Chapman's Adventure Continues

ONE OF THE MOST RECOGNIZABLE FIGURES in contemporary Christian music today is Steven Curtis Chapman. Since he appeared on the scene with the release of his *First Hand* album in 1987,



the Paducah, Kentucky native has set fire to the world of gospel music as we know it. In February of 1992, when he received a Grammy Award for Best Pop Gospel Album, Chapman had already won Songwriter Of The Year honors from the Gospel Music Association for three consecutive years and Artist Of The Year twice. In fact, he ended the nine-year reign for the title held by Gospel greats Amy Grant and Sandi Patti. He has also been the recipient of an unprecedented 10 Dove Award nominations in a single year.

Chapman recently scored his second consecutive Grammy Award for Best Pop Gospel Album for *The Great Adventure* at the National Association of Recording Arts & Sciences' 35th annual Grammy Award ceremony held at The Shrine Auditorium. The telecast was aired to a record two billion people on CBS. Chapman also recently received eight Dove Award nominations for the 24th Annual Dove Awards (see Gospel Section) from the Gospel Music Association including Artist Of The Year, Male Vocalist Of The Year, Songwriter Of The Year and Contemporary Album Of The Year and was recognized by *American Songwriter* magazine as Overall Songwriter and Artist Of The Year.

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MCA, MO & BO SETTLE: MCA Records, Motown Records and Boston Ventures agreed on March 23 to settle all pending litigation among themselves. The parties became involved beginning May 1991. Pursuant to the parties' settlement agreement, all claims alleged in the various lawsuits will be dismissed. In addition, Boston Ventures will purchase MCA's ownership interest in Motown. The parties also expect that the lawsuits pending between MCA and PolyGram will be resolved in connection with the agreement announced.

RHINO GOES "FORWARD": Rhino Records has established Forward, a new label for contemporary artists. The label is designed to provide established artists a supportive environment in which they are encouraged to create the music they want to make. VP/A&R Gary Stewart said, "Many artists in their second or third decade of creativity are still making challenging and relevant music that doesn't necessarily fit into the gold/platinum sales class that is promoted in most corners of our industry. These artists do, however, have a substantial base and deserve wider, more effective distribution of their music."

VP/marketing Chris Tobey elaborated, "In addition to offering a progressive perspective for artists and their managers, Forward is an aggressive departure from 'business as usual'."

Like Rhino, Forward will be distributed by Atlantic Records which, in turn, is distributed by WEA. Atlantic co-chairman and co-CEO, Doug Morris stated, "We are very proud to have Rhino, the company which has set the standard for high-quality compilations, as a member of The Atlantic Group. With Forward, Rhino is branching out into untapped territory with a new label that is sure to further burnish their reputation..."

The new label's premiere release will be *La Danse De La Vie*, due April 20 from Beausoleil. Also signed are NRBQ and Todd Rundgren.

Salpietro was vice president/operations for the Warner/Elektra/Atlantic Corporation. He had been with WEA since its founding, working first in Chicago and moving to Burbank in 1989. He is survived by wife Linda and children Ron, Jr., Kimberly, Patricia, Diane, Kathy and Karen. MUSIC REVIEWS By Randy Clark


■ DAMN YANKEES: "Silence Is Broken" (Warner Bros. PRO-CD-5962)

If this star-studded group had been assembled in the days when hard-rock bands were dominating the charts, they would have unquestionably been the cream at the top of the heap. Their style is clean and straight-ahead, with just the right amount of production sweetening. The epic rock track's original version is on their Don't Tread album, and this sweep ing single remix was featured in the action film, Nowhere To Run. Ron Nevison produces the Chris Lord-Alge mix.



■ BRUCE HORNSBY: "Harbor Lights" (RCA RDJ 62486-2)

It's nice to hear from Bruce again, although this isn't exactly the same Bruce you might want to remember. His sound on "The Way It Is" is more like "the way it was" on this first single from his new album of the same name. This track sounds a little more like Steely Dan meets Todd Rundgren in a pleasant mix of jazz/rock/blues fusion. Guest musician Pat Metheny sits in on electric sitar and the guitar solos. Bruce produces himself this time out.



It makes me skeptical when a new artist's first single from a debut album is a remake. Especially when the artist is touted as a songwriter as well. In Scotti's case the song is an updated version of the Harold Melvin & The Bluenotes' 1975 sociopolitcal/environmental classic. Nick's white-boy-got-soul voice evokes mild tributory to the Teddy Pendergrass version, and of course, the beat and tempo have been set to today's dance standards. Benny Medina produces.





■ CRUSH: "The Rain" (EastWest PRCD 4972-2)

Simple Minds is the first thing that pops into the brain during the verses of this first single from their self-titled debut album. The choruses are a bit grungier guitar-wise, but with an English dance beat. The new group consists of former members of Siouxie and the Banshees and Killing Joke and maintains a more alternative/rock than English-acid/dance-act front. They sound a little like both to me. Produced by Pat (Robert Plant, Edie Brickell, Iggy Pop) Moran.

■ HEAVY BONES: "TurnItOn" (ReprisePRO-CD-5595)

This rock ballad shows all the signs of the classically stereotypical late '80s hard-rock anthem, and is sure to please all those post-dated programmers at AOR radio. Former Quiet Riot skinwhacker and veteran session drummer Frankie Banali lays down the beat-laden groove on this mid-tempo rocker in solid fashion, the guitar licks are tasty, and the harmonies are all there. The song appears on their self-titled debut album. Produced by Richie Zito with a Jim Barton mix.



PICK OF THE WEEK:

■ MICHAEL JACKSON: "Who Is It" (Epic ESK 74406)



It doesn't take a wizard to guess that yet another single from Michael's multi-platinum Dangerous album will fare well on the charts. Saturating himself in the media in a seemingly futile attempt at re-shaping his public perception of late has mildly re-stimulated the relatively poor record sales (compared to Thriller and Bad) of his 1991 effort. This cut is the song Oprah Winfrey coaxed him to sing a cappella during his live television interview, and the same lip-smacking intro is included on one of the four re-mixes on the CD-single. Another is a jammin' house mix.

ALBUMS

COVERDALE/PAGE: Coverdale/Page (Geffen GEFD-24487)

The anticipated collaboration of these two time-tested rockers is about what you might imagine, despite all the touting to the contrary. Jimmy Page hasn't had a solid outlet for his musical creativity and guitar genius in years, and David Coverdale has always wanted to be Robert Plant anyway. It's Page's undeniable Zeppelin-esque influence that dominates the overall sound on the 11-track album. Predictable, but certainly not disappointing. Page, Coverdale and Mike Fraser produce.





■ HOTHOUSE FLOWERS: Songs From The Rain (London 828 350-2)

Three years after their last critically acclaimed release (Home), this group of passionate, Dublin-based alternative/folk/rock musicians have re-emerged with 11 new compelling tracks, three of which represent collaborations with Dave Stewart (Eurythmics) and the Grammy-winning Will ("Tears In Heaven") Jennings. Although their musical structure is essentially free-form, the songs are soulful, deep, and emotionally evocative. Stewart Levine produces.

SONIA DADA: Sonia Dada (Chameleon/Elektra 61342-4)

"Sonic irrationality" is what the name means and is exactly what this eight-piece musical melting pot represents. With sounds that range from funk, blues and soul to mondo-metal and gospelized harmonies, the listen is equallly as eclectic as the look of this multi-cultural grab-bag from Chicago. Australians have already emphatically embraced the ensemble's debut album as well as current release U.S. single, "You Don't Treat Me No Good." Daniel Laszlo produces.





■ LAUREN CHRISTY: Lauren Christy (Mercury 314 512 719-2)

This 11-track debut album is an intensely personal and feminine musical confession of a young singer/songwriter from London. Although Ms. Christy's autobiographical perspective of love gained/lost and little-girl-growing-up are far lighter by comparison, her inner-revealing songwriting style, music and voice are strikingly similar to those of Tori Amos (who ironically did her soul-searching in Lauren's hometown). Tony Peluso (Smokey Robinson, Stephanie Mills) produces.

FRANK GAMBALE: The Great Explorers (JVC

Guitarist Frank Gambale has played with some of the best contemporary jazz and rock instrumentalists in the world. The work on his own solo albums as well as the six recorded with Chick Corea has put Frank well inside the innermost circle of the musical elite. His latest solo album (third at JVC) consists of 11 soaring instrumental tracks with various rock, jazz and funk fusions. Numerous top-flight sidemen con tribute to this uplifting collection. Gambale produces.



PICK OF THE WEEK:

■ DEPECHE MODE: Songs Of Faith And Devotion (Sire/Reprise 9 45243-2)



This album has certainly been one of the most anxiously awaited albums of late by virtue of the fact it's been three years since the release of their last album (Violator), which was so far their best received here in the U.S. Meanwhile, the Essex-based alternative rockers have amassed a huge cult following among certain markets and demographics. So, for those who have been chomping at their fingernails, this album should more than please, and will likely be their biggest effort Stateside to date (all nine of their previous albums have done well in the U.K.). This 10-track effort continues in the band's religiously mocking/inquisitive nature on several tracks, as well as their ongoing alternative musical exploration. Depeche Mode and Flood produce.

SHAMROCK SHAKE: As the luck of the Irish would have it, Sinead O'Connor was nowhere to be pinched for not wearing green in her St. Mark's Place bar, Sin-E, on St. Patty's day. However, a couple of her friends performed including: Freddie White, Dehlla, Tom Clark, Toasted Heretic, Ketel, Digman & Guff and Kelneg who was joined by Liam O'Maonial of Hothouse Flowers, who in turn, had performed on Late Night With David Letterman with material off their new album Songs From The Rain (London) including "Emotional Times," written with Eurythmics' Dave Stewart. Meanwhile, on the Irish-American front, Black 47 drove the snakes out of The Ritz that day while House Of Pain were slated for a March 27 show at Roseland. On the eve of the festivities, Cash Box joined Ireland's Ma~'ire of Clannad, Ireland's true veterans—they taught former Clannader Enya everything she knows, but after 10 years it took a little Fahrvernugen and an 800 number to launch the masters to semi-stardom, after thousands of people having seen a Volkswagen commercial called up the consumer line after the song instead of the car...details in upcoming issue!

LUCKY CHARMS: If you want to embrace the Irish scene like a claddah ring, check out Scotti Bros' compilation *Strait Outta Ireland* for bands from Eire on the rise, or volume 3 of the Irish Trade Board's *Music From Ireland: Breaking Sound Barriers*, sure to be floating around the New Music Seminar this summer.

Last weekend was New York's dance radio station, Hot 97's 4th annual Expo '93. Apart from the usual promos, they featured performances by Sound Factory, Bizarre Inc., SOUL System, and a surprise performance by Prince Markee Dee—however, it was Tommy Boy's latest pride and joy, Rupaul, who brought the house down hissing and, well, working it.

CLUB FOOT: A slew of new house clubs have opened around town including Flat Iron Grill (Euro sans trash), Bellevue (Octagon), Deco (former Wunderbar turned '70s gaudy), and earlier The Grand Meanwhile, we're still kinda waiting on Peter Gatien's re-opening of The Tunnel to join his empire of Club USA, Palladium and Limelight.

JAMES BROWN IS ALIVE! Forget the L.A. Style sample, forget the arrest record—JB is back with the new album *Universal James* (Scotti Bros). The industry has long been creaming over the idea of a new Brown release, particularly the new crop of soul revivalists and acid jazz funkateers (their biggest label, Talkin' Loud, takes its name from JB's famous line, "Talkin' loud and sayin' nothing"). Though reviewers say *Universal James* doesn't quite compare to classic JB and may make the God of Groove seem aged to a slight decline, Clivilles and Cole and Soul II Soul's Jazzie B mix the tracks and follow the Man's order to "make it funky." For a good survey of the classics, out now is *James Brown's Greatest Hits* (PolyGram)

Paul McCartney will make his first appearance at the Hollywood Bowl since playing the venue with the Beatles.

CONSIDERING it took less than 45 minutes to sell out the 52,000+ seats at Anaheim Stadium, it should come as good news to some that Paul McCartney will precede by one day his April 17 "only Southern California appearance" in Anaheim by headlining the bill of the National Earth Day Concert at the Hollywood Bowl on Friday, April 16. The impressive lineup of talent set to perform includes Steve Miller, 10,000 Maniacs, En Vogue, Kenny Loggins, k.d. lang and others.

The Hollywood Bowl concert will highlight a national education and action campaign, urging individuals and businesses to take "Sound Action" to protect the environment. The campaign also includes concerts to be held in New York (April 18 at The Ritz Theater) and Washington, D.C. (on April 22 at Merriweather Post Pavillion) with themes encouraging Americans to participate in local Earth Day events. All Earth Day Concerts utilize solar-powered sound, video and lighting backstage.

Local events held nationwide will be announced on cable stations including VH-1 and by local radio stations across the country who support the effort. Listeners can call for a schedule of events near them by calling the Concerts For The Environment Events Hotline at 1-800-4-ECO-ACT where they will receive information on local Earth Day events from April 1 through May 1

Also at the Hollywood Bowl concert, there will be an informational ECO-Plaza where the registering of volunteers to participate in a project called The Great L.A. Cleanup, will take place. This non-profit group is helping to create a new climate of cooperation and healing in the L.A. area in the aftermath of last year's riots. The campaign is a concerned coalition of environmental, community-action, entertainment industry, and government organizations. Mayor Bradley is even proclaiming April 16 through May 2 officially, The Great L.A. Clean-Up. Members of the many local organizations working with the Clean-Up will be encouraging others to "Sign Up To Clean Up." Clean-Ups will include communities, beaches and oceans, as well as tree plantings, restorations, fairs, festivals, public planning meetings, prayer vigils, and other gatherings.

McCartney is taking a more visible activist stance on his latest sold-out world tour and will be handing out a free 100-page book at his concerts detailing his and wife Linda's position on environmental issues and articles explaining the work of other organizations the couple support such as Greenpeace, Friends of the Earth, and the People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals. All of this activity sounds great to me, and the concerts should sound even better. But what I want to know is, when McCartney says, "Think global, act local" is he speaking about environmental action, or were these instructions given to the people selling tickets for his

Ain't New To This, But So What?

FOR MOST ACTS, stepping from a major to an indie is a sign of defeat. Unable to break even or to justify large advances, the act is dropped, leaving it to either retire or try to re-sign elsewhere, or go the indie path.

For some, the end of a major deal actually means more cash, and more control. Which is the situation with gangsta/hip-hop maven and guru,

Ice T.

"I brought the masters of Home Invasion to Warners, and they said they couldn't put it out as it was, and I refuse to be censored," says the rapper. "Cool, I'll just do it myself. So I hooked up with Priority (home to Ice Cube and N.W.A. and Dr. Dre, Ice's fellow L.A. M.C.'s), and I got them to distribute my own label, Rhyme Syndicate."

Ice T. is completely happy with the situation. "I'm the CEO, the president and sole stockholder." Not to mention the beneficiary of a royalty rate far above what Warners was paying him, although T. says, "I don't like to talk about money with the public. It

ain't cool."

Ice T. says he has no hard feelings about the mutual separation. "Warner Bros. records was alright, but the parent company, Time-Warner, dropped the ball. I don't think you'll ever see a major put out hardcore rap again after the 'Cop Killer' problem. The press kinda rolled over for the

cops, too."

Home Invasion, the disc in question, is probably Ice T.'s hardest, harshest record to date. Calling out the L.A.P.D. on virtually every track, running down the sell-out pop rappers who he says "can't sleep at night, they know who they are," relating stories of bad deals gone down, and issuing warnings of an apocalypse, Ice T. has made one of the deepest, most cutting works in hip-hop. With the help of his Syndicate and guests Marquis of 2 Live Crew and 14-year old wunderkind Grip, Ice T. has pushed the envelope open.

With the first single slated to be the truce plea "Gotta Lotta Love" and the second "I Ain't New To This," Ice T. will be burning up the charts, and without the help of a mega-conglomerate. "Knowing what I know now, I'd never sign with a major again," says Ice T. "But when you're starting out, that's where you gotta go, cause you have no money, no promotion, no nothing. But the majors have been intimidated into giving up on free speech, and so I gotta

do it for myself."

As far as new talent on his label, T. will only committo a possible Body Count lp later. Until then, Home Invasion is his sole priority.

ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

L.A. Style

L.A. STYLE AND the radically emerging techno-scene are synonymous with each other. When this European band recorded "James Brown Is Dead" (Antwerp label Decadance) dance floors burned with the unusual fiery fast beat. L.A. Style did not give birth to techno, though some fans may tell you otherwise. They did, however record one of the first techno songs to reach the Top 100 singles chart. The fever flew to the U.S. in 1991 when "James Brown Is Dead" on Arista hit #4 on the Dance Charts and sold over two million copies.

"Techno" is a new term for a new generation. It's difficult to explain what it is without listening to it, but L.A. Style's Franz Merkx (alias F/X) did his best to describe "techno" to Cash Box. "Remember the stuff from the early days, the Germans, when they made that technical sound with the keyboards?" he asks vehemently. "It's just an upbeat version of that, but you bring in rock and rap."

In describing the sound, F/X is as full of energy as the music itself. "There are a lot of rock elements, but it's dance too. It's powerful! It's like disco gone wild; disco and you haven't slept for 10 years—heavily armed disco."

F/X is proud that L.A. Style's techno tunes are color blind. "I'm pleased I can bring it [the music] to white, black, blue, pink, and green—whatever kind of people. We don't have a color barrier. The problem with Hip-Hop and Rock is that there is a distinction that if you go for Rock, you're white and if you go for Hip-Hop, you're black. We don't give a sh**! Most of the people who do it in Europe are mixed anyway. I think that's the beauty of techno."

The pure energy and anarchy of Techno takes a while to warm up to. F/X pointed out that even when L.A. Style, and techno in general was accepted beyond the European nightclub scene, it took a long time for the radio airwaves to embrace it. "It's a bit powerful for radio airplay," he says. "They like the little pop songs that sound nice to everybody."

Now, with their recently released debut album, *L.A. Style*, produced by techno pro Denzil Slemming on Arista, the group is hoping for an international following. The single "I'm Raving" is already on the Top 20 chart in Holland. L.A. Style's booming beat is coming to America. On describing their recent gig at New York City's church-turned-nightclub, Limelight, F/X recalls, "They had these other bands on, but they couldn't keep up with us. Personally nice people, but they can't touch me. I'm furious. We kicked off the stage. People were trying to rip my pants off."

April 14 is the unofficial date for their official six-week United States tour. "I hope it kicks off in America the way it did in Europe." Full of energy, F/X says. "It's exciting for me to talk to you guys like this. I'm used to doing promotional interviews in Europe. It's a freak-out when I can do it with you guys over in America." The techno talent of L.A. Style will party later this year in Japan and Australia. "That's what it is," F/X says. "It's not just performing, it's pure partying."

Ray Charles

CERRITOS CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS, CER-

RITOS, CA—Actors achieve greatness by submerging themselves in a cast of characters. But musicians achieve greatness by emerging from

their songs as themselves. By this definition, a Ray Charles concert is still the greatest show on earth.

Ray Charles is a six-ring circus of styles: big-band swing, Vegas-lounge pop, jazz, country, and blues—all steeped in the essence of soul. While generally credited as soul's originator, Charles prefers to be cast as its continuing re-inventor. Only Ray can turn Hank Williams' "Your Cheatin' Heart" into an urban classic whose grit is underlined rather than obscured by a 45-piece orchestra.



Ray's instrumentation at his two-night, sold-out Cerritos stand (lots of brass and strings, but no Raelettes) was initially as puzzling and ultimately as sweeping as his choice of material.

He ignored soul originals like "Hit The Road Jack" in favor of tunes associated with other performers. His set careened from Mario Lanza's grandly operatic "Be My Love" to Sonny & Cher's soap opera-ish "All I Ever Need Is You." Ray sanctified the former with his own keyboard-synthesized vibes solo, and consecrated the latter with his own surprising sax attack.

Other serendipitous segments of his 13-song program included an ecstatic version of Jacques Brel's "If You Go Away" and a swinging reading of the Tony Bennett-famed "The Good Life." Ray delivered only a handful of his own hits, and most of these re-asserted his powers as an interpreter rather than as writer. Besides "Your Cheatin' Heart," he revisited the country of "Georgia On My Mind" and "Take These Chains From My Heart." His only rock-influenced number was The Beatles' "Eleanor Rigby," re-framed as a tribute to "all the homeless people."

In addition to his over 80 hit singles, Ray Charles is also strongly identified with songs that can't be measured by their chart impact alone. Sesame Street's "Being Green" and our nation's unofficial anthem "America The Beautiful" have both become in-concert signature tunes for Ray—and each provided some of the evening's most climactic moments.

While he rarely moved far from his piano bench, Charles sent out enough choreographic sparks to equal a Michael Jackson show. He maniacally flung every visible part of his anatomy in a dozen daredevilish directions before the night was through.

Besides the unexplained absence of The Raelettes, Charles fans also missed hearing anything from Brother Ray's new Warner Bros. album My World, a Richard Perry-produced affair that sounds like his most soulful studio achievement in two decades.

But rather than promoting his latest CD release or Pepsi commercial, this Ray Charles concert promoted his long-standing role as a spokesperson for live music. He remains a performer who delivers the unexpected and emerges the unequaled.

Opening for Charles was giant-sized comic John Pinette. In between punchlines that make the most of his profuse poundage, he also turned in flawlessly funny musical impressions of Billy Ocean, Buffalo Springfield, Freddie Jackson and The Chipmunks. Whether aiming at the obvious or the slightly more obscure, Pinette hits the bullseye with superstar consistency.

among those who will perform an all-star "Tribute To Dizzy Gillespie" at the 36th Annual Monterey Jazz Festival Presented by MCI, scheduled for September 17-19 in the quaint coastal town. Hampton and his crew will lead the tribute, a fitting assignment because of the trombonist's partnership with Gillespie in founding the United Nations Orchestra. Hampton will be joined by players like Jimmy Heath, James Moody, Dianne Reeves, and Paquita D'Rivera. Other artists that will appear at the 36th staging of this venerable jazz festival, the first without Jimmy Lyons at the helm, will be announced later...The four-day, Third Annual Jazz Aspen at Snowmass festival, billed as the "Le Cirque du Jazz," is scheduled for June 24-27 in the Rocky Mountain ski resort. In addition to the music, paced by the music of B.B. King and Dr. John, the show will be staged under a 2,000-seat circus tent, mirroring the style of the festival's sister event, "Jazz in Marciac," which is located in southwest France near the Basque region. As in years past, the show will feature a theme, this year it will be "The New Orleans Experience." Plans are to offer an expanded food bazaar featuring Cajun and French dishes. Dr. John (who turned it out last year), will be joined by Big Easy neighbors Bela Fleck and The Flecktones and Charmaine Neville, daughter of Neville Brothers founder Charles Neville. Other artists who will appear at the Aspen fete include Dianne Reeves, Michel Petrucciani, The Mighty Clouds of Joy, Spyro Gyra and Nestor Torres...New Age Grammy-winner Yanni on April 6 will release his ninth album for Private Music Records, In My Time, and is prepping for a 40-city symphony concert tour that will break June 8 with six shows at the Gershwin Theatre in New York City.

■ NORMAN CONNORS: Remember Who You Are (MoJazz 374637003-2). Producer: Norman Connors.



Norman's starship has been flying under the radar in recent years. But, keeping his production maneuvers sharp, he's made a potential comeback—no, that should be return, to the hit universe with this lush collection. What he does here is re-interpret jazz and pop classics like Billy Strayhorn's "Lush Life," Stevie Wonder's "You And I," and John Coltrane's "Naima" as a founda-

tion for newer material. But, it all gets the Connors treatment. He's joined by vocalists such as Phyllis Hyman (for whom he served as Svengali in the late '70s), Angela Bofill (whom he produced before), and newcomers Denise Stewart, Eve Cornelious and Spencer Harrison, all of whom provide alter egos in voice for Connors. The record is most effective on songs like the title track, "I Can't Wait Till I See You Again," and the Wonder track. But Connors flexes his production muscles on the the instrumental "Only When She Cries."

■ REGGAE SUNSPLASH: Reggae Sunsplash Live (MCA MCAD-10707). Producers: Lee Jaffe and Stephen Stewart.

There's nothing like a live Reggae Sunsplash—the heartbeat grooves, the colorful melange of people, arts and crafts, and the engaging roots food and herbs. But, if you haven't been to one of the live shows, then this record will provoke memories of those good vibes. Recorded at the six-day, 15th anniversary of the show in Jamaica, the record is a proper mix of roots riddim and dancehall styles more common in the U.S. Rastafari, Emperor, Haile Selassie I (whose 100th birthday was celebrated during the show) would have been proud of Marcia Griffith, Freddie McGregor, Dennis Brown and the Mystic Revealers. In fact, the whole bill would have made him sway gently and rock steady.

GANGSTAS AND SOLDIERS: Guns and microphones have become the weapons of choice for the inner cities and impoverished communities in the wars to gain equality, justice, true freedom of RHYME

speech and to end brutality against them. Underground musics like rap, punk and some alternative and metal rock have served as chronicles in this era of discontent, which is coming to a head like a festering carbuncle on the verge of pop, pop, popping. The traditional conventions that have built the recording industry have become corporate, rigid, and groups that seek to maintain the status quo have not anticipated the resilence of those artists that have been singled out in newspapers as hate-mongers, cop killers and inciters of violence. But, it's not the desire for annihilation that drives the people and the music they make. Yeah, they wanna collect paper for what they do. But the heady combination of street consciousness and rhyme skills is more than a new money-making proposition. It is the drum beat, the warning to all concerned that they better keep a sharp eye on the clock. The following reviews—by Ice-T and Bloods & Crips straight from the streets of L.A. are reflections of the alarm being sounded nationwide that the conflagrations of April 29, 1992 might have been little more than a dress rehearsal, that America needs to wake up because there's no snooze button on this clock. It's a State of Emergency.

ICE-T: Home Invasion (Rhyme Syndicate/Priority P2 53858). Producers: Ice-T, SLJ, DJ Aladdin and others.



Yes, radio will be afraid of this motherphukin' record. Ice-T even offers a scatological ~~"Warning" that those offended by the language and the unfiltered anger should take "the mother phukin' record off." Those soldiers and gangstas that were worried Ice-T might be punked out by last year's "Cop Killer" rift that eventually led to his departure from Warner Bros. will be happy to hear this 19-track collection of black rage. The presentation on this disc is dramatic, but it actually distills the riffin'

heard on any day at anytime on the streets of the hood. Like the title track suggests, Ice's music has shot from its support in the hood to invade suburbia. There's violence ("It's On," "G-Style," "Addicted To Danger"); there are veiled cries for ethnic and community solidarity ("Race War," "Gotta Lotta Love," "Message To The Soldier"); and there's sex ("Pimp Behind The Wheel" featuring DJ Evil E, "Hit The Fan," "99 Problems"). This has platinum bullet written all over it.

BLOODS & CRIPS: Bangin' On Wax (Dangerous/Pump CDL-19382). Producers: Ronnie Phillips.



From the opening interlude ("Gangsta Talk (Bloods & Crips)"), this record is an open book to some of the most treacherous inner city streets in America. Performed by real members of

two of the most notorious street gangs known, this record moves with attitude and groove through an equally balanced collection of Blood and Crip tracks. It's not a show so much as it is a chance for the rival factions to step to each other on disc. And the only things that will bleed are ears. While most of the music is uneventful, the no-holds- barred boasting and recollections of ballistic encounters comprising this 18-track collection covers territory made familiar by the horde of studio gangstas. But, since it comes from the source, there are some insights into the banger's mind that can be gleaned. Bloods don't back off Crips ("C Sick") and Crips tell Bloods they'll have 'em livin' up to their names ("Another Slob Bites The Dust"). This should fly out of the trunks of cars wherever there is a Blood or Crip set.

NARAS Has Arts Ed Ally In D.C.

NARAS PRESIDENT MICHAEL GREENE has finally found a federal ally for his arts education advocacy in the Clinton Administration, which recently added the arts to the congressional education guidelines known as "America 2000." Greene and the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences have been strident supporters of the philosophy that more arts programs be instituted in schools, and have backed that belief with the "Grammy In The Schools" music education program held each year at Hamilton High School in Los Angeles.

For the last 12 years, however, Greene and NARAS have struggled against the more digressive arts education philosophies of the Bush and Reagan administrations. But current U.S. Secretary of Education Richard Riley recently said, "The president is proposing the addition of music and the arts as one of the government's national educational goals." He further said that the president's proposed education reform legislation will be announced soon.

"If these goals are enacted this year by Congress, the next 10 years promise to be an exciting and challenging decade for improving education for all students." Riley inferred that the fight for more resources to be channeled to education will be gritty because arts

are always a tempting target of budget cutters.

Greene called the announcement by the Clinton Administration "an exciting step in the right direction. We compliment the Clinton Administration for realizing that the arts are essential to the well-rounded education." Greene, the past two years, has spoken to leaders in education and the government in efforts to gain support for the arts. He has gained the support of groups like the Music Educators National Conference (MENC) and the National Assn. of Music Merchants (NAMM).

But the Grammy Awards telecast has been the most effective forum that Greene has employed to gain public and government support for shoring up arts education resources. During the recent 35th Annual Grammy Awards seen by 1.4 billion people in 110 countries, Greene said: "For the past 15 years, our government has been about the dirty business of getting music, art, dance and creative writing from the curriculum of America's schools...The Japanese government spends nearly \$5 a person on arts, Germany spends half that and Canada and UK about \$1.20."

Noting that the U.S spends about 15 cents per person for arts education, he further said, "We are confident that when the Clinton Administration reveals its arts policy, it will become a seminal call to re-deploy resources and insure that the arts are mandatory core

curriculum for graduation."

Trisha Yearwood: Strawberry fields forever

THERE HAS BEEN A STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL in Plant City, Florida, for more than 50 years but few British country music fans have heard of it, and I suspect that is also true for American country fans.

For the first 30 years of its existence I do not think this is surprising, but a couple of decades ago the organizers

decided that the local strawberries needed some co-stars to promote their event and that those stars would be from the world of country music and Pat Boone was the first act booked.

Since then they have gradually presented stronger and stronger shows and in '91 they even managed to include Garth Brooks, before he got outside their price range and last year featured Travis Tritt...how do you top that? Well, apparently their idea was to book everyone who was anyone in country music that was available and came up with: The Statler Brothers, Billy Ray Cyrus, Trisha Yearwood, Wynonna, Vince Gill, Diamond Rio, Billy Dean, Charley Pride, Mark Chesnutt, Doug Stone and Ronnie Milsap.

The line-up also had us coming all the way from Britain to see what the Strawberry Festival was all about. That is the reason this column has not appeared for three weeks, and you now have a columnist

employed to write about Britain covering a Florida event.

Florida country fans are very lucky because for the entrance fee of \$5 per day there were plenty of unreserved seats to see any of the above stars that appeared...one each day. There were reserved seats as well but these were mainly sold out in advance—sure, you had to be there early to be certain you could get a seat but each act did two one-hour shows (4:30 and 7:30) each day so, apart from Billy Ray and Vince it was usually possible to find a place to view from. In addition to the superstars there were also other acts like Leroy Van Dyke that appeared during the day in the entertainment tent plus a bluegrass band and all the attractions of an agricultural fair...in its musicality it definitely challenged the Florida State Fair which took place about 10 miles away a couple of weeks before.

One disadvantage when you have the majority of the audience not having paid to see the specific star that is appearing is that when it gets cold or when they are not familiar with the work of the artist, they are inclined to drift away and, at times, there was a lot of to-ing and fro-ing. I felt the second shows, when it was dark and a large video screen

appeared above the stage, had more atmosphere.

Space restricts me from going into too much detail but recently many pundits have been comparing Trisha Yearwood and Wynonna, and with the two acts appearing on subsequent nights it was possible to make a direct comparison. Both have strong voices, both have some excellent modern songs but it was noticeable that all the major shows Wynonna has headlined over the past five years have left her oozing with stage craft...she flicks the guitar over when the crowd applauds and it says "Thanks"...she gets a local cop to help out on "Mama" much to the audience's delight...and she just has to end with a standing ovation because she has the whole audience on its feet swaying and singing along to a gospel song.

I am sure that Trisha's time will come but Wynonna certainly ain't moving over yet, although it was also apparent from this audience's reaction that they preferred the songs she made famous when singing

with her mother.

The organizers (and fans) were also lucky with the weather (about a week later they had the terrible tornadoes) but it was fine all the time we were there, but Billy Dean did manage to shine like a "Fire In The Dark" and just finish before the rain began on his evening.

I suppose this is basically a local affair but it has a line-up the festival's president, Mr. Al Berry (yes, that really is his name!) can be

proud of




Speech of Arrested Development

Curb Music Counter-Sues MCA

NASHVILLE—Curb Music Company recently filed a lawsuit against MCA Records, Inc., for a total of \$30 million in compensatory and punitive damages and judgment against MCA. According to officials at Curb Music, which entered into an agreement with MCA (Curb/MCA) in September of 1983, MCA has repeatedly violated its contract with Curb to the financial detriment of Curb Music. In a lawsuit filed by MCA against Curb on February 19, 1993, MCA seeks to force Curb to exclusively license to the venture certain master recordings by country artists, The Judds, which were not a part of the original agreement. Those master recordings are currently licensed by Curb to RCA, and are scheduled to revert back to Curb in 1995. Curb officials state there is no contractual obligation for Curb to exclusively license those particular Judds masters to Curb/MCA, and request confirmation from the Court. MCA Records, Inc., is a subsidiary of MCA Inc., which is a unit of Matsushita Electronic Industrial Co. Ltd., Japan's largest producer of electric and electronic products. Curb Records is a locally owned Nashville record company.

Song of the Year

VINCE GILL & JOHN BARLOW JARVIS won top honors at the Music City News Country Songwriters Awards telecast live from the Grand Ole Opry House, Tuesday, March 9, on TNN: The Nashville Network. Gill and Jarvis won the coveted Song of the Year award for their #1 country tune, "I Still Believe In You," which Gill performed on the live telecast, accompanied by Jarvis on piano. This is the second major award in less than a month for the song, which recently won a Grammy for Best Country Song. The Songwriters Awards telecast reportedly achieved a 3.0 Nielsen rating and reached 1,700,000 households.







On Monday Ken Davis, one of the country's top inspirational/motivational speakers and authors, will present the keynote address for the GMA's annual membership meeting. During this "Monday Morning Live" meeting the Hall Of Fame induction will take place, along with the presentation of the Impact, International, and Lifetime Achievement Awards.


Other activities for the week include the Songwriter's Showcase, the New Artist Showcase featuring all 20 artists nominated for the Best New Artist Award, and the nightly "Evening Concerts," which are open to the public as well as the Gospel Music Week registrants. The week's festivities will culminate Thursday night with the 24th Annual presentation of **The Dove Awards** for excellence in Christian music. The awards are voted on by the 3,000-plus members of the GMA, which is now in its 29th year of furthering the growth of Gospel Music.

The group 4Him received six nominations, while Michael W. Smith and Michael English were both nominated in five categories. They also vie with Chapman for "Artist of the Year."

The show will be hosted by the multi-talented Barbara Mandrell, herself a winner of nine Peoples Choice Awards, six American Music Awards, and two consecutive awards as the Country Music Association's Entertainer of the Year. It looks to be a very busy, very exciting week for Gospel Music 1993.

Vanessa Bell Armstrong Something On The Inside (Jive)

Fans Of this talented singer will be excited to get a hold of this long-awaited album. This release has more of a traditional gospel feel than her previous two albums on this label. That doesn't mean there aren't any grooves of the urban/contemporary variety featuring the voice that is often likened to the legendary ~~"Queen of Soul," Aretha Franklin. Highlights include a hot Armstrong/John P. Kee duet on the title cut; the beautiful Calvin Winans-penned ballad "Ounce of Your Love," and the treasured talents of the late Min. Thomas Whitfield, who produced four of the album's eight tracks prior to his death.

Edwin Hawkins Seminar '91 (Fixit)

The "master of contemporary gospel music" returns with what should be his best collection in some time. Recorded live in 1991 at his annual Music and Arts Seminar, held this particular year in Oakland, CA, this project includes some scorching material which should easily become gospel favorites. Check out such tunes as "I'll Go," which features Tina Thames and Lynette Hawkins Stephens; "Your Name I Give The Praise," featuring Hawkins and Stephens and a tune that has already begun to make its mark across the USA, "Leaning On Jesus," featuring the popular La Shun Pace Rhodes.

■ The Dixie Hummingbirds In Good Health (AIR)

The legendary "Birds" have been delivering the traditional sound in gospel music for over 60 years. This treasure displays why this group has gained national recognition by their peers and music notables alike, for the quality that graces their performance. Even at their advanced age the vocals are smooth, the harmonies intact, and the delivery crisp and distinct. Latch on to this one. In due time it will undoubtedly become a collector's item.

THE BENSON MUSIC GROUP turns 90 years old this year. How are they celebrating? By simply doing what they do best, turning out consistently good contemporary Christian music and garnering as many awards along the way as they can. The Nashville-based company chalked up more #1 albums in 1992 than any other competing label, as well as the #1 album for the year, Carman's *Addicted To Jesus*.

Abbey and Betty

THIS MUSIC IS THE MAGIC of

somebody who's seen it all and is here to

tell you about it—Abbey Lincoln through her poetic and insightful lyrics and with that look in her eyes, and Betty Carter with a voice that is as vulnerable as it is undaunted, as far-reaching as it is genuine. Before a standing-room-only crowd at S.O.B.'s recently in New York, these two women shared a bill that brought a diverse and eager following from all over.

Lincoln started out the evening, with her three-piece band setting the scene with the mysterious fragment that is the backbone of her "The Music Is The Magic Of A Secret World" as she took the stage. Wearing a long velvet robe that rippled behind the gentle swaying of her body to the pulse, she playfully acknowledged the audience with the ease of a woman who knows how to assume the spotlight. That's the closing tune from her new Devil's Got Your Tongue (Verve/Gitanes), her third album for that label and the follow-up to her enormously successful You Gotta Pau The Band.

Lincoln went on to sing "Bird Alone" from that album, a song that catches her voice in its most fertile setting. Thick and rough, unadorned but essentially so, her sound is one soaked in reality as she sings her own words: "Bird Alone with no mate/ Turning corners tempting fate/ Flying circles in the air/ Are you on your way somewhere?" She continued with her rendition of the depressionera "Brother, Can You Spare A Dime," getting full mileage out of the consonants, singing "Yankee Doodle Dee Dumb."

Tastefully led throughout the set by pianist Rodney Kendrick, the rhythm section (featuring drummer Yoron Israel, who took a solo on the drum set with his bare hands) soon had the crowd clapping along with "Story Of My Father." An eloquent portrait of the oppression of Black America, she tells us of a man whose "images were stolen! And his beauty was denied." Lincoln's music is inseparable from its messages. And while it must be considered an evolved body of work, it seems to be reaching, unable to simply sit there, longing to be something it's not—just as it longs for you to be something you're not: "You got holy magic/But the devil's got your tongue."

Betty Carter stepped up after her band was off and swinging, scatting through every nook and cranny of "Just Like Old Times," which she segued into "The Man I Love." Her trio (consisting of Clarence Penn of drums, Cyrus Chestnut on piano and Christopher Thomas on bass) are all up-and-coming hotshots in the Betty Carter tradition—her group is often considered the premier training ground for young players. And they were right beside her through the incredible peaks and valleys of her arrangements, sliding into the lilt of "Caribbean Sun," clearing the air for Carter's "30 Years." Bits of a conversation with a wife that knows her husband is going to leave her ("She's young and Beautiful But do you really love her?"), it's a song that pulls no punches yet makes no judgments—it doesn't need to. "30 years is a long time," she mused in a cloudy sigh.

"Here's a good song to sing after 30 years." she told the audience, leading the group into Lerner and Lane's "Why Him?" A perfect example of her interpretive approach, her voice swept down low in a sustained, hollow caress that was as unexpected as it was beautiful. She is able to keep the humor of the lyrics intact ("What is there to say about his face/Except his features are in place") while taking the song someplace it has never been before.

It's Not About The Melody (Verve) is the title of Carter's new album, but guess what—it is. Maybe it's just not the melody you've heard a hundred times, when she stretches "What's New" into a passage reminiscent of Pachelbel's Canon (you know, that music from Ordinary People) and coos "How has that new love been treating you?" These surprises keep the music exciting and alive,

just as she remains on the cutting edge at 62. And while Lincoln has "given up singing songs of unrequited love," Carter's music is that of an incurable romantic. With the distinctive tone that makes itself at home with every note it can run up against, her voice communicates tenderness at every turn.

The two women got together at the end of the show to sing "What A Little Moonlight Can Do." Having a ball and letting the cards fall where they may, they ended the night cheerfully, unsure of who was going to be hitting the final note, and not the least bit concerned either way.

JOE SAMPLE: Invitation (Warner Bros. 9 4520). Producer: Tommy LiPuma.

While it might be easygoing at times, Sample's 10-song disc harkens to the best of modern jazz sensibilities as a collection of standards, obscure compositions by great composers and fresh material played in the spirit of traditional jazz. The disc offers buoyant pop/jazz ("Black Is The Color") and mellow, sonorous covers of older material ("Come Rain Or Come Shine," "Summertime," "Stormy Weather," "Mood Indigo"). While this record pays homage to traditional jazz, it also serves as a testament to Sample's formidable ivory-caressing acumen.

EMT Brings Kiddie Ride Line To No. America; Sets Up U.S. **Quarters In Chicago**

CHICAGO—Elektro-Mobiltech nik of Germany (EMT) is entering the North American market with its line of "Safety Certified" kiddie rides. Firm is currently in the process of establishing a U.S. base in the Chicago area.

EMT president Ulli Kunnecke advised that all of the rides being offered to Canadian and American operators (through the newly formed EMT-America) are in the final stages of testing by ETL Testing Laboratories and TUV labs. The full line of EMT rides are being tested to Underwriter Laboratory (UL) standards and will bear the internationally recognized ETL Safety Inspection

Stressing the importance of independent laboratory testing, Kunnecke noted, "It is not just important anymore...it is becoming absolutely necessary...a requirement by many governmental agencies and location owners." He went on to explain that many locations, particularly shopping malls and chain stores, are beginning to require that kiddie rides on their premises be safety inspected and bear the seal of a recognized independent testing laboratory. He also pointed out that "Kiddie ride operators will find liability insurance will become more and more necessary to carry and much harder to get without safety certification."

About The Company. EMT started out in business over 20 years ago, in Raubach, Germany, where they quickly became known for the "lifetime" quality of their rides. Over the years they designed and tested more than 150 objects, including animals, cars and other designs that would appeal to children, in order to determine "what kids really liked." The result is a condensed line of "the cream of the EMT crop," which will soon be offered through the firm's new North American affiliate, EMT-America.

Product Line. Among the pieces being released in the North American market are: Astronaut, which is a kiddie version of virtual reality that "free floats" kids through space on a time travel trip; Sky Wolf, a fast-moving, action packed animated helicopter ride, complete with blinking lights, radio "chatter" from the tower, and a cockpit that swoops up and down on command; and Airliner, a 747-looking jumbo aircraft that flies kids through the sky, banking, diving and climbing as they go—and there's a friendly brown bear called Petzy that lets them ride on his stomach so they can actually see the character they're riding on while they're

EMT has designed all of its rides to be interchangeable within a "Series," which means any fiberglass design can be switched with another one within its model series. No special parts or tools are required.

EMT is a recent acquisition of NSM Aktiengesellschaft of Germany, which is well known in the trade for its outstanding "HyperBeam" CD jukeboxes. NSM's North American distribution company is NSM-America; and it is in the latter's Chicago facilities that EMT-America will headquarter during its formative
