MIDEM '90 World Music on a Global Scale

I've just returned from my third annual visit to MIDEM in Cannes, France. MIDEM is the world's largest convention of music merchants, artists and broadcasters. It's held each year at The Palais des Festivals in a charming Mediterranean port city in the south of France. The convention ran from Sunday, January 21 to Wednesday, January 24.

This year's attendance topped 8,200 registrants, with first-time participation from Eastern European countries including Hungary, Poland, The USSR. There seemed to be more Americans at MIDEM this year, with US registration totaling just under 300.



Highlights for me included a day-long tribute to Quincy Jones, which began with the celebrated producer/musician receiving the insignia of The National Order of the (French) Legion Of Honor followed by the presentation of Midem's Cartier-designed trophy for Man Of The Year, named in honor of the late Nesuhi Ertegun. At a mid-afternoon press conference Jones received a special commendation from Poland's Solidarity, presented by special emissaries of Lech Walesa.

An ironicissue was also raised during the Jones press conference. It seems that in the exhibit hall three floors below the room in which Quincy was with meeting the press, a Swiss distributor was marketing what Jones referred to as a counterfeit copy of an old Mercury album of his



called "Soul Man." MIDEM officials were appropriately embarrassed, but apparently not enough to exorcise its exhibit area of all pirates. Two days later EMI and MIDEM had to call in the gendarmes to arrest another suspected bootlegger—this one hawking Beatles albums.

At a radio seminar on Monday, Chrysalis Chairman Chris Wright, keynoted a session and figuratively took radio broadcasters to task for not breaking new artists. Paradoxically, when in London later that week I was read a London Independent newspaperstory in which the same Mr. Wright was considering, on behalf of Chrysalis, "to bid for either a local radio station or television franchise when they are offered in 1992—more likely in radio than television."

On Tuesday, KIIS-Los Angeles VP/GM Lynn Anderson, along with French and British broadcasters, participated on a panel. The subject: TARGETING THE LISTENER. The session's highlight was a video montage of KIIS promotion contests and TV spots designed to show what high visibility is all about. To say the Europeans were overwhelmed by the video would be an understatement.

When I attended my first MIDEM in 1987, radio broadcasters in Europe were wrestling with deregulation and the commercialization of frequencies. Formatting to specific listeners rather than block-programming to cume was a relatively new phenomenon to

both broadcasters and listeners. In the years since the number of stations and the variety of programming is increasing—but nothing to the extent we've grown accustomed to. Radio's role in the soon-to-change European Community (1992) has yet to be clarified. The monolithic BBC is under siege from commercial and independent stations throughout Britain, even though it still holds a 61% share of radio listening. As I was leaving London last Sunday there was speculation on what effect a \$75 million dollar cut in BBC funding was to have on the four BBC radio network channels.

Even more than normal this year, MIDEM's artist showcases were packed with entertainment. Among the performers were:

Daniel Lanois-Canada Mahlathini & Mahotella Queens-South Africa Youssou N'Dour-Senegal Noiseworks, Black Sorrows & Kate Ceberano-Australia Black Box-Great Britain Technotronic featuring Felly-Belgium Booker T & The MG's with The Memphis Horns, Sam Moore, Carla Thomas, Eddie Floyd and Phil Upchurch-USA

As the world turns it continues to shrink. MIDEM proves time and time again how small and yet how significant the world of music is becoming.

Effective immediately, CBS Records will be selling 7" vinyl singles retailers on a non-returnable basis only...

WTG RESTRUCTURES

WTG Records is in the process of restructuring its promotion department. Three executives will be assuming new marketing positions within CBS branch distribution departments and two will be let go.

"The Epic local promotion staff will be servicing the WTG product to radio, but the national staff stays in place," said Senior VP, President and General Manager Jerry Greenberg. "There are going to be additional people hired within the national positions in the home office (Los Angeles). I'm also opening up a New York office which will have promotion people on a national level based there."

Greenberg says the reorganization does not mean the company is considering layoffs, as rumored in the past few weeks. The New York office will be in CBS' "Black Rock" building on 52nd Street. "It's a positive reorganization," Greenberg wenton. "It shouldn't be treated as anything other than just what that is. The Epic staff is going to handle all of the promotion of WTG in the field, and we're beefing up more internally."

ON MANAGEMENT

EFFECTIVE MANAGERS' APPROACH TO ACTION

ast time I reviewed a research project that I have been carrying out with my colleague Linda Mukai. Linda and I investigated effective and less effective managers in a variety of companies and industries. We found three attributes that separated the two groups. One was how they defined their role as a manager, another was their approach to action, and the third was the way they developed company allies. These attributes are all learnable, and I anticipate that you'll find them useful in your own career as we enter the chaotic business world of the '90s. Last time I described the first attribute-the new management role-and now I will discuss the second attribute with you: action. Next time we'll wrap it up with a discussion of how effective managers develop company allies.

Effective managers are proactive—not reactive—in thought and action. They are innovators, hustlers and scramblers.

As before, let's break this down into some key elements.

CONTROL

Ineffective managers believe that their environments (people, systems, events) control them. They think "I can't get anything done and it doesn't even pay to try until senior management gets their act together."

Effective managers believe that they have control over their environments. They believe that their efforts can and will impact the organization. They certainly like getting top management support, but they know they can get things done even under trying circumstances. They don't expect the executive suite to solve their problems.

INITIATIVE

Inneffective managers are reactive. They respond to actions; they rarely initiate them. They are usually too busy fire-fighting to plan ahead. They wait for "someday," when there will be more budget, more time, more clarity, more top management mandates. Their philosophy: If I haven't explicitly been told "yes," I can't do it.

Effective managers don't talk about "someday," and they don't wait. They feel a sense of urgency to get things done, and they assume that in organizations it's easier to get forgiveness than permission. They live Tom Peters' notion of "Ready Fire Aim," but they've already spent some time thinking about some

basic contingencies, hurdles and opportunities. Without being irresponsible, they sometimes bypass counterproductive procedures to get the job done. Their philosophy: If I haven't explicitly been told "no," I can do it.

RISK-TAKING

Ineffective managers take few risks. They go by the book and wait for directives. They do anything to avoid the appearance of making mistakes.

Effective managers are innovators. Hence by definition they take risks in developing and trying new ways to solve problems, accomplish tasks and improve operations. This means that they sometimes fail in a particular endeavor, but they're not afraid of failure. They use "failure" as a learning tool. They work hard to create an environment where their own people will feel confident of doing the same.

ACCOUNTABILITY

Ineffective managers are quick to place blame anywhere—other than on themselves when things go wrong. They always have some excuses. Sometimes they even spend time planning excuses before they take action—just in case. They often complain.

Effective managers make themselves accountable for their actions. They take responsibility for setbacks—and successes. They don't tolerate an excuse or complaint mentality in themselves or in others, including subordinates. They give reasons—not excuses—for setbacks and mistakes, and they immediately set out to rectify matters.

GOALS

Ineffective managers view success as maintaining "steady state" and achieving any particular goals set by or with their superiors.

Effective managers constantly set goals and priorities beyond formal goals set by or with their superiors. They are impatient with status quo management and are always looking for ways to "make things better."

In short, we found effective managers to be "hustlers," in the good sense of the word. That is, they do plan and think ahead, but they don't fall prey to "analysis paralysis." They scramble. They try things. They take calculated risks. They learn from mistakes. They constantly up the ante on their personal goals and priorities. They have a sense of urgency in getting on with it.

Whenever one is around these managers, one sees and feels action.

P.D. NOTEBOOK

REFERENCES THAT BACKFIRE

n the last few months I've had calls and letters from several readers who have had trouble with the references they list on job applications. The common thread seems to be that a reference they've listed has been checked—and has given them a bad reference, which has ended the interest in them by the station they applied to. In at least one case I'll tell you about, not only did they lose the job they applied for, but they lost the job that they had as well.

I guess the point to make is that you should not list a reference you think may hurt you! That seems fairly obvious, but apparently some radio folks list references that they sincerely hope won't be contacted simply because they feel they should. But any reference you list is considered by the station checking you out to be "typical and fair," since they assume you wouldn't list one that isn't! If they call that person—and every station should check references—and they then get a bad report on you, they will naturally consider that if the people you chose to list as references cannot say good things about you, then nothing good can be said about you!

In the first case, the person listed the reference because their experience at the station in question was an important part of their total broadcast experience. However, this person had resigned the station because of drug use and harassment there, and later found it necessary to bring a legal action against that station to stop malicious attempts to undermine the person's voice-talent business by

rumor and lies. It shouldn't have been a surprise that when a prospective station contacted that reference, there was a malicious (and successful) effort to warn off the prospective station on hiring this person.

Not only did I advise this person not to list references from that station in the future, but in view of the lawsuit I suggested strongly that future applications by the person include a brief statement explaining the situation, since few stations want to hire someone who has sued a previous employer for fear that it could happen to them too. If they discover you have done something like this, that will usually end their interest in you right away. In my opinion, they should learn it from you, and know why you did it; finding out indirectly will certainly and understandably end any interest a prospective employer might have in you, since you obviously were not candid with them on this important matter. (That also means they will not accept your explanation of why you did it, when offered after they do find out.)

In a second case, an air talent responded to a trade ad for an air talent, and apparently listed someone else on the staff of the station as a reference. When the reference check came through, the person giving reference apparently gave a bad one, thus closing the door on the new job—and then immediately told the General Manager about the call and the air talent got fired for "looking."

Although I think it is dumb for an employer to fire an employee for looking for another job—it can only have a very negative effect on the rest of the staff, encouraging others who want to "get out before they get fired too"—it certainly can and does happen, so if you must give a reference from within your current station, choose the person very carefully—and, as with all references, it's very wise to let the person know you'd like to use them as a reference and get their permission to do so, so they are not surprised when they

get the call.

And as for the importance of checking references of prospective employees: Without such a check you cannot know the true character of the person you are considering. I recall getting an excellent resume and an exciting tape a few years ago from a prospective air talent who I really wanted to hire; I almost decided it would be a waste of money

You should not list a reference you think may hurt you!

to place long distance calls to check the listed references. But I was glad I did: I learned that although he was as good on the air as I had thought, he had a lamentable tendency to write bad checks, and after having been given "one more chance" at his current station after such an incident, had done it again, and had then been arrested for it in the control room. Amazingly, the station still liked him enough to keep him employed while he was looking for another job, but they had given him only a limited amount of time to find one. Needless to say, I passed on him—and he then found a job in a Top 20 market, with a station which obviously didn't check his references!!





Ever since k.d. lang polka-ed her way into the American music scene three years ago, she has had to battle misconceptions. Here

was a woman with short spiky hair wearing men's clothes, singing country music as sweet and true as her idol, Patsy Cline. In a world where women wear sequined gowns and stand by their men, k.d. was an oddity. She doesn't drink, smake or eat meat—hell, she

doesn't drink, smoke or eat meat—hell, she doesn't even wear makeup. What kind of a

Country queen is that?

Fadio was caught off-guard—k.d. didn't fit their image of a Country singer, yet there was too much twang in her sound for Pop formats. Often her music fell through the cracks. Programmers loved her, but didn't know what to do with her. However fans, not bothered with formats, bought her records and went to her shows. And they told their friends. With the release of her third album, Absolute Torch and Twang, k.d. lang is outselling many of her contemporaries who have bigger radio hits, and she's selling out everywhere she goes. Her fan base goes beyond Country, or Alternative or Pop. Everybody loves k.d. lang, and every day more people are becoming believers.

So why then is k.d. still relatively shut out

from radio play? The soft-spoken Canadian has obviously been doing a lot of thinking about the situation. "I'm sort of lost, in terms of where my music fits in," k.d. explains. "I think that (Top 40) radio has to figure out if they want to play a record with steel guitar, and Country radio has to figure out whether they want to play a girl with short hair!" she laughs.

K.d. was born Kathryn Dawn Lang in Consort, Alberta, a small Canadian farming community of 650 people. She started playing piano at age seven, switched to guitar at ten, and by 13 she was performing at local events. It was during k.d.'s college years, when she was doing performance art, that she became interested in Country music. Her first loves were Anne Murray and Linda Ronstadt, and later she became enamored with Gram Parsons and Emmylou Harris. But it all came together for k.d. when she landed a role in a play based on the life of Patsy Cline. A friend bought her a Cline album and k.d. was hooked. As she told Michael Corcoran in American Way, "I remember the first night I got that record, playing, 'I Wish I Didn't Love You So' and feeling all the emotions that song brought out in me. It just seemed to turn the sky purple and make the moon full. I thought, 'This is what I've gotta do.' "

he moved to Edmonton and put a band together, which she named the reclines ("re"viving Patsy Cline) and set out to do her

thing. In 1984 the band released A Truly Western Experience on their own label, and they were signed to Sire the same year. Her first album for Sire, the Dave Edmunds-produced Angel With A Lariat, was released in 1987. It was a critical success, and quickly alerted those-in-the-know that k.d. was someone to look out for. The album is highenergy—a mix of rockabilly and smoky ballads that showed off k.d.'s wonderful, expressive voice. Unfortunately, k.d. remained a critic's darling, and the album did not yield any radio hits.

After Angel, k.d. set out to pursue another dream—to somehow pay tribute to the greats that had inspired her. She persuaded veteran producer Owen Bradley to work with her—quite a coup when you realize that Bradley had semi-retired in the '70s. Bradley had

worked with Patsy Cline, Loretta Lynn, Marty Robbins, Buddy Holly and Kitty Wells in their heydays. The lang/Bradley match seemed destined; Bradley first saw k.d. lang sing while he was in a hospital bed recovering from a heart attack. k.d. was performing "Three Cigarettes In An Ashtray" on The Tonight Show and Bradley was blown away. Of course he knew the song well, having produced the original for Patsy.

The collaboration produced Shadowland, an album of ballads and torch songs that highlights k.d.'s vocal range, and her ability to wrench emotion from a song. It turned many heads in Nashville, for not only did k.d. have the support of Owen Bradley, but also Kitty Wells, Loretta Lynn and Brenda Lee, who recorded the album-ending medley with her. k.d. told Grant Turner of the Grand Ole



Opry that "having the respect of people like Owen, Kitty Wells, Loretta and Brenda Lee is better than having a #1 single on the charts. It's the absolute compliment." Bradley credits lang for getting him involved in music again just for the love of it. He said, "After working with k.d. for awhile, I didn't need to take my pills." lang called the album Shadowland because she says she felt in the shadow of so many Country greats. By the time it was released, k.d. lang was no longer in the shadows.

The album garnered heaps of acclaim; k.d. was awarded Rolling Stone's Critic Pick for Best Female Singer (a tie with Tracy Chapman). She was also nominated for three Grammys that year, and won Best Vocal Collaboration for her duet with the late Roy Orbison, "Cryin'."

Pollowing Shadowland's release k.d. vowed, "Now that one of my dreams has come true it's time to get back to work on the other." She had given the reclines a rest while recording Shadowland—relying on Bradley's string arrangements and Nashville studio musicians. It was time to get the band back into the studio, and do a little rockin'. Absolute Torch and Twang is the perfect balance of the two sides of k.d. — ballads and frantic polkarock, what k.d. likes to dub "cool country music." She says, "One of the intentions of this album was to balance the two extremes of my personality, and hopefully mature beyond both of them at the same time."

The blend is a good representation of her live show, where she goes from an emotional rendition of Roy Orbison's "Cryin'" to a goofball enactment of Joanie Summers 1962 hit "Johnny Get Angry." She sashays across the stage, teasing and flirting with the audience, yet always remaining just out-ofreach. Her three years as a performance artist have paid off; k.d. is totally in control of the show, the band, the audience. She has the ability to manipulate the crowd's emotions, delivering some of her most heart-wrenching vocals on her knees, or collapsed flat on her back. She even makes fun of her dramatics, as when she performs "Three Cigarettes" complete with props, staring woefully into the ashtray.

k.d. has always given all-out performances, but this time she seems more comfortable with

herself and her show. She agrees that the experience of touring the last few years has given her confidence. "I think that having people know me better has made a difference. Reaching the level of success that I'm at makes me feel more comfortable."

By now, most people know that k.d. does not wear make-up because she's against animal-testing, and that she's a vegetarian, although she does not make a big deal about these things. She explains, "I support a lot of issues just by being a strong example. I think it's better to live your example, rather than making it an issue."

**Ld. lang's unique style is easy to hear on "Pulling Back The Reins," the latest single from Absolute Torch & Twang. She hasn't compromised her sound in search of a radio hit, and doesn't plan to. She admits that as far as formats, "There's no easy place for me to fit in—I'm straddling a lot of cracks in radio." But she's quick to add, "I certainly won't be offended if I have a number one record!"



In just four weeks the LINDA RONSTADT and AARON NEVILLE duet, "All My Life" has tallied 200 A/C stations and a 72% HIT FACTOR. The record is even scoring in a BIG way at Top 40 radio, as it sails into the top thirty nationally.

BILLY JOEL's latest, "I Go To Extremes," has all the right stats to eventually go to an extreme#1. In its first four weeks of A/C play it's HIT FACTORed at 84% of its players. New this week at WVMT, WLMX, WFMK/FM, WTIC/AM, WNSR/FM, WIHN and KWLO.



Supersmooth LUTHER VANDROSS moves 22 to 15 thanks to a 91% HIT FACTOR. In other words, only 9% of those playing it haven't yet committed to serious rotations. HEAVY rotation is already happening at WALR, WZNY, WMT/FM, B100, KBIG, KOST, WQNY, WAHR, WTWR, etc.

CROSBY, STILLS, NASH and TAYLOR have had a 19 point jump in the past two weeks (37-18) and though there is not an

album available, listener interest continues to pump it up the charts. New chippers this week include WFBG, KDES, KKOR, KQEU and WIER

Last week's TOP TIP, TAYLOR DAYNE'S "Love Will Lead You Back," explodes on the chart at #26. It's this issue's winner in PLUS FACTOR with a 29% increase in HIT FACTOR and takes third MOST ADDED with 40 new including B100, WJON, WELI, WMXB, KXLK, CKFM, WKYE, KFYR, KSBL and KAEZ/FM.

The heartless among A/C are becoming a minority as we show 130 A/Cs playing it including WGOL/FM, WFMK/FM, KFMB, KAER, WTNY, KYMG/FM, KLSS and KKMK new this week.

Steady as she goes for SHAWN COLVIN. Fifteen new players, including KRKO, WYRY, KKRB, WGBE, KLOG, KIXK and WXLV/FM. More importantly, it's HIT FACTORED by 65% of those stations playing more than one week.

PHIL COLLINS takes MOST ADDED. In its first official A/C week 55 stations added it including WEBE/FM, WSKY, WHAI, KIDX/





REUNION - GARY BURTON (GRP)

As Pat Metheny so correctly stated, Gary Burton performed a major service in recruiting young Jazz listeners in the late sixties by performing with electric guitarists, wearing long hair and refusing to appear onstage dressed in a suit. By 1973 Burton had helped rescue Metheny from the outbacks of Wichita, and even convinced him to leave the University of Miami for the more conducive surroundings of Berklee and Boston. Metheny eventually joined Burton's band, but in 1977 left to chase his own visions. After that the two strayed apart due to busy schedules. Reunion is a full blown collaborative project and listeners around the world will be pleased to have Burton and Metheny together on sound byte again. Though Burton is clearly a generation ahead in chops, Metheny has ascended to awesome charttopping proportions. And it was Burton who helped Pat in find his way before he took his band to Brazil the early eighties. The two are flanked by keyboardist Mitchel Forman, bassist Will Lee and drummer Peter Erskine—a true master rhythm section capable of managing such a crucial date—and one notices immediately how fantastic both Burton and Metheny are as improvisers. None of the tracks, be it "Autumn," "Will You Say You Will," or "House On The Hill," fuss around with silly jams. Reunion is not some silly drop-in recording designed to return a favor. It's an appropriate project by two bright players who had the good fortune to bump into each again. And it was lucky for all of us.

RENEE ROSNES (BLUE NOTE)

Renee Rosnes, the talented 27 year old pianist from Saskatchewan, Canada, debuts her first solo session since becoming pianist for OTB. There's an evenhanded temperament throughout the session as Rosnes delivers her licks with the lush aplomb of her self-proclaimed mentors Oscar Peterson and Cedar Walton. Rosnes relies on the crystalline support of Branford Marsalis and Wayne Shorter, a move that will give an extended run to this already popular addition to many Jazz playlists. Fellow OTB member and tenor player Ralph Bowen completes the set's sax parts admirably, especially on the opener, "The Storyteller." For her first solo go, Rosnes has plenty of technique to spread around a career that looks bright and promising. Check out the Branford tunes, the floating "Playground For The Birds" and the textbook swing piece "Bright Mississippi."

SPECIAL 3-SONG SAMPLER - BASIA (EPIC)

Basia releases the follow-up to her platinum debut Time And Tide, and four radio formats see pound/zloty/dollar signs. This sampler, from her upcoming release, london warsaw new york, spells out Jazz/ Adult options in no uncertain terms. Cut for cut, Basia's latest threesome offering for Jazz/Adult is doused with sophisticated London camp, European panache and New York supper club etiquette. "Baby You're Mine" and "Ordinary People" sashay like pricey Moschino couture, revelling in arresting elegance but it's nonetheless notably pop in its statement and approach. "Copernicus" lacks the previous tracks' popular tint, substituting a jazzier garnish to the arrangement.

SIDEWALK CAFE - MICHAEL DAVIS (VOSS)

Generally, trombonists belong more on the Jazz side of Jazz/Adult Alternative, but Michael Davis breaks that rule. He abandons the horn's traditional preconceptions. And, jeez, we know the guy can really play—his first major professional apprenticeship was served with the late Buddy Rich and his traveling big band. Since then he has played on countless movie soundtracks and national commercial dates as well as with notables like Aretha Franklin, Mel Torme and Ella Fitzgerald. Sidewalk Cafe ranks high in duo-format appeal and succeeds in actually redefining a musical instrument, quite impressive on that count alone. No mean feat mind you. Stylistically, the album has a sweet style of soloing, almost understating the glissando, blustering attack we're accustomed to. As producer and composer of Sidewalk Cafe, Davis puts his keen credentials to good use and the result is a fine, open-ended set of tunes from which to choose.



"BLUE SKY MINE" - MIDNIGHT OIL (COLUMBIA)

Midnight Oil tackles the usual questions about survival—"Who's gonna save me?" Well, ultimately you save yourself. This is an excellent, vibrant Midnight Oil composition. If you had any concerns about how they would follow-up their first gold-plus American success, rest assured. The Oils are still one of the best rock n roll bands in the world. To think that they're singing about sugar refineries...

"NOTHING COMPARES 2 U" -

SINEAD O'CONNOR (ENSIGN/CHRYSALIS) There's a record on our shelves that a lot of musicians comment favorably on (Robert Palmer comes to mind), and that's the album by The Family released in 1985 on Prince's Paisley Park label. On it is a sad and beautiful ballad that Sinead O'Connor has done an incredible job interpreting. "Nothing Compares 2 U" shows the feisty O'Connor as an able stylist—but then again, Prince as a songwriter gives a singer lots of emotion to relate to. And on the video, Sinead O'Connor puts her heart into it, right down to the tear on her cheek.

"KISS THIS THING GOODBYE" - DEL AMITRI (A&M)

Yes! Scotland's del Amitri have come a long way since their debut album came and went in one day (the band was dropped the day after their Chrysalis debut was released). But that didn't stop them. When they found themselves stranded in the US after a bum gig they worked their way across the country, literally singing for their supper. "Kiss This Thing Goodbye" and the rest of the upcoming album (due the end of February) shows their newlybuilt character. Bravo, guys. Hard work does pay off, as does putting it all on the line, P.S. Doesn't this sound like a better Dave Edmunds than Dave Edmunds?

A CHANGE IN THE WEATHER -

CLIVE GREGSON & CHRISTINE COLLISTER (RHINO)

Like just about everybody else in the musical universe, Clive Gregson and Christine Collister have to fight the battle of the category. Because of an early association with Richard



Thompson and because of Christine's faint comparison to Sandy Denny, Gregson and Collister have had to bear the folk tag though their music is certainly much more. Like other rock n roll outfits that have combined a male and female perspective (and I'm thinking late seventies Fleetwood Mac). Gregson and Collister have much to offer commercial radio looking for crafted songs, adult-oriented maturity and Alternative hipness. A Change In The Weather is a stellar follow-up to last year's Mischief album. As on Mischief, G/C balance strong instrumentation (Clive is a quality quitarist) with vocal excellence. But as a songwriter, Gregson has the ability to make the pieces fit. "This Is The Deal" starts things on strong footing. Then it's upward from there as Christine doesn't leave a dry eye in the house on "Blessing In Disguise." There's also a mini Elvis tribute (also one to Bruce Springsteen) inside the original (Don't Step In) My blue suede shoes," that explores the concept of fame from "inside" somebody's shoes rather than stepping all over the legend. The next track is Elvis' "Tryin' To Get To You," from the King's original Sun Sessions. On a Change In The Weather, a strong rock n roll statement is made, proving you don't need a shag haircut and a sexy video to "do it."

"STILL WATER (LIVE)" - DANIEL LANOIS (OPAL/WARNER BROS.)

Daniel Lanois' opening song is explored further with a dazzling live rendition from his exclusive mini tour late last year. What you hear is a different dimension of the song's texture. The strange "synth" sound is an Omni chord, a cheapo instrument that gives this rendition a spooky ambience

THE SWEET KEÉPER - TANITA TIKARAM (REPRISE)

What usually happens when a young European artist finds success the first time around is that the big time producers move in and move their sound toward expansion. Maybe that's why Tanita Tikaram chose to stay with Peter Van Hooke and Rod Argent. That way she not only bucked a trend, but showed a little loyality—a rare commodity once Pop success filters into an artist's psyche. And the team has grown as The Sweet Keeper explores Ms. Tikaram's darker ethnic/acoustic side as heard on "It All Came Back Today." The songs on The Sweet Keeper sound much more confident and less tentative, as if what worked on the debut album has been expanded upon. Many of the songs seem to deal with time-considering its passage, anticipating its passage and dealing with the lack of it. That's the paradox when you consider how bright a future Tanita Tikaram has. I caught her live last year and the venue was sold out, so the base audience is certainly there. Note: The Kreisler String Quartet makes a quest appearance as does trumpeter Mark Isham and John Hiatt's fine guitarist Sonny Landreth.

"DOES IT FEEL LIKE LOVE" - SIGNAL (EMI) A young American band gets their signals crossed with producer Kevin Elson, resulting in a straight-ahead mainstream rocker. "Does It Feel Like Love" begins with a keyboard lick, thereby escaping the hard rock pigeon-hole. Meanwhile the arrangement is tight and controlled. The first time through, four minutes sounded like two. Turn it up.

"FIRE" - THE FRONT (COLUMBIA)

Another young band on a mission. The Front, ironically, come from America, yet their brand of rock and roll is not unlike that of Billy Idol or the Cult. The band (a young group of lookers), sing and play with chips on their shoulders. That is, "Fire" has that "snarl" that's sometimes necessary when you're wielding that axe. KZ





If the name sounds familiar but you don't remember from where, here's a hint: he's the

force behind Georgia's Drivin' And Cryin'. With this effort, Kevin abandons the electric guitars and pounding drum in favor of a gentler, acoustic sound, which lends itself wonderfully to his stories wonderfully. Keen observations of human nature, a good sense of humor and what a way with words! Spend some time with this one and really listen to the stories—you'll like what you hear. Start with "McDougal Blues", "Iron Mountain" and "Hey Landlord (Meatloaf And Fishsticks)". LINDA RYAN



THE WEDDING PRESENT - BIZARRO (RCA)

Since 1985, this Leeds quartet has been assailing the British indie charts with singles, John Peel Sessions and albums. The Wedding Present have recently signed to RCA who hopes to create the same excitement in America that is so prevalent in England. David Gedge the singer, songwriter and guitarist, creates lyrics that address the human dilemma of relationships. He writes from his own personal experience in simple, straightforward language that conveys love's frustration. Gedge encompasses his prose with a hard-edged sound of speeding melodic guitars that build, fade and carry you into their fantastic world. Listen to every track, but a real smoker and one that serves as a prime example of The Weedoes sound is "Bewitched." Also check: "No," "Kennedy" (Gedge's insight into a controversial issue) and "Granadaland." The band is currently working on an EP with Steve Albini. Play often and enjoy. ROBERT BARONE

"Blue Sky Mine" draws on the 'working man' theme, and the politics that go along with many dangerous blue collar jobs—jobs that people do to put food on the table for their families. Sack Full Of Silver represents Thin White Rope's fourth Frontier effort, their first for RCA. Guy Kyser's lyrics are journeys into the dark, untrusting side of human nature—sucked in a downward spiral with little hope for rescue or escape. Morrissey could take lessons from this guy! For some really heavy guitars check out "Yoo Doo Right" and "Whirling Dervish." Then try "On The Floc" and "Sack Full Of Silver". LR






