An International Common Market — A Reality Through Music

Commencing September 8, the second annual Musexpo international convention will convene at the Fairmount Hotel in New Orleans. Long before he ever dreamed there would one day be a second such gathering, Roddy Shashoua, founder of Musexpo, asked a simple question. Since America is the largest consumer and exporter of music — in all forms — why should an international convention be held anyplace else? The governments of England, Australia and Canada must also believe in his basic premise, for they are subsidizing large percentages of the cost of participation by their citizens who are involved in the music industry. To round out his basic concept, Shashoua has chosen as this year's site, New Orleans — the birthplace of jazz and the blues.

The international concept to merchandising is still relatively new to most. We are all so busy trying to keep pace with our own market that we tend to lose sight of our role in the world market. A better dialogue between music men of all nations represents a definite need. Cash Box feels Musexpo can help answer this need.



Only through a forum such as this can we begin to understand the problems and needs of our counterparts in the vast international market and vice-versa. Besides looking for music to release domestically, we must gain a knowledge of what type of product we should package to satisfy the international consumer.

We feel we speak for the industry when we say America is honored to play host to the rest of the world. Let us make every effort to keep a forum of this magnitude alive in our nation. 

name of the new west coast-based CBS Records label, CBS has announced. Portrait is the first new label introduced by CBS Records since 1953, when Epic Records was established as the second CBS-owned label. As previously announced, Larry Harris has been named vice president and general manager of the label by Ron Alexenburg, senior vice president, Epic and associated labels.

One Goody Coin Promo Dropped

NEW YORK - Sam Goody Inc. has, for the past two weeks in New York newspapers, and for one week in Philadelphia, placed ads offering to exchange certain older American coins for credit slips of varying amounts, to be used for the purchase of records and tapes at Sam Goody stores. The promotion, however, has not worked out as successfully as Goody had planned and will be discontinued in the next few weeks, according to the chain's founder, Sam Goody.

The program is a takeoff on a program instituted more than two years ago, where Goody offered a \$1.50 credit slip for \$1 in pennies at the height of the then penny shortage. The idea was highly successful, and at the time Goody outlined three goals that were achieved at the same time: 1) it provided pennies for the Goody stores to use in change when none were available from banks; 2) Goody was able to sell the pennies to other banks for \$1.09 for every 100; 3) but most important, the promotion créated plus business as stored away pennies were turned into record buying dollars. No refunds of cash were offered.

Silver Promotion

Two weeks after the introduction of the penny program, Goody offered \$3 for \$1 worth of silver quarters, dimes or halves And now, two years later, Goody has of-

Soundtracks, Denver And Manilow Albums **Dominate Weekly Record Advertisements**

albums this week, in a survey of 19 major metropolitan markets, are the original soundtracks to the motion pictures "The Omen" and "Obsession." Neither is on the Cash Box album chart, but both films are among the 50 top-grossing movies for the week ending August 18, according to Variety ("The Omen" at #3 and "Obsession" at #33). Consequently, Tattoo Records and London Records, manufacturers of the soundtracks, believe that their respective albums could make an impressive impact at the retail level.

"The Omen" was advertised in 10 markets, in conjunction with the movie: Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Cleveland, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, San Francisco, and Washington. In addition. Korvettes offered the \$6.98 list LF for \$2.99. Mort Weiner, director of custom labels for RCA (Tattoo is distributed by RCA) believes that because of the extensive exposure of the film (it has grossed more than \$12 million to date), there is a potentially large audience for the soundtrack, and he has planned a comby Julian Shapiro

"We've already utilized radio spots, print ads in Korvettes and Goody, and in-store displays, which we feel will draw a lot of attention. That's because the movie is very visually appealing." In addition, a halfmillion book markers have been given to book stores with the inscription "If you've seen the movie and read the book, you'll love the soundtrack.'

Weiner declined to detail sales figures for the album, offering only that "it hasn't sold 100,000 units." However, as the custom label's second offering, it has sur-passed Becky Hobbs' "From The Heartland," the label's debut release, in sales.

'Obsession'

Ad offering the soundtrack to "Obsession" appeared in nine markets: Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Denver, New Orleans, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and San Francisco. All were tied directly to the film. According to Gary Willet, who works in the sales department of London Records, the

long enough to gauge any sales pattern, having been shipped during the week of August 16, but he is highly optimistic as to the album's sales future. "We'll probably put out 20-25,000 copies initially, which is fairly incredible for a London Phase-4 recording; the anticipation is tremendous.' John Denver's newest release, "Spirit," launched a major print advertising campaign, though not as extensive as RCA had initially outlined. Ads appeared in eight markets, with full-page ads everywhere but Baltimore. The release was offered there at Record and Tape Collector for \$3.94/\$5.24 tape, at Lechmere in Boston for \$3.64 per LP, at 28 record stores and 10 discount merchandise chains in Denver with no prices listed, at Musicland stores in Minneapolis with no price listed (the first time in the past four months that the chain had an

Frampton Catalog Sales Increase Due To Impact Of #1 Bestseller

NEW YORK — "Frampton Comes Alive" is the #1 album on the Cash Box chart for the fourth consecutive week, and many of the nation's largest retailers and rack jobbers readily agree that one month at the top can have a bearing on catalog sales.

The 2-LP set is the best selling unit at JL Marsh/Hellicher Bros. (the nation's largest rackjobbing operation that also operates 185 Musicland stores), the sixty-plus unit Record Bar chain, ABC Records and Tapes (the nation's third largest rackjobbing operation), the 30-store Disc Records chain, and the 30 Korvettes stores in the New York metropolitan area. In all, it is #1 at 26 of the key retail and wholesale accounts that Cash Box monitors on a weekly basis. According to figures released by A&M Records, the package has sold 3, 307,067 units as of August 24.

These sales have continued through most of the weeks since January of this year. But recently there have been indications that the additional four albums in Frampton's catalog may be reaping the benefits of the exposure the newest release is enjoying. "Frampton, released in March, 1975, and the artist's last studio release has already re-charted and is currently at #179 after three weeks. The remaining three albums may follow shortly.

Columbia, Monument **End Distribution Pact** NASHVILLE - Columbia Records and

Monument Records have jointly agreed to an amicable termination of their domestic distribution pact. This agreement is effective September 9, 1976. Monument/CBS International and Monument/Columbia House (Record Club) agreements remain in full force and effect.

Fred Foster, president/owner, Monument Records stated: "Columbia will retain distribution rights domestically to the product of Billy Swan and Kris Kristofferson. Both artists remain signed to Monument and Monument is responsible for the production of their product. All other Monument artists, in addition to Monument's subsidiary label Sound Stage Seven, will be handled by independent distribution, effective September 9, 1976."

Both Columbia and Monument officials concurred that an earlier story that CBS was instigating the dissolution was in error. Announcements are forthcoming as to Monument's restructuring and new direc-

GRT Corporation: Intellect, Diversity And High Hurdles Kick Off Seventh Maple Year

TORONTO - GRT-Canada held its sixth (and largest) annual sales meeting here (18-21) bringing together representatives from the corporation's regional sales offices and U.S. affiliates and allowing a peek inside.

In 1970 the Canadian firm issued its first catalog, composed of a dozen labels com-150 LPs. In comparison, the fall 1976 list includes 37 labels making up 900 albums. In fact, the company now has so much product to move that there is, according to president Ross Reynolds, the danger of falling into the same trap that some other majors have fallen into merely looking at product from the standpoint of a distributor.'

Fortunately for GRT-Canada, that particular trap doesn't appear at this time to pose a very great threat. This brief meet revealed enough diversification between corporate intellect, far-sightedness, bright product and high hurdles to keep the entire concern on its feet for some time to come.

Diverse Roots

Springing out of its best-ever first quarter, GRT-Canada is indeed rated high among the top distributors north of the border. But the Canadian situation is perhaps more fully understood in light of the activities of the parent GRT, located in Sun-



National Newspaper Survey Notes Marginal Record Company Ads

by Julian Shapiro

NEW YORK — Advertising Age issued a special 60-page section as part of its August 16 issue, detailing newspaper advertising expenditures for "20 top markets: 1975 vs. 1974." Record company advertising, as reflected in the survey, is conspicuous only in its relative

Only Columbia, Atlantic and RCA are represented, and only the first appears in more than three markets, registering in 11 of the 20. The reason for this obvious inadequacy is that the report concerns itself with brand spending, according to Fred Danzig, executive editor of Advertising Age. In lay parlance, that translates to national advertising, which is not the standard procedure record companies follow when scheduling print advertising expenditures.

The practice of cooperative spending between retailers and manufacturers governs most record company print advertising, and, though this is common knowledge throughout the advertising industry, Media Records, Inc., which was commissioned by Advertising Age to develop and compile the figures for the survey, did not respond to this fact. Retail Ads Not Measured

"We picked up no retail store advertising," commented Frank MacCallum, sales manager for Media Records, which functions as a measuring and certification service that audits and compiles reports of individual newspapers' advertising performance. "We serviced Advertising Age with general, not retail, advertising information."

MacCallum explained that cooperative advertising is monitored as retail advertising, which is available to daily newspapers separately. "Our basic customer is the newspaper, and they don't want it (cooperative advertising) picked up that way as a general advertising. They want to know the primary customer; that's where they get their ads." Under cooperative advertising practices, a record company makes available a certain dollar amount to retailers for advertising the company's product, based on the store's amount of purchases from the company. The store then schedules the ad, and the record company pays for that portion of the ad that features the company's product.

Columbia Markets Delineated

As a result, the only record company advertising monitored by Media Records for the Advertising Age supplement would be that with no store tie-ins. For Columbia, such advertising appeared in the following markets: Baltimore (\$76,949 in 1975, up from \$47,068 in 1974); Boston (\$108,692 up from \$52,694); Chicago, which includes advertising for the tape club (\$264,715 up from \$119,040); Cleveland (\$35,745 up from \$3,447); Dallas (\$52,-830 up from \$42,911); Denver (\$52,149 up from \$19,504). Also, Detroit (\$151,528 up from \$97,613); Houston (\$73,245 up from \$38,451); Pittsburgh (\$112,246 up from \$86,926); San Diego (\$49,167 up from \$22,950); and Washington (\$216,405 up from \$77,588). In Philadelphia such expenditures were phased out from a 1974 total of \$32,776.

RCA Records appeared in three markets. They were: Chicago (\$12,862 up from nothing in 1974); Los' Angeles (\$5,733 down from \$31,289); and New York (\$30,662 down from \$49,188). Atlantic Records, similarly, appeared in Los Angeles and New York. Figures for

The Managers:

Bob Seger/Punch Andrews — Perseverance Pays Off

"This is the first interview I've ever done in my life!" exclaimed Ed "Punch" Andrews, but before he could continue, his sole client, Bob Seger, chimed in, "Not true! At the press conference at Pontiac you were answering all kinds of questions." Adopting an expression of pseudo-disgust, Punch retorted, "Yeah, but I was sitting at the back of the room — and it was only three guestions, not all kinds of questions!"

To the casual observer the two seem to be kid brothers, playfully tussling each other about, but to Capitol Records they're a highly successful professional artist/manager team. "It's taken thirteen long years to get to this point," reflected Punch, "and nine of those were spent trying to convince Bob to put down his guitar and be a lead singer.'

At this point in the conversation, Seger resumed his "big brother" stance, declaring, "I'd like to say something in defense of Ed, who has sometimes been maligned by certain members of the rock press for his alleged 'poor management.' Sure, it's taken a long time for us to come this far, but that isn't his fault," Seger emphasized, pointing at Punch. "I was the problem. For the first nine years of my career, I was probably the most idealistic rock 'n' roller ever conceived. I never wanted to do anything that wasn't totally artistic - I never really involved the audience in my show. Another thing that ruined about eight or nine years was that I wanted to be a lead guitar player more than anything else in the world."

Commenting on his desire to become a competent guitarist, Seger continued, "I guess I got caught up in the fever that grabbed hundreds of thousands of young guitarists - when Hendrix and Beck and Clapton came on the scene, I decided that that's what I wanted to do. So for about nine by Nick Nichols

years I concentrated on my guitar playing and totally neglected my singing. In fact, I didn't become a front man/lead singer 'til three years ago. And all of our success has come since that time.

"Prior to that," Seger elaborated, "Punch would try to tell me what was best for me and I'd just refuse to do it. This forced him to deal with the record companies on a very uncomfortable level. In any business where there's an artist/manager relationship, the manager's always the hatchet man. It's the manager's job to make sure that the artist looks like the nice guy at all times. So even though Ed always knew what was best for me, I'd refuse to do things and as a result, he'd be forced to say 'no' to a lot of people he should have been saying 'yes' to. He wouldn't tell people that I wouldn't do something, he'd say that he didn't think it was right for me. Consequently, a lot of people were saying, 'Bob would've done it but Punch wouldn't let him,' and that just wasn't the way it was."

From System To Silver Bullets Reflecting on his earlier career, Seger

related, "In the early days I had a band called The System. We'd been playing together for about four years when the single 'Ramblin' Gamblin' Man' came out and became a hit for us. At that time we were getting ready to hit the road when our organ player went on a superstar trip and split the band. Although the organ was the predominant instrument in the single, we were forced to tour with a trio, without the organ. Shortly after the tour we added another organ player and recorded the 'Mongrel' LP - The System stayed together until about 1970 and by that time I had been playing for four and a half years without a break or a vacation. That may not sound so bad, but we were a hard-working act - we played between 200 and 250 dates a year. So at that point I just had to get out for a year or so.

'From '71 to '73 I had three or four dif-

Polygram Corp. Issues First Annual Report

HAMBURG — Polygram has printed and distributed, for the first time in their history, an annual report on their operations. Worldwide, their 1975 sales jumped 13% to over 1.6 billion marks. Polygram includes the Phongram International and Polydor International operations, in addition to the Chappell and Intersong publishing operations. The company is also involved in TV, film and video. Group headquarters of Polygram are in Baarn, the Netherlands, and Hamburg, West Germany, and Polygram operates in 31 countries.

Their annual report indicates that the worldwide music market grew by 6 percent in 1975, and that over the last 10 years, worldwide growth of the music market has been approximately 9%.

No separate breakdowns on sales of their U.S. operations were included, although Polydor Inc. of USA reported a record six-month period (see separate story).

3 Speakers Named For Mid-Year NARM

CHERRY HILL, N.J. — Three speakers have been chosen for the coming mid-year NARM meeting in Chicago. Neil Bogart, president of Casablanca Records, will deliver the keynote address. In addition, Dr. Steven Star of the Harvard Business School will discuss "the implications of the growing adult market on the music industry's marketing opportunities," while Robert Curtis, a security expert, will speak on retail security. Curtis had previously addressed the 1976 NARM convention in Florida on security, and has since worked with the Record Bar chain on retail security problems.

Fantasy's Bromberg LP Out At \$2 Lower List

BERKELEY — Fantasy Records' new David Bromberg album "How Late'll Ya Play 'Til," a two record set that will retail at a \$9.98 list, will be released initially at a \$7.98 list. The label plans to maintain the \$2 lower price for at least 30 days following the release of the album.

Letter To The Editor Appel On Springsteen Hassle

To The Editor:

Your publication and others have published stories recently concerning the litigation now going on between Bruce Springsteen and myself. Your article was based largely on the unsupported allegations contained in a complaint filed on Mr. Springsteen's behalf, and of course drafted by his attorneys. I am writing to inform you of some of the background of my relationship with Mr. Springsteen and some of the events which have taken place in the litigation since Mr.Springsteen's complaint was filed. These facts will give you the other side of the picture and will demonstrate that Mr.Springsteen's wild allegations are unfounded.

First, and perhaps more important, I instituted an action against Mr. Springsteen, CBS Records and Jon Landau to enjoin them from making any records in violation of the exclusive recording agreements between me and Springsteen and me and CBS. On August 19, 1976, Mr. Justice Arnold Fein granted a preliminary injunction "restraining Springsteen, CBS and Landau from recording or producing any record, record album, tape or other reproduction in which Springsteen is the artist and Landau is the producer."

In the course of his eleven page opinion (a copy of which is enclosed), Judge Fein reviewed Springsteen's federal court complaint and stated: "There is no showing that the contracts (between me and Springsteen) were obtained by fraud or duress or are unconscionable."

Judge Fein also held that Jon Landau has no rights to produce Springsteen's albums either under my agreement with Springsteen or my agreement with CBS. Judge Fein said: "Landau has no rights under either of the agreements. He has plainly acted in the face of their provisions."

In addition, Springsteen has given sworn testimony in the course of the federal court proceedings which directly contradicts his allegations in the complaint against me. (Copies of certain pages of that testimony are enclosed).

Contrary to the complaint, Springsteen did not testify that he was induced to sign contracts by undue pressure, manipulation or false representations by me. Instead, he testified that he was given copies of the contracts he signed only after he and I had established a relationship for six months; he took the contracts home with him for approximately one week, and read them

through. Only then did he determine to sign the contracts. When he was asked what happened at the meeting when he signed the contracts, Springsteen did not even hint that there had been any unfair dealing. (See pages143 to 146 of Springsteen's deposition testimony).

Springsteen's complaint seeks to give the impression that my commissions as his manager were 50% of all his earnings. In his sworn deposition testimony Springsteen admitted that my commissions as manager were never more than 20%, that I rendered statements to him only at the 20% rate and that I never used any rate in excess of 20% in computing commissions. As you know, a 20% manager's commission is standard in the industry. (See pages 148 to 152 of Springsteen's deposition).

Incidentally, the fact is that I didn't take any manager's commissions during the first 3½ years I acted as Springsteen's manager. My management fees, recording royalties and publishing royalties were all used to pay Springsteen's expenses and advance his career. I even contributed additional funds of my own.

The allegations in Springsteen's federal court complaint that Jon Landau was entirely responsible for his success are also completely unjustified. Springsteen's success is due to my single-minded promotion of his career for more than four vears, combined with his own talent and substantial promotional spending by CBS. As Judge Fein said: "Success has many fathers. Only failure is an orphan." Springsteen himself testified that I obtained his CBS recording contract for him, that I devoted my full time to him and his career during most of the past 41/2 years, and that I obtained William Morris as his booking agent when no one else would have him. (See pages 162 to 164 of Springsteen's deposition)

I am sure that any further stories that you write concerning the litigation between Springsteen and me will not be based solely on the wild and unsubstantiated allegations in Springsteen's complaint. I hope that you will play fair, publish this letter and give equal coverage to my side of the story, including Judge Fein's opinion, Springsteen's own sworn testimony, and the other facts I have set forth.



Chrysalis' First Single Spins An Odd Web

LOS ANGELES — Chrysalis Records has released its first single as an independent label. "Roxy Roller," by Nick Gilder, has an interesting background, and looks to have an explosive future.

Nick Gilder used to be in a Canadian band called Sweeny Todd, and Sweeney Todd had a #1 single in Canada on London Records called "Roxy Roller." Then Terry Ellis, president of Chrysalis Records, bought out Gilder's and Jimmy McCulloch's (the guitar player in Sweeney Todd) contracts from Top Hot International Music Inc. From Label To Label . . . And Back Again

Walter Lee, national sales manager for Capitol Records, commented on Capitol's signing of Seger's Silver Bullets Band. "Up until a couple of months ago, I was the sales manager for the Detroit area - I've really grown up with Bob Seger and I remember the old days all too well. At that time, the national management of Capitol left something to be desired - they just didn't see Bob Seger as a number one priority. So the company balked and lost him to Warner Brothers. Now the band is providing us with good product and they are a top priority we have an excellent working relationship with the Seger organization.

Amplifying on Lee's comments, Punch Andrews added, "After we left Capitol, I fell into a syndrome of thinking that the best way to motivate a record company was to do it myself — give them the product on our own label. So Bob and I started Palladium Records and put out the 'Smokin' OPs' album on the label. That's when we began to run into trouble. The record got so big so fast that we just couldn't get a hold of adequate production facilities. We literally had a hit single and a hit album, so all of these companies began making us fantastic money offers to work the album. People were coming out of the woodwork saying, 'don't try to do it yourself, you can't cope with it,' it was incredible! We didn't take the fabulous money deals - we took Warner Brothers. I just figured that they were the biggest and the best, but it never occured to me that the biggest and best would say, 'this album is great, but we've got bigger

"The deal was a disaster," Andrews recalled, "it took Warners six weeks just to transfer the master tapes over, consequently the album fell right off the charts -after all, it'd been six weeks and not one market had been serviced with product. Well, they finally picked up the ball and tried to run with it, but then they just said, 'we got on this one too late, so let's go to the next one.' When that determination came down, I sat down with Bob and said, 'I've made a mistake, a bad mistake.

Creating A Monster

Andrews explained how the success of the first album for Palladium/Warner Brothers could have changed his future. "If they'd really worked the 'Smokin' OPs'

Also, at Sam Goody in New York for \$3.99/\$5.49 tape, at Sam Goody in Philadelphia for \$3.79/\$5.49 tape, at Viscount and Discount Records in St. Louis for \$3.99/\$4. 9 tape, and at Treasury stores in San Francisco for \$3.99/\$4.99. According to plans made by Jack Kiernan, division vice president of marketing for RCA, ads were also supposed to appear simultaneously in the Los Angeles *Times*, Chicago *Tribune*, Washington Post, and the Atlanta Journal and Constitution. The ads, however, did not appear in any of these papers.

Arista Records continued its major market campaign for the third week in support of the newest Barry Manilow release, "This One's For You." Ads appeared in nine

Meanwhile, in New York, where the "price war" among record retailers continued its low profile, jockeving for optimal position remained the week's most important concern. Korvettes retained at least a share of the front running spot with its list of "super specials," at \$2.99 each, expanded to seven in the Sunday edition of the New York Times. The albums offered were "Ten Percent" by Double Exposure, "Wild Cherry," "Silk Degrees" by Boz Scaggs, "Good King Bad" by George Benson, "Juicy Fruit" by Isaac Hayes, "You Are My Starship" by Norman Connors, and "Love, Life & Feelings" by Shirley Bassey. In addition, newest albums by the Andrea True Connection, Marilyn McCoo & Billy Davis, Jr., Grand Funk Railroad, and Walter Murphy were available for \$3.54 each. Four days later, the 30-store area chain added "War's Greatest Hits," to its list of \$2.99 specials, as well as four 2-LP sets from Buddah Records (The Best Of ... Sha Na Na, Lovin' Spoonful, Monty Python, and The Essential Paul Anka). The War offering is significant because this is the album's first week of general release to retailers.

'Hottest Top 10'

Alexander's temporarily abandoned its policy of \$3.64 for sale-priced albums offering the "hottest top 10" for \$2.99 each. The albums involved were latest releases by the Ritchie Family, Beach Boys, Helen Reddy, Jefferson Starship, Barry Manilow, Diana Ross, Lou Rawls, David Bowie, and, interestingly enough "War's Greatest Hits." Quantities were limited to 100 of each title per store, and one of each per customer. Jimmy's, recently expanded to 10 stores, advertised 10 "new releases and best sellers" for \$3.49/\$4.99 tape.

album, Palladium might have become a new Capricorn. But when a record company starts a project like that, it's really creating its own little monster.

"After all," insisted Andrews, "how much money can they really afford to dump into Palladium Records knowing that in three or four years I'm going to say to them, 'I want a million dollars if you want me to stay.' Keeping this in mind, it's only natural that Warner Brothers product is going to get worked and if it happens at Palladium, great. If you can wield enough economic power, like a Capricorn or an Asylum has now, you can demand that your product is worked. But at the time we were in no position to be making demands, besides it's just not realistic to expect them to dump tons of money and time into something when they know that they're just creating a monster. When I apprised them of the situation, they told me, 'give us one more album and if we can't bring that record together we'll write you a release.' And that's exactly what they did the album didn't come together and they wrote us the release."

According to Andrews, that's when the label shopping began. "We had decided to leave Palladium with Warner Brothers because I wanted my artist to be one of the number one acts at a label again so he would receive the attention that he deserves. Without our own label to worry about, we knew that a company would see that if they'd build us, they would stand to make some money on us, rather than just creating somebody to bitch at.

Management — A Tough Game Gets Tougher

"The manager's job is getting tougher and tougher," related Andrews, "fortunately for us, all the guys we had known when we were with Capitol way back in the beginning had become influencial executives, so we didn't have to prove anything to anybody. They knew what kind of people we were — that we were hard

Seger interrupted Andrews with a smile. "We're just not the type of band that's in a big hurry to get home and sit around and do nothing — our living is on the road." He then summarized: "Working the road is your key to the top. It's definitely the hardest, but it's also the best.

Prefacing his statement with a broad grin, Punch Andrews resumed: "Like I was saying, it's really getting tough for a manager to break a new act. For example, even FM airplay is getting tough to get no, I shouldn't say that it's getting tough, cause it's always been tough - now it's brutal. And agents — sure a lot of them will sign you, but they won't do anything for you. They've got a lot of acts to book, so they're not likely to take a new act with nothing going for it in the way of sales and throw it on a Z.Z. Top or Kiss, or Rolling Stones tour they're just not going to do it," he emphasized. "Unless you've got credentials, meaning sales, you're really up a

Bringing all of these elements together in one definitive statement, Seger concluded, "If you're a new act without any product, the only things a record company has to look at are your live performance and management. There is absolutely no doubt that the two are equally important. You can have the best band in the world but if the record company thinks your management is flaky and they're going to have trouble with them, you might as well forget it."

In order of largest to smallest, they were: New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit, San Francisco, Washington, D.C., Boston, Dallas, Pittsburgh, Long Island, Houston, Baltimore, Cleveland, Atlanta, St. Petersburg-Tampa, San Diego, Miami, Denver and Cincinnati. However, These are not the nation's 20 largest markets, according to Standard Rate and Data.

"We wanted to get the 20 top markets," explained an official of Media Records, "but we


found out that certain ones weren't subscribers to our service, either last year or this year."



Living It Down (2:30) (Ben Peters/Crazy Cajun - BMI)

The melody of this one is strictly country, but Freddy has invited crossover possibilities by putting on some slick harmony work. A love song, this will break country and if pop programmers are smart they'll give it a listen. The Spanish verse is a good hook.

NICK GILDER (Chrysalis 2115)

Roxy Roller (2:50) (Robbins/Beachwood - BMI) (N. Gilder, McCulloch)

This might be about the Roxy Theatre in Hollywood, but it doesn't really matter. It's a good song with con-trolled vocal phrasing that gives a new touch of life to rock 'n' roll. A certain add on all FM progressive stations.

THE MOVIES (Arista 0202)

Dancin' On Ice (3:25) (Mind Bee — ASCAP) (M. Morgan) From "The Movies" LP, this is a refreshing and interesting cut that will doubtless get some deserved FM progressive play. It's got a forties sound to it, probably due to the fast chording on plano, and a tremendously attractive chorus. Could cross to AM with proper push.

SHIRLEY BASSEY (UA XW 854Y)

If I Never Sing Another Song (3:39) (Dick James — BMI) (B. Black, U. Jurgens)
From the "Love, Life And Feelings" LP, this is a sen-

sitively voiced ballad that should score some fast points in MOR. Bassey's voice still has a lot of kick and she hits a lot of the notes you want to hear. Good lyrics, better arrangement, will both contribute to quick pop charting.



NEIL DIAMOND (Columbia 3-10405)

Don't Think . . . Feel (2:57) (Stonebridge — ASCAP) (N. Diamond)

The second single from the chart-busting "Beautiful Noise" LP, this has a deft pop feel to it and should hit the higher regions of the single chart. Diamond sings the lyric with an exotic flavor, almost reggae, and the chorus is a dynamite hook. Produced with obvious care by Robbie Robertson.

JOHN DENVER (RCA JH 10774)

Like A Sad Song (3:41) (Cherry Lane — ASCAP) (J. Denver)
From the just-released "Smile" LP, this is actually the second single. "It Makes Me Giggle" was the first, and this is much better. Denver handles the ballad on acoustic guitar with sensitive string backing and this should be a fast riser on the pop charts. Will get immediate FM play as well as MOR. A very pretty song.

CARLY SIMON (Elektra E-45341-A)

Half A Chance (2:49) (C'est/Maya — ASCAP) (C. Simon, J. Brackman)
Simon is back with co-writer Jacob Brackman on this one, and it's a good choice for a single. The chorus is authoritative, filled with confidence, and, as usual, her words are striking. This might very well be another "You're So Vain." Another classy production by Ted Templeman. Check out the fine horn fill.

SPINNERS (Atlantic 45-3355)

The Rubberband Man (3:30) (Mighty Three — BMI) (L. Creed, T. Bell)

A funky bass line provides the thrust for this hit-bound effort. The horn charts are dynamic and the legendary vocals are in full force. A must for R&B and pop play, this will get immediate adds in both areas. Much better than "Wake Up Susan," the group's last effort. The lead vocal has a lot of energy when it's laid over that pounding bass.

THE SONS OF CHAMPLIN (Ariola America P-7633)

Imagination's Sake (2:41) (Intersong - ASCAP) (B. Champlin, R. Moitoza)

This is one of the best things we've heard in a long time from The Sons. It's slick, extremely smooth and favorably reminiscent of some of Boz Scaggs' best work. This is a tune that's instantly recognizable, and instantly charming. If you're not on this record already, check it out. It's a killer.

DON COVAY (Philly Int'I./CBS ZS8 3602)

Travelin' In Heavy Traffic (3:05) (Mighty Three/Rag Mop BMI) (D. Covay, D. Wansel)

This record starts out with a terrific unison riff between voice and guitar. From there it just gets better. Covay sings the tune with flair, and plays well off the funky arrangement. Sure pick for R&B and disco lists.

JERRY BUTLER (Motown 1403F)

The Devil In Mrs. Jones (3:10) (Kizzie — ASCAP) (M. Smith)

Certainly a catchy title; what's more, a catchy tune. Butler sings with a convincing style. This one's about a wicked woman — "If this love Jones is a curse, then I'm ready for the worst." The lyric line is attractively staccato and the music is right in the groove. Should pick up R&B play in short order.

TOMMY JAMES (Fantasy F776-A-M)

Tighter, Tighter (3:47) (Big Seven — BMI) (James, King)
It looks like Tommy James is going to be a big star all over again if you can judge from this single. It's got tremendous top 40 possibilities; the chorus makes you want to sing along and the arrangement is the kind that's perfect for radio - succinct, to the point, but with a couple of real catchy riffs.

TOM SNOW (Capitol P4330)

Rock & Roll Widow (3:28) (Beechwood/Snow — BMI) (T.

This is a great song that has some obvious autobiographical roots. Some terrific lines about a woman all alone at home while her man is on the road. She "gets her news from the Rolling Stone." Already picking up some FM progressive adds, this one could be a real sleeper.

JAMES VINCENT (Caribou/CBS ZS 8-9016) Drifting Into Love (3:10) (Big Elk — ASCAP) (J. Vincent, D. Wolinski)

From the recent "Space Traveler" LP, this is an intelligent disco-rocker. The vocals are nicely paced with good call and response from both male and female voices. It's got a good musical break with excellent keyboard work. Nice guitar playing too. Should get more than a few spins on FM progressive outlets.

C.B. VICTORIA (Janus J-264)

I Don't Belleve In Miracles (3:24) (Mainspring — ASCAP) (R. Ballard)

English rocker Russ Ballard penned this song, and C.B. Victoria makes it his own. It's an uptempo ballad with a catchy melody line. Most noteworthy, aside from Victoria's intelligent and subtle phrasing, is the playing, which really drives the song. A smart add for FM progressives and might pick up considerable MOR

DAVID MOHR (Farr FR 010)

Good Time Sally (2:51) (Westroad — ASCAP) (D. Mohr)

"Good Time Sally" kicks off with some good-time piano licks. Mohr carries the tune well, and injects the proper amount of humor into his phrasing. A slick arrangement lends a good flavor to the cut, and this should get some AM pop play in many markets.

SNEAKERS & LACE (PIP P6525)

Skateboardin' (2:59) (Cheep Skate - ASCAP) (N. Levenson, P. Margo)

They say imitation is the highest form of flattery, so the Beach Boys should be very happy. This draws its influence primarily from "Surfin' U.S.A." and it's a good record. What with the skateboard craze running wild throughout the land, this has a chance to hit big. Wellcrafted production.

WHEELS (Atco 45-7062)

Skateboard U.S.A. (2:45) (Tomeja — ASCAP) (D. Oriolo) The title of this one should give it away; it's in the same vein as the other skateboard record this week. New artists Dunn & Rubini have come up with an auspicious first single. The arrangement really swings and they work well providing counterpoint for the swing-ing arrangement. A certain pop add. It's got a good lyric and the melody is definitely memorable.

WHITE WING (ASI 1006)

Hansa (3:14) (Tektra — BMI) (M. Coates)

A haunting ballad, this would be a unique addition to any FM progressive playlist. The tune is done up with great musical style; the harmonies and arrangements are outstanding. It sounds like a full chorus has been laid on top of an excellent string and synthesizer arrangement. Watch for this to get swift play.

ENERGY CRISIS (Circus CR-1)

Disco Chicken (2:55) (Sukha-Duhka Music) (B. Barthol, L. Dunlop, P. Marsh, P. Milio)

What with all the noise being made about "Disco Duck," this one could hit big. The lyrics are quite funny and the music is terrific. The Energy Crisis is an excellent band, the nucleus of which is often seen with Country Joe McDonald, and we think this song will go far. A smart add for any pop programmer, and it's a strong danceclub of-fering. Driving bass from Bruce Barthol.

ESTHER WILLIAMS (Friends & Co. F-129)

Last Night Changed It Ali (3:38) (Damit - BMI) (J. Wheeler)

A complicated harmony kicks this hopping disco number off to a fine start. There's an almost hypnotic riff that provides the thrust of the backing on the verses, and the strings are used well on the chorus. Williams' voice is in fine form. This should get disco and R&B play.

ALBUM REVIEWS

GREATEST HITS — Abba — Atlantic SD 18189 — Producers: Benny Andersson, Bjorn Ulvaeus — List: 6.98

When it comes to pop music, many European groups have always displayed an uncanny understanding of this essential musical form and Abba is certainly one of them. This LP will prove to be an excellent marketing tool as it includes 14 of the group's very best cuts, like their monster hits "S.O.S." and "Waterloo." Abba is the perfect example of what European pop music is all about — the vocals are clean and instantly dominant, the melodies catchy and generously spiced with good pop hooks. Retailers take notice: this is one record that's going to sell very well in the racks.



Having established a name for himself as a leading rocker during his tenure with the Jimi Hendrix Experience, Noel Redding has branched out, adding many a notch to his increasing list of credentials. On this outing Redding demonstrates his varied talents as musician, producer, arranger and writer. The tone of the LP spans a wide range of emotional levels from the uptempo rockers like "Back On The Road Again" to the acoustic-ballad stance of "You Make Me Feel So Good." A natural for the FM progressive market, several tunes from this LP will no doubt find comfortable spots on AM playlists.

COMING OUT — The Manhattan Transfer — Atlantic SD 18183 — Producer: Richard Perry — List: 6 98

The Manhattan Transfer is a group that's known for its versatility — this effort is, indeed, a study in versatility. It ranges in musical theme and emotional intensity from the searing and sensual vocal licks of "Don't Let Go" to the mid-sixties soul sound of the Holland-Dozier-Holland tune, "Helpless" and finally the mellow cocktail lounge strains of "Scotch And Soda." All in all, a very fine LP from a very professional group. Much potential exists here for AM/pop and FM progressive play.

STREET CORNER STUFF — Peddler — United Artists CH-LA 665G — Producer: Gary Schatzlein — List: 6.98

Funk combines with some tasty rock licks and a moving ballad or two to create "Street Corner Stuff," a fine premiere outing by Peddler. Of special note are the vocals, both lead and harmony, and the extremely pleasing way in which they blend with the funk and rock inflections of the melodies themselves. This LP is going to be very popular in the R&B market, with much attention from both AM and FM programmers soon to follow. Give a listen to "Now That You're Mine" and "Masquerade Charade."

AUTOMATIC MAN — Automatic Man — Island ILPS 9397 — Producers: Automatic Man, Lou Casablanca — List: 6.98

This LP is a unique progressive effort which combines several different musical forms to produce a delightful musical whole. The instrumentation and vocals which make up the tunes on this LP are at times funky, at times heavy rock and always quite progressive in nature. A very strong offering aimed directly at the FM progressive market, "Automatic Man" is sure to be accepted with energetic anticipation by all who are fortunate enough to come in contact with it. "Newspapers" and "Right Back Down" strike us as being two impressive cuts.

A LEGENDARY PERFORMER — Perry Como — RCA CPL 1-1752 — Producers: Various — List: 7 98

"Relaxed and warm and tender," that's what the liner notes say and we're inclined to agree. Perry Como is recognized far and wide as the master of the mellow, a very highly respected tune-weaver. This tastefully packaged collection demonstrates much attention to marketing, as it includes an illustrated booklet which tells the "Perry Como Story" along with a four-color portrait of the man himself that's suitable for framing. Included on this LP are such Como notables as "It's Impossible" and "My Favorite Things."

















RON WOOD & RONNIE LANE MAHONEY'S LAST STAND









CHAMELEON — Labelle — Epic PE 34189 — Producer: David Rubinson — List: 6.98

These three dynamic ladies have made waves throughout the music industry with their imaginative approach to their music. This effort is a continuation of this creative stance. Labelle is well known for vocal excelience and this LP is an impressive showcase of that aspect of their performing capabilities, particularly on the many ballad numbers included herein. Certain instrumental touches, like the subtle use of the harp, lend an air of fantasy to the songs, all of which will appeal to the R&B market and a majority of which will also find their way onto various pop and progressive playlists — our favorite is "Go-ing Down Makes Me Shiver."

AIN'T NOTHIN' STOPPIN' US NOW — Tower Of Power — Columbia PC34302 — Producers: Emilio Castillo, Tower Of Power — List: 6.98

Having earned a reputation for being one of the hottest brass-oriented groups around, Tower Of Power proceeds to strengthen and broaden that reputation on this outing. Flawlessly produced by the group itself and Emilio Castillo, the LP is a fine collection of movin' numbers that cast the spotlight on the interplay between the horns and the vocals on such uplifting tunes as "Make Someone Happy" and the title track. A sure add for R&B stations, some pop and progressive programmers will also want to get in on this one.

MAHONEY'S LAST STAND — Ron Wood & Ronnie Lane — Atco SD 36-126 — Producer: Glyn Johns — List: 6.98

This original soundtrack LP is both a refreshing change of pace and at the same time a sort of throwback to some of the early Small Faces sounds. Wood and Lane, both ex-Faces, seem to be right at home on this rather rustic outing, whose overall sound is the result of a cast of musicians that includes all of the Faces, Pete Townshend, Rick Grech and Micky Waller plus top studio players like Bobby Keys and Jim Price. An incredibly pleasant LP that's sure to provide the pop and FM progressive ariwaves with some fine cuts like "Car Radio."

BOSTON — Epic PE 34188 — Producers: John Boylan, Tom Scholz — List: 6.98

Not many hard rock bands show even a smidgeon of the concern for pleasing melody lines and supporting harmonics that are the hallmarks of the Boston sound. An extremely impressive debut effort, "Boston" demonstrates all the essential ingredients for first rate rock 'n' roll — glass-shattering vocals, molten guitar lines and just enough use of keyboards to make the whole package interesting. Don't be surprised if you hear a majority of the cuts from this LP on the FM progressive airwaves. In fact, tunes like the autobiographical "Rock & Roll Band" will also be warmly received by the pop programmers. Boston is a very promising group.

DIGGIN' IT — Dunn & Rubini — Prodigal/Motown P6-10013S1 — Producer: Michel Rubini — List: 6.98

Smooth and ingratiating are terms that can be easily and aptly applied to this offering by Dunn & Rubini. The feel is one of instrumental and vocal expertise that is reflected in the clean professionalism displayed on cuts like "Love is Blind" and "Just Keep Laughin'." Accompanied by many notable sidemen, Dunn & Rubini demonstrate a high degree of versatility (witness their cover of Nilsson's "Turn On The Radio") that will make this effort a welcome addition to many pop and progressive playlists.

STREET PEOPLE — Street People — Vigor VI-7001 — Producer: Ray Dahrouge — List: 6.98

A very nice soul offering that features strong vocal lines which are well integrated into the rhythm tracks. Backing vocals are smooth and pure, while the dynamite string and horn arrangements of Bert deCoteaux provide the perfect vehicle for the vocal power of Street People, making this an LP that will wind up on many playlists in both the R&B and pop markets. "Never Get Enough Of Your Love" and "Gotta Get Back With You" display the energetic approach that's sure to make "Street People" a radioactive LP.

WSPT's Martin — 'Ideal Station In An Ideal Market'

by J.B. Carmicle

LOS ANGELES - Stevens Point, Wisconsin is an ideal market for testing top 40 music, according to WSPT PD Pat Martin. WSPT is a 50,000 watt FM and simulcast 1000 watt daytime AM operation which covers almost one-third of the state of Wisconsin from a central location. The station has been programmed with a top 40 contemporary format for at least 15 years. "We're serving an isolated geographic region without any signals from Min-neapolis, Milwaukee, Madison, and an extremely weak signal from Chicago," said Martin. "We also do intense station research and measure specific demographic response by phone requests." A key secondary reporting station to Cash Box, WSPT's purpose, according to Martin, is to achieve "overall mass appeal" not only with music but news and promotion as well.

Demographic Coding

The number of records WSPT plays varies from 32 to 37, depending on the amount and quality of product available, Martin said. "We tighten up the station sound by playing fewer records if we don't have good music from which to choose. Our goal is to reach every listener 12 years and older, but I'd say the basic station appeal would be to the 12-49 age group. We have a system of demographically coding the records we play that not only provides balance of the station's sound, but reinforces the fact that we're a 'mass appeal' station.3

Across The Board

Martin explained that demographic coding does not simply indicate that each record has only one daypart it may be played in. "Most records we play can be programmed right across the board, with only a few records restricted to certain dayparts. We wouldn't air Wild Cherry's 'Play That Funky Music' until after 10 a.m., because it would be a pretty heavy song to wake up to. We wouldn't play 'Stairway To Heaven' by Led Zeppelin that early in the day either," he continued.

'Being creative is paramount," declared Martin. "I believe in offering our listeners something different on WSPT, something no other station is doing. You can do it with

your music, your promotions, and your jocks.

"I'm given the creative leverage with music because I'm never questioned on records added at the station," he noted. Explaining that record decisions come from three sources, the program director said that his objective is to have new product on the station at all times. "I'll either add a record after making the decision myself or I'll ask the jocks their opinions individually. We'll ask someone other than a staff member sometimes, just to get an outside opin-

'Informative Stages'

Martin told of having what he called a 90 percent success rate in taking a new record, following it through the "informative stages," and determining whether it would be a hit or not. Clarifying "informative stages" as request and sales feedback, Martin said, "Stevens Point is an ideal market because there's no outside influence from other stations. We can measure record feedback with requests and in-store research. Both of those help to reflect a record's popularity to a great

degree."
WSPT research procedures involve request lines that log each request throughout the broadcast day with a demographic breakdown of each caller and the time the call was made. Unusual requests are noted and considered for airplay at the end of the week, said Martin.

Store Research

"Presently we are calling and visiting five stores in the area," Martin related. "But one of the paramount problems of store research is that store rack merchandising is not coordinated with our airplay." He went on to explain that only one store of the five researched was stocking WSPT's playlist in its entirety. "That store can report sales to us very quickly because they have what we are playing," Martin reflected, "but the other stores do not stock records sometimes until they are being played on major market stations like KDWB in Minneapolis or WOKY in Milwaukee." Noting that all the stores are "musts" for measur-



Jefferson Starship/Jeff Beck with Jan Hammer

NASSAU COLISEUM, LONG ISLAND -Jefferson Starship has continued to suffer from an uneasy, split personality throughout its oftentimes stormy recording career. Spawned by Paul Kantner's desire to explore more freeform, loosely defined musical directions, the band reached a nearly fatal level of acceptance, until resurrected by Marty Balin several years (and three albums) ago with a succession of love songs. "Caroline," "Miracles," and the presently charted "With Your Love" (#18. bullet), all written by Balin, have vaulted the Starship to a level of popularity unprecedented for the members since Kantner, Balin, and vocalist Grace Slick flew on the more down-to-earth Airplane. The Starship may be the current vehicle, but judging from a recent performance an overtly enthusiastic, demonstrably young crowd, the ride is less than easy.

Just as the Starship has faced recurring identity problems in the recording studio, so do they generate obvious comparisons with their former incarnation on stage; and these problems are more serious. Initially, after only several songs, one is struck by the sound of two really distinct bands. Without Balin's lyric input, the Starship tends to revert to the overindulgent musicianship that characterized earlier efforts; however, with the joining of Balin's voice to Slick's and Kantner's, the vocal symmetry and resultant harmonic textures that made this grouping so unique become

apparent.

This need for a continuous, more highly organized and developed stage persona becomes more urgent with the musical additions of ex-Quicksilver Messenger Service member David Freiberg on bass and assorted keyboards, and rock 'n' roll stylists John Barbata on percussion and Craig Chaquico on guitar. The performing skills are certainly there, but tend to compete with each other rather than integrating to create any semblence of the dynamic interplay that was a trademark of the Jefferson Airplane.

Occasionally the parts meshed, and when they did, the results were varying degrees of exciting. Grace Slick's reading of a slow blues accompanied solely by Peter Sears's excellent acoustic piano was particularly well-received. "Cruisin'," from the successful "Spitfire" album, was a similarly effective vocal showcase, this time for Balin, and could prove to be a potent follow-up to their current single. An extended version of "St. Charles" featured some lively guitar playing, but it was "Have You Seen The Saucers?" that proved to be the instrumental tour-de-force for the evening, highlighted by a multi-chorded bass solo by the versatile Sears.

Jeff Beck, with the aid of the Jan Hammer Group, opened the show. While Beck's guitar work was, at times, outstanding, the bulk of the performance tended to be aim-

Felix Pappalardi/Joan Armatrading

BOXY I A -- Felix Pappalardi and Creation. a Japanese rock 'n' roll band Pappalardi encountered at a rock festival in Japan in 1975, brought their music to the Roxy recently. The group opened the set with "Preacher's Daughter," a powerful tune from their latest album. The melodic guitar riffs provided by Kazuo Takeda highlighted the show, as Takeda transformed his lead quitar into a blues instrument B.B. King would envy. Pappalardi's vocals were well done, but on some tunes the lyrics were inaudible, with the group's instruments at what must have been full volume. Percussive shading, including two drummers who went crashing through "Secret Power" to a crescendo ending, received the best response of the night. Flash, Daybreak, Sugar, and Thunder, as the Creation members are dubbed, are fulfilling their desire to make U.S. audiences aware of them by

putting together with Pappalardi, veteran of Cream, Youngblood and Mountain, one of the best rock and roll shows for any venue, large or small. Music, whether influenced by the East or West, is the universal language, and Felix Pappalardi and Creation provide a much clearer meaning for that language through their music.

Although Joan Armatrading squandered a chance to rap with her audience, her brand of modest rock was well performed before newcomers to the Armatrading name. The paucity of female guitarists notwithstanding, Ms. Armatrading's R&B overtones on "Love And Affection," and her acoustic accompaniment on "Tall in The Saddle," a powerful love lament, show-cased a vocal telent reminiscent of Phoebe Snow only stronger. Joan Armatrading's name will be heard again.

ian Matthews/Graham Parker

BOTTOM LINE, NYC — With a voice impeccable in range and clarity, and a solid band of session men behind him, Ian Matthews has emerged as a song-oriented solo artist who expands the dimensions of his presentation with careful attention to instrumental elements. Matthews blends musical styles with a reference to his former affiliations with Fairport Convention and his own Southern Comfort, combining folk, pop, jazz and blues influences. While the cultists were relentless in their demand for old material. Matthews kept the set in an orbit close to his latest album on Columbia, "Go For Broke," while delving into the past and future as well. The current single, Van Morrison's "Brown Eved Girl." was characterized by the delicately arranged lead and harmony vocals that pervaded the set, while a yet unrecorded selection, tentatively titled "The Shuffle," was more than "lyrically bizarre," as Matthews put it. Adding a harmonic twist to a simple blues beat, the band's expertise wrought a simple form into something unusual and arresting. All the solos were short, to-the-point statements, yet each piece reached a crescendo all its own. Matthews obliged the bottlethumpers with one request, "Simple Tigers Will Survive." While he no doubt has written many songs that cultists will always de-

mand, there is no reason why he shouldn't be able to combine his compositional ideas with the rich combination of colors and textures afforded by good arrangements and excellent musicians, to create more varied but equally memorable moments.

It wasn't Graham Parker, but guitarist Martin Belmont of his band the Rumour "Gypsy who offered a "quieter number." Blood," to the members of the audience who were tired of dancing. While few among the staid opening night gathering actually were dancing, Parker's brand of British R&B never stops dancing within it-"Back To School Days" is a non-stop uplift through each chorus, while "Lady Doctor" is almost a cool-blues shuffle until it explodes with Parker's shouting vocal delivery. Another dance form he experiments with is reggae, turning out an authentic product with "Just Something You're Going Through," and using the rhythms in a blues fusion for "Don't Ask Me Questions," which ends his Mercury album, 'Howlin' Wind," with a wailing, haunting chorus. While Parker will inevitably be compared to Springsteen and other figures of the Asbury Park scene, he has much of his own style to offer, especially English blues-oriented musicianship.

EAST COASTINGS — Power to the Pyramid — Those of you who have been trying to convince your friends of the mystical power of the pyramid structure and who have had to put up with a lot of snide comments because of it, take heart. It seems that the Record Plant, primo New York recording studio, has just built a new 24 track mixing room which features a pyramid-shaped chamber which rises high over the glass ceiling of the room. Several books have been published lately extolling the age-old mysterious powers of the pyramid, which is supposed to collect cosmic rays in a manner which gives it amazing preservative powers. Small pyramids are sold and used to keep razor blades sharp for months and to preserve food. Record Plant engineers claim that the pyramid room has unusual acoustical properties which they are unable to explain. Coastings suggests they leave a pizza in the room for a few months and see what happens.

RHODES RETURNS — During his recent stint on Scott Muni's WNEW-FM radio show here, during which he blasted New York Times critic John Rockwell. Elton John played an old Emitt Rhodes cut and asked the audience if anyone knew of his whereabouts. He got his answer from a listener that the former ABC recording artist has surfaced as an a&r man for Elektra-Asylum Records in Los Angeles. Rhodes will also act as a staff producer, and one of his key projects is the utilization of the ill-fated Countryside studio in the San Fernando Valley. That studio was once a key E/A project under the aegis of former Monkee Mike Nesmith Queen will play a free concert in London's Hyde park, scene of the 1969 Rolling Stones free concert. Other shows have been held in the area of the park since them, but none as big as the Stones show. This concert is scheduled to have five acts, and the organizers are trying obtain the use of the same area used by the Stones, the Cockpit by the Serpentine. Sounds like an appropriate place for a show by either group . . . Several members of Bonnie Raitt's road crew were arrested on the Jersey Turnpike for possession of one or another controlled substance on the day of the recent concert in Central Park. Ms. Raitt was reportedly following the equipment truck when it was stopped, and then followed her boys to the police station to help out. The equipment was held for a time, her boys for longer, and she and what was left of her crew arrived at the park not much more than an hour before showtime. Those attending were treated to an appearance by Elton John. resplendent in baseball cap. He sang "I'm Blowin' Away" with Bonnie, and played piano on another number. Also joining the hoot was David Bromberg, members of opening acts Muddy Waters's band, and Martin Mull, who repeated his "Let's give her a warm hand on her opening" intro from a Raitt show of a year or so ago . . . At Bruce Springsteen's recent Red Bank concerts, he referred to saxman Clarence Clemmons as "Mr. Hollywood," This was a reference to Clemmons' featured role in Martin ("Taxi Driver") Scorcese's upcoming movie musical "New York, New York." Clemmons is co-starring with Liza Minnelli and Robert DeNiro, and portrays a sax player . . . Franki Valli added to Elton John's collection of glasses the last night of his Madison Square Garden concert series by presenting him with a pair which featured a season in the corner of each lens . . . Robbie Krieger, former guitarist with the **Doors**, is recording an instrumental album for Blue Note Records. Krieger is producing the alubum, which features top L.A. studio musicians. "Light My Fire," the Doors biggest hit single, was authored by Krieger . . . The b-side of Steve Miller's new single, "Rock 'N' Me," is the old Miller song "Living In The USA." After the initial pressing of 200,000, a more recent cut will be substituted . . . Jimmy Carter was pictured flying to L.A. with John Denver in last Monday's Daily News.

Tony Orlando garnered himself some neat publicity during the recent Republican convention in Kansas City. Nancy Reagan had just made her entrance into the hall, thus prompting a vociferous Reagan demonstration. The band then for some reason struck up "Tie A Yellow Ribbon 'Round The Old Oak Tree," and Orlando, who had been sitting in the Ford box, began to trip the light fantastic with former Martha Graham student Betty Ford, thus drawing the TV cameras and much of the attention away from Mrs. Reagan. Jack "Backstage" Ford was later photographed on stage in Kansas City with Orlando, wearing an old leather flying helmet. Does Jack know more than he's telling about various methods of flying? . . . Three-fourths of the original Monkees re-united onstage recently at, of all places, Disneyland. The touring and recording group of Dolenz, Jones, Boyce and Hart (two ex-Monkees and their producer/songwriters) were joined by ex-Monkee Peter Tork. Tork is now teaching under his real name, Thorkelson. Dave Clark, leader of the Dave Clark Five, was in the audience.

Another L.A. reunion occured recently when **Spirit** was joined onstage at Santa Monica Civic by original members **Jay Ferguson** and **Mark Andes.** The one-time reunion was "just for the hell of it" according to **Randy California**, who organized it... **Dave Edmunds**, called the "world's finest producer" by **Phil Spector**, who should know, is officially pacted with Swan Song Records... **Tavares** have challenged the Harlem Globetrotters to a basketball game... **Randy Edelman's** deal with Arista includes the U.S. and Canada only, not everywhere but England as reported in **Cash Box** last week... **Michael Henderson** has been signed to Buddah Records... **Joey George** and **Lewis McGehee** have been pacted to Lifesong Records... **Carole Sager** and **Marvin Hamlisch** recently co-produced an **Aretha Franklin** session during which she recorded their song "Break It To Me Gently."

Members of the **Dwight Twilley Band** stopped by the **CB** office last week while in town promoting their ABC/Shelter LP "Sincerely," and the upcoming single "Could Be Love." The band will rehearse at Shelter headquarters in Tulsa in preparation for a tour in September. Reaction in Tulsa, which is also Twilley's hometown, was that the cuts on the album were too short. The nucleus of the group has been together for seven years and they produced their LP under the collective name of Oister . . . Look for a live album of Bob Dylan's Rolling Thunder Review, to be released in mid-September by CBS to coincide with the Rolling Thunder TV special . . . Appearing on Don Kirshner's Rock Concert on September 4 will be Gladys Knight and the Pips, Doug Kershaw, The Crusaders, and Murray the K with film footage of The Beatles, The Doors, Otis Redding and Aretha Franklin. 

Bassist Ron Carter's music on CTI has included an incredibly wide range of material. There have been orchestrated disco tracks, all-star blowing dates and then there are his own small band performances. Billy Cobham, Kenny Barron and Hugh McCracken assist the leader in able fashion during the course of four Carter tunes and two additional titles. Carter's artistry shines through every moment of this disk and the result is one continuous display of the creative gifts of this fine musician.





JAKE HANNA — Kansas City Express — Concord Jazz CJ 22 — Producer: Carl Jefferson — List: 6.98

This is an especially pleasant visit to small band Basieana circa 1930-1947. Hanna is an excellent drummer for this groove and with the likes of Richie Kamuca, Bill Berry and Nat Pierce for the soloists the set could hardly go wrong. But the big surprise is the return to disk of Many Ann McCall, one of the era's finest vocalists. Very nice cover art and excellent sound are a part of the Concord tradition. For the band, try "Robbins' Nest"; for Mary Ann try "Wrap Your Troubles In Dreams."

HOT TRACKS - Herb Ellis-Ray Brown - Concord Jazz CJ 12 | Producer: Carl Jefferson - List: 6.98

Concord has managed to present some excellent mainstream jazz over the past couple of years. Most of the artists are involved in studio work so the chance to step into a full blown jazz date generally brings out the best in those present. Ellis and Brown should need little introduction by this time, as both were members of the best Oscar Peterson trio. Plas Johnson and Sweets Edison form a most effective front line and there are originals from all four men. Quality jazz timeless in nature.

WEA Finds More Black Retailers Buy Direct

LOS ANGELES — More black retailers are buying directly from the manufacturer than ever before. Where previously the black retailer was almost overlooked by the manufacturer, he is now a more viable force in the industry. The survival rate of the black retail store is unquestionably reaching new heights. They're moving more product, making larger profits, and handling credit better than in the past.

Taking its Place

Henry Allen, president of Cotillion Records, told **CB** "the black retail store is definitely taking its place in the industry." Stores are now more frequently being included in the company advertising and getting more display materials, because the manufacturer realizes the black retailer is becoming a more integral part of the record business. Allen also stated that by purchasing directly from the manufacturer the black retail store has a larger profit margin, is able to increase its volume and handle finances more effectively. Allen also maintained that several of the smaller mom & pop stores are banding together, forming co-ops so that they too will have the buying

Atari Buys TV Network Time To Advertise Home Video Models

SUNNYVALE, CA. — Atari, Inc. announced the purchase of CBS network time in National Football League/NFC telecasts during November and December. The buy includes regular season games and features the first round of the league playoffs on December 19.

Mike Shea, Atari's director of marketing, Consumer Division, said of the buy, "We estimate that we'll reach a total audience of 65 million people during these broadcasts. This exposure during the last critical weeks before Christmas will really give our retailers the extra support they need." He added that, "To our knowledge, Atari is the first firm in the video game field to buy network NFL telecasts.

Thirty-second commercials for the Sunnyvale firm's Pong and Super Pong games for home TV will be aired during the contests between Minnesota/Green Bay, Los Angeles/San Francisco, Washington/New York, Chicago/Detroit and Dallas/Atlanta, among others. The spots will be only part of a heavy television, radio and print effort for Atari's Pong, as Shea indicated. During the months before Christmas, advertising for Atari will appear in every major U.S. market.

'Atari has the distinction of being the only maker of electronic video games to test every one of its units both on computers and in actual play situations," Shea noted. "Our people actually hook up every one of those units to a TV set and test it under tougher conditions than you'll find in an actual home."

Atari Produces 500,000th Unit

It was also announced that on August 11. Atari marked the production of its half millionth unit at the firm's 125,000 sq. ft. production facility in Sunnyvale.

Malcolm Kuhn, director of sales for Atari's Consumer Division, reports that the firm has stepped up production of games in anticipation of a big Christmas buying season. "We anticipate a strong Christmas buying season for video games and we expect Atari to emerge as the industry sales

Kuhn expects inventory to lead orders until the beginning of October, but "after that we can't be sure," he cautioned. "It would be wise for retailers to order their Super Pong units now."

Kuhn attributes Atari's success in the consumer market to the quality of its product and the firm's rigorous testing program. "We test every single unit under actual playing conditions," he said, "and Atari is the only firm using integrated circuits designed especially for its games. Most firms use standard supplied components. This means that no matter whose name goes on the cabinet, the inside of the game is exactly the same. Atari, on the other hand, uses special chips designed by our own group of design engineers. That really makes a big difference in the quality and excitement of Pong.'

NAMA Bicentennial Conv. In Philly To Feature 'Revolutionary' Program

CHICAGO — Some "revolutionary" ideas in programming and timing will be applied to the 1976 Bicentennial Convention and Exhibit of the National Automatic Merchandising Association (NAMA) which opens on October 7 at the Civic Center in Philadelphia, said Howard Michaels and Jerry Engle, general and program chairmen of the four-day event.

Combining the Bicentennial theme and location with the 40th anniversary of NAMA, the convention will feature outstanding national personalities such as Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen, popular previous NAMA convention keynoter, economist Leo Cherne and leaders of the U.S. Congress and of the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

Completely changed will be the programming and timing of the Sunday program on October 10, Michaels said. On "Super Sunday," exhibit hours are being changed to open at 10 a.m. and conclude at 2 p.m. Three concurrent program sessions are set for Sunday morning from 9 to 10

The changed Sunday schedule will allow convention visitors to take part in Philadelphia's traditional "Super Sunday" events which happen to fall on Columbus Day. This includes the city's biggest annual parade and the country's largest "block party" along Franklin Parkway.

A Columbus Day Ladies' brunch at the Hilton Hotel near the Civic Center is another of the "Super Sunday" highlights.

The annual banquet on Saturday night also will carry out the Bicentennial theme with a "Revolutionary Era" menu and Yankee Doodle pre-banquet entertainment furnished by the host city's Boys' Choir and Mummers.

Exhibit hours are scheduled from noon to 6 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, from noon to 5 p.m. on Saturday and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Sunday.

Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen will be the

keynote speaker at the opening meeting on Thursday, which also includes the NAMA annual meeting and an address by NAMA Chairman of the Board Charles E. Bertsch.

Friday's meeting schedule highlights cigarette vending with a feature address by H.R. Kornegay, president of the Tobacco Institute, Washington, D.C.; the results of a two-year long study by Philip Morris on cigarette merchandising; concurrent sessions on office coffee-cooperative service vending equipment with Robert E. Sertell, instructor at Delsea Regional High School, Franklinville, N.J.; and a financial planning workshop titled, "Accounting For Inflation In Your ROI And P&L."

The general session on Friday will open with an audiovisual historical presentation, followed by a panel discussion by leaders of the U.S. Department of the Treasury and others on the subject of coinage moderated by NAMA President G. Richard Schreiber. Participants will be Congressman Henry Reuss, (Wis.), chairman of the House Banking, Currency and Housing Committee; Mrs. Mary Brooks, Director of the Mint; Stephen Gardner, vice chairman of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System; and David Stuart of the Research Triangle Institute, Durham, N.C. Topic of the discussion will be trends in coinage and the development of a dollar coin. Congressman Reuss will conclude the morning session with an "open forum" on the Washington scene.

Concurrent sessions, opening the Saturday morning program, will feature a repeat of Friday's cigarette vending session, a presentation on the coffee business by a panel of coffee suppliers, and a second workshop on financial planning dealing with financing and borrowing programs. Chemical Bank, New York City, and Price Waterhouse & Co. experts will conduct the session

The general meeting on Saturday will deal with trends and consumer attitudes on vending and manual food service, featuring consumer attitude research about vending services conducted by specialists of Purdue University in two geographic areas.

Leo Cherne, executive director of the Research Institute of America, New York City, will be keynote speaker, dealing with forecasts on the economy. He has been a warmly received keynoter at previous NAMA conventions.

The Sunday business program will feature a presentation on the benefits of research in achieving higher profits and return on investment by the Philip Morris Company and concurrent sessions on equipment maintenance and financial

Comedian George Kirby is the headliner for the NAMA Banquet and an extensive program is also planned for the ladies. This includes a presentation on the famous Edward Marshall Boehm, Inc. porcelains sponsored by the Vendo Company, a bus tour of historic Philadelphia sponsored by National Vendors, a luncheon and fashion show at the new Riverfront Restaurant with the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company as sponsor and a Rock-Ola Manufacturing Company-sponsored brunch at the Top of the Philadelphia Hilton on "Super Sunday."

Schreiber said NAMA expects a record number of exhibitors and predicted that exhibit space will be sold out before the convention opens.

Airport Game Room Successfully Operated By New Orleans Novelty

NEW ORLEANS, LA. — One of the most notable and highly publicized airport game rooms in the country is located at New Orleans International Airport and operated by New Orleans Novelty Co.

The room measures a mere 29' x 15' but the skillful arrangement of the equipment allows it to house nine flippers and an assortment of seven arcade pieces and video games. Although some of the models are prototypes, the majority of the games, with one or two exceptions, are usually brand new releases. New game installations are made on an average of about one every ten days, according to J.C. Lawrence, manager and chief mechanic of the room.

Despite the handicap of having only one arm, J.C. Lawrence is reputedly one of the most capable coin machine mechanics in the industry. He is largely responsible for keeping the game room's equipment clean. neat and playable twenty-four hours a day, a condition which has earned the room an

Lawrence noted that Ned Berkemer, executive assistant to New Orleans Novelty Co's head engineer Joe Isaacson, makes a daily inspection of the room to take care of the acute mechanical defects, while one of the novelty company's top cleaners also makes a daily visit to clean the games and fill the coin changer. "You can bet that the game room is also frequently inspected by all the bosses at New Orleans Co., Lawrence said, "and if you don't think they are particular about this operation you don't know the half of it!"

It has been estimated that this particular game room has created more sales of games for distributors and manufacturers throughout the country than any similar operation, Lawrence indicated. The airport is a focal point for both U.S. and international travel, as he explained, and thus has unlimited exposure potential, em-

musical works. (See Cash Box, Aug. 7, 1976).

Kastenmeier, chairman of the Judiciary Subcommittee that held some 17 days of hearings and 22 days of markup on \$.22, urged full committee members to accept the long and arduous work of the subcommittee. "We have pored over this for eleven years," said the subcommittee chairman, referring to the length of time the bill has bounced back and forth between the House and Senate. "It's time the Congress acted."

Jukebox Owner Resistance
Earlier Rep. Robert Kastenmeirer (D. -Wis) noted that it was "impossible to draft a copyright bill that resolves all the conflicts." Nevertheless, he felt jukebox owner resistance to the new royalty had been somewhat mitigated through "equitable

Cable companies' opposition to new royalties continues to be a problem, however. Rep. Eilberg (D.-Penn.) thought 'small cable systems are very unhappy'

Congressman Drinan (D.-Mass.), a member of the copyright subcommittee, defended the bill's cable provisions. 'Smaller cable companies would oppose any form of copyright liability," he observed. "The coverage they have is minimal."

The Senate rejected a 1967 Housepassed copyright bill because of the cable controversy. In 1974, and again last February, the Senate did adopt a copyright bill. The current Senate bill exempts the smallest cable companies from compulsory license. It's likely the cable issue may be dragged onto the floor of the House.

ing the area's record sales, he stressed that the station puts together as fair a sales figure as possible considering the rackairplay problem.

Marketing Analyst

The station retains Gary Bond who according to Martin, is a marketing analyst from Madison and an expert on ARB information and call-out research. "Bond supplies the station with objective information on the popularity of current, re-current, and oldies weekly," Martin added.

Remarking that he had scanned stations in seven states on a trip recently, the station PD noted, "... there seems to be a lack of programming creativity right now. There's a big lack of community service and community happenings on local radio stations, and this is one thing that can help distinguish markets and stations within those markets apart from each other. Those station people should be talking to record promotion people, to each other, and to community leaders who can help them become more aware of what's happening in their communities so they can provide a

more localized sound on their stations."

Friend On The Air

Martin cited public service announcements as a way to localize radio in the community. "We let local officials voice our public service announcements, so that in effect the WSPT listeners are hearing a friend on the air. The believability factor is heightened with the local approach," concluded Martin.

Emphasizing that radio stations are only as good as the goals of the owners and managers, Martin said, "If the management is not solid, if the station employees are not paid well, and if program directors, like myself, are not given the latitude to make decisions, the station will not sound good, much less succeed.

"And you can't win without a strong news department," he continued. "Our news people are self-motivators who cover the area in-depth. That coverage with enhances what we're doing on the size."

don of Motown. "It's as good as any Schwann catalog, and it's compact enough to be used and kept. I was really impressed with the handbook."

However, Bob Belanoy, manager of the Tower Records outlet in Anaheim, had some doubts as to the availability of the listed singles, and estimated that "only sixty percent of the records are ones that you can still get from the manufacturer.

Indeed, a phone call to Capitol Records revealed that many of their listings in the handbook were numbers that had been cut from the catalog.

Not From Manufacturer

"Sure, there are inaccuracies," said Gary Stong, singles buyer for Record Rack. "Some of the records have been cut out, but that does not mean that they aren't still available. There are other sources besides the manufacturer," Strong explained.

Jerry Talmadge emphasized that fact. "We (Record Rack) have every one of these singles. Some we only have a couple units of, some we have more. You can get these singles."

So, according to Record Rack, the singles, with the exception of a few understandable inaccuracies (the book has over 14,000 listings), are correct and available.

Frampton's #1 Bestseller Sees Increase In Catalog Sales #7

and Lieberman Enterprises, a major rackjobbing operation servicing the central and midwestern U.S., with additional branches covering the northwest corner of the country and as far south as Dallas and Houston.

'Frampton" jumped from #104 last week to #70 on Heilicher's list of top selling LPs, which is based exclusively on sales monitored within the various corporate branches. Sales increased from 400 to 495. Similarly, the album has registered impressive upward movement on the computer read-out that Lieberman monitors bi-weekly. From a position of #128 on July 28, the album lept to #58 (at the branch operation which covers Nebraska, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Montana, and parts of Wisconsin and Iowa) on August 11, where it currently stands. Sales more than doubled from approximately 40 units a month ago to nearly 100 during each of the last two reporting periods.

Frampton's First Solo Album

"Wind Of Change," Frampton's initial solo recording, which was released on June 14, 1972, has shown similar increased strength at the retail level. It is presently #341 on the Heilicher list, up from #413 a week ago, with sales of 131 as compared to 115. At Lieberman, the album took a spectacular 200 point jump to #397; four weeks ago it was #866. Sales have been steadily encouraging, from five units a month ago to 20 and now 31 for the current period. Jim Grady, buyer for the Heilicher division examined this progression. "Initially, we bought lightly, but sales have been increasing steadily. We've bought 20,000

to date, but 5,000 since July."

"Frampton's Camel," released in May, 1973 and "Somethin's Happening," released in February, 1974, scored impressive gains at Heilicher. The former is currently #374 from #533, with sales escalating from 93 to 121; the latter is two places behind at #376 from #508, with sales increasing from 97 to 120. According to Grady, "Frampton's Camel" is "surging right now." However, its impact, as well as that of "Somethin's Happening," has not been felt at Lieberman, and there's a very good reason.

Lieberman's Buyer Explains

"They're out in the stores pretty lightly," explained Sylvester Vanyo, national buyer for Lieberman Enterprises. "We sold about 700 copies of 'Frampton Comes Alive' during the last period, which is up from approximately 600 the period before. And we're getting pretty good tickets on 'Frampton' (after each sale at a store that Lieberman racks, a ticket is returned to the company to accurately tabulate sales). But not the others."

This should change soon. Based on information he had recently received, Vanyo indicated that he would reallocate copies of the three remaining albums to his stores within the next week. "When an artist has a catalog, and has a smash, the catalog jumps," he

Just how much of a smash is "Frampton Comes Alive?" Last week, Heilicher sold 5,317 copies of the package, and that increased to 6, 387 for the current week. "Their Greatest Hits" by the Eagles is the merchandising conglomerate's #2 best selling album. It sold over 4,000 copies last week and this week sold 3,750.

European RCA Subsidiaries, Licensees To Rome Sept. 6

NEW YORK — RCA Records will convene a four-day marketing meeting for its European subsidiaries and licensees in Rome Sept. 6.

Representatives from subsidiary companies in France, Germany, Italy, Spain and the United Kingdom, as well as management representatives from licensee companies in Austria, the Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, Czechoslovakia, Israel, Scandinavia, Portugal and Switzerland will be present, as will a large delegation from New York headed by Robert D. Summer, division vice president, RCA Records International.

The meeting will develop European coordination and planning of future manufacturing, marketing and promotion projects.

Cornish Named Island Director

LONDON — Peter Cornish has been named a director of Island Music Ltd. by Martin Humphrey, managing director of the company.

Cornish assumes his new status nearly two years after joining Island Music as general manager. Prior to that he was copyright and royalty control manager at Pye Records following four years as general manager of Ember Records.

Succeeding Cornish as general manger of Island Music is Billy Lawrie, brother of singing star Lulu. Lawrie will continue functioning as the company's professional manager in his new post.

On-The-Hour Beatle Tunes Spark Radio 1 Programming

PARIS — Europe 1, the French radio station most oriented towards young audiences is launching an operation on the air which consists of plugging, all day long, a Beatles single every hour, throughout the summer. Claude Brunet, program manager of the station wants to bring a new flavor into programs, breaking up the French rules which claim that a certain music is required at a certain time of the day. Brunet's team is now playing any music ranging from easy listening to progressive or standard French songs along with classical music to keep a constant interest to content the listeners. First reaction to this decision is quite enthusiastic

After their summer tour Yes will come to the south of France (Mougins) for four months to record their fothcoming album for WEA. The group will not use the Rolling Stones' mobile recording studio as planned earlier this month, but their own instead. WEA France has also just rush-released the Jon Anderson LP "Olias Of Sunhillow" by public demand. This album was previously scheduled for the beginning of September; to kick it off, the "Yessongs" film is playing in summer resort cinemas.

Simon Waintrob, chairman of W.I.P. Records, has signed Ricky Shayne who had, some years ago, a number one single in Europe with "Mamy Blue." Ricky is still on top in Europe where he sold over five million copies of his latest single "Quand On Se Retrouve Seul," written by Francis Lai and arranged by Michel Colombier. A heavy promotion campaign is planned for this single in France including important TV appearances. The single is already appearing on radio charts.

There will be presentations of forthcoming U.S., European and Latin American popular product, new Red Seal recordings from the U.S. and Europe, and a presentation of new TK product, which is released throughout Europe by RCA.

The meeting is being planned and organized by Ralph Mace of RCA Records' European marketing office in London.

GRT-Canada Computerized 11.35

This convention marked the opening of a new, computerized GRT-Canada accounting office, a thorough-minded and long-range move. Until now, the process of filing was handled on a manual basis, consuming time and labor to an impractical degree. With the computer, orders placed from Toronto to Sunnyvale can be confirmed within 15 minutes and may shortly realize a one-day turnaround from receipt to packing and shipping.

Computerization will serve other useful

functions. Once the program is in full swing, each GRT sales office and licensor will be more frequently provided with more detailed periodic updates of sales by label, artist and destination. Weighed against U.S. sales performances, this will help the GRT distribution network determine where to focus more attention.

There are definitely areas within the Canadian market which demand a high concentration of one sort or another.

Bi-Lingual Market

Canada is a bi-lingual country. While the majority of the geography entertains English-speaking peoples, the province of Quebec is a French market in every sense of the word. Deeply immersed in a culture of its own, this territory is so radically different that it is a confusion to most outsiders - which includes even fellow Canadians living only a few hundred miles away in Toronto. Although GRT maintains a sales office in Quebec, it is understood that some kind of veil naturally exists between the two markets. Two quests, then, Tom McLean and Peggy Colston, program directors for CKGM and CHOM-FM respectively, provided one of the sessions highlights.

After delivering some prefatory comments, McLean and Colston fielded questions having to do with Montreal — the city from which their stations broadcast — a city which buys more music than any other Canadian city.

Next week **CB** will dwell on French Canada in more detail as it defines itself, specifically through a government ruling affecting CHOM-FM and other radio stations within that specific market. For now, suffice to say GRT is looking to develop the market more fully and is even considering some production of Canadian regional material per se. At the same time, GRT wishes to avoid one-shots or French cover versions of American hits, in favor of building longlasting relationships with artists who can sell LPs. At present, GRT-Canada has no A&R effort functioning in French Canada.

Overall, according to national A&R manager Jeff Burns, GRT-Canada is not consciously looking for "new talent" in order to expand the roster. More in agreement with Ross Reynolds, Burns (who doubles as national promotion manager) would rather first make sure the current load is portable before stacking more straw on the camel's back.

Incentive Program

To this end, an incentive program has been put into effect. An all-expense-paid, two-week Hawaiian vacation for two will dangle before the GRT-Canada promotion staff from now until January 31. Whoever generates the most creative/successful campaign will slip off into the tropics to try on his or her prize with a friend.

Incentive toward the incentive also occupied a substantial portion of the time spent at this meeting. ABC, ABC/Dot, Shelter, Sire, 20th Century, Janus and Creem Records were all on hand, most with samples of pending releases which were presented to the GRT staff which, in turn, modeled new GRT and Axe Records product.

Product Presentations

Leading off the U.S. presentations, Peter Pasternak, international director for 20th Century Records, introduced upcoming material from Ambrosia — a highly energetic album with a special jacket which unfolds into the shape of a pyramid; Love Unlimited Orchestra, Cotton Lloyd & Christian; Nitzinger and the Keane Brothers. Throughout the conference Pasternak bantered with GRT sales reps over the destiny of "Tales Of Mystery And Imagination." (In answer to his queries, the Alan Panagonal

U.K. Tape Sales: Healthy But Largely Unappreciated

David MacDougald, DJM Product Manager, Airs Views On Role Of Pre-Recorded Tape

LONDON — With sales of pre-recorded tape now accounting for an estimated 30% of the UK music market turnover, this form of entertainment is assuming major importance in the reckoning and future planning of the record companies. Or at least it should be doing so, but in the view of one expert and experienced tape man, this growth sector of the business is being largely ignored and neglected by too many labels.

David MacDougald, tape product manager at DJM Records since March of this year, came into the music industry 10 years ago on the retail side in Yeovil, Somerset, joined EMI in 1970, and moved on to Precision Tapes, the Pye Records subsidiary, a year later. He rose to the post of A&R manager before quitting just prior to the drastic cut-back and reduction in Precision's scope earlier this year.

Lethargy

"There is an amazing amount of lethargy in the industry in general towards tapes," declared MacDougald. "Very much a couldn't-care-less attitude. Record companies are always interested in breaking new artists, which is right, but they always put the emphasis on the LP, whereas there should be equal attention to the tape side now. The only way the cassette can be made as good a seller as the LP is by extra emphasis on it now."

MacDougald advocates simultaneous releases on LP and tape so that the consumer can choose which format he wishes to buy without waiting for the tape or opting for the LP in case a tape issue is not forthcoming.

"I'd like to see the reissue of deleted LPs in tape form," MacDougald added. "LP buyers have already had their chance to obtain these so why not give the same opportunity to tape buyers? With around eight million tape hardware owners in the UK, there is a sufficiently large potential market to justify such a step."

Packaging And Quality

He stressed the importance of packaging and the quality of the tape sound. In his opinion some manufacturers could take more trouble and achieve better quality on both counts.

"The basic fundamental should be making a cassette look like a cassette and not a reduced-size LP. If liner notes are printed on the LP sleeve, together with personnel and recording details, these should be reproduced on the tape inlay cards. Obviously this will cost a little more, but that would be covered by enhanced sales. Cassettes should be made a separate entity on release lists for the trade, and not put down by the 'also available on tape' phrase."

MacDougald hopes that the broadcasting media, particularly radio, will aid the cause of tape by using cassettes more instead of concentrating almost exclusively on the LP. In most cases he reckons the quality of cassettes to be good enough for broacasting use, and would like to hear technical assessments of tapes on the air as well as reviews of the music.

Industrial Help He thinks that software industry committees such as the British Recorded Tape Development Committee can be very helpful, providing all the member companies are fully committed and enthusiastic about the purpose. He regrets that the BRTDC's efforts to initiate joint promotion schemes and campaigns with hardware manufacturers have mostly fallen on stony ground.

MacDougald has been busy at DJM since March supervising the repackaging and reissue of much of that company's tape repertoire as well as planning new product releases for a fall sales campaign. Significantly, of the reissued product only the Elton John repertoire is available in both cassette and cartridge form.

Cassettes Dominant

"Unlike the States, the cassette has become the dominant configuration in the UK market," MacDougald said. "It will never take over completely here, but there is a basis for an ultimate 50-50 parity with the LP. The cartridge has been deserted for one reason — the consumer has been offered a choice between the configurations for the last six years and has opted for the cassette, particularly during the last two years. At one time there was parity in production and sales, but now ten cassettes are sold for every cartridge; it's at the stage where it's no longer viable to manufacture cartridges."

Jobim Album Dawns Brazilian WEA Operation

RIO DE JANEIRO — WEA, now an independent, is launching its operation this week with an LP by Antonio Carlos Jobim and is receiving wonderful sales reaction.

The CNDA (national copyright council) hired SERPRO (the government data

processing agency) to do the programming of collection and distributuion of the performing rights. According to the new law now in force, all those services — beginning January 1, 1977 — should be done by the ECAD (central collection and distribution office). The CNDA department in charge of the performing rights was not affected by the new legislation and the "paid public domain," a novelty here is being discussed not only by the music publishers, but also by the book industry.

Janus Records' general manager, Ed DeJoy, invited his artist AI Stewart to join the meeting and the two nailed the GRT sales force to the floor with several very commercial cuts from Stewart's new album, "Year Of The Cat." Equally impressive was the list of print ads with which Janus intends to support the LP — ads aimed at both trade and consumer publications. Product by C.B. Victoria (whose single is getting action in Ontario and Calgary), John Small, and new group Molkie Cole rounded out the new Janus schedule.

ABC Family

Jim Fogelsong jetted away from his presidential duties over the ABC country trust in Nashville long enough to introduce ABC/Dot to a new team.

Fogelsong remarked that twelve years ago, when he first stepped on to the scene, there were but 112 full-time country stations in the U.S. — now there are 1200. Although he didn't claim to know the Canadian market. Fogelsong did recognize a "vocal country faction out of Canada in terms of letters," and shared the domestic direction of the moment by commenting that ABC/Dot is now engaged in an campaign to educate the stores that are now capitalizing on the 1200 country stations. No doubt GRT will study the ABC/Dot promotional dances in order to follow suit.

Sire, in the person of Elsie Heatherman from New York, showcased music by the Ramones, Renaissance, Climax, the Flaming Groovies, Kraan and Fire Ballet (the latter two being Passport acts).

Bernadette Gorman proffered new Shelter merchandise by the Dwight Twilley Band (very hot), J.J. Cale, Lyons & Clark and Larry Hosford as well as a "Best Of Leon" (Russell) album.

Phil Alexander, assistant to ABC International president Steve Diener, took the stage next with the new Impulse wave, embracing creative artistry from John Handy, Wade Marcus, Bobby Bland, Sonny Criss, Sam Rivers and Brass Fever. Then, turning his attention to some of the R&B acts that make up ABC, Alexander pitched seven strikes through the likes of Rufus, Ruby Andrews, The Four Tops, Marilyn McCoo & Billy Davis Jr., Bobby Bland and Carl Carlton.

Finally, ABC International director of artist development Elaine Corlett delivered the lion's share of the current label release. If GRT-Canada ever wanted for a diverse line before they hooked up with ABC, they certainly have one now, from the melodic jazz-oriented passages of John Klemmer, the Mark-Almond Band, John Mayall and the Crusaders, through the country-flavored pop of Delbert McClinton, the Amazing Rhythm Aces and Jimmy Buffett, blue-eyed soul from the Faragher Brothers and the straight-ahead rock of Terry Reid, Joe Walsh, Crosby/Nash and Steely Dan.

In addition to the tape/record presenta-

tions, Corlett and Alexander ran film clips of Isaac Hayes and Poco.

Canadian Talent

In return, the Canadian hosts demonstrated some home-grown MOR material from Axe Records as well as some contemporary rock music from Thundermug.

A taste of irony seasoned the GRT portion of the presentation, as it was revealed that there is often quite a bit of difficulty in persuading local stations that Canadian talent can be as strong as it is. Consider the recent Klaatu release which was purposely held up by GRT so that the U.S. licensee (Capitol) could service Canadian radio first. Maple stations added the LP — on the assumption that it was an American act. Besides Klaatu, GRT played for the convention a bit of the jazz virtuoso Moe Koffman; David-Clayton Thomas' reggae-find, Ishan People; The Soul Brothers Six; lan Thomas (newly-signed to Chrysalis); Tom Cochrane; Ralph Murphey and Stanley Screamer.

A special moment arrived with a live performance by Juno award-winner Dan Hill, a performer bound for great things, as evidenced by the spell he cast over his label affiliates. Hill's album, "Hold On," probably has one of the strongest shots out of all Canada to break the U.S.

GRT Directions

Over the past year-and-a-half GRT-Canada has been attempting to establish itself as a serious publisher in terms of plugging and seeking covers; an endeavor which will be more fully developed over the next year as well. GRT-Canada recently added the Charisma catalog with two more acquisitions to be announced shortly. (Outside the North American continent, GRT is represented by UA in Australasia, by RCA in German and Mogull in the Benelux countries.)

Other points expressed by the Canadians during the get-together were the recent introduction of a twelve-inch disco pressing at a list price of \$2.98, and the pending development of a mid-price line, targeted at next January or February.

Look for GRT-Canada to take the lead of its parent company and begin experimentation with TV promotional packages. In the words of president Ross Reynolds, "We're not out to conquer the world, but we feel our strong Canadian catalog can be exploited this way."

In summation, much lip-service has been paid to the concept behind the speech, "The Day Radio Died," delivered by Stan Cornyn a few NARMs ago. GRT-Canada, through the example and momentum of the Sunnyvale, California offices, seems to be in a well-balanced-enough position and frame of mind to actually make a strong assault on that "after-youth" market. If GRT honestly decides to diversify (and we have it that they will), it could well protect itself from the notion of "merely looking at product from the standpoint of a distributor." It could well become a Canadian giant.

MCPS Updates Licensing To Include Synchronization

LONDON — The Mechanical Copyright Protection Society has introduced its new licensing scheme to collect fees connected with synchronization rights.

The method was officially inaugurated August 9, and is administered by the society's licensing department. It centers mainly on the producers of film, television and all forms of audio-visual productions, and though principally concerned with the synchronization right, also affects mechanical rights involved with the recording of music in radio productions and non-synchronization slide-tape or filmstrip presentation. It has no bearing on BBC-TV or radio usage of music covered by "blanket" license.

Any producer wishing to incorporate music controlled by MCPS members will receive from the society a formal offer of license document, assuming that the musical works involved have been cleared by the copyright controllers concerned. In this respect, MCPS also represents the major recording companies in instances where re-recordings of their records are made for inclusion in films, audio-visual and radio soundtracks and the like.

The actual mechanical copyright license can only be secured by acceptance of the offer, and acceptance entails full payment of the fees required.

MCPS regards the new system as a major step forward on two counts. First of all, it avoids the unsatisfactory situation of furnishing licenses before payment to

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
