

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



KVRE? KRVE?

When Album/Alternative station KVRE-Santa Rosa, CA was sold last year and the call letters changed to KXFX ("The Fox"), some of the old KVRE staff was lucky enough to find another Santa Rosa station (KPLS) that was ready to change over to an Album/Alternative format. Even better, the station filed for the old KVRE call letters, and were granted their use by the FCC. So, this past February KPLS became KVRE and everybody seemed happy. Everybody, that is, except the owners of KXFX, which used to be KVRE. Remember?

"KXFX has been trying to sue to keep us from using their old call letters," said MD Scott Murray. "The day before we went on the air back in February as KVRE the judge denied their request."

KVRE cruised along happily as KVRE, sounding much like the old KVRE and keeping their fans happy. But, unfortunately, the story doesn't have a happy ending. "They kept pushing and last week got another judge to issue a court injunction to keep us from using them (the KVRE calls) 'til the appeal hearing in September," said Murray. "We've gotten new letters, and we'll be on with them tomorrow." The station's new alphabetical equation? KRVE.

The new KRVE's lawyers are discussing the situation, and will soon decide whether or not to push for the old calls. Meanwhile Murray just received an order of 5,000 KVRE bumper stickers, and is doing a big on air push for listeners to "get your limited edition, soon-to-be-illegal KVRE bumper stickers." He's getting great response, and even sees some good in all of the hassle. "We've been on the front page of the local paper three times in the past two months," he said good naturedly.

According to KXFX GM Jim Kefford, "we own the mark, and the court upheld the state mark. The state jurisdiction has more power than the FCC." Kefford also indicated that he hopes the legal action is over

TWO NEW AT ELEKTRA

Elektra Records' Senior Vice President of Promotion Brad Hunt has announced that Lesley Doyle has joined the label as National Director of Dance Music, and Maureen Guinan has been named Manager of Top 40 Promotion. Doyle comes to the label from A&M where she held a similar position. Guinan worked at Arista from 1985-88 as a Top 40 promotion coordinator.

WFXC GOES UP, THEN DOWN

The good news at Urban Station WFXC-Durham is that the station's 12+ Arbitron numbers rose animpressive four points—from 5.5 to 9.2. After the departure of former PD Wayne Walker, who left for WLNV-Greenville, interim PD Hozie Mack tightened the music, instituted some ear-catching promo-

tions and as a result brought the station to an Arbitron high.

The mediocre news is that on Friday (May 5) Mother Nature tried to bring the house down. "Atabout7:22 my EBS alert came on and I received a tornado warning," said Mack. "I broadcast a message and the power blinked twice. The second time, the station stayed off the air."

Since the front of the building in which WFXC is housed is all glass, the evening staff huddled ("as in football," said Mack) in the building's center hallway. Parts of the ceiling fell in, things were thrown about, but no one was hurt.

"Our engineers got us back on at 1AM," reports Mack, "and we're still broadcasting from the transmitter. Our microwave tower was bent all the way down to the ground. We expect to be back in our studios by the end of the week."





INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

As they do each year around this time of year, broadcasters from all corners of the globe descended upon Las Vegas last week for the first of two annual NAB conventions. Television gets the lion's share of attention at the Spring gathering—not surprising when you consider that, as Jhan Hiber informed me, a mere 1600 radio registrants were among the 47,000 in attendance. NAB President Eddie Fritts unveiled plans for a "Free TV Task Force" campaign. Walter Cronkite has been drafted to act as spokesperson for this effort which one TV critic termed "cautioning Americans about the evils of pay television." In the early Sixties debate raged about whether or not the public would pay to see movies, sporting events and other specialty programming on TV. At the same time a lot of folks were voicing serious doubts about the commercial viability of FM radio. Much like the AM Top 40 powerhouses of the '50s, '60s and '70s who cornered the market with one or two competitors, at most, until FM became a factor, the three major networks pretty much owned the national TV landscape until cable came to town. Radio programmers had to learn to live with and combat audience fragmentation in new and ingenious ways. Few people, if any, under 25 remembers listening to music on AM. Similarly, more and more of us have only vague memories of a world without cable and subscription TV. Wisely the FCC deregulated the broadcast industry during the Eighties, removing outdated restrictions and costly time consuming red tape. Ask programmers in Canada how they feel about the Canadian Contentrules that hampered FM radio's competitiveness in their country. Fragmentation has arrived at television's door as it did to radio's over a decade ago. But even though more are lining up for a slice of the audience pie, plenty of big chunks are available. Regulation can't and shouldn't attempt to hinder the choices available. In the free enterprise system it's survival of the fittest.

Two months ago JIMMY HARNEN with SYNCH became the RECORD TO WATCH and this week it holds onto number one at 100KHI Ocean City and moves into the top slot at KCIL 4-1, WQUT 2-1, KEWB 2-1 and KWYR 4-1. HIT FACTOR is up from 52% to 70% with top twenty conversions at WTIC/FM 26-18, EAGLE106 23-17, BAM99 30-16, Z103 24-18, WJJH 22-17, KOKZ 28-19, Z104.5 23-16, etc.

Request activity is excellent on MILLI VANILLI who is number one on the phones for Rob Taylor at WZLS Valdosta, GA where it climbs 34-24. Moves into the top twenty at B94 Pittsburgh 23-18, WSPK Poughkeepsie 22-18, 102QQ Saratoga Springs/Albany 23-

ven casual observers of the music business have noted the sudden dis appearance of vinyl at the retail level. The advent and now dominance of cassettes and compact discs have radically changed the face of music in the civilized world.

It's reasonable to assume that most retailers will have stopped selling vinyl singles and albums in the next couple of years. Many retailers will choose to only carry compact discs and selected cassettes. Consumer demand made them do it. And if you haven't noticed, the audiophile is back buying prerecorded music again.

Alienated by sloppy attention to detail, quality in manufacturing and inconsistent musicianship as recently as a decade ago, the post-adolescent patrons of recorded music lost confidence in the hard ware and software of music. A few from the previous avant garde generation were burned by the "Hula Hoop" of music hardware, the Quad system; even more patrons of the art bought into the ridiculous configuration known as the eighttrack. A Grand Canyon of erosion in credibil-

ity between consumer and the business of

musicdeveloped.

But in the early years of this decade we began to hear of and becameearwitness to the compact disc and its spectacular ability to re-

produce first generation, studio quality music. Through even the most modest playback systems, digital discs improved intended quality and eliminated obtrusive flaws inherent in flawed vinyl. Gone was the friction created by a diamond point cutting through a microscopic groove; gone was the inevitable boulder of dust; gone was the rumble of a two bit tone arm trying to hold an imperfectly cut spiral. (There was a time, not too long ago, when I could find 25% of all singles pressed at least an eighth of an inch off-center.)

Thanks to two offshore companies, Sony in Japan and Phillips in Europe, the hardware (the playback unit) and software (the disc) took shape and a legitimate revolution began. The technology to record in a digital configuration actually preceded the disc and playback unit. If I'm not mistaken, Ry Cooder was the first popular musician to record digitally, though the original intent was to master the end result to vinyl and tape.

From almost the first day, the compact disc demand far exceeded production capacity. American record companies and unit manu-

but they're down to a respectable, affordable \$12-\$14 level.



The compact disc is only about six years old in the consumer marketplace, yet the disc already accounts for about a third of the consumer's dollar spent on all configurations of pre-recorded music. More than \$2 billion was spent on CDs in 1988—hearly four times the money spent on vinyl a bums.

Many qualityconscious radio stations in America now boast that they ONLY play compact discs. Yet other stations, hard as it may be to believe, haven't yet made the nominal investment in equipment to augment their turntable/ vinyl operation withcompactdisc

Not only is it a short-sighted management error a decision to avoid such technology in the future could force a station out of the contemporary music and a altogether. Several major record companies are discontinuing vinyls ngle service to radio. It's simply economically impractical to provide multiple copies of vinyl singles to tho usands of radio stations when one CD single will last five years or more

The commercial vinyl single is also about to die. For the first time in more than fifteen years, dollar volume spent on vinyl singles has fallen below the \$200 million level. Cassingles ard CD singles have come from nowhere to register \$67 million in less than two years.


It may surprese you to learn that in 1988 more than half the money spent

by consumers on pre-recorded music went to cassettes of entire albums. But at its current rate of growth (47% last year), the CD will have replaced the cassette as the format of choice by the end of 1990. The CD's portability, programmability, indestructability and technical excellence will win out even if the CD remains 50% more expensive than the cassette.



facturers were slow to respond. As was the case with VCRs, the Japanese took advantage of the "sleeping giant" and were soon saturating the American marketplace with playback units while nearly all the earliest discs themselves were being imported from Germany and Japan. It took three or four years for domestic disc manufacturing to come close to meeting production demand.

With sets in place and catalogue now duplicated in sufficient quantities, prices for adequate playback units have dropped from \$1,000 or more to under \$200. Prices for the discs themselves haven't yet dropped as much,

aving literally grown up before the eyes of America, Donny Osmond has to reach deep into his memory to recall a time when he wasn't on stage. Together with his brothers he first came into our living room in the mid-sixties via TV and "The Andy Williams Show." By his early teens, following a string of hits as part of The Osmonds, he was ready to step out solo. Part of that role was cast in what became more than just a song title, "Sweet And Innocent," his first hit single early in the summer of 1971. I'll never forget the listener hysteria surrounding a phoner I did with him on his sixteenth birthday. Callers deluged the station's switchboard for days. Many of those kids are now parents.

olstered by his terrific sense of humor and genuine warmth, Donny was undaunted by the difficult task of convincing skeptical music and radio decision makers about his contemporary viability as an artist. A meeting with Peter Gabriel in '87 turned out to be a fateful one. It led to a new album that includes his first top ten single in more than a decade. Joined by some of the world's top players, Donny's been able to forge a sound that he truly feels reflects his musical persona. Talking to us recently from Southern California, he was upbeat and grateful to those who've been helping him battle his way back to the forefront of popular music.

DAVE SHOLIN: Welcome back, Donny.

DONNY OSMOND: Thanks, it feels good. It's been ten years since I've been on the charts. DS: There are a lot of fans out there that are really happy to have you back. How old were you at your first public appearance and what do you remember about it?

DO: Five—I was five years old. It was an "Andy Williams Show" and I sat on his knee singing "You Are My Sunshine." Then there was a live show at the old McCormick place that burnt down in Chicago. I just went on, did my gig, got off. I rehearsed over and over again what I was going to do (it was just one little number), but I do vaguely remember vast amounts of people; of course, when you're five years old, ten people are a lot of people. I remember the applause and having to come out and keep taking bows.

DS: You performed with your brothers for quite awhile and then made the decision to break away and become a solo act. How did that come about?

DO: Rick Hall, who was producing us at the time, made the suggestion. Until I was seven or eight I was the novelty of the act. I'd perform with my brothers, then leave and they'd finish the show. Then I became a full-fledged member of the band. So, I was always singled out. When we did our first album called, *The Osmonds*, I did a song called "Sweet And Innocent." That song was not only on that album, but was my first single and on my first solo album—so I think it was just a natural progression.

DS: In those younger years, did you comprehend what an accomplishment it was, to not only score those hit records, but go all the way to #1?

DO: I had no idea, Dave. I really didn't. I was working my butt off, so nobody could ever point fingers at me and say, "You didn't work for it." I certainly paid my dues, starting at five and finally about thirteen, fourteen—going #1 with "One Bad Apple." Everything was happening so fast I couldn't really appreciate it.

DS: You did a lot of covers (remakes) in those days. Did you have any input choosing those songs?

DO: No. They just handed me the music and said "This is it."

DS: Did they play you the originals?

DO: A couple of times—I remember "Too Young"—I think Nat King Cole did it and I remember hearing that version FIVE minutes before I did mine—that was the first time I heard the song. A lot of those were just first and second takes, too. It was "Wham! Bam! Thank You, Ma'am." We spent a lot more time on The Osmonds' albums.

DS: Yours and Marie's television show lasted four seasons. How did it evolve?

DO: Well, back when I was about fourteen—The Osmonds were headlining at Caesar's Palace—Marie sang the Roberta Flack and Donny Hathaway song, "Where is The Love?" with me. I was already being singled out and with Marie having the novelty of being the only sister, it was natural to pair us up. From there, we co-hosted some "Mike Douglas Shows" and that's where Freddie Silverman from ABC saw us and said, "Got a great idea." I remember the day, Dave, when they came to me—it was actually Marie who broke

the news and said, "We're going to be doing a television show together." And IMMEDIATELY I thought, "This is going to kill a record career." It really hurts it unless, you go through other means—for instance, Cher went through the film industry and that is what got the record career going again. Glen Campbell is a great example—FABULO JS voice, talented, he's got chops for days but once again, TV hurt his recording career. Andy Williams is another good example I'm very lucky to have happen what's happening now.

DS: I'm sure luck enters into it but it's also talent and your desire...

DO: I'm glad you picked up on that because when you have a potential hit record, a lot of people just seem to think of the success and not the work that went on behind the scenes—and for the last ten years I've been beating the doors down recording and demo-ing, showing people that I'm not just some pop teen star that happened in the '70s.

DS: ...maybe it makes the reward that much sweeter.

DO: It does. I remember ten years ago working with David Foster and Jay Graydon—

matter of fact, we cult a whole album together. I was planning to be the lead singer of a band with the three of us—called Airplay. They came out with an album a long time ago that featured the Earth, Wind and Fire song, "After The Love" as Gone." Airplay recorded it before Earth, Wind and Fire did. DS: What were the positives and negatives of being a teen idol?

DO: I do have to say the when we were on stage—that's when it was great. I don't have a lot of bad things to ay about the '70s because it was very exciting—let's face it. I don't know if I really want that right now because music is much more important than hysteria; but I'll admit it was exciting going to Knotts' Berry Farm recently with Hollywood Hamilton of KIIS/FM and I was unbelievable! It was like the '70s all over again—young teenagers screaming.

DS: Was there a tough part of that transition from teen idol to adulth od in showbiz?

DO: Well, I think I was a victim of what we all go through. Dave—we all go through a self-denial process of what we used to do in our early teens. An eighteer admit to some things he used to do at four-teen—and I was victimited by that natural instinct. I look back at same of the records I


did and they were awfully sugary sweet and saccharine, but that's what was sung at the time and some of it was great. Nevertheless, we still go through that self-denial process. As a matter of fact, going to these listening parties across the country and having twenty-five year olds come up to me with old albums saying, "Can you sign this—it's been sitting in my closet for all these years?!" Do you think they would admit to that five years ago? NO WAY!

DS: Do you ever wonder what it would've been like to grow up without all the adulation and just been an everyday kid?

DO: Absolutely. As a matter of fact I wrote a song on the album about that. It's called "Only Heaven Knows," which is actually written about living life vicariously through my kids—you know, Scouting, Little League and all that kind of stuff. I'm basically living my other childhood I wish I had had through them today.

DS: How many children do you have and are you encouraging or discouraging them from show business?

DO: I have three boys—four, seven and nine. I try to isolate them from entertainment as much as I can right now because I've seen too many "star" kids get messed up by it, or get into it because they think their parents have expectations that they've got to follow the same footsteps. I'm definitely not pushing it. I think the likelihood of them doing something in this business is pretty good because of the exposure they will have as they grow up. If they choose to go into the business seriously, then they have every bit of support from me.

DS: Your newest album is a real departure from the Donny Osmond we're familiar with. Who has influenced you musically over the years?

DO: I go the spectrum. I love to put on a Keith Jarrett CD and I really like Chick Corea a lot,

but I guess my roots are R&B because after listening to those Andy Williams albums I moved into Stevie Wonder, who became my hero and the one that's influenced me more than anybody. Plus, there's some records out right now that I really like—the new Jody Watley and Roachford's stuff. I'm also a big Tower Of Power fan. I can't remember the name of the album, but they had a GREAT song called, "You Gotta Funkify."

I admire Prince—he just keeps pumping them out. The problem with a lot of today's bands is they get one great song and become "one-hit wonders."

DS: A lot of programmers have discussed the current crop of one or two hit artists.

DO: Well, it's difficult nowadays because there's so much more competition. I mean, you're up there and you're down-you're not on the charts as long as you used to be in the '70s. There's a lot of pressure on an artist to make sure they keep pumping it out AND there's a fine line if you overdo it. You can burn yourself out with the public, but if you stay away too long, they forget about you. DS: When you recorded this album, was that in the back of your mind, "I'm going to go in and let people know exactly what Donny Osmond is about today, and their image of who I am and what kind of music I do may be totally different, but I'm going to go in and show them I can do something else..." It sounds like your new album is a reflection of your varied musical tastes.

DO: Well, it took me years to feel good with the direction I wanted to go in. I went in knowing exactly how I wanted to sing and

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how I wanted to come across. Now, an interesting thing about my career is that I've done so many different styles of music that I could put an album together from Take 6 to Def Leppard—are you familiar with Take 6 stuff? (DS: Yes.)—but I don't think that would be a smart thing to do, so what I did was put enough variety on the album from "Sacred Emotion," which is almost Gospel to "Soldier Of Love," which in my opinion is pure Pop to "Faces In The Mirror," which is Funk, but not trying to be such a mix 'n match album—a smorgasbord album that people are confused as to, "What is he?"

DS: You couldn't describe it as a concept album

DO: No, definitely not.

DS: "Soldier Of Love" was a song that radio really forced out as a single even before its U.S. release.

DO: Well, Lou Simon (former KCPX-Salt Lake City PD) was the very first person who played it back in August and he told me then it was going to be a smash. He told other people and they laughed at him. I've gotten to know him pretty well over these past few months and he said, "People are laughing, but I'm going to have the last laugh over this one." Then, Jessica Ettinger at WPLJ picked up on it. three or four months ago. She played it and didn't tell anybody who it was. Then I believe Guy Zapoleon and the Nationwide chain among many others got the ball rolling. But the very first programmer to play my new music, even before "Soldier" was recorded. was Sunny Joe White who played "Groove" at KISS 108 in Boston early last year.

DS: At this point the record was only an import on Virgin Records in England.

DO: Right, same way the Roxette thing happened. An import was brought in and there was no record deal here in the States.

DS: What was the reaction from the labels? DO: They passed—they were afraid of the image—they were afraid that radio wouldn't want it and felt it was a crap shoot to get Donny Osmond on the air, which was a reality. I mean, let's face the fact that it was dangerous for anybody to go on the radio and play a Donny Osmond record because of past images, but it took several gutsy people that had the balls to play it and it took off from there. Then Jessica Ettinger told us to send John Fagot at Capitol a copy. Evan Rogers and Carl Sturken, my producers, are signed to Capitol and they'd been talking to John all along about this and he's had some great things to say about it. When he got a copy of the CD import, he went up to David Berman's office and said, "Do you hear three singles on this thing like I do?" Berman listened to it and said, "Get that guy on the label as quickly as

possible." We were talking with several companies at the time, but as soon as I saw the enthusiasm of Fagot and Berman, that convinced me to go with Capitol. They're on an upswing right now and I'm glad to be be part of it

DS: Do you think people are listening to the music and hearing what's in the grooves rather than being over-concerned with image? Maybe this is a lesson for everybody—when a record is there and the song is in the grooves the public's going to respond to it.

DO: I'm starting to see some things happen at radio—they're getting more aggressive. Roxette and Sheriff are good examples. They're playing it because it's good music, not because of a promotional campaign. You have to promote like crazy, but they're playing it because there's response and people like the music. Times are changing now and people are starting to listen to the music a little bit more; image is important, granted, but I think it's become secondary or equal to the music rather than foremost.

DS: How did you discover "Soldier Of Love?"
DO: It sat on my desk for three weeks—I get a ton of tapes and it just sat on my desk. A friend of mine turned me onto Carl Sturken and Evan Rogers and they sent me a tape. I was just sitting here thinking, "What am I going to do to finish up this album?" because we had recorded some things at Peter Gabriel's studio with George Acogny. I put "Soldier" in the cassette machine one day and I immediately called my friend up over at Virgin, Gemma Corfield, who's got ears for days..."Yes, I gotta have this—let's do it." I hate to oversimplify it, but that's about what happened.

DS: A lot of PD's and MD's are raving about "Sacred Emotion."

DO: I didn't want to come out with something similar to "Soldier Of Love" and "Sacred Emotion" leans in a Soul/Gospel direction.

DS: The writers, players and producers on your album read like a "Who's Who?" of people in music.

DO: They're key to the project. George Acogny did some great musical songs on the album. I wanted the musical quality of an album like Donald Fagen's Nightfly. I wanted sophisticated musicians like Michael Brecker, Darrell Jones and Manu Katche. Funny story about Michael Brecker. When George and I were over in Bath, England recording we started listening to some music. He put on the Brecker CD and I said, "We gotta have this guy on the album!" George knows Michael and he called him up and said, "Hey Michael, I'm cutting this artist that Peter Gabriel turned me onto and I'd like you to fly over here and cut some of the stuff on the album." Michael

says, "Oh, great—well, who are you cutting?" George replies, "Donny Osmond," Then there's that long pause on the phone (laughs). Michael says, "You want me to play on WHOSE album?!?" (laughs) George goes, "Look, I want you to fly over here—it's a free trip, free vacation—whatever you want to do—if you don't like the music fly home—simple as that." Well, he flew over and listened to some of the stuff we were cutting and ended up canceling some of his own sessions and postponing a bit of his album to finish up what we wanted him to do on the album because he liked the music. When we were in New York, Peter told me, "If your music is strong, then there's no stopping you. Forget about all this image stuff that people are talking about." As a matter of fact, on the album, I put just below all the credits a little statement that says, "Perception versus reality is deceiving."

DS: Tell me about the photo of you and Billy Idol. Are the two of you planning a tour?

DO: (Laughing) It's ambeing. I went to this ASCAP party and Billy was there and one of the photographers said. "Hey, Billy—Donny, let me get a shot." Billy thought it was kind of fun because he didn't know what I was doing at the time, so he made a face and I made a face and the shot circulated all over the place. Once again, the perception of people. Here's Donny Osmond with Billy Idol—oil and water, right?

DS: What made you decide to move to Southern California in 1985?

DO: Here again, the perception of me is Utah, but I was basically raised in the San Fernando Valley—and then moved to Westwood. I moved back to Utah when I was seventeen but I've lived most of my lie here in California. DS: Years ago we did an on-air interview and you were really into electronics. Do you still like to tinker ground?

DO: Very much so—and i'm glad I was in the past because it's enabled me to stay on top of what's going on. It advances so fast and my schedule makes that difficult these days. The next piece of gear I want to get is a Synclavier. The whole digital scene is just amazina.

DS: How do you really ant people to perceive Donny Osmond to day and in the '90s? DO: Hard worker with am azing chops (laughs). The reason I put hard worker in there is because you have to work your product and I'm working hard—that's why I'm traveling so much, I want to meet all these program directors—I want to get to know them because I want to hear their response. I don't want to second guess them. They've embraced this project—they've helped me out tremendously. They've all taken some chances and thank goodness it's wo king.

P.D. NOTEBOOK

WHO FRAMED THE MAILBAG?

We'll dedicate that column headline to Bob Hoskins, star of "Who Framed Roger Rabbit." We feel that he delivered one of the most remarkable and demanding acting performances in the history of cinema, playing opposite a costar he never saw in virtually every scene of the movie; doing all his own stunts; and speaking with an American accent" so well that nobody could tell he was British until he spoke with his natural accent in television interviews—and he never even got an Oscar nomination!

Well, that's as sidetracked as we've ever gotten in the 10-1/2 years of writing this column. Now we'll behave and get back to

the letters we've received.

This one comes from Steve Dylan, Program Director of KGKL AM/FM in San Angelo, Texas, who writes:

"It seems that about every two years, an article will appear in one or more trade magazines regarding the lack of experienced minority talent. Usually, the articles are referring specifically to Blacks. If not actually written by them, these articles often have supporting comments from well-known Urban P.D.'s and G.M.'s.

"Some of these comments are: 'There just isn't any well-trained, experienced talent out there'...'I would love to find air talent with the basic skills, and train them to work in my market'...'What radio needs is some fresh, creative, new air talent,

but it's just not there.'

"Well, I'd like to say that the talent <u>is</u> out there. The problem I see is not a lack of fresh talent, but rather a lack of these programmers giving it a chance! I have sent out letters, resumes, airchecks, and made hundreds of dollars worth of phone calls to medium and major market programmers, with virtually no response. Now, I don't claim to be the best air talent in America, but I certainly have all the basic skills, plus experience in virtually every aspect of radio that one encounters in any size market. I've read where these top programmers believe there should be some type of 'farm system' in which talent can train in the 'minors' before moving to the 'major leagues.' Is this not what air talent is doing when they work in Hiawatha, Kansas and in Yankton, South Dakota radio stations?

"I have worked in numerous small-to-medium markets, often being the only Black air talent. Likewise, I have worked in markets in which I was the only Black P.D. for miles around. In my present market, I am the only Black person among any of the ten radio stations. The nearest Urban stations are 200 and 250 miles away—[surely not too far for a programmer to at least ask me to interview]. I should mention that I have programmed, mostly, country music stations...but I

have also programmed, and worked on-air, at Album, Top 40, A/C and MOR-formatted stations. In addition I have been Music Director in all these formats, plus Spanish! Some would call that versatility. And I have accomplished all this in the 6-1/2 years since I entered broadcasting. I have always thrived on, rather than having been intimidated by, a challenge.

"So, major market programmers, the next time you get an aircheck or resume (or even a phone call) from some air talent in some little-known town whose name you have never heard of, take the time to give that tape a listen, or that guy or

gal a few minutes of conversation. Who knows—you might just find that 'diamond in the rough!'

"In conclusion, and in fairness to the big markets, just let me say that I realize that in many instances they have to go with a 'sure thing' and don't have the time to bring talent along. but I also believe that many big market programmers would be surprised at how helping a broadcast newcomer break a few bad habits would leave them with an air talent already well on the way to realizing their potential."

The purpose of this column is not to help individuals find jobs, but I think Steve makes a couple of very thought-provoking points.

In addition, I think a couple more inferences can be drawn from his letter. One, which I've mentioned rather pointedly before, is that there is just no justification at all, in my opinion, for a lack of common politeness. If you receive an application in response to a trade notice of an opening, you must review all the applications, and respond to all of them. The fact that nobody will penalize you for not doing so is no excuse for ignoring this common courtesy. And if you receive an unsolicited application-do the same anyway. (After all, you don't get the quantity of unsolicited applications that you do when you advertise an opening.) And you get extra bonus points from me if you return the tape, too, instead of tossing it into the production room for reuse! (Even the smallest station can afford the postage to do this, in my experience.) It's common courtesy-but also, as Steve points out quite accurately, that's how bright new talent is found. You aren't going to find it among the applications you get from "heavyweights" of the business—and the bright new talent is there, and always has been. I've programmed, and received applications, for 21 years, large markets and small, and I can state that as a fact.

Second, Steve seems to dispute what most of us in the industry, I think, had assumed to be a truth: the E.O.E. laws would naturally assist a talented minority, even over other qualified applicants. Although when programming I have received relatively few applications from minorities (with the exception of women, in recent years, and I have a hard time considering a majority of the population a "minority!"), I have encountered some superbly talented beginners who also are members of minority groups.

Could the presumed "preference" in the law be working against talented minority broadcasters in the same way the Canadian Content rule hurt Canadian music's chances in the U.S. after it was implemented ("hey, that record got where it is on the Canadian charts because of a quota, not because it's really a hit")...???

I think everybody in the business might do well to mull *that* question over.

Certainly, though I haven't heard his work, Steve's resume should be sufficient to get him more attention from broadcasters than apparently he has gotten. Or so it seems to me. Forget E.O.E. I'm talking about ability.







ast Halloween, a special day of celebration took place in the major metropolis of Okmulgee, Oklahoma. Hometown boy Mel McDaniel was honored for 30 years in Country Music with a day fit for a king. U.S. Senator David Boren entered McDaniel into the congressional record for his lifetime achievements, while Oklahoma State Senator John Dahl presented McDaniel with a proclamation declaring October 31st "Mel McDaniel Day." Okmulgee's Mayor Mabrey gave McDaniel a key to the city, while Chief Cox of the Oklahoma Creek Indian Nation proclaimed McDaniel an honorary chief.

"It was a wonderful day," mused McDaniel. "It brought back a lot of memories of the first time I got on stage there, on Halloween night, 1958. It was on the back of a flatbed truck, and I sang, "I Wanna Play House With You." I've always gotten tons of support from the people of Oklahoma, and I just wanted to do something nice for the people there. The proceeds of the 30th Anniversary Celebration concert benefitted Okmulgee's United Fund, which included many local and area charities. I hope we can make it an annual event, so I can go back home every year!"

That day brought back more than a few memories for McDaniel. He was born in Okmulgee but spent his formative years being shuttled between divorced parents. His Mom lived in Bakersfield and his Dad was a road construction truck driver. "I guess during all the trips between California and Oklahoma in the back of an old Ford I had nothing to do so I just sang a lot," he remembers. As he got older he started to develop definite tastes in music. "When I was about 14, Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis and Chuck Berry came out on the radio. It excited me because I saw these people making music that listeners really liked and got into. Those guys were my heroes along with Fats Domino and The Platters—all those guys from back then. That's when I decided that's what I wanted to do, to make music that people really liked."

At 19, Mel married his high school sweetheart, Mary, and soon thereafter their daughter Danielle was born. While his love for

music never waivered, his responsibilities to family took precedence for awhile. "I pumped gas and did everything I could. Having a family and all, I had to do something to keep food on the table. Eventually, this company I was with transferred me to Houston. As me and my brother were on our way to pick up a U-Haul truck to move with, my brother said

to me, 'Man, I don't know why you're going down there. You know where you really want to be is Nashville. Why don't you just go there?' I went back home and told Mary, 'We're not going to Houston, we're going to Nashville.' So we loaded up the U-Haul and headed for Nashville—this was back in 1970."

The McDaniel family remained in Nashville for two years, with Mel pumping gas and trying to get a foct in the door of Music Row. "Nothing panned out," Mel remembers. "I just didn't have the experience at the time." Frustrated, Mel took his family and headed for Alaska, where his brother and father were living. "I dred all the way out of Nashville. Damn, I didn't want to leave. It had taken me so long to getthere. It was one of the hardest things I ever dd, but I guess it was also one of the best things, because people were great to us up in Alaska." Mel quickly landed a job singing sonights a week at the Kings X Lounge. He gained a lot of confidence and experience there, enough to consider giving Music City a second chance. They moved back to Nashville in 1973. This time, McDaniel met up with Combine Music founder Bob Beckham. I told Bob that if they ever needed anyone to sing on demos, to give mea shot at it. He said, Let's give the boy a try and see what he can do.' So I started doing demos for the publishing places in town. Finally, in '76, we cut Have A Dream On Me. Capitol accepted it, signed me to a contract, and I've been with them ever since." Mel's lifelong dream was on i s way to coming true. What followed was a string of hits including, "Hello Daddy, Good Morning Darling,"
"Countrified," "Right in The Palm Of Your Hand," "Take Me To The Country," and "Big Ole Brew."

Then, in 1985, Mel's career skyrocketed with a simple record about blue jeans called "Baby's Got Her Blue Jeans On." "I never dreamed that would the one," says Mel. "Of course, you believe in every record you put out and want the best for it. You want it to be a number one record. I never dreamed it would come for me on Blue Jeans, but people really took to it."



That's an understatement. The song not only became his first number one record, it also garnered three Country Music Association Award nominations, an induction into the Country Music Hall of Fame's "Walkway Of Stars", two Grammy Award nominations and membership in the cast of the Grand Ole Opry.

Since "Blue Jeans," Mel's career has remained sure and steady." There have been other hits, including "Stand Up," "Let It Roll," "Shoe String" a rockin' Country version of Springsteen's "Stand On It," and his "Real Good Feel Good Song." His videos have proven to be very popular, with "Stand Up" becoming the most requested video on TNN for the '85-'86 year. He's had quite a bit of luck with songwriting, too. Hoyt Axton was the first to ever record Mel's song, "Roll Your Own," later recorded by Commander Cody and Arlo Guthrie. Kenny Rogers recorded his "Goodbye Marie," and Conway Twitty was the first to record his "Grandest Lady Of Them All." the song that became the grand finale on the Grand Ole Opry's nationally televised 60th Anniversary Special.

And don't forget his hats. It's probably the first thing you'll notice when you meet him, and they've become his trademark. "I never grew up wearing a hat," says Mel. "I could never find one that I really liked. Then I saw this short brimmed black hat, the kind that I wear now. I had my picture taken with it, and now it goes everywhere I go." One of his hats recently brought in \$600 at a Nashville celebrity auction for charity.

As McDaniel enters his fourth decade in Country music, we can certailly expect to hear more upbeat, feel good Mel music, because Mel feels pretty good about his life. "I've finally got the band that I've struggled for so long to have. I guess the highlight of my career is having everything where I think it should be. I've tried so long and so hard to get it where I felt it should be. I think I've finally accomplished that."

JAZZ PROFILE

arold Childs is not exactly a rookie who fell off the turnip truck. Before becoming the Vice President of Jazz and Progressive Music at Warner Brothers, he spent sixteen years at A&M in various executive capacities including Senior Vice President of of Sales and Promotion. Then came a stint at PolyGram as Senior Vice President of Urban Promotion, after which came three years as President of Quincy Jones' Qwest Records. What's unique about Harold Childs is that after all that time promoting pop music, he's using his expertise in marketing to anticipate the change in how adults will buy, wear and feel their music in the nineties.

What's the range of music that falls under your jursidiction at Warner Bros?

"The music I deal with can range from David Sanborn to Everything But The Girl to Jackie Mason—all that fits into Warner's progressive area. My responsibility is to create a marketing direction for the promotion department to follow. Outside of the Jazz music, there is usually a record with a sound or a track that could fit into a progressive direction of adult radio, or a station like The Wave. I'm talking about artists like Brian Wilson, Miriam Makeba or even a Paul Simon."

Is Jazz and Adult music more a marketing project or is it a promotional animal?

'As far as Jazz promotion, the way it's developing, it's getting easier to define and plan. You have your different kinds of adult stations, Jazz stations, A/C stations that play Jazz music. Marketing is the problem of convincing the distribution side and the retail side that music shouldn't be limited because of the label of 'Jazz.' It should be dealt with as the adult music of the 1990s. You have to put the same kind of effort into the mechandising and the displays as you would any other popular new adult or progressive music. If you're dealing initially with acts like Basia or Bobby McFerrin, you shouldn't hesitant when it comes to introducing this music. Retail and marketing should be in front of this music. Smell it coming. Feel it coming. Be aggressive with the marketing.

In marketing an artist like Bob James, do you avoid the "J" word?

"Not at all. We don't wish to avoid the "J" word nor the basic issue which is we want retailers to realize that Jazz is not a bad word. This is instrumental adult music. This music fits into cross-formats and cross-areas in retail stores as opposed to being stuffed solely into the Jazz section."

What is Warner Brothers' attitude about the changing face of Jazz and Adult Alternative radio?

"They have a very progressive attitude. We're expanding our department with the

addition of Chris Jonz, who expands our relationship with radio. Plus he will interface with the other departments like Album Radio and Urban/Contemporary whenever the need arises. Thus there's an understanding of how this music will grow in importance once we get into the nineties. That's a very progressive attitude.

Having been at A&M and now Warners, do you see a different between the Jazz boom of the seventies where we heard much of this same rap as opposed to the growth of Jazz and adult music into the nineties?

"There's not that much of a difference. During the late sixties at A&M it was Wes Montgomery. Then acts like Herb Alpert and Sergio Mendes who moved from Jazz to R&B to A/C to Top Forty. We're duplicating that same situation as we go into the ninties. Top Forty radio today no longer has the boundries it had in the early eighties or the late seventies. Top Forty is now able to cherry pick music from all the other formats. So you're going to continue to see records like Kenny G or Basia or Bobby McFerrin hitting Top Forty, whereas six or seven years ago, no matter how large an artist might be in other formats, there would be a reluctance. So I see the same situation happening as we go into the nineties with Jazz and Adult music as what happened in the sixties and early seventies."

You mention boundaries in radio. Do you see Adult Alternative and Jazz maintaining wide boundaries? Some feel that this type of radio can only narrow and focus in the future

"I feel that Adult Alternative has a wealth of music out there to choose from. I think it's

up to publications like Gavin to help bring this music to the fore ront. By adding this latest section, you've helped tremendously. But we haven't reached the maximum. We still have to grow. I have the boundries don't get tighter. But I am starting to sense some changes already. I have we don't get ourselves into a "Breaker" syndrome where it's more important to count stations than to get quality airplay. That is what I'm concerned about. We have to exact the things so we don't fall into the same traps that we've fallen into with other formats of radio."

How come when tob James and David Sanborn record together and sell a million records, the impact is n't as great as when a pop act goes equally platinum?

"When it comes to be press, there's still no real understanding to this marketplace. Plus it takes a longer period of time, hence you don't get that instant click that you get from a pop million seller. David Sanborn and Bob James took a year! But that's a short time when you consider that it was viewed as a Jazz album."

Do you feel that the analogies between Jazz and Adult stations and the progressive stations of the sixties are valid?

"I think that stations like The Wave are becoming the progressive stations of the nineties. I see those stations lending themselves towards playing more Alternative adult cuts, moving from instrumental to maybe a fifty/ fifty or sixty/forty vacal mix during the next eighteen months. If you remember, stations like KSAN in San Francisco twenty to twentyfive years ago were havily into Jazz. It gradually went from Jazz to vocals to blues and rock. That was the beginning of Album Radio. So, during the next two years, I think we'll see more vocals that come from bands out of Europe and new progressive things out of the United States, such as olk music, which is just now starting to raise its head."

After dealing with hit Top Forty and R&B product, what was the biggest adjustment you had to go through working with Jazz music?

"The product I worked at A&M was always a building process. We built Joe Cocker, Captain and Tennille, the Carpenters and the Police. I came from a company that worked things album by album with artists like Joan Armatrading. That's the kind of atmosphere that I'm comfortable in—being in on the beginning. You take one step, two steps—that's the exciting part of being in the record business. So working with Jazz and progressive music was, to me, ust like coming home."



"NOTHING HAS BEEN PROVED" - DUSTY SPRINGFIELD (ENIGMA)

When Scandal, the blockbuster British film about Christine Keeler/John Profumo tryst, hit town you know we were there opening night. Now Enigma has made available on a three track CD the provocative theme that plays through the closing credits. Written and produced by the Pet Shop Boys, the vocals are supplied by the legendary Dusty Springfield complete with customized lyrics based on the film plot. There's also a mentholated instrumental version with an added closing Kenny G-esque solo. As Rain Man and Bagdad Cafe leave cinematic tracks across progressive adult airwaves, this Scandal theme could provide intriguing possibilities. Sensational!

FOLLOW ME - KIMIKO ITOH (COLUMBIA)

In 1985 Kimiko Itoh returned to Japan after spending six months in New York City gigging and absorbing the world center of Jazz and its influences. Soonafter, she hit the road again and began recording with Masahiko Satoh and his indispensable rhythm allies Eddie Gomez and Steve Gadd. True, Follow Me is styled with the same elegant persuasion as Sade, but Itoh's technique is more uptown Americana. Gadd and Gomez continue their association this time around as Eddie's solo on the cover of John Lennon's "Love" ignites a creative boost across the drawn out phrases of Itoh's vocalisms. Kimiko also performs a Bill Gable composition entitled "Intimate Strangers," and her version of "Bridge Over Troubled Water" features Richard Tee on lonely Hammond organ propped up against a lilting orchestral backdrop. There are enough tracks to choose from so that Jazz programmers can avoid the pop edge and still bask in the sophistication of Itoh's message. One tasteful outing.



BOUQUET - PHIL WOODS QUINTET (CONCORD AZZ)

Phil Woods has been Gavin Jazz's most productive artist since we started the chart last July—he's released four individual projects. This latest is live and highlights his fine band which includes trumpet/flugelhorn hero Tom Harrell. "Theme From Star Trek" is a delightful novelty, with Woods kicking off the familiar theme in his typical bright and brassy tone. Harrell answers back sharply on trumpet with a stellar scale run—as always a fine improviser. Many astute fans reckon that Woods' intonation on alto very much resembles a tenor, best shown on Hal Galper's piece "Tune Of The Unknown Samba." Track for track, Bouquet is anything but flowery. Instead its appeal stems (sorry) from a live wire chromatic confrontation between Woods and his seasoned team.

"...MEASURE FOR MEASURE." - THE DICK BAUERLE GROUP (ATLANTIC)


It's time for Another Buffalo, New York talent like Dick Bauerle to pick up where Spyro Gyra, Rick Stauss and Gamalon left off. Bauerle as a guitarist has also co-produced a few projects and his partner, drummer Eli Konikoff spent nine years with Spyro and in that time picked up six Grammy nominations. Bassist Jerry Livingston served with another Buffaloite, Rick James, while saxophonist Sal Andolina has played some serious philharmonic gigs. Tracks like "Esprit," "The Bottom Line" and the title cut offer some snappy potential for commercial Jazz/AA consideration.

<u>URBAN EXPRESS - MICHAL URBANIAK (ATLANTIC)</u>

Michal Urbaniak is one of the original artisans of electric violin technology. Starting on the electric violin and then graduating to the violectra, which is a bit lower in pitch, Urbaniak has, in the past, experimented with modified six string models. Teamed up with drummer and co-producer Lenny White, Michal has added talking violin, Zeta Midiviolin and WX7 to his playing credits. Don't ask us to describe these latest accouterments, but we do like "Moonlight," "I Want To Know Your Name," the title track and "Code Blue." Like Phil Woods, Urbaniak has been very active lately, releasing lots of highly interesting music for Jazz and Adult playlists.




PERPETUAL MOTION - JEFF BEAL (ANTILLES NEW DIRECTION/ISLAND)

Impressively teeing off on "Exit Only" with a symphonic salute, trumpeter Jeff Beal launches into a Spanish march flavored arrangement a la Carla Bley's Central American Ballad Of The Fallen. As a college undergrad, Beal netted eleven downbeat magazine student awards as well as a couple of industry grants (one from Exxonouch!) that have enriched Beal's confidence as a composer. We found the album to be a homage to energies and eras past and future. Like Mark Isham Beal isn't afraid to tonally emulate Master Miles by running the voodoo down in Decoy fashion during in compositions like "Meshugenah Man." Each side features a completely different ensemble, and within each side flow many possible directions of future expertise.

"DOWN ON THE KEYS" / "IN THE NAME OF LOVE" -RICHARD ELLIOT (INTIMA)

These two trax give us a taste of what's to come from tenor man Richard Elliot. First we hear from the instrumental side as Elliot gets down on the keys on "Down On The Keys." On "In The Name Of Love," a friendly voice returns as Bobby Caldwell lays down a smooth vocal. Both Elliot and Caldwell are technicians adding high calibre melodic instincts for AA programmers looking for an edge over their tired A/C competition.



TOURIST IN PARADISE - THE RIPPINGTONS (GRP)

We came aboard the Jazz and AA scene just as the Rippingtons' last effort was winding down a successful run on a new and flourishing mindset of adult radio. Well, almost a year has passed and both AA and the Rippingtons have grown. Tourist In Paradise is also the band's debut on the GRP label. Russ Freeman and Steve Reid provide the nucleus of creativity when it comes to the studio, with support players like Rob Mullins, Brandon Fields and Tony Morales rounding things out. I especially like "One Summer Night In Brazil" not because the song jumps on a Brazilian bandwagon (which it doesn't), but because the textures are agreeable for AA radio. With the Kentucky Derby already run and won, let reput in my two cents worth. Look for the Rippingtons to be one of 1989 biggest AA releases.



DISINTEGRATION - THE CURE (ELEKTRA) Having proven themselves thrice before on the retail front, radio is getting closer and closer to finally taking "the cure." This time we see radio going out of its way to understand the phenomenon. Since Head On The Door, the Cure's most accessible album, the band has been moving more and more to the creative left. Disintegration is a seventy-two minute collection of simple studio collages. Rather than the forceful direction of their early days, the Cure now take an almost hallucinogenic view of melody. Still, there are few bands with a signature sound as identifiable as the Cure. Vocalist Robert Smith's distinguished breathy vocals make it easy for longtime listeners and newfound fans to log on. How special is the occasion of a new Cure album? KROQ made it a Cure weekend. Starter trax include "Fascination Street," "Lullaby" and "Pictures Of You."

"THE WANT OF A NAIL" - TODD RUNDGREN (WARNER BROS.)

As an engineer/producer, Todd Rundgren is mistakenly tagged as a machine specialist. Actually, Rundgren's last few projects, including this one, center on live, spontaneous group performance. On this track, Todd's Philly roots are showing as he squares-off vocally with the great Bobby Womack.

"MY BRAVE FACE" - PAUL McCARTNEY (CAPITOL)


The melody side sounds like all McCartney while the lyrics have a Elvis Costello twist. Rather than verse/chorus/verse/chorus, Paul McCartney's latest single unpeels and unwinds, barely repeating itself, showing a sophisticated style good for morning airplay.

Judging from the outof-the-box strength of songs like the pregnant "Eat For Two," "Please Forgive Us" and "Poison In The Well," 10,000 Maniacs will generate all the enthusiasm of their last album and more, in a fraction of the time. Excellent digital offering!



"DISAPPOINTED" - PUBLIC IMAGE LTD. (VIRGIN)

John Lydon is back with a tighter, anthemic beauty. Awash with guitars and furious energy, "Disappointed" keeps the tempo at even keel. Without the slightest hint of anarchy, PIL maintains a momentum of excellence. Again, we talk about context. Wait until you hear the entire album.



MORE SONGS ABOUT LOVE & HATE -**GODFATHERS** (EPIC)

More songs is right. Godfathers, like the Who and many other rowdy working class bands, personify the inner confusion linked with the fallen UK empire. That confusion is then distilled into the nucleus of a rock n roll song. All you get is a pounding back beat, choppy chords and a pumping bass. But it's real food as trax like "Those Days Are Over," "She Gives Me Love" and "I'm Lost And Then I'm Found" fuel themselves on starkness, both from a musical and a reality standpoint, KZ "WAITING FOR MARY" - PERE UBU

UNBROKEN (UNIVERSAL/MCA)

But number two succeeds wonderfully on many fronts. Though few will have the luxury to bask in the foolhardy carefree beauty of this project on an airplay basis. The appearances of Bruce Hornsby, Levon Helm, John Hiatt, Roger McGuinn, Chris Hillman, Emmylou Harris, Rosanne Cash and the many talented contributors and sidemen make this one of 1989's very best releases. 



ENTERTAINMENT CONGLOMERATE BASED IN THE

NORTHWEST

UB-POP is an independent record labe based in Seattle, WA that's storming the country. It started in 1980 as a magazine called Subterranean Pop, and after a few months Publisher Bruce Pavitt shortened the name to Sub-Pop.

The magazine's initial focus was on Northwest regional bands.

Pavitt gradually expanded from publishing to releasing a series of cassettes. After the magazine's fourth issue, Pavitt and co-founder, promoter Jonathan Poneman began alternating between publishing the fanzine and releasing a series of cassettes. Bruce began hosting a radio show called Sub-Pop USA at noncommercial station KCMU in Seattle, and also wrote a column for Seattle's Rocket magazine which ended up run ing for five years. His column and radio show concentrated on American independent releases.

Through Sub-Pop, Pavitt cultivated national underground connections with Poneman, who already knew the bands. Their first musical venture together was a single by Soundgarden, which came out immediately before their Screaming Life El' From then on "we decided to put every single bit of money we will ever have in our lifetimes into this titanic operation."

Sub-Pop is involved with all their artists from beginning to end. The visual image is as important as the sound, which is hard and grungy. They work with such groups as Tad, The Fluid, Mudhoney and Soundgarden (who were recently signed to A&M). Photographer Charles Peterson, who deals with tradit onal themes in a sensual, and often times sexual sense designs all of Sub-Pop's album jackets. His streaky photos give a sense of electricity and relay brute force or intensity. Using Peterson, who recently did the cover photo for the Buck Pets' release on Island Records, tves Sub-Pop albums cohesiveness and consistency.

"We give the artists advice on how they should present themselves on the record cover," says Poneman. There's alot of classicism in the presentation of rock music and we like to present things artfully, i.e. tactfully. Classic is the best word. Often that has to do with a lot of variables, sexuality, humor, intensity and electricity." Headds, "We allow bands to express themselves more openly. Labels often apply this perverse science and business application to a given artist and will turn band Z from what it is in it's essence to something that is considered to be more marketable. We love to move units and product, but the idea is to create something that we are proud of. And if we are, we will sell a lot of records too."

SUB-POP's continuing strategy is to be a northwest regional label first and foremost. "Our vision is that each are would have it's own particular nuances and favorites," says Ponerran.

MINNEAPOLIS RADIO **CONQUERS THE PRESS** AND OTHER PHENOMENON

by Kent Zimmerman

Have you ever noticed that newspaper writers can sometimes be distanced from the realities of the music industry? As both the radio and record biz fight the blizzard winds of trying to please both mainstream listeners and buyers as well as cutting edge audiences, writers (aside from their own unique pressures) still have the luxury of taking a critical stance when it comes to radio and music. That's why it was so pleasing to receive a reprint of a recent "review" of KTCZ-Minneapolis (whose local handle is Cities' 97) from the St. Paul Pioneer Press Dispatch.

In the article, writer Rick Shefchik admits up front that his auto cassette machine has broken down, "forcing me to turn to local radio to satisfy my auto music needs." What follows is a cautious then glowing overview, and I quote,

"I have always liked the concepts of Cities' 97-album cuts from a broad range of pop groups—but early in the station's existence, I found the execution to be uneven. Specifically I came to expect either the Alan Parsons Project or Steely Dan every time I turned it on. No more. While Steely Dan has been thankfully preserved in more sparing

doses, Mr. Parsons and his Project have all but disappeared, replaced by the widest, deepest and most diversified playlist of any commercial station in town (and probably many other towns as well)."

In the column headlined "Cities 97 Thrives Without Pandering," Shefchik interviews PD Alan Lawson, who explains his station's philosophy using musical examples rather than the quarter hour cume stat talk that usually turns newspaper writers off when

covering the radio beat.

"We really are into artists," Lawson was quoted when mentioning that artist interviews and live impromptu performances spice up KTCZ's approach. "They have been wonderful. I guess the reaction I sense from artists is surprise. It's a bit of a crying shame that that would be their reaction. They're asked so little to come in and talk about their music. A year ago, Wendy Waldman said, 'I couldn't believe it when my management told me you wanted me to bring my guitar

I can't vouch for your local media, but it's mighty tough in my town for Album Radio stations to get positive ink about their programming. Here's an example of a station impressing a hard customer coming in.

Now some good news for the frustrated air talent artiste.

KTCZ has a rare full time afternoon drive opening. Lawson is looking for "applicants with a deep and diverse music knowledge>





spanning from rock to jazz to folk to blues with a personable one-to-one converstational style. Minimum five years experience." I know it sounds too good to be true, but if you're interested, polish up your best stuff and send T&R to Alan at 100 North Sixth St., Butler Square, Minneapolis, MN, 55403. No calls please.

We received lots of good reponse to our three part hard rock and radio series. The most impassioned response came from **Brian Knotts**, PD at **KPGA**-San Luis Obispo who writes,

"I read with great interest part two of your series of articles regarding hard rock. I was appalled to see how prevalent anti-hard rock biases seem to be. 'Led Clones... definitely nights only,' Is anybody listening to these records? I wonder, if we continue to refuse to give young people what they want, who will listen to Album Radio in five or ten years? Many stations—fortunately not mineseem be be run by people only interested in turning a quick profit and getting out, with no regard to the future of the station. If the future of my career is programming Musak for old hippies, I'm not sure this is where my future lies. I still believe the people who aren't afraid to take calculated risks will win."

Speaking of risks, count on Oedipus at WBCN to be the first when it comes to adding rock n roll from the Soviet Union. Jumping the gun a little (the domestic release isn't due until June), 'BCN added red rocker Boris Grebenshikov to their playlist. Produced by Eurythmic Dave Stewart, Grebenshikov's debut at the Bottom Line last month featured daring Dave on lead guitar, as well as a sample of his upcoming Columbia solo album. Back in the USSR, Grebenshikov and his band Aquarium spent ten years underground. With their first official Russian release on Melodia (the state-run label), Boris and Aquarium sold 200,000 in a matter of hours. Besides witnessing an historic United States debut, I was particularly struck by Grebenshikov's complex acoustic side. He melds Eastern folk and rock n roll much the same way our artists draw from a Western folk heritage. Look out for Boris. He's bad enough.





INSIDE ALTERNATIVE RADIO PETER STANDISH

"The Beat(en) Generation" - THE THE (Epic) After a lengthy layoff, Matt Johnson is back. This time he's armed with a shotgun behind the door in the form of Johnny Marr contributing on guitar and harmonica. Johnny Marr's best asset is his ability to add to the sonic quality of a song without demanding the spotlight. Expect this song to grow on you, rather than bonking you over the head like much of Johnson's last album, Infected, did. The advance tape of the full album sounds killer.

Museum - MARY MY HOPE (Silvertone/RCA)

My Hope are hard to peg. On my favorite cut, "Wildman Childman," they take on their thrashing Detroit garage punk persona, while songs like "I'm Not Singing," "Untitled," "Suicide King" and "Communion" are given that 70's treatment complete with acoustic guitar chord progressions and echoed vo-cals. "Grind" finds them downshifting into an industrial traced sound that slowly builds into rapid frenzy.

The Tragically Hip THE TRAGICALLY HIP (MCA)

The Tragically Hip have an Americana flavor all their own — a happy blend of electric and acoustic guitar. In this case Americana extends to North America, since the band is from Ontario, which is not all that different from American heartlands like Wisconsin (home of the BoDeans & Violent Femmes) or Illinois (EIEIO's home base). There's an honest element here that's not often present when high-technology is introduced. Key cuts: "Small Town Bringdown," "Highway Girl" and "Killin' Time."

Bayou Cadillac - BEAUSOLEIL (Rounder) For years Beausoleil has quietly been creating some of the country's best Cajun music. Scoring one of the primary cuts on the "Big Easy" Soundtrack opened a lot of doors for this durable Louisiana band. The group takes that familiar traditional Cajun tact on most of the album. However, cuts like "Flammes D'Enfer," "Macaque Sur Mon Dos" and "Bayou Cadillac: Not Fade Away, Bo Diddley, Iko Iko" represent another stylistic branch in the band's main trunk.

DONNA SUMMER

Another Place And Time (Atlantic)
Donna seems more comfortable in this kind of European production arrangement configuration where echo and Linn drums create wall-to-wall acoustics. With such electric support similar to her early Giorgio Moroder catalogue, Donna rides tight tracksglides confidently and turns potentially mediocresongs into towering, pulsing songs of love. It's one of the best examples I've heard in recent months of a merger between the musical machine age and truly human vocal qualities. Though this all comes to us through the Stock, Aitken, Waterman assembly line (responsible for Rick Astley, Kylie Minogue, etc.) Donna's pure power as a singer gives the songs their heart.

JOHN COUGAR MELLENCAMP Big Daddy (Mercury/PolyGram)

With an album titled Big Daddy and having a huge first hit with a song called POP SINGER, one might assume this to be a rather bodacious and/or arrogant offering. The strut is there, but the lyrical drift is of humble, spiritually impoverished characters—some of whom are drawn from first person experience. POP SINGER is the showpiece of the set-it rocks and bites the hand that feeds it. The fiddle and accordion, prominent instruments in recent JCM music, give a unique anti-urban quality and credibility to words of ever-imploding importance.




