AMERICAN VS. U.K. PHONO "SHELL": Los Angeles-based American Recordings, owned by Rick Rubin, reports that they have discovered the U.K. record giant Phonogram Ltd., which boasts a line-up of Elton John, Metallica, Def Leppard, Dire Straits and Tears For Fears, to be nothing more than "a shell company." The charge stems from evidence introduced into American's lawsuit against Phonogram charging fraud, breach of contract, misappropriation of funds, dishonest under-accounting and other charges.

Oueen's counsel John McDonnell, representing Rubin in London's High Court, referred to a report and accounts for Phonogram Ltd. for the year ended December 1992 which show that the company has no income or expenditures, no employees, acts as an agent for an undisclosed principal, its only asset is an unpaid debtor in respect of share capital and it appears not to trade.

The events of the case include the attempt to introduce an unauthorized tape recording of a privileged and confidential conversation between Rubin and his attorney John Branca into evidence by Phonogram Ltd. director of commercial and legal affairs Isaac David Perez, who admitted to purchasing the surreptitiously recorded tape. The tape was refused admittance. The proceedings caused A&R executive Mike Bone to state, "In all my years, I have never experienced skullduggery like that on the part of a record company."

LIBERTY PLANS BEATLES TRIBUTE: Liberty Records announced plans for a Beatles tribute featuring a top line-up of yet to be announced country music stars. Recording will begin later this year, the 30-year anniversary of the Beatles' 1964 American chart debut.

Jerry Crutchfield, who will produce the album commented, "The impact of the Beatles is nearly incalculable, with many country artists being influenced by the group in one way or another. In addition to the excellent songwriting abilities of the band's members, the Beatles' sound has contributed greatly to the mainstream American fusion of today's country music."

A portion of the proceeds will go toward building an industry retirement home for artists, musicians and others directly involved with the country music industry.

CISAC SET FOR SEPTEMBER: CISAC, the International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers, will hold its biennial World Congress in Washington, D.C. September 18-22, it was announced. CISAC represents more than a million composers, authors and publishers of music, as well as creators in the fields of drama, literature, film and graphic and visual arts. ASCAP president Marilyn Bergman and BMI president/CEO Frances Preston will jointly host the affair.

The theme of 1994's congress will be "Protecting Creativity In The Next Century' with the focus on opportunities and challenges in the Digital Age. The affair will be held at the Omni-Shoreham Hotel in Washington, D.C.

SHANDLING SHOWS ROSEN 'SPIRIT': Garry Shandling has been confirmed to appear at the City of Hope "Spirit of Life" Award dinner honoring Ticketmaster president/CEO Fred Rosen September 28 at Univer-

Rosen's participation in this year's Award Dinner significantly advances the goal of the Music & Entertainment Industry Chapter to expand its honoree base beyond the traditional list of record company chief executives. Proceeds from this year's Award Dinner will establish the Frederic D. Rosen Research Fellowship at the City of Hope National Medical Center and Beckman Research Institute.

The Fred Rosen 1994 Spirit of Life Award campaign continues with Giant Records and Giant Merchandising donating tickets to the City of Hope Music & Entertainment Industry Chapter for the sold-out Eagles concert on October 8 at the Rose Bowl. The tickets are being packaged with VIP parking, credentials and reception. The entire package is priced at \$250 per person, a large portion of which is tax deductible. A similar package for the Rolling Stones shows in October at the Rose Bowl for \$300 per person have completely sold out.

NIRVANA II = I: Plans announced earlier to release a Nirvana double album have changed. Instead, only a single album of the band's entire "MTV Unplugged" acoustic special, plus two songs recorded and filmed for that show but not aired, will be released on DGC Records this year. The second album of unreleased live electric performances has been postponed indefinitely.

The capsule, produced by the Rochester Museum and Science Cenetr, is expected to remain in orbit for several millions of years. Included in the project is a special compact disc featuring 18 artists. Among the acts represented on the one-time use CD are Peter Gabriel, Jimi Hendrix and former Starship guitarist Craig Chaquico.

Commented Chaquico, who has a new album due in September, "It's kind of ironic that after being in a band called 'Starship,' my solo album, Acoustic Planet, has spawned a track that truly is going into space." He then added, in the thanks-for-your-honesty file, "Aliens will find it someday and send a message back to Earth saying, 'Please send more Chuck Berry."

ALICE COOPER will receive the Foundations Lifetime Achievment Award at this year's Foundations Forum, to be held September 8, 9, and 10 in Burbank, CA. Presenting the award to the legendary shock-rocker, best-known for the in-your-face anthems "School's Out" and "I'm Eighteen," will be Guns N' Roses guitarist Slash.

Cooper, who had countless hits in the '70s as well as becoming an icon of the decade, has just released a new album on Epic Records entitled The Last Temptation. The record features two songs co-written by Soundgarden's Chris Cornell, who also provides backing vocals on the two tracks. Spin Doctors

IRVINE MEADOWS AMPHITHEATRE, IRVINE, CA-Think Friday night. Think Spin Doctors. You get the gist. The Spin Doctors stop in Irvine, which also featured The Gin Blossoms, Cracker and Vinx, was pretty much what you imagined—a rip-roaring good-time party. The N.Y.-bred Epic Records act made their reputation as a live act in the clubs and colleges of the East Coast, thanks to lead vocalist Chris Barron's limber feats of gymnastics and long, drawn-out jams that showed off the band's musicianship. The gymnastics remain the same, but the song doesn't.

The group have graduated from college to the summer shed schedule,

including their stop at Irvine Meadows (capacity approximately 14,000). The commencement came in '92 and '93 with a couple of hit songs, "Little Miss Can't Be Wrong" and "Two Princes," a Rolling Stone cover and a similar tour last summer that saw them headline over Soul Asylum. The results of that success were apparent during their almost 90-minute set, as the band stayed on the safer route, eliminating the jams in favor of conventional pop songs for the conservative Orange County throngs. In the case of the Spin Doctors, though, the

change doesn't hurt them, as pop songs are part of their strength; case in point being their excellent versions of the aforementioned singles, as well as "Cleopatra's Cat," from the new album. In addition, both the crowd and the band seemed to have a good time.

The second-billed Gin Blossoms write excellent songs, as evidenced by the three hit singles from their major label debut New Miserable Experience. The A&M album is still riding high after more than a year. They are to be commended for a song like "Until I Fall Away." Unfortunately, if you've heard it on the radio then you've heard it all. The high point of their set was their cover of the KISS anthem, "Christine Sixteen." If only they would've done "Detroit Rock City."

Cracker, led by David Lowery of Camper Van Beethoven underground fame, are another band riding high off a few hit singles, but the group showed during their set what fans suspected to be true—the college music band are by far the most ambitious of the trio. Their drive paid off with a strong set, including their new single, "Get Off This," and a great acoustic Grateful

Opening act Vinx, who played to a largely empty house, returned for an encore by coming out right before the Spin Doctors for a brief spell. His 15 minutes on stage the second time around may have been the highlight of the show, thanks to his stunning vocals, cool bongo drum and biting sense of humor.

Jackson Browne

IRVINE MEADOWS AMPHITHEATRE, IRVINE, CA-Jackson Browne's foray into the Southland was a songwriter's dream, as the veteran singer/songwriter has been touring all summer with the highly acclaimed and well-respected John Hiatt. The double-bill did not disappoint, filling the night with one great song after another. Hiatt and his backing band, the Guilty Dogs, opened the show with a straight-ahead rock 'n' roll set. During his 40 minutes plus an encore, Hiatt mixed his best rockers with some of his most beautiful ballads, including "ley Blue Heart" and the superb "Have A Little Faith In Me." On the rocking side of things, "Slow Turning" and "A Thing Called Love," which was a hit for Bonnie Raitt, provided Hiatt and the Guilty Dogs

with their best moments. While Hiatt seems to have come into his own over the past few years, Browne has been traveling in the opposite direction. Once one of the most vital figures in rock, with charttopping success and rave reviews, Browne's tortoise-like pace and zealous political beliefs finally caught up with him, as his name just slipped out of the limelight. The near-capacity crowd proved he hasn't been forgotten, but the king the California singer/songwriter movement in the '70s, which

spawned the Eagles and James Taylor among others, is no longer the superstar he once was.


While he may not be a superstar now, or ever again, Browne's two-hourplus set demonstrated he is something more—one of the all-time greats. Because of his decline in the '80s, which there is no denying had a lot to do with quality, Browne's place in the annals of rock is neglected, but how can one argue with the beauty of "Late For The Sky"? The mid-'70s number, from the album of the same name, remains one of the most majestic songs rock has to offer 20 years after its release. It also provided one of the night's many highlights when Browne sat down at the piano and began a solo version of the

Browne and his seven-piece band opened with the title track to his most recent album, I'm Alive, and proceeded through a memorable walk down memory lane, taking a generous sampling from throughout his entire career, mixing hits with little-known gems like "These Days" from the For Everyman record. In addition to the great music Browne was an entertaining host, thanks to his between-song banter, an art that is almost lost on modern-day bands. However, it was near the end when Browne launched into a string of hits; "Boulevard,""For Everyman," "Doctor My Eyes,""The Pretender" and the closing "Running On Empty" showed where his strength comes from, a catalog that few artists could ever hope to match.

During the cavalcade of hits came what had to be the triumph of the evening, the lovely "Sky Blue And Black." The song, which is from his most recent album, was sandwiched between "Doctor My Eyes" and "The Pretender" without any dropoff. The fact that the song, which is the strongest thing he has written since 1980's Hold Out collection, fit in so nicely with his older hits should be taken as a sign that Browne may have something left to give to today's scene. For one night, at least, Browne had a lot to contribute.




JOE COCKER: "The Simple Things" (550 Music/Epic 77660)

Joe Cocker's career is one of those freaks of nature, like Keith Richards or cockroaches, that will survive nuclear war. Cocker's two-decades-plus in music have been the equivalent of riding a roller-coaster on speed. And now, after his opening set at Woodstock '94, he's back. What gets him there, for better or for worse, is that gravelly voice John Belushi made famous. When one thinks of that voice they don't think poppy keyboards, but that's

what can be found here, along with backing vocals that drown out Cocker.

It starts with a cool riff taken from the cheesiest of '70s rock and runs with it. Somewhere between heavy metal and rap, with an almost disco-like chorus, the end result is a bitchin' song. Combining so many different sounds either leads to disaster or makes the band seem like genuises. In this case, the infectious and angry track takes 311 much closer to the latter. It also has a cool fade-out.



KARYN WHITE: "Hungah" (Warner Bros. 6995)

White's reintroduction to the scene was produced by Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis, who helped Janet grow up so quickly last year. Much of that same vibe is felt early on in this song, before White attempts to take over. Lewis, who, incidentally, is married to White, and Jam throw down a lot of grooves in a very short time, leaving listeners wanting more of White to come through. It's a hit, though.

SARAH McLACH-LAN: "Good Enough" (Arista 2690)



REVIEWS by Steve Baltin



DINOSAUR JR: Without A Sound (Sire/Reprise 45719)

More sonic-stylings from j mascis...not as noise-oriented as last year's breakthrough, Where You Been, this 11song collection is a welcome display of versatility from the alternative guitar-wiz. The album begins with the typically fevered "Feel The Pain," complete with a distortion solo, then continues with the alternative sound before changing in mood with the fourth track, the sweet "Outta Hand." On tracks like the edgy "Even You" and the rhythmic blues of "Mind Glow," the technical virtuosity of Mascis will probably alienate kids who want

their music spoon-fed to them. But those willing to go to the obscure will be amply rewarded with a consistently strong effort.

SLOAN: Twice Removed (DGC 24711)

One listen to this band and you'll say to yourself "80s England."...guess again. This wet dream of collegesounding pop comes from '90s Nova Scotia. This album marks their second effort, the first one having been recorded almost three years ago, though it was just released last year. Ergo, don't be so surprised by the different sound and drastic growth. From the opening poppy "Penpals" to the delightfully infectious "Coax Me," Sloan appear to be a band with a direction-up.



AMY GRANT: House Of Love (A&M 540230)

Welcome to the world of computer-generated pop, courtesy of producers Keith Thomas and Michael Omartian. Grant's latest effort tries to be more moody and atmospheric than her previous work, as evidenced by "Our Love," a barrage of synths designed to make Grant sound sexy. The irony is that the former Contemporary Christian singer is more than capable of doing that herself. Grant demonstrates stronger vocal range here than ever before, even if the material doesn't always measure up. But it'll sell millions. Of particular note is her cover of the Joni Mitchell classic "Big Yellow Taxi."

VARIOUS ARTISTS: No Prima Donna: The Songs Of Van Morrison (Polydor 523368)

With the onslaught of tribute albums (one saluting the Village People is in the works or will be shortly), it's getting hard to distinguish who actually deserves the honor. But there's no doubting Van Morrison's place in the elite of rock, including his songwriting—an aspect of his talent that's often neglected. There are some great artists on hand, notably Sinead O'Connor and Elvis Costello, and some fascinating sidebars, like actor Liam Neeson's spoken-word version of "Coney Island" and the appearance of Morrison's daughter Shana, to make it interesting. Morrison co-produced the album.

MARVIN: Weapons Of The Spirit (Restless 72730)

As a former member of Lone Justice, Marvin Etzioni, now known simply as Marvin, has been through ups and downs. His latest album definitely qualifies as an up, benefitting from excellent guest-starring turns from Victoria Williams and former L.J. lead singer Maria McKee. The duet with Williams, "Daughter Of The Rainbow," is a lovely number, while McKee provides backing vocals on the groovin' "Temple And Shrine" and the rockin" "Bending And Craving." Everybody knows what McKee and Williams are capable of; the pleasant surprise here is how well the rest of the album holds up without a little help from his friends. The best of the rest: the title track and Where I Am Is Where I Wanna Be."



THE SAMPLES: Autopilot (What Are Records? 60008)

Another winner from the Colorado band, who've steadily built up a legion of admirers with their previous albums and incessant touring. Led by the silky vocals and jangly guitars of Sean Kelly, the quartet glide through the 11-song assortment of ditties. The band is at their best with the pop sounds of "As Tears Fall," but prove to be adept with the

ballad, "Weight Of The World," as well as the rocker with "Water Rush." A band to seek out.

■ JEFF BUCKLEY: Grace (Columbia 57528)

Yes, you've probably heard the name, but this is Buckley's first album. Last year, Buckley went the unusual route of releasing a live e.p. as his introduction to the world. The recording, from New York's East Village, was atmospheric, to say the least, but Buckley wastes no time on this album showing he can rock with the gritty opening track, "Mojo Pin," revamped from the e.p. Playing with a band, Buckley and his mates create a rich orchestra of sounds that show off how well-versed Buckley is in music history. That same knowledge lends itself to the poise and maturity found on the album. The result is one hell of a debut.



PICK OF THE WEEK



SHAWN COLVIN: Cover Girl (Columbia 57875)

The music from this album emanates from the speakers like a breath of fresh air. Breezy and delightful, Colvin's collection of covers does everything right, from the packaging to the selection of songs. Ranging from renowned songwriters like Tom Waits and Bob Dylan to lesser-known artists such as Greg Brown and Willis Alan Ramsey, the ensuing blend of styles has a flow to it that makes it an album. A great part of the record's success comes from the liner

notes, where Colvin describes, in brief, why each song was placed on the album and what it means to her. Though the largely acoustic music, some of which was recorded live, is very strong, it's that personal feel the album presents that makes it great. In addition, starting off with the upbeat "Every Little Thing She Does Is Magic" Police cover, was an excellent decision as it sets the tone for the remainder of the album. A wonderful record free of pretension that puts the music first.

EX-GIRLFRIEND: It's A Woman Thang (Reprise 45376). Producers: Various.

Production is the key to this music. There's a nearly seamless wall of sound on each track. And this comely quartet has to work hard at finding space for their blended vocals. The tone of this album is about gettin' busy on the horizontal cha-cha tip. They don't even pretend at subtlety. It's all about putting the "X In Your Sex," "Can I Get Nasty, " "Sexual Chocolate" and the "Cost Of Love." The grooves are funky, the harmonies shimmer and the vibe is youthful.

CHANGING FACES: Changing Faces (Big Beat 92369). Producers: Kenny Kornegay, R. Kelly & others.

Incredibly mature production on most of this album provides a rock solid foundation for this lovely duo's seductive vocals. Little wonder...people like R. Kelly ("Stroke You Up"), Devante Swing ("Keep It Right There") and Heavy D. ("Baby Your Love") all take a turn at the console and help sculpt sexy wordplay. The contemporary R&B ballads on this collection are quietly powerful. Other tracks of note include "Lovin Ya Boy," "One Of Those Things," "Foolin' Around" and "Good Thing."



BILLY LAWRENCE: One Might Say (East-West 92367). Producers: Kevin Deane & others.

The opening, title track forward, it's clear there's an effort to transcend the cubbyhole that much of contemporary black music is shoved through. There has been an earnest effort to acquaint radio with the unique style that is this St. Louis native's music. The grooves fairly well lilt along, and even when she switches up from stinky funk like "Feelings Carry On" to more stringdriven swoons like "Happiness," and then on to a country-fresh tune like "Truly," Lawrence's babydoll voice seems to find the right place to show up.

RUBY ANDREWS: Ruby (Goldwax 4774). Producers: E.W. Clark, Sr.

There's no mistaking this for anything but what it is: serious R&B blues. Ruby doesn't pretend that she wants contemporary R&B radio airplay. She tells stories that only a generation or two removed from the New Jack swing era might understand. There are no click tracks on this album-it's musicians playing each lick, and Ruby beside them in this musical wilderness. The opening track, "Dead To The Right In The Wrong," is apt example of what this woman has to offer.

PICK OF THE WEEK



VARIOUS ARTISTS: Fresh Soundtrack (RCA 66478). Producers: Various.

A combination of old-school veteran and up-and-coming hip-hop and rap acts come together in this collection of music inspired by the film Fresh. Wu-Tang Clan's remix of "Can It Be So Simple" has a deep, dark aura about it and should help bring a great deal of attention to this album. But discount Whodini ("Freaks Come Out At Night"), Cold Crush Brothers ("Fresh, Wild, Fly And Bold") and Grand-

master Master Flash and the Furious Five ("It's Nasty"). If the movie does just so-so at the box office, this album could spark.

MACK E.L.: "Get On It" (Bass P.F.P. 94 241).

This is strictly for the bass crowd. The rap is underdeveloped, but the bass groove will satisfy fans of this peculiar Southeastern phenomena. In fact, there is a Southeastern Mix that would seem to be the better bargain for bass beat junkies.

SUSANNAH McCORKLE: From Broadway To Bebop (Concord Jazz 4615). Producer: Carl E. Jefferson.

She's got a great sense of humor. And she doesn't pretend that that bebop is more important than the drama of Broadway. She deftly wraps her vocals around some accomplished soloists (including Randy Sandke on trumpet and reedmen Ken Peplowski and Dick Oates). McCorkle's style would adapt easily to a club venue. Her vocal affectations are diverse and become motifs like on "Chic, Chic Boom Chic." Swing becomes a funk and outside self-gratification is evident on

JOSHUA REDMAN: MoodSwing (Warner Bros. 7072). Producer: Matt Pierson.


This is an aptly titled collection. Redman and his marvelously capable collaborators play music that swirls, envelopes and are kaleidoscopic in width and depth. Moody blues spring forth; sassy, introspective muse abounds; and playful tonality is sparklingly evident. And that's just on the first composition, "Sweet Sorrow." "Chill" is like a stroll down a tony Manhattan sidewalk. And "Faith" is like reflection on the inner mirror. Bassist Christian McBride, drummer Brian Blades and pianist Brad Mehldau complement the emotional landscape served up by Redman.

PAUL WNTER: Prayer For The Wild Things (Living Music 0028). Producer: P. Winter.

You have to go somewhere quiet to listen to Paul Winter, who on this album springs forth like a swirl of autumn leaves aloft on a gentle breeze and who performs like a warm summer sunset. Production in this album is the key. The reed, violin, bass and cello riffs are more diverse than superficial examination might suggest. Take a "Moose Walk" and let the groove take you down a heady, cerebral, New Age path. This ethereal sonic journey could transcend waking hours, and then you might have an "Antelope Dream." Be careful waking up.

TIM WEISBERG: Naked Eyes (Fahrenheit 3451). Producers:

You don't need vocalists when melodies and harmonies are warbled on a flute at the lips of Tim Weisberg. His incredible lyricism on this album is marvelously meshed with a variety of bumpin' rhythmic stances. This is R&B transcending cocktail fusion; it's quasi-Caribbean-spiced funk with incredible dexterity. Tracks like "I'm Talkin' To You," "Brazilian Dance," "A Better World" and the endlessly funky "YoYo" does justice to the ears.

There's an indefatigable energy about this music. Dunlap finds a window to a proper place on nearly each track on this album. Examples of near introspective attention to the music abound on "City, Country, City," "I Let U (Move Me)," "The Lights Went Out And..." and "Groove With You/Be With You."

Dunlap provides a rich rhythmic underpinning to much of this music. He's ably supported by players like keyboardist Al Duncan, bassist Al Turner and saxophonist Ray Manzerolle.

Fusion meets R&B/jazz with passion as drummer White and his crew establish an identity throughout the album. White and company accomplish this take without becoming burdensome. Established sidemen like saxophonist Everette Harp, guitarist Eric Gale, keyboardists John Beaseley and Brian Sampson make for a diverse and in-pocket delivery. The title track and the dusky rendition of Monk's classic "Round Midnight" are demonstrations of diversity and craftsmanship.

RIM SHOTS: Instrumental music and jazz is the focus of a marriage between Salem, MA-based Rykodisc Records and Gramavision Records, and first offsprings from that label will be compilations featuring eclectic electric guitarist John Scofield and harmodolic (i.e. Ornette Coleman) graduate bassist Jamaaldeen Tacuma. Both are to be released in October. The depth and width of the Gramavision catalog must have been attractive to Rykodisc. More recognizable names in the catalog include funkmeister keyboardist Bernie Worrell, John Carter, Taj Mahal, the J.B. Horns, LaMonte Young, Bobby Previte and Robert Wyatt, current artists such as Medeski, Martin & Wood (an acid jazz trio), big band composer Bob Moses and Ray Anderson and rock jazz fusionists David Fluczinynski and John Medeski's Lunar Crush. Exclusive distribution of the Gramavision catalog will be handled in the U.S. through The Rep Company, the Minneapolis-based music distributor owned by Rykodisc. Gramavision will relocate its offices to the Salem lot...

Erotiques-Music For Romantic Interludes is set for release on Sept. 13 by Playfull Records. The 10 tracks on the album were composed by James Baker, Scott Borden (any relation to Lizzy?) and Mike Mullen...

A shout out and prayer to Los Angeles Times legendary jazz journalist Leonard Feather who, as of this writing, was in guarded condition in the hospital. No other details were available at our press date...

Some of the most compelling word music comes from a Los Angeles-based artist named Lynn Manning, who kicks flavor on life in a way that would make Last Poets proud. The man's eyes might be blind, but he can definitely see. His album, Clarity of Vision, has been released on New Alliance Records, a Southern California label. He speaks on a number of relevant topics couched in the clothing of muse. One of the writer's faves is "Electric Midnight Emergency Call," a six-minute, 15-second slice of jazz riff and insightful, echoplexed wordplay. This man and Reg E. Gaines of Mercury Records can do damage to the soul—Reg as the funky now-wit'-it kind of guy, and Lynn as the water-well-deep professor...

There's nothing overwhelmingly compelling on the video sent out in support of the Joshua Redman Quartet album MoodSwing...well, except for the music. It's a nice look at this band in the studio, plying their respective craftwork with precision and inspiration. Quartet members Christian McBride (the bassist with whom most jazz A&R people would like to have a recording contract), drummer Brian Blades and pianist Brad Mehldau join saxman Redman in a verbal assessment of the musical content, as strains of the music waft forth. The opening peek of Redman trying to get drummer Blade to stop playing is a visual kick.

3 Chains O' Gold

WARNER REPRISE VIDEO is releasing 3 Chains O' Gold as a visual longform adjunct to their latest "performer formerly known as Prince' project Come. Here he's known as Prince-I swear that's the way the credits read, don't point that pistol mic at me!

It's a colorful, fashion-laden, risqué (female frontal nudity) 73 minutes that showcases 11 tunes encased in a loose tale of how Prince and mysterious Mayte (she gets Introductory billing here) get together...lots of intrigue, posturing imagery and entertainment.

The tunes include "My Name Is Prince," "Sexy Mother Fucker" (which, following nudity and a kill-

ing, becomes unintentionally humorous as two factions of posturing, costumed men face one another in garage for a dance and shout out with pistol mics.). 'I Wanna Melt With U'' and title tune "3 Chains O' Gold," among others.

Piece includes some early, vintage footage from the old "That's Incredible" TV show featuring a young "Princess Mayte" (8-10 years old) doing a belly dance routine, "incredibly" flipping three coins with belly muscles. Kirstie Alley turns up as a TV newsperson in Minneapolis.

Directors include Parvis Patton, Randee St. Nicholas and, Paisley Park with P.P. also credited as Producer. Pieces feature less visual gimmickry than most music videos, allowing the performers to perform, and that is appreciated. All in all, a fun piece.

The Who's Tommy, The Amazing Journey

SOMEBODY OVER AT ELEGANT FILMS has a delicious sense of history and Buena Vista Home Video is bringing it out. This anniversary celebration spotlights the journey of The Who's Tommy rock opera from the reason it was written-"1 got bored with endlessly trotting out three-minute...tunes," says Pete Townshend, which was only one of several reasonsto its present incarnation on stage, over 25 years of maturation.

This is a wonderfully interesting documentary, smoothly directed by Barry Alexander Brown positioning vintage footage from The Who's beginnings through the first Tommy with present footage of them reminiscing about their history. Townshend, Roger Daltrey and John Entwhistle seem aware of their place within the scope of rock music history and are comfortable with it, speak with maturity and humor about it and themselves. What comes through is a thorough respect and love for one another and their accomplishments.

There are also interviews with Phil Collins remembering calling Townshend after original drummer Keith Moon's death to ask to play drums for the group; Elton John, the film's Pinball Wizard; Tina Turner, Gypsy the speed queen; and the film's director Ken Russell, who remembers his time with the project—he's represented with interviews from both Then and Now-as well as Bill Curbishley, the group's long-time manager; Des McAnuff, the current stage production director, and choreographer Wayne Cilentro and current performers in the show.

All reflect on the varied periods of their and Tommy's lives and one of the highlights is Daltrey remembering their appearance at Woodstock '69, seeing the sun rise over the crowd while performing "See Me" and recalling the feeling he had at the moment.

It's a terrific look back as well as sporting a good take on today and an acceptance of the future, a wonderfully well balanced and rounded video. Produced for Elegant Films by Eve Chilton and Maude Chilton. Executive producer is David Linde.

Chet Atkins Gets Some Licks In

OR MOST ENTERTAINERS, being ranked sixth in Life Magazine's "100 Most Important People in the History of Country" would be one of the biggest distinctions of their career, but for Chet Atkins it's only another in a long list of accolades and achievements for a career that began well over 40 years ago.

Well respected for his many talents in the music industry, Atkins is considered by many to be one of the chief architects for what is termed the "Nashville Sound," both as a producer and a musician. As the recipient of 12 Grammy awards and nine CMA awards, being named the youngest inductee (at age 49) into the Country Music Hall of Fame and having a street named in his honor on Nashville's Music Row, Atkins has done, played, seen and heard just about everything. Whether it's playing on such rock classics as Elvis Presley's "Heartbreak Hotel" and "Hound Dog" or discovering and producing the likes of the Everly Brothers, Roy Orbison, Perry Como, Waylon Jennings, Willie Nelson, Dolly Parton, Charley Pride and Don Gibson, Atkins brings his innovative style and boundary-crossing appeal to everything he touches.

Although the music industry may know him for his multitude of accomplishments, his fans know him best for his ability to breath life into a guitar. Voted *Guitar Player* Magazine's "Popular Music's Most Influential Stylist," Atkins has remained one of the most in-demand session guitarists in Nashville history and has collaborated with such contemporary artists as Dire Straits frontman Mark Knopfler, Paul McCartney (who has credited Atkins for being a major influence on the Beatles), jazz great Earl Klugh and pop star George Benson.

After recording over 75—seventy-five—albums with RCA Records, Atkins moved to Columbia Records in 1982 and has recorded six albums since. The latest project, Read My Licks, is the culmination of Atkins' experience, poise, style and grace when it comes to the music he loves. Cash Box caught up with Atkins at his office in Nashville, where he talked of his music, his forthcoming TNN special, Nashville's future and the future of country music.

Cash Box: Tell us about this latest album.

Atkins: Two guys here in town wrote a song called "Read My Licks," and it's about a guy who, when he wants to tell his girlfriend certain things, gets embarrassed and shy and can't say the words. So he plays the words on the guitar. They wrote it and brought it to me, of course, because I play guitar and sing a little. I thought it was a good title for an album. I'd been working on some other tunes, so we used that for a title.

I wrote about five of the tunes on there. There's a couple of standards...there's "After Your Gone" by Suzy Bogguss. I decided to collect from her because I had played on several of her records and I knew that she'd sing on one of mine if I ever asked her. Then Eric Johnson has come to some of my shows out in Austin, where he lives, and he's a great rock 'n' roll player and I knew that he'd probably play on it. There's a cut in there of me and George Benson called "Dream." Also, there's Steve Wanner-l've played on a lot of his stuff, too, and he's played on mine and I admire him a lot as a person and a great musician. So it was just a friendly get-together, trying to play some nice melodies and so on

Before you start an album, do you have in mind someone you'd like to have on it?

No, it's mostly determined by the tunes that you write or pick up here and there. After 1 make the tracks on those and do my part 1 think, "Maybe Steve Wariner would sound good on this because he's a better singer than 1 am. He could sing part of it with me." So that's kind of how it worked.

How long were you in the studio?

I was in the studio to make the tracks about three days. The mixing took a long time. We mixed it and then didn't like some of the mixes, and a guy came in from Detroit, who I admire a lot, and he mixed some. We were in an unfortunate situation because I had to go out and do a Christmas special with Vince Gill, so I wasn't here when they did a lot of the mixes. We had to talk on the telephone a lot while we were out there to try and determine what was important on each track. But it turned out alright—we wound up going back and using some of the old mixes and some of the new. Sounds alright to me...I never listen to my records, except for when they first come out to see if everything is alright.

Do you have the final say as to what goes on the finished project?

I guess so, yes. I was co-producer with David Hungate, a bass player here in Nashville that used to be with Toto. He's a fine musician and adds a bit of class to anything he's associated with.

Is this an album that will have any singles released from it?

I don't have anything to do with that. [Columbia] might plan something, I don't know.

Is that something you can see happening?

I hope so...we've mailed about three cuts out to jazz stations and to New Age stations. They're promoting it also on stations that don't report to the

> magazines. There's an awful lot of stations out there that can play what they wans.

The National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences is honoring you and Owen Bradley with the Governors Award on August 31...what does that award mean to

They're raising money for a chanty. Brenda Lee came to Owen and wanted him to do it. He said, "I'll do it if Chet will do it." He kind of wanted to do it because he loves Brenda and I said, "I'll do it if you want me to" because I love Owen a lot. When I was younger, years ago, I wanted to be like Owen and I still admire him a lot. He's a clever man and he's smart and he was and still is a great producer, so we're doing it. But they go around and pick on our friends and raise money and sell tickets. I wish they just had it for Owen. I'll be there and maybe I can say some nice things about Owen, which l'd like to do.

What about this TNN special that's scheduled to air on September

It's kind of like the album...we took the people we could get who played on

the album. Suzy's on there, Steve Wariner, Eric Johnson, and others....

The first tune I play [is] a tune called "Young Thing," a little boogie-woogie tune played on guitar. If the people will notice on TV during that first tune, my fly is unzipped during the whole first song [it will actually be edited out of the show]. I mean, it is gaped open, but I had on beautiful shorts, so it didn't matter. I was playing and I thought something was wrong, then I looked down and I had already played two tunes. So I stopped and went out in front of the audience, zipped up, and went back and finished. They showed it on TNN the other night on "Music City Tonight." Steve Wariner was there and he brought a clip and they showed it. That's not the first time that happened to me. Up in Portland, Maine once, I played about two tunes and I reached over to get my classic guitar and I felt a draft. It was kind of cold. I got the guitar and I looked down and saw this guy holding up this sign that said, "Your fly is unzipped." So, of course, I autographed the sign after the show. It didn't embarrass me...it's kind of funny.

How important has television become in the career of today's country artists?

It's become a visual business over the past few years. Back when Owen and I were producing so much it was an audio business; people bought what they heard---they didn't care what the hell the guy looked like. A lot of times they didn't know until he was a star. Now they buy young, virile artists, handsome girls and boys who look great on the video and most of them sing a lot alike. Of course, if you hear anyone long enough you can kind of recognize different things in their voice and style. But not like when we used to have Ernest Tubbs, Johnny Cash, Hank Snow, Eddy Arnold and all those great stylists. Those were the good times, I think.

Now it seems to be strictly visual, young handsome people...even a guy like Randy Travis, the greatest country singer around today, I think. Since he came on the scene, he's just been a wonderful country singer. People have kind of cast him aside, and he's still young, you know. He doesn't have nearly that magnetism he used to have and it's too bad, but the public...they're kind of insatiable and I don't think that star power will last as long for those people as it has for George Jones, Johnny Cash and the great stylists of the years past. I hope they do, but there's so damn many of them....

Hits use to last a lot longer, you know. If you had a hit it would be a hit for six months or something. They'll (record companies) have a tune be #1 for a week or so and then they'll move that off and try to get something else on there. The time span is even shorter. I don't think anybody, Cash Box, Billboard or anybody, reflects what the hits are. They reflect what the record companies are promoting and what the video stations are promoting. The public gets left somewhere along the way.

Do you think a lot of producers today are having to adapt the music to meet certain demands?

There's so much conformity---it's easy for an old guy like me to say, but it's true. I remember back when Owen and I use to make records, we could experiment and try different sounds like that Floyd Cramer piano-style---it changed the world....

There should be room for a lot of things that aren't there. It's all about line dancing now...the tempo's got to be right for line dancing. Not all of the people

are that way, but there's a lot of that going on with the record companies--with the producers, with the radio stations, with the programmers, with everybody.

Mike Curb of Curb Records said that Nashville would be the pop capital by the year 2000. What do you think?

You know, it wouldn't surprise me a damn bit because it's been getting that way ever since I got in the business. I remember I went to work for RCA officially in 1957, and I was just trying to keep my job...l'd been fired from every job l ever had. I made records and finally I had big hits with Don Gibson with "Oh, Lonesome Me" and "I Can't Stop Loving You," and I thought, "Well, it will slack off and they'll start making hits somewhere else and l'Il get fired again." But each year it would grow and it would always surprise me and I would think, "We survived again---l haven't gotten fired!" So finally, after several years, I realized that it was going to keep growing and keep getting bigger and bigger.

And it has and will continue to, I guess. It all depends on the writers. The

writers are everything. Without the writers, you don't have anything. I was so lucky when I produced. A lot of writers, like Harlan [Howard] and those guys, who were really good friends and still are, would bring me good songs. That was the hardest part of producing, telling writers that you can't use this. I would say, "Take it over to Owen, 'so-and-so' can do it" and come up with some excuse, because it really hurts a writer's feelings when they get turned down. That was the most difficult part of the job...that and dropping an artist. I hated that. I never learned how do to it without it tearing my heart out. So I got out of it. I don't want any more production duties.

Are you worried about the younger country fan not having a sense of the history of country music?

They also don't know the old songs. They will gradually as they get older learn the history and everything...maybe listen to some of the old records and laugh, the way every generation laughs at the other. But it's bound to happen. You've got to make room for the young people. When I die, they'll play my records and they'll say, "Boy, he was great, wasn't he?" and you'll never hear from me again. That's the way it's going to be---you've got to make room for the young folks.

Where is country music headed?

If I knew that, I'd be a genius. I think it will keep changing and changing and changing because the public demands that. Because every time you come out with a record, you have to surprise the public with something different. Who knows what direction it will go? Out there somewhere, somebody will innovate and write about another subject and start a trend, but always, though, I think it will go back to pure country music. I think it will move uptown, get homogenized, and then some great country artist like the Kendalls or a Randy Travis or a Ricky Skaggs or somebody like that will come along and bring us back to where we should be. It will continue to change and come back to pure country again. But it really depends on the writers. If people continue to give the writers respect, and if they record the best damn songs they can find instead of what they publish or what some artist wrote that isn't that good a writer, then I think it can continue and be the pop capital in America by 2000.

The auction will begin with the sale of Twitty's home and office furnishings on October 14. All remaining items will be sold on the following two days. The estate sale, under the direction of **ADT Truck and Equipment Auctions**, will also include four automobiles personally owned by Twitty, particularly the 1956 green Thunderbird which has been on display at Twitty City since 1982 and is prominently displayed on his 1981 **MCA album** *Mr. T.*

For those who can't afford the actual items, the estate is preparing a limited-edition buyer's guide and commemorative book, which will be available in mid-September, complete with photos and descriptions of the significance of certain items.

The auction comes as a result of the late country singer's heirs not being able to reach an agreement on the value of Twitty's personal property, according to **Hugh Carden**, co-executor of the Twitty estate.

News From The United Kingdom

EMI PROFITS UP: EMI Music recorded a 16% increase in turnover to £404.9 million for the three months to June 30. Operating profit increased 14.6% to £33 million compared with the same period last year.

This was attributed to the performance sales from albums such as **Pink** Floyd's *The Division Bell* and the **Canto Gregoriano** disc. Solid performance from **Virgin**, **HMV** also increased turnover by 12.4% year on year to £87.8 million.

THE CHRYSALIS ROAD SHOW: Chrysalis Records may take its retail road show to the continent after it attracted more than 1,400 dealers and journalists to five U.K. dates during August. The road show, which was to celebrate the company's 25th birthday, turned out to be so successful that they now want to visit other countries where the label is represented. It is acclaimed to be the first show of this nature to be undertaken by a major record company for three years. PolyGram went on the road in 1991, three years after the last EMI tour in 1988.

RWANDAN AID SINGLE: Music Relief has secured a deal with EMI UK to release the Rwandan charity single "You're The Voice/What's Going On" featuring Aswad on September 26th. 35 acts have already confirmed their support to the project.

SUNDAY TRADE: Record stores were set to take advantage of the first day of legal Sunday trading in the U.K. last weekend. Most multiples responded to the new laws, which came into force after the new Sunday Trading Act reached the statute book on Friday.

EMI RECORDS ON THE MOVE: EMI Records will be vacating its historic Manchester Square offices in the new year. The company's 200 staff were told last Wednesday of plans to move to a newly refurbished building in Brook Green, between Hammersmith and Shepherds Bush between May and June '95. The label will be taking its landmark staircase railing, which was featured on the Beatles' "Red" and "Blue" album sleeves, with it. EMI will join the long-term drift of the music industry towards West London, which will leave only Sony and MCA in the centre of the capital.

NEW JAMES ALBUM IN & OUTM: Fontana is planning to delete the new James album Wah Wah (released on September 12) after one week. Phonogram managing director Howard Berman says the 23-track album offers retailers a genuine limited-edition.

RASCHKES KILLED IN ACCIDENT: Carole Raschkes, marketing manager for Touche Ross, died in a parachuting accident last week, aged 37. Raschkes died instantly after the accident at the RAF base at Weston-On-The-Green in Oxfordshire. She was an experienced parachutist and civilian

member of the RAF Sport Parachute Association. Raschkes, a well-known face at **Midem**, had worked with the **BPI** on behalf of Touche Ross' management consultancy division.

FRANKY MILLER SCARE: I was saddened to hear that the legendary singer Franky Miller suffered a cerebral hemmorrhage in New York last week. I am sure I would be joined by many others in the industry to wish him a speedy recovery.

ON THE ROAD: UB40 have refused to play in South Africa since their formation in 1978, despite repeated requests from promoters. Their records have been released, but only in their original form, which has caused embarrassment to the previous government due to the critical nature of the lyrics. Apartheid is now a thing of the past and the band will play their first concerts in the country this autumn: 30th September, Cape Town; 5th October, Durban; 8th October, Pretoria...The vocal master of contemporary soul, Luther Vandross, returns to the U.K. to appear for one night only at the Albert Hall, London on September 13th... A full scale U.K. tour is currently being put together for Dodgy; meanwhile they will be appearing on September 14, Derby; 15, Plymouth; 16, The Venue New Cross London...Due to illness, Soundgarden have been forced to cancel their U.K. and European tours that were to have commenced this coming Thursday, August 25th. Lead singer Chris Cornell has suffered severe strain to his vocal cords and is under strict medical directive to immediately stop all strenuous use of his voice in order to avoid permanent damage and allow for a complete recovery...Michael Ball will be touring the U.K. from the 28th November thru to December 21st...Proclaimers dates: October 6th thru to the 26th...Ramones on tour in Europe; the brothers four return to the U.K. to play 4 dates in September.

News From Japan

A NEW SUBSIDIARY COMPANY of SME (Sony Music Entertainment), Double O Records has been established with SME investments. The most clear feature of the new company, according to a person concerned, is making fresh music with various concepts to meet new demands of the permanently changing generation. At the same time, a new label of the company, Oken/Sony, has been set up. The first release of the new label will be released November 21.

THE TOTAL REVENUES OF VICTOR ENTERTAINMENT for the 26th fiscal term (April 1993 to March 1994) were, according to a survey conducted by Cash Box Tokyo, \$939.49 million, 1% down from the prior fiscal year. Breaking it down: CDs showed 49.2% of the total with \$461.96 million, 7% up from the year stated above. On the other hand, analog records were \$4.55 million, 0.5% of the total indicating a sharp recovery of a 607% increase. Music tapes were \$24.98 million, 2.6% of the total and an 8% drop. The total of the audio division, including the three items mentioned above, was \$491.49 million, 52% of the total, up 7%. A comparison of audio softwares between domestic works and internationals showed 82% to 18%. Domestic titles were \$403.22 million while international titles showed \$88.27 million. Video softwares were \$389.98 million, 41.5% of the total, down 12%. Game

THE COALITION OF COPYRIGHT HOLDERS of Japan has disclosed a statement on CD-R and delivered it to EIAJ (Electric Industry Assoiciation of Japan). The note said, "...economics damages by advents on the market of CD-R are supposed to be very serious to copyright holders. We are unable to admit unconditional release of it on the market.'

CANDI SOSA: Cuba...Mi Corazon Te Llama (Discos Dos Coronas)

Candi Sosa is truly a living Latin legend, at least in Los Angeles. She is not only a talented performer, but an incredibly impressive songwriter. With her premiere release of *Cuba*, *Mi Corazon Te Lllama*, Sosa exhibits her incredible versatility as an accomplished entertainer, composer and vocalist. The opening number is a swinging Salsa number, "Llamada Collect," reliving the childhood calls to her parents in Cuba. The Salsa fever continues with "Contigo No

Quiero Na','' a heavy danceable tune that perhaps echoes the spirit of Salseras everywhere. Traditional Cuban rhythms, guaguaneo, comparsa and merengue abound in this album, including some pleasant surprises. There is "Caribbean Blue," an Afro-Cuban ballad ending in an explosive Yoruba chant. Then there is the poetic side of Sosa as evident in two tunes: "Para Quedarme Contigo" and "Piel de Arbol." Harry Scorzo accompanies on violin in addition to Sosa's acoustic guitar. Sosa has the uncanny ability to cast her musical magic in a very infectious, yet innocent way. Listen to the merengaso "Cuando El Amor Se Va," the impassioned Salsa number, "Apasionada," as well as the bilingual "Como He DeSaber." Her trademark tune is "Sola Naci," one that'll have you swinging on any dance floor.

EL RETORNO DE MELCOCHITA: Libertad (Levesque)

Peruvian Salsa veteran vocalist Melcochita returns to delight dancers and music lovers alike with his first recorded compact disc, Libertad. This writer remembers Melcochita years ago as his sister's back-up vocalist. The lady's name was Lita Branda. Where's Lita now? Who knows, since even Meleochita won't say. The artist's first selection is "Madre," a sad, tear-jerking, yet danceable tune dedicated to the memory of moms everywhere. The second of eight tunes is a call by Melcochita to all Latins to wake up: we will succeed, if we prepare! Upon hearing "Mulata II," you start wondering if Melcochita has ever met Monguito or vice-versa. Whatever, since Melcochita does nothing but cook on each selection. "Baila Mi Rumba" features the timbale solo artistry of Pablo "Chino" Nunez. Then there's Papo Pepin on congas. Equally notably The most danceable is Jose Mangual, Jr., on maracas, chorus and guiro. tune is "Rumbera Mayor." This number has never failed to work for any nightclub DJ. "Cali Flamenco" is a moving tribute to Columbians. "El Sopon' follows in that same tradition with a tinge of vallenato. The album ends with a monster number, "Pegaso." The storyline is about a horse whose owner is betting everything on. Melcochita's horse does come in with this for-sure winner.

ISIDRO INFANTE & LA ELITE: Isidro Infante & La Elite (Marcas)

Recorded in New York and Puerto Rico, Isidro Infante launches his first solo project with this, but his list of credits would probably fill most of the pages of this magazine. He is one of the top premiere arrangers, producers, musical directors, composers and musicians in the Salsa recording business. On this venture, Infante co-writes only once on the very smooth "Has Qedada Retratada.'' Infante features two talented vocalists, Ricky Soto and Di Carlo. The first number is the swinging "Nave De Papel," sung very ably by Soto. "Ganas Que Tenga De Ti" will surely delight dancers with consistent swing. Infante has an uncanny knack of producing fresh melodic numbers. Other contemporaries don't possess that spark of creativity nor a sound ear. A number of Salsa artists have turned to Infante for an assist with their material. Yari More consulted him prior to releasing his debut project. Undoubtedly the man has a golden touch in this regard. Virtually every selection in this group of eight (should've been at least ten) is a gem for any band to reproduce. In "Paga Que Debes," singer Soto once again does a great rendition. The number does invoke memories of material previously offered by Ray Sepulveda. You be the judge. The best number is "Estoy Jugando Con Fuego." The swing is suave yet relentlessly assertive. You'll be humming the melody in no time flat. Finally, and a bit surprisingly considering all the songs this man must love, Infante ends with the Lucho Bermudez classic "San Fernando" in a straightahead Salsa style. Join the Salsa elite and pick up Isidro Infante's premiere work.

THE LATIN LOWDOWN

THE AUGUST 13 ISSUE of Cash Box revealed an interesting news item. It noted that Gloria Estefan's Mi Tierra

was the first all-Latin album to reach Platinum since Linda Ronstadt's Canciones De MiPadre in 1987. Has it really taken seven years for Latin artists to repeat such an achievement? Does this type of milestone necessarily mark a sudden resurgence of the Latin music market? Is there a critical need for revitalization or will it be business as usual? In forthcoming columns, a more in-depth look into these and other issues facing the Latin music industry will be explored. Until then, here are some new developments:

Carlos Nuno and his Gran D Madrid are the first Salsa act to be signed by the newly formed independent FonoVisa Tropical. This artist caused quite a sensation on his debut release for the Musical Productions label in 1993. The album, La Grande de Madrid Para Puerto Rico y El Mundo, was his fourth, but also his first Salsa project. With an uncanny ability to mimic Julio Iglesias, Nuno's physical appearance is more akin to Paul McCartney. His latest album, De Cintura Para Abajo, will include three original compositions. It goes on sale September 22. The first single, "Aguita De Coco," was released late this month and receiving strong airplay....

While Willie Colon and Ruben Blades have been pursuing non-musical interests for sometime now, another Salsa icon has switched career paths...sort of, anyway. Eddie Santiago recently caused quite a stir in Puerto Rico when he pinched-hit as a sportscaster on Radio San Juan during a baseball game there. As to the stats on Santiago's chart action, his current album, Cada Vez Otra Vez (EMI Latin) continues to sell steadily. The newest production, set for release in September, will include remakes of earlier hit tuncs such as "Lluiva," "Tu Me Quemas," "Todo Empezo" and "Mia." Composer-singer Luis Angel will be joining him on deck.

Latin jazz enthusiasts have several new releases by veteran artists. The first is Poncho Sanchez' Para Todos (Concord). The three-time Grammy award nominee offers a few classics like Mongo Santamaria's Afro Blue and Rapture by Harold Land. Trumpeter/bandleader Arturo Sandoval has two recordings making it a total of five for GRP. Danzon is a collection of Afro-Cuban music tinged with jazz and fusion. Arturo Sandoval Plays Trumpet Concertos is el maestro's debut classical recording...

SDI recently signed its first regional Mexican group, Rosita Y Casablanca. "El Me Dejo" is the second single to be released. The label's pop balladecr, Rafael Armando, has launched his first single, "Tuyo," from the debut album of the same name. Dominican Bachata vet Victor Victor showcases his long-anticipated project Alma De Barrio on SDI. The single is a medley of bachatas (Dominican ballads) entitled "Medley De Bachatas."...

There has been a increasing amount of consumer interest in Cuban artists. Andy Garcia just produced the Cachao album with the legendary Israel "Cachao" Lopez. BMG has been marketing remastered albums on CD by the likes of Tito Puente, Beny More, Perez Prado and numerous other major artists. The Tropicana label headed by Oliver Berliner has taken another slant in their approach. The indie has released new material from contemporary Cuban artists. The "Cuba on Fire" series features Jacqueline Castellanos' Cuba's Rhythm Queen (La Dama Del Son), La Original de Manzanillo's The Most (La Originalisima) and Elena and Malena Burke's Today And Tomorrow (Hoy Y Manana). Future releases will include El Conjunto Rumbavana, singer Pio Leyva, Elio Reve y su Orquesta, Merceditas Valdes, Habana Son, Los Papines, Maravillas de Florida, Caridad Cuervo and Miriam Bayard. Bola de Nieve, Conjunto Casino and Orquesta Riverside are slated for a later release date....

The indie Joey International recently launched an extensive publicity and promotions campaign. Its primary focus is on the thriving Banda and Rancheras/Nortenas market. Several full-page ads (along with a CD sampler insert) have been bought in the Spanish-language trade monthly Antenna out of Camarillo, CA. Rhonda, Los Chacales de Pepe Tovar, Los Medinas, Astros de China and Banda Super Golpe are in the exclusive line-up....
