

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INSIDE THE BOX

Cheyenne Means Christian Country

AT THE BEGINNING of 1993, Homeland Records president Bill Traylor announced the formation of a new label, Cheyenne Records. Cheyenne became the first label devoted entirely to the Christian Country Music genre.

Interest in Christian Country Music has skyrocketed over the past couple of years. Radio stations are including the music—strong Christian lyrics set to a contemporary Country music sound—in their formats. Some have changed their formats entirely to Christian Country. A publication devoted to Christian Country has been started, as well.

Traylor comments, "After thorough market research regarding the opportunity of Christian Country Music, the obvious conclusion was that many consumers of secular country music are Christians and are very desirous of a product that is country-oriented with Christian lyrics."

Right away Cheyenne artists have gone to the top of the industry, having received more than five nominations in the 1993 Christian Country Music Association Awards as well as being the having the first #1 on the Cash Box Christian Country Top 30 Singles Chart.

Recently, Cheyenne announced a new distribution deal with Intersound Records in Atlanta. Intersound will represent Cheyenne in the CBA market as well as in the mainstream retail market.

Cheyenne is very aggressive in pursuit of radio promotion, but is committed to not diluting the lyrical content of the music just to fit in. Darrell Turner notes that a good many of the stations adding Christian Country or changing their formats completely are "from the West, which represents uncharted territoty for gospel music."

In addition to making records, Cheyenne also produces a weekly radio show for the Christian Broadcasting Network, Canyon Country with Larry Black.

Congratulations to Cheyenne in their early victories and may the future bring only greater success!

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JACKSON SCOOPS UP SCOPUS: Entertainer and philanthropist Michael Jackson will receive the 1994 Scopus Award from the American Friends of Hebrew University. It will be presented to him at the 23rd Annual Scopus Award Gala January 29, 1994 at the Beverly Hilton Hotel.

The Scopus Award, the highest honor conferred upon an individual by the University, will be presented in recognition of Jackson's international humanitarian efforts.

Jackson created and heads the Heal The World Foundation, donating the proceeds from fragrances bearing his name to the foundation. In 1984, he donated his profits from the Jacksons' Victory Tour to the United Negro College Fund and two other charitable and philanthropic organizations. Jackson has since provided more than 100 scholarships to the UNCF. Among the organizations he has assisted are the Congressional Black Caucus, Make-A-Wish Foundation, the National Rainbow Coalition, Starlight Foundation, the Sickle Cell Research Foundation, Big Brothers, Camp Ronald McDonald, Challengers Boys and Girls Club, and several YMCAs in Southern California.

As with Hollywood Records, Elektra Entertainment will distribute all Acme product through WEA.

In motion pictures, Generation Films is now aligned with Touchstone Pictures. Overseeing the day-to-day is prexy Richard Silverman. The company, already with several projects in development, has a first-look producer deal with Touchstone and will be acquiring scripts. In addition, Generation will be involved in developing TV programming.



Yo Yo: Tape's a No Go

NOD, SLOT, STICK, PAW, Milk, Seed, Queer, Fudge, Nuke, Numb, Dig, Dish, Small, Slow, Odds, Pods, Bats, Gits, Goats and Gore? A word salad whose ingredients comprise our would-be musical shapers of tomorrow—all are bands performing in this year's New Music Seminar, all are guys and gals who would dare to be different (but not too different). One syllable groups aside, my vote for most inspirational goes to the band for whom

things can only get better, Dog Pile.

Local and just-signed Groove Academy trendies The Repercussions (Warner Bros.) and Cooly's Hot Box (Pay Day), did their '70s funk/Latin-sprinkled pop as Kool G Rap and DJ Polo headlined a rap bill of 18 acts at The Muse. Atlantic put on a hip hop showcase at the Palladium on Friday, including rapper/actor Tupac Shakur (or 2 Pac) fresh from starring in John Singleton's Poetic Justice with Janet Jackson. After his 10 minutes, female rappers Yo Yo and MC Lyte came on. Unfortunately, Yo Yo's set was plagued by a misbehaving backing tape that just wouldn't play. Gone are the days when James Brown could seek revenge by fining his band members for every note missed.

The next night, as The Ramones were busy stretching the "new" in New Music Seminar at the Academy, trendiness had a run-in with dementia as the avant-groove poetry group Slam spoke to the beatnik in you at Fez. Summoned by the gleeful, hockey-helmeted MC, a parade of grunge poets shared their deepest and darkest as the band and DJ gave them a Star Trekflavored funk bed to lie on. Fluorescent green NMS necklaces bearing to the world one's name and purpose abounded, but my perhaps ill-informed sources didn't tell me of any new A&R activity that night or any other during the week. Were they

Wherever they were, they all surfaced on Monday, two nights after the Seminar ended, at CBGB's to see Girdle. On what is normally a loser's night of painful auditions, the place was buzzing with the presence of types who knew you had it all along, anxious to see each other all there, having responded to the intermittent Bat signal in the sky that flashes "hot new act." Drummer and onstage wildman Jamie Van Bramer is enthusiastic indeed but seems to know better, saying, "We'll just have to see."



Bonnie Raitt says: "The long box is un-American." And who are we to argue?

THE RECORDING INDUSTRY, in a rare example of unity, seems to be waking up to the urgent need to completely eliminate the wasteful long box package. On August 9, the Earth Communications Office (ECO) is celebrating industry efforts to do just that with a luncheon thrown in honor of the recording artists, execs, VIPs, retailers and other folks who have expended time, energy and effort towards that goal. Primary honorees are the Beach Boys, Bonnie Raitt and Raffi, as well as the organizers of Ban The Box, a group whose mission, obviously, is to find alternative, eco-friendly packaging for music releases. Other notables scheduled to appear at the Westwood Marquis fete include long-time Springsteen sidekick Roy Bittan, Interscope Records prez Jimmy Iovine, Geffen honcho Ed Rosenblatt, SoCal ACLU president/Atlantic Records veep Danny Goldberg, CEMA's Russ Bach, alt-rock band Toad The Wet Sprocket and Def American's Mike Bone. RIAA head Jay Berman will be addressing the gathering, which meets from noon until 1:30 p.m. Information on this and other ECO activities can be obtained at (213) 629-4974.

WITH ALL THE RECENT internal turmoil at the company's Vine St. headquarters, the folks at Capitol Records are probably hungry for a little fun in the sun. And what better occasion to throw a party than the 30th anniversary of the first Top 10 hit by one of the label's biggest all-time acts, the Beach Boys. Believe it or not, it was the summer of '63 that the Boys first hit the charts with "Surfin' USA," the first of an incredible string of best-selling hits. Six hundred and fifty tons of sand are being trucked in for the August 5 shindig, which will also feature a hamburger and hotdog cook-out, a volleyball tourney, a herd of classic '63 Corvette convertibles, a '60s hair-styling salon and a bunch of Muscle Beach bodybuilders. The event, to be broadcast nationally by Westwood One, will be crowned by a Beach Boys concert, played live in the sand-covered parking lot. Capitol has just issued an exhaustive, five-CD compilation that not only includes most of the band's biggest and best, but also features previously unreleased studio and live recordings, some from the Boys' most potent recording periods (Pet Sounds, etc.).

HOT ON THE HEELS of the recently released rock 'n' roll cookbook comes the next in an apparently unending string of silly music merchandise ideas: rock 'n' roll comic books. They're called Rock-It Comix, and they're being produced via a joint venture teaming Malibu Comics Entertainment, Gold Mountain Entertainment and International Strategic Marketing. The first issues will be debuted at this year's San Diego Comic Convention later this month, with initial public offering starting in November. Early titles will include Metallica, Pharcyde, Soundgarden, Ozzy Osbourne, Naughty By Nature, The Doors, Yes and P.M. Dawn. By the way: Americans currently spend over \$600 million a year on comic books.

New Order

HOLLYWOOD BOWL, HOLLYWOOD, CA—Shortly after the opening chords of New Order's set at the Hollywood Bowl, a return to the Los Angeles stage after a four-year hiatus, it was evident that the much-anticipated concert would be more anticipated than triumphant. The computer-driven, electronic dance pop stalwarts from Britain have lost none of their technological magic since taking a break from each other in 1989. But the quartet's newer, more gentler approach to the frenetic electronic dance grooves that propelled them from the ashes of Joy Division in the late '70s failed to spark the audience the way some of the older material and more passionate approach of the past.

of the older material and more passionate approach of the past.

Mixing in tracks from their latest Qwest/Warner Records album,
Republic, such as "Regret" and "World," with past major and minor hits
like "Perfect Kiss," "Blue Monday," "Round and Round" and "Bizarre
Love Triangle," New Order managed to turn the Bowl into an open-air
dance party for most of the evening. Aided by an aggressive laser and
light show package, the atmosphere was like a modern-day dance club
for the masses, complete with primal rhythms delivered with an overkill of sophistication.

Lead 'singer/guitarist Bernard Sumner and keyboardist Gilliam Gilbert provided their share of engaging, ethereal textures, while bassist Peter Hook and drummer Stephen Morris exorted the crowd with non-stop rhythmic grooves and riffing (although Morris was obviously aided by the "machine"). Aside from Hooks' stage front antics with the audience, there was little raw charisma exuding from the stage, only the prepackaged, manifestations of the uptempo techno-beat.

Those fans—old and newwho thought they had come for the perfect kiss, found only regrets.

Jellyfish

PALACE THEATRE, HOLLYWOOD, CA—Promoting its latest Charisma album, *Spilt Milk*, San Francisco's favorite retro sons Jellyfish turned the dance floor at Hollywood's Palace into something of a '70s love-in. And what's not to love about these guys? Smart, sassy music that captures the free-living spirit of the '70s; bright and soaring vocals that borrow equally from sources as seemingly disparate as Queen and ABBA; and a lighthearted, optimistic vibe to the whole affair that makes resisting the sting of the band next to impossible.

Playing equally from both of its albums, the band demonstrated that it has achieved, in its three years of touring, an effective balance of comfortable looseness and accomplished performance. Led by drummer/singer Andy Sturmer, the band offered all of the packed house's favorites; first alb hit "That Is Why," the quartet's power ballad entry "Glutton Of Sympathy," the infectious "Joining A Fan Club" (one of *Spilt Milk*'s best tunes), and crowd-pleaser "The Ghost At Number One." Show closer "All I Want Is Everything," one of the show's most effective songs, was speeded up as it progressed, almost turning into a punk rave-up.

And it should be pointed out that the sound for this show at the Palace, usually one of the worst-sounding venues in town, was actually uncluttered and semi-clear. High praise for what's normally a graveyard for live music.

Whether the current musical fascination with all things '70s, espoused by bands like Jellyfish, the Black Crowes and Redd Kross, is just a passing fad or one that's going to stick around still remains to be seen. But as long as folks want to hear that decade's musical tendencies, and want to wear that generation's flowery clothing, you can bet that these guys will be offering plenty of both.

Take That: Next Beatles?

THE OFFICIAL SALES FIGURES are now out for the first half of the year, and they show that new artists are appearing in ever greater numbers...and the types of music covered is even more varied.

The biggest hits during the period, as far as singles are concerned, may have been covers-songs that have been used in TV commercials or reworked golden oldies—but we at last seem to be developing more acts that the young record buying public seem to find exciting.

Many of these, of course, are dance or club acts and of the new Brit acts the pop of East 17 probably made the biggest impression on the market, holding down the top spot for singles and also having Walthamstow at #3 in the album sales for new artists. East 17 and Take That seemed to have captured the hearts and cast of the teenage audience with such hits as "Deep" and "Why Can't I Wake Up With You." The effect of Take That has so impressed Capital Radio's director of programs Richard Park that he is on record as going over the top and describing them as a "modern-day Beatles!"

But the variety of music offered by these new acts now having success is staggering. Jamiroquai have suddenly given a new meaning to jazz/funk music; we have had Asian rapper Apache Indian who scored with a couple of singles, and this opens the doors to a kind of musical culture that seldom appears in our Top 40. Reggae still seems to be flavor of the month (or should I say months?) and Brit act Louchie Lou & Michie One's rehash of the old classic "Shout" has put them into the spotlight.

So, are the new sounds dominating the music offered by new acts? No, far from it! More traditional singers are still the trendsetters. Dina Caroll is in poll position as far as album sales are concerned helped by So Close going platinum and leaving all the other new contenders way behind.

In the singles sales Gabrielle has gone off like a rocket coming from nowhere to sell half a million copies of "Dreams" in only five weeks—probably the success story of the year as far as our charts are concerned.

Other trends? It appears that the public is getting fed up with sequencers and samplers because guitar bands seem to be on the

up and up with Suede picking up all the honors on their way to becoming the second biggest-selling new act in album sales. Also up there in the top sales are The Auteurs and Verve and EMI broke Pablo Honey by Radiohead. With about five other guitar-style acts in the Top 20 it will only encourage more young bands to try and build their career from grassroots.

So rock is not dead but it seems to be harder the heavier they get with only Terrorvision making these new charts—and then only at 19.

BILLY RAY CYRUS... A year ago Billy Ray was one of the hottest new acts becoming a milestone by being the first country performer to get into our Top Ten single charts for more than a decade. But the album, Some Gave All, by comparison with other countries, did not do all that well in Britain only going gold and "Achy Breaky Heart" could prove to have been a millstone as well because his new It Won't Be The Last album only received a ++ rating in the music trade paper...way below average.

It is vital for Cyrus' career in Britain that he get another hit single from this current offering because, at present, none of the other country acts are making any impression whatsoever.

CHARTS...There is a typical summer lack of activity in our charts but Take That are easily holding the top spot in the single charts with "Pray"—a position they made a debut with last week.

The movies are still influencing record sales and Roxette enter at #7 with "Almost Unreal" from Super Mario Brothers and UB40's "Can't Help Falling In Love With You" from Sliver and Michael Jackson's "Will You Be There" from Free Willy are also in the Top Ten. The movie connection continues with the cover of "You're The One That I Want" by Debbie Gibson and Craig McLachlan—they play the lead roles in the stage version of Grease and the song made its debut at #14.

U...KNOW WHAT I MEAN? U seems to be the initial of the summer with UB40's Promises And Lies immediately going gold and entering the album charts at No. One pushing U2 and Zooropa (platinum) into second position. With so many Unplugged records albums present and Utah Saints at 28 the letter U seems to have made an initial impact—if U know what I mean!

NEWS FROM JAPAN

ACCORDING TO A SURVEY conducted by JVA (Japan Video Association), the total shipments of video softwares here for May, 1993 were \$154 million, 11.7% down from the comparable month of 1992 while the volume was 3,077,435 units, a 9% drop. Cassettes were \$98 million, 64.3% of the total and 3.2% down which represented a volume of 1,767,663 units, 57.4% of the total and 3.4% down. Video disks took in \$55 million, 35.7% of the total while dropping 23%. Cassette volume was 1,309,772 units, 42.6% of the total, 15.5% down for the period. Of the total units of cassettes, new works were 386 units in volume, up 2.9% while new video disks were 236 units, 2.6% up. The total units of new video software works were 622 units, 2.8% up over the month stated above.

Shabba Ranks: Comin' to Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO—Brazil's biggest media star and recording artist in recent years, Xuxa, is currently in Los Angeles where she is recording her first ever English language TV series for MTM (Mary Tyler Moore).

While Xuxa has been hard at work on her English and the recording of her series, her manager, Marlene Mattos, has also been far from idle and has managed to scoop the pot by signing both Michael Jackson and Madonna for shows in Brazil at the end of the year.

Despite having no experience in concert promotions, other than Xuxa's occasional live appearances, Mattos saw off bids from other established Brazilian promoters, thanks to her star's personal contact with Jackson. Jackson is set to play Rio de Janeiro, and possibly Sao Paulo, in October while Madonna is expected to follow in November if Mattos can organize a group of sponsors to bank the show. Jackson already has the backing of Pepsi Cola for his tour. Both artists will also play Argentina where the tours are being supervised by the experienced promoter, Daniel Grimback.

It is not known what part TV Globo, to whom Xuxa is contracted in Brazil, will play in the tours or if any television specials will result from the concerts, but Rio's Maracana Stadium, the world's largest, has already hosted telecasts for Frank Sinatra, Sting, Tina Turner and Paul McCartney, all of whom set world boxoffice records for the largest paying crowd to see a single artist. The current record, cited in the Guinness Book of Records is for Paul McCartney, who performed to a crowd in excess of 180,000 on April 21, 1990. Maracana was also the site of Rock in Rio in 1991 when a crowd estimated to be closer to 200,000 packed the stadium for the night when Guns 'n Roses were the head-lining act.

Prior to the arrival of Jackson and Madonna, Brazil will have the chance to see both Liza Minnelli and Shabba Ranks who are due in for shows in August while September sees the, by now, traditional Free Jazz Festival, South America's most important.

This year the festival takes place in Rio at the theater of the Hotel Nacional from September 22 through 28 while in Sao Paulo Free Jazz will be based at the Palace from September 23 through 30.

As in the past, the organizers have pulled together a collection of talent which any jazz festival would be proud of. Among the main international attractions set to play are Sade, Pat Metheny, Gerry Mulligan, Betty Carter, Joe Henderson, McCoy Tyner, Elvin Jones and Ornette Coleman. Free Jazz will also have its traditional blues night which this year brings to Brazil Bo Diddley and Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown. Another festival highlight will be a tribute to Brazil's Tom Jobim which unites Herbie Hancock, Gerry Mulligan, Jon Hendricks, Joe Henderson, Freddie Hubbard and Shirley Horn.

Tickets go on sale in Brazil on August 7 and vary between \$20 and \$30.

RICK STEINBERG, OWNER OF NASHVILLE'S IMAGINE GALLERY has announced that, as a result of a special licensing agreement with the John Lennon Estate and its executrix Yoko Ono, an exhibit of original artwork and limited edition signed prints by Lennon will begin making appearances in selected cities throuhout the U.S. and Canada. The tour is scheduled to begin in late August, and will include photographs of Lennon by renowned photographer Bob Gruen.

Steinberg has appointed Chicago native Tracy Nicol as special promotions director for the tour. REVIEWS

■ STRAIGHT AHEAD: Body & Soul (Atlantic Jazz 782492-2). Producer: Lenny White.

There's greater ensemble comfort on this album than on the Atlantic Jazz debut by this quintet of Motor City jazzists. The violin lead work by Regina Carter, the bass textures by Marion Hayden-Banfield, the pithy flute fills by Cynthia Dewberry, Gayelynn McKinney's steady work on drums and Eileen Orr's subtle key work are given historical credibility on a trio of traditional tracks including the title track. On the contemporary material, the quintet explores gentle and rigorous textures, especially on the lilting "Never Let You Go" and the post-fusionesque "Look Straight Ahead." A special treat is the Jam, Lewis and Hines-penned "Optimistic," which should spark airplay the way it did the Sounds of Blackness.

■ **JOHN BEASLEY:** A Change Of Heart (Windham Hill/BMG 01934 10145-2). Producer: Walter Becker.

There's plenty of attitude on this disc, a 10-song collection that serves as a calling card for John Beasley's fresh piano attack. He's joined on the album by some of the best contemporary players around, including drummer Terri Lynne Carrington, percussionist Bill Summers, bassists John Patitucci and Freddie Washington, reedman Bob Sheppard and John Tavaglione, supplying some tasty alto and soprano sax leads. Beasley takes full advantage of the remarkable rhythm accompaniment on this album (like on the tracks "Carnal Appetite" and "Skippy") and finds more casual territory to accompany sidemen solos, like on "Until Now." There's not a boring moment on this disc.

I'LL NEVER FORGET CHRISTMAS MORNING, 1982. Fulfilling my greatest wish ever, Santa had left me my best present ever, a stereo. It had everything I needed-A.M. and F.M. and a turntable, along with several shiny black vinyl records that kids today might barely recognize. The best of the bunch, though, was the album I had most hoped for—Bobbie Sue by the Oak Ridge Boys.

The Oaks had been among my favorite groups since I first heard "Y' All Come Back Saloon" in 1977, the year they had their first great commercial success. My favorite song on the album that was under the tree that year came to be the one that showed just where the band's roots were. The song was "Would They Love Him Down In Shreveport," a song that asked the question, "How would people react if Christ came back and walked among us as he did 2,000 years ago?

What I didn't know then was that the Oak Ridge Boys had won a dozen Dove Awards between 1969 and 1973. All I knew was that the song combined the messages I heard in church and the music I listened to on the radio. And that was cool. It was really cool.

Through all of the success they have known in the more than 15 years they have been in the mainstream of country music, they have never forgotten their roots in gospel music. Still today, in the midst of a 100-city tour, they take time out during each concert to play an acoustic set consisting of family-oriented songs and gospel favorites.

Among the things that have always improved me most shout this

Among the things that have always impressed me most about this group, though, has been the integrity of their work; their Christian values come through in all that they do. This, as much as any other thing—and there are many-- makes the Oak Ridge Boys true pioneers in Christian Country music.



Bruce Haynes

EVERY YEAR THOUSANDS OF HOPEFUL YOUNG ARTISTS COME TO NASHVILLE WITH THEIR DREAMS of "making it" in the country music industry. Very few actually succeed. Even fewer do what Cheyenne artist Bruce Haynes did. He received an offer of a major recording contract with RCA, and he turned it down. Why? "I didn't feel that's what God wanted me to do, so I passed," says Haynes.

Bruce's music career began at age 21 in Branson, MO. He worked at Presley's Mountain Music Theater and at Silver Dollar City performing

what he calls "a combination of Oak Ridge Boys-type country and southern gospel." Before too long, though, he and a couple of female artists felt the call to reach out with Christian music. They started a group called Jubilation that eventually disbanded and then reformed a couple of years later as an

all-male group.

Eventually that group became White River and signed with the Homeland label, but Bruce has felt the call to go on alone, not knowing for certain what he was going to do. For some time he worked on his songwriting. It was during this period that he was approached with the major label offer and declined it. Instead, he began talking with Bill Traylor at Homeland. Shortly thereafter he signed a recording deal with the company.

This week Bruce Haynes makes history as the artist with the first #1

single on the Cash Box Christian Country Singles Chart.

As for his future? 'T'm looking forward to getting out in the fairs, in the concerts...out there where they love country music and where they'll listen to me because of my style and then hear the difference in the lyrics. That's what my goal is, because [getting the message out] is still what it's all

White River

CHEYENNE RECORDS, THE ONLY RECORD LABEL specializing solely in Christian music, got started on the right foot when they signed the band White River! Initially with Homeland Records, Cheyenne's parent company, the band was formed by five men from Branson, Missouri's country music theaters with a desire to put God first in their music. The messages these men now deliver are devoted to their Master, but the style of their music remains the same—pure country.

There have been a couple of membership changes, but the message and the music of this group remains intact. The quality of the sound is impeccable. Their first album, What Ya Gonna Do, was named album of the month by Holland's #1 radio station. Their second album, Rodeo Preacher, showed even greater progress as they built the album around the life of a rodeo rider who turned his life to the Lord. Their third album, Have A Little Faith is expected to be released very soon, and the word from Cheyenne is that it promises to be their best effort yet.

The current group consists of Gene Reasoner singing baritone and playing keyboards, guitarist Benny Wood singing tenor, Bob Ashley on lead and steel guitars, lead vocalist and drummer Ronny Ricks, and Kerry

Huckaba on bass.

White River is doubtless the shape of things to come as far as groups are concerned in the Christian Country market.

The Cumberland Boys

THE CUMBERLAND BOYS FIRST STARTED in the fall of 1980 as a production at Opryland theme park in Nashville. At the time they were called the Opryland Gospel Quartet. As time passed and the original members moved on to other pursuits, the question arose as to whether or not to keep the group going at all.

As the only remaining member of the original group, Depp Britt made the decision to keep on going. He teamed up with Steve Goforth, who joined the group in 1983, and together they acquired controlling interest in the group and kept it alive, changing the name to The Cumberland Boys.

Today they still perform at Opryland—four times a day, six days a week-during the park season. In the off months, November, December, January and February, they take the show on the road, sharing their love for gospel music with a vast array of audiences.

The group had recorded several albums on their own before signing with Daywind label in 1988. Their focus has become more Christian Country than Southern Gospel as time has gone by, enough to have won them the Sunrise award for Best New Country Christian Artists a couple of years ago. Depp's songwriting ability and the band's musical talent have helped their albums chart consistently in the Top 20.

Depp Britt, Bill Britt, Jim Worthing, Steve Goforth and their four-piece band carry out a unique ministry in song through their work at Opryland and throughout the country. Their next release is expected this fall.

Texas International Music Association

THE TEXAS INTERNATIONAL MUSIC ASSOCIATION (TIMA) was formed on December 1, 1992, with the intent of providing a vehicle for independent artists, songwriters, musicians, and others in the industry. In the '60s, a great percentage of records were produced independently. Today, however, that number has been greatly reduced. The result has been that it is more and more difficult for the artists in any musical genre to successfully produce and market an independent record. In order to achieve those ends TIMA was formed—to achieve as a group what might not be possible individually.

The Texas International Music Association is directed by a board of seven officers with a strong background in a wide variety of musical styles.

Dr. Joe Price, CEO and Chaplain, brings over 30 years of experience to TIMA. He is also the pastor of Mesquite Valley Baptist Church. President Jimmy Fields also has more than 30 years invested in the industry, having been a close friend of Hank Williams, Sr. Fields has had hit songs recorded by Webb Pierce and Ray Price. At one time he was Junior Yodeling World Champion, but these days Gene Bradley is the vice president, gospel division, for TIMA. Boots Bourquin, formerly guitar player for Ernest Tubb, is vice president of the country division. Vice president of the country/rock division, Jim Fautheree performed for 11 years on The Louisiana Hayride and is "Jimmy" of the Jimmy and Johnny Show on the Grand Ole Opry. His wife Nancy is the group's treasurer. Silvia Harra is the vice president, rock/pop. She is also a manager and producer.

Paul Overstreet

PAUL OVERSTREET GREW UP IN MISSISSIPPI, a Baptist minister's son with dreams of a music career. Right out of high school he The early days were hard, though. Success seemed to dance just out of reach for the young man. Finally, in 1983, he got the break he needed when George Jones recorded and made a hit of Paul's song "Same Old Me."

Since then the sweet sunshine of success has beamed down. His songs have been recorded by Randy Travis, The Forester Sisters, The Judds, Michael Martin Murphey, Tanya Tucker and others. For five consequition

Michael Martin Murphey, Tanya Tucker and others. For five consecutive years he has been BMI's Songwriter of the Year. Twice he has taken home CMA Awards for Song of the Year and has also earned two Grammy Awards.

Paul's Christian roots came through very clearly on his first Word release in 1989, Sowin' Love. That album generated five Top 10 hits and put Paul in the limelight as a performer as well as a writer. Heroes, his second release was also successful. His latest release, *Love Is Strong*, has solidified his reputation as one of today's top artists.

The most exciting thing for the Christian Country Music industry about Paul's success is that it has not been limited in any way in the secular industry; the songs that have made his name as a Christian Country artist are the same songs that have made his reputation so great as a mainstream country artist, proof positive that the country music industry as a whole is ready to accept a better sort of music, music with a positive, Christian message—Christian Country Music!


Coneheads

HOW MUCH MORE BOXOFFICE ORE

can the Saturday Night Live lode give out? Just when you think they're down to dust and shavings, Paramount pulls this nugget out of the mine, and it looks like the beginning of another



Produced by Lorne Michaels, SNL's resident genius, the script by Tom Davis & Dan Aykroyd and Bonnie Turner & Jerry Turner strands the Conehead skit characters Beldar and Prymaat (Aykroyd and Jane Curtin) on Earth waiting for a rescue party from their own planet. While waiting, they attempt to blend in and make a life for themselves and their approaching young one, Michelle Burke. Because of Aykroyd's give-it-all work ethic, he's accepted, aided and befriended by bosses, co-workers and neighbors. They work into the neighborhoods and society in spite of an INS agent attempting to make an example of them as "illegal aliens." While doing all this they have the young one, she grows into a teenager, becomes a cheerleader, sports enthusiast and involved in a romance. There are all the day-to-day problems and situations every "normal" family faces before they are rescued at the moment the INS catches up with them, return to their own planet but miss Earth and devise a way back.

All this is played wonderfully straight and almost the entire SNL cast takes a turn at one point or other, which is one reason the consistency is so smooth to the mix. The gags are performed with precision, with none of the see-whatwe're-doing-now attitude. Director Steve Barron blends the story with action and gags wonderfully, without stopping the flow of the story for the sake of a gag. Everything progresses the story and pays off down the line. Aykroyd's obsession with golf on Earth ends up saving their lives on their home planet later. The film is well woven and thought out.

Aykroyd and Curtin reprise their roles from the original and are wonderful. Burke makes a delightful daughter, and when she falls in love she falls not for the school jock/dreamboat but for the local grease jockey, Chris Farley who's chubby, non-athletic, almost simpleminded but delightful. Terrific blend.

Michael McKean as the INS agent punctures the bureacracy balloon along with some special help from suck-up sidekick David Spade, whose weasel-like character is marvelously realized. Funny!

Others, some no more than scene bits, but all contributing professionally to the whole-wonderful ensemble attitude too often missing-are Sinbad, Michael Richards, Phil Hartman, Adam Sandler, Kevin Nealon, Jan Hooks, Garrett Morris, Peter Aykroyd, Laraine Newman and a host of others.

Photography by Francis Kenny is fine and Paul Trejo's editing hits the beats for the gags terrifically. Original score by David Newman is supplemented by a host of tunes (soundtrack album review Cash Box, July 31) which are better motivated and incorporated into the action than most seen recently. Most of them mean something onscreen and aren't simply put there to motivate the release of a soundtrack album later.



Rising Sun

WHEN A STORY HAS A SHARP point of view, blunt it. Tight weave? Unravel it. Commentary on relationships? Ignore and/or obfuscate it. Break it down to its lowest common denominator and stick it out there. Simplify and insignify.

Too bad somebody didn't give Michael Crichton the money and let him do his own screenplay from his own book and direct his own Rising Sun—he's



experienced in all three areas. We might have had a movie then, with a P.O.V., with form and substance rather than the search for one that it is.

Commercially it has Sean Connery who, credits inform us, doubled as executive producer; Wesley Snipes, who hasn't as big a following as Connery but is building; and the Crichton title and recognizable name (he's also represented this year with the mega-hit Jurassic Park...as if no one knew).

Crichton is credited here as co-screenwriter, in collaboration with Michael Backes. First position writing credit goes to director Philip Kaufman, as in: "Screenplay by Philip Kaufman and Michael Crichton & Michael Backes." Of course, it is "A Philip Kaufman Film." So, with that auteurship brand and all it implies in mind-never mind that everybody who can stutter "Action!" these days edits that masturbatory pedestal onto a roll of celluloid—Kaufman must accept whatever Rising Sun attracts, good and bad.

Hopefully filmmakers, when they alter their source material, change it for the better. Kaufman has taken the single thread of a mystery, the search for a killer and pulled on it, to the detriment of the broader tapestry Crichton wove his mystery into; that of the chasm of cultures and businesses between Japanese and American. He's also weaved in a few bits which, while important to him no doubt, are almost ludicrously insignificant to the story. (Example: street-gang member fingers Sean Connery's jacket: "Armani?"-guess who's credited with designing Connery's wardrobe?). The hint of a blossoming romance between the Snipes and Tia Carrere characters in Crichton's book, in Kaufman's view becomes a lust-after thread which sets up the tacky final scene with the implication that Snipes is about to move in on Connery's woman, thereby negating any respect the two men-who've become something of partners through the filmhave gained for one another.

Alteration of the film's murderer from a Japanese currying favor with hierarchy to an American lawyer who'd do anything (even murder) to push a deal through gives him a chance for some gratuitous ending chase action which smacks of B-movie making. (Well, perhaps it's politically or business-expedient.) Taken in pieces all the changes may seem small, but added together create one big anchor which ultimately sinks Rising Sun.


Connery adds class and conviction to this role, as he does any part he takes on. Half-hearted attempt of why a Scotsman is an LAPD detective via Japan is mercifully not labored over but the fact that it's there at all calls attention to the situation. The actor's personal strength carries the role. Snipes' character suffers with the near deletion of his ex-wife and the lessening of Crichton's swingingaxe charge from child molestation to bribery. As with Connery, it's the actor's personal strength which carries him through the potholes of the screenplay.

Harvey Keitel, on a roll with roles lately, squeezes the good juice from the hard-nosed detective here. Cary-Hiroyuki Tagawa stands out as hip, goodtiming Japanese swinger. Ray Wise does his best with a truncated role which, on screen, comes off as simply another cliched, weak-willed politico. Kevin Anderson looks good as the killer, and that's all he's required to do—look good. Mako turns in strong portrait of Japanese head man of business and Stan Egi gives strong support in his role of subservient businessman.

Interesting use of hi-tech computers gets strong hint but, again, not the comprehensive treatment involving them in the book. That aspect, however, isn't necessary. Good balance and translation was done in this area utilizing the cinematic aspects probably as best they could be.

Toru Takemitsu presents as fine stirring score, exciting party sequence music which, filtered up to the murder sequence floor, adds an ominous, edgy feeling to the onscreen proceedings.

PETER GABRIEL: "Come Talk To Me" (Geffen

45337) Tender song is the lead track from Gabriel's fine, soul-cleansing current album, *Us*, and is also the opening number of his current concert tour. The song dramatizes the isolation and fear of someone who feels cut off from a loved one, but it can also be looked at in a more broadbased way: people in general have a hard time talking to and relating to other people anymore. Produced by P.C. and Daniel Lanois, song is an easy add for adult rockers and, during daylight hours, album outlets.





EXTREME: "Tragic Comic" (A&M 8031)
Song is yet another example of the Boston band's versatility and potential for consistent, broad-based appeal.
Despite mega-success of a pair of singles from Extreme's previous album, the band doesn't seem to have made a lasting impact with either consumers or radio folk which, hopefully, won't prevent this catchy, feel-good number from getting its deserved exposure. Ear-pleasing, layered vocals, courtesy of singer Gary Cherone and guitarist Nuno Bettencourt, are the frosting on this musically tasty cake.

SNOW: "Runway" (EastWest 5162)
Sassy dancehall mouth is back at it again, looking to add to his highly unlikely run of pop hits. Canadian would-be toaster works hard for respect, and who are we to deny him that? "Runway" rocks harder than Snow's first hit, "Informer," and won't be as big a candidate for the burnout factor as that song. Glowing words? Not exactly, but then, this song proably won't need good reviews to succeed. Radio will eat it up, and what better place for a little girl to spend her hard-earned two bucks than on the new Snow single?

Former Doobie Bros. singer McDonald is working an excellent new album, from which this captivating and sweet tune is lifted. Now if only McDonald would put as much effort into a couple "China Grove"-type rockers, he might be on to something.

The unfulfilled nonromance of "Charm Light," the confused priorities of "Baby Don't" and "Big Black Heaven," which guests Springsteen, are the solid album's best. Scialfa and partner Mike Campbell (The Heartbreakers) have crafted a country-flavored, moving body of work that'll soothe the lonely and charm the romantic.

First entry from this Washington State band mixes lush pop melodies and vocal harmonies with jumpin' dance beats for a catchy, quirky style usually dished by Brit groups like EMF and Jesus Jones, though with more emphasis on the hook factor than those bands. Frontguy Johnny Fly (John Stevens) holds little back as he bares his soul throughout the album, particularly on the track "Fly," his cynical, semi-autobiographical tale of angst in the "90s. Worth a listen.

More affecting than your standard new-age sleeper, this dramatic collection scores with its uplifting themes, delicately delivered progressions and St John's touching, at times Enya-like vocals. Moving "We Stay Still," title track and "Song Of Songs" seem like old friends.

You can let this trio get its flow on. It's all about the mic technique, coupled with phat beats and textures that don't get in the way of the mic work of Wayne Wayne, M & M Sweet and Spunky D. The emphasis is on funk, like on the hype mix of "Can I Get My Flow On," where Ms. M & M Sweet and Lady Spunky D rhyme the right way over some of those patented grooves by the Oaktown braintrust of Foster and McElroy. Other tracks of note include "Yo, Mr. President," "Free To Be" and "Block Party."

THE RHYME

THE FLAVOR OF WISER YOUTH: Capitol recording artist **Young MC** has come to grips with being 26-years-old, a rapper, whose promise of greatness after a two-million selling debut album was not fulfilled in his sophomore effort for Capitol Records. His third album, *What's The Flavor*, though, is more satisfying to him creatively, and he believes that there is a future beyond the gold that word of mouth brought him the last time out. Since Young MC busted a move with his "Bust A Move" single in 1989, the same year writing hits like "Wild Thang" and "Funky Cold Medina" for **Tone Loc**, and earning himself a Grammy award for his debut album *Stone Cold Rhymin*' (which went double platinum sales), Young MC has created a cult of personality.

But his 1991 *Brainstorm* did not perpetuate the move. It went gold, but as the Young One says, "It did so without anybody outside the industry really knowing it was out. I was really trying to do different things on that album, but it came out at the same time as (labelmate) M.C. Hammer's record, and the label seemed to focus more on what that album was doing." His current album does not suffer from the same glut of product in the pipeline. Young MC has been among the list of artists that have been rumored for release to free agency in the wake of stiff staff cuts and roster trimming at Capitol.

At press time, the Young One could not be reached for comment (the interview took place prior to the ripeness of such roster depletion rumors). But he remains confident that his record is quality and that his work with Ali of A Tribe Called Quest expanded the dimension of his production and enhanced his approach to the lyrics. "This guy was great in the studio," Young MC recalls. "It had more a New York feel to it, that was different, and even after we finished working together, when I did my own production back in Los Angeles, it was obvious the work I did with him was affecting my own."

Rus Strahan Departs **NSM-America**

CHICAGO—Stanley "Rus" Strahan, long-time president of NSM-America and well-known industry spokesman and supporter, announced his resignation from the jukebox distribution company, effective July 23, 1993.

Strahan has been with NSM-America (formerly Loewen-America) almost since its inception; having started out as a service technician nearly 15 years ago, and worked his way to the top. He assumed the presidency in 1982.

NSM-America is the North American distribution arm for NSM Aktiengessllschaft (NSM AG), a German company headquartered in Bingen, Germany. Under Strahan's direction, NSM AG's jukebox products grew in popularity, assuming a progressively larger share of the North American marketplace along the way. Today, NSM jukeboxes have reportedly captured the second largest market share account largest market sh the second largest market share percentage among its major competitors

Strahan is credited with all but singlehandedly building the company into what it is at the present time. Most recently, he also introduced the kiddie ride products, produced by NSM AG subsidiary Elektro-Mobiltecknik (EMT), headquartered in Germany, in the U.S. market. Sales of the parent company's consumer products to the consumer electronics industry is another of his numerous achievements.

Rus Strahan has been involved in almost every aspect of the jukebox industry, from

participating in political lobbying efforts in behalf of the trade, to helping draft manufacturing standards. He was recently elected vice president of the American Amusement Machine Association and is currently serving his second three-year term as a member of the AAMA board of directors.

Ullrich Schulze, managing director of NSM AG (Germany), and his associate Peter Kuhn, marketing director of NSM AG, expressed deep regret in accepting Strahan's resignation.

"We are very sorry that Rus has chosen to leave NSM-America," stated Schulze. "Our relationship was one that was far more than just business. We enjoyed a fellowship that grew over the years, one that I highly prized and respected a great deal." Peter Kuhn expressed similar feelings, adding, "Our respect for Rus and his efforts extends well beyond business dealings,

and we all wish him continuing success in his future endeavors."

Peter Kuhn, who also sits on NSM AG's four-person board of directors, will assume the position of president of NSM-America, "at least for a period of time," and will report directly to Ullrich Schulze. John Margold will remain vice president of sales and marketing and Jurgen Jost will remain controller and financial manager.

PAPA Plans Three Major Regional Pin Tournaments

CHICAGO—Steve Epstein, president of the Professional and Amateur Pinball Association (PAPA), announced that his organization will sponsor a series of three regional pinball tournaments this coming fall in San Francisco, Atlanta and Chicago. The six-week tournaments, to be run on the PAPA competitive pinball scoring system, will culminate in early December, with winners from each region heading for New York to compete in the PAPA 4 International Pinball Championships, scheduled for February 5-7, 1994. Prime support for the "Fall Flipoffs" (as Epstein has dubbed the enterprise) comes from toy manufacturer Toy Biz, Inc., whose tabletop pinball game, *Pinball Warrior*, is scheduled for Fall shipment to toy stores.

"The idea of regional tournaments is a dream come true," commented Epstein. "Everything I've tried to do with PAPA has been built around bringing high-quality pinball action to the people. The Fall Flipoffs are a strong first step in that direction." Market coverage will be widespread. With the help of regional distributors and operators such as Frank Gumma, Jr. of American Vending Sales (Chicago); David Capilouto of Greater Southern Distributors (Atlanta); Ira Bettelman of C.A. Robinson & Co. (San Francisco) and Peter Betti of Betson Pacific (also San Francisco), PAPA competition will reach approximately 100 pinball locations in each region,

from local taverns and convenience stores to the foremost mall locations in the areas. Special promotional tie-ins are still being developed, and will be

The Fall Flipoffs are Epstein's response to growing nationwide interest in competitive pinball, originally set in motion by the PAPA Championships of 1992 and 1993, which drew entrants from 22 states and international media coverage. Noticing that percentages of participating players from the Midwest, South and Far West were increasing, Epstein put out feelers to distributors in those areas. "The response was much more enthusiastic than I had anticipated," he said. "Distributors, even some who were lukewarm to pinball a couple of years ago, were anxious to be included." This year's

to pinoan a couple or years ago, were anxious to be included. In syear's tournaments are only the beginning for Epstein, who would like to be conducting "a minimum of eight" regionals by 1996.

The sponsorship connection with Toy Biz and *Pinball Warrior* was also fortuitous. "A Toy Biz executive saw PAPA 3 coverage on *CBS This Morning* with Harry Smith, and called me," Epstein noted. "They had been looking for a way to introduce their product, and the fit with PAPA's program was a natural." *Pinball Warrior* games will be included in the tournaments' prize packages and Toy Biz will also act as title sponsor for PAPA 4's Youth Division during the February championships

PAPA 3 champion Lyman Sheats, Jr., the "world's greatest pinball player," and under-16 champion Willy McKinney, will be among the PAPA champions visiting the Flipoffs during the first weekend of competition, from Friday, October 29 to Sunday, October 31, and are expected to participate in demonstrations as well as be available to local media.
