



Burkhimer On RCA A&R: More Expansion On The Way

INIOLEY WOOD — In the six months that he has headed RCA's A&R dedepartment out of Hollywood, Don Burkhimer has significantly expanded the company's services and facilities in virtually every area of his day-to-day operations. "My goal has been to streamline these operations," he says, "and my first move in that direction was to bring together the contemporary and pop music sections of this department and to get rid of the dividing line that in terms of responsibility and reporting had separated the for so long." As A&R vice president, Burkhimer firstalled Don Grierson to handle A&R datininistration and brought in two steament, had steered RCA's Chicago A&R operations for more than a year. The other, Dave Blume, was pistant director of A&R for Paramount Records. Burkhimer also aid be was planning to bring out a marketing man and would soon set up a Hollywood art department. "It's is too hard, having to send covers and things back and forth across the country for approval," he said.

Signing Selectivity

Concerning the artist roster, Burk-himer said he had done some cutting but was otherwise engaged in select-ively signing new acts, pointing out that the pool of available, potentially marketable talent in southern Califor-nia was considerably greater than it marketable talent in southern Califor-nia was considerably greater than it was even in New York. Among the new acts he has lined up are singer-writers B. W. Stevenson and Bobby Bridger, as well as Lou Reed—a "dy-namite" act produced by David Bowie in England. There will also be Nov. product by groups called Contraband, The Ides of March and The Hughes Corporation, the last-named with their second RCA album. The Everly Brothers, too, will be represented by an LP they began here in Hollywood and finished in Nashville with Chet Atkins producing

and finished in Nashville with Chet Atkins producing. Burkhimer mentioned that he must work closely with independent pro-ducers along with his in-house men. "You have to have both, especially in a company as large as this. You have to keep feeding this machine, and I'm happy to say that the number of proj-ects coming in is phenomenal. It happens whenever you achieve any happens whenever you achieve any degree of success."

happens whenever you achieve any degree of success." What does he look for? "There are so many things. This business is very competitive, and you have to look carefully not only at an artist's mate-rial and his ability, but at his pro-ducer, his management and his agency affiliations. But if we're successful, they'll come."

Studio Upgraded

Studio Upgraded Many from the RCA stable already have. The Guess Who were here in July, recording an album slated for December release, and are due again next month. Jack Richardson, the company's Canadian A&R topper, makes regular visits from Toronto. A new group from Minneapolis, Gypsy, came west to record, too, not so long ago. The chief reason, according to Burkhimer. is the upgrading he has done on RCA's studio capability in Hollywood, including the instal'ation of boards imported from England's Rudolf Nebe in newly redesigned con-trol booths adjoining two good-sized studios, which are likewise being re-built. There is also a third, somewhat smaller rock studio.

smaller rock studio. "We're building something good here," Burkhimer stated. "We can only go way up."

Execs Comment

Commenting on the quarter, Kass pointed out: "The Buddah Group has only released 9 LP's this past quarter (with five of those in the last week), as opposed to 17 albums in the previ-ous quarter. We anticipate," he con-tinued, "that the company will release 50% less product this year than in our previous year." Bogart stated: "Too much good product is being lost on all labels. Record companies simply must adjust to the times. Insofar as the radio playlists have not expanded, more and more effort is required at the develop-

playlists have not expanded, more and more effort is required at the develop-ment level, and this inevitably results in more push on less product." Bogart further commented that hit singles are more important than ever for "album" artists. The company, therefore, is taking pains to develop successful singles for a number of acts that in the past would have sim-ply gone the album route. "Our pro-motion staff has discovered." Bogart added, "that even traditionally album-oriented stations would rather receive one good cut than an entire new al-bum. Success, not to mention sur-

one good cut than an entire new al-bum. Success, not to mention sur-vival, depends on sensitivity to the marketplace. And we are confident that our sensitivity in this direction will best serve the needs of our art-ists."

Presley, Nelson & Berry: Together In Top Ten For First Time In 8 Yrs.

NEW YORK — Three giants of 50's rock 'n roll — Chuck Berry, Elvis Presley and Rick Nelson—are back together in this week's Cash Box Top 10. (All are also bulleted.) While there artists have been retogether in this week's Cash Box Top 10. (All are also bulleted.) While these three artists have been re-cording steadily since their first suc-cesses, this marks the first time they have enjoyed Top 10 status coinci-dentally, since 1964. The trend toward nostalgia in both lyric and sound now runs deeper than ever.

Chuck Berry

"Ding-A-Ling" is this week's #1 record, and it is Chuck Berry's first Top 10 single since July 1964, when his "No Particular Place To Go" peaked. His first Top 10 single was "Maybelline," during Sept. and Oct. of 1955. Berry began his career with Chess, and his current single and al-bum are also on the label. (For a period in the late 60's, he also record-ed for Mercury.) "The London Chuck Berry Sessions" is bulleted on the LP charts this week at #10.

Elvis Preslev

Like Berry, Elvis Presley's current successes are on the label that brought him his first Top 10 record "Heartbreak Hotel" during the sum-mer of 1956. He came to RCA after some regional success on Sun Records and has remained with them ever since. Elvis Presley has been on the single and LP charts ever since 1956. His "Burning Love" is currently bul-

NY NARAS To Tackle City's 'Music Co. Exodus'

NEW YORK - NARAS members and NEW YORK — NARAS members and guests will face the question of the "New York recording exodus on Wednesday, Oct. 25, in RCA's Studio A when the New York chapter of the Record Academy will devote its mem-bership meeting to the topic of "What's Happened to Recording in New York and What Can We Do About It?"

About It?" Already set as panalists to help members try to find ways of reviving the local recording scene have been Robert Crothers, in charge of re-cording for the National AFM office, Al Knopf, vice president of Local 802 in charge of New York city record-ing, Phil Kraus, head of the Musi-cian's Recording Committee, Ken Grott, exec secretary of AFTRA's New York chapter, plus representa-tives of Mayor Lindsay's office and of producers conductors and record producers, conductors and record companies. Dick Jablow, NARAS counsel, will serve as moderator.

Note 'Grave' Concern

The emigration of recording artists, musicians, arrangers, producers, and conductors out of New York has loomed as a matter of "grave" con-cern to the NARAS board of governors, whose members have noted the "success" of cooperation between the Mayor's office, trade unions and others in the recent revitalization of the motion picture industry in New York. Hopefully, they feel, the Oct. 25 early evening meeting will also lead to so-lutions for eliminating some of the difficulties responsible for the recent shift of recording away from New York.

Those attending will be encouraged to ask questions. Rick Nelson

Rick Nelson's "Garden Party" is bulleted at #10 this week. The Decca release deals with his recent appear-ance at a Richard Nader "Rock 'N Roll Revival." The country-rock tune is Nelson's first Top 10 item since "For You," also for Decca in Febru-ary of 1964. Nelson began his re-cording career with Verve, and then moved to Imperial where he enjoyed his first Top 10 record, "Be Bop Baby" in November of '57. He moved to Decca in the mid sixties.

Oldies Revived

For more than a year, re-makes of former 50's and early 60's hits have made up a substantial portion of the Top 100. This week's list includes: Donny Osmond's version of the Frankie Avalon ballad "Why" (#29); The Band's re-creation of Marvin Gaye's early hit, "Don't Do It" (bul-leted at #34); Johnny Rivers' "Rock-in' Pneumonia-Boogie Woogie Flu" (#88), the Huey Smith & The Clowns charter. Two new items on the Top 100 this week are also new versions of former hits: Bones' "Roberta" (#97), was the B side to Frankie's Ford's "Sea Cruise" while Stefan's "Holy Cow" (#99) was originally a hit for Lee Dorsey. hit for Lee Dorsey.

On The Road

Richard Nader's productions are currently touring the country. Many hard rock bands are encoring with 50's material (quite frequently they are old Berry or Presley hits). Even "folkies" like Jackson Browne (who is known to break out in a version of "Runaway" by Del Shannon) and Joan Baez (who has added the first two songs she ever performed public-ly, The Penguins' "Earth Angel" and The Drifters' "Honey Love" back to her act) are also getting into the rockin' swing of things.

Berry Signs New Chess Tie

NEW YORK — Chuck Berry, one of the pioneer artists in rock 'n roll and still making hits, has been re-pacted to the Chess label under a long-term, exclusive agreement, reports Marv exclusive agreement, reports Marv Schlachter, president of Chess/Janus Records.

Records. Indicative of his continuing popu-larity, Berry has just had his single, "Ding A Ling," number 1 this week, certified by RIAA as a million-seller, and is doing hot chart business with his LP, "The London Chuck Berry Sessions." Also, the label is celebrat-ing "Chuck Berry Month" in Oct. The label is presently engaged in a full-scale ad, promo and publicity campaign on the star. He'll soon be seen in a Columbia Pictures/Metrome-dia film on the rock 'n roll revival, tentatively titled, "Hail Hail Rock & Roll," taken from a Berry lyric.

Supreme Court Refuses Review Of Federal Court On Anti:Piracy

NEW YORK—The Supreme Court of the United States refused last week (10) to review the landmark federal appellate court decision in favor of Fox Agency publishers holding that manufacturers of pirated recordings do not obtain authorization to use copyrighted music by sending notice of intention to use and paying royal-ties under the compulsory license provision of the Copyright Act. (Duchess Music Corporation, et al. v. Stern, et al. No. 71-1551) The decision lays to rest the claim of some pirates, self-described as "legal pirates" or "legal duplicators," that they comply with all requirements of federal law by with all requirements of federal law by paying compulsory license royalties.

Publishers Action

Publishers Action The action was started in Phoenix, in the Spring of 1971, when more than 50 music publisher principals of The Harry Fox Agency busted a large scale piracy operation by seiz-ing all of its recording equipment, inventory and supplies under a writ of seizure issued by the federal Dis-trict court in their copyright in-fringement action. The seizure was the first time in copyright history that machinery and supplies were taken from any infringer for even-tual destruction. Although the action named dozens of defendants charged with the illegal acts, all fled the jur-isdiction and abandoned defense of the action, except defendant Pearl Rosner. She claimed she was entitled to rely on the compulsory license pro-vision as a defense to the claim of infringement and that the seized ar-ticles should be released. The Federal Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, sitting in Cali-fornia, agreed with the Fox Agency publishers that a pirate who dupli-cates another's recordings can not de-feat a claim of copyright infringe-ment in the music by paying royalties

cates another's recordings can not de-feat a claim of copyright infringe-ment in the music by paying royalties under the compulsory license provi-sions, and that the Copyright Act authorizes seizure and destruction of the recording equipment and supplies used to make infringing recordings. "A thorough examination of the seizure remedy by our attor-neys Abeles and Clark, resulted in an opinion that the remedy could be properly invoked against pirates, al-though there was no direct legal precedent for such action. Following the determination of the Court of Appeals in this action, federal courts have uniformly authorized similar seizures, including in Alabama, Min-nesota and Nevada . .." Renew Action

Congress Extends Copyr'ts 2 Years

Copyrits 2 Years NEW YORK — By a more than two to one majority, the House of Rep-resentatives voted last week (11) to approve S. J. Res 247 that will extend copyright protection for an addition-al two years. Already approved by the Senate, the bill provides that mu-sical and literary works that would have lost their copyright shelter as of December 31, 1972 will now be pro-tected until December 31, 1974. "This is an important step for the talented men and women who create America's music and lyrics," president Stanley Adams of ASCAP, said on hearing the announcement. "It is also good news for literally thousands of windows and their children, since they will now continue to receive some in-come for at least another 24 months. Both branches of Congress deserve the warm thanks of all Americans who care about our country's music and its creators, and special commen-dation should go to Senator John McClellan and Representative Emanu-el Celler whose leadership was a very significant factor in getting this ex-tension passed. I hope that S. J. Res. 247 will be signed by the President shortly." The copyright period in this coun-try is still substantially shorter than

shortly." The copyright period in this coun-try is still substantially shorter than that in many countries, which provide for a period of the life of the writer plus fifty years. Under the U.S. Copy-right Act of 1909, which Congress is actively considering revising, the period is 28 years with possible ex-tension for another 28 years.



NATRA's Shaw Comments On FCC **Minority Employment Position**

CHICAGO — Curtis Shaw, president of NATRA, who recently assailed white ownership of black radio as "contributing to the disenfranchise-ment of black broadcasters" (see CashBox, Oct. 7, pg. 7) has ad-dressed the position of FCC Chair-man Dean Burch and Commissioner Benjamin Hooks regarding minority employment in an open letter to the industry. The complete text follows:

Shaw Text

Let it be known to the broadcast industry that the National Associa-tion of Television and Radio An-nouncers supports in full the direc-tion and attitude of FCC Commission-er Benjamin Hooks and Chairman Dean Burch relative to minority em-ployment ployment.

The problem of minority employ-ment in the broadcast industry is so deeply rooted that it alone breeds many of the other inequities which we as minority broadcasters have been

forced to endure for so long. NATRA has for years echoed the ills of discriminatory hiring practices, and all else in between. We see clear signs of a long awaited aggression by the







HOLLYWOOD-CYMBAL & CLINGER: BACK IN THE SPOTLIGHT AGAIN

Johnny Cymbal and Peggy Clinger are two artists who have tasted the sweetness of success and the feeling that often follows, a need for change. Cymbal's hit single, "Mr. Bassman," in 1963, rocketed him into the spotlight. He continued his writing with occasional success, "Mary In The Morning" being a prime example. Peggy Clinger came to focus in the public eye as one of the Clinger Sisters. There she found a secure place on the television variety show circuit appearing with Danny Kaye, The Smothers Brothers, Andy Williams, Steve Allen, and many others.

Yet until three years ago neither was totally content with the path their creative talent were taking. Both were open for new direction, and as it so happened, that direction came in the form of each other. They met and started combining their skills in writing.

A year ago their music came to the attention of Wes Farrell, president of Chelsea Records. Their songs impressed him so that they immediately became resident writers for Farrell's other artists. The result has been that since the fall of 1971, Farrell has had every song (24) that Cymbal & Clinger wrote recorded, including "Rock Me, Baby," David Cassidy's hit single. And now their combined success has led them, quite naturally, back to record-

And now their combined success has led them, quite naturally, back to recording and performing. With a recently released album, featuring their new single, "God Bless You, Rock & Roll," dates for future concert appearances are now being planned.

Cymbal & Clinger have reacted to their return to public attention optimistically with the simple goal of being accepted for what they're doing rather than what they did.

Cymbal: "It's the same place but it's not the same time. I have a completely different frame of mind and it's a completely different situation. We'd like people to listen to our music and judge us on that."

NEW YORK-CURTIS MAYFIELD: THE MAN-DEDICATED; THE ARTIST-GIFTED

"Super Fly" composer/performer Curtis Mayfield readily admits that the phenomenal success of the soundtrack album and movie is having a dramatic effect on him, especially his life-style. And, with Curtis it has been a life totally devoted to music. "It's richly rewarding to achieve success in any first venture; even more important is the recognition and respect that comes with it, and this is a basic for any man," says Curtis.

Curtis feels his work is important; but he also believes the talent he possesses is a gift. Mayfield has been a significant force and a major contributor in the 70's soul explosion. His words and music are personal statements flowing from his own experiences in the "now" black happening. "These messages are relevant because they express the masses' feelings; the people must be able to relate," says Curtis, and, let's face it, Mayfield does have the soulful, gentle preacher quality. His unique singing style gives one the feeling of listening to an earthy sermon. And, he does come by this honestly, his grandmother was a minister in the Traveling Souls Spiritualists Church; this is how he met Jerry Butler who was singing with the church. Jerry and Curtis then met a group called the Roosters, which combined to form The Impressions. In 1958 The Impressions had their first big hit with the Jerry Butler rendition of, "For Your Precious Love." Jerry eventually went solo and Curtis fronted the group. During those years Curtis gained a wealth of experience and insight. It served as the training ground of going through the school of life with plenty of hard knocks. It was also the period in which the Mayfield lyric power began to flower.

Chicago born and still Chicago based, Curtis gives a great deal of credit to his first manager and partner, Eddie Thomas and also to his current manager, Marv Stewart. In 1970 a deal was set to have his Curtom label distributed through

HOLLYWOOD-VIKKI CARR:

SOUTH OF THE BORDER—"My fans kept asking me, When are you going to record a complete album in Spanish?" So stated Florencia Bisenta de Casillas Martinez Cardona Moss, and she finally answered their cries, the result being an album entitled "En Espanol," which is currently paving its way up the charts. Not many people would recognize the name of this artist, even if you told them that this was the real name of a Columbia Records star who is one of the top-selling female singers in the United States.

This performer also has another name that is much shorter, and one most people would recognize: the name Vikki Carr. She became another "overnight sensation" after ten years' time when in 1967 her rendition of "It Must Be Him" brought her to the pinnacle of the national pop charts. Miss Carr is a pert. diminutive, and vivacious young lady who looks like a farmer's daughter (probably from drinking all that milk!), but she is in reality the only singer of Mexican-American heritage who has made it to the top as a major recording and night-club star. She is very proud of her heritage and felt an album of all Spanish songs would be one way of showing it.

"I asked Columbia if I could do something special as I was very happy to be with them and had recorded three albums for them—but nothing special—so I convinced them. They let me pick the producer Jack Gold, and the arranger Bob Florence with whom I finally got to work again. Bob arranged the first three or four albums I ever recorded and all the songs that made me a hit in this country."

Miss Carr adds, "We worked on this Spanish album for four months, and I never put so much love into anything. Columbia let me have my say on photographer, we got a centerfold, we put the Spanish lyrics in, everything I wanted. I worked on it like it was the first album I ever recorded!"

She recently introduced the album on the "Tonight Show" when she sang two of the cuts. The album hit the charts and is selling very nicely, oddly enough, in (Cont'd. on page 69)

Going solo, Curtis made his first major concert appearance in December '71 at the Philharmonic in New York and the concert was a smashing success. Performing selections from his "Curtis/Live" Ip which contains many of the truth of living messages such as, "Stare and Stare", "Stone Junkie", "We The People Who Are Darker Than Blue", and also selections from the "Roots" Ip such as, "Get Down", "We Got To Have Peace", and "If There's A Hell Below, We're All Gonna Go" are all shining examples of the Mayfield power to communicate; the audience did get the messages. They went wild!

Getting back to "Super Fly", it was at the reception right after his Philharmonic performance that Curtis was offered the first draft of the script. He accepted the challenge and began to write words and music that he felt would serve as an in-depth commentary for the film. As it turns out his statements are accurate, although "Little Child Running Wild" was written 3 years earlier.

Curtis, in producing the alarm, used his own band consisting of, Craig Mc-Mullen, Guitarist; Lucky Scott, Bass; Henry Gison, percussion; Scotty Harris, a new drummer, and of course, Curtis, on guitar. This band is bad, and brother that means they are really together. "What does follow Super Fly"? replied Curtis, with a gentlemanly smile of confidence. (The "Freddie's Dead" single is already top 10 on singles charts, and the album is still number one on the CB top 100 album chart).

Numerous offers from movie and tv folk are being submitted to Curtis and while he is making considerations he is keeping busy at his own 16 track studio in Chicago where he is also producing other artists.

You will discover it's a heady trip when listening to a Mayfield album. The trip may be worthwhile.

It can be definitely said that Curtis Mayfield has gotten his message across. don drossell

As early as March, 1970, accord-ing to Brambila, he approached the then A&R chief of Capitol Records, Karl Engemann, with the idea of pro-ducing Latin-oriented rock records on which Capitol would have first re-fusal. Brambila was granted free stu-dio time by the company to come up dio time by the company to come up with some demos and, he says, by December of that year had been for-mally granted 100 hours of free time under the name Brown Bag Productions.

under the name Brown Bag Produc-tions. Brambila further alleges that in January, 1971, Ode Records contract-ed directly with Brown Bag Produc-tions for the services of recording artist Mark Guerrero, currently rep-resented on the Capitol label with a single titled "Rock 'n' Roll Queen" and another due for release in the next few weeks, "I'm Brown." Capi-tol also has an album by Guerrero slated for February, 1973, release. At press time, Terry Knight said, "I have not been served, and accord-ing to my attorneys, I have not been sued. All I know is that I bought the name and concept for Brown Bag Records from the Wilkes-Braun Graphic Design firm. Since no action has been taken to stop the release of any Brown Bag Records product, I do not intend to delay the release of our first LP."

CARNEGIE HALL, N.Y. — It's been more than a year since Dan Hicks brought his own nostalgia movement to town. Since that time, we've also seen Bette Midler. The comparison is unavoidable. Dan Hicks' easy-goin' manner is not what it takes to really impress such an impersonal gathering as this. And he can impress when he

We still groove on those potted palms, stuffed birds and sounds that combine the smoothest influences from the jugband, Dixieland and bop eras. But to just stand there amid the finery dressed like you're going to real-ly do something different—and then save it all up for the "neato" choreog-raphy in the closing number—is like spicing mush with pineapple and call-ing it a luau. What works in a club (and it does, evertime) does not necessarily work in concert hall. Without the intimacy going for it, his act seems (rather unfairly) lackluster and boring. We know it isn't. The music is great, but suffers from a sameness that only some real visual zip can dispell. Instead of "get up and go," we got "came and went." Fana-tics were well-satisfied, but no new converts were won over.

PHILHARMONIC HALL, N.Y.—Izzy Young and folk music lives in this town. A triple bill of talents such as these is a welcomed change of pace for the harried reviewer.

Dave Bromberg was plagued by a horrendous sound system, but there's absolutely nothing which can dampen the joy of witnessing one of his per-formances. (This was his second appearance in the Hall—his first was as part of the Herald Tribune World Youth Forum years back at Lincoln Center's opening.) Over the course of many years and through the active involvement of many of folkdom's most famed personalities, Bromberg has developed a presence that has heretofore been the property of the Pete Seegers and Michael Cooneys among us—a small number to be sure. The Columbia artist performed with friends from the Earl Scrugg's Review and resident New York musicians in a program that proved oldtimey is good-timey in its post-electric state.

Doc Watson, accompanied by his trusty and nimble-pickin' son Merle provided the most traditional mo-ments of the evening. Wherever they play, everyone's on their back porch right along with them. Selections from both their Vanguard and Poppy catalog were greeted with the perfect audience attitude: "We know that one and are glad to hear it again."

Phil Ochs was a bit of a sorry sight. Maybe Phil should go to one of Joan Baez's concerts sometime. We hate to lose our old friends for so little a reason as apathy.





SWEET AS FUNK CAN BE-The Dells-Cadet CA 50021 Perhaps the finest soul concept LP to ever

Perhaps the finest soul concept LP to ever be released, this new entry from The Dells should have little trouble giving them hit single after hit single while establishing its own album totality. Most of the tunes were penned by Terry Callier (alone or with Larry Wade) and they provide all the faith you need to be con-vinced r&b will survive stronger than ever in the seventies. Especially noteworthy: the up-beat "Windy City Soul" and the beautiful mam-moth "Just As Long As We're In Love." The segues are unbelievably strong.

BAD BUT NOT EVIL-Marjoe-Chelsea CHE-1005



And the soft side—"How Can I Be Sure?" and a tune he wrote with Kim Carnes, "Song For A Rainy Day." Another winning gentle track is Dave Ellingson's "Some Kind Of A Summer" (both Kim & Dave sing back-up for D_vid on the LP as they do live). Jim Gordon, Hal Blaine and Joe Osborn are among the musical luminaries helping David to rock right up the LP charts ... a journey he can now take blindfolded.

HONKY-TONK STARDUST COWBOY—Jonathan Edwards—Atco SD 7015 The guy who had a hit first time out of the box with his "Sunshine" delivers a second LP with more of a country flair. Title tune fits him to the proverbial "t"—one about a c&w singer with an aura about him of the mystical. Two new originals are extremely impressive: the up "Stop And Start It All Again" and the contemplative "Dream Song." Also included, a live and all-too-short version of the standard "Paper Doll" and Jesse Colin Young's "Sugar Babe."

MOUNTAIN MAMA-Dianne Davidson-Janus

MOUNTAIN MAMA—Dianne Davidson—Janus JLS 3048 This is the third LP from the stouthearted and soul stirrin' mama who should soon be recognized for the talent she is (opening for the Moody Blues on their curent U.S. tour should help see to that). Again, her latest LP is that Utopian blend of country and blues. Highlight has to happen when she's joined by Mac Gayden on vocals and guitar: "Ain't Gonna Be Treated This Way." (That's Mississippi John Hurt with him on the cover, and the feeling here celebrates the late blues genius' style.) Side 1 is live; on the second side, Taj is joined for two numbers by the fantastic Pointer Sisters. Together they "recycle" both blues and Dixieland to come up with a sound that is bound to get you excited about roots music. A change of pace album for him, and a superfine good 'un.

In his seven years as an exclusive RCA recording artist, Charley Pride has assembled enough hit records to become the label's current biggest selling country artist, and his popu-larity has since spilled out of the country music field into the main stream of popular music.

When he was named the Top Male Vocalist by Cash Box for the second consecutive year, another link was forged in his chain of achievements, lending physical evi-dence to the wealth of talent and ability he has contributed to the world of music.

PORTER WAGONER & DOLLY PARTON

Top Duo (Tied)

Tying for #1 position as Cash Box top Vocal Duo, Porter Wagoner and Dolly Parton have the right combina-

top Vocal Duo, Porter Wagoner and Dolly Parton have the right combina-tion. Alone or together, they are mas-ters of their profession. writers, re-cording artists, stage and television personalities, and astute executives. A native of Missouri, Porter Wag-oner is a veteran of some twenty successful music-oriented years. A Grammy Award winner and star in his own TV syndicated "The Porter Wagoner Show," he is seen weekly in over 100 markets, with a viewing au-dience in excess of 45 million people. From the hills of East Tennessee, and one of a dozen children from a successful history of TV and re-cording work when Porter Wagoner asked her to join "The Porter Wag-oner Show." Grand Ole Opry regu-lars, the team has become a musical and recording partnership that is a major attraction. Their current hit RCA record is "Always Together" and was produced by Bob Ferguson.

RED SIMPSON

New Male Artist

Joe, better known as "Red" Simp-son is a singin' and movin' man. Mostly he sings about the lives of truckers but he was never actually a

truckers but he was never actually a truck drivin' man himself. He was born in Arizona into a family of country musicians and wrote his first song, "The Chicken House Boogie," when he was 14. Red played in a lot of bands, then started writing with Buck Owens, producing hits which include "Sam's Place," "Kansas City Song," "Gonna Have Love," and "I Want No One But You". Love,' You''. On

LYNN ANDERSON

Top Female Vocalist

Beginning her singing career at the age of six, Lynn Anderson has since become one of the most popular vo-calists in country music. "Rose Garcalists in country music. "Rose Gar-den," the album and the single by the same title, scored at the top of the pop and country charts and placed high on the MOR charts. Both gar-nered gold records for Lynn. Her un-precedented triple market success with "Rose Garden" was capped by a 1970 Grammy for Best Country Vocal Performance (female). Appearing on numerous television

Performance (female). Appearing on numerous television shows—including the Johnny Cash Show, Mike Douglas Show, Lawrence Welk Show, the Tonight Show, per-forming throughout the country at state fairs and rodeos and an invita-tion to the White House Celebrity Breakfast as the President's guest, are among Lynn's numerous activi-ties. Her upcoming schedule includes additional network television, in par-ticular the Dean Martin Show. Versatile Lynn is also an expert

Versatile Lynn is also an expert guitarist and devotes as much time as she can to raising and training quar-ter horses. Into this busy schedule, she fits enough studio time to release hit after hit, riding the charts with albums and singles—her current hit single being "Fool Me". All of Lynn's recordings are produced for Columbia Records by talented songwriter/producer Glenn Sutton, who is Lynn's husband.

TAMMY WYNETTE & **GEORGE JONES**

Top Duo (Tied)

Tied as top duo of the year, the Jones'--George Jones and Tammy Wynette--also double as strong ar-tists as singles in their own right. With the release of their first Epic album "We Go Together." everyone's storybook couple finally got together. Mississippi born Tammy has succeed-ed in capturing the hearts and ears of Mississippi born Tammy has succeed-ed in capturing the hearts and ears of the record buying public to the extent that she became the first female singer with a country repertoire to have an album sell in excess of one million. As writer and artist, she has been constantly at the top of the charts with singles and albums, won two Grammies as best female vocalist and just about every other award she could possibly win. She is one of the most honored performers in country music today. Launching one of the greatest re-

most honored performers in country music today. Launching one of the greatest re-cording careers in the late 1950's George Jones is an artist whose suc-cess has established him as one of the most consistent top ten artists in country music—an artist who com-mands respect from the entire music industry and whose ability and talent has molded many others in their climb to success. Today, The George Jones And Tammy Wynette Show is in constant denand for television, stage, and movie appearances. Currently on the charts are their hit albums titled "Me And The First Lady," and "We Love Tq Sing About Jesus," plus their sin-gle "The Ceremony".

DONNA FARGO

New Female Vocalist

A California transplant from North Carolina, Donna Fargo has had a number of regional hits, but it took her self-penned "The Happiest Girl In the Whole U.S.A." to break into a national hit, a hit that swept the charts and claimed the number one position in both country and pop. A Dot Records artist, Donna is contin-uing her claim to being the "Happiest Girl," plus proving her ability both as an artist and a writer, with her cur-rent chart climbing hit "Funny Face".

STATLER BROTHERS

Top Vocal Group

Top Vocal Group Winning the Cash Box top vocal group poll for the second time, the Statler Brothers are four young men from Virginia who are neither Stat-lers or Brothers. The group consists of Harold Reid and Don Reid (the only two brothers), Lew DeWitt and Phil Balsey. Their professional career began in 1964, when they were discovered by Johnny Cash and joined his road show of family regulars. Still touring regularly with the Johnny Cash Show, recording dates, personal ap-pearance tours, tv regulars and guest spots, and movie appearances keep the boys busy. The two experiences the Statler Brothers honor most are their ap-pearances with the Billy Graham Crusades, and "The Evening At The White House" where they performed for the President and Mrs. Nixon. With "Flowers On The Wall" the group first gained national acclaim, followed by such hits as "Bed Of Roses," "New York City," and "Pic-tures". Today, with their Mercury Records

Roses," "New York City," and "Pic-tures". Today, with their Mercury Records hit of "Class of 57," the Statlers will be around as long as people appreci-ate music, comedy, and honest talent.

CHET ATKINS

Top Instrumentalist

Chet Atkins has been an RCA artist for 25 years and a musician for all his life. A native of Tennessee, Chet Atkins has created more clamor and noise in the music industry world-wide than almost any other figure on the recording scene today. He's a vice president in charge of

figure on the recording scene today. He's a vice president in charge of RCA's Nashville operation, catalyst for the musical careers of other per-formers, a guitarist equally at home with the country, pop, jazz, and clas-sical, object of admiration by those who fancy symphony music or the formal restrictions of Spanish classi-cal techniques, recorded 48 successful albums, and is headliner of the Mas-ters Festival of Music. Chet Atkins has apreared, by invi-tation, with Arthur Fiedler's famed Boston Pops, plus a heavy schedule of symphonic appearances. His concert tours have been taken

His concert tours have been taken to more than 100 cities in the United States, to Canada. Europe, Africa, and Japan, where he had a tumultuous welcome.

Chet Atkins has been honored in his field by these whose accolades mean a lot because they not only come from people with the musical knowledge to evaluate his work, but also because they reflect the way the average listener feels about him. He is associated with the Gretsch Guitar Co. in a consultant capacity, a designer and endorser of the firm's product; is a co-headliner in the Mas-ters Festival of Music, a musical-variety act which plays approximate-ly 50 shows away from Music City, U.S.A. annually, and which has been a consistent, if not fantastic, box office success, and is founder of the Chet Atkins Guitar Festival and Fame, Inc. (an educational guitar training course). Winner of too many awards to enu-merate, his most recent honor was the Humanitarian Award in May, 1972. He records for RCA Victor and what he records is a profitable prod-uct for his employers. Sales of At-kins' albums and singles total in the millions of dollars. 



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

NASHVILLE—During October each year the Country Music Association (CMA) celebrates its founding anni-versary and takes stock of what has been accomplished during the year just completed. The current year has been notable for many innovations and the culmination of several long-sought goals by the trade organiza-tion.

sought goals by tion. CMA was chartered in 1958 as a non-profit international corporation, formed to promote the whole product of Country Music and to act as a catalyst for the diverse regional, pro-duction and marketing activities of catalyst for the diverse regional, pro-duction, and marketing activities of the then-fiedgling industry. It has grown from less than 300 to more than 3000 members, with strong sup-port across the country and in Cana-da, England, Europe, South Africa, Japan, New Zealand, and Australia.

A 'Catalyst'

A 'Catalyst' CMA has been the catalyst through the years in establishing important focal points for the industry, includ-ing the Annual Country Music Asso-ciation Awards Show on network tel-evision, the selection of Hall of Fame members, the Country Music Founda-tion (non-profit, educational institu-tion which operates the Country Mu-sic Hall of Fame and Museum and the Library and Media Center in the Mu-seum), an official annual Country Music Month celebration in October which now has Presidential recogni-tion, the annual Music City Pro-Celebrity Golf Tournament, plus nu-merous trade and promotion projects

Celebrity Golf Tournament, plus nu-merous trade and promotion projects coordinated by the association. Entering its 15th year, CMA now turns to new ideas and long-range plans by which it may further the gains and penetration already achieved. To this end, attention dur-ing 1972 has been directed toward new concepts in sales promotion, creation of new events, expanded pub-lic relations and public service pro-grams, and further national and in-ternational involvement.

C&W Growth

C&W Growth CMA representation at the 1972 conventions of the Music Operators of America (MOA) and the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM) pointed out the 10-fold in-crease in Country record sales and popularity during the past 10 years. Further emphasized were two of the most salient merchandising character-istics of Country Music: the extreme loyalty of country music fans, and the longevity of Country Music hits as compared to pop and rock chart-toppers. 

His business activities are so varied he must maintain a Nashville office to ride herd on his many successful interests. Marty produces his own recordings on Decca, with Marty Landau handling all bookings.

Ricci Mareno entered country music after having success with such pop artists as Frankie Avalon, Fabian, Bobby Rydell, Della Reese, Frankie Laine, Al Martino and Mike Douglas. Shortly after his arrival in Nashville, Mareno had top chart records with "I Got You" by Waylon Jennings, and "A Rose Is a Rose" by Jimmy Dean. Mareno went on to have his songs recorded by Bobby Bare, Connie Smith, Peggy Little, Nat Stuckey, Skeeter Davis, Freddy Hart and Billy Walker. Walker.

In 1970 Ricci Mareno moved into production. He began with Happy Ti-ger Records and then to Dot Records. The first big record produced was "Gwen" (Congratulations) which was written by Mareno and Jerry Gilles-pie, recorded by Tommy Overstreet, and was number one nationally. Then came "I Don't Know You" and "Ann" (Don't Go Runnin') which also reached the number one spot. reached the number one spot.

Since forming MGB Production, Mareno, Gillespie and Black have pro-duced such records as "Catch The Wind" by Jack Barlow, "Love Isn't Love" by Bobby Lee Trammell, and "Heaven Is My Woman's Love" by Tommy Overstreet which is currently climbing in the country charts.

We've come a long way since then. And we've done it together. BMI still believes in the American Country Dream. A barefoot boy with a fiddle can still grow up to be a star.

oriented stations which give oper-ating data, personnel contacts, num-ber of hours of Country programming, and other useful information. It also commissioned a Pulse demographic survey which was distributed to all stations, plus the CMA "Sound of America" Broadcasters' Kits which include programming, promotion, and sales sections and a supplemental resales sections and a supplemental re-cording of Hall of Fame members with representative samples of their music. Reaction to these aids has been highly favorable, especially from the many member stations which have rethereby swelling the census of Coun-try stations to more than 800 full-time and 2200 part-time Country operations.

Legislation. Ethics

In the area of legislation and eth-ics, CMA has strongly encouraged an-ti-piracy measures and successful leg-In the area of legislation and eth-ics, CMA has strongly encouraged an-ti-piracy measures and successful leg-islative efforts to cover the authoriza-tion of copyrights for recorded sound material; and is cooperating with merchandisers toward finding means of attacking the sale and purchase of pirated material. Another project has been the wide dissemination of in-formation to amateur writers and composers to avoid "song sharks" and other purveyors of unscrupulous recording, publishing, and promotion schemes. A third effort involves inves-tigating present Departments of State and Labor immigration regulations which reportedly create serious prob-lems for Canadian artists who wish to perform in the United States. A spe-cial committee has studied this prob-lem in depth and is currently drawing up recommendations for CMA action. CMA, as a non-profit organization, conducts no commercial activities, but is a participant in fund-raising proj-ects for the promotion and preserva-tion of Country Music. One of the recipients of the proceeds from the annual Music City Pro-Celebrity Golf Tournament, which CMA co-sponsors, is the Country Music Foundation. The Foundation is presently involved in collecting records and data about the history of Country Music, and is in-stituting courses for the serious study of Country Music.

history of Country Music, and is in-stituting courses for the serious study of Country Music. With progress in so many direc-tions, CMA has been equally active in building its membership and improv-ing its effectiveness in specific geo-graphic and professional areas. The Board of Directors welcomed a Japa-nese representative to its ranks this year, with gratifying exchanges be-tween the two countries and an in-crease in members from the Orient. The CMA Board has instituted a series of membership gatherings in some of the cities in which Board Meetings have been held, with local prospective members as invited guests, and effective programs on the benefits of CMA membership. Two of these meetings were held in Atlanta, Ga., and Houston, Texas, and another in Bakersfield, California, where a complete show by West Coast artists was organized and presented by a progressive CMA West Coast Mem-bership Committee. International memberships are now

progressive CMA West Coast Mem-bership Committee. International memberships are now well established in Australia, Bel-gium, Canada, England, Ireland, Italy, France, Germany, Japan. Mexico, New Zealand, Puerto Rico. South Af-rica, and Sweden. International inter-est in Country Music is further evi-denced by responses to a CMA/U.S. Travel Service invitation for foreign tour agents to visit this country for a fact-finding tour of country music fact-finding tour of country music points of interest. Travel writers from Europe, Canada, and the Orient were duly hosted in the Nashville area and were thus able to return to

their homelands with firsthand in-formation for their clients. In April, CMA also assisted a group of German TV representatives who observed country music programming at the Fan Fair events for the purpose of formulating a 30-min-ute network Country show for the Christmas Season. They later paid a return visit to request additional con-ferences and assistance in expanding

their program to 45 minutes—a "first Country Music special" for German TV, with authentic American flavor. As services to its membership, CMA has conducted Convention Week as-semblies and seminars in a variety of interest areas such as Artist-DJ tape sessions in conjunction with WMS: sessions, in conjunction with WMS; and a new seminar this year with the International Country Music Buyers' International Country Music Buyers' Association, in conjunction with Amusement Business, to expound the value of Country Music attractions for fairs and rodeos. In addition, a Songwriters' conference was held in Sept. in cooperation with the Nash-ville Songwriters' Association to dis-cuss the benefits of CMA membership for songwriters, and to explore means by which CMA may further assist the endeavors of songwriters as a profes-sional group.


Throughout this year of progress and activity, CMA has looked to its president Bill Farr of Columbia Rec-ords for leadership; and to its permapresident Bill Fair of Columbia Rec-ords for leadership; and to its perma-nent executive director Mrs. Jo Wa'k-er for continuity of administrative and operational efficiency. Overall guidance was provided by the late Hubert Long of Hubert Long Inter-national, board chairman and former President of CMA. Mr. Long's death in Sept. was a sad loss to the entire Country Music industry as well as to CMA. He was not only a major figure as an agent and publisher; he was also the personal benefactor of many individual artists, a lifelong sprkes-man for Country Music, and a found-ing member of CMA. A number of internal and public innovations have also been effected by CMA during 1972. Within the organi-zation, a new membership category

zation, a new membership category was established by dividing the man-ager/booker/promoter membership was established by dividing the man-ager/booker/promoter membership group into artists' manager/agent and talent buyer/promoter designations, bringing to 13 the number of profes-sional categories represented on the CMA Board of Directors and thus further refining the representative nature of this body. Another change revised the eligibility requirement for the annual CMA Song of the Year Award by removing the "released for the first time" stipulation for songs which may be nominated. In con-nection with CMA's annual Country Music Month (broadcasting) Awards, another new plan has been estab-lished: the winners of the 1972 awards for best broadcast promotions of Country Music Month throughout October, will receive their awards with due ceremony at the 1973 CMA convention, where their efforts will receive more recognition and provide more impetus for future Music Month contests. The contest has been held for the past six years, but award presentations have previously re-ceived limited public attention. **'Fan Fair'**

The completely innovative CMA/ WSM "Fan Fair" event last April WSM "Fan Fair" event last April was an unqualified success and will become an annual expression of the industry's appreciation to its loyal consumer public. Fan Fair drew 5000 country devotees from the United States and Canada, with 100 artists and 140 industry exhibitors providing entertainment and trade contacts of all types for four days. Substantial awards were presented for prize-winning "Fan Booths", and Fan Fair was also the setting for the First Annual Grand Masters' Fiddling Contest. Contest



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

EDITORIAL: The Record Specialist

If there's anything an operator hates worse than losing his best location it's reading another editorial on record programming. But from time to time, it's always good to reappraise one's attitude on record selection in particular, and even music in general.

Many operators, let's face it, personally dislike "today's music". It's a natural prejudice, since many in the trade think "Sinatra" and "Dorsey" when music is discussed, rather than Led Zeppelin and Grand Funk Railroad. But when that prejudice leads to indifference when record purchases are to be made, then it can only hurt in the cash box.

In addition to this personal disinterest in current music trends, many operators have too little time on their hands to delve into trade charts, reviews, one stop racks and whatever to search out the best changes for their stops. They treat record buying much like buying any other replacement part, and find it an annoyance at best . . . an outright drudge at worst. Add to this the fact that many operators actually get guilt feelings if they sit around the shop listening to record sales, thinking they should be out on the route with the men or on the horn with distribs, other operators or prospective locations.

It must be remembered that today's jukeboxes, as fine as they look, are really the packaging for the product you sell—music. You can have the finest look-ing cabinet on a new TV but if the reception stinks, you've got a fine looking dust collector in your livingroom. Same goes for the jukes, obviously, although good looking machines can do a selling job on even the worst record playlists.

Point is, if the operator can't find the time (or doesn't want to find the time) to dope out record purchases, it's okay, provided he's got someone on the staff, who's hip to the music scene, to do it for him. In some cases, good one stops provide this service, but they can only be as accurate as the location information you give it (and that's not very much). Therefore, your best guide to choosing the best records for each specific location is someone who's tuned to that location, be it you or an employee, a son or a daughter.

Music is the product the jukebox vends and that product is highly perishable. Some disks have an earning life of four weeks and if you don't jump on them fast enough, that's money lost. Every big vend-ing operation runs some sort of food commissary, the manager of which knows those types of sandwiches which sell best. Sticking the wrong goods into any machine . . . be it a food vender, a cigarette unit or a jukebox, leads to stale goods and skimpy collections.

Effective record programming requires special knowledge of the new tunes now on the market and special skills to shuffle and deal the right disks to the right stops. In other words, it requires a specialist,
