The multi-dimensional Herbie Hancock recently released Dis Is Da Drum, his debut album for Mercury Records. The record is a compendium of Hancock's 360 degree perspective on music. While he didn't intend the record to be a jazz album, his jazz roots come through along with healthy doses of hip-hop, funk and African rhythms. Zoo Downsizes, Restructures L.A. and **Gotham Offices**

ZOO RESTRUCTURES: Zoo Entertainment president Lou Maglia recently announced staff changes in the wake of a February 1995 trimming which will see all of the label's department heads operating from Zoo's Los Angeles headquarters. Zoo will retain its East Coast presence with a condensed staff in New York's BMG offices.

"Our personnel restructuring will ensure that these and other releases will receive the finest in promotions and marketing," says Maglia.

The following as a brief rundown of some of the recently implemented changes at the company:

Ray Gmeiner, AOR promotion v.p., announced the addition of Thomas Westfall as senior director of alternative promotion, to be based in the L.A. office. Westfall previously worked at Mercury Records as national manager

Brooks & Dunn Get RIAA First

RIAA'S MINES MAY GOLD AND PLATINUM: The Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) announced their May awards which included three gold and latinum singles, 15 gold, 16 platinum and 19 multi-platinum albums. Music videos totaled four gold and one platinum. Some of the highlights from the Merry Month of May are: Brooks & Dunn became the first duo in country music history to land three multi-platinum albums when their current Waitin' On Sundown certified double-platinum completed the hat trick after Brand New Man and Hard Workin' Man.

Pink Floyd's 1979 concept album The Wall jumped the 10 million U.S. sales wall to make them the fifth act in music history with two albums certified at or above 10 million. The Dark Side Of The Moon is certified at 13 million.

Toni Braxton's self-titled debut album reached the 7 million mark.

TLC landed their second consecutive triple-platinum album with CrazySexyCool.

Alison Krauss walked with gold and platinum for Now That I've Found You, The Dave Matthews Band's Under The Table And Dreaming and Des'ree's I Ain't Movin' were also among new artists achieving their first Platinum albums.

AGE OLD QUESTION: If it is summer then it must be Festival season, and the Knitting Factory, one of New York's groundbreaking clubs is hosting its 8th Annual What Is Jazz fest. The shows are being held over a week and a half at four different locations including the new Knitting Factory, the Old Knit, Whitney Museum and Summer Stage in Central Park. Here are a few of the highlights day by day—June 19th: Jazz Passengers. June 20th: Tom Cora's Roof, Cecil Taylor Solo June 21st: Joey Baron's Baron Down, Bill Ware Trio June 22nd: Charles Gayle Quartet, William Hooker & Billy Bang, Don Byron Quintet. June 23rd: Archie Shepp, Richard Davis, Jackie Byard, Alleh Dawson. June 24th: David S. Ware Quartet, Henry Threadgill Quartet, June 25th: Anthony Coleman Trio, Skatalites. June 26th: David Murray Big Band. June 27th: Roy Haynes Quartet June 28th: Thomas Chapin Trio, Lester Bowie's Brass Fantasy. June 29th: Jazzhole. June 30th: Jim Nolet and Bern Nix's New York Is Now, James "Blood" Ulmer Music Revue Ensemble. Each night contains between 7 to 9 acts and tickets range from \$18 to \$22, depending on the day.

BAND OF ATTRACTION: Last Sunday the Magnetic Fields played another one of their packed gigs at the music showcase Mercury Lounge. This foursome recently put out an album under the name The 6ths on London Recordings to great critical acclaim. The LP entitled Wasp's Nests features fifteen of their songs all sung by different people including Mac McCaughan of Superchunk, Lou Barlow of Sebadoh, Barbara Manning of The San Francisco Seals, and the producer Mitch Easter. This time though it was just Stephin Merritt singing his own infectious perfect pop with the backing of the usual cello, guitar and drums. And, like any of their stage appearances, half the fun was seeing the banter between Stephin, drummer Claudia Gonson and the audience. The Magnetic Fields have just completed recording their next album called Get Lost, which will be out sometime in early Fall on Merge Records. Their previous records are finally back in print on the same label

DOWN HOME: Maxwell's in Hoboken, across the Hudson from the Big Apple, was the site of a gathering of bands from the edges of the South. Hailing from Tampa, Florida was the DIY band Home. Looking like band nerds who had stumbled through a 70's used clothing store, the group played what sounded like early Elton John filtered through a mesh of Sonic Youth/Dinosaur Jr. The playfulness on stage with their numbers was definitely appreciated. Home's debut album IX is out on Relativity.

On the other side of Dixie is where The Grifters are based. Memphis is not just a place they sleep. You can hear it coming out of their music. Out now supporting their seven song Eureka E.P. on Shangri-La they continue to show why they can never be pinned down. Through their many recordings one can hear the mixture of blues, country and rock, for which their hometown is famous, seeping out of their songs. And each time they play, one is never sure which influence will be the predominant factor, making each appearance unique. Which probably explains why their fans just keep on increasing.

Tickets go on sale nationwide at Ticketmaster June 24. Plans for a worldwide television broadcast will be announced shortly. There are a lot of cliches and hyperbole used in rock, but with more acts to be announced, and Bruce on the bill, this really is a once in a lifetime event. Hope to see you there.

ATTENTION WOULD BE ROCK STARS!: NBC's Late Night With Conan O'Brien, AT&T and Warner Music Enterprises are teaming up for the "10th Annual College Band Search." Following up on last year's successful search, which led to a deal for a seven-inch single with Los Angeles-based Restless Records for winning band Blightobody, O'Brien is 'scouring the country' for this year's hottest college band

The winning band will appear on Late Night and have its song recorded on CD and distributed to more than 350,000 subscribers of huH magazine. The publication is Warner Music's monthly music magazine that includes an exclusive full-length CD with every issue.

The 1995 grand prize also includes round-trip airfare, three nights and four days of hotel accomodations in New York and \$500 spending money for the winning band. Prizes for the 20 runner-up bands include a free annual subscription to huH.

Late Night began the band-search event last year with the "9th Annual College Band Search" (O'Brien claims the first eight were conducted in his parents' basement), and more than 300 bands submitted entries. To this year's hopefuls, O'Brien urges, "Blow off finals. Rehearse for my show."

The contest runs until June 15. Entrants are invited to submit half inch

videotapes of up to five minutes in length to: Conan O'Brien's 10th Annual College Band Search, Maildrop 4852, 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10112.

FOR THOSE FEELING A LITTLE Clueless this summer, Capitol Records may have the answer. Capitol will be releasing the soundtrack to the upcoming Paramount Pictures teenage romantic comedy Clueless starring rcd-hot rising star Alicia Silverstone The first single from the album, due on July 18, will be Luscious Jackson's "Here," which can also be found on their Natural Ingredients CD. Other acts featured on the album include Radiohead, The Beastie Boys and The Smoking Popes. Among the artists contributing new tracks are Cracker, Jill Sobule, World Party, The Muffs and The Mighty Mighty Bosstones.

Given the impact soundtracks have on the top of the charts, and the fact the Batman Forever soundtrack will have already been out for a month and a half, this one could make its presense felt on the album charts

Herbie Hancock: Future Shock Now

THE IRONY IS this man has always been on the cutting edge of technology and music. But his album, his debut release for Mercury Records is titled Dis Is Da Drum, the drum, the most visceral and primordial instrument on the planetnext to the heartbeat. The person being discussed is Herbie Hancock, who at 55 is as energtic and vital an artist as he was was as a fresh-faced young pianist from Chicago who was part of the famed Miles Davis Quintet that became a touchstone for music to come. Herbie's music remained vivid barometer for the state of music and the quality of his own growth. The energy from his

groundbreaking fusion record 1974's *Headhunters* has scarcely diminished. And his aptly-titled funk/dance/jazz fusion statement *Future Shock* still inspires a horde of hip-hop producers in search of an edge that Hancock seems to consistently supply.

But Hancock said in a story published earlier this year in *Urban Network* that *Dis Is Da Drum*, his first album of new material since 1988, came arduously after a search for the new sound, fresh energy and groundbreaking ideas. "For quite a few years, I just didn't know what I wanted to do," Hancock said in the article. "There was nothing stimulating me from inside or from outside."

But, again ironically, he became intrigued by the possibilities of marrying African beats with street beats, and with the help of long-time collaborator percussionist Bill Summers, they developed the title track of the new album. The remainder of this new offering serves up a bumper crop of beats, grooves and vamps and features Hancock with folks such as Will Roc, Bob Dog and Darrell Smith. While there is the underpinning of hip-hop on much of the album. The only outright rap track is "The Melody," a collaboration with Boo Yaa Tribe's Will Rock.

Even though Hancock did not intend the record to be a jazz album (he admits it sounds more like jazz than he had envisioned) the record will present some challenges for the Mercury marketing and promotion staffs. The company anticipates abundant TV and press exposure (witness this article without so much as a phone interview with the artist) because of who Hancock is. The pianist's broad audience—which includes jazz fans, R&B buffs and a chunk of the hip-hop nation, from New Adult Contemporary to adult alternative— could provide several avenues for promotion and marketing. The character of the album, despite fibers of jazz and straight-up African sounds, will probably attract a younger audience.

While no commercial singles are currently planned by Mercury, a three-track sampler featuring a remake of Hancock's 1974 composition "Butterfly," "Hump" and "Bo Ba Be Da" has been serviced to R&B adult and adult alternative stations. Some stations have been serviced with a Japanese import version of 'Dis Is Da Drum, which features two additional tracks mixed with a more vigorous edge. Clubs are supposed to get a special 12" that features remixes of the title track, "Mojuba" and "Call it '95." The

breakout at radio will likely determine what video will be developed for promotion on that front.

In addition to his album, Hancock recently demonstrated that, while returning to some basic modes of expression musically, he has hardly abandoned his gleeful relationship with cutting edge technology. At a recent press conference held at West Hollywood's House of Blues, Hancock and HOB's new media vp Marc Schiller unveiled a new CD-ROM that will accompany release of *Dis Is Da Drum*.

Ultimately, Hancock is an artist to be experienced live. The centerpiece of a tour of the West Coast in late May and into June is his apperance with a trio at the 17th Annual Playboy Jazz Festival at the Hollywood Bowl. Hancock will appear on the closing night of the two-day musical feast. While it seems unlikely that Hancock will play many selections from his new album, if he just gives the massive audience a taste of the material from his new album, the drum won't seem a part of the past and the future will seem like now.

Billy Joel's *Greatest Hits, Volume 1 and 2* certified at 8 million to make him the first artist to have five albums at or above 7 million

In the music video category, John Tesh got his second gold and platinum award for *Live At Red Rocks* on GTS Records.

ARTISTS' 'ACT OF '95' ON CAPITOL HILL: On behalf of over 225 recording artists who are in full support of the "Digital Performance Right in Sound Recordings Act of 1995 (S.227)," Hilary Rosen, RIAA president, presented an important document to members of the Senate Judiciary Committee in anticipation of the committee's mark-up of the legislation on June 15.

Under the heading, "Artists For A Performance Right Now," the letter asks for "fairness in being granted the same protection as is afforded every other U.S. copyright holder." The document urges lawmakers to pass S.227 without weakening amendments to protect the interests of artists and recording companies in an age of digital delivery.

Artists signing the document include, among others: Don Henley, Sheryl Crow, Billy Joel, Faith Hill, Mary Chapin Carpenter, Victoria Shaw, Amy Grant, Diane Schuur, Maura O'Connell and Steve Ripley of The Tractors.

"Now that digital technology is becoming more prevalent in the marketplace, our members have a heightened awareness of this issue—they know that legal protection of their work is inadequate today," said Bruce York, national executive director of the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA), in a statement. AFTRA represents 75,000 professional performers and broadcasters. Both AFTRA and its sister organization, the American Federation of Musicians (AFM), are longtime supporters of the bill.

PRODUCER PAYNE AT UCLA EXTENSION: Anthony Payne of IM-PULSE, and producer of R.E.M. and INXS, Paul McCartney, Lionel Richie and B.B. King, has been engaged by UCLA Extension to appear at a six-session course beginning June 27, titled "The Music Video Industry Today: The Process, the Players, the Opportunities." The fec for the course is \$295 and students can earn two units of credit in Music.

The comprehensive update on the music video industry examines the evolution of the form; how music videos become commissioned, created, written, produced, edited and distributed; and what the near future offers. It will also show pre-production, production and post-production, how to use videos on MTV, VH1. The Box, and other outlets.

Guest speakers (subject to availability) include Les Garland, The Box exec v.p.; John Sykes, VH1 president; Peter Baron, producer, Geffen Records; David Naylor, producer, DNA; Nigel Dick, video director; and Michael Houseman, video director.

JULIANNA HATFIELD: "What A Life" (Atlantic/Mammoth 6079-2)

The second single from Hatfield's Only Everything album is a hard-edged guitar rocker that approaches punk speeds at times. Even the single eover finds the short-haired Hatfield looking particularly stylish. The point being this is Hatfield's time to shed the cute image that she got with "My Sister." This song will go a long way towards that, though it will be interesting to see how radio



and audiences respond to an established artist drastically altering her image. If the song is given a fair shot it could become a favorite at modern rock stations.

GLORIA ESTEFAN: "It's Too Late" (Epic 77877)

Estefan has been a hit making machine throughout her career, but her new single proves there are some songs she should not touch. On faster-paced diseo covers Estefan more than holds her own, but the soulful "It's Too Late," one of the biggest hits from Carole King's landmark *Tapestry* album, is a stretch. In actuality, Estefan does a decent job with the vocals, but this is one of those songs that everybody feels they own. As such, it's better off being left alone.

■ BAD COMPANY: "Down And Dirty" (EastWest 9190-2)

Bad Company is currently helping to lead the eharge of '70s bands playing shed sehedules this summer. The veteran band, now fronted by Robert Hart, are on the road with Ted Nugent. Furthering the contention this is the summer of the '70s is the fact that this very Bad Company sounding tune was the most added track at AOR its first week out of the box. Fans of the band, and obviously there are still plenty, will get off on this rehashing of the group's classic gritty soul/rock sound.



WEEZER: "Say It Ain't So" (DGC 4742)

Yet another modern rock hit from one of the past year's biggest success stories. Where "Undone (The Sweater Song)" found the group leaning more towards novelty status, this aggressive and melodic tune demonstrates superior musicianship. Consistently strong, "Say It Ain't So" may not be

the biggest hit from the band's self-titled debut, but it does hold the most promise for the future of the quartet.

PICK OF THE WEEK

GREN: "Pop Songs" (IRS 10742)

This L.A. trio's debut single, from their forthcoming CD, Camp Grenada, is an auspicious beginning to say the least. The slow and hypnotic hooks of the verses lead into wild raucous playing on the chorus. The most promising thing about Gren's future is that they can play, and play scriously. Individually guitarist/voealist Brett White, bassist Mareus Gonzalez and drummer Possum are all superb musicians,



but their strength is the collective chemistry they demonstrate. If you're looking for a sleeper in this busy summer, Gren could very well be it. This single's controlled rocking sound is the kind that drives kids wild. Proof of that is in the mosh pits that can often be found at their shows.

PRIMUS: Tales From The Punchbowl (Interscope 92553-2)

When the last album by Primus, Pork Soda, entered the national charts in the top 10 many in the industry were floored. Even with their past success, and a headlining spot on Lollapalooza two years ago, similar results would bring similar shock as Les Claypool and his mates just aren't rock stars. At least not in the conventional sense, or even the unconventional sense. "Gerald Was A Race Car Driver" was a completely unlikely track for Modern Rock stations, but something about



Primus' sound clicks. Opening with the cartoonish sounding "Professor Nutbutter's House Of Treats," Primus leave no doubt that they will be making no concessions in their comical sound. However, the contradiction in the band has always been that beneath their sense of humor lays one of the most talented group of players in music. On Tales... the Primus story continues. (S.B.)

THE REMBRANDTS: LP (EastWest Records 61752-2)

There is such a thing as a mixed blessing, an example being a hit single that sounds nothing like the rest of your music. The Rembrandts would seem to be the luckiest duo on the face of the earth, as the tunc, "I'll Be There For You," the song appears uncredited here as the mysterious 15th track, is the theme song for the runaway hit TV show, Friends. With the cast members of the show gracing virtually every major magazine cover in the past few months, the Rembrandts have been the beneficiary of major radio support. However, on the rest of the 14 songs found here, the music bounces between melodic, slow and pop. While "I'll Be There..." is poppy, the other pop tunes don't have the energy of the Friends theme. Wish the Rembrandts luck, if other bands with hit singles out of the blue are any indication, they're going to need it. (S.B.)

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HUM: You'd Prefer An Astronaut (RCA 66577)

What can really be said about a band whose most distinguishing sound amongst an otherwise droll and subdued wall of guitar is a single riff after the chorus of the song? "Stars" has recently been thrown into rotation on radio stations that undoubtedly also hailed the derivative (sshhh, don't tell anyone) Bush as the next big sound. Neither have anything particularly fresh to add or, even better, to propel the force of alternative music. In the case of Hum, the songs on their own don't pull you in, and the muddy guitar washes over the vocal too much to give it the benefit of an immediately recognizable sound. The ear isn't forced to focus on the music, and listening to it becomes much like chewing gum—the initial burst of sugar/mint is soon reduced to autopilot chewing activity until you just want to spit it out. I'd prefer an AstroPop. (K.A.)

VARIOUS ARTISTS: Mighty Morphin Power Rangers: Original Soundtrack (Fox/Atlantic 82777-2)

By mixing completely cute and innocuous tunes like Shampoo's "Trouble," which features the refrain, "Uh oh, we're in trouble/something's come along and burst our bubble," with more recognizable rock songs like Van Halen's "Dreams" and "Higher Ground" from the Red Hot Chili Peppers, the makers of this soundtrack have created a CD that will have strong appeal to the film's target audience. That leads to good and bad news. The bad news is those are the only people this album will appeal to. The good news is those are the people who buy records. (S.B.)

■ GENERAL PUBLIC: Rub It Better (Epic 64270)


Of all the '80s new wave bands, General Public got lumped in to that category because of their descension from the English Beat, General Public seemed the most unlikely to have success in the '90s. However, they came back with a hit single last year with "I'll Take You There" from the soundtrack to *Three*-





some. Attempting to capitalize on that momentum, Dave Wakeling and Ranking Roger have released their first new album in years. Time has been kind, as this eclectic mix of reggae, dance and pop may be the most complete album they've ever done. It's still scattered at times, but the finer moments are surprisingly strong, especially "Friends Again," the CD's best song, the reggac-bursting title track and "Rainy Days." In addition to appealing to the band's old listeners. reggae fans will enjoy this. (S.B.)

■ VARIOUS ARTISTS: The Bridges Of Madison County: Music From The Motion Picture (Malpaso/Warner Bros. 45949-

This is not a soundtrack that can stand on it's own, at least commercially. Once you've seen the movie though, and the movie will be one of the blockbusters of summer, the soundtrack becomes an essential. Therefore this could be the Forest Gump of 1995. Comprised primarily of old jazz staples, like the lovely deep vocals of Johnny Hartman's "Easy Living," this CD is a sweetly romantic valentine. They don't play notes anymore like the sax solo at the end of "Easy Living." The one new track is "Doc

Eyes," the ubiquitous "Love Theme." However, despite it's mandatory presence, both as the opening and closing selections, the Clint Eastwood composed tune works because of it's understated subltety. But the romance of the CD comes from the staples that comprise that the heart of the record. With the exception of the 1960's classic, "Baby I'm Yours," performed here by Barbara Lewis, all the other tunes come from classic crooners Hartman, Irene Kral and Dinah Washington. Other highlights are Hartman's beautiful "I See Your Face Before Me" and Washington's gentle "I'll Close My Eyes." For anyone who complains, myself included, about the abundance of sound-alike bands, this CD is an oasis in the wasteland of noise. (S.B.)



On their debut CD they mix various sub genres of R&B to create another eclectic mix of songs that are pleasing to both ear and fect. Although this is essential a hip-hop/rap record it has an old school soul feel that again represents a refreshing departure from most of the aimless contemporary rap/hip-hop



currently available. This disc has strong potential to be a winner on several programming formats. Standout tracks: "Hey Lookaway," "Sex On The Brain" and "Daddy.

ROUND 'N ROUND: Musical chairs is once again the name of the game at the industry's black music divisions with label executives scurrying to not be shut out. Over at Sony Music, entertainment lawyer Ron Sweeney has come on board in a big way which should result in some major changes at the conglomerates Black Music division. Over at Island Records, producer/manager Hiram Hicks is slated to oversee the Black Music division for Island Records. At Perspective, label president Sharon Heyward has left the company. Word has it that the label's co-founders, Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis will take on a more active role at the company. Uptown executive Angela Thomas will be joining the staff of Capitol Records, and at Motown publicist Gwendolyn Priestly has left the label, but with her execeptional talents she'll have no problem securing a new assignment.

First up was a mini-brawl between two rappers, followed by a main event performance that featured one rapper allegedly using a golf club to bash another in the head. An intermission was called with the arrival of the club's security team, which resulted in a subsequent halt to video production for the day. According to reports, the night's final performance took place as some of the rappers who were exiting the club grounds decided to take part in an impromptu shouting match.

The identities of the individuals involved really isn't the issue here. Their behavior and attitude is deplorable and without foundation. As African American men and entrepreneurs, it's about time these young men become aware and take responsibilty for the image they project to popular culture and the public at large. The action that took place the other day not only resulted in a loss of time and money for a fellow artist but it serves to re-enforce beliefs and stereotypes that many hold as being true not only about rappers but African American men as a group. It's sad but true that for many outside of the "community" these rappers represent their only contact with who we are as a people, and as an African American male, I'm sick and tired of being misrepresented. My message to those individuals who chose to take part in such shenanigans is to get with it and come correct. Fellas, you've been blessed with the talent to get ahead and now have the opportunity to make a real difference, not only with your lives but in the lives of those who follow you as well. Don't blow it with ridiculous antics that will get you nowhere. As the voice of the new generation, it's time to grow up and get real.

Indie News: On The Cutting Edge

Recognize this face? Neither did l, but soon you will. This is Tony Pellegrino, the new vp of sales for Sonic Underground. Hell, even the press release says his 17 years in the record business have gone unnoticed. Previously he worked for 10 years for Elektra Entertainment (NY) as Northeast regional marketing manager & national sales director, as well as holding several titles for WEA Distribution. Mr. Pellegrino will be working out of Sonic Underground's NY office.

RED ALERT! NEW INDIE LABEL: Former major label executives Corbin Dooley (previously of EMI Records/New York) and Paul Brinberg (who previously worked out of the New York offices of Atlantic) recently announced the formation of PC!

Music—a San Diego-based indie label.

The label will come out of the box with two alternative/rock acts. The initial signings include Another Society, an alternative metal band from Mississippi, and Jack Johnson, a Tennessee native whose music is described as ''distorted soul.'

"After realizing that this industry is so focused on money, and not on music, we decided to offer our artists three important things: intense musical freedom, generous royalty rates, and a policy of non-recoupment," remarked Dooley. He added, "We feel these three policies will distance us from all of our counterparts in terms of business, and consequently, we will be able to attract many creative, musical people to our label.'

Brinberg said, "Between us, we have spent a great amount of time learning the 'business' side of music, but what will really drive this label is the fact that both of us have this 'whatever it takes' ethic. We are the kind of people that when we find something we respond to, musically, it becomes all-consuming and we will do whatever it takes to find every other living human who has the same response. Maybe it's sick, but it's the perfect disease to have in the music business."

RECENT SHOWS: World Domination's Low Pop Suicide and Latimer recently concluded a lengthy tour with Interscope's Compulsion at the Roxy on the Sunset Strip. The Philadelphia trio Latimer opened the show with a half-hour of music predominantly drawn from their self-titled debut CD. While the CD is a strong introduction to the group's rock riffs, that they haven't played live very much is evident. Though in fairness to them, it's hard for anybody to put on a good show without any kind of crowd feedback. And the fashionably late L.A. crowd was nonexistent for most of their set.

Low Pop Suicide, whose early '95 release The Death Of Excellence is still holding up as one of the year's best, put on a stellar set. The Rick Boston-led group rocked through a 45-minute set that opened with the fierce "Bless This Body'' from their newest CD. The set's other highlight was "Life & Death," a stunning mix of hypnotic hooks and an explosive rock chorus.

After Low Pop Suicide's excellent set most anyone would have paled, such was the case with Compulsion. The group, who've had minor radio success on major stations, were obviously a large part of the draw. Though Compulsion clearly have their fans, their brand of sound-alike rock didn't have the vision that marked Low Pop Suicide's songs.

THE THIRD ANNUAL INDEPENDENT LABEL FESTIVAL will be held this year at Columbia College, along with participating venues, in Chicago. NOAH STONE: Love That Smile Off Your Face (World Domination 0016-2)

Co-produced by Stone and World Domination head, as well as former Shriekback and Low Pop Suicide member, Dave Allen, Stone's debut CD shows a singer/songwriter doesn't have to be quiet. Stone is joined on the 11 song collection by a revolving band, including Allen on the "International" and current Low Pop Suicide member Rick Boston on multiple tracks. He serves up an aural assault listeners with deadeye rhythmic accuracy. An impressive collection, Love That Smile... reveals a talent that has the potential to be around for a while. A real find for college radio.



SLAUGHTER: Fear No Evil (CMC Records 74032)

What can you say about a record that features a woman about to tongue a snake on the front cover, and says on the back, "Listen at maximum volume?" Not much, but thank God this is now on an indie label, and will probably never be heard on commercial radio. On the moronic '80s sounding opening track, ''Live Life Like There's No Tomorrow,'' Mark Slaughter and his partners in crime wonder aloud, "How many times has the world passed you by?" Not as many times as it's going to sail by this record.



VARIOUS ARTISTS: Gag Me With A Spoon: Don't Records Celebrates The 1980's (Don't Records 00102)

Don't Records has the right idea. If ever there was an era to be poked fun at, the '80s is it. Forget about the '70s, the '80s was it when it came to one-hit wonders. A perfect example is Tommy Tutone's "867-5309/Jenny," covered here by Marques Bovre & The Evil Twins. The peak of the song is the spoken word refrain where Bovre says, "Hello, Jenny, you don't know me, but we've been living in

the same song together for 12 years and I finally got up the nerve to call you. The CD's big selling asset is up and coming AAA artist Willy Porter, who does a soulful version of Devo's classic "Whip It." Other highlights include SODA's version of the Waitresses' "I Know What Boys Like" and The Psychedelic Furs "The Ghost In You," performed here by The Blow Pops. Novelty aside, there are some superior songs here. Get this record.

PODUNK: Breech (Core 9451-2)

Slightly melodic sounding metal, Podunk will likely be marketed as an alternative act. But unless you have the marketing staff of Maverick or Atlantic it's not an easy move to pull off. Thusly, don't look for this band on modern rock stations, or for that matter, AOR stations. It's not bad music, but there's nothing about it to make it break out of the pack.

PICK OF THE WEEK

Unclogged (Infidelity/Sunset Blvd. 10812-2)

For anyone who gre up in L.A. all that needs to be said about this record is "See How We Are," "White Girl" and "Burning House Of Love." An acoustic rendering of many of their greatest hits, done X style, of course, Unclogged is a treasure chest of memories for the legendary band's legions of diehard fans. Equally rewarding for fans are John Doc's liner notes, which explain why the band decided to do this now and the background of acoustic punk. Having used the



Knitters as a vehicle for their quieter side in the '80s, X are no strangers to acoustic music. As such, this record features some of the best reworkings you're likely to hear in the "Unplugged" movement. Whether it be on the lovely refrain of "Unheard Music" or the superb harmonies of "Lying In The Road," X demonstrate a gift for making beautiful music together.

THE DRAGONFLY, LOS ANGELES, CA—So it was 200 degrees in the popular cozy L.A. club, there was no room to walk and X didn't go on until after 11:00. As soon as the four members of X walked on stage, with vocalist Exene Cervenka taking her place in the middle, and the band kicked into a semi-acoustic version of "White Girl" none of that mattered anymore. Doing a secret show, that was hardly kept anonymous (the ads read: "hint [blank] marks the spot"), the seminal L.A. band were out to preview their just released Unclogged CD, released on their new Infidelity label.

There's something about seeing X in L.A. Whether you're a long time fan or a new convert, there's a glee in watching the band that started the original

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punk movement here (ask any local musicians, including Jane's Addiction or the Red Hot Chili Peppers, and they'll tell you it's true) perform at a club, even though they never went far beyond the club status.

It's not like X ever played the Forum and came back to the clubs. But their place in L.A. folklore dictates that seeing them is an event, and in the small Dragonfly, where many well-known bands have taken to doing surprise shows, the event feel is multiplied.

While many were looking forward to seeing X tear the roof off the Dragonfly, the band stuck to the acoustic feel of *Unclogged*.

The result was not only no less impressive, but seemed to inspire the band to new heights. The most notable performances were of "I Must Not Think Bad Thoughts" and the John Doe-led "See How We Are," maybe the group's best number, it certainly is in an acoustic format. Adding spice to the nearly 90-minute set was the inclusion of a couple of Knitters' songs (X's '80s acoustic alter-ego).

Bowling With Luther Vandross

THE HOLLYWOOD BOWL, HOLLYWOOD, CA—In his first local Southern California appearance of the season, pop superstar Luther Vandross performed a tight set of old Vandross favorites and his take on classic standard offerings to a capacity crowd at the Hollywood Bowl.

Vandross was in great vocal form throughout the evening, and his support band, under the direction of Nate Adderley, Jr. with background singers, Paulette Williams, Cindy Mizelle, Kevin Owens, Brenda White Kin and Valleri Pinkston-Mayo, more than compliment his enormous talent.

The biggest problem with the Vandross show is that it's too structured and calculated. From the songs selected, his on stage audience talk, the light/video display and background choreography, it all seems over produced. To have a smooth running show is one thing; however, with Luther's extravagant personality it seems contrived and not real. More than one audience incomber commented that his lack of real personality combined with Hollywood theatrics, particularly in evidence with his closing rendition of "The Impossible Dream," made them think twice about seeking a refund. Although the

concert was titled *Songs*, the name of his current CD of classic remakes, many in the audience were not interested in hearing Luther's version of "Evergreen" or "Killing Me Softly With His Song" and would rather he stuck to his own material. Also Luther's choice in wardrobe for the evening, a pair of blue jeans and leather jacket, seemed inappropiate for the Bowl's classic veneer and, on one level, cheapened the whole mood of the occasion.

Overall the evening was still a success. Even with his shortcomings, Vandross is still one of the most compelling vocalists of this generation, with a style and song execution

that few of his contemporaries can match. However, the bigger issue is: is the experience is good enough to make one want to sit an hour in traffic, and spend twenty minutes in line to get in? To answer that one, Vandross will need to start sharing with his audiences more of himself in addition to his talent.

Upcoming Show

Africa Fete Tour Grows

AN ADMISSION-FREE CONCERT at Los Angeles' California Plaza on June 21 will kick off "Africa Fete 3," which will visit 16 cities through July, is expected to reach new audiences and break last year's attendance records. This year's show is being underwritten by Island Records (one of the first supporters of the tour in America) with Motown Records and Rounder Records. Senegalese star and Fete '93 alum Baaba Maal, Boukman Eksperyans from Haiti (also from the cast of '93), Femi Kuti from Nigeria (son of Fela Kuti) and Mali's Oumou Sangare are headlining this year's tour.

The tour, which started out in nine cities in 1993 and drew more than 20,000 people to the SummerStage in New York's Central Park, will close in New York in Central Park on July 8-9 with free admission. Those dates will offer different line-ups each day. Maal and Kuti will be joined by seminal African pop group Osibisa on July 8, and on the second day Sangare and Boukman Eksperyans will be joined by Tabu Ley Rocherau. There will also be a free concert in Camden, NJ's Wiggins Park.

The remainder of the dates, some of which will be paired with other events like the world Music Fest dates in Marysville, CA, and in Washington D.C., will be for paid admission. The Fete will also be joined with the Vancouver

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Baaba Maal will be one of the Africa Fete '96

Jazz Festival (June 26 at the Commodore Ballroom) and the Montreal Jazz Festival (July 6 at the Le Spectrum) in mutual dates.

Started by Mamadou Konte in 1978 in Paris as a way to bring African culture to the French, Island CEO/founder and world music svengali Chris Blackwell says, "Since this kind of music is not readily accessible on radio and television in America, 1 felt the best way to develop these artists was by trying to create an event that people will come to. It gives people a chance to be exposed to the music in a way that will leave them wanting more."

Film Reviews

Eastwood's *Bridges* To Cross Into Oscar Country

A pair of powerful performers, Eastwood and Streep, show how to touch emotions in peaceful lowa.

LOVE, LANGUID, LOVELY AND TOUCHING; everything that love is supposed to be is lovingly wrapped up here in *The Bridges Of Madison County*. It's complete, solid, everlasting, and in its completeness it will make your heart ache, not from the obvious physical loss of someone but from the fullness a fully shared love inspires and leaves behind. As Clint Eastwood's photog-

rapher character sums up, "A certainty like this comes along only once in a lifetime." The certainty here is that, *The Bridges Of Madison County* is and will continue to be successful, totally. It has the legs to walk 25 years into the future without faltering into classic status. Most certainly it will vie for top honors in all major categories at next year's Oscar festivities.

Robert James Waller's book has been in the Top Ten Bestseller list for over two years—look for *that* to go back up to Number One with the film's release—and that's a crowd not to be blown off lightly. It's also a demographic crowd, the majority of which isn't the preferred target for the drooling top brass because it's the read-and-think crowd. It's a safe bet also that these people will see this more than once. If it does nothing else, perhaps *The Bridges Of Madison County* will persuade the powers with the purse strings that there is an audience out there who *will* respond to product with stories, sentiment and older actors in caring roles. Love is not the exclusive territory of the tongue swallowing, jump and hump hormone-driven tcen to '40s crowd.

Richard LaGravenese's screenplay improves on Waller's book, making the Eastwood charaeter more accessible, more human but retains the emotional core of a once-in-a-lifetime-love, that "certainty" spoken of, which drove the book. It's a wonderful cinematic adaptation and director Clint Eastwood has kept the line as plain and simple as the outward appearances of the characters' lives while actor Eastwood and co-actor Meryl Streep convey the inner complications, feelings and river-deep emotions almost telepathically to the audience, most certainly empathetically.

Eastwood, more familiar with wider territories behind and in front of the camera than most, continues to push his own boundaries—successfully, imminently so. He proves here there's no emotional arena he's afraid to enter as actor or director; outwardly iconic, inwardly understanding and sympathetic as actor—as director he carries these emotional moments to the edge also, allowing feelings and emotions between the two characters to play out in long sequences with only music and body language. That takes courage not many directors show, and extreme faith in his performers. One sequence he allows himself and Streep to play out in the Master Shot is exquisite—even though it's the middle of an Iowa summer and they're in front of a fireplace. He's in for both Best Actor and Best Director.

And I can't think of anyone other than Meryl Streep who could have brought the strength, understanding and sensitivity to the screen for the Francesca character. Any other actress would have gotten lost. Streep has taken on the look and characteristics of an Iowa farm wife. You feel her thoughts when she looks at herself in the mirror—remember, these aren't hard-body, Bally's-buffed iron pumpers we're talking about here. As played by Streep and Eastwood, they aren't even actors, they *are* these people: Richard and Francesca. Look for Streep once more in the Best Actress race.

Annie Corley and Victor Slezak play Streep's grown up children. These characters, simply devices in the book, here take on social commentary and

emotionally relevant "now" aspects in order to compare their mother and father's strength and commitment to within the framework of LaGravenese's inventive work, and serve the piece well.

Eastwood has his trusted DP Jack N. Green behind the camera and Green presents the Iowa farm territory and small town (Winterset, Iowa location, until now noted mainly as the birthplace of John Wayne) as just what they are: middle America, simple and beautiful in their simplicity. There is no implication of Hollywood or "show biz" to Green's camera work.

Lennie Niehaus, longtime music collaborator with Eastwood, again brings the feelings to the fore and compiles some of the most romantic music, sourced through the kitchen and pick-up truck radios, for absolute maximum effect. Eastwood himself has gotten into the music end this time by composing the film's highly romantic Love Theme "Doe Eyes," which is a beautiful refrain.

Last year's Oscar editing winner (for Unforgiven) is back again with his own seamless contribution.

The Amblin/Malpaso Production, Warner Bros. presentation was produced by Eastwood and Kathleen Kennedy.

MGM's Fluke: A Charmer

He's really not as dumb as he looks...Who? Fluke.

CARLO CARLEL MADE AN IMPRES-SION on audiences with last year's Flight Of The Innocent, filmed in his homeland of Italy. Fluke, his American filmmaking debut for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Pictures release and Rocket Pictures presentation, is only minimally satisfying and not as impressive. Put together with care—it's a project Carlei had harbored for 12 years, having clout enough to do it only after Flight success—the director brings cinematographer, Raffaele Mertes, and composer Carlo Siliotto, over from the Flight and between them there are flashes of what made their other project so warming.

What lessens the impact here after an intriguing beginning is the lapse into cliche with voice-over dialogue for animals which gives it the look and feel of something lesser than what the filmmaker had envisioned. Underneath the exterior there are feelings and a story which want to be taken seriously: When a man dies under dark circumstances his soul is channeled into a dog, Fluke, but memorics draw him back to the family he left behind and the discovery that the death was his own fault and he needs to make amends. Also parallel storics operating on this world and otherworldly levels attempt to show that love and caring transcend death and continue to cross over one another—somc heavy food for thought if one is so inclined. Carlei and James Carrington wrote the screenplay, based on the novel by James Herbert.

Some neat casting works trickily for the film also. Matthew Modine's good guy image works subliminally as a twister and the opening attitude of Eric Stoltz shows that when moments are taken out of context they can be very misleading—intentionally here but manipulated for a warmer understanding at film's end.

Carlei is a fine director. I just wish he could have pioneered a better way of presenting the animal's thoughts; even single narration might have been

Modine does both the role and the voice of Fluke and the Thomas Johnson character and is solid. Nancy Travis and young Max Pomerane are his wife and son left behind and fill in nicely while Stoltz becomes his business partner.

Ron Perlman makes a fine bad guy. Samuel L. Jackson does the uncredited vocal turn as Fluke's doggy pal and mentor.

Paramount's Congo Is **Eaten Alive**

CONGO IS A CARTOON. It wouldn't have been surprising to see George Of The Jungle swing through the trees at any moment. Barring that, the ghost of Johnny Weismuller or an outtake from King Solomon's Mines, which is referenced here—No, Angelyne, not the movie, the mine. One of them anyway. Encircled by the "Lost City of Zinj."

Based on Michael Crichton's book, Congo, the screenplay by John Patrick Shanley is a mishmash. A night scene with animals howling all around brings the safari members out to ask "Great Black Hunter-Guide" Ernie Hudson (who gets some humorous footage out of that) what's happening? Ol' Ern looks up into the sky wistfully and says, "Full Moon." Guess that was Shanley wistfully referring to better days with Moonstruck. Director Frank Marshall should have taken a compass with him into this wilderness. He doesn't seem to know which way to turn.

Even Industrial Light & Magic (ILM)'s FX look tacky. The best thing about Congo is production designer J. Michael Riva's Lost City setting which gives off a mysterious ambience.

Basically: Greedy scientific tycoon Joe Don Baker sends assistant Laura Linney out to take over childlike primatologist Dylan Walsh's trek into the Congo. Walsh wants to return Amy the ape (who he's taught to communicate) home to the jungle while Linney's supposed to get these fabulous diamonds needed for new laser weaponry and rescue the previous expedition who've been mysteriously cut off. Russian troublemaker Tim Curry wiggles into the journey in search of the lost city and diamonds. Wise cracking, cigar smoking Ernie Hudson guides them and it's difficult to tell where he was educated: Cambridge or Berkeley. Curry's Russian accent humorously rolls over Georgia (Russian GA, understand) and certain colorful areas of England. Once into the jungle they are beset by mutant apes, trained hundreds of years ago to kill as guardians of the mine. Oh yeah, there's lots of thermal activity underground here too. They're right next to a volcano with heartburn, y'understand? O.K! O.K, I gave away the ending...sort of. Linney, Walsh and Hudson escape via hot air (is there any other kind in a windbag like this?) balloon. Lots more in between but, geez, I'd need a compass.



And this pretty much sums it up, folks. (I-r) Dylan Walsh and Amy.


RIM SHOTS: The famed Impulse! label that flourished once through ABC Records and more recently through MCA Records has been reactivated by GRP Records president Tommy LiPuma. On June 20, the head of GRP (which is distributed through MCA) will lead with three honored releases by the legendary John Coltrane—A Love Supreme, Ballads and John Coltrane And Johnny Hartman, the latter of which is well represented on the soundtrack to the Clint Eastwood film The Bridges Of Madison County along with seminal soulful jazz diva Dinah Washington.

To re-launch the Impulse!, GRP has devised a three-tiered campaign. The first part will focus on digitally-remastered reissues of some of the label's titles from artists like Coltrane, Archie Shepp, Sonny Rollins and Charles Mingus. The limited pressings will include never before seen photos, amended liner notes and specially-created artwork. Phase two will include the signing of past Impulse! artists, with the first being McCoy Tyner's album Infinity. Other artists signed anew to the label include Michael Brecker and Billy Taylor. Liberty Revisits Capitol Nashville

LIBERTY RECORDS PRESIDENT AND CEO Scott Hendricks announced that the label will return to its original Capitol Nashville name, effective immediately, and will cease operations of sister label Patriot Records. Patriot recording artists John Berry, Lisa Brokop and Deana Carter will move to the Capitol Nashville label. The announcements and subsequent unveiling of the new label logo were made during a press conference hosted by Hendricks and Capitol Nashville exec. vp/gm Walt Wilson.

In 1989, Capitol Nashville became the first major autonomous record label in Nashville with the establishment of its own business affairs, international and finance departments. The label was renamed Liberty Records in 1992. In 1994, the Patriot spin-off label was launched.

Hendricks, named president/CEO of the label May 1 of this year, described the name change as a return to the company's roots. "The original Capitol Nashville was a forerunner in the growth of the country music industry as we know it today," he said. "I feel strongly that it is important for us to draw on our rich heritage and to revisit the solid foundation of this company."

"Scott is extremely focused and clear about his vision for the label to become a creative powerhouse," remarked Terri Santisi, exec. vp/gm of EMI Records Group North America. "By bringing back the Capitol Nashville name, and by bringing Patriot into the fold, I am confident that the label is poised for tremendous success."

Wilson also announced several new executive appointments. Lorie Hoppers Lytle, previously owner of Rocket Science Media, an independent public relations firm based in Dallas, Texas, and former director of publicity for MCA Records, has been named vp of publicity. Doug Baker joins the Capitol Nashville staff as director of radio marketing, a newly-created position for the label. Baker was formerly program and music director for WSIX-FM in Nashville. Stephanie Cox was named sr. director of A&R. Most recently, Cox was creative director of Starstruek Writers Group. Additional staffing announcements will be made in the coming weeks.

EMI Records Group North America, headquartered in New York, is the operating company for a diverse group of record labels, including Capitol Nashville. EMI Records Group North America is part of New York-based EMI Music, one of the world's leading music companies.

Hall Of Fame Opens Guitar Exhibit

THE COUNTRY MUSIC HALL OF FAME and Museum unveiled "Stars and Guitars: The Gibson Centennial Exhibit" on June 1. The exhibit showcases a collection of more than 50 historically and musically significant Gibson instruments as well as dozens of artifacts illustrating the development and growth of the Gibson company.

The exhibit is the first major retrospective focus on the century-long impact of a major American musical instrument manufacturer. With Gibson signature artist and Hall of Fame member Chet Atkins serving as guest curator, the staff of the museum has assembled the exhibition from handmade and factory built instruments in the Gibson corporate collection, and has also drawn upon the holdings of the Country Music Hall of Fame as well as the personal collections of many individuals.

"There's never been an exhibition of this scope on the history of the American guitar," said Bill Ivey, Director, Country Music Foundation. "With the cooperation of Chet Atkins, Gibson, and many collectors, we've been able to assemble examples of all the great Gibsons. This display will thrill guitarists and entertain all those with a love of American music."

The extensive collection includes the oldest Gibson, hand built by Orville Gibson in 1894; a guitar custom built for jazz/pop guitar great Les Paul in 1938; Chet Atkins' "first good electric guitar," acquired by Atkins in 1948; and the ES-5 guitar purchased by finger-picking legend lke Everly and later played by Phil Everly on many Everly Brothers recording sessions.

Of special significance is a computer-interactive video presentation featuring commentary and performances by a number of artists who have played Gibson guitars throughout their careers, including B.B. King, Merle Travis and Neil Young.

The RCA recording artist will offer special ticket prices and various promotions in association with USA Harvest throughout the year.

TWO OF COUNTRY MUSIC'S most influential singer/songwriters will perform together for the first time in 25 years on June 16 in Bakersfield, California. Merle Haggard and Buck Owens will kick off the second annual Bud Light Country Jam '95.

SOR'S WESTERN FLYER HELPED kick off "Camp Anytown," a program of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, Nashville Region, by announcing their sponsorship. The group has gained considerable attention with their single, "Cherokee Highway" which promotes better racial understanding. "Camp Anytown" is a week-long camp designed to help children and teens discuss and learn about racial and ethnic respect.
