Schwaid Calls For Greater Diversity In Act Mgmt

NEWYORK — There's a need for more personal managers who can "intelligently deal with record companies, television, promotors, publicists and booking agencies," according to Bob Schwaid, president of Thruppence Ltd., a thriving personal management firm.

"The era," continues Schwaid, "when someone with little or no experience in the entertainment industry could simply ride the career of an artist, learning his trade as he went along, is over and the continuation of these people in our

business has become one of the major stumbling blocks in creating new stars."

Thruppence currently represents the Raspberries, The Independents, Melba Montgomery, Ian Thomas and Cymande and is credited with providing the direction behind the present star status of both Al Green and Van Morrison. The firm recently expanded with the addition of vet manager Stan Poses.

Pointing to the need for what he calls "specialization in diversification," Schwaid stated, "No manager can contribute to the successful recording career of the artist he represents unless he understands the marketplace. That includes knowing which radio stations are really significant for that particular performer, what the realities are of record distribution and retailing and how to reach the audience that is most vital to his client. This is the kind of expertise that the record company's must have from the managers they work with. When that is missing, it is so detrimental that many labels simply will not work on an act if they feel these qualities are lacking in his direction.

TV, TOO

"This same situation extends both to television where understanding visual values are as important or more important than hits and to working with promoters who too often deal with managers who equate chart position with the ability to attract an audience — one of the most dangerous oversimplifications in the entire business of personal appearances.

"The same is true when the manager deals with a publicist. The public relations firm looks to the manager to be a source of news; to exchange ideas and most importantly to have a clear idea of the image he is seeking for their mutual

At GRT Meet: Key Mass Merchandisers Say Industry Can Beat Energy Crisis

HOLLYWOOD — Three key rackdistribution men have struck a positive note on the effects of the energy shortage in the music industry.

The distributors — among them Amos Heilicher, president of J. L. Marsh Co., Lou Lavinthal, president of ABC Records/Tapes; and John Kaplan of the Handleman Co. — were contacted during business meetings held by GRT Music Tapes, Sunnyvale, Calif., one of the nation's largest independent manufacturers of pre-recorded tapes.

When questioned about the energy crunch and its possible effects on the record and tape industry, Heilicher said:

"I am going to be optimistic and say that the energy crisis probably will have little ill effect on our businesses. There will be some added apprehension — and, if I may say so — that could eventually

Disavow SLA Claim On Use Of Crusaders Disk

HOLLYWOOD — Use of the Crusaders' song "Way Back Home" at the end of the taped statement issued by the Symbionese Liberation Army, from kidnapped newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst, was disavowed by members of the Crusaders, their record company Blue Thumb, and any of their representatives.

Bob Krasnow, chairman of the board for Blue Thumb, and the public relations firm of Gibson & Stromberg disclaimed any knowledge or responsibility for the use and playing of the song by the SLA, and insisted they do not endorse use of the song in this fashion.

The tape was received at San Francisco radio station KSAN, stating that Ms. Hearst had voluntarily joined the SLA, and ending with the Crusaders' "Way Back Home" — described as the SLA's "national anthem."

NARAS Chapter In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, CA. — When the general membership ratified its charter on March 25 by unanimous approval, San Francisco became one of only six cities in the country with its own chapter of N.A.R.A.S., the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences. The formal approval of the San Francisco Chapter is of course still subject to the vote of the national Trustees, which approval is imminent

The chief concerns of NARAS — San Francisco will be with (a) getting more recording work done in San Francisco and making the Bay Area scene more attractive to producers of music; (b) promoting a healthy image of San Francisco as an alive and growing recording center.

Membership in NARAS is open to singers, songwriters, musicians, arrangers, producers and engineers who have worked on at least six commercially released songs. Photographers, designers and writers whose work has appeared on six album covers are also eligible. Dues are \$20 per year, and non-voting associate memberships are open at \$15 to anyone who has a legitimate interest in the recording industry.

The comprehensive agreement covers a wide range of services including catalog promotion and the publication of music, and will be coordinated by Chappell Music Company for Williamson Music Inc., in the United States and Western Hemisphere and by Chappell & Co., Ltd. for Williamson Music Ltd. in the United Kingdom and Eastern Hemisphere.

Norman Weiser, president of Chappell, stated: "We are extremely proud to resume the longstanding relationship with Williamson that began in 1943 with the formation of that company. We look forward to the expansion of our activities and the development of joint creative projects for the future."

The Williamson catalog contains such outstanding show scores as "The King and I", "Oklahoma!", "The Sound of Music" and "South Pacific", plus music from many other musical shows, films and television specials.

Idaho Governor Vetoes Bill To OK Pirate Goods

BOISE, IDAHO — Gov. Cecil C. Andrus has vetoed a bill passed by both houses of the Idaho State Legislature that would have allowed anyone to manufacture and sell pirated sound recordings if a 26 royalty was paid to the owner of the master recording.

Governor Andrus said the measure would, in effect, "legalize rather than prohibit tape piracy and place a substantial burden on the recording industry." The legislature has since adjourned.

CBS Posts Top First Quarter In Its History

NEW YORK — CBS has reported the highest first quarter sales and operating earnings in the company's history, according to William S. Paley, chairman and Arthur R. Taylor, president. Income from continuing operations is estimated at \$20.9 million, 22% ahead of the \$17.1 million earned in the first quarter of 1973. Sales for the period increased to \$414.5 million, a 14% rise over the \$363.7 million in the comparable period last year.

Estimated first quarter operating earnings per share were 73¢, 22% higher than the 60¢ operating earnings per share achieved in the first quarter of 1973. (First quarter 1973 earnings per share do not include a gain on discontinued operations of 18¢ resulting primarily from the sale of the New York Yankees.)

Commenting on the first quarter results, Paley and Taylor said, "CBS has now enjoyed 12 consecutive quarters in which sales and operating earnings have improved over comparable year-earlier periods."

MCA Reports Record Income

UNIVERSAL CITY — MCA Inc. has announced a combined operating income figure of \$18,234,000 in 1973 for its records and music publishing divisions. This represents an increase of 49% from the \$12,246,000 figure reached in 1972.

For MCA Records, under the administration of its president, J.K. Maitland, this figure represents an all time high, both in operating income and in gross revenues.

Five singles and six LP albums achieved "gold" record status during 1973. The singles were "Half Breed" by Cher, "Drift Away" by Dobie Gray, "Garden Party" by Rick Nelson, "Crocodile Rock" and "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road" by Elton John. The LP records were "Hot August Night" by Neil Diamond, "Quadrophenia" by The Who, "Don't Shoot Me, I'm Only The Piano Player" and "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road" by Elton John, and the movie soundtracks from "Jesus Christ Superstar" and "American Graffiti."

RCA Promo Man Back On Disks

NEW YORK -- RCA Records' Cincinnati based promo man Rob Hegel has traded his promo bag for the studio. Hegel has just cut his first single for RCA, "New York City Girl."

In addition to singing, Hegel also wrote, produced, and played piano on the session. Hegel went from music director at WFIB at the University of Cincinnati, to doing independent promo in that city.

C. S. N. & Y. Reunion

NEW YORK — Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young will reunite this summer, their manager confirmed last week. They got together two months ago in Hawaii and discussed getting back together. Prior commitments had Neil Young the last to confirm

The first date will be June 29 at Fort Collins, near Denver on the Colorado State University Campus, according to Bill Graham, the San Francisco promoter who will produce some of the concerts. The official opening will be in Southern California on July 6th at either the Los Angeles Coliseum or the Ontario Motor Speedway near Los Angeles.

NY Times Co-Pub, Admn Ties With Jackie DeShannon

NEW YORK — Murray Deutch, president of the New York Times Music Publishing Corp. has announced a long-term copublishing and administration agreement with Plain & Simple Music, which includes a writing and in-house production agreement with singer/writer/producer Jackie De Shannon.

Ms De Shannon, who currently records for Atlantic Records, won five Grammy nominations for "What The World Needs Now" and "Put A Little Love In Your Heart." Her writing reflects her background in pop, blues, folk and country music. She has starred in virtually every major TV variety show and has presented an Oscar-nominated song on the Academy Awards telecast. A highly prolific writer, her hits include "Put A Little Love In Your Heart," "Dum Dum," "Heart In Hand," "So Deep," "When You Walk In The Room," "The Great Imposter" and "Come Stay With Me."

The current agreement adds to the New York Times Music Corp.'s recent acquisitions of Metromedia Music, the Clyde Otis pop-soul catalog and the score to the smash hit Broadway musical "Over Here."



economic sense, so get ready for things to get better for you. People aren't going to be going to expensive nightclubs with live entertainment as much as they used to. I think they're going to be putting their entertainment money into the jukes in the local bar or into records and tapes.

The feeling of luxury has to be in his life in one form or another or his life won't be worth living."

NEW YORK - MELANIE: SPRINGTIME FOR THE AUTUMN LADY

Melanie, though she was born Feb. 3, thinks of herself as an Autumn lady, a fact that almost surfaced when she and husband/manager Peter Schekeryk contemplated calling her recent Neighborhood Records' LP by that name. But while remaining an Autumn lady at heart, Melanie, and Peter, also the president of her label, have focused on the Portuguese concept called "Madrugada," the time between midnight and dawn, and have used that elusive, but beautiful word to capture the essence of Melanie's new effort.

"I think it's a beautiful word," said **Melanie** in a recent interview in her luxurious New York apartment, "it's something special. The Portuguese are the only people I know of who have a name for that particular time of the day. The reason we chose it as the title of the album is because it's my favorite time, the time when I sing best and get my best inspiration."

Obviously, the inspiration found throughout "Madrugada" is considerable, so there must be some truth to the old saying that timing is everything. Particularly incredible is Melanie's overwhelming version of Mick Jagger and Keith Richards' "Wild Horses." It's not the fine string section that makes the song work so much as the incredible dynamic control Melanie and band have over the transitional passages of the tune where the sound is hushed to a whisper before returning with an unparalleled and furious intensity. The treatment of this song in a way is reflective of the care and love that Melanie puts into her work.

"I feel "Madrugada" is more of a high energy album than "Stoneground Words"," said Melanie. "It's much more like "Gather Me." If the LP can surpass sales of "Candles In The Rain" and "Gather Me," Melanie will have achieved victory on another, and from a business perspective, equally important front, because if "Madrugada" passes either of these LP's it will become her third RIAA certified gold album. In Melanie's case no tribute from her undaunted legion of devoted fans could matter more, since she always tries her hardest to please her audience. Her annual birthday concerts in New York in the past few years have been extra treats for those die-hard fans who would brave anything to see her in concert. Her recent party at the famed

HOLLYWOOD - HARRIET SCHOCK: OF SUPERSTAR STOCK

Film director/screenwriter **Alexandro Jodorowsky** comments in "The Holy Mountain," his new film produced by **Allen Klein**, "You could have made history and now we can't even forget you." This somewhat perplexing line seems to pertain well to our industry's own plethora of perishable produced platter product. Success in the music world is often as fugacious and quick to experience as it is long and hard to finally have acquired. Andy Warhol is known to have said recently that in the future, individual fame will be limited to fifteen minutes per person. However after one listens to the fifteen minutes of side one of Harriet Schock's new 20th Century record album 'Hollywood Town," one is strongly convinced even long after her "allotted time of fame," has been dispatched that she is going to be around for a much longer time. Today's record industry unlike any other consumer oriented industry is essentially turn-table involved in selling people like non-organic product. Their ad infinitum list of "superstars," is introduced to the record going public just about every fifteen minutes via some large, ad-hominem campaign. The superabundance of superstars may in itself explain why companies superannuate their own manufactured superstar somewhere between the release of the record and the release of superfluous ad copy. Even Russ Regan, president of 20th Century Records was aware of this snare, this "sequela" or afteraffect caused by producing too many superstars; all at the same time. Perhaps that's why when Roger Gordon of Screen Gems Music called Russ about five months ago to hear a new female songwriter/performer signed to Colgems, **Russ** reportedly was not interested in signing "Anybody else." The reason being that he had turned a lot of any-bodies into somebodies and quite frankly the invitation to hear another superstar (for that is the most colloquial and most appropriate 'selling' adjective) was something Russ passed on. However when Danny Davis, a personal friend of Russ' from Screen Gems asked Russ as a favor to him to listen to the Harriet Schock tape, Regan relented. One can practically imagine the scene which duty to friendship obliges. Here a hopeful Davis probably sat with a compliant Regan who had prepared himself, if even in a slightly perfunctory way, to listen to the tape in spite of the fact that his mind was pretty much firmed to not signing anybody else. Metropolitan Opera House (a first for any 'pop' performer) was a stunning example of the devotion that so openly exists between Melanie and her fans. Braving a blizzard and gale force winds, thousands swarmed the staid classical palace to reminisce and hear Melanie performing selections from "Madrugada." The evening was a smashing success on all levels and Melanie said later, "It was one of the greatest experiences of my life and something I hope to continue for a long long time."

But her recent triumph at the Met is really only the tip of the iceberg as far as Melanie's past achievements and future plans are concerned. The lady who won Cash Box's 1972 award for the Top Female Vocalist and who toured Yugoslavia, Rumania, West Germany, Great Britain, and Japan as official spokeswoman for UNICEF, said that audiences the world over have received her tremendously, particularly in Japan where she played a Thanksgiving concert to an appreciative and understanding audience. "I was knocked out by the reception I got abroad, but truthfully, there's no place like home," smiled the young artist knowing she had used a cherished cliche to describe her gut level feelings.

With all the positive things **Melanie** has achieved in her career, her outlook is still fresh and optimistic. "I suppose", she mused, "that I might like to go to school to take an oriental art course if I weren't busy playing and singing, but for the time being I just want to continue doing what I do best." For **Melanie**, 'best' means perfection, and so she hoards what she calls her private hours during which time she probably composes songs like "Brand New Key," her gigantic million selling single of 1971.

Though she's been busy recording and performing over the winter, **Melanie's** excited about the spring, a time of rebirth according to the poets, and a time of renewed activity for the Autumn lady. outcome to this all too familiar situation seems most predictable. Isn't it usually a cursory examination of the material afterwhich the record label executive tells his friend without much abandon that so and so is good but there's just no room for them here. However that's not at all the way it happened in Russ' "Hollywood Town," offices. In fact contrary to such expectation, Russ kept his friend of long standing long sitting while he listened to that tape seven times and then superveniently added still another superstar to the 20th Century roster. Ad copy for Ms. Schock's debut album campaign run the gamut of gasconade with lines which include "Listen Our Friends and you shall hear the Harriet Schock album of the year." The advertising tactics here apparently ascribe to those of the "new wave of Madison Avenue" which relish on honesty for it is the album of the year. Harriet herself understood ad copywriting since she was a full time agency copywriter whose part time songs were secretly stored up in a bottle of brand X before Roger Gordon and Colgems happened to discover the copious supply, signed her and thereafter took over all the chores of copyright. Harriet, who hails from Dallas, Texas came to "Hollywood Town," with her aspiring actor husband, who to borrow a song title from her album was "Standin' in the Way of the Music," and so they separated. Harriet stayed on in tinsel town and helped to paint the town with pictures of advertising suggestion via her artful ad copy. She studied the craft of writing at the University of Texas under the professorship of Ambrose Gordon (no relation to her producer Roger(who taught her all the things any good lyric writer should know like how to write sonnets and villanelles. The logic in the foregoing statement is that if you can write sonnets and villanelles you can write anything including lyrics. She admits that Ambrose Gordon (A Charles Dickens character name to be sure) was a martinet in the strictest sense and the most severe, most difficult assignment he could bestow upon his class, she tells us, would be for them to write "a nostalgic poem in blank verse." Harriet Schock concedes this was especially cumbersome for her since she finds she can be 'more terse in rhyme than she's inclined to be in free verse. HOLLYWOOD - ANN PEEBLES: HI HOPES

John Lennon's now famous laudation of Ann Peebles' "I Can't Stand The Rain" served to confirm the presentiment that Ann was the logical heiress to Memphis superstar status. With musical guidance provided by producer Willie Mitchell, her recordings have acquired that smooth, loping sound that has already entrenched Al Green in the ranks of best-selling artists and makes Ann's songs immediate pop crossover material.



Ann, who is about to celebrate her 27th birthday, is a diminutive lady from East St Louis, Missouri. There were eleven kids in the family, and together with Ann's parents they composed the **Peebles Choir**, a gospel group that sang in several of the local churches. The choir has been a long-standing tradition in the Peebles family, having been founded generations ago by Ann's great-grandfather and it provided Ann with valuable experience in performing and singing.

After deciding on a career for herself apart from her family, Ann found herself in Memphis several years ago and landed a job at the Rosewood Club. It was there that Willie Mitchell saw her. Almost a year before Al Green arrived on the scene, Hi Records was a fledgling label at the time, reaching out for fresh and new talent. Ann fit the bill and her first album, "Part Time Love" was recorded. It was released in late

The album was a moderate success, hitting the R&B charts soon after its release and a string of singles, as well as another album followed soon thereafter. Somewhere before the production of that second album, Ann, finding a new facet to her talents, wrote her first song, "What You Laid On Me" which was included on the second LP, "Straight From The Heart." As Ann tells it, it was a little over one year later that she rousted her husband, Don Bryant out of bed at some ungodly hour in the morning with the inspiration and itch for "I Can't Stand The Rain." She had dreamed about the tune, it seems, and despite the discomfiture of such nocturnal stimulation, all turned out for the best. The song, with Willie Mitchell's Maxwell House Coffee commercial intro, became Ann Peebles' first crossover hit and made her future success a certainty. Her latest Hi LP, naturally titled after her "I Can't Stand The Rain" hit, was written for the most part by Ann and her husband on various sleepless nights.

Future plans for Ann's recordings include collaborations with her husband and Hi's ace in the hole, Al Green; both projects would be produced by Willie Mitchell. Ann intends to continue writing. "There are so many thoughts that I want to express;" she says, "and now that I'm working at it, it seems like a new me."

Money, money everywhere . . .Dr. Hook & The Medicine performed the first official "streaking" concert ever, in Copenhagen, Denmark, appearing in the nude at the Falconer Theatre, before what was described as an "overly enthusiastic crowd". The group had previously appeared on Scandanavian TV last year in the buff, so the naked encore was nothing new for the group's Danish fans... At Captain Beefheart's show at the Whisky in L.A. last week, his first U.S. appearance in over two years, the fans began lining up at 5 PM for the 8 PM show. As a result of this enthusiasm, the club's owners left word that no others would be allowed in. That was, until, a limo arrived that had as its passengers, John Lennon and Paul McCartney.

Anyone for more of those Beatles reunion rumors?

Kenny Loggins & Jim Messina's live LP should be arriving any day now. The disk was recorded at Carnegie Hall, the Orpheum in Boston, and at Winterland, in San Francisco. As well as their string of hits, the LP includes never before released material. A nation wide tour is in the planning stages for this Fall . . . Roger McGuinn's new LP, to be entitled "Peace On You" is due out in July. Bill Halverson produced . . . Add this week's rocking and rolling birthdays. Ritchie Blackmore (of Deep Purple) on April 14, Dusty Springfield on April 16, Alan Price on April 19 and Mark Volman (of Flo & Eddie, the Mothers and the Turtles to name a few) also on April 19... According to those folks at Capricorn, down in Macon, Ga, the Allman Brothers Band has not split up. There was speculation considering that Gregg is now touring on his own. The truth is the Allmans will be touring later this year (probably during the late Summer) and that the arrangement of dates is now in the works . . . HOME, HOME ON THE ROAD-New Riders of the Purple Sage - Columbia PC 32870

The Riders are back again, this time with a knockout live LP highlighted by the group's spirited versions of Chuck Berry's "School Days", Jagger and Richard's "Dead Flowers", and big hit "Hello Mary Lou", written by Pitney and Mangiaracina. The great thing about NRPS is their ability to catalyze any audience and on this great live album you get a chance to see just how the boys do it. Starting with "Hi, Hello, How Are You", the band starts the momentum rolling and it never stops as the fellows whip through "Groupie," "Sutter's Mill," and "Sunday Susie". A fine effort.

THE HOOPLE-Mott The Hoople-Columbia PC 32871

When Mott The Hoople broke big with the David Bowie penned single, "All the Young Dudes", they established themselves as leaders of the 'new' rock and this LP continues that reputation very strongly. "The Golden Age of Rock'n'Roll," "Marionette," "Crash Street

"Through The Looking Glass," and "Born Late" are all superbly blended mixtures of lyric dexterity, musical proficiency, and special effects definess. Ian Hunter's lyrics continue to show the forceful introspection of Dylan in his prime and are a major part of the band's success.

NEXUS - Argent - Epic KE 32573

Argent has always been one of the most respected progressive British bands on the rock scene and this LP is a giant step towards even greater future recognition. "The Coming of Kohoutek" and "Once Around The Sun" spearhead this marvelous LP whose textures and moods are blended together in a masterful display of musical brilliance. Throughout the collection, the dynamics the quartet employs are stunning, highlighting the subtleties of the arrangements, particularly on "Thunder and Lightning" and "Gonna Meet My Maker". Watch for this package to take off.

STARLESS AND BIBLE BLACK-King Crimson – Atlantic SD 7298

The enigmatic King Crimson has enjoyed a long and celebrated reputation both in the U.S. and England and the group's latest venture follows in the strikingly new direction of the last LP.
"The Great Deceiver" gives messrs. Cross,
Fripp, Wetton, and Bruford an excellent opportunity to demonstrate their grasp of the difficult and sometimes extremely complicated motif within which they work. Their precision patterns are keyed by a keen sense of arrangement whereby every possible use of dynamics enhances the package. We particularly like the title track.

PIPEDREAM - Alan Hull - Elektra EKS 75075

One of Lindisfarne's shining lights for a long while, Alan Hull's solo Elektra LP is a bit more punchy than the parent group's sound, but very effective and pleasing nonetheless "Breakfast,"
"Justanothersadsong," "Country Gentleman's
Wife,""Drug Song,""For The Bairns," and "Song
For a Windmill" are among the most potent selections from this intriguing package. The entire effort suffers no blemishes and is distinguished by an overall grasp of dynamics and arrangement that sets it apart from its imitators. It should do very well for Mr. Hull.

MINGUS MOVES-Charles Mingus-Atlantic SD 1653

Anytime you take a genius of Charles Mingus' stature and turn him loose in a studio, you can always expect his very best. For Mingus there has never been any other way to do things. This LP, brilliant in its awesome array of musical pyrotechnics, reunites the artist with his first Atlantic producer, Nesuhi Ertegun and it's obvious from the first tune, "Canon", that the chemistry between the two is still working. Particularly effective is Mingus' ability to utilize the talents of musicians Ronald Hampton, George Adams, Don Pullen, and Dannie Richmond throughout the LP.



CROSSWINDS - Billy Cobham -Atlantic SD 7300

Billy's latest LP project, as he refers to it, is another step into the future for the brilliant percussionist whose work with the Mahavishnu Orchestra first got him the attention he now so deservedly basks in Cobham's ability to float textures and moods is the trademark of the album, one on which the artist also explores a variety of special effects on his drums, particularly during parts of the "Spanish Moss - A Sound Portrait" suite made up of four movements lasting slightly over 17 minutes. Billy's playing never loses its wonderous quality and neither does the LP.

DESITIVELY BONNAROO - Dr. John -**Atco SD 7043**

OK, folks, you can let your breath out. The new Dr. John LP is here at last and it's a killer. Featuring his current single, "Everybody Wanna Get Rich Rite Away", the album has that distinctive sound about it that's so beautiful it makes you want to get up dance. "Quitters Never Win" is a fantastic creole rocker written by Mac Rebennack (Dr. John) himself in the tradition of "Right Place Wrong Time" and shows why Mac is one of the hottest artists in the business today. Other outstanding examples of Mac's work are 'Me-You= Loneliness", "Mos' Scocious," and "Sing Along Song"

ROAD - Johnny Rivers - Atlantic SD 7301

Johnny Rivers has become one of the most popular vocalists in America for good reason as you'll readily discover from listening to his latest LP, one filled with tunes penned by some fine young writers as well as a couple of crafty veterans. Johnny himself co-produced the LP with Bob Montgomery and together their attention to detail has paid off handsomely. Particularly enjoyable is Johnny's version of Jimmy Cliff and Guilly Bright's "Sitting In Limbo". Throughout his presentation, Rivers' poise and professional artistry shines through. We like his 'Artists and Poets" a lot.

SECOND HELPING — Lynyrd Skynyrd — Sounds of the South MCA-413

People who have seen this band live are aware of the power the group packs and Skynyrd's first LP held a great deal of promise for the seven piece band. All of that potential has been realized on this second helping of sounds from the south, an LP whose strength is the undeniable fury and soul that abounds in every "Sweet Home, Alabama" gets the package off in typically strong fashion and the frenzy never really ends. "Workin' For MCA",
"The Needle and the Spoon", and the incredible
bluesy "I Need You" are the highlights of this great collection.

NICKELODEON - Hudson-Ford - A&M SP 3616

The fine harmonies and distinctive songwriting ability found on the duo's single, "Picking Up The Pieces," are found in abundance on the new Hudson, Ford LP, one that incorporates the crucial quantities of dynamics and arrangements with excellent production. Particularly effective are "Crying Blues," "Revelations," "Let Her Cry,"
"Burn Baby Burn," and "Hello, I Thought You
Were Dead," as much because of the clever lyrics as the musical inspiration found on each cut. Hudson and Ford have cut themselves a nice groove with this LP and their prospects look

BLUES ON BACH—The Modern Jazz Quartet—Atlantic SD 1652

The MJQ has become a tradition not just in jazz, but in the music community of the world, and this LP, an in depth series of jazz inter-pretations of Bach with blues overtones sprinkled liberally throughout, has the magnetism to attract even more attention than the group's last effort. Milt Jackson, Percy Heath, Connie Kay, and John Lewis have always created a work of art with each of their LP's and this is no exception. "Regret?" is haunting and rapturous as are "Blues In B Flat," "Tears From The Children," and "Blues In A Minor". A class LP, this one is a real treat.





PUSSYCATS CAN GO FAR - Buzzy Linhart - Atco SD 7044

The inimitable Buzzy Linhart has found himself a new home with Atco and his debut LP for the label reflects how much fun he's having. Always a master of making people happy with his music, Buzzy has included his and Mark Klingman's classic goodtime tune, "Friends" along with ten other new original compositions that are as catchy as Buzzy's sense of humor. "The Justice Game" and "If You Can't Join 'Em, Beat 'Em' from "The Trials of Oz" show Linhart as a concerned human being, one who realizes the importance of truth. We love "Shoo That Fly" and "The Greatest Person I Know".

THE LAST SUMMER – The Siegel-Schwall Band Live – Wooden Nickel BWL1-0288

The Siegel-Schwall Band has become one of the most popular live bands in the country and this new LP is a perfect indication why. Featuring the band in adventurous blues settings (the LP was recorded live at the Brewery in Lansing Mich. and The Quiet Night in Chicago), the LP is chock full of tunes that are reminiscent of the blues tradition in its finest hour. Particularly good are "Rock Me Baby," "You Don't Love Me Like That," "Hey, Billie Jean," "West Coast Blues," and "I Won't Hold My Breath," each of which demonstrates the band's commanding stage presence.

STRANDED-Roxy Music-Atco SD 7045

The inimitable Roxy Music has come up with another inscrutable gem with "Stranded," an LP whose cover is as provocative as any we've seen recently. But the spicy packaging is only a sample of the tasty treats inside. "Street Life," "Sunset," "Serenade," "Psalm," and "A Song For Europe" are exemplary of the band's futuristic approach, one highlighted by a variety of catchy sound effects interwoven into the mainstream of the music with an adroit touch that would make any sculptor proud. Bryan Ferry's vocals are particularly effective and the group's musicianship impeccable.

FRICTION - The Soul Children - Stax STS-5507

Featuring their fabulous hit single, "I'll Be The Other Woman", the Soul Children's new Stax LP is a thoroughly soulful delight, highlighting the group's amazing harmonic precision and a knack for lyric phrasing seldom found, even amongst cagey old professionals who've spent decades at their craft. "What's Happening Baby" is a stunning cut, taking a simple story and building it to an emotional crescendo in the chorus. The lush production found throughout this collection serves as the perfect backdrop for this supremely talented quartet.

CHILDSTAR - Allee Willis - Epic KE 32575

One of the most inventive talents to come to the fore recently, Allee Willis takes off on her Epic debut LP with a variety of tunes ranging from plaintive, emotional ballads to tear-em-up packages of dynamite. A singer with exceptional range, Allee also demonstrates her considerable ability as a writer. Her lyrics are sensitive, but also hilarious at times as "If Only You Were Robert Young" so appropriately points out. "Ain't No Man Worth It", "What Kind of Shoes Does September Wear?", "Children's Day Parade", and especially the title track are excellent. So's Allee

FIRST IMPRESSIONS - Dorothy Lerner - Crunch CRS-035000

Dorothy Lerner's first impressions come through very strongly on her debut Crunch LP, one highlighted throughout by the artist's ability to communicate emotion in each of her songs. Her version of Roy Orbison's "Crying" kicks off this splendid collection which also features "La Douce Gypsy Rose", "It's What I Want To Do", "Father of This Moment", and "Why Try To Explain". Dorothy's vocals, though, give this disk the strength to turn a lot of heads. Crafty at times, but totally unrestrained when giving vent to a tender emotional ballad, Dorothy's debut is a success













CINEMA SOUNDS THOSE NEW OLD SOUNDTRACKS

It's been nearly two years now since Richard Oliver and John lerardi first started researching and repackaging, in their original high fidelity sound (something of the moyen-age) soundtracks to MGM's movie musicals. The pair's first set of soundtracks released last August was such a success that another new set of six, two record albums were put out in February. Their endeavours made "Those Glorious MGM Musicals," the malapert forerunner in our Industry's soundtrack revival.

Oliver and lerardi pointed out how this movie musical soundtrack movement has evolved in a years time from nostalgic camp to cashregister campanology (bell ringing). They also cleared up the misconception that record retail store bins marked "New Old Movie Music," are only frequented by geriatric, wizened, sentimental folks who buy the resusitated soundtracks with their social security money. Truth of the matter is that the movie musical soundtrack has secured a wide spectrum of social groups of all ages. At a recent retrospective for Anne Miller (featured on at least five of the Glorious MGM LP's) held at the Unicorn Theatre in San Diego, at least half of the audience were reported as being college kids. Miller was present, along with lerardi and Oliver and Jesse Kaye, who originally produced all of the MGM musical soundtracks.

lerardi contends that these revived archives are in their own right "an art form," just as classical music is. The composers who have emerged from this non-effete entertainment era include many whose works are still being used today. Cole Porter and Irving Berlin are two that exemplify this. Film director Peter Bogdonovich plans to use Porter tunes in a forthcoming film and Berlin's "What'll I Do," is the theme to Paramount's "Great Gatsby," film. Cole is represented on "Those Glorious MGM Musicals," via "Silk Stockings," (his last Broadway musical), "Les Girls," (His Last movie musical) and "Kiss Me Kate." Berlin is MGM immortalized and vinylized on "Easter Parade," and "Annie Get Your Gun." There are future plans of even a third set in the MGM series which would include "American in Paris," "Funny Face," "Lily," and "I'll Cry Tomorrow." MGM film's are just about to release "That's Entertainment," a full length feature film comprised of vignettes from 25 years of MGM musicals.

UA Records which at one time was the hubris of the soundtrack companies is planning a summer LP release of revival soundtracks. The reissues should begin about July with two separate series. One will be a film composer anthology while the other will be "classic film scores." Among the film soundtracks one can expect "Some Like It Hot." The soundtrack graphics will also be the resurrected covers which they originally appeared in.

Even Mnemosyne, goddess of memory, would have a little trouble remembering that Phil Moore had so much to do with the arranging of those old MGM movie musicals. Maybe because he never really received sufficient credit during the 'big studio' days where black stature at the executive level was enervated and at the creative level went sans significant film title recognition. Moore, arranger & composer, recently closed his Carnegie Hall studio which he occupied for fifteen years, so that he could relocate on the West Coast. He's here to do film scores and to this time get credit for them. He is also in the process of reactivating a company called This was a venture which he began in the forties which dealt with filming popular artists of that day performing their hits to be sent out to tv stations as a library service. The audio/visual operation was created to be the counterpart to the already existing music library available to syndicated radio station. Telescriptions was born prematurely and consequentially it's potential was never fully realized. Nevertheless during it's inception 400 mini-musical segments were filmed. These include performances by Louis Armstrong, Peggy Lee, and Billie Holiday. Moore maintains that Telescriptions could be beneficial to many of the satelite independent tv stations flourishing everywhere. Many of these "fm" tv stations have even gone so far as to create visual disc jockey shows and the advent of this type of programming would probably welcome an operation like Telescriptions. Telescriptions is definitely a service for this decade however the word "tele," means "at a distance," and due to some still unresolved litagation regarding the films, Moore's company is still a distance

BRIGHTON, ENGLAND group Abba can claim to be the first group to win the Eurovision Song contest, and the first Swedish artists to win

With a total of 24 points for their song "Waterloo" written by Stig Anderson, their nearest rival Italy never looked likely to win, coming second with 18 points with their song, "Si", written by Danielle Pace and sung by Gigliola Cinquetti. Third was Netherlands with 15 points and Olivia Newton-John with Long Live Love", scraped in 4th with 14 points, sharing the position with Luxembourg and Monaco

This year's contest showed a change from the usual Eurovision tradition, with more groups entering, and this year one winning with a song out of the ordinary from the regular banal ballads that plague the contest. Perhaps this change

will revive the contest instead of suffering from an uncertain future, which it has over the last year.

JPRA Reports On Disk, Tape Sale

TOKYO — The Japan Phonograph Record Association announced the total sales of record and tape as of Feb., 1974. Record sales were 14,927,571 copies with Japanese music outselling Western music by a 2 to 1 margin. Sales were 14% more than the previous month and 20% more than the same month of the previous year. Sales of all records were 10,035,240,098 yen (\$33,450,800) with Japanese music accounting for 55% of sales. This was up 17% over the previous month and up 45% over the same month of the previous year.

Tapes (cartridge, cassette, and open reel) sold 1,583,107 units with Japanese music accounting for 85% of total sales. This was 24% more than the previous month, but 10% less than the same month of the previous year. Total tape sales were 2,169,700,203 yen (\$7,232,333), 16% more than the previous month, but 22% less than the same period for the previous year.

This is the first time in the firm's history that it has racked up more than 5,000,000,000 yen in half-year sales. The company attributed the sales increase to consumer demand for artists who had series of consecutive hits. Included among these artists were Kenji Sawada, Goro Noguchi, and Yoosui Inouye. Sales target for the 43rd term was set at 4,400,000,000 yen (\$14,666,666) in anticipation of a decline

The award will be called, 'The Black Record' which will cite those songs considered relevant to Black young people by NYM. "Traditionally, gold records have been given to recording artists for a record that sells a million copies or more, the NYM Black Record will be the black communities' answer to this ritual," said Rev. Sharpton

The Rev. Alfred Sharpton, NYM's 19 year old Chairman stated, "Our Black Record will salute those artists that record a song that has particular relevance to Black America in its present condition. White people give gold records to those recording stars that make large sums of money for white companies. It is now time for black people to salute those who have stayed black both musically and in other areas. Black people must at this time demand the proper music and proper lyrics that relate to our plight as a people. This award will be given to tunes that are attuned with the community."

Rev. Sharpton presented the first Black Record to the Godfather of Soul, James Brown at his Manhattan Center concert Friday, April 6, 1974. The award was designed and made by a young Harlemnite named Samuel Spencer. Rev. Sharpton, during the presentation said, "Everyone knows that James Brown has been a brother on many levels for many years. His new release, the "Payback," expresses the sentiments of many young blacks. We cite him because many white and Uncle Toms refused to give him what he is due. We, the young people both love and respect him, and in the final analysis, it is we, the young consumer that really counts."



The Who Sell Out

NEW YORK — Last Sunday's (4/6) radio broadcast of a live Who concert proved the national popularity of the group, as well as the effectiveness of the King Biscuit Flower Hour in advertising the Who's upcoming appearances at Madison Square Garden in New York, June 10, 11, 13, 14

The live Who broadcast was picked up by 131 stations nationally, a new high for the King Biscuit series. Seven local stations ranging from Boston to Washington, D. C. carried on 60-second spot, announcing the New York dates, after the broadcast.

The response to the Who show as overwhelming and many of the stations are already requesting permission to rerun the show.

There is also a special editorial by Mrs. Jo Walker, Executive Director of the Country Music Association.




Atkins Donates Travis Guitar

NASHVILLE — A handmade guitar designed and played by guitarist-songwriter Merle Travis was donated to the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum. Chet Atkins, guitarist and RCA executive, and Cecil Null, songwriter and president of Old Masters Records, donated the instrument on Travis' behalf.

Atkins noted that "the guitar includes many features which later became standard on electric guitars. The strings are attached through the body from the guitar's back and the turning gears are all on one side of the peghead. It is obvious from a glance at the guitar that it inspired the Fender line."

The guitar - the first solid-body instrument actually used in professional performance — was designed by Merle Travis in the late 1940's, and was hand built by Paul Bigsby in 1948. Atkins add-ed that "the guitar still sounds good. It has a pickup designed and hand-wired by Bigsby, and it has a particularly full and rounded tone even in the highest register of the instrument.

Diane Johnson — curator of the Hall of Fame and Museum - accepted the donation of the rare instrument.

CARNEGIE HALL, N.Y. — Ol' Greatness is Back!! In his first New York appearance since 1957, Frank Sinatra performed to a celebrity studded crowd for the benefit of the Variety Clubs Int'l. And, wow! What a treat\$ There is just no one in his league, or even near him, when it comes to capturing the meaning of a lyric. When he does a ballad, every word seems to be separated from the others and the meaning the writer intended that lyric to have is presented with just the perfect expression. Songs we've heard for years and loved thru the decades, songs too often clouded by arrangements and gimmickry, are laid bare in all their naked beauty when Sinatra handles them. And it's just a great feeling falling in love with an old song all over again. There was also great joy in being able to understand everything performed. You didn't have to know all the records by heart to understand what the performer was saving. There were no wild electronics to destroy the mood. And the 40-piece orchestra was a joy to behold during the instrumental breaks and as a backdrop for Sinatra. His upbeat stuff was, as always, hip, cool and cleverly turned with the Sinatra lyric changes: "Come Fly With Me," "I Get No Kick From Champagne," "Bad Bad Leroy "I've Got You Under My Skin, 'That's Life" and "My Kind of Town." You couldn't ask for a better program. It was a double joy hearing this writer's 21 year old daughter say, "He's great" after hearing Frank live for the first time in her

But nothing could cut Sinatra ballads.

Johnny Rivers Chi Coltrane

TROUBADOR L.A. — Somewhere in Johnny Rivers' reedy, country-ish singing lies the pure essence of honkytonk music. Putting one's finger on exactly what make the singer so successful with his audiences can be difficult, but whatever it is, Rivers has been doing something right for over ten years now, and his recent showing at the Troubador proved that his prowess has far from diminished with time.

He's the best cover artist in pop music, and with songs like Jackson Browne's "Red Neck Friend" (in which the sexual connotations of the song were far more apparent than they were in the original recording) & Van Morrisson's "Brown Eyed Girl," Rivers displayed his uncanny talent for doing established songs in the original arrangement and making them sound fresh and new despite their familiarity. Especially well received was a medley of old Rivers hits: "Rewind Melody," "Rockin' Pneumonia," "Secret Agent Man," and "Tracks Of My Tears, which inspired a female streaker to prance across the stage appreciatively. In a rendition of "Memphis," Rivers humorously employed Bob Dylan phrasing and accent, adding a bit of comic relief to an altogether sparkling show. The singer's new Atlantic single, 'Sitting In Limbo," was previewed during the set.

Chi Coltrane belted out her gospelflavored, bluesy material for openers, and the crowd had no trouble getting into her gutsy self-penned, occasionally introspective songs. Her singing was good, her backup excellent, and besides, nobody could resist the image of the very beautiful blonde lady tearing through that raunchy blues and soul.

Highlights of her set included her earlier Columbia Records hit, "Thunder and Lightning," as well as several new songs from her most recent LP: "Hallelujah," and "Who Ever Told You?".

David Gates' "If" had a new believability in its solo form. "Don't Worry 'Bout Me," "Violets For Your Fur," and the touching Joe Raposo song "There Used to Be A Ball Park Right Here" gave us chills. This tour is gonna make a million new fans for the man.

HARRIET SCHOCK

TROUBADOUR, L.A. — Everybody was wishing everybody else concerned with the press premiere of 20th Century Records new artist, Harriet Schock "Good Luck." However it became evident during her performance that one only really need bid tidings of luck to those who need it as a substitute for talent. Harriet Schock clearly demonstrated that she is especially "good," and that her performing/composing talents are not "luck," but moreover a rare gift which has been cultivated by years of concentrative work and the perserverance which motivates the "creative artist," to keep trying until they succeed. Judging by the remarkable response of Harriet's press invited audience (always the most critical), she has indeed succeeded. Accompanying herself on piano, she delighted everybody with tunes from her album "Hollywood Highlights were "You Took The Town." Words Out of My Mouth," "Hollywood Town," (her new single), and "Hold Me.

WHISKY L.A. - Only months after their rise as the darling of some southern Californian cult, the Hollywood Starrs have begun to churn the west coast pop scene like a mixmaster. People began to hear about them and read about them; what's more, labels began to hear about them and read about them. Columbia signed them, and all this by dint of diarrhetic word of mouth, a few Whisky gigs, and a couple of titillated libidos among the local rock press. It would make a nice movie, anyway.

To some people's surprise, to some people's satisfaction and to everyone's good fortune, the Hollywood Starrs really live up to all those inflated expectations. They play straight ahead poprock, tight and unpretentious and seem to have a knack for blatantly top 40 material.

Lead singer Scott Pharesh managed to put on a good show without hamming too much and blended well with other voices in the group; theirs is a pleasantly harmonic sound. Ruben de Suentes, lead guitarist for the band, was inoffensively inventive and the rhythm section held their own. They work very well together.

Billing Elliott Murphy with the Hollywood Starrs was sheer brilliance on someone's part and immediately recalled Rudyard Kipling: "O east is east and Murphy, a hip kid from west is west. New York's suburb's is a Max's Kansas City looking fellow in foppish white linen surrounded by a brace of black leather sidemen. His act has a hardboiled big apple ambience, not snotty, but refreshingly cynical. Lyrics like "I won't be there like some dead fly caught on your lampshade" were sung with some of the sound of Dylan (You really have to admit it) but with the feeling of an updated, middle class Velvet Underground.

Elliott Murphy is still a New York phenomena, but he's got the charisma, and apparently the talent, to break out of that mold. His songs were mostly drawn from his first Polydor album, recently released and titled "Aquashow.

CARNEGIE HALL, NYC - A most enjoyable show afforded the eager audience the talents of some very accomplished musicians who presented a mellow potpourri of some very fine

FELT FORUM, NYC - In his first New York City appearance to date the Hag really wowed them on his Felt Forum engagement. As part of the continuing series of the Country In New York series, Hag became part of the incredible country music phenomenon that is sweeping the "Big Apple" and the rest of the country

Kicking off the show was Don Bowman RCA recording artist and one very funny fellow. Rapid fire one liners and fast paced quitar pickin' made for a great opening act carried off with Don's down home humility and well timed professionalism.

Following into some great blue grass pickin' and singin' brought the Osborne Brothers out for a really cookin' set. Getting into the fine traditional music of America that is really the backbone of country the Osbornes really sung and played their way into the hearts of the audience. The MCA recording artists cooked with some moving material as 'Midnight Flyer," and "Blue Ridge Breaddown", both of which really smoked. A great cover of Denver's 'Country Roads" made the country seem more verdant then ever. "Black Mt. Blues," "Ruby," and "Rocky Top" which they had written and originally performed has been covered by a multitude of country acts. The Osborne's rendition gave the song the original life and style that was intended that only the creators could properly carry off.

A short intermission was followed by Merle Haggard. His set was a real knockout and the audience enthusiasm was electricity in the air.

The Strangers, Haggard's backing group were dressed in ruffled pink shirts, bowties, and tuxedo-like jackets. Their instrumentation included dobro, trumpet, tenor saxophone, banjo, guitar, and drums. The arrangements were full and gave Merle's musicianship a fine punch.

The Hag sauntered onto the stage dressed in Levi's and looking very cool His mystique was never broken and only seemed to grow as his sterling performance sparkled with a great selection of material and just the right amount of talk between songs. The "poet of the common man" as Haggard is sometimes called received a standing ovation even before he played a note. The unprecedented respect and enthusiasm that was solely his was well deserved as his repertoire blasted everyone out of their seats with numbers as "Everybody's Had The Blues, workin manager will lament for the common laborer, "Will lament for the common laborer, "Daddy Had The Blues," "Workin' Man's Blues" a Franks", the legendary and most controversial "Okie From Muskogee," and of course the title track from his most recent Capitol LP," Through December." If We Make It

great Johnny Cash impersonation, had the audience really hysterical. Haggard in New York was a true landmark for any true country fan and for the furtherance of country music in the New York metropolitan area.

Kicking off this great show were the Eric Andersen. primarily ballads, his laid-back and easy vocal technique was complimented by his adroit guitar playing. His set lasting dose to seventy minutes was performed entirely by himself. His sound mixing was truly superb and such gently ballads as "I Love You Like," "Blue River," the title track from this last Columbia LP, 'Wind & Sand," and "Loving You Is The Hardest Thing To Do," all came off with the consummate ability of his great performance. "Don't You Know," and "I'm Leaving You," were up-tempo movers and Andersen played two numbers on piano, "Blue River," and "Wind & Sand." particularly outstanding song was Time Run Like A Freight Train," a very pretty ballad that flowed with all the richness of Eric's voice. In appreciation of his fine performance Eric received a justly deserved standing ovation.

The inimitable Nitty Gritty Dirt Band with their unique mixture of pop, country and bluegrass repertoire really broke the place up. Their electrifying performance was charged with the Dirt Band's great energy. The audience reaction was frenetic, as people were dancing away in the aisles and some even jumped up on stage thoroughly getting into the infectious rhythms and music of the Dirt Band The talented quartette all interchanged instruments and all sing very well. Drums, bass guitar, fiddle, banjo and guitar create a great sound which was highlighted by some virtuosic fiddle playing. The audience was extremely receptive to the United Artist recording artists who's extensive repertoire included classic "Jambalya," New Orleans," "Mr. Bo "Battle Of "Mr. Bojangles," medley which included Johnny," and "Cosmic Cow "Tulane & and "Cosmic Cowboy." 'Teardrops in My Eyes," a washboard tune, and an outstanding rendition of "Orange Blossom Special.

Jerry Jeff Walker coming out with electric guitar did not pick up an acoustic guitar in the entire show. He started off slow and worked his way to a strong crescendo. His band had a dixieland flavor with a sax, trombone, organ, lead guitar, bass, piano, and drums. His tunes were all received very enthusiastically, and it wasn't until after the third tune that he removed his ten gallon cowboy hat which had hidden his face up until the point of unveiling. A pleasant singer, Jerry's voice has a fine quality to it. Excellent renditions of "L.A. Freeway," "Charlie Dunn," "Redneck Mother," and "Homesick Blues," were all well received. "Desperado Waiting For A Train" was a very good ballad.

The MCA recording artist and the Dirt Band jammed at the end of the show, leaving the audience very moved.

Charles Bevel

THE NETRO, NYC - A&M recording artist 'Mississippi" Charles Bevel wound his way through a most provocative set on his opening night. Accompanied by Erica Jaye on bass, Bevel skillfully played acoustic guitar and sang his story songs.

Prefacing each tune with a story of what compelled him to write it. Bevel then segued into the songs which enhanced the entire story. Such numbers as "Sally Be White", an interesting song about an Uncle Tom type lady and "Porcupine Meat" highlighted the set.



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Pete Wendling Writer — Pianist Is Dead At 85

NEW YORK — Pete Wendling, composer and pianist and member of ASCAP since 1919, died here last week in his home in New York. Wendling, a native New Yorker, was 85 years old. He grew up in Manhattan's Lower East Side, and even while attending Dewitt Clinton High School he was an avid devotee of the ragtime piano players who appeared at Tony Pastor's 14th Street Theatre. In 1908, young Wendling entered a ragtime playing contest and won the national championship as embodied in the Richard K. Fox Gold Medal. After graduating from high school, he got a job playing the piano at the Dewey Theatre but left this 14th Street nickelodeon for employment at a music publishing firm

Later he worked at Watterson, Berlin Snyder — the "Berlin" being Irving Berlin. Wendling left this for a vaudeville career, but later returned to Irving Berlin's own publishing house at the end of World War I. His first major popular song was introduced by Al Jolson in the musical titled "Sinbad" in 1916. This smash sold more than 1,000,000 copies despite the title of "Yanka Hula Hickey Dula". In 1918, Wendling scored with "Oh, How I Wish I Could Sleep Till Me Daddy Comes Home" and in 1919 he succeeded again with "Oh, What A Pal Was Mary". After "Take Me To The Land Of Jazz" was proven to be another hit, Wendling retired from writing for a decade and cut master player piano rolls for the QRS Music Roll Company. He returned to composing and music publishing later.





Bally Solo-Player "Sky Kings" Puts Focus On Special Scores

CHICAGO — Two chances at special scores with each ball is a king-size coincatcher built into 'Sky Kings'," Paul Calamari, sales manager of Bally Manufacturing, pointed out, announcing delivery this week of the new solo player flipper game.

"But double special targets are not as important as the location of the targets, the way they're lit to qualify to score specials and the way they get hit to ring up the specials. Special targets are at the top of closed channels, one at the upper left corner of the playfield, one at the upper right corner. Each target can only be hit by a captive ball in the channel, which is propelled up the channel by a good strong sock by the ball in play.

"If the target lights are not lit, a captive ball that hits the target simply scores 1,000. But the lights are frequently lit by a clever tie-in with the bonus feature. When the bonus climbs to 15,000, both special target lights light and remain lit until ball sinks in the outhole. The bonus is advanced by a variety of skill shots, including a new spin-light feature which can send the bonus to the top in a flash.

"Spin-lights are advanced by hitting a new spinning target, which may be hit from above or below. Each time the spin-lights advance to the top or tenth position, the bonus jumps another 1,000. Rapid, prolonged whirling of the spinning target can cause the spin-lights to go to top position several times by a single strong hit against the target.

Immediate Response to MOA Drive; 25% New Member Goal by Expo '74

State Chairmen Named; Sign-Up Literature In Mail

CHICAGO — According to executive vice president Fred Granger, MOA's 1974 drive for new members is already underway and new applications are coming in. The goal is for a 25% increase by the Exposition, November 1, 2 and 3.

In a mailing just sent out to the drive's state chairmen, he enclosed an Operator application (white with green print), a green Manufacturer application and a pink application for Distributors, One Stops, Suppliers and Others (for those for which there is no specific category, such as insurance companies, magazines, etc.). Since most new members will be operators, it is very important to sign up new operator members under the correct dues category. Categories are based on number of phonographs and games (explained on face of application).

Also enclosed was the new self-explanatory short form application which has proved very successful. These may be mailed or given to prospects. "Of course, whenever you can talk to a prospect, sign him up and get a check on the spot, that is the best," Granger declared
