

Rodney Crowell

LOS ANGELES – "I don't like the word 'work' in terms of music, and I don't like 'career'," Rodney Crowell stated quite frankly and with conviction. "The most important thing I want to do is be a friend - be someone somebody knows by listening to my music.

"Everything I've ever done I've entered into with some sort of confusion," confessed Crowell during a recent interview with *Cash Box.* "Then, finally, midway somewhere I kind of find what it is that I'm doing and the clarity comes later for me. I

feel like I'm in a period where some clarity has come in for me, and I'm enjoying that. And it may be here now and gone tomorrow, and that's okay - the main thing for me is that I'm enjoying writing more than ever, I'm enjoying playing music more than ever and I'm enjoying other people's music more than ever - those three things just make me excited and glad that I'm a musician more than ever."

Crowell's newfound enthusiasm is certainly evident on *Diamonds & Dirt* (Columbia), his fifth and most recent LP. With this album, it appears that fans and critics alike are agreeing that the artist has recorded his finest work to date. The straight-ahead, no-nonsense approach of *Diamonds & Dirt* (as opposed to 1986's experimental *Street Language*) instantly captures one's attention and appreciation. Many are noting the fact that the album reveals Crowell's country and blues roots sharper and more concise than ever before. Crowell explained the evolution: "Looking back on [*Street Language*], I was more concerned about drum sounds and arrangements and things... [co-producer] Tony [Brown] just got me focused on the idea of being a songwriter and a singer, and we made that the centerpiece on the new record. [*Street Language*] was less focussed on the artist and more focussed on the package.

NARM To Retailers: Got Shoplifters? Call Us.

NEW YORK – NARM, in its continuing effort to shoot down shoplifters, has installed a toll-free nationwide hotline to receive theft/shoplifting reports nationwide. The number is (800) 234-NARM.

According to a recent theft loss surey, shoplifting – in large and small forms – has been increasing nationwide, with CDs a particularly enticing target. With the hotline, NARM hopes to alert retailers of problems in given area, and to provide written summaries of the ways and means of heplifters around the country and send them to members in the soontorbe-unveiled Shrink Link newsletter.

According to the Musicland Group's Keith Wanke, chairman of NARM's Loss Prevention Committee, "While some may initially wonder why they should alert other stores in their market after they have been shoplifted, because saving the other guy from being hit won't change the fact that they have suffered a loss - the bottom line is that if the criminals know they are being closely monitored by everyone in town, they'll move on. And if every town is linked by NARM's hotline and Shrink Link, we will have a better chance of putting the thieves out of business."

BMI Announces New Agreement With Background Music Industry

LOS ANGELES – BMI and the mackground music industry (combanies that provide recorded or satelto transmitted music services to retail and service establishments) have reached a new long-term agreement that includes several concepts a med at broadening the licensing of BMI music.

"The new agreement is the result over two years of active negotiations between BMI and represcntatives of the background music industry," said Tom Annastas, BMI, Assistant Vice President, General Licensing.

"The agreement is fair and equital e to both sides and gives us a platfor n to forge a new relationship over the years ahead. We're also pleased the the extended term of the agreement will lend stability to our relationship with the background music industry and give us the opportunity to achieve some of our long-term goals." Significantly, said Annastas, the new agreement creates incentives on both sides for the expansion of awareness among music users of the need for performing rights licenses.

One of the incentives is an advertising and promotion campaign that is currently being planned under the auspices of a joint task force with representatives from both BMI and the background music industry.

"We plan to aggressively carry the music licensing message to the full spectrum of retail and service establishments nationwide," said Annastas.

Justice Department Says BMI Should Continue Bonus Payments

NEW YORK - BMI should continue to pay bonuses on all BMI repertoire regardless of the present affiliation of the writer or composer, according to a preliminary verbal notification from the Justice Department, which had been investigating BMI's 1987 Payment Plan. The Justice Department found that the Plan would have discriminated against writers who were no longer affiliated with BMI by paying less for works they left with BMI than the same works would earn if the writers remained with BMI. Since this may have prevented writers form leaving BMI, to avoid suffering a cut in royalty payments, the Justice Department found that the Plan was in violation of BMI's anti-trust decree.

The issue is a continuing sore point between BMI and ASCAP. According to a BMI statement – which also tersely says that "BMI had been informed that the Antitrust Division of the Justice Department is now examining ASCAP's policies with respect to payments to its former writers" – "It is BMI's view that the central issue has been, and remains, a songwriter's ability to freely move his or her share of copyrights to the performing rights organization of one's choice. BMI will continue to press for this freedom using all available means."

"I assume that BMI will now honor its agreements with writers and treat all BMI writers – past and present – alike," said ASCAP president Morton Gould, who also suggested that writers had been "co-erced" into resigning from ASCAP and re-affiliating with BMI.

"In the future as in the past," said BMI president Frances W. Preston, "we will look for new ways to better serve BMI songwriters, composers and copyright holders, and maximize their income. This is the goal of the new payment schedule. It has been, and will always be, our priority."

CD3 Meeting Held

NEW YORK – A meeting was held Thursday, June 21 to plan an industry-wide !aunch of CD3. The latest in compact disc technology – this three inch disc can carry a maximum of twenty minutes of audio. It can be played on any standard compact disc player by using a disc adapter similar to the one used for a 45rpm record.

The meeting held at Sony's New York office, was attended by marketing executives from 20 record companies. The purpose - to initiate a successful industry-wide consumer education campaign for the new configuration. Capitol Records' Joe Mansfield presented the results of a retailer survey on CD3 placement of product currently in stores. A&M's Jane Simon proposed several generic advertising campaign ideas. She was followed by CBS's Jerry Shulman who presented proposals for an industry-wide promotion. Marc Finer of Communication Research, Inc., gave the labels a report on CD3 hardware and accessories.

Major shipment announcements were made by CBS, Elektra/Asylum and Virgin promising works by top artists by July 8, 1988. CBS will release 40 titles including George Michael, Michael Jackson, Gloria Estefan & The Miami Sound Machine and Bruce Springsteen. Keith Sweat and Tracy Chapman will come from Elektra/Asylum and a Steve Winwood single will be released by Virgin. A&M shipped six CD3 titles to stores last week including Sting, OMD and Squeeze. Six more A&M titles will be released in August. Other labels including Rhino and Rykodisc have had CD3 single titles in stores for more than two months. "We are committed to exploring as an industry, the most effective, creative ways to introduce this exciting product to the consumer," stated Hale Milgrim, Senior Vice President of Marketing, Elektra/Asylum.

Ideas for an industry-wide CD3 promotion and merchandising campaign were discussed and will be presented at a NARM/RIAA Merchandising Committee meeting in Chicago on June 27.

2-INCH REPORT – Pop programmers and other trendwatching mavens take note: if Johnny Kemp's Teddy Riley produced "Just Got Paid" (Columbia) hits nearly as hard as, say, Pebbles's pop top ten "Mercedes Boy" (MCA) clubland will soon rule the pop charts. While neither song sounds like the return of George Clinton, both mark a new interest in a nonmechanized funk sound with a distinct hip-hop influence. Other dance singles with pop potential include:

Sinitta, "Cross My Broken Heart" (Atlantic) – Stock, Aitken, and Waterman, the production team that worked up Rick Astley's current smash "Together Forever," wrote and produced this slab of teenie-pop. Slick as ice, sure, but bouncy beyond belief. S.A.W. have the same genuine gift for melodies as Debbie Gibson and George Michael, and they toss off about four good ones here. Melodies alone don't add up to meaning, but they are fun, and so is this.

Salt-N-Pepa, "Shake Your Thang" (Next Plateau) - With his recent singles for Sweet Tee, Kid-N-Play, and Antoinette, producer Hurby Luv Bug pushed rap into thick and funky R&B territory, offering a poppier alternative to more groove oriented James Brown styled rap. Those records sounded like old Clarence Carter songs with raps on top of them. "Shake Your Thang," from the hotly anticipated A Salt With A Deadly Pepa, continues in that style. No scratching, no st-st-stuttering samples, just a deep, foinky groove with a catchy sung chorus and raw rapping from the duo that gave us "Push It." Percussion and vocals courtsey of go-go group E.U. who scored with "Da Butt."

Regina, "Extraordinary Love," (Atlantic) – In tone and title this is the follow-up to Regina's 1986 hit "Baby Love." The hyped teen beats, hooky horns, and propulsive synth bass are courtsey of producer Fred Zarr (Debbie Gibson). The delightful melody is courtesy of Regina, who co-wrote the song with Eric Beall. Michael Huchinson of INXS did the dub mix.

CHARITY AUCTION ACTION -The T.J. Martell Foundation rock 'n' roll memorabilia auction on Saturday, June 18, raised \$127,600 for research to fight lukemia, cancer and aids. The list of superstars who donated items includes Michael Jackson (an autographed hat from the "Billie Jean" video), Keith Richards (a personal wake-up call), Run-DMC (their sneakers, laces not included), and Tony Bennett (his portrait of Frank Sinatra), as well as Bob Dylan, Lou Reed, Bruce Springsteen, Pat Benatar, Talking Heads, Whitney Houston and more than thirty others. The top bid of the afternoon went for Madonna's bustier (autographed), for which some generous soul paid \$9,000. Heated bid-ding for Michael Jackson's autographed hat ended with an

unidentified phone-in bid of \$3,750. Rumours that it was Michael himself on the phone trying to buy back his headgear quickly swept the prestigious Sotheby's auction house, only to disappear nearly as quickly (and be revived here). The T.J. Martell Foundation for Luekemia, Cancer and Aids Research was founded in 1975 by a small group of record executives in memory of 21year-old luekemia victim T.J. Martell. To date the foundation has raised over \$22 million.

BOWERY ROCK – The new book This Ain't No Disco (Farber and Farber, \$9.95) is an oral history of CBGB, the lower Manhattan rock club where, according to legends passed down from one generation of mythmongers to the current generation of mythmongers, punk all started in and around 1976. Interviews with important scenemakers, musicians (notably Lenny Kaye and Richard Lloyd), rock critics (Robert Christgau and Legs McNeil), and CBGB staff members are lovingly melded together by music journalist Roman Kozak. It's not a comprehensive history of punk or the New York club scene (though it at times tries to

be), but it adds up to a fitting tribute to CBGB owner Hilly Kristal, without whom, as Kozak proves, there would have been no Ramones, Dead Boys, Television or Blondie. Full of memories of outrageous times in an outrageous place, *This Ain't No Disco* has some stories to tell, and Kozak orgainizes those stories into a history of a dive bar that became an underground rock mecca.

Every Dog Has His Day (I.R.S.) was produced by Easter and John Leckie (XTC, Simple Minds, Be-Bop Deluxe, Pink Floyd)...Speaking of I.R.S., the I.R.S. New Music Seminar showcase is scheduled for CBGB, July 18, and features Timbuk 3, Peter Holsapple, The Balancing Act, and Jules Shear and the Reckless Sleepers.

Face To Face

LOS ANGELES - They hail from the lively Boston scene where Face To Face started as a mix of dance, neoounk and rock roots in the early 80's. Their self-titled first LP was produced by Jimmy Iovine and Arthur Baker, and featured a couple of club hits "Under The Gun" and "10-9-8." Today, their sound is different, reflecting a period of evolution and absorption of a multitude of influences, from the Rolling Stones to Little Feat to Appalachian harmonies. Their new PolyGram LP One Big Day is a synthesis of rock and country, fronted by talented lead singer Laurie Sargent. Face To Face members are vocalist Laurie Sargent, guitarists Stu Kimball and Angelo, bassist John Ryder and drummer Billy Beard. Sargent talked to Cash *Box* about the evolution of the band.

"The radio and clubs in Boston were very supportive of original music," says Sargent. "Our first popular songs, '10-9-8' and 'Under The Gun' were dance oriented tunes, both kind of flukes. We were really easy going people, and we were working with Arthur Baker, and that was the direction we were encouraged to go in. It was good, because we got airplay, but it was contradictory to what we are, a rock band, not a dance band. The music now features melody and lyrics, we start with a song and write around it."

The lead songs on the LP, and the first single "As Forever As You" reflects this new emphasis on strong writing, featuring a lovely balladike intro before kicking into a steady backbeat. "The biggest inspiration as a writer and singer for me lately has

been the new John Hiatt record," says Sargent. "It's simplicity was astounding. I get really upset about that record because it didn't do as well as it should have."

One Big Day is produced by Golden Palominos leader Anton Fier. "It was great, but difficult at times, like it is with any producer. You're locked in a confined area for a ridiculous amount of hours. He understood what we were trying to do with the music and agreed, and kept us focused. He whipped us into shape."

Sargent added, "Other producers that heard our band wanted to make us more like Scandal, I guess because we have a woman at the front. They wanted to add a lot of production. Anton didn't put his stamp on us, he just help us make a record, which is what a producer is supposed to do."

Sargent concludes that Face To Face live is even more powerful than on record. "We're going to play as much as we can this summer. The band really thrives on playing live. Live is where is where we feel at our best. We've been looking forward to getting back out there."

LOS ANGELES – "I'm sort of a babe in the woods to this whole industry. Not even a year ago I was teaching English literature at Memphis State," confessed John Kilzer. *Memory In The Making*, Kilzer's debut LP on Geffen Records, is being lauded as one of the freshest debut's to emerge in recent memory. The album's first single, the biting "Red Blue Jeans," has proved a major hit at AOR radio.

"I never, ever played music when I was growing up - I never even sang in the shower. There was no music in my family at all," Kilzer admitted. While attending college, he purchased an acoustic guitar and a Bob Dylan songbook and began playing for his own recreation. Then, he recalled, "I started getting little gigs in places like 'Prince Mongo's Pizza Parlor,' where I played for pizza and beer [laughs]." After receiving his Bachelor Degree, Kilzer served a brief stint moving furniture before returning to school to attain his Masters in English literature. All the while, he was honing his musical talents performing acoustic sets in local clubs and bars "...which is trial by fire in Memphis," he explained. Kilzer was then offered a teaching

Kilzer was then offered a teaching position at MSU (Memphis State University), 'which he accepted. Soon Kilzer found himself with an unusual double life: teaching by day and playing clubs at night. "It got real strange," he recalled, "because sometimes I'd get out of a bar at 3 in the morning, get home at 4 and have to teach a 7 a.m. class. At times there were some pretty serious identity crisis. I'd go to class in the morning in a motorcycle jacket and cowboy

boots and say 'turn to page 12 and let's read William Butler Yates' *The Second Coming'*.

"I really never pursued [music] as a career," Kilzer admitted. "When I look back now, I realized how truly lucky I am." Luck may have been a key factor in Kilzer's development as an artist, yet one can't deny his true abilities as a musician and songwriter. From the piercing "Green, Yellow And Red" to the blues grind found on "Dirty Dishes," Kilzer proves himself an extremely varied songwriter throughout. In the recent past his songs have been covered by the likes of Rosanne Cash ("Green, Yellow And Red" and "707") and Jimmy Davis ("I Wonder Why The West Was Won").

"We did [the recording] in two months. We had a lot of pre-production done and the guys that play on the record are in my band so they knew the songs. We didn't have to spend time going over charts. ...some (Continued on page 12)

New Faces To Watch

Parthenon Huxley

Who is Parthenon Huxley?

With a pseudonym that combines the name of a famous landmark and the name of a famous author, you'd expect a literate and worldly individual, and that's exactly what Parthenon Huxley is. He's also a triplethreat singer/songwriter/guitarist with a remarkable debut album, *Sunny Nights*, on Columbia Records.

Huxley's interest in music was stirred by a pivotal event in his childhood. He was living a normally idyllic American boyhood until the day his father informed the family that they were moving to Greece. On the ocean voyage to Europe, songs started forming in his head, and as the years passed and his father toiled as a chemical engineer in Athens, Parthenon and his expatriate pals tried to satisfy their hunger for music any way that they could.

"Whenver a new kid from the States would arrive at our school, we would grill him for information about what was happening back in his hometown. One day these two sisters from Detroit arrived in town and told us that the big thing in Detroit was a band called the Iggy and the Stooges. We all laughed, but when we listenend to the tapes, suddenly there was an army of Stooges fans in Athens, Greece.

"American kids have this biological desire to create bands, and we did over there, too. Of course, it was really hard to get equipment, and strings, etc., but we played the hits at teen dances and Greek youth centers."

Native Greek music taught Huxley an appreciation of non-Western scales and controlled cacophony, and there's a lingering European art-rock element in his music that works effectively with its folk-pop underpinnings. Huxley cites influences that range from David Bowie to the Beach Boys.

But what makes Sunny Nights such a stunning debut is the quality of the songwriting, particularly the lyrics, which touch upon fundamental questions of identity and eternity without ever lapsing into cliche.

"You have all your life to write your songs," Huxley says. "There's no excuse for dashing them off in the studio unless it's a really inspired piece of writing. I spend a lot of time on my lyrics. Unless you really got a doozy, most lines can be improved. I don't like songs to wander around subject matter, I like to get down into it. It's very satisfying when you get a good verse, when it even looks good on paper."

Huxley's lyric sense certainly wasn't hurt by his career as a music journalist, which he started after returning to the States and graduating from the University of North Carolina. "I knew I wasn't going to be a chemical engineer, so I worked in restaurants a lot, and got a journalism degree. I did as many things as I could that didn't stray too far from music. Chapel Hill, North Carolina, isn't exactly an industry town, and you're not going to make a lot of money playing music unless you're in a bar/cover band."

In North Carolina, Huxley tagged up with musician/producer Don Dixon. After playing guitar in Dixon's touring band, Huxley left for Los Angleles. Within a year of arriving in L.A., Huxley had landed a publishing deal and an album on Columbia. "A career is a series of meaningful events," he says, trying to sum up his good fortune, "and I guess one meaningful event lead to another."

The album features an interesting mix of support personnel, ranging from songstress Robin Lane to drummer Fish from the funk-punk band Fishbone. His live band, which is just starting to feel its oats, comprises Jennifer Condos and Rusty Anderson on bass and guitar, and Robert Williams (formerly with Captain Beefheart) on drums.

Of his music, Huxley is both modest and proud. "I was always searching and trying to make it better and better. And I've gotten to the point where I'm pretty darn happy with it."

But what about that name?

"It used to be Parthenon Huxley D'Arby Mellencamp," he deadpans. "But I shortened it."

...everybody keeps saying [Diamonds & Dirt] is more focussed overall, and I suppose that's because it's in a time of my life where I'm more focussed than I've ever been before."

Diamonds & Dirt has all the potential of becoming a crossover success. It appears that Crowell, the original "new traditionalist," is on the verge of achieving the mainstream radio and retail success garnered by such 80's artists as Dwight Yoakam and Randy Travis. "I still have it in my romantic heart that there's a handful of disc-jockeys out there who just might someday barricade themselves the control room of their radio station and play a record that they love for seventeen straight hours, just to drive it across. I still have my fingers crossed that music could still be like it was in 1958 or '56 - somebody moved so much that they'll lay their heart on the line."

Recently, Crowell soared to the top of the country singles chart with the first release off *Diamonds & Dirt*, "It's Such A Small World," a duet with his wife Rosanne Cash. The single marked the first time Crowell has achieved chart-topping success as a performer (although several of his compositions have proved major hits for other artists in the past).


"I enjoy songwriting more than ever," Crowell enthused. "I enjoy it more because I used to think that I had to sit down everyday whether I was inspired or not and bang something out. So now whenever I don't feel like writing songs, I don't write. I have the faith and the belief that I'm going to be inspired, and just the fact that I truly believe that in my heart it comes around. So the times when I'm not writing I don't have to get freaked out thinking I have writer's block... If I don't write it's because I don't have anything to say. And as a result I'm writing more than ever, because there's no pressure to write. There's a difference to me between manufacturing songs and writing songs. The last thing in the world that I want to do is get lazy and get predictable.

"More than anything my music is just natural me." He concluded "I've reached a point in my life where it's more important to satisfy myself than anyone else."

of the tracks on the record were actually demo tracks we recorded on the first day, and you can sort of sense that spontaneity."

It is safe to assume that *Memory In The Making* is only a small sampling of Kilzer's obviously vast talents, and that he will be contributing his musical abilities to an appreciative audience for some time to come. He concluded, simply and honestly, "As long as I'm allowed to perform my music I will remain happy."




Talent On Stage

CARNEGIE HALL, NYC - In a perfect world George Jones would wake up one day, phone retro-neuvo country producer Pete Anderson, and make plans to record an album of John Prine and John Hiatt songs. As long as we're dreaming, might as well make it a double album and have ole George record a few duets with X's John Doe. Lord knows the three Johns (Prine, Hiatt, and Doe, are three of the best songwriters and singers currently languishing in undeserved obscurity. Lord knows it'd be sweet to hear George Jones wrage his voice around Prine's wittily trenchent turns of phrase and sing something as blindingly brilliant as, "If heartaches were commercials, we'd all be on TV." Lord knows George Sings The Three Johns would sell enough to keep Prine, Hiatt, and Doe in guitar stings for the rest of their lives.

After a little more than one and a half decades as an awesomely talented performer who never quite settled into any of the niches the industry or he himself could dream up. (folkie, country artist, singersongwriter, rockabilly cat), and after seven albums on two major labels, Prine has settled for being atawesomely talented performer who releases his records on his own On Boy label (he has a double live record due this summer). It's not a perfect world, but for nearly two hours at Carnegie on June 16 John Prine did his best to make us forget that.

Accompanying himself on acoustic guitar Prine sang in his trademark bittersweet rasp, the voice of one too many cigarettes and one too few whiskies. In the true tradition of country music wordplay, the songs presented folk wisdom merged with songwriter savy, cleverness charged with the ring of truth. Though some of the comic numbers were let downs" (the whole hall already knew the punchlines), songs like "Donald And Lydia," "Six O'Clock News," "Blue Umbrella," and "Souvenirs" were stripped down to their emotional core. They were full of the ache of nostalgia as it turns into real life regret, and Prine embued them with a hard won world-weariness.

Opening the show was MCA artist Nancy Griffith, who sang an hour's, worth of folk-country. Despite the fact that Griffith's short stories (word has it she's working on a novel) wererendered incomprehensible by the amplification, and despite the fact that Griffith delivered every song with the same chirpy, smiling attack, the audience received her very enthusiastically. Her following is dedicated and growing swiftly. Joe Levy



Ohio Players: *Back* And Hotter Than Ever

LOS ANGELES – The Ohio Players are back and hotter than ever... The legendary black/pop music group, with millions of record sales to their credit have reunited to produce their most exciting album to date. The band has once again captured a sound that is destined to become the biggest urban album project in 1988.

The Ohio Players, who took their name from their common place of residence, worked diligently for fifteen years before they suddenly leaped into the spotlight as one of the hottest record and concert attractions in the music industry.

From 1974 to 1976, the Ohio Players landed three platinum albums (*Fire, Honey* and *Skin Tight*) and gold albums (*Contradiction, Ohio Players Gold,* and *Pain*). They also scored four gold singles "Funky Worm," "Skin Tight," "Fire," and "Love Rollercoaster." Each one of those hit number one on the B/C charts. "Fire" and "Love Rollercoaster" hit number one on the pop chart.

Some of the inspiration for the new Ohio Players LP came from spur-ofthe-moment experience. "I'm Madd!," for example, is an impassoned attack on drunk drivers. The song began when an inebriated motorist slammed into another car, tried to get away from the scene of the crime, and in the process rammed Billy Beck's auto as it stood at a red light. No one was hurt. But Beck's car was badly damaged. Says Sugar Bonner, "Mr. Beck came into the studio expounding. I told him not to waste his breath - write it down. If it's causing you misery, you can make music with it." Many of the songs on Back were about the players as a band. "Let's Play Again" and "Rockin' The House" expressed the group's desire to get out and perform together. "Try" said don't ever give up. "Reputation" was about living up to their own standard for setting a stage in major motion. Says Diamond Williams, "We're going back on stage as good guys, as knights, to get our revenge."



The Ohio Players sound had an unforgettable impact. Larry Blackmon of Cameo called the group one of his major influences. Sly Dunbar and Robbie Shakespeare recorded the Ohio Player's "Fire" on their critically acclaimed 1987 album. And Canadian supergroup Platinum Blonde have covered "Fire" on their new LP.

When the Ohio Players went into the studio to record their first album of the 80's, the elements that had once made them great surfaced all over again. First of those factors was democracy. Says Billy Beck, "Everyone contributes to each song. We don't have any loose spots in this band. Everything is nailed down tight and ready to fly." The second factor was versatility. The band utilized over 20 instruments, including a wide variety of keyboards and midiequipped drum machines. The third element was spontaneity. Explains Sugar Bonner, "We had our demos, but we kicked most of them out. We brought together most of the album in the studio. We had written out the songs, but we got into the studio and said, "We're going to do this from zero. We want fire.

That "revenge" is coming swiftly. Shortly before The Ohio Players finished their own LP, guitarist/lead vocalist, Sugar Bonner received an invitation to join Herbie Hancock on his next album. Bonner ended up cowriting and performing vocals on three of the Hancock cuts. The Ohio Players also cut "Vibe Alive" on their album, Back. While he was on his way up to join Hancock, Sugar ran into Cameo's Larry Blackmon in the studio elevator. Recalls Sugar delightedly, "I think Larry is the greatest. And here he was telling me how he'd been trying to sound like me for years. I said hey, I've been trying to sound like me for years."

Coming up is a plan for The Ohio Players to take their influence a step further. The band will work on a few cuts with the Average White Band. But their real mission is to put the human sound into today's technology. Says Ohio Player, Diamond Williams, "When we first got started, a computer was something you kept in a room the size of a house. Today there's a computer in every instrument, and we've learned how to handle them all. But what we're (Continued on page 18)

Rap Music And Stereotypes

NEW YORK - It is becoming increasingly difficult for today's young black rap artists to shake the stereotypes imposed by the media. These stereotypes, which are probably rap music's greatest foe, attack both the artists and the art form itself. Rap music is one of the purest forms of black music today, yet, there are those who disparage it, because, they say, it provokes violence. They base their claims on media coverage of violence that may have occurred during rap concerts. The large summer rap tours cover approximately 60 cities nationwide, but how many times do you see coverage of a concert unless some incident occurs? My bet is there would have been no coverage had there been no incident. It is unfortunate that some must spoil it for the rest of us, but when someone shoots or stabs another at a rap concert, it is highly unlikely that the music is the instigator. All it may mean is that someone shot or stabbed another. Period. If someone were murdered at a classical music concert-which, if I recall correctly, actually happened recently-would people say that classical music provokes violence? I don't think so, but I am sure that some of those who would come to classical music's defense would, at the same time, condemn hip hop.

Lopsided coverage is the foundation on which stereotyping thrives, and it pains me to see the media program the public toward a negative image of rap music and the personnel involved. This is a type of brainwashing that infects all of those who watch and aren't aware of what is actually happening. What really hurts, though, is to hear black program directors say that they don't play rap music because they don't like it. Their judgements, no doubt, reflect the negativity and bias perpetuated by the media. Don't get me wrong, because I'm not saying that everyone who doesn't like or listen to rap music has been programmed, however, I am saying that it does exist. Such offhanded dismissals not only constrain rap as a crossover music form, but as a black one as well.

The media do their share to create negative images for rap music, but they are not fully to blame. There are other factors to consider, like the behavior of some of the rappers themselves. Performers should always be aware that they are representatives of their art form and should consider themselves role models for all who

listen to their music, especially children. Unfortunately there are those rappers who do nothing to shake the stereotypes plaguing rap music. Rather they do more to create new -or reinforce existingstereotypes. Rappers, on the whole, should not have to take the weight for a few knuckleheads who decide to get obscene, lewd, or just plain stupid on stage or record. But as we all know, there's one in every crowd.

Along with negative exceptions, there are also positive exceptions, such as Los Angeles rapper Ice-T, who calls out to his listeners to stay away from the gang and street life he once lived. Demonstrating a keen sensitivity to the controversy surrounding rap, Boogie Down Productions' front man, KRS-One, sends out the message to "Stop the Violence" on a track of the same name. On his album's first single, titled "My Philosophy," he comes down hard with his views on stereotypes, rap artists and the industry.

These rappers are helping to knock down the stereotypes that are commonly associated with rap artists by saying something worth listening to, as opposed to just the usual braggadocio coming out of other rappers' speakers. Those of you in the rap music industry can actively help break these stereotypes, no matter who you are or what level you're at, by exercising good judgement and some common sense. My word to all rappers out there is to send out positive messages to your people, because you are the ones who are able to reach them. My word to those biased p.d.'s at the radio stations is to keep an open mind to this art form called rap music, not only because you could be depriving your stations of large audiences of urban youth, not only because rap music usually wins its audience share per market, but because every time you say no to rap, you're possibly closing the door to someone's only chance to make something good out of him or herself.

Finally, my word to the media reporters is to cover both sides of the story. When you only cover the negative, people only see the negative, and this is where the stereotypes breed. With that in mind, I believe I have spoken my piece. PEACE!

Personally, I love an underdog who eventually triumphs because of unrelenting tenacity. Kenny Wilson, no doubt, comes from that mold.

He was born and raised in El Reno, Oklahoma. He came from a Christian background and, although he may not be a saint, you can still detect the early teachings of his preacher/father in his attitude. Here's the way Kenny tells it...

"We sang a lot in church, of couse, and everywhere else when we could. I was nine years old when I got my first guitar. Daddy showed me how to play three chords, and I took it from there. I picked up different chords and 'licks' from a lotta folks.

"I played my first payin' job at the Southern Hotel, in El Reno, when I was 16 years old. I picked with a Bob Wills-type band with twin fiddles and all!"

Kenny, like so many, formed his love for country music by playing weekend gigs while growing up. After a tour of duty in the armed forces, he returned to Oklahoma and joined a band led by J. David Sloan,

"We did pretty well out in Oklahoma. Eventually, I formed by own 3-piece band, and did the night club circuit for 14 years. Somehow, we wound up in Fayetteville, N.C and I was tired of struggling financially. So, I decided to return to m old training and began driving trucks again. Two years later, I got chance to transfer, so I chose Nashville to be close to my first love...country music!"

That was in 1985. Kenny still drives trucks for Danny Herman Trucking, but he's also recording on the GBS record label, thanks to Colonel Ernie Bivens who owns the label. Kenny says, "I met Ernie Bivens over the telephone. In fact, we got into a small argument during our first phone conversation. However, everything worked out fine, and we have a very close working relationship. It's a good association for both of us."

So, my friends, country music has a real truck drivin' singer once again. If you're drivin' down the highway and "Double Nickle" comes over your CB radio, you will be talking to Kenny Wilson. You may not know him, yet, but you will one day soon. Kenny's talent and determination will see to that. In fact, Kenny Wilson has a brand new single out there right now. His net release on GBS records is titled "Savannah"!

Kenny Wilson gained a lot of new fans at Fan Fair, in Nashville, recently. He will gain many more with his new release. As they say in Kenny's two professions..."put the pedal to the metal" and "let the good times roll," Kenny Wilson!

THE BYRDS – Never Before – Re-Flyte (MH 70318)

There are countless listeners who will hail this new Byrds compilation as landmark, from the misty-eyed legions of aging folk-hippies to the new generation of jangle rockers who owe everything to Roger McGuinn and his Rickenbacker 12-string. The Byrds were America's answer to the Beatles, and although they were plagued by personnel problems and lost their rock direction after four or five albums, the body of work that they produced from 1965-1967 can stand with anyone's.

This album is culled from original masters and leftover tapes of the Byrds earliest sessions. And while it may not rival the Younger Than Yesterday or Mr. Tambourine Man albums, it's a whole lot more than house-cleaning. Three of these takes have been previously released, albeit in mono, and the transition to stereo is convenient but no big deal. The album also includes alternate takes of "Eight Miles High" and the spectacular tune "Why." Neither is as good as the original album versions, but they are worth owning for McGuinn's guitar work, particularly on "Eight Miles High," which jars against the familiar version in our memories and reinvigorates the eeriness of the song.

The real bonus for Byrds fans is the presence of several "previously unreleased" songs, including their version of Dylan's "It's All Over Now, Baby Blue" (which is even better than the version of "All I Really Want To Do" that they released as a single), and a couple tracks written by Gene Clark that have a lilting folk-country sound. Perhaps the most pleasant surprise is the work by David Crosby, who has never fully gotten his due as a contributor to the Byrds sound. His "Triad" features a sweet vocal and a suggestive free-love lyric that kept the song from ever being released until now, while "Lady Friend" is a spectacular, soaring pop song that embodies everything that was great about the band: chimey guitars, seamless harmonies and meticulously clean production.

THE BEEF SISTERS - The Beef Sisters - Stonegarden (SGN 902)

The folk revolution continues to produce new and surprising variations on the acoustic sing-along style. The unlikely-named Beef Sisters - two unrelated women with angelic voices and a trio of talented back-up musicians - shoot to the top of the heap with their debut L.P. Their sound is folk, but with a percussive underpinning that gives the album an artful texture. There's a dash of rappy funk in "White House," a jazzy lilt in "The Reverence" and a bop-downthe street jauntiness in "Patti Smith" to compliment the madrigal sweetness of "Rosh Hoshanna" and the unadorned sincerity of the Jacksons' "I'll Be There." But the real bonus is the wit and invention of the lyrics, as in "Las Vegas," wherein the protagonist "prays to the crooked arm so he shall win," and "Patti Smith," a fanciful ode to "the poetic princess from Pitman, New Jersey." The joyful interplay of the the two voices, the understated production by Ethan James and the easy transition from one style to the next makes the Beef Sisters album an absolute delight.

Vicious Rumors is a group of talented players with a rather dark outlook on life. Utilizing a surprisingly wide range of instrumentation to good effect, the group takes the listener through an aural onslaught of present day and futureshock visions of our world - pretty serious stuff in the tradition of Iron Maiden and Queensryche. Sides one and two are respectively titled Western Front and Eastern Front.

Vicious Rumors is a good metal band. Bassist Dave Starr and drummer Larry Howe are a well-oiled rhythm machine, and guitarists Geoff Thorpe and Mark McGee compliment each other well. Singer Carl Albert definitely has what it takes to break into the big time. But c'mon guys, lighten up a bit.

Talent On Stage



AT MY PLACE, LOS ANGELES -Jazz violinist Doug Cameron's recent appearance at the Santa Monica venue, At My Place, was a combination of solid musicianship, inventive and craftsmanlike compositions, and a lighthearted humorous attitude. The key word here is humorous. Cameron's music is a jazz/rock fusion, a style that all to often, gets caught up in its own excess and pretentiousness. Fortunately, Cameron avoids those trappings that give fusion a bad name. The message here is "have an enjoyable evening, and don't take it too seriously."

Cameron's set was drawn largely from his two Spindletop Record releases, *Freeway Mentality* and his latest, *Passion Suite (SPT124)*. Selections from the new LP included "It Doesn't Get Any Better," "Passion Suite," "Remember When" and "Late Night." Also featured in the set were two new, and as of yet untitled, works of Spanish and Brazilian character. Cameron also spread the spotlight around evenly, allowing each of his excellent musicians time to stretch out and solo. The crowdpleaser of the evening was a novely jazz-rocker called "The Lesson." a humorous poke at childhood music lessons in which Cameron interspersed rock motifs with classical excerpts and violin etudes. All in all, a thoroughly enjoyable evening. Gary Starr

OPPING AROUND - As you read this, the JVC Jazz Festival extravaganza is sprawling through New York, as are two avant-garde fringe festivals, Improvisations II and the Knitting Factory Jazz Festival. JVC long ago gave up trying to offer a full spectrum of jazz, and the two alternate festivals fill in nicely. The Knitting Factory Festival is particularly ambitious - all double-bills, many of them big enough to fill auditoriums European festivals. Vinylmania Jazz, the Carmine Street store that is the jazz arm of Vinylmania's growing empire, is the festival's main sponsor. The World Music Institute is sponsoring Improvisations II, which will offer the first ew York appearance in I-don't-knownow-many-years of Yusef Lateef (Symphony Space, July 1). All the schedules are self-explanatory, but I'd particularly recommend Wednesday's IVC "Salute going to bring in some extraordinary ropean musicians, including Martial Solal, one of my three or four favorite silanists, bass virtuoso J.F. Jenny-Clarke (whose CMP CD is one of the year's best albums), pianist Joachim Kuhn, and Grummer Daniel Humair. This isn't going to be one of JVC's better-attended programs, but it should be a real good ne...Ssssh, Blue Note has just put out a few new CD reissues. See, Blue Note fills CD bins with reissues, but doesn't tell anybody about them. They also didn't say much about the enormous CD 1 sissue overruns - you can actually pick o certain Blue Note CDs in certain tores for less than the price of the vinyl where the vinyl is available). In any case, Blue Note's CDs are among the best around - soundwise, extra trackvise - and among those just added are bree volumes under the heading of The Complete Art Pepper Aladdin Recordings, unid-50s recordings the terrific altoist did for various teeny West Coast labels (and reissued on vinyl a few years ago under the Aladdin banner) and includg such blue-chip players as Carl erkins (the pianist, of course, not the 'Blue Suede Shoes" man), Shelly

Manne, Red Norvo and Leroy Vinnegar: Billie's Blues, a Billie Holiday CD with nine live tracks from '54, four littleknown Aladdin sides (recorded between her associations with Decca and Verve) and a lone Capitol side from '42, Jimmy Smith's Prayer Meetin' and Art Blakey & The Jazz Messengers' Ritual...WBGO-FM is offering free lunchtime concerts at Newark's Pier at Exchange Place; look for Irene Reid (6/30) and Houston Person/Etta Jones (7/7) next...Long ago and far away: During a 1982 trip to Australia, I heard a wonderful alto saxophonist named Bernie McGann. A couple of months ago, I received a package from Australia's (formerly England's) Emanem Records with the first two recordings as a leader by that same Bernie McGann. They're good records; he's a real good player (in fact, he was stateside recently with the Australian Jazz Orchestra), and that's that. Emanem, for those who remember them (they've got some early Steve Lacy record out) is now at 16 Larra Crescent, North Rocks, Sydney, NSW 2151, Australia...The Association for Recorded Sound Collections has approved three grants to individuals pursuing research in the field of recorded sound. Charles Haddix of Kansas City, was given one for his work on a bio-discography of pianist/vocalist Julia Lee, and Madison, Wisconson's Dr. Ronald Radano was given one for his research on saxophonist Budd Johnson...CBS has just issued Bolling's Greatest Hits, bits and pieces from eight of Claude Bolling's cloying, but very popular, classical/jazz suites... David Liebman, the intelligent soprano saxophonist, has just published a book of autobiographical musings and other thoughts that, at first glance, looks like an intelligent and interesting read. It's called, not surprisingly, A Self-Portrait of a Jazz Artist, and it's available for \$8.95 plus \$2.00 postage and handling from Caris Music Services, RD 7 - Box 7621G, Stroudsberg, PA 18360... Southampton has always had sun and rich people and surf and all sorts of things, but, until now, they didn't have a jazz festival. Forget it they've got one now. Actually it's a twoweekend do at the Fine Arts Center of LIU's Southampton Campus. Weekend one is July 2nd & 3rd (good place to be July 4th weekend, Southampton) and will salute Louis Armstrong, with Dick Hyman, Ruby Braff, Carrie Smith and Terry Waldo among the saluters. Weekend two is August 7th & 8th and will salute Duke Ellington, with Jon Hendricks & Co., the Duke's Men, and others joining in. WPBX, the campus radio station, will benefit from ticket sales, and tickets (at 25 bucks per night) can be ordered by calling (516) 283-4000 ext. 290. Lee Jeske

During the meeting Romstar's marketing chief Rene Lopez fielded a lot of heated dialogue from the audience! Keep tuned for photo coverage and further details... The Sega format included cocktails, complete with a unique program, presented by Kavanagh Productions (specialists in murder, mystery entertainment). The theme focused on the 20th Reunion of the Cambridge University Class of 1919 with each distrib assigned a specific character to portray (costumes optional), and we must single out Schafer's Bill Kraft, Active's Dave Gilfor and Lieberman's Glenn Charney for their outstanding characterizations, and who could forget Jon Brady's memorable death scene! Entire performance took place at Chicago's popular That Steak Joynt where sumptuous dinner capped the evening. The product presentation was held (17) at the Sofitel O'Hare and the pieces revealed included Sega's exciting, new "Hot Rod" driving game which comes in two sizes (3-player and 4-player uprights) and offers some outstanding features; their new "Altered

Beast" kit, based on an adventurous fight theme where you employ various methods including martial arts to rescue the maiden and, along the way, the play character goes (or alters) from a wimp type through various stages to reach a dynamic wolf-like creature. Sega also showed a piece they are currently testing, called "Galaxy Force" which literally knocked the socks off the distribs in attendance! It comes in three sizes, standard upright, a kind of mid-size, and a real biggie. This game provides the ultimate in movement, spins and total player involvement. If the market warrants it, you'll be seeing this piece around the fall season. Sega also advised that they will be shipping "Bullseye" (which has been updated) by the end of June.

When you're hot you're hot! Or, as William's director of marketing Roger Sharpe put it, "as summer keeps heating up, William's is getting hotter than hot!" Factory's cur-rent pin in test is "Banzai Run" and the results are "phenomenal." It's a perfect follow-up to "Cyclone," which is still in production and still in very big demand... On the personal front, Roger is anxiously looking forward to relocating his wife, Ellen, and the kids from their just sold house in Cheshire, Connecticut to their newly acquired house in Arlington Heights, IL. They should be all settled in within the next couple of weeks or so.

A first! When have you ever heard of a new album being launched by way of a jukebox? Well, it will be happening on Friday, June 24, at the Ringside Sports Club & The Other Side location in Elk Grove Village, Illinois under the auspices of A.H. Entertainers and Geffen Records. The jukebox will be a Seeburg Laser Music c.d. machine and the album will be the new Jimmy Page offering titled Outrider. A.H.'s Don Hesch and Brad Hamma, who put this project together, along with the people at W.E.A. and Ringside, are very excited about it. Besides which, this is a perfect tie-in with the 100th anniversary of the jukebox!

New 'Spider' Breakthrough From Valley

CHICAGO – A new electronic darts target, "Spider" (designated the T-60/30 Target), has been developed and is now being marketed by The Valley Company of Bay City, Michigan. "This is something we have been working on for some time now," stated Alan Schafer, vice president of marketing, "and we believe the coin games industry will be as fully excited about it as we are. We think everyone will see the difference at once when the new T-60/30 Target is placed side-by-side with conventional targets."

The T-60/30 Target gets its name from the differences it offers in reduced over-all spider area and increased over-all hitting area, as compared to conventional elecreonic dart game targets. The new target has an over-all spider area that is reduced by as much as 60 percent when compared with today's most commonly used electronic targets, while the hitting area is at least 30 percent greater.

"The new thin-line spider alone would make this new target a real breakthrough." said Schafer, "but it is even more important when you consider the advantages to the avid electronics darts player and the coin games operator. The player has a larger over-all target area to aim at, and there will be far fewer bounce outs, as well as fewer broken tips," he added. "At the same time, scoring will be more accurate and positive because the player has a better chance of having his throw register, exactly what it hits." Schafer noted that operators will appreciate the T-60/30 Target "because it looks and plays most like the steel-tip gome and will have great appeal to traditional players."

In stressing other operator advantages of the new Target, Schafer said, "The fact that we have manufactured both the spider and the segments out of resilient fiberfilled nylon will also have great traction for the operator, because of the reduced maintenance."

The new T-60/30 Target is now available through Valley distributors and is also available in kit form that is campatible with existing Valley games.
