

NESUHI ERTEGUN PASSES AWAY



Nesuhi Ertegun, who made Atlantic Records the foremost label for Jazz and Rhythm and Blues, died on Saturday (7/15) of complications following cancer surgery. Mr. Ertegun was 71.

There is not a person in our industry who doesn't know of and appreciate Nesuhi Ertegun's accomplishments. In the early 1940's he and his brother Ahmet "haunted" the Howard Theatre in Washington, DC and Mr. Ertegun ran Los Angeles' "Jazzman Record Shop" beginning in 1944. While in Los Angeles he began his first record label, Crescent (later changed to Jazzman), edited Record Changer magazine and taught an accredited Jazz course at UCLA.

In the mid-50's Mr. Ertegun joined his brother Ahmet's New York record company, Atlantic, and over the years he signed and/or produced some of the greatest musical talents of all time. John Coltrane, Charles Mingus, Carmen McCrae and Ray Charles are only a few of the legends exposed by Nesuhi Ertegun. One of his crowning achievements at Atlantic is considered to be the signing of and "sticking with through thick and thin" Roberta Flack. It took two years for Flack to be accepted by the public, but Nesuhi Ertegun knewshe would and stayed with

Mr. Ertegun started WEA International, served as President of N.A.R.A.S., and fought piracy through the International Federation of Phonogram and Video Producers (IFPI). On a more personal level, he collected art masterpieces and enjoyed

soccer. He owned the now-defunct New York Cosmos and brought soccer star Pele to the United States.







INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

Bob Dylan's frame of reference was certainly a lot different in the 1960s when he wrote "The Times They Are A Changin" but the sentiment certainly applied to many of the discussions that took place at last weekend's Upper Midwest Conclave in Minneapolis. Major technological advances will continue to cause sweeping changes in society. There was plenty of evidence to indicate that the role radio plays in people's lives will be vastly different in the years ahead. Tom Kay and his staff are to be commended for combining practical hands-on workshops with provocative and theoretical subject matter. While we need to be concerned with how to make our day-to-day operations function more efficiently, it's nice to get away for a few days to soak up new information that will help expand our horizons. In this business, it's sometimes easy to get a narrow perspective and miss the big picture. Conclave '89 afforded attendees plenty of food for thought in and outside the scheduled sessions, some of which you'll be reading about in future columns.

During the Top 40 format session the subject of CDs was brought up and when Columbia's Burt Baumgartner asked if anyone in the room still wanted vinyl singles not one hand went up. It's obvious that the days of the 7" single are numbered. Programmers did air concerns about getting CD single service, and after years of hearing about poor vinyl service, we can hopefully move into the 1990s with all stations receiving the CD product they require.

No other record out right now defines the term "hit" better than RICHARD MARX. Rock 40's, Dance 40's, Mainstream stations, hard and soft A/C's—it's just one of those songs that touches people of all shapes and sizes with varied musical tastes. Checks in at #1 on POWER 96 Miami, WDFX Detroit, WNVZ Norfolk, KRNQ Des Moines, KXSS St. Cloud, KAGO Klamath Falls and KRQ Tucson. Added at WIOQ Philadelphia, KDWZDes Moines, KATM Colorado Springs and KMEL San Francisco.




A number of strong conversions on SWEET SENSATION who're burning up the phones

at WDEK DeKalb, IL where MD Gail Henning takes them top thirty with a 37-29 gain. Phone action is hot as well at KVVQ Victorville, CA with PD Susan Landers moving it 30-23 and getting females 12-19 calling in dedications. Other upward moves include WIGY 31-21, KOZE 29-24, KZZK 27-22, WMME 29-21, etc.

Fast-climbing CHER tops 200 reports with adds at BAM99, Y106, Q102, KYYA, Q107, WAVA, WKSQ, KCPX, KZZP, X102 and KBIU. Heads into the top twenty-five at KDOG Mankato, MN with MD Greg Husak taking it 33-24 and reporting across the board requests and lots of comments about the video. Already top twenty for Brian Phillips and Mr. Ed at KDWB Minneapolis 22-18.

A few years have passed since SURFACE appeared on the Top 40 and they're doing it again big time. Big jumps include K10637-27 ("top album sales and top ten requests—all female"), 100KHI 22-12, KC101 23-17, WOVV 25-10, KIXY 37-25, KCPW 26-21 and WIOQ 23-16. Debuts at #33 on WQGN where MD Joe Reale reports calls from adults on their "Power Request Lunch Hour."



SOUL II SOUL goes 12-10 at EAGLE106 Philadelphia where sales continue to be strong. Top Five at Z100 and HOT 97 New York (#1 for the second week) and KMEL, plus adds at B94, KZOU, KISN, KEEZ, WIQQ, WHHY, WMMY, PRO/FM and WNVZ.

Hearing a song on another station when you're on the road can sometimes get that little light to go on. That's what happened when WJZQ Kenosha's Terry Havel heard GRAYSON HUGHon Z104 Madison on his drive to the Conclave. Terry says, "It sounded great," and he added it. Last week's TOP TIP is also new on 102QQ, 106RTB, KYYA, KTDR, KAFX, KSYZ, KYNO, WNVZ, WHDQ, WYKS, WJLQ, 100KHI, KMOK, WYAV, etc INDIGO GIRLS close in on 100 total re-

ports in the same week they take a big seven point move on the A/C chart. Top thirty at KDWZ #26, K106 #30, K104 #23, KOZE #25 and KKEZ #30. Twenty-seven adds including WLVY, WBEC/FM, KUBE, KYYA, KATM, KGLI, KZ103, WXXQ, KNEN, KNIN, etc.

Former RECORD TO WATCH, SKID ROW logs a 24% HIT FACTOR and keeps generating some heavy chart increases. Takes a ten point gain at WSPK Poughkeepsie 22-12, WCIL/FM Carbondale 10-5 ("#4 on the phones"), KPXI Mt. Pleasant, TX 28-19, KATM Colorado Springs 14-7, Z100 24-19 and WPLJ New York 34-30, B94 Pittsburgh 22-16 and Y100 Miami 29-23. Adds at WAVA, Q107, Z104.5, WNCI/FM, 92X, KMON, K100, Y106, etc.





WARRANT'S "Heaven" is off to a great start with early believers giving it a 5% HIT FACTOR. New on Q105, G105, 95XXX, WJMX, WJET, KBQ, KZOU, Y94, KSND, KZZU, X100, KS104, KYYY, KDWB and WHYT.

New believers joining KZZP, KDWB, KRZR, KYNO, X100 and others playing THE CURE include KIIS/FM Los Angeles, Q106 San Diego, 93Q Houston, Y95 Dallas, WPST Trenton, WKTI Milwaukee, KXXR Kansas City, X102 Reno and KWSS San Jose. Initial activity is the best they've had yet for Top 40 radio.

Request action is excellent on YOUNG MC who is generating top ten phones at KSTN Stockton and an 18-10 move along with WWCK Flint, MI where it goes 38-25. This is the guy who wrote the TONE LOC hits.

RATINGS 101:

TURNOVER, TIME SPENT LISTENING EXAMINED

 \boldsymbol{B}_{y} now many of you have received your Spring Arbitrons (and Birches). You're up or down. But why?

In this third chapter of "Ratings 101" we'll help by delving into two more key terms that can unlock some ratings mysteries. These terms are—

TIME SPENT LISTENING

TURNOVER ■

In our August 4 column we will offer some specifics about breaking out your latest ratings report. However, it occurred to me that before we plow into analyses at that time it would help to have a working knowledge of turnover and TSL. As you'll see these are two vital and very related terms.

TIME SPENT LISTENING

What programmer in America, or other environs, doesn't want to extend the Time Spent Listening of each listener? Ah, Nirvana! But what is TSL? How is it computed? And what formats can reasonably expect to do well—or poorly—in the TSL arena?

TSL DEFINED:

Time Spent Listening is an estimate of how long (in quarter hours) the average diarykeeper spends listening to a certain station within a specific daypart.

TSL CALCULATION:

FORMULA

Station's average quarter hour audience X (times) number of total quarter hours in daypart ÷ Cume audience for same audience / daypart.

Let's take the definition and calculation formula and breathe some life into these dry terms. Our mythical WAAA's numbers could look like this—

Monday-Sunday 6AM-Midnight AQH persons 12+= 7500

Total quarter hours M-S, 6AM-Mid-night= 504

Monday-Sunday 12+ cume persons= 100,000

—thus the formula's calculations would come out as follows:

 $\frac{7500 \times 504}{100,000} = 37.8$

or 38 QHs weekly

In English this means that the AVERAGE listener to WAAA spent nine and one-half hours weekly with the station.

HOW TO USE:

Great, so now you know how to compute TSL. But what good does it do you? Here are some thoughts on how you can use TSL data to gauge if your station is progressing or falling back:

1. Compare your station's TSL figure with the TSL for other format competitors in *your*

narket.

2. Compare your TSL with the TSL for similarly programmed stations in *other* markets.

3. Compare your TSL to the average of stations appealing to your target demos.

4. *Trend* your station's TSL—is it rising, falling, or inconsistent? Be sure to compare on a like-survey to like-survey basis (such as Spring to Spring, Fall to Fall).

—you'll probably think of other valuable ways TSL analyses can be beneficial.

FORMAT IMPACT

As you can imagine, certain formats are better than others at achieving long TSL. Some of the traditional winners in the TSL derby include:

 Adult Contemporary (often averages 40+ QHs per week)

• Album/Classic Rock (TSLs in the 45+ range are not unusual)

•Country (successful stations we had the experience of working with garnered a TSL in the 50 QH range)

•Easy Listening (again, like A/C, good ones achieve 40+ QHs weekly)

•Talk stations often are magnets for their devotees, thus may grab 45 or more QHs a week

If you're in Top 40 or News, the TSL battle is a tough one. Those formats feature high cumes but not the loyalty that generates long span TSL. Top 40 stations with a TSL over 36 are doing quite well in that regard.

TURNOVER

The flip side of TSL is Turnover (T/O). If you think about it you can probably define T/O, but for our purposes let's say,

TURNOVER DEFINED:

Turnover is an approximation of the flux or movement within your audience—in other words, how much change takes place in your audience during a daypart?

As you can perhaps begin to see, there is a major relationship between TSL and T/O.

Formats with much audience movement or flux, such as News or Top 40, have high T/O. More stable formats, a la Country, which have higher TSLs thus have less audience flow, thus a lower T/O factor.

TURNOVER CALCULATION:

FORMULA

Cume audience for/ the relevant demo/daypart

AQH audience for /the relevant demo/daypart

To put some meat on the formula's bones we'll plug in these numbers as an example:

—Monday-Sunday 6-Midnight Cume 12+= 100,000

—Monday-Sunday 6-Midnight AQH persons 12+=7500

—thus the formula's equation would come to life as follows:

 $\frac{100,000}{7500} = 13.3$

HOW TO USE

Since the 13 in WAAA's example does not represent quarter-hours, but instead a factor to be compared to other stations, let's review some comparisons that make sense.

1. How does the T/O for your station com-

pare to the competition?

2. How do T/O factors compare within the various dayparts of your station? Are you seeing more listeners come and go during the morning show, thus a higher T/O—lower TSL relationship? Maybe it's different in other dayparts.

3. Trend your T/O numbers to see if there's

any pattern from survey to survey.

4. Most of all, keep in mind the relationship between TSL and T/O. If TSL is high, there's a loyal audience thus less flux in that audience. Just the opposite occurs in most Top 40 situations—lots of people cuming for the hits, then leaving soon thereafter. Higher audience movement factor, thus higher T/O—and of course, less TSL due to a fickle audience


Time Spent Listening and Turnover are biggies. With them you can figure much about how well or poorly your station is doing. Ideally, you'd like to see TSL over 40 QHs weekly, and T/O under a factor of 15. If you're not in this profile, winning may be a tough challenge.

Next week we'll look at the ratings of various forms of Jazz. Then "Ratings 101" fourth edition will debut in the August 4 issue. At that time we'll give you some key clues to un-

Every now and then I chance across a topic that draws an unusual amount of reader response. I don't think that's been more true than of the "speeding up records" columns last year! It also turned out to be true of the column "Pushbutton Radios For PD's" in this year's April 21 issue.

I first heard from Bobby Cole, Vice President of Fairmont Communications, a radio group owner based in San Francisco. Bobby pointed out that he was using a "pushbutton radio" (digitally tuned with preset buttons) by Aiwa, the model HS-J800, which I had not mentioned in the column. He told me it had five station presets on both AM and FM, and included a recording cassette machine that allows airchecks to be made as you listen. Then Jay Albright, a broadcast consultant based in Seattle, dropped me a note mentioning the same unit: "Ît's from the Sharper Image catalog. The non recording model (playback-only cassette built in) is \$139; the one with the stereo recorder is \$229. It works and sounds very well!"

I hadn't even heard of this one, so I thank both men very much for the tip. The Sharper Image is hardly a discount store; if you can locate a local dealer offering Aiwa products, you may be able to get it for less. If you want to order from The Sharper Image in San Francisco, though, their number is 800-344-4444.

Then I got a packet of information from legendary programmer Paul Drew, a charter Gavin subscriber, and still well remembered for his days as Group PD for the RKO stations in the '70s. These days Drew is President of his own USA/JAPAN COMPANY, based in Los Angeles. Paul, it develops, is as big a fan of Sony radio innovation as I am, but on a larger scale. I've collected perhaps 25 of these radios over the years; but Paul notes, "in my lifetime, I think I've owned well over 100 Sony radios. Your article about Sony preset tuning radios was fascinating and informative. Dhad two Sony 2R-26 radios and I recently gave one to Sony (with some others) for use in a display of older products."

The 2R-26 was the first-ever preset-tuning pocket radio; it came out in the pre-digital late '60's, and in addition to having a tuning condenser on the top there was a 5-position switch next to it, which gave you the option of switching to four key-set tuning condensers built into the side of the receiver, thus allowing

instantaneous switching between up to five AM stations. Paul adds, "The picture with your article had me searching through my Sony books. Are you sure this is a preset tuning radio? It looks like a WM F202 Walkman from 3 or 4 years ago." And I'm sure he's right. Through a printing error, the picture printed with the column was not the ICF-M10W digital AM/FM preset radio I mentioned in the column. However, since the radio with that model number has been discontinued for some years, I doubt if it caused anyone to buy the wrong product.

The current Sony radio with preset tuning, a small, light Walkman with no tape capability but with 7 AM and 7 FM presets, a digital frequency display, and FM stereo, is the SRF-M40W. It's relatively small, and only operates on stereo headphones, like the whole Walkman series. I bought mine from a mail order company in Virginia called Crutchfield for \$49 plus handling. If you can't find it locally and want to order it, their number is 800-446-1640.

By the way, I have always recorded radio conferences I have attended for later reference, and have found the audio to be reverberant and hard to understand unless I recorded in steréo, using a "one-point stereo mike." But small recorders, even stereo ones, have often proven to be of marginal quality in the past. When I attended this year's Gavin Seminar For Media Professionals in San Francisco, I was trying out the new stereo recorder I had just bought, and results were terrific.

I had just bought, and results were terrific.

It is the Sony "Walkman Professional,"
#WM-D3, with Dolby noise reduction, and optional chrome tape bias. With the tiny onepoint stereo mike that comes with it, the tapes are by far the best I've ever made at a conference—easily understood even in mono, and sensational in stereo. I can highly recommend this recorder if you're looking for "quality" combined with "small!"

My own lifelong love affair with radio extends to the electronic marvels one listens to it on; I'm always interested in learning of new developments and products to pass along in this column. 

KZ: Since the original Doobies last recorded, the concept of a group has been changed—exploited, if you will. Many times it's just a key member and a lot of production techniques. Was Cycles recorded as a group effort?

TOM JOHNSTON: I can truthfully say yes. We'd gone back to the band format as opposed to a while back, when we may have gotten away from just being a band in the studio.

KZ: There is a split production credit on a few of the tracks, yet I understand that Rodney Mills was a key ingredient.

TJ: He did a lot of work on it. We started off with two other guys, Charlie Midnight and Eddie Schwartz, and took it to a certain point. Yet at the time we thought we weren't quite going where we wanted to. So at that point, we decided to try out some other guys. Rodney turned out to be real comfortable to work with. Consequently, we went back and redid a lot of the stuff—especially drum sounds, among other things. We got away from strict computer sounds, making them more humansounding. They were all computer drums on the first songs. We were not used to that. I sure as hell wasn't. So the drummers themselves went back and did a lot of warming up, so to speak, playing electronic drums, but they were actually playing these drums, which put more of a human element into the music. We redid some vocals and some other odds and ends. Rodney warmed the whole thing up.

KZ: When did it feel good to reform the original Doobie Brothers?

TJ: We talked about it after we did a little spurt of a tour in 1987 that started out as a Viet Nam veterans benefit and got a little bigger. That lasted ten days, with one date in Russia.

PATRICK SIMMONS: I remember you (Tom) and me talking about it years ago, but we didn't think it was realistic at the time. We actually had a record contract left for this original band. Our option at Warner Brothers had not run out. This was years ago. So we could have just put the band together anytime. I didn't think anyone would be interested, to tell you the truth. Tommy and I talked about it. The other guys were off doing other things. It didn't seem like a feasible thing at the moment People were living all over the place. John (Hartman) was somewhere living on a horse ranch in the country, going to college. Mike Hossack was going through a lot of changes with his family. Tiran Porter was playing with another band. Tommy had a band. Ihad a band. As for the Doobies, we felt that wasn't progressive. That's not moving forward, so we all went off and did other things. When it was finally suggested that we do it again, we all wondered what we'd come up with. What will it

ans of rock n roll, more specifically Southern rock n roll, will recognize Rodney Mills from his associations with early Allman Brothers, 38 Special, Atlanta Rhythm Section and lately Gregg Allman, the newest 38 Special, the Radiators and now the Doobie Brothers. In a sense, Rodney is "the doctor" that took the Doobie Brothers' reunion effort to its high-quality success level.

KZ: What was the mood of the band when you joined the project?

RM: I think they were kind of wary. They were all in agreement for change. They didn't know what to expect from me except that they knew my basic personality from the meetings. They were very open and receptive. They seemed to want someone that they could count on. Some of the guys hadn't made records in a while, but some of them were pretty contemporary as far knowing what was out there. As far as how to use things, that was my role. To be truthful, I thought we were going to approach the music by making a record more in the classic way. But talking to Michael Hossack and Pat Simmons, they wanted to use the new technology. So we brought in Don Frank, who has all of the latest gadgets and knows how to use technology in a traditional programming sense. But we didn't want to do it that way. The drummers, for instance, wanted to play along with the band-electronically put their parts down onto the tape, then be able to change things later. (laughs) That was a learning process. Luckily I was familiar enough with the Macintosh computer. There were sounds we wanted to use that the traditional live drums wouldn't allow us to do.

KZ: How about it working with the Doobie guitarists, Tom and Pat?

RM: This record is very much a guitar record. There's no keyboardist in the band, so I always try to stay within the basic framework of the band. I approached it so that Pat and Tom could carry the rhythm of the music. I'm very used to working with guitar bands. We fit the keyboards around things later, unlike the way most records are recorded these days. While each player had parts for his particular songs, there was no one song where any one guitarist would dominate. As far as soloing went, they talked between the two of them. It balanced itself out. Pat by nature is a great rhythm guitarist, but Tommy comes up with those hooky rhythm parts. He tries to come up with things that would sound familiar after only a few listens. We

tried to establish that on every song as opposed to just playing straight-ahead rhythm. I was definitely not afraid to exploit that. As a fan, I always admired their work because when the song started off, you could always tell it was them. So I said, "Let's not stay away from that." I think people would love to hear that kind of stuff again, as opposed to the real techno-electronic music. Tommy plays from a gutfeeling. Pat likes to think things through. Pat's parts are intricate. Tommy, you can tap your feet and clap your hands along with him. You couldn't ask for a better combination. You then get a very diverse rhythmic thing going on in every song because Pat hears things differently than Tommy.

KZ: Was there any creative tension that you were able to exploit?

RM: There's always this competitive nature. Both of them wanted to create something on every song that really meant something. Therefore they'd assert themselves. Pat would put down this part that really sounded good. Then Tommy would hear it and would strive to exemplify himself. It was never vocalized, but you could definitely feel it. I've worked with a lot of two-guitar bands. The same thing happened with 38 Special's Don Barnes and Jeff Carlessi.

KZ: So when we listen to this record and we hear good chemistry, harmony and feeling, does that sum up your experience making this album?

RM: That emulates the sessions that I went through. Here's the straight facts. It was a pleasure working with these guys! There was no important friction. They'll definitely disagree with each other in a heartbeat, but they really got into making this record. It was a pleasure and we looked forward to recording every day. They wanted to have a good time after not recording together for so long. And I think it shows in their playing and in the performances. We talked about everything from making music to politics. It was a completely enjoyable experience.

TJ: That was the big turning point, when somebody finally called us up, asking us, "Hey do you think...?"

PS: Giving us a concept and an idea to put the band together again, do an album, get new sounds and update it. We actually got an offer at that point. Prior to that we had never had any solid direction. This became a serious way to go.

KZ: How long did you work on this new record? TJ: The record took, what, nine months? Plus there was another eight or nine months before we were originally contacted, so it actually took about two

PS: It took us a year to actually get a contract.

KZ: That's surprising considering no one heard much about any kind of Doobies reunion.

PS: It's not really surprising because there wasn't much to hear and we did put a lid on it. We didn't know what would happen, so we didn't make a big deal out of it. We figured we'd look like idiots if we didn't score a contract.

TJ: Our former producer, Ted Templeman was busy doing other bands. It was his idea. He was the one who called us up. But he never got around to putting the finishing touches on the idea. He'd always produced us. He was the one we all felt comfortable with. Then he got busy. So other record companies were interested and we didn't want to lose that interest.

PS: Ted would have produced it, but we probably would have been just getting started about now.

TJ: I'm happy about the way Capitol is pushing us.

They've been great. Sometimes it is easier just cleaning the slate. Plus we signed with Joe (Smith) who signed us in 1971 to Warners. That didn't hurt, either.

KZ: How long has "The Doctor," the first hit single, been laying around? The reason I ask is, did you ever have any doubts whether such a classic groove would fly in this era of MTV and technology?

TJ: Nope. I'll tell you why. Everybody stays current in their own way. Pat is probably more current than I am, I must confess. But everybody writes the way they write. I went through a real thing about that. For awhile I was trying to do this and do that, trying to stay current, screwing around with the way I write. And I got lost. So I quit doing that. Some people who I respect in this business told me, "Write the way you write! You can go in the studio and change the sounds only as long as you still have who you are in the writing. You'll be fine." So I went back to writing the way that I used to write. Also, playing with other people, I got ideas for the arrangements and things, that works. Thank God it works, otherwise I'd be out of a job! Coming back to this, I used a lot of songs that I'd had, and just changed the sounds in the studio. But in a sense, that's no different than the way we always did it. Everybody always had ideas to contribute. It's all current ideas, as current as everybody walking through the door and working on the tunes.

KZ: It's a simple sound, but I've never heard anyone else effectively imitate it. Why do you



think that is?

TJ: Don't know!

KZ: I've always thought the Doobies sound was vooted in the percussion.

TJ: We did use a lot of percussionists on the albums. That's probably why when Teddy got us all back together, he suggested we add Bobby (LaKind) as part of the group. He wanted the original group plus Bobby on percussion so we would have that quality. Plus it frees up one of the drummers to play even more percussion.

KZ: Let's touch on some of the songs. What about "South Of The Border?"

TJ: That was supposed to be the first single. But we wanted "The Doctor" out there first, to give everybody a sound that they could identify with immediately. That doesn't mean we wanted to date ourselves. Every song on this album is a compilation of what has happened to us up to now. It's not like we're trying to go back and sound like we did back then. Still, the voices sound the same. We've always been vocal heavy and guitar heavy. "South Of The Border"...

PS: (to Tommy) He wants to know if it's a true story.

TJ: I made it up although we did used to go to Juarez.

PS: Come on. Tell us the truth!

KZ: Okay, Pat, what about "Take Me To The Highway."

PS: Is it a true story. Yeah. The tune is in D minor, then it goes to an A—let's see. Actually I should say that it's a song that doesn't have the proper credits. There's one other player on there, a little girl (Shannon Eigsti) that we dedicated the album to. She played keyboards on that tune. That's a story in itself.

KZ: I'd like to hear it.

PS: She had leukemia and was dying over at Children's Hospital at Stanford. She used to hang with us when we'd play at the hospital-she would play along with us too. She even came out and played with us at a live date nearby. Then she got real sick. At first she had gone into remission and was doing real well, but then she had a relapse and got really sick. They put her back in the hospital and I used to go and see her. I told her we were in the studio and she was real interested. She'd ask, "How are you doing? You know, that's my dream, to play on a record. If I could do that, that's what I'd want to do in life." So we took over a computer and a MIDI keyboard and brought a tape of the tune. We ran the drum track, I played guitar and she played the keyboard part. So she got to play on the record. But they fucked up the credits. They were supposed to give her credit on the song. So besides dedicating the album to her which we were able to do, on the next run she'll be in the credits. A sad story, but happy for her in the end. She got to do something that she wanted to do.

KZ: Tell you what, we'll set the record straight. PS: I'd appreciate that.

KZ: How did the cover of The Isley's "One Chain (Don't Make No Prison)" with the "Listen To The Music" intro end up on "Cycles"?



ON MANAGEMENT

THE MANAGER OF THE FUTURE: ANOTHER PERSPECTIVE

Last time I presented four attributes which I believe the practicing manager of tomorrow will need to become proficient in. I proposed that the future is already here; that is, effective managers today are already becoming proficient in the four attributes, which, if you remember, were:

1. The manager must be comfortable with the use of up-to-date computer and telecommunications technology.

2. The manager must be comfortable with working in a "blurry" (that is, unstructured and ambiguous) organization.

3. The manager will be very well-read, including in areas that are not directly "business."

The manager will be a true internationalist.

Coincidentally, a study has just come out which discusses the changing requirements for successful business leadership. The study was conducted by Korn/Ferry International, a major headhunter firm. The study sampled the opinions of 1500 senior executives in 20 countries and concluded, unsurprisingly, that the skills required of successful business leaders in the year 2000 are somewhat different than those required of successful leaders today. Most of us are not executives. However, reviewing the skills and attributes that will be needed by executives in the year 2000 may give us a head start in our careers. Accordingly, let's review some of the key findings of the Korn/Ferry study.

1. The executive will need to convey a strong sense of vision, and will have to be very proficient in strategy formulation. These will be the most important attributes of the senior manager, concluded the study.

2. The executive will need to become very proficient in human resource management. Choosing and retaining good people will be a top priority. Working with and through people will be crucial for success.

3. Along the lines of #2, the executive's need to communicate frequently with employees will rise exponentially. Successful executives will be those who can communicate well and communicate frequently regarding vision, strategy, issues, ideas, problems, and solutions.

4. Communication will not stop with inhouse personnel. The senior manager of the year 2000 will find it essential to communicate frequently with customers as well. In addition to personally sampling customers'

attitudes, it will not be uncommon for executives to work directly with customers on strategy, ideas, problems, and solutions.

5. The nuts and bolts of personnel management will change. Pay will be linked closely to performance; merit pay, bonuses pegged to productivity gains, and profit-sharing will be the norm. Likewise, mediocre performance by an employee is more likely to lead to reassignment or termination. In short, the executive of the year 2000 will be much more aggressive about expecting and rewarding high performance, and disciplining inadequate performance. The executive will be far less tolerant of seniority per se and just "putting in one's hours." He or she will have little choice in the matter, because the competition will be much more global and much more intense.

6. What skills and attributes are becoming less important? Here're a few: Behaving conservatively, making all major decisions, public relations and public speaking. Surprisingly, even accounting and finance skills will be significantly less important at the executive level. Presumably, those tasks will be handled by lower-level personnel, leaving the executive with a "big picture" focus on getting the organization to be customer-focused and innovative.

The nuts and bolts of personnel management will change.

So far, so good. But now come the results which I find surprising. According to the study, the following knowledge bases will be relatively *unimportant* for the executive in the year 2000: International economics and politics, science and technology, and computer literacy.

I disagree. As I noted last time, I believe that those very attributes will be crucial for managerial success in the near future, even now. And I'm not alone. John Naisbitt wrote in *Megatrends* several years ago that the American manager will very shortly need to be proficient in at least three languages: English, Spanish, and computer. And recently, the *Wall St. Journal* presented a story called "Day in the Life of Tomorrow's Manager."

Here's an excerpt from Mr. Smith's lunch, which he eats in "his high-tech office":

"12:30p.m. Lunch is in Mr. Smith's office, giving him time to take a video lesson in conversational Chinese. He already speaks Spanish fluently and wants to master at least two more languages. After 20 minutes, though, he decides to go to his computer to check his company's latest political-risk assessment on Spain..."

I find it ironic that even as Lester Korn,

Chairman of Korn/Ferry, is presenting his study's results, he himself quotes Chrysler's Lee Iacocca as follows:

"If a guy wants to be a chief executive 25 or 50 years from now, he will have to be well rounded. There will be no more of 'Is he a good lawyer, is he a good marketing guy?' He'd better speak Japanese or German, he'd better understand the history of both of those countries and how they got where they are, and he'd better know their economics pretty cold."

Ithink that what happened is that the Korn/

Ferry study asked *current* executives for their predictions, and, sadly, many current executives are fairly ignorant about international issues and hands-on technology. Even so, given the realities around them, I am surprised that they don't recognize certain inevitabilities. But many critics have argued that senior executives are often out of touch with organizational realities anyway. One of the Korn/Ferry findings indicated that current executives believe that the executive in the year 2000 will have to "emphasize ethics."

Admirable and desirable, but given the realities I read about nearly every day in the newspapers, it's easy to be a bit pessimistic. Still, give the Korn/Ferry study some credit. They've empirically determined some important trends, many of which most commentators would subscribe to.

In any event, I hope that you've found some value in this and the prior column as you plan your own career. See you in the executive suites!

INSIDE A/C by Ron Fell & Diane Rufer

Congratulations to everyone involved with this year's Conclave in Minneapolis. It drew nearly 600 registrants, the sessions were great and A/C radio really turned out for the weekend. At the A/C format breakfast we co-moderated the session with WLIP's Terry Havel and we covered some new ground--plotting to overcome the apathy attacking our format from outside and within. At conventions, seminars and conclaves, A/C stations seem to care about the survival and revitalization of the format, but unless all 400 A/C stations play a concerted role in the development of new A/Cartists and can do so with enthusiasm. the format could well go the way of what used to be AOR. We're not that bad yet, but we're perilously close. RON FELL

Now to this week's music...we have a new number one--DON HENLEY's "The End Of The Innocence", which hits the top of the chart in only six weeks, replacing SIMPLY RED's "If You Don't Know Me By Now" which was number one for five of those weeks.

RICHARD MARX clears 200 stations in his first four weeks since release. More stations are playing Richard than any other artist. Reaction has been so exceptionally quick and positive that it would be hard not for it to succeed HENLEY at the top.

Next up should be GLORIA ESTEFAN's new single, which by this time next week will be over the magic 200 station mark. It's new this week for KFIG, KBOI, WTPI, WMXC and WKIO.

DONNY OSMOND's "Sacred Emotion" is now at number 16, the peak chart position of his previous single, "Soldier Of Love". But

"Sacred" is destined for a much higher peak. It's new this week for KVIL, WZNY, WTIC/ AM, WAED, KWLO and WRVA and HIT FACTORing for 84% of all stations playing it more than one week.



JOHN COUGAR MELLENCAMP's "Jackie Blue" is already at #24 in two weeks of charted status. HIT FACTOR is now an even 50% thanks to quality rotations from the likes of WKYE, WGOL, KYJC, WMT/ FM, WELI, KBLQ, WZST, KOKO, etc.

CHER wastes no time charting. Her new singlelandsatnumber 28 (out highest debut by a long shot) and is a MOST ADDED again this week thanks to K103, WOKZ, WZPK, WLAM, KRKO, KYLT and WGOL.

PHOEBE SNOW charts with "Something Real" at number 38. It does so with a 63% HIT FACTOR from 60 stations. Among the quality rotations are WKCX, WJON, KŠAL, WELW, KYJC, KHLT/FM and WMT/FM.

Last week's RECORD TO WATCH, CUTTING CREW's "Everything But My Pride" is this week's TOP TIP and our MOST ADDED. Big chart number for sure.

TJ: That was Teddy. Apparently when he was going to produce the album, he was going to put the song to us. So he gave it to Tom Whalley, who is in the A&R department at Capitol, who gave it to Rodney Mills who gave it to us. We listened to it. To be perfectly fair, some guys liked it, some guys didn't. I was one of the guys who wasn't real nuts about it. I didn't hear what they heard. Plus the version we listened to was recorded badly. It sounded like there was gum on the tape when they recorded it. But we had a tense encounter session in the recording booth. The whole damn band was stuck in this small, intense area and we WORKED IT OUT. Pat came up with that guitar lick. The rest of us added parts. It went back and forth. Finally we got it all together, recording it-boom boom boom-in about three days, faster than we did anything else. In fact, they put the keyboards on when they were mixing it. Nobody was even there to watch.

PS: I was.

TJ: I'm glad you were. And I'm glad they put the keyboards on, because without them, the song really sounds dead to me. You could say we're paying the Isleys back because they did a cover of "Listen To The Music" a long time ago. I'd been a fan of theirs since I was a kid. I was complimented that somebody who'd done "shake it up baby, twist and shout" and everything after that had cut a version of "Listen To The Music" that I really liked. So I went over to thank them back in '77 or '78. I was a little nervous for a while because I

thought I was going to be ejected on my face from their dressing room. Finally the guitarist, Ernie recognized me. "Oh, you're the guy who wrote 'Listen To The Music." I said, "Yeah, I'm about to get my ass kicked, please tell the guys I'm not some little fool wandering around the dressing room." I guess you can say it's our chance to say "Thank you."

KZ: This album is riddled with highway and road references. Does the road have a different meaning since the constant touring of the past? TJ: I like playing live, but I don't like what goes on in between. We're not going to go out and do two hundred gigs a year anymore. That was insane. You don't need to tour that much. I often wonder why we did. But I never paid attention back then. I just did it. Some guys have families. But we're definitely as lively onstage as we were back then. Playing live rejuvinates us.

KZ: Allegedly "China Grove" was played one million times on the radio?

PS: I can believe it. We played it a million times! KZ: Any impressions of the radio and music business today after having been through a couple of important eras of rock n roll?

PS: I think what musicians are hoping for is that music will come back around toward covering a broader pop spectrum. Right now it's been a little bit segmented, so much so that it's hard to enjoy it as much. It's hard to get introduced to things because it's like, "Another rock slide!" They play all these songs and you ask, "Who was that?" It's like there's no one to help people find or enhance

the experience of discovering new music. I'm seeing music being presented in narrow spectrums. I hear all these tunes in a row. You have no idea who it was, you just listen, then they go into a car stereo commercial or something. You never hear who the artist is. You find out eventually by listening, but wouldn't it be nice if they just told you who you were listening to? Radio could be a little more intimate with the listener. I think that's gone away from radio a little bit. The deejay is a little bit strained for my taste. The more "new age" type stations seem to be more sensitive to their listeners in that they talk and communicate a little more. They establish a rapport. Regarding that specific type of music-new age and Jazz-there's some interesting stuff going on in that type of radio. I'm talking about stations like KKSF.

KZ: Much of Album Radio still plays lots of music from the seventies. Has that effected the band? Does the old Doobie Brothers music sell? TJ: Do you mean has that saved our asses? Is that what you're asking?

KZ: In a more polite way, yes.

TJ: It ain't hurt us, that's for sure. I've said this many times. We don't look at this as a nostalgia thing. We sure as hell weren't aware that we would be touring out when so many bands who had been together during that era were going out. We didn't know that. This is all new stuff and we're looking at this as a brand new project. We're starting all over again.

JAZZ NEW RELEASES

THE SPIN - YELLOWIACKETS (MCA)

When we last chatted, the 'jackets were pondering taking a more acoustic route and while The Spin couldn't possibly be classified as an acoustical bum, pianist Russell Ferrante makes a strong acoustic statement on trax like "Geraldine," (the disc's melodic opener) and "Storytellers." Ferrante put on his composing shoes for this one. Recorded in ECM land at Rainbow Studios in Oslo, Norway, The Spin was engineered by Jan Erik Kongshaug, whose name is synonymous with the mysterious fidelity of early and current ECM projects. On Ferrante's "Prayer For El Salvador," Marc Russo uses his upper range for the more passionate moments. As somber as this song could be, it evokes a very hopeful feeling, personifying the spirit of the region so torn by international superpower chessboard politics. "Whistle While You Walk" is-you guessed it-the walkingest bass work on the set list. Also written by Ferrante, it's very much a group rave-up, the closest we come to an all-out bebopping assault. In midstream, Yellowjackets break out into a tight and smoky Jazz four-piece. This time around, nothing comes close to being a conscious pop entry like last time's "Local Hero." We feel good about that. As Jazz and Adult music reels toward the mainstream, a blatant concession could hurt a band of Yellowjacket's caliber. As for the ECM connection, I'm willing to bet that their visit inspired both parties.

IOHN ABERCROMBIE/ MARC JOHNSON/PETER ERSKINE

On the subject of ECM....while this live album (recorded in Boston) wasn't born in a Norwegian studio, Abercrombie brought his brand of atmospherics to the USA. On the opening Marc Johnson composition, Abercrombie experiments with violin tones on his guitar synthesizer. On what sounded like a magic night, Abercrombie uses the force of drummer Peter Erskine and bassist Johnson to give his music a bottom-heavy swing. For a trio, this is a cinematic presentation. On a dime, Abercrombie turns over a traditional leaf, jamming with a clean yet reverberated tone on what basically could be called "Stella By Starlight." This is an interesting effort if only because it shows us how an ECM road show sounds in principal. SKINDIVER - NONA HENDRYX(PRIVATE MUSIC)

Hearing a progressive Nona Hendryx doesn't surprise us a bit. Those who associate her with Patti Labelle just haven't been following her music. Working out of New York, her solo work over the past six years has utilized the progressive talents of Material. She has since developed an affinity with artists like Peter Gabriel, Laurie Anderson and Kate Bush rather than Ms. Labelle or Tina Turner. Yet none of the aforementioned artists can draw from such a soulfulness as can Nona Hendryx. Lyrically, Hendryx wrestles with some of the less intimate by-products of life in the late twentieth century. Ironically utilizing a newfound computer expertise, Hendryx longs for a less technocratic approach to human interaction. On songs like "Women Who Fly," "SkinDiver" or "Off The Coast Of Love" Hendryx exhibits a feminist strength and self-determination. Co-produced by Peter Baumann. Definitely not for squeamish milquetoast "new age" ears.

SIDEWAULK - CAPERCAILLIE (GREEN LINNET)

Fans of electric and eclectic music the likes of Clannad, Van Morrison, Flairck, Pyewacket and Enya will rejoice with this one. Capercaillie (pronounced Kapper-Kelly) weave a tannehill spell with recorders, whistles, bouzoukis, fiddles accordions, Martin acoustic guitars AND synths and drums. The playing is absolutely dexterous. There is complicatedly-structured vocal tunes, but it's the multimovemented instrumental dance pieces that fly. Holy smokes can these Scots play! There's a myriad of directions you can go with this one. You can start with the instrumental "Balindore" or else the haunting vocal "Fisherman's Dream." As you may have guessed Capercaille juggle their traditional roots with the wonders of modern age synthesizers and digital drum sounds. We found it refreshingly outrageous! RIDIN' THE TIDE - OCEANS (PROJAZZ)

Music is Oceans game and NBA basketball is their trade. When we say trade, we mean that Oceans performs at all Milwaukee Bucks home games. No doubt, genius former Bucks/current Warriors coach Don Nelson misses their licks. All we get here at Warrior games are crusty oldie/classic rock snores. Oceans play a tasty blend of easy electric Jazz pleasers, not unlike the style of early Yellowjackets. Cuts include the rousing opener/title track, "Ridin' The Tide." Tell you what, we'll send over an extra guard for Oceans'

performances at our Coliseum. THE ROAD LESS TRAVELED - MARVIN "SMITTY" SMITH (CONCORD)

Praised by KJAZ's Bob Parlocha as one of this year's best, Marvin "Smitty" Smith releases his second effort as a bandleader with a "big band" that includes such young neo-boppers as Robin Eubanks, Wallace Roney, James Williams, Ralph Moore and Steve Coleman, calling in the chips after guesting on thirty albums as a sideman. Playing it traditional, Smith leads the parade with swingin' authenticity. Like Winard Harper (another bandleader/swing drummer), Smith shows himself to be quite an accomplished Jazz leader. As impressively as writing seven out of eight performances on The Road Less Traveled, Smith chooses to cover the complicated "Gothic 17" penned by Jazz/Rock/progresso percussionist Bill Bruford. That choice balanced with the pure Jazz sanctity of the remaining songs (like "The Neighborhood") points to a major worker in progress. Don't forget to check out the hot "Salsa Blue." We look forward to hearing more from Smitty!

"CHEER DOWN" - GEORGE HARRISON (WARNER BROS.)

All of those who saw the latest Lethal Weapon sequel starring Mel Gibson and Danny Glover no doubt noticed a brand new George Harrison track that sounds suspiciously close to being a Traveling Wilbury tune. Co-written by Tom Petty, I like "Cheer Down" a lot even though it's hard to hear any literal connection between the lyrics and the movie, something that shouldn't concern radio one iota. Consider also that Lethal Weapon 2 biff! bang! pow! kicked Batman's butt its' first week out.

"IT'S NOT ENOUGH" - STARSHIP (RCA) According to the Los Angeles Times, the next Starship album features some blatant swipes at the opposing Jefferson Airplane/ Paul Kantner/Grace Slick faction. Titled Love Among The Cannibals (named after the big fall-out), singer Mickey Thomas told the Times, "Someone said the two groups should tour together and they could promote it like big-time wrestling." On "It's Not Enough," surviving members Thomas and guitarist Craig Chiquico una bashedly ride a mainstream wave as the audio team of Mike Shipley and Larry Klein (whose past credit include working with the Cars and Joni Mitchell) light a powerful fire under the song and the performers. Hot stuff. Can't wait until things heat up.

<u>"SHAKIN" THE TRÊE"</u> N'DOUR (VIRGIN)

Few people can judge the power of the singing voice better than Peter Gabriel. And his presence on "Shakin' The Tree" makes a strong statement in favor of Senegalese dynamo Youssou N'Dour. Gabriel performs the payback as it was N'Dour that contributed greatly to "In Your Eyes" and the Last **Temptation Of Christ** soundtrack. If you've $ever\,seen\,N'Dour\,perform, you\,know\,that\,he$ has the voice that could topple the Tower Of Babel. Try something truly unusual and let your listeners hear this fantastic pair in action.

"SOMETHING TO HOLD ON TO" -TREVOR RABIN (ELEKTRA)

Bound to cause more enthusiasm and/or confusion in the Yes camp, but what the hay. Before joining the late-Yes line-up, Trevor Rabin, like a mainstream version of Todd

Rundgren, bashed away, recording one-man band rock n roll albums. "Something To Hold On To" is another rocker from the man who owns a thousand guitars and probably crams just as many inside his solo songs. This one's thick and dense with pop power chords, harmonies and backbeat drumming. Both the video and the playing are zany and, fortunately, not overly serious.

IASON AND THE SCORCHERS (A&M) Jason Ringenberg is one of the kindest, most sensitive guys you're liable to meet in rock n roll. But put him up onstage with that guitarbashing madman Warner Hodge and you've got pure trouble. Nashville's favorite son is back without the confusing "Is he country or is he rock n roll?" reputation. By sitting it out for a spell, Jason and the Scorchers come back rockin' without apologizing for it. So switching their sights completely to Album Radio, trax like "My Kingdom For A Car" or "When Angels Cry" showcase some high energy. But alas, this new album isn't without a tip of the hat to some bluesy honky tonk whether it's slow ("Close Up The Road") or frantic ("Bible And A Gun"). Produced by Muscle Shoals legend Barry Beckett, the Scorchers stay true to their roots. But, I repeat, this is a rockin' album that's focused and revitalized. Good to have the guys back, isn't it?

MR. BIG (ATLANTIC)

Mr. Big plug in and play rough. The excitement of this band of young welterweights is translated through the nerve-endings of the music. The players were seemingly selected on the basis of their individual talents. Eric Martin has always been a strong singer in search of a band vehicle. Billy Sheehan combines a fusion-like fury with rock tones and bass runs. Drummer Pat Torpey and guitarist Paul Gilbert keep up with the pack. The band sure seems to be enjoying themselves, as heard on the last few seconds of "Addicted To That Rush" and the first few seconds of "Wind Me Up." To borrow a phrase, the music on Mr. Big's debut is straight down to the knucklebones. Little concession is made to softening the blow. Rather than playing up the pop polish, this is hard stuff that, as a result will build a base of

sales first without having to push airplay buttons to survive. The playing is dexterous and, like I mentioned before, akin to some of the fast-paced playing I hear on the other end of my workweek when auditioning electric Jazz players. And believe me, I've come to appreciate that kind of musical integrity. PROMISING TRAVELER - NEW POTATO

CABOOSE (RYKO) New Potato Caboose are an extremely popular live performing unit who frequently sell out shows on the East Coast, especially in the Washington DC and Philly regions. This seven piece, virtually recorded live, are similar to bands like Camper Van Beethoven and Poi Dog Pondering, in that their structure and musical outlook is very much sixties-oriented and communal in spirit. Undaunted by time, New Potato Caboose build their sound around real drums, Hammondsounding organ and imprecise Deadheadtype vocals. Also like the Dead, NPC carry a lyricist among their ranks. Producer Elliot Mazer, who produced Janis Joplin and Neil Young in their prime, instills exactly the right amount of sixties spirit, seventies transition and eighties fidelity. Songs like "The Mansion" and "Rust In Peace" evoke a "truckin" feel. There are some nice ensemble performances that are loose, which is the type of playing a young audience will be turning to after being "technoed" to death. Each soloist plays like they're dying to express themselves. Check it out.

HE STONE ROSES

SHE BANGS THE DRUMS" - STONE ROSES (SILVERTONE IMPORT)

Look out! Stone Roses are one of Linda Ryan's ear picks—she swears by this Manchester group. Due out on the Silvertone/ RCA label, Stone Roses will hastily pick up in Alternative America where they left off in Great Britain. Stone Roses are produced by John Leckie, who expanded the sounds of House Of Freaks. Theirs is a fresh sound of the future influenced by early American bands like Love and perhaps a little by fellow hometown heroes, the Smiths. The spirit of the guitar work is very similar to the weaving style of Johnny Marr. KZ



INSIDE ALBUM by Kent Zimmerman

NEW ARTIST ALERT. Ya-hoo! There are some new artists bucking the odds and making a dent in this week's round-up. I grabbed four extreme examples to show that all different kinds of musicare alive and well on this week's survey. Examples are Texas, Boris Grebenshikov, Tora Tora and Canada's Indio.

TEXAS. Texas has enjoyed an extremely respectable first three weeks. As the entire album comes your way, check out additional trax like "Thrill Has Gone" or "Everyday Now." But the real plus is Texas'radio profile. According to this week's Gavin readout, there is a direct give and take between the more progressive tastemaker stations and the mainstreamers who are working together in breaking this act. So while you have KBCO, there's also KILO, WHFS and KXUS, 91X and KLAQ, KUKQ and KOME, WDST and WBCN and so on. That, to me, is an enviable wide appeal.

FROM RUSSIA WITH LOVE. One of the unexpected pluses of the glasnost movement between the USA and the Soviet Union and its satellite nations is the music exchange. Just out on the Mercury label is a new Soviet band Gorky Park, a hard rock outfit who sound seriously influenced by bands like Led Zep, Deep Purple and the Beatles. Culturally related, I saw an interesting television broadcast this past week. Not that I'm into Tabloid TV, but the Fox Network show "Cops" ran a very interesting hour. Usually consisting of docu-video footage of arrests and police procedure in American cities, this special episode came from a half American, half Soviet crew who filmed in Moscow and Leningrad. The tapes then left the USSR uncensored and unedited. The intriguing part of the show was how the Moscow police force is dealing with the youth culture they've been unable to stave off. Kids with motorbikes, haircuts and rock n roll have entered

the Russian mainstream. And they seem to be dealing with it the same way the Brits dealt with hooligans like the early Who, or the way we Yanks related to drug music of the sixties and the political unrest of the early seventies. Hopefully, music by Boris Grebenshikov will eliminate the stereotype we have that the Ruskies are generally an oppressed group listening to peasant music. It seems to me that the pop culture has taken over the Eastern Bloc, another example of the undeniable power that rock n roll has over the world. Incidently, Gorky Park cover Pete Townshend's "My Generation." Good

luck, Gorby. You're gonna need it.

ANOTHER BITE OF MARY'S DANISH.

Though I have no idea how the group got their name, I'm seeing increased interest on last week's Record To Watch, "Don't Crash The Car Tonight" by Mary's Danish on the Chameleon label (distributed by our friends at CEMA formerly EMI/Capitol etc.). Twenty brave souls are chug-a-lugging this one including WBRU, KTCL, WXRT, WBCN, WKZQ, KOTR, KUKQ, KSPN, WDST, 91X, KROQ, WMDK and a host of other hip signals. Please keep dibs on this witty rock n roll record. KZ





The Hangmen know how to write great songs, and the late Vic Maile (Godfathers, Screaming Blue Messiahs, Dr. Feelgood) knows how to make the most of the band's raw talent. There are plenty of songs to choose from. The single is "Rotten Sunday" and my personal favorites include "My Way," "Desperation Town," "Tell Me What You Want" and a killer version of the Flamin' Groovies' classic, "Slow Death." The single doesn't do this record justice, so don't be afraid to give the album a thorough listen. LR



LOST - THE DIED PRETTY (Beggars Banquet)

The Died Pretty are one of Australia's best indie talents. Although they are lesser known in America, last summer the band reached number one on the singles and album charts down under. It's lucky for us that Beggars Banquet is releasing this album in the States for a number of reasons. Reason number one: This is a great record. The Died Pretty obviously have spent time listening to a healthy dose of vintage garage music which comes through on the faster, psyche-out type songs. The slower, more brooding tracks are quite beautiful. Reason number two: This should mean the end of outrageous import prices on future Died Pretty releases. That alone is reason to celebrate. Reason number three: Hopefully this could mean a tour sometime in the future. The single is "Lost," but my personal favorites include the wild "Out of My Hands," "Crawls Away," and the Australia charttopper, "Towers of Strength." It takes a couple of spins to digest the more introspective pieces, so spend some time with this one. You'll be glad you did. LR



A Way Of Life—SUICIDE (Wax

Alan Vega (vocals) and Martin Rev (instruments) recorded two albums in the mid '70s then parted company to pursue solo projects. On A Way Of Life the instrumentations are minimal and repetitive while the vocals are filled with angst-a combination that pulls you into their world of sound. Though you'd never know it, Boston's Suicide has influenced such mainstreamers as Bruce Springsteen and The Cars. STARSHIP - It's Not Enough (RCA)

Personnel changes have shifted the group's direction, reflected on the first single from their soon to be released "Love Among The Cannibals" album. Lead vocalist Mickey Thomas keeps the crew on course, attacking the stellar chorus provided by the writing team of Martin Page ("We Built This City") and Tommy Funderburk. Mass appeal rock!

MILLI VANILLI - I'm Gonna Miss You (Arista)

Rob Pilatus and Fab Morvan's explosion on the American music scene is one of those remarkable success stories. Here's the song that should put them in consideration for "Best New Artist Of The Year." KWSS San Jose reports it as their second most-requested, which is easy to understand after hearing the first few notes of this spectacular ballad.

FINE YOUNG CANNIBALS - Don't Look Back (IRS/MCA)

Can't tell you how many times I've told people this is my favorite album of the year so far. They all say the same thing: "Yeah, it's mine too!" After listening numerous times I find it impossible to burn out on "The Raw &

The Cooked," which is simply a collection of one great single after another.

BEASTIE BOYS - Hey Ladies (Capitol)

Just when you thought it was safe to crank up the radio, here come those party animals to shake things up once again. Never short on creative ways to play off a song title, The Beasties have concocted a rap that guys and ladies are sure to get off on this summer.

CROSSOVER PICK

SHARON BRYANT - Let Go

(Wing/PolyGram)

Exceptional solo effort from the former lead singer of Atlantic Starr. Takes a big five point move for a spot inside the top twenty-five on the URBAN CONTEMPORARY chart this week. Sharon's unique phrasing adds a special touch to this smooth production.

ALBUMS by Ron Fell

BABYFACE-Tender Love (Solar/CBS)

Boy howdy, are the hits gonna flow from this set! Babyface, no stranger to great production dating back to ROCK STEADY by The Whispers (maybe even before that), has a gifted sense of hitmaking. The lead single, IT'S NO CRIME, may have had an unfair month's lead in Urban radio, but the evergrowing legion of dance-oriented Top 40 stations will have a field day with it in the weeks to come. The title track, TENDER LOVE, is a traditional, mid-hop love song loaded with production hooks. CAN'TSTOP MY HEART is as persistently percussive as its title. My fave, other than the current single, is MY KINDA GIRL. Its melodic undercurrent sweeps an otherwise rhythm ditty into the pop mainstream. Side two (for those of you with vinyl) will find the exotically titled WHIP APPEAL the dominant ballad of the package. It's a track that's hard to beat. The reason this is such a creative success is that Mr. Babyface excels as a songwriter, producer, arranger AND performer. There are few who do so well in all areas.


