldn't really cut thru the movement of waiters and the serving of appetizers.

I'd love to see this Pickett Revue again in a better setting. Maybe the Copa, with its present day tour audi-ences, isn't yet ready for "real" soul music. m.o.

Tickets for all three concerts were scaled from \$4-6. There was a student discount factor working at the uni-versity. Three Dog Night presently ranks as America's largest-grossing live rock attraction. The ABC/Dunhill Records artists earned more than 5^{1}_{2} -million on the road last year.

NEW YORK-LORD SUTCH, ALIAS JACK THE RIPPER

David Sutch . . . Lord David Sutch . . . Screaming Lord Sutch!

The transformation of **David Sutch** to Screaming Lord Sutch, the Fifth Earl of Harrow and a rightful English heir to good old rock & roll, is a continuing saga. Metamorphosis began in 1961, when Sutch got the idea to grow his hair long

almost before anyone else. He even had pictures taken in the newspapers that showed his $11\frac{1}{2}$ " long hair being measured with a ruler.

The next step was Screaming Lord Sutch & the Savages. On the rampage in England—helping keep rock & roll alive during the years that America wallowed in Frankie Avalon and Bobby Rydell. The Savages was the first band that Nickey Hopkins ever played in professionally. There were also Sutch Savages as Jimmy Page, Jeff Beck, Noel Redding, Matthew Fisher and many others, all who have played with Sutch in the past and continue to sit in today for his live sets and recording sessions. He even had pictures taken for his album covers that depict him as really palsy-walsy with lots of rock & roll stars.

"If you're in a recording studio, then your first concern is the music. When you're onstage, people are mainly interested in the show you give them. The music is definitely important, but theatrics are what it is in front of a live audience." Following his credo, the Screaming Lord took to being wheeled onstage in a coffin, like Screaming Jay Hawkins. The next step was setting the stage on fire during his version of Jerry Lee Lewis' "Great Balls Of Fire."

The transformation continued. Somewhere along the way, Screaming David swallowed a bubbling vial containing a mysterious solution of horror stories, theatrics and rock & roll. After much gagging and considerable wretching and rolling on the floor, the Fifth Earl of Harrow turned into Jack the Ripper!

Where Are You, Mary Clarke?

The stage is set with the usual English hard-rock equipment, manned by Ritchie Blackmore and Nick Simpler (both of Deep Purple), Matthew Fisher of Procol Harum and Victor & Annette Brox of "Jesus Christ Superstar." But the feeling that something different is about to happen is soon justified when an Olde English bobby walks onstage, dressed as though the last corner he rounded was the Turn of the Century.

Checking around and then deciding that all is well, the bobby leaves. Enter a pretty young lady, dressed from the same era as the bobby. Even though she's dressed in old fashioned clothes, it's easy to tell that this lady of the night is a prostitute, especially since she walks around saying, "Come here, Dearie, I've got something for you."

And Jack, the Fifth Earl of Harrow, has something for the lady, too. Something (Cont'd on p. 34)

HOLLYWOOD—I SAW DICKIE YESTERDAY—The story of the rock and roll performer who has "gone country" has been told many times. There's Conway Twitty, for instance, Carl Perkins, Jerry Lee Lewis—and we told you about Ray Peterson in these pages not too many weeks ago.

We were going to do another such story on **Dickie Lee**, who hit in 1962 with "Patches," continued with "I Saw Linda Yesterday," "Laurie" and "The Girl From Peyton Place" in the years following. Dickie's had a couple of country hits recently, on RCA, and we asked for his version of the switch.

"Of course there's a difference between 'pop' and 'country.' It's in the arrangements, the instrumentation, the songs and the feel. For me, one of the best things about the change is the simplicity of country music. It's basic, and honest. The songs I used to do would have maybe twenty chords in them. I'd be working with pick-up bands all over the country, and it'd really difficult to get them used to the arrangements.

"But, really, I've always been a frustrated hillbilly at heart. My first recordings were with a group of friends on Sun. I met Jack Clement there; he was engineering the sessions. Jack and I have together ever since. He's still producing me. We recorded 'Patches' in Beaumont, Texas. Jack had stolen the demo from Chet Atkins' desk in Nashville. Most people don't notice it right away, but there's even a country fiddle on the record."


At about that time, Dickie, who cites **Webb Pierce** as having been his first big idol, wrote "She Thinks I Still Care," a standard that was subsequently cut by everybody from **George Jones to Jerry Lee Lewis to Connie Francis** and beyond.

Dickie feels that when he first went straight-on country, recording "Specials," a tune he found on a **Charley Pride** album, some of the new audience may have doubted his sincerity. "I think that 'Mahogany Pulpit' really helped. I didn't originally want to do the song. I didn't think I could handle the recitation. But it came off really well. Now I've been talking to some people out here in Los Angeles about doing some voice-overs and songs for television and movies.

"But I guess I really knew that I was going to be accepted when I appeared on **Porter Wagoner's** TV show. I sang Jimmie **Rod**gers' 'Waiting for a Train.' A few days later I got a letter from an elderly lady who had been watching the program. She said 'I've never seen you before, but if you keep on like that, I know you'll do real well.' I like to hang out at the Opry. I'd never stay around auditoriums and dance halls back in the old days."

Dickie also finds doing live shows 'a lot more fun'' than during the early sixties. "I really like the audiences much more. Maybe it's because they dig me."



And Jack the Ripper will soon be here in the flesh, so to speak. Screaming Lord David Sutch the Fifth is planning his first U.S. tour in February, on the bill with **Deep Purple**. The dual bill will make **Ritchie Blackmore** available for the Sutch show, with a good chance that Matthew Fisher will also be there to head up a solid band lineup. Between now and then, if David drinks any more mysterious vials, there might be even more interesting transformations for us to witness when he gets here. mark pines

HOLLYWOOD-DENNY RANDELL: LISTENING TO YOU, I HEAR THE MUSIC.

In a couple of weeks, the first full-scale professional production of The Who's "Tommy" will be presented, at the Aquarius Theatre in Los Angeles. The production will be staged with actors, singers and dancers (most cast members in all three capacities) in a concept formulated by Joel Rosensweig, who originated the concept as his Master's degree project at USC last year.

Making the transition from amateur student production to professional presentation is a project deserving serious attention. One of the prime forces in making that transition is musical director Denny Randell.

Probably best known in the industry for his work with Bob Crewe as a songwriter for the Four Seasons and The Toys, among others, Randell was also, for a time, staff producer for RCA here on the coast. He comes to the project with a lot of enthusiasm.

"When I joined, I was given a copy of the album and Joel's story line concept. To me, the style of the opera is as important to it as the songs The Who wrote. So I've tried to keep the flavor as close to the original as possible. The main changes result from expanding the vocal parts from four male voices to a mixed chorus of as many as 26 on some songs. We expanded the brass section from one French horn, adding to it two trumpets, a trombone and a baritone sax. We've kept the rhythm section to electric and acoustic guitars, keyboards, bass, drums, percussion and Moog.

"To insure the best sound, we've designed a new system for the Aquarius. When 'Hair' was here, they were never able to work the problems out completely, but we're trying something new. Our setup will be in many ways similar to a recording studio. Instruments will be isolated and baffled so that it's possible to add echo individually or to bring up separate levels. There's a booth for four background singers, and another vocal chorus will be miked separately. All of the actors will be carrying hand mikes."

In arranging the music. Randell and Rosensweig have only changed the sequencing a bit and have kept the arrangements as close to the originals as possible. Pieces have been lengthened for dance routines, and an occasional bit of Randell original material may be fit in, but the audience will hear primarlly what they have come to expect. At the time of this writing, the show is in the midst of rehearsal, and bugs are still being worked out. The quadraphonic sound system is being installed. And, as we said, there's a lot of enthusiasm on the set.

'Committee To Save Opry' Fights For Ryman Hall

NASHVILLE — A move is under way here to save the Ryman Auditor-ium (currently known as WSM's Grand Ole Opry House) from destruc-tion following the final performance of the Grand Ole Opry there some-time next year. The drive is drawing chief support from civic and cultural organizations such as the Nashville symphony orchestra and the city's arts council, it is reported. Some of those organizations feel Ryman is an ideal location for civic and cultural events because of the au-ditorium's audience capacity of about 3,600. Nashville's Municipal Auditori-um is too large for their purposes, they say, and other city auditoriums NASHVILLE -A move is under

they say, and other city auditoriums are too small. Ryman has served as the site of the Grand Ole Opry since 1941, when the show was moved from the Nashville's War Memorial Building. 
NSD Set To Distrib Indies



Jerry Lee has double-barreled potential on his new release. "Think About It Darlin' " is a strong, slow ballad that is sure to climb the country charts, while "Chantilly Lace" is a Big Bopper pop classic that could rescore on pop surveys when given the Jerry Lee treatment.

JOHNNY PAYCHECK (Epic 10836)

Someone To Give My Love To (3:00) (Jack & Bill, ASCAP-J. Foster, B. Rice) A sound follow up to "She's All I Got," this new Johnny Paycheck single retains some of the stylization of the previous single that should firmly establish his sound on the charts. The tune manages to get across the "She's All I Got" feel but still sound different and distinctive. Flip: no info available.

DON GIBSON (Hickory 1623)

Far, Far Away (2:22) (Acuff-Rose, BMI-D. Gibson) Top hit status isn't very far, far away from Don Gibson's new single. Kicking off with a funky backbeat that doesn't quit, Gibson's vocals place smooth melody over the driving background. Flip: "What's Happened To Me" (2:50) (same credits).

CONNIE SMITH (RCA 0655)

Just For What I Am (2:23) (Blue Crest, Hill & Range, BMI-D. Frazier, A.L. Owens) A strong ballad with a big 12-string and steel guitar sound, "Just For What I Am" provides a fitting showcase for the unique vocal styling of Connie Smith. Flip: "I'd Still Want To Serve Him Today" (2:18) (Neelys Bend, BMI—R. Lewis).

THE STATLER BROS. (Mercury 73275)

Lee) A bouncy, infectious beat and smooth, old fashioned harmonies trigger the ostalgia in a tune about all the fond memories of childhood. The combination is bound to appeal to a wide market. Flip: "Does Mel Tillis Really Stutter?" (2:19) (same credits).

SHIRLEY EIKHARD (Capitol 3281)

Smiling Wine (2:50) (Newtonville, ASCAP-S. Tyson)

Placing the contemporary phrasing of Tracy Nelson and Rita Coolidge into the country idiom, Shirley Eikhard uses a Sylvia Tyson song as her vehicle. The result is a refreshing sound that should catch on with no trouble. Flip: "Together" (2:13) (Beechwood, BMI-S. Eikhard).

THE COMPTON BROS. (Dot 17408)

Yellow River (2:48) (Guild Pub. of Cal., ASCAP—A. Laszio) Starting with a Motown-type guitar riff, this tune quickly gets into a rhythmic country groove, complete with fiddle. PALOMINO, L.A. — Waylon Jen-nings doesn't make it out to Los An-Waylon Jennings doesn't make it out to Los An-geles enough. Evidence enough was that this 400-seat club was sold out for two shows, and that Kris Kris-tofferson and Phil Spector showed up from across town to watch the RCA artist sing and play

from across town to watch the RCA artist sing and play. The set opened with three numbers from Jenning's topnotch band, the Waylors. Their versions of "My Bucket's Got a Hole In It," "Red, Red Wine" and "Long Black Veil" were capably performed, though not par-ticularly distinctive.

Then Jennings came onstage and Then Jennings came onstage and sang his way through practically ev-ery song he's ever recorded, it seems, from "Just to Satisfy You" to his most recent "Good Hearted Woman." Along the way, he drew from the pop charts ("MacArthur Park"), r&b ("Sick and Tired") and "folk" ("For Lovin' Me"), turning them all into Jennings material.

Kristofferson came onstage to join him in a chorus of "Me and Bobby McGee" and, speaking of Jennings' prowess as a singer, commented "This is the first time Moby Dick ever sang with Flipper." That pretty well takes

care of his voice, but perhaps not enough attention is spent on his tal-

care of his voice, but perhaps not enough attention is spent on his tal-ent as a guitarist—strictly first-rate, and totally distinctive. Outstanding was the bluesy introduction to "It Should Be Easier Now," and the in-strumental choruses of "McGee." Opening the show was the Palomi-no's house band, led by Capitol's Tony Booth. Often awarded locally for their work, the group seem to approach the ideal for that type of unit—clean, well-played versions of the big hits of the day, with a couple of off-the-wall choices thrown in. Dan Holder and J. D. Maness were out-standing on guitar and steel guitar respectively, with Holder performing admirably on banjo, as well. At one point, the band played a medley that included such disparate material as "Last Train to Clarksville" and "White Cliffs of Dover" and pulled it off well. Holder sang "Old Rivers" doing imitations of James Stewart, Lum & Abner and, of course, Walter Brennan, that was quite amusing. Tony Booth strummed at an unmiked acoustic guitar and sang, quite capa-bly, from time to time acoustic guitar and sang, quite capably, from time to time.

Some of the tunes go back quite a ways, such as Ivory Joe Hunter's "Since I Met You, Baby" and Brook Benton's "It's Just A Matter Of Time." Others such as "Only Love Can Break A Heart" and "Here Comes Honey Again" are more recent. But whether they are old, new or in between, these ten tunes are pure Sonny James and that's enough said!

WHAT AIN'T TO BE, JUST MIGHT HAPPEN— Porter Wagoner—RCA 4661 This new collection of songs just might hap-pen for Porter Wagoner, and that's not saying that it wasn't meant to be to start with. There are a number of new directions present that that it wasn't meant to be to start with. There are a number of new directions present that are sure to influence country music in the months to come; bouncy echo vocals in "The Rubber Room" and the topical lyrics of "Waldo The Wierdo" are tricks that not everyone could pull off with country purists. But Porter shouldn't have any trouble since he uses his effects and new directions tastefully, backing them with his years of solid country experi-ence. Other highlights include "Comes And Goes," "Little Bird" and "I Found A Man."





GOOD HEARTED WOMAN—Waylon Jennings-RCA 4647

Seikodo Holds Annual Confab

At the gathering, the company's president Masanobu Iihara said as follows: "It is eleven years since we held the first gathering in attendance of all of our staff. The sales for the first year were 120 mil-lion yen. In June 1971, the 10th an-niversary of our company, we achieved the sales of 6.2 billion yen. For the period of July 1971 to Jan. 20, 1972, sales were 5 billion yen, this means we can expect the gross sales of 7.5 billion yen for the fiscal 1972 of July 1971 to June 1972. In March, we will have 60 new members who came from all over the country. We established new branches in Southern part of Tokvo, Fukuoka and Chiba last year to extend the sales. "As for 1972, we should be aware of the general severe economy. As for the fiscal 1973 of July 1972 to June 1973, we set a sales target of 9.5 bil-lion yen as a part of our policy to accomplish the sales of 18 billion yen for fiscal 1975. To do this, I think we have to keep our policy of extend in quality, improve in quality."

AFM, Mexican Unions Reach Accords For Stronger Ties

NEW YORK — Agreements designed to protect the jobs of professional musicians and to strengthen relations between the American Federation of Musicians and its counterparts in Mexico have been announced by Hal Davis, President of the 315,-Davis, President 000-member AFM.

Davis, President of the 315,-000-member AFM. Davis' announcement followed rat-ification of identical pacts between the AFM and the two unions rep-resenting musicians in Mexico. In an-nouncing the agreements, Davis ex-pressed optimism that "musicians on both sides of the border will benefit, because the agreements call for equal jobs, equal opportunities, and equal exchanges. In addition, they insure that professional wages and working conditions will prevail in both coun-tries, and that the AFM and its coun-terparts in Mexico will assist each other in compiling and exchanging information vital to the protection of all the unions' members." Davis recently led an AFM delega-tion during three days of negotiations

tion during three days of negotiations in Mexico City, where they met with officials of the Sindicato Unico de Trabajadores de la Musica del Distrito Federal (which represents musi-cians working in Mexico City) and the Sindicato Nacional de Tra-bajadores de la Musica de la R. M. (which has jurisdiction in the provinces)

Additional highlights of the agreements are: The musicians unions in Mexico

will exert "all possible efforts to per-suade the Mexican Immigration Bu-reau" to enforce union membership as a prime condition of visa approval.

All organizations agree that signed contracts will be an "essential re-quirement in any work transaction," and have implemented administrative procedures to insure compliance. Appropriate minimum wages will be paid, and applicable working con-ditions will be observed. Unfair and Defaulters' lists will be maintained and exchanged.

maintained and exchanged. Assistance to deserving music stu-dents of both nations will be offered under available scholarship opportu-

nities. The respective organizations will cooperate in handling of wage de-faults and claims grievances.

faults and claims grievances. Respective organizations agree that union membership in good standing will be a prerequisite to approval (by any of the unions) of any musician crossing the border to work. The AFM has recently given new emphasis to stronger relationships with foreign unions of musicians and other performers. Last year, Davis announced new agreements with the British Musicians Union.

Tom Grantham will be in charge of special projects and inter-group liaison.

Larry Page and Terry Noon concluded a number of sub-publishing deals with European companies at the recent MIDEM for their Page Full of Hits pubbery and Stirling McQueen catalog which is jointly owned with Daniel Boone. Altus Music took the Stirling McQueen catalog in Germany on a three-year deal as did Labrador for France and Air Music for Scandinavia. Same territories took the Page Full of Hits catalog but on a oneyear contract. Jim Webb's Royal Albert Hall concert in April will be recorded live by Kinney and most of the tracks will be published by Page Full of Hits through the Canopy and Ja-Ma subsidiaries with the remainder published by Carlin Music. On the record side a new Daniel Boone single "Beautiful Sunday" (his own composition) will be released simultaneously throughout the world on February 25th. On Penny Farthing in the U.K.; Bellaphon (Germany); AZ (France) (two new licensees) Belgium, Holland and Scandinavia (Phonogram); EMI (Italy) and Teal in South Africa. Page and Noon plan a visit to the States in March to set up their own record label.

Sir Winston Churchill's daughter, Sarah, has formed a company with publisher Hal Shaper and agent Tito Burns to be named Sarah Churchill. They will jointly produce a TV special "An Evening With Sarah Churchill" which will include the singing talents of Miss Churchill and clips from her films. An album will be released to commemorate the show, and after the screening Miss Churchill will tour Europe and America. Shaper's Sparta Music is currently scoring in the American charts with two British compositions "Simple Game" by The Four Tops on Tamla Motown and "Oklahoma Sunday Morning" by Glen Campbell on Capitol.

Phonogram introduced a new label last week to be called Applause with its own logo but with a Philips prefix. All albums will contain previously unrecorded tracks by new artists, and will be in the lower-priced bracket retailing at $\pounds 1.50$.

Producer Don Lawson and Beacon Records managing director have formed a new company Seven Sun Records to be marketed through Beacon and distributed by EMI and Lugtons. The label will concentrate on pop but another label, Autumn, will be launched in the fall for heavy and progressive material. Lawson plans a minimum of 12 singles and four albums in the first year of operation with initial single by Sarah Gordon and Bondage "If I Linger A Little Longer". American and European outlets are currently under negotiation.

Danny O'Donovan of APB Interna-Danny O'Donovan of AFB interna-tional plans to launch a soul invasion in Britain with some 25 blues and soul artists coming in for tours dur-ing the next twelve months. The Fan-tastics already here for a three-month atoy will down Cormany in April and stay will tour Germany in April and Spain in May. Following their "Something Old Something New" "Something Old Something New" smash last year the group have a new single "Love Me Love The Life I Lead" and album "The Fantastics" with most tracks penned and pro-duced by ace-songwriter Tony Ma-cauley and released on Bell. Donovan is currently engaged in getting together a "Soul Spectacular" package to tour all major cities of South Africa for eleven weeks starting February 21st. This will be the first all black soul package to tour South Africa and contains such names as Peaches and Herb, Arthur Conley, Inez Fox, Oscar Tony Jr., etc., to be backed by South African Musicians. Eddie Floyd is currently on a three week tour; Ben E. King arrives in March for four weeks thence to Germany and Spain followed by Percy Sledge, Solomon Burke, The Temptations, Al Green, Franki Valli and The Four Seasons. So convinced is Donovan that soul would boom in Britain and Europe this year that he has returned from America to set up an international office from which to direct operations.

Chicken Shack and Savoy Brown will tour the states February and March respectively with the latter's eighth album "Hellbound Train" released in the USA (London) and U.K. (Decca) in April. Chicken Shack's "Imagination Lady" will be issued in America (London) to coincide with their visit and on Deram in the U.K. Manager for the two groups Harry Simonds has now severed all connections with Chrysalis and is now represented in America by agent Ira Blacker.

Stevie Wonder launched his tenth annual tour of England last week with an appearance on BBC's "Top of the Pops," on Thursday (13).



MOA's Notre Dame Regional Seminar Scores High With 55 Operators

NOTRE DAME, IND. — In case mu-sic and games operators don't know it (and no doubt many don't), their business is underpriced, they them-selves are overburdened but their future is extremely promising. So said the faculty members who conducted MOA's first regional business seminar here at Notre Dame's Center for Con-

MOA's first regional business seminar here at Notre Dame's Center for Con-tinuing Education last weekend. The landmark meeting, first in a series to take place at selected U.S. cities, was entitled Improving Per-formance and Profit for the Operator, and gave 55 attending operators 12 hours of lectures and discussion workshops spread over Friday and Saturday (Feb. 4-5). Arranged by MOA president John Trucano and executive vice president Fred Granger, the sessions were chaired by Notre Dame's Dr. Gerry Sequin and featured Dr. Sal Bella on the subject of industry personnel pol-ices, Herman Wolske on computer-ized record keeping, Bob Curtis on security and Dr. John Malone on new directions in marketing. It was evident that considerable re-search went into the lectures. The op-erators were extremely enthusiastic and became totally involved in the program, especially in the workshop sessions where every man was able to say his piece. These "rap" sessions were highly productive, and nicely augmented the formal lectures with the color and personal approach of operators citing specific events from

their own experience. Dr. Bella's essential message was that every route employee's training continues even after his formal on-the-job training is over. He warned operators to set the proper example in matters of appearance, attention to work, honesty and punctuality. He also said employee sloppiness and ir-responsibility were the operator's fault and such problems can be cor-rected merely by reviewing each man's work with him periodically during the year. "Show your men you care," Bella said. "Infrequent contact with them can lead to low morale, frustration and pilferage," he de-clared. He also advised operators that the most important job ingredient to an employee is "appreciation for a job well done," and noted that "high-er wages" was by far not the most important, as many think. Herman Wolsky discussed applica-tions of the reinstated investment tax credit, and machine depreciation. He recommended that operators follow the double declining balance system, writing salvage at the end. His table for depreciation was roughly: 3-4 years on games, 5-6 years on jukeboxes and 8-10 years on candy and cigarettes. He further recom-mended that operators list their col-lectors as "salesman" on tax returns, since many benefits can be enjoyed thereby. Dr. Malone's subject was perhaps (Continued on page 43)

EDITORIAL:

The Start of Something Big

Fifty-five music operators now have the special distinction of "graduating" from MOA's first regional business seminar—a most laudable distinction be-cause its outstanding success practically guarantees a continuing series of such conferences for years to come. There's no question that MOA stuck its neck way out with this experiment, nor that it now deserves an award for providing the trade with the most stimulating, informative, and, yes, provocative forum yet available in this industry for the exchange of worth-while business techniques and ideas.

We're reporting on the seminar elsewhere in this section, so we'll take this space simply to congratulate both those who had the good sense to register and attend, and, more especially, those prime movers like president John Trucano, executive vice president Fred Granger and Notre Dame's Gerry Sequin for the true grit they displayed in putting the rather adventurous program together in the first place. We also tip the hat to the good Notre Dame professors (as well as to independent security consultant Bob Curtis and accountant Herman Wolske) for really doing a standout job.

The lectures and workshop rap sessions this faculty piloted suffered from only one thing-not enough time for every operator to say his piece. (We doubt if there could ever be sufficient time for a group of operators to really get it all off their chests, especially in the no-holds-barred atmosphere which prevailed at Notre Dame.) The lectures, especially that delivered by Dr. John Malone, were right on the spot. When a stranger to this industry, like Mr. Malone, can hold forth with accuracy on subjects ranging from commissions to red money to guarantees, we think it's remarkable . . . especially when you consider how really specialized this trade is.

Are we recommending attendance at the Las Vegas and New York City seminars? Definitely! (The Atlanta seminar has just been cancelled since most southern seminar has just been cancelled since most southern operators interested in attending would rather do either Vegas or New York). Unfortunately, the pro-gram is so unique to the trade it has to be "sold" to the operators, in a sense. Some have said they don't want to go "back to school", adding "I really don't need it." The question is not whether you "need" it but whether or not it will "help" you. And in that vein lies its undisputed success—help in every area from inhibiting collectors helping themselves to your quarinhibiting collectors helping themselves to your quarters, to better methods for pricing a route, to tactics leading to the eventual elimination of unwarranted bonuses to location.

In the last analysis, the seminars succeeded in opening up the trade's traditionally closed mouth, and the knowledge that came out was overwhelming. Participating operators clearly demonstrated that many fine, progressive people are among us. For the other professional operators who wish to participate in either of the two remaining seminars, please note the places and dates and register now: March 24-25 at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas; April 21-22 at the Hilton in New York.





the most functional of all, since he touched upon all the basics in normal route operation. For starters, he advised the operation. For starters, he ad-vised the operators that the Consumer Price Index rose 192% since 1940, while the change from dime to $3-25\phi$ music pricing is an increase of only 67%, and from dime to $2-25\phi$ only 150%. Malone recommended the mini-mum collection guarantee rether the 150%. Malone recommended the mini-mum collection guarantee, rather than moving toward 60-40 split, for in-creasing income. "It's easier for the location to take that way," he said. Malone termed red money as "assin-ine", but agreed some unmarked pro-motional money could be given the location if the stop warranted it. He declared that the industry was definitely underpriced and that opera-

definitely underpriced and that operators were not getting a good return on their investment. He said they on their investment. He said they should get 20-25% return after taxes, in addition to a salary for them-selves. While he expressed dislike of the 50% commission to locations, he agreed it couldn't be rolled back very easily and again recommended mini-mums, plus a wholesale move into 2-25¢ pricing.

Malone said the future was good for the music and games business, and that many states will soon permit drinking at 18 years of age, throwing an additional 12 million tavern cus-tomers onto the market. He also said more Americans are eating outside the home than ever before. His chief compliment to the operator was: "Few businesses on this small scale burden the owner with so much too do with so little help."

do with so httle heip." Bob Curtis kept the group spell-bound with his analysis of thievery, starting with the interesting note that 75% of stealing is committed by em-ployees of the company. Further, that 76% of all larceny is committed by persons 22 years old and under. He warned operators to be extremely careful in hiring and to watch for the psychotic type whose class is respon-sible for the bulk of lost property today.

TRAVELERS—Len Schneller a happy traveler, often referred to as Mr. 8 Ball, and sales chief of U. S. Billiards has been chalking up the miles in helping state associations, from Oregon, Washington and all the way to Long Island, set up 8-Ball tournaments and through his efforts the interest in sanctioned location tournaments is building. A case in point, the recently concluded Oregon Amusement and Music Operators Association 8-ball tournament drew nearly 3,000 at the two day finals in Portland.

AT THE MOA SEMINAR—The interesting thing about a New Yorker going to South Bend, Indiana for the first MOA regional seminar at Notre Dame is that you can't get there from here. Really. The involved flight took us to Cleveland (where we got in a phone call to CCI's **Ron Gold** during the layover), then to Fort Wayne and finally South Bend and a lady cab driver to the college. The seminar sessions were held at Notre Dame's new Center for Continuing Education Bldg. The guys ate and bedded down at the Morris Inn directly across the road. Heavy snows fell practically throughout the two days and the guys were grateful that a tunnel connected the two buildings. Arriving late, we met **Pat** and **Vinnie Storino** of Toms River, N.J. and **Vic Scola** of Trenton at lunch who told us the morning's presentations were great, especially **Dr. Sal Bella's** fire and brimstone lecture on hiring practices. Operator **John Elum** of Findlay, Ohio got everything on cassette tape and we caught up to the bunch by listening to it.

The afternoon's workshops gave us our first taste of Bella, whose provocative comments on what and what not too look for when hiring a collector or mechanic, and how prejudice can cripple good judgment, really got the operators to open up and share their own hiring techniques (and some bizarre experiences) with the rest. Bella's critical point was that an employee's training never stops and the operator should set the example for his men in terms of honesty, punctuality, appearance and aggressive attitude toward work. Herman Wolsky sent an electric shock thru a lot of operators at his accounting lecture afterward, dropping word on new tax regulations. His lecture on music box depreciation may have been the most useful part of the entire two days, and after hearing operator comments on individual methods they use, the chief lesson learned was not to throw everything in your accountant's lap because he really knows less about the coin business than you. Bob Curtis' lecture on the syndrome of the thief was a masterpiece. This was our first exposure to Curtis and we can tell you his educated comments on employees who help themselves to your coinage were alone worth the \$45 registration fee. Perhaps John Malone's discussion on play pricing, promotional money and new locations was the most informative because he really opened the ops up to share their own methods for boosting prices, eliminating red money, etc. We think the single most pregnant point Malone made was his appeal for all to move into 2.25 ¢ music, after showing how far behind the rest of industry we are in raising prices.

Friday evening was spent in the lounge, joining all the operators in heavy discussion on the day's lessons. Wurlitzer's **Syd Vertlieb**, fresh from an American Management Assn. course in New York, said the Notre Dame sessions were superior in that they got down to operating nitty gritty points. Incidentally, several of the ladies attended the sessions, including Les **Montooth's** new bride **Bernice**, who joined the **Fred Granger's** for cocktails in the lounge after dinner. Quite a few of the good lads drifted into the lounge, and after a while. drifted away from discussion on the lectures and into, shall we say, "story telling". Like at most of your solid universities, the bar closed uncommonly early, and the die-hards took off for some place called the Torch Club where a much-fabled "exotic dancer" topped the entertainment bill. Among those operators who went to the Torch Club were: . . . oh, sorry, we're out of space.




