

Schulhof Exits Sony

MICHAEL SCHULHOF, president/CEO of Sony Corp. of America, and the person credited with bringing the multi-billion dollar Japanese Sony Corp into the American entertainment business, has resigned his position. Although Schlhof said in a statement that he is leaving to pursue "new business interests in the new technologies and entertainment arena," industry insiders say that his departure marks a campaign by Sony's parent company management to take control of the American enterprises. His position, Sony said last week in a statement, is being eliminated.

Sources also believe that his resignation was hastened by Nobuyuki Idei, who was named president/COO of consumer electronics/entertaiment monolith Sony Corp. in April. The company has named Sony Corp. chairman/CEO Norio Ohga, chairman of both Sony Music Entertainment and Sony Pictures Entertainment. Idei was named vice chairman of Sony Corp. of America and chairman of Sony Electronics.

All other U.S. operations will report to the Sony Corp. of America's executive committee, including Sony Interactive, Sony Retail, Sony Signatures, SW Networks and Sony New Technologies.

It is believed that, at least for now, the top executives at Sony Music Entertainment, including SME president Tommy Mattola and Columbia Records chairman Don Ienner are safe.

Schulhof, a trained physicist who joined Sony in 1974 and was the only American on the parent company's board, commented in a written statement, ''My years at Sony have provided me with exhilarating opportunity in a truly wonderful company. Now that the acquisition of our entertainment companies is complete and the strategic plan for the ongoing management for all of Sony's U.S. businesses is in place, I want to begin to explore a new entreprenurial role outside the corporation.''

The dinner will be part of a week-long series of high profile events leading up to the 38th Annual Grammy Awards at the Shrine Auditorium, Feb. 28. Clarence Avant, Motown Records chairman; Les Bider, Warner-Chappell Music Publishing chairman/CEO and Russ Thyret, Warner Bros. Records CEO/chairman will co-chair the fundraising event.

BMI CD ROM Release

PERFORMING RIGHTS ORGANIZATION, BMI, the first with its own Internet site, is producing a CD ROM containing repertoire information in a comprehensive searchable song title database, announced Frances W. Preston, BMI president/CEO. The Repertoire CD ROM, which provides the ability to search for information on songs licensed by BMI, marks the second phase of the company's digital repertoire access program, known as BMI-way, which was initiated in July of this year by the BMI New Technology Strategy Group with the launching of its 7.5 million item song title database on the Internet's World Wide Web at http://bmi.com/.

Meat Loaf is pictured above with an unidentified fan signing (gulp!) a Nirvana t-shirt.

ON THE BEACHES AND IN THE ORCHESTRA PIT: A new builb has lit up in The Indie Rock, the super group. No longer are people just members of one group, now they have three different projects going at once. The center of this activity is the city of the broad shoulders: Chicago. With such bands as Thrill Jockey's Tortoise and The Sea and Cake leading the way into band polygamy. Thursday the 30th saw the Westbeth Theater be host to a tour of this new phenomenon. Headlining was June of 44, a quartet that includes ex-members of Rodan, Hoover and Codeine and who are current members of The Sonora Pine, Rex, Lungfish and The Crown Hate Ruin. They blend a disjointed noise attack with placid moments, almost as if they are falling apart and coming back together simultaneously. When they solidify the two guitars come into close synchronization and then spin away from each other. The group's LP Engine Takes To The Water on 1/4 Stick has some of those sweet moments and a few others. The Rachels have a whole different agenda, they attempt to bring Classical music to the great unwashed of hipsterdom. The group is a constant swirl of change, but on this night it was a quintet with piano, cello, violin, drums, guitar and the occasional bass. For each piece they had a different film timed for that particular composition being projected onto a screen to the side of the stage. One could almost hear the word 'soundtrack' wafting through the air. At intervals they were chillingly beautiful, but if the group didn't have members who had been in the scene, it is doubtful the band would be getting so many ears from this young crowd. A new album Music For Egon Schiele will be out in February also on 1/4 Stick. And with mighty leaps both bands are "Up, Up and Away."

WITHOUT CONSTRAINT: With country music getting a bigger audience every time Garth wipes his brow, it is only a matter of time before those coattails start to drag along the less rhinestoned performers. The Nashville Bluegrass Band is as deserving a group of folks as any to get a little spotlight shined on them. Hailing from all corners of America the quintet has an ear for a good mix of the traditional and contemporary streams that run through the burgeoning hills of Bluegrass. A fact, along with its acumen as instrumentalists, that was readily apparent when the act played The Bottom Line the last day of November. With a very apparent joy of playing on stage they kept the crowd well entertained. Taking requests with hardly a blink kept a little grit on a group that sometimes has a little too much sheen from its namesake's town. Unleashed, its latest on Sugar Hill, was no doubt spinning on people's stereos after the gig.

MORE WINDY CITY: Number One Cup may not be Mrs. O'Leary's cow in starting off a firestorm. But on the Cup's debut, from Flydaddy, the group has a book of twenty matches that could casily ignite a liking for this foursome. The title, Possum Trot Plan gives a whiff of its pop juxtapositions. It never settles into one musical chair before jumping to the next, all the time keeping a hummable buzz in your head. Definitely reminiscent of half a dozen oft-mentioned groups without being a knock-off of any of them. Any band that starts a song off with the lyric "I had a dream I was beating up skinheads" could easily be found playing out of dorm windows

FOLLOWING ITS SUCCESSFUL PRE-MIERE with Melissa Etheridge and friends, VH1 Duets is apparently off and running. The series took over famed Union Station in L.A.

for the taping of its third episode, to premiere December 20, featuring Matthew Sweet (Zoo Records) and John Hiatt (Capitol).

The show figured to be terrific as it matched two of the best pop songwriters in music today. For once, an event lived up to its hype. Sweet's band, with Hiatt joining in, played first, doing four songs, some of which had to be repeated for the cameras. The audience of industry and press dignitaries, as well as contest winners, didn't seem to mind. Fortunately, we were witnessing a strong enough tunesmith that his songs never wear thin. Included in his four song segment were great versions of "Sick Of Myself" and his biggest hit to date, "Girlfriend."

After a brief changing of the guard, Hiatt and his three-piece backing band

took their turn, with Sweet playing the guest this time. Playing two songs, "Good As She Could Be" and "Cry Love," from his superb new album, Walk On, Hiatt put on his usual charming but abbreviated, set. Much as I'm dying to tell you, I'll refrain from spoiling the surprise ending. Trust me though, it's worth tuning in just for their version of "an American country classic.

In a sidenote, given the success of the venue, others may wanna think about Union Sation in the future. It's a great setting.

PUNK ICON AND HERO to adolescents and twentysomethings everywhere, Henry Rollins left behind the lights and amps to introduce a reading at a Santa Monica bookstore recently. Rollins, who is an accomplished author in his own right, served as the host for a reading of excerpts from the acclaimed novel, Random Acts Of Senseless Violence by Jack Womack.

Rollins' 213CD just released a four-CD audio version of the cult novel Written as the diary of a 12-year-old girl, Random Acts... is read on the CD set by Tricia Warden. However, for the in-store, Womack did the reading, bringing an interesting flavor to the gripping story of a girl discovering the cruelties of the streets. One thing Womack definitely deserves credit for is knowing how to grab an audience and keep 'em. He ended the reading at just the right place to make the audience's curiosity overwhelm them.

Following the approximately 30-minute reading, Womack and Rollins stuck around to sign books, with many of the youthful attendees there pleased to get even a glimpse of their hero.

WARNER BROS.' L.A. OFFICES were working overtime recently, as Chris Isaak came into L.A. for two sold-out nights at the Pantages in Hollywood, and the very next night Son Volt did a sold-out show at the Troubadour.

Isaak put on his usual entertaining show. "The King Of The Broken who was doing his first shows in L.A. since the night before the release of his Forever Blue album, may be the best between songs performer in music today. Completely hilarious, sarcastic and delightful, Isaak is a must see everytime he comes through town.

Son Volt showed some of the signs of being a new touring act, though the fans treated them as heroes. Behind Jay Farrar's graceful songs, the band overcame poor sound to give a show worth checking out

God Lives Underwater: Running on Empty

"Touring and touring and touring, eventually you're gonna find your audience, whether radio or your record label does anything."

-God Lives Underwater's David Reilly

"BE NICE TO HIM, he's a friend of mine." These are the first words I hear upon entering my interview with three quarters of Pennsylvania's God Lives Underwater (drummer Adam Kary was absent). Indeed, if you're not at your sharpest, walking into an interview with the razor-sharp guys from God Lives Underwater is like being thrown into the lion's den doused in teryiaki sauce.

David Reilly (guitars, keyboards and vocals), Jeff Turzo (guitars and keyboards) and Andrew "Drew" McGee (guitar), are three of the nicest guys you'd ever want to meet, however, they have sarcasm down to such an art that their tongues, especially Reilly's,

should one day hang in the Lourve. The group's 11-song full length debut, Empty, on American Recordings, masks Reilly and Turzo's (the duo founded the band and wrote all the songs on Empty) sense of humor behind a wall of berating techno/industrial guitar riffs and angst-filled stories. Hailed by the press and radio, who made the disc's first single, "All Wrong," the most added song at rock

radio prior to the official launch date, as completely unique, G.L.U. are definitely onto something. But like anyone doing something innovative, G.L.U. has experienced its share of drawbacks. The trio spoke about these during a recent

Cash Box: You guys just got off the road with KMFDM, how'd that go? Turzo: Oh, it was the worst. They're the coolest. They're kind of like our uncles.

McGee: Yeah, exactly. They sort of took that role in helping us out and looking out for us, as the young upstart children on the tour.

C.B.: How close is Perkiomenville (Turzo and Reilly's hometown) to Philadelphia?

Turzo: Probably like an hour's drive.

C.B.: Did you spend a lot of time there, then?

Turzo: Yeah. We spent time there and in New York. But, that was earlier than when Dave and I really started to work on this. That was sort of when we were out of the city and not...We didn't feel there was much there for us, anyhow. But, when we were younger we did. You know, downtown at the clubs, shopping, South Street, partying...

Reilly: Frat house.

C.B.: And you guys are based out of L.A. now?

Reilly: We're based out of a van. And so wherever that's parked. Right now, I think it's...oh no, our van's gone, too.

Turzo: Our van's back in Vegas, so we are based literally nowhere.

Reilly: So, I guess now we live in Vegas.

Turzo: Once we get off the road, I don't know where we'll end up. We've been staying in L.A. for almost a year, but we're never really here cause we're always on the road.

Reilly: If anything we're a Pennsylvania band. C.B.: Why did uou decide to record in L.A.?

Reilly: Cause it's where we lived. We moved from Pennsylvania just for a little change in scenery. We were sort of unproductive in Pennsylvania, so we moved in with our manager and he kicked our ass so we could make a record.

C.B.: Did you find it hard to get motivated, without something else around

Turzo: For a long time being there helped us, but then we got unmotivated when we were finished with our record and it didn't come out for a long time. There really wasn't much for us to do besides work on our music. Then we were excited to get here.

C.B.: How did you end up with American?

Reilly: What happened was there was a D.J. in Philadelphia we were friends

with and we played him a song. He thought it was pretty cool and he sent it to all of his other D.J. friends and one of 'em worked at American. That was Gary Richards. He played it for the A&R department, who didn't like it. So, Gary just waited until Rick Rubin came into the office and he slipped it to him. Rick was like, "What does the A&R depratment think?" Gary told him, "They don't like it."Rick said, "Fly 'em out here. I wanna meet them." So, we met with Rick and he signed us. We went through the trials and tribulations that you go through signing a record deal with other labels, but we went with American for not much money, just because we had Gary working there, helping us not get lost in the shuffle

Turzo: Gary has since become our manager.

C.B.: When did you take the name God Lives Underwater?

Turzo: We didn't become G.L.U. until we had to come up with a name for the record labels that were interested.

Reilly: They thought we were called TDK SA-90 for a little while there.

C.B.: Drew, when did you join the band?

McGee: About a year after all that happened. It was just Jeff and David who made the songs. They didn't want it to be like Steely Dan or something, where you never tour. They wanted it to be a band that would go out and play live. I had been in bands with Dave before, lived with Jeff for awhile, so we had all been friends. I joined when it got to the point where it needed to be a banú that could go out and play live.

C.B.: So, it was always your intention then that it would be a full band. Was it your idea that it would be a quartet in the studio as well?

Turzo: No. I don't think we ever had any specific intentions. Dave and I had a way that we were really used to working and that was just the two of us on our home gear. We were so used to working like that, it was hard to do anything else after 10 years of doing it that way. We have recently co-written some stuff with Drew

McGee: Eventually it might be like that more. But they work really well together, they work efficiently, so, that's the way it works best. When I can throw something in and it works, then cool.

Turzo: Which is starting to happen lately.

Reilly: We're starting to get that synergy that you get from playing on the

C.B.: How many tours have you guys done now?

Turzo: Three. We did a tour with Maids Of Gravity, the Lords of Acid tour. We were on three quarters of that one. Then KMFDM which went from S.D. to L.A. the long way.

McGee: I think the only cities we haven't been to, I was thinking about this the other day, we haven't been to Austin, we haven't been to Nashville.

C.B.: How have you found the audience's response has changed since you started getting airplay?

Reilly: I think it's better now cause we're better onstage and we're better players. I don't think it has anything to do with airplay

McGee: Regardless of how much exposure we've had on the radio, we're still going out with bands that are so different that we're always 95% in front of faces that don't know who we are.

Reilly: Every show we do, we have the people who've heard it on the radio, but it's not that many. More often than not, it's, "I never heard of you guys before, you guys were great.

C.B.: Are you guys finding, because you have such a unique sound, that it's harder for you to get tours?

McGee: It's funny, we were just talking about that. We were just saying we wanna tour with different bands, bands that are more song oriented. Not industrial, techno rave kind of stuff.

Turzo: I don't think there's an ideal band for us to tour with.

Reilly: If Garbage had harder guitar riffs that would be the band for us to go on tour with. There's really no band that we can go on tour with. If we go out with a rock band like Soundgarden, kids aren't gonna like the beat and the techno. If we were to go on tour with Moby we'd look like Lynyrd Skynyrd. It's a real weird thing, but we've been successfully turning people onto our music. Of course, there are some other people that are like, "you suck. You guys would be great if you had somebody on stage that sang with balls."

McGee: People think if you have hard guitars you have to sound like fucking

Pantera, or something like that.

Reilly: If you sing about the devil, every once in awhile people might cut you a little slack. People are afraid of a song they might be able to hum along with or sing along with.

C.B.: Where was the album cover photo taken?

Turzo: Florida Keys. It's allegedly a shipwreck from the 1500's of a Spanish ship that had a lot of Christian paraphernalia on it.

■ GREN: "She Shines" (I.R.S. 10513)

The second single from the L.A. trio's fine debut, Camp Grenada, is getting the power pop/punk group the radio support it's deserved since the band released the album this summer. A hard-driven song with more of a grinding feel than the band's more frenzied tracks, "She Shines" is a prime example of the band's biggest assets: Brett White's lyrics

and outstanding musicianship. Gren has already proven itself live, playing CMJ and opening for the Ramones. With radio finally catching on, look for this band to make a major jump soon.

■ PIZZICATO FIVE: "Good" (Matador/Atlantic 6553)

Taken from the group's new *The Sound Of Music By Pizzicato Five* album, this single has the same weird 1960's spy movies intro that's marked the group's other singles. The intro may be the most normal part of this time-warp, *I Dream Of Jeannie* sounding track from the Japanese band hip Americans have embraced. As trippy as it is, it's easy to see why with "Good." It's a fun song.

■ ELEVEN: "Tomorrow Speaks" (Hollywood)

The latest single from the trio's *Thunk* album finds the L.A. band achieving a strong blend of acoustic and rock, though the hard chorus has a bit too much art rock feel to it. The track works best during its quieter moments, which gives Alain Johannes a nice vocal turn and some good harmonies between Johannes and Natasha Shneider.

MICHAEL BOLTON: "A Love So Beautiful" (Columbia 7520)

America's favorite male vocalist, at least according to the sales figures, follows his "Can I Touch You There?" single with this Roy Orbison/Jeff Lynne penned track. Against a lush backdrop, Bolton provides his usual melodramatic intensity. In fairness to the song, another person in the office found this to be a beautiful song. And fans of Bolton



will swoon at his soaring climax. Bolton has clearly learned the axiom, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

EVE'S PLUM: "Wishing The Day Away" (550 Music/Epic 7448)

Why Eve's Plum isn't huge yet is completely unexplainable. This band consistently releases wonderful pop songs, dating back to 1993's "I Want It All." The second single from the quartet's delightful *Cherry Alive CD* is yet another killer track. Clocking it at three minutes and 42 seconds, "Wishing The Day Away" is close to a perfect pop single. Rich in its lush

and dreamy melody, the song provides the best vehicle yet for Colleen Fitzpatrick's lovely vocals. A song that should make Modern Rock and MTV cream, this track must be played. Get with it already—THIS BAND RULES!

"It's only in San Francisco that that special musical lightning can strike more than once. And tonight, tonight everything is right; the time, the place, the man—Peter Frampton." If Meat Loaf can do it, why the hell not? Frampton attempts to make sales lightning strike twice with this "sequel" to Frampton Comes Alive, still the top-selling live album of all-time. One automatically



questions the potential of a live album that features mostly unfamiliar tunes. Some are new and the others, except for 1977's "I'm In You," suffered because of Frampton's lack of airplay over the last decade-plus. It's important to remember most people didn't know "Do You Feel Like We Do" and "Baby, I Love Your prior to 1976. As much as I expected this 14-song disc to be a joke, there are some strong moments here, particularly on the mid-tempo ballads. In addition, there's never been any question about Frampton's ability to play guitar, and he does a nice blues turn on "I'm In You."

STEELY DAN: Allve in America (Giant 24634-2)

For a band notorious for not touring, Steely Dan has certainly made up for it. After spending nearly all of the last two years on the road, Walter Becker and Donald Fagen release their first ever live album. This 11-song CD is the perfect souvenir for the millions of fans who saw the band's first tour since the Ice Age. Though the song selection is a little eclectic, with noticable omissions like "Do It Again' and "Deacon Blues," fans will dig the stellar versions of "Aja" and "Kid Charlemagne," among others. Alive In America features the funky/jazzy laid-back grooves that took Steely Dan to the top of the charts and beyond.

PRETENDERS: The Isle Of View (Warner Bros. 46085-2)

For the quartet's first live album, Chrissie Hynde and mates borrow a page from labelmate Elvis Costello's bag of tricks, teaming up with a string quartet (Costello recorded The Juliet Letters with the Brodsky Quartet a few years ago). To reflect the band's maturity, as well as give such familiar tracks as "Back On The Chain Gang," "Kid," "The Phone Call" and "Brass In Pocket" a new vibe, the Pretenders recorded the 14-song collection with The Duke Quartet. The string arrangements are downplayed throughout, adding a very understated elegance behind Hynde's still powerful vocals. Standouts include "Sense Of Purpose," the graceful "Kid," "2,000 Miles" and "Lovers Of Today." Like the Stones' Stripped, the Pretenders have created an album that not only stands on past glories. but stands on its own as an original work.

COMBOY JUNK-1ES: 200 More Miles (RCA 66780-

The Cowboy Junkies' debut album, The Trinity Sessions exploded onto the scene like a supernova doused with alcohol, as critics and fans fell in love with Margo Timmins' sultry version of the Velvet Underground classic, "Sweet Jane." Ten years

later, the band is no longer thought of as the future of rock, but Margo and brother Michael, along with the rest of the group, remain a consistent source of beauty. This two CD set, comprised of some of the band's best original numbers (by the recent Pale Sun, Crescent Moon album, Michael had grown into a formidable songwriter) as well as some covers that fans have been dying to hear Margo's lovely voice tackle, including Patsy Cline's "Walking After Midnight," "Blue Moon" and Hank Williams" "I'm So Lonesmome I Could Cry," is a must have for any fans of the Canadian outfit.

PHARCYDE: Labcabincalifernia (Delicious Vinyl 3510221) Producers: Various

These guys continue to break al. the rules and chart new courses in rap/hip-hop with their new release. The music here is executed with a verve and precision that not only moves the group further creatively but also allows them to showcase their enormous abilities as songwriters and producers. Of all the follow-up efforts that have been released this year, this one is by far the best. Radio programmers

across the board had better pay close attention to this group, who I predict will blow up even larger in the new year. Standout tracks: "Bullshit," "She Said," "Y?" and "The Hustle."

■ BOBBY CALDWELL: Soul Survivor (Sin-drome 8910) Producers: Randy Waldman & Bobby Caldwell

Caldwell is back with another finely crafted collection of slow and mid-tempo tracks that will only reinforce his position as the best kept secret in urban contemporary music. Although most of the songs selected are remakes (a popular trend in recent years), Caldwell does effectively breathe new life into the songs as he *Caldwellizes* them with his effervescent vocal style that has made him a



popular fixture on quiet storm formats the world over. It would have been nice to see this artist drop some new original works and finally garner the attention he deserves, however, for now this release will have to suffice. Standout tracks: "Walk On By," "At Last," "Back In The Fire," and "Let It Be."



R. KELLY: R. Kelly (Jive 41579-2) Producer: R. Kelly

Kelly's new release showcases his considerable artistic growth as he explores the various textures of R&B music. The seamless way in which Kelly incorporates elements of vintage soul, gospel, and even the blues with his music, adds greatly to his credbility as an artist. It is equally refreshing because of the introduction it will offer to his fan base whose members are perhaps not aware of these musical forms. Radio has been in love with

Kelly since his first release and no doubt this will only further the attraction. This is a solid album that will position the artist to be a major and versatile force in R&B/Pop well into the foreseeable future. Standout tracks: "Step In My Room," "As I Look Into My Life," "Religious Love," and "You Remand Mc Of Something."

QUINCY JONES: Q's Jook Joint (Qwest 946109-2) Producer: Quincy Jones

With over fifty years in the business, Quincy Jones continues to prove that he can do no wrong. This release provides a stellar showcase for his talents as a producer, as it does for the music form he obviously loves: Rhythm & Blues. The artist explores several music formats, from blues and jazz to hip-hop and quiet storm k&B. A stellar line-up of artists are present here which only adds to the merit and edge of the album. As he has often done in the past. Jones uses this opportunity to introduce a new: singer (Tamia) to music audiences. Pay special attention to her, this girl

can sing her butt off and, with Jones' Midas touch, has a promising career ahead of her. To use the word "excellence" to describes Jones' talents is almost redundant, but that is exactly what he and his new record is. Standout tracks: "You Put A Move On My Heart," "Moody's Mood For Love," "Stomp" and "Is It Love That We're Missing."

Jones also discussed producing the historical recording session for "We Are The World," the biggest-selling single in music history. Jones also talked about the three albums he produced for Miehael Jaekson: Off The Wall, Thriller, and Bad. Quiney Jones owns Qwest Records, founded Vibe magazine, produces the The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air and Mad TV for television and co-produced the film The Color Purple with Steven Spielberg. Additionally, he has composed music for numerous television and film projects, including the movies The Pawnbroker and In Cold Blood. Jones will produce the 1996 Academy Awards.

ATTITUDE RECORDS LAUNCHES the industry's only 7-inch vinyl promotion. Recognizing the need for quality R&B and Rap releases in the 7-inch vinyl configuration for the approximately 200,000 vinyl jukeboxers across the country, Jacksonville, Florida-based Attitude Records has launched the industry's first marketing plan for artist exposure via jukeboxes. Through Attitude's affiliation with Dolphin Music and other vinyl one-stops, the program is geared toward label one-stop customers who sell to the jukebox industry. With the advent of cassette singles, most labels don't press 7-inch vinyl, and many only have a limited knowledge of the venue for it. (Most 7-inch vinyl users are jukebox owners with machines located in Urban nightclubs, game rooms, lounges and restaurants.) With Attitude's JBO Double Sided Hit campaign, the company plans to capitalize on this wide open market. Through the JBO program, labels will grant Attitude the permission to license releases for 7-inch singles to be distributed to their network of jukebox vendors. Attitude will then press and distribute the 7-inch vinyl singles to jukebox vendors at no cost to participating labels. Attitude will also supply labels with semi-annual sales reports with sales information on such matters as units shipped and the markets to which they are distributed. Labels of course, will have final approval on which songs are on the AA side of the release and whether they be songs by the A side artist or another on their label. The first release is DJ Traus' "Ride Out," on side A and CC Lemonhead featuring the 69 Boyz' "Take It Off," on side AA.

DIS N' DAT: Warner Bros. recording artist/chanteuse, Marilyn Scott, brings her special blend of blues, jazz and soul to B.B. King's Blues Club December 15 for two sets of Christmas songs designed to get the holiday spirit flowing. FROST: Smile Now, Die Later (Ruthless/Relativity, 88561) Producer: Various. RAP/HIP-HOP.

One of the first West Coast rappers on vinyl, Kid Frost is a true hip-hop pioneer. His songs "Rough Cut" and "Terminator" were released in 1984 on Electro Beat Records. Al Davis contracted with Frost to do the original Raiders rap. Five years later Frost recorded the hit "La Raza." The end result is the debut release of *Smile Now, Die Later*. Frost has clearly taken his music to a higher level while maintaining his distinctive style. Frost con-



veys his inner messages. He lays out his life and times in true poetic fashion. Whether good, bad or indifferent, Frost simply and quite succinctly states: what goes around, comes around. Frost's best has certainly arrived.

Salseros will easily recognize the all-star lineup: India,

Johnny Rivera, Ray Sepúlveda, Oscar D'León, Tito Nieves, Tony Vega, Jose Alberto "El Canario," Guianko, Miles Peña, and Celia Cruz to mention a few. This album will sell like hotcakes with adequate in-store play.

LOS SABROSOS DEL MEREN-GUE: *P'aqui y pa' llevar* (MP, 6173)Producer: Antonio L. Rivera. TROPICAL/MERENGUE.

Los Sabrosos del Merengue is a ten-year old Puerto Rican band with a long string of hits. Their latest album, *P'aqui y pa' llevar*, was produced by the group's founder, Antonio Rivera. The sound, fronted by singer Arnaldo Vallellanes, is distinctly aimed at a younger, more dance-oriented consumer. As a result, the group maintains the same formula that churned out previous hits like

VARIOUS ARTISTS: Best of Techno Volume 6—Pure (Sm:)e SM-8018-2)



This collection is au example of how broad the techno music genre has become. Although a largely uneven package, the artists assembled here do represent a range of musical sensibilities— all tethered together by some cutting edge electronic beats, blips and boombastic textures. The disc opens with Pleasant Chemistry's "(Let's Have Some)Sax (Sax Or Snares? Mix), which is BPM-driven tome with bell like trills on top, and speaking of bells, the album really gets going with Robert Armani's "Curcus Bells," a trance dance mix that borders of trip-hop. The highlight of the album is "East (Opium Deu Mix)," the moody, ethereal, yet danceable, track by Humate And Rabbit In The Moon. Get ready for the rave. (MRM)

■ RED THUNDER: Makoce Wakan (Eagle Thunder Records/Koch Records)



Makoce Wakan is unlike most commercially available releases today. This album consists of 11 delicately crafted mini operas, resulting in an intense spiritual collection. Red Thunder's new creation of expressive "native rock" symbolizes the deep beliefs and passionate views of this quartet's Native American heritage. With intrumental interludes and tracks with vocals this disc screams out originality and inspiration. Thought provoking songs such as "Medicine Woman," "Sacred Ground," "Prayer Song" and "Hidden Medicine" make up the release. 
■ BOYS LIFE: Boys Life (Crank! 004)

After releasing four singles through a few indie labels over the last twenty-something months, Los Angeles-based record company Crank! has just put out the quartet's self-titled full-length debut. ■ JONATHA BROOKE & THE STORY: Plumb (Blue Thumb/GRP Records)

Jonatha Brooke sings with casual delivery her sometimes sweet, other times fierce lyrics. She vocalizes ultra personal stories throughout *Plumb*, an album of a dozen tracks. With Brooke's moving words, she immediately captures attention, letting the listener feel the emotions that sparked the



tunes' initial penning. With questioning songs like "Where Were You?" and "Is This All?," Brooke demands explanation to her rhetorical probes. Yet, to the contrary, tracks such as "No Better," "Charming" and "Nothing Sacred," leave no room for dispute. Of the 12 substantial trac's making up the release, Brooke has a hand in scribing nearly all of them, inaddition to her acoustic, often times electric, guitar playing and vocal resposibilities. Needless to say, this release is credible and deserving, making Brooke an artist to keep an eye and ear out for. (KS)

News From The United Kingdom, Ireland & Europe

AT THE MARKETPLACE: Thorn EMI at £15.48 up 1.8%; Rank is £4.07 up 1.9% and PolyGram is £38.74 (Dutch 96.5) and up 4.3%.

STILL AT THE MARKETPLACE, CHRYSALIS reported an operating loss of £7 million in the year ending August 31 compared to a loss the year before of £4.2 million. However, the company was able to report a pre-tax profit of £1 million, due to the sale of its stake in Metro Radio. The year before the company reported a loss of £3.9 million. There was no dividend the past two years, but in April 1996, a dividend of 2.75 pence will be paid. Shares closed at £3.46. According to chairman Chris Wright, the transforming of Chrysalis from a music company to a media group, covering music publishing, television production, film development and distribution as well as radio stations, has taken some steam out of profits but reports that all divisions have made considerable progress during the past year and while there may be a pre-tax loss next year, he is optimistic about the upcoming years.

The group pulled out of the all-star lineup when they discovered they weren't on the BBC promo trailer. Manager Tom Watkins denied the group pulled out when they didn't win any awards at the teenage magazine's event.

BRING ON DEM CHAINS: Joining the self-proclaimed list of slaves in the multi-million dollar slave game is Simply Red's Mick Hucknall who complained that Warners has made some £375 million from the group's efforts in the past ten years. And the group only took in some £50 million.

THE URGE TO MERGE: Thorn EMI, in spite of its demerger, plans to enter the CD ROM market.

AND HANGING ON TO IT is the Rank Organization which has decided to keep London's Claremont Casino as the foundation on which it intends to build its gambling and gaming business.

ANALYSIS: HE'S GOING UP. Ken Brotherston, former CBS Records' European financial analyst, has been named managing director of Korn/Ferry Associates, a division of headhunters Korn/Ferry International.

JAZZ ME: Northern Ireland's Coyote Records has released Gravity Still Works by The Irish Jazz Orchestra. The CD, a first for Ireland, was financed by the Arts Councils in Northern Ireland and Republic of Ireland.

THE SKULL AND CROSSBONES: The International Federation of the Phonographic Industry (IFPI) will spend \$1 million in Italy next year to fight a growing pirate CD and cassette market there. While most of Europe shows sales of pirate product falling, Italy has jumped from 15.3 million to 21 million in the past year. IFPI's new effort calls for new laws against pirate producers as well as working closely with magistrates in the leading Italian cities, especially in the South where the Mafia is thought to be involved. In the past year, pirate sales in Germany dropped 51% and in Spain pirate sales are now estimated at less than 5%. Also helping the fight is Poland's recently enacted copyright law as well as the European Court decisions regarding pirate copies of Phil Collins and Cliff

SORRY, I'M A VEGETARIAN: Damien Hirst, who directed Blur's video single, "Country House," won this year's £30,000 Turner Prize for his sculpture "Mother and Child Divided." The piece, a formerly alive cow and calf, who were cut in half and sealed in a glass cage. Record producer Brian Eno presented the check to Hirst in London.

CHECK YOUR DRAWERS: Bonhams, a top London auction house is putting on the first Fab Four auction in Tokyo in September 1996. Ted Owen of Bonhams said the Beatles items to be sold will be collectibles of original clothes, handwritten letters, contracts and other items of value, and no souvenir or plastics allowed. Collection will be gathered from private individuals throughout the world

TO SUE OR NOT TO SUE: When Channel 5 Television was awarded its TV license, the Canadian-backed consortium UKTV and Virgin TV were the main losers. UKTV decided not to contest the decision by the Independent Television Commission. However, Virgin TV decided to seek a judicial review on its own. Now UKTV has decided to follow Virgin into the eourts. Launch date for the UK's fifth terrestrial television channel is due January 1997.

TO SKYB OR NOT TO BSKYB: It's beginning to look like all televised sports will be exclusively on Rupert Murdoch's BSkyB, a division of his News Corporation. And other companies in the field are fighting back. They have asked the Office of Fair Trading to conduct a review of the company's operations to see if it is abusing its leading position in the television market. Earlier this year a Monopolies and Mergers Commission inquiry was called off when BSkyB agreed to make some changes. However, cable companies called the changes inadequate

because BSkyB dominates the conditional access technology and has also forced cable companies to take packages of channels. BSkyB said that cable operators should develop their own access technology and compete financially for sports programs if they weren't satisfied with BSkyB's terms. BSkyB also said it had good relationships with most of the larger cable operators. However, few, if any of the companies can compete financially with BSkyB.

SHE'S NO CHINESE TAKE-A-WAY: Wei Wei Wong has sold over 100 million records, making her, numerically at least, the world's top recording star. Now she's in trouble with her bosses at Beijing's Central Dance and Singing Troupe because she is refusing to share the money she receives at concerts with the Troupe. She's also shown her independence by recording an album of Chinese love songs in English. Prudently, she is doing her refusing from a temporary home in Atlanta.

LET'S PARTY: Where? Well, the Benedictine monks of Belmont Abbey in Hereford are advertising the abbey as the perfect place to party with facilities for everything from an office party to weddings complete with liquor bar and disco.

AND WHILE WE'RE AT IT: Benedictine monks at Ganagobie Abbey in France are offering a non-religious business-ethics course that runs from three to five days and costs up to \$2,000.

UK SINGLES: Hanging onto een is Robson & Jerome's "I Believe," followed by Coolio's "Gangsta's Paradise" still sitting on twee and Everything But The Girl's "Missing" is resting on drie with Boyzone's "Father & Son" jumping up to vier. Oasis' "Wonderwall" drops down to vijf while newcomer Passengers' "Miss Sarajevo" lands on zes and Enya's "Anywhere Is" clings to zeven while Bjork's ''It's Oh So Quiet' moves up to acht. And ''You'll See' Madonna down to negen while Bon Jovi's ''Lie To Me'' is still on tien.

News From Japan And The Orient

THE TOTAL SHIPMENTS of audio and video software in Japan for October 1995, according to RIAJ (Record Industries Association of Japan), totaled \$686.612 million, a drop of 3% from the comparable month of 1994 while 56.13 million units in volume, up 16%. Breaking them down: Audios were \$558.12 million, 81% of the total, 3% up at 48.051 million units, 86% of the total, up 15%; CD-oriented items, CD-Graphics, CD-I and CD ROM were \$22.41 million, 3% of the total and down 6% at 4.951 million units, 9% of the total, up 71%. Video shipments amounted to \$105.59 million, 15% of the total, down 25%, 3.127 million units, 6% of the total, down 19%; Total audios, CDs were \$532.51 million, up 3%, 45.458 million units, up 17%; Local Repertoire CDs were \$346.07 million, 65% of the total, up 1% for 32.571 million units, 72%, up 19%. International Repertoires were \$186.45 million, up 7%, 35% of the total, 12.888 million units, 28%, up 12%; Audio Tapes, \$25.18 million, down 2%, 2.563 million units, down

FILM REVIEWS

TriStar's Jumanji

JUMANJI IS A BOARD GAME originated out of darkest Africa. Whoever plays it becomes an active participant within the game, facing all the dangers of the natural jungle and it must be played out to the end in order for everything to right itself. Destruction and ostensibly death, though that's never shown, is possible in the play of the game and the participants must elude each new peril until the next roll of the dice presents either something new or the end of the game.

The screenplay was written by Jonathan Hensleigh and Greg Taylor & Jim Strain from a screen story by Taylor and Strain and Chris Val Allsburg, all based on the book by Van Allsburg. Joe Johnston directed.

Young Alan Parrish, Adam Hann-Byrd, discovers the game, buried in New England many years before by another young boy who recognized the inherent dangers within it. Unwittingly he and his young girlfriend Sarah, Laura Bell Bundy, begin the game. Alan is disseminated and swept into Jumanji, to be kept there until someone rolls a five or eight on the board, which is put away for 26 years before another young boy and girl, Bradley Pierce and Kirsten Dunst, find and begin play again, unwittingly picking up the same game.

Robin Williams is released from the jungle as the 26-year older Alan Parrish and is faced with the same dangers because the game is on and he is still an active part of it. It must be played to its end by all four participants now, Pierce, Dunst, Williams and the older Sarah, Bonnie Hunt, confronting a loose pack of looting monkeys, a stampede of elephants, rhinos, zebras and other jungle animals, a lion in the house, a monsoon, a white hunter stalking Williams and giant mosquitoes. The destruction let loose by all this on a sleepy New England town is tremendous and involves not only the game's participants but the townspeople as well, particularly the children's aunt, Bebe Neuwirth and town deputy David Alan Grier before the game is completed and all is restored to normalcy and the group attempts once again to dispose of the game. The film ends with the box washed up on some foreign beach as another pair of unsuspecting youths approach it.

The film showcases the excellent special visual effects created by Industrial Light & Magic, division of Lucas Digital Limited. All the stampede and

crash action on screen is further augmented and heightened by the Digital Sound System which can be felt throughout the theatre.

The animaltronics effects and special make-up was designed and created by Tom Woodruff, Jr. and Alec Gillis. Thomas Ackerman was director of photography and James Horner did the music.

Touchstone's Father Of The Bride

ACTUALLY, THIS IS a sequel re-do of the remake of another. First came Father Of The Bride with Spencer Tracy, Joan Bennett and Elizabeth Taylor. The sequel to that was Father's Little Dividend, same cast. Forty years later there was Father Of The Bride with the above pictured cast, and now Father Of The Bride II, another sequel.

Producer Nancy Meyers and director Charles Shyer again collaborated on the screenplay, based on the Albert Haekett/Frances Goodrich original Dividend. It's a good one for the family and holiday season.

There are those who'll say Father Of The Bride II is a fantasy, but it's good, solid, entertaining filmmaking.

Anyone who's ever loved a fellow family member will be touched, especially fathers and daughters, which was the center of the first Father. Bride. That element is here again but the concern broadens to include more. This time around, daughter Kimberly Williams is pregnant, which sets father Steve Martin onto an aging trip. A touching and humorous attempt at looking younger ends with mom Diane Keaton turning up pregnant. It's pretty predictable throughout but Meyers and Shyer make it fun, poignant and enjoyable in getting to the same day delivery making father a father again and grandfather at the same time.

Meyers and Shyer deal with '90s concerns of middle age and men and women acting as equals, but they don't do it hamfistedly. They make you think while you laugh and remember, and they touch your heart while they're doing it. Shyer, doubling as director, knows the tree-lined street and the way to the full heart, and guides his audience there wonderfully. A final basketball sequence between father and daughter is guaranteed to squeeze the heart of any man who's ever had a daughter. I dare 'em not to drop a tear or two.

The cast is also familiar with the territory. Martin is George Banks again and conveys a father and husband's feelings nicely and without gimmickery. Diane Keaton returns in a well controlled performance as the mother and mother-to-be. Martin Short is back to design the dual baby shower and nursery with some fey but concerned humor. Willams and George Newbern are the young couple, arguing but loving. Jane Adams is impressive as the doctor, first allaying Martin's apprehension then winning him over enough so that the new baby girl bears her name.

William A. Fraker's camera work wonderfully conveys the warmth this family feels toward one another and Alan Silvestri's music fills out the enjoyable experience.

Columbia's Sense And Sensibility

JANE AUSTEN'S 200-YEAR OLD BOOK was the source material for Emma Thompson's debut as screenwriter. It was the author's first novel.

The film is lovely, summoning up a pristine English countryside and manners, beautifully evoking, visually, a long gone era while spotlighting a time-spanning relationship intent—that of marrying for money and position—still in place today. Ang Lee directed.

Thompson's script is literate and comprehensive: When Henry Dashwood (Tom Wilkinson) dies unexpectedly, his estate must pass, by law, in the 1700s, to his son from his first marriage, leaving his current wife (Gemma Jones) and three daughters (Emma Thompson, Kate Winslet and Emilie Francois) without a home and at the monetary mercy of the son John (James Fleet) and wife Fanny (Harriet Walter).

Fanny's brother Edward (Hugh Grant) captures Thompson's heart but before anything major can come of the relationship he is sent of to London by his ultra class conscious sister.

Thompson, in the meantime, struggles to keep the family's tight purse strings intact and Winslet becomes swept up in a passionate love affair with a handsome young man Greg Wise while keeping the more sedentary but solid Alan Rickman at arm's length.

As Thompson and Winslet struggle to find romantic fulfillment in a society obsessed with financial and social status, they must learn to mix sense with sensibility in their dealings with both money and men. Eventually the women wind up with the men best suited for them at film's end.

Thompson and Winslet's characters are center focus. All performances are strait-laced in accordance with the costumes and era.

Costume designers Jenny Beavan and John Bright's contribution is major Michael Coulter's photography is sparkling, near-dreamy and gorgcous.

Collective Soul Wants The World To Know

SUCCESS IS A CONSTANT BATTLE. Just because Collective Soul's first release, Hints, Allegations and Things Left Unsaid, has certified double-platinum, and the band's current self-titled effort is following in the debut's footsteps with

more than a million to date, the quintet isn't about to relax yet.

They have just released "The World I Know," the record's third single, which is bulleting in the #43 position on this week's Cash Box pop singles list. The excessive radio and video spinning of it, along with the previous track "December," should prove they're anything but a flash in the pan.

Singer/songwriter/guitarist/co-producer, Ed Roland and the rest of the bandrhythm guitarist and Ed's younger brother Dean Roland, drummer Shane Evans, bassist Will Turpin and lead guitarist Ross Childress—say they're in the business for the long haul.

In addition to hoping for an expansive and productive career, their label, Atlantic Records, also sees consistency for the fivesome. During a recent conversation with Atlantic product manager, Lisa Gray, she outlined the strategy for maintaining a consistent fanbase for the group's future. "The bottom line on Collective Soul is that they write incredible songs that get a major reaction from radio, and once it's put on radio, it reacts very strongly at retail... The important thing with Collective Soul is that we are really focusing on their image and letting people know who they are.'

bands. He's very, very talented."

On why the band recorded their discs at a variety of studios over scattered periods of time he says, "Well, the first one was because I worked at a studio so I used the tapes from there. My manager built a small demo studio for me in his basement, so that's where the bulk of it was done. Then my friend Matt has started building a studio in Miami, so I went there. The second was done (at a variety of places) because when we had days off (from touring) last year we would go in and record. But the bulk of it was done at Criteria (in Miami). We were trying to come together as a band in the studio. When we were doing it live, it's a different aspect than in the studio. We used different takes from different places.'

Considering Ed and the band were pleasantly surprised at the response to Hints..., what expectations did they have for their follow-up effort? "We didn't even think about it. Our whole objective to this release was for people to see what Collective Soul, and hear what Collective Soul was about. But there were still songs on the first one that people liked and I'm never going to take that away. It got our foot in the door and it would have been really vain of me to say 'you can't like the songs that way, you have to like it this way.' We're not about that. But at the same time we wanted to present Collective Soul, to show people what we are capable of."

Though Ed isn't displeased with Hints..., he just would have expressed some

things differently had he known a few million people would go for it. "I was very happy with it for what it is. I think it's a very good demo. It shows songs. It doesn't show a band. It was never presented to show a band. It just so happened it took off...

With such strong opinions about songwriting and music in general, Ed speaks of his early exposure to music. "I grew up with Elvis in the house and you'd go to a friend's house and they'd play (various) records. I actually bought an Elton John record, Greatest Hits. I remember my parents allowed me to buy one record. It was a choice between Elton John, Olivia Newton John and John Denver. I still remember the rack. I remember thinking 'wow, Elton John was just too damn cool.' I would love to meet the man. Of all the people, I respect him and Bernie Taupin (and) their songwriting. Every time I write a song, I try to compare it to that. I'm nowhere near it, but that's what I aim for.'

With regard to Ed's statement on how his parents "allowed" him to buy one record; with his father being a minister, his upbringing was a bit heavy on discipline. And though Ed doesn't agree with many sectors of organized religion, he has the utmost respect for people to believe in what they wish and says, "I'm very spiritual. I think religion lost (its) spirituality. I think maybe, originally, religion started off at the spiritual end of it but somewhere along the line it's definitely lost that. But that's not to say somebody can't find spirituality within a church or a religion..

Did his upbringing influence his work? "So many people write to us (thinking we're a Christian band). It's funny, we got one the other day where someone sent our CD in broke, accusing us of how we could claim to be a Christian band. I've never claimed to be anything other than a rock n' roll band... I guess a lot of people are searching (for something to believe in). To me, you shouldn't look to another person, you should look a little bit higher. You should look somewhere other than myself, (laughs) because I definitely don't have the answers.

And while Ed doesn't admit to having the solution, he does acknowledge a simple respect for other people's decisions. Ed bluntly simplifies his reasons for not rebelling while living in his parents fairly strict home. "I wanted to eat, and I wanted to have a bed. There is a matter of respect to your family... And I still respect my parents home. When I go there, it's their home, their rules... but it would be the same as if I were to go to your home. Whatever rules apply in your home, I have to go by those.

Ed admits he doesn't really have a permanent home at the moment. Most of the last two years has been spent on the road.

And what's in the future for Collective Soul? "A lot of touring. We want to put a new record out next year. We grew up in the 70's, I believe in putting a record out a year. That's just to see the band grow. We feel we have a lot to offer."

Only time will tell where Collective Soul will be in the future, and if they're still on the road 20 years from now, there will be few complaints from this Georgia

Roland considers Collective Soul a group effort and explains how the chemistry brews when the others approve of his musicial ideas. "It's a band thing. There's a lot of bands where one individual writes the songs. That's all I ever wanted to be, a songwriter. I didn't necessarily want to sing the songs. It's just that nobody clse would sing, so I took that up. As far as the production, I co-produced it with a friend, Matt Serletic. I've worked in a studio for eight years, so that comes second nature to me. I know how I would like the songs to sound, but without a bass player you have no song. Without a drummer you don't have a complete song. So to me, I look at it and so do the rest of the guys, each person has their responsibilty and it's no more or no less important than the next person's responsibility. Mine just happens to be to write the songs. To sit there and say it would be a song without bass or drums or guitar, it wouldn't be. I've worked with this band since 1989 and it's something that we've been trying to do and it's just something that I've always wanted to do. It's a sound that we've developed as a band. It wasn't shown on the first (release) because that was a demo. Like I said this is something we've been working years to get, our second release, which we consider our debut record, out.

And while Ed did co-produce both releases, he tells why he worked with Serletic on both sets of tunes. "(Matt) is a classically trained pianist and he went to the University of Miami and got his masters degree in trombone and piano. He's very much into the arrangement of orchestrating instruments. That's his forte and Matt has a real good ear... Hopefully, he'll get to stretch out and produce other

AFTRA Spars With TNN

TNN: THE NASHVILLE NETWORK released a statement on Nov. 30 which accused The American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA) of forcing the network to recognize a union not supported by its employees. The TNN statement was made in response to a memo directed to all AFTRA performers from the AFTRA New York and Nashville offices.

The memo appears to have been distributed to members of other trade organizations, artists' managers, record labels, former AFTRA members, members of the **American Federation of Musicians** (AF of M), and all businesses which provide talent to TNN. The notice threatens disciplinary action by AFTRA against performers who want to appear on TNN and demands these performers boycott the network. TNN is currently operating under an agreement with the American Federation of Musicians for the services of performers/musicians.

In response to the statement, AFTRA executive director Randy Himes said, "There's no reason as to why AFTRA, who represents the main product of what they (TNN) put out—the performers, singers, announcers, the royalty artists—can't have their issues addressed just as the other people did." according to Himes, AFTRA and TNN have been discussing the issue since 1983.

"It's almost to the point that they ought to be looking out the window saying, 'The British are coming,'" Himes continued. It's not a surprise to them whatsoever. They've known about our activities and we haven't tried to hide it from them for months, or even years. It's just a matter of now to where we say, 'Okay, we can't and will not treat you any differently than anybody else in the industry.""

Regarding TNN's comment that AFTRA is trying to "browbeat the country music industry," the AFTRA exec director said, "I think they're trying to tie the whole industry in with them, when, in fact, the rest of the industry is already on board."

AFTRA president CeCe DuBois added, "TNN is the biggest game in town, and so I think the membership has been a little intimidated to really stand their ground in terms of health and retirement benefits, and that's really what we're talking about. I don't believe the issue is one of money because no one has even been willing to come to the negotiating table to talk dollars yet."

New Video Channel Debuts

JONES INTERNATIONAL NETWORKS, INC. announced that Great American Country, a new country music video network, will premiere on Dec. 31, 1995. The 24-hour cable TV channel has materialized due to music industry and consumer demand experienced by its sister company, Jones Satellite Networks, Inc., operator of the largest country music radio network in the United States.

"Country music has been one of the largest growth areas in entertainment, increasing to a \$1.3 billion industry during the same decade that has witnessed a decline in virtually all other music genres," said **Gregory J. Liptak**, Group president for **Jones International**, **Ltd.**, the parent eompany for **JIN**. "We see a great opportunity to combine the technological, distribution and entertainment talents of several Jones companies to create a network that will meet consumer demand for country music that appeals to the 25-54 age category."

Jones Satellite Networks, with nearly 1,000 affiliate radio stations, is the nation's largest provider of live, 24-hour satellite delivered radio formats. JSN's 450 US Country CD Country format affiliate stations constitute the largest country radio network in the United States. JSN's relationship with country artists and record companies will support Great American Country's objective to feature top country music videos and celebrity interviews.

Kraft Sponsors All-Female Tour

KRAFT FOODS INC. ANNOUNCED that the company will sponsor a first-ofits-kind music tour featuring three of country music's most popular female stars. Carlene Carter, Lorrie Morgan and Pam Tillis will kick off a 33-city Kraft Country Tour in May 1996, which will benefit, in part, the nation's hungry through Second Harvest, the national food bank network.

"Supporting a country music tour featuring these outstanding artists is a natural fit for Kraft because, like country music, Kraft is a part of millions of American households," said Robert Hopton, Kraft's director of marketing strategy and development. "In addition, Kraft has long been a supporter of the country music industry, and in fact, sponsored the Country Music Association Awards for 20 years."

The Kraft Country Tour will consist of performances at amphitheaters, arenas, state fairs and theme parks in 33 cities. Shows will take place primarily throughout the South and Midwest, with some dates in the East and West. Second Harvest and its local affiliates will benefit from food drives held at all concert venues. The organization will receive a portion of sales from a commemorative poster featuring all three artists, in addition to proceeds from guitar and front row ticket auctions.

All three artists scheduled for the tour have impressive musical backgrounds. BNA Records' platinum-selling Lorrie Morgan has four number one records, three platinum albums and two gold albums to her credit, as well as various nominations and awards from the CMA, ACM, Grammy and AMA. Lee Roy Parnell's Lucky Streak

LEE ROY PARNELL IS A GRACIOUS HOST. As we settle into our interview, Parnell, in a charming Texas drawl, offers refreshments and apologizes for his appearance. He's just come from riding his motorcycle (a recent gift from his girlfriend) and he's casually clad in jeans, a T-shirt and a ball cap. Perhaps the reason Parnell is so gracious is that this is our second attempt to sit down and talk about his latest album on Career Records, We All Get Lucky Sometimes. Our first scheduled meeting was thwarted by Parnell's unscheduled disappearance, which occurred a week earlier. After the cancellation, Parnell's management company explained that he was later found writing songs for his next album. Next album—isn't this a little premature?

"I get really paranoid that I'm not gonna have enough material," Parnell responds. "I write for months before, because I want to have a lot to choose from, you know, when I get ready to make another record." As a result of his extreme preparation, Parnell says he always ends up with too many songs. "But here's the thing-when I make a record, I don't make records out of singles, okay? I make records to be albums," he says.

While working on his fourth project, the album concept is a philosophy to which Parnell and his producers, Scott Hendricks (president, Capitol Nashville) and Tim DuBois (president, Arista Nashville) strongly adhered when going into the studio. "We've always had a system," Parnell says. "All three of us would have to agree that it was the right song. One song that initially met with resistance from Parnell was his current single. "When A Woman Loves A Man' was a song that I wasn't sure I wanted to try and cut, but they both believed that it was the right song for me," Parnell says. "The reason I didn't think it was was because Mark Luna, one of the writers of that song, sang such an incredible demo that I didn't know that I could ever do it as good as Mark had done it," Parnell explains with modesty. "But they kept saying, 'We hear you doing it. And your way.'"

Parnell also did things his way by using his road band in the studio. "I've known some of these guys for 15 years and have always said that if I could ever hand-pick a band, I would pick them...and eventually it all happened.' Over the years, Parnell has been steadily working on developing his unique exerching country. He describes his ultimate sound as "something that, when voig came on the radio, the listener would know it was gonna be me before I started singing." Parnell relates this idea of individuality to the music of his past: "When Bob Wills would play, you knew a long time before Tommy Duncan came in singing that it was gonna be the Wills' band...And when the Buckaroos kicked in, you would know that was gonna be Buck singing.

We All Get Lucky Sometimes, Parnell's newest album on the equally-new Career Records, has stayed true to its title thus far. "A Little Bit Of You," the first single, went number one, making it the first number one for the Arista Nashville sister label as well. Parnell, as the label's flagship artist, feels fortunate to be a part of president Tim DuBois' latest vision. "He has been my guardian angel for many years," Parnell says. "I know that he believed it was the right thing for me and I believed him.'

As many artists will attest, recording an album often reflects a certain stage in their careers or personal lives. Parnell is no exception. "There's a song on this album called 'Saved By The Grace Of Your Love,' that I wrote with Mike Reid which probably sums up the way I feel about what perfect love and life is all about," he says. "I was allowed to go as far on the rockin' side as I wanted to like with "If The House Is Rockin"," and then come all the way back to something as tender as "Saved By The Grace Of Your Love." So it was a wider spectrum than anything I've ever done before. And I think it's the most honest record I've done to date."

"To me, it really comes down to whether or not the record company believes that an artist is really a true artist and deserves to be recorded and deserves to be heard," Parnell continues. "I think we have a lot of entertainers these days in the music business. I don't know how many artists we have. How many Johnny Cashes are around here right now? Waylon Jennings or Willie Nelsons or Merle Haggards? Don't know.'

And what does Parnell consider himself? "I don't know. You know, I'm a guitar player. I always think about myself like that," he says. For a musician best known for his masterful slide ability (who grew up listening to the likes of Duane Allman, Ry Cooder and Robert Johnson), 'guitar player' would be an accurate description. "I like to sing and I like to write, but I'm a guitar player," he says. "I hope that my peers would consider me to be an artist."

In addition to songs from some of Nashville's top tunesmiths, We All Get Lucky Sometimes also contains six songs co-written by Parnell. The writing process is one that he is (obviously) dedicated to and one of which he is extremely protective; Parnell mentions very few co-writers. "Writing is an extremely personal thing. And I have a hard time sitting down in a room with a guy that I just don't know...and try to dig into songs. So it takes time to get comfortable with a co-writer." When writing, Parnell usually comes up with a title or idea first. "Rarely does the music come before the idea," he says. "Occasionally a lick on the guitar will inspire me to create a lyric to fit with it. But usually it's a lyric—something I believe in or I feel compelled to do. And then I try to fit the music around that."

Commercial success has been a slow but steady climb for Parnell. For years, both critics and his label have been "singing" his praises, a fact that Parnell counts more valuable than monetary wealth. "I think that having my fellow musicians and the folks who are around mc, both in an audience sense and in the musical community sense, giving me the nod [is more important]. And being happy with it myself, too, you know? I know when I've done a good job, and I know when I've done a mediocre job and I would have liked to have done it better," he says. "I have my integrity and that's something that ten zillion records couldn't give me if I wasn't happy with it.

At age 38, some proprietors of "young country" might consider this stage veteran as having one foot in the grave. Thankfully, Parnell still feels like a baby in the business and is finally reaping from the seeds sown three albums ago. "I'm just now getting to the point where I can articulate a little bit about what I believe I'm supposed to be doing," he says. "I'm 38 years old—and in this day and time that's no spring chicken. I'm young for a rock-n-roller," Parnell laughs, "but I'm gettin' on up there in country terms. It seems so silly to me, but it kinda looks that way. I think I'm just gettin' started."

As the next decade of his career unfolds, Parnell plans to continue performing his mix of country/blues. Doubters of his intentions need only to look at Parnell's musical influences for proof. "The people that I know in the music business that are my heroes are people who have been doing it for a long time," he says. "You go see Merle Haggard right now and he's better than he's ever been. Go see B.B. King. He's 70 years old. I guarantee you he's better than he's ever been. Why slow down? Why stop?'

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
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
