## Turn, Turn, Turn

he pendulum theory of pop music suggests that certain styles will enjoy renewed currency in relation to a changing political climate and the endless pursuit of novelty. There's no refuting the commercial supremacy of heavy metal in today's marketplace, but it's impossible to know what's next. When disco reigned over a complacent, postrevolutionary culture, punk rushed into the void, rubbing our noses in what we'd become. For every resurrection of gloom-rock there's a teeny-bopper backlash, and for every move towards simplicity and sensitivity there's an impulse to magnify and orchestrate. Even if a trend is especially promising, its original impulses are unlikely to survive the hype and the inherent compromises of the marketing machinery. Still, many of us who have grown tired of the clatter, clutter and misogynist fantasies of commercial rock-n-roll are excited about the renewed vigor of . . . folk music.

Folk had its original fifteen minutes of prominence in the early '60s, a leftover beatnik phenomenon that was perfectly suited to the protest climate of the time. But as soon as Dylan went electric, the folk moment was over, and for twenty-odd years we have lived in a world of competing amplifiers. While folk has continued as a coffee-house novelty, it has generated little attention in such an overheated and competitive marketplace. But punk has taught a new generation of musicians a pair of valuable lessons that can be applied to a variety of musical styles: that there's room in this world for socially-conscious songwriting, and that a quality record can be made on the cheap with a minimum of studio embellishments.

Just as the cutting edge of country music today is the back-tobasics movement, there's a growing army of rock musicians whose club performances and recorded output are notable for their simplicity, their directness and their political edge. The American underground sports a number of bands who are appealing to a college-radio audience with minimal instrumentation, bands like Mojo Nixon and Skid Roper, House of Freaks,

## NARAS Adds Rap, Heavy Metal And Bluegrass Grammys

NEW YORK – NARAS has added Grammy Award categories for Best Rap Performance, Best Hard Rock/Heavy Metal Performance, and Best Bluegrass Recording, bringing to the current number of Grammy categories to 76. In addition, NARAS has "softened" the eligibility requirements for Best New Artist.

ÑARAS was criticized last year for its failure to recognize Rap as a separate category and for its peculiar Best New Artist requirements, which allowed Jody Watley (formerly of Shalamar) to compete but which disallowed Richard Marx for making a prior vocal appearance. NARAS was stung during the disco years, when it finally voted a Disco category just in time to watch disco disappear, so it was reluctant to attach itself to Rap.

"It should have its own award," says rapper Biz Markie. "The only reason is some rap records didn't sell that much, and there wasn't enough records hitting like there is. But they can't say that about this year."

NARAS, at its annual Trustees meeting in Santa Fe, decided to "soften" the Best New Artist eligibility requirements, but it has not yet worked out exactly how. It will, said a spokesman, allow "certain artists who may have appeared on previously released recordings, but not as featured artists," to vie for the Award. Details are expected to be worked out over the next month. At the same time, NARAS "tightened" the requirements for its two Producer of the Year Grammys - Classical Producer of the Year and Non-Classical Producer of the Year now required to have participated on two separately released recordings in the eligibility period (single or album, but not an album and a single from that album).

NARAS also created a new Fusion field, into which established Grammy categories of Best New Age Performance (formerly under the Pop heading) and Best Jazz Fusion Performance (formerly under the Jazz heading) will be placed.

Other business dealt with at the meetings were NARAS' intentions to place greater emphasis on its program of educational activities, its balloting procedures for the Lifetime Achievement and Trustees Awards, and its use once again of Los Angeles' Shrine Auditorium for the 1989 Awards telecast (with plans for a larger venue for 1990 discussed).

Among its other actions, the NARAS board approved potential funding for a contemplated building to house the national NARAS office and, possibly, the NARAS Foundation, and endorsed a stand against censorship.

Alfred W. Schlesinger was reelected for a second one-year term as chairman of the Board of Trustees, Tim McCabe was reelected as first national vice president, and Tom Morgan will serve a second term as national secretary/treasurer.

Mike Greene, NARAS' new permanent national president, said, "The attitudes and actions of the meeting were indicative of the progressive new attitude I feel is essential for the Academy's future," adding that NARAS is moving at "light speed in the development of its educational, archival and membership programs, in addition to our research efforts."

## Judge Approves Audiofidelity Settlement

NEW YORK – A settlement of the class action for copyright infringement brought on behalf of 200 music publishers against Audiofidelity Enterprises and its president Dante Pugliese was approved May 20 by U.S. District Court Judge Vincent L. Broderick. The settlement provides for payment of all royalties owed by Audiofidelity, an estimated \$1.6 million (to be verified by an audit examination of Audiofidelity's books and records).

The action was originally brought by Conrad Music on behalf of itself and the other publisher-principals of the Harry Fox Agency who hadrevoked and terminated their licenses under the Copyright Act to Audiofidelity, which failed to pay royalties for songs used on its records<sup>1</sup> and tapes.

As part of the settlement, Pulgiese must personally pay the publishers'. legal fees, more than \$50,000, and must divest himself of all of his direct or indirect ownership interests in Audiofidelity, a publicly-held corporation, as well as resign as an officer and director and terminate any direct or indirect beneficial business relationships with the corporation.

## Songwriter's Spotlight – Mann And Weil

LOS ANGELES – "There always seems to be room on the charts for real songs, songs that say something," comments lyricist Cynthia Weil. " When you hit that universal emotion – that's when you have a standard."

Fleetwood Mac, formed a little over a year ago by Peter Green (guitar, mouth harp and vocal), includes Jeremy Spencer (guitar and vocal), John McVie (bass) and Mick Fleetwood (drums)...Scheduling for the first U.S. tour by Atco's hot British quintet, the Bee Gees, is nearing completion. With guarantees at each date ranging from \$25,000 upwards, the tour could be the most financially rewarding one for any British act since the Beatles. ## COVER STORY Midnight Oil

LOS ANGELES – With the release of their sixth album, *Diesel And Dust* (Columbia), Sydney, Australia's Midnight Oil are finally receiving the U.S. recognition that they so richly deserve.

Since their formation in 1977, Midnight Oil have been reaping immense critical attention - their potent lyrics coupled with a relentless drive and passion made them one of the more successful underground imports.

The facts presented lead one to believe that a band of Midnight Oil's stature and conviction are relegated to cult status, critical acclaim, and, in the tradition of so many other worthy bands, virtually no record sales or radio airplay. So what is this band doing with a Top 40 single?

It's true. The first single off Diesel And Dust, "Beds Are Burning," is currently rising up the Cash Box Top 40 on the singles chart (#34 bullet this week). How did such a band achieve this mainstream recognition? They certainly did not compromise; the lyrical content of the songs on the LP are as powerful as anything the band has ever done - the messages are in tact and their intentions are clear. Perhaps what happened was that preconceptions of the band and their music were tossed out the window and, this time out, the public was allowed to decide for themselves. Whatever was done, it worked: not only is the single moving beyond anyone's expectations, but the album is steadily rising up Cash Box's Top 200 album chart as well (checking in this week at #20, with a bullet).

The power of their music immediately commands one's atten-

## Peter Murphy: From Bauhaus To Our House

There's something ironic about meeting a tanned and smiling Peter Murphy by a Hollywood poolside. From 1978 to 1983, Murphy was the lead singer of Bauhaus, the British band whose artful gloominess gave birth to the Gothic movement. If ever there was a pale prince of darkness, it was Peter Murphy, the man who made a hit record out of a song called "Bela Lugosi's Dead." But on his new

solo L.P., Love Hysteria, Murphy has ditched the witchiness for a tastefully-layered post-industrial crooning sound. A reasonable comparison is David Bowie circa "China Girl," and there are echoes of Bryan Ferry and Iggy Pop. The arrangements shimmer, with chiming guitars, glistening synths and danceable percussion behind Murphy's portentious vocals. There's a romantic, ethereal tone to much of his songwriting, with a bar-

rel full of poetic images and philosophical allusions. But Murphy in person is very down-to-earth, and he makes it clear that there's a deliberately theatrical element to his stage persona that too many people



tion; the underlying messages found\_ within the lyrics stir the mind. An initial spin to the music of Midnight Qil may cause the listener to perceive the lyrics simply as anthems of angst closer inspection finds them filled with hope and inspiration:

## NEW FACES TO WATCH

## Full Circle

#### By Lee Jeske

NEW YORK – "I always meant it to be an exploration into jazz and classical music and also drawing from ethnic musics – African music, Far Eastern music, South American music, gospel music – and trying to fuse these sorts of things into something without it getting to be jazzrock fusion," says Karl Lundeberg about Full Circle, whose album *Full Circle* is a recent Columbia release. "Tusion is sort of a dirty word, so I never sought to attach that label to is music."

Full Circle began its history over ten years ago, when Lundeberg, the band's composer and keyboardist, was going to school in Norway. Lundeberg, however, is American, and the current version of Full Circle – a flute/keyboards/bass/drums/vocals band – was formed in Boston, though – coincidentally? – two of its players are Scandinavian: bassist Terje Gewelt and flutist Anders Bostrom.

There is sort of a pan-Scandinavian element to this whole thing. And I think there's perhaps a coolless that you find in a lot of Scandinavian music that we go after. Not iciness, but a little coolness, a cleanliness, trying to keep lots of air in the nusic, lots of sky, that kind of thing.

"I think the concept also is trying to keep a lot of acoustic instruments acoustic bass, piano, flute and voice with a minimum of electronics. There is synthesizer and whatnot, but I try to balance everything so that there is not an overtly electric sound to things. I've tried to make it a little more organic." Lundeberg, who considers himself a composer more than anything, talks about all sorts of combinations: classical-jazz (he writes symphonies, too), jazz-classical, new age-jazzclassical, all kinds of things. But he doesn't mention the dreaded word, fusion – at least not very often. He does, however, have a feeling that his music can reach farther and wider than your usual jazz release.

"A lot of people have commented on the very melodic nature of our jazz, and that's something, without getting commercial. I've never been interested in pop music or commercial music. I think there are people who listen to James Taylor who, if they were exposed to this kind of jazz, would like it. Plus, this is jazz about fun. We're not interested, really, in exploring our personal problems on stage. We want to have fun, we want to interact with the audience.

"A lot of jazz groups go on stage and they have a very introspective aura that sort of is along the lines of: 'Okay, you're the audience. You're there, you can watch us, we're just going to do our thing. If you watch you watch, if you don't want to, go.'

"I grew up going to Pink Floyd concerts, where there was a big show. I think all of us in the group have had that experience and want to really put out more on stage and have some more fun and really involve the audience."

mistake for his true character. It's a misimpression that goes back to his work with Bauhaus.

"I never thought the Gothic thing was what we were all about," says Murphy of his old band. "We were cetting those gloomy, black-clad udiences when we were Bauhaus, but we never identified with them. We didn't laugh at them or mock them, but it was like, Why are people dressing up like this?' It was a herd, a whole crowd. Even now, you go anywhere in the world and they're an over. I must say, it's a wonderful legacy. Bauhaus is almost mythical now."

Murphy says he was forced to reevaluate his music- and his message when fans started taking his act too beriously. "Inevitably there are cople who take it all wrong. They're very affected by what you do. You might like to say, 'I'm just putting on a show,' and you want them to leave thinking that they've witnessed a great performance. But a lot more comes with that. People were saying to us, 'Why aren't you wearing black?' or 'I tried to kill myself last week and Bauhaus was the only thing that stopped me.' There was one guy who said, 'I can't live without Bauhaus. I'm going to check myself into an asylum next week.' \_\_\_\_\_'There's one part of you that says,

"There's one part of you that says, 'This is not my responsibility. This is their life.' But in another way, it was important to look at what we were doing, and to see through all the nonsense. I've definitely discovered through my own person, dealing with my own personal guilts and fears, what my responsibilities are as a performer."

After the break-up of Bauhaus, the other three members of the band went on to form Love And Rockets, while Murphy was free to pursue his solo vision. "The new music reflects the knowledge that I've gained since then. It's much more truthful now. I'm writing it, I'm in control. It isn't all gloom and doom. I've discovered, for instance, that I can write about my love for somebody, really write about it. Bauhaus was scared to use the word 'love.' We were convinced that there were so many bad songs (Continued on page 16)

OB DYLAN'S 115th TOUR -Here's the scoop on the Bob Dylan tour in support of the new Down In The Groove. The back-up band is not, as rumored, The Alarm, but a small group including Marshall Crenshaw on bass (who phoned Columbia not long ago to request the entire Dylan catalogue so he could study up), G.E. Smith on guitar, and Christopher Parker on drums. The Alarm will be on the bill as an opening act. Dates presently scheduled in the New York area: Jones Beach, Thursday and Friday, June 30 and July 1. Dylan, who is on at least one of the six studio tracks of the upcoming (mostly) live U2 record, is also set to appear in the next Dennis Hopper movie. Presently titled A Time To Die, it's the story of the romance between a woman who witnesses a gangland slaying and the hitman hired to kill her. Neil Young, Jodie Foster, and Hopper himself will also be in the movie.

TROPICANA - A quick argument for New York as the pan-ethnic musical center of the universe: Yomo Toro at S.O.B.'s, May 12; the Brazil Projects concert series at Town Hall, May 11 to May 14; the upcoming Kassav show at the Ritz, May 29. And if that isn't homegrown enough for you, take a listen to the first legit flourishings of the reggae-rap connection (not just impositions of one style on the other, but genuine creoles), all from the Bronx: Shinehead's Rough And Rugged (African Love), Boogie Down Production's "The Bridge ls Over" from Criminal Minded (B Boy), and The Masters Of Ceremony singles "Sexy" and "Master Move" both from their upcoming LP on Fourth And Broadway. And they say Paris is cool.

Yomo Toro didn't win the title "the Jimi Hendrix of the cuatro" (conferred by New York Times critic Robert Palmer) just for his virtuosity on the ten stringed guitar-like instrument. At his S.O.B.'s show, a release party for the excellent new Funky Jibaro (Antilles/New Directions), his playing was furious and inspired, and when his solos could build no further he would practically assault his instrument with a slashing, wild strumming that cut deep into the salsa beat. It was the ultimate combination of rhythm and melody in a lust dance of celebration. That drive, more than the flurries of notes he can unleash, is what merits the Hendrix comparison. A hip record and a very hip show (David Byrne was there, and he was dancing happily).

The Brazil Projects shows brought four Brazilian performers to New York for rare appearences, tropicalista Caetano Veloso, jazz singer Leny Andrade, jazz-samba fusionist Joao Bosco, and the father of bossa nova Joao Giberto. Veloso, whose album Caetano is out domestically on PolyGram, did a beautiful acoustic set (which included a dreamy version of Jorge Ben's "Charles, Anjo 45," and a deliciously understated solo version of Cole Porter's "Just One Of Those Things"), surrounded by two electric sets in which he played rock and reggae with varying degrees of success. Though the Brazilians may get off on his stage antics, he doesn't have a bit of rock star presence, not for a U.S. audience, and his clownish "Look at me, I'm a cross between the cultural significance of Michael Jackson and the intelligence of David Byrne" behavior during a cover of an Arto Lindsay song (from Lindsay's soon to be released Greed on Virgin) was plain embarrassing. Joao Gilberto closed the series with a solo concert that was enthralling. What more can 1 say?

EQUAL RIGHTS - An Animal Rights Music Festival has been organized by PETA (People For The Ethical Treatment Of Animals), the same organization responsible for the Animal Liberation album last year. Scheduled to take place on the National Mall in Washington, DC, on Saturday, June 11, the festival will include Howard Jones, Natalie Merchant and Robert Buck of 10,000 Manics, Guadacanal Diary, Exene Cervenka of X, Lene Lovich, Nina Hagen, and Washington area groups Betty, and Big Bang Theory. The B-52's are listed as guest hosts. PETA can be reached at (202) 726-0156.

ANTI-NUCLEAR SUMMIT – And yet more music in service of social action: Crosby, Stills & Nash, Bruce Cockburn, and the U.S.S.R. rock band Aquarium will all play a concert to kick off 8th World Congress of the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War (IPPNW) at Montreal's Forum on June 3. IPPNW won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1985.

TASTY BITS - Teddy Riley is one of the best producers to come out of New York recently. His talent for harnessing def street beats and putting them to work in soulfully sung pop songs has tricked black radio into programming rap rhythms, paving the way for the radio and chart sucess of rappers like Kool Moe Dee (whose first album Riley worked on) and DJ Jazzy Jeff & The Fresh Prince. With hits like Keith Sweat's "I Want Her," and Johnny Kemp's current smash "Just Got Paid" to his credit, Riley is in demand. His recent work includes Guy's Groove Me and Stephanie Mills's next record, both on MCA, both recorded at Quantum Studios in Jersey City...Hugo Largo, whose ethereal debut EP was produced by Mike Stipe of R.E.M., have been signed to a Warners Distributed label...Run-DMC's "Beats To The Rhyme" (the flip of "Run's House") is already a Coke commercial ... Public Enemy's second record, out next month on Def Jam-Columbia, is called It Takes A Nation Of Millions To Hold Us Back ... The Newport Folk Festival, discontinued in 1969 and revived 1985, will survive thanks to sponsorship from Ben and Jerry's Homemade ice cream. 

Iceland's coolest export (and England's band-of-the-month) serve up an eerily entertaining brand of neo-psychedelia, somewhat in the manner of Siouxsie and the Banshees. Bjork the songstress unleashes her piercing, English-language vocals in a way that is wide-eyed and overtly sexual, while Einar contributes offbeat spoken-word observations. This is the sound of crosscultural pollination when it blooms into something completely new.

A new American troubadour emerges in Michael Anderson, whose muscular singing and folk-cum-boogie arrangements evoke the same feelings as Springsteen or Mellencamp. The politically charged title track should score big.

This is jangly guitar pop with polish and heart from a young British quartet that takes its songcraft seriously. Herbie and his toys have recruited some funk heavy-hitters for this album, including producer Bill Laswell, bassist Bootsy Collins and vocalist Sugar Bonner of the Ohio Players. The result is a space-age synth-funk explosion with moments of soaring, melodic sweetness.

F IMPORT – PolyGram Special Imports may be dead, but PolyGram's special imports continue. Presently out and about from the various European labels that Poly-Gram Jazz imports are David Murray and Randy Weston's unique The Healers, Nana Vasconcelos and Italian pianist Antonello Salis's unique Lester (from Black Saint); Billy Bang's Live At Carlos 1, Paul Motian's Misterioso, the fantastic Spanish pianist Tete Montoliu's The Music I Like To Play, Mal Waldrons solo Update (from Soul Note, Black Saint's sister label); An Evening with Joe Henderson, Charlie Haden and Al Foster, Kenny Barron and Buster Williams' Two As One, Cedar Walton's The Trio 2, continually-underrecognized alto saxophonist Bobby Watson's Love Remains (Red Records); Steve Lacy and Gil Evans's unusual album of duets, Paris Blues (Evans' last recording session), and Richie Beirach's Common Heart (Owl). Lots of good and diverse listening there, I reckon.

MAKING GOOD WITH TATERS AND GRITS - Jazziz Magazine, that aggressive fusionoriented publication from Florida, is about to launch a national campaign called (get this) "Making Jazz Popular Music." Sounds like a good idea to me. What we're talking about here is a combined effort of (get this) 17 record labels, seven retail chains, and over 400 radio stations, and a cross-promotion with VH-1's New Visions. The thrust of this thing is a Jazziz sampler CD with 17 tracks, one from each of those 17 labels – a menu degustation of 17 of those labels' new albums (heavily weighted towards fusion and new age music, by the way). The CD, called Jazziz Collections Volume One, will (get this) be avail-able free to anybody purchasing two CDs from any of the participating labels. Radio stations'll be inundated with these samplers, and all sorts of interrelated marketing schemes are planned. Music Land, Peaches, Record Bar, Strawberries, Radio Doctors, Camelot and Rose Records are the retailers already signed up

A LITTLE THIS, A LITTLE THAT – Columbia Jazz Masterpieces continues to be the most

steadfast jazz reissue series - every couple of months, another stack of the things is issued in every format known to mankind. As usual, the current issue (six items) is a mixed bag of goods. In the plain-old reissue category is Ray Bryant's '60-'61 Con Alma, with one extra track. In the previously-unissued category is Earl Hines Live at the Village Vanguard, '65 trio and quartet performances from the piano giant. In the continuing (though not complete) series category is Benny Goodman Vol. III, All The Cats Join In, '41-'46 tracks from the big band. In the anthology category is The 1940s - The Small Groups: New Directions, bringing together the small-band offspring of three big bands: Woody Herman & His Woodchoppers (10 tracks), The Gene Krupa Trio (five tracks), and The Harry James Sextet (two tracks). And in the compilation category are The Great Concerts, a two-disc set culled from a number of live LPs (recorded in '57 and '63) by the Dave Brubeck Quartet (Paul Desmond, Joe Morello, Gene Wright), and Ballads, another Miles Davis cut-and-paste job, bringing together four tracks (out of seven) from Quiet Nights, three tracks from Seven Steps to Heaven, and a live Blackhawk track; all ballads of course.

WINNERS – The five semifinalists in the fourth annual "Hennessy Cognac Jazz Search" are (drum roll) Harold McKinney (Detroit), the Scott Kreitzer Quartet (New York), the Wainapel Quintet (Los Angeles), Digression Mode (Chicago), and the Stefan Karlsson Quintet (New Orleans). They've each won a thousand bucks and an all-expenses paid trip to L.A., where they'll compete at The Palace, June 16, for a chance to open the Playboy Jazz Festival at the Hollywood Bowl, June 19.

STUDENTS – The sixth edition of "Jazz Greats/Great Jazz," an NYU School of Continuing Education course on our favorite American art form, taught by jazz writer/publicist/bon vivant Arnold Jay Smith, will get under way June 8 with an appearance by Grady Tate. Also signed on for guest spots at the weekly sessions are Tito Puente, Walter Bishop Jr., Bucky Pizzarelli, Doc Cheatham, and Herbie Mann. A call to (212) 998-7130 gets you registration information and all sorts of other details.

BOPPING AROUND – ProJazz is running a promotion called "Cool Jazz Hot Summer," which centers around a \$5.99 sampler CD of 15 tracks from their catalogue...New School of New York music student Christopher Walker has won the \$1,500 Errol Garner Memorial Foundation Scholarship award.

Feeling" helped create blue-eyed soul and gave producer Phil Spector a blueprint for his modern-pop style. "On Broadway" (written with Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller) brought jazz-tinged chords into 60's pop music again. "We Gotta Get Out Of This Place," a hit for the Animals and "Kicks", Paul Revere and The Raiders' anti-drug song, were leader tunes for the movement of socially conscious statements on to pop radio. Their early 80's song "Just Once" was a hit for James Ingram on Quincy Jones' album The Dude, and was credited for establishing the "Eighties" standard for sophisticated pop songwriting. Their Sergio Mendes hit, "Never Gonna Let You Go" was another example of this new trend. Recently the team got an Academy Award nomination for the song "Somewhere Out There" from an American Tail. Sprinkled around these landmarks were numerous other hits written both as a team and separately, any one of which would be enough to sustain most songwriters' careers.

Over the last 25 years Cynthia Weil and Barry Mann have seen the music business evolve, and they spoke to *Cash Box* about how conditions have changed for the songwriter, and about their new aspirations.

"In the old days (as staff writer's) there was such competitiveness, such angst, my stomach was always turning," says Mann. "But what I do miss was the real excitement about music...Heads of record companies, A&R guys were close to what we were doing, there wasn't such a concern for demographics, it was less clinical. Also, there were many more record companies, a lot more product."

"Things would happen quickly in those days," says Weil."The songs would be out in a couple of months. Nowadays young writers can have a song held for a year for an album. Also hearing what other top writers were doing, in close proximity, was really great. Young songwriters today are very isolated. They only hear what's on the radio. We heard how songs evolved, how other people worked. I have a feeling writers today think everyone is writing a hit every time out!"

In order to keep up with the times, Mann has built his own recording studio to demo his tunes and produce artists, and he finds it to be a great challenge. 'Today, unless you're an artist or

"Today, unless you're an artist or record producer, there are fewer outlets for great songs," says Mann. "The business goes through these phases. It's because of the studio scene and the accessible technology... synthesizes, drum machines... kids grow up around the equipment and become writers, performers and producers. To be contemporary, a songwriter has to know the modern studio and production techniques."

"It's more difficult today for a lyricist," says Weil. "A lot of the stuff you hear today is forgettable and interchangeable. For a lot of dance records the words don't matter, they just have to flow with the music and have the general essence of something vague that people want to hear. When you think of a really structured song in the classical sense, it has a point, it all makes sense, each verse is an outgrowth of the next and it captures an emotion that people want to express but don't know how ... there aren't that many of those around. In fact when one comes out, like

Michael Bolton and Eric Kaz's "That's What Love Is All About," a couple people thought we'd written it! I considered it a compliment because when I heard it on the radio, I wished I had written it."

"If Cynthia and I were artists," says Mann. "We'd have the vehicle to do even more trend-setting songs." Adds Weil, "Barry's strengths as a songwriter actually hurt his chances of being an artist, because he can write in any style and he never really figured out what sounded best when he was singing. Most artists have a specific musical and lyrical point of view that people want to hear. That's why they get hot for a couple of years than cool off. They hit a chord that people want to hear."

Mann and Weil's hit songs were recently featured in a Broadway show called Just Once, a Romeo and Juliet-type story that follows starcrossed lovers from the 60's to the present, using the tunes as the connecting thread. Barry Mann thinks they could write a good original musical as well. But for Cynthia, her interests are turning to screenwriting, and she penned a T.V. movie called *Running With The Night*, based on her hit song she wrote with Lionel Richie.

"I feel really lucky that my songs have gotten heard as a songwriter," says Weil. "But after you've done one thing for a certain number of years, it's hard to keep growing and challenging yourself. So I've gotten into screenwriting. Songwriting is such a collaborative medium, at least with screenwriting you can do it alone, and on the day you want to do it."

Despite other interests, Barry Mann and Cynthia Weil will write songs for as long as they feel it's working. And it's worked brilliantly for more than a quarter-century. In this unpredictable business, that's astounding.

with the word 'love' in them that we couldn't touch it."

But Love Hysteria is hardly a straightforward pop experience. In its way it is as textured and challenging as his previous work, with an added dimension of wordplay and subtle humor. Most of the songs are delivered as stories or parables, and Murphy says they are deliberately ambiguous.

"Some people worry too much about my lyrics. They want to know what they all mean. If you don't want to work with it, if you just want to listen to the music itself, that's okay. When I write something, I've got several things in mind at once, and I try to describe it in the widest possible sense. You can't literally describe what's going on. It's a train of thought, playing with the words themselves as well as having a meaning."

His mixture of complex ideas and accessible arrangements should translate into success on both a dance-club and cult level. His new single, "All Night Long" is making steady progress on the charts, while the theatrical flourish of his current tour is drawing sizable crowds from small Midwestern markets to the media centers of Europe and America. Soon he will embark on a Japanese tour as well.

Having established an identity of his own, Murphy has big plans for his future, plans that include dance, film and literary experimentation in addition to his music. "I want to be Jean Cocteau," he says, "the multi, multi man."

the Balancing Act and the Washington Squares. A handful of folky duos, like Timbuk 3, They Might Be Giants and Pineapple 69, use a guitar and beatbox arrangement to simulate a larger ensemble while maintaining their low-tech portability. House of Freaks is just a guitarist and drummer, while Mojo and Skid brew up a howlin' rootsrock explosion on guitar and washboard.

On the L.A. club circuit, electric performers such as X, the Dream Syndicate, Firehose and the Circle Jerks are playing all-acoustic sets in intimate little venues, while Cindy-Lee Berryhill has attracted majorlabel interest with her Bob Dylan guitar-and-harmonica thing. In England, Billy Bragg plays nothing but a solo electric guitar, often hauling a small amplifier on his back as he travels from city to city, agitating for workers' rights.

Even on the commercial level Suzanne Vega is enjoying big success with just her little guitar, while performers like R.E.M., Bruce Springsteen, John Cougar Mellencamp, and the Celtic band the Pogues incorporate various folk/acoustic elements into their music, presumably as a reaction against the excesses of rock orthodoxy. Solo-folky Tracy Chapman is the big news of the moment on both sides of the Atlantic, and 10,000 Maniacs recently made a hit single out of Cat Stevens' "Peace Train."

But all this renewed interest in folk music has hardly inspired a corresponding rise in protest activity, and for every clever songwriter with an acoustic guitar, there are a hundred new bands like Guns N'-Roses that are trying to revive the long-haired, rock-outlaw aesthetic, with much more commercial success. This could suggest that the pendulum has already swung in another direction – or it could mean that the full flowering of the folk revolution is still ahead of us.

This week in Shop Talk we take a look at the soundtrack. Of the 200 releases on the Cash Box Album Chart, ten are soundtracks. We asked the soundtrack in terms of - among other things - re-releases, sales, popularity and promotion. MAINSTREAM - Milwaukee, WI.

#### Reporting: Scott White

Soundtracks are definitely happening. People have taken notice with the ones that have really taken off, and know that the only way to get certain songs is by buying the Soundtrack."

"I think The Big Chill recording really started the escalation of soundtrack sales. The abels are now realizing the benefits of collaborating with other labels in order to put together a soundtrack. They understand the financial impact this combined effort can have - even if the movie's a disaster."

"As far as promotion goes, we do endcaps that feature all the hot soundtracks. We put these near our video department and that is usually real effective.'

"The musical/show type soundtracks are getting a lot of interest from high school or-ganizations. They're definitely selling. RCA Victor seems to be particularly happening in terms of soundtrack re-releases"

#### MARVARD COOP - Boston, Mass.

#### Reporting: Robert Etherington

"I think the record companies are being a little slow in exploiting show, as opposed to movie soundtracks, when it comes to the compact disc. It's very frustrating not being able to get the old soundtracks from the 40's and 50's. People want them on CD. Everything now is CD, CD, CD. Almost anything on this format will sell here... of course you have to remember where we are."

"All the free advertising that is inherent with soundtracks helps immensely. We also do a fair amount of displays.'

The Betty Blue soundtrack has been big for us. It's a very fashionable movie among the college set. It used to be only on the French Virgin label. Now, however, it is available domestically at a more reasonable price."

"Dirty Dancing is still very strong after all these months. Otherwise, the show music has been more popular than the movie soundtracks... like Phantom of the Opera, Into the Woods, Les Miserables and anything with Irving Berlin's name on it. Strangely, one of our best sellers after all these years is the Amadeus soundtrack on Fantasy Records. And, also on Fantasy and just now out on CD is the soundtrack from The Unbearable Lightness of Being. It should be a very big seller.'

#### POPLAR TUNES - Memphis. Tenn.

#### Reporting: Jim Burge

"We put up posters in the local movie theatres to inform the public that the soundtrack is available in our store. We also try to get in touch with the theatres to try and set up some cross-promotional ideas.

The show soundtracks don't do so well here since it is few and far between when show might come through town. We seem to do better with them farther down the fine. The CD re-releases of the soundtracks are good, solid catalog items."

TOWER -- San Francisco, CA

#### Reporting: Allan Wilson

"I don't think that the recent popularity of the soundtrack is a unique phenomenon. I mean, you can go back to American Graffiti and Saturday Night Fever which were top of the chart type albums. It seemed in the past year or so that every movie had a soundtrack out or it had a rock n' roll song in it. Many became more like MTV-type shows."

"Our whole back wall is soundtracks. We have boards above them that have some current displays of what is hot or what we feel will be"

"Catalog releases sell really well, as do the Broadway shows like Phantom and Les Miserables and Into the Woods. Colors is our biggest seller right now - it's very strong. Also, the Dirty Dancing, More Dirty Dancing, Good Morning, Vietnam, School Daze and Philip Glass' Powaqqatsi soundtrack are all doing well."

#### MIDDLE EARTH - Downey, CA

#### Reporting: Brian Rosser

"Since Grease and Saturday Night Fever, and even more since Footloose, there's just been a flood of soundtracks. Permanent Record is the latest one that's doing well. Labels used to do compilations with various artists, now they do soundtracks.

"Our store layout is it's own form of cross-promotion. You have to go through the LP department in order to get to the videos. When Dirty Dancing came out on video, we put a display near the front counter - it worked very well. A lot of times when something comes out on video the soundtrack will pick up again. However, I also feel that if the film isn't popular, the soundtrack won't sell no matter how good it is."

#### TOWER - New York, NY

**Reporting: Tony Coyle** 

"I think the soundtracks are selling better now than ever. They are a lot more impor-tant to the success of a movie, and vice-versa, than before. This store sells a lot of scores - things like Tangerine Dream and Ennio Morricone. That type of soundtrack is really picking up.'

The CD re-releases are doing well for us. The Blade Runner CD just came out and is doing extremely, as is the To Live and Die in LA release. Also, when something comes out on video cassette, our sales jump. The Lost Boys is one of our better sellers again. We do some cross-promotion with our video store down the street as well.'

## Select Records Raps Into The '80's

LOS ANGELES – They are a mere eight years old, yet Select Records is one of the strongest and most streethip Rap labels around. Under the supervision of owner/founder Fred Munao, they recently expanded into R&B, Dance and Heavy Metal, proving their ability to be a full-service record company.

Munao, formerly a music manager, decided to form the label after observing how record companies worked and stating, "I could make the same mistakes!" The company maintains a truly independent stance, controlling its own distribution and marketing nationwide. They license all their own product, including international.

One of the Select's first successful rap acts was UTFO. Company spokesman and Director of Publicity Glen Olsheim commented, "UTFO's song 'Roxanne, Roxanne' really changed the face of Rap Music. Up to that song, Rappers had been totally invincible. I'm the King of Rappers, I can get any woman I want... Here was a group singing a song about a girl they *couldn't* get. It ended up selling over 400,000 singles and it went to the top of the charts in the summer of '83. It inspired 28 answer records."

Select has gone on to have success with such rap acts as Real Roxanne, Whistle (who scored a top 30 tune "Just Bugging"), Chubb Rock, and True Mathematics (produced by Public Enemy's producer Hank Shocklee). Additionally they have signed dance acts including Travis Fludd and Darcy Alonzo ("Love Grows Stronger"). Another talented R&B vocalist is Annette Taylor.

Not to be pigeon-holed into any category, Munao and company have started a new Heavy Metal division, a subsidiary label called Mondo Music. The first release is a band called Damien from Toledo, Ohio.

"We have more albums coming out than ever," says Olsheim. "We have about a dozen coming out this year. That's as many as we produced in the first four years of operation. Rap, of course, used to be primarily

a 12' market. It's really exciting for us to grow and we're adding a lot of personnel to the company."

## The Season For Mouzon

LOS ANGELES – One of the hottest drummers in any genre over the past two decades, Alphonse Mouzon, is riding the success of his most recent release for Optimism Records, *Early Spring*. The disc has risen all the way up to #14 with a bullet on the *Cash Box* Jazz Album chart, after only six weeks. Currently on tour, Alphonse was one of the highlight performers at the prestigious Queen Mary Jazz Festival in Long Beach. He is a polished veteran that is no stranger to the studio or the stage, and one who has helped to spawn many success stories on the contemporary jazz scene.

Mouzon was one of the founding members in both Weather Report and The Eleventh House, two of the

most innovative and influential jazz/fusion bands of the seventies. Aside from being one of the most versatile drummers around, Alphonse often surprises his audiences with dexterity and finesse on the piano as well. Mouzon's familiarity with the keyboard gives him his strong compositional sense that enables him write, arrange, and produce all of his tunes. Early Spring displays a range of material, from the accessible flair of "Early Spring,"the contemporary re-working of the classic "Seven Steps To Heaven," the smoking grooves of "We Almost Made It" and "I Can Give You Love," to the moving delicacy of "Alone in Paris" and 'Waterfall."

Mouzon will be in perpetual motion the next few months in support of the LP. Astoundingly, even though Alphonse is a veteran of seventeen albums, this will be his first national tour with his own band. Aside from his involvement with Weather Report and the Eleventh House, Mouzon has worked with George Benson, Eric Clapton, Al DiMeola, Gil Evans, Joe Zawinal, Larry Coryell, Chubby Checker, McCoy Tyner, Roy Ayers, Herbie Hancock, Freddie Hubbard, Les McCann, Stevie Wonder, Carlos Santana, Donald Byrd, Lee Ritenour, Tom Scott, John Klemmer, Dave Grusin, David Benoit, Gerald Albright, Dizzy Gillespie, and Sonny Rollins - just to name a few. Gerald Albright, now at #29 on the Cash Box Jazz chart, David Benoit at #6, Dave Grusin, co-founder of GRP Records with three albums in the top ten, and Lee Ritenour, featured on GRP Super Live, at #20, were all sidemen for Mouzon early in their careers. Along with Joe Zawinal at #19, McCoy Tyner at #30 and Wayne Shorter at #28, it's remarkable to note the quantity of current success stories that Mouzon has been associated with.

Always one to take the bull by the horns, Mouzon has maintained total creative control of his recent recordings, and plays an active part in the business facet of his affairs - helping to organize his tours and track many of the details of his career. He has always maintained a practical businness dimension to balance his creative side, having even graduated from Manhattan Medical Schoolbefore his music career vaulted into high gear.

Alphonse will be touring with the dynamic Richard Elliot on sax, Amil-Palame and Pat Coil alternating on keys, and Jay Dulaney on bass. They will be appearing at The Coach\* House in San Juan Capistrano on June 2nd, the Baccaret in Seattle on June 9th, the Great American Music Hall in San Francisco on June 10th the Cabaret in San Jose June 11th, Birdland West in Longbeach June 17th & 18th, Valentynes in Orlando, Fla. June 22nd - 25th, July 15th in Tulsa, Oklahoma, the Toya Right Festival in Colorado on July 16th, Concerts by the Sea July 21st-24th the Rockefellas in Houston on August 5th, Mt. Charleston in Las Vegas on August 7th, and the Newport Beach Jazz Festival on August 14th. Profile Records has such a wide array of successful and uprising rappers that we were unable to cover them all in last week's Rap issue. So, Profile Rap II has been spawned out of necessity in order to keep you abreast of some of the hottest budding rappers around...

#### Derek B

Derek B is Great Britain's first authentic rap star. His debut album, *Bullet From A Gun*, is due for release here in the states on June 20th. Profile's expectations are running very high for this effort, especially since Derek has already had two popular singles here in the U.S. A third U.K. release entitled "Goodgroove," which appears on the LP, reached the top 10 back in England.

Derek had spent six arduous years of paying dues, moving and shaking

within East London's club scene as a club jock, and DJ-ing on several of London's influential pirate radio broadcasters. He then worked as an employee of his first label, Music of Life. His first project as an A&R per-

son was in setting up a compilation album of stateside rap. Faced with an empty slot to fill and no more money in the budget to recruit another U.S. artist, Derek pumped out his own (Continued on page 19)

collection. The ramifications of "Rock the Beat" were more far-reaching than Derek could have imagined. Mr. Magic, the distinguished rap DJ in New York, passed along an import copy to Profile, and within a week Derek had amazingly become a label-mate of the kings of rap, Run-DMC. Experience London's premier rapper on Bullet From a Gun, predicted to go down as a "milestone for British rap" by England's own Record Mirror.

#### Asher D. & Daddy Freddy

Asher D. & Daddy Freddy are in the forefront of what has been described as the "next phase in rap music" - the fusion of rap with Jamaican reggae. The common denominators of the two idioms have long been recognized by fans and critics alike, having become popular "styles during the same era. With two singles, "Raggamuffin Hip Hop" and "Brutality" b/w "Don't Stop Do ""/"Asher's Revenge," the duo has set the standard for the melding of styles. Both Asher D. and Daddy Freddy are Jamaican expatriates who were well known on the reggae circuit in London. Freddy had two significant dance hall hits with "Get Fat" and "Body Lasher" before the two combined for their first venture into hiphop rhythm on "Raggamuffin Hip Hop." With their newest single, shipped on May 18th, look for a new pulse to start taking shape.

#### Rob Base & DJ E-Z Rock

Rob Base & DJ E-Z Rock are riding the crest of their current release and smash single, "It Takes Two,"which has sold over 60,000 copies to date. The tune was an instant hit at the underground rap and radio shows here in the U.S.. Not only that, but, it managed to achieve Top 20 status on the U.K. national dance chart as an import even before its release on the British Citybeat label. "It Takes Two" has been described as "the most danceable and accessible rap record of the spring of 1988," incorporating the soul rhythms of the early 70's with the high-tech dance power of the drum machine. The demand for the Harlem duo as live performers is also increasing on the heels of the record's success, having sold over 50,000 copies to date.

#### M.C.Beta

M.C. Beta is another up and coming rapper whose modest ambition is to advance the art of rap itself. His first single "There's Nothing Like New York" was produced by the influential Bronx-based Jazzy Jay. The single has been described by Beta as "a mellow groove for people who work hard. I want to change the way people listen to rap, adding lots of logic and straightforward meaning."



#### *Tones: The Calgary Sampler Album, 1988* – Golden Rock (WRC1-5627) –

There's something profoundly gratifying about hearing a compilation album from a supposed cultural backwater like Calgary, Canada, and finding that none of the material stinks. We Yankees tend to take our friends up north for granted, and while it's true that their creative output is usually an echo of our own, they have a wonderful way of sorting through American excess and producing material that is solid, sincere and unpretentious.

## **Rappin' With the Teach**

LOS ANGELES – Daylle The Rappin' Teach is on a roll these days. In response to a dare by some of her students who said that "a white woman couldn't do rap," Daylle bet them that she could and ended up writing and recording a legitimate rap disk.

With the help of producer Kenni Hairston, former musical director for Cyndi Lauper and currently the keyboard player with Cameo, she wrote and recorded "Girls Can Do," a toast to woman and their expanding roles in today's society. This disc received an endorsement from Noreen Connell, the N.Y.S. President of the National Organization of Woman.

Daylle's second release, "Wrap It Up," was produced by Leroi Evans of the Force MD's. It is her account of rap from a teacher's point of view, and the story of how Daylle became a rapper. Her third release is entitled "Teacher's Breaking Back," which explains why kids don't learn in school. All of these titles have been released on the Revenge Records label. Daylle has also recently toured with Kurtis Blow in England. This acceptance in the music industry proved vital in erasing the barriers and prejudices among the students who originally laughed at her. They now consider her a serious rapper.

Her message is a simple, and positive one: believe in yourself and you will succeed. It has been well received by her pupils/fans. They have dubbed her "The Rappin" Teach," and have begun to sport "I'm a DAYLLE Believer" T-shirts and buttons. To get the message across, she also raps to her students during the course of a lesson, and she intends to carry on her dual career as long as possible. For more information, Ida S. ## NARM Opens Door To Independents

LOS ANGELES - At the National Association of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) Independendent Action Committee (IAC) meeting at the Monteleone Hotel in New Orleans, The doors were opened to any representative of an independent label or distributor. The announcement came while the National Association of Independent Record Distributors and Manufacturers (NAIRD) were have their own convention at the same notel. The gesture has resulted in several new objectives and programs for the expanded IAC, including bi-monthly conference calls Letween promotion departments for the purpose of sharing airplay and market action information on new and breaking records distributed by NARM.

IAC Executive Committee Chairman Phil Jones (of Fantasy Records) announced at the open meeting the appointment of chairpersons to head the IAC's two sub-committees. Appointed as Chairman of the Promotion Sub-Committee was John Salstone (M.S. Distributing) and Mel Fuhrman (Little Major Records) was appointed to chair the Sales/Marketing Sub-Committee.

The IAC also endorsed the development of a Standard Radio Tracking Sheet for the independents. The Tracking Sheet will eliminate confusion caused by the different tracking methods used. Additionally, the group announced an attempt to develop standard, appropriate contract language for indie distributors.

The semi-weekly conference calls were developed by John Salstone at

M.S. Distributing, Chairman of the IAC Promotion Sub-Committee. The calls, which run about 30 minutes, are scheduled to take place every other Friday at 3:30 eastern standard time. The teleconferences are open to the promotion departments of any NARM member independent label or distributor. The format of the call has been a region-by-region recap of airplay reports followed by a section devoted exclusively to the concerns of the sponsoring indie labels. NARM will be circulating a sign-up sheet to independent labels interest in the calls. Contact John Salstone at M.S. Distributing (312) 364-2888.

Phil Jones, Chairman of the IAC, says he is "very enthusiastic" about the value of the phone exchanges. "The IAC was formed for the purpose of facilitating communication between both indie labels and distributors."

John Salstone at M.S. commented, "We've had five conference calls since the NARM Convention with about 30 people on each call. The calls really help because we're all out there working hard to break records, but we're isolated."

Future objectives discussed at the convention included more independent involvement in NARM operations, as well as a continued "open door" policy to any NARM member indie label or distributor. The next scheduled meeting will take place during the annual NARM Wholesalers Conference, set for October 24-27th at the Palm Springs Plaza in Palm Springs, California.

As far as I know, the only Canadian band that has cracked the college radio market in the last few years is the solid, sincere and unpretentious 54-40, but if this album is any indication, there are numerous bands playing in larger cities across Canada that have what it takes to appeal to hip listeners everywhere. All four of the bands that are showcased on this eight-song platter are in the newwave/college-radio/alternative-rock vein, and none are so abrasive or adventurous that they couldn't appeal to a wider audience as well.

Remarkably, the bands complement each other rather than duplicate or conflict with one another. The material is polished without being glossy, brash without being rude. The two songs by Big Bang Theory alternate between post-R.E.M. guitar jangle and skiffle-bouncy roots rock. This Bicameral Mind offers two doses of earnest art-folk, one of which, somewhat puzzingly, addresses the assasination of John Kennedy. The 21 Hundredz get the prize for most spirited ensemble with a propulsive pop-punk number called "Now Playing," and contribute a progressive, somber slice of angst called "Today." Same Difference, behind the dynamic vocals of Janine Bracewell, might be the most talented of the bunch, with a stately neo-jazz tune called "Soft In her Silence" and a passionate synthdance number called "Kiss of Ice."

All in all, this is everything a compilation album should be – energetic, cohesive, solidly produced and a surprising introduction to a scene that we haven't fully appreciated until now.

LESLIE WEST *Theme* – Passport PB 6061 For those of you who mourn the demise of such bands as Cream, Mountain, and the Jimi Hendrix Experience, and for those of you who yearn for a guitarist who can wring more soul and emotion out of a single sustained note than any number of today's pretenders to the guitar-god throne - your wait has ended. Leslie West, formerly or the groups Mountain and West, Bruce & Laing, is back with a new album on Passport Records. He recorded the LP with Cream bassist Jack Bruce and Twisted Sister drummer Joe Franco.

The album has the look and sound of one recorded during the late 60's. The music is stripped-down, basic blues oriented rock in the tradition of the great 60's power-trios. The performances are loose and relaxed. West even resurrects several classics including Mountain's "Theme From an Imaginary Western," and live versions of Hendrix's "Red House" and Cream's "Spoonful." Bruce, who co-wrote "Imaginary Western," is featured vocally on the track, as well as on "Spoonful." West holds forth vocally on "Red House," and his rhythm guitar replaces the familiar Hammond B-3 background wash on "Imaginary Western." Leslie's signature playing has not deteriorated through the years, with his solos right on the mark throughout the collection.

With all the attention being given to

the great bands and solo artists from the late 60's and early 70's, the time may be right for a revamped Mountain to hit the road and start tearing up the concert circuit. One only hopes that this album will provide the spark that makes this scenario a reality. 



## NASHVILLE NOTE-ABLES

## Mary Reeves Davis... "Jim's Career Never Peaked!"

n February, when the tourist traffic isn't so heavy, I spent a relaxed morning at the Jim Reeves Museum located at Briley Parkway and Gallatin Road in Nashville/Madison, Tennessee. The museum is a stately, old home with more than a hundred years of rich American history in its background. It is also a beautiful, tastefully-done reminder of the man's career and accomplishments of a tragically shortened lifetime.

I was there as the guest of a very gracious lady...Mary Reeves Davis, Jim's widow. In a small building off to the side of the "big house" (now the office), we sat in casual conversation...although there is nothing casual about Mary's business attitude. I had suspected that from knowing of her accomplishments in the music industry. She mentioned one fact that made me very proud...Cash Box gave Jim Reeves his very first award in 1953! It was a relatively small trophy presented to him in honor of his #1 jukebox record, "Mexican Joe," on Abbott Records.

Mary and Jim were married in 1947. Both grew up in East Texas. They moved to Nashville in 1955, when Jim signed with RCA. He was honored with membership to the Grand Ole Opry, and what was to be a spectacular career was beginning to blossom. He was a country music superstar shortly after. His soft, easy style combined with a neverto-be-matched velvet quality in his voice made him an international star. But, as every true country fan knows, Jim Reeves lost his life, while piloting his private airplane, on July 31, 1964. Mary explained what her life was like immediately after the tragedy.

"You think about things you would do in *case* something does happen. I knew what I wanted to do, which is what I have done. You see, Jim's career never peaked! So, I knew there was more to his career after he was gone.

"I kept records coming out. He had just recorded one LP and one single session (16 songs) before the end. He also had demo sessions recorded...songs for his publishing companies...and some songs he had written.

"After so many years most great songs hit again. It has been a matter of repackaging and accomplishing real feats in recording others with is voice. Debra Allen, for example may not have realized the international scope of Jim's popularity when we recorded her singing iwth Jim's voice. We had two Top 10 songs from that album. Then, in 1981, we accomplished recording Patsy Cline's and Jim's voices together. We also had two Top 10 songs from that album! Those albums are still available today."

Mary went on to explain her success in marketing her late husband's recorded products. "I went on tours abroad with the RCA artists. I did Wembley for 12 straight years! Of course, I was promoting his career. I expanded the publishing companies and formed some others, activated Shannon Records (still active), and had eight artists on the label, at one time.

"Then, I opened the museum on July 1, 1981. It' still here and doing very well. Just being a part of country music, and being accepted, as an associate and peer, by the artists and executives in the business is what I'm most proud of!"

And, Mary Reeves Davis must be very proud! She has also been prominent in the political arena of country music...President of the Nashville Songwriter's Association, International; a member of the Board of Directors of the Country Music Association; and the first woman on the Board of Directors on the National Music Publisher's Association.

Today, Mary is married to Terry Davis who is, himself, a well-known and successful businessman in the fields of real estate and moviemaking. Mary Reeves Davis is a perfect example of the 'life must go on'' attitude. Many of us should learn from her examples.

Mr. McGill is turning out some mighty fine product these days. This song is set to a waltz rhythm and has an anthem-like message. With producers Jackie Thompson and Tommy Dee at the helm, McGill finds a song that'll make you think twice. You see, here we are reminded that love is, and will always be, the most valuable possession a person can have.

KENNY BLAIR (Awesome, ASM-119) Lost In Austin (2:56) (Ensign-BMI) (D. Goodman, L. Caudell) (Producers: S. Young, R. Cochran)

Kenny Blair releases an interesting tune here; it's a man's daydream about being out in Texas. The melody vehicle is a western ballad with some lonesome violins to relay the pain. Writers Don Goodman and Lane Caudell give it the solitary lyrics and Blair interprets the song well.

THE DIRECT HIT BAND WITH GLENN HALL (Direct Hit, DHR-0019B) Readin' Rightin' Rt 23 (3:29) (Direct Line-BMI) (D. Yoakam) (Producer: G. Hall)

Living in the midst of a coal-mining community, there's plenty of heartache to overcome. That's the message that Dwight Yoakam is sending in this tune cut most recently by Glenn Hall and his band. Some interesting guitar work carries this piece nicely.

ŠARAH (Hub, HR-46-2) Chains (2:58) (Screen Gems-EMI-BMI) (C. King, G. Goffin) (Producer: B. Summers)

Sarah got a Carol King and Gerold Goffin song and made it her own. The material is outstanding and the country instrumentation is true blue. Although she sings of the chains of love that bind us at one time or another, her voice seems to know no boundaries.

## **RAPPIN' WITH THE WRITERS:**

#### TOMMY DEE

In 1959, an extremely popular record was released. It was titled "Three Stars," and the recording artist was Tommy Dee. The song paid homage to Buddy Holly, Richie Valens, and The Big Bopper, all of whom had perished in a tragic plane crash

Tommy Dee was 19 years old, and working at KFMX radio in San Bernadino, California, when the news of the crash ar-rived. Tommy had to break the sad news to his listeners on the air. The fans lit up the station phone lines wanting to know if the news was actually true, and showing the popularity of the three stars lost to the world.

Tommy Dee lived in Burbank and, by the time he drove home that evening, he had written the song in about 20 minutes. It was the second song he had ever written. After several futile attempts to contact record companies, Tommy remebered a business card given to him by Tom Tall from American Music. They asked him to bring the song right over. American Music liked the way Tommy did the song on his hastily prepared demo, and they decided Tommy should record it. Tommy says, "We did it on one take, and it was released on Crest Records." The song was an *immediate* hit. Two days after the release,

Tommy had sold the first 12,000 copies from his desk at the radio station! Tommy Dee moved to Nashville in 1964, and wrote for Tree Publishing Company for a good while He also worked for WENO Radio, here, and for WMTS in Murfreesboro, TN. He left Nashville in the early 70's, but returned in 1980 to pursue his writing and music career. He has written nearly 40 chart singles recorded by a variety of fine country artists. In fact, Tony McGill, outstanding Indie artist, has recorded nearly 20 of Tommy's songs. Others of note are: Charlie Louvin, The Hinson Bros., Vernon Oxford, Gail Taylor, Ricky Wright, Grant Tumer, Bobby Helms and Indiana.

Dependent of the phone service in the Chicago (Cicero) office of Cash Box, the first two calls that came through were from Phoenix and Los Angeles, respectively. Coinbiz photog Joe Gino was on the other end of the Phoenix call. He recently relocated from the Windy City to a more tolerable climate (101) degrees-above zerowhew!). Joe will continue to do photography, on a part time basis, while pursuing other avenues of employment. We wish him much success.

The second call brought sad tidings. Manuel J. Bringas, founder and co-owner with his brother Al Bringas, of Bringas Bros. died on May 16 at the age of 87. The company has been headquartered at the same location,6081/2 E. 7th St. in downtown L.A., for the past 48 years and is noted as one of the largest jukebox operations in East Los Angeles. Up until about a year ago, when the terminal illness struck him, "M.J." Bringas was still active on the route, which deals exclusively with Seeburg jukeboxes (since he discontinued games operation back in the 60's). The operation made a tremendous impact during the 50's, attracting extensive media coverage for the company, as well as "M.J." personally. At this point in time, with nephew Al Bringas, Jr. at the helm, the route operation (street locations, arcades, restaurants, et al) remains top priority, however they've also been concentrating for some time now on the rental business, focusing mainly on television and movies. The jukebox featured on the Happy Days tv'er was provided by Bringas Bros. One of their machines was also used on a Golden Girls episode; and the model seen on the Pee Wee Herman show was also rented from Bringas Bros. Funeral services for Mr. Bringas were held on May 20 at St. James Francis in North Hollywood. Survivors include his wife, Carmen: brother Al Bringas; two daughters; four grand children; and five great grandchildren. Our sincere condolences to the family.

Hitsville. Williams' "Cyclone" pin is really makin' it big and, from what marketing veepee Marty Glazman tells us, it will "prove to be the best pinball machine Williams has built to date...including High Speed!" Collection reports, stemming from early February when Cyclone was first put on test, have been outstanding and consistently high, he added. Since the Williams plant will be shutting down for summer vacation the first three weeks in July, it is recommended that you get those orders in by June!

On the singles scene. Gus Tartol of Singer One Stop For Ops clewed us in on some singles that are catching on with jukebox ops. Titles include "Sunday Kind Of Love" by Reba McEntire (MCA), which is a natural for country and adult locations; "The Valley Road" by Bruce Hornsby & The Range (RCA); "Rooty Toot Toot" by John Cougar Mellencamp (Mercury) and "Paradise" by Sade (Epic).

Coming Soon. "Hot Rod," a new driving game from Sega, has been testing out just beautifully, according to factory reports. As you can tell by the name, this new piece captures all of the excitement of hot rod racing and it will be available both in the 4-player and 3-player mode. Production is targeted for sometime in June. Sega will be featuring the new piece at its upcoming distribs meeting in Chicago on June 17. Watch for it!

Atari gathering. As we went to press Atari was hosting its "Tradition '88" distribs meeting at La Costa in Carlsbad, California. Hope to have some particulars for you in next week's edition.

Also learned that the recent AMOA Washington Conference was a big success. Again, keep tuned for further details.

Watch for the new "Bad Dudes" dedicated video from Data East.


