The news this week was the most startling in a long time. First of all, there was word that Warner Communications, Inc. (WCI) was in negotiations to merge PolyGram Records with its own record group, which already includes the Warner Bros., Elektra/Asylum, Atlantic and Geffen labels. Then, equally significant, Motown will leave the ranks of the indies in favor of branch distribution by MCA.

Both developments indicate the seriousness of the shake-out now taking place in the distribution arena. If the WCI-PolyGram merger is carried out, the industry will lose one of its branch operations the very same one that only a few short years ago carried the two best-selling albums of all time, the soundtracks to Saturday Night Fever and Grease. The speculation that the recession has caused such a drop in unit volume that a major branch would have to fold may soon come to pass.

Even more serious in its implications for the in-

dustry is the Motown-MCA plan. The last remaining major independent label, Motown now appears pinched by circumstance. With the recent demise of Pickwick, Motown was forced to assume some distribution responsibilities and rearrange others at a time when its 25th Anniversary albums and the good publicity generated by its recent TV special made its product particularly hot.

However, how will the independent distributors continue to exist? A few years ago, the ranks of indie-distributed labels included A&M, Casablanca, RSO, Chrysalis, Arista and Motown; but with this new deal, the last of these will have gone to the branches. Then what?

Cash Box certainly does not intend to cast blame about, but the implications of these actions are clear the record industry is about to undergo a very significant change. Let's hope that it will end up as something we can all still live with.

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ON THE COVER

MCA recording group The Fixx snuck up on the new music-conscious American teens last year with the intoxicatingly dreamy single "Stand Or Fall" from its debut album, "Shuttered Room The song clung tenaciously to AOR lists throughout the country, growing like a vine, until it pulled such other tracks as "Red Skies (At Night)" with it. The result was that



'Shuttered Room" became a certifiable new rock sleeper, hanging on the charts for the better part of this year, until the English band came out with the follow-up, "Reach The Beach."

If "Shuttered Room" served notice that The Fixx was a force to be reckoned with, the success of "Reach The Beach" clearly indicates that the band has arrived. After seven weeks, the first single, "Saved By Zero," stands at #33 bullet on the Cash Box Top 100 Singles chart, while the LP has moved to exactly the same position on the Top 100 Albums chart. As The Fixx — Cy Curnin, Adam Woods, Jamie West-Oram and Rupert Greenall — say on the opening track from "Reach The Beach," "One thing leads to another.

WCI And PolyGram Examine Possible Worldwide Merger

NEW YORK — Warner Communications Inc. (WCI) and the PolyGram Group last week revealed that they are discussing a restructuring that would see WCI gain the controlling interest in PolyGram Records. The proposed deal would create two companies: a Warner/PolyGram company for territories outside the U.S., of which WCI would own 50%, and a U.S. company, of which WCI would own 80%.

Nelther company would comment beyond a brief printed statement released by WCI last Wednesday, June 29, and a WCI spokesman declined to suggest a possible timetable for completion of a deal.

With the PolyGram group presently owned jointly by N.V. Philips of The Netherlands and Slemans AG of West Germany, the proposed merger would see Siemans taking a decreasing role in the record business.

Among the largest changes inherent in

the proposal are the replacement of WEA International by the new Warner/PolyGram outside the U.S., and the distribution of PolyGram here In the U.S. by WEA Distribution Corp. PolyGram presently maintains 10 sales offices around the country.

and they are expected to be selectively absorbed by WEA. There was also speculation that WEA would be moving out of its present branch offices and into the more modern PolyGram warehouse facilities.

It was not known how the proposed

division, which has its own sales staff, or PolyGram Special Imports. WEA International presently has its own exclusive import arrangement with Jem Records for domestic sale of foreign titles.

merger would affect PolyGram's classics

It was stressed that PolyGram Records U.S. will maintain its identify as a self-contained record company, with Guenter Hensler continuing as president and chief executive officer.

The Warner/PolyGram company will also succeed WEA International as the home video distributor in most countries outside the United States of the film libraries controlled by WCi.

The music publishing interests of both parties — Warner Bros. Music and Chappell Music respectively — will not be a part of the proposed merger.

Although a WCi spokesman would not single out any overriding factor in that company's decision to acquire a controlling

Motown Leaves Ranks Of Indies, Signs U.S. Distrib Pact With MCA

LOS ANGELES — Following a swirl of speculation, Motown Records last week entered into a U.S. distribution deal with MCA Records Group. The deal, which takes the last of the major independent labels to the branch system, was signed 1 a.m., Friday, July 1.

Motown's decision to go to branch distribution — which effectively removes the last high-volume label from the ranks of the indies — follows on the heels of similar moves by Chrysalls (to CBS) and Arista (to

RCA) and could be a devastating blow to the independent distributors. (The loss of the Chrysalis and Arista accounts was acknowledged as the final blow that caused the demise of the Pickwick independent distribution operation.)

No timetable was given for the actual switch from its independent distributors to MCA, nor were there any announcements on arrangements for returns. However, it is believed that Motown's move to MCA's

Talk Dominates Top Markets In Spring Arb Book

NEW YORK — Talk radio remained the dominant format in top markets according to advance Spring '83 Arbitron ratings results. Talk outlets in New York, Los Angeles, Chicago and San Francisco were #1 respectively, with black/urban and contemporary music stations running a close second. In another significant trend, beautiful music experienced healthy gains in New York and Los Angeles, while FM outlet KJQY in San Diego retained its market lead.

Numbers reported represent Monday to Sunday listening, 6 a.m. to 12 mldnight average quarterly hour shares, 12-plus.

In New York, WOR-AM took the top spot from news outlet WINS with a 5.2, up from Winter's 4.9. WINS dropped from 5.4 to a 4.8. All-news WCBS was also down, 4.6 to 4.3. The three-way race for the urban contemporary share remained tight as WBLS regained its lead and actually tied WOR for #1 with a 5.2, also up from a 4.9. WKTU traded numbers with WBLS, dropping to a

PolyGram To Ship CDs At \$11-\$12 Wholesale

LOS ANGELES — On Aug. 1, PolyGram Records will ship between 40,000 and 50,000 digital Compacts Discs (CDs) into its account base in Chicago, officially beginning its CD launch here in the U.S., according to Emiel Petrone, PolyGram vice president, marketing, West Coast, and U.S. Compact Disc coordinator. As previously announced, PolyGram is making available 100 CD titles from its Casabianca, Deutsche Grammophon, Mercury London, Philips, Polydor, RSO and Verve labels as part of the August debut (Cash Box, June 18).

In a Cash Box interview last week, Petrone revealed further detalls regarding PolyGram's CD roll-out, such as wholesale pricing, packaging, merchandising, sales and distribution. Focusing first on the latter, he expanded on the plans for the establishment of 200 "flagship" outlets across the country to preview PolyGram CD product.

"We are presently in the process of talking to retailers through our sales

Retailers Foresee Continued Upturn, If Not Turnaround

NEW YORK — On the eve of the third quarter, retallers contacted by **Cash Box** see a resurgence of interest in recorded music fueled by such factors as strong hit product, exposure of new music via TV and radio, a slack off in video games sales, the increasing availability of compact discs and a general upturn in the economy. And while few dealers were willing to go out on a limb and declare that the music industry is at the brink of a full-fledged turnaround, all felt that the recent pickup in business goes far beyond the mega-hit strength of a few titles

"People are getting turned on again," declared Howard Appelbaum, vice president of the Kemp Mill Records chain based in Beltsville, Md. He joined practically everyone in marvelling at the huge success of Michael Jackson's "Thriller," but also noted that lesser hits were showing greater strength than before. "Thriller" is the biggest record ever for us, double the

biggest one before. But even though the gap between that and our #2 record is big, when you look at the Top 20 for us, even #20 sells X amount plus 50% more from the #20 last year."

At Budget Tapes & Records headquarters in Denver, chain head Evan Lasky observed a significant change in the normal sales pattern where the top-selling album far outsold its immediate competition, and called it a good sign. "Interestingly enough, the difference between the #1, #2 and #3 is pretty big historically, but look at the board: The Police and Def Leppard are tied. If we can have Def Leppard, which has been out a long time, doing as well as a new Police album, that's a really healthy situation."

Lasky went on to note a fairly even spread in his list of top sellers between brand new releases like "Synchronicity" and Loverboy's "Keep It Up," and more mature fare such as "Thriller," the Flashdance soundtrack, and ZZ Top's "Eliminator."

"Those are the kind of things that mean

unit sales are up," said Lasky. "When you see the same #1 for 20 weeks, you know that unit sales are dropping. In an economy and price situation where you are dealing with single unit sales, a stagnant Top Five shows that people are coming in in smaller increments every week."

Norman Hunter, buyer for the 146-store Record Bar chain, also noted a decreasing gap between the top-selling album and the one below it. In his chain's case, the nearly 6,000 "Thriller"s sold last week bettered Def Leppard's "Pyromania" by only 95 pieces.

"The current picture is definitely more than a one-record turnaround," continued Hunter. "For example, the new Men At Work album dropped two spaces this week for us, but not because it's slowing down, but because other records are speeding us."

Other merchants have witnessed a similar phenomenon. Bob Sturgess, who heads Coconuts Tapes & Records stores in Jacksonville, Fla. and Atlanta, reported increased sales across the board. "There's no rise in sales on our #1 or Top 10," he said. "A lot more artists are being bought."

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Senate Approves Bill Regulating Record Rentals

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Legislation giving copyright owners of audio recordings and underlying musical works the right to authorize commercial rentals was unanimously approved by the Senate June 28. It had previously passed without opposition through the full Senate Judiciary Committee on June 16 and, prior to that, by the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Patents, Copyrights and Trademarks on May 26

S-32, the Record Rental Amendment, was sponsored by Sen. Charles Mathias (R-Md.). Mathias is also the sponsor of a similar bill, still pending, which would revise the first sale doctrine for videocassettes and videodiscs. Unlike the Record Rental Amendment, though, which faced little or no resistance since there are only an estimated 250 record outlets presently renting in the U.S., S-33 has been the subject of a hard-fought struggle between video dealers and manufacturers,

AFM Concludes Biennial Confab

LOS ANGELES — More than 750 delegates representing over 400 locals gathered in Phoenix recently to address resolutions and recommendations aimed at improving services of the American Federation of Musicians (AFM), including a measure that would give the union's international board jurisdiction over traveling musicians.

The traveling artists issue was a key topic according to Victor Fuentealba, who was reelected president of the AFM, and was entered as recommendation by the union's International Executive Board. The measure was approved overwhelmingly.

Another key Issue was annual meetings. A resolution that the AFM delegates gathering

be held annually was resoundingly defeated.

New officers of the AFM include Thomas Kenny, voted vice president. Bob Manners, president of Local 47 in Los Angeles, and Sam Follo, an official in the union's Clarksburg, W.Va. office, were also elected to the executive committee during the convention, which was held June 27-29.

honored by the group, which traditionally tributes business leaders in the music industry. Walter Yetnikoff will be executive chairman of the function, and Phil Kahl will be dinner chairman. Dinner co-chairmen(s) are Bob Altschuler, Bob Austin, Ellis Kern and Theodora Zavin. Morris Levy is chairman emeritus.

Clapton Wins U.K. Silver Clef Award

LONDON — A grand luncheon for the Silver Clef awards was held at the InterContinental Hotel. The proceedings were organized by the charity Nordoff-Robbins Music Therapy. Princess Michael of Kent presented this year's Silver Clef award to Eric Clapton for outstanding achievement in the British music business

Previous holders of this award have included Cliff Richard, Pink Floyd, The Who, Genesis, Elton John and The Rolling Stones.

This year's luncheon raised 35,000 pounds (\$52,000).

Bob Dickins, chairman of WEA Records U.K. was successful in his election to the new council of the British Phonographic Industry (BPI). Another new member representing the independent labels was Lain McNay, head of Cherry Red Records.

McNay, who is calling for tighter control of chart hyping, told Cash Box: "I want to see much heavier fines for hyping the charts. I think fines of 20,000 pounds (\$30,000) would be appropriate. I would also like to see the BPI made more attractive to independent labels. For instance, a lot of labels that are not members do not know they can get government grants for taking out a stand at MIDEM.

ALBUM - Joan Jett and The Blackhearts - Blackheart/MCA MCA-5437 — Producers: Richle Cordell and Kenny Laguna — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

Jett -- In all her chunka-chunka, fuzz tone, three-chord rock glory — goes over familiar turf on her third solo album and first for MCA. First of all, there are the bynow-obligatory covers: a buzzing, monotone version of Siy Stone's "Everday People" and a Chuck Berrylsh run through Bobby Lewls' 1961 hit, "Tossin' & Turnin'." Secondly, there's felsty Joan's own pouty rockers, sung In her inimitably raspy bark and given the appropriately "dirty" production touch by Messrs. Cordell and Laguna. Lotsa hard rock high points here: "The French Song," with its whispery verses and cranking axe; the Sex Pistols-meets-Scorpions "Had Enough" and the classic "Coney Island Whiteflsh," with Jett howling "Scum bagl" throughout the chorus. Vacation." As you would expect, the music is impressionistic, full of the in-mind zaniness that has made Zappa a rock legend. Conducted by Kent Nagano, The London Symphony is challenged to bring an element of classicism to this rangy, often ambient work. But the high-tech pressing should intrigue Zappa fans and aficionados of the classics alike. Don't look for this at AOR.

C'EST C BON — Carlene Carter — Epic BFE 38663 — Producer: Roger Bechirian — List: None — Bar Coded

Cariene Carter remains a wonderful puzzle on "C'Est C Bon." She never lost the throaty yet supple country quality she gained in her early teen years singing gospei and bluegrass, yet she wraps that slightly twangy mezzo around modern pop arrangements here, courtesy of keyboardist/producer Roger Bechirlan (Elvis Costello, Squeeze, etc.). Bechirian's band, Blanket of Secrecy, forms most of the backing group and damned if what appears to be a contradiction in styles turns out to be oddly seductive. "Meant It For A Minute" sounds like Carter's husband Nick Lowe (even if she wrote It with partner and Noise To Go bassist James Eller), as does the sultry "Don't Give My Heart A Break' (which she did indeed write with Lowe and Paul Carrack). But "I'm The Kind A Sugar Daddy Likes" has a light funkiness, "Third Time Charm" is a synth pop ballad and "One Way Ticket" is a brassy pop/rocker. And that's just to name a few.

EMOTION — DFX2 — MCA MCA-36000 — Producers: Howard Steele, Jon Scott and Jim Blake — List: 6.98 — Bar Coded

Southern Callfornia rock radio (particularly KROQ) listeners will remember the title track from "Emotion" as one of the last summer's most heavily played independent records. The track, which was found on a sampler of unsigned San Diego rock bands, sucked 'em in with it's catchy Stones-like quality. It proved to be the springboard for the brothers Farage, Douglas and David (hence DFX2), to this MCA mini LP debut. It's basically garage rock with a nod to Mick Jagger In Doug Farage vocals (check out "Something's Always Happening").

NIGHT CALLER — A.P.B. — Carousel/MCA — MCA-39003 — Producer: Howard "Buck" Steele — List: 6.98 — Bar Coded

Thought A.P.B. stood for Ali Points Bulletin? Gotcha. A.P.B. Is the Artimus Pyle Band, Pyle being the former drummer for Lynyrd Skynyrd. Like the Rossington Collins Band, the last Skynyrd offshoot, A.P.B. features a sexy ms. in front with a throaty blues rock voice. Karen Blackmon isn't quite as gritty as RCB's Dale Krantz (she leans more toward Bonnle Raitt), but then A.P.B. is going more for the middle-of-the-rock audience — the Quarterflash crowd. There are cookers here, to be sure, such as "Tight Spot," by this debut is dominated by mld-tempo pop/rockers.

HAND OF KINDNESS — Richard Thompson — Hannibal HNLP 1313 — Producer: Joe Boyd — List: 8.98

To the critics and aficianados of traditional electric music, a.k.a. folk rock, Richard Thompson Is a man who needs no introduction. Queen Ida

When Ida Guillory walked on stage at the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles to accept a Grammy Award back in February, it was the culmination of a most improbable success story. A 55-year-old housewife from Daly City outside of San Francisco, Queen Ida, along with her Bon Temps Zydeco Band, had gone from playing at private parties and dances to the stage of the Shrine (and later the US Festival) — all because she kept the music of her Louisiana heritage alive as a hobby while she raised her children.

Her award-winning LP was entitled "Queen Ida And The Bon Temps Zydeco Band On Tour," and the music was a unique blend of a variety of styles and influences from the bayou country of Louisiana. "The roots of zydeco music come from the French-Canadian," Ida explains, "Nova Scotia, to be exact. The music was brought into Louisiana by the Acadians ('cajuns') when they were forced into exile.

"What we have done is take the basic cajun music and build from there. We've added a little rhythm & blues, a little Caribbean influence, a little reggae, some country & western, a little rock..."

And the result has been an infectious brand of very lively, danceable music that defies categorization. The lead instrument, after all, is Queen Ida's accordion — something that she picked up as a child growing up in Lake Charles, La.

"I've been playing professionally for about eight years now," she explains, "but I've been around the music since my teens. Back then, though, it was more of a pastime, just something to do.

"The music was passed from one generation to the next, and on and on. That's how it's kept alive up until now. We're trying to update it a little — that transition from folk music to something a little more on the commercial side."

And by all accounts, Queen Ida has been very successful at that. She and the band have kept busy since the Grammys — with a European tour ("our best European audience is in Scandinavia, where they also have a long



tradition of accordion music") and an appearance at the country segment of the recent US Festival — and now a new LP, "Queen Ida And Her Zydeco Band In San Francisco," her fifth for the GNP/Crescendo label, is ready for release.

In addition, she and the band will appear in the soon-to-be-released film Rumble Fish — a job they got while playing at a party that happened to be hosted by the film's director, Francis Ford Coppola.

"I have been kept so busy that I haven't actually gotten together with myself on being a music 'star' yet," Ida remarks of everything that has happened to her since the beginning of the year. "I'm still just out there. I'm really overjoyed, but I've been so busy that I just haven't had a chance to sit down and have a cup of coffee and a cigarette and look at the Grammy and say, "Wowl Here's my Grammy.""

For now, though, Queen Ida and her Bon Temps Zydeco Band — consisting of her brother Wilbur on washboard, (the only member of the band with a Louisiana heritage Ilke Ida), Peter Allen on fiddle and guitar, Dennis Galloway on bass guitar, Gregory Depew on drums and Douglas Drayson on guitar — will remain busy with more of the music that caused San Francisco Chronicle columnist Peter Levine to dub her "Queen Ida — Queen of the Mardi Gras" at the beginning of her career.

Lights," with his ex-wife, Linda Thompson, received much-deserved acclaim and set the stage for "Hand Of KIndness." Dance radio and club spinners will eat and gnaw at various slices from Cheri's "Love Stew." hispers / Chi-Lites

RADIO CITY MUSIC HALL, NYC Solar/Elektra Records' Whispers did not disappoint a well-dressed SRO crowd that came ready to party up the group's return to the stage at one of New York's great showplaces. Their fine-tuned trademark harmonies, "Old-soul" choreography, and crack back-up band led by horn player John Parrish took the stage with both fury and sensitivity. The show came complete with emcee Von West, who exhorted the audience in traditional R&B style while the band played a show-bizzy-yet-still funky introductory medley of hits. In its entirety the show's pacing was as balanced as the "Dancin'/Romancin" format of recent LPs.

Although the Whispers just celebrated their 20th anniversary in show business, the live set consisted of their most popular material since (and including) the comeback success of 1979's "And The Beat Goes On." While one may wonder what happened to early 1970s vocal classics like "Bingo" and "Mother For My Children," the show never lacked for musical excitement.

Fans were in an equal frenzy over dance numbers like the aforementioned "Beat" and "It's A Love Thing", and the sweet harmonies of ballads, including "Say Yes" and "Lady." The twins Walter and Wallace "Scotty" Scott acted as group leaders and were in control throughout the 70-minute performance. At one point they invited a woman up on stage to sing, and member Leaveil Degree was given the honors of choosing someone from the front row. Walter and Scotty traded lines in an impressive vocal duel for the invited guest's affections, and proved that beyond the clap machines and bank of keyboards the voices live on.

There was dancing in the aisles, with a number of people rushing up on stage in the excitement. Added security was evident and a change from last year's practice of couples being brought on stage to dance with the group. Nevertheless, it was a smooth, heartfelt love affair between the Whispers and the crowd. There were roses tossed into the first few rows at the close of the show, and each Whisper took the time to reach down and touch hands.

Opening act The Chl-Lites re-kindled some memories with thrilling renditions of their classics including "Oh Girl," "Have You Seen Her" and "A Lonely Man." The drawback to hearing these chestnuts again was their relegation to an obligatory medley format. The three original Chi-Lites — Eugene Record, Marshall Thompson and Robert "Squirrel" Lester — were in fine form, however, and could also sound as contemporary as they looked with a thumping version of their current LARC hit, "Bad Motor Scooter."

acy J. Dalton

THE LONE STAR CAFE, N.Y.C. — It's not often that a country singer, male or female, comes out on a club with Lacy J. Dalton's self-assurance and vitality and proceeds to merrily sing straight through, which is pretty much what she did before an appreciative Lone Star audience. The only interruptions came every now and then when she took a slug from the many beer bottles raised her way by fans at the front, and she did this with equal gusto. Then again, as the lyrics to her western

swing song, "You Can't Take The Texas Out Of Me," state, she takes her Jack Daniels straight.

None of this is meant to suggest that Dalton is little more than one hell of a honky tonk girl, though this was ably demonstrated with gutsy renditions of such big hits for her as "Wild Turkey," in which she threw in a little kazoo accompaniment; her signature song "Hillibilly Girl With The Blues;" and first hit "Crazy Blue Eyes," which she called the "bad girls" national anthem and said was about "falling for those mayericks who don't settle down."

But other hit material like "Hard Times" and "16th Avenue" showed her range as both singer and songwriter. "Everybody Makes Mistakes," which she wrote with her producer Billy Sherrill, was especially moving. A lovely, poignant melody and statement to begin with, Dalton's clenched tremble, especially in the lower notes of her low range, fully brought out the very real character in her voice, a quality that is hard to come by in any type of music.

One other noteworthy difference between Dalton and too many other country acts is that she brings with her a very tight backup group. Her current Dalton Gang was as competent in supporting her on her current single and album title track, "Dream Baby," the old Roy Orbison ballad, as it was on the hard-edged set-closing rocker, "Dixie Devil," which Dalton wrote for Charlie Daniels.

L.A. SPORTS ARENA — During U2's revelatory set at the US Festival less than a month prior to the Island recording group's triumphant return appearance in Southern California, the intensely energetic lead singer Bono stated emphatically that the Irish quartet was "not an English fashion band." If anyone in the Sports Arena audience needed a reminder, Bono again made the point clear when he said, "This is not Duran Duran."

Indeed, U2 is as far from the clump of preening synth pop bands overrunning America and Europe as you could possibly get while still falling under that allencompassing label, "new music." Aside from the obvious musical differences (U2 does not resort to innocuous electronic noodlings and pre-programmed discoid rhythms), there is more earnestness and conviction in a single lyric from U2's several uplifting anthems than in most of their contemporaries' entire repertoire.

That conviction is born of some deeplyheld beliefs on the part of the group's members (three of the four are avowed Christians). Yet U2 never preaches or proselytizes; religious commitment is more often than not expressed simply in terms of a life-affirming idealism, as opposed to the "chic" cynicism that is more prevalent in punk and new wave. That may make U2 seem naive in the eyes of critical hipsters, but it's precisely that positivism which gives the band's music such undeniable force on record and in concert.

At the Sports Arena, Bono, guitarist The Edge, bassist Adam Clayton, and drummer Larry Mullen put on a truly passionate performance, the sort that could only be pulled off by a band that honestly believes in the redeeming power of rock. Because it is still young, exuberance at times won out over the better judgment, particularly in the case of Bono's grand, but nevertheless sincere, gestures. At the US Festlval, the singer scaled the dangerously high stage rigging to wave the group's trademark white flag of peace from the edge of the canopy. Here, he ran through the Arena's second tier with the flag before an over-

zealous fan ripped it from the staff, then teetered along the narrow rim of the loge before dropping into the awalting arms of the main floor audience.

It was an exciting moment, to be sure, but it's doubtful whether the largely teenage crowd saw it as much more than a wild stunt, certainly not the act of trust that Bono intended it to be.

In fact, it wasn't the only time that the bond of trust that U2 sought to establish with its audience here was broken. As has become increasingly more common at punk and new wave shows, kids were continually rushing onstage to show their affection for Bono and the group or merely to grab a few minutes in the spotlight. At times, Bono good naturedly played along, returning the kisses and hugs of a few girls or, in one case, hoisting one of the younger stage crashers aloft on his shoulders during a tune.

Mostly, though, such antics were merely disruptive and distracting. During the moving "Sunday Bloody Sunday," a song inspired by Ireland's internal strife, Bono halted the number after some knucklehead jumped in front of him and started flalling about

While U2 was visibly agitated by a few incidents, it handled the situation as well as could be expected and delivered a stunning set, highlighted by "New Year's Day," "I Will Follow," "Gloria" and "Seconds," as well as "Sunday." michael glynn

ameo/Dazz Band

GREEK THEATRE, L.A. — Open air funk concerts have had their successes. The early Kool Jazz shows and the Budweiser SuperFests have been able to move large stadiums in a house party way. At the recent Greek Theatre appearance of two formidable bands — Cameo and The Dazz Band — funk was in the air, but not nearly as many people had to be impressed.

The outdoor venue seemed cavernous, as many of the 4,800 plus seats were conspicuously empty. But Dazz and Cameo managed to fill the alr with a professional, if not exuberant display of black pop musicianship.

Headliner Cameo fared the best as it hit a tasteful but sparsely decorated stage with an energy level normally reserved for soldout, screaming, foot-stomping audiences. But the Larry Blackmon-led, Atlanta-based group exhorted the audience to "Just Be Yourself," let the hair down and not worry about sweating in the chilly night air.

Cameo's smart mixture of moonshinebarrel-funk and new rock whlmsiness was a propelling force throughout the set, and the perpetual motion that has become the band's trademark underscored its determination to make the show a success.

Blackmon, with core members Tomi Jenkins, Nathan Leftenant and Charlie Singleton are a galvinizing quartet that could very well lead Cameo into more adventurous bookings with arty rock bands using funk and R&B as a base of expression. Even though the band can drop to the slow-dance floor with ballads like the current single, "I Can't Help Falling In Love With You," it would undoubtedly be a pleasant surprise among enterprising rock/pop fans.

That is not to say that the Dazz Band, with its sophisticated rhythmic grooves, piercing falsettos and gut-level lyrics, was not a good opener. But Dazz, more than Cameo, suffered from audience apathy as an opening act. Closing with the Grammynominated "Let It Whip," the group saved its best for last.

Supertramp Sets U.S., Canadian Tour Itinerary

After the 28-date all-outdoor European leg, Supertramp will bring its \$5 million worth of sound and visual equipment to the U.S. for its domestic swing in August and September. The stage set includes four projection screens for live and filmed footage.

Joining the band on tour will be session players Scott Paige and Fred Mandel.

Moss — which pioneered budget classical cassettes and handles the Danish Storyville jazz label here — makes its first move into street music with three Celluloid 12-inches by Fab 5 Freddy, Infinity and Grand Master D.St. and the Afrika Bambeataa-produced Time Zone. All are outstanding, and only serve to whet the appetite for other projects under the deal, which includes albums on the OAO label, an independent sister to Celluloid owned by Celluloid head Jean Karakos, New York manager Roger Trilling, recording

First five albums from OAO are expected in the next two weeks and include titles by Massacre featuring Fred Frith, Fred Maher and Bill Laswell; The Golden Palominos with Anton Feir, Arto Lindsay, John Zorn, Mark Miller, David Moss and Jamaaladeen Tacuma; percussionist Daniel Ponce with Orlando Puntilla and Paquito D'Rivera; guitarist Derek Bailey with George Lewis and Zorn and violinist Billy Bang with a large ensemble conducted by Butch Morris and featuring David Murray, Charles Tyler, Sonny Murray and Wilbur Morris. First Case Using Stronger Copyright Laws Closes With 11 Convictions

NEW YORK — "Operation Copy Cat," the first tape piracy actions falling within the new increased penalties amendments to the Copyright Law, ended last week with the sentencing of Robert Earl HIII in Wilmington, N.C. to three years imprisonment and a \$9,000 fine for his conviction of criminal copyright infringement and trafficking in counterfelt labels for phonorecords. Hill became the 11th North Carolinian to be sentenced as a result of the undercover investigation jointly conducted by the U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of North Carolina and the North Carolina Field Division of the FBI.

The other 10 who were Indicted with Hill on April 5 had been convicted and sentenced previously within the past month. They are Julian Clark Tutt, of Kinston, who was sentenced to three years Imprisonment for his conviction of criminal copyright Infringement; Charles Edward Smith, of Monroe, who was sentenced to three years imprisonment and a \$25,000 fine for his conviction of criminal copyright infringement: John L. Reed, cf Gastonia, who was sentenced to six months imprisonment and three years probation for his conviction of criminal copyright infringement; Kenneth Wayne Rogers, of Wilmington, who was sentenced to a three-year suspended sentence, four years of probation and a \$25,000 fine for his conviction of criminal copyright infringement; Sylvia Shaw Rogers, of Wilmington, who was sentenced to one year suspended sentence, two years of probation and a \$15,000 fine for her conviction of criminal copyright infringement; Amanda Hill, of Kinston, who was sentenced to \$1,000 fine and three years of probation including 10 hours a month in community service for her conviction of criminal copyright infringement: Robin Rogers, of Kinston, who was sentenced to one year of probation including 10 hours a month in community service for her conviction of criminal copyright infringment; Robin Stroud, of Kinston, who was sentenced to six months in jail and five years probation for his conviction of criminal copyright infringement; Vallen Wright, of Franklin, who was sentenced to probation and a \$3,000 fine for his conviction of conspiracy to commit criminal copyright infringement; and Johnny Stroud, of Kinston, who was sentenced to one year of probation including 10 hours a month in community service for his conviction of aiding and abetting criminal copyright infringement. All of the defendants pleaded guilty to felony counts except for Amanda Hill, Robin Rogers and Johnny Stroud, who pleaded guilty to misdemeanor counts.

The anti-plracy operation climaxed with raids on five locations in the Kinston area on June 29, 1982 and an additional on Oct. 22, 1982. The June 29 raids were on three premises and one vehicle owned or controlled by Robert Earl Hill and one location owned by Tutt, and netted vast quantities of raw materials, manufacturing equipment, masters, finished product and business records involved in the reproduction and distribution of alleged counterfeit and pirate 8-tracks, cassettes and videocassettes.

Lots Of Contraband

The Oct. 22 raid at the premises of Kenneth Wayne Rogers and Sylvia Shaw Rogers took in approximately 4,477 audio cassettes, 463 reei-to-reei tapes and 489 video cassettes, which were identified as being used as masters for duplication purposes. Wayne Rogers had reportedly operated a record and cassette mall order company for over nine years, during which time he mailed allegedly bootleg product throughout the U.S. and abroad.

Under the new Piracy and Counterfelting Amendments Act of 1982, which was signed by President Reagan on May 24, 1982, sound recording, motion picture and audiovisual pirates and counterfelters can be sentenced for up to five years imprisonment and/or fines up to \$250,000, Samuel T. Currin, the U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of North Carolina, hoped that the sentences in "Operation Copy Cat" would have a deterrent effect on future piracy activities. "I am pleased that we could bring the first prosecution under the Piracy and Counterfelting Amendments Act of 1982 in the Eastern District of North Carolina, where sound recording piracy has been a serious problem." he said.

Sam Moore: Return Of A Soul **Man From Obscurity, Drugs**

LOS ANGELES - "I had almost given up -I was just living from day to day," recalls Sam Moore, from the original Sam & Dave R&B duo, of his bout with drug addiction that lasted more than a decade. "I didn't care that much about performing, but I'd get numb enough to go on stage to get money to get some more of the stuff.

For the last few years, Moore has been concentrating his energies on revitalizing his health rather than rejuvenating his career, which has languished since the final split with long-time partner Dave Prater in the mid-'70s.

Having tried a spectrum of treatment for his drug problem which plagued him since the height of his career with the then major, now classic "Soul Man" single, it wasn't until November 1981 that Moore began his trek back through detoxification. What cold turkey, methadone and other chemical treatments failed to do, Naltrexone, a littleknown drug that is essentially experimen-

tal, started a nearly two-year process of detoxification.

The non-addictive drug blocks the effects of all opiate drugs and, unlike methodone, does not have the nauseating side effects. Those who have been on opiate drugs like heroin, morphine or codeine, and even cocaine, before starting treatment must go through a seven-day detoxification period using either Darvon-

"I take care of myself now," Moore said. "I eat well and have gone from 120 lbs. to 200 lbs. and now I'm down to about 183.
"I exercise every day," he continued,

and now I have a chance for recommitment to my craft."

But work, in Moore's words, "has been all too infrequent," and his trip back to the studio has been one fraught with obstacles. Partner Dave is back on the road with another Sam and has been playing R&B clubs nationwide under the old Sam & Dave moniker, thus his bookings have

Another factor is the addict image that he is now trying to shed. "A lot of people

were surprised to discover I had a habit," Moore recounts, noting that "word of mouth in the industry became a powerful weapon against me. But you think you'll be there (on top) all your life.'

Looking back on that perspective, Moore's voice became distant as he reflected on years of small club gigging leading to little gain and a growing rift between himself and partner Dave.

After recording a string of hits for Roulette, Stax and later Atlantic Records through the late '50s to the late '60s, including "You Don't Know Like I Know," "I Take What i Want," "Hold On I'm Coming," "Soul Man" and "When Something Is Wrong With My Baby," the duo hit a drought, creatively and commercially, leading to the first break-up.

"It was during that slow period, which scared me to death," Moore said, "that I realized how easy it was to be vulnerable in this business.

"I started getting numb on alcohol and drugs," he continued. "I wanted to be accepted by fans and the industry, just to be with the boys.

And although Moore joined Prater for a second incarnation of the Sam & Dave duo in 1971, the thrill was gone and the vocal magic that had made them soul men legends was a figment of history.

PolyGram to Ship 40,000-50,000 CDs In Launch, Sets \$11.75-12.75 Wholesale

organization to find the outlets among the various chains in the major markets which have the highest store traffic and the most affluent customers," sald Petrone. "Those will be our 'flagship stores' . . . In many cases, we'll have a number of flagship stores in certain citles, such as New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. For instance, in L.A., we'd have a Tower (store), a Licorice Pizza, a Music Plus, and a Wherehouse. We're in touch with the Russ Solomons and Lou Fogelmans to determine which locations would be best suited and we're looking to have those 'flagship stores' set by the third week of August."

Due to PolyGram's initially limited supply of CDs for the U.S. (in spite of anticipated production of five million discs at its Hanover, West Germany plant this year), Petrone noted, "We won't have the Compact Disc available to racks or onestops in the beginning. However, limited supply isn't the only reason. "Approximately 1.5 million Compact Discs will be produced for the U.S. market," Petrone explained, "but that number may change according to such factors as demand and the number of players produced . . . A lot hinges on the coordination between the hardware and software manufacturers. We realize this, which is why we're going through 'flagship' dealers in the roll-out. They'll be able to most effectively cross-promote and crossmerchandise software and hardware . . . We're strongly urging that these 200 stores work closely with hardware dealers in their

He added that the job of "effecting this relationship between CD software and hardware manufactures" falls upon the recently-formed Compact Disc Group, under Recording Industry Assn. of America (RIAA) vice president and executive director Stephen Traiman, who is presently functioning as CDG coordinator (Cash Box, June 18).

As PolyGram's senior director, Compact Disc Project, Hans Gout indicated during the launch announcement at the Consumer Electronics Show in Chicago, "flagship stores" will be supplied with an array of point of purchase materials. Among these will be silk banners, posters and a nine-minute audio/visual presentation, providing a description of the digital process and a brief overview of available PolyGram titles. Petrone pointed out that "PolyGram branches in 14 major cities will be equipped with the a/v presentation."

PolyGram will be packaging its CD titles in a 6x12-inch clear plastic, heat-sealed container, which Petrone said would be color-coded by label. The clear pack will allow customers to see the opened jewel

box, which serves as the permanent housing for the disc, in addition to a handcolored illustration, information about the recording and a two-color, generic message summarizing the digital CD technology.

The 6x12 clear plastic packaging, we believe, has a number of advantages," Petrone stated, holding up a sample. "First, it allows the consumer to see the disc itself, which is attractive and sexy-looking in itself. Second, the 6x12 size tells the dealer he doesn't have to put under lock and key: two units fit comfortably side by side in existing racks . . . Or individual racks or display modules can be created by the retailer to fit the layout of the store. It's pretty versatile."

Packaging had been the subject of controversy and debate among manufacturers and retailers some months ago, but it was generally resolved that a 6x12-inch configuration should be the industry standard.

"We had to be sensitive to the middle retailer who wants something pilfer-proof, that would fit into established fixtures," Petrone explained. "Each of the packages (from the various labels) will be different." For example, we've got a plastic pack, while Warner Bros. is utilizing a paper box. However, the size will be standard.

Previously, PolyGram projected that the consumer price range for the CD in the U.S. would be between \$17 and \$20. Petrone stated that this was based on an anticipated markup of \$5 to \$7 over PolyGram's wholesale price of \$11.75 for contemporary pop and rock titles and \$12.75 for classical recordings.

(Eighty of PolyGram's initial 100 CD titles are classic, which means that the bulk of PolyGram's premiere Compact Discs will be wholesale priced at \$12.75.)

Looking toward the future, Petrone concluded, "Hopefully, by mid-'84, we will simultaneously release albums in the CD, LP and cassette configurations. Quite a bit depends on the number of players sold but we remain very optimistic. By the end of 1983, 650,000 players are expected to be sold just in Europe and Japan . . . In the U.S., we're looking at sales of between 50,000 and 100,000 players by the end of this year. WEA, CBS, A&M and others will all have CD product out this year, totaling approximately 450 titles, 200 of which will be PolyGram.

"The Compact Disc Group is talking about exhibits for the Winter CES in Las Vegas and generic merchandising materials for the CD and the CDG will be meeting in August and October to plan those and other things. Everyone has been very responsive. Now we're actually moving into gear.

They must do something to protect their large investment in the video, but most are loath to embark on an overhead expansion when the industry is still feeling its way out of the recession. We've the alternative solution."

Second Vision will aid record company video departments in creating national and regional promotions including video club nights, video in-stores and contests via local cable companies.

Admitting that the company had originally checked out numerous New York locations, the new kid on the block said that he had his hands full establishing the first store and learning the New York market. As for further expansion into the East Coast territory, he said that there were "no hard plans" to do so at this time, again due to the current project. Incidentally, the new Tower is loaded with state-of-the-art video equipment for showing MTV and prerecorded music videotapes. It is staffed by 60 people and is open daily from 9 a.m.-midnight.

CRAZY EDDIE'S IS DIS-GRACED — A bitter feud that erupted between Crazy Eddle's and Island recording artist Grace Jones has apparently halted all relations between the New York chain and WEA. No one at WEA, Island or Crazy Eddie's would talk, but the scuttlebutt is that Eddie's owner, Eddle Antar, has retaliated for Jones' public gripes about service at the stores by removing all Jones product and WEA displays, as well as curtailing further WEA orders. Jones had complained to the New York Post and Live At Five that she had purchased a malfunctioning TV set at the Greenwich Village outlet, and when it was finally replaced, the replacement didn't work. While there was no resolution to the conflict at presstime, the unhappy parties involved were said to be hopeful that bruised feelings could be soothed soon.

JETT ENGINEERING - Joan Jett And The Blackhearts' new "Album" will be getting the promotional works, at least in terms of merchandising aids. A full line of p-o-p material center around the splendid "jump shot" cover photo, which features Jett with guitar in mid-air jump pose. The glossy color photo is a cut out and presented upon a plain yellow-orange background without any copy, so that the artist and title information will be delivered via a clear sticker affixed to the shrink-wrap. According to graphic designer Spencer Drate, who designed the album with his associate, Judith Salavetz, and directed the art along with Jett and her co-manager, Meryl Laguna, the jump shot is "an important focal point visually" and one that can be adapted to a wide variety of siaplays. Already out with the "Album" release are album posters and trim fronts and an artist and album title banner featuring Drate's new, tightened-up Joan Jett logo. A triangular mobile featuring the front and back covers and a group shot will be available in another two weeks, and a die-cut, easel-back stand-up of the cover jump shot will be out in a couple months. Drate says that the three-pronged merchandising schedule results from MCA's belief that it is better to space out the materials and prolong the initial display impact of the album than to bring everything out at once. Incidentally, Drate adds that economic constraints prevent manufacturers overseas from using the album stickers, so those albums will include title and artist info directly on the album cover. This recalls Drate's memorable work on the Talking Heads' "Fear Of Music" LP, where the embossed pattern could not be reproduced on Spanish copies.

CITY ONE STOP'S BLACK MUSIC DAY — City One Stop in Los Angeles held a Black Music Day celebration in which they invited their retail accounts to meet and eat with numerous recording artists, including Janet Jackson, Randy Crawford, Evelyn King, Thelma Houston, Brenda Russell, Ronnle Laws, Barry White, Leon Haywood, the Busboys, Larry Graham, DeBarge, Finis Henderson and Tease. Nearly 300 people showed up.

BUDGET BITS — Denver area Budget Tapes & Records stores are giving away stereos and cameras in a A Flock Of Seagulls in-store registration-with-purchase promotion respectively supporting the "Listen" LP and "Wishing (If I Had A Photograph Of You)" single. . . The annual tie-in with the Red Rock outdoor summer concert venue is underway in Denver, with 25,000 "Summer of Stars" Red Rock wallet schedules and maps already available. A Budget/KAZY "Super Scramble" crossword puzzle made up from information about all of the acts in the 45 Red Rock concerts ran in the Denver Post and Rocky Mountain News. Some 10,000 entries have been received, with winners getting prizes including tickets to the concerts, stereo equipment. \$500 worth of records and KAZY satin jackets.

WRKS (KISS-FM), without the services of a regular morning man for the book, managed to increase to 4.5 from Winter's 4.0 Beautiful Music outlet WRFM recently began airing occasional A/C-style tracks mixed in with the muzak and jumped to a 4.9 from last book's equally surprising 3.7. A/C station WINY was flat, 4.7 to 4.6, but up-and-comer WPIX continued to gain with 3.3 to 3.6 increase. In the AOR derby all three stations were down slightly. WPLJ took the lead once again with a 4.1, down from 4.5, and was also #1 in teens. WAPP had a 2.9 to 2.8 downturn, while Abrams' N.Y. experiment, WNEW-FM, went from a 2.2 to 2.1. Both country stations had a small but encouraging increase. Format leader WHN was up 2.1 to 2.4, while WKHK-FM went from 1.6 to 1.9. The baby of the talk

Sabo Exits ABC To Consult RKO

NEW YORK — Walter Sabo, vice president of the ABC Radio Networks, resigned his post Friday, June 24, and has joined the RKO Radio Division as consultant to the RKO-owned-and-operated radio stations.

Sabo had been vice president of the ABC Radio networks since March 1982. He previously had been executive vice president of FM Radio for the NBC Radio Network. From 1976-78, Sabo was at ABC as director of the FM network.

In other ABC Network developments, Rick Devlin has been appointed to the newly created position of vice president and director of ABC Talkradio. Bob Chambers, currently vice president, market development, for ABC Radio Networks, had been handling the management of Talkradio in addition to his responsibilities for the network's 1984 Olympics coverage. Devlin's appointment apparently solidifies ABC's corporate commitment to the talk format in the wake of the overall Talkradio project falling behind network expectations.

The network had also been unhappy with the performance of its talk outlet in San Francisco, KGO-FM, and will sell the station as rumored. ABC, Inc. reached agreement with KLOK Radio, a limited partnership of the Donis Fowler Corp. and the Weaver Broadcasting Co., for the sale by ABC of KGO-FM and three KGO-FM booster stations. The sale is pending approval by the FCC, as well as the ABC board of directors. Davis Fowler and Weaver own and operate five radio stations in Orange County, Fresno and San Jose.

circuit, WABC, was up a half point, 2.4 to 2.9.

Talk radio KABC in Los Angeles met the onrushing easy listening KBIG and CHR KIIS-FM with a big 6.2 to 7.6 jump in numbers to protect its market lead. KBIG went from 5.3 to 6.1, while KIIS-FM continued its climb by rising 4.7 to 6.0. BM outlet KJOI had a healthy jump also, reaching 4.1 from Winter's 3.4. On the AOR front, new music pioneers KROQ dipped 4.6 to 4.4, while KLOS went 4.0 to 4.1. KMET was also up slightly, 3.0 to 3.2. Mellow rocker KNX-FM sealed the fate of its format with 1.4 to 1.2 slide. A/C stations were down slightly -KOST went 2.8 to 2.6, while KHTZ also slipped, 2.7 to 2.3. CHR outlet KIQQ was up, 2.6 to 2.8, while KRTH dropped a half point. 3.5 to 3.0. News station KNX-AM was also down 3.7 to 3.1.

In Chicago, WGN was flat with an 8.7, but its talk format was still the runaway leader. Beautiful music outlet WLOO was a distant second with a 5.4, down a half-point from 5.9. Another talk station, WIND, was up a half point, 3.8 to 4.3, while news outlet WBBM-AM had 5.2 to 5.0 dip. On the contemporary music side, urban WGCI went from 5.4 to 5.1. Black station WBMX had a healthy 3.6 to 4.3 jump. CHR WBBM-FM was up, 4.0 to 4.4, wresting the format lead from WLS-AM, which stayed flat at 4.1. WLS-FM stayed fairly even, moving 3.5 to 3.6. The AOR race stayed close, with format leader WLUP feeling the heat of its two competitors. The Loop was up, 3.1 to 3.5, as were WXRT, 2.9 to 3.4, and Doubleday's WMET, 2.6 to 3.0.

Bay Area Numbers

Back west, talk station KGO-AM in San Francisco was way up, 7.2 to 8.6, and naturally kept its market lead. News station KGBS was second, although its numbers were down significantly, 6.3 to 5.1. The A/C derby in the Bay Area was tight with the insurgence of KSFO, as it jumped 2.1 to 3.2. KNBR pulled into the format lead, however. with a 3.0 to 3.6 increase. KIOI dropped from 3.5 to 3.1, while KBLX faded 3.3 to 2.6. KFRC went from a 4.1 to 4.2, while CHR competitor KYUU was down, 3.7 to 3.2. Urban/black outlets stayed even, as KSOL went from 3.2 to 3.1, and KDIA dittoed its Winter book with a 2.4. The myriad of AORs remained close with each other, with an increase garnered by the Rick Carrollconsulted station, KQAK, upping 1.2 to 1.9. KMEL was up slightly, 2.1 to 2.3; KSJO was flat at 2.2; KRQR went down a touch, 2.3 to 2.2; and KOME dipped 1.6 to 1.3. Country station KSAN increased its market share, moving 3.3 to 4.1.

HELLO AGAIN — In case you've forgotten, long before the '70s music radio battlelines were drawn, one could hear all sorts of wonderful hit music side by side in a format dubiously (and incorrectly) dubbed Top 40. Lotsa hot rock and soul stuff and the love (luv!) ballads, too; each could stand on its own if one wanted it to, but the rush was knowing that someone somewhere was singing along at the top of their lungs to the exact same record. And you didn't have to change the dial every other song, either. The success of the Motown 25th anniversary TV show was no surprise; it was just one example of an already existing, continuing love for great pop music, black or white. NBC-TV, and A/C radio for that matter, didn't discover this just last month. Yes, there are listeners dying for this stuff. . . and there are changes, however belated, around the

dial. The new Spring Book shows hit music stations are up. Urban contemporary is now mass appeal in big markets (think about that when black artists can't seem to "cross over"). Los Angeles has a new music leader in CHR-style KIIS-FM, which seemed to sway the vote to change the tune at mellow AOR outlet KNX-FM. The CBS company announced a format switch last week to contemporary hit radio and will file new, undetermined call letters with the FCC. Station vice president and general manager Bob Nelson says they'll go with the CBS-FM national version of CHR, which has been enormously successful in Boston, Chicago and St. Louis. The new L.A.PD (no pun intended) hails from the latter city - Ed Scarborough, fresh from KHTR-FM in

the Cards' home town. With KIIS-FM's ratings success and Ed Lippincott now installed at KHTZ, the fight is on. A similar situation is brewing 3,000 miles east in the Big Apple. as Malrite gears up for the WHTZ debut. A program director has been found in Scott Shannon from Tampa, Florida. Gary Fisher, on the streets since the recent WABC "blue wall" house-cleaning, will be the station's general sales manager. New York has been waiting for an energetic radio station for years, and at the very least, the expected format should stimulate some nervous, healthy competition. Rumors did fly last week that stodgy AOR leader WPLJ was taking the Top 40 plunge. A quick flip of the dial revealed the AOR formula holding firm, but, yes, they do sound different; lots of, good heavens, "new music"! Station PD Larry Berger says they're "modernizing" the air sound, increasing the rotation of acts like Prince, Kajagoogoo, Culture Club, etc., while pulling the deep cuts from LPs of the recent past (Led Zep, et al). This change came about even after the announcement that WPLJ was tied for #1 overall spot in the new Birch (and still #1 AOR in the Arbs). Better late than never, hm? Yet this move only appears gutsy in the context of a narcoleptic radio market. The trend has been apparent for quite some time. A dinosaur has awakened from its deep sleep, but once the initial excitement surrounding PLJ and the imminent WHTZ entry dies down, New York radio will continue to follow rather than lead. 'DeFord Bailey Day' Declared To Honor Late Opry Pioneer

NASHVILLE — Thursday, June 23, was declared "DeFord Balley Day" by Nashville Mayor Richard Fulton to honor the memory of one of the Grand Ole Opry's earliest popular performers. Highlights of the day were the presentation of a commemorative plaque to the I.W. Gernert Homes, a memorial ceremony at Greenwood Cemetery and a reception at the Country Music Hall of Fame.

The commemorative plaque was presented to the high-rise home for the elderly where Bailey Ilved from 1971 until his death on July 2, 1982. From the I.W. Gernet building, Balley could look down on the empty lot where he had maintained a shoe-shine shop during his years of pop-

ularity on the Opry and after his Opry affiliation ended (1941) until the building housing the shop was demolished in 1971.

For the memorial gathering at Greenwood Cemetery, several Opry performers who had worked with Bailey during his years on the Opry (1925-1941) made remarks and played. David Morton, now with the Dallas Housing Authority and a historian who befriended Bailey during his last 10 years, told the sparse crowd the purpose of the day was not to bury someone, but to celebrate the achievements of an artist. Musical selections reflected the sound of the early Opry with the Crook Brothers ("Sugar and the Gourd" and "Grey Eagle"), Bill Monroe ("Evening Prayer Blues"), James Talley 'John Henry'') and Herman Crook ("Amazing Grace"). In addition to the performers, honored guests included Roy Acuff, Jerry Stroble and Hal Durham of the Grand Ole Opry, Kirk McGee, Zeke Clements, Uncle Dave Macon's grandson, Jack Kaluki of Hohner Harmonicas, state senator Douglas Henry and state representative Mansfield Douglas.

in his remarks, Acuff explained why he had asked Bailey to be a part of his traveling show in the late 1930s. Bailey had already been a mainstay on the Opry for 10 years when Acuff joined. Acuff, as a "new act," needed a name that would draw an audience. Bailely was that "well-known. name act." Commented Acuff, "I never introduced him to an audience that didn't enjoy him." Concerning a possible drive to have Bailey inducted into the Hall of Fame, Acuff reiterated that Balley "deserved it as much as anyone as far as musicianship is concerned" although he thought Bailey lacked the criterion of the furthering of country music. "If his name is ever on the ballot, he'll have one (vote) from Roy Acuff.

Mayor Fulton, Monroe and Acuff unveiled the tombstone that had been the final request Bailey had made of his friend Morton. It was this request that had led Morton to pursue "Deford Balley Day" as a project since the musician's death a year ago. The stone, donated by Mr. and Mrs. Willie Simpson of Elverton, Ga., was designed by Rodney Dobbs.

Items Donated

A motorcade led participants from the cemetery to the Hall of Fame, where Bill Ivey, director, Country Music Foundation (CMF), accepted personal effects donated to the Hall by Bailey's children, Deford Bailey Jr., Christine Bailey Craig and Dezoral Bailey Thomas. The items are three hats, a framed business card that had hung on Bailey's shoeshine stand, shoes, a folding cane chair and two megaphones designed by Bailey in the '30's especially for his harmonica.

The reception, held for invited guests in the CMF library, featured rare recordings of "the Harmonica Wizard" and a sevenminute film of Bailey in performance from the late '60s. A series of Bailey photographs by Nashville photographer Dennis Wile decorated the area.

Born in rural Smith County, Tenn. in 1899, Bailey learned to play the harmonica while bedridden with infantile paralysis during his third year. This early affliction was the key factor in making music more than a mere pastime for a child left stunted and sickly by disease. The young Bailey spent most of his time learning music and imitating the rural sounds surrounding him.

In 1918, he moved to Nashville, working odd jobs and playing his harmonica whenever and wherever possible. When the manager of Nashville's first commercial radio station, WDAD, heard him play, he was invited to perform soon after when the station went on the air in September 1925.

SKY'S THE LIMIT - Contemporary country radio station KXXY/Oklahoma City began broadcasting recently from its new "Tall Tower" location, atop the antenna of KOKH-TV in northwest Oklahoma City. The new facility stands 1,204 feet above ground level, as opposed to the 300-foot antenna used previously. The tower makes KXXY the highest operating power transmitter in Oklahoma City County, with a transmitting power of 31,514 watts, and 100,000 watts effective radiating power. KXXY has nearly tripled its coverage area to approximately 7,230 square miles, and 948,325 potential listeners from the previous 2,635 square miles and 660,700 potential listeners. Bill Kirkpatrick is vice president and general manager for the station and Charlle Marcus serves as program director.

KNAL PRESENTS AWARDS /Victoria presented the KNAL Academy of Country Listeners Awards for 1983. Balloting began in early May, with the publication of the Official Ballot in KNAL's monthly full-page newspaper promotion "The KNAL Country News." Ballots were also available at the station studio. Five nominees for each category, including Entertainer of the Year, Top Male Vocalist, Top Vocal Group or Duet, Song Of The Year and KNAL Country Record Hall Of Fame were determined by music director Marvin Paul based upon request line action and local record sales. Write-in space was also available. The KNAL Country Hall of Fame nominees were determined by consistent request line action on records released prior to 1980.

Nominees for Favorite Local Singer and Favorite Local Group were selected exclusively by write-in vote. The balloting concluded on My 25 and voters were asked to provide their name, address, phone number and age group to validate the ballot, After the votes were tallied, ballots were divided by age group and a ballot drawn at random from each group to choose the Listener of the Year winner. Local entertainers chosen as winners in their categories received award plaques and Listener of the Year winners received plaques, albums and custom designed KNAL Listener of the Year jackets. They will also be included at special radio events throughout the year. KAVU-TV, the local NBC affiliate, broadcast the awards show as a "special" edition of the weekday magazine, Souder & Company, and KNAL simulcast the event. Souder & Company host Larry Souder, formerly of WSM/Nashville, supervised segments of the show's music segments.

NASHVILLE NEWS — WSIX/Nashville, in cooperation with Kroger and Hermitage Landing, celebrated July 4 with "All American Monday" from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. at Hermitage Landing. This was the station's second annual Independence Day celebration, the first being at Centennial Park in 1982 and attracting more than 14,000 people. "All American Monday" featured live entertainment on the lakeside stage. Performing artists included Debble Peters, Bandana, Rick and Janis Carnes and Margo Smith. The day's activities included games for the whole family, and as a finishing touch, there was a professionally staged aerial fireworks display over the lake . . . "The Waking Crew," WSM/Nashville's live morning radio show, went on the road last week . . . literally! Broadcasting from atop two hydraulic lifts, host Tony Lyons, the six-man band and singer Darlene Austin performed the show before a Waking Crew billboard on I-40 West. Lyons says it is the first time they've actually "seen their audience." Over the air they asked listeners to blow their horns. Jones, his band, New Life, and The A-Strings performed the new material live at the posh new Radisson Plaza Hotel. The arrangements contain mostly modern, funky leads and lush orchestrations. Standouts are "Hold On," a positive economic message, and "Call Him Up," an uptempo shouter worthy of Clara Ward or Bessie Griffin.

The group's recording and tour work with Barbara Mandrell over the past year has brought them some prominence in the gospel field. They will open for Mandrell July 25-31 at the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas. Later that same year, he became a regular on the "Saturday Night Barn Dance," which later became the "Grand Ole Opry."

Judge Hay, the station director and opening announcer for the Barn Dance, was reportedly inspired by Bailey's imitative gifts on that famous night he renamed the Barn Dance. That particular evening, an hour of symphony music conducted by Dr. Walter Damrosch preceded the program. In the symphonic segment, a young composer's impression of train sounds was included. A mainstay of Bailey's was the "Pan American Blues," complete with a rendition of a fast-moving locomotive. It was the marked difference in styles that prompted Judge Hay's remark, "For the past hour we have been listening to the music taken largely from the Grand Ole Opera, but from now on we will present the Grand Ole Opry." Bailey then went into "Pan American Blues," making him the first musician to perform on the "Grand Ole Opry.'

During his years on the Opry, most listeners never knew that Bailey was black. Those who took him on their tours say the audiences were already such fans of their harmonica favorite that they readily accepted him as a performer.

Adult contemporary led the San Diego market overall, with most A/C outlets increasing their numbers. Beautiful music station KJQY barely kept its lead, dropping from 9.8 to 8.6. KFMB-AM led the A/C pack with a 5.5 to 8.4 leap. KBZT dropped from 4.6 to 3.9, while KYXY was up 4.5 to 5.4. KFMB-FM increased 4.6 to 5.3 and KSBO FM moved 3.4 to 3.6. The city's one CHR station, XTRA-AM, went from 3.5 to 4.3. KGB and XTRA-FM tled for the AOR lead with a 5.6 each. Competitor KPRI was down, 4.6 to 4.4, while upstart KIFM was up almost a full point, 1.6 to 2.5. The three country stations found themselves in a hot race, with KSON-FM leading the pack with 2.4 to 2.6 increase. KSON's AM side, also country, went 1.9 to 2.0, while Winter for-mat leader KCBQ-FM dropped more than a point, 3.6 to 2.3.

In 1928, he appeared on 48 of the 52 Opry shows of that year, a feat unequalled by any other early performer. That same year, he became the first musician recorded in Nashville when the Victor Talking Machine Company (RCA) sent a representative to Tennessee to record rural folk musicians. Bailey remained a regular on the Opry until 1941.

It was his limited repertoire that prompted his exit from the Opry line-up. WSM had become involved with Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI) and began requiring its performers to come up with new material that the newly formed licensing organization could handle. Balley was not known as a composer, but rather as a distinctive arranger of older material. This limitation led to a dispute with Judge Hay, and Balley left.

In what is now the Edgefield district of Nashville, Bailey returned to his shoeshine stand to eke out a living, making only extremely rare appearances as a performer during his next 41 years. With the demolition of the building where he had his shop in 1971, he sank into farther obscurity, living in a home for the elderly. His last public performance took place shortly before his death at age 83 on July 2, 1982. Appropriately, that performance was as part of an educational series sponsored by the CMF for school children.

HOT VINYL — Eddy Grant's Ice/CBS single "Electric Avenue" charted at #1 bullet this week on the Cash Box Pop Singles chart. But The Police is in hot pursuit at #2 bullet with "Every Breath You Take" on A&M . . . And although Michael Jackson's Epic single, "Beat It," will most likely drop out of the Top 10 after this week (it's #10), his 'Wanna Be Startin' Somethin'" is poised for Top 10 territory at #13 bullet after seven weeks on the chart.

THE AUCTION BLOCK — The Raleigh, N.C. Record Bar and WQDR radio there recently sponsored a "Rock 'N' Roll Auction" for charity. The event featured coveted belongings from some of music's most notables. Drawing the highest bid was the trench coat worn by Prince during his recent "1999" tour. His studded, rude boy trench garment was bought for \$450, while ${f John \, Cougar}$'s leather jacket drew \$370, ${f Billy \, (ZZ)}$ Top) Glbbon's custom made guitar brought \$250, and John (Styx) Panozzo's autographed snare drum went for \$85. The woman who won the bidding for Prince's trench, which was the hottest item in the bidding among women, announced that she would wear the coat everywhere she goes this summer.

BANKING ON MURPHY'S LAW — Eddle Murphy, the 22-year-old comedy whiz of NBC-TV's Saturday Night Live, 48 HRS. and now Trading Places film fame, is gettin' while the gettin' is still there. Whether it be his total splash on the entertainment scene as a versatile comedic and screen performer or recognition that the public's adulation can be like a Coney Island roller coaster ride, Murphy recently entered an exclusive, five-film contract with Paramount Pictures Corp.'s motion picture division. The performer's Eddie Murphy Prods., Inc., a film production outfit administered by Robert Wachs and Richard Tienken, will develop other properties for Paramount release, but such projects will not necessarily involve Murphy. The deal harkens back to the days when actors and actresses had exclusive deals with major studios. The new voque is major studio/production company arrangements, but Murphy has built a career on breaking molds. His standout success as a regular among the new SNL players has given him the opportunity to follow the path travelled by SNL alums Dan Ackroyd, Bill Murray and the late John Belushl. Unlike that trio, Murphy has managed to do a pair of films that have shown strong box office and moderately substantial critical acclaim. His Columbia Records comedy album debut also proved a viable tool in this artist's development. The initial film in the Paramount deal is to be announced in the near future.

- Grammy-winning guitarist Pat Metheny was on the Euro-tour trail for three months to support his recently released "Travels" LP, a double-album live package. What started out as a seven-week, 12-country trek expanded. Metheny finished the tour and then joined soundtrack composer Jerry Goldsmith in London to solo on Goldsmith's score for the upcoming Orion Films release *Under Fire*. Metheny is also set to make an eight-day tour in Japan during late July with tenor saxman Sonny Rollins, who will also be joined by drummer Jack Delohnette and bassist Alphonso Johnson

ANOTHER STAR FOR HIS CAP — Earlier this year, Willle Stargell made headlines, but not for his now-legendary prowess on the baseball diamond. Stargell gained fresh notoriety as the narrator of a symphonic presentation titled "New Morning For The World," a piece composed by Pulitzer winner Joseph Schwantner and based on the words of the late Martin Luther King, Jr. Performed five times, including dates at New York's Carnegie Hall and Washington D.C.'s Kennedy Center, with the Eastman Phllharmonla under conductor David Effron, the former Pittsburgh Pirates captain has recreated the work on vinyl with the Philharmonia for Mercury Records. The Schwantner piece was commissioned by the Eastman School of Music and was made possible through a grant from American Telephone and Telegraph. AT&T also commissioned "An Eastman Overture" by George Walker, which will be included on the Mercury LP along with the Schwantner opus and Aaron Copeland's "Lincoln Portrait." Joining Stargell in narrating chores for the LP is Eastman alumnus William Warfield. According to "Papa" Stargell, commenting on his involvement in the "New Morning project and speaking to its importance, "I could think of no greater honor than to be asked to be a part of something like this . . . I don't think we can ever let the memory of Dr. King and what he stood for grow dim. His message was for all of humanity, and we can't afford to ignore it."

MORE SHORT CUTS — Columbia Records artist Andre Symone, who cut his pro chops as the bass player for Prince's stage outfit, will be coming with his second solo LP in August and is also producing an all-girl group for Columbia called, appropriately, The Girls . . . Narada Michael Walden was recently in Washington D.C. producing Cotillion artist Stacey Lattlsaw's "Sixteen" LP (slated for summer release) and was joined by Kathy Sledge of the famous sister group for vocals on Lattisaw's tune, "What's So Hot About Bad Boys" . . . LARC Records recently signed Jackson family member LaToya to an exclusive worldwide contract and will release the single "Betcha Gonna Need My Lovin" July 7 . . . Jerome Gasper was recently named director of A&R, black music division, at PolyGram Records. Gasper held similar positions with CBS michael martinez

general manager Michael Mowers disagreed. "Our first five albums are strong, but after that it drops considerably," he said. "For instance, our #1 last week was The Police, which sold a thousand pieces. Number 10 was Eddy Grant, which only sold 150. And regular catalog is the pits."

Mowers was the only dealer contacted who anticipated a soft summer, though he noted that a northern market like Milwaukee was especially affected by warm weather, adversely so in terms of record sales. He also mentioned that

LOS ANGELES — On the heels of the recent settlement of the dispute between the Elvis Presley estate, Col. Tom Parker and RCA Records, Col. Parker issued the following statement:

The Estate of Elvis Presley, Colonel Tom Parker and RCA Records today jointly announced that they have amicably resolved the various matters of controversy among them

The parties are satisfied with the terms of the resolution, which are fair and equitable to all concerned. The Estate fully acknowledges the significant contribution of Col. Parker and RCA Records to the unparalleled career of Elvis Presley.

Col. Parker has chosen, however, to discontinue his involvement with the Estate. Because of Col. Parker's fondness for Elvis Presley and Elvis' many fans and friends, Col. Parker has graciously agreed to furnish to the Estate a sampling of his collection of Elvis Presley memorabilia which will be on display at Graceland, the late entertainer's home, in Memphis, Tennessee.

Since Col. Parker will no longer be involved in the management of the late entertainer's affairs, the Estate has designated Joseph F. Rascoff, a New York business manager and CPA, to handle the business affairs of the late Elvis Presley. Mr. Rascoff stated: "Col. Parker has clearly been a major factor in the enormous success which Elvis Presley enjoyed and the Co-Executors of the Estate have asked that their gratitude be extended to the Colonel for his unique and dedicated service."

The Co-Executors of the late entertainer's estate, along with Blanchard E. Tual, the Court-appointed Guardian ad Litem for Elvis Presley's daughter and sole heir, Lisa Marie Presley, also issued the following statement: "RCA Records will continue to be Elvis Presley's only record company worldwide, as they have been for nearly 30 years. RCA has expended enormous efforts to establish and maintain Elvis as the best selling solo artist in the history of recorded music. The continuity of this relationship was one of the keys to Elvis Presley's great career, and because RCA has always dealt fairly with Elvis and his Estate, we are pleased that RCA and the Estate have today affirmed and strengthened their mutual commitments.'

The Estate shall continue to focus on Elvis' contributions to America's music and shall seek business opportunities in reference to the name, image, likeness and life of Elvis Presley. In that connection, Col. Parker and RCA have each extended their very best wishes to the Estate and are hopeful that the extraordinary legend of Elvis Presley will continue to live for many years to come.

Mr. Tual acknowledged his complete approval of the resolution in its entirety.

Milwaukee's heavy manufacturing Industry has been slow to lift up out of the recession.

Like Mowers, James Rose, general manager of Rose Records' seven Chicago locations, noted a detrimental effect from summer weather on sales and hedged his bets accordingly despite seeing some "very big numbers on things which we haven't seen in a long time." Further hampering Rose's outlook is a lack of cable TV in Chicago and its accompanying video music services, and a radio situation that he called "really behind the times."

Other dealers, however, were basking in the sunny predictions prompted by the much-documented new artist exposure via video and radio. In addition, reduced priced product was hailed for its positive effect on consumers and consumption. "\$6.98 and \$5.98 catalog have been tremendously successful," said Tower Records president Russ Solomon, adding that from his vantage point, "people are responding to a variety of items, and business is getting better all over."

"We aren't hearing complaints that records cost too much anymore," stated Kemp Mills' Appelbaum. "With WEA lowering its catalog and so many labels releasing \$5.98 and \$6.98 product, consumer awareness is turning around to where they realize that records are a good value again. And companies are serious about doing business and treating us as partners instead of adversaries. Clearly, things are getting better for a lot of people."

Appelbaum noted another vitally important aspect of the current healthy state of the industry: "The glow is off of the video arcade games. An enormous amount of our demographic's disposable income was being spent in arcades, but now it's not so much."

Seconding Appelbaum was Record Bar's Hunter. "Our #1 source of competition is in a much weaker position," he said. "The video game industry is not taking anywhere near the bite of leisure dollars as it did a year ago."

Aside from the drop in video game strength, Hunter cited the growth in the general economy, the steady stream of strong releases since last Christmas and the cassette boom as major factors in his chain's turnaround, which he currently rates a "four" on a 10-scale, "one" being "no turnaround" and "10" being "1977 all over again." He said that "good business sense and cautious intelligence" could boost the turnaround to a "six."

Other retailers, including Rose's Rose, Radio Doctor's Mowers and Record World/TSS head Roy Imber, were looking at the expanded availability of CD hardware and disc titles to provide, in Imber's words, "a big improvement in our business."

But the most important factor in continuing the upturn in retailer spirits is continued quality releases, and in this regard, most were excited. "I'm real interested in July," said Budget's Lasky, just back from a lengthy field trip in which he saw "a lot of smiles" on the faces of his store personnel. "It definitely looks like a lot of good product is coming out."

Mark Briggs, operations manager at the Bostonbased Strawberries Records & Tapes chain, was especially pleased that the labels seem to be stretching out the upcoming releases so that the sales momentum could be maintained. And based on a glance at the third quarter release schedules of CBS and WEA, Record Bar's Hunter predicted at least five and as many as 15 "legitimate happening records" to last through the rest of the year.

"It will be a hotly contested race to stay in Record Bar's Top 10," concluded Hunter.

Sam Moore: Return Of A Soul Man From Obscurity, Drugs

Sam continued to live with the nightmare of addiction through the mid-to-late '70s when he entered a methadone detoxification program that created another addiction, to the treatment itself. Between efforts to stem his drug abuse and continue to work, both health and career deteriorated. When working on the road, Moore had to buy black market meth or heroin, usually spending more for the drugs because he was a celebrity.

It was with the help of manager Joyce McCray, who saw a TV news item on KNBC, that Moore got on the Naltrexon program located in West Covina, Calif., just outside Los Angeles.

Resurrecting his health, while a slow, arduous process, has been successful; getting his solo career launched has also been slow, arduous, but less successful.

This all could change as producer and noted record industry veteran Al Bell soon will be taking Moore into the studio to record an album and then ship it to major labels for a deal.

"As much as I need work," Moore said, "I won't beg for it. I'm prepared to work; I just want to get back to what I do best.

"But while I'm sitting here doing nothing," he added, "I feel like I should do something to help prevent others experiencing some of the same things that I have, especially young people."

To this end, Moore has been appearing in various articles and on TV and radio talk segments, relating his experiences, describing his new lease on life and discussing Naltrexon.

Among his TV appearances has been the interview segment with KNBC/Los Angeles' Kelly Lange April 4 and then again June 8. He also appeared May 2 on *Mid Morning L.A.* He has done radio interviews and discussed the problem on a nationally syndicated radio show, *Radioscope*, which is set to air in full June 24.

Moore in each instance recounts his life on drugs and gives some perspective on the depth to which the problem penetrates music industry ranks.

"The problem is grave," Moore said, "and in many cases, it is not behind closed doors. But still people don't seem to know how serious the problem is."

The R&B crooner said that "enough established artists who have addictions will not come out and speak against it. Heroin has always been looked down on as a 'black' drug because it was so cheap. Cocaine was chic.

"Those people who have a dependence on coke are more apt to speak out about that," he continued, "but heroin addicts are likely to keep more to themselves."

Moore said the real losers in the situa-

tion are the younger players coming Into the business. "Some of the younger artists are wiser. Some are quite foolish," he observed, adding, "but there's no use in being ignorant; there's just too much Information available now."

On the Radioscope telecast, Moore plans to announce that the Fair Oaks Hospital in New Jersey will advertise a toll-free number that can be used to reach Moore, who plans to talk with people wishing some insight on the problem — whether it be theirs or a loved one's.

In between his speaking engagements, Moore said that he is still perparing himself for a strong career comeback, with plans to record a demo and shop for a moderate label deal. "I've been in the business 30 years, but this is the first time I've had so much fun. I enjoy what I do now."

Other news related to EMI is that the company has moved to new headquarters, in the city of Florida, nearby Buenos Aires. The new address is Av. San Martin 3590, Florida, Pcla. de Buenos Aires.

Jose Blankleider and Rafael Abud have formed a new label, Colly Records, which is starting to operate with an array of artists coming from Europe, Canada and the States under indie label banners. Blanklejder has been for many years producer of radio programs and is also searching for local talent. The address of this company is Uruguay 978, Buenos Alres, and Colly is interested in deals with foreign labels.

Marlo Kaminsky of Microfon is very happy with the extraordinary sales of Joan Manuel Serrat's new album, released during the stay of the famed Spanish chanteur in Argentina. Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO - If the group Biltz dominated the singles chart in the second half of 1982, it has been left to a "new" artist Ritchle to take its place in the first six months of 1983. Ritchie is Richard Court who was born in Beckenham in Kent (England) and only came to Brazil in 1972.

Since coming to Brazil, Ritchie has formed part of Soma, A Barca de Sol and Vimana all of which have enjoyed a considerable cult following in the past. He has also participated on Patrick Moraz's first solo album and went to London in 1980 to work on a Jim Capaldi album. Now Ritchie has topped the Brazilian charts and dominated the airwaves across the entire country with a catchy "new pop" number, "Menina Veneno," which he wrote with **Bernardo** VIIhena. The single has now sold close to half a million copies with no drop in sales imminent. For this reason, there is a great deal of interest in the artist's forthcoming album, which he is in the process of putting the finishing touches on at the SIGLA studio in Rio for CBS.

The start of the year has seen a number of major artists on the road, most notably Roberto Carlos, who is undertaking a massive nationwide tour with his show, 'Emocoes," which has already had a lengthy run in Rio at Canecao and which inaugurated the new Palace showhouse in Sao Paulo, which holds nearly 3,000 people. By the end of the tour Carlos will have been seen by close to 1.3 million people, not counting Rio and Sao Paulo.

Italy

MILAN - The IFPI Council Jubilee, organized to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Federation, took place in Venice on June 1 and 2, directed by IFPI president Coen Solleveld and general manager lan Thomas. Among the problems examined were the relationship between record industry and new developments in the technology, and legal aspects in the home taping field.

CGD Messaggerie Musicali held its annual convention in Sardegna, from May 28-30. In his introduction, Franco Crepax, CGD managing director, showed satisfaction for the 1982 results - with a total income of \$34.2 million - but declared that he was worried about the sales decline in the first months of 1983 due to the crisis in the Italian record business. Crepax also announced for next autumn many new releases (Pooh, Ornella Vanoni, Celentano and others), and the creation of a new midline called "MusicA."

Dischi Ricordi published the first 12 albums of a new midline called "Nashville Country Sound," including releases by Roy Clark, Jerry Leff Walker, Conway Twitty, Loretta Lynn and others.

Nowo (exclusive importer of the Denon catalog in Italy) signed an agreement with Decca Dischi for the distribution through the record retailers of its 500 LPs. Nowo will directly follow the distribution only through the hi-fi retailers.

Eleven Music signed a distribution

agreement with RCA. In the Eleven catalog, there are new releases by $\boldsymbol{\mathsf{Morris}}$ Albert . Saxophone soloist GII Ventura switched from EMI to Soedi...Intersong Italiana announced a license agreement with Ben Scotti Promotion Inc., concerning material by Survivor and Sky.

Japan

TOKYO - According to the JASRAC (Japan's Association of rights of Authors and Composers), the 34th conference of CISAC (International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers) will be held in Tokyo for six days from Nov. 12 to 17, 1984. At the same time, the general meeting of BIEM (International Bureau of Societies to Control of Rights of Recording and Duplication) is to be held in Tokyo on Nov. 9, 10, 1984, also. The 300 or 400 delegations (including their wives) from about 50 countries worldwide are expected to participate in these conferences to discuss many controversial problems of copyrights in which the record rental practices and the home-taping will be included.

The mechanical royalty rate has been raised in Japan after long negotiation between JASRAC and JPRA (Japan Phonograph and Record Association). The mechanical royalty is a fee to be paid by record companies to a copyright owner. According to a conclusion reached by both sides, the rate of the mechanical royalty will be raised to 5.5% from 5.4% for both albums and tapes, 5% from 4.8% for singles at list price after deducting the sales tax of 8.5%.

Toshiba EMI (president Yasuhide Taku) has disclosed sales-strategies for 1983 (Apr. 1983 to Mar. 1984) which consisted of eight main points to promote sales. According to the company, continual promotions of artists, aggressive sales of both album and tape in the first six months of 1983, new items including VTR being promoted specifically and strong appeal by sharing extensive information between dealers and users are the most important

LONDON - Virgin Records closed down for five days last week - because its owner, Richard Branson, took his entire office staff to Portugal to thank them for their part in the success of the company. Virgin has just had its most successful year, with the impressive roster of Culture Club, Heaven 17, Japan, Phil Collins and Human League.

share of PolyGram Records, speculation ran high in and outside both companies that the compact disc is the linchpin of the deal. PolyGram's CD pressing facility in Hamburg is one of the few CD facilities presently in operation, and a major stake in PolyGram would certainly give WCI's other labels access to the Hamburg plant. CBS Records recently announced that it had pacted with CBS/Sony to open a CD plant in the U.S. (Cash Box, July 3), the only U.S. facility unveiled so far, and that CBS Records would be the sole sales agent for that plant's product during Its first five years of operation.

The acquisition of PolyGram Records by WCI also gives WEA the largest classical catalog in the world. The PolyGram Records Group has classical titles on its Deutsche Grammophon, London and Philips labels. With the exception of Atlantic's tiny Finnadar label, WEA's only classical label has been Elektra's Nonesuch.

A survey of last week's **Cash Box** Top 200 Albums Chart found that a combined tally of WEA and PolyGram albums accounted for 32%, or nearly one-third, of all charting titles. By comparison, CBS-distributed titles accounted for 26%.

The proposed deal is expected to come under the scrutiny of both the Federal Trade Commission and the Justice Department's Anti-Trust Division, although WCI spokesman Geoffrey Holmes indicated that the company "(doesn't) believe there is any violation." He added that PolyGram and WCI have already filled required papers for the deal with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Labels contacted by Cash Box declined to comment on the possibility of bringing anti trust suits of their own.

Aside from WEA Distribution and WEA International, the WCI Records group includes Warner Bros., Elektra, Atlantic and Geffen Records. Aside from Deutsche Grammophon, Philips and London, the PolyGram Records Group includes the Polydor, Mercury, Casabianca and De-Lite labels.

No timetable for the dissolution of Together — which had already started operations distributing a number of labels, including Boardwalk Entertainment and Sugar Hill, in the West Coast region — was available at presstime.

with both sides lobbying heavily.

However, the Senate has been sitting on S-33 while it awalts the decision of the Supreme Court on the Sony Betamax case, which deals with copyright liability and the issue of home videotaping. A parallel bill in the House of Representatives, still in review before the House judiciary subcommittee on copyrights (headed by Rep. Robert Kastenmeier (D-Wisc.)), is also to be held in abeyance until the high court ruling (Cash Box, June 25).

According to a subcommittee source, no decision had been made as to whether audio should be treated separately from video. During hearings before the subcom-

mittee at UCLA in April of last year, Stanley Gortikov, president of the Recording Industry Assn. of America (RIAA) and a founder of the Coalition to Save America's Music, led an appeal for legIslation which would impose a royalty on home taping, while record retail witnesses, such as Hastings Books & Records' John Marmaduke, spoke of the "threat of record rentals . . . which might well spread from Japan to the U.S." (Cash Box, April 24, 1982).

Industry figures set the number of record rental outlets in Japan at 1,600 and record manufacturers there have consistently cited record rentals as a major cause for their sharp drop in sales during the past few years.
