New Film Musical With Grace

We're not talking the all-stops-out MGM musical, replete with Busby Berkeley-scale production numbers, but the Gramercy Pictures film *Grace Of My Heart* could very well revive this dormant genre, if the Alison Anders film has anything to do with it, or if the MCA Records soundtrack—featuring a panoramic cross-section of musical talent—sparks interest. Extant musical flavors of past and present populate this depiction of blossoming womanhood, which also glimpses at bygone artistic ideals. In his cover story, *Cash Box* film pundit John Goff discusses the film's merits, how it's being marketed and the depth and diversity of music on the soundtrack.

November Is Independence Month

\$30 Mil Slated For Day Promo Campaign

IF IT COULD BE JUNE IN JANUARY, why can't it be July in November? That is, a repeat of 20th Century Fox's record breaking *Independence Day* boxoffice assault which opened July 4, only this time for FoxVideo's home release November 22.

The Roland Emmerich-directed, Dean Devlin-produced paean to Irwin Allen and any number of disaster films which, at this time, is still running in theaters across the country, and at \$296 million and counting is billing itself as the boxoffice champion as well as "the fastest grossing movie of all time" is looking for another record. It's also pretty much of a shoo-in to reach its goal.

With a reported \$30 million allotted for the video push FoxVideo is aiming an opening day at 100,000 retail outlets across North America alone on the 22nd. Its theatrical run opened in almost 4,000 theaters, more than any other opening day film, and netted it the debuting four day record, its first. Its kick-off price for the home vid market is set at an ownable \$22.98 in the U.S. and \$24.98 in Canada.

The six weeks leading up to November 22 will see a massive television advertising blitz. FoxVideo is also creating a series of exclusive region and city-specific billboards in the top 25 markets in the U.S. and Canada expected to deliver more than 6.5 billion direct consumer impressions.

Additional support will be in point-of-purchase materials: multiple posters, banners, standees, shelf-talkers and other creative materials. The company is also creating a wide variety of pre-pack configurations from 24-piece shippers to 1,400-piece mega-towers.

FoxVideo also plans to make *Independence Day* an event at the retail level as a companion blitz to the success of the *event* film opening day with exclusively created 3D Live-Action Art attached directly to the videocassette box, for a limited-time only, thus driving the "collectible" nature of the home debut. The 3D keepsake will be the popular image of the destruction of The White House from the film. With the TV advertising blitz running through the Holiday season, the 3D Action Art cut-off will be December 31.

Crossing products, FoxVideo has also created an in-pack consumer promotion that offers any purchaser of *Independence Day* on video a \$5 rebate when they purchase the same company's last-time-of-this-decade's *The Sound Of Music* (can we live three years without *Sound*?) videocassette.

Further, the company has created an in-school teaching program themed to *ID4*. Reaching over 6 million students in grades 6 through 8, the learning program explores areas of science, technology and science fiction while a massive on-line promotion at www.foxhome.com/id4 allows site visitors to relive the movie event at the website. Worldwide, web surfers can participate in an interactive multi-player attack game, learn about upcoming *ID4* events and how to be eligible to win exclusive prizes, trips and merchandise.

RIAA To Broaden MAP

OFFICIALLY JOINING efforts to intensify substance abuse intervention in the music industry, the Recording Industry Assn. of America (RIAA), recently voted to broaden its current substance abuse initiatives and establish a three-year \$2 million grant to fund additional outreach through the Musicians' Assistance Program (MAP).

The National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences (NARAS), led by president Michael Greene, since late last year has urged greater effort by record companies to better police their artists and staff on matters of substance abuse, which initially rankled record company executives. But the high-profile deaths and incarceration of musicians due to drug addictions has rallied the RIAA, which represents the major labels in such matters. The RIAA board on Sept. 5 unanimously voted to beef up its efforts in this sensitive area.

"This record company effort achieves a much needed balance between private and public initiatives," commented RIAA president Hilary Rosen. "On one end of the scale—the private side—is the heroic good that our label chiefs have accomplished over the years by addressing substance abuse with the confidentiality that individuals deserve and demand.

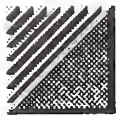

He comes to the job after two years as vp of promotion at Caliber Records. ■ Ken Citron has been upped to vp of distribution and logistics systems for Sony Music Entertainment (SME), where he will be responsible for supporting order management, billing, inventory management, returns fulfillment, warehousing and transportation in the U.S. Citron had served as director in the department since 1991, and prior to joining SME worked for Price Waterhouse and Anderson Consulting. ■ Mike Worthington has been named head of sales at The Enclave. Most recently dir. of sales for Atlantic Records, he oversaw development of the label's emerging artists at retail. Worthington began his career in 1985 as New York retail manager for the Musicland Group, and in 1990 was named national accts. mgr. at Relativity/RED Distribution. He joined Atlantic Records as mgr. sales and progressive music/singles. ■ Roger Greenway has been upped to sr. vp of international for ASCAP. Previously vp/United Kingdom and European dir. of operations, in his new job, Greenway will oversee administration and operational management of ASCAP's entire international activities. Prior to ASCAP, he was chairman of Britain's PRS, on the board of M.R.S. and the Songwriters Guild. He also is a songwriter and record producer. ■ Karen Walker has been promoted to art director at A&M Records. Walker will oversee the packaging design for selected label releases, as well as conceptualize and design promotional materials and merchandise. She has been with A&M for more than two years, most recently as a designer for the label's creative services department. ■ RCA Victor Records has named Steve Backer jazz A&R consultant. Under the non-exclusive agreement with the label, veteran jazz impresario Backer will sign new artists and consult on reissuing and repackaging archival releases. This is a return to BMG for Backer, who helped grow the conglomerate's Novus and Bluebird labels during a tenure there in the '80s. During his 25-year career, Backer has held a variety of executive posts at MGM/Verve, Elektra, ABC/Impulse, Island/Antilles and Windham Hill. He started a jazz division at Arista Records in 1974. ■ Tracy Anderson has been named creative coordinator at Quincy Jones Music Publishing, where she will assist in the development of the company's writers, producers and catalog. Anderson also will seek new writers and producers for the company's roster. Her varied background included work at Bust It/Capitol Records (Hammer's label) for four years, when she worked retail marketing and also served as national publicity director. She formed Monarch Entertainment and acted as a music and image consultant to various record labels, developing artists, writers and producers.

"On the public side, MAP will help everyone working both inside and outside the established music community...to become better educated about helping friends and associates deal positively with their drug and alcohol addictions," Rosen continued.

The RIAA revealed a two-level attack on the problem that includes a) record company internal programs that encompass rehabilitation services, confidential counseling and other assistance; b) Outreach and intervention through MAP, which will use the RIAA grant to develop training and educational materials for industry executives and others regarding drug and alcohol addiction. MAP also will provide companies with consultation, assessment, intervention, placement, treatment monitoring, follow-up and aftercare.

While the RIAA did not assign additional funding to NARAS's Musicians' Substance Abuse Intervention and Referral Program, performing rights organization ASCAP on October 3 will present a benefit concert for Musicians' Cares during the F Music Musicfest, where acts House Of Pain, Unwritten Law, 22 Jacks and Save Ferris are scheduled to perform. Monies raised will supplement Musicians' 24-hour substance abuse helpline (1-800-MUSICARES) and the financial aid fund.

FIRST WEEK OF SCHOOL AND MUSIC: Once again able to take over the environs of Lincoln Center, the 16th annual **College Music Journal Convention** kicked off school for the class of 2000. While there was plenty to occupy the time of those assembled, the atmosphere did not appear as heady as last year. Whether it was the lack of special acts or just a more diversified crop of bands, the CMJ Festival had a much more relaxed feel than the last few outings.

One of the oddities was that so many of the most interesting shows were frontloaded to the opening day on the 4th. At **Coney Island High** the early evening was dominated by **Crypt Records** night. Opening was recent signing **The Revelators**, which played its first gig outside the state of Missouri. The neo-rockabilly trio had technical problems, but overcame them with some fire in the belly that turned the end of the set into roughhousing for man and equipment. The duo **20 Miles** has become quite polished in the short time they have been together. The **Bauer** brothers just released a triple seven inch collection on **In The Red** and will be recording an album for **Fat Possum** in the near future. The **Oblivions** were all grit and fire when they stormed on with a garage sound that has been considerably souped up. At the **Continental**, Columbus' **Moviola** showed why these much-touted popsters deserve praise. **Shannon Wright of Crowdsell**, recently transplanted from Florida and newly-signed to **Columbia/Jet Set**, still has a voice that soars with emotional power. On the other end of the spectrum, the **High Llamas**, who are on the same label, were at the **Thread Waxing Space**. The eight-piece group (minus the brass) was as smooth as silk while playing orchestrated Steely Dan-influenced pop in the Soho art space's tropical conditions.

The next day brought the **Thomas Jefferson Slave Apartments**, who are on **Onion/American**, doing a mix of comedy with rock hooks at an in-store at **Mondo Kim's**. A more unorthodox venue hosted **Sportguitar** on Canadian label **Derivative**, which played at the **Swiss Institute**. The group from Lucerne played tunes that were both catchy and original. One of the highlights of the whole CMJ was seeing **R. L. Burnside** play the shambolic **Continental**, more known for booking punk bands than blues legends. R.L. led his trio through a set that was all highs no matter how low his stories sank.

Friday was when the famous British label **Creation Records** took over the **Mercury Lounge**. **Heavy Stereo** dressed like early glam rockers and sounded close to their labelmates **Oasis**, but much more scaled back. **Merge Records** held its showcase at the **Westbeth Music Hall**. **Guv'nor** managed to fuse bubblegum cuteness with honest quirkiness. **Neutral Milk Hotel** was just a high energy burst of country and pop that would be dangerous to try to contain.

The last day's highlights included the **Jet Set** label band **Pro lapse at Tramps**. The group's two singers resembled a rock 'n' roll version of the **Sugarcubes** with plenty of charm. **The Fez** was host to a trio of groups that hark back to the lush sounding '60s. **The Lilys** have gone through many incarnations, but their latest with its heavy Byrds influence is probably their best. **Richard Davies**, currently on **Flydaddy**, played a scaled-backed version of his compositions which lost little power with the sparse approach. **Yum Yum on Tag** was almost at full strength (the band was missing its keyboardist), but they still had the ultra-sweetness that makes the group so beloved. That's just about the way you could look at the convention—lacking that extra "oomph," but still worth the wait.

Grace Is Graceful History And Woman's Musical

1958 AND NEW YORK'S BRILL BUILDING—just the era and the setting evoke a pastel-like colorful and happily creative milieu which anyone who lived through that time will remember with excitement. Artists during the period went into entertainment for the fun, for the creativity, for the opportunity to express themselves, for the magic and almost mystical thrill that music, stage and films offered. And for almost two decades all that held pretty much true with wave after wave of creativity cresting during that time. Still, while all that was going on, commerciality and the ever encroaching culture of drugs began to weigh upon the pure white foam of those rolling crests like an oil tanker spill in the late '70s and creativity became placid for the most part. Imagination and creativity within the product—entertainment; music, films and television—gave way to the imaginative selling of the product as the dominant concern. Never at any time in the history of entertainment has artistic imagination been wrapped so peacefully in the blanket of mediocrity, consoled by the bottomline joys of ever increasing monetary returns via technocracy than right now. Who the hell needs emotions, we've got machines!

Ah, but, listen...y'hear? Somewhere out there there are voices, a few anyway, whispering. They're the voices of creativity, imagination, basic skill, storytelling, harmony and tone; and it may not be in these '90s but they will make a comeback. Have a little faith. It's not as dead as some believe.

Allison Anders' is one of those voices and she has recognized where all the flowers of creativity have gone, when and why they left. Her latest film, the Gramercy Pictures release *Grace Of My Heart* is acknowledgement of that and a tribute to better times. Anders' is a new voice but an old soul.

Gas Food Lodging and *Mi Vida Loca* were Anders' looks at women in the '90s which have given the writer/director a following and *Grace...* should give her more credibility for future projects.

There have been rumblings about the film musical making a comeback with the advance word on *Evita* being hot. Well, the musical won't come back the way we once knew them; too much money, too risky unless maybe—How about *Die Hard 5: The Musical*, *Lethal Weapon 4: The*

Musical, *Independence Day 2: The Musical?*—Now that's *High Concept*.

Allison Anders' concept of *Grace Of My Heart* could be a nice overlay to bring the less-than-megabuck musical back. Here she's caused music to be an integral part of her story and the characters' lives but she hasn't used period music. The music is in the manner of the '50s, '60s and '70s, but all the tunes have been created for this particular piece.

Risky?...Perhaps. MCA Records is releasing the soundtrack, but without a lot of promotion, as yet. Gramercy is platform releasing the film, opening in only 42 theatres across the country in major markets such as L.A., NY, Chicago, Boston, S.F. and others September 13 and going to 48 total on the 20th. That will cut costs as well as give Anders' cult followers an opportunity to begin the build slowly, with word of mouth being leaned on heavily for further success. And too, Gramercy has its own growing reputation as something of a gambling independent organization; actually one of those looked at as a torchbearer within the truly/edgy indie world by those who treasure creative voices. One other major selling point for *Grace...* within the more commercially oriented audience potential, is the respected executive producer name of Martin Scorsese, an Anders champion. With this release plan Gramercy is giving *Grace Of My Heart* a chance to compete in the long run as a quality piece of entertainment in not being viewed as a piece of meat on the market which will spoil if not bought in the first week.

Music-wise there are the selling names of Burt Bacharach teamed with Elvis Costello, among others, on a tune which will undoubtedly vie for an Oscar Best Song, "God Give Me Strength." Bacharach's film musical reputation is solidly recognized by the Academy. Then, too, there are Carole Bayer Sager and Joni Mitchell. Other writers are well-recognized in the music industry: Gerry Goffin, Louise Goffin, Larry Klein (who does the music for the entire film) Tom Delaney, Los Lobos, Pearl Delancy, Boyd Rice, David A. Stewart, J Mascis, Tiffany Anders, David Baerwald, Cynthia Strother with performances by Sonic Youth, Shawn Colvin, Costello, The Bell Sisters, For Real, Portrait, Miss Lily Banquette of Combustible Edison.

And the performances within the film are top rank with Illeana Douglas and John Turturro looking like—if *Grace...* makes at least \$2 at the boxoffice—Oscar contenders. Douglas is mesmerizing in the changes she coerees her character through via the well-written female character, of which there have been very few in the past couple of years. Her performance should become, as word and the film's reputation builds, one of the dominant selling points of the piece.

With the platformed release Gramercy looks as if it's going in strong support of building an audience for *Grace*. It causes a person to shudder to think what would happen were this taken on by a strictly commercial major releasing organization. This film deserves a shot at finding its audience and allowing its audience to find it.

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SINGLES REVIEWS By Daina Darzin

■ DISHWALLA: "Charlie Brown's Parents" (A&M AMCDP 00263)



The follow-up to Dishwalla's breakthrough smash, "Counting Blue Cars," is a bit more uptempo, but still sports the mellifluous, undulating lilt that makes their alterna-sound such a relaxed, cool pleasure—and a perfect add for any commercial alternative station you'd want to name. Dishwalla will be touring more or less for the rest of their lives to support the soon-to-be-gold debut, *Pet Your Friends*.

■ JEWEL: "You Were Meant For Me" (Atlantic PRCD 6888)

A sleeper success story whose debut, *Pieces of You*, recently went platinum, Jewel follows up her hit, "Who Will Save Your Soul," with a sweetly affecting, charming tune whose easy groove showcases her effortless, lovely voice. "You Were Meant For Me" was actually the second single off the disc, re-released here. But then, "Who Will Save Your Soul" was the first single, didn't do much, and blew up when it was re-released as #3. So "You Were Meant For Me" is actually single #2 AND 4. (Are we confused yet?)

■ PALADINS: "Keep Lovin' Me" (4AD/Warner Bros. 2-46367-AB)

Off the band's September 24 release, *Million Mile Club*, "Keep Lovin' Me" lands the band in the exact right place to benefit from the neo-roots movement spearheaded by such acts as the Rev. Horton Heat and blues up-and-comer Kenny Wayne Shepherd. It's a rollicking, exuberant track heavy on the guitar muscle (no wonder the Paladins were originally discovered by a member of the Fabulous Thunderbirds). The Paladins are touring the states this fall and will be going to Europe thereafter. "Keep Lovin' Me" will be primarily worked to album rock stations.

■ NICKELBAG: "Love Song" (Iguana 574-2)

Nickelbag originally began as a jam session between rock veterans Bernard Fowler (Rolling Stones, Iggy Pop) and Stevie Salas (George Clinton, Rod Stewart), along with many of their pals including Ron Wood, P-Funk keyboard craftsman Bernie Worrell and ex-Pearl Jam drummer Dave Abbruzzese. However, that soon turned into a real band with a real album, *12 Hits and a Bump*, and a big, anthemic metal-edged single which is doing very nicely at metal and active rock: "Love Song" has already garnered adds at WRAS in Atlanta, XEQC in Phoenix, WKCR in Miami and almost 50 other stations.



PICK OF THE WEEK

■ SKOLD: "Neverland" (RCA RDJ 64614-2)

Skold mixes the moody elegance of goth with a fine songwriting sensibility and the power of industrial—vaguely in the same ballpark as the Cure, who've been known to sell some records in their time. "Neverland" is a thickly layered, pulsing, gloomy track which could cross over between modern rock and active rock with ease.

ALBUM REVIEWS by Daina Darzin

■ SUZANNE VEGA: *Nine Objects of Desire* (A&M 31454 0583 2)

Suzanne Vega ventures out from her more folky earlier work, mixing it up on "Birthday (Love Made Real)" with a syncopated groove that's got real, percolating muscle behind it, while "Caramel" sidles up to an almost Latin vibe and mellifluous orchestration that could go on AAA as well as modern rock and other station formats. The first single, "No Cheap Thrill," sets the tone with its percussion-focused charm.

■ R.E.M.: *New Adventures in Hi Fi* (Warner Bros. 9 46320-2)

From the jazzy, restrained groove of "How The West Was Won and Where It Got Us" to the sweet lilt of "The Test Leper," to the unvarnished live feel of "Departure," *New Adventures in Hi Fi* is another R.E.M. disc that will garner the magic combination of critical acclaim and monster sales. Guest artists include Patti Smith, who shares vocals with Michael Stipe on the first of what will undoubtedly be a string of singles. "E-Bow The Letter" is already a radio smash, getting added to every modern rock station in the country, as well as heavy play on rock, active rock and AAA stations, as well as heavy rotation on MTV.



■ STEVE VAI: *Fire Garden* (Epic 67776)

With the release of a new Rush disc and this solo effort from guitar virtuoso Steve Vai, guitar-focused rock is on the upswing again. From the big, lushly grandiose instrumental tracks to tunes like the first single, "Little Alligator," and "Whookam" (featuring Vai's former lead singer, Devin Townsend), Vai's technique is constantly jaw-dropping. "Little Alligator" will be worked primarily to active rock radio; *Fire Garden* will also be getting a substantial publicity boost from the G3 tour, which starts October 11 and features Vai and fellow guitar wizards Joe Satriani and Eric Johnson.

■ FLUFFY: *Black Eye* (The Enclave DPRO 11701)

Fluffy put its raw-as-they-wanna-be street credibility on the table with a recent five-song EP. *Black Eye*, the English band's full-length debut, adopts a slightly bigger, more produced sound, but retains the band's primordial-fury style of Sex Pistols-y punk rock. Appropriately, Fluffy is currently on the road with another nasty, heavy band, the Neurotic Outsiders (who actually feature a Sex Pistol among its members).



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PICK OF THE WEEK



■ PET: *Pet* (TAG/Atlantic 92717-2)

Signed and executive-produced by Tori Amos, L.A.-based Pet makes a stunning debut with this firestorm-heavy disc, which mixes Amos' high-angst vocal sensibilities with a darkly multi-layered, almost industrial sound. (Kinda like a cross between Ministry and Hole.) Modern and active rock possibilities abound on this highly-recommended platter; Lisa Papineau's powerful, edgy voice ranges from blood-curdling uptempo shrieks to the breathy, plaintive gloom of the beautiful "Calmate!" The first single, "Skin Tite," is currently being worked at modern rock radio.

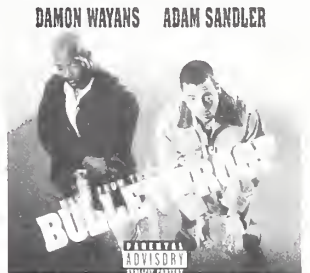

HEADY, HAIRY INDUSTRY WEEK for urban acts. At the *Soul Train Lady Of Soul Awards*, Faith Evans captured best new artist and best solo R&B album, while TLC's "Waterfalls" single collected two trophies, complimenting that trio's enduring appeal. Others were captured by Xscape and Mary J. Blige for best group R&B album and best solo single, respectively. Arnold Schwarzenegger humorously introduced Eraser co-star Vanessa Williams for her *Lena Horne Award* for best career achievement. *Mo'isha* star Brandy was named entertainer of the year. There was at least one official afterparty at the *Santa Monica Aircraft Museum* hangar, and a throng gathered at *Billboard Live* on the Sunset Strip for *Queen Latifah's Flavor Unit West* celebration. Warner Bros. Records staged "An Evening Of Funk & Soul" at that venue the following evening, featuring Sandra St. Victor, and Eric Benét, consistent with a fresh, elegant, roots-driven R&B vibe.

ISLAND IN THE SKY: Island Records artists The Isley Brothers were presented with gold albums commemorating sales of 750,000 units of their *Mission To Please* LP at the *Hollywood Hard Rock Cafe*, Universal City Walk. Hiriam Hicks, sr vp, Black Music, Island Records projected that the album should hit platinum sales levels by Thanksgiving. Ronald Isley and Ernie Isley also donated stage costumes and a guitar used to record the *Between The Sheets* LP and on the subsequent tour, to the restaurant's memorabilia collection. Isley presented a signed guitar to President Bill Clinton earlier this year. Island artists Dru Hill were also on hand for the event, and the label is keen about its upcoming *Nekca* debut later this quarter.

ADDRHYTHM: Ask Priority artists Tha Truth!, who is responsible for their leather-clad motorcycle look and they will tell you that producer T-Smoov, has a great part in their styling as well as their musical persona. Cindy, Jamie, and Theresa are enjoying club success for their "Red Lights" single, but really want people to feel their "skillful, laid-back melodies" as a trio just as much as their uptempo urban stomp. The Houston natives came to Los Angeles a year ago molded to an R&B/hip hop formula, determined to come away with a deal which respected their gifts, particularly their vocal chemistry. LaFace artist Tony Rich has struck platinum twice. Sales of the singer/songwriter/producer/musician's first single "Nobody Knows" and his album *Words* each topped the one million mark. Rich filmed the performance of two of his songs for the Fox-TV program *Beverly Hills, 90210*, set to air October 30.

THE RHYME

MORE ROUNDZ AT HIM: The travails of Death Row recording artist Tupac Shakur took a turn for the worse this week, as his life imitated his defiant, "reality-based" compositions once again. Whether by choice or not is moot compared to how much punishment he has absorbed as a consequence of his fame. 2Pac was critically wounded by gunfire in Las Vegas last weekend while traveling in a five-car motorcade with Death Row CEO Suge Knight shortly following Mike Tyson's heavyweight title bout at the MGM Grand Hotel. A white Cadillac with unidentified passengers reportedly closed up to the motorcade and unleashed a fusillade at the car Knight drove with 2Pac in the front passenger seat. Four rounds hit 2Pac and one reportedly grazed Knight's forehead. Doctors later removed 2Pac's lung during emergency surgery, and he is still struggling to recover. There was no return fire from the motorcade, possibly due to the suddenness and ferocity of the attack, and also out of consideration for hundreds of visitors congregating near the Las Vegas strip district.

2Pac was scheduled to appear with Death Row labelmates Snoop Doggy Dogg and Tha Dogg Pound on the "All Eyez On Us Tour" next month. Speculation remains as to whether the attack was gang-related or was yet another farfetched episode of the ongoing "East vs. West" rap conflict. However bad this event may be perceived for the rap business map, once again there is a jolt of publicity for the game off its more hazardous "playa hating" elements. Playcalling reserved for sports events is now freely banded by armchair theorists while the principals themselves as well as witnesses to the ambush remain ziplocked.

Conjecturally, Shug and 2Pac underwent harrasing fire, to maim, to snipe, but not to kill outright. Both passengers were left alive to contemplate and digest their fate as interpreted under street code...a "serving." Death Row's cash flow suffers momentarily from a derailed asset. Security will be beefed, incompetents fired and replaced. Commerce chugs on, morbidly for some, especially if sales of 2Pac's LP or Death Row product should suddenly spike upward.

Certainly, 2Pac will have a new vein to mine for songs, but will 2Pac perform his material again? Produce full time? If not, then a book would seriously be in order, as emerging from this latest crisis and documenting it may cement 2Pac's place in a new urban mythology. "All Sightz On Me, at a bookstore near you..." could be the text of a scarred, wiser survivor's memoirs, disclosing for posterity the true price of a "bad boy's" stripes.

Hopefully, the Dons of the rap game will have a meeting behind 2Pac's tragedy. Pausing from the war, countermoves aside, if they're really Corleones, at least one of them should ask: "How did we ever let things get so far?"

ADDRHYME: A Tribe Called Quest is way busy lately. Having wrapped *The House Of Blues "Smokin Grooves Tour,"* they'll be kicking off an East Coast-centered fall college tour October 2. "Stressed Out," their follow-up single to "Ince Again," drops mid-September. Jive Records will release their first two LP's as a double vinyl LP set, November 12.

Jeru the Damaja and DJ Premier put the finishing touches on Jeru's highly anticipated sophomore album, *Wrath Of The Math*.

■ THE ROSE FAMILY: "Beaches & Creme" b/w "HAH!" (Rawkus RWK 105-2) Producers: Acid Phunk Productions.

Thanks to exposure by New York's DJ Red Alert on WQHT Hot 97, The Rose Family has emerged from Brooklyn's Brownsville section with an infectious groove, a contagiously enviable concept, "Chillin'...sitting on about a half million with all my dogs all my kids all my women," coupled with the barest, cutting edge production. The Family's oral hieroglyphics are vivid enough for the masses to peep out. Most of it is shorthand about grand designs recognizable to hustlers and polygamously-bonded African men. The novel *The Color Purple* ends with a similar celebration of wealth, offspring and health, albeit without playa trappings. Should blow up all over with wider ranging airplay after September 17th.

■ ICE CUBE: "Bow Down" (Lench Mob/Priority DPRO 30061) Producers: Bud'da for Lockdown Productions.

Already, the first single off Ice Cube's forthcoming LP *Westside Connection* has market recognition thanks to a video that stages Cube, W.C. and Mack 10 in vignettes reflecting West Coast material trappings, affirming the rightful stature of throwers of the "W" for all who will listen. Barring a quick judgement as to who the absolute best rappers are, one can say the creative case is stated well enough on this single to please party and club crowds magnetized by the rhythm track alone, if not by its partisan lyrics or implied kingship.

■ JERU THE DAMAJA: "Ya Playin' Yaself" (Payday DPRO 420-2) Producer: DJ Premier

Bagging on what he feels are the trampier features of modern urban sisters, Jeru the Damaja, sage social critic, seeks to jolt the veneer of ladies who feel their provocative apparel choices are okay, among other items, on this bass-bouncy track from his forthcoming LP *Wrath Of The Math*.

The blues is the root of all popular American music. With hardly any exception, our popular music structure is literally riddled with the substance of the blues. And it goes much further than just popular music or even jazz for that matter. Listen to any piece of music by the late **George Gershwin** who, by the way, would not be considered a current popular composer by any shape of the imagination. Yet, one listen to *Rhapsody In Blue* and any blues aficionado will hear that this great American classic, written in the 1920s by a Russian Jew from New York, was influenced by the musical form known as the blues.

Today R&B artists like **Johnnie Taylor**, **Carl Sims**, **Little Milton** and **Marvin Sease** are dominating the new blues charts performing the music that until recently had fallen through the cracks in the over-categorized and pigeonholed marketplace. New bluesmen are coming up playing their own brand of blues but still keeping a close eye on the traditions. It's a new world but the blues is still the same.

Did you know there are more song titles which contain the word *blue* or *blues* than any other word in current musical usage? Example: *Milk Cow Boogie Blues*, *Blues With A Feeling*, *Blue On Blue*, *Love Is Blue* and on and on, ad infinitum.

At one time or another everybody has had what has now become commonly known as *the blues*, and it's strange how listening to the blues can make one feel better, as though somewhere in time there was someone who understood and was sympathetic.

The word *blue* as defined by **Webster's Dictionary** is a *black folk music characterized by minor harmonies, typically with slow melody and melancholy words*. The blues has travelled a long way from this definition.

A little research will show that all through American recorded musical history there are times when the blues has come to the foreground specifically when pop music has become too complicated, fragmented or over-arranged.

In the 40's, blues, then called *race music*, simmered below the surface as **Tommy Dorsey** and the big bands played highly-arranged compositions such as *Boogie Woogie* and **Artie Shaw** released *Summit Ridge Drive*, both traditional forms of the blues leaning towards jazz. These great musicians realized even then the tremendous communicative power of the blues.

The '40s gave way to the '50s and hundreds of independent record companies sprung forth, most of which recorded and sold the blues or a derivative called *Doo-Wop*. Great companies such as **Chess** (**Howlin' Wolf** and **Chuck Berry**), **Checker** (**Bo Diddley** and **Sonny Boy Williamson**), **Atlantic** (**Ruth Brown** and **The Clovers**), **King** (**Little Willie John**, **Hank Ballard** and **The Midnighters**) and **James Brown** and **The Famous Flames**) and **Vee Jay** (**John Lee Hooker**) spread the blues into every corner of the world. There are certainly too many companies to mention on one page. But to put it mildly, the independent companies selling the blues built empires with the music in the '50s.

During that time, larger companies, trying to bring blues into the predominantly white consumer mainstream, had artists like **Pat Boone** do covers of blues hits like "Tutti Frutti" by **Little Richard** and "Ain't It A Shame" by **Fats Domino**, with the "cleaned up" versions gaining more accessibility at predominantly white radio. Many white recording artists built careers covering blues and R&B hits. Of course, in those days it was not inconceivable for eight to 10 artists to cover what looked to be a song that was hitbound, and everyone was ogling what was now called R&B, which was merely an offshoot of the blues. To this day, some songs originally written and recorded by black artists are not considered "the" classic recordings. For instance "Little Darlin'," originally by **The Gladiolas** on **Excelllo**, was covered and made a classic by **The Diamonds** on **Mercury** and, according to *Cash Box* July 28, 1956, **The Crew Cuts** cover of "Sh-Boom" originally by **The Chords** and **Georgia Gibb's** versions of "Tweedle Dee" (org. by **LaVerne Baker**) and "Dance With Me Henry" (org. by **Etta James**) are listed as some of the first recordings ever to sell over a million records.

The '60s saw the blues grow and mutate into pop accepted R&B and Rock and Roll. The British Invasion led by **John Mayall** and **The Bluesbreakers**, **The Beatles** and **The Rolling Stones**, combined with black American artists like **Wilson Pickett**, **Otis Redding** and **Sam and Dave**, forged blues and R&B into a huge commercial and financial force. The '70s saw more changes with the invention of disco and in the '80s and '90s more mutation occurred with the development of rap and hip-hop, each an art form all its own.

The musical wheel has spun into position again and the blues and real funk/R&B is back with a vengeance, spawning new companies and new sales to young audiences hungry for *real* feelings, the kind brought to the USA hundreds of years ago when black folks were taken from their homes and deposited here as slaves. One does not have to listen hard to hear the sadness, love and joy born of pain and suffering created here centuries ago at the end of a whip. It's amazing how the entire world of music and the public at large has benefitted from this travesty to mankind. And the blues lives on.

Trout, Gordon and Verheyen join a Who's-Who list of guitar greats such as **Jeff Beck**, **Carlos Santana**, **Joe Satriani** and **Adrian Belew**. A must for guitar enthusiasts.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY to Mr. **Keith Abel** of **Jewel/Paula Records** Shreveport, LA. Also at that same company, a birthday coming up on the 30th of September to the namesake of one of the greatest rock songs ever written, *Susie Q*. Last but certainly not least, happy birthday to my son **Brian** on this milestone, the big 15. Take care y'all and remember...The Gods love the blues.

KOCH ADDS LABELS: KOCH International has entered an exclusive agreement for U.S. distribution of the Ichiban group of labels, including back catalog and seven new titles, and the distributor also has signed Signature Sounds Recording Company to an exclusive deal.

Georgia-based Ichiban's new titles roll out through the remainder of September and include Ashford & Simpson's collaboration with poet laureate Maya Angelou, *Been Found; Can't Stop The Rock*, the debut album by D.J. Kizzy Rock; and new releases by Krazy-K (*Krazy Radio*), Kilo ("Real Bass"), Big U and the Madhouse Crew (*Raw Deal*), L.A. Voices of Watts (*Power*) and Lee Morris (*Morris Code 337*).

While most of Ichiban's product has been aimed at the African American market—with artists like Millie Jackson, Clarence Carter, M.C. Breed, Jimmy Dawkins, William Bell and Trudy Lynn—the company recently began to explore the alternative rock and dance waters with Tia, Dash Rip Rock, Love Huskies and the Penniless People of Bulgaria.

The Ichiban labels include Ichiban Records, WRAP Records, Wild Dog Blues, Sky Records, Soul Classics, Techno 404, Naked Language, Kingfisher and Altered Records, all of which will be distributed by KOCH along with 35 Ichiban Distributed Label imprints. International distribution remains exclusively with EMD.

Previously distributed by a network of regional indies, Ichiban president John Abbey says while he's sad that he is leaving those associations after 11 years, "it is also exciting to be able to be part of such a forward looking enterprise as KOCH International. The potential opportunities available to us are limitless, and everyone at Ichiban is committed to taking full advantage of what is now at our fingertips."

Michael Koch, president of KOCH International, stated, "We are extremely pleased to welcome them to our family of labels, which now—finally—includes urban music."

KOCH also has gained firmer toehold on the folk bluegrass market with the signing of Signature Sounds, which specializes in folk, bluegrass and singer-songwriters of the Pioneer Valley of Massachusetts. Consummated in September, KOCH's deal calls for distribution of the company's back catalog and a pair of new releases, including *Passion Train* by the Salamander Crossing and singer-songwriter Maria Sangiolo's *Follow Your Own Road*.

Of the deal with KOCH, Jim Olsen, who founded the label in 1994 along with producer Mark Thayer, says: "The Northampton area is brimming with incredibly talented musicians who don't have the resources to have their music heard outside this area. We're glad to get them this opportunity. With their talent and our pooled resources here at the label, we get their albums in retail stores across the country, out to radio and press, and provide as much tour support as possible."

BUILDING UNDER CONSTRUCTION: TVT Records and producer Don Fury have partnered to construct Building Records, a TVT subsidiary that will focus on developing a roster of young cutting edge bands. TVT will handle all manufacturing, distribution and promotion activities for the new label, whose first project will be ... *At The Speed Of Light* by New York melodic/progressive hardcore band Stillsuit.

Fury has produced bands such as Agnostic Front, Orange 9MM, Quicksand, CIV, Into Another, Shelter, Helmet, Burn and Gorilla Biscuits. His career took form 15 years ago when he built a downtown Manhattan studio that was designed to be an environment where indie New York bands could make records without huge resources. After producing the first two records for Agnostic Front, the studio became a mecca for the New York hardcore players and punksters.

"TVT is a hard-working independent with the ability to work at the street level," Fury comments. "Building Records' goal will be to put young talent into the thriving environment at TVT and create a tough new label loaded with energy and style."

INDIE ITEMS: Permanent Press Recordings the Van DeLecki's are gearing up to do a series of in-store performances around the country in support of the album *Letters From The Desk of Count S. Van DeLecki* (see review page seven). The duo, who has been gaining airplay with the track "What's Wrong With Yo-Yo?," is topping at three Tower Records outlets—in Atlanta, GA (Sept. 28), Los Angeles, CA (Oct. 10) and San Diego, CA (Oct. 12)...peermusic, the international music publishing company, has signed a pair of acts. Los Angeles-based alternative rock act 3 Penny Needle, whose debut album *Brand New Worries* is due this fall from nu.millennia records, has signed with the publishing company, and Italian composer/producer Max Di Carlo has also signed with peermusic. Di Carlo, who has worked with artists such as Elton John, Donna

Summer, and Latino artists Pinn, Mistizzo. Lourdes Robles and Filipino trio Vanna Vanna, is currently working with Brazilian artist Xuxa and Mexico's Emmanuel and Jason Everly, son of Phil Everly... Domo Records act The Violet Burning recently took some heat from police officials and members of a local gang in Juarez, Mexico. Following a gig in El Paso, TX, the band went south of the border and was mobbed by fans, many of them female, which reportedly incited a local crime boss to start a fight. Members of the band engaged in fistacuffs before the gangster urged his "buddies" on the police force to arrest the group. They were released, however, when the gang's leader, known only as "Gabriel" and a fan of the band, told the federales to release them. Needless to say, the party broke up. Marketing Mike and the Suits is taking its name seriously with release of *Marketing Blues*, an 11-song album on the BizBlues Records. The album satirizes common business situations, as the song titles suggests: "PR Blues," "The Annual Report," "Pricing," "Business Week Boogie" and "Sales Won't Push His New Product."...Time Changes, Time Change is the title of percussionist Jom Norman's recording debut for Dark Light/Twinbrook. The former bandmate of Paul Shaffer (*The Late Show's* CBS Orchestra), Norman has assembled 35 drums, 15 cymbals, gongs, chimes, rain sticks and other percussive sounds for an unusual aural sensation, that respected jazzist Oliver Lake calls the "Bitches Brew of the '90s." Musicians joining him on the album are among the most hailed in Canada, including Matt Horner, Monte Hornton, Pat Kilbride, Oliver Schroer and Michael White.

News From The United Kingdom, Ireland & Europe

TOP UK SINGLES: Well, it pays to advertise and promote and coming onto the charts in number one spot is Peter Andre's "Flava" followed by newcomer Fugees' "Ready Or Not" in second spot. All this hype finally pushed Spice Girls' "Wannabe" out of top spot down to three with Smurfs' "I've Got A Little Puppy" still barking on four and also holding its own on is Jamiroquai's "Virtual Insanity" on five. Joining us is Stretch & Vern Present Maddog's "I'm Alive" on six. Kula Shaker's "Hey Dude" goes down to seven and hanging on to eight is OMC's "How Bizarre." Also dropping down is Los Del Rio's "Macarena" now on nine with Charlatan's "One To Another" hitting ten.

Suede's *Coming Up* comes onto the album chart in first place, knocking off Alanis Morissette's long run with *Jagged Little Pill*. Top music video sale continues to be Bill Whelan's *Riverdance—The Show* and followed again in second place is his *Riverdance—A Journey*.

Universal's *Casper* is still top UK video sales and Warner Bros. *Trainspotting* hits the list again as top video rental.

In the computer game field again both Super Nintendo and Mega Drive report that *Atlanta '96-Olympic Games* is top rental.

Still controlling the UK's theatrical boxoffice is Fox's *Independence Day* followed by newcomer Buena Vista's *Phenomenon*.

It's not "Killing Them Softly" in Europe, it's killing them hard as the Fugees' single once again is Europe's top single, leading in Switzerland, France, Belgium, Latvia, Iceland, Yugoslavia, Croatia and Lithuania. Spice Girls' "Wannabe" wanta-be noticed in Sweden and Norway while Bob Marley's "What Comes Around Goes Around" comes around in Italy, Finland and Austria.

Fugees not only have the singles market, but they seem to be the leaders in Europe's album field as their *The Score* is a big hit in France, Austria and Switzerland with other albums leading only in one country.

Top non-fiction hardback bestseller this week in the UK is still Dave Sobel's *Longitude* (Fourth Estate) with Ben Elton's *Popcorn* (Simon & Schuster) heading the fiction list. In the non-fiction paperback list Bill Bryson's *Notes From A Small Island* (Black Swan) is still top of the list with Stephen King's *Coffey On The Mile* (Penguin) knocking *The Horse Whisperer* (Corgi) down to second place. Audio book of the week is Lionel Davidson's *Kotlymsky Heights*, read by Bill Nighy (Reed).

HELLO MICKEY as we'll be checking in weekly at Euro Disney which this week at £1.82 (Ff 14.4) is down 2.20%. Also down are EMI at £3.87, down 1.20% and Thorn's £4.62, is down 2.10%. PolyGram is another downer selling at (Nlf 93.5) £36.97, down 5.48%. Bucking the trend is Rank Organization, selling at £4.55, up 1.10%.

DON'T DESPAIR. UK market experts point out, in regards to EMI and Thorn, that several recent spinoffs have shown a downward trend after opening, but after a brief period of stabilization, most have gone up.

GO EAST, YOUNG MAN—THE FAR EAST THAT IS as far as Asia, where music sales of \$10.6 billion in 1995 are expected to hit \$18 billion in five years and \$33 billion in ten. While mature markets like Japan and Hong Kong keep on increasing, the highest growth is expected in such countries as India, Pakistan and China. Last year Japan had sales of \$8.3 billion, with the rest of the continent selling only \$2.3 billion. But these other countries are expected to increase the market by some 300% in the next five years. While the major labels, PolyGram, Sony, Warner, EMI and BMG are expected to keep their lead, most of the new money will be spent on local Asian groups. And the majors are putting their hands in also. PolyGram has signed Hong Kong's Jacky Cheung and the Philippines' Teeth is under Warner's wing. And while Britpop still may sell, look for local music genres like Mandopop and Cantapop to start hitting big time.

ALMOST ALWAYS FAITHFUL-L is Marianne Faithfull and her new Coalition label album 20th Century Blues. The album with songs by Brecht and Weill was released last week and it was thought to be a sure rocket to the top spot in the classical charts. However, Chart Information Network, a chart compiler, said as far as they were concerned, the album didn't come under the classical umbrella.

YOU'LL NEED A BIGGER MAILBOX if you join the growing numbers of people who are buying recorded music from record clubs and/or mail-order companies. 1995 UK figures indicate that about 13% of those over 16 went this route, up from the previous year. The choice proved more popular with men, 14%, with women coming in at 11%. While the 25-34 year olds had the largest numbers, the biggest buyers were in the 35-55 year old group. And more than a third of these customers bought between 6-10 albums. However, industry people point out that this figure can be deceptive since many people joining a record club often come in under the "5 for the price of 1" offers.

WHAT'S THE NEW SMELL IN THE LONDON TUBES? Why, it's Tommy and Tommy Girl perfumes introduced last week in the UK by Estee Lauder. The perfumes, reportedly a big hit in the States, are named for Tommy Hilfinger, sportswear designer whose clothes have been called "the unofficial uniform of rap stars."

HOME TEAM—DOWN: The Swedish music industry reports that while international sales keep on going up, this year's first half sales in Sweden have seen a drop of 20.7% from last year's figures. Looking for an answer, industry executives have pointed to the popularity of the new video games, the growing use of the Internet as well as the pessimistic feeling around the general Swedish economic

picture. However, some people point to a not-too-successful season of releases that didn't catch on fire. In 1995, EMI held 17.5% of the market. Sony Music and Warner Music each had 14.7%. PolyGram's 13.7% was followed by BMG at 11.6%, SCA (Arcade) 9.2%. Musikdistribution 6.4%, EMI's Virgin 4.6%, PolyGram's Sonet/Stockholm 4.1% and MCA at 3.3%.

HELLO 911—SEND ME A POLICE CAR: Well, in the UK, you might soon have to ask what kind you want. Do you want one sponsored by Harrods, the chic department store or The Body Shop (for environmental cosmetics) or perhaps Ford, the car makers. The UK's Police & Magistrates' Court permits law enforcement agencies to raise 1% of their annual budget through sponsorship, and police departments are taking advantage to raise extra monies. So, do you want a Capitol cop, a Warner cop, or even a Virgin cop?

IRISH EYES ARE SMILING as they read recently released figures that show the Irish music industry now has an annual gross of £160 million and employs almost 10,000 people full time. And there are another estimated 5,000 working part time.

MEANWHILE at Dublin's In The City Music Conference more than 2,000 international industry executives crowded the city's nightspots at night to check out the talent, and during the day there were lots of seminars for those who could keep their eyes open. What they learned was that while the big names like Enya, U2, Sinéad O'Connor, The Cranberries, The Chieftains and Van Morrison were bringing in the big bucks, most of it didn't reach Ireland since, while the top recording studios, management and marketing support services as well as promotion and merchandising companies were abundant in the UK, they were scarce in Ireland. There are about 30 labels in Ireland, mainly small independent ones, but the big companies have been opening up Irish branches.

A NAUGHTY NAUGHTY to the UK's Screen Multimedia, who were fined £10,000 plus court costs for using music works in karaoke videos without permission and licenses from the copyright owners. The case was brought by the UK's Mechanical-Copyright Protection Society, which represents music publishers and composers. MCPS licenses the use of music and collects and distributes the royalties to members. In 1995, royalties amounted to some £37.4 million.

DO YOUR MARKETING IN SCANDINAVIA IN OCTOBER by visiting Musikmassan, October 17-20 in Gothenburg, Sweden. It's going to be the first major trade fair for the Swedish music industry. In addition to music publishers and record companies, various equipment manufacturers, tour promoters and advertising/marketing people are expected to attend. Then pop over to Copenhagen, Denmark, Oct. 23-24 for WOMEX, the music expo of World and Folk Music.

WHERE THE MONEY IS: Ireland's 1996 Finance Act has extended its Business Expansion Scheme to give tax relief in investments in production, promotion, marketing and publication of new artists' studio recordings and associated videos. A qualifying company would have to show the Revenue Commissioners (tax people) that they are a company whose sole purpose is the producing in Ireland and promoting of one (and only one) new artists. A "new artist" is either a solo act or a group whose total previous album sales in all markets has not exceeded 5,000 units. An applying company has to submit a Business Plan, covering a minimum three year period, specifying its main objectives. The company also must submit an annual progress report. Special rules apply to projects with a budget of more than £250,000.

WHAT'S LEFT TO SELL? Well, Manchester United Football Club, which has its name on almost every item of clothes imaginable as well as sports equipment has come up with another moneymaker using its name. How about Manchester United Premium Blend Whiskey with a MU chocolate bar and MU potato chips on the side? Could you soon be going into a bar and ordering a PolyGram with a chaser, or perhaps for the lady, an EMI on the rocks or a BMG with a Sony chaser?

DON'T PUT DVD ON YOUR CHRISTMAS LIST as the Philips/Sony Digital Versatile Disc, which the companies had hoped to be on the market in time for the Christmas rush, is still waiting at the start gate. Dan Costerveld, director of Philips Key Modules, said last week at the Cobit Home Exhibition in Hanover, Germany, that a number of problems still needed to be resolved, mainly copy protection, regional coding as well as the availability of software. Hollywood is reportedly still not happy about the DVDs, since they don't wear out. If they replace VCRs at video shops, the shops would cut down on their orders and less units sold means loss of royalties.

DON'T MOVE: Virtual reality will do it all for you at the Pepsi Trocadero in London. Europe's first interactive theme park opened last week. Dominating the center, taking up seven floors with 110,000 square feet is the £50 million Segaworld, a joint enterprise between Japan's Sega Entertainment and the UK's Trocadero. (As reported last week, Pepsi Cola paid £3 million for three years to have the center called Pepsi Trocadero.) In virtual reality, you sit still, with 3D glasses and computer graphics create the movement. You just sit there and let the chairs, which can turn 360 degrees, do the "walking." Therefore, rides that could take up acres of ground can be reduced to a small room, since it's all in the mind. Video games are at the very center of Segaworld and Sega currently has two similar Segaworlds in Tokyo and is working on a fourth for Sydney, Australia.



Gramercy's *Grace* Has Solid Heartbeat

THE GOOD OL' DAYS OF MUSIC ARE BACK, on screen at least, courtesy of writer/director Allison Anders and Gramercy Pictures. And, to a degree, the good ol' days of movies.

Opening *Grace Of My Heart* in the late fifties (1958), on the crest of that major surge into the golden age of rock, Anders and her excellent cast and crew re-create not only the look and feel of the era but also the sound and the spirit. It is a tribute to the pioneers of another era as well as a story, sometimes taking on the feel of a documentary, that draws us into the time when there was more fun and personal involvement in the business of songwriting and singing, making records, even living.

Anders focuses her story on Illeana Douglas who, in her quest for a singing career at the end of the '50's female ballad singer period, is discovered by manager John Turturro as a talented songwriter. Their working relationship runs the length of the story which carries Douglas from naive aspiring teen through motherhood, divorce, other-womanhood, widowhood and into her own as a self sufficient woman in the seventies, music business connected all the way. And the collaboration of Anders and Douglas makes it a mesmerizing journey with director and actress molding the character into one of the most fascinating and fully realized female role on film in the last two years.

Anders lets the story drop into a couple cliché patterns—hubby Eric Stoltz caught in bed with another woman; lasting bond between manager and artist; with poolside soul-cleansing; and *Star Is Born*-like turn and ending and if there is anything less-than about *Grace* these are the moments—but she makes them fit. Just like the music for the various periods although the tunes are originals, written by such craftspeople as Burt Bacharach teamed, with Elvis Costello ("God Give Me Strength," which looks like a Best Song contender), Gerry Goffin and Los Lobos, Larry Klein (also film's music composer), Sonic Youth, Cynthia Strother, Joni Mitchell. Recognizable styles echoed, though without the name brand coming with it, are The Beach Boys, Everly Brothers and a touch of The Supremes.

Using NY's time-famed Brill Building, the place where it all happened, as a '58 jumping off place and inspiration, Anders blends an historic feel with her fictional story flair, easily mixing reality with imagination for a totally satisfying feel. And she's exceptionally well served by director of photography Jean Yves Escoffier.

But if you come away from the theater with nothing else, you're going to know that you've seen an *Actress*. Illeana Douglas pulls everything from this role Anders wrote into it—and then some. She moves from mother-controlled teen girl to stand-alone woman with total commitment and makes the audience commit with her. The meeting-music sequence introing "God Give Me Strength" between her and Matt Dillon (in a Brian Wilson-cum-Norman Maine type role) is absolutely riveting through the tension generated by the pair of performers and Douglas' richly nuanced visual interpretation of the song. (Lip-synched to Kristen Vigard's interpretive vocals.)

Second strongest performance of the film is from John Turturro who manages humor and a business-like attitude toward performers along with a respect for their talent and a talent of his character's own by knowing which ones to pair. A trio of men—Eric Stoltz, Bruce Davison and Dillon—are Douglas' soulmates and husbands whom she learns from, hurts from, grows through and beyond in her own definition of herself. They are unique in their own approaches. Bridget Fonda as a hot femme singer with a lesbian lover—not presented sleazily or untoward—which presents then writing partners Douglas and Patsy Kensit with inspiration for a hit tune, is solid while that particular story sequence points up the wonderful creative facility writers of that period, and others before it, had for masking romantic realities metaphorically to gain a universality which writers today don't seem to have the talent or imagination for, knowledge or sensibility to attempt. Jennifer Leigh Warren displays some heat as lead singer of "The Luminaries (Supremes)." Patsy Kensit as an initial writing competitor-eventual compatriot is solid.

New Line's *Last Man Standing* Stands Tall

LITERALLY, THE *LAST MAN STANDING* at the fade out of *Last Man*. Well, except for ol' Bruce Dern, and we all know you can't kill a crooked public official.

Walter Hill's terrific period Americanization of Akira Kurosawa's classic *Yojimbo* is hard, edgy, a metaphor for the warring factions of society if you want to look for it, and if you don't it's simply moody, gorgeously stylized action with a noirish patina that makes one long for the return of that genre.

For the faint-hearted, go in knowing that there is death and brutality here. Warring bootleg factions of the 1930s, slipping booze across the border and running it to Chicago, New York and points profitable, didn't sit down to dine together over foie-gras

and fine wine while verbally working out territorial logistics. Tommy guns talked faster and were more persuasive than the most facile of participants. Hill knows that and displays it, aided immensely by Lloyd Ahern's superb photography and everyone right down the line from top to bottom.

Director/screenwriter Hill is on top of his game with *Last Man Standing* and if it sometimes seems he's being advised by the spirit of Sam Peckinpah, there's not a thing wrong with that. Perhaps it's the period, perhaps it's the hurting brutality stemming out of the situations, but if Peckinpah and Hill aren't brothers then they're at least close cousins who hung out together in their film-formative years. Their action violence *shows* you the results and, given the situational circumstances, gives reason for it to occur—but, pal, I sure wouldn't want to go there in actuality.

Hill has taken Ryuzo Kikushima and Akira Kurosawa's story, isolated it to the Texas-Mexican border and superbly nuanced the story and characters between

showpieces and humans. In that lonely setting, surrounded by dust devils, dirt and space he brings a loner, Bruce Willis in the Toshiro Mifune center role, looking for a moment of respite. Here he finds the bootlegging factions, Irish and Italian, the go-betweens and wannabes between the sellers across the border and the bigshots in the cities, creating their own dynasties here in dust bowl Texas. He plays both ends against the middle, himself being the middle and survives, though he pays dearly.

Hill and Ahern create a totally believable visual world, with a tip of the hat and deep bow to production designer Gary Wissner and costume designer Dan Moore. Everything here is lived in and we feel the dust, wind and rain. And when Ahern tracks some action through weary, wavy window panes we're caught up in both the poetry of motion and the mystery of what's real or not. Moving through all of that is music by Ry Cooder which becomes the audience's pulsing heartbeat and jangled nerves. An excellent score.

Somebody's missing a bet if they don't put Bruce Willis in a black and white noir piece—and let me qualify that—with a good story. He's great here with a world-weary wit, let's-get-it-done approach with a current of caring running just below the surface, and a solid understanding of it all. Some of his best work. Christopher Walken as a near-demented, facially scarred shooter with a sense of self-preservation is also at the top of his game. Bruce Dern is marvelous as the graft-seeking sheriff. Nobody plays both sides of the fence with the total believability in what he's accomplishing as Dern does. The actor makes you assess the situation and come up with the answer; 'I'd do the same thing.' You simply can't beat old pros. William Sanderson's another one, totally at home in the surroundings and believable in his actions. David Patrick Kelly works his Irish gangster with a feeling-like-love for Karina Lombard like a tuning fork. The tones he delivers are varied, subtle and seamless. A tremendous support presence touchingly adding humanitarian flaws to gangster mentality. Lombard, held against her will is a smoking loveliness, making you understand why Kelly wants to keep her. Alexandra Powers has some nice moments as a hooker looking to get out of town. Standing out in smaller roles simply by the presence they bring to the moments are Ken Jenkins as a Ranger Captain; Luis Contreras as a desert rat-like, corrupt Mexican commandante; and John Paxton as an undertaker smilingly displaying the made-up bodies in front window caskets. Actually the totality of casting by Mary Gail Artz and Barbara Cohen is directly on the dime, totally believable.

Freeman Davies edits with a fluidity in action which keeps the audience in the story and progression at all times, never losing them.

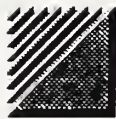

Prompt TRIPS Action Urged

"PROMPT AND EFFECTIVE" implementation of the agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) being a top priority of the U.S. delegation to the upcoming World Trade Organization (WTO) meetings was urged last week when a spokesman for the International Intellectual Property Alliance (IIPA) addressed a congressional subcommittee.

IIPA president Eric H. Smith told the Trade Subcommittee of the U.S. House Ways and Means Committee that when the U.S. delegation reaches the WTO's Ministerial meetings in Singapore that TRIP copyright provisions should be implemented to stem the estimated \$18-20 billion in piracy losses to the U.S. economy.

The IIPA is the umbrella organization representing U.S. prerecorded music, film, music publishing and computer and business software groups' international intellectual properties interests.

Noting that such companies have become increasingly global in scope, Smith said "Inadequate copyright protection and enforcement represent the U.S. copyright industries"—one of the fastest growing sectors of the economy—number one trade barrier. These countries have become increasingly globalized, with over half their overall revenues and job growth due to international trade.

"The fastest growth is occurring in non-developed countries, which also account for 60% of the losses due to piracy," the IIPA president said.

Testifying before the subcommittee that implementation of TRIPS, the international trade agreement that took years to finally hone in ratify, should be based on four interrelated elements. They include: 1) commencement of WTO dispute settlement actions; 2) insisting on immediate adherence to the TRIPS provisions by newly-industrialized nations that have not been qualified for extensions to the year 2000 or beyond; 3) press for compliance by developing countries that don't qualify for the extensions; and 3) insure that non-WTO member nations seeking membership first fully implement TRIPS without transition by no later than their joining date.

Smith urged the U.S. delegation to seek an endorsement of such action by all WTO members, with particular attention paid to enforcement provisions. He additionally asked that Congress and the subcommittee monitor these developments closely through the U.S. Trade Representative and other relevant agencies.

Wal-Mart Bans Crow Disc

MULTIPLATINUM ARTIST SHERYL CROW has incurred the wrath of Wal-Mart Stores Inc. The mass retailer, which has taken a conservative position regarding cover art and controversial lyrics in the past, refusing to sell albums it considers overly violent or sexually explicit, has banned the Grammy-winning Crow's self-titled new A&M disc from its stores because of a song lyric suggesting Wal-Mart sells guns to children.

In statements to the press, representatives of Wal-Mart have insisted that the retailer has stringent rules against selling firearms to minors, and that the lyrics of "Love Is A Good Thing"—"Watch out sister, watch out brother, watch our children as they kill each other with a gun they bought at the Wal-Mart discount stores"—are an insult to the store and its employees. However, Wal-Mart has previously been the object of several lawsuits over the retailer's lax approach to gun sales. The company has ostensibly tightened its policies in recent years, and stopped selling handguns in 1994.

Wal-Mart's action could result in the loss of millions of dollars in sales from its 2,265 outlets, since many are located in rural areas where music fans have limited access to buying discs from other stores. The banning of Crow's album is apparently the first instance of a retailer banning an album because it's targeted in a lyric. Ironically, Crow is considered a rather mainstream, non-controversial artist, whose biggest hit, "All I Wanna Do," extolls the joys of having fun. To double the irony, "Love Is A Good Thing" is emphatically an anti-violence song, just the sort of positive statement politicians have been calling on the music industry to make.

Whether Wal-Mart's decision will negatively impact sales of Crow's record, or (to triple the irony) have the opposite effect because of the publicity about the ban, remains to be seen.

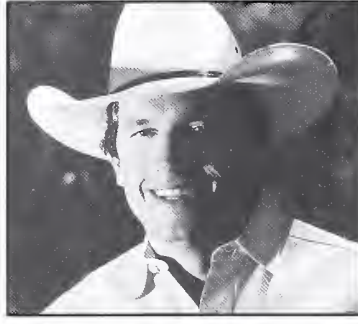

■ THE SKY KINGS: "That Just About Says It All" (Warner Bros. PRO-CD-8294)



As soon as John Cowan's heartfelt voice cuts through the opening of "That Just About Says It All," it's apparent that this second single is something special. For those music historians familiar with Cowan's note-bending, glass-breaking style, this a very low-key performance. However, Cowan's talent shines even when he's holding back a bit. Supporting harmony vocals by fellow Kings Bill Lloyd and Rusty Young complete this engaging trio.

■ KEVIN SHARP: "Nobody Knows" (Asylum 61930-2/4)



The folks on the R&B side of the charts have borrowed from country radio several times in recent years—"I Swear" and "I Can Love You Like That" being two examples. Now the tables are turned and country newcomer Kevin Sharp borrows from The Tony Rich Project with "Nobody Knows." This ballad finds Sharp singing with an inner hurt and loneliness that translates in any format.

■ LEE ROY PARNELL: "We All Get Lucky Sometimes" (Arista ASCD-3044)



Some road weary-but-wise singing and a personal musical groove that is unduplicated are highlights of the title cut of Parnell's latest album. Supporting vocals by Mary Chapin Carpenter put the icing on one heck of a hit.

■ WYNONNA: "My Angel Is Here" (Curb/MCA C-11090)



Veering totally away from her country roots, Wynonna sprouts a new branch of acoustic pop with this sweet ballad. "My Angel Is Here" has a generous sprinkling of religious imagery and the gospel undertones that showcase Wynonna's ability to vocally finesse as expertly as she belts.

■ VERN GOSDIN: "The Number" (American Harvest Recording Society 57706)

Gosdin co-wrote this cleverly-penned story about a man who's about to cheat on his wife. As he dials the recommended scarlet woman's phone number, he realizes he's dialing his own number. Ouch. Bill Monroe Dies At 84

THE WORLD OF BLUEGRASS MUSIC LOST its founding member Monday, September 9. **Bill Monroe**, the Father of Bluegrass, died at Northcrest Home & Hospice in Springfield, TN. Monroe, who suffered a stroke in April of this year, was enduring complications from that stroke at his passing.

Monroe is credited with inventing the style of music that came to be known as "bluegrass." The Rosine, KY native debuted on the Grand Ole Opry in 1939 as Bill Monroe & The Bluegrass Boys, performing "Mule-skinner Blues" and earning several encores. In addition to mentoring gener-

ations of bluegrass musicians, Monroe's creativeness also influenced countless artists in country music, including **Emmylou Harris** and **Vince Gill**.

A memorial service for Monroe was held September 11 at the Ryman Auditorium in Nashville. Monroe would have been 85 years old on September 13, 1996.

AAMA Receives President's 'E' Award

CHICAGO—Robert C. Fay, executive director of the American Amusement Machine Association, announced that the association has been named a recipient of the President's "E" Award for exporting by the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Established in 1961 by President John F. Kennedy, the "E" Award acknowledges persons, firms or organizations which contribute significantly in the effort to increase U.S. exports. AAMA president Rick Kirby of New England Coin-Op added, "since the inception of the Foreign Business Development Program in 1991, the association has consistently expanded its work in this area. I believe that many people deserve credit for their contributions to these efforts and I am pleased that they are being recognized through the honor of this prestigious award."

An award presentation is currently being planned for sometime in October, with Secretary of Commerce Michael Kantor coming to Chicago for the ceremony.

NAMA's New Software Package Enables Ops To Monitor Product Profits

CHICAGO—Figuring out exactly which products in a vending machine make the most profit for vending operators has long been a problem without solution. Those in the vending industry have struggled for years to determine the cost implications of their marketing, operational and merchandising decisions.

NAMA has come to the rescue with a new software package and back-up instructional manual called the NAMA DPP (Direct Product Profitability) Model for Vending Machines. This Lotus-based spreadsheet tool measures the profit contributions of all products in a vending machine, compares them to others within that machine, and then evaluates said machine to others at the same or different locations.

The DPP model adjust the retail price of each item in a vending machine for allowances, discounts and taxes. It also factors in such other items as operating costs of handling and storage of products in the warehouse, route service, machine costs and location commissions. The model can calculate the profit advantages or disadvantages of changes in service for locations, or for machines within each location.

As explained by Richard M. Geerdes, NAMA vice president-member services, "Operators may find that certain products in their machines may make more money than others, even though they cost more. Others may find out that certain products are more 'efficient' in their machines because of their high sales to space requirement ratio." He stressed that the DPP Model provides operators with a new way of looking at the cost implications of many important business decisions.

Development of the software package was sponsored by M&M/Mars and produced by Willard Bishop Consulting, a leading expert in the application of DPP techniques.

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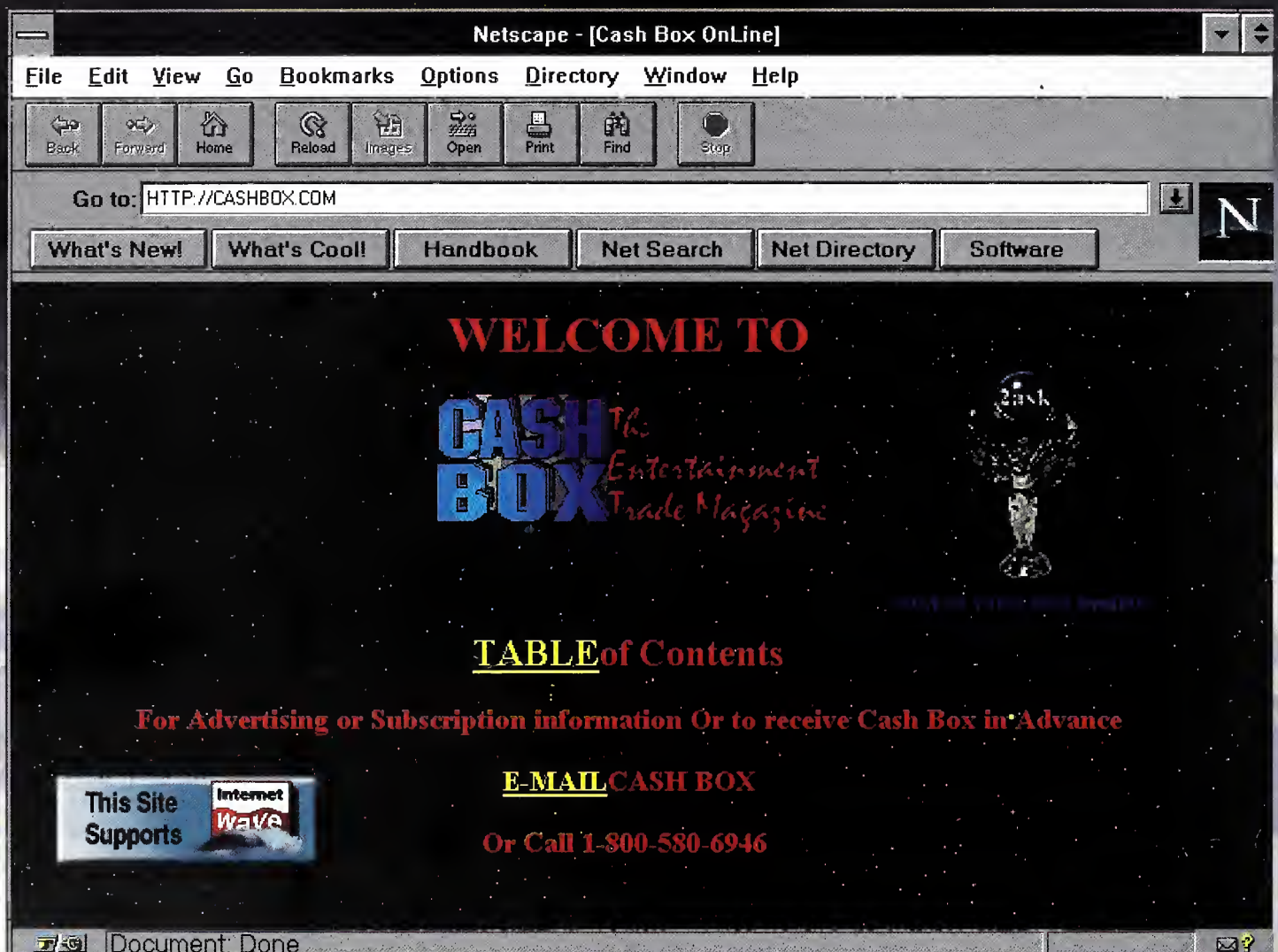
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
