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

YOU GOTTA MOVE: Bertelsmann has decided to purchase a new New York building at Broadway and W. 45th St. to house its music and book publishing units. The purchase of the 44-story building, 1540 Broadway, "underscores a long-term commitment to the future of our operations in the U.S.," said Michael Dornemann, BMG's chairman and CEO. The music division will move from its longtime Sixth Ave. home in mid-1993.

ATTENTION COLLECTORS: START HOARDING THOSE LONGBOXES: By April, 1993, cardboard CD longboxes should be history in America, according to the RIAA. All the American major labels have decided to can the wasteful longbox in favor of a new jewel-box-size packaging standard. Record stores, needless to say, aren't too thrilled.

PLATINUM BY NATURE: You down with "O.P.P."? Album buyers sure are: Naughty by Nature's self-titled album debut rocketed to the platinum level last month, a long ride for a novelty hit. All in all, it was a wan month for gold and platinum certifications, according to the RIAA, with Capitol cashing in their gold and platinum chips on a stack of old Beatles, Beach Boys, Grand Funk Railroad and Glen Campbell albums. So what else got clocked for plaques?

Multi-platinum: Paul Simon's Graceland (four million), Nirvana's Nevermind, Mariah Carey's Emotions, Randy Travis' Storms of Life and Bonnie Raitt's Luck of the Draw (three million each), and Def Leppard's High and Dry.

Platinum: Naughty by Nature, The Geto Boys' We Can't Be Stopped, Keith Sweat's Keep It Comin', Joe Satriani's Surfin' with the Alien and Squeeze's Singles 45's and Under.

Gold: Karyn White's Ritual of Love, George Jones' Super Hits, Marc Cohn, Timespace: The Best of Stevie Nicks, Tevin Campbell's T.E.V.I.N., Randy Travis' An Old Time Christmas, A Tribe Called Quest's Low End Theory, Mr. Big's Lean Into It, Pearl Jam's Ten and Gerald Levert's Private Line.

ZOO ME, ZOO YOU BLUES: Is there life after Fleetwood Mac for Mick Fleetwood? Apparently so. The bearded drummer is now a member of the Zoo, a band co-led by vocalist Bekka Bramlett, daughter of Delaney & Bonnie Bramlett, and Australian vocalist Billy Thorpe. Look for their debut album from Capricorn in May.

AND: All of Prince's proceeds from his new single, "Money Don't Matter 2 Night," will be donated to the United Negro College Fund.... The Music Video Association has released its 1992 Video Directory. Want it? Call (212) 888-8415 and tell them Paul McCartney, who has more money than Saudi Arabia, got togther with British music publishers recently to try to get them involved in his plans to open a performing arts school in Liverpool. The site is the now derelict grammar school that he and George Harrison attended; it would be England's first performing arts public school.... Fiona, for those of you who've wondered what ever happened to Fiona, has signed with Geffen Records. Her Geffen debut, Squeeze, will be out on April 1st and she'll be topless on the cover. She and her band, she says, "didn't want to be defined by what we were wearing." Michael Jackson, who likes awards, received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Association of Black Owned Broadcasters last week. And filmmaker Chuck Workman, who specializes in fast cuts, has just completed a five-minute video for Jackson about hs life. It has a lot of fast cuts and music by Felix Mendelssohn.

NARM's Bonk On CD **Packaging Change**

A BROAD AND VARIED AGENDA will be offered during the upcoming 34th Annual National Assn. of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) convention. But the topic likely to dominate discussion during the five-day confab is the recent decision by recording manufacturers to change CD packaging.

'I think according to conversations I have had, companies (during the convention) will be looking at what they have to do to accomodate the decision," Jim Bonk, NARM president and chief operating officer of the Carnelot Music chain, told Cash Box. 'But a lot of the membership is wondering why NARM's packaging committee had to go through the process of discussing it."

Most retailers have strongly favored the 6" x 12" "spaghetti" boxes over the standard 5 1/2" x 5" plastic boxes contained inside the long boxes because of anti-pilferage advantages and to avoid the cost of refixturing store shelves

Manufacturers claim that the 6" x 12" long boxes in which the jewel boxes are contained are more environment-friendly and will comply to merchandising of the configuration in Europe and Japan.

"We can work through the migration to the new packaging, but I think that retailers will be hoping for some significant help from manufacturers," Bonk said.

He said that retailers will likely question manufacturers about additional discounts, extended credit and return policies to offset the anticipated costs of refixturing and loss of revenue due to theft.

"From a cost standpoint," Bonk said, "the refixturing and the establishment of electronic security to prevent theft will increase costs. But manufacturers will have significant cost savings on warehouse space and shipping. We hope that they pass some of those savings on to dealers."

Otherwise, Bonk said, dealers will be exploring accomodation of the shift according to their own agendas. He said that a variety of electronic security devises are

available, that some dealers will likely discuss employing reusable boxes, and that some might use the "lift" system widely used in video stores.

The system displays the title's graphics on a shelf and the consumer then takes the title name and number to the counter to make a purchase. Bonk said that all the alternatives carry added cost and are labor-intensive.

Another issue that may generate some dialogue in the halls and hospitality suites at the NARM convention is royalties legislation now pending before a U.S. House of Representatives subcommittee.

NARM joined other segments of the recording industry in its support of the Audio Home Recording Act of 1991 which recently was the subject of hearings before the House subcommittee on intellectual property.

The bill calls for a royalty payment system for musicans and recording manufacturers to be paid by the makers of the latest electronic devices used in home taping-i.e. the DAT and compact disc recorders.

On Saturday, March 14 NARM has scheduled a demonstration of new technologies including the Mini Disc (MD) and Digital Compact Cassette.

Bonk said, "We have to support the idea that artists and record companies get compensated for their work."

The bill calls for an additional levy on blank tape and CDs, a cost that will surely be passed on to consumers. But Bonk said that he didn't forsee "significant impact at the cash register" and did not forsee any change in how retailers would merchandise blank recording mediums.

But Pam Horowitz, NARM executive vice president, said that while NARM supports the recording industry's efforts to gain passage of the bill, "no one considers the loss of revenue to retailers due to home taping and the Copyright Tribunal that would pay the new royalties to artists and manufacturers will not be giving a dime to dealers."



MUSIC REVIEWS

SINGLES

■ NIRVANA: "Come As You Are" (DGC PRO-CD-4375) The surprise act of the year releases the second single from their current smash album, *Nevermind*, which has dominated the #1 spot on the chart for months and has been holding down majors like U2, Michael Jackson and Prince. "Come As You Are" follows the long ride of "Smells Like Teen Spirit" and is written by bandmembers Kurt Cobain, David Grohl and Chris Novoselic. This cut is produced and engineered by Butch Vig and Nirvana.





SEAL: "Killer" (ZTT/Sire/Warner Bros. PRO-CD-5085) New act, and double-Grammy nominee, Seal's latest single, "Killer" is from his now gold, self-titled, debut album released last year. This Tinley/Seal composition follows his last cut, "Crazy" which he performed at the Grammy telecast, and is a slick, dance-oriented, futuristic tribal chant. The CD-single contains four mixes of varied lengths and is produced by Trevor Horn with additional mixes by William Orbit.

THE STORM: "Show Me The Way" (Interscope PRCD 4346-2)

Here is another second release single from new powerpop band The Storm, from their self-titled album. This cut features the vocals of co-lead singer Kevin Chalfant (sound a little like Steve Perry?), who co-wrote the tune along with Gregg Rolie (Journey, Santana) and is a strong follow-up to current hit single, "I've Got A Lot To Learn About Love." Making its chart debut last week, this track, along with the rest of the album, is produced by Beau Hill.





BOYZ II MEN: "Please Don't Go" (Motown

Boyz II Men have practically dominated radio the past year with songs featured on their debut album titled *Cooleyhighharmony*. "Please Don't Go," the follow-up to their number one hit "Uhh Ahh," is another slow-jam that has the same potential (if not, more) as the three previous singles they have released. Look for heavy radio rotation on R&B and top 40 stations.

NICE & SMOOTH: "Sometimes I Rhyme Slow" (RAL/Columbia CSK 74167)

Nice & Smooth, who topped various music charts with their smash single, "Hip-Hop Junkies," have returned with another single that is destined to follow in "Junkies" footsteps. "Sometimes I Rhyme Slow," is a catchy cut in which Nice & Smooth combine their talents to deliver their clearly distinctive sound. The musical production is also catchy, and they put the Tracy Chapman sample that runs throughout the song to good use.





JODECI: "Come & Talk To Me" (MCA 1595) For months, Jodeci's debut album Forever My Lady,

■ LEVEL 42: Guaranteed (RCA 07863 61033-2) After a decade of albums and over a year off, one of the UK's most consistantly sucsessful bands, Level 42 has re-grouped and signed to a new label only to release *Guaranteed*, a 12-cut dance/jazz/funk-flavored album that is more mature yet still maintains the familiar 42 flavor and harmonies. It sounds as though the time off did the band good, even if it came on the heels of some bad luck. This album is produced by Level 42 and Wally Badarou.





YANNI: Dare To Dream (Private 01005-82096-2) Following the release of two successful compilation lps, Dare To Dream is the first collection of all new material from the versatile composer since 1989. This 12-cut CD of modern instrumental music is unmistakable Yanni, an artist whose work is reaching new popularity through film and television scores, his live performances, and, of course, his universally acclaimed recordings. The album is produced, engineered, composed and performed by Yanni.

FIONA: Squeeze (Geffen GEFC/24429)

This is confusing. Fiona is the name of the band, and the name of the lead singer. *Squeeze* is the debut album for the band, but Fiona (the singer) has had three albums out previously, but this is her debut on Geffen. Got it? Good. This advance cassette is a 10-cut, guitar-oriented rock album, with a powerful female voice, which is the root of this two-girl, two-guy band. The album is due out in early April and is produced by Marc Tanner.



CHIC: Chic-ism (Warner Bros. 26394-2) Do you remember Chic? If so, get ready for a 1992 update of the group. The sound they employ is somewhat different from their previous material, but still has that old-school flava' that many groups tried to achieve. The production on the album is basic is some parts and in others you can hear a lot of samples and basslines being used. On the lyric tip, Da Youngsta's show some good vocal control leaving their overall product marketable and catchy.

Do you think Morton Gould has a bigger collection of Johnny Cash records than Johnny has of Morton Gould records? Would *you* ask them?

OH, WHAT A NIGHT: The night after the Grammy Awards-with all its unctuous, empty-headed glitzthe Rhythm & Blues Foundation gathered the bleary-eyed at the Rainbow Room to give its 1992 Pioneer Awards to a group of real musicians. Hank Ballard, Bobby "Blue" Bland, Chuck Jackson, Ella Johnson, Nellie Lutcher, Jesse Stone, Rufus Thomas, Paul "Hucklebuck" Williams, the Dells and the Staple Singers were the honorees and most of them were there in person: to accept their awards (cash awards, not just wall hangings) and to remind those who packed the room that pop music was once made by real musicians with real heart and real soul.

One after the other, they came to the podium-grey, aged people brimming with pride and bursting with ripe anecdotes about another time: a time with non-existent royalties and crummy working conditions, a time criss-crossing a racist, segregated South armed with little more than genuine talent and a genuine desire to make people happy. Some sang (including the Staple Singers, whose "Respect Yourself" rang through the room with brassy truth), some reminisced, some expressed bitterness, some just said thanks. Queen Latifah and Sam Moore were the affable hosts, and Bonnie Raitt, Fred



Schneider, Jerry But-Ier and M.C. Lyte were among those who brought them on.

The Rhythm and Blues Foundation, of course, is there to redress some of the imbalance, to right some of the wrongs done to these great American performers in their heyday. After four hours of mousse and pre-recorded bands at Radio City the night

before, it was like a balm; it made you feel good. It made me think of the guy sitting behind me who, after every one of the little people Michael Bolton thanked in accepting his Grammy for "When a Man Loves a Woman," shouted, "What about Percy Sledge?" Bolton forgot to thank Sledge, who wrote the song and who sang the pants off of it 25 years ago. The Rhythm and Blues Foundation, a marvelous organization, knows the truth: If you don't respect yourself, ain't nobody going to give a good cahoot. Long may they wave.

HERE'S SOMETHING I DIDN'T DO LAST WEEKEND: I didn't go to the Ritz on Saturday, March 7. What I didn't see was a show called "The Ritz Plays the Hitz with a Tribute to the Greats,' featuring "the Soft Parade as the Doors, Kashmir as Led Zeppelin, Strutter as KISS and Fantastic as Elton John." Every once in a while I'm just speechless. This is one of those times. l thought full shows based on impersonations (as opposed to, say, Rich Little, who does five minutes of Dean Martin per show and makes something comedic out of it) were limited to Elvis, but, at a time when the nostalgia craze has led to somebody at a New York flea market last weekend offering a Bullwinkle Pez dispenser for \$175 (I am not kidding), why the hell not go see Strutter as KISS? Wake me when the world comes back to its senses.

LISTENING PARTIES seem to be the way labels like to introduce new artists to the media, and subsequently, the public. Parties are really no more than an interesting indication of a more substantial *push* than just the standard product/photo/bio mailer and follow-up phone calls, and no doubt the ploy of a major rather than indie label. Radio stations have long since felt the same way about independent record promotion... the record must be better if the label is spending the extra money to push it.

Indie labels do have parties, they're just less interesting and on a much smaller budget (like, you have to buy your own drinks). Granted, it's lots easier to get attention when you hand out free food and drink, (the opportunity to fraternize with fellow cohorts is of only slight consolation, most media people are just *too boring*). The question is... can you decide which artists will or won't make it by the budget for the buffet? Does the choice of a caterer nescessarily translate into good reviews? ... more industry buzz? ...a playlist add? ...and ultimately, more record sales?

How about when the president and CEO of the label takes the time to write and send a letter specifically to the music journalist, to personally introduce the artist, and urge a listen? (Like Doug Morris of Atlantic did for new artist Tori Amos, plus a listening party.) Does that mean all the other new artists on the label aren't any good? And if that's the case, why do they sign all the other crap in the first place? And does the artist realize that all the money spent to push, promote, mail, give away, razzle-dazzle, and feed others, to hustle their questionable success, ultimately comes out of their own pockets? And if so, do they have a choice on how much they are willing to gamble on their careers? Is there an honest accountablility factor in the figures given to these artists on the costs involved, or are they all padded up like so many government military contracts? Does the \$2,000 hammer that gets charged back to the Pentagon translate into \$20-a-piece hors d'oeuvres served to music writers when it's charged back to the artist?

Does any of this even matter? Most new artists would sell their soul for a big, major-label push (see joke). It's the ones that *don't* get it that end up with non-careers, and it's a cold, hard fact that many starry-eyed hopefuls are dropped with a label debt they'll never understand hanging over them... So far better be it to throw that listening party than to spend the rest of your life wondering if it could have ever happened... blow the bucks... get a great caterer... and pass the shrimp, please...

JOKE: The devil walks up to this musician and says, 'I can make you the biggest and wealthiest star that has *ever been*, but in return, it will cost your eternal soul, the eternal souls of your parents, and the eternal souls of your wife and children"...and the musician says, "Great... so, what's the catch?" ...see you at NARM... next week...



Priority: From Rap To Rock

UP FROM SPECIALITY. That's the aim of the brand new arm of mega-indie Priority Records for their brand-spanking new off-shoot, Priority Rocks.

Priority itself is and was the Horatio Álger story of the industry. Initially a haven for compilation albums (the label was started up by former K-Tel execs), Priority made its first headway into the mainstream via the ludicrous novelty act, the California Raisins (who are the most popular singing fruits since the Village People, I suppose). Priority got into the burgeoning West Coast hip-hop scene with N.W.A.'s debut, Straight Outta Compton, and amassed an incredible 2.8% of the record market. Considering that Motown's heftiest share in its heyday was only 6%, that is an extrordinary figure.

Priority itself continues to be the dominant rap label for the L.A. scene today. Ice Cube's Death Certificate, Éazy-E's Eazy-Duz-It and N.W.A.'s Efil4zaggin' have moved into the rarified stratosphere of multi-platinum albums.

By the fall of 1991, Priority decided to move into the field of heavy metal by the establishment of Priority Rocks. According to Brian Turner, presi-dent of Priority, "Metal is so much like rap—the way it's marketed, the grass-roots movement of starting at college radio and non-stop touring, you don't really need a hit single." Sounds

pretty much like the indie credo. Turner's first signings on the Priority Rocks label that are set to be released are Slammin' Gladys, a raunchy hard-rock act whose debut was produced by Jani Lane of Warrant, and Maestro Alex Gregory, a guitar virtuoso from Europe who will undoubtedly wow the followers of Yngvie Malmsteen (if there are any left) with his excursions into speedy Baroque-isms.

Given that Priority has its own merchandising company (Northland), and all of its acts are either hip-hop or world-beat, the trip into that lucrative end of the music business isn't such a surprise, even if the genre of conventional metal seems to have peaked out. "Rap acts don't seem to do the kind of merchandising and concert dollars that the rock bands do, primarily because the audience doesn't have the cash," says one Priority staffer. "Also, the hype about violence at shows tends to diminish the number of rap gigs, although there is probably more of that at an average football game.

THE STRAND, REDONDO BEACH, CA-Windham Hill recording artists Tuck and Patti have an amazing knack for taking familiar melodies and running with them—stripping them bare, and building them up again through detailed exploration of all hidden aspects of the chord and colors of the phrase. The duoguitar virtuoso Tuck Andress and soulíul vocalist Patti Cathcart-Andress—captivated the capacity crowd at the Strand in a characteristically elegant, involving twohour set. Their considerable talents were demonstrated on a wide variety of tunes, ranging from gentle pop ballads to blues to seamless jazz improvisation.

Tuck's guitar wizardry was both visually and aurally arresting as he provided full orchestrations on one instrument, playing the bass line, rhythm parts and lead simultaneously (these parts often moved

in completely opposite directions, and encompassed a variety of registers). This talent for utilizing the entire instrument was showcased particularly well on his solo number—a joyous, energetic read-ing of Stevie Wonder's "I Wish."

Tuck's settings on the vocal pieces were beautiful as well, as his ringing, clipped chords and skillful hammering on the finger board propelled uptempo tunes like "Tears Of Joy" and The Beatles' vaudevillian "Honey Pie." Gentle, fluid picking and utilization of harmonics set the tone for Patti's thoughtful readings of the gentler pieces, such as "You Take My Breath Away," Cyndi Lauper's "Time After Time," and the seamless medley 'Castles Made Of Sand/Little

CLUB LINGERIE, HOLLYWOOD, CA-Forget Liz Taylor's 60th birthday bash at Disneyland. February's truly big L.A. event was the wedding of Wilson Phillips to Talking Heads, with Reverend George Clinton officiating. Cleverly disguised as a BETTY concert, the musical evening drew both the hip and the curious. (The committed already know that you spell their name in all capital letters because—well, just because.) BETTY is a female trio that's often as on-target as it is off-center. As the

inventors of a musical melange that could be labeled "alternative cabaret

rock," their toolbox includes the best of hip-hop fun, a cappella purity, new rock passion, performance art angst and piano bar style. Frizzy-haired Jewish fraternal twins Amy and Bitzi Ziff have found a different kind of sister in the tall, black, bass-playing Alyson Palmer. But if bi-racial, cross-cultural feminism provides BETTY's undertow, the waves they make are more musically than politically correct.

Cover tunes are only a small part of BETTY's act, but theirs abound with undercover intrigue. "Fun Girl" gives a Laurie Anderson slant to a Streisand medley from *Funny Girl*, fusing "People" and "You Are Woman" into a brand new psychodrama. Their "Betticoat Junction" turns the corny theme song from the *Beverly Hillbillies* sitcom spinoff *Petticoat Junction* into a conditionate to make in check hump and grind. a sophisticated, tongue-in-cheek bump-and-grind.

Their original anti-love song treasures include the a cappella loneliness of "First Date" ("Guess I shaved my legs for nothing") and the sexually ambivalent, industrial-strength "Shrinkback" ("Sex with a married man/Fun with an African/Tea with a lesbian"). Using nothing but their vocals to deliver the first and heavy techno-sampling to liberate the latter, BETTY's instrumentation is never expected but always welcome.

Live—as on their self-titled, indie album debut (on The Man From BETTY Records, produced by Mike "Bronski Beat" Thorne)—they segue their music with spoken-word bits that raise between-song patter to a new artform. The overlapping conversational tone of "Martini Talk" recalls the best of Ken Nordine's "wordjazz." Their urban saga, "N.Y.U.," is an O'-Henry story for the typical attention span of the '90s (less than 30 seconds). A BETTY show captures both the come-hither wave of an index finger

and the fend-off salute of the middle finger-reminding us that both are part of the same hand that puts the writing on the wall.

So what's the commercial bottom line for a group that includes a cello as well as a drum machine in their musical lineup? With material this strong, BETTY may be only a distribution deal and re-mix away from the mainstream success of a B-52's, Suzanne Vega or a P.M. Dawn. As the band's T-shirts say, "BETTY Rules." With a cutting-edge vengeance.

In perfect synchronicity with the textured guitar work were Patti's embracing vocals. Her husky alto was perfectly suited to phrase-painting on love songs like "My Romance" and the thoughtful high-light, "In My Life," but also proved strong and agile on the uptempo

KRS-One

CASH BOX ARTIST PROFILE: Most would know, but those that don't, **Boogie Down Productions** consists of **KRS-One** and his posse from the South Bronx. At the age of 13, Kris Parker (KRS-One) was a runaway and spent the following seven years of his life learning and surviving. He also spent countless hours—between hanging out on the subways and in public shelters—at the public library.

In the Bronx, at Franklin Shelter, which is a public shelter for homeless men, Parker met his greatest inspiration, a counselor named Scott Sterling (Scott LaRock), who encouraged him to further his talents. KRS-One and Scott then went on to form BDP in homage to the borough that they stayed true to, the "Boogie Down" Bronx.

BDP made songs about the harsh life in urban America with songs such as "Crack Attack," the debut single that was completely financed by the group. Following the single, they went on to record their debut album titled Criminal Minded, that was released in 1986, and is one of the albums that took rap to another level. The slammin' azz production fit perfectly to KRS-One's pure and uncensored vocals on songs like "South Bronx," "Poetry," the title track "Criminal Minded" and "The Bridge ls Over," which was BDP's response to MC Shan's "The Bridge." Boogie Down Productions were finally established and were well on their way to the top.

STREET BEAT

In August of that year, Scott was shot and killed after he and a few of his homies had gone to some projects in the Bronx to squash some beef (settle an argument). After his death, the group started to unravel, but KRS held things together.

In 1987, BDP was signed to Jive Records and released their second album titled By All Means Necessary that set off a chain reaction of clone-like product. "My Philosophy," "I'm Still #1," and "Stop The Violence" were by far, the album's standout cuts. The group had advanced their sound both lyrically and production-wise to a point where, to this day, they are considered to be one of the most talented groups in the market. What KRS-One acheived on this album is what no other artist had done in the way he delivered messages of education.

1989 marked the year that KRS-One and many other leading names in rap formed the Stop The Violence Movement that is an organization to increase public awareness on the effects of black-on-black crimes. The single, "Self Destruction," raised over \$500,000 for the National Urban League to fund youth programs that concentrated on illiteracy and crime.

Ghetto Music: The Blueprint of Hip-Hop, Edutainment and Live Hardcore Worldwide were the next three albums to follow. Every album served as another large step forward for BDP and set the stage for their most recent release, Sex And Violence.

On this album, KRS-One takes things back to the oldschool days and mixes it in with his educational and hardhittin' lyrics. Throughout the album, there is a constant change of pace and various topics being addressed. Just as the rest of BDP's albums have done, this will also be another step forward for the group educating even more listeners this time around.



WAYNE NEWTON: Moods & Moments (Curb 7755)



Some artists put out an album to gain success, continue their chart access or just gain some kind of exposure. Why then would Wayne Newton, the king of all musical trades, add another release to his 90-album collection? Why is less the point, considering the fact that fans will have even more tangible evidence of the performer who is much more than a Las Vegas standard. Newton's album entitled *Moods & Moments* captures the essence of emotionally intense music. From the pumping


razzle dazzle of the current single cut, "I Know So," to the heart-tugging "Old Loves Never Die," Newton not only proves his undaunted legacy of style but also his ability to awaken musical chords in any time period, in any musical style. Along with producing the album, Newton also takes co-writing credits for the album's most passionate cuts, "Tell Me Who We Are" and "The Letter." Bobby Jones' Televised Explosion Has Become Gospel Music's New Realm Of Reach

PEOPLE TRAVELED FROM ALL CORNERS of the United States to be part of the newest, most comprehensive Black Christian music gathering since the inception of the Gospel Music Workshop of America, founded by the late, legendary Rev. James Cleveland. "Gospel Explosion V," held February 5-8, 1992 at the Tennessee Performing Arts Center (TPAC) in Nashville, attracted more than 2,500 gospel enthusiasts. The Explosion, headquartered at the Crowne Plaza Holiday Inn Hotel (downtown) assembled in Christian love and musical fellowship for tapings of the *Bobby Jones Gospel Show*.

People from all over the world have defined gospel music as one of America's most important musics. Gospel music, now recognized as an American art form, is seen three times weekly (in most marketplaces) by 30 million viewers in 28 countries via *Bobby Jones Gospel*. It is the number-one-rated program on the Black Entertainment Television Network (BET). *Video Gospel*, another Bobby Jones show which serves as an outlet for Christian videos, has moved into the number four spot on BET.

"Symposiums conducted during the day by the best of the industry, including *Cash Box* president and publisher George Albert, and nightly concerts displaying the art form, for both the artist with high visibility as well as the unknown through the medium of television, have become the expression that the Lord has allowed us to use to foster the concepts of Christianity," said Jones in a statement. "We are excited about the way the Lord is using the airwaves, and we want to present what the Lord has given us to give, in the most dignified, sincere, sanctified and Holy-Ghost-filled way that we can."

Some of the nation's top recording artists and industry notables, including Walter Hawkins, Ron Winans, Mom and Pop Winans, Vanessa Bell Armstrong, Thomas Whitfield, Willie Neal Johnson and The Gospel Key Notes, The Williams Brothers, The Impressions, Albertina Walker, Teresa Hairston, Billy Ray Hearn, Vicki Mack Lataillade, George W. Stewart, Milton Biggham, Pearl Jarrett from London, England, Ab and Marsha Meerebeek from Australia and many, many others were all on hand to celebrate the liveliness, popularity, tradition and history of gospel music worldwide.

Choirs, groups, soloists and instrumentalists also came for the op-

portunity to meet, greet and have their pictures taken with the stars, market their product, network, shop for record deals and be presented in the most professional venue for Christian music available.

Jones, who holds a doctorate from Vanderbilt University, has 10 albums to his credit. He is also a winner of the Stellar, Dove and coveted Grammy awards. Dr. Jones provided an educational forum for the gathered gospel participants with a discussion of industry affairs as presented by the recently formed United Gospel Industry Council.

"Bobby Jones is a champion for Christian music programming at the network," said Jeff Lee, BET vice president, in an address last year. "Gospel music couldn't have a better advocate. I pledge continued respect, support and more to Dr. Jones on behalf of myself, Bob Johnson (president) and the entire Black Entertainment Television Network."

Bobby Jones will certainly be listed in the archives of Christian television and Christian music. Because of Bobby Jones, Christians all over this country have had the privilege to minister the gospel worldwide through tele-evangelism. A standing ovation goes out to Bobby Jones for using his vehicle (television) for the enhancement of us all. Thanks to Bobby Jones, television has become gospel music's new realm of reach!
