



CAPITOL RECORDS CHIEF RESIGNS

Capitol Records President David Berman resigned his position, and will pursue other interests.

Berman joined the label in 1987 as President of Capitol-EMI Music. He became President of Capitol Records that same year. In the interim Capitol-EMI Music, Inc. President and Chief Executive Officer Joe Smith will oversee Berman's former duties.

"David Berman has played a key role in the revitalization and return to profitability of Capitol Records," said Smith. "We wish him well in his future endeavors."

Quinn Flies From Eagle 106

Eagle 106-Philadelphia Program Director Charlie Quinn has left the station after disagreeing with General Manager David Noll about programming.

"Charlie left because we basically disagreed on the direction the radio station should go in," said Noll. "Charlie felt that we should be more of an Urban radio station and I felt we should be more of a main line Top 40." The philosophical differences of the two obviously ran deeper, evidenced by Noll's statement,

"We had some other areas of the station we pretty much disagreed on. Charlie had some things he wanted to do and we decided it was best that we parted company."

Noll hasn't found a replacement. "We're talking to people right now."

Quinn was not reached for comment.

EICHNER LEAVES CBS

After seventeen and a half years with the company, CBS A&R chief Mickey Eichner is leaving to pursue other interests.

Eichner joined the label as Director of Independent Productions in 1972 and eventually became Senior Vice President of A&R. Since joining the label he has worked closely with the company's impressive roster. CBS President and CEO Walter Yetnikoff said, "The creative direction and executive leadership that Mickey Eichner has provided played a major role in the extraordinary growth of CBS Records during the past seventeen and a half years. We will miss him and wish him continued success."

Officer Joe Smith will oversee BIRCH LEAVES BIRCH

Tom Birch, founder and Chairman of Birch/Scarborough has announced his decision to leave the company and start a radio acquisition firm, Opus Media Group.

"As you can imagine, it was a very difficult decision," Birch told the Gavin Report. "What led up to my decision to depart and start something new was a period of introspection that occurred after we sold our interest to VNU. I knew when I sold out my stock and became Chairman and CEO, operating under VNU, my role would change."

Dutch Multimedia firm VNU bought controlling interest in Birch/Scarborough in October of 1987. VNU, a \$1.2 billion company has, according to Birch, "built up quietly and rapidly an empire of companies in the research sector." One of VNU's holdings is the

Simmons Major Market Research which is the newspaper ratings arm of that giant research corporation.

Birch decided to form Opus when "I finally came to realize what I've enjoyed most is the building process, and for me to have the fun that I like to have on the job I really had to return to my roots and start building something again."

Six months ago, along with his partner, former programmer Raymond Quinn, Birch began his acquistioning by taking over WWAV-Ft. Walton Beach/Santa Rosa Beach, FL, which he says will shortly be the top biller in the station's market.

When asked if he had reservations regarding leaving his name behind, Birch said, "Quite the opposite. I have tremendous pride in this company. The

downside is that I believe that Birch/Scarborough is within striking distance of surpassing Arbitron and it's really a kind of personal disappointment that I won't be at the helm when we cross the finish line and grab that 51% share point from Arbitron. But, I'll be rooting from the sidelines."

Birch officially leaves Birch in January of 1990. Currently plans have him working out of Coral Gables, FL and Quinn out of San Antonio, TX. "Sometime we hope to move into an office together, said Birch in closing. "For now we'll be meeting on the road."

"Mr. Bacchus made a major contribution to the success of our jazz program," said PolyGram Jazz VP Barry Seidel. Bacchus is credited with helping along the success of Betty Carter and Terri Lyne Carrington among others. He has been with the label's jazz division since 1987.

It hasn't been officially announced, but the Gavin Report learned that Michelle Taylor has exited EMI for PolyGram, and it is speculated that she will assume Bacchus' former position.

Radio Stations Help Cities Recover From Hugo

As residents of the Southeastern seaboard try to return to normal after the devastation caused by Hurricane Hugo last week, some of our Gavin Reporters have been doing whatever they can to help make the transition back to normal life as smooth as humanly possible. In the Charleston, South Carolina area, nearly 70,000 people are homeless as a result of the storm and electricity is out, and will be out for as long as three to four weeks, in large portions of the area.

"People are really pulling together. They're reaching out to help. The majority of Charleston radio stations are off the air," said WMGL Program Director Earl Boston, whose station is one of those that is off the air. "The stations that are on the air are talk They are giving out information on where you can find water, shelter, ice, food, batteries. Listeners are actually calling in saying I have an extra bedroom and can house two or three people." Boston reports that while the power is on at WMGL offices, the transmitter site is in the dark, and it could be as long as a few weeks before it goes back

Steve Chapman, who is Program Director at WNMB in Myrtle Beach said that his station avoided destruction because the eye of the storm passed them by. But the first few blocks beyond Myrtle Beach is totally destroyed, he said, and the tourist industry will be set back. "We are on the air," said Chapman. "We went off the air only a few hours over one night. We went on emergency generator power for awhile, but now we're back on regular power." WNMB is a drop-off

point for individuals donating items to the Red Cross.

WHTK in Hilton Head, South Carolina has suspended its Top 40 programming and is concentrating on broadcasting vital information and has opened up their phone lines. Ralph Wimmer of WHTK urges his colleagues around the nation to let their listeners know they can make contributions through WHTK by calling 803-757-9485.

The Curse of the Morning People

KWSS MORNING TEAM OUT

The plague that seems to have infected San Francisco morning shows has spread south to San Jose, claiming KWSS' Bill Kelly and Al Kline as its first victims.

"They've been very successful for six years, but there comes a time when it's better to have a different approach—and that time has arrived," said PD Mark St. John. "We have a new morning show planned, but we can't say who'll do it right away."

In the interim KWSS afternoon personality Larry Morgan is rising and shining. "This is to his chagrin," laughs St. John, "because he left KHQT (HOT 97.7) (San Jose) to come to work for me so he wouldn't have to do mornings. But what do I do??? I put him on mornings!!!"

When asked to elaborate on what he means by "fresh approach," St. John said, "A new coat of paint for the station."

Kelly and Kline join Alex Bennett, last seen at LIVE 105 and Don Bleu, lately of X-100 as Bay Area Morning Personalities out of work.

Tolliver Exits WZAK

Citing lack of support, both from his station and the community, WZAK-Cleveland Program Director Lynn Tolliver has resigned from the station.

"I am not at liberty to discuss the direction I plan to take, but it will be in the radio/record industry," said Tolliver in a FAXed communique that railed against both WZAK and local organizations. "It's not my responsibility to be your quick fix," it said.


Upon Tolliver's departure, Bobby Rush was named Acting Program Director/Music Director. Currently the station is not looking outside for a new PD.

INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

Word of impending disaster in the form of Hurricane Hugo topped newspaper, TV and radio reports across the country. But when the storm hit The Carolina's and surrounding states, it was radio to the rescue as the main conduit of information to an understandably shaken and concerned citizenry. I spoke with Barry Richards, Program Director of POWER 98 (WBPR) in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, who has experienced his first hurricane, which he hopes will be his last. According to Barry, "the high winds and rain began last Thursday (9/21) at about three in the afternoon and Civil Defense told everybody to evacuate the town by eight o'clock that evening. Prior to that, everybody had gone to shelters and all the stations had shut down, except WKZQ which remained on with reduced power." When the storm was upgraded to a 4 (high intensity), Barry admits he considered going off too but kept POWER 98 running, offering staffers the option of leaving the premises. Most stayed and the station broadcast "calls from people at shelters giving personal accounts of what was taking place, playing requests for those at shelters and weather advisories from the National Hurricane Center in Florida." Going beyond the call of duty, air talent and MD Stevie Rocker, Promotions Director Michael Ray and weekend jock Kahuna drove in hazardous conditions of winds up to 100 mph and reported on conditions that included seeing looters and alerting police. Richards suspended music almost completely and says, "We let the radio become the people's forum." The Red Cross explained what they needed and in one case, a man having a heart attack called to ask for oxygen and a rescue squad got over to save him." POWER 98 was the most powerful station along the coast and stayed on-the-air, getting calls from North Charleston nearly 90 miles away. South Carolina Governor Carroll A. Campbell, Jr., will be honoring the station for its efforts. Charleston's Mayor, Joseph P. Riley, Jr. also had high praise for the POWER 98 crew. Rated number one in the most recent Birch, Barry points to the crisis as another example of "what radio is all about. This has really endeared us to the community and it's been really gratifying. No one else could have done this except radio. TV stations were off and power was out, so the only link was radio." Never one short on

one-liners, Richards didn't lose his sense of humor proclaiming to one and all, "While the others were bailin'—we were wailin'!" Hats off to POWER 98 and all the other broadcasters throughout the Carolina's region who put it all on the line when it counted most.

Good callout results along with top ten phones for MARTIKA at KEZY Anaheim where it races into the top ten 15-7. Results are similar at KSND Eugene where it's also an across the board callout winner taking a 16-10 jump. Other gains include WZZR 26-19, WAIL 31-24, WNSL 32-21, Z95 26-19, KGLI 12-6, KFBD 27-20, KWNQ 25-18, KMON 10-5, KAFX 27-19, KZMC 28-21, KHSS 22-14, KUBE 18-15, etc.

After four weeks of play at WBNQ Bloomington, IL the B-52's soar ahead 35-26. PD Mike Justin reports that it's a "big reaction record that's consistently in their 'Top Five At Ten.'" Mike says it creates "instant reaction." Heads into the top ten at WHHY Montgomery, AL where MD Nikki Stewart says, "It's hot—top ten phones and very strong with adults 25 plus." New on PRO/FM Providence, RI, WAVA Washington, D.C., WPXR Rock Island, IL, WLAZ Naples, FL, YES97 Columbia, SC and WYNU92FM Jackson, TN.



PAULA ABDUL continues on her smokin' streak with no slowdown in sales or requests in most areas. Like many who didn't play this track the first time around, WBEC/FM Pittsfield, MA PD Pat Ryan and MD Victor Lisle say reaction is all positive and move it 36-26. Charted top thirty at Z100, WDJX, Y106, Y100, WNVZ, Z95, WLXR, WSTO, WHSB, WWCK, KZZP, KYYA, SLY96, KGGI, FM102, etc.

"Mainstream rap" is how Ron Brooks, MD at WOVV West Palm Beach, FL, describes YOUNG MC where it charts at #15 and shows "solid top ten twelve-inch/cassingle sales and requests." Ron says, "Adult females like it because they can understand the words." Kristie Weimar, MD at WFHN/FM New Bedford, MA takes it 27-13 and is getting "tons of requests and excellent

sales—stores are selling out of it." At KMOK Lewiston, ID it's been on-the-air for a month and MD Kevin Chase reports, "The single went top ten as soon as it got into the stores with consistent top five requests," and a 21-11 gain. On fire at Y106 14-10, KDON 1-1, KITY 9-6, WFMF 17-12, KYNO 1-1, KIIS/FM 2-1, POWER 106 8-5, etc.

WDFX Detroit charts KIX at #1 for the second week. Response is immediate most everywhere. It was a "make it or break it" contender at Z104 Madison three weeks ago and now it's top five on the phones debuting at #35. Also taking off at KWYR with a debut at #37 and "top five requests after one week," KELY 34-28 "similar response pattern to other hit rock ballads," WPFM 39-33 "hot young adult calls," KBAU 28-24 "top five phones," KZZT 31-25 "top ten phones in first three weeks of play then slowed down a bit—picking up again. Strong reaction with 18-28 demo." Also #1 at OK95 Tri-Cities and KRZR Fresno.



Chart story developing nicely on ALICE COOPER who moves 24-19 at Q105 Tampa. Mark Hansen, MD at KFMW Waterloo, IA shows it moving 37-29 and says it's "appealing to younger demos and is a steady 'Hot Five At Nine' entry." Added at 93Q Houston, WGGZBaton Rouge, POWER 105 Albuquerque, X102 Reno, KPXR and KGOT Anchorage, Q96 San Antonio, WMJQ Buffalo, WMMY Melbourne, WBIZ Eau Claire, WKDD Akron/Canton, etc.

RICHARD ELLIOT featuring BOBBY CALDWELL is off and running at KSWB Seaside, OR and PD Jon Michaels says it's been "instant reaction, primarily female 20 plus" taking it 28-26. Other top thirty action includes KMEL 27-24, KWXX 36-27 and KITY 34-27. New on WXXQ, 106RTB, KQEN, KELY, KPKY, KZZT, KTDR, WZIX, WGBQ, etc.

HOT 97 New York moves SHANA's "I Want You" top ten with a 15-9 gain. Doing well at B95 Fresno 19-13, HOT 97.7 San Jose 32-27, ENERGY 96.5 Houston 30-26 and debuts at #28 for Q106 San Diego. Added at KMEL San Francisco and FM102 Sacramento.



THE REPEAT PERFORMER

ince the release of his first single, "Don't Mean Nothing", in June of 1987, Richard Marx has made his home in the Top Five with an unbroken string of hit songs. Whether writing and singing sensitive ballads that belie his youth (he turned 26 on September 16th) or rockin' hard n' heavy, Marx closes out 1989 as one of the most prolific and exciting artists to come along in many years. Not content with writing music just for himself, he's found time in his busy schedule to write and produce music for other acts, including Vixen, Poco, Ann Wilson and Robin Zander, Toto's Steve Lukather and Animotion. In the case of the latter it's fair to call it a labor of love, since he's husband to Animotion vocalist and "Dirty Dancing" star Cynthia Rhodes. Richard talked candidly about his life and career, immediately making it obvious that he's focused, very together and extremely happy with everything that's happened to him over the past two years.

DAVE SHOLIN: You've accomplished so much at such a young age. Have you been carefully planning your career?

RICHARD MARX: Well, there's certainly a lot of planning that goes into it and we try and think out each step we make, but I spent a lot of years banging my head against the wall, being rejected like a lot of people. I think I came along at a time when people were maybe getting tired of hearing dance grooves and there was the other audience that didn't really get into heavy metal. Then, there weren't that many people doing straightahead, melodic, song-oriented rock 'n roll. So in that way I'm lucky. I get to play the kind of music that I like to play. I haven't had to try to fit into any format. I write music that I would want to hear on the radio myself and try and make the best records out of it. It's been nice because I haven't had to worry about anything except doing what I love to do.

DS: I hate labels, but would it be safe to describe your music as mass appeal? "Right Here Waiting" is a good example of crossing format boundaries.

RM: "Right Here Waiting"-it's even difficult for me to understand and it's bigger than meway bigger than me. It's the song that was never intended to be on my record. In fact, I had to argue for months because I didn't want it on the album. Not because I didn't think it was a good song, it was just never set up to be a record for my album. It was never set up to be a song that I would play in concert or anything. It was a song that was just a personal thing. It would have been like me writing a love letter and then printing it in the National Enquirer. It felt very impersonal to put it on the record and yet everybody that heard the little demo I made responded in such a way that I figured that's what I do as a songwriter. I'm trying to communicate with people and hopefully let them relate to what I'm trying to think about. It felt like an oddball of a song because the rest of the album is a lot harder than the first album and it felt weird to put a really sparse, pretty song like that on the record—but I'm sure as hell glad I did.

DS: That is really surprising, especially about a song that could be one of the biggest, if not THE biggest song of the year. Sounds like you're not one of those who thought it would become a giant?

RM: No. I've never been able to predict that stuff. I argued with the record company when they wanted to put out "Endless Summer Nights". I argued with them when they wanted to put out "Hold Onto The Nights." I argued about "Right Here Waiting" coming as soon as it did. "Right Here Waiting" was a strange thing because when I agreed to put it on the album I didn't want to come with a ballad that soon. "Satisfied" led off the LP and I wanted to come with "Nothin' You Can Do About It" or "Too Late To Say Goodbye". Radio stations just started to play it off the album. After a few weeks of that I just said, "It's out of our hands, so put it out."

DS: Smart move considering the heavy airplay it's been getting for months...

RM: ...nausea rotation I call it.

DS: What do you feel it is about "Right Here Waiting" that turned it into one of the biggest number one songs of this year?

RM: It's the kind of lyric that people, if they were songwriters, would want to write to somebody else. I have so many people tell me that the lyrics of that song describe their relationship. Tons of guys come up to me and say, "Man, I wish I'd been able to say that to my old lady." A guy came up to me vesterday and said, "I sent a copy of that single to my girlfriend. She lives in Utah and that's our song now." On one hand, it's really flattering and sweet, but on the other hand, I have this nightmare of me singing that song in a white tuxedo in Las Vegas! But I take it for the compliment that it is. The other thing, if I had to put my finger on it, is that the melody was just there—it was not even a song melodically that I had to work at, it just kind of wrote itself. There's something familiar about the melody, and yet it's not stealing from anything in particular. People who hear it feel like they've heard it before even though they haven't.

DS: Your Dad is a commercial jingle writer. What about your Mom?

RM: She started as a singer with a big band and still sings on commercials today.


DS: How much of your interest in music and entertainment as a youngster do you attribute to your folks?

RM: My parents made a decision when I was born that they were not going to turn the stereo down because there was a baby in the house. Most parents go through that dilemma and my Dad said, "Hey, this is our life. He's going to have to fit into our life." So in the crib I was hearing stuff like Blood, Sweat and Tears. Luckily, my parents were not strictly into either Jazz or Classical music, they were into the music of the day. They were very interested in popular music. My parents loved all the bands I loved. Even to this day my Dad, who is sixty-five, thinks Def Leppard's great! Fortunately, there's been that communication musically and whatever ability I have as a singer, I get from my Mom and whatever ability I have as a melodic writer, I get from my old man. DS: Did you sing on some jingles yourself?

RM: Yes. Years ago when I was a little kid—that's the first thing I did. Everybody's made such a big deal out of it. I haven't done it since I was six or seven years old.

DS: Did you know that jingles weren't your forte?

RM: There came a point very early on when I knew I never wanted to write jingles because I'd never be as good as my old man and I didn't want to be second best. Plus, I wanted to write songs. My Dad didn't have a problem with writing the music he wrote. I just never wanted to write songs about furniture stores and breath mints and stuff like that. My Dad took it as, "Hey, this is what I do." He never wrote the lyrics to those stupid ads themselves, but he wrote really catchy musical melodies.



DS: Anything we know that he's written?

RM: Hundreds and hundreds—the list goes on and on. I mean, from the old Marlboro commercials, to Pillsbury and Chevrolet, Kellogg's to Nestle's, just tons of familiar jingles.

DS: Do you consider yourself first and foremost a songwriter?

RM: Yes. Everything that I do starts with a song and it's what I pay the most attention to. What I work the hardest at is songwriting because I don't really think about singing. I mean, I've always sung since I was a little kid so I don't ever think of myself as a singer. I think of Steve Perry as a singer. My favorite singer is John Farnham, from Australia. I think of him as a SINGER, I think of myself as a songwriter who sings rather than a singer who happens to write songs.

DS: You've expressed some strong feelings about rights of composers...

RM: My attitude has always been that unless you're starving, don't sell your publishing. I try to encourage young songwriters to hold onto their publishing. Publishers do serve a purpose sometimes, but there are a lot of people out there that want to take your shit and give you a percentage of what you own, instead of the other way around. I've been offered so many publishing deals for various amounts of money and to me as a songwriter it's really all I have. So I've always held onto my publishing and that's the main point I try to get across to other songwriters. If they can hold out and their songs are decent, the songs will see the light of day with or without a publisher.

DS: When you wrote "Don't Mean Nothing" you'd experienced rejection at every label—some several times. Now, with a perfect track record on all your singles, it must be an incredible feeling?

RM: On one hand, I'm thrilled about the fact that I'm able to do what I've always wanted to do and have the opportunity to play music people get to hear. But it's frustrating because I see so much of the same thing going on with other people and the problem, in my opinion, with the record business in general is A and R (Artists and Repertoire). In any other business you can think of-if a guy has no success and he's fired, he's out of the business! A guy at a record company, who has no success in A and R, gets fired and then he gets hired by another record company! I can tell you about a guy who not only rejected me, but actually encouraged me at first to go in the studio and make my demos better. One of the songs on my demo tape at the time was "Should've Known Better," and another one "Endless Summer Nights." This guy said to me, "You need to make these demos better." I said, "That's fine, except I don't have any money." "No, no, no," he said. "I'm going to sign you, just go and make the demos, do what you have to do and you'll get the money back when I sign va." So me, Mister Naive, thinking this is about as close as I'm going to get to getting signed, got money that I didn't have and went in and made the demos better and the guy rejected me again. He told me I should think about writing with other people and told me, "Go listen to the Go West album—that's what's happening, man—that's where it's at." I think Peter Cox, Go West's lead singer, is an anazing singer, but you saw what happened to the Go West record—it's Go Who? now. This same A and R guy either quit or got fired a few weeks ago. Now, I'm just waiting to see in the trades who will hire him for his next ten years!

DS: Don't you think A and R is tough?

RM: I don't have anything against a guy who has found somebody and nurtured a performer and signed him and then maybe gone through five years where he hasn't had that kind of luck. At least you can say then that he's able to spot talent. But I know for a fact this guy has never signed an act successfully—EVER! So, it's very frustrating because there's some talented people out there who he's rejecting. He doesn't know what he's doing.

DS: Yet some of those experiences inspired you to write your first hit record.

RM: Right and the one time I saw this person since then, he came up and put his arm around me and told me he always knew I was going to do well.

DS: Didn't you do some work with David Foster at one time?

RM: We worked together very closely for awhile and then there came a time when I had to move away from what he was doing because I wanted to go in a different direction—I wanted to make more rock records than he was interested in making-and there also came a point when I really had to completely focus on me as a performer and recording artist. I hadn't had any bites and I certainly hadn't gotten close to getting a deal and David was somebody that I really looked up to and admired. There was a time when he said to me, "You are not an artist, you're a songwriter. You're never going to get a record deal." When I realized that he felt that way, I told myself, "I gotta get away from this, I gotta get around people who are positive about me.

DS: Have you spoken with him since then? RM: Yes, It's very personable and cordial. It's not like he and I dislike each other at all, I

not like he and I dislike each other at all. I certainly don't dislike him; in fact, he helped me a great deal in terms of helping me get credits as a songwriter and he gave me work as a background singer. It's not a negative thing at all, it's just that when I finally got my record deal, I wanted to surround myself with people who believed in me as a singer and I couldn't include David on that list.

DS: Can you briefly go through your songwriting process? Is it different for every song you write or is there some kind of system?

RM: There's not really a process so much as I used to force myself to write. I used to set aside time to write songs and it wasn't a very productive time for me. I found that if I just let the inspiration happen, it happens more frequently and the music almost always comes first—maybe a title line, but I almost always write all the music before any of the lyrics start to form. I write melodies

pretty fast but the lyrics take me anywhere from a week to three weeks to three months. Lyrics can be really rough for me, but the process is that I don't write with an instrument anymore because when I'm on the road so much I can't get to a piano and I don't want to lug my guitar into the room sometimes, so I just sing melodies into a little hand-held cassette machine. I think it strengthens my melodies to not be relying on any instrument, I just kind of sing melodies and I've found there's a lot less limitations.

DS: Can great lyrics save a melody that really isn't that strong-or is a melody everything? RM: It's all opinions. The perfect example I think, for me, and I'm sure a zillion people disagree with me--1 felt like Tracy Chapman's "Fast Car" was not a great melody. I didn't think it was much of a tune at all, but the lyric was so powerful that I think people related and responded to it despite the fact that it wasn't, in my opinion, a very memorable melody. A lot of people may say, "You're fucked, it was a great melody." I don't think I'm nearly as good a lyricist as I am a melody writer. I try to write most of the lyrics and write the best lyrics I can, but a guy like Fee Waybill, with whom I write sometimes, comes up with brilliance in a matter of hours. As much as I'm envious of that, I have what I think are my strengths and weaknesses and try and balance the two out, making the best song overall through that.

DS: Have you found that your romance and subsequent marriage to Cynthia (Rhodes) has affected your music and mood and fueled any ideas?

RM: My relationship with her has certainly inspired a lot of music and a lot of song lyrics, but not since we've been married. We were together for such a long time before we were married. It's not really that different. It's just as great as it always was—it's not worse or better necessarily, it's kind of the same in a great way.

When we were first dating—they were very humble times for me and I wrote a lot of songs back then that she certainly inspired in different ways. They were not necessarily love songs all the time, but various songs, some of which may never even see the light of day. I draw on everything that I live. I draw on my experiences from being on the road and playing in a band, on everything—my relationship with my parents, my friends, my wife—it all comes into play.

DS: Any inspiration for the latest single, "Angelia"?

RM: "Angelia" is mostly a fictitious song. I've definitely had feelings about different girls in my life that relate to it, which is why I was able to write the lyrics, but there is no "Angelia" in my life. The name came from a flight attendant. We were in the middle of our first tour and we were exhausted, flying on America West Airlines and she was obviously brand new at what she did because she was smiling and having a good time with her job. There's something really nice about seeing someone have fun at what they do because

I think I'm one of the few people who really loves what he does. I noticed that her name was Angelia, which is a very neat name. I wrote it down and then a couple of months later I just started humming her name along with this melody and basically just drew from old past experiences to write the song.

DS: You sing it with so much feeling, it makes for a very intense listening experience.

RM: Well the video is going to surprise a lot of people. I think that we've taken a big risk in this video because the director interpreted the lyrics completely different than I wrote them and in the video what you'll find out is that "Angelia" has passed away. She's not gone in the terms of running out on me, she's gone because she was killed in an accident. We made it so it's not morbid, but I've never seen a video or storyline like that before and I think it's pretty powerful. The people on the set, the crew people, we did these various, pretty emotional scenes and they were taking out their handkerchiefs. I said, "Oh, great—all I need is to make people cry with this video!"

DS: Did you feel more confident going into the studio to record Repeat Offender after coming off such a huge success with your first album? RM: Yeah, I felt more confident just in terms of having made an album before. I was pretty experienced in the studio, but there's nothing like making your own record to give you experience and I felt like I knew exactly what it was I wanted to accomplish, and I wanted to have as much fun as humanly possible. Did I feel more confident that it was going to be successful? No, because I really just can't. I refuse to try and predict where songs are going to end up on the charts. I just do what I enjoy doing and the rest is left up to my managers and the record company. Repeat Offender gave me further experience for when I take on some producing projects in the next year. I don't let Richard Marx the singer or Richard Marx the performer shade the kind of records I make for other people. Luckily I try and make everybody's record unique to them—to the artist themselves-and that includes me too.

DS: What is it about producing others that you love so much?

RM: It takes the pressure and focus off of me. I don't have to worry about what my voice feels like, what I wear, I don't have to shave or do any of the things I have to keep in mind when I'm on the road or doing things for my own career as a singer. The other beauty of it is I'm home—I can stay home—I live very normal hours when I'm making a record, whether I'm producing some-body else or making my own. I work from cleven in the morning until seven at night and I'm home for dinner every night. I can see my friends. When I'm on the road like this, although I love the ninety minutes on stage a lot, it's a total drag being in a different town everyday and it's a very strange lifestyle, especially when you've got a family.

DS: With you and Cynthia being so busy, do you

have time for a personal life? Or do you postpone it?

RM: Well, Ma Bell knows us both on a first-name basis! It's the only way we can get through it because she is so busy and she's not the kind of woman who will just follow me around on the road. I probably wouldn't think that that would be great for us anyway, so she comes out every three or four weeks and spends a couple of days so we can stay in touch and not become strangers, but it's not easy. It's a very warped, strange way to have a relationship, but we've managed to survive the worst of circumstances.

DS: Is there one artist you'd love to produce that you haven't worked with before?

RM: Yeah, John Farnham. He's the guy from Australia who sang with Little River Band. He's been around a long time. He came to my first show in Melbourne, Australia a few weeks ago and John is my hero—he's the best singer I've ever heard in my life and also one of the nicest guys I've ever met. We spent some time with him and his family out at his house. I've been writing some songs for him and we're now trying to nail down some dates to coincide with his time off from his tour and my time off from my tour and just go in the studio and have some fun. That would be the ultimate treat for me as a producer to be able to not only write songs, but to produce a guy that l feel is vocally the best I've ever heard. He apparently really wants to work with me and God knows, I really want to work with him, so we're going to try and make a record together some time in the next six months or so.

DS: Does Cynthia give you any feedback on your music or help you come up with ideas? RM: She gives me a lot of honest feedback and luckily she likes most of the things that I write. But there have been a few where she says, "Uh, it's not my favorite," which freaks me out and I usually toss it. She's a pretty good gauge—we like the same kind of music so usually, if it's something she's not that crazy about, the more I listen to it and the more I work with it, the less interested in it I become. But ninety percent of the time she really likes the stuff that I come up with. I play her ideas, unfinished things and little pieces here

DS: What kind of music gets played the majority of the time in the Marx household?

and there—she's a good sounding board.

RM: Again. Farnham—his two albums 1 play constantly. Def Leppard, Aerosmith, I thought the last album was brilliant, I can't wait to hear the new one. Old Sam Cooke records—play 'em night and day. In fact, we've been doing "Bring It On Home To Me" a cappella every night in my show and it's been really fun. A lot of kids in my audience don't even know who Sam Cooke is and it's amazing. Plus, I still listen to tons of old Elvis records.

DS: Is there one song that you're proudest of? RM: I suppose that lyrically the song I'm proudest of is "Children Of The Night," because it was such an interesting idea for a song. I really tried my best to get as much imagery and as much of the

point across that I could, I think that's probably the best lyric I've written so far. Musically, my favorite song to sing that I've ever written is "Nothin' You Can Do About It." Hike the lyrics to that, too. It's a different kind of pride because "Nothin' You Can Do About It" was one of those songs where I just felt better after I wrote it—it was something I really needed to say for myself. Not only that, but I wrote it deliberately to stretch and try to challenge myself as a singer. When you write all your own songs, you write melodies that are easier to sing and sometimes you don't kick yourself in the ass.

DS: What can you tell us about your donating the publishing royalties for "Should've Known Better" to a young cancer patient?

RM: It was actually to the hospital that treated her in New York at NYU Medical Center.

DS: She had written for an autograph and you donated the song's royalties to the hospital? RM: Yes, after I became friends with her and saw the kind of work they were doing there—it seemed like the right thing to do because they need funding—they need help over there because they're doing great work and there's unfortunately more illness than technology can treat right now.

DS: Aren't you also donating royalties from "Children Of The Night" to an organization that helps runaways?

RM: Yes.

DS: That must be something you feel strongly about. What about the responsibility of other performers in doing these types of things? Or is that something that's an individual choice?

RM: Yeah, it's just for me. I can't say that I feel that artists have a responsibility. I think it's left up to the person and how they feel about things. If a guy feels like, "Hey, I'm giving joy to the world through my music and that's enough," then, that's his opinion and I can't argue with him. I try and find things that interest me personally. I don't like being part of a group of people trying to raise consciousness about things, not that the issues aren't valid, because they are certainly the rain forests are a major thing. I endorse the cause, but I don't want to be a part of a group on a bandwagon. I find things that really interest me and the majority of them have had to do with kids. I suppose because I had such a great childhood myself. I feel every kid should be entitled to having fun and not dealing with any crap, whether it be illness or living on a street. Some of these kids that are involved in the "Children Of The Night" organization were prostitutes at age twelve and thirteen and there's just no way that I can sit and go, "I'm too busy to help." When you know the facts about certain organizations, it's impossible to ignore them if you're a human being with any feelings. It doesn't mean oh, Richard Marx, what a great guy—it's just that I feel like I can't say "No" to that and I believe no one who has the opportunity to help would say, "No." I really believe that. I'm just very lucky to be in a position where I can help.

Only one record in last week's top ten increased in rotations this week as VAN MOR-RISON's "Have I told You Lately" gains 28 HEAVY mentions.

New to the top ten are ELTON JOHN's "Healing Hands" (+32 in HEAVY), POCO's "Call It Love" (+45 HEAVY) and JEFF HEALEY's "Angel Eyes" (+24 HEAVY).

The Swedish duo of PER and MARIE,



known as ROXETTE, are about to have their first top ten A/C record. Moving nine points each of the past two weeks, they've moved in HIT FACTOR (from 49% to 87%) and have tallied 32 ADDs including KBIG, K101, WJON, WMYX and WFBG this week.

A/C's hottest record this week is SIM-PLY RED's "You've Got It" which in two weeks has broken wide-open, moving 38 to 19. They ADD 57 A/Cs to the party over the two-week span and a better than two-outof-three HIT FACTOR. ADDs this week include K103, WKMI, KSTP/FM, WFMK and WVUD.



Another explosive, A/Cexclusive is JEI FERSON AIRPLANE's "Summer Of Love with 131 not-so-nostalgic A/C's hearing the late-eighties adult smash in just three weeks. New JEFFERSON Airplay from WFAS/FM, WIHN, KFQD, KDEŚ, KFIG

Our highest debut is last week's TOPTIP, STEPHEN BISHOP's "Walking On Air." BISH is averaging 41 ADDs a week including WZNY, WGOL/FM, WJTW, WKIO/ FM, WALR, WFAS/FM, WMGI, KRKOand WJZM, while its HIT FACTOR moves up to 44% (59% from those on it more than a week).

English newcomers, SOULSISTER, debut at number 32 and just miss the MOST ADDED box with 41 new stations. Among those stations are WTWR, WKCX, KSAL, WVMT, WKMI, KWLO, KFYR and WCVQ.

MOST ADDED each of its first two weeks is the wonderful duet from LINDA RON-STADT and AARON NEVILLE. Totalling 119 stations in ten working days, the track debuts early at number 33 and leads all records in PLUS FACTOR. Of the stations that added it last week, 75% are already committing it to meaningful rotations.

DONNA SUMMER

Breakaway (Atlantic)

A song about the clean, fast break—how to do it and what to take when you go. The most adult-attractive track on her triumphant comeback album.

KOOL & THE GANG

Never Give Up (Mercury/PolyGram)

The best Kool & The Gang single since J.T. left the group. This a fresh treatment of a song George Benson did for A/C radio in 1982. As good as the original.

PETER FRAMPTON

Holding On To You (Atlantic)

If the track sounds like a Winwood song, it could because the song's co-writer, Will Jennings, often writes with SW. Frampton adds his own signatures of vocal and guitar to the hooks and bridges. Good stuff!!

GRAYSON HUGH

Bring It All Back (RCA)

Eventually every A/C station in America played his previous single, "Talk It Over." Now's the time to show some unity. This can be a much bigger record, as it Cooke's in a cool way.

NATALIÉ COLE

As A Matter Of Fact (EMI)

Was Ms. Cole thinking of her producer, now husband, Andre Fisher, when singing this single? Natalie is proving that as a matter of fact it is good to be back with the release of her third single from her current

THE JETS

The Same Love (MCA)

Here's another single written by hitmaker Diane Warren. The Jets are accustomed to that word "hit," and even with a balladheavy playlist you will not be able to ignore this one. Elizabeth brings across Ms. Warren's words eloquently.

BILLY JOEL

We Didn't Start The Fire (Columbia)

Clever and novel, B.J. headlines the best and worst of our times -heroes and villains from Walter Winchell to Woodstock, from Watergate to Wheel Of Fortune. Hot A/C hittin' us where we were.

SERGIO MENDES' "Some Morning", our RECORDTOWATCH last week, picked up WFEB, WXVL, KQAQ, KLKC, KSTQ, WHIZ, KPTL and KRKO. The HIT FAC-TOR of the 48 stations now on it increases by 15%. This single is better than the usual caffeine for a perk-up playlist.

RECORD TO WATCH this week is RANDY CRAWFORD's "Knockin' On Heaven's Door" which comes to us via the hit movie, "Lethal Weapon 2." The combination of this lady's soulful vocals and the musical talents of ERIC CLAPTON and DAVID SANBORN, Mr. DYLAN would be proud of this version. Picking up WBTH, KFMO, KQAQ, KQIC/FM, WĔLŴ, WJEH, KRED, KITZ and KSNN.

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

BONNIE RAITT

TIMEKEEPER FOR A GENERATION OF ADULTS

onnie Raitt has spent two decades making wonderful music. Grow ing up in a show business family—her father, John Raitt starred in Pajama Game and Carousel—Bonnie took a different route to stardom, eschewing the bright lights of Broadway and Hollywood in favor of the closer, more intimate environs of blues and rock music clubs.

Bonnie's catalogue of recorded music and an almost constant touring schedule has won her an enviable core following who appreciate the commitment she's made to the roots music of rock 'n' roll.

Her current single, NICK OFTIME, which she wrote, is attracting considerable acclaim from critics and Adult Contemporary radio listeners. The song raises, in musical terms, the seldom heard issues of maturity and the personal contention of the biological clock ticking in each of us.

Bonnie is not a prolific songwriter, yet, as she says, "My arena is usually internal, or about one-to-one relationships. Morality can be on a societal level or how you treat your parents, your children, or whether you're good to the persons you love."

Since rock 'n' roll's infancy, the overwhelming attitude in lyric content has been a youthful, carefree lifestyle and sometimes the generation gap as seen from the young half. The heroes of the pop generation are not always those who share the ideals of adulthood and responsibility. The core issues addressed in Bonnie's NICK OF TIME are hitting home with the older half.

For Bonnie, the success of the current single has multiple benefits. Not only is there an empathetic bonding of adults to the lyric, but she says NICK OF TIME has created "the most unbelievable response of any song in my career from women AND men. It shows a certain maturity on radio's part to play a song like NICK OF TIME. It's certainly not a shallow, kid-oriented topic."

Response to songs like NICK OF TIME from radio furthers the cause of songs with lyrical substance. The song's video is also

getting considerable exposure on the national video outlets. "If I can have some airplay without looking like a movie star, maybe artists like Melissa Etheridge, The Indigo Girls and Tracy Chapman can succeed without being disco divas. Somebody from my generation has gotta be the sassy one and thank you, I'll be me."

Though some critics and fans praise her new album as a comeback, Bonnie disagrees. She released three albums at the tail end of her recording commitment to Warner Bros. before signing with her current label, Capitol. Bonnie candidly blames lack of promotion for the perception that she's been away. Yet, as she told me, "I got three Grammy nominations for those last three albums that weren't promoted."

In the two years since her split from Warner Bros., Bonnie admits to a change in lifestyle. Life in rock's fast lane tends to wear down even its most hearty participants. Bonnie sees her reformation as a natural process, "I stopped drinking two and a half years ago. Most of the generation of artist I grew up with are all pretty straight now."

To have weathered two decades of fickle winds in the music business requires equal quotients of intelligence, tenacity, creativity and pragmatism. As Bonnie muses, "You have to be shrewd in the long run to have a career with any meaning. When FM progressive radio just about went out of business in this decade, I worried and was bitter that artists like Ry Cooder, Van Dyke Parks, NRBQ, the blues people, Little Feat....where were they going to get their hits? I survived by touring. I might not have had hits, but if I have fifty people coming to see me play, I won't have to paint houses for a living."

Her legend is one of a multi-faceted singer/musician with roots in blues, folk and rock. She's one of the few women in the biz who looks comfortable with a six-string slung around her neck. Her rep as a mean, fret-full player is genuine and well-earned, yet she wouldn't want to be thought of as a novelty. "There's no biological wonder to being a female guitar player. Too much is made of it. I just want people to get the whole picture," notes Bonnie.

Whether it's behind a guitar, on top of a groove, or out-front with a thought, Bonnie Raitt's music is a pleasant diversion from the ordinary and just in the NICK OF TIME.



OH MERCY - BOB DYLAN (COLUMBIA)

With the help of producer Daniel Lanois, who recorded his own album in the Crescent City, Bob Dylan comes to some compositional rhythmical sense, cutting a scrapper of an album. As a prolific modern artist, appreciating Dylan has been a process of separating the wheat from the chaf. Oh Mercy rescues Dylan's reputation in the same way such crucial records like Blood On The Tracks and Slow Train did when Bob was dangling by a cuticle. Side people like Lanois, Rockin' Dopsie, Mason Ruffner, Cyril Neville and Neville Brothers' bandmembers Brian Stoltz and Willie Green round out a comfortable portrait. Seems like all Dylan needed was an extended stay in Nawlins. Trax: "Political World," "Everything Is Broken" and "Most Of The Time."

ACADIE - DANIEL LANOIS (OPAL/WARNER BROS.)

The perfect companion piece for Dylan's Oh Mercy album. Daniel Lanois recruits his U2 production partner Brian Eno to add atmospherics to his country blues/folk comforts. Some of the songs are scraps of musical ideas Lanois has stored in the junk drawer for a few years. And like his co-hort Mr. Eno, he's opposed to needless trappings colliding with some of the songs' minimalist statements. Recruits include U2's million dollar rhythm section, stray Nevilles, Mason Ruffner, both Eno brothers, guitarist Bill Dillon (whose playing graced Robbie Robertson's solo effort) as well as Lanois sidekick Malcolm Burn. Acadie is folky, bluesy and never nuthin' more than it needs to be. Less is infinitely

more. Trax: Start with "Still Water" into "The Maker" and "Jolie Louise."

LET LOVE RULE - LENNY KRAVITZ (VIRGIN) Ever yearn for a soul record by a young singer minus the machines and the glitzy digital dance steps? Are you hooked on Curtis Mayfield's Superfly soundtrack? Ever wish Otis would awaken from the dead or SIV would wise up or Al Green would get evil again? Impossible, I know. But there's hope for the young. Lenny Kravitz approaches his brand of "soul music" with a spiritual link to the soulmen of yesteryear. I know you're thinking Terrence Trent D'Arby. Not quite. Lenny Kravitz risks it all by producing a raw-knuckled debut set in an era of sampling, synths and blinking Christmas tree lights. I, for one, certainly appreciate the attempt at a musical reality check. Trax: "Let Love Rule" into "Freedom Train" and "Rosemary."

"I'LL BE HOLDING ON" - GREGG ALLMAN (VIRGIN)

About the only thing I can recommend about Ridley Scott's new movie Black Rain is Gregg Allman's unlikely contribution to the opening musical theme. Combined with a murky plot, Aliman's convincing growl is the only taste of truth throughout the entire two hours. It's a moving interior dialogue between Allman and his stamina that ranks among the best of his recent work.

BOUND BY THE BEAUTY - JANE SIBERRY (REPRISE) MISS AMERICA - MARY MARGA-**RET O'HARA (VIRGIN)**

Jane Siberry gathered last week's Most Added honors on the Alternative level with her latest effort. Born out of the Toronto Art/Music/Film community. Siberry has moved a few steps away from her role as a performance artist and more towards some even-tempered balladeering that shoots for intelligent females. Still, Siberry is at her best with cock-eyed subject matter like hockey, trains and red wagons. Special thanks to Ginger Havlat at KBCO for turning me on to "The Life Is The Red Wagon," one of Bound By The Beauty's

highlights. Just about as creatively quirky is fellow Canadian Mary Margaret O'Hara, whose Miss America disc took a little more than four years to record and assemble. Mary is not an easy talent to describe. Her approach can start out quite direct, strumming a clean electric guitar, while the song will suddenly crescendo into a spatter of nervous energy and semi-articulate syllablic singing. Just when you thought you've heard it all, the envelope of unique expression is pushed out further.

WILD WEEKEND - NRBQ (VIRGIN)

Wild Weekend is a subtle reminder not to take rock n roll so damned seriously. Consistently inbred in the music is not only a valuable roots rock element, but NRBQ's sense of humor is second to nobody. Lots of major labels have attempted to ride this bucking band to a level of mainstream appreciation. And while this band's vision is always bigger than trendy stardom, I'm sure they wouldn't mind living in reckless splendor after a couple of rough decades of road food, Motel 6's and boisterous venues and ballrooms. Many trax to choose from starting with "It's A Wild Weekend," the humorous "Boozoo, That's Who" and "Poppin' Circumstance."

THE HEALER - JOHN LEE HOOKER (CHAMELEON/CEMA)

John Lee Hooker has long been revered by the likes of Carlos Santana, George Thorogood, Robert Cray and Los Lobos. Now they get to trade licks with the master on his own healing turf. The only downbeat of the sessions was that many of the first-takers did the job so effectively, it robbed some of the guests of the opportunity to blow it out all day long. Produced by Bay Area slide guitarist Roy Rogers, The Healer is a contemporarysounding project. Of those already wired to this disc, the consensus enthusiasm points towards "I'm In The Mood" by Hooker and Bonnie Raitt. In fact, WMVY's Jeff Damon was practically having a coronary over it. That's what happens when you're on the air, the moon is full and the master of boogie is on the cans. Down, boy.

ALTERNATIVE PROFILE

Pop Will Eat Itself...This Is The Day... This Is The Hour...This Is The Story!

op Will Eat Itself got their unique name from a music paper in Eng land; the writer's theory being everything that could be done in music has been done and from here on in, pop music is merely regurgitating itself. In retrospect, the article seems to have served as an inspiration, not only for the band's name but for their musical direction as well.

Pop Will Eat Itself's distinct 'sample first, ask questions later' style has garnered them critical acclaim and fans world-wide. But for a band from Stourbridge—a small industrial city within England's Midlands—the prospect of touring America for the first time must be nerve-wracking. "We've been in the Southern part of the United States since we got here two weeks ago," says Clint Poppy, the band's lead vocalist. "It's a bit like a holiday resort, really."

By now Pop Will Eat Itself is probably used to the nervousness of playing someplace they've never been before. Last summer (1988) Soviet officials invited the band to Russia to play at a music festival—the first independent act ever to do so. "I didn't like it very much." says Clint. "It reminded me of Europe—I don't really like Europe. It was a bit of a drag; it's so hypocritical there." And the gig? "The gig itself was a bit humbling, really. I mean the crowd went wild-we were U2 for the day. But really, any band would've gone down as well as we did. They like us because we were new and from the West." He is quick to add, "The others quite liked it. I mean, we went to Red Square at 3 A.M. and it was all lit up. That was quite impressive, but really, I'm not much of a tourist."

That anti-tourist sentiment seems to be holding true throughout the band's stay in America as well, and although Pop Will Eat Itself hasn't seen much of the country, impressions have been made. "So far it doesn't seem like America to me. We got to Washington D.C. and I sort of thought it looked like Hill St. Blues—something I was familiar with, anyway. As far as the gigs are concerned, they've been great! A lot of people know the first album (Box Frenzy), so it's a bit like being home." But how 'bout the drum machine? American audiences haven't seemed to ever get completely comfortable with the idea of a drum machine used in September 29, 1989/the GAVIN REPORT

a live performance. "Well, so far no one has said, 'You're shit—where're the f*cking drums!' I suppose it makes it a little harder to categorize exactly what we're doing, but the audience we're playing to is familiar with us and they just sort of say,'Oh, that's Pop Will Eat Itself—that's what they do.' We make the live show pretty happening anyway, so I don't think they miss a drummer. We're pretty raucous and like to enjoy ourselves onstage."


So far, so good. The band didn't expect it to be this good their first time in America. "It's surprising, really because I think,'Oh America is so big—they won't like us' but everything has been great so far. We've been really lucky."

Luck alone doesn't allow a band to sell

close to 100,000 records their first time on a major. Pop Will Eat Itself is an innovation, to be sure. The samples the band chooses from television and radio give just enough familiarity to a song so the listener is immediately comfortable with it. Couple that with high-tech visuals (the album artwork and videos borrow heavily from comic books, especially the Watchman series) and you begin to see what makes this band tick. A keen sense of humor seems to help too.

About the band's sarcastic lyrics Clint says, "It's an element that's obviously within the four of us. We're quite cynical and we like to take the piss out of other people and other things. It comes through in our music because it's in our character, I suppose." This from a man who describes his band as a cross between "Blade Runner and Foghorn Leghorn".

Robin Hood might be more like it—the way they 'borrow' their samples. Whatever the case, you can count on Pop Will Eat Itself to keep it in perspective. "We're just four guys making the noise that we want to hear. If somebody else was doing this, we wouldn't sound this way."



BILLY JOEL - We Didn't Start The Fire (Columbia)

Leave it to one of our generation's finest singer/songwriters to sing a forty year history lesson in less that four and a half minutes. Audio images flash by year-by-year in a power-packed, highly original and creative effort that's sure to garner a lot of media attention. The fire gets more intense after hearing it repeatedly.

BENNY MARDONES - I'll Be Good To You (Curb)

Spurred by renewed interest in his 1980 hit, "Into The Night," Benny bounced back into hot rotation with that tune several months ago. On his newest outing he proves he's got it all back together, turning in an emotionally charged performance that's complete with a melody that feels right for fall and

VAN MORRISON - Have I Told You Lately (Mercury/PolyGram)

Set against a background of lush yet simple production and Morrison's magnificent vocalizing and piano, this beauty of a song makes it hard to resist one more "Moondance" with Van. Loaded with upper demo appeal (already in Gavin A/C's Top Ten), it's got the goods to enhance daytime and late night programming on Top 40 too.

ALBUMS by Ron Fell

LINDA RONSTADT featuring AARON NEVILLE - Cry Like A Rainstorm—Howl Like The Wind (Elektra)

What musical mediums have yet to be conquered by Linda? She has already proved proficient in rock, country, light opera, big band—even Mexican ranchero. Her pop fan base has been tolerant of her recent diversions, hoping for a return to the contemporary forum. This album, her first complete pop set since 1982's "Get Closer" shows how close she's willing to come. Linda's nearly co-billing with Aaron Neville is fair tribute to one who contributes a soulful companionship during a few of the songs in this appetizing, mixed salad of songs chosen for their classic lyric and fluid melodic structure. It's obvious that her three volumes of work with the late Nelson Riddle have made an indelible impression on Ms. Ronstadt, for whom the expense of live strings within a full orchestra is now essential. Two composers provide seven of the album's twelve tracks; the legendary Jimmy Webb brings four, and three come from the pen of Linda's favorite female writer, Karla Bonoff. 
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
