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
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COVER STORY Doc Holiday

A STUDENT OF THE MUSIC INDUSTRY SINCE THE AGE OF FOUR, Doc Holiday has come full circle.

At 17 he was awarded a scholarship to attend the famed Juilliard School Of Music in New York, during which time he was playing what is now called "blue-eyed soul" in Asbury Park, New Jersey, with a group of local musicians which included none other than Bruce Springsteen.

Holiday also worked as an engineer at the famous Record Plant studio in New York, gripped hands with the likes of Jimi Hendrix, The Rascals, and many more of today's legends, produced records for Buddah Records, and played guitar for Jerry Lee Lewis. Firmly planted in the recording industry, Holiday currently operates Tug Boat Records and Mega International Records, and promotes and produces artists such as Fats Domino, Big Al Downing, Doug Kershaw, Narvel Felts, and King B & The New Jack Crew.

As an artist, Holiday is enjoying chart success with his latest single, "Canadian State Of Mind," which hits #63 with a bullet on this week's *Cash Box* Top 100 Country Singles Chart.

TICKERTAPE

ICE-T COOLS IT: Rapper Ice-T has told his record label, **Warner Bros./Sire Records** and its parent company, Time Warner, to pull the controversial song, "Cop Killer," off of future pressings of his *Body Count* album. The label will immediately cease manufacturing and distributing the current version of the lp and replace it with a new one without "Cop Killer." Ice-T did say, however, that he would give the song away at concerts and "to anyone who asks, because I'm not trying to shut the message down." The *Body Count* album is nearing the 500,000 unit mark.

I GOTTA CROWE: Johnny Colt, bassist with the Black Crowes, was arrested in Minneapolis, MN as he attempted to assist an intoxicated and disoriented fan. It seems Colt intervened when police officers tried to arrest the fan, who initially had accosted the band member at the band's hotel. Colt was cited for obstruction of justice. He was released on bail and has been scheduled to appear in court July 31.

SCORE: ASCAP will hold an eight-session film scoring workshop beginning Oct. 13 in Los Angeles. Fred Karlin, author of *On the Track: A Guide to Contemporary Film Scoring* will run the show, which will be open to 14 composers. Do you want to be one? JUST PLAIN FOLK: The Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest Fund has set aside \$4 million to promote the vitality of folk arts in America. The money will be broken into a S1 million grant to the Fund for Folk Culture of Santa Fe, to administer the Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest Community Folklife Program, and an initial \$3 million for a series of traveling exhibitions, touring concerts and national radio broadcasts, including a concert series at Wolf Trap, a variety of folk music tours via the National Council for the Traditional Arts, and a "Root and Branches Folk Festival" as part of the National Black Arts Festival in Atlanta.

WONDERAMA: Sony Wonder has been formed to "create innovative entertainment for the children's and family markets." Becky Mancuso-Winding will manage its operations.

AND...: Danzig has re-signed to Def American.... September's Minnesota Black Music Expo will commemorate the 10th anniversary of Flyte Tyme producers Jimmy "Jam" Harris and Terry Lewis with a celebrity roast as part of the Black Music Awards, Sept. 5. The Expo runs Sept. 3-5.... And Run-DMC are recording their next Profile album, 7, which marks *their* 10th anniversary. The rap pioneers will be joined on the album by Chuck D, Pete Rock, A Tribe Called Quest, EPMD and others.

JAMMIN': The long-awaited **Bob** Marley boxed set, *Songs of Freedom*, will be issued by Tuff Gong/Island Records on Sept. 22. Limited to a million copies worldwide, the four-CD job promises to take Marley from his earliest days (1962) to his death in 1980, including plenty of previously unreleased material among its 78 tracks. Around the same time, *Time Will Tell*, a feature-length home video documentary about the reggae legend will also be released. 

ALBUMS

PETER CETERA: World Falling Down (Warner Bros. 9 26894-2)

The former voice of Chicago's new solo album is filled The former voice of Chicago's new solo album is filled with AC/MOR melodies only four of which are actually written by Cetera. Familiar sounding horns play on "Even A Fool Can See,""Feels Like Heaven" is a duet featuring Chaka Khan. Cetera co-produces the 10-cut CD along with Andy Hill, who also lends a co-writing hand on current single, "Restless Heart," the title track, and two others. "The Last Place God Made" features key-boards and production by longtime associate, David Foster. Foster.





PAT METHENY: Secret Story (Geffen GEFD-24468) Metheny's new release is 14 tracks of essentially new age/jazz instrumentals composed, executed and produced by Metheny. Naturally. All selections feature members of the London Orchesira, conducted by Jeremy Lubbock, along with Pat's performance on various instru-ments like acoustic and electric guitars, planos and syn-thesizers, sitar, basese, electric percussion, and basically everything but the kitchen sink. Co-production credits go to Steve Rodby and David Oakes.

DIXIE DREGS: Bring 'Em Back Alive (Capricom 9 42005-2)

42005-2) The title to this effort is appropriate in more ways than one. "Bring 'Em Back" we can assume is indicative of both their re-forming for a recent tour for the first time in nearly 10 years, and also because it was recorded in the band's native Georgia. "Alive" would just so happen to cover the fact it is a live album. Guitarist extraordinaire, Steve Morse, and the Dregs have assembled some of their best work including a rendition of Zeppelin's "Kashmir."





JOE COCKER: Night Calls (Capitol CDP 7 97801 2) JOE COCKER: Night Calls (Capitol CDP 7 97801 2) Joe's voice is passionately lent on this collection of 12 tunes that include first single, "Feels Like Forever," writ-ten by Bryan Adams and Diane Warren and is featured in the upcoming film, *The Cutting Edge*. Others include the Beatles' "You've Got To Hide Your Love Away," Gary Wright's "Love Is Alive," Elton John's "Don't Let The Sun Go Down On Me," Steve Winwood's "Can't Find My Way Home." Produced by David Trickle, Chris Lord-Alge, Danny Kortchmar and Jeff Lynne.

MINISTRY: Psaim 69: The Way To Succeed And The Way To Suck Eggs (Sire/Warner Bros. 9 26727-2) Way To Suck Eggs (Sire/Warner Bros. 9 26727-2) You probably wouldn't get the title to this 9-cut CD by the hierogly phics on the album. Anyway, if Satan could sing, he'd want to sound like singer, Al Jourgensen. Who knows, maybe he already is. This collection of industrial thrash/ metal mayhem tunes is full of the speed-noise and anti-establishment, anti-authority, anti-religion, anti-whatever we've all come to expect from Ministry. First single is 'Jesus Built My Hotrod' Producers: H. Luxa & H. Pan.





SWING OUT SISTER: Get In Touch With Yourself (Fontana 314 512 241-2)

(Fontana 314 512 241-2) The English duo's first release in three years features nine originals, a cover ("Am I The Same Girl" which is really disco classic, "Soulful Strut" with words), and two in-strumental cuts. Andy Connell and Corrine Drewery offer up dancey, English-type pop songs backed up with lush disco backing that bring back memories of Barry White or Isaac Hayes. Nevertheless, this act has a distinct following in the dance clubs of Europe. Most cuts produced by Paul Staveley O'Duffy. PICK OF THE WEEK:

GEORGE HARRISON: Live In Japan (Warner Bros./Dark Horse 9 26964-2)



We all know it's been far too long (like 17 years) since George Har-rison has played his own music to a live audience, let alone selections of his best early Beatles material and solo career. Put that together with Eric Clapton and a killer hand-picked band, and you have the makings of an historic album. The double CD contains 19 cuts in-cluding versions of "Something," "Here Comes The Sun," "While My Guitar Gently Weeps" (on which Clapton was the original soloist), "Taxman," "Roll Over Beethoven," "My Sweet Lord," and the more recent "All Those Years Ago" and "Got My Mind Set On You." To say the least this would be a collector's item, it's also nice to know Ceorge is having a good time. a good time.

SINGLES

RED HOT CHILI PEPPERS: "Breaking The Girl" (Warner Bros. PRO-CD-5274)

(Warner Bros. PRO-CD-5274) Just yet another track from the Red Hot Blood Sugar Sex Majik Ip still in the Top 10 after 44 weeks. This waltz-tempo cut is more natural-sounding, using acoustic guitars, flute-like instruments and natural percussion (sounds more like banging on pots and pans). Still alterna-tive, and not likely to cross over to any format ground the Chili Peppers haven't already broken, the song was writ-ten by the boys and produced by Def American chief, Rick Rubin. ten by the b Rick Rubin.





THE BLACK CROWES: "Thom In My Pride" (Def American PRO-CD-5610)

American PRO-CD-5610) Continuing in the style of early '70s Southern Rock, the Crowes' brother team of Chris and Rich Robinson have written a basic, straight-ahead blues/rock ballad com-plete with all the trimmings from their Southern Harmony And Musical Companion album. There is enough of a raw edge on this track to please programmers on CHR and AC, listen for wide play on both radio formats. Produced by the Crowes and George Drakoulias. The CD single also includes "Sting Me."

INXS: "Not Enough Time" (Atlantic PRCD 4721-2) This first-released single from the band's latest album, Welcome To Wherever You Are, is clearly an example of what has made this down-under band's new studio what has made this down-under band's new studio album worth waiting for. This danceable, romantic rocker shows signs of maturity and further definition in the group's style. Both the album and single are packaged in the new environmentally conscious (and slightly confus-ing) Eco-Pak, and produced by Mark Opitz and INXS.





SPIRITUALIZED: "I Want You" (BMG RDJ 62327-2) Spiritualized: "I Want You" (BMG RDJ 62327-2) Sort of like an early U2 song done in monotone, "I Want You" is this U.K. band's latest release from their Laser Guided Melodies Ip and is more of the same drone-ish idea they were trying to escape when they disbanded the former Spacemen 3. The CD single also includes a nearly 13 1/2 minute, previously unreleased cut, entitled "Feel So Bad." Produced by J. Spaceman (who is singer/guitarist and former Spacemen founder Jason Pierce) and Barry Clempson.

LINEAR: "Smile If You Like Sex" (Atlantic PRCD 4730) **EINEAR:** "Smile it You Like Sex" (Atlantic PRCD 4730) This youth-oriented, hormone-driven, pop/dance trio's latest release is from their sophomore, *Caught In The Mid-dle* 1p, and follows the group's current single, "T.L.C.," dropping down after 13 weeks. Although this bub-blerum, teeny-bop dance act is clearly aimed at a young audience, most of the band's success has been in foreign-teen markets. Considering the subject matter and depth of the material, this is the best bet. Producer is David Frank.





■ WAILING SOULS: "All Over The World" (CHAOS/Columbia OSK 4647) Inaugurating the new Chaos label, the Wailing Souls have long been one of Jamaica's most acclaimed reggae bands. The singing duo combines Jamaican reggae with American R&B, to come up with an almost "disco"-ized version of the traditional reggae feel. This title song from the debut album is filled with social awareness and global consciousness, and could receive much club play and possibly cross over a few different radio formats. Produced by Richard Feldman.

PUBLISHING

"CHART-Y" MARTI: Songwriter/producer Marti Sharron has had her ups and downs in this business, but her career took a quantum leap in 1984 with the success of her first big hit, "Jump (For My Love)" by the Pointer Sisters. That Grammy Award-winning song (co-written with Gary Skardina and Steven Mitchell) propelled Sharron to the level of a ''major'' songwriter and opened the doors to her becoming one of the most successful female producers as well.

Born in Ohio and raised in Florida, Sharron received a degree in journalism from the University of Miami. But it was music that moved her. Her first break came when Paul Anka published one of her songs. Then she got a job at Henry Stone's TK Records, where she eventually got to co-produce her first record, "The Magician," for Timmy Thomas. At that point she felt she was ready to take on Los Angeles. She arrived here in the late '70s, prepared to conquer the music industry. But it wasn't that easy.

"I really struggled for five years," recalls Sharron, whose socially prominent parents supported her for a while. "They thought I was using the money to get my masters degree. I was really using it for demos. When I finally told them the truth, they were furious. They didn't talk to me for a year."

Those demos were sent all over town, only to be rejected or not even listened to. "You'd get the person's secretary on the phone," Sharron says, "and she'd ask you, 'What is this regarding?' After a while, I'd



get so frustrated, I would answer, 'HIS BODY, OK!?' During that time, she worked as a rep for an auto body shop and as a swimming instructor to help make ends meet.

But Sharron's persistence paid off when, in 1983, after an ASCAP showcase, she was signed by Linda Perry at ATV Music. For nearly a year, Perry worked with her signee to hone the skills necessary to become a hit writer. "Linda was great," Sharron remarks. "She would go over each song like it was her own-line by line-to make sure it was good. There aren't many publishers who would do that."

The Perry connection came into play when Linda suggested Sharron sing "Jump" for Linda's ex-husband, producer **Richard Perry**. "When Richard heard it," Sharron says, "he said it was a hit, and that it would be great for Julio [Richard was also producing Julio Iglesias at the time]. Linda said, 'Not Julio. This song is for the Pointers." The rest, as they say, is history.

'Jump' Since the phenomenon, Sharron has had numerous hits as both writer and producer. "Own The Night" was recorded by Chaka Khan and featured on the quadruple-platinum Miami Vice soundtrack lp; "No One In The World" by Anita Baker was a Top 20 single and was on the three-million-selling Rapture album; and Natalie Cole's Dangerous album, for which Sharron produced and cowrote five songs. She has also had cuts by Earth, Wind and Fire, Phyllis Hyman, Nancy Wilson and Glenn Medeiros, among a host of others.

Today, Sharron is excited about several projects in the works. She has been collaborating with Eric Carmen for his new album and has written a song with Burt Bacharach (one of her idols). Another one of her idols, Ray Charles, has just recorded her song, "If I Could."

It looks like Marti will continue to be "chart-y" for a long time.

INDUSTRY BUZZ

LUCKY TOWN: I know what **Bruce Springsteen** is trying to do, he's trying to move on. The reason he put





out two albums at once, he says in *Rolling Stone*, was because he wanted to have a lot of new songs to choose from when he hit the road. The reason he fired the E **Street Band** was because he wanted a change.

On opening night of his first U.S. tour since 1988's *Tunnel of Love* jaunt,

Springsteen worked as long—three-and-a-half solid hours of music—and as hard as I've ever seen him work. He swam out into the orchestra seats of his (former) hometown Byrne Arena, he joked amicably about the current chart positions of his new albums (sinking like a pair of stones), he tried gamefully to work up a hint of the rock and roll steam that Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band got in their heyday. (The last time Springsteen was at the Byrne Arena was on the opening leg of the *Born in the U.S.A.* tour, and it was *the* Springsteen concert of them all: the new songs were already on everybody's lips, the old anthems were at their loosest, the band was brimming with forward motion good cheer. It was a three-hour grin.)

Three things came to mind, watching Springsteen work the crowd.

One, the new albums have been out long enough for Springsteen's staunchest fans to have learned every word of every song. They didn't. Me, I think he should have put out one album—the best stuff from the two—because who has time to learn 24 songs? The best songs worked really well in concert—"Roll of the Dice," "Better Days," "Leap of Faith," and on and on—but it seems the fans stepped back a bit when faced with two albums: "Do I still like Springsteen enough to shell out for two CDs?" that kind of thing. (The show was primarily drawn from the new albums, with *Born in the U.S.A.* the only older album to get more than a passing nod.)

Two, by giving up what he gave up in firing his band—20 years of very, very, very strong live camaraderie-he should have gotten more in terms of change. In other words, what's required of the current band is nothing much different from what was required of the last band: some solid, meat-andpotatoes rock and roll. The music's sound-especially with holdover Roy Bittan's cheerfully chiming keyboards—hasn't changed. I can understand if he was going for something out of left field—say Sly and Robbie on rhythm—but to trade in the incredible rhythmic empathy of Max Weinberg and Gary Tallent for a pair of competent studio guns-for-hire doesn't make a heck of a lot of sense. I wonder if bagging the whole band wasn't just an elaborate excuse to bag the big guy on saxophone, who had worn out his musical welcome on the *Born in the U.S.A.* tour. I kept thinking it must have been like seeing Jagger in Australia, doing Rolling Stones songs with a pick-up band. This wasn't a band—Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band was a great rock and roll entity—but a superstar with a backing band.

Three, Springsteen's encores used to be highly-packed sets of rock and roll oldies, sweaty tidbits from his radio-listening past. Now his own old music has become the encores: "Hungry Heart," "Born to Run," "Thunder Road," stuff like that. I wonder if he now looks on them as he looks on the stuff in the "Detroit Medley," as yesterday's news, as old fun. Still, it was a hell of a show, and it will get better as it steams

Still, it was a hell of a show, and it will get better as it steams along, as the new songs become a bit more familiar to the audience, the old songs become a bit more familiar to the band, and the work—much of the time, Springsteen and company seemed like they were working—becomes second nature, becomes fun. A great concert, but there'll be better days, it's true. By Randy Clark

ESSENTIALLY, IT'S ABOUT RESPONSIBILITY: The music

business and the entire Hollywood community is up in arms over the



Ice-T "Cop Killer" controversy. The tentacles of which have spread across the country through the retail records community, police departments in practically all urban areas, and certainly local as well as the federal government. The news media also helps fuel the fire, but then, it is *news*, isn't it?

No matter what medium an artist chooses, be it stone, paint, ink, film, performance, music, *whatever* it is, and has been, one of our basic beliefs as Americans to maintain the right to express our creativity. Some forms of expression are more likely to reach the masses easier than others, naturally, the more exposure and acclaim these works of "art" get, the exploitation "agencies" and machinery through which an artist's work is made available (and a profit derived from) stand subject to criticism as well as does the artist.

Sure, an artist wants to send his message as far and wide as possible. And most are quite willing to enjoy the benefits of financial reward through getting their message out. Why not? That leaves much more free time to maintain and develop further creativity, does it not? It is on this very principle, that Hollywood was based.

Societies throughout history have long been the moral judges of any artist's work. Remember Victorianism? It is precisely that type of censorship and regulation on freedom of expression, that made our country's founders include express guidelines in the U.S. Constitution proclaiming such *freedom* as one of our inalienable rights.

That aside, let's take your basic scenario. Artist shows his work. People respond favorably. Artist is approached by "promoter/exploiter" types with offers of financial rewards in return for participation in those profits. Hollywood. Now, we all know what has happened since then. The age of electronic information and mass media have made fortunes for those artists whose work is chosen for this exploitaion. The entire "show biz" community is a direct result of this principle. Gargantuan media conglomerates have risen to unparalelled might, and were it not for competition in the marketplace they would certainly be dictating virtually everything we see and hear.

Ice-T made a statement with his work and he needs to face the responsibility of owning up to it having been said. If he can't take the heat, he can always leave the kitchen. He should also feel very fortunate that his message can be heard. His label should also be concerned with the content of his material in a financially responsible way, as should parent company, Time Warner, be concerned with each piece of their art and information, as should radio and television broadcasters as well. It's a matter of individual responsibility on every level.

There will always be controversy. There will always be accidents. Henry Ford built cars for transportation purposes, the down side is traffic fatalities. Smith & Wesson make tools for hunting, yet there is murder. Ford and Smith & Wesson are not responsible for these deaths. Ice-T, to my knowledge, has never killed a cop. But Orson Welles sure got a lot of people scared with his Halloween *War Of The Worlds* broadcast. Go figure.

Does art imitate life? Or vice versa? Cops have been gunned down as long as there have been cops. Movies, television and Ice-T don't make it happen. And if Time Warner, Sire/Warner Bros., the broadcasters of the material and Ice-T are comfortable with the repercussions, so be it. Society will have to make up its own mind, and assume its own responsibility. That's just the way the system works... Next week...

Michael Jackson: Man In The *Mirror*

BRITISH BARRISTERS FOR POP STAR MICHAEL JACKSON plan to test the notion that mirrors don't lie. In this case, Jackson's legal representatives say they expect to win the singer's libel suit filed against publishers of the *London Daily Mirror* over a series of articles claiming that Jackson's face has been horribly disfigured because of extensive plastic surgery. In a separate action, barrister Julia Palco of the London legal firm of Simon Olswang & Company obtained an injunction in the London High Court blocking the newspaper and its photographer, Ken Lennox from re-publishing, or licensing others to publish, any photographs taken by Lennox during Jackson's June 27 Munich concert. The motion for the injunction was initiated by TTC Touring, Jackson's touring company.

The suit claims that the *Daily Mirror* labeled Jackson "Scarface" and said that his appearance was merely a mask hiding a "hideously disfigured" face. The suit alleges that the article wrongfully claimed that Jackson is scarred—a phantom whose face is covered with scar tissue, with a hole in his nose, one cheek higher than the other and an oddly sagging chin. "Of course that's ridiculous," said Jackson's U.S. attorney, Bert Fields. "If they'd bothered to check with anyone who has seen Michael up close, they couldn't have printed that story; they'd know it was false." Fields said that he has seen the singer up close a dozen times in the last year—"and there was no evidence of the disfigurement reported in the *Daily Mirror*."

Fields explained that the injunctive motion sought and obtained against the newspaper and Lennox was filed because an allegedly written agreement prohibited the use/sale of any photo after a first-time publishing. Jackson's attorneys claimed that selling the photograph—which Fields claims was taken from an extreme angle, from a distance and in bad light, with the singer's face"scrunched up" while singing—clearly and deliberately violated the agreement.

Fields said the London barristers are pursuing an "unreserved and total apology" from the *Daily Mirror* and substantial damages. Fields explained that British law does not permit a specific figure to be attached to such lawsuits, but that he expected the court to award a substantial settlement.

Jackson spokesman Bob Jones, speaking from London said the singer had no comment on the case and that the singer's world tour would continue as planned. Jackson was in London last week for three dates at Wembley Stadium.

MOST PEOPLE WOULD describe the archetypical ambitious Hollywood woman as a shrill, overbearing stereotype. This description couldn't be farther from reality with **Piece of Mind** recording artist **Debbie Patino**.

Ms. Patino and her combo Holy Water have just released their debut single for the small Santa Monica-based label. The single, "Superstition Highway"/"Smokescreen" is somewhat out of the label's usual bill of fare, as Holy Water could best be described as mainstream rock with heavy, early '70s psychedelic overtones, unlike the industrial tracks which typically bear the Piece of Mind label.

A long-time fixture on the Hollywood club and spoken-word scene, Patino began her indie recording career doing spokenword on a Harvey Kubernik compilation. Her first foray into music was with the all-female combo Ras Zebrae, who recorded for SST-subsidiary Unseen Hand. "It was your typical indie situation, van tours, no money, five years of struggle," sighs Patino."We had a great time, but nothing really happened. In those days, you did it all yourself, and while I think that's cool to a certain degree, we needed more than we got."

Mixing poetry with song became the singer's next project, as she teamed up with the like-minded Iris Berry and Pleasant Gehman for what became the Ringling Sisters. "We had interest from Lou Adler before we even had any real material," says Patino. "So we demoed the three songs we had, and Lou signed us to Ode, which he started back up again." This time the pitfalls of major -label hell struck; the band spent a fortune in the studio, and started to dump members and squabble. "As an indie, you have to build a following from the ground up," says Patino. "But because we were really on A&M, everybody thought, 'Wow, let's let the company do all our work for us.' Plus, we started to fire people from the band, and it ceased to be cooperative."

Patino has learned the hard way from her 10 years in Hollywood. "I know that you've got to be willing to kill and die for your music, but it floors me when I hear people say, 'Oh, L7 sold out, oh, Rollins sold out,' all because they made the jump to majors, and are finally on the radio. If the people knew how tough it is to try and do your art in this scene, they might appreciate the artist's standpoint a lot more."

Currently, Patino is involved with a pro-choice, spoken-word album entitled, *Choice*, also on Piece of Mind. The album features members of Mary's Danish, L7, Rosie Flores, *LA Weekly* music editor Sue Cummings, Exene, Jula Bell and Patino, all doing their various things. It would seem that the artist, whose day gig is booking A&M's mastering lab, has come full circle.

Once On This Island

WILSHIRE THEATRE, BEVERLY HILLS, CA—Once On This Island may be the bolder black cousin, once removed, of the Hans Christian Andersen fable *The Little Mermaid*. But its industry success story reads more like a grown-up musical version of *The Little Engine That Could*.

This "little show that could"—and did—was born off-Broadway in 1990. When the sleeper hit moved up to Broadway the following year, it was greeted with eight Tony nominations including Best Musical. Now its '92 national touring company is proving that "small" and "black" can be beautiful simultaneously, even in uprising-torn and mega-movie-fixated Los Angeles.

With a spirited but tiny cast by stage musical standards (just 11 performers), an effective but short one-act format (just over 90 minutes), and a joyous yet compact approach to staging, *Once On This Island* shrinks Broadway's lust for spectacle down to intimate size. The musical's book is adapted from Trinidad-born writer Rosa

The musical's book is adapted from Trinidad-born writer Rosa Guy's version of the melancholy mermaid myth which she re-invented for her novel *My Love*, *My Love*. Far from its origins in the Danish sea, a swift and politically-correct current washes this plot ashore on a Haiti-like island—and into a cauldron of rich-versus-poor, socio-economic toils and troubles. This familiar story of star-crossed lovers is fish tale no more as it takes on many of the dramatic dimensions of a *West Side Story*.

Once On This Island is virtually all Carribbean-influenced song and dance, but there's more calypso/reggae feeling in director Graciela Daniele's choreography than in the songs or orchestrations themselves. Many of this musical's best tunes sound closer to the Broadway of Manhattan island than to the beaches of Hispaniola. But this ultimately works to the score's benefit, as a haunting ballad like "Some Girls" can now be covered by more than just Harry Belafonte or Ziggy Marley.

Musical purists familiar with the authentic Haitian music on the Jonathan Demme-produced compilation *Konbit: Burning Rhythms Of Haiti* (A&M) probably leave the theater wishing that composer Stephan Flaherty and lyricist Lynn Ahrens had spent more time in The Caribbean before putting pen to paper. But the bulk of theatergoers aren't ethno-musicologists: they simply want their show tunes to sound like show tunes, and that's what this 16-song score delivers in hummable abundance.

This national touring company features less than half of the voices gracing the RCA Victor original Broadway cast album, but there's too much bright new talent on stage to warrant a detailed census of the missing-in-action.

Instead of non-stop special effects, we get show-stopping numbers. Instead of a vapid happy ending, we get a goose-bumpy spiritual redemption—and a new appreciation for "small is beautiful" entertainment. Once On This Island engages our imagination by leaving so much to it. It's big on emotion, and that's ultimately where size counts most on the musical stage.

El Rescate Benefit Featuring John Doe

THE VARIETY ARTS THEATRE, LOS ANGELES, CA—In an intimate, informal concert for about 250 people, John Doe (DGC Records), best known for his work with L.A.'s critically acclaimed band X, lent his efforts to aid in the reconstruction of El Salvador. The benefit, put together by activist organization El Rescate ("the rescue"), raised money for The Caravan to the New El Salvador, an international project which will deliver construction and agricultural materials, medicines, food, and other supplies designed to promote self-development projects in the devastated region.

The group could not have picked a better spokesperson than Doe, who inspired the crowd with his dry political and social humor as well as his music. His solo acoustic set, which included Elvis-style rockers, country-flavored story songs and romantic ballads, was performed with a passionate spirit. Doe joked informally and took requests from the audience, giving the show a low-key, "community" feel which made everyone feel a part of the cause. The small upstairs room, and bare stage gave an up-close, unadorned look at the performer—almost as if we had all been invited to the family garage for a jam session.

Also on the bill was Marvin The Mandolin Man, who has produced albums for Voice Of The Beehive and Toad The Wet Sprocket, among others. His social troubadour approach took him out into the audience for an unamplified story ballad, and up to the stage to lead an unusual three-piece folk ensemble of accordion, hurdy-gurdy, and, of course, mandolin. Marvin sang with choked sadness and fury throughout his set, and strummed and picked on the mandolin with equal intensity against the rolling wall of sound provided by Ethan James on the hurdy-gurdy.

The Caravan to the New El Salvador will begin its journey to El Salvador this August, and will include participation from Canada and Australia as well as the United States. Although attention to the benefit was ironically overshadowed by security surrounding a film crew shooting in the main hall downstairs, it seemed appropriate that such a personal concert should support a grassroots self-development project, designed to help on a human scale.

Body Count/Ice-T

ELECTRIC BALLROOM, NORTH HOLLYWOOD, CA— Controversial rock band, Body Count's (Sire/Warner Bros.) mildly abrasive song, "Cop Killer," has given politicians and law enforcement agencies a reason to challenge the First Amendment. The LAPD was *in the house* to emcee the event in quantity, wearing standard uniforms and party hats (riot helmets). Upon entering the venue, people were required to undergo a search with a metal detector and be frisked by security guards. There were no incidents of violence throughout the evening.

Body Count opened with "Body Count's In The House," and the crowd rose from their seats to greet Ice-T and the boys. With few exceptions, the audience congregated to the mosh pit in front of the stage to let off some aggression.

They played every song from their self-titled debut lp, including "Evil Dick," "Momma's Gotta Die Tonight," "Body Count Anthem," the first single "There Goes The Neighborhood," and "KKK Bitch," another song that's under censorship fire. The material was executed (played, not shot) accurately and energetically with standout performances by guitarist Ernie C and drummer Beatmaster V.

The set ended with the song that started all the *@#%&\$, "Cop Killer." No encore followed after Body Count left the stage, probably running for their lives. Outside the venue, protesters across the street condemned the crowd as they left, but were ignored.

TALENT REVIEW Chicago By Fred L. Goodman

THE GREEK THEATRE, HOLLYWOOD, CA—Lasting 25 years in the music business is no small feat, and Chicago (Reprise) has done more than just *lasted*—they have *thrived*. With sales of over 100 million copies of 21 albums and dozens of hit singles, the Windy City group has been on the superstar level almost since the outset.

Those 25 chart-filled years were cause for celebration last week when the band received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame the same day (23) they appeared at the Greek. The audience, which ranged from teens to those who were that age when Chicago first emerged in 1967, joined in the revelry as they cheered wildly each of the group's mega-hits. One enthusiastic youth turned to his date and gushed, "Can these old geezers rock, or what?"

There have been a few personnel changes over the years, but they haven't diminished the sound and tightness that made Chicago famous. The horn section of Lee Loughnane, James Pankow and Walt Parazaider has remained intact, and they are still as brassy and sassy as ever. The other original member, keyboardist/vocalist, Robert Lamm, still sounds great on songs like "Saturday In The Park." Dawayne Bailey is probably the best lead guitarist they've ever had. Bassist Jason Scheff's tenor voice and keyboardist/guitarist Bill Champlin's baritone echo can sometimes surpass the vocals of Peter Cetera and Terry Kath of years gone by. Drummer Tris Imboden nearly makes one forget Danny Seraphine.

But oh, those songs! Any act that can be onstage for two hours and play nothing but hits clearly has an advantage, and Chicago performs their golden repertoire to the hilt. Smashes like "Feelin' Stronger Every Day," "If You Leave Me Now," "Hard Habit To Break," "Look Away," "You're The Inspiration" and "Just You & Me" come fast and furious, allowing the crowd very little time to catch its breath.

Word is that the group will be back in the studio after this tour, sometime in the fall. Possibly by next spring, Chicago fans will be in stores making 22 gold or platinum just like its predecessors.

Old geezers, indeed!

BRAZIL

SHOW TIME: The second **Rio Show Festival** is currently taking place over two weekends at Riocentro, home to June's Earth Summit.

A million-dollar production—the tab of which is being picked up by the Brazilian brewer, Brahma—the event runs from July 31 through August 9 and brings together a number of the top names in Brazilian music, many of whom will share the stage for the first time.

Last year, the festival resulted in 11 hours of filmed material, a Globo TV special, and three records for Som Livre, each of which sold in excess of 30,000 units locally.

With a nightly capacity this year of 11,000, the promoters, Maior Prazer, hope to match last year's 60,000 attendance, and will again record the event for a TV special and a future "best of" on Som Livre.

The festival kicked off on July 31 with two of Brazil's top percussionists, Nana Vasconcelos and Carlinhos Brown. They were followed by Simone, whose last Rio performance was for President George Bush's birthday party during his visit to the Earth Summit. Simone was to be joined on stage by Ney Matogrosso, who was in turn to be joined by guitarist Raphael Rabelo and the group Aquarela Carioca.

Other nights bring together **Dorival**, **Nana** and **Danilo Caymmi**, who will perform with **Raimundo Fagner**, while a night has been reserved for the Mineiras—natives of the state of Minas Gerais—including many of the musicians who helped **Milton Nascimento** on his way to stardom, among them **Beto Guedes**, **Lo Borges**, **Wagner Tiso** and the group **Boca Livre**.

The second Friday gets underway with the least known of the acts, singer **Rosa Passos**. She'll be followed by **Joao Bosco**, who will play the latter part of his set with guitarist **Ricardo Silveira**. Silveira then gets a solo spotlight for his jazz fusion, before **Djavan** closes the show, sharing part of his set with Bosco.

Saturday promises to raise the roof off Riocentro by bringing together two of the hottest properties on the current Brazilian music scene, singer **Marisa Monte** and the group **Titas**. Adding their own beat to the evening will be the group **Moleque de Rua**, made up of street kids under the production of Titas drummer, **Charles Gavin**. This is the festival's hottest ticket.

Rio Show wraps up next Sunday with a show that is appropriately Carioca in nature, a marriage of bossa nova and samba that brings together Jorge Benjor, MPB-4, Os Cariocas, Joao Nogueira, Roberto Menescal, Be Happy and members of the Salgueiro and Estacio de Sa samba schools.

Reflecting the current economic crisis, prices for Rio Show are down in dollar terms from last year's \$9 to \$3.50. This is a fall reflected in most current Brazilian tours, a situation that has left promoters looking for sponsorship to pay costs, or an extended Argentinian tour, where prices are generally higher.

Proving that Brazil, despite falling ticket prices, has not lost its magical attraction to performers, current tours include Iron Maiden, Black Sabbath, Skid Row, the Ramones and, due in September (possibly as part of the Free Jazz Festival), Kenny G.

One Brazilian artist who won't be treading the boards for some time is **Chico Buarque**, who recently fractured his ankle playing soccer.

NEWS FROM JAPAN

ACCORDING TO A SURVEY by Record Industries Association of Japan (RIAJ), the total shipment of audio and video softwares for May, 1992 was \$381 million representing a 3 percent increase over the same monthly period of last year with a volume of 35,400,000 units, 16 percent up over '91. Breaking it down: audio was \$290 million and video \$81 million with the former up 19 percent while the latter went down 22 percent for the comparable May of '91. As for audio-disks, CDs represented 91 percent of the total to \$270 million, up 16 percent over the same period last year. On the other hand, analog-disk was only \$1 million, 62,000 units volume while audio-tape continued down to \$24 million, 10 percent down from the same month last year, volume report was 3,207,000 units, 1 percent down. As for video-softwares, the total shipment returned \$81 million, down 22 percent, while the volume was 2,850,000 units, 7 percent down from last year.

THE MESSAGE IS CLEAR 10 YEARS LATER: Most people in America are living close to the edge.

All it will take is a little push for some of them to go under. It's not just your traditional have-nots that are feeling the crunch of a seemingly interminable recession (the one that President George Bush will not call a depression). But the country's burdened middle class is also feeling the bind as they are increasingly unable to maintain the varying standards of living they carved out for themselves in more prosperous times.

Paramount's World And Boomerang Go For The Gold

PARAMOUNT PICTURES WILL SELL more than a million soundtrack albums for two separate films released in 1992 and is looking forward to two more releases this summer, according to Harlan Goodman, senior vice president, music, for the Motion Picture Group of the company.

The *Boomerang* album track of the Eddie Murphy starrer currently in release has, to date, shipped more than 800,000 units, guaranteeing gold status at 500,000 and approaching platinum at the million mark. Released on La Face, manufactured and distributed by Arista, *Boomerang* debuted on the *Cash Box* Top 200 Pop Albums chart at #20 (7/25) and made like an Olympian with a 15-hurdle leap into #5 position its first week (8/1). This week's Top 200 Pop Albums sees it at #3 and peaking—Paramounting, if you will—*Cash Box*'s Soundtrack Chart at #1.

Earlier this year Paramount's *Wayne's World*, soundtrack album released on Reprise, topped *Cash Box*'s Album charts at #1 for several weeks. It has to date sold approximately 11/2 million units taking it 75 percent of the way to double-platinum status, according to Paramount. WW remains on the Top Album chart.

"Two million-selling albums in the same year is exciting for Paramount," said Goodman, "and never before has the company witnessed the release of three major soundtracks in such quick succession as those for the studio's summer releases." Goodman is alluding, in addition to *Boomerang*, to *Cool World* and *Bebe's Kids*, which have just been released. *Cool World* is on Warner Bros. (debuting this week at #97) and *Bebe's Kids* is out under the Capitol Records banner.

Boomerang's debut single, "Give U My Heart," performed by Babyface and featuring Toni Braxton reaches #28 with a bullet on Cash Box's Top 100 R&B Singles this week with the music video currently playing on MTV. Upcoming music videos from the soundtrack are Boyz II Men's "End Of The Road" and P.M. Dawn's "I'd Die Without You."

Music videos from the *Cool World* soundtrack will be "Real Cool World," performed by David Bowie and, currently playing, "Sex On Wheelz" by My Life With The Thrill Kill Kult.

Marty Stuart On This One's Gonna Hurt You

BRIDGING THE GAP between the late masters of hillbilly music and the upstarts who would follow in their shoes is an ambition Marty Stuart has turned into reality. Hailing originally from Philadelphia, Mississippi, Stuart began his career in 1972 at the tender age of 13, playing mandolin with bluegrass icon Lester Flatt. After Flatt's death, Stuart spent time playing and recording with Johnny Cash. He also did work with Bob Dylan, Neil Young, Billy Joel, The Eagles, Roger Miller, Willie Nelson, Emmylou Harris, and Gram Parsons, among others.

In addition to his musicianship, songwriting, and production skills, Stuart is also an accomplished freelance writer and photographer. His work has been published in several country music magazines and publications, and he's writing a book about his early musical experiences. Still, Stuart has even more going for him as his "No Hats Tour" with Travis Tritt is scheduled to continue in the fall, supporting his latest MCA album, *This One's Gonna Hurt You*. Stuart is currently doing solo concert dates and, in August, will be hosting *Nashville Now*, as well as appearing at Opryland's Geo Theatre. *Cash Box* recently had the pleasure of speaking with Marty about his new album. These are some of his thoughts:

Cash Box: Let's talk about the new album. Tell me about the opening monologue, "Me & Hank & Jumpin' Jack Flash," and how it was conceived.

Marty Stuart: We were going through Oak Hill, West Virginia, which is a place close to where Hank Williams died, and I wrote that opening monologue. Actually, I don't know why I wrote it or how it came. I was sittin' in the back of the bus, writing, and it just came to me—one of those things. *C.B.*: "High On A Mountain Top," with Pam Tillis, that's an old bluegrass standard, right? **M.S.**: That's right. I had no idea that song existed until Richard Bennett brought it to the project of an album by some alternative band called The Blurred Oranges or something. How I'd missed it all these years I don't know. Pam Tillis is great on it.

C.B.: This is definitely a concept album, is that correct?

M.S.: Well, the album kind of took its own course and its own direction about halfway through. You mentioned concept twice now and that was the furthest thing from my mind at the time. It just presented itself that way. I don't know what kind of concept it is except for country music.

C.B.: Î'm not trying to put labels on it.

M.S.: (laughing) You can call it anything you want to.

C.B.: You say the album took its own course. Were some of the songs originally intended for the album replaced by better songs, or by songs that fit better?

or by songs that fit better? **M.S.**: I think that's why it took us a year to complete. We thought it was finished three times, and (we) just kept coming up with more songs and more ideas. The record company let me have enough rope to hang my own self this time. Originally, we had three songs we thought were hits, and then Johnny Cash and I played a show together and did that song "Doin' My Time" that we used to do and that sounded good to me. Then the thing with Travis, "This One's Gonna Hurt You" worked out, and it just fell in place piece by piece, unintentionally.

C.B.: What's your favorite song on the album?

M.S.: "Just Between You And Me" means a lot to me just because Cowboy Jack Clement wrote it, and it's a song I've been carrying around in my head for about 10 years. I've finally gotten up the nerve to sing it, even though Charley Pride sang it exactly right the first time.

C.B.: "The King Of Dixie" hits close to home for me. **M.S.**: Me too. I was sitting one day at Granite Falls (in Nashville), and across the road is The Great Escape, and on the window at The Great Escape they've got a picture of Hank and Elvis, Bob Dylan, Janis Joplin, Patsy Cline, and the top two were Elvis and Hank. I thought, hell they're still the kings of Dixie. Everywhere you go in the South you see Elvis at those little roadside stands on velvet or on a flag. Elvis is still all over the South and so is Hank Williams.

C.B.: You said MCA had given you some artistic freedom on this project. How did you maintain a happy medium between artistic integrity and commerciality?

M.S.: It gets harder, but the bottom line is the radio hits. If I wanted total integrity, I'd make acoustic albums that only serve myself, but I'm truly here to sell records 'cause I understand that is the bottom line out here. Trying to write 'em is the fun part. It's a game really, and I'm having fun playing it. It's easy to get attached to numbers. You know the whole industry is based on numbers on Monday morning, and sometimes we get so caught up in being #1 that we forget to write good songs and entertain people. Those people out there listening to you don't really give a damn about numbers. We have to remember if we're having fun and making good music, chances are the numbers are going to be better anyway. When I get caught up in chasing numbers I get onto myself.

C.B.: What's it like at the top?

M.S.: I don't see myself as being at the top. I know I've pulled a lot of ground together in the last couple of years, but there's always things left to prove, there's always uncharted territory, and there's always a horse that hasn't been broken out there. If I were in Garth Brooks' position, I'd still look at what I hadn't accomplished. I never see myself as being at the top. It's a job. I've been doing it for 20 years, and the next thing I'm worried about is making sure I've got my time-card punched on January 1st.

Aibum: For My Broken Heart

You need a song sung with tears dripping off the vinyl, then you get Reba. The latest single from country music's diva is "The Greatest Man I Never Knew," a nostalgic single about a father and daughter's estranged relationship. Sweepingly perfect in Reba's charactersitic delivery, upstaged only by the production which she co-anchored with MCA's Tony Brown.



I AM ALWAYS RELUCTANT TO LIST ANY ARTIST AS NEW considering the

course they've run getting to the status of even being called new. But titles are titles, and what point do they serve better than convenience. So the latest in the series of new signers, but veteran performers, is Liberty's latest acquisition, Traci Peel.

Besides receiving her debut single, "Almost Single," country radio programmers have also been handed a charter for the song's airplay, a deposition of her talent by respected witnesses, and are asked to "waive all future alimony, provided the defendant (d.j.) plays "Almost Single."

The legal hoopla surrounding the release of Traci's first single is a promotional stunt to overcome the deluge of new CDs falling on the already inundated desks of radio programmers. With favorable comments from Ronnie Milsap and Jeffrey Beals, vp of the William Morris Agency, she should have some luck. The single itself, produced by Jerry Crutchfield (Tanya Tucker, Lee Greenwood), is dyed-in-the-wool traditional country, from the moaning steel guitar to the foreboding bass, telling the story of a woman's new-found freedom and the less than desirable thrill of being single, again.

The fact that Traci was born in Enid, Oklahoma may be the only tangible evidence of the singer's country roots. Traci most definitely fits the '90s country mold, with her uptown presence and Indiana accent, which she gained during her formal music training at Indiana University in Bloomington.

Opting for some more profitable hands-on training, Traci hit the road, finally joining the entertainment entourage, The New Seekers, best known for the single, "I'd Like To Teach The World To Sing." Traci sang with the group, and acted as frontline coordinator for nearly seven years, before being attracted to the "Urban Cowboy" craze, denoting her eventual move into country, and more specifically her move to Nashville. Soon after, she was tapped by Ronnie Milsap as a back-up vocalist and vocal coordinator.

By 1988, Traci quit the road and stayed in Nashville to pursue a recording contract. After nearly 14 years of doing performance dates on the road, Traci says that less formal club dates in Nashville "took the edge off of her slick image."

"Now I think I have a really good balance between show and professionalism and being down to earth. I think I'm ready."

Traci is ready, but a few technicalities are still waiting to be inked. She and Crutchfield have recorded four songs as part of a development deal she signed with Liberty in 1990. Since then, her option with Liberty has been extended in order to complete her debut album. She has signed with Buddy Lee Attractions for management, and Pabst Brewing Company is currently handling the production and distribution of her publicity posters.

Records; Erma Byrd, Warner Bros.; Linda Brockington, New York; Lionel Darty, Sweet Rain Records; Rev. Kenneth Dupree, National Baptist Publishing Board; Chris Squire, WDAS- AM/FM, Philadelphia; Teresa Hairston, *Score* magazine; Effie Rolfe, WGCI-AM, Chicago; Juandolyn Stokes, Atlanta International Records; Walt Whitman, Chicago Soul Children, I AM Records; and Tim A. Smith, *Cash Box* magazine.

The winning participants were: 1st Place: Voices of St. Mark, St. Mark Baptist Church (Harvey, IL), \$10,000; 2nd Place: Fellowship Choir, Fellowship Tabernacle (Philadelphia, PA), \$5,000; 3rd Place: Concert Choir, Liberty Baptist Church (St. Louis, MO), \$2,500; Best Choir Director: Lonnie Hunter, St. Mark Baptist Church (Harvey, IL), \$2,000. Each of the remaining participating choirs received \$2,000.

Closing out the evening were performances by Vickie Winans and special guests, the Williams Brothers.

The entire concept of the choir competition, as well as the *Singsation* television show, was the brain child of Willie Wilson. According to Wilson, the creation of these two projects is his way of giving something back to the community, to be a means of inspiring young people, as well as promoting the art form of gospel music to a greater level of visibility.

Debbie Austin

By Gregory S. Cooper DEBBIE AUSTIN, A NATIVE OF CLEVELAND, OHIO is the youngest of seven children, and presently resides in Warren, Ohio.



Austin, who began singing and making melody at the tender age of four years old, recorded "I Believe" with the United Voices of Faith at 13. After having sung with many different choirs and groups (a trademark of Ms. Austin's), she, by invitation, joined forces with evangelist Shirley Caesar and the Caesar Singers of Durham, North Carolina. She remained a faithful member with the singers, traveling throughout the United States and abroad, for more than eight years.

In 1979, Austin formed her own group called Unity. They later recorded their first album on the Savoy label entitled, For The Prize, produced by the late Rev. James Cleveland, founder and former president of the Gospel Music Workshop of America (GMWA), of which she has been an active member for almost 25 years.

Austin's second album, Never Defeated, was recorded in 1983 with the combined efforts of Unity and the James Cleveland Singers and Band. In 1984, Debbie achieved yet another credit, her debut performance in an off-Broad way gospel musical titled, Power of Prayer.

Austin continued to gain fame and national attention as a house soloist and lead singer with the 2,000-voice GMWA Mass Choir. In 1985, she recorded live in Atlanta, the gospel smash hit, "That's What My God Will Do For You." In 1987, she recorded a dual performance with Mr. Carlton Fellows live from Detroit entitled, "God Is Our Fortress" and, in 1989, live from New Orleans, Austin recorded another smash hit entitled "Everyday Is A Day Of Thanksgiving" with Mr. Bernard Pender.

Capcom Reports Major Seizure Of Illegal Boards

CHICAGO—The months of June and July were very productive for Capcom in its ongoing anti-counterfeiting campaign. During the period of June 3-9, and with the aid of the Hong Kong authorities, 356 counterfeit Street Fighter II Champion Edition boards were seized, resulting in 20 arrests.

In mid-June, nearly 225 of the illegal boards were seized from New Jersey-based Coin-Tech, Inc., according to Capcom; and the factory subsequently filed a suit against Coin-Tech in Maryland (where the boards were seized).

Most recently, (7/22), 1,100 counterfeit Street Fighter II Champion Edition boards were seized in Taiwan, representing Capcom's largest seizure to date.

Philly Media Spotlights Stan And Sharon Harris


CHICAGO—Sharon Harris, president of the International Flipper Pinball Association, discussed a favorite topic (pinball) during a taping (7/6) for the popular Saturday evening *Prime Time* television show, which is aired on WPVI, the ABC affiliate station in Philadelphia. The show focuses on human interest stories in the Delaware Valley area and reaches an estimated viewing audience of half a million people.

The seven-minute feature is a follow-up to an article, spotlighting her father, Stan, and his 50 years of operating and collecting antique pinball and vending machines, that appeared in the June 29 *Daily News*. The *Prime Time* piece will be presented as a "Pinball Past and Present in Philadelphia" stroll down memory lane and is scheduled for airing this coming fall.

Stan Harris is a well-known figure in the coin-op community; and Philadelphia, as the article pointed out, was the only major city in America where pinball was a legal game until well into the 1960s.
