Hand-in-hand with the formation of Universal Records comes an announcement by MCA President Al Teller of the executive lineup of MCA Records/Nashville.

Bruce Hinton has been promoted to President of the label and Tony Brown has been named Executive Vice President and Head of A&R.

Both gentlemen were promoted from within. Hinton was most recently Executive Vice President and General Manager of MCA/Nashville. He came to MCA in 1984 from Hinton/Svendsen Promotions in Los Angeles. Hinton also has held executive positions with CBS and Warner/Reprise Records.

Brown was Senior Vice President of A&R for the label. He has signed and co-produced Lyle Lovett and Patty Loveless. Brown began his musical career by touring with The Oak Ridge Boys, Emmylou Harris, Roseanne Cash, Rodney Crowell and Elvis Presley.

In making the announcement Teller commented: "Bruce Hinton and Tony Brown have contributed enormously to MCA Records/Nashville's success...I'm confident they'll lead the company to even greater heights."





PERSUASIONS INSPIRE DESPITE TRAGEDY

At a show by the Persuasions on Thursday evening, December 8, I experienced one of the most inspiring, yet tragic performances I have ever witnessed. The previous day, en route to San Francisco from Corvallis, Oregon, their baritone Herbert "Toubo" Rhoad was admitted to a Sacramento hospital for what started as a headache and digressed into a brain hemmorhage. Rhoad died three hours before the Persuasions scheduled San Francisco show.

Despite their shock, the remaining vocalists chose to go on with the performance. I was amazed with their courage to carry on without mentioning, or even hinting at the tragedy that had just occurred. They entertained, smiled--even joked--refusing to dampen the spirits of their audience.

It wasn't until the Persuasions returned for their encore that they told the crowd, through choked words and teary eyes, of Rhoad's sudden passing.

The audience gasped as a shock wave rode through us, leaving few dry eyes in the house. There's no silver lining, but the courage displayed by the remaining Persuasions to essentially proclaim that "the show must go on" was an inspiration that I'll never forget.

ISSIES BY Sheila Rene

Van Halen's heritage stems from the rich Southern California club scene of the 70's. They signed with Warner Brothers Records in 1977, and scored an immediate hit with their remake of the Kinks' Classic "You Really Got Me." Guitarist Eddie Van Halen has been voted Guitar Player Magazine's "Best Guitarist" so many times he's been retired to their hall of fame.

With David Lee Roth as their vocalist, Eddie, Alex Van Hafen and Michael Anthony moved toward monster status in the world of rock. Now, ten years later, with Sammy Hagar as their vocalist, Van Halen is taking a new approach to their sound. The first Hagar album, 5150, was the band's fastest seller and their first number 1. As of 1988 Van Halen has sold over 35 million albums, not including their second with Hagar, OU812. When Dave "Mr. Top 40" Sholin asked me to interview Van Halen my heart stopped. I first interviewed the band in 1978 and have known and admired Sammy Hagar since his Montrose days. This interview took place at their only Northern California tour date in Sacramento at the Arco Arena. The first part of the interview—with Sammy Hagar—takes place before Van Halen's performance. The second part—with Alex Van Halen—takes place after the encores. In each case, the energy level hit the roof.

SHEILA RENE: One of the highlights of my summer was Van Halen's Monsters of Rock tour. SAMMY HAGAR: That tour almost killed me. It was so exciting; there was so much energy every night. When we were in San Francisco I got a sinus and ear infection that caused vessels in both my eardrums to burst. It wasn't until the last show that I could sing again. I thought I was Mr. Durable.

SR: Did the band have input on who would be on the Monsters of Rock tour.

SH A lot of it had to do with availability and some of the bands we wanted weren't available or had broken up-like the Beatles and Zeppelin.

SR: Shortly after the tour, Metallica sold 2 million opies of "And Justice For All" within a two week period.

SH: I predicted Metallica would come out the best. At the last show I bet James (Hetfield) and Lars Ulrich) \$100 each trat their record would go platinum within the first month. They said, "You're crazy" and doubled the bet. So I'm gonna make them pay me \$200!! On my list of bands to put on the show, they were the first choice. They are going to be a huge band. It's the truth! And we got 'em!

SR: A lot of your fame might not go out to see

SHEILA RENE: One of the highlights of my summer was Van Halen's Monsters of Rock tour.

SAMMY HAGAR: That tour almost killed me. It was so exciting; there was so much energy every anymore.

SH: That's absolutely right. They were exposed to a band that has a lot of energy and has something to lay.

SR: I read that Ted Templeman wanted you as vocall t f r Van Halen as far back as 1978.

SH: That's what the boys say, eth as said that too, but we don't talk about that on much because both Van Halea and Dave (Roth) are still on Warner Brothers and I'm on Ge fen. We don't want to stir up any bad vibes within the family SR: But this is history. You weren't a hame that

SR: But this is history. You weren't a mame that came out of left field.

SH. But it was out of left field. When Eddie finally called me it was through our car mechanic-that old story is really true. And, don't forget that Templeman produced Montrose, and Van Lalen was alot like Montrose, guitars, from man, produced by Ted Templeman Warner Brothers, you name it—it's all the same. Fore I am 18 years later in Van Halen instead of Montrose.

SR: Two albums later.

5H: Two number one abums later

SR: 5150 is the biggest selling Van Halen album



What was so different between that one and 1984?

R: 1984 had a couple of big hit singles. "Jump" was the first Top 40 hit for Van Halen. Before that, like me, they didn't have any really big Top 40 singles. They had albums that sold a millionmillion and a half, but until "Jump" they didn't have breakthrough Top 40 success. With 5150 Dave was gone and had taken a lot of his fans with him, and I came and brought my fans with me. Add to that a fringe group that was interested in the fact that something new had happened in rock n roll-someone with a solo career joined a band Everyone quits bands to start a solo career. I love the back door. I think curiosity made 5150 sell fast. It was the fastest selling record in Warner Brothers' history—it sold three million records in three weeks. They couldn't press them fast enough. Warner Brothers practically shut down all their other projects to work on Van Halen. Initially we shipped about 700,000 copies because we didn't know what was going to happen. They didn't want to ship too many and Boom! the thing exploded and people had to work 24 hours a day stamping out records. 5150 is a great record. When you hear "Why Can't This be Love?" you hear a brand new Van Halen.

SR: Unlike 5150, each song on OU812 was finished before another one was started.

SH: Yes and we took more time with it. It's different. Some people might not get it because there are so many different styles of songs on it. They'll think "I really like this song and you should have put this one next to that one." The running order was fough because each song was finished in one complete painting instead of smearing it all throughout the album. Each song is like an entire album because the vocal was done with the guitar solo—all in the same few days. It was cut all at the same time so the same feeling was there. On the next song the moor was different—Mercury was in Jupiter or something. Upon first listering it probably sour ded disjointes.

SR: I just re d that addie almost forgot to lay down some guitar because he was so into the keyboard action?

SH: Eddie's conquered the guitar, so now he's fascinated by keyboards. We're not nervous about trying new thing. We only do two or three keyboard tunes on stage. We almost didn't put a guitar on the keyboard tunes, something I was all for. I idolize Eddie. He's the greatest.

SR: Does OU812 meet up with your sales and music expectations?

SH: This album sold faster during its first two weeks than 5150 because Warner Brothers had printed more so they were able to ship more. The only thing that held 5150 back was lack of product. Things are going great. For us to have our first number one albums two in a row at this stage of the game is quite amazing.

SR: I was expecting something else. But I kept listening and now I like it.

SH: It's a deeper album. There was a point during the middle of the making of it that I was afraid we had taken too many chances. "Finish What Ya Started" was taking a chance; "Source Of Infection"-actually the title alone is taking a chance. We knew we were taking chances, but that's the way Van Halen has always worked, and it's the way I've always worked. Take a song like "A.F.U. (All Fired Up)"—a typical rock n roll thing. After awhile you realize it's an anthem. It's not a "Running with the Devil," anthem that you recognize the first time you hear it. And there's "Mine All Mine." It's one of the best lyrics I've ever written, but you don't hear that upon first listen. Six On first listen, OU812 just didn't have the punch I was looking for.

SH: It's running order. If we had put "A.F.U.,"
"Mine All Mine" and "Source of Infection," "Cobo" and "Sucker In A 3 Diece" all in a row, then the
first reaction would have been different. But we
clidn't Intentionally. We hoped that it would reak
the album deeper, and that people wouldn't just
listen to one side. Make 'em listen to "When It's
Love." That one went to number 5, and that's
pretty good.

SR: What about "Finish What Ya Started"

SH I think "Finish What Ya Started" is the biggest chance I an Halen ever took. That song sounds like Tony Joe White meets The Rolling Stones meets Creedence Clearwater Revival. I've never sung like that. Eddie's never played guitar like that. We've got a big but with it.

SR: Did you pay attention to Top 40 sales in your solo days?

SH: No." Can't Drive 55" went to number 27, I did sell a couple of milion albums.

SR You like taking chances

SH I'll never do the same thing over again for money, that's all there is to it. I have to feel that I'm breaking new ground. I spent two days in New

LOOKING BACK ON 1988

In September I completed my tenth year of writing this column. The pleasure and surprise of when Bill Gavin called me and wondered if I'd be interested in writing it is still fresh in my mind. Bill was my mentor, although mainly through his writing and occasional phone calls, since at that point I only had the chance to meet and speak with him in person at the annual Gavin Programming Conferences.

Usually in these year-end columns, I concentrate on programming trends of the past year, but aside from the growing strength of "Urban"-flavored stations as direct competition for Top 40 stations, nothing particularly new has emerged in radio programming. Last years new format, "New Age" or "New A/C" hasn't lived up to advance expectations, as most new formats haven't in recent years, and the format—although now recognized with charts of its own—has yet to establish its own niche.

What was more notable this year was the advance in technology on both the AM and FM bands. For FM, the long heralded "FMX" stereo transmission process seems to have ended its experimental status and is ready for installation. The Innovonics model 705 FMX stereo innovator is available now, and several stations have already begun transmitting with it.

In the meantime, the FCC, which has been allowing Class A FM stations to reclassify at special Class B or C levels to allow major increases of power where it will not result in interference to other stations, now seems to be prepared to allow these stations remaining "Class A" to increase the maximum "effective radiated power" ("E.R.P.") allowed from 3,000 watts to 6,000 watts, where no interference results. And the FCC is also considering allowing more widespread use of FM directional transmitting antennas, to permit more flexibility in location transmitters, while keeping interference to other stations at a minimum.

With all 100 FM channels pretty well used up in much of the country, one innovative engineer has suggested redefining "100% modulations" on FM as being ±37.5 kHz, instead of the present ±75%, and spacing stations .1 MHz apart instead of .2 MHz apart as is now the case. Thus, stations would be assigned at 97.1, 97.2, 97.3, 97.4, 97.5, etc. instead of 97.1, 97.3, 97.5 as is now done. This would permit doubling the number of available channels to 200, and with mileage separation rules maintained, interference would not necessarily increase. The reduced modulation deviation would

keep FM stations from overlapping each other with this allocations plan, and reception would remain about as it is now on existing receivers. The "volume level" of all FM stations would drop by 3 db, but if this posed a problem, maximum power for each class of station could be increased by 3 db (doubled) to maintain the same signal-tonoise radio. TV sound (which is FM) is transmitted now with a much smaller deviation than FM, and channel 6 audio is received clearly on all FM receivers just below the FM band at 87.75 MHz. Although the FCC has not yet taken up this suggestion, it does seem workable.

As for AM, there have been a lot of technical developments in the past year. The FCC now seems likely to adopt the NRSC transmission standard as a requirement for all AM stations, which should prod manufacturers into building a standard high fidelity AM receiving circuit into all radios. The NRSC standard includes a high-frequency pre-emphasis on transmission, the same as the FM curve up to 10,000 Hz (where it is up 10db), then a very sharp cutoff above 10 kHz to greatly reduce "splatter" interference between each station and those near it on the dial. Motorola has designed a high fidelity AM receiving chip which incorporates the NRSC (de-emphasis matching the transmission pre-emphasis), a 10 kHz notch filter (to remove the 10,000 Hz whistle which wideband AM receivers pick up from carrier waves on adjacent frequencies, especially at night), and C-Quam AM stereo, which is now all but officially the one and only AM stereo transmission system.

Although the FCC refuses to make it official, not only are there now many hundreds of AM stereo stations using C-Quam in the United States, but the diehards who are still using the Kahn system continue to dwindle in numbers; WMAQ in Chicago made the switch, KNBR and KFRC in San Francisco made the switch, KKSN in Portland, Oregon made the switch, and the former WNBC, now WFAN, has switched to C-Quam stereo. At least one former Kahn station I know of has turned off its stereo generator and not replaced it with any system, and at this point I know of only one major station still committed to the Kahn system no consumers can receive, though there may be others.

Although there are very few Kahn stereo receivers in existence, Motorola is claiming 500,000,000 AM receivers in the United States, some 15,000,000 are now C-Quam AM stereo—many of them in cars and trucks, but some also built into home stereo receiving equipment. Chrysler has announced that henceforth all radios in all their vehicles will be C-Quam AM stereo! The most perplexing myth in the radio business today is the one among broadcasters that "there are no AM stereo receivers, so why convert to stereo transmission?" These broadcasters are confusing consumer demand for AM stereo (which so far is still very low, largely because

the public still isn't widely aware that it exists, or can sound good), for receiver availability. People are getting AM stereo, particularly in vehicles they buy, whether they know

or want it or not. And once they hear AM stereo, they like it, and it <u>doe</u>s influence their radio listening habits in a positive manner.







STORIES - TOM HARRELL (CONTEMPORARY)

Unleashed on the Jazz world by Phil Woods, Tom Harrell is a focused flugelhornist of magnanimous proportions. His "stories," especially ballads like "Song Flower," represent some of the most expressive, soul-bearing bearing moments we've heard all year. As a composer, Harrell gives his soloists room for expression. Tenor man Bob Bergman has a strong presence on "The Mountain." Guitarist John Scofield contributes his best work of the year on three of the six tracks. But it's always Harrell's re-entry that wraps things up with a dash of complexity. Side two features two extended trax that stretch and blow. Stories is one of this year's special gifts.
ON THE THIRD EXTREME -

ON THE THIRD EXTREME RICHARD BURMER (GAIA)

If it has to be non-Jazz instrumental

music, then it has to have motion, dynamics and a spirit of aggressive ambience rather than stale mood. Here's an example of a splendid standout. Richard Burmer, who has become an original darling of the WAVE station and network, has prepared his third album suitably titled On The Third Extreme. Burmer, like Vangelis, is a one-man show who spreads his high ideals generously over an arsenal of keyboards and emulators. His forte is weaving layers of orchestral synthesizer, creating a landscape of dynamism illustrated on the opening "Magellan." Turn this up and let it reign.

LEGEND OF THE SEVEN DREAMS -IAN GARBAREK (ECM)

If John Coltrane invented meditative Jazz in the sixties, then the ECM label surely must be credited for maturing it through the seventies, eighties, into the nineties. Notably accompanied by bassist Eberhard Weber, Nana Vasconcelos and keyboardist Rainier Bruringhaus, side one flows as if conceived in three movements. Tripling on soprano sax, ten sax and flute, Garbarek has a unique relationship with the trance-like percussion he cloaks himself in. "He Comes From The North" is a fruitful rhythmic adventure while "Tongue Of Secrets" is more ominous.




DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVES - ROBIN EUBANKS (IMT/POLYGRAM) An exciting package of melodic, modern and abstract styles. Robin is much more than Kevin Eubanks' brother. His experience ranges from playing with McCoy Tyner, Sun Ra, Philly Joe Jones, Patti LaBelle and Dave Holland to the Talking Heads. On this album Robin keeps the promise of the title. While he is capable of conjuring up quiet acoustic moments like "The Night Before," look out for "Walkin'," where a four piece trombone section bounces off an acoustic rhythm section. The results are disciplined and exciting. The remainder of the album suggests what Eubanks might have offered his aforementioned employers. As a trombonist, he is truly flexible and versatile.



DUETS - CARLA BLEY & STEVE SWALLOW (ECM)

Being a piano/bass duet concept places Duets a little on the avant side in regards to Jazz airplay and potential. "Utviklingssang" comes closest to drawing the emotion of past Bley masterworks like "Heavy Heart" and "Us And Them." "Revolutionary Tango" is the bareboned version of the big band arrangement that first appeared on Carla's collaboration with Charlie Haden on the political Ballad Of The Fallen. Its inclusion gives her fans the chance to put a microscope to the Bley genius of composition. The album's opening "Baby Baby" comes closest to traditional Jazz playing. No doubt Duets is a pitstop for Bley and Swallow as they prepare a full-blown serving of their unique brand of progressive ensemble work. BLUE TO THE BONE - JIMMY McGRIFF (MILESTONE)

Counting the latest by Charles Earland, this is the second funk-packed organ quintet LP to hit our turntables in a week. The bonus on this set is the playing of Bernard Purdie. On the opener, "Ain't That Funk For You," things start off as a round-robin solo fest featuring McGriff, guitarist Melvin Sparks, trombonist Al Grey and Bill Easley on sax. Check out the bright "After Dark" for more great solo performances. BLUES BRED TO THE BONE - RAY ANDERSON

(GRAMAVISION)

Whadda week for trombonists competing for the Roswell Rudd crown of the late eighties! From the first minute, BBTTB begins exploring every sonic nook and cranny of the sliding phenomenon. The title track is an odd shuffle, a perfect platform for a duet with guitarist John Scofield (who is very busy these days). Anderson's style is so obtuse he seems to bend his trombone's notes the same way Scofield can easily bend his strings. "Mona Lisa" may be crazy as hell, but it showcases the talent that helped Anderson top downbeat's critics poll two years running. Check out the wild threads on the cover. This man's a character all right.

MINGUS' SOUNDS OF LOVE -

THE MINGUS DYNASTY (SOUL NOTE/POLYGRAM) Mingus, the romantic, is explored in this concept album that interprets six songs written to six women in Mingus' life. Besides the notable contributions of players the calibre of Randy Brecker, James Newton and Roland Hanna, this is some of the last music performed by Dannie Richmond before his death. Richmond, who started out as a tenor saxophonist, was magically tranformed into a powerful drummer by Charles Mingus' wild inspiration and imagination. Richmond, besides being one of those closest to Mingus' heart, explored a vast amount of musical territory. Thankfully, he appears on five out of six trax and will be sorely missed, not only as a fine drummer, but as a link to the mysterious genius of the Charles Mingus dynasty. MINDGAMÉS - GREĞ OSBY (IMT/POLYGRAM) Don't you love it when a new talent walks the highwire? With

electric accompaniment, saxophonist Greg Osby sets off shards of electricity and mystery. His opening statement with synthesist Geri Allen is a walk on the edge. By making daring statements, Osby raises the stakes and standards of his music. By walking a complex and abstract line, we are attuned to a bright new talent who bravely starts his career on an unusual level of intensity that should gain him fast notoriety and respect. Trax differ from the afore-mentioned opener, "Dolemite" to a strange voice piece called "Mindgames" to the introspective "Silent Attitude."

COMING OUT OF THE CAVE

THE GAVIN INTERVIEWS NICK CAVE

In the late 70's and early 80's no one realized the reverberations the Birthday Party would leave on the international Alternative music scene. As lead vocalist, Nick Cave developed a dark, defiant image within the underground music circles. After disbanding the Birthday Party in 1983 he formed the Bad Seeds, who have now recorded five albums including their new release, Tender Prey. But Nick's vision goes beyond the world of rock and transcends into both literature and film. He's already published "King Ink," a collection of his lyrics and prose, and is just finishing an epic four-part "And The Ass Saw the Angel" ("With the novel I can be a lot more complicated about things, which in turn gives me a license to be more simple in my song writing"). Nick and the Bad Seeds made an appearance performing in the award-winning film "Wings of Desire" and have recorded the soundtrack to the upcoming Australian movie "Ghosts...of the Civil Dead." Nick helped write the script and also plays a role within the film.

PS: This album seems to have less raw energy than some of your earlier works. There appears to be more pain, anger and frustration.

NC: I think that's a good observation. A lot of people consider this record to be the most uplifting and optimistic we've made and I think that tends to be because they see it as the most commercial. But personally, of all the records that I look back on, the conditions in which it was recorded and the state of mind that we were all in is by far the most despairing. There was a lot of things going on at the time.

PS: Within the personal lives of the band members?

NC: Usually the band spends more time together before we make a record. There didn't initially seem to be the same kind of direction as there was with some of our other records which have a more cohesive nature about them. And in a way I think that's the record's charm in the end, that it is a collection of styles, and different ideas and moods. It was quite accidental with this particular record, but it reminds me of "Kicking Against The Pricks" in the same way as that's something akin to an exercise in style. It also leaves our future recordings wide open as to which direction we would care to go in.

PS: Maybe that's a window out from where people have you pigeonholed?

NC: Our records aren't usually just a collection of songs, there is a definite kind of mood almost a philosophy of some sort behind them. This is the impression I get from the press and so forth—they kind of catch hold of certain elements. With this record it's not so much like that.

PS: I'm curious about the song "New Morning" and what the premise might be behind that. It seems to start out sad but ends on an optimistic note

NC: There was a certain amount of irony when we recorded that particular song. It actually meant something quite different to me than it does now. I do see it as quite an optimistic song now in a kind of classic tradition. The way we perform it onstage and so forth has kind of a religious, healing atmosphere about it. But when we recorded it, it was done with a kind of sicker sense of irony.

PS: What's the role of religion in your music? It seems like this album deals with good and evil on a lot of songs like "Up Jumped The Devil," or "City Of Refuge."

NC: It's been a pretty consistent theme throughout my career.

PS: Does it play a big role in your music and in your life?

NC: I guess the more I continue the more the line between good and evil tends to blur a bit really. I once saw it as a cut and dry thing.

PS: Why do you think the song "Deanna" is gaining the most attention here?

NC: Well, it was originally based upon "Oh Happy Day." That's an old Gospel flavored song by the Edwin Hawkins Singers. Deanna was built on that. It's got to do with childhood recollections.

PS: Tell me about the song "Mercy Seat". Is it about an innocent person on death row and what inspired the song?

NC: It has to do with the three levels of judgment. A person in an isolated atmosphere thinking about society and divine judgment. It's him being iso-

lated and applying these levels of judgment to things around himself.

I'd been working for quite awhile on writing and acting in a film called "Ghosts...Of The Civil Dead." I guess a lot of songs have been born out of having to do research for that particular film.

PS: Where is it set?

NC: It's a prison film. I was one of the people involved in writing the initial draft. The director went to America and met a rather interesting guy called Dave Hale who was an ex-prison guard and who had this story to tell. It's based on his experiences in a maximum security prison. His experience is in America but similar types of things have happened in Australia, so it's just kind of feeding off information from both.

PS: Tell me about your role.

NC: I play a convict called Maynard who's brought into the prison to deliberately provoke a kind of violent reaction within the prison, like a prove.

PS: You're also in "Wings Of Desire"?

NC: That was due to Wim Wenders having a situation in the film where he needed some musicians. The Bad Seeds and Crime And The City Solution were both in the film. I lived in Berlin at the time and I think because we were two of his favorite groups he asked us.

PS:My favorite trackis "Slowly Goes The Night." It has a night club and folk feel to it. It's a very sad song, conveying emotions directly.

NC: On a musical level that song was sad. There was a piece of piano that I'd written that I really liked, but I struggled with it. I don't know how many months I tried to fit a vocal to it. It was a difficult song to sing. I'm not really happy with it yet, but I think that the lyrics are self-explanatory. I like its potential but I don't know whether the song actually lives up to it.

PS: It seems that the element of mystique is an important part of your music.

NC: It's true. I'm not really comfortable in explaining lyrics and so forth. I find that a lot of my lyrics are, to me, quite atmospheric and within them there are abstract notions about things that affect me indirectly—things that, when I perform them live onstage, mean different things at different times. New kinds of meanings come out of the lyrics with repeated singing and so forth, but I find that when I have to dissect them in an interview situation it tends to destroy that, and I think it probably does to any listener as well. I can give you my view of what the "Mercy Seat" is about, but I'm reluctant to do so because I think the song is as it was. I'm happy with the way it is, and with the different levels there are. Giving any concrete analogy of the song is only going to take away from it. I'm constantly hearing other records and not quite understanding the lyrics and thinking "Wow, what a great line." It'll inspire me a lot and give me all sorts of ideas and then I find out that I've misunderstood the line totally. That happens to me all the time.

PS: You were born and raised in Australia, which is where you formed the Birthday Party. When and why did you choose to move the band to England?

NG. It was about 1980. We just had wrung the sponge as far as we could, playing for the same two or three hundred people for three years and it was just nowhere. It was necessary for us to leave

for our own sanity. When we actually left Australia we had no kind of help or prospects whatsoever in England. We just had to leave and landed in London. For awhile it was out of the frying pan and into the fire. But it was just impossible for us to carry on in Australia.

PS: How do you feel when you look back at the Birthday Party?

NC: I feel very proud of being part of that particular group. I think that we behaved ourselves really well in terms of the way we handled things, and broke up at a healthy time. The whole concept of the Birthday Party was a strong package in an historical sense, in that it had a solid statement to make about things. There were growths within that and it ended nicely. I think it had a lot of dimensions to it, a lot of levels. It made quite a solid statement of what it was like for a band to rise from nothing. I think it was possibly the most concise statement on confrontation, physical and emotional, that could have been made. There's quite a nice story about the group's growth, its rise and downfall.

PS: Why did it become an albatross?

NC: Because the basic idea behind it was healthy anti-audience, and as soon as it became known to the group that to do what we did was what the audience wanted us to do, it kind of destroyed the whole concept in a way. There was a time when we would shock and scare people, but when that fell away and people wanted to be abused and people wanted to be shocked and it lost its purpose. Whereas, it was always good to play America, because for some reason we continued to have that effect on Americans—you could see it in their faces. To an English audience any kind of healthy fire that you might have is quickly squelched.

PS: Who were some of your musical influences when you were growing up in Melbourne?

NC: The Saints were always a big influence for us when we started the group in Australia. We drew things from all places. You know—the American blues—Robert Johnson and John Lee Hooker.

PS: It sounds like the American blues have been a big influence in a lot of your music.

NC: It's a home base for us. We continually return there. Musically we can venture off into other areas as we've done on the "Tender Prey" record, but I think the Blues and Gospel Music is some sort of base where we will return to and it always holds a fascination for me.

TWENTY ARTISTIC TRIUMPHS OF 1988

Gazing at our 1988 Album/Alternative Top 100s, we know who received tremendous, undying airplay. Steve Winwood rolled with it. Guns N' Roses shot up the retail scene. Def Leppard hysterically spread airplay over mega months. Van Halen and INXS brought streams into the live concert arenas. Yet who were the artists who also put their noses to the analog/digital grindstones, coming up with the artistic eyebrow-raisers of 1988? Here are twenty examples of artistic intergrity and risk, music that's not always rewarded with airplay and sales, but nonetheless represents our musical future.

1.COPPERHEAD ROAD - STEVE EARLE (UNI/MCA)

Steve Earle risks his core Country audience by playing rock n roll partly for the sake of political expression. Copperhead Road is in praise of an America that realizes her problems and is hellbent on facing them.

2. <u>LAND OF DREAMS - RANDY NEWMAN</u> (REPRISE)

This collaboration was strong enough to push a promotion-shy **Mark Knopfler** into the limelight in praise of a national treasure like **Randy Newman**. Newman himself rose to the challenge with a thoughtful collection of wit and wisdom.



3. SLOW TURNING - JOHN HIATT (A&M)

Topping last year's Bring The Family was no easy feat, yet I'd rate Slow Turning even higher. Line of the year: "Well, David put a match to a Lucky Strike/and the smoke curled up 'round his head/how he liked." You find the track.

4. <u>HIDDEN CHARMS - WILLIE DIXON</u> (BUG/CAPITOL)

Blues albums seldom get the Cadillac treatment when it comes to production. But Willie's legendary stature is captured by T Bone Burnett's sure hand with a roots-conscious reverence.



5. STARFISH - THE CHURCH (ARISTA)

I've never doubted this talented and diverse quartet would finally win over the crowd. Starfish is their long overdue breakthrough.

6. NOTHING BUT THE TRUTH -RUBEN BLADES (ELEKTRA)

Ruben's first English language album was a stable and mature collection of emotions. In an upcoming interview, Lou Reed comments on his experiences as his collaborator.

7. <u>DIESEL AND DUST - MIDNIGHT OIL</u> (COLUMBIA)

When **Midnight Oil** finally translated their live energy onto tape for the first time, the result was their most successful worldwide effort.

8. EVERYTHING'S DIFFERENT NOW - 'TIL TUESDAY (EPIC)

In writing the material for this fine effort, **Aimee Mann** spilled both ink and guts. As a listener, I appreciate the candor.



9. IF I SHOULD FALL FROM GRACE WITH GOD - THE POGUES (ISLAND)

With the folkiness of Fairport Convention and the energy of the Who, the Pogues make a nineties statement with supercharged wooden instruments. Producer Steve Lillywhite adds the electricity.

10. TIRED OF THE RUNNING -THE O'KANES (COLUMBIA)

Country music continues its renaissance rage despite Steve Earle's exit stage right. Tired Of The Running has a luminiscence and subtlety rock n rollers can catch in just one listen.

11.LOVESEXY - PRINCE (WARNER BROS.)

Prince is still the king of musical and sexual ambiguity. Lovesexy dares to brandish love and sex in this era of AIDS and street/drug warfare. New power!

12.MESSAGE FROM THE LOST CIVILIZATION - TONIO K (WHAT?/A&M)

Tonio K is still the king of religious and social ambiguity. This album is like a conference call with Norman Mailer, Woody Guthrie and Martin Luther.

13.TRACY CHAPMAN (ELEKTRA)

The fact that this album is one of 1988's big sellers helps a lot of us sleep at night.

THE TRINITY SESSION -COWBOY JUNKIES (RCA)

Take Hank Williams, Waylon and Lou Reed, make it dark and simple and you get this beautiful work.

15.<u>LIFE'S TOO GOOD -</u> THE SUGARCUBES (ELEKTRA)

Nothing gets lost in the translation. Our number one Alternative record of the year is another goodie.



16.INSTINCT - IGGY POP (A&M)

Besides going back to his killer instincts, **Iggy**'s gig at the Fillmore was this year's finest show.

17. LIVE AND LET LIVE - BOBBY KING & TERRY EVANS (ROUNDER)

Easy to see why **Ry Cooder** had more fun producing this album than recording his own. **King & Evans** induce soul, rock and blues to grandiose results.

18. TEMPLE OF LOW MEN -CROWDED HOUSE (CAPITOL)

Though they took commercial risks, Crowded House needed to make this obscure but wonderful set of songs.

19. MISCHIEF - CLIVE GREGSON /CHRISTINE COLLISTER (RHINO)

Voices and guitars blend as emotional fireworks explode. A big future for this quality duo.

20.<u>TALK IS CHEAP - KEITH RICHARDS</u> (VIRGIN)

By releasing a pastiche of grooves, **Keef** shows that it's not who you play with but rather who you've spent your life listening to.



TWENTY GREAT SLEEPER SONGS OF

Making a great album in the eighties may not be the ultimate challenge in this song-oriented era of radio. Watching a perfectly constructed song shiver the timbers of Album Radio listeners is but one of the many joys of the radio music profession. The other joy is being on the receiving end of an artist's emotional power surge. Here are twenty examples of songs seemingly born from the inner depths of the artist's torn and frayed psyche. By "sleeper" we may mean overlooked or possibly underadmired. Still, we managed to include a few of this year's high-profile airplay tunes



1. "AND A BANG ON THE EAR" or "FISHERMAN'S BLUES" - THE WATERBOYS (CHRYSALIS)

Mike Scott steals a trick from mentor Van Morrison. When in doubt, go back to the basics which in this case is the bare roots of Scottish culture with a little Bob Dylan thrown in for good measure.



2. "ANCHORAGE" - MICHELLE SHOCKED (MERCURY/POLYGRAM) Randy Newman referred to this as a superb "acting job." This time Ms. Shocked surely puts her imagination to work creating a character folks would like to get to know

3. "APRIL SKIES" - JESUS & MARY **CHAIN (REPRISE)**

I can't resist including an attitude-heavy ode to the wild side.



4. "WHAT I AM" - EDIE BRICKELL & **NEW BOHEMIANS (GEFFEN)**

Try putting pen to paper and explain "what l am" in a few stray verses and choruses. Not easy, is it?

5. "PEOPLE HAVE THE POWER" - PATTI SMITH (ARISTA)

After a long silence, this was Patti Smith's way of saying that she doesn't equate her reclusive nature to apathy. In the information age, all you have to do is hoist your antenna, broadcast your message and it could circle the globe.

6. "WHEN LOVE COMES TO TOWN" -U2/B.B. KING (ISLAND)

While I'm still digesting Rattle And Hum and its cause and effect, here is a song that hit home immediately.

7. "ALL NIGHT LOŃG" - PETER MURPHY (BEGGARS BANQUET/RCA)

You have to admire songs that shatter an artist's preconceived image. Murphy, the dark prince of Bauhaus, is actually a humorous fellow with a semi-normal sense of humor. He also wears Birkenstock sandals.

8. "ONE STEP UP" - BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN (COLUMBIA)

I was very late on Tunnel Of Love. Now raise your hand if your were glad Bruce Springsteen had marital problems, ran away with his female bandmate and turned out to be just as confused as the rest of us. 9. "MR. JÓNES" - TALKING HEADS (FLY/SIRE)

My favorite track because of the Keith Richards guitar chord at the beginning of each verse. Then the salsa arrangement really fires things up. Poor Mr. Jones, America's timeless nerd, gets picked on again.

10. "DON'T WORRY, BE HAPPY" -**BOBBY McFERRIN (EMI)**

The song of 1988 if you asked a random person on the street. It's funny that a song like this would catch on when we have the biggest reason to worry in eight years. 11. "SUCCESS" - GRAHAM PARKER

The first time I heard this my jaw dropped. Though a little on the cynical side, Parker defines the craving of success to a tee.

12. "ONLY A MEMORY" - THE SMITHEREENS (ENIGMA/CAPITOL)

Though the Smithereens are the kind of group you might think would make it on the band identity. So far they've made it on their songwriting skills. Here's one example. 13. "SOMEBODY BRING ME SOME WATER" - MELISSA ETHERIDGE

Keith Zimmerman just said it to me today: "Melissa Etheridge makes the best 'other woman' songs in recent memory.'

14. "SEEDS I'VE SOWN" - BROKEN HOMES (MCA)

(ISLAND)

Included primarily because this band needs to be heeded sooner or later. Watch out for this band. They're for real.

15. "TO YOUR DOOR" - PAUL KELLY & MESSENGERS (A&M)

A tough choice, but this was my favorite Paul Kelly song of 1988. After all, songwriters should be great story tellers and this one's a movie of minutes.

16. "THIS OLD PORCH" or "L.A. COUNTY" - LYLE LOVETT (CURB/MCA)

Until Lyle makes his masterpiece, here are two songs that shed light on his interpretive genius.

17. "JUDAS KISS" - DEL LORDS (ENIGMA)

Besides the rappers, the Lords were the first to mention the dreaded crack problem on their single, as opposed to an obscure LP track. Carry on, guys.

18. "I HATE MYSELF FOR LOVING YOU" - JOAN JETT & THE BLACKHEARTS (Blackheart/CBS)

Joan Jett's success this year ALMOST makes up for her overlooked performance on Light Of Day, both the movie and the song. For me, Joan and her music has always been a reality check. When it sounds wrong, it'll be time to hang 'em up.

19. "THIS NOTE'S FOR YOU" - NEIL YOUNG & THE BLUENOTES (ATLANTIC)

Neil makes the ultimate statement regarding sponsorship, accompanied by a hilarious video parody of those whose music is for easy sale.



20. "ZIMBABWE" - TONI CHILDS

Another daring female artist that should figure into the plan of the 1990s, which I hope means music from all walks of life, male or female.



INSIDE ALTERNATIVE

It took a gallant effort and the Waterboys finally unseated REM as the #1 Alternative record. The Fall are HOT with curious programmers including Doris Duwe-WTSR ("I lust the Fall"), Greg Vegas-WXCI, Jason Cohen-WNUR, Gary "U.S." Downs-KUCI and Scott Carter-KCPR. The Cowboy Junkies spot a respectable, but modest, move yet are one of the most talked- about releases on the chart. Cowboy Junkies junkies include Patrick Ferrise-WWVU, Andrew Moss-WICB, Bruce McDonald-WFNX ("#3 Most requested") and Ray Diggins-KOTR. The Saints make a god-like leap into the Top Ten, behind the avid support of people like Mike Thomas-WMDK. Dinosaur Jr. are right behind the

Saints, moving the same exact number of chart positions behind tyrannosaurus sized support from Brett Greene-KUNV ("Jumped 15 spots on our playlist"), Phillip Wygmans-WRUV and James Lien-WTUL ("Awesome"). The Go-Betweens squeeze inside the Top Ten, while A House and the Lilac Time explode. Fairground Attraction is another sleeper waiting to be detonated. This dark horse record had a strong week judging the comments from Gina Galli-WBNY, Ann Delisi-WDET ("Gaining more and more airplay"), Ted McEnroe-WBRU and Pete Jones-KYOS. This week features an interview with Nick Cave (page 38) who continues to build an airplay foundation. American Music Club, Últra Vivid Scene and Wolfgang Press refuse to fade and should carry on through the new year. Sound Garden is our highest debut and Top Tip. The Dead Milkmen are gaining airplay quickly and requests even faster. Huge response on the Milkmen has been gauged by Robbie Fung-KFSR and Bill Gruber-WAPS. New Order cracks the Top 50 before the year's end and will undoubtedly be in their usual Top Ten form in January, with instant reaction noted by Kim Saade-WRAS ("Really kicking in") and Chris Sheppard-CFNY. A few records below the chart to monitor closely include our Record To Watch, the Rollins Band, the Volcano Suns (big for Doug Kelly-KFJC) and Brave Combo (drawing raves from Chris Crowley-WUSB and Maggie McCabe-KCMU). Our number one Most Added is Tanita Tikaram and she looks like a winner in '89 according to well-informed sources Jean Atwood-WDST, Bob Showacre-WHFS and Lin "Mitch Williams" Brehmer-WXRT ("Will be a Top Five national album by April"). AROUND THE HORN AND OTHER ODDS AND ENDS...This is our last chart and issue for 1988. We will begin accepting reports again on Tuesday January 3rd. Best of luck to a great Music Director, John Koski from WRVU in Nashville who departs this week. Taking over for John will be Marc Hill and Cinda Swanson. Special thanks this year to Robert Barone who was a super sub while I took my walkabout in New Zealand and Australia. Also thanks to Judy Asman who assists us each week and Steve Tourte who diligently helps research all new potential Alternative reporters. A reminder that the Gavin Seminar will take place on February 16, 17 and 18, 1989 here in San Francisco. The annual Alternative conclave will take place a little earlier this year - It's tentatively scheduled to begin at 5:30 on Thursday Feb. 16th. Don't miss it! Also don't forget the Alternative East vs. West softball game on Sunday Feb. 19th (Monday Feb. 20th is Presidents Day holiday). This game is special for all of you Alternative folks. Orleans on this tour and I didn't sleep the whole time. I was jammin' with old blues bands and singing with people who didn't know who I was. Eddie and I just played and played. It's important to be stimulated, and Van Halen is a very stimulating band. This is a real band; we work together. Sometimes you want to punch a guy in the face and sometimes you want to hug him because he's come up with such a good idea. There are no egos involved—it's simply amazing.

SR: What next?

SH: I don't know where we're going on the next one. I want to go into the studio for two or three years if it takes that long for us to come out with a masterpiece. I've never been 100% happy with any album I've done, except for my last solo outing. On that one I was happy with the songs and the final statement. But Van Halen, as a band, can do more. The four individuals as a whole are much bigger than the single parts, believe me. I want the next album to be a masterpiece, and for every one of us to say we wouldn't change a thing if we had to. We just signed a new contract with Warner Brothers, so we obviously want to go on.

SR: What do you think about what's going on in radio?

SH: Album radio doesn't break them like they used to. The Robbie Robertson record—which was a great, great record—got tons of Album radio play and didn't sell. That's scary. MTV is breaking new acts. There have been a lot of changes.

SR: What do you want to say to Program and Music Directors?

SH: First, I should thank all the listeners, Program and Music Directors for being so kind to me during my 15 years in rock and roll. I'm very sincere about that. I've had a long career and to be on top now—thank you! Secondly I'd like to say don't forget about the new guys and I wish you wouldn't play it so safe. Let's take a few more chances like Van Halen and Metallica does. Let's get back to creativity.

SR: How do you feel about being nominated Best Male Vocalist for this year's Bay Area Music Awards?

SH: It's an honor—it gives me goose bumps. People don't know how much it means to me, because the Bammies have passed me by so many years. I've been up for a Grammy for soundtracks and this and that and it doesn't mean as much to me. Win or lose I'm happy. This comes straight from my heart.

After two hours of a raging set before a sold-out crowd of 17,000 Alex Van Halen and I headed for a quiet room. We talked about his influences and most importantly, his sobriety.

SHEILA RENE: You have only two more U.S. dates before you head to Japan.

ALEX VAN HALEN: Maybe I can talk the guys into doing some more touring in the States. The rhythm feels right. This is the shortest tour we've ever done—two months of the Monsters and two months headlining.

SR: Sammy says you've never played better in your life.

AVH: Well, I've never heard Sammy sound better in his life.

SR: You've stopped drinking.

AVH: This is the first time ever. For 17 years I was doing the rock n roll thing to the bone. I never do anything half way. I grew up with musicians and the association of music, good times and alcoholnot necessarily in that order-always goes together. I started drinking when I was six-a couple of beers for breakfast, a couple before lunch—that kind of thing. By the time I was 18 I was out of high school and working in clubs. It was non-stop. I had a beer in my hand every waking moment. At first it gave me a nice buzz and made me a little less inhibited. Over the course of 17 years my body built up a resistance to beer. On the 5150 tour I went over the edge and took the liberty of doing whatever the hell I wanted. We had our first number one record, every date was sold out, the audience accepted the way the band was. I came back home and said "Now what?" I'm not into drugs so I just starting drinking more to cop a buzz and celebrate.

SR: What happened?

AVH: My good friends-the band-suggested that I stop for awhile. I didn't because I wasn't looking forward to the withdrawals, because I had tried to quit before. Finally we all got together at Ed Lefler's house and they asked me how I'd like to go to a place in the sun with a golf course and swimming p∞l for a month. They told me I could be alone. I knew what was going on. I finally said, "sure, I'll go" and it turns out they meant Betty Ford. There's no golf course and you can only use the pool one hour a week. Your wife can only come once a week, just to make sure you still know each other. I did it. I didn't want to end up like John Bonham who died at 32 or Keith Moon, who also died in his early 30's. My Dad managed to make it to sixty, but I didn't want to end up like that either. SR: Didn't your dad ask you to stop?

AVH: Yes. I don't remember it, but Ed says he did.

I remember my Dad asking me not to smoke anymore.

SR: 5150 was the beginning of your new vitality. AVH: 5150 was the first record I ever played on sober. Actually, I don't look upon it as being sober or drunk. It's just an imbalance in your system. When you put anything into your system that temporarily makes you feel good, there's something wrong. I got to a point where I wanted to know if I loved copping a buzz and playing drums or if I just loved playing drums. That was the scariest thing of all. But I found out that I love playing drums.

SR: As for the what's to come, you're on a roll

with numbered albums.

AVH: Believe it or not the numbers are coincidence. 1984 started at the ideal time. It's not original, in fact it's hokey. By flipping it around two times it was a play on a play. 5150 was not only where we recorded that album, but it was the whole feeling and excitement. 5150 something to be screamed about after a show or something—it was catchy.

SR: Did you have fun recording OU812?

AVH: The last two have been different. Every record has a character of its own. 5150 was almost as if we had walked out and recorded it live. It just went BAM! There it was. On OU812 we took more time, and not only in the recording process. It was really a test to see if if wasn't the infatuation of being fresh together that made it work,

SR: When Sammy joined the band were you sure everyone would accept him?

AVH: To be honest we really didn't care. The bottom line is— and this holds true to all art,—if you don't please yourself first, if you just do something to please the audience, then you're selling a product. We're musicians not salesmen, and there is a difference. I know this is going to sound snotty, but we want to be happy first, and if it's good and people accept our work then it's a bonus. It's like my Dad. He played because he loved it—whether it was playing in a club or recording in Harlem. To him, music was music, and that was what kept him going.

SR: "Finish What Ya Started" is one of your best videos. How do you feel about that side of your career?

AVH: The song was so unusual —it was a little bit sideways— that's the only way I can describe it—off center. We figured we would let someone else take control. The director told us that we weren't going to understand what we were doing, so we did what we were told. I like the way it turned out. It's clean and totally opposite of what people expect from us.

SR: Where will you be in ten years?

AVH: I'd like to take it day by day. The ultimate goal of a musician is to get better, and hopefully share that with someone else. I learned a lot of things from Bonham, Ginger Baker, and Keith Moon. So, I hope I can do something that someone else can learn from. I feel that life has a certain flow to it. I wouldn't call it destiny because you can change that. In ten years I'll still be playing music.
