SANTANA: "Somewhere In Heaven" (Polydor CDP




This romantic R&B ballad features Patti's versatile voice on a tune easily formattable for Urban as well as AC radio. Elaborate backing vocals and lush string arrangements add warmth and feeling to this track from her Burnin' album. Ms. LaBelle holds back her usual power until the last few bars of the cut, but the strength of the song itself should be enough to push this track onto playlists. Produced and arranged by James R. "Budd" Ellison.

This attractive English singer/songwriter, formerly from an all-girl band called The Marines, has her first album coming out in October, and this advance single is a powerful, anthemic, coming-of-age rock ballad, ala female Springsteen. Helen's voice is slightly pop-ish, but strong enough to offer an excellent alternative to the fluffy girl stuff that has been pumped out by some American pop divas. 
JUDE COLE: "Start The Car" (Reprise PRO-CD-5642) Here's a rockin' little ditty with a bad Texas-blues attitude. "Start The Car" is the title track to Cole's album,
and hits hard with a fat horn arrangement atop punching
drums and solid rhythm section. Guitar tones bring ZZ.
Top to mind, and Cole's voice is slightly reminiscent of
Don Henley's, but, hey Jude, that an't a bad combination. The groove is just catchy enough to hit AOR stations
and make a big dent. Written by Cole and co-produced
with James Newton Howard.



Although "Bronx Style" may be from the ghetto, and he may have been featured with Ice-T's Rhyme Syndicate, and may even be a qualified rapper, but on his major label debut album, Grandma's Ghost Bob sings. That's right. "I Can't Love U" is a pop ballad in every sense. The song features not only the traditional ballad string arrangement, but he throws in some screamin' guitars just to runk it up a touch. Producers are Sam Catalona & Mike Hightower.



This group of brutal babes from the pits of Hollywood is rapidly becoming one of Los Angeles' most popular underground girl groups. And no wonder, they rock. The material is on the alternative/college tip, with "Pretend We're Dead" calling up a slightly retro, psychodelic thrash of reverse-sounding guitars feeding back and a repetitious driving rhythm. From the album, Bricks Are Heavy, produced by Butch Vig and L7.


SUICIDAL TENDENCIES: The Art Of Rebellion (Epic EK 48864)

UTAH SAINTS: Something Good (London 869 843-2) This self-produced duo isn't from Utah, and they aren't saints. They're rave-club disc jockeys from England where they are enjoying techno-pop success with their multi-usage of samples, most notably on title cut "Something Good," which cops a Kate Bush tune, "Cloudbusting" and throws it a new curve, and ditto with "What Can You Do For Me," from "There Must Be An Angel Playing With My Heart" by the Eurythmics. The seven-track EP really contains only five dance-length cuts and two alternative mixes.



And World News (JVC 2014-2)

As half of the duo making up the contemporary jazz group, Special EFX, George Jinda is one of today's most acclaimed and formidable percussionists. After nine albums, George has only temporarily left the duo to experiment as part of a combo. The nine tracks on World News' debut lp, feature the compositions of Jinda, keyboardist Szakcsi, guitarist Randy Roos, and bassist Gerald Veasley. The flowing musicianship of this four-piece group is nothing less than outstanding. Jinda and Roos produce.



FASTER PUSSYCAT: Whipped! (Elektra 9 61124-2) The Pussycat might not be faster on their third lp, but they do have a tendency to move on a varied course. The sense of tongue-in-cheek humor is still there on the 12-cut CD, along with a bigger dose of the dark side as the band matures as shown on "Mr. Lovedog" referring to the overdose of a friend and "The Body Thief" a serial killer ditty. The band even makes fun of some of the dirt tossed on them with "Cat Bash." Produced by John Jansen.

TROUBADOURING: There it is, sitting on a shelf in my apartment: Donovan's A Gift From A Flower To A Garden, the first boxed set I ever got, circa 1967. I looked for it yesterday after receiving Troubadour, a two-CD Donovan retrospective from Epic.

As my musical tastes have changed and evolved, and as I've moved residences over the years, my record albums have come and gone. I used to like Donovan, but his albums have disappeared over the decades, probably in those years in college when I was loathe to admit that I ever heard of Donovan, let alone looked forward to his records. And although I probably haven't listened to it in 20 years, A Gift From A Flower To A Garden—in its sturdy blue box, housing two measly LPs and a folder with illustrated lyrics—apparently never left my collection, because there it was, not much the worse for mileage. It's the box, no doubt, that made me hang on to it—pop albums in boxes were rarities until recently. I wonder if it's a collector's item, something else to sell to the grandchildren.

Anyway, I put on *Troubadour* with some trepidation: I expected the gooey hippie sentiments of "Mellow Yellow," "Epistle to Dippy," "Sunshine Superman," "Jennifer Juniper," "Barabajagal," "Atlantis" and the like to grate on me, to remind me of the worst aspects of '60s folk and pop. Wrong. Surprise, surprise, ol' Donovan Leitch wears well, as well as my A Gift From A Flower To A Garden box.

But forget about Donovan for a second (easy enough, right?) and mark October 16 on your calendar. That's the day that Bob Dylan—the '60s troubadour who has become a real deal troubadour in the '90s, schlepping around endlessly from gig to gig—allows himself to be the subject of a Madison Square Garden tribute concert, the kind of thing normally reserved for old geezers like John Lee Hooker. Dylan will be there, as will a number of big ticket (but as yet unannounced) tributarians, and it will all be broadcast on pay-per-view. The occasion? The 30th anniversary of the release of Bob Dylan, his first album for Columbia, the label with which he still does his business (he strayed to Asylum for a half-minute in '74, but the resulting albums are now all tucked into his Columbia catalogue).

I think it's safe to say that Bob Dylan is the most important and influential figure of the Rock Era (go ahead, name somebody more important). I think it's also safe to say that Bob Dylan is the weirdest figure of the Rock Era—a man who, in a business that thrives on contrived eccentricity, seems like the real article, a dyed-in-the-wool wacko (go ahead, name somebody weirder).

We're talking Bob Dylan.

Peter Frampton

FRAMPTON COMES BACK TO LIFE: Not that he was ever dead, but considering how high a profile he had 15 years ago, has left some of those 14 million fans who bought his 1976 double live album, *Frampton Comes Alive* wondering where he's been.

Well, where has he been lately, anyway? His contract with A&M was up 10 years ago, but that didn't stop him from working on pet projects like a tribute album for Thelonius Monk in '84, a new album, *Premonition* on Atlantic and a North American Tour on the same bill with Stevie Nicks in '86. He was on the road again with David Bowie in '87 for the Glass Spider Tour, which brought him back to action. In '89 he released his last album, *When All The Pieces Fit.* And maybe he took some time off.

Okay, so he hasn't been dead. But there hasn't been a huge reaction to the more recent material. Ironically, it was the reaction he got last year at Universal Amphitheatre where he was coaxed onto the stage during a Lynyrd Skynyrd concert that gave him the thrill he needed to get out and do the old stuff again. Which brings us to the current Frampton tour, which I saw (at Universal) August 12.

Although Peter Frampton is now over 40, and the blond mane is thinning, his boyish charm is still intact and sure enough, so are his chops on the guitar. The show started a little slow, and there was no great staging or production values to mention, but he wasn't playing to the MTV generation, he was out to please those fans who have been patiently waiting for him to re-emerge.

Los Angeles is not an easy audience to please, which is probably why he seemed slightly nervous at the top of the show, but his confidence grew as he started to play old favorites from his Humble Pie and early solo days. The emotional reaction to the songs that made up the record-breaking, '76 live album brought back to life the Frampton of old; his teasing with the crowd on whether or not to play his signature "air bag" technique on what had to be his biggest hit, "Show Me The Way." (C'mon Peter, you know you're probably the best in the business with that gadget.)

A short acoustic set pleased the die-hards, as well as the curious, with his dexterity, proving almost more to himself, that he is as good as people have told him he is. Sure, the show was dated (a nearly 15-minute version of "Do You Feel Like I Do" was sort of an indication), but the overall reaction was definitely one of simplistic joy in seeing Frampton Come Alive. all over again.

Curiously, this blast from the past had me sitting next to a pair of names from years back, the rather odd coupling of Julian Lennon with Brooke Shields, and co-mingling backstage was... Twiggy. And to think I was wondering where Frampton had been?

Fire In The Rain...Singer In The Storm

MARK TAPER FORUM, LOS ANGELES, CA—The first autobiographical musical about an indie label pioneer isn't about Philles' Phil Spector, Motown's Berry Gordy or Scepter's Florence Greenberg. It's about Redwood's Holly Near. And it surprises you at every turn.

Holly Near never set out to run a record company. As her musical Fire In The Rain...Singer In The Storm so convincingly portrays, her earliest dreams were of becoming Peter Pan, not Ahmet Ertegun. But with two left-wing political activists for parents and The Vietnam War era to rebel against, Near was destined to make music that marched to no drummer at all. And so she was destined to start her own company to get that music to the people.

Had she been born a few years earlier, Near's acoustic anti-war messages might have attracted the ears of Elektra or Vanguard Records. But by the early '70s, even these early protest music mainstays were forsaking folk artists for rock. After Columbia Records repeatedly tried to turn her into a "submissive girl singer," she turned to her own resources to get her music out in its uncompromised form.

For Near, running her own label was always secondary to running around the world to make it a better place. No other record company president spent quite as much time with Jane Fonda in Indochina or with rebel leaders in Chile. On the other hand, few record company presidents have enjoyed Near's rural, back-on-the-farm childhood either. The juxtapositions of her all-American high school days and her so-called "anti-American" graduate work are what make this musical autobiography so compelling.

Going back and forth in time between adolescence and adulthood, this non-linear production features almost two dozen songs from Near's two decades worth of Redwood albums. The narrative that helps it dramatically hang together relies on emotions rather than abrondogy.

As an actress (who starred in *Hair* as well as guesting on *The Partridge Family*), Holly Near has naturally come by enough dramatic talent to make real life come to life on stage. Fortunately, she hasn't picked up any of the negative theatrical baggage along the way that could have weighed the show down with self-conscious, self-serving puffery.

As Fire In The Rain unfolds, Near comes out to the audience as a vocal supporter of gay and lesbian rights as well as of world peace, feminism and environmentalism. This process turns the show into the most politically correct musical of all time. But you don't have to share any of Near's "isms" to be moved by her musical life story. In spite of what might be viewed as political dogmatism in someone else, Near's sense of self-worth and self-determination come across as charmingly disarming in every sense of the term.

Based on Singer In The Storm, Near's Redwood audio cassette autobiography, Fire In The Rain becomes visionary as well as visual through a stunning succession of colorful slide images. The arresting multi-media talents of director Timothy Near, Holly's sister, prove to be the exception to the rule that nepotism and theater don't mix.

Although not a musical comedy, there is enough wit in this show to rank Holly Near up there with Groucho Marx in the insightful sarcasm department. Singer In The Storm should appeal to everyone who loved Lily Tomlin's In Search Of Intelligent Life In The Universe. May it run as long and hard as Ms. Near's life already has.

Stray Cats

THE STRAND, REDONDO BEACH,

CA—Narrowly escaping the "whatever-happened-to" black hole of music, the rockabilly trio Stray Cats, who scored big in the early '80s with retro hits like "Rock This Town," and "(She's) Sexy And 17," have hooked up again to record a new album, Choo Choo Hot Fish, for JRS Records. Judging from the enthusiasm of the packed house at the Strand, the effort has been long overdue. The wildly varied crowd of



suited yuppies and pompadoured, long-sideburned greasers enjoyed a set which continued in the Stray Cats typical vein—fun, sock-hop sounds dealing with cars, broken hearts, and rock n' roll.

The band carries a dual nostalgia for the spirit of rockers like Elvis Presley and especially Eddie Cochran (evoked in the Cats' tribute "Gene and Eddie") and for a more recent time in which witty party albums like their own Built For Speed and the Go-Gos' Beauty And The Beat hopped around the charts. Of the new tunes, "Please Don't Touch" and "Crybaby" (penned by frontman Brian Setzer and Dave Edmunds) best captured that spirit, while "Elvis On Velvet," with Lee Rocker's thumping bass undertone, was presented as a funny twist on the extremes of nostalgia.

However, many emptier offerings (like the repetitive and silly "Lust N Love" and painfully melodramatic ballad "My Heart Is A Liar") slowed the pace of the show, and called attention to the fact that the Stray Cats weren't going to cover any new musical territory. There were a few moments when the trio's timing was sloppy as well (drummer Jim Phantom's theatrics—licking his own hands, cat-style, for example, may have had something to do with this), but Brian Setzer always managed to bring things back together with his impressive solo guitar work. Setzer also treated the audience to a nice improvisational reading of the classic instrumental, "Sleepwalk."

Although many of the fans in the audience had already memorized the songs from *Choo Choo Hot Fish*, the undisputed treats of the evening—"Rock This Town" and signature tune "Stray Cat Strut" were shrewdly saved for the end, removing the dull, formulaic sense of much of the set in favor of their still very likeable party spirit.

Around The World And Back

INDIE MUSIC

THE GUN CLUB was one of the first indie star bands making pure rock and roll. Along with R.E.M., X and the Replacements, they defined the genre in the early '80s: low-budget van tours, college radio and fanzine exposure, and devout fans in every little town.

The band and its leader, Jeffrey Lee Pierce have returned to the States to promote their XXX release, In Exile. Aptly titled, as it was recorded in a plethora of European cities, In Exile comprises a potpourri of the band's import tracks of the last five years, and is vintage Gun Club; slurry, bluesy and raw.

Those who recall the Gun Club from its salad days might be a bit surprised at the current state of its being, specifically the mind-set of the band's leader. Speaking to the singer at his father's Salt Lake City home, Pierce seems strangely serene for a man whose antics typified excess: falling off of stages, missing

gigs, or being too in the bag to play.
"I stopped drinking about three years ago," Pierce explains, "because if I'd have continued, I'd have died. We stopped doing the song, 'She's Like Heroin To Me' after I stopped using dope, but I kept drinking after that. Giving that up was the hardest part."

Pierce began his career in music as the young head of Blondie's fan club. "It was a small, cool thing up until Parallel Lines," says the singer. 'Then this professional-fan-club-running thing took over, and I couldn't handle that." He then formed the Gun Club with Kid Congo (former head of the Ramones fan club, also), but the Cramps nicked the guitarist, and the Gun Club recorded its debut for Slash with new guitarist Ward Dotson. "No major would even consider us then," says Pierce. "I'm amazed at the records that come out on majors now, like the militant rap and

some of the Seattle bands. Back then, it was indie or nothing."
Which is still home to Pierce. "I like XXX, they seem really nice, no problem. And I still get publishing from the Slash record, too. But I can't figure out why it's not on CD yet in the States." The Gun Club will try to tour America soon.

As for Pierce, he's a little tired of both Europe and America as home. "I grew out of England. We just stopped getting along in such close quarters. I've learned to really love Asian cultures, and Asian people. I've been to Thailand three times, and Vietnam also. The Vietnamese really love Americans, because they've become so much poorer since we left. And the countryside is totally beautiful, too. Of course, there are so many Asian people in L.A., I wouldn't really have to go too far for the same thing."

GASSING ON: A few months ago, The New York Sunday Times Magazine ran a cover story by Peter Watrous about Branford Marsalis, in which Branford, as usual, talked about everything and anything, including his then upcoming Tonight Show gig and how a live recording of John Coltrane once made him want to throw his saxophone into a lake. The article prompted only a single letter that The Times deemed worthy of printing: a missive by Keith Jarrett complaining about jazz musicians who sell their souls to TV shows, jazz musicians who don't realize that Coltrane is there to be learned from, not to be cowed by.

That letter apparently gave some *Times* editor the brainstorm to have Jarrett do a whole piece, and there it was: Categories Aplenty, But Where's the Music?, taking up too much of my Arts & Leisure section last Sunday.

Jarrett's point, basically, is this, stated in his third paragraph: "Listeners are swindled by the music industry's insatiable need to stay alive no matter what the quality of the music. If it can find talented young players, the industry will tell them how great they are and give them lots of money to keep them satisfied (more correctly, buy off their souls, if they have any left)...'

He goes on to warn us that "unless radio, television, newspapers and magazines stop falling over like dominoes, happy to have a 'marketable' story, we will see two separate cultures: the popular culture and the underground culture (the underground for the music, the popular for the hype)."

And on and on and on and on.

This from a man who came up playing with Charles Lloyd, who was to John Coltrane in the '60s what Pat Boone was to Little Richard in the '50s, a popularizer. This from a man whose masturbatory solo piano concerts-filled with pomp and portentiousness, not to mention self-indulgent writhing and audienceberating—helped give birth to New Age music (a category he trashes in the article). This from a white man who, with his Afro'ed appearance in the early '70s, encouraged the belief that he was black. This from a man who raked in buckets of money and media attention (popular culture) while things like New York's loft scene, Chicago's AACM, and St. Louis' BAG were bursting with unheralded talents (underground culture).


What's new? What's different? The difference is that the media attention and record company money now go to musicians (many of them damn young, some of them damn good) who unashamedly play acoustic jazz rather than, oh, fusion or jazzpop or watery prototype New Age music. The difference is that larrett's music is, for the first time in two decades, on the outs (while veteran talents like Steve Lacy and George Coleman record for major labels for the first time in their long careers).

Jarrett says, about these dreaded young musicians, "Let's not allow self-appointed experts to tell us what jazz is when we can hear in their music that they have no voice." Jarrett, cowardly, mentions not a single name, a luxury we self-appointed experts don't have. As has always been the case in the jazz world, for every Louis Armstrong there is a Louis Prima, for every Thelonious Monk there is a Dave Brubeck, for every Muhal Richard Abrams there is a Keith Jarrett, for every Najee there is a Tim Berne, and for every major label jazz player without a voice there is a unique talent playing somewhere for somebody.

Laughs Take The Soul Train

edy arena with the launching of the *Soul Train Comedy Awards*, a live, two-hour prime-time broadcast, which Cornelius hopes will repeat the success of his annual music awards program. Scheduled to launch Aug. 3, 1993 from the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium, Cornelius will serve as executive producer on the new show. He will be partnered with the Tribune Entertainment Company which syndicates the long-running *Soul Train* weekly series and the *Soul Train Music Awards* each year. Tribune is predicting that the comedy awards program will be cleared to 85 percent of the existing TV households and 95 percent of all African-American TV households.

The Soul Train Comedy Awards, according to a spokesperson for Cornelius, will annually recognize the funniest African-American comedy performers in television, film and stand-up in 10 categories. Nominees in television and film categories will be selected from a poll of African-American TV viewers and moviegoers, while the stand-up noninees will be selected through an invitational "Soul Train Comedy Showdown" to be held at a Los Angeles venue six to eight weeks prior to the telecast. "Our comedy awards program will help acknowledge and bring attention to the burgeoning rise of African-American comedians, in all mediums, sparked by an ever-developing pool of talented comics who perform both late night and cable and for family audiences as well," Cornelius says.

The nationally-syndicated special will be produced by *Soul Train Music Awards* co-producer Anthony Sabatino, *Entertainment Tonight* and *Soul Train Music Awards* director Ron De Moraes. Tony Cornelius will co-produce.

Hammer Sued by Producer

CAPITOL RECORDS ARTIST HAMMER was sued recently in Los Angeles Superior Court by producer James Early, who claims that he is owed 40% of the \$14 million Hammer was paid by Capitol for sales of the albums *Please*, *Hammer*, *Don't Hurt'Em* and *Too Legit To Quit*. Early's suit alleges that as part of an overall co-production and writing deal, he was entitled to 40% of all fees, advance royalties or other compensation received by Hammer for sales of Early-produced masters. The suit asks for \$5.9 million of the \$14 million and another \$100,000 for mechancial royalties for songs that Early allegedly wrote.

The suit further said that Hammer and his companies, Bust It Prods. and Bust It Publishing reached an agreement with Early on April 29 to pay \$503,000, but refused to make additional payments after an initial installment of \$100,000 made July 10. Hammer attorney Larry Blake said he was surprised the suit was filed. "We have settled the dispute and have begun to implement settlement. They are acting very precipitously in filing the suit rather than going ahead with the settlement." Also involved in the suit are Bust It acts Special Generation, One Cause One Effect and B Angie B for whom Early allegedly wrote or produced.

AIRING OUT INNER SPACE:

Occasionally, an artist comes along who can offer a music album that combines unique sonic sensibilities with insightful observations of self and life. Bemshi, Capitol Records' latest singer/songwriter, brings together a melange of life and musical experience and an odd mixture of street vibe and spiritualism on her debut album Womanchild, a blend of pop, R&B, jazz stylings with world beat and ethnic textures.

The East Harlem native-who studies Buddhism, is the mother of a 14-year-old daughter and the daughter herself of a jazz musician, says this album was not necessarily meant to be a message package. She also nearly bristles at the notion that Womanchild is eclectic. While acknowledging that her music's lyrics deal with a spectrum of emotional color, Bemshi told Cash Box, "My goal was to evoke thought; not to be a preacher, but just to evoke thought. Music is continuum for me; I don't see what's so eclectic about my music. Yeah, I throw in acoustic folk guitar on a hip-hop jam. But that's just how I felt about that particular song."

Bemshi says the album is meant to suggest "different words" that help create a more positive selfimage. "The words and phrases we use to describe ourselves and our lives can mentally serve as

chains-like the words minority, impoverished. I grew up in East Harlem, a community the media regularly interprets as impoverished; but growing up I felt anything but impoverished." Musically, Bemshi says that she abandoned any efforts to consider marketing and promotional angles for her music because, it "began to worry me, weigh on my mind in a way that I tried to compromise. And the more I tried to do that, the more I found my music was becoming whitewashed. I had to stop worrying about marketing and just be myself." She said that no matter how much she compromised, "my music is going to be different" and hard for the industry-not the buying public-to accept. Bemshi says her goals are such that "the success of this album and everything that comes from it will permit me to have a platform so that my revolutionary spirit can get across ideas for change in this world."

No preacher, huh? "I have a higher goal, it's not about me making it, selling a bunch of records and becoming a famous diva. My goal is to actually use this vehicle, which I enjoy very much, to help me make my contribution to this world. Trying to come from a higher spiritual place, coming from that sincerity of trying to touch people's hearts and evoke thought, then (the marketing) will take care of itself." The debut single from her album is the plain-tive "Where's My Daddy?" which demonstrates her penchant for mixing musical styles and lyrically getting to the heart of the matter. She recently performed the single and the track "In My Mind" on the Tonight Show with Jay Leno.

SHINDIG: Volume One The British Invasion (Rhino Home Video) (Currently available) 14.95.



Volume One of Rhino's Shindig series provides rock fans with an overview of 10 bands from the first British Invasion of the American record industry, circa 1964-65. Shindig, you surely recall, was that marvelous ABC-TV series that featured every manner of recording group, novelty act to the Rolling Stones, performing their hit songs in prime time, one after the other. The shows were shot in black and white in a very straightforward way and are an accurate document of those groundbreaking times. Many of the Invasion-era bands were forgettable, but their hit singles weren't, and these performances are spirited, capturing the unrestrained glee these bands felt at making a mark in America. Included are Gerry & the Pacemakers, Herman's Hermits, Billy J. Kramer and the Dakotas, Manfred Mann, The Searchers, Nashville Teens, The Honeycombs, lan Whitcomb, Peter and Gor-

don and Freddy and the Dreamers. Manfred Mann and The Searchers have the hipness quotient.


KISS: X-Treme Close-up (PolyGram Video) (Currently available) \$19.95.



A video-documentary-history (ViDocTory) of the flamboyant group with crossover appeal to apathetic (if any) or non KISS-ers from long-time fans. Well interspersed between the 30 or so numbers (or snatches), original members Gene Simmons and Paul Stanley offer up insightful and (seemingly) honest—only they know for sure—history of the group's evolvement, hirings, firings, their own rises and falls of interest (Stanley comes off the most rooted in the group, Simmons made one detour for a while) in group goals. They don't gloss

over Ace Frehley, Peter Criss or Vinnie Vincent's drug abuse. Includes footage of drummer Eric Carr, who died of cancer. Replacement Eric Singer tells what it's like to move from fan to member. Bill Brown directed; Chuck Mitchell produced and Annette Cirrillo exec-ed. A good watch.

BILLY RAY CYRUS: Billy Ray Cyrus (PolyGram Video) (Currently available) \$12.95.



This too-short video includes performances of two songs, the smash "Achy Breaky Heart" and "It Could've Been Me, combined with 18 minutes of additional footage of Cyrus working an outdoor festival date and talking about his quick rise from obscurity to stardom. All country stars have to show how humble they are, and Cyrus does plenty of that while explaining how many times he was rejected in Nashville and what it was like to get the word he had landed a record contract. If you are trying to ascertain why Cyrus jumped out

of the box so fast while others struggle, this Billy Ray Cyrus home video won't answer your questions. We will probably get a more definitive video soon. But if you are already a fan, you will likely enjoy this opportunity to see the likable Cyrus talk about how he gets so excited while out on the road that he can hardly stand it.

ERIC CLAPTON: Eric Clapton Unplugged (Warner Home Video) (Release date: August 25) \$19.98.



Eric Clapton made an appearance on MTV's Unplugged series, giving the acoustic music series its highest ratings to that point. A result of that appearance is *Unplugged*, the home video and laser disc, set for simultaneous release with *Unplugged*, the album, this week. The video offers fans the unusual opportunity to see a very relaxed, gracious Clapton in an acoustic setting supported by a full band, including keyboardist Chuck Leavell, percussionist Ray Cooper and fellow guitarist Andy Fairweather Low. The set includes a version of guitar virtuoso Clapton's second career number one single, "Tears In Heaven," from the recent film, Rush, as well as modified renditions of "Layla" and "Running On Empty" that seem adapted for the occasion. The rollicking "Rollin' and Tumblin" provide counterpoint to too many slow and

midtempo blues numbers. Reaction from the MTV studio audience is strong, bordering on rock star adoration. Though "Clapton Unlugged" is a welcome addition for those who prefer acoustic music and for dedicated Clapton fans, if you are in the market for the definitive Clapton video, this isn't it.

Pike Fills Sails For Disney's Captain Ron With Music

BLUE CARIBBEAN WATERS AND BALMY BREEZES), white sails and soaring strings. Ahhhhhh... Sails, breezes and soaring strings? In the San Fernando Valley where there's heat enough to hard-boil the dropped proverbial egg before it hits pavement? Well, yes, if you're on a Todd-AO scoring stage in Studio City and Nicholas Pike is conducting a 70piece orchestra through a portion of the score he's written and composed for the Walt Disney/Touchstone feature film Captain Ron.

Pike, as cool as the breezes and smooth as the strings, works through a sectional problem to his satisfaction, puts it all together with the complete orchestra for a take. It works. It works well, enriching the scene on film, complementing the visuals and creating a mood. He wanders into the control room for a playback and to confer with the film's director, Thom Eberhardt. If Eberhardt is worried or has problems with Captain Ron, it's not because of the music. He's a relaxed man on this stage, complimentary and in agreement with Pike's creative addition to the project, confident he has the right man for this very important element in the success of this project he's lived with for God knows how long. That's a good feeling. Mutual respect shows in the men's exchanges between takes. That's good to see, even better to experience in a working relationship.

Nicholas Pike's come a long way, from his birth in England, living and growing up in France and South Africa to a Todd-AO scoring stage at CBS-MTM Studios. His musical journey began at Canterbury Choir School through graduation from Berklee College of Music in Boston with a degree in composition. From Berklee he went to New York where he played flute in orchestras, jazz ensembles and "did some rock and roll."

While he was in New York, Pike had a friend who was directing documentaries for the BBC, without music. Pike suggested, "Why don't you put music to some of these?" The friend suggested that Nicholas be the one to do that. He did, liked the work and thought that perhaps film was the place for him.

He did the music for a film "that didn't happen," but made it pay off anyway by putting his themes together then going to people he knew and had worked with in the business with a proposition: Whoever invested in him, his talent, could use a portion of the music on the demo tape he would produce in some future project as payment. He raised \$8,000 worth of

faith, went back to London and hired the London Philharmonic Orchestra to record his themes, in their own Hall. The demo opened enough doors back in New York to get him an agent and the chance to score some commercials and industrial films.

The move to California came after a director of Alfred Hitchcock Presents said, "Give me a call when you get out [to California]."

"Persistence pays off," Pike states, because when he did come out the old "give me a call" line appeared to be just that-a line. He had trouble getting in touch with the director until he found out where he was filming one day, walked on the set and presented his tape. He got a job scoring a Hitchcock episode. "That was thrilling," he says, walking on the scoring stage at Universal with a 35-piece orchestra. Now it's doubled.

Pike's first feature came in 1986 with Graveyard Shift. Since then he has worked on other episodic TV, Disney's Prince And The Pauper and orchestral interludes for Hammer's Too Legit To Quit video. He received an ACE Award nomination for work on last season's Tales From The Crypt. His most recent film score was for Columbia's Stephen King's Sleepwalkers released earlier this year.

Pike saw in Captain Ron an "opportunity for the music to create the mood." It was a "fun movie as opposed to the darker mood of Sleepwalker," he says. For this he marries a small steel and percussion band to the larger, lush, 70-piece orchestra to achieve the desired mood and sounds. He says that bringing the two elements together is a challenge both technically and stylistically. "A steel band's approach is based on rhythm and 'feel,'" Pike explains. "The composer can only set the musical framework. By contrast, an orchestra is lyrical, disciplined, even rigid in their interpretation of a score. In incorporating elements of the calypso beat to the score, I will be stretching them to their limits.'

The feature, with long-time Disney favorite Kurt Russell sporting an eye patch in the title role of Captain Ron and also starring Martin Short, is scheduled for release September 18.

The percussion band Pike has assembled includes Louis Conte, salsa music specialist who was on Madonna's Blonde Ambition and Who's That Girl tours; John Robinson, drummer from Michael Jackson's Thriller and Bad albums and Andy Norell, steel drum impresario from the international jazz concert circuit.

It was tough to sail back out into the heat of the streets of Studio City but for a few moments, Nicholas Pike had caught me up in some excitement and sent me restfully sailing on the waters of the Caribbean. That made it easier. If the whole is as good as the parts Captain Ron should be a good journey in September.



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Vince Ebo Talks About New Career Move

VINCE EBO IS THE NAME BEHIND THE VOICE that has added a soulful touch to the recordings of one of contemporary Christian music's most avant garde artists, Charlie Peacock

Ebo has taken his silky smooth, soulful riffs to a different level. The man, whose talents have spread through the avenues of writer, producer, arranger, actor, and model, has released his debut solo album on Warner Alliance, entitled Love Is The Better Way.

Cash Box caught up with Ebo recently at the West Coast division of Warner Bros. Records to discuss this new chapter in his career.

C.B.: When did you decide to pursue a solo career?

Ebo: I have to be honest with you, I didn't really decide to pursue a solo career. It's kind of been thrown in my lap. I didn't even do this record to leave the Charlie Peacock thing. I did the record because there was an opportunity for me to express some things in my heart. But it has turned into

C.B.: Your sound, vocally speaking, is reminiscent of such R&B crooners as Teddy Pendergrass, Luther Vandross, as well as a few others. Did you pattern yourself after singers such as these?

more, and I'm just going to go

where the Lord leads me.

Ebo: For you to say Luther Vandross, there may be a little bit of him in there, unconsciously. I did Luther so much that it's ridiculous. I was weened on the Temptations; you know what I'm saying, from the old school. We had Eddie Kendricks and all of the rest. I just love to sing. I had a good friend tell me a long time ago, "Listen, everything has already been done. They're just finding newer ways to do it. Anytime you hear a riff, steal it. If you hear somebody that you think you would like to do, if it turns you on, then it's probably going to turn somebody else on." I found myself in a situation where I had to stop sounding like other people, because I did it fairly well. l mean you hit it; Teddy, Ľuther, Peabo Bryson, I love them all.

C.B.: After one listen, it seems as if the concept of the album centers around love. Is this the direction you purposely pursued?

Ebo: Yes and no. I'm one who tends to write about what's going on in my life. Since I've accepted the Lord into my life, it's all been about love. It was love that brought me back to church. It's

love that 1 perceive as God. Nowhere on the record do l hide the fact that I'm singing about God's love, except in the title track, "Love Is A Better Way," where I don't say Jesus' name. A lyric from that song goes, "There is a light from above and It wants us

to know." In one instance, I almost caught some flack for that. But the reason I phrased it that way is, because within the context of my life, my walk in getting to know the Lord, I first had to come to the realization that there was a higher power, if that makes sense. For me, that power was love. It's God's love. In listening to the whole album, you'll realize that the love I'm talking about is God's

C.B.: On a personal note, Vince Ebo the person, what is he like?

Ebo: Ah, man! I couldn't tell ya. Vince Ebo? Well, l'm a poor schmuck that's in need of God's love. I've been blessed with the opportunity to sing a little bit about the love of God and hopefully have reached some people. I like monster movies, fast cars, and the fact that I'm in a position to fly all over the place, meet people, do things and see new places.

C.B.: What lies ahead for Vince

Ebo: I would like to branch out into other mediums, on top of the music. I'd love to get back into some stage plays. Maybe, now that I know the Lord, that can be incorporated into the whole thing. Film work, television work, whatever. But to bring it all in, 1 just want to do the will of the Lord. I'm not a preachy type of guy. I don't have banners all around saying "Jesus, Jesus." 1 was drawn to the Lord through the lives of people who were true examples. That's the way my music is, and that's the reason 1 signed with a label like Warner Alliance. I want to go beyond the boundaries of Christian radio. 1 want to reach those individuals who are like I once was. Those individuals who are not acquainted or haven't formally been introduced to God's love.

Lyle Lovett **Delivers Some** Kind Of Gospel

ON STAGE

QUIRKY, BENT, DARK HUMORED, AND EC-**CENTRIC** might be just a few of the adjectives used to describe the delightfully unclassifiable Grammy awardwinning Lyle Lovett. "Wicked intelligence" and "absurdity" might have, unintentionally,

become the hallmarks upon which Lovett has established himself as a voice in American pop music and as a songwriter.

This native of Houston graduated from Texas A&M with a degree in journalism, but, pretends with a convincing sincerity, not to have what it takes to be a journalist or

songwriter.

Lovett, who when not hanging out with friend and former Tonight Show host Johnny Carson (on whose show Lovett appeared eight times), touring Europe or making movies, takes the time to pen lyrics that attract the audiences of blues, folk, bebop, jazz, country, and gospel alike. Joshua Judges Ruth, Lovett's latest album on the MCA/Curb label is another example of those double-entendre lyrical concept albums. The title is meant to allude to the gospel-style arrangements and religious themes of some of his songs. He takes the title of three consecutive books of the Bible and allows them to be read as a sentence, thereby implying male perspective.

Lovett, who is selling out auditoriums all over the country and some parts of the world, has successfully and consistently used gospel arrangements to take the people to church that might not ordinarily go. During his recent standing-room-only performance at Nashville's Tennessee Performing Arts Center, Warner Alliance artists, The Fairfield Four, America's oldest teenage group, served as the opening

The audience went wild over the a cappella quintet steeped in the jubilee tradition. Take 6 credits them as having been their inspiration and pioneering the acceptance of a cappella singing worldwide. For 30 minutes the audience got plenty of it, as The Fairfield Four treated them to some pure gospel jubilee singing. Group members James Hill, Isaac Freeman, Wilson Waters, W.L. Richardson, all in their seventies, have truly become living national treasures.

The Fairfield Four seem to be overwhelmingly received by this young urban crowd

that Lovett attracts. They have also appeared as featured artists at the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, the Lincoln Center's Folk and Heritage Festival, Carnegie Hall, and have also been awarded National Heritage Fellowships by the National Endowment for the Arts in a special presentation in Washington, D.C.

Lovett is one smart cookie as he also featured two of his four background singers, Everett Drake and Francine Reed (gospel, jazz, and blues singers themselves) during his set singing lead vocals.

Probably one of the greatest compliments given was one that I overheard by a concert attendee. His response to the show, "I feel like I've just been to church!"

Lovett closed his moving concert to thunderous applause with an encore of the gospel favorite "Pass Me Not, Oh Gentle Savior" with the Fairfield Four, Everett Drake and Willie Green sharing the lead vocals.

It has mainstream, as well as alternative appeal—an irritant in an often redundant system crowded with fabricated hits. It's always a pleasure to review an album with this much class.

Mercury Takes A Jeff Chance

ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

IT'S BEEN SAID that if you're a hit

in Texas, then you're going to make it. If this is true, then Jeff Chance is having his chance for a hit. He's already passed the only practical test there is on the unsigned circuit—he's been getting repeat bookings there for over a decade, while honing his professional talents.

Now signed with Mercury, he says, "I'm getting a lot of support in my home state. Those Texas dance halls hold a lot of people. They'll listen to you, and if you're good, they'll come back. I just hope I get that support elsewhere." On a corporate note, Jeff Chance is being sponsored by the Miller Lite and Lite Beer Live programs, as well as by Laredo Boots.

Jeff began his musical career in El Campo, Texas, on his father's 600-acre grain farm on the Gulf Coast, southwest of Houston. Drawing influences from the dance hall crowds, Chance credits Buck Owens, Conway Twitty, Mel Street, and Mel Tillis as his country music favorites, offering a sampling of country styles from Texas dance music to Virginia ballads. Playing in a family band since the age of six, Chance has learned to play guitar, fiddle, and pedal steel, which remains his favorite instrument to date. When Chance saw Tom Brumley playing steel with Buck Owens and his Buckaroos in a show in El Campo, he was musically floored, and bought his first steel guitar a week later. Even today he still plays one of Brumley's ZB Custom Steels. Of his upbringing, Jeff says, "My dad always played traditional country, and I grew up in his band. I tried country-pop, but this is really where my heart is."

His latest album, Walk Softly On The Bridges, was produced by Mercury's A&R chief, Harold Shedd, who has also produced for Alabama, K.T. Oslin, and other acts. Shedd, Chance, and Mercury Nashville's A&R manager, Buddy Cannon, went through over 200 songs to find material for the album. In a tribute to Mel Street, Jeff has recorded a pair of the late artist's tunes, "Walk Softly On The Bridges," and "Touching Home." Another traditional song on the album is "Portrait Of The Blues," co-written by Sheb Wooley. "Where Do I Go From Her" adds a modern touch to tradition, as does "Casting My Shadow In The Road," written by Jim Rushing and Randy Scruggs.

His current single, "Walk Softly On The Bridges" debuted last week at #63 on the Cash Box Top 100 Country Charts. Chance feels that Walk Softly On The Bridges showcases his true musical identity—a solid traditional and honky-tonk singer, steel guitar player, fiddler, and bandleader.





AMOA JB Award Nominees Announced

CHICAGO—Country artist Billy Ray Cyrus, rappers Kris Kross and mega-seller Garth Brooks are the top nominees for the Amusement & Music Operators Association's 1992 Jukebox Awards.

Cyrus received four nominations for: "Achy Breaky Heart" (in the Pop and Country record categories); an album nomination for Some Gave All (as Jukebox Country CD of the year); and was also nominated for Male Jukebox Artist of the year.

Brooks earned three nominations for "Rodeo" and "Shameless" (country singles category); and for his album Ropin' The Wind (as Jukebox Country CD of the year).

Rappers Kris Kross received three nominations for their single "Jump" (Jukebox R&B record of the year); their album Totally Krossed Out (R&B CD of the year) and were also nominated in the new Juke Box Artists-Group category.

Garnering two nominations each were: Bonnie Raitt, Travis Tritt, Michael Jackson, Alan Jackson, Genesis, Nirvana and Hammer.

The songs and artists are nominated by the members of AMOA, who own/service approximately one-half of the nation's estimated 250,000 45rpm and CD jukeboxes. In nine categories, the nominations are based on the highest jukebox earners for the period June 1, 1991 to June 15,

Award winners will be announced and honored at the AMOA 1992 Awards Show on October 2 in Nashville, during this year's Exposition.

Two Thousand Attend Mexico Show

CHICAGO—All previous show records were broken when the Latin American Amusement, Music & Games Exposition concluded its two-day exposition in Mexico City on July 23. More than 2,000 people walked the aisles of Exhibimex to see a broad spectrum of coin-op products on display in 125 booths.

AAMA president Bill Rickett (Dynamo) was very enthusiastic about the turnout in Mexico City. "It's refreshing to see such a high level of excitement on the exhibit floor by both attendees and exhibitors," he commented. "There is a genuine interest in our products in the Mexican marketplace, which reinforces the premise on which the exposition was developed—to help AAMA members promote their products in the Mexican marketplace. Now that AAMA has positioned itself as a leading trade event in Mexico, combined with the reality of the North American Free Trade Agreement, our members can look forward to further expanding and developing business opportunities in this emerging new marketplace."

There were 77 companies from both the U.S. and Mexico occupying 125 booths in Exhibimex. More than 1,700 operators, distributors and interested trade guests attended this third annual event. Mark Struhs (Dynamo), chairman of AAMA's Foreign Business Development Committee, said "with exhibit sales up 50% compared to last year, and attendance in the buyer categories increasing nearly 40%, we can expect an even larger exposition next year." The demand for exhibit space was so great that, in May, a decision was reached to move the exhibits from the Sheraton Maria Isabel Hotel to the larger Exhibimex.

Highlights of the show included the official inauguration of the exposition by Lic. Fernando Ruis Abbd, president of the Mexican National Chamber of Commerce on opening day. A press conference held on July 22, prior to the opening of the exhibits, was attended by 20 members of the local print and broadcast media. The Welcome Reception, hosted by AAMA on Wednesday night at the Sheraton Maria Isabel, was attended by more than 500 exhibitors, Mexican operators and distributors.
