## **GAVIN OFFICES CLOSED JULY 4**

#### GOOD LUCK, PETER 18th ANNUAL POE CONVENTION SETS ATTENDANCE RECORD

In late 1982 and early 1983, when I worked as Music Director at A/ Cstation K-101 here in San Francisco, I'd regularly receive playlists from KUSF, and every once in awhile the station's Program Coordinator, Peter Standish, called to make sure I was getting (and studying!) them. After being satisfied that I got his playlists, and even listened to KUSF occasionally, he'd ask: "Do you like the music?" It was as important to him then, as it is now, that we open ourselves up to modern rock.

After Peter graduated from the University of San Francisco, and KUSF, we lost contact, but luckily this business is a small one and through the Zimmermen and his progress at the Gavin Report, I always knew what he was up to.

Last August, when I began working at the Gavin, Peter and Ieasily resumed our phone-ship, and when we moved to Second Street, we landed in offices next to each other with a picture window in between. The glass was great, because now we could talk and see each other at the same time on our own space-age telephone system. We talked, argued about and eventually solved matters of race, religion, politics and sports, and in between one of us would come up

Networking on the phone was a topic covered at several sessions, and there was also quite a bit of it going on face-to-face at last weekend's Bobby Poe Convention in Tyson's Corner, VA. With nearly 700 Top 40 programmers and record executives in attendance, it was the biggest in the Poe Kat's 18-year history. Alongside Keynote Speaker Larry King, who entertained the gathering with anecdotes about his career, were meetings that gave everyone a chance to discuss the issues facing Top 40 stations around the country. Plenty of attention was placed on the further splintering of the format, with Rock, Dance and Mainstream Top 40's going headto-head in more markets all the

time. On the rock side, KXXR-Kansas City PD Brian Burns proclaimed "AOR is a dead for-mat," and WDFX-Detroit PD Chuck Beck stressed "attitude" as a key factor in onair promotions. Other topics included the trend toward bringing back old releases with a general feeling that it's being overdone; developing a workable system for more stations to exchange information by phone (networking); difficulty with stations wanting performers for track dates at events and on-air artist interviews; improving air talent; sales vs. audience research, and the problem of major releases getting leaked early. Also discussed was the monitoring of stations by trades to reflect actual airplay of songs. Legendary WFIL/WABC personality George Michael made an appearance and inspired the crowd, and taking them to task for lack of relatability and entertainment on radio these days. After coming in second (to KMEL-SFPD Keith Naftaly in 1987 and Q105/Tampa and Pirate Radio's Randy Kabrich in 1988) Q-106-San Diego MD Kevin Weatherly was the big winner of this year's Active Industry Air Competition—the Tenth Annual. For thirty weeks

programmers vote on chart positions of specific records, and after a complicated point system is tabulated, the expert with the most accurate total goes home with a Porsche. Kevin told the Gavin Report that he waiting for the delivery of his 944, and plans to be "cruisin' the freeways this summer!" As a finale, the Awards Banquet began with John Cougar Mellencamp receiving a standing ovation after playing a three-song acoustic set and thanking radio for letting his music be heard. The Gavin salutes all of this year's winners, and sends congratulations to Poe Kat, his wife Ora Mae, son Bobby, Jr. and Bonnie on a wellrun, successful event!

## VIACOM BUYS KASY/AM

Viacom International has agreed to purchase KASY/AM-Auburn/Seattle, WA, and has opted to let the existing KASY staff go, change call letters to KSBG/AM and simulcast with KSBG/FM, which the company already owns. The station will be increase from 10,000 watts to a daytime power of 50,000 watts. Programming changes are already in effect.

"With the addition of an AM station to the already successfully KSBG/FM, Viacom's commitment to the Pacific Northwest continues to strengthen," said Senior Vice President William Figenshu. KASY President Edward Garre sees simulcasting as a way to expose listeners to KSBG's "solid news, public affairs and entertainment programming." Viacom owns and operates five television and eight radio stations.



Bill Berger has joined Arista Records as Executive Vice President. He will oversee Promotion, Sales, Video/Artist Development, Publicity, Creative Services, Manufacturing and Purchasing. Before coming to Arista, Berger was at Island Records for three years and Elektra for eleven.

uring this year's Rock 'N Roll Hall Of Fame induction Lou Reed posed the now well-documented question, "After all who could be hipper than Dion?" There can only be one answer—nobody!

hile only in his teens Dion, backed by his group The Belmonts, doowopped his way onto the charts with "I Wonder Why" in 1958. That kicked off a succession of massive hits including "Runaround Sue" and "The Wanderer," classics if there ever were any. The British music invasion coupled by a long running battle with drug dependency proved too much and Dion all but disappeared from the pop music scene in the mid-sixties, reemerging briefly in 1968 to express the nation's innermost feelings on "Abraham, Martin and John," a song that's become synonymous with the commemoration of JFK, RFK and Martin Luther King Jr. Always a blues and folk enthusiast (today Dion's a big John Hiatt fan), Dion parlayed that enthusiasm into a mellow folkish troubadouring career on Warners, which included the ultra-honest "Your Own Backyard" and the haunting "Sanctuary." Shortly after that success, he ended years of drug and alcohol abuse, and took his music down a religious path singing and performing gospel, and developing quite a following in the world of Christian music.

of guy of who will never settle down" has been happily married for 26 years and has three daughters. Dion's recent visit to the Gavin offices kept the entire staff buzzing for days before and after. Relaxed, at peace, and happy to be rockin' again, he talked about the good ol' days and his newest accomplishment "Yo Frankie," an album that brings the past and present together, never bowing to a nostalgic spirit.

DAVE SHOLIN: I was fascinated by the fact that Hank Williams was your first musical inspiration.

DION: The first time I heard Hank Williams he was singing "Honky Tonk Blues" on the radio. I heard this guy just tearing into the words, gripping them like pliers and ripping them open. I had never heard anything like that so'I went up to Fordham Road where there was this record store called "Cousins." I must have been eleven years old and said, "You gotta find this record." I didn't even know what "Honky Tonk" meant. By the time I was thirteen I had a collection of about 125 Hank Williams 78s and I knew about two hundred songs. I really got caught up in itwhoosh! It was early rock 'n roll to me. Hank Williams and all the Black music I started listening to was like my music—Black music filtered through an Italian neighborhood that comes out with an attitude. That's what it is. DS: Was there a time when you decided, "I'm going to be singer?"

DION: What happened is that I learned how to sing "Honky Tonk Blues" and I'd sit out on the stoops on those hot August nights when the fire hydrants were coolin' everybody off, spraying the streets and the guys would gather 'round me saying "Do that again!" I knew at a very early age that I could take people on a trip and when I was in the middle of a song I just felt kind of special. It was like a gift—it just feels good when you're doing it. People were enjoying it and I LOVED doing it.

KÉNT ŽIMMERMAN: ...it had an addicting feeling?

DION: It's like at that age you're looking for who you are, what you are, where you're going, why you're here and all of a sudden you're connected—and you feel a part of things—you're sharing yourself with people and it's connecting. It's just a good feeling.

DS: What was it about the early doo-wop sound and why was it so prevalent in New York City?

DION: It was like homemade music—street-corner—you didn't need \$40,000 worth of equipment to start a group. It started out with the Black guys. I used to hang out backstage at the Apollo Theatre, copying riffs from The Cadillacs, The Harptones, The Cleftones. They'd come out talking and singing, I'd be listening, "Hey, how'd you do that?" It was like homemade music. You'd bang on cardboard boxes and beer bottles and you made music. It's not like today. Contrary to what people think, there wasn't a group on every corner. In fact, we (The Belmonts) were the only group I knew for miles.

DS: A lot of your songs, were about girls. "Runaround Sue," "The Prima Donna," "Ruby Baby," "Little Diane," "Sandy." Are these just names that rhymed or were they women you knew?

DION: Hey listen, if you can write a song about a girl's name, at least you knew you'd sell. How many girls are named Diane? You got sales already! I know that for a fact!

DS: How did the decision to leave The Belmonts and go solo come about?

DION: There was a guy atour company named Alan Sussel who called Laurie Records. He was a "man's man"—he was like a father figure to me—I really loved the guy. His favorite song was "Where Or When," so I cooked up an arrangement. We worked hard at it. The thought was there to just do it for him, but it was out of our back yard, totally. But we did it for him. Well, after we did that, The Belmonts started saying, "We want to do every song like that, we want to be legitimate, get the tuxedos..." and it was a battle. So we did a whole album called WISH UPON A STAR of all these standards. One day—The Belmonts were standing on the side of me singing and I just freaked. I said, "This is not for me!" So "Where Or When" ended up being our swan song. I said, "I can't do this." I went back to my guitar. That's when I put out "The Wanderer" and "Runaround Sue." They wanted to be the Four Aces. I said, "Go ahead." I couldn't take

DS: Did you know from the very first take that "The Wanderer" was going to be a classic?

DION: I did a song on this new album called, "King Of The New York Streets." When I started that song I knew that something happened in there and I just felt it. It's like I'm singing it, enjoying it and saying, "Oooh, this feels GREAT!" I felt that "King Of The New York Streets" is as special as "The Wanderer." From beginning to end it was one take.

From beginning to end it was one take.

KZ: "King Of The New York Streets" was one take?

DION: Yes, it really felt good to me. And to answer your question, I knew "The Wanderer" was special when I was doing it, but how could I know after thirty years that people like Bruce Springsteen would come up to me and ask, "Who played drums on that?" or "Who's playing sax?" "How did the drummer do that?" "Is he hitting the high hat from underneath?" Panama Francis played on that song—he had a Jazz group in the '40s—he was the drummer. All I knew was that it felt good, I didn't know people were going to be asking me questions about it years later. I love singing about strong characters. You throw away all your doubts and you just hit it. It's so strong, it's just so focused and it's so much the attitude of the neighborhood I grew up in. The KID is HERE! Like, whoa! These songs are great to get behind. They're fun to sing. I like singing about characterslike "Runaround Sue" or "Yo Frankie." It's a very proud place to come from.

KZ: Sounds like you found out who you are very early on...

DIÓN: When I'm in the middle of a song that I love, I know exactly who I am.

KZ: ...amidst all the applause, the girls, the cars, the money...

DION: That has nothing to do with it...

KZ: ...no, but is it hard to keep it together with all those forces coming at you?

DION: Not now, but maybe when I was a kid. When you're a kid you get distracted. When people start treating you like you're something special, you start believing it and sometimes you think you can do no wrong. You can get very self-centered. Now I'm in music because I love it. My peace of mind doesn't depend on a hit record. I think if your identity is tied to a career, if your career goes—then you're gone. My identity's not tied up in my

self-worth. Today it's just something I do. I know who I am. I'm privileged to do something I love and use the gifts God gave me to be of service to people. But there was a time when my pride and I were insecure. Boy, I went off on a tangent and I got kind of lost back then—it hurts to do it that way because then you get isolated from people, from yourself and God—it's boring. It's better the second time around.

KZ: "King of The New York Streets" epitomizes all that. It's a strong statement.

DION: It's something we all go through when we're sixteen and full of ourselves. The whole world revolves around us and we're the center of the universe.

KZ: So what was it like when rock 'n roll was just being invented?

DION: When we started it was like the dawn of creation. It's hard for second and third generation rock 'n rollers to understand the times when there were no rules, no expectations. There was nothing—not to mention luxury tour buses and monitors-you weren't in charge of your own destiny. People didn't know you produced your own music. At that time we were breaking a show business tradition; I know this today but I didn't really understand it then. There was a show business tradition that existed. It was kind of like a Hollywood set-you put up the front, but there's nothing behind it. You made a song that was you—so they think they know you because you have a hit song, but they don't really know you. When you took a picture, you put the cigarette down and smiled at the camera. Rock 'n rollers-the second and third generations—bought the illusion of the rebellion and the proclaiming of your individual freedom saying, "Hey, this is me-I'm traveling around the country, I'm gonna kick ass and man, I'm secure and I'm 'The Wanderer!"" And they went, "Yeah, that's the way I feel..." and they bought it! So, little by little the tradition even affected The Beatles. I think it even affected the Rolling Stones a lot; I know it affected Presley. Elvis Presley was the "King Of Rock'N Roll," I know it, you know it but he didn't know it. If he knew it, he would have gone to Woodstock and had some fun with The Rolling Stones—he would have sunglead up in Woodstock. He would be here today with guys like Springsteen, Billy Joel, Paul Simon, Little Steven and John Hiatt—all these people!

KZ: ...Lou Reed...

DION: Yes, Lou Reed definitely. What's happening now is that music got this kind of community and caring, not this competition thing or this show business and self-centered thing. Musicians talk, get honest with themselves, cut away the fat. It's healthy when you support each other. We started out with the music very angry. Rock 'n Roll's a REBELLIOUS music. It starts out with a lot of anger, but if you work through that, you come out much more powerful in the end because in the beginning you think the power is just in the amplifiers and it's really not. When you work through that, then you really come into the power and you can really understand that it's an international communications tool. You get out there. You can communicate. It helps

you feel and think and keeps you aware, lifts your spirit, keeps you young—it does for me. KZ: You've really witnessed some changes over the past thirty years.

DION: What I'm saying is that when we started we thought it was just music for very young, innocent kids because we had nothing to go on. Now we realize you could be an old fart at nineteen and you can kick ass at sixty-three because it's an attitude. Rock 'n roll is an attitude, not an age! It's something very real. When I was standing up there at the Hall of Fame and they were honoring me, I was looking out at all the people. All these artists that have kept me young the past three decades. Man, I was saying, "Thank YOU! You've filled me, you've made my life very rich, you've filled my spirit!" I've always been a diehard from the early days and I never drifted off into Tony Bennettor Robert Goulet, I just couldn't... KZ: ...even though that was the way when you talk about legitimizing yourself.

DION: Yes, in the beginning we played with a lot of Jazz musicians and a lot of them used to hate us. It was very insecure because here you are making hit records—everybody LOVES it—but the musicians that are playing for you can't stand doing these shows at the Alan Freed Theater. "Who are you out there standing in the light, singing this bullshit? We're back here, getting paid ten dollars to play behind YOU?!?"

KZ: That's a lot to take.

DION: It was hard for them, it was hard for us and there was no communication, no maturity. The guys didn't come up to us and say, "Hey listen..." There was no way to communicate. They were probably as immature as we were and they were older than us. Today musicians encourage you, they support you. I feel it's much better because they're real. It's not a Hollywood set to them. Today you get people that are the same off as they're on. It's like there's no front.

DS: You joked at the Rock 'N Roll Hall Of Fame dinner about making a total of \$14,000 off "The Wanderer," while today stars are making millions. Do you ever look back and ask, "Geez, I was a star, but where was the cash?"

DION: Yes, but it's never really affected me to the point where it turned me bitter. I don't really have any real horror stories. I don't want to sound like a fool, but I got into this business because of the music. I wanted to get close to the music-I wasn't thinking of money. So I've always kept that focus, it's always been a very sacred thing to me. I've raised three daughters, I've always eaten, I've never gone hungry, I've always been able to express myself, I've been really blessed. Man, companies always pick me up, I've always made albums—I am so grateful that I have a chance with this new one because I was thinking, "Well, here I've got a shot-I'm gonna get up at bat, I'm gonna relax and I'm gonna take a good cut at that ball and we'll see what happens." In other words, I saw these Jazz musicians lose focus. I saw people die from resentment just from getting caught in some kind of trap. I've always looked for solutions on how to work through a lot of these trappings. If ve

#### P.D. NOTEBOOK

### POSITIONING— THE MCLENDON WAY

We conclude our four-week visit with the late Gordon McLendon, through memos and formats devised for the successful debut of the first "beautiful music" station, KABL in Oakland/San Francisco in 1959, with yet another of this innovator's startling promotional ideas.

The modern principle of "positioning" starts with the idea that people can't really define something new unless they can compare it to something they already know. I refer you to the excellent, best-selling book on the subject by Trout and Reis called "Positioning—The Battle For Your Mind," which is still available in paperback.

Long before that principle evolved or the book was written, Gordon McLendon was "positioning" his revolutionary "beautiful music" station by doing something which even today most broadcasters would be very reluctant to do: Mention the competition, and in a positive light. From the notebook loaned me by Dave Verdery at KBIG in Los Angeles, here are a few of those revolutionary promos from 1959:

"With more than three thousand radio stations in the United States, nowhere can you find more varied radio entertainment than in San Francisco. KABL invites your attention to the fine network radio programs on KNBC, KCBS and KGO, at 680, 740 and 810 kilocycles respectively. Nowhere are there finer network radio programs than in San Francisco. KABL hopes you will listen to them, and rest assured that you are also welcome always to good music on 'Cable.'"

(That one is particularly sly, since <u>by definition</u> network radio programs are the same everywhere on the network!! In his instructions, McLendon told his staff, "when describing other stations, never use phrases which may sound uncomplimentary.")

"Moods and tempos change, and so do one's desires in radio fare. KABL points out to listeners who may be in the mood for popular or Top 40 music, the listenable pop music programming on radio stations KSJO, KOBY, KJBS, KDIA, KEWB, KSAN, KSFO, KEEN, KYA, and KFRC. Nowhere can one find more attractive popularmusic-radio-entertainment than on the San Francisco dial. KABL hopes you will enjoy these stations, and invites you always to good music on 'Cable.'"

Notice how, in the kindest, most sincere manner possible, McLendon was positioning KABL as the alternative to all other popular music stations, and in addition was repositioning all of them with respect to each other by lumping them together without distinction. How can one of those other

stations <u>undo</u> that re-positioning? For the KABL listener, it's essentially impossible. Here's another one.

"KABL listeners are listeners of discriminating, yet varied desires. In the possibility that you may occasionally wish to hear such new pop performers as Dodie Stevens, Bo Diddley, Sam Cooke and Elvis Presley, KABL can recommend the pop music programming of stations KEWB, KOBY, and KYA, at 910, 1550, and 1260 kilocycles respectively. KABL hopes, of course, that when you return to 'Cable,' you will always feel welcome."

Again, McLendon appeared to be being almost naively nice to his competition, while being secure in the certainty that the refined image of his own station would guarantee that his listeners would not go barging off to listen to Bo Diddley or the dreaded Elvis Presley on the competition, but would stick with the station which reflected their own "good taste"—KABL! In the process he further distinguished, or positioned, his own station clearly from the competition in the minds of his listeners—and flaunted its uniqueness with these unique "competitor promos."

"KABL hopes that all of San Francisco will be proud of the variety which its radio offers. On other stations, listeners can hear such outstanding popular phonograph-record-disc-jockies as Jim Spero, Don Sherwood, Frank Bell, Bill Bennett, Doug Pledger, Gary Owens [yep—same one—on KEWB!], Jerry Roy, Bill Wood, Del Courtney, Jim O'Hara, Buck Herring, Mike Bradley, Jumpin' George, Tony Tremayne, Larry Dean, Ted Randall, and many, many others. If times or names change, KABL cannot be responsible. KABL hopes that you will enjoy many of these pop music authorities, and of course, be always welcome at KABL for good music."

Ouch! That one addressed the turnover of radio personalities, and the transitory nature of the competition, while positioning KABL as a station whose only "personality" was the station itself—consistent and dependable.

Many in radio would consider any acknowledgement of the competition on the air as risky-perhaps even suicidal. In the real world, listeners know there are other stations, whether they listen to them or not, and presume all are competitive with each other. McLendon chose to be the maverick, and reap the reward by repositioning all the other stations as being competitive with each other-but not with KABL. A crazy idea? As Tom Peters said, in his February keynote at the Gavin Seminar, "in a crazy world, a company can't afford not to have crazy people on the staff!" And frequently, "craziness" is nothing more than original thinking in a copycat world!

I hope you have enjoyed and profited from this brief trip through broadcast history, and I thank Dave Verdery of KBIG for his generosity in sharing these valuable and instructive papers.

GERALD ALSTON CAN TELL US WHY Motown crooner Gerald Alston, former lead singer of the Manhattans, took home the Drummer Award for Best New Artist-Male, at the recent BRE ceremony. # DE LA SOUL

#### FROM THE SOUL

#### DE LA SOUL'S POSDNUOS

he first clue that De La Soul are not your average rap band is the dayglo album cover, full of peace signs, paisley and flowers. These self-styled "public speakers" set themselves apart with their insistence on the 'inner sound,' what they call the D.A.I.S.Y. age. Add to this the music, which uses samples ranging from Johnny Cash and Steely Dan to a grade-school multiplication record, and you've got a totally new sound. Last summer's release of the first 12" "Plug Tunin," put the word out that this band was something to hear. The current single "Me, Myself and I," already went Top Ten on the Urban charts, and is now getting play on Alternative and Top 40 stations. The album "Three Feet High And Rising" is the number one selling album on the Black charts.

Posdnuos, Trugoy the Dove and Pasemaster Mace started the group four years ago in Amityville, Long Island. Posdnuos says that the name De La Soul "means 'from the soul.' We felt that everything that we wanted to do had to come from our hearts. We weren't trying to be like L.L. Cool J or anyone else. Everything we do comes from the soul."

De La Soul are the latest in a line of innovative rap acts to come out of Long Island. Eric B & Rakim, Public Enemy and EPMD all call the suburban area home. "When someone does something real good, then it inspires everyone else around you to give it a shot," Pos says. "Now you got everyone trying, making their demo tapes. At one point Queens was the place, with Salt N' Pepa, L.L., Run DMC. Now it's Long Island." Producer Prince Paul, also a Long Islander and a member of the group Stetsasonic, is credited for bringing De La Soul's sound together.

Posdnuos and Dove have practically in-

vented a new language of hip-hop. Instead of a tired old rapper complaining about sucker MC's biting his lines, De La Soul's lyricists have created songs like "Potholes In My Lawn." "The lawn is our rhymes," Pos explains, "the rhymes that we take care of and nuture, and they're growing like a lawn. Potholes are the bits and pieces of the words that we wrote that are missing, from other artists taking the concepts and ideas that we came up with."

"Three Feet High And Rising," contains 22 songs and begins and ends with references to "the D.A.I.S.Y. age," which means"DaInnerSound Y'All." Pos explains, "We deal with the inner sound—everything that comes from within. This album is showing people that you can be more creative than what was being shown. You should be yourself, and not try to mimic someone. With 'Me, Myself and I' we're trying to say that it wasn't an image that we sat down and made up—it was just basically our personalities. But a lot of people focused on that D.A.I.S.Y., they didn't look at what it meant. They focused on daisies and the hippie thing started. Dove wrote the song because we just wanted to lay down the law that, straight up, we're being ourselves."

Because of this focus on the inner sound, many people consider De La Soul to be the opposite of hard-core rappers like Public Enemy. Pos sees it differently, "We're coming across in the same way. We're trying to educate the minds of people, trying to make them understand the theories that we're promoting—you can do anything, you shouldn't give up. We're just going about it in different ways."

Those "different ways" are appealing to more than the hip-hop audience. Alternative and Pop radio have also picked up on their music. "It's wild—I remember when I used to go to Run DMC concerts," Pos says, "not too many white people would come down if it was in an area populated by blacks. Every one of our shows is mixed. I've never seen a crowd so mixed before, with any rapper." But the band did not intentionally set out to

make a crossover record. "People say, 'if he used Steely Dan, then of course he's trying to get this audience because Steely Dan was a white artist," Pos complains. "That's not true. 'Peg' was a song that everyone heard. The samples we used were songs that we loved. We weren't trying to attract a certain

type of audience."

The band sampled everything from French instruction records to Johnny Čash to Liberace, all from their own record collections. Pos says, "The way it is in New York-I'm sure it's like that everywhere else-you usually find old breaks and scratch off the titles, because you don't want anyone to know what you're using. People will take the liberty of seeing what you're buying and buy the same record. Up in Manhattan, we'll walk into a store, and I'll buy a break that everyone knows just because I want to use it in a different way. And they'll all go 'Oh! Pos just bought Nitty Gritty by Gladys Knight. Yea, Yea, that's the record, that's the record to buy!' So it's good when you can go and get records from someone's garage." You can hear the results—a lot of the loops have that scratchy thrift-store sound. "Yea, the records were left out of covers, so when you sample, you're getting to see the popping and the crackling. The engineers would want to clear it up but we say, 'no, we want it dirty, nasty sounding."

"Some rappers want to use records that already have a real good hook and beat behind them so they can just put it down and rap over it," Pos continues. "A lot of the stuff that we did would sound terrible without the accompaniment of other loops. Like with "Eye Know"—I found the guitars on that first, and I thought, 'what can I do to this?' But then when I came across the Steely Dan record I thought, 'this matches the guitars.' "Plug Tunin" was the same way. If you were to hear the original at its' right speed you'd be like, 'What can you do with this doo-wop record?' I slowed it down and I was singing a beat to myself, thinking that it could really be hooked if you do it right. A lot of people think that it has to sound good right away. I think on a level of This can be worked with' and that's what I do."

How long until we start seeing rap acts on the Tonight Show? "Not long," says Pos. "I can see us on the Tonight Show. Not like we really would want to do it, but I can see us being asked. We've been getting a lot of offers that other rappers wouldn't get the opportunity to have, because of how diverse the album is. We've been in a lot of magazines that rappers have never been in. We've been offered a lot of good press, and good radio play on stations that would never think about touching a rap record."



Don't expect much change, if any, in the top four next week. Of the major movement next week we'll look for SWING OUTSIS-TER to breakout and STEVIE NICKS to bump the leaders. The SOS and the NICKS have similar HIT FACTOR profiles and both deserve a top five.



## JAZZ NEW RELEASES

### COLD SWEAT PLAYS J.B. (JMT/POLYGRAM)

The profundity of this project really hits you by the third track—a jazz ensemble send-up of James Brown's "It's A Man's World!" Although big name participants include David Murray and Arthur Blythe, it's trombonist Craig Harris who seems to carry the



creative and melodic load. Harris, a musical associate of Murray and Henry Threadgill, is certainly no St. Clair Pinckney when it comes to recreating the original JB horn magic. But CSPJB is metaphysically innovative and carries a lofty charm all its own. The guitars jingle, the drums rattle and funk and then the horns do their thing—New York City loft style. Punch up the medley on track six. It's clever as hell. Other worthwhile renditions include "Try Me," the aforementioned "Man's World" plus the "Cold Sweat" finale.

### TRIO JEEPY - BRANFORD MARSALIS (COLUMBIA)

Branford Marsalis' newest has one major common element with Marcus Roberts' Truth Is Spoken Here album. Like Roberts' use of the late Charles Rouse, Branford enlists Milt "the Judge" Hinton into his trio lineup to provided epth and sustenance from the past. The Marsalis school of thought stresses the importance of musical lineage and roots recognition in order to properly jettison to the next level of jazz enlightenment, thus avoiding any pitfalls of histrionics. The Judge, who put in a decade and a half of service with Cab Calloway and has traded muses with Louis Armstrong and Dizzy Gillespie, lends not only his considerable experience but also his legendary ease of time and ability to play many different styles of music. Trio Jeepy relys heavily on Hinton because of its desire to turn on a dime and constantly switch genres.

### IN GOOD COMPANY - JOE WILLIAMS (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

Joe Williams' shining career, particularly his work with the Basie band during the entire '50s Bop revolution, helped to modernize and redefine the role of a big band vocalist. With his newest, it's the company he keeps that makes things interesting. Marlena Shaw drops by for a little song and conversation on Louis Jordan's "Is You Is Or Is You Ain't My Baby." Things cozy up even more when likeable Joe meets up with Shirley Horn on "Love Without Money." On "Just Friends," Super Sax sets up and turns a five piece into a rousing ten piece extravaganza.

#### <u>LIBERAL ARTS - ELEMENTS</u> (NOVUS/RCA)

Elements play a very satisfying blend of music, borrowing from the soulful depths of rock and progressive jazz. Its eclecticism is never wimpy, particularly when the guitars kick in. Bill Evans' saxwork on on some of the tracks will help make Liberal Arts' appeal a Jazz/Adult Alternative split, but I really wish the guitar-oriented tracks like "Amber Linn," "Liberal Arts", "FB 206" and "Underwater" would stand more of a chance with discriminating programmers out there. Mark Egan and Danny Gottlieb work best in the pocket when the guitarists, Joe Caro, Steve Khan and Stan Samole, are allowed to roam free. "Oslo" is a nice ethereal piece and could serve as an second choice, along with "American Hope" as an alternates for the more mild mannered tas MILTONS-MILTON NASCIMENTO (COLUMBIA)

Here is the album we expected last time around. Milton's sounds are much more organically-grown, correctly juggling the talents of the Brazilian singer/guitarist with solid support from Nana Vasconcelos and Herbie Hancock. The opening "River Phoenix" is, surprisingly, a poem to the young film actor. Following that is "Like Us," with Herbie Hancock giving the song a sparkling acoustic piano Jazz feel with lyrics written by Brazilian rocker Paulo Ricardo of RPM. But it is Vasconcelos who provides the greatest support, keeping Milton strong with percussive integrity. The stretch of moods is wide, spanning from pensive moments ("Good Fruit") to more melodic energy, capturing that spirit of Brazilian soul music. <u>LÉT IT GO - CLAIR MARLO</u>

#### (SHEFFIELD LAB)

Working for a radio syndicator by day, Clair Marlo honed her crafts as a singer, instrumentalist and arranger by night. After earninga degree in composition at Berklee, Marlo apprenticed at a recording studio, learning the ropes of synth and MIDI technology and recording. Let It Go (inexplicably recorded live-to-two-track) features familiar faces like Steve Porcaro, Dean Parks and Leland Sklar. Recorded and mixed by Bill Schnee (who has worked with folks like Boz Scaggs and Huey Lewis), Let It Go has that West Coast gloss to it. Entries by Stevie Wonder and Richard Thompson augment the majority of original compositions, including the final instrumental, "Where You Are," which adds a final note of credibility to this Adult Alternative

#### LATE ONE NIGHT - DAN SIEGEL (CBS)

With Gavin Jazz/AA gearing towards its first year anniversary, we find ourselves finally catching up with the original pioneers of the formats. Dan Siegel, who built a large Northwestern following with his reputation as a melodic keyboardist, unleashes Late One Night, which was six months in the making. From the sweet moments like "Say



You Will" to more aggressive minutes like the opening "Hometown," Late One Night is already off to a hot start, gunning toward becoming a fast AA Top Fiver—not surprising since there is a nice balance between the electric feel of the backing trax, mixed with the acoustic piano soloing.

POINT OF VIEW - SPYRO GYRA (MCA)

It's hard to believe that ten years has passed since the Morning Dance LP gave Spyro Gyraits unlikely Top Forty hit, earning them mass appeal wings. Heavy club touring in the seventies and world touring in the eighties has continued to give Spyro's feel-good sound quite a lot of recognition. By my count Point Of View is the lucky thirteenth release for the group. Jay Breckentstein's sax and Dave Samuel's vibes keep things snappy. As you would expect, Point Of View is a seemingly bottomless airplay caldron that Jazz and AA will feast on for months to come. We pick "Carolina," "Slow Burn," the Jazzy "Swing Street," "Fairweather" and "Counter Point" while "Riverwalk" is custom AA.

ARARA-SERGIO MENDES (A&M) Sergio Mendes departs from the A/C and pop scene to devote his energy to an arrangement collaboration with Dori Caymmi. Compositions by Caymmi, Gilberto Gil, Djavan, Milton Nascimento and Ivan Lins give Arara's material a sophisticated glow. Sergio is no stranger to roots albums. Arara is another one of those recharging creative pitstops from which Jazz and AA can benefit. We prefer Nascimento's "Cinnamon And Clove" plus Caymmi's instrumental "Toucan's Dance."

NIGHT RHYTHMS - SANDY OWEN (IVORY) Sandy Owen's keyboard alliance with Jazz and Adult radio represents a carefully built relationship. On Night Rhythms Owen enlists the soprano sax work of Paul Carman. The music is spare and intimate, free of extraneous percussion and basslines. The opening "The City" will be familar to those who remember the original version cut by Mark/Almond in the early seventies. Known for his solo piano work, Owen keeps up with the times, utilizing an electric piano sound on both "The City" and "Peacock's Dance." Night Rhythms is off to a fast start. Most Added on Adult Alternative and second Most Added on Jazz, Owen has his fan base both from a listener and programmer standpoint. This is his ninth effort, making Owens a lean, mean, Jazz/AA fighting

THE END OF THE INNOCENCE - DON HENLEY (GEFFEN)

Don't know if I'd recognize Don Henley walking down the street, but it sure is easy to pick out that voice. After the demise of the **Eagles**, and after the smoke cleared, it was Don Henley who had the most to say. And after a few thoughtful listens, you have to admire Henley for putting together a lot of unlikely ingredients, making each release a special occasion. Guest contributions by saxophonist Wayne Shorter and Bruce Hornsby are augmented by cameo shots by Guns' Axl Ros Take 6, Melissa Etheridge, and Edie Brickell who join Henley regulars Danny Kootch and Mike Campbell. While Album Radio is immediately excited about "I Will Not Go Quietly," there is solace in the moodier tunes like the single/title track, "The Last Worthless Evening," and "The Heart Of The Matter." "New York Minute" sounds like an easy follow-up single with a superior song structure that hits home. "Gimme What You Got" is the dirty laundry lecture of the disc, bringing home some solid points.

RADIO SILENCE - BORIS GREBENSHIKOV

(COLUMBIA)

Boris Grebenshikov's collaboration with Dave Stewart combines the latest techno knowhow that goes into nineties record-making with the naivete of someone who has been as isolated from American pop culture as any first or second world musician could possibly be. The opening title track is actually a raw rendition (the rough mix is included on the disc) with plenty of fury and emotion. While the lyrics sometimes read like a bad translation of Tolstoy, the emotion of the vocals compensate. If Dave Stewart was looking for someone far removed from the music business machinery, working with Grebenshikov's raw talents was undoubtedly a cultural delight. On the other hand, if Grebenshikov was technologically curious, he certainly sounds it on his debut record. I'd say that "Silence, "The Postcard" and "Young Lions" bear a front announce for maximum listener appreciation.



HOME - BODEANS (SLASH/REPRISE) Home was cut at home with the BoDeans sounding right at home. Mellencamp drummer Kenny Aronoff brought his funky thunky snare. The Bo Brothers turned up retaining as much reverberation as possible. The opening "When the Love Is Goob (I Mean Good)" has a Staples/"Respect Yourself" groove to it, even though the notes cop to a Motown heist. Home's charm is in its looseness. After T Bone Burnett brought out the essential sloppiness in the band, the BoDeans got serious sounding. It's good to hear them sounding homemade again. Other trax: "Good Work" and "You Don't Get Much."



GOOD EVENING - MARSHALL CRENSHAW (WARNER BROS.)

First hailed as the next big thing out of New York and Beatlemania, Crenshaw carried the world on his shoulders as he experimented with producers like T Bone Burnett and Steve **Lillywhite**. Ultimately it took a trip into publishing land as well as editing a fine vintage Country music anthology to recreate the buzz. Though Crenshaw has always been respected as a songwriter with songs popping up all over other artists' records, Good Evening sounds like Crenshaw's most focused set of songs yet. This time some of the guitarwork (by both Marshall and David Lindley) gives the songs more bite. Besides his own songs. I particularly liked his versions of Richard Thompson's "Valerie" and Diane Warren's "Some Hearts."

"IDON'T BELIEVE IN LOVE" - QUEENSRYCHE (EMI)

Eventually, Sheila Rene and I will be vindicated. First released in the spring of 1988. Queensryche has been supported by their retail base, pushing this Orwellian concept album up around the 800 K mark. Not that sales are an instant airplay indicator, but 1 thinkthat Queensryche's story deserves to be heard. A hip handful of radio programmers had great luck with the previous trax. "I Don't Believe In Love" stands enough apart from the concept to be taken seriously as an individual track.

"NOTHING YOU CAN DO ABOUT IT"/
"ANGELIA" - RICHARD MARX (EMI)

Although "Nothing You Can Do About It" serves Album Radio's rock needs, be aware that "Angelia" sounds like one of those blockbuster summer songs. Perhaps a split rotation between rock and ballad will keep Album Radio in the chips on this one. Both trax have that BIG radio sound.

"LOVE CRUSHING" - FETCHIN BONES (CAPITOL)

I'm a rug, lay me down, shake me down, walk on me. Great hook but a low self-respect quotient. Fetchin' Bones crushes some bones on "Love Crushing" as Ed Stasium (known for his work with Julian Cope, the Ramones, Living Colour) keeps things popping. The Bones come up with a riff that crossbreeds Led Zep's "Wanton Song" with REM's "Orange Crush." Short and sweet at 3:13. Watch that outro—it's cold cold cold.

BAD ENGLISH (EPIC)

**Bad English** is a middleweight American rock n roll contender stocked with John Waite and Journey's Neal Schon and Jon Cain. What you get is sixty-two minutes of wear and tear on poor John Waite's soul. This guy needs a full metal jacket on his heart. Yet deep in the disc is a nice piece called "The Restless" Ones." It's pretty and moving with the band clicking into their specific roles beautifully.

### **INSIDE ALTERNATIVE RADIO**

It's never easy saying goodbye to a group of people who have been such an important part of your life. To me, the Gavin Report has been more than a place of employment over the past seven years. It's been an experience that has influenced me both directly and profoundly. When people outside the Gavin talk about it they mention words like family, integrity, honesty, insight, respect and a place that's for real. Those words cannot be overstated and I'm proud to have been a part of this wonderful organization. I've learned a myriad of things here, but the one element that I'll most cherish is the Gavin character that's was never instilled ON me, but rather INSIDE me. Developing the Alternative section here was an exciting and exhilarating experience, but it never would have happened without the belief and support of Kent Z and the staff of the Gavin who patiently allowed it to grow at its own natural pace. A vital part of its growth has been the tireless support of the countless volunteers who have worked here over the years. But, the most important contributors are the artists who make the music and take the real risks. Without them our services and skills would mean very little, at least within this industry.

This is an exciting time for the Alternative/New Music/Modern Music or whatever format. In the nearly ten years I've been associated with the format I've never seen it wielding as much respect or attention as it is now. It's also a dangerous time as the expectations and pressures mount. As I wrote last February, this could stymie its natural growth if those of us in the industry try to treat it as the other formats. We all have a responsibility to encourage its growth (both creatively and in terms of influence) and to protect it from complacency. We must allow it's rebellious and unpredictable character to thrive or else we risk killing the goose that laid this golden egg.

When I was a young little whipper snapper in high school one of the first journalists I studied was I.F. Stone. I was immediately turned on by his irreverant, honest, insightful and innovative style. I.F. Stone died a few weeks ago, but his spirit and influence never will. Publisher Peter Osnos wrote in the New York Times that Izzy had explained to him many years ago that he began his career as an outcast, remained around long enough to be tolerated, and if he lasted to old age, might become an institution. Izzy, Osnos wrote, "did better than that. He became a symbol of what the First Amendment is all about."

The Alternative format certainly began as an outcast, has remained around long enough to be tolerated and now is on the brink of becoming (do I dare say it?) an institution. Whether that institution is either positive growth and a symbol of what the best innovative performance art is all about, or a negative mass, rests within our minds and hearts. PETER STANDISH


Winter Hours - WINTER HOURS (Chrysalis)



FLY THE FLAG. Fans of Randy Newman's last album will no doubt recall the track called "Follow The Flag." In typical Newman style, this is biting satire that addresses the current flag furor. Album Radio could be taking a look and listen at this timely song to incite some listener response. If, like Newman, you feel that flag waving is a little bit on the ridiculous side, here's a starting point to initiate some discussion. If, on the other hand, you feel that anyone who burns the flag deserves to be shot with an AK-40 Assault Rifle (still easily available in most states), let the controversy flow. JAMES McMURTRY. Amid all of the superstar releases ("There's so many!" cites KBCO's Ginger Havlat), I have to say that I'm much more moved by a brand new face that will be unleashed sometime in August. James McMurtry is a singer/songwriter who has a straight-shooting folk style that captures the real American spirit of combining words and guitar chords. It's hard to mention James' album without also saying that he's the son of Western/humanist author Larry McMurtry (Last Picture Show, Texasville, Lonesome Dove, Terms Of Endearment). But James is certainly no celebrity knock-off. John Mellencamp produced this arresting debut. All I got was a bio and a crappy little tape, but it sounds like a million bucks. Look for it on the Columbia label. It's one of the very best things I've heard this year, that's fer sure. You'll get a closer look in Gavin's New Artist issue due in two short

seen a lot of very talented people just die of loneliness, bitterness and isolation, blaming everybody. I got hooked on finding solutions and working through it. But I'm very aware of the business side of things, especially today because I've learned a little about it.

DS: You have some strong feelings about groups such as Sha-Na-Na who make fun of the early music.

DION: When somebody approaches the music that I grew up with like they do, it's an insult. I'm not stupid, I wasn't then and I'm not now and I love this music. It just fills my heart with richness that I belonged and was a part of it. To this day, I can get with my friends, strike up a harmony and we have so much fun. We could doo-wop all night long!

KZ: You once wrote a song called "Your Own Backyard" that deals with drugs.

DION: I abused drugs in the '60s and it got me nowhere. A lot of people thought that drugs made me creative, but they didn't-they kill you. I've seen it. That's not where creativeness comes from. It comes from life, it comes from your spirit, it doesn't come from drugs. I've NEVER seen people shoot "up" or "get high." I've seen them shoot "down"—seen them GO DOWN, so it's like propaganda. I'm talking about people who abuse. "Drink up, cheers!" No, it's always down, it's never up and I've seen it time and time again. I didn't like what was happening to me, I looked up to heaven one night and said, "God, help me," and I changed. I didn't have to run buy no bag anymore. "Your Own Backyard," was a small way of sharing my experience, strength and hope and not preaching to everybody, just talking about what I found.

KZ: Why did you abandon Pop music for Christian music?

DION: I'm still, in a sense, that kid on the stoop that just likes to express himself. Music gives me an opportunity to share my feelings. Early on, in my house, emotions were forbidden. My parents were frightened of feelings. With music I could express myself and not threaten anybody. In fact, they'd ask me to sing it again. I love my old records, "The Wanderer," "Runaround Sue,"—they become more valuable to me every year. I don't like doing them in the context of a lot of these tours. Sha-Na-Na has a show in Atlantic City where they hire Ben E. King and Del Shannon, the Shirelles—I can't take that. I can't take doing medleys of old songs. Maybe I'm too serious, but those songs are sacred. I don't want to destroy them for me or for anybody else. That's the way I feel.

DS: So, like Rick Nelson was saying in "Garden Party," you've got to please yourself and just can't do all the oldies all the time

DION: In stores they might put my records in a different rack, "OK, put him in the Gospel rack, put him in the Oldies rack, now put him over here," but to me, it's ME. I sing about what's inside me. In the '80s I made five Gospel albums and one of them was nominated for a Grammy. All I was doing was expressing spiritual principles. I was raising three daughters and it was something that was relevant to

me at the time and I wanted to sing about it. About two years ago, they asked me to do a concert at Radio City Music Hall and they gave me the whole night. I said, "I'm going to do all my records." I went up there and I sang all MY songs. It was a wonderful night.

It was a very healing thing for me because I've always been protective of those songs. I can't even explain it, but it was almost like I connected that night—what I did in the past—all those hit records, all the Gospel albums. My faith was being expressed through music. I said, "Hey, I'm OK," it was like it came together that night. I'm grateful that I can do another album. It's fun to keep expressing yourself in music.

DS: How did you decide on Dave Edmunds? What was the chemistry like between you two?

DION: We met in L.A. and I ran twelve songs by him. I brought a little drum machine with me and I sang them all. He liked "King Of The New York Streets," "And The Night Stood Still," "Yo Frankie,"—he liked all of them actually and we went for it—he cut two out, I just told him I wanted to make a rock 'n roll album. It's a little polished, but I'm happy with it because I like the songs and had a ball doing it.

DS: What inspired "Written On The Subway Walls?" I've read you spent some time singing in subways.

DION: Paul Simon once wrote, "...and the words of the prophet are written on the subway wall...the sounds of silence." It's a very proud song of being raised in New York with the people, the culture, the love and the community that I grew up in. These are memories you claim and you're proud of them. You sing with a lot of pride. But you can't go back—that's what that song's about. It's about all those memories that are underneath the posters and the graffiti.

DS: How did you hit upon "Little Star?" DION: That just came out naturally. One day we were in the middle of it and Paul Simon asked to be on it. What's interesting is that he's very well-versed in doo-wop. So he sang "Little Star," and not only did he sing "Little Star," he did all the vocals under his lead. Listen to the group! He's singing all the vocals.

DS: "Drive All Night" was cut with Bryan Adams?

DION: Bryan Adams is a great kid to work with. He's intense and hard working. I learned a lot from him.

DS: It's a great line, "...with the windows down and the radio on..."

DION: I love the urgency. It's a song where this guy realizes he was on an ego trip. Now he's come to his senses and he's coming back. I like those kinds of songs. To me, you could sing those songs at any age because we all make those mistakes. I made one last week. (laughs)

DS: What is the biggest single change you've seen on radio or in music over the past thirty years?

DION: The BIGGEST change is the equipment. It's changing right and left. The real change is the synthesizer, the emulator, drum machines—but basically, rock 'n roll to me is

a backbeat with a good bassline. That's the heart and soul of a record. Everything else is window trimming. We used to run around the studio banging on ashtrays and Coke bottles and venetian blinds. I did "Runaround Sue" with these big tympany drums with canvas on them, just to get a thud! I always liked a fresh expression, the real, individual expression of music, like what John Hiatt does today. You can't emulate or simulate spirit and a person's individual expression. Heart and soul is something real and I love that.

DS: You have three daughters. What do you hear around the house?

DION: I hear, "Dad, you got any money, you got twenty dollars?" Aside from that, my oldest daughter likes Phil Collins—she wants to be a teacher—she likes Peter Gabriel, Steve Winwood, that's her bag. Then the middle one likes Barbra Streisand and Madonna and she's into Broadway shows. The fifteen year old? Forget about it! She plays The Replacements, Guns N' Roses and thinks Paul McCartney is someone who made a video with Michael Jackson. She's into all the hardcore stuff. My wife's into Lou Reed.


DS: Do you remember what you felt when you first heard "Abraham, Martin and John?" DION: Originally, "Abraham, Martin and John" was a shuffle. The first time I heard it, I didn't like it and I got turned off by it because it sounded like an opportunist kind of song. Then after I played it again I started to think, "Man, this is about four guys who had a dream of a state of love that does exist and they were working toward making it real..." Martin Luther King laid down his life. Maybe he died, but it's for us to pick up on the dream and carry it further. The dream doesn't die. I started hearing the song differently. I changed it from a shuffle to an acoustic song using the language of the heart, as if I was talking to someone just across the table saying, "You know, the good might die young, we can carry this on, we can pick up the dream, we can carry it further because these guys were an inspiration." And when I did that song it was amazing because I got letters from all over the country, from college kids. Thousands and thousands of letters! I never got letters from college kids and they were saying, "Thank you." It was like in a bad situation—there was a solution. So that's a special song to me.

KZ: Will this then be your most focused, personally focused, record?

DION: I don't know. I could take songs from my past that were very focused, but I think that this is an album that proclaims my individual freedom and homecoming, not only to my roots, not only to a state of mind that's free and drug-free, not only just working through all that and coming into a place where rock 'n roll is a part of you. That's why I wanted to end the album with "Serenade." It says I've come home and I think that encompasses it all. I just feel very blessed right now—grateful that I'm still enjoying music and people are encouraging me. They are just receiving it and it feels better now than it did then. It's really better the second time around.

**SINGLES** by Dave Sholin



◆ NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK - Hangin'
Tough (Columbia)

Those five good looking guys on the cover of last week's Gavin strike for the fourth time in a row! What could well be their theme song is a super-charged production with a rock edge. When you got the right stuff you can do it all!

<u>SEDUCTION</u> - (You're My One And Only) True Love (Vendetta/A&M)

Just like the group's name, the song weaves an enticing spell. Doing well at the Dance/Crossover level with adds at POWER 106, POWER 104, KSTN, KZOU and KITY among others. One that deserves being checked out.

BULLETBOYS - Smooth Up (Warner Bros.) Right on target for what is turning out to be a rockin' Top 40 summer. Some Zeppelinesque elements intertwined with a dynamic chorus make it one of the standout tracks off the album.

#### **SPECIAL MENTION**

RANDY NEWMAN - Follow The Flag

(Reprise)

Not a single, but noted here because of its timeliness. With July 4th around the corner and the furor over the recent Supreme Court decision regarding flag burning, this 2:15 song from Newman's "Land Of Dreams" LP will hit the hot button with millions of Americans.

#### **ALBUMS** by Ron Fell

DON HENLEY- The End Of The Innocence (Geffen)

When you start off the set with one of the finest singles of the year, THE END OF THE INNOCENCE, the rest could pale by comparison. Fortunately for Mr. Henley he doesn't try to replicate the formula. The heart of the remaining matter is acerbically witty with gobs of rock 'n' roll attitude. Henley and co-producer Danny Kortchmar give everything on the album an edge—competitively and otherwise. THE LAST WORTH-LESŚ EVENING is an epilogue to The Eagles' LYIN' EYES. NEW YORK MINUTE is a melancholic ode to a guy who takes too big a bite out of The Big Apple. GIMME WHAT YOU GOT has the lion's share of great lines including: "All these trumped-up towers," "A man with a briefcase can steal more money than any man with a gun" and "You don't  $see \,no\,hearses\,with\,luggage\,racks.''\,Butafter$ all is said and done it's still the collaboration with Bruce Hornsby on THE END OF THE INNOCENCE which will endure as the singular essence of the package. It's a song on which Henley outsings what could have been a Hornsby vocal, yet Bruce is there lending his patented keyboards for sweetening and warmth.
