PRIVATE PACTS BLUES: House Of Blues and Private Music have joined together to form The House Of Blues Music Company, a joint venture funded by BMG, announced Ron Goldstein, Private Music president/CEO and Isaac Tigrett, founder/CEO of House of Blues Entertainment, Inc.

The label's philosophy continues House Of Blues' celebration of the blues culture by identifying, cultivating and signing new blues-influenced artists as well as traditional blues projects. The joint venture will use Private Music as the marketing and support structure including sales, promotion, publicity, creative services and business affairs for the new label. HOB will be responsible for artist signings, recording productions and publicity and will maintain its own in-house staff.

Initial staff for the HOB record label will include a general manager, marketing/product director and A&R director. In addition, **Kiva Studios**, a state-of-the-art recording facility in Memphis, TN, will become the official in-house studio for the label. It will be renovated and launched as House Of Blues Studios by February 1995.

A CD FOR PYTHON 25TH ANNI: Virgin Records will commemorate the 25th anniversary of Monty Python with the September 6 release of a six-CD box set of their material, including sketches never previously released in the U.S.

The Instant Monty Python CD Collection will include such Python pieces as "The Parrot Sketch," "The Cheese Shop," "The Spanish Inquisition," material from the Python films and songs such as "The Lumberjack Song" and "Every Sperm Is Sacred." Accompanying the set will be a 40-page color booklet.

"Monty Python's Flying Circus' first aired on Britain's BBC-TV on October 5, 1969. The group consisted of John Cleese, Eric Idle, Michael Palin, Terry Jones, Terry Gilliam and the late Graham Chapman.

MERCURY RELEASING CASABLANCA: Mercury Records will release *The Casablanca Records Story* (Casablanca/Chronicles), a four-CD/four-cassette boxed set which will feature some of the biggest and most influential tracks in dance music history September 13.

The music included will run from the beginnings (Donna Summer's 17minute "Love To Love You, Baby") to its later successes (Irene Cara's "Flashdance" and Michael Sembello's "Maniac") and will contain over five hours' worth of digitally re-mastered music. A 48-page booklet will be included in the set.

PRESLEY TRIBUTE OCTOBER 8: Avalon Attractions, PolyGram Diversified Entertainment (PDE) and Elvis Presley Enterprises (EPE) have joined forces to produce an entertainment tribute honoring Elvis Presley on October 8 at the Pyramid Arena in Mcmphis, TN. *Elvis Aaron Presley*—*The Tribute*, will be broadcast live on pay-per-view and will mark the first event of this kind approved by the Presley estate. The lineup of talent will be announced shortly.

The format of the show, according to EPE president Priscilla Presley, will be charitable and benefit organizations such as St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and T.J. Martell Foundation.

The production team assembled includes musical director Don Was, director Louis J. Horvitz and producer Allen Newman.





Butt Seriously...Sir Mix-A-Lot's Humor Belies His Business Savvy

SIR MIX-A-LOT PUT "SEA-TOWN" on the rap map in the mid- to late '80s with a string of independently-released Gold and Platinum albums and singles. After his relationship with Seattlebased Nastymix Records soured, Mix inked a deal in 1991 with Rick Rubin's Def American Records (now American Recordings), distributed by Warner Bros. Despite his track record, Mix-A-Lot had remained somewhat anonymous outside the Pacific Northwest. But his double Platinum album, Mack Daddy, featuring the Grammy-winning single, "Baby Got Baek," ehanged all that.

Ask him about his independent label, Rhyme Cartel, and his deal with Warners, and he'll let you know he's a mack in business, too.

Ask him about his in-home, 28-track studio, or the Quadra 950 Macintosh with Pro-Tool Program that Mix used to produce his new album, Chief Boot Knocka', and he sounds more like a computer technician than a rapper.

Nearly sample-free with Kraftwerk-inspired, bassdriven anecdotes about Sir Mix-A-Lot's scxploits and boardroom savvy, the new LP is clover and

funny-trademark Mix-A-Lot. A couple days before his album hit, we talked to Mix, who said he had his fingers erossed

Cash Box: You've never been afraid to try new things. You released a Black Sabbath cover, which appeared on your first album, Swass. Then you did the Mudhoney collaboration, and Flea cameos on your new project. Are rock and metal big influences?

Sir Mix-A-Lot: Not really...the Black Sabbath cover was the biggest mistake of my career. It did okay, but I think it was too obvious that we were underestimating the intelligence of white record buyers.

Like trying to come up with another "Walk This Way"?

Trying to do something rock because we think, "Ah, here's the way to cross-over." From the time it left the pressing plant, I had a sour taste in my mouth about it. If it had blown up, I think I would have gotten more [flack] for it, but it sold like 100,000 singles and kind of fizzled, and "Posse On Broadway'' carried that album. It could have been a bigger career mistake if it had blown up.

What about the more recent cut, "Freak Mama," on the Judgment Night soundtrack?

Now that was different. We were just clowning around with two different genres which are a lot the same, even though the music sounds so different...the anti-establishment stuff. When someone said Mudhoney, "from Seattle," and I heard the song, which was fast... I said, "This is a challenge." I had a lot of fun. I know this sounds goofy coming from an artist who's foeused on money 90% of the time, but I liked the way they didn't promote [the album], just let it happen and didn't shove it down anyone's throat. And Flea?

We were talking about the bassline to "Sleeping Wit My Fonk." I love the old Bootsy bassline [the song samples Collins' "Pinocchio Theory"], but it didn't have that Bootsy slap-and-pop feel. Rick Rubin, who produced the Chili Peppers, came up with the idea [of Flea's appearance], and I said, "Yeah, if you can get him." To be honest, the riff you hear in the song is actually just little samples of his rolls and fills, which are super in my opinion. You don't know how bad I was itching to sample "Give It Away Now," but I didn't think I could do the song any better than they did, so I just left it alone. Mixing genres can have great results.

[Groups] in metal and rap both tend to be scared to do it because we think we might lose the hardcore purist fans...which may be true or not.

Speaking of which, you've never really worried about that kind of labelling-being "hardcore" or "real" with all your music. You addressed that on the last album, and on this one, too ("What's Real").



Well, there's too much posing in rap. Like we have some rappers who are "real" gangstas, but we have more "fronting" like they are...big nerds with drum machines and thick glasses. What I'm about is, I want to keep the "entertainment" in entertainment. I'm tired of looking at rap shows where a guy grabs his nuts and walks from side to side for two hours. I'm trying to do things to ehange everybody's impression of what rap should be. Grandmaster Flash and Sugar Hill used to go in all different directions. Now, if you're not saggin' and flippin' every mutha off, you're not "real." Or you lose respect. That's bullshit to me.

Right. Now, what about the deal with Warners? Are you happy?

Definitely. My ehecks are on time. They're big. When 1 sold a million records on an independent 1 always wondered, "What would I get if I was on a major?"

But wouldn't you make more money per record on an indie label?

It's only true if you own the indie label. I was thinking that when 1 got to a major I'd make less

money, but I was only making a buck, or maybe a buck and a quarter through Ed Loeke [CEO of his former label, Nastymix]. Right now, if I sell a CD, I'm over \$2! If it goes over a million, I get damn-near \$3 at that point! I bust my ass to get it, too. I don't throw them no bullshit albums. Yeah, sometimes we have to go down and argue with the lawyers at Warner Bros., but that's business. When I walk in the office, they don't offer me a "40" [40-ounce malt liquor], they don't try to change the way they talk ... "Was-sup, homeboy-ee!"...none of that shit.

Under your deal, Rick Rubin has first right of refusal for each artist on Rhyme Cartel, but if he and Warner Bros. doesn't take them in 30 days, you can shop them.

Right. My deal with American Recordings is only exclusive for the services of Sir Mix-A-Lot. If you want to make a guy put out an album he doesn't like, it's gonna flop. If Rick doesn't like it, I'd rather take it elsewhere. Who's on the roster?

Jazz Lee Alston, Kid Sensation, E-Dawg...we're taking E-Dawg through different channels, because we think if he goes through Warner Bros., he's gonna offend a lot of people, especially after the problems they had with Ice-T. He grew up in a gang and all that, but he's not your typical gangsta rapper. Rick Rubin passed on it. I think he thought it was gonna be another shoot-'em-up, bang-bang album, and when it comes out I think he's going to regret it.

How often are you compared to Luke?

Never. I love Luke, he's a hell of a businessman, but [people] know the difference between "Give me a sister, I can't resist her, red beans and rice did miss her'' [from "Baby Got Back''] and "Shake that pussy, bitch ... ". Just a little...I meant more on a business tip.

Definitely, as far as that's concerned...a lot of people ask us the same questions: "How can you go from the studio into the boardroom?" It's important for people to see that side of us, because the problem with rap is, it's almost cool to be stupid. It's cool to drink beer, smoke weed...make me two or three thousand dollars, go to the bank and buy a pound of weed. That's what a racist wants to make an example of.

Last question. Most of the hip-hop community took "Baby Got Back" as a playful jam that questioned white anorexic standards of beauty. "Put 'Em On The Glass'' [the first single from Chief Boot Knocka'] goes a little further. Do women ever call you a "sexist pig" for your songs?

I don't hear it that often, but with "Baby Got Back" I mostly heard it from white, Republican, middle-aged males who thought they knew what black women wanted to hear. How can you know what all women want to hear? I've only got four minutes to do a song, and "Baby Got Brains" would not have been interesting. There's messages in every song, but I keep it humorous.

90 M.P.H.: Mackframalama (Madsounds/Motown 31453). Producers: Various.

90 M.P.H. is a unique player in the universe that has become Madsounds Records. This Atlanta group provides textures, beats, groove and some positive noise in varying degrees throughout this 11-track album. On some tracks (like "Oh What A Night," "Hang Around") this group has more of a hip-hopped R&B feel. But there is considerable flava on the straight-up hip-hop tip. Progressive textures abound on tracks like

the title track ("Mackaframalama"), "Heidi's A Ho" and the jazz/trance-inflicted "Weakness." Smooth, Ejip & Nick blow it up.

POPPA DOO: Da Saga Continues (DuuMark/CMBR Critique 14420). Producers: D-Ray & Poppa Doo.

This crew has been listening to the most unique jazz and progressive-textured hip-hop and musically has come up with an identity that is truly their own. Poppa Doo claims Snoop, 2 Pac and Ice Cube as inspirations. And you can hear various components of his disc heroes on each track. There are more than a few that seem like they can establish this 22-year-old New York native who has honed his craft in Atlanta, GA. "Life Of A llustler," the



first single ("Walk Like a Play-A") and the prologue ("Da Jack") distinguish this homage to the idiom.

LADAE: the moment (Island/Polydor 314 523 040). Producers: Hitmakers.

Contemporary R&B vocal stylings have a chilling similarity these days (everybody wants to duplicate the successes of Boyz II Men, Silk, Shai or Jodeci). But Ladac manages to combine New Jack sensibilities with traditional rhythm & blues. Tone Wilson as a lead singer for this quartet alternately shines and demonstrates that this outfit will grow into the big shoes they are designing for themselves. "Deep Down," "Be My Luv," "Fallin' Back" (because of its unique sonic qualities), "So Far Away," and "Without The Rain" can grab attention.


RON BANKS & L.J. REYNOLDS: 2 Of A Kind (Life LR 78003). Producers: F.L. Pittman & Rick Balentine.

Let's ignore their history (they are the legacy of The Dramatics). Even that ignorance can't displace this duo's straight-up and down R&B vocal and production magic. This is adult contemporary with a capital "A" for adult. But most of the music is accessible beyond trite and confining assignations. Production shimmers throughout this work, especially on tracks such as "Aces (Instrumental Interlude)," "Maddy (Album Version)," "Our Day Will Come," "Smooth Sailin'," "Finishing Touch," and "Blessings (A Tribute To Alvertis Isbell)."

PICK OF THE WEEK

MC EIHT FEATURING CMW: We Come Strapped (Epic Street) EK 57696, Producers: MC Eiht & DJ Slip.

Video has not killed this star, which is in effective evidence by the high debut of this album. MC Eiht has become the most wanted rapper from Compton, which apparently provides a compendium of overbearingly violent stories for the tomes on this 15-track collection. In the absence of a pop charting single, Eiht created a blazing buzz while still in studio: people knew he was doing the album and drooled with money in hand to buy it. He also invited name acts like Redman and Spice 1 to finish off the pop-pop-pop to the cranium. "Def Wish III," "Take Take 2 With Me," Strapped," all provide compelling cache.

N II U also celebrated the national launch of Atlanta-based fanzine *Trafija*. FUGEES (TRANZLATOR CREW): "Nappy Heads" (Ruffhouse/Columbia CSK 6427).

Incredibly literate, and coy, this is the track that could do for the Fugees what "Tennessee" did for Arrested Development. Neither mix of the track is beatheavy, but the mie work is better than you might hear from anybody else on the planet. This Crew truly translates vernacular with whimsy and ease. "Vocab (intrumental)" is a trance-inspired bonus.

EXTRA PROLIFIC: "Brown Sugar" (Jive 01241 - 42199).

The acoustic bass/percussive intro makes you think homeboy Extra might come with some philosophically correct (he does mention Socrates) diatribe on the culture. But this is about "goin' drama" with the homegirl of choice. This man is smooth; the click track is totally engaging and does little to sully the libido. All Brown Sugar should be this sweet.

📕 READY TA ROLL: "Drug Game" b/w "Taste The Flavor" (Pep PC 0953).

The title tells most of the story on this first single from the Jersey City erew. The groove is tireless even if the mic work does not always seem inspired. But make no mistake, these guys have got some knowledge to bring to the party. The noise is there, and you don't mind that the technique is not always innovative. "Taste The Flavor" is funky in a street-corner kinda way.

 FRANCIS DUNNERY: "Homegrown" (Atlantic 5764)

Current Robert Plant sideman (and former member of also-ran Brit rock outfit It Bites) Dunnery strikes an R&B-meets-Peter Gabriel stance here, sprinkling tasty organ and keyboard stings and sharp drum lines throughout this bouncing, semi-funky ditty. Familiar sounding vocal approach will ease programmers' minds that care to add this intriguing piece but are hesitant given Dunnery's low profile. Song's ending nicks a bit of the Rolling Stones' "Satisfaction."

EDIE BRICKELL: "Good Times" (Geffen 19723)

From Brickell's first, post-New Bohemians solo effort, *Picture Perfect Morning*, comes this silky adult ballad that proves what we've always said about Edie and her underappreciated soulful talent. Featuring a (presumably) intimidating co-vocal with the big man, Barry White (who answers the question, "How low can you go?"), "Good Times" is a surprising yet satisfying bow from solo Brickell and will be embraced by adult formats, with soft top-40s and even a few album outlets also sampling.

GREEN JELLY: "Slave Boy" (Zoo 14148)

Those costumed wackos that brought you "Three Little Pigs" return with an S&M-flavored taste of their forthcoming Zoo album, 333. Naughty back-and-forth between male and female vocalists makes for good, semi-clean fun that looks to make top-40 a playground for these fetish-loving deviants.



EVERYTHING BUT THE GIRL: "Rollercoaster" (Atlantic 5687)

Self-produced track from EBTG's fourth long-player, *Amplified Heart*, looks to give this very deserving British band its long-promised Stateside breakthrough. Partners Tracey Thorne, whose smooth vocals always bring a smile, and songwriter Ben Watt work perfectly in synch here, crafting a lovely A/C entry that should make a big enough buzz to warrant crossover on both top-40 and alternative stations.



HARRY CONNICK, JR.: She (Columbia 64376)

Connick rolls up his sleeves here and dispenses with 60 minutes of New Orleans-inspired funk, a la Dr. John. A loose, improvisational spirit fuels *She*, giving such songs as the Bruce Hornsby-ish "Between Us," the horn-filled first single, "(I Could Only) Whisper Your Name" and the mystical instrumental "Joe Slam And The Spaceship" an engaging vibe that, despite the disparate ingredients, makes for Harry's most fulfilling release since 1990's *Lofty's Roach Souffle*. A man of many surprises, Harry Connick, Jr., it seems, was saving his best trick for last.

LOST TRIBE: Soulfish (High Street 10327)

Second album from this super-talented, New York-based jazz-rock fusion band (their publicist says "Ornette Coleman meets Led Zeppelin") is even more engaging than the first. The music here smoothly flows between delicate jazz glides, serious hard-rock blasts and everything in-between. The five members all have long, impressive résumés and somehow find room here to include most every possible musical style and inclination. A must-see band live, Lost Tribe have, with *Soulfish*, reinvigorated what was becoming a stale fusion scene.

THE MASK: Music From The Motion Picture (Chaos 66297)

Lively collection accompanies Jim Carrey's new laugher and is as non-stop-go as the film. From Carrey's pop-salsa "Cuban Pete" to Fishbone's update of Louis Jordan's "Let The Good Times Roll," something for most everyone. Also of note, Tony Toni Tone's jumpin' "Bounce Around," future single "Who's That Man" from Xscape and Vanessa Williams' slinky "You Would Be My Baby."

OZRIC TENTACLES: Arborescence (IRS 29486)

Third full American release from prolific Brit hippic-jam-ambient-space-prog band (this is their 12th recording overall) is a warlock's brew of '70s-inspired, '90s-aware

exploratory musical excursions that go where no band has gone before. Impressive instrumental voyages that borrow equally from carly Pink Floyd, the Grateful Dead *and* Focus (among many others) make for mighty fine listening. The band recently finished its first U.S. tour.



GILBY CLARKE: Pawnshop Guitars (Virgin 39567) Guns N' Roses guitarist Clarke makes his solo debut with this boot-knockin' round-up of nine originals and two covers. Featuring guest turns from the other members of GNR, as well as Skid Row's Rob Affuso, former Pixie Frank Black and guitarist Waddy Wachtel (who also produces the alb), the songs range from the cool country-rock fusion of "Skin & Bones" to an anxious run at The Clash's "Jail Guitar Doors" to the classic bad-boy tome "Tijuana Jail." Less than appealing: AxI Rose's backing vocal's on a cover of the Rolling Stones' "Dead Flowers." A solid first effort.

ALICE COOPER: The Last Temptation (Epic 52771) Yikes! Alice is back and as darkly engaging and theatrical as ever. Released in conjunction with a series of Marvel Comics books, The Last Temptation is Cooper's latest trip into the dark, foreboding world of supernatural fantasy and evil vs. evil-er. Best tracks here feature the songwriting and singing talents of Soundgarden's Chris Cornell: "Unholy War" is a straight-up commercial rocker, while "Stolen Prayer" features some decidedly devilish back-ups from Cornell.



ENGINE ALLEY: Engine Alley (Mother 521-235)

There must be something in the water at Dublin's Windmill Lane studios. Something that gives albums that are recorded there a flowing, spacious quality that's most enjoyable. Engine Alley looks like your standard-issue rock band on paper, but on the group's debut, a keen sense of songwriting sense (much of it inspired by mid- and late-'60s pop groups) as well as a clever feel for dynamic restraint make for a entry well worth notice.

STEVE PERRY: For The Love Of Strange Medicine (Columbia 44287) Producers: James "Jimbo" Barton and Steve Perry

Former Journey singer Perry's second solo effort comes a full 10 years after his first, but was well worth the wait. Featuring a much more cohesive sound than 1984's *Street Talk*, this new one walks the same path as that walked by his old band and will find instant acceptance with the old fans. New listeners will also enjoy this set's mix of straight-ahead poprock and sweeping ballads—the latter, of course, Perry's

S.O.B.'S CENTER STAGE FOR NMS-New York City, once more, played host town to the 1994 New Music Seminar. In the last several confabs, NMS has been making a con-

siderable effort to develop their mission statement, with exposure and showcasing of new, up-and-coming artists regardless of genre. Moreover, a considerable effort is being made to focus on the quantum pool of talent that exists within the Latin American market. All levels of musical transformations within the Latin genre were given an opportunity to show their wares, from pop, rock, rap, hip-hop, salsa, Brazilian, Tropical/Latin Jazz and Tejano/Country Western to what I call "Root-Raving" (I'll soon explain).

First off, a delicious presentation at S.O.B.'s featuring Quetzal and Nil Lara. Quetzal, an eclectic group of musicians based in the New England area, are a superb example of "world beat" fusionistic music. They pumped several tunes from their latest album Ancestros: "Leno Verde" ("Green Wood", not a new late-night talk-show host), "Ancestros," and "ChiCha," their collective sampling of all the diverse musical traditions that exists in the Americas and beyond. Quetzal homogenizes several styles of South American and Eurocentric melodious rhythms with an exuberant, non-stop level of energy (my definition of "Root-Raving"). Quetzal's brand of music is more than eclectic or rhythmic...it's spiritual, it's all cultures existing as one. That's univeral music.



Next up was Lara and his Beluga Blues Band. Miamian/Cuban-American Lara simply turned the house out. Lara is absolutely an original in every sense of the word. His style, his music comes from the heart, the blending of his rich Hispanic musical heritage with rock, pop, blues and folk. Lara and crew slammed seven tunes from his latest album on Beluga Blue Records (soon to be on Capitol Records) entitled My First Child: "I Will Be Frce," "How Was I To Know," "My First Child," "A King's Throne," "Sunshine," "Love Let Go" and "Vida Mas Simple." Nil Lara absolutely destroys

FILM REVIEWS

Castle Rock's North Goes South

A SATIRIC LOOK AT KIDS' FREE AGENTRY would seem to be right up Castle Rock and director Rob Reiner's alley, given his background working with kids and his wit. There are moments on screen that are funny, but they would have been funnier-to-hilarious on TV, which is where *North* really belongs. Maybe, had Reiner and author of the book from which *North* was culled, Alan Zweibel, gotten this project done when they originally discussed it 10 years ago, it could have played out on the big screen. But, of course, the muscle to gct it done wasn't there at that time, and 10 years is a long time for a dated premise.

Zweibel's background as one of the original "Saturday Night Live" writers and that show's format heavily influenced the structure of the screenplay, co-written with longtime Reiner cohort Andrew Scheinman (*Stand By Me, Harry..Sally, A Few Good Men*). It is skit-oriented with send-up references to movies, TV, headlines and some situations going back in time—a musical number with Reba McEntire and Dan Aykroyd to the "Bonanza" theme as well as echoes of "The Ozzie And Harriet Show" and "Leave It To Beaver." Sometimes it seems their guide-on is "so much to cram and so little time." But it's going to play well on cable and VCR.

Production designer J. Michael Riva had fun colorfully pulling everything together from Hawaii to Alaska, Texas, Pennsylvania, Africa and China (have I missed any place?—probably.)

The cast consists of a multitude of cameos from Jason Alexander, Julia Louis-Dreyfus, Alan Arkin, Alan Rachins, Aykroyd, McEntire, Lauren Tom, Kathy Bates, Graham Greene, Abe Vigoda, Richard Belzer, Kelly McGillis, Faith Ford, John Ritter, and others. Elijah Wood is the central figure of *North* around whom these others play out their individual situations. Bruce Willis smirkingly turns up on each location as a Guardian Angel to verbally guide Wood on his way. He's sort of a token guide to reality, if you can picture BW as such. Jon Lovitz as an ambulance-chasing (literally) lawyer has some nifty moments and Mathew McCurley as a master manipulator who sets this all in motion (within the framework of the dream-sequence motif) comes off best of the lot.

Warner's *Black Beauty*'s A Beauty

THE WORD THAT BEST FITS the Warner Bros. incarnation of the classic Anna Sewell novel *Black Beauty* is simply—*elegant*.

It's the vision of screenwriter/director Caroline Thompson, who's no stranger to scripting for animals (Homeward Bound: The Incredible Journey), and she obviously held this project near to her hcart. Indeed, anyone who's ever read the classic-it's been around for 120 years-isn't able to forget the mood and themes of hope and courage Sewell so marvelously put on paper, even if they don't immediately recall specifics. Here Thompson, making her directorial bow, takes the focus off the people and puts it where Sewell placed it-on Black Beauty-allowing the horse's feelings and observations of people and situations

on his life's journey to propel the story. It's simple, straightforward and immensely effective. Even if you don't care for narrators on film. Sometimes it's called for...like now.

Combined with this simplicity are the equally elegant and rich textures of Alex Thomson's superb photography and Danny Elfman's celebratory, soar-

ing score which gets into the character of Black Beauty, takes an audience along and at times literally fills the heart and mind with noted images. This is not just a children's movie, as the book was not just a children's book. This is an absolutely satisfying movie for adults as well.

The actor/horse taking the role of Black Beauty is one named Justin and, whether you like horses or not, have or have not been around them, the beauty of this animal is so striking you will desire to. Its lines are graceful, proud, designed to run with the wind and made for the camera. The horse was trained for this role by Rex Peterson.

Human performers are mostly cameos as various owners and include some touching moments from David Thewlis as a 19th century London cabbie, Sean Bean as Beauty's original trainer and Andrew Knott as Bean's young son who falls in love with the horse. There are also the snobbish, unfeeling aristocratic Earl of Wexmire, brittly portrayed by Peter Cook and his wife, Eleanor Bron, who bring out audience hatred with the sharp delineation of the "haves" from the "have nots."

John Box's production design reaches from the lush English countryside to the squalid and cruel, freezing and dispassionate, crowded streets of 19th century London. And the audience feels every inch. A super job.

VIDEO REVIEW Hammer: It's All Good; The Adventures Of The Funky Headhunter

HAMMER'S BACK ON THE TRAIL, looking for the big rush after some time out of the spotlight and he's coming at you from all angles in this 40-minute Warner Reprise Video.

The time is spent with four tunes—well, three actually—"It's All Good" (if you aren't weary of hearing him repeat that phrase by mid-tape, you're a glutton for sheer overkill), "Pumps And A Bump" twice (the first which drew critical fire because of its sexuality and caused a remake) and closer "Don't Stop," edited from "The Arsenio Hall Show" footage. Spaced in there are footage of Hammer moving through an airport. signing autographs and a sit-down interview at the performer's palatial home in Oakland in which he attempts to appease all segments of the purchasing

public, alternately appearing as a business man, tough guy but with soft edges, positive role model, but beneath it all, performer with a product.

He *does* create excitement when he performs, and it's performing excitement as the pieces presented turn their backs on the grittier street locales most rappers prefer. Hammer shows off the richness the fame has given him, kceping it in the arena of *performance*, sort of the Gene Kelly-Fred Astaire of hip-hop/rap. That analogy probably won't be appreciated in any arena but, there it is: That's Entertainment.

Stone Temple Pilots

GREEK THEATRE, LOS ANGELES, CA—It's not often that a young rock band finds itself headlining arena-sized venues after only two album releases. Of course, not many bands sell more than three million copies of their debut and follow that success with a #1 album the way San Diego's Stone Temple Pilots have done. The quartet finished a series of Southern California dates at the sold-out Greek and proceeded to turn in one of their most riveting area performances.

Singer Scott Weiland (who prefers to be addressed simply as Weiland) is a gangly, awkward frontman, reminiscent of the classic school-yard bully, whose spastic flailings and pained on-stage expressions perfectly matched his lyrics of emotional detachment and spiritual struggle.

Dressed in the yard-sale threads that have come to signify STP's style of slacker-groove-grunge, the singer kept the conversation to a minimum, concentrating instead, he told the boisterous crowd, on being "nice for all the L.A. rock press." Smart thinking, as the band charged with little interruption through most of its hit Atlantic album *Purple* as well as choice tracks from its 1992 bow *Core*.

Framed by giant lava lamp projections and decorative opera curtains, the band, which also includes brothers Dean and Robert DeLeo on guitar and bass and drummer Eric Kretz, displayed a more informed sense of concert style than it did last summer at Castaic Lake. Just as *Purple* outshines its inferior predecessor, so to does STP, circa 1994, outperform the tentative and seemingly shell-shocked band that last came through town.

Songs that stood out of the 65-minute set included early hit "Plush," the appropriately tagged "Unglued," the thickly-grooved "Meatplow" and "Big Empty," a tale of a relationship void of spirit that was first featured in the film *The Crow.* A surprise highlight was the three-song acoustic set, where "Creep" and "Pretty Penny," an affecting song of lost hope, were offered in simple yet moving terms, and the band added David Bowie's "Andy Warhol."

Few unproven bands could have withstood the intense scrutiny and criticisms that Stone Temple Pilots has weathered since its inception. Not only has the quartet persevered, it's evolved into a tight, anxious and, ultimately, beautiful rock 'n' roll band that gives one a new appreciation for what it actually means to survive success.

Metallica

GLEN HELEN BLOCKBUSTER PAVILION, DEVORE, CA—Despite having no new album to promote, not even one new tune to try out, Metallica, which these days is arguably America's most popular rock band (Pearl Jam also claims the title), turned in yet another tightly wound, over-the-top metal extravaganza that reasserts the band's place as the most accomplished and entertaining band of the entirc hard-rock/heavy metal world.

Just about the only commercially successful survivor of the early-'80s-bred old-school thrash-metal movement, Metallica has, with just the right amount of undeniably listenable panache, evolved into a ferocious and explosive concert unit that held this capacity-filled desert venue captive from the first note to the last.

Taking the stage to the strains of Thin Lizzy's "The Boys Are Back In Town," the Bay-area foursome (growling singer/guitarist James Hetfield, super guitar shredder Kirk Hammett, heavy-handed bassist Jason Newsted and L.A.-reared Lars Ulrich on drums) launched into seldom-heard oldie "Breadfan" as the apocalyptic, sci-fi-inspired metallic stage rigging roared and glowed with fireballs, thick smoke and assorted random explosions.

What followed were 2 1/2 hours of the best cuts from all six of the band's albums. Best of the bunch included "Welcome Home (Sanitarium)," an increasingly intense song of paranoia and mental failure, the menacing "For Whom The Bell Tolls," ultra-heavy "The God That Failed" (from the band's most recent, three-year-old self-titled Elektra album), classic thrasher "Leper Messiah," featuring guitarist Hammett's best impersonation of a punk Jimmy Page, the methodically crafted slow-burner "Sad But True" and "Whiplash," a breakneck-paced ditty that lived up to its name.

Also of note, a clever *Kill 'Em All/Ride The Lightning* medley featuring some of the band's best early-'80s material...material that, despite the band's terrific songwriting growth, still stands the test of time.

United Kingdom

CASTLE UPDATE: Castle Communications are close to completing a deal with U.S. media group Alliance Entertainment Corp. Last week Castle's share value remained high at 325p, after Castle admitted it was engaged in talks which could result in a take-over. Alongside film sales and video interests, Alliance also owns two North American audio wholesalers.

DCC PANIC CUT: Philips is slashing the price of its DCC hardware by almost 50% in a bid to save the ailing format. Latest reports show the digital tape system falling behind MiniDisc, with around half its rival sales. In the first six months of this year less than 600 DCC tapes were sold, compared with more than 1,300 copies of Sony's MD format (remember Beta?).

BIG RATINGS FOR THE THREE TENORS: More than 11 million viewers tuned to the **BBC**'s TV broadcast of "The Three Tenors World Cup" concert. The show had an immediate impact on sales, sending **Decca**'s original recording into the Top 10 albums and boosting the Three Tenors single "Libiamo." Warners' 1994 album and video is released on August 29th.

EMAP RULING SOON: Emap should know by the end of this week if its planned takeover of **Trans World Communications** will be permitted under the terms of the Broadcasting Act. **The Guardian Media Group**, which owns a 20% stake in Trans World, has challenged the **Radio Authority**'s decision to allow the deal and a judicial review begins on Wednesday (July 27). Trans World is also against the deal claiming that the Emap offer undervalues the company.

MIDEM TO CUT THEIR RATES: The Midem Organisation is planning to cut the registration rates in a bid to attract smaller companies to the annual south of France music conference. At present, the single registration fee is £1,000, which allows up to three full-time employees to attend. This is to be replaced by a per-person charge of £390 (FF3,300), which will start as from next year's event, taking place in Cannes from January 30 to February 3.

MUSICLINK STOPPED IN THEIR TRACKS: The recently formed company **MusicLink** has been forced to fold its direct sales service after distributor **EUK** cancelled a supply agreement between the two companies. MusicLink, who offered consumers CD and cassette albums over the telephone at High Street prices to be delivered within three working days, has closed the service following the EUK decision. **Kingfisher**-owned EUK agreed to supply MusicLink when it was launched last September but ended the agreement in March after only 2,000 albums were sold in six months.

U.S. TOUR VISA SHAKE UP: Record companies and artist managers are being advised to apply now for visas to tour and record in the U.S. to avoid a flood of applications in the New Year. The U.S. government has announced that multiple indefinite business holiday visas, the type most commonly used by U.K. acts, will cease to be valid from January 1995.

STILL FAITH IN MUSIC VIDEO: Despite enduring the worst six months sales figures in its history, music video retains the backing of retailers who insist that there is still life left in the format. Sales have fallen this year to their lowest point since the launch of VHS in the early '80s. Just two million units were sold in the first six months of 1994, down 28% on the 2.8 million sales for the same period last year.

VIRGIN IN-STORE RADIO: Virgin Retail is launching its own radio station which will broadcast to all the chain's 30 stores. The retailer has secured a license from the Radio Authority to turn its existing Virgin FM radio operation at London's Oxford Street Megastore into a national service. The service will be beamed by satellite across the U.K. starting next month. **PLATINUM UP:** The number of Platinum albums has surged in the first half of 1994, according to new figures released by the **BPI**. A total of 24 albums achieved Platinum discs for shipment in excess of 300,000 in the first half of 1994, compared with just eight for the first six months of 1993.



VOCALIST AND COM-POSER EDDI READER will see the U.S. release of her eponymously-titled **Reprise Records** solo album on August 30. But in the U.K., where Reader has long been one of the country's best-kept musical secrets, she is already off and running with an out-of-the-box smash.

The album, featuring 12 Reader originals and produced by **Greg Penny** (**k.d. lang**), debuted at #4 on U.K. album charts, and the first single, "Patience Of Angels," received immediate play on both **Radio 1** and **Capitol Radio**, where it is still in heavy rotation after eight weeks.

Eddi Reader

Just shipped worldwide, Eddi Reader has already sold

over 20,000 copies within the first week of its release in Japan. Reader, an in-demand session singer for eight years and one-time lead singer for **Fairground Attraction**, made her stage acting debut in recent months in a London production of *The Trick Is To Keep Breathing*.

DIGITAL ZEPPELIN: EastWest is re-issuing back catalogue albums by Led Zeppelin and AC/DC in re-mastered form. The entire Zeppelin catalogue consisting of nine studio albums, which have been digitally re-mastered by the band's guitarist Jimmy Page, will be at full price, replacing the mid-price versions, which have been deleted.

ON THE ROAD: Chart-topping **Wet Wet**, whose single "Love Is All Around" has now sold over a million copies making it this year's biggestselling single, have just announced their plans for a spectacular arena tour in summer 1995. Still at #1 after seven weeks, the band have just confirmed Double Platinum sales for their recent album *End Of Part One—Their Greatest Hits...***Traffic** will be touring in the U.K. from September 20th thru to October 3rd...Acclaimed Canadian four-piece **Rheostatics** hit the U.K. next month for a handful of live shows. Dates are: August 18, 21, 23, 24, 27-29 and September 1...Texan singer/songwriter **Tish Hinojosa** releases her debut album *Destiny's Gate* here on August 1st and celebrates with a one-off show as part of the **Roots Festival** at London's **South Bank Centre** on July 29th...**Blur** have confirmed a headline show at **Aston Villa Leisure Centre** on Wednesday, 5th October. Their only other date this year will be the **Alexandra Parklife Show** on Friday, 7th October and their headline appearance at the **T In The Park Festival** in Glasgow on Saturday, 30th July.

Profile **Critique Records Reaches Critical Mass**

"SYNERGY"-MANY ELEMENTS COMBINING TOGETHER and forming one creative force...that one word is in itself a description of Critique Records, Inc. and the philosophies behind which Critique operates. Critique Records, in only ten years' time, has managed to progress from being a small, independent label based in Boston, MA to a major independent label (distributed by BMG) that has, via their acts, reached international magnitudes. Though its sales office is based in the Los Angeles BMG building, the main office is still based in Boston, a city that has always been a breeding ground for talent. Yet Critique differs from other labels in Boston as its acts are not all Boston-based; as a matter of fact, even though Critique has signed strong Boston acts, the majority of its artists are based throughout the world.

Diversity of styles was part of president/founder Carl Strube's image of his label. "My vision of Critique was that it was going to be a label that signs and releases a wide variety of music," he says. "Over the years we've had a lot of hits with dance and urban music, but we also have released artists as

diverse as Engelbert Humper-

when BASF had a record label. When BASF phased out the label to focus on the tape business, Strube formed his own marketing and promotion firm in Boston, which a few years later (in 1983) evolved into Critique Records. It was "a natural offshoot," says Strube, to have a label for acts that they signed, marketed and promoted. "We're critical about the artists and the music that we sign... our philosophy is to sign quality artists with quality music---quality over quantity, less is more!" comments Strube about the origins of the label, " hence the name Critique."

A present sampling of Critique's diverse palette of groups includes: 2 Unlimited, Euro/dance sensations from Holland, have had their fervent techno dance beats and vocal stylings sell 15 million records worldwide-Critique, in conjunction with Radikal Records, released Get Ready in 1992, No Limits in 1993, and are just about to release 2 Unlimited's third album, Real Things; besides 2 Unlimited, Critique and Radikal have also teamed up for Shabba Ranks and Ava Cherry, who is one of Luther Vandross' back-up singers; another mutual distribution deal came about earlier this year with production/promotion whizzes Tony Mercedes and David Michery and their label CMBR (Cash Money Brother Records)—Mercedes and Michery, responsible for marketing such hits as Tag Team's "Whoomp There It Is" and Duice's "Dazzy Duks," are currently working with Critique on an enthusiastic rap/hip-hop artist from Birmingham who calls himself Poppa Doo; and Fem 2 Fcm, the female dance/pop group that initially stirred controversy by making the talk-show rounds speaking on the subject of homosexuality (a couple of the group members are lesbians), have advanced to a legitimate charting group with dance-oriented and A/C songs from 1993's Woman To Woman-they even snagged the coveted opening spot for Nine Inch Nails on their recent tour...all due, in part, to Critique's marketing campaign.

Strube describes the approach to present and future growth at Critique Records as "slow, methodical, being very fiscally responsible in the way that we manufacture and ship product ... we're willing to work with artists, whether they be new and developing artists or established artists who are rethinking their future with the label they're with now. If they have the confidence in themselves and their sales ability, we as a company are willing to offer them a home where they can participate in their success to a much more lucrative and higher degree "

Spotlight Michael Grandé: In The **Grand Tradition Of** Troubadours



CARRYING ON IN THE TRADITION of such folk singer/songwriters as Harry Chapin, Jim Croce and Richie Havens is Michael Grandé, a performing artist with a considerable personal history considering his relative newcomer status to recording. Beacon Records, Boston's premier progressive folk and world music label, has just reissued his limited-release CD Brooklyn Rescue Mission (E.O.S. Records) nationally under the title Hey Friend.

While the solo disc is his first, Grandé is quite the veteran...literally. He joined the Marines during the Vietnam War in the early '60s, as had 11 friends from his Brooklyn neighborhood; only Michael survived. He returned to live in Greenwich Village, where he taught himself to play guitar and write poetry. In the '70s, he became proficient in his unique folk/flamenco style of playing while frequenting the New York folk club circuit. It was here that he caught the attention of Richie Havens and signed with Havens' agent to tour as Havens' opening act. "Michael is one of the finest and most inspiring artists I have shared the stage with," says Havens, and after several U.S. and international tours together, Grandé went on to tour with several other major acts in the '70s, including Canned Heat, John Lee Hooker, Van Morrison, Seal & Crofts, Jim Croce, and briefly, even Bruce Springsteen.

While on the road, Grandé's weight ballooned to 218 pounds. Comedian/activist Dick Gregory pointed him to the Hippocrates Health Institute in Boston. A hiatus from music burgeoned an education in nutrition and fitness, and Grandé wrote, lectured, pursued a Ph.D., became a nationally ranked cyclist, ran in 27 marathons and met and married world-class Canadian runner Gayle Olinekova. In the '80s they would found SunRunners Sports Promotions, dedicated to creating a professional running circuit and responsible for conceiving and developing the Los Angeles Marathon, and Michael ran a chain of fitness centers in Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. He was also a much sought-after guitar teacher, and eventually he became convinced that he must resume his music career.

With that, Grandé returned to performing, bringing with him his unique life experiences that would comprise the songs on Hey Friend. In the album's liner notes, Grandé lists among his "poets, teachers & inspirations" fellow singer/songwriters Leonard Cohen and Nanci Griffith and guitarists Paco De Lucia and Al Di Meola, and one can hear those influences amid such songs as "Willie Lo" (a remembrance of a neighborhood alcoholic Michael befriended as a boy), "Mike's Bike" (an ode to Grandé's joys of cycling) and the tender "All That We Feel" with its Spanish background vocals. Grandé wrote or co-wrote the vast majority of songs on the relcase, as well as co-producing and co-arranging all of the songs with Robert Etoll.

Grandé is once again a popular performer, particularly on the college circuit, where as a solo acoustic entertainer he charmingly engages his audiences with mellow yet powerful stories of life and love. "Michael is a seasoned pro of U.S., Canada and world tours," says manager Frank Campana of Campana/Revel Management, "and we are all excited about his latest record deal." At Beacon Records, Grandé joins artists such as Aztec Two-Step and Celtic singer Aine Minogue. He has travelled a long and winding road to get there, but finds himself back in a position to passionately relate his journey to anyone who'll listen.

Gaylord Reports On Overall Increases And Specific Losses

GAYLORD ENTERTAINMENT CO. reported second-quarter results with revenues up 11.9 percent, income from continuing operations up 35.7 percent and per share income from continuing operations up 28 percent over second quarter 1993, according to E.W. Wendell, president and CEO.

Points of interest from the financial disclosure include:

-CMT posted the most spectacular results with a 58 percent increase in revenues. However, CMT Europe posted expected losses of \$1.2 million for the quarter, an improvement from the \$1.5 million loss in first quarter 1994.

-Advertising revenues for TNN: The Nashville Network grew by 11.6 percent.

-The Opryland Hotel, with an occupancy rate of 89.6 percent for the quarter, showed a 5 percent increase in revenues.

—According to Wendell, "During the quarter, the entertainment division opened four new ventures; the Wildhorse Saloon, a country dance club and restaurant; the Ryman Auditorium; "Nashville On Stage," a concert series at Opryland theme park...; and the Opryland River Taxis, which ferry passengers between downtown Nashville and the Opryland complex on the Cumberland River."

The start up of these new ventures resulted in related operating losses of \$4.7 million in the quarter. The most significant amount of loss was attributable to the start-up of "Nashville On Stage."

"Overall we are pleased with the results from the second quarter," said Wendell. "The results reflect the strength of our franchise in providing country music and country lifestyle entertainment to a growing national and international audience."

In Other News...

GARTH BROOKS WILL BE JOINED on the second leg of his European Tour this fall by **Sparrow** recording artist **Susan Ashton**. Brooks commented, "My brother introduced me to Susan and her music. I feel she'll be a wonderful addition to our tour." Since her debut in 1991, Ashton has firmly established herself as one of the most popular vocalists in Christian music.

GEORGE JONES AND PAM TILLIS will co-host a press conference on Aug. 16 to announce the final nominees for "The 28th Annual CMA Awards." The awards will be broadcast live by CBS on Oct. 5, from 8-11 p.m. (Eastern).

THE CALIFORNIA-BASED LABEL Patriot Records that was in a dispute with Liberty Records Nashville-based sister label of the same name has changed its name to Rugged Records. According to Rugged Records, "Considering the name Patriot to be the perfect complement to their label, Liberty president Jimmy Bowen and Patriot president Michael Betts negotiated terms in which Liberty would take the name Patriot in exchange for adequate financial compensation."

COUNTRY MUSIC HITS JAPAN October 16, in Kumamoto, Japan, as part of the sixth annual "Country Gold Festival." Headlining the event, expected to draw over 25,000, is Charlie Daniels, followed by The Bellamy Brothers, Becky Hobbs, The Sons of the San Joaquin and the bluegrass band Silver Lining.

HALLWAY ENTERTAINMENT, INC. announced the signing of a distribution agreement with ABC Video recently. Under the agreement, ABC Video will distribute Hallway's titles, which include: "George Jones—Same Ole Me," "George Jones—Live In Tennessee," "Remembering Patsy Cline," and several other country music-related videos.

ON THE RECENTLY CERTIFIED GOLD LIST are two BNA artists, John Anderson for Solid Ground and Doug Supernaw for his debut Red & Rio Grande.

Off Tillis' new album, Sweetheart's Dance, this slightly upbeat single will probably do more on the strength of her vocals than the strength of the "same old, same old" lyrics. Nevertheless, expect it to reach moderate success.



SUZY BOGGUSS: "Souvenirs" (Liberty 79050)

With an almost Caribbean drum beat going in the background and a sweet harmonica playing here and there, Bogguss throws in her vocal prowess to produce a noteworthy tune. It will be interesting to see what radio does with this one.

PEARL RIVER: Pearl River (Liberty 28397)

This six-member group, formerly named The Toys, certainly isn't lacking in the vocal or talent department. With great production, sweet harmonies, Jeff Stewart's lead vocals and the bands great stage presence, it shouldn't take long for these guys to catch fire. Songs to check out include: "Don't Know Much About Love," "How Quick I Remember," "You've Always Got Me" and

"Heartbroke Everyday." This sophomore project for the band was produced by Steve Gibson (one of Nashville's hottest guitarists), who's also working on Aaron Tippin's forthcoming project. According to Jeff Stewart, "Pearl River is not just a country band per se, but we are six good ol' country boys making music"...while a bit of an understatement, that sounds about right.

DAN SEALS: Fired Up (Warner Bros. 45628)

In what can best be described as a weird twist of irony, Dan Seals' forthcoming album, *Fired Up*, is like a big breath of fresh air. Why, you may ask?—Because it's actually a Country album that has actual Country Music on it (minus a couple cuts). While his first release, "All Fired Up" offers a fun-loving feeling, slower songs like "A Rose From Another Garden" and "A Good Place To Be" truly shine on this 10-cut album. *Fired Up* delivers great music via Seals' superb country



vocals and well-written songs (Seals wrote the last cut). Produced by Jerry Crutchfield, it's a job very well done. Now let's hope that radio gives him a chance.

THE TRACTORS: The Tractors (Arista 18728)

What the hell *is* this? 'Cause it's certainly not country. With jazzy vocals, horns blaring everywhere, wild piano licks and a New Orleans attitude on the opening cut "The Tulsa Shuffle," The Tractors certainly have devised one of the most unique sounds I've heard in a long while. In fact, if you want to categorize this band of seasoned veterans, you'll have to invent a new word. Intermingled within the 14-cut album you'll find a hint of country in songs like "Fallin' Apart," "I've Had Enough," "Settin' The Woods On Fire" and "The Little Man." Whatever you decide to call it, it's just this simple: The Tractors are making some great music.

PICK OF THE WEEK

MARK COLLIE: Unleashed (MCA 11055)

This is one album that balances precariously on the country tightrope. Of course, so does 90% of every country product out these days. On this, his fourth (10-cut) album, Collie's distinctive vocals bring out the best in songs that cater to a disposition of modern country listeners. Just listen to his coasting, laid-back version of "Ring Of Fire," which sounds more like U2 than a Johnny Cash cover. Nevertheless, it's

imaginative and creative. Unleashed is one album that has many sides. Collie's mood shift from the rockabilly attitude in "Rainy Day Woman" and "Hard Lovin' Woman" to a more traditional sound in "When You Belonged To Me" and finally to the fluid "Lonely Streak." With the exception of the Cash classic, Collie had a hand in writing every song. With what can only be described as a copious amount of diversity, aggressive rockabilly and uniqueness, Collie has, for lack of a better word, unleashed a great product.



WITH A BIO that spans six pages, 12 of 16 albums that are certified Platinum or multi-Platinum, it was anything but hard for Alabama, the "Artist of the Decade," to fill their allotted two-hour show at Opryland's Chevrolet/GEO Celebrity Theater in Nashville on July 18.

While there may be slicker and fancier productions with more wild enthusiasm, more showmanship with flashing lights, pyrotechnics and cho-

reography, you probably won't see any band who knows how to get the crowd more involved. Even though Alabama may have briefly touched on some of the those production values previously mentioned, their show at Opryland was completely geared toward making the droves of fans that had come from so far away feel a part of the show. Whether it was allowing a lucky fan to get his picture made with the band (on stage during the concert), introducing bandmember Randy Owen's young son to the crowd, walking into the crowd for pictures, signing autographs, or asking for baseball caps prior to their singing of "Cheap Seats," Alabama had the crowd feeling like a fifth member.

The band, to satisfy their fans, ran the gamut of their song archives, as well as songs off their current album *Cheap Seats*. With a down-home appeal, a genuinely likeable persona, and some great country music, this band from Ft. Payne, Alabama gave this out-of-town audience something they will no doubt remember for a long time.

Andy Landis: A Shining Star for Star Song

Η JONATHAN WATKINS OF STAR SONG asked Andy Landis if she'd like to be a recording artist in Christian Country music, Landis, who'd been writing and doing demos, first said "no." Then, as she says, 'I spent a week crying. I was arguing with God—'At least give me some alternative deal, not this.' When I finally stopped myself, I realized why I didn't want to do it. l thought I'd have to be perfect. I thought being a Christian artist meant you had to be a saint. You had to swers. And, I realized what a dumb

reason that was." So after her "week of crying," Landis went back to meet with Watkins.

Landis relates, "I had my head on the desk, because I was embarrassed. l told him all these horrible things about myself: 'I'm insecure,' 'l get jealous,' 'I forget things.' I went down the list and thought I'd look up to see him sitting there with his arms folded saying, 'Well, I'm sure glad we found this out.' Instead he said, 'We want people like you. We need people that are very real about where they are in their relationship to God."

She still felt inadequate-not as a songwriter or artist, but as a Christian who wasn't perfect. "I told him I couldn't be like Twila Paris. She's awesome. l told him she'd been a Christian all her life. I hadn't. I'd had terrible things happen. I'd been raped. I'd had cancer twice. I had problems with my father. And I'm not finished. I'm like a work in progress. He looked at me and said, 'But Andy-we don't need Twila

Paris. We already have her.""

Finally, Landis realized that it could be done and she started her voyage with Star Song. Now set to bring her brand of music to an eager audience, she had overcome many obstaeles to get to this point. She moved from New Jersey to Los Angeles in the early '80s and was modeling, acting,

as well as singing and playing in a band. It was something she'd always wanted to do. She said she remembered at the age of 3 or 4 loving the musicals and wanting to sing and dance. In 1984 she cut her first record with a small independent company called Allegiance. Her first singles were successful and she found she loved to do live radio interviews—something she still enjoys today. But then the label folded and it took a couple of years to untangle contracts and other business matters.

"By 1986 I felt I really needed to go somewhere else," says Landis. "I didn't feel understood musically... I liked to do acoustic and this was the time of Cyndi Lauper, so acoustic was not very popular. I would do modeling here or there and then would go to the studio and not get anywhere or the music wouldn't turn out like they said it would."

She decided to try Nashville, even though she didn't know anyone in the music industry. "I got a real cheap ticket, stayed at Shoney's and walked up and down Music Row with a-believe it or not-brown paper bag of tapes. But, God bless Roger Sovine-he set up an appointment with BMI and Tim Whipperman." Whipperman told Landis that she had something in her songs. It wasn't the way it would be written in Nashville, but he said he'd definitely stay in touch with her. Landis recalls, "He even got me something to eat, which was a big deal because I didn't have any money."

Landis took the flight back to L.A. and submerged herself in writing. A year later she was signed as a writer. "He actually wrote out the deal on a napkin. Because I didn't believe him, I said I need to see it in writing. He wrote it out and dated it and signed it."

Landis went back and forth between Nashville and L.A. for the first couple of years. She fondly recalls, "When I'd come down [to Nashville] I'd write with all these great Warner-Chappell artists. They nurtured me and taught me and they thought I was good. And it was food for my heart because of the experiences in L.A. when I was told I wasn't pop enough, or enough of this or that."

Today she is writing and recording her songs and has released an album that she's extremely proud of. "It affects people, and it's not about religion or religious ways or being perfect and having all the answers. It's about being real and having God go with you as you're struggling. You win some and lose some. God's with you through it all. It's about the average person's...the real person's struggles with day-to-day living. The records and tapes I've had before, musically, didn't reflect my heart and desires. Lyrically, it's pretty much been me. This was the first time I was so diligent. I probably bothered people with [directions like], 'No, we've got to have an accordion in this spot,' 'cause I could hear it in my head. I was very adamant and very strong. I'm not in anyway embarrassed with this record-which has happened to me before.'

Landis is also very adamant about Positive/Christian Country music. "1 think the Christian Country thing is really, really needed. Country music did that for a while. Sure, there were the 'cheatin'' and 'drinkin'' songs, but people were very open about their faith. Whether they did it correctly, I don't know, but they believed in God. I still think if you ask people in country music if they are believers they would say they are. But I think this little niche (Positive/Christian Country), where you can listen to it and be uplifted and get that little positive country message, is really exciting."

When she's in concert or in her travels, Landis says she'll often go places where others are quoting scriptures. She confesses, "I don't know where God put it in the Bible...but I know where God put it in my heart. People who are just trying to get through life will come up to me. You know, He's made me a colorful person out of all my broken hearts, my broken promises, my broken

dreams, and endless amounts of struggles. Somehow He's been able to take what could have been bitterness and put in humor and something colorful and make me into this unique person. l want to encourage other people to do this. Because there's a place for all of us. I didn't know there was a place for me. I'm glad there is."

And others are glad, too. Andy

Landis is not only a tremendous entertainer, singer and songwriter, but she is a very real person with a heart for everyday people and the trials they go through. As a Christian, she knows there will still be mountains to climb and valleys to cross, but she'll have the Lord with her all the way. And she'll have her fans-including this writer-with her all the way, too.

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
