



CANCELLATIONS: Nirvana lopped themselves out of the "Lollapalooza '94'' summer tour citing doctor's concerns over lead singer Kurt Cobain's health as the reason. Cobain spent a portion of last month in a coma in Rome due to the ingestion of substances (depending on who your source is as to the identification of said substances) which didn't agree with him. The pull-out has spawned rumors of a break-up of the group which was denied by a spokesman for the group's label, Geffen Records.

Morrissey postponed a trio of concerts—one in Los Angeles and a pair in New York—because the band was not rehearsed to his satisfaction to uphold the standard he has set. The dates, however, have been rescheduled for the month of September (30th for LA; 19-20 NY).

Lenny Kravitz has called a halt to his entire 1994 tour with no explanation forthcoming at press time.

And The Grateful Dead cancelled a single concert in Orlando, FL due to the scrious illness of a band member's father.

THESE GUYS ARE PLAYING: Billy Joel and Elton John have announced that they will team up to co-headline a multi-city stadium tour this summer. The tour kicks off July 8 at Veterans Stadium in Philadelphia, and the concerts will begin with John and Joel performing acoustically together, followed by solo sets with respective bands and an electric grand finale.

NATIONAL HERO AWARD NOMINEES NAMED: Each year the Chesebrough-Pond's/Fabergé National Hero Awards honor individuals who use their celebrity status or expertise to help others. Nominations are made to include five people in categorics: Arts, Business, Entertainment, Lifesavers & Crusaders, Music, Sports and the posthumous Legendary Award. This year's nominees in the Music category are: Mary Chapin Carpenter, a literacy advocate and co-chair of the Country Music AIDS Awareness Campaign; Freddie Jackson for his work in funding battered women's shelters; Willie Nelson for his work with Farm-Aid; Salt N Pepa for their AIDS awareness campaign; and Travis Tritt, the National Spokesperson for the Disabled Veterans of America.

Recipients are chosen by the public via balloting in the May 16th issue of People magazine and the winners will be announced in August with the awards to be presented in a September ceremony in New York.

MCA RECORDS MATCHES: Rhythm, Country & Blues, MCA Records' all-star duets album pairing top stars from country and R&B on classic songs from both genres, brought a group of those stars together at one time on the Universal Amphitheatre stage in Los Angeles for a concert to benefit the Country Music Foundation and the Rhythm and Blues Foundation, two charitable organizations dedicated to the preservation of America's musical heritage.

LIVE JAZZ ON RADIO is much too scarce these days, but two of our major cultural institutions are about to change that. Lincoln Center in New York and the Kennedy Center in Washington have announced that they will present a 26-week series of live radio broadcasts in conjunction with National Public Radio.

The Lincoln Center series, called Jazz At Lincoln Center—The Sound Of The Century, kicked off Saturday April 2 with the world premiere of Wynton Marsalis' first composition for big bands, "Blood On The Fields," performed by Marsalis and Septet. Marsalis is also the director of the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra. The series, hosted by CBS News correspondent Ed Bradley, is broadcast locally on WNYC-FM on Saturday nights at 8 p.m. and re-broadcast on jazz station WBGO-FM on Monday nights at 8. The series will feature everything from small groups to the aformentioned Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra, and wide-ranging jazz styles, including tributes to Louis Armstrong, Miles Davis, Duke Ellington and others.

The Kennedy Center has named Dr. Billy Taylor, pianist/composer/lecturer and activist, as its Director of Jazz. Taylor is organizing a series of 26 weekly NPR broadcasts from the Center. Tapings will begin in late May, with airings set to begin in the fall of 1995. Taylor will feature a number of artists including Frank Wess, Marian McPartland, Jon Faddis and others, mostly in small groups.

MAYNARD FERGUSON'S BIG BOP NOUVEAU band rocked NYC's Blue Note club recently. The Canadian-born trumpet legend leads a group of talented, spirited youngsters who complement his select high-register bursts. Ferguson's always friendly, engaging manner warms the patrons into an attentive state while the band swings through inventive arrangements of be-bop standards like Dizzy Gillespie's "A Night In Tunisia" and Sonny Rollins' "St. Thomas' as well as several originals. The set was also a sampling of the maestro's latest album, Live In London on the Avenue Jazz label.

BASEBALL AND THE BLUES? Well...Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall, on April 15th, will be the setting for a "Baseball Blues" concert. Featuring the Persuasions, David Frishberg and others, the show is billed as "a musical exploration of America's national pastime, featuring baseball history, humor and nostalgia in song." Why not?

THE ALLMAN BROTHERS ARE HOT AGAIN. The group, in one day, sold out eight performances at the Beacon Theater in New York from April 1-10. The band, who also sold out two shows (March 28 & 29) at the Orpheum in Boston, will show up on "Late Night With Conan O'Brien" on April 11, and on "The Tonight Show With Jay Leno'' on May 9. During the first week in May, Epic Records will release the long-awaited Allmans' album Where It All Begins.

Titled 'Male Head & Dove,' the 50x65-centimeter drawing is meant to represent the fragile hope for peace now evident in South Africa, now on the verge of its first-ever multi-race elections. Said Bowie: "I wanted to evoke the fragility of peace which exists in South Africa, but also to imply a positive outcome." After the show, the artwork, as well as three prep drawings, was auctioned off, with proceeds ear marked for Nelson Mandela's Fund For A Free South Africa.

WE'RE NOT HAPPY TO REPORT that Morrissey's sold-out Olympic Auditorium show, originally skedded for last Friday, has been bumped all the way to September 30, owing to what Morrissey said was his band's lack of adequate preparation for the show. Also, last week's Leonard Peltier benefit concerts at the Palladium have been pushed back due to injuries suffered by bassist Timmy C. of headlining band Rage Against The Machine in a mountain-biking accident. The new dates are April 28-29, with Cypress Hill and Quicksand appearing both nights with a special performance by the Beastie Boys. Although previously advertised, John Trudell will not make the rescheduled shows due to prior commitments.

THAT LINE IN FRONT OF TOWER Sunset last Friday that lasted two hours must have been due to some hot new rock band doing an in-store, right? Guess again. The mob scene was created by an appearance of Carol Channing, on hand to promote her new Jazz Baby album and to spread the word on her revival tour of Hello Dolly, coming this fall.

TICKETS FOR ALL 61 DATES of Meat Loaf's upcoming U.S. tour were put on sale at the same time last Saturday, due to what Ticketmaster is calling "overwhelming demand." Nearly all of the tour's available ducats, including those for two L.A.-area dates, were quickly snapped up. This was the first time that Ticketmaster has ever offered an entire tour's tickets at the same time. U.S. sales of the big guy's new MCA album, Bat Out Of Hell II, have topped the 5 million mark.

MUSIC INDUSTRY AIDS CHARITY LIFEbeat has been named as one of the chief beneficiaries receiving choice blocks of tickets for Barbra Streisand's upcoming sold-out tour. The benevolent org will get 500 seats that it can sell for \$1000 apiece. Monies from LIFEbeat activities go to, among others, the T.J. Martell Foundation and the Stand Up Harlem Foundation.

SEATTLE ROCK BAND CANDLEBOX has the distinction of scoring the first-ever gold record award by a Maverick Records act.

It's self-titled debut, which features the MTV hit "You," recently passed 500,000 in sales while the quartet was on the road with Rush. Recent Letterman sparring partner Madonna is a part-owner of Maverick.

Good Lord! What's Huey Lewis done to singer Faith Hill to get this reaction? This moving shot comes to us from last month's NARM convention. Lewis' new Elektra album is due May 10.



RIAA Names March Awards; 48 Disney Titles Included

THE RECORDING INDUSTRY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA'S Gold, Platinum and Multi-Platinum awards packed a wallop last month with 20 Gold Singles, eight Platinum Singles and four Multi-Platinum Singles. There were a total of 43 Gold, 13 Platinum and 20 Multi-Platinum Albums awarded. Jar Of Flies by Alice In Chains on Columbia became the year's second short-form album title to be certified, and that in three categories: Gold, Platinum & Multi-Platinum. A partial list includes:

Pink Floyd's 1973 LP *The Dark Side Of The Moon* hit 13 million in U.S. sales, becoming the fourth top-selling album in music history and the best-selling album ever by a British act. Both Fleetwood Mac's *Runours* and the Eagles' *Their Greatest Hits 1971-1975* are at 14 million. Michael Jackson's *Thriller* holds steady at 22 million.

Pink Floyd was also awarded three Gold albums for A Nice Pair—Piper At The Gates Of Dawn, Atom Heart Mother and Obscured By Clouds, giving them a total of 14 Gold albums and ranking them among the top 10 Gold album achievers of all-time for a group. Ummagumma hit Platinum and Meddle made Double Platinum.

Reba McEntire's Greatest Hits reached sales of two million, making her the first woman in country music history to receive five Multi-Platinum albums. Previously her last three albums made the mark as well as both Greatest Hits collections.

Salt N' Pepa spiced up with their first Double-Platinum for Very Necessary to become the first female rap act to reach the mark.

Four movie soundtracks took awards in March: 8 Seconds, Philadelphia and Jurassic Park mined Gold while Sleepless In Seattle dug into Triple-Platinum. There were 11 first-time Gold-Album achievers including self-titled LPs by Domino, The Jerky Boys, Danzig and Candlebox.

Walt Disney Records, which includes the Disneyland and Buena Vista labels, mined Gold, Platinum and/or Multi-Platinum status on 48 of its animated classics, which included 17 Gold Singles, 10 Platinum/Multi-Platinum Singles, 13 Gold Albums and eight Platinum/Multi-Platinum Albums in March

Highlights of the Disney lode are:

"Bambi" joined Whitney Houston's "I Will Always Love You," Tag Team's "Whoomp! There It Is" and USA For Africa's "We Are The World" in certifying Multi-Platinum for sales of four million.

"Lady And The Tramp" became Disney's fifth Triple-Platinum single, joining "The Jungle Book," "Snow White," "Pinocchio" and "Cinderella."

Nine of Disney's most popular projects made Gold: Bambi, Cinderella, Peter Pan, Pinocchio, Robin Hood, Snow White, Uncle Remus, Pooh's Blustery Day and Pooh's Tigger Too.

Beauty And The Beast became the second best-selling Disney soundtrack, tying with Aladdin at sales of three million.

In the Music Video Longform arena Buena Vista Home Video's Simply Mad About The Mouse featuring various artists took home Gold, Platinum and Multi-Platinum while the Red Hot Chili Peppers' Funky Monks on Warner Music Video made Gold with its 50,000-unit sales.

Counting Crows: Platinum And Everything After

THE COUNTING CROWS WERE FORMED a couple of years ago when singer Adam Duritz and guitarist David Bryson starting performing as an acoustic duo in the coffeehouses around Berkeley, California. As word spread around town that the twosome had hit on an engaging formula that combined elements of The Band, Van Morrison, R.E.M. and the Rolling Stones, musicians began turning up at the duo's gigs, eager to contribute to what was obviously an important band in the making.

Connections were made, with bassist Matt Walley, drummer Steve Bowman, keys player Charlie Gillingham and multi-instrumentalist/part-time member David Immergluck joing Duritz and Bryson to finalize the band's line-up. The rest, of course, is platinum history.

Counting Crows' debut DGC album, August And Everything After, has now sold nearly 2 million copies, buoyed by the runaway success of MTV and radio hit track "Mr. Jones." The album remains in the top 5, moving at a rate of more than 100,000 copies a week...unheard-of numbers, certainly, for a new, relatively unassuming act as Counting Crows.

August And Everything After was produced by L.A. singer/songwriter T. Bone Burnett, a veteran of sessions with Elvis Costello and Bob Dylan and the husband of Virgin Records singer Sam Phillips. Recording took place on a mobile studio at a previously unoccupied Hollywood Hills estate at the suggestion of supporter and former Band leader Robbie Robertson, who had seen the group perform at a Los Angeles benefit for multiple sclerosis patient and songwriter Victoria Williams.

Robertson also had a hand in another of the Counting Crows' early victories, securing the then-unknown group a prestigious support slot at last year's Rock 'N' Roll Hall Of Fame dinner, where Duritz, Bryson and Immergluck were joined by keyboardist Benmont Tench (of Tom Petty's Heartbreakers) for a stunning version of Van Morrison's "Caravan."

Duritz, 29, was born in Baltimore and went to boarding school in Connecticut, but has spent much of his adult life in Northern California. His short, wild dreadlocks and seemingly easy manner belie a singer whose aching tales of disillusionment, frustration and loss harken back to a musical era when musicians were known more for their artistic visions than their rap sheets.

Last year, Duritz told hometown paper the San Francisco *Chronicle*: "If there is any band that I'd like us to emulate, it would be The Band. They were an incredible organic ensemble. They could play emotions." And so can Counting Crows.

Since the fall '93 issue of August And Everything After, the Crows have been on the road, playing countless sold-out club gigs, as well as performing well-received spots on "Saturday Night Live" and "Late Show With David Letterman." And it's these live appearances that indicate the awesome potential of the band. While the focus is unavoidably on Duritz, an enigmatic frontman whose sense of irony and tension on stage are awesome to witness, it's the communal feel of the Crows as a unit that indicate years of affecting music can be expected from this most exciting and talented young band.

TONY TONI TONE: "Leavin" (Wing 855-762)

New single from the three singing T's is this edited version of one of current album Sons Of Soul's best tracks. Featuring Crisp and catchy string arrangements, subtle dj scratches, the boys' usual sharp vocal harmonies and an overall feeling of seasonal freshness (Spring, it would seem, is in the air), "Leavin" is a no-brain add for all urban outlets as well as many top 40 and adult stations and promises to be a hit track with little burnout.

THE POSIES: "Going, Going, Gone" (RCA 62815)

From the hit soundtrack to cute Gen X flick *Reality Bites* comes a new single from cool guitar-pop band The Posies. Like much of the band's DGC-associated work, "Going, Going, Gone" is thick with Beatles-inspired pop awareness, sharp production (this time courtesy of David Bianco) and an irresistible melodic hook that will work well at modern rockers as well as album outlets and adventurous hit stations. A solid track from a solid band.



COWBOY JUNKIES: "The Post" (RCA 62811)

An unusual release from this under-appreciated Canadian outfit, "The Post" was written by Dinosaur Jr's J. Mascis and is Cowboy Junkies in all of their roots-rock glory. While Margo Timmin's left-field vocal performance here doesn't immediately bring the phrase "hit single" to mind, the song's solid arrangement and unique vibe make for an interesting add for rock and AAA stations, though college radio may be where this ambitious tune finds a comfy

BONO & GAVIN FRIDAY: "In The Name Of The Father" (Island 6813)

U2's Bono and former Virgin Prunes frontman Gavin Friday team here for the title track from the Oscar-nominated Irish politipic. Loads of industrial noises and rhythms, Bono's dynamic, progressively powerful vocals and spooky production work from Friday and Tim Simenon give this song a trippy edge that, while not tailormade for radio airplay, will translate into significant action, if for no other reason its singer's résumé. DJs should seek out the remixes.



PICK OF THE WEEK



PHIL COLLINS: "We Wait & We Wonder" (Atlantic 5595)

Collins' latest Atlantic collection, Both Sides, may be near the bottom of the album chart these days, but that doesn't mean that the record is devoid of any good music. As proof, look no further than "We Wait & We Wonder," just released as the title's third single. This one ranks as one of Phil's best efforts, both from a songwriting point of view—the solid arrangement and crafty hook will result in summer-long airplay for the song—and a delivery standpoint, as Collins comes through with all the drama and passion that have made his greatest songs so memorable. And the big, Sears-sponsored tour starts soon.



PHISH: Hoist (Elektra 61628)

This country's foremost Dead-influenced jam band has returned with this, its fifth and arguably best album. More of a spontaneous, free-form vibe permeates this alb, eschewing the experimental nature of some of Phish's recent efforts. Though occasionally venturing too far into influence-worship (as on the dead-on Grateful Dead cop 'If I Could''), Hoist reflects a band hitting its songwriting and style peaks, further expanding the cult band's rabid

■ THE BLAZERS: Short Fuse (Rounder 9043)

The history of East L.A. Chicano roots rockers The Blazers can be traced back to 1971, when the group's guitarists, Ruben Guaderrama and Manuel Gonzales, played together at Roosevelt High. Now, some 23 years later. The Blazers have made their first title for eclectic Boston label Rounder. With Cesar Rosas of Los Lobos handling production chores, Short Fuse is a veritable party-in-a-record, full of infectious blues, brujeria and rockabilly rock strains





■ INFECTIOUS GROOVES: Groove Family Cyco (550/Epic 57279)

Infectious album No. 3 further explores Mike Muir and Robert Trujillo's need for bass speed. And given Trujillo's thick n' nasty way with a 4-string and Muir's newfound skill at writing groove-based thrash rave-ups (as opposed to the punk-based thrash rave-ups he writes for Suicidal Tendencies), this one's the closest that Infectious Grooves have come to reaching hardcore funk heaven. Reach for sick "Cousin Randy" and lead single "Violent & Funky.

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SAUSAGE: Riddles Are Abound Tonight (Interscope 92361)



Sausage is comprised of the original line up of Primus, ultimately doomed by family commitments and other such distractions. Now regrouped, Sausage lay down a much more focused and groove-oriented sound than their nextof-kin, benefitting from drummer Jay Lane's comparatively basic approach and Todd Huth's acid-blues guitar feel. Of course, there's no mistaking Les Claypool's frenzied bass playing or animated vocals. Band may actually find a larger audience than Primus

THE JAZZ BUTCHER CONSPIRACY: Waiting For The Love Bus (Creation/Tristar 57563)

Jazz Butcher has always struggled with its identity, particularly in the U.S., where rave press and U.K.-generated hype has done little to move Yank alt-rock listeners. Of course, Band leader Pat Fish has no interest in being known as spokesman to the so-called alternative generation, preferring to see his slightly warped, mostly beautiful visions of turmoil-driven life as nothing more than great pop music. And he's got a point. Only openminded listeners need board this bus.





MATTHEW SWEET: Son Of A Beast (Zoo 11078)

As Rock n' Roll's consummate Jekyll and Hyde character, Matthew Sweet has a civic responsibility to keep us forever guessing as to which of his equally compelling personalities is going to crop up on a given record. But on Son Of A Beast, Sweet simultaneously reveals his light, pop side (a remix of "Devil With The Green Eyes," Neil Young's "Don't Cry No Tears") and his dark, scary side (a host of raw live tracks). A frightening prospect indeed.

SAMMY HAGAR: Unboxed (Geffen 24702)

Ol' Red brings his Geffen affairs to a close with this well-thought-out greatest hits package covering his solo years 1981-87, with two new tunes also thrown in for good measure. Of the new songs-"High Hopes" and "Buying My Way Into Heaven"-the former is a straight-ahead rocker that wouldn't be out of place on a Van Halen (Sam's current employer) album, while the latter is an angry shot at the televangelists of the world. A fine collection from an old rock pro.



PICK OF THE WEEK



PANTERA: Far Beyond Driven (EastWest 92302) Producers: Terry Date & Vinnie Paul.

It's becoming difficult to believe those rumors that Pantera was originally a lightweight poseur band. Just a quick listen in on the Texas quartet's latest album, particularly first rager "Strength Beyond Strength," should answer any lingering doubts about these boys' mettle. Raw, guttural fury is unleashed here by screaming frontman Phil Anselmo, leaving his band's past efforts shrinking in dwarfed insignificance. Mix in the ever-sharp guitar fireworks of Diamond Darrell, the grooved thunder of bassist Rex and the bulldozer tactics of drummer Vinnie James, and you've got a metal band at the top of its warped game.

PHILIP BAILEY: Philip Bailey (Zoo/BMG 72445-11051-2). Producers: Various.

This multi-layered debut serves up some of the best of Philip Bailey, whose classic falsetto became indelibly etched on consumers' minds through his work with icon group Earth, Wind & Fire. This work—richly diverse melodically, rhythmically and lyrically—closely resembles his complete vision with the help of producer/songwriter collaborations with Chuckii Booker, Brian McKnight, Prince Be of PM Dawn and Nidirah Ali of Arrested Ali. After the McKnight/Bailey midtempo ballad teamwork of lead single "Here With Me," other noteworthy tracks include "Stay Right Here," "Love Me Tonight" and "I Won't Open My Arms."



ORIGINAL FLAVOR: Beyond Flavor (Atlantic Street 7 82508-2). Producer: Ski.

This is a progression from previous material, yet the Original Flavor flava is carefully retained, despite the addition of G-Strong and DJ Chubby Chubb. Like The Pharcyde and Freestyle Fellowship, this group relies on a gregarious mixture of softcore mic flow, humor, quirky grooves and disjointed samples to create a gripping showcase. The title track, "Beyond Flava," is the best example of this funky/weird melange of music. But other tracks support the mix, like "Old School," "Whatchawant," "Stick It Where The Sun Don't Shine," "Nigga Code" and "All That," which features Michelle Mitchell's vocal refrain.

THE TREACHEROUS THREE: Old School Flava (Wrap/Easylee WRA 8128). Producers: Various.

Kool Moe Dee and his posse are back in effect. L.A. Sunshine, Special K and DJ EasyLee bring some of the harmonic/rhythmic mic flow and scratch mixing that made Kool's previous releases quite live. Phat grooves, phatter bass lines and smooth mic work make this a flash from the past and immediately fresh. You can rock it hard on "The Mic Wreckers," get into some scat funk on "Mo Money Moe" and "Ain't Nothin' Changed," and imbibe the jazz-spiced mic sauce of the all-star cast on "We Wit It," which features Grandmaster Caz, Big Daddy Kane, Heavy D, Tito, Melle Mel and Chuck D. Another groove thing on here is Kool & The Gane's "June le Boogie" driven "A True Story" on here is Kool & The Gang's "Jungle Boogie"-driven "A True Story.





YELLOWMAN: Prayer (Ras RASCD 3132). Producer: Simeon Stewart.

Long regarded one of the most important players in the reggae universe, Yellowman is back here with a spiritual and musical mixture of roots and contemporary sensibilities. The title track, 'The Prayer,' is a blend of sweet vocals and dancehall-style chanting. It's the Lord's Prayer, culled from the book of Matthew, but delivered like a gentle tropical breeze. Other tracks of note include the classic "Carolina," the percussive and lilting "Reggae Music" and the hip-hop-flavored skank of "Politician" featuring Daddy Snake.

BRAND NEW HEAVIES: Brother Sister (Delicious Vinyl 2-92319). Producers: **Brand New Heavies.**

While there are several groups that have mixed current hard-edged rhythmic grooves, old-fashioned funk and soulful vocals—all swirled in a live music eauldron—Brit posse the Brand New Heavies have continued to perfect the phenomenon they launched. This latest collection, recorded (live of course) at London's The Rak studios, is the culmination of more complete collaboration with vibrant vocalist N'Dea Davenport, something evident on the album's first single, "Dream On Dreamer." There's some wickedly funky guitar work by Simon Bartholomew on "Ten Ton Take," which also features some fine horn work by Mike Smith (sax), Kevin Robinson (trumpet) and Dennis Rollins (trombone). Davenport also shows up sexy strong on "Mind Trips," and the band wiggles on

WOMACK ON THE MEND: He stopped singing in the middle of a song because his already raspy, yet delicate, vocal instrument had suddenly stopped working. It was March 19 at New York's Beacon Theatre and the show stopped for veteran soul singer/songwriter Bobby Womack. Doctors speculated the cause was throat cancer. "When the doctor said 'throat cancer,' I saw the end of my life before me," Womack later said. "I live to perform, and my life is not worth living without my voice." Womack returned to his Los Angeles home and immediately checked into a hospital, where doctors revised the initial diagnosis and the singer took up treatment to remove non-carcinogenic polyps. Currently recuperating, Womack not only anticipates resumption of his national tour, but in June will release a new album, the aptly-named Resurrection. Hmmm.... The album is due out on Slide Records, a label owned by Rolling Stones member Ron Wood and marketed and distributed internationally by Continuum Records, Wood, Keith Richards, Charlie Watts, Stevie Wonder, rapper May May Ali (Muhammad Ali's daughter) and many other artists turn up as guests on the collection, Womack's first solo work since the mid-'80s.

He also contributed material to the Dangerous/Pump/Quality album Bangin' On Wax featuring the Bloods & Crips. HARMFUL GANGSTA: The "Gangsta Rap" issue and a litany of state legislative measures designed to protect minors from overtly sexual and violent content in all media are beginning to swirl in a cauldron kept hot by the Recording Industry Assn. of America (RIAA). From Alaska to Puerto Rico, the RIAA has either thrown its support behind or tried to influence alteration of existing obscenity laws or establish U.S. Supreme Court case law guidelines for determining what is "harmful to minors." The RIAA has also supported U.S. congressional hearings on gangsta rap and reports that several states are seeking more information on the issue.

The organization's representatives have generally urged legislators to consider the merits of the industry's voluntary labeling practice and to avoid measures that would impose greater cost on record companies and consumers. Case in point would be a pair of measures in Missouri, S.B. 641, that would criminalize the sale of sound recordings or video labeled with a parental advisory sticker (a measure still in committee), and H.B. 1476, which would impose a tax of 50 cents per unit on any sound recording or video sold in Missouri to fund a proposed youth violence-prevention program. The lyrics of gangsta rap have been associated with escalating violence and lawlessness among the nation's youth, and recent congressional hearings on such lyrics have brought the issue to the attention of several state legislatures. For example, in Tennessee a resolution has been introduced to urge radio and cable outlets to refrain from broadcasting gangsta rap. RIAA officials have gone on the record encouraging open dialogue among the music community, consumers, and religious and political leaders. They have, however, fought the scent of censorship.

FESU: "Blind, Cripple and Crazy" (Nuff Nuff/Continuum 12404-

Fesu doesn't focus on battling, which is the early essence of rap. Instead he has his own, slightly off-beat style complete with live drums and keyboards to get his point across. The point focuses on the trials and tribulations of an urban young black male. If you're tired of the crazy MC-eat-MC world, try the refreshing pro-black militancy of Fesu.




GRUPO WAO: Vida De Perro (Sony Tropical CDZ-81235/2)

Merengué, anyone? Spring is in the air and Summer is just around the corner. Grupo Wao's latest album will have a profound effect on those who listen to it. It will put you into a partying mood...a festive mode full of mental pictures of sand, surf and slammir sexy femme fatales. Marvelous merengué from top to bottom. High energy through and through. "Mentira Y Engano" has been surfacing in Puerto Rico with

NEWS FROM JAPAN

THE TOTAL REVENUES of Sony Music Entertainment for the first half of fiscal 1993 (April to September 1993) were, according to a survey conducted by Cash Box Tokyo, \$476 million, 0.05% up over the prior six months while 1.7% down from the comparable six months of the prior fiscal year. Net incomes after taxes were \$68 million, a drop of 22.8% from the comparable six months of the prior fiscal year. Breaking down the total revenues: CDs were \$350 million, 73.6% of the total and 7.27% up over the prior six months while 4.9% down from the comparable six months of the prior fiscal year; MTs were \$11 million, 2.3% of the total, 25% and 26% down from the periods stated above, respectively. A total, including CDs and MTs, was \$361 million, 75.9% of the total, 5.19% up over the prior six months, 5.7% down from the comparable prior fiscal term. Of the total of audio (CD and MT), domestic repertoires were 79.2%, \$286 million, 2.23% up over the prior six months while down 12.2% from the comparable prior fiscal. International repertoires were \$75 million, 20.8% of the total, 22.68% up and 31.45% up over the terms above. Video softwares were \$42 million. 8.7% of the total, 10.6% down from the prior six months and up 27.4% over the comparable prior year. Of the total, video disks were 75% while videotapes reached 25%. The main titles contributing to the total sales were as follows: Domestic repertoires (Single)--"Kimiga Irudakede" (Kome Kome Club), "Kokorozake" (Ayako Fuji), "Shima Uta" (The Boom), "Forever My Love" (Masatoshi Ono), and "Taisetsuna Anata" (Seiko Matsuda). (Album): Junanasai No Chizu (Yutaka Ozaki), Last Teenage Appearance (Yutaka Ozaki), I Will Catch U (Nokko), Mori No Jikan (Nae Yuki) and Donnani Uchinomesaretemo (Izumi Tachibana). International Repertoires (Album: janet (Janet Jackson), Whole New World (Peabo Bryson), Sex And Religion (Via), River Of Dreams (Billy Joel) and Music Box (Mariah Carey).

THE TOTAL SHIPMENTS of video software for January 1994 in Japan, according to the survey conducted by Cash Box's Tokyo office, came in at

\$172 million at wholesale prices, up 9.3% over the comparable month of the prior year. Breaking them down: cassettes were \$102 million, up 12% while disks showed \$52 million, down 21.4% from the same period. In volume the total was 3.869 million units, up 20%. Results by items: cassettes, 1.75 million units, up 6.8%; disks, 1.315 million units, down 17.1%. Of the total, 559 titles were new works, up 10%, while cassettes showed 353 titles and disk titles reached 185, up 29% and down 21.3% respectively for the period

THE TOTAL REVENUES of Warner Music Japan for fiscal 1993 (Nov. 21, 1992 to Nov. 20, 1993) showed a severe drop of 3.5%, \$327 million, from the comparable period of the prior fiscal of \$340 million. This result included three subsidiary companies, EastWest Japan, TDK Records and One Up Music at \$130 million. So, the net of Warner Music Japan was \$200 million, which consisted of domestic repertoires at \$1.001 million, or 50.2% of the total, and international repertoires at \$0.999 million, or 49.8% of the

SHINSEI-DO, ONE OF THE MAJOR wholesalers in the Japanese music industries, has experienced the first loss in annual total sales in its 31st fiscal year (March 1, 1993 to February 28, 1994). According to the company, the total sales in this term were \$725 million, a 5.3% drop from the prior fiscal year of \$765 million. A company source said, "A depressed market for a long time in this country and inactive individual consumptions were two main factors to the sales drop in this term."

EIGHTH JAPAN GOLD DISK GRAND PRIX held here by RIAJ (Record Industries Association of Japan) saw Wands (Polydor/Toshiba EMI) and The Beatles (Toshiba/EMI) awarded Gold Disk prizes in the Artist Section. Prize-winning works are chosen according to sales revenue for 12 months this period based on the stretch from January 20, 1993 to January 20, 1994.

Other works awarded included Best Artists: Zard (Polydor); Chage & Aska (Pony Canyon); T-Bolan, (PLDC); Dreams Come True (Sony); Wands (Polydor/Toshiba EMI).

Grand Prix New Artists: Trf (Crown); Snow (EastWest Japan).

Best 5 New Artists: Class (Apollon); Trf (Crown); Deen (Polydor); Yui Nishiwaki (King); Yasuhiro Yamane (Crown).

Marc Fields (Oxford); I Say Me for a Parable: The Oral Autobiography of Mance Lipscomb, Texas Bluesman as told to and compiled by Glen Alyn (Norton); It's Not About A Salary: Rap, Race + Resistance in Los Angeles by Brian Cross (Verso); The Land Where Blues Began by Alan Lomax (Pantheon); The Memory of All That: The Life of George Gershwin by Joan Peyser (Simon & Schuster); Nothing But the Blues: The Music and the Musicians by Lawrence Cohn (Abbeville); Rhythm and the Blues: A Life in American Music by Jerry Wexler and David Ritz (Knopf); Sassy: The Life of Sarah Vaughn by Leslie Gourse (Scribner's); Stevie Ray Vaughn: Caught In The Crossfire by Joe Nick Patoski and Bill Crawford (Little Brown); and Hank Williams: The Complete Lyrics, edited by Don Cusic (St. Martin's Press).

The three final award books, selected by a jury of pop music critics and authors, will share \$5,000 in awards funded by *Rolling Stone* and BMI. First prize is \$2,500; second prize is \$1,500; and third prize is \$1,000. ANOTHER WORD ABOUT BOOKS: The ASCAP-Deems Taylor Award program is an important series of annual awards presented to American authors and journalists whose books and articles on the subject of music are selected for their excellence. The awards were established in 1967 to honor the memory of the composer/critic/commentator Deems Taylor, who died in 1966 after a distinguished career that included six years as president of ASCAP.

Eligible works must be published in the U.S., in English, during the calendar year 1993. The subject matter may be biographical or critical, reportorial or historical—any form of nonfiction prose about music and/or its creators—not an instructional textbook, how-to guide, or a work of fiction. Paperbacks that were originally published in hardcover are not eligible. Reprints or translations of works that were previously published outside the U.S. and are now being published in the U.S. for the first time are eligible. Program notes and liner notes are also eligible.

Two categories of cash prizes will be presented: \$500 for the best books and \$250 for the best newspaper, journal or magazine articles. Plaques are also presented to the authors and journalists as well as to their respective publishers.

There is no official entry form or fee; however all submissions must include a cover letter containing the following information:

- 1) the title of the book or article;
- 2) the copyright date of the book or the date of publication for the article:
- 3) the name, address and daytime phone number of all authors of the book or article;
- 4) a contact name, address and daytime phone of the publisher or publication in which the article appeared.

FILM REVIEW

Back Beat

THE BEATLES' EARLY HAM-BURG BEGINNINGS and the socalled "Fifth Beatle" Stuart Sutcliffe are the primary focuses in this excellent Gramercy Pictures release. This is as classy a bit of filmmaking as you're going to find; it's got it all, from well-researched and -realized script right on down. My guess would be that even craft services cared about what was going on with Backbeat. Given the subjects and the high quality of production, look for Backbeat to be that most revered and envied of all product: critically and commercially successful.

The script, by director Iain Softley, Stephen Ward and Michael Thomas, is wonderfully balanced, humorous, insightful, touching and

gives its audience credit for thought processes. You know the subjects, probably their latter existence better than this focal time, but—according to the script—that Fifth Beatle gave the early Beatles, through his close soulmate relationship with John Lennon and all that came later, a spiritual backbeat which, unknowingly, influenced a lot of their later work and actions. It is a marvelously interwoven piece of work, more than a biography and certainly not a whitewashing of the times or the principles, going even a couple of steps farther than last year's What's Love Got To Do With It? in dealing more honestly with celebrity lives and their problems on film.

Softley's vision—this became his brainchild after viewing some early Hamburg photos by one of the film's principles—as director is exceptionally presented. He excitingly illustrates a theme—that the music of the era was just as much art as painting—through montage intercutting of the band on stage in grungey German and Liverpudlian dives and Sutcliffe working on canvas alone tied with that early rock and roll. He's given the project a spirit and pace that literally sweeps an audience up and carries it wherever he wants it to go and has also guided some wonderful performances.

Stephen Dorff as Sutcliffe captures the essence of that rare type of being that flashes young; whose life, and presumably talent, is cut short by death. .those people who reach for everything they can wring from life as quickly as they can seemingly because they are inwardly aware of their own short life which, in turn, insures their own immortality. Dorff realizes Sutcliffe's insides, and assures himself of moving up another rung on that ladder of ''hot property.'' Ian Hart presents a youthful, hyper and angry but caring Lennon. In Hart's portrayal we can feel the drive which ultimately made Lennon what he became, with strength and with fear. An excellent job. Sheryl Lee reflects a knowing and understanding portrayal of Astrid Kirchherr, Sutcliffe's German love, the focus of Lennon's jealousy and rages and the photographer whose pictures inspired Softley. Lee is a strong actress and sends the audience out of the theater with a complete portrait of a truly liberated and confident lady in a time when that concept was extremely rare.

Gary Bakewell is a close McCartney look-alike and offers a passionate while petulant portrait of the more diplomatically driven Beatles member. Chris O'Neill is fine as Harrison and Scot Williams takes on the role of drummer Pete Best (era is before Ringo, though he is met briefly).

You won't hear any of the Beatles' classics since this was "before" but you will hear the frantic and searching beginnings of *the Sound* that was, at the time, becoming Rock & Roll: "Long Tall Sally," "Twist And Shout," "Good Golly Miss Molly," "Money (That's What I Want)" and "Rock And Roll Music" (Got a *Backbeat* you can't lose it)" well produced by Don Was.

You can smell the stale beer, cigarette smoke and sweat of rushing bodies in these settings, thanks to Joseph Barrett's production design and his art department and Ian Wilson's wonderful photography.

The fully satisfying film was produced by Stephen Woolley and Finola Dwyer, executive produced by Nik Powell.

Threesome

THE TITLE TELLS IT ALL. And there is, seemingly, no place in the scheme of things for anyone other than this threesome—Lara Flynn Boyle, Josh Charles and Stephen Baldwin—for any other characters in the piece are blatant devices: "Hey you!...Come here. Stand there. Say this. Pick up your voucher at the door. Now let's get back to business. In bed, guys!"

Screenwriter/director Andrew Fleming has fashioned a totally characterdriven piece taking place over a year of college after a mix-up in housing assignments and Lara Flynn ends up rooming with Stephen and Josh. Josh is ''sexually ambivalent'' toward women but has closet hots for Stephen; Lara has the hots for Josh; and Stephen has the hots for anything warm and moist but especially for Lara, and he's friends with roomie Josh. These friends become good friends, then very good friends all at the same time between the same sheets, then the school year is over and they drift away and in a narrative voice-over Josh tells us they don't keep in touch much anymore.

It's a momentary slice of very private life with a few yuks along the way but does anyone outside the threesome care? It never really takes off to soar as a treatise on current sexuality or friendship or co-ed college housing or even sheet cleaning. It provides the opportunity to photograph three nude people in varied settings. I got the feeling that Fleming picked up the inspiration for writing this after watching an outtake of "Sally Jessy," "Oprah" or "A Current Affair" on E!'s "Talk Soup." The characters are only mildly interesting. About all we know of them at the beginning and the end is that they are hormonally-driven, and that's not a lot to keep a character-driven piece interesting for nearly two hours with the climax (pardon the pun) a foregone conclusion. And it's not really racy enough to provide TriStar with a lot of boxoffice draw.

Boyle, as the drama major (hence the—script-wise—open-to-new-stuff stereotypical attitude) and fulcrum of the threesome has some nice moments, some feeling moments, some fun—a sexual arousal scene in a library chipped from the restaurant scene of When Harry Met Sally...—and is very comfortable. Charles, whose studies are as ambivalent as his sexuality—literature, maybe?—has a neat, zaftig appearance which wears well for the role in contrast to the grungy, buffed look of no-nonsense Business major Baldwin. Of the trio, Baldwin comes off as most likeable because the character is more straightforward in beliefs and attitudes. Baldwin the actor makes him likeable with a corresponding straightforward approach to the role

The Regulators

THE ODDS OF A GIVEN BAND "MAKING IT" TODAY are rather sufficiently stacked against it—much less should that band lose an integral member. But such is the case of The Regulators, a rowdy Carson, California-based group whose signing with Polydor/PLG yielded a self-titled debut in 1992—only to suffer the loss of their driving force and principal songwriter, guitarist Jimi Hughes, from a gunshot wound in early 1993.

"We looked like ants after somebody had scattered their trail," says bassist Randy Smith, Hughes' half-brother, of the initial period following the death of The Regulators' leader. They were able to put together a few "tribute" shows with other Southern rock/boogie bands, and then gathered up the resolve to forge ahead with Hughes' legacy "as an inspiration for us to be better."

Their label signing—again like most bands that even get to that point—did not come overnight. Hughes and second guitarist Johnny Barnes, the band's nucleus, originally formed a group known as Smith & Wesson as early as 1980. The evolution of the band through the decade, inspired by and emulating such acts as Molly Hatchet, the Doobie Brothers, Lynyrd Skynyrd and the Allman Brothers Band (and in obvious antithesis to the punk rock of the day), would ultimately find Bobby Bird adding still more guitar, Cliff Smith on vocals and Mark Aceves on drums.

One of Randy Smith's more memorable touring experiences in those days was, in fact, opening for the Allman Brothers in New York City. "They were great guys," Smith recalls. "We partied with 'em backstage, and the people just went nuts for our band."

And the Regulators' similarity to the "guitar army" of Lynyrd Skynyrd was more than just passing. Hughes was "our own (late Skynyrd lead singer) Ronnie Van Zant, in a way," Smith believes. "He was intelligent, but humble, and had it all together...a lot of people loved him." A Skynyrd-like song from the debut album, Last Chance, written by Smith, Hughes and Barnes, may have even held some foreshadowing of their own particular tragedy, with lines like "I'm grateful for the friends I have/and the special ones that passed" and "One by one we leave the stage/but still the show goes on/it's hard to realize/our time is not that long."

But Smith says the band members have collectively taken up the reins of their career. They've added a keyboard player to the mix, with a "Billy Powell-like sound" (another Skynyrd reference), instead of attempting to replace Hughes, and "everyone's writing songs, in homage to him," says Smith. And live appearances this year include a perennial Regulators favorite, the massive Sturgis annual biker gathering at Buffalo Chip Stadium & Campground in Sturgis, South Dakota on Aug. 8-13, where they'll jam each day with the likes of Confederate Railroad, Marshall Tucker and as-yet unconfirmed Lynyrd Skynyrd (tix @ area code 605-892-2200). New demos from the band are in the works, and hopefully by year's end recording on a follow-up will have begun, which Smith promises to be "even more rockin", more boogiein than the first...we'll do it for him."

UNIVERSAL AMPHITHEATRE, LOS ANGELES, CA—The latest high-profile purveyor of hip-hop-meets-jazz stylings is Us3, the New York-based brainchild of London jazz producers Mel Simpson and Geoff Wilkinson. The group's debut Blue Note/Capitol album, Hand On The Torch, recently spent time in the top 100, propelled by the crossover radio success of the combo's first single, "Cantaloop (Flip Fantasia)," a smooth, midtempo jazz track that heavily samples Herbie Hancock's "Cantaloupe Island."

What separates Us3 from many like-minded fusion acts, such as Digable Planets and Gang Starr's Guru, is its unfettered access to the entire back catalog of Blue Note Records, one of jazz music's most revered labels, an arrangement that resulted from Simpson and Wilkinson's earlier, unauthorized sampling of Blue Note's artists. Instead of taking legal action, Blue Note signed the duo to a record contract.

At the Universal Amphitheatre, at the second of two nights opening for pop-reggae act UB40 (reviewed in N.Y. here previously), Us3 proved to be a talented, likeable group, deftly combining raps of self-confidence, tolerance and justice with tasty recreations of the sampled classic works, from the likes of Thelonious Monk, Art Blakey and Hancock, that are found on the album.

On numbers like "Just Another Brother," a song that rails against the endless cycle of poverty and violence in black society. Us3 tackles subjects common to many rap acts but rises above the genre's usual obnoxious bravado with its accompanying slick jazz arrangements.

Other stand-out tracks included the pop infectious "Tukka Yoot's Riddim," featuring Jamaican toaster Tukka Yoot, the up-beat "Make Tracks," featuring tasty trumpet stings from Dominick Glover, and "Cantaloop," which received a warm, surprised response from a UB40 crowd that probably didn't expect to know songs by the opening act.

Occasionally, the youth of the players involved was apparent as they attempted, with varying success, to cop lieks made famous by some of jazz music's biggest names. That small criticism aside, though, Us3's ambitious, satisfying musical style is an important progression for both rap music—which, in light of recent headline-grabbing shenanigans by many of its acts, is certainly in need of an image enhancement—and jazz, which has been fighting for years to make inroads with contemporary music listeners seemingly alienated by the genre's perceived elitism.

Lawrence Accused of Aggravated Assault

Lawrence was in a truck with his brother Stewart, the driver of the vehicle who was charged with criminal responsibility for helping his brother follow the youths and leave the scene. Tracy Lawrence was also

charged with criminal impersonation of a police officer after police found a badge and identification card for "Captain Tracy Lawrence" naming a nonexistent police department in the truck.

Lawrence's lawyer Jack Lowery said the confrontation began when his client, traveling on Interstate 40, was shot at from another car. Police have said they found no evidence that the occupants of the car fired at Lawrence. But for whatever reason, Stewart Lawrence followed the car onto Leeville Pike and into a residence driveway where Tracy allegedly fired twice into the air and proceeded to drive off. Police stopped the two about 10 miles away and brought them to Wilson County Jail before being released on \$5,500 bond each. A hearing is set for May 2 in Wilson County General Sessions Court.

Gaylord Entertainment Co. Tries To Expand

NASHVILLE—Gaylord Entertainment Co. said it is aggressively seeking to expand the Opryland Music Group (OMG), its music publishing operation, through the purchase of other music catalogs.

Jerry Flowers, formerly executive director, has been promoted to vice president and will oversee the expansion efforts, according to OMG President Jerry Bradley. The expansion of OMG will come in the form of an aggressive search for additional song catalogs and individual song copyrights, as well as the signing of additional staff songwriters.

"There are some fabulous independent catalogs and some great unaffiliated single songs," Flowers said. "We hope OMG's style and reputation, along with our proven success in marketing our current catalog, will be attractive to any owners who might contemplate selling their catalogs."

Flowers added that the search will begin in Nashville because of OMG's country music experience, but acquisitions will not necessarily be limited to country product.

An upbeat song that doesn't take itself too seriously, and McEntire's bluesy vocals make it that much better.

This uptempo number is off the album Every Little Word, and with Ketchum's vocals, which are suited perfectly for this song, and a catchy beat it'll do well. Ketchum co-wrote the song with Al Anderson and '(Tonight We Just Might) Fall In Love Again' is nothing to get too excited about, but Ketchum's distinctive vocals make it worth a listen.

■ TURNER NICHOLS "Come Saturday Night" (BNA 62819)

You've got to hand it to these guys; they not only perform this tune with great heartfelt vocals, but wrote it as well. "Come Saturday Night" isn't your typical "I just lost my woman" tune—rather Turner Nichols makes you believe it, and that's something there seems to be a shortage of these days. A job well-done for Zack Turner and Tim Nichols.





■ BRUCE HAYNES "Don't Want To Hurt Anymore" (Cheyenne 9091)

Off his Heavely High album, Haynes sings in a sincere fashion about the inner pain of lost love. A tender ballad with tender vocals and a sweet steel guitar make this single worth listening to. Give Haynes a lot of credit, he also co-wrote this tune—along with every other song on his album.

KEN MELLONS Ken Mellons (Epic 53746)

A heavy, heavy eross between Hank Williams Jr. and borderline John Anderson, Mellons' deep country vocals will certainly add commercial ability to songs like his already successful first release, "Lookin' In The Same Direction" and bar-drinking party songs like "Workin' For The Weekend" and "Keepin' It Country." Whether a benefit or a hindrance, this guy sounds just like Hank Jr. on the fast cuts, but has a little more distinctfulness on the slow singles like "The Pleasure's All Mine" and "Seven Lonely Days (Makes One Weak)." Mellons is more than just a singer; he's also credited with co-writing nine out of the ten cuts.



MERLE HAGGARD Merle Haggard 1994 (Curb 77636)


Haggard, who has been a country idol and influence for many of today's entertainers, has generated, for lack of a better word, an "average" project. Haggard wrote or co-wrote eight songs off this 11-track album, and latter cuts like "Bye, Bye Travelin' Blue" and "Solid As A Rock" do have commercial appeal. Diehard Haggard fans will appreciate it, but it's hard to tell what today's country listener will think of songs like "Set My Chickens Free" or "What's New In New York City."

■ RESTLESS HEART Matters Of The Heart (RCA 66397)

Put together tender ballads, great vocals, a high level of production and songs about small towns, and what do you get? Restless Heart's Matters Of The Heart. The album has some uptempo toe-tappers in "You're A Stronger Man Than I Am" and "Baby Needs New Shoes," but the unhurried pace of songs like "Hometown Boy," "Mind Over Matters Of The Heart" and "Sweet Whiskey Lies" best capture the album's spirit.


TIM MCGRAW Not A Moment Too Soon (Curb 77659)



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"DYING TO LIVE": Second Big Hit for Paula McCulla

The Artist

A native of Reading, Pennslvania, Paula McCulla has been singing gospel music since she was seven years old. Even in high school she wanted to be a gospel singer, and sang with her father and cousin before heading to Florida Bible College, where she continued her music profession. While at college she also had the opportunity to explore her other love-studying the Bible.

Paula had prayed for an opportunity in radio and soon had her prayers answered. This led to television opportunities and eventually attendance at the National Religious Broadcaster's convention, where she caught the eye of evangelist E.J.Daniels. Paula became part of Daniels' worldwide crusade for a year.

In 1980 Paula married. During the early years of her marriage she set aside the sing-

ing and began spending more time on songwriting. When her husband took a job in Nashville in 1984, Paula made the best of the opportunity to learn and improve her songwriting abilities. It was here she also recorded her first album for an independent label. Although the label folded because of investment setbacks, her singing and songwriting caught the attention of Todd Payne and Bill Traylor of Cheyenne Records. A year and half later Paula became one of the charter members of Cheyenne Records' roster of Christian Country artists.

Paula lives in Hermitage, Tennessee with her husband, Paul, and two children, Megan and Tyler. She is excited about the Christian Country/Positive Country movement. She wants to keep improving as an artist and songwriter, and "reach as many people as I can with my music and go as far as the Lord wants me to go."

The Songwriter

Paula McCulla the artist is also the songwriter of "Dying to Live." The song came at a time when Paula was becoming frustrated with trying to make it as a writer and artist. Her move to Nashville had given her the opportunity to improve her skills as a writer, but she wasn't having the commercial success for which she had hoped. One day, while sitting at the piano, she recommitted herself to the Lord and totally turned over her singing and songwriting career to Him to use as He wanted. "Dying to Live" began developing.

The Song

"Dying to Live" is the second release from the album You Tell Me on music label Cheyenne. The first release "Pull the Wool" was also on the Cash Box Positive Country charts. The producer was Eddie Kilroy; executive producer was Todd Payne.



Country Trail Band and Wim Pots In the Eve of the Storm (Dureco 1159272)

The Country Trail Band from The Netherlands deliver their Christian message with a contemporary country sound much in the same vein as

Diamond Rio. They seem equally at home with up-tempo songs such as "It's Not What We Say" or slower ballads such as "In The Eye Of The Storm." The duet and harmony vocals are outstanding as is lead vocalist Wim Pots, who also wrote nine of the songs. It's an album that's loaded with songs that have a message for everyday life. The album contains 16 songs altogether, so it is somewhat longer than the norm. Three or four of the weaker songs could have been left off and this still would have been a quality album. However, even these songs were delivered with feeling and do lend themselves to the stated purpose of the album—"The music is country, the message is Christ."
