When you reminisce and hum Roberta Flack's Grammy Award-winning hits to yourself-songs like "Killing Me Softly With His Song," "First Time Ever I Saw Your Face," "Where Is The Love," and "Feel Like Making Love," you probably assume she's been singing all her life. Not true. At the age of 13, she won honors for her performance of a Scarlatti sonata in a state-wide contest for black students. When she entered college on a music scholarship at the age of 15 her forte was classical piano. She changed her major from piano to voice to music education, and by the time she was 19 she had already directed a production of "Aida." She began her career as a music teacher, but in 1968 Les McCann saw Roberta singing at a benefit for the Inner City Ghetto Children's Library Fund. In his exact words, "Her voice touched, tapped, trapped, and kicked every emotion I've ever known. I laughed, cried, and screamed for more...she alone had the voice." McCann arranged an audition with Atlantic Records, the label she has been with for 19 years, and the rest is history.

"Oasis" is Roberta's first album in six years. In the following exclusive interview she opens up about her life's successes and tragedies, and talks candidly about the 1979 suicide of Donny Hathaway--something she hadn't be able to talk about up to now. She called from her home in New York's famous Dakota, where the late John Lennon lived and was her neighbor. She had just returned from a charity event.

BH: Why so long between albums?
RF: I work all the time. I've been all over the world in the last five years since I did my album with Peabo Bryson. I've been doing a lot of concerts, some writing and I've collected a lot of material. "Oasis" is the result of going through a number of songs. In the past, I would just decide to sing a song because I loved it. I did this album differently. I got very serious about the business end of it so I wouldn't waste any time and money in the studio. After two years of research I went into the studio and recorded twenty-one songs. In the past nine months I picked the final eleven that appear on the album. It was difficult because I love all of the songs. The rest of them will probably appear on some recording that I'm going to do in the very near future, or they'll be performed live. BH: Who worked on the album with you? RF: There are a lot of talented people involved in the production of the album--Quincy Jones, Michael Omartian, Jerry Hey and Andy Goldmark. Brenda Russell and I wrote a song, Siedah Garrett wrote





"Reach Out And Touch," and "Ain't That Peculiar." Valerie and Nick finished the song the day Valerie went into the hospital to have their last baby. She delivered the last verse and her baby at the same time.

BH: What did Greg Phillinganes contribute?

RF: Greg is all over the album. We also did a song called "That's How You Play The Game" that will probably be on my next project. Now he's traveling around the world as music director for Michael lackson's BAD tour.

BH: What is this about you doing a project with Lee Greenwood?

RF: I was born in Asheville, North Carolina, in Black Mountain. Lee and I had a chance to do a signature song for station WRAL-Raleigh. I love his voice, I love the way he writes songs, and he's a really nice man. We had a great time together and almost did a concert together.

BH: As you advanced through your career, how did you select

producers? RF: In the old days everything I did was produced by Joel Dorn. Atlantic Records gave him to me. That was a very good marriage because he let me do what I do best. After he went out on his own, I had to do some things myself. On the "Feel Like Making Love" and "Blue Lights In The Basement" albums (which contained "The Closer I Get To You"), I took the Executive Producer role in the sense that found the material, I went after the musicians, I made the phone calls. On Oasis, the songs came with the producer, as was the case with Marcus Miller. Marcus was a bass player in my band for a couple of years. At the same time Luther Vandross was singing background. Marcus and I are close friends and I asked him to write me a song and produce it. He did that successfully for Luther, Miles Davis, himself and David Sanborn, so why not? He came up with "Oasis," which is the first single, and "Something Magic," which leads off side two of the album.

BH: Piano, rather than vocal talent was your ticket into this

RF: I started taking formal piano lessons when I was nine years old. My mom was a church organist and my dad taught himself to play a type of what's called a Stride piano, where you could play certain chords and sing "Blue Moon," "Heart And Soul" and twelve other songs with those same basic chords. He played basic rhythm and blues, so I was surrounded by music and grew up to love it. When I was fifteen I got a scholarship to Howard University and I wanted to be a concert pianist. I used to practice the classics six hours a day during the week and maybe eight hours on Sunday.

BH: Who discovered your vocal talent?

BH: Who discovered your vocal talent?
RF: Early in my career I sang with some great church choirs. I taught school for almost five years, and all this had me singing, but not as a soloist. I was a great sight reader and got a job in Georgetown at the Tivoli Opera Restaurant. My job was to accompany aspiring Opera singers and in between performances I would play a little Gershwin. It was a little show business for me because I was hungry to use my talents. On Christmas 1968, the owner was trying to get 75 people out so he could bring in the 50 or 60 who were standing out on the sidewalk. He told me to stop playing the Arias and start playing Christmas carols. Instead of leaving, who were standing out on the sidewalk. Instead of leaving, the people applauded and yelled "do it again!," so I started singing with them and then-this was almost like a movie--everybody got quiet and suddenly I was out there by myself. Voila! I found my light, center stage! I gave it all I had. They loved it, and corny as it may sound, that's how I discovered my solo voice. Subsequently, I got a job playing at Mr. Henry's on Capitol Hill. I was just a piano player, but I'd punch a hole in a tambourine and put it around my ankle so I'd have a little rhythm when I tapped my foot (laughs). I would sing songs like "My Beautiful Balloon" and I'd release all these balloons that I had blown up - anything to get people's

one and Marvin Hamlisch wrote one. You can't get all that together in a week! Over the last two years I worked with Marvin on a lot of benefits to raise money for AIDS, and we got to be very good friends. I did a concert with him last night in Seattle. At the time he was doing a Broadway show and movies, but when Marvin Hamlisch says "I'm going to write you a song," you wait however long it takes. BH: Which song did Marvin Hamlisch write?

RF: Marvin wrote a song with Siedah Garrett called "All Caught

Up In Love."

BH: Ashford and Simpson contributed a song, too. RF: They wrote "Uh, Uh, Ooh, Ooh, Look Out, Here It Comes (I Know A Goodbye When I Hear One)." Now that's a long title, but in the true Motown fashion! Valerie and Nick are the heart and soul of early Motown. They wrote all of those songs that Marvin, Tammi and Ray Charles sang. When they said they were going to write a song for me, I expected it to be great and it is. It's almost a reflection of what they did in the early part of their career, like



Prior to 1960, the U.S. motorcycle market was served primarily by Harley-Davidson of the U.S., BSA, Triumph and Norton of Great Britain and Moto-Guzzi of Italy. How different things stand today. Just for kicks, I recently counted brand names of motorbikes parked in a downtown lot: Honda, Yamaha, Honda, Kawasaki, Honda—you get the picture. The Japanese were not even a factor pre-1960. Now they command over 80% market share in motorcycles. Honda, the biggest player of them all, only got around to establishing its first little American subsidiary in 1959. What happened?

Prior to the Japanese invasion, the motocycle industry was filled primarily by fairly narrow niches including cops, military personnel, aficionados with a mechanical bent, and assorted groups like Hell's Angels and Devil's Disciples. The motorcycles tended to be on the big hog side, with legendary quality problems. For example, many people who bought Harleys kept cardboard under them when they were parked at home in order to collect the inevitable oil leaks.

Honda redefined the entire business. The firm's strategy was to create a new market for the product. As described in the 1963 annual report, Honda's aim was to sell "...not primarily to confirmed motorcyclists, but rather to members of the general public who had never before given a second thought to a motorcycle..."

Accordingly, Honda introduced small, lightweight bikes with automatic clutch, three-speed transmission and electric starter. The bikes were easy to handle, had a safe "friendly" look, and even had step-through frames for female riders. The price was affordable, and the company worked obsessively on attaining superb quality machines so that even mechanical misfits and cleanliness fetishists would feel safe in purchasing a Honda motorcycle. The "You meet the nicest people on a Honda" advertising campaign was geared toward families and toward an emerging leisure class with discretionary income.

It worked. The skyrocketing demand for the little bikes allowed Honda and other Japanese firms to create a new large market and build on it through proprietary technology, production efficiency and constant improvements in design and features. Non-Japanese competitors have recently started to fight back with singular improvements in quality and options (Harley-Davidson being a prime example), but the momentum enjoyed by the Japanese has kept them well ahead of the pack.

Nowadays too many firms limit their attempts for creative advantage by making changes (price, features) that are so small as to be unnoticed in the din of the marketplace, or so insignificant as to be easily copied by competitors. While a menu of constant small improvements is vital for business success, the vision of the big winners, like Honda, has often led to the creation of entirely new markets. Let's briefly review a few more examples.

Walt Disney reinvented the theme park business. Before Disney, "amusement parks" were often mobile, had limited attractions and frequently had a variety of negative connotations for parents: dirty, dingy, unsavory, unsafe. Many still do. But they don't generate a billion dollars in gate receipts like Disney does, either. Who would have thought that families and business people would travel thousands of miles to spend vacations and corporate retreats at "amusement parks" like Disneyland and Disney World?

Fred Smith recreated the postal business with Federal Express. A vast new untapped market eagerly responded to Smith's guarantee of "absolutely, positively overnight" (by 10:30AM the next day, to be exact). making Federal Express a \$3.8 billion sucess story. Similarly, Steven Jobs and Steve Wozniak recreated the computer business. Computers used to be large, complex technologies operated only by sophisticated professionals. The "home computer" market, occupied by computer hackers and electronic whiz kids, was tiny. The Apple company turned the computer world inside out, spawning a \$50 billion (and still growing) world personal computer industry, and in the process made Jobs, Wozniak and other Apple shareholders multi-millionaires before they turned 30.

The lesson for you, the manager, is not to cease calling for small improvements and innovations. Those are vital. But you can do more. Step back and ask yourself this question: How can you reshape and reposition the products or services that your firm produces in such a way that you create new markets and reinvent your own business?

Keep in mind that reinvention occurs in the most mundane of industries. The Carl Sewell Cadillac dealership in Dallas has enjoyed \$100 million annual revenue by emphasizing features like a personal mechanic for each customer, customer service representatives, a huge fleet of loaner cars available to customers who have mechanical problems with their Cadillacs, and extraordinary courtesy and responsiveness to whomever joins the Carl Sewell "family." The emphasis on service is so profound that one observer noted: "Carl Sewell doesn't even sell cars. He sells service." A Sewell representative agreed: "We try to take the car out of the deal altogether."

In Amherst Massachusetts, the new Laundry Club is reinventing the public laundromat. The 3,400 square foot facility has 36 washers and 28 driers-all state-of-the-art, and they all work! The Laundry Club has dry cleaning and one-day laundry pick-up and delivery service. Those who want to do their own sudsing will find a congenial atmosphere, including three television sets and a menu of nachos, buffalo wings, mozzarella sticks, fried zucchini, soft drinks and frozen yogurt. Preliminary response is, unsurprisingly, so enthusiastic that expansion into other cities is already being planned. (In all fairness, the Duds 'n' Suds laundromat chain-which made its college student founder a millionaire-may have first reinvented the laundromat industry with the beer and wine bar next to the washers!)

Even pest control—yes, pest control can be reinvented. Most pest-control companies talk about "controlling" pests or keeping them down to "acceptable" levels. Not Miami-based "Bugs" Burger Bug Killers (BBBK). BBBK guarantees its customers (like hotels, restaurants and hospitals) the follow-



attention. I sang during brunch and at first people came because it was a great deal. There'd be members of the Kennedy family, Mike Mansfield's family, Burch Bayh's family--but eventually people began coming to hear me. So I began to sing songs I loved, and one of them was "First Time Ever I Saw Your Face." I actually taught my junior high school girls' glee club that song.

BH: Why did you leave education?

RF: I didn't leave the field of education--I just sort of migrated to music. I didn't do it for the money. I was married and money never was and to this day isn't an important factor in my life. What's important is playing. The opportunity to perform was what led me away from teaching. I love the art of music and I still take lessons. When I had a chance to be a soloist I left education quite quickly. I gave up my \$8,000 a year teaching job for one that paid \$20 a week. BH: Was "Killing Me Softly With His Song" written about someone?

RF: It was originally called, "Killing Me Softly With His Blues," written by Norman Gimball and Charles Fox. A friend of theirs (Lori Lieberman) saw Don McLean perform at the Troubador in L.A. Don's very charismatic. She went back, spoke to the writers, changed the title to "Killing Me Softly With His Song" and rewrote the lyrics to describe going into the Troubador and hearing this guy "...strumming my pain with his fingers." The first time I sang it in public Quincy and I were doing a date at the Greek Theater in Los Angeles. We had done all the songs we had rehearsed and needed an encore so Quincy said "Do something!" I did "Killing Me Softly..." and Quincy walked up to me and said "Don't you ever perform that song again until you record it." I did it without any bass, any drums, any guitar, and he thought I was crazy! (laughs)

BH: You have very high standards. How do you maintain them?

Do you still take lessons?

RF: A person who runs track runs alone. When you sing a song, you sing alone. Even when you're singing four-part harmony, your part is your part. The preparation requires that you read, study, and practice. The creative process itself takes time. I'm like an athlete in training. There's no way you can be Iron Mike and not run every morning. You can't be Roberta or Diana or Whitney or Michael unless you have your stuff together. Everyone knows the wonderful story of how Michael goes in front of the mirror on Sundays and dances for hours! The end result is on the stage.

BH: When you hear other female vocalists copy your style of

singing do you consider it a form of flattery?

RF: I've never heard anyone that I thought sounded like me, but I would consider it a form of flattery. What I do hear in other singers is a certain quality of femaleness, of race. My voice sounds like a dark black voice as opposed to a lighter oriental voice, or Far Eastern voice. Mine is a North Carolina black lady sound. The thing that I protest is that when you copy someone else, you don't give yourself a chance to develop and to be appreciated for your own distinct very special abilities. A lot of times guys will come up to me and say they sound just like Donny Hathaway. I want to say, "Don't do that" but what I do say is "Good. Now, what do you sound like?" The person who gets the votes and captures the Grammies is the person who is unique.

BH: How did you and Donny Hathaway get together?

RF: I met Donny through some friends and through my ex-husband who was a musician playing with Donny at the time. He was also a Howard University student. Anyway, when I first met him I was just getting my nerve up to play some pop music, but I hadn't made that transition yet. When I began, I got a job playing in a bar because I didn't feel I'd be judged so harshly (laughs). Some of the songs I sang were Donny's songs. He signed a contract at Atlantic and I was with them too. Jerry Wexler had the brilliant idea that Donny and I should sing together. Carole King wrote a song called "You've Got A Friend." James Taylor had already recorded it. Jerry called me in Arlington, Virginia, and asked me to come to New York to sing it, and Donny and I got together. It took us about two hours to learn, record and finish that song. It was easier than that to finish the album.

BH: You didn't have to practice together to do the harmonies or anything like that?

RF: No. That's why it was such an emotional thing. Donny was not a person who would sit down and rehearse with me. He was a very strong musician.

BH: Did Donny seem troubled, or was there a side you never

RF: Donny had some emotional problems. But like everyone else around him, I hoped the emotional problems were not as serious as they were. A few little things happened on the stage and word drifted back, but in this business gossip is both a curse and a boon. Sometimes when people don't say things about you that means they don't like you. Then when they say anything about you, you tend to be grateful. So I didn't know how much to believe. I knew Donny as a musician only. We didn't hang out together. It was only a musical alliance. For years I didn't talk about his suicide and I still get emotional because Donny was with me in my house that day. We were in the studio, we went and bought food, I cooked, we ate, we drank, we laughed, he played my piano, and then he went to the hotel and you know the rest. It was very hard for me. BH: When you're near the end of a set and you sing, "Ballad Of

The Sad Young Men" are you thinking of Donny or your former neighbor John Lennon? Do you relate events in your life to this

particular song?

RF: "The Ballad Of The Sad Young Men" is one of those songs that I can't sing a lot, particularly in this day of AIDS, when so many of my gay male friends have been taken away too early. It's very hard for me to sing because the song was written for a play called "The Nervous Set" and although I've never seen the play, I was told it was about homosexual love and certainly "The Ballad Of The Sad Young Men" is an appropriate song for any number of reasons. When I first recorded it, the Black Panthers were still in existence and they sent me a letter telling me they had adopted it as their theme song. When I sing "Imagine" I think of John. And when I sing, "The Ballad..." I think of Donny, I think of John, I think of Vincent Nasso, Jonathan Hitchcock and a lot of friends of mine who are gone. The song expresses emotions I feel for someone who is lost--who is still living in the physical sense, but who may be emotionally lost. As for John, I moved into this building the same year he and Yoko did. We were very good friends. I did a song for Yoko called "Goodbye Sadness" for the album she did in John's

BH: Did I read somewhere that you do commercials, too? RF: Yes, I do and I'm available and open! (laughs) I did an Oil of Olay commercial where they used "First Time Ever I Saw Your Face" and I've done an ad for (sings) "Kentucky Fried Chicken..." I love doing them!

BH: You're a multiple Grammy winner. What further goals have

you set for yourself?


RF: I want to move forward as a business entrepreneur. I'm trying to open some doors so that other young people can get the golden opportunity to share their talents. I want to be the person who does that. I'm interested in producing films and television. I have a company called "Magic Lady Productions" and we're trying to grow. At the moment we manage me and produce me, and we're branching out. I did all the music for Richard Pryor's film "Bustin' Loose", and I did something for the movie "White Nights." I'd like to not only score movies myself, I'd like to do all the little incidental music too

BH: Would you do a cameo role in one of them?

RF: If it was the right thing to do. I feel that I have an interesting background and I feel I am qualified.

BH: Are you approached a lot to do things for benefits and charities?

RF: Yes, I'm approached a lot. I give it back, or away, or to someone or to some organization if I can. The determining factor is usually time, not money. I do a lot of things that don't get P.R. or publicity. I'm not so sure that the people who are asking you to do the benefit are the only ones who are being benefited--I get a lot out of it. I feel like my crown is so heavily laden with these stars, Betty, I feel

room and send a letter of apology with a gift certificate for a return visit.

• If the customer's facility is closed down due to the presence of roaches or rodents, BBBK will pay all fines, all lost profits and \$5000 to boot.

BBBK does the impossible by using an approach vastly different from the industry norm: an obsessive vision of error-free service, extraordinarily rigorous hiring policies (one out of fifty applicants) and training programs (up to six months), generous employment benefits including insurance, pension, profit sharing, performance bo-nuses, job descriptions which encourage individual autonomy and self-control, and commitments from the customers. Regarding the latter, BBBK may insist that the customer change cleaning and storage practices, or build a wall for greater sanitation. BBBK customers must have their premises ready for monthly BBBK servicing, and pay a fine if the premises are not ready.

As a result, BBBK rarely has to make good on its guarantees. In 1987, for example, BBBK paid out only \$120,000 on sales of \$33 million. Because of its superb service and reputation, the company charges up to 10 times its competitors' fees, yet still has a major market share in its operating areas.

If they can do it with pest control, motorcycles, amusement parks, postal service, computers, laundromats and car dealerships, can you reinvent your business too? ●

THE OLDIES AND TALK TRAPS FOR AM STATIONS

I've written before about the plight of the former mass appeal AM who led the marketplace ten or fifteen years ago, has now seen major erosion of its position and sought alternate approaches. In the "first wave" of adjustments, many of these stations tried to convert to A/C, but some made the fatal mistake of trying to reposition themselves as having "changed," rather than having kept the same (usually Top 40) "lifestyle," and simply changing the "point of view" to the young adult, so that the station would still deliver the same general feeling of keeping up with the times, in music and news, as was the case when the listener was a kid. The latter approach worked very well for those few stations who recognized it and implemented it correctly.

For those who converted to A/C without the hoped-for success, or who only now are snatching at straws to rescue an AM station going down at the stern, the two most popular approaches are "oldies" or some form of all-talk (usually with liberal help from satellite talk program services). Both can have some success, provided these positions are

not already preempted, although "oldies" tend not to sustain well because many of the records played, though familiar, are now irrelevant to the target audience—and once the novelty of hearing them again wears off, listening declines.

Before taking the drastic step of changing what a station represents to the listener, bear in mind that <u>cume is hard to rebuild</u> for AM stations that still have it, and reflect that usually AM stations don't look as weak in cume share as in average-quarter-hour share. (Cume share is obtained by dividing the station's cume by the total market cume, in 12+ or in any demo you choose.) Frequently, once-leading AM stations still have considerable cume in some demos, even if a deteriorating listening span is causing the average-quarter-hour share to decline. (See last week's column for how to do this analysis.)

So if you are in this position, I urge you to determine what sort of cume the station has—trend it back as far as you can, and determine if the cume composition has changed. (Keeping in mind that the 15-year-old of ten years ago is 25 today, and that sort of cume profile change does not necessarily mean that the listening audience base has changed!) Then study the demographic cume profile of the station today. Is the station responding well to that demographic's expectations? Is the current cume substantial enough to make the station a winner if the former listening spans can be restored?

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Let me put these thoughts in more material terms, with a specific example.

Earlier in this decade I was approached by a former market-leading AM station, whose share was in a long-term downtrend. This former Top 40 station was responding to this problem by trying to mix A/C with as many syndicated and networked talk features as they could find, trying to be a talk-oriented station to appeal to the 35+/45+ demo which they understood was "all that was still available to the AM band." They weren't building an older audience, the share was still slumping, and they asked me to provide some input.

My first step was trending and analyzing the cumes in their ratings (3 different services surveyed their market). Their cume was centered in the 25-34 demographic because of their Top 40 heritage in the market-but these young adults were less and less hearing what they like when they did tune in. Meantime, another station in the market was dominant in the 40+ audience-the hardest audience to dislodge. My conclusion was that they had little hope of switching the older listener to their station, and their best prospect was to offer the 25-34 cume what they wanted to hear when they next tuned in. (What they wanted to hear related to what they used to hear, of course!)

I'll tell you what the solution was that put them back on top—and what happened after that—next week. ● HOLLYWOOD



Not so much a love song as it is a song about love. The phrase "saved by love" is engraved in the track, as Amy uses it at least 26 times, to affirm the salvation of the maternal spirit.

NU SHOOZ

Driftin' (Atlantic)

A song about an untethered relationship where natural currents are pulling two apart. Unlike their previous hits, Nu Shooz have made a gentle, casual record this time and should attract exactly the kind of stations which avoided their previous releases.

As predicted last week, the top of the chart remains competitive. BARBRA & DON pick up 28 HEAVY rotations to threaten GEORGE MICHAEL for number one.

JOHNNY HATES JAZZ adds 42 HEAVY rotations yet they can only climb one number on the chart.

ROBERTA FLACK, this week's cover artist, climbs six slots to number 13 (lucky we hope). She's new this week for WWDE, WROK, KKJO, U102 etc and now in HEAVY at KLZS, WBLU, KYLT, WFBG, WKST, WKCX, WAHR, CKFM, KFOR etc.

The MOODY BLUES are having one of their greatest A/C success stories in the nearly quarter of a century of their existence. Only 124 A/C's playing "No More Lies," but 81% of the play is quality committment. New for KAAK, WJMQ, KGY etc.



With an 18% increase in HII FACTOR, THE FOUR TOPS & ARETHA have gained seven points this week and eighteen in the past two weeks.

PHIL COLLINS wins MOST ADDED again this week and now shows 153 A/C's. "Two Hearts" also wins PLUS FACTOR this week with a 29% increase. Second only to PHIL COLLINS in HIT FACTOR increase is BASIA's new single, "New Day For You," which climbs 28%. Among her 25 adds (sixth MOST ADDED) were KWLO, KFOR, WTBC, WLLH and WMMG.





Oslin, Lyle is continually pushing the boundaries of Country music subject matter. From the sounds of this first single, his upcoming album should be full of more subtle surprises.




I Feel Fine (Columbia)

So-Pac throws in a bit of everything from Western Swing to Jerry Lee and it all works. For many of you this was a popular album cut, and it should continue to pull in requests on the phone and the dance floor.



EDDY RAVEN - 'Til You Cry' (RCA)
Another one of those records that grows on you with each listen. It's also very possibly one of the prettiest songs that Raven's ever recorded, perfect for those long winter nights.

JAZZ NEW RELEASES

C.G.P. - CHET ATKINS (COLUMBIA)

When we first started Jazz/AA, boy were we naive about Nashville's contributions to these formats! Mark O'Connor, John Jarvis, Billy Joe Walker, Jr. and Jim Horn are but a few peak performers from this region who easily venture past the Country idiom. Now here is the Country Gentleman himself, Chet Atkins, with a fine project simply titled Chet Atkins, C.G.P. This set is a virtual feast for Jazz/AA. Jazz folks should check out "Jethreaux" and "Light-Hearted Lisa." For AA consideration try "Chinook Winds," "Put Your Clothes On" and "Which Way Del Vecchio?". Also, Lennon's "Imagine," co-featuring Mark Knopfler is extremely relevant these days. It's a tribute to Jazz/AA's music intensity that they've embraced C.G.P. so warmly. With other formats of radio, sometimes artists get typecasted into one kind of music. Atkins has managed to steer clear of that problem with C.G.P.

BACK TO BECK - JOE BECK (DMP) Now we have two "Becks" in our musical routine. First it was Jeff, now it's Joe Beck. In all fairness, Joe has been around longer (though not by much), working with giants like Sinatra, Ellington, Miles and Steely Dan. Joe Beck's third LP for DMP starts off with a reggae shuffle titled "I Won't Be Back." Most of Back To Beck is an easy-going pastiche of his trademark acoustic guitar style. "Dreamin" gives Joe an opportunity to soar while most of the material is fairly low key. "Funk Parade" is also a little more adventurous.

IN FOCUS - BILLY MITCHELL (VISTA/OPTIMISM)

This is keyboardist Billy Mitchell's latest project since producing John Bolivar's last Gavin Jazz/AA chartbreaker release. His friend Bolivar contributes woodwinds on In Focus and is pictured on the back sleeve. Mitchell's music is breezing and loping as exemplified by the two best tracks, "It Could Only Be You" and "Come In Out Of The Pain." You'll find Mitchell's solo technique soulful and economic while the rhythm section on In Focus gives the sessions an ingredience of an Urban/Quiet Storm feel.
PENSYL SKETCHES #1- KIM PENSYL

(OPTIMISM)

Optimism releases two keyboard projects in one week. So how does Kim Pensyl differ from Billy Mitchell? While Mitchell has an Urban flair, Pensyl (as in the writing utensil) is more improvisational and inboard synthesizerly speaking. Even on "I'll Wait For You" and "Alone," which are essentially acoustic-type melodies, Pensyl opts for an "electric" acoustic sound instead of the real Steinway. Pensyl's career started with Gerald Wilson and Guy Lombardo big bands before moving on to improvised piano music. Other recommended Pensyl sketches include "Are You Ready" and "The Moroccan Junction."

DIRECT - VANGELIS (ARISTA) Though we don't recall seeing a full-blown album project lately, keyboardist/ innovator Vangelis has been busy scoring films, ballets, symphonic and choir efforts and perform two grand performances to benefit the Acropolis Preservation Fund. Direct is an important first release of a series of works that will range from "modern symphonic works to ethnic music." Yet the amazing aspect of this disc is while each song sounds layered and pre-planned, it is, in fact, spontaneously and simultaneously composed, arranged and recorded as it flows from the performer's brain, to his fingers, straight onto digital tape. Hence the sixty-three minutes of dramatic material is especially impressive. We found the motion and the passion of this music breathtaking. And while we realize that an hour in the day of those who audition this music is precious, a high decibeled hour spent with Direct is an absolute must. We love "Will Of The Wind" just for starters

SIGNATURE - RICHIE COLE (MILESTONE)

Richie Cole's be bop roots have always endeared him as one of Jazz's finest altoists. On Signature, he recreates what he calls the "Mega -Universal Saxophone Orchestra" using two altos, two tenors and two baritones and the power of the overdub. Does such a display sound stilted? No way. On "Sunday In New York" and "An Occasional Man," Cole and his "six-man" sound swings with dexterity and just the right amount of imprecision to make it work. There's also a generous helping of Richie's solo work. His chemistry with guitarists has always been natural. On "Trade Winds," the exchange with guitarist Vic Juris is no exception. MIDNIGHT DREAMS - ROBERT IRVING III (VERVE FORECAST) Robert Irving soaked up Jazz the hard way, with his Uncle Miles Davis, always the stern professor. But stylisitcally, Irving avoids any sign of the cool school, opting for an individual path. While Midnight Dreams spans the world of Jazz and Urban/Contemporary potential, it's three Jazz trax ("Masada," "Seeds" and "All Is Well") that wield the fire. Irving's keyboard work lays a solid foundation for support players like guitarist John Scofield and bassist Daryl Jones.

TIARA - TONY GUERRERO (WHITE LIGHT PRODUCTIONS)

At a mere twenty-three years of age, flugel-hornist Tony Guerrero has won the praise of players and chart-dwellers like Tom Scott, Grant Geissman and Max Bennett. Obviously it was the music of Chuck Mangione who first influenced the young self-taught Guerrero the flugel possibilities, however it's his experience as a studio gunslinger that seems to have broadened his horizons. Starting with the mellow "La'd" and "Tightrope," Tiara graduates to higher levels of intensity as heard on trax like "The Attitude" and "Freckles.



TOUCH - SARAH McLACHLAN (NETTWERK/CAPITOL)

I keep waiting for 1988's cash crop of female talent to end, but it looks like it's just not going to. The lastest gem is Sarah McLachlan's debut on the same label that spawned Skinny Puppy. Touch is an excellent example of ambitious production put to good use, creating loftier ideas. The breadth and the feeling of McLachlan's songs are somewhat akin to Kate Bush, Julia Fordham and fellow Canadian Jane Siberry. Still, hers is a unique and living direction. Check out "Steaming," "Vox" and the instrumental "Uphill Battle." Born and raised in Halifax, Nova Scotia, McLachlan's music sounds light years beyond her twenty. Perhaps it's her youth that gives her an innocent yet surreal appeal.

AMERICAN DREAM - CROSBY, STILLS, NASH & YOUNG (ATLANTIC)

American Dream is an honest effort by four individuals so diverse in personality it's a miracle that they intersect on common soil much less common musical ground. It seems that the separate diversities have made American Dream all the more interesting. Even more of a shock is **Neil Young**'s avid participation since historically he has been the hesitant initial inside the **CSNY** line-up. No less than fourteen songs have been crammed onto one disc. Recorded at the Young Ranch, each member has ample room (in fact, some of the members need ample room) to express themselves. I found **Crosby**'s "Triad"-like "Compass" to be particularly revealing. On "Nightime For Generals," Crosby


seems to have rediscovered his political voice. **Graham Nash** retains his humanitarian shine through his writing, particularly on "Clear Blue Blue Skies" and "Soldiers Of Peace." Neil Young not only contributes the most songs, but is a major instrumental collaborator throughout. Fortunately, American Dream, a team effort, is awash in liberal politics in its lyrical content and attitude. So take that, America!

"WILD AGAIN" - STARSHIP (ELEKTRA)
Contractual hassles kept this fine Starship
track from single/twelve -inch status until now.
While on the bench, the track went through a
thorough remix by Mike Shipley, making "Wild
Again" wild again. So far, the soundtrack and
the movie have done tremendous business. "Wild
Again" has always been one of the album's very
best tracks. I predict that it will give Cocktail
radio legs for the remainder of the year.



THE PRICE OF PROGRESSION - THE TOLL (GEFFEN)

Rather than release a shorter composition, The Toll led off with the ten minute "Jonathan Toledo." Since that song is the band's live signature, it's admirable that they would stick to their guns so early in their careers, rather than knuckling under out of the starting-gate. Upon inspection of the entire album, it seems that The Toll aren't avid clock watchers. Two more trax inch past the ten minute mark mostly due to singer Brad Circone's tendency to launch into stream-of-consciousness sermonettes and mini American docu-dramas. The instrumentation is no-frills rock n roll, providing aggressive instrumental support for Circone, the lastest neo-Lizard king candidate.



I hear smashes and hits but no thrashes. Here are fifteen trax, most of which have never been released without make-up. The two new tunes, "Let's Put The X In Sex" and "(You Make Me) Rock Hard" aren't exactly subtle love songs, but they rank as some of the clearest rock sounds Kiss has recorded yet. If you can spare the time, take a trip through yesteryear by scanning the oldies starting with 1974's "Strutter." Also included is "I Was Made For Lovin' You," Kiss' classic retaliation during the Travolta/Disco period.


DELICATE SOUND OF THUNDER - PINK FLOYD (COLUMBIA)


There's not too much that's delicate about the presence of live Floyd and this album's impact is likely to be even less so. This live set is the result of Pink Floyd's recent tireless tour. Sans the edge of Roger Waters (which I still can't help missing), the new Floyd leans toward the dreamier side of their past persona. David Gilmour, Nick Mason and Richard Wright (and friends) aren't timid about resurrecting chestnuts that have yet to be released live to the public. Bet that this double-set package will be one of the holiday season's big retail tales because it's exactly what young Floyd fans want: larger, live-sounding, faithful renditions of classic Floyd.

"KISS" - ART OF NOISE (CHINA/POLYGRAM)

You should have seen the Gavin staff huddled around the video monitor when **Tom Jones** was strutting his stuff **Art of Noise**-style. Tom treads on **Prince**'s lyrics like he's walking on the green graes of home in hobnail boots. You gotta hear and see this to believe it. Smack! **KZ**

INSIDE ALBUM by Kent Zimmerman

When Oren Harari, our On Management columnist, calls for a favor it was my duty to rise for the occasion. After all, Harari writes a damn good column and is a respected business consultant on top of his tenure as a Business Professor at the University of San Francisco. He teaches a capacity-filled class called Administrative Decision-Making. They were reviewing a case study that involved a fictional Album Radio station in Denver which actually was a composite of a lot of stations nationwide. The study was well written. Could I sit in on the class and contribute? That sounded easy enough. Later I found out that I would be lecturing a class of forty college senior business students. Take it away, Kent. Trust me when I say that it's scarier facing a classroom full of students than it is to interview some hard-assed rock n roll

After the experience I re-learned a couple of things. First, it's possible to overcome stage fright and face fear. More importantly, try explaining this business to even an interested captive audience of outsiders. After a compressed day of talking to Jazz radio, my energy level was high. I had jotted down just a few notes, expecting to draw the usual conclusions, in a sense winging it. Just before I was out the door, John Edwards of KBER-Salt Lake City was calling. John had spent a few years in the Denver market at KBPI. Getting information out of him was a breeze. His philosophy about focused radio is both realistic and a little controversial. Denver proved to be an intricate case study. After just ten minutes, I had scribbled a page of notes about KBPI and KAZY, then KBCO, then KILO, then KADX which had gone heavy metal that very day. A couple of hours later, I was standing in front of a blackboard with a confusing diagram of four radio stations, some not playing Keith Richards and opting for Bon Jovi, while some played both, some played neither, some reached adults, some rocked, some rolled and some succeeding big time in their markets while attempting to literally scale a stone mountain to penetrate another one. You get the picture. The diagram was a complete mess. The scenario was confusing as hell. Radio is fragmented and chaotic. And the students seemed to understand this chaos, even accepting it. Business, as they saw it, was a matter of splitting hairs, overcoming impossible debt services, jousting with the national economy. Even if you win, there are the inevitable challenges of keeping the egos in check. That doesn't take into account the competition of Top Forty and the rising popularity of Jazz and Adult Alternative. Album Radio as a microcosm is a fascinating reflection of the change between the sixties and the seventies, the

seventies and the eighties and on top of that, we're entering the damn nineties. The nineties! Then the 21st century, a new millennium! And it's chaos and we love it. In fact, we thrive on it.

Tom Peters, a very important management thinker of the late 20th century will be speaking at our Seminar the afternoon of Friday, February 17. Among his achievements is the current bestseller, Thriving On Chaos. In his past books about pursuing excellence, one of the ideas he espouses is getting the hell out of your office. It may sound impossible, but if you broadcast to a large or small campus in your marketplace, chances are you know

something worth passing on to a group of students. If you promote music in a large metro area or service a region, you have experiences that are relevant to education. We gain a lot from the energies of schools, colleges and universities. Many times they are a vital part of a listening/ buying audience. They generate revenue and enthusiasm for what we have to offer-radio, music, entertainment and information. See if you can grab the opportunity to give something back. It's well worth the time and energy. Plus you get the hell out of the office. You might even be able to knock out some quick street research. Admit it. You need it. Stay well. Yer pal, KZ.

INSIDE ALTERNATIVE RADIO

Over the past six years no other band has dominated this format more than REM. Their ascent to #1 maintains a perfect record of all their records (of new material) going #1 on the Alternative chart. Julian Cope and the Stay Awake compilation had the largest gains of chart points within the top ten. Scruffy The Cat is HOT and could be Top Five material. Big Dipper, The Lime Spiders and Sonic Youth are all growing at a rapid pace and look like Top Ten candidates. Last week's Record To Watch, American Music Club, is our highest debut. Nick Cave debuts just ahead of a surging Waterboys who debut the same week they are #1 Most Added. Nick Cave is gathering an ardent group of followers in Tim Ziegler-KUŜF, Jennifer MacLellan-WRUV and Ivar Hamiltion-CFNY. Check out the BIG news on Ivar in this week's RADI-O-RAMA. There's also news about other Alternative friends including John Sigler, Larry "The Duck" Dunn and Dave "Rambo" Darus. The Waterboys gained more adds in one week than I have seen in years! Early Waterboys ravers include Scott Carter-KCPR and Robbie Fung-KFSR. Dannielle Dax debuts and is attracting comments from Ann Delisi-WDET, Helen Urriola-WFIT (whose station just had a big power boost) and **Beth Hoepner-WUOG**. The **Cowboy** Junkies are Record to Watch. A few other ones to monitor closely include Laibach and the Royal Crescent Mob, who should debut once their many Adds kick into rotations

<u>Prodigal Son - THE SAINTS (TVT)</u>
After developing a reputation for rugged and raw rock n roll in the late 70's, group leader Chris Bailey has choosen to focus on a cleaner sound that relies more on quality song



structures rather than on just desire and guts. Don't be mistaken--the emotion still burns, it's just easier to find. On this effort (like last year's All Fools Day) you don't have to sift through a rubble of destroyed bricks and mortar in each song. I guess after 10 albums you learn something. The cuts on Prodigal Son are first rate and finding one stand-out track is difficult because there is plenty of ripe pickings. I'd give the edge to "Fire and Brimstone," followed closely by "Grain of Sand," "Music Goes Round My Head" "Ghost Ships," "Massacre" and "Before Hollywood." Originally released last year on The Saints native Australian label, Mushroom, this domestic release omitted my favorite track "Some Things Never Change."

Craps - BIG DIPPER (Homestead) Craps is an important watershed album for Big Dipper. This Boston-based band's songs have never been stronger and they're ready to expand on their core following that they've nurtured over the years. The single, "Meet The Witch," is an unconventional pop song that sticks to your brain. Big Dipper reveals their new secret weapon on "Ron Klaus Wrecked His House,"vocal harmonies! There's subtle chaos that fuels Big Dipper, and in the past it sometimes sent them all over the road, but on Craps, a new found cohesiveness holds the pieces together. Other stellar cuts are "The Insane Girl," "Bonnie," "Stardom Because" and "Hey! Mr. Lincoln."



SINGLES by Dave Sholin

ENYA - Orinoco Flow (Sail Away, Sail Away, Sail Away) (Geffen)

One of the truly special records to cross my desk this year. It's not surprising that this imaginative and mystical production went to number one in Britain after only three weeks! A "secret weapon" record that'll stand out and reflect the mood and aura of this time of year.

BON JOVI - Born To Be My Baby (Mercury/PolyGram)

A real "Jersey" rocker that's straight off the Boardwalk. With "Bad Medicine" still in the top three, these guys aren't wasting any time phone response. issuing this follow-up release. Expect the same growth pattern.

ERASURE - A Little Respect (Sire/Reprise) Chalk up another one for this dynamic duo. That bass beat and a crisp, inventive vocal accentuate a danceable, power pop track. Hard to top their debut single, but it sure sounds like they've done it.

TONE LOC - Wild Thing (Delicious Vinyl/Island)

Several times this past year "rap" has broken through to Top 40, and each time it was because of a unique presentation. Here is what can best be described as "cool" rap with a lyric designed to generate heavy

CROSBY, STILLS, NASH & YOUNG-American Dream (Atlantic) Certainly the comeback of the year in popular music. I for one held no great expectations from this project. Their music from the late sixties and early seventies was brilliant and inspiring. CSN&Y was one of the first supergroups to live up to the sum of its individual talents. The group, which set

the standards by which the last two decades of acoustic rock are still judged, proved then and again now, that there is no finer quartet. This is the album which should have been titled Deja Vu. Their distinctive trademark harmonies, stacked to the roof and sweet to the taste, have stood the test of time. And during their long hiatus, studio technology has caught up with them, now able to capture their talent fully. As with their other albums, American Dream is often front page news turned to Op-Ed poetry. The lead single, AMERICAN DREAM, Neil Young's tribute to fallen false prophets, is set to a quirkish Motown backbeat, making light of a dark situation. Another Neil Young contribution, THIS OLD HOUSE, is back porch harmony sung about a repo man who's knockin' on the front door. NIGHT TIME FOR GENERALS is David Crosby's best song and solo of the set. I'd never have guessed that it was Crosby singing. DRIVIN' THUNDER is the roadhouse rocker on the LP, as Stephen Stills and Neil trade leads on guitar and vocally in a flatout floorboard rambler. THAT GIRL is a briskly paced yet harmonically comfortable future single. All in all, American Dream is a bountiful harvest.

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








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
