

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

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

Phonogram To Stick With **Indie Outlets**

NEW YORK - Phonogram Records

NEW YORK — Phonogram Records will continue to maintain indie dis-tributors despite the possible acquisi-tion by its parent company, Poly-gram, of the U.D.D. branch setup. Bob Brockway, president of Poly-gram, noted that "there is consider-able industry speculation over the fu-ture distribution plans of the Poly-gram companies. MGM Records and Polydor Records are being dis-tributed through U.D.C., Inc. But Phonogram/Mercury opted to remain under independent distributorships. Irwin Steinberg, Phonogram's pres-ident, will continue to exercise, as do all our companies, independent judgment in this matter." Steinberg, in turn, was emphatic over Phonogram's status with indie distributors. "Regardless of what de-cisions are made that might bring Polygram and U.D.C. closer togeth-er," Steinberg said, "Phonogram and the Mercury labels will continue to be distributed by independents. It's working for us and we see no reason to make any changes." While negotiations between Poly-gram and United Artists are report-edly continuing over the future status of U.D.C., it's understood that final disposition of the matter is still open.

NCRD Survey: **Retail Outlets** Down 53% In Yr

NEW YORK — The total number of U.S. retail outlets dropped by more than 19,000 during the past year, 53% more than the 12,400-store loss rec-orded in 1972.

orded in 1972. This reduces the number of stores by 1,657,000, according to the Na-tional Census of Retail Distribution conducted annually by Audits & Sur-veys Inc., a leading marketing re-search firm. The 1973 figures represent a 1.1% dealing from the 1.676.770 recorded in

Search firm. The 1973 figures represent a 1.1% decline from the 1,676,770 recorded in 1972. Annual attrition between 1968 and 1972 ranged from 9,100 units to 14.200. The loss in 1973 was more than 55% greater than the five-year average of 12,200. Fewer outlets, along with increas-ing population, resulted in a record high store-to-people ratio of one store for every 125 persons, Audits & Surveys reported. Last year the ratio was 1 to 122; two years ago it was 1 to 120; three years ago it was 1 to 118. The ratio was 1 to 112 in 1967. Solomon Dutka, president of Aud-its & Surveys, noted that the trend to higher store-to-people ratios reflects the growing attraction of consumers to the convenience of one-stop shop-ping. (Additionally, the shainlage in the

to the convenience of one-stop shop-ping. "Additionally, the shrinkage in the number of retail outlets was abetted by the continuing rise in te costs of doing business, and the squeeze on profit margins which was heightened during the past year as a result of national economic policies," he said. A broad range of findings emerges from the 1973 retail census. Based on a nationwide area probability sample of more than 40,000 retail and select-ed service establishments, the annual study is the largest business census in the nation that is conducted in person. person.

person. With the exception of the furni-ture-home furnishings classification which, as a group, remained relative-ly unchanged, the study recorded a downturn for every major category. The growth of discount department stores, up 6% or 300 units to approx-imately 5,300, outpaced the growth of traditional department stores which imately 5,300, outpaced the growth of traditional department stores, which rose 1.9% or approximately 100 units to 4,800 outlets. In 1972, they posted gains of 8.3% and 3.3%, respectively. Dutka pointed out that the increase in discount operations reflects the impact they have had in the general morphondise.

merchandise area.

merchandise area. These gains, however, were offset and dry goods outlets. Variety by losses in the number of variety stores, which have recorded shrink-ages for six straight years, dropped 2.3% during the past year to some 20,700. In 1972, they fell 1.7% from the previous year. Dry goods outlets posted a 0.4% drop to approximately 39,900 units. Overall, the general merchandise category fell to about 70,700 outlets, down 0.4% or nearly 300 units from the previous year. In the 1972 census.

the previous year. In the 1972 census, these outlets posted a gain of some 1,000 stores over the year before.

1,000 stores over the year before. Gainers during the past year in-cluded radio-TV stores which had a gain of 1.7% or 200 units to approx-mately 12,200, their highest level since 1967 when they accounted for 12,500 outlets.







A minimum of 30 million people will walk through the display section of the train and millions more will view it through low profile windows as it slows down to 3 miles per hour while passing towns along its route.





From the rocking neon "R" out front to the carefully detailed embellishments in-side, the Roxy is clearly the poshest pop club in L.A. The five owners— Lou Adler, David Geffen, Elliot Rob-erts, Chuck Landis and, at the last minute, Bill Graham—were all con-spicuously hosting on opening night, with both shows jam-packed. Sur-prises included an intro by Graham, a guest shot by Cheech & Chong, a substitute for the originally billed Grin, and an intermission feature—a right-in-the-middle-of-it-all perform-ance by the Soul Train dancers. ance by the Soul Train dancers. The replacement act was Graham Nash, who happened to be in town recording—and it was that albumin-progress from which he picked most of his material. Morgana King

Morgana King ALICE TULLY HALL, NYC — Paramount recording artist Morgana King had appeared at Kenny's Casta-ways in May in a workshop setting, but New York had waited a long time for her to give another major concert. Always the perfectionist, Morgana set the staid musical estab-lishment on its ear with an amazing demonstration of her singing prowess as she delivered 21 songs, ten of which are brand new, to an audience representing a true cross-section of musical tastes. Backed by a combo including Gene

Backed by a combo including Gene Bertoncini on lead guitar, Bob Dougherty on bass, Bill Goodwin on drums, and a strong quartet, Mor-gana immediately captured the fancy of everyone by opening with George Harrison's "Something." Using just the combo to back her, she displayed her rampant sensitivity with moving versions of the Lennon-McCartney tune "Eleanor Rigby" and Donovan's "Sunshine Superman." Remarkably adept at working within any musical framework, Morgana was overwhelm-ing with the entire orchestra back-ing her on "Like A Seed." She returned from the intermission Backed by a combo including Gene

She returned from the intermission break with the Paul Williams' song "We Could Be Flying," which estab-lished the tone for the second half of the concert. Her version of Leon Russell's beautiful ballad, "A Song For You," was one of the evening's many touching and tender highlights. But Morgana can interpret any lyric and any style as she proved with virtuostic scat-singing on the campy "Them There Eyes."

"Them There Eyes." Singing a number of Beatle songs including "Gotta Get You Into My Life" and the Stevie Wonder gem, "You Are The Sunshine of My Life," Morgana was fine enough to get a well deserved standing ovation. She responded for an encore with a song from her brilliant, new LP, "New Be-ginnings," called "All In All." Justi-fying the faith and good wishes from her producer/mgr. Vince Mauro, Ste-vie Wonder, and Donny Hathaway as well as the stunning response from well as the stunning response from an enraptured audience, Morgana King has come back in a big way and once again looms bright in the sky like the star she is.

n Nash glasses. Not, he said, because he was the star of the show but because his eyes were over-strained from staring into so many lights at so many con-certs. Roger Miller

KINGS CASTLE, LAKE TAHOE — He's identified nowadays as the most honored songwriter of our time, and dang me if Roger Miller isn't just that, 11 Grammy Awards over two years a prime indicator, but Miller on stage shows why the honors extend elsewhere.

He is the consummate performer, exponent of a type entertainment that has been imitated, borrowed from and used as a model by others, but never quite duplicated or equaled since he first put the parts together. They fit. as usual, like a mink-lined glove of joy through this headline engagement, during which he's incor-porating a slew of new songs.

porating a slew of new songs. Written after a two-year hiatus, there's the current chart-clinging "Open Up Your Heart;" "I Believe in the Sunshine," designated as the next single and a rousing salute to life; "Shannon's Song," composed for his young daughter; and "Whistle Stop," a wordless travelog that Miller turns into a singalong, all part of his soon-due, debut album for Columbia Records. Records.

Records. And all elicited the same kind of warm response from his audience as the Miller traditionals, the classics that keep accounting for the SRO houses here and elsewhere. "Dang Me," for sure, and "King of the Road" and "England Swings" and "Chug-A-Lug" and "In the Summer-time" and "Buffalo Herd" and "Hus-bands and Wives."

And, oh, yeah, (why not?), even the one he didn't write but made his own anyway, "Little Green Apples," and it's all held together by a certain grace and good humor that welds the performer to the people who've come to pay homage the best way they know how, by enjoying.

Enjoy they do, irrespective of taste, real or presumed, for Miller has the ability to please no matter whom. Too, in the Will Rogers tradi-tion, he is blessed with a grassroots, back-home brand of humor that's as magical as his music. Whether planned or spontaneous, his observations bridge songs with infectious laughter.

That he pauses to show his way around a banjo or ride the "Orange Blossom Special" on fiddle is so much bonus to the entertainment phenomenon that is Roger Miller.

Opening the bill were Jack Burns and Avery Schreiber, whose cerebral comedy is a record feature now and again, but right now is mostly in evidence on their own summer TV show. Based on a series of their vin-tage, finely-honed routines, the act starts with laughs and only gets better. They should get bigger.

JSD Band

BITTER END, NYC-The JSD Band, from Scotland, debuted in New York from Scotland, debuted in New York with a marvelous show. The music of the five man group is traditional Eng-lish and sounds almost as good as Fairport Convention and Steeleye Span. Jim Divers(J), Sean O'Rourke-(S), Des Coffield(D), Chuck Fleming, and Colin Finn play at least 14 differ-ent instruments between them and they showed us here a precise right and Colin Finn play at least 14 differ-ent instruments between them and they showed us how on opening night. The group's music is easy to enjoy and get into; I don't think that any-one in the audience wasn't tapping their feet along with the music. On the comical side, every time some-one in the group spoke to the audi-ence, everyone started to laugh be-cause the group have such strong ac-cents that none could honestly un-derstand what they were talking about. One of the JSD Band's selections combined four tunes into a long in-strumental that was excellent. I'm sure if there had been room people would have danced as the music was very lively and catchy. Eric Weissberg and Deliverance Alex Harvey

Alex Harvey TROUBADOR, L.A.—Somewhere in the on-going country and bluegrass revival there had to be room for Eric Weissberg. Perhaps the greatest of the city-slicker banjo virtuosos, Weiss-berg has been seen on folksy stages for more than a decade, spending six years with the banana boat balladeers, the Tarriers. With the movie "Deliverance" came new-found popularity. To everyone's

new-found popularity. To everyone's surprise, including Eric Weissberg's, "Duelling Banjos" became a hit rec-ord, and the formation of the group Deliverance followed soon thereafter. Deliverance followed soon thereafter. From their opening instrumental, "Scalded Cat," a Weissberg original, and through such songs as the Flatt and Scruggs tune "Till the End Of the World Rolls Around," both from their recent Warner Brothers LP, the ob-vious enjoyment of the musicians on stage was infectious. It spread through the audience with all the exuberance of a hog-tying contest at a rural county fair, transforming the crowd into one great tapping foot. Eric Weissberg may be from New York City, but as far as the hillbillies in the Troubador are concerned, he is pure country. pure country.

Alex Harvey is best known as the Alex harvey is best known as the writer of several country and pop hits, most recently "Delta Dawn." He brought to the stage a wealth of new material, a beery Nashville baritone and a pastoral nonchalance that turned to intensity with the first chords sounded by his guitar.

It was a static set, with Harvey and his two accompanists seated on stools throughout the performance. The music, much of it from his new Capitol Records album "True Love," was left to its own devices, with little salesmanship coming from the stage. If the intent expressions on the faces of the audience is any indication or of the audience is any indication, or the applause that followed each song, one could safely say that, even with-out salesmanship, the audience was sold on Alex Harvey.

Playing as well as they did against adverse circumstances, Bang clearly demonstrated that they are among the most resilient acts around. They quite possibly could become as familiar to the rock audience as that bottle of coca-cola. e.s.





NEW YORK-GRACE SLICK: UNITING THE MOVIE THEME FREAKS

As she stood backstage at the Elton John concert, Grace Slick said she felt really nervous. "After all," she commented, "I hadn't been on stage for over a year and I had trouble realizing I was a guest. I was working myself up to go out and perform." The tension is understandable when you realize that Grace as lead singer of the Jefferson Airplane has become sort of a musical institution in concert halls from the group's home in San Francisco to England and Europe.

But if Grace has been inactive as far as performing with the Airplane, don't attribute it to laziness. "Actually," she says, picking over her midday breakfast of bacon and eggs, "I think we've been in the studio something like nine or ten months straight with a only a little time off between sessions. And if that's not enough, RCA has asked us (The Airplane) if we're ready to record again." The studio time Grace and Paul Kantner have put in thus far this year has been to finish the "Baron Von Tollbooth and the Chrome Nun" LP with David Freiberg (also a singer with The Airplane) and bring to near completion Grace's latest solo LP entitled "Manhole."

"Except for a couple of minor details," says Grace, "the album is done and will be released sometime in November. We'd like to get **David Freiberg**, **David Crosby**, and a whole bunch of folks together this week to help us with a big vocal chorus that goes, 'Don't tie me down, I want to run, give me the sun'. It would sound great with a lot of voices. Other than that, we've got a few decisions to make about flute tracks and things like that."

While Grace speaks, Paul Kantner (an Airplane charter member) enters the room and after listening to bits of the conversation about the "Manhole" LP, which he co-produced with Grace, he plays a cassette tape of the album to help fill in the verbal gaps. "I'm really into the album," beams Grace with obvious pride. "I've always had a fascination for movie themes. I mean some of them are really fine and on this record I got into that concept. One whole side is called "Theme From The Movie Manholé" and it's sort of for closet movie theme freaks. It's for all those folks who are really into the flicks." A global venture of sorts, "Manhole" was recorded at the Record Plant and Wally Heider Studios in San Francisco and Olympic Studios in England. A diverse

HOLLYWOOD-STEELY DAN: ICONOCLASTIC BOOGALOO

"In our heart of hearts, we are really bizarre," comments Donald Fagen, comfortably crumpled like a ball of scrap paper on the couch. His friend and collaborator, Walter Becker, nods noncommittally, an attitude to which he is not usually prone. The conversation, expecting but not receiving further elaboration on the subject, slides into brief silence.

We were sitting in Becker's new Laurel Canyon house, perched pleasantly on top of Los Angeles, 3200 miles as the crow flies from Brooklyn. Fagen and Becker flew from Brooklyn three years ago, shortly after leaving the instrumental entourage of Jay and the Americans. Originally contracted to ABC/Dunhill as a songwrit-ing team, they instead gave birth to Steely Dan, a pair of hit singles ("Do It Again" and "Reelin' In The Years") and an album that was certified gold a year after release.

Now there is "Countdown to Ecstasy," their second ABC LP, struggling its way through the top 40 charts and a single, "Show Biz Kids," that got lost somewhere along the way. It was a strange choice for a single release, containing an oddball contrapuntal chorus and an entire verse that needed bleeping. "We're sadder but wiser in relation to that" says Becker, "but its always comforting to know that you've got something potentially obscene on AM radio."

With characteristic ambiguity, they are fond of comparing their song-writing process to the creation of "junk sculpture." "Some songs are completely mine and some are Walter's, but in most there isn't any cut-and-dried division. 'Boston Rag,' for instance, has my chorus and verses by Walter." Musically, both of them have a predilection for jazz, a slight disdain for theatrics and an amiable cynicism towards the pretensions of the rock "scene," but not for the music. "Someone sent me a newspaper clipping that described rock concerts as 'the inept playing for the untutored,'" said Walter, with more amusement than indignance. "That just isn't true. The music may be simple, not as sophisticated, say, as jazz or classical music, but some of the guys playing it—a lot of the successful ones-are very, very good at what they do."

"I listen to music for its intrinsic musical values, as opposed to any dramatic or theatrical qualities," continued Fagen. "For that reason our lyrics are usually dry and objective. The content may be subjective, but it's pure music, pure lyrics." Within the complexities of their music, there is seldom anything thrown in

operation among several talented musicians has made the effort a gratifying one. "It's all sort of incestuous," says Grace, referring to the free interchange of musicians in The Airplane and Steelwind with Hot Tuna Grace and Paul and ... "well it gets complicated, doesn't it?," asks Ms. Slick. Arranged by longtime friend **Stephen Schuster**, the symphony orchestra that weaves in and out of "Theme From The Movie Manholé" is an interesting contrast to **Paul's** bagpipes and the piano and guitar flights of fancy of **Grace**. **Craig Chaquico**, the brilliant 17 year old Portuguese lead guitarist of Steelwind, plays some of his finest licks on "Manhole" and is ably assisted by a rhythm section including the redoubtable Jack Casady and Peter Sears on bass and John Barbata on drums. David Freiberg, whom illness prevented from playing on the album at first, recovered in time to add a couple of songs to the LP as well as play some keyboard.

When asked how she chose the title for her new album, Grace frowns and then laughs saying, "I guess you could call it a blast at women's lib. I mean, I believe everyone's entitled to his point of view, but women are undermining their own cause by coming on so heavy. There's a cold aloofness that's kind of frightening and when men sense that in a woman it turns them off pretty quick. I mean, I always liked the way men have treated me, so I never could really identify with

the women's lib point of view." Completing "Manhole" has made Grace happy, but it appears she won't have much time to sit back and enjoy listening to the fruits of her labor for very long. With RCA anxious for the Airplane to start recording their eighth and even ninth albums, there is also management pressure of sorts to put the group out on the road for an extended tour. "Obviously," says Grace, "we're not going to be able to rehearse for a new album and go out on tour at the same time. I guess RCA is going to have to make up its mind which it wants first." If, in fact, Grace and Paul take The Airplane on the road, it will be in a

different form than that audiences have become accustomed to. "We'll definitely do our family trip," smiles Grace, "and everybody will get a chance to do his thing. The Airplane will play some songs, Hot Tuna will do some of its things,

for emotional content. They prefer to leave their compositions uncluttered by images that would allow the listener to relate on the basis of sentiment or any non-musical experience. As in jazz, then, the feelings of the audience are aroused not by story telling or catch-phrases but purely by the sounds of the music itself. "Actually," added Walter, "they (the lyrics) just appear to be passionless because everyone else's stuff is so soppy.

Steely Dan has undergone changes of peripheral personnel since its inception, but the original quintet has remained intact. Becker on bass and Fagen's keyboards are joined by drummer Jim Hodder to form the rhythm section. Jeffrey "Skunk" Baxter, an outstanding and very original musician who previously did studio work for Carly Simon, alternates guitar leads with Denny Dias.

Recently, the group has taken pains to enliven their stage act, adding vocalist Royce Jones and two girls, introduced as Porky and Bucky, who add some oomph to the choruses while dancing on the side of the stage. Fagen was asked, half jokingly, if he had thought of going "whole hog" with the idea; he could, for example, enclose the girls in cages and dangle them, Las Vegas style, above the band on stage.

Fagen: "Don't think we haven't thought of that. Unfortunately, though, unless you take the authority upon yourself, like Frank Zappa, for instance, you can only get people to do just so many things."

Becker disagreed: "We can get those people to do anything we want them to." Fagen: "Yeah, but then you're assuming a burden of responsibility . . . I just couldn't ask them to do that routine with a real, live python; that's pretty dangerous

Becker interrupted: "Sooner or later," he said, "they will do the routine with the python." eliot sekuler

ASCAP 'Rap Session' **Answers Questions**

NEW YORK — A large segment of the 2,000,000,000 musical per-formances on U.S. radio and televi-sion stations are covered by the AS-CAP survey, pres. Stanley Adams of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers told a near-capacity audience at the season's sixth N.Y.C. "rap session" sponsored by AGAC. Erwin Drake, pres. of the American Guild of Authors and Com-posers, chaired the September 25th gathering at the Warwick Hotel. Many of the questions that Adams fielded an informal introduction related to the survey and pay-out sys-tem. Avoiding statements on the roy-alty system of B.M.I. Adams noted that the ASCAP survey covers some 1,000 stations—including FM outlets— during the course of a year. He point-ed out that the ASCAP near programs

He point-ed out that the ASCAP pay programs offer a writer two different plans from which to choose, noting that a new member can start with the fast-cash "current performance" option and then change three years later to the spread-averaged payments of the "four funds" system without losing a single performance credit in the switch. He explained that an ASCAP writer member can collaborate with a BMI "affiliate" and collect every cent of his performing rights income from AS-CAP. He reported that research had established that night club, hotel etc. performances followed the same lines as radio and TV and added that the cost of surveying non-broadcast per-formances might match or exceed the total fees paid by such users. Drake, who had earlier lauded Adams for his role in straightening out the "second-ary lvric" situation, confirmed that a top BMI executive had told him the same thing. The Rolling Stones' third LP on their own label, "Goats Head Soup," has also been RIAA certified gold after two weeks on the charts. The other two releases on Rolling Stone Records have also sold over the one million dollar mark. They are: "Sticky Fingers" and "Exile On Maine Street."

The Allman Brothers' "Beginnings" on the Capricorn label, distributed by Atlantic, is the third LP that was certified gold last week.

NEW YORK - RCA Records has NEW YORK — RCA Records has released the first three volumes of a salute to late composer-pianist Sergei Rachmaninoff. Two extra three-record sets will be released in Nov. to com-plete the 15-record set containing all the known recordings of the Russian who was born 100 years ago. "At least 13 items have not been previously released, and we addition-ally have all his Edison discs, his first recordings," Munves said.

The first album of three records contains Rachmaninoff's acoustical recordings (including the Edison discs). The second and third sets con-tain electrical recordings of Rach-maninoff as piano recitalist.

The five albums were co-produced by John Pfeiffer, exec. Red Seal prod. for RCA, and Gregor Benko, vice pres. of the Intl. Piano Library.

Contents of the two November sets include Rachmaninoff's collaborations with the late Fritz Kreisler, Rach-maninoff conducting the Philadelphia Orchestra in performances of his or-chestral works, and Rachmaninoff performing his four piano concertos and his Rhapsody on a Theme of Pa-gainini with the Philadelphia Orches-tra conducted by Leopold Stokowski and Eugene Ormandy.



MCA's office will move into EMI's Manchester Square headquarters. The courage to move newer records onto the jukebox playlist before they even hit the charts. The courage to speak out at association meetings when the financial health of your operation and the operations of your brothers could be mutually helped. The courage to walk into a brand

new type of location with a brand new sales pitch and sell it. Sure, there are tons of steps the operator has to take that require courage, if he seriously intends to get ahead. But courage isn't really the kind of heroism depicted in John Wayne marine movies . . . it's simply the ability to try some-thing new and be prepared for failure. That's all it is, but it's supprising how many people is this is defined at the surprising how and be prepared for failure. That is all it is, but it's surprising how many people in this industry and elsewhere that are afraid to do anything out of the ordinary because they're afraid of dropping the ball and maybe losing face. As such, we are faced with the "status quo" that exists in many parts of this industry. If you're not content with being a member of a "status quo,"

well, go out and get cracking.

Sam Wolberg, Co-Founder of ChiCoin and Industry Pioneer, Dies at 82

CHICAGO — Samuel Wolberg, one of the country's pioneers in the coin-operated amusement industry died Tuesday 25 September 1973 at the age of 82 after a lingering bout with cancer cancer.

Wolberg was noted as an industri-al philanthropist who, along with Samuel Gensburg, founded Chicago Coin Machine Exchange 42 years ago, predecessor to Chicago Dynamic Industries.

Wolberg was active in company operations until illness restricted his activities. The business he co-founded

Toward a Super European Assn.

BRUSSELS — Representatives of European national coin associations recently met in Brussels on an in-formal level to discuss what their newly-formed European-federation Economic Community (common mar-ket) and what that EEC could do for them. Major topics of common inter-est under discussion at that gather-ing included: coin machine taxation, technical conformity, the elimination of secular legal obstructions to machine operation and the gradual elim-ination of individual national curren-

cy. Dr. Bruns-Wuestefeld of the EEC indicated that the coin federation is considered by the common market commission as the representative body acting in the mutual interests of the industry for several member countries, and could be registered and considered as a valuable partner in case of consultation. The representatives of the German central organization of automatic machines (ZOA) and of the German association of wholesale trade of coin machines (DAGV) stated on this occasion that their organizations had decided to adhere to the European union. The association of the German coin machine manufacturers (VDAI) is a member as well as founder of the union. union.

Representatives of the Belgian, British, Danish, Luxembourg and Dutch associations have shown their iinterest and made known their inten-tion to bring this question of adhe-sion to the European union within their respective organizations.
