

Records Being Removed In Other Cities

2 LIVE CREW BUSTED FOR BEING 'NASTY'

The fallout from the arrest of the members of the controversial Florida-based rap group 2 Live Crew continues as police in San Antonio, TX "advised" major record store owners stop selling "As Nasty As They Wanna Be." Bill Towery, spokesman for The Bexar County, TX Criminal District Attorney's Office told the Gavin Report, "The police department in San Antonio did go around to record stores, giving them a letter advising them to take the record off the shelves. and pointed out the decision made in Florida by a Federal Judge that they might be liable for prosecution under (Texas) state obscenity laws," He continued, "I understand most of the record stores are in compliance and have pulled the record off. So I suppose if I want to buy a record today it's going to cost me a hundred dollars." According to Towery, the D.A.'s office will not become involved unless arrests are made. He also said that he hadn't actually seen the letter given to store owners.

Band members Luther Campbell and Chris Wongwon

were arrested on a misdemeanor charge Sunday, June 10 after defying a court ruling banning the performance of material deemed obscene. The group is charged with violating Florida's obscenity laws. It is, apparently, the first time a group has been arrested for "lyrical content." Two other members of 2 Live Crew, Mark Ross and David Hobbs, were arrested later. All have been released, but if they are convicted they face up to a year incarceration and a \$1,000 fine.

The group performed twice on Sunday. The early show, attended by 300, featured sanitized versions of the album's songs. During that "clean" show, concert-goers loudly sang the "nasty" lyrics themselves. The second show was billed "adults only" and featured uncensored versions of 2 Live Crew's material.

Recording Academy President Michael Greene called the charges shocking and appalling. "The music and recording industry has to mobilize to fight these political actions at the grass roots level," he said

GRIFFITHS NAMED EPIC/ASSOCIATED PRESIDENT

Richard Griffiths has been named to the newly-created position of President of Epic/Associated Records. He'll work closely with E/A Senior VP & GM Tony Martell and report directly to Epic President, Dave Glew. Currently working in Los Angeles, Griffiths, who was upped from his position as CBS Senior Vice President, will relocate to New York.

"The combined acumen and experience of these two outstanding executives working with Dave Glew promise a great future for an expanded and diversified Associated roster," said CBS Records Division President Tommy Mottola. "This further strengthens our team commitment to artist development."

It's a quick rise up the CBS elevator for British-born Griffiths, who joined the company in April. Prior to that he worked in A&R at Virgin Music from 1981-1990. His impressive list of signings include Pet Shop Boys, Tears For Fears and Warrant. In the late seventies he worked with Island Records.

"(I'm) very excited by this move," said Griffiths. "In particular I'm looking forward to working closely with Dave Glew and Tony Martell. I've been fortunate to have been involved with a number of Epic/Associated acts in the past and it will be great to work

Although the 2 Live Crew arrests caused disgust among industry executives, Y100-Miami PD Frank Amadeo said that he was surprised when the majority of his station's callers supported Florida authorities. "Believe it or not, they seem to be in favor of the Judge's decision to ban it," he said. "I'm was really surprised by that."

"The notice of appeal was filed on the Federal case yesterday seeking review of the Federal Judge's decision," said 2 Live Crew Attorney Bruce Rogow. "That goes to the U.S. Court of Appeals in the llth Circuit and we'll be moving to expedite that appeal."

In a related, and equally as disturbing, incident, Charles Freeman, who owns E-C Records in Ft. Lauderdale, was arrested for selling "Nasty As They Wanna Be" to an undercover deputy. In his capacity as an ACLU volunteer, Rogow is working as an Attorney on the Freeman case.

A sidebar to this story is that lost amid the hoopla is that 2 Live Crew leader Luther Campbell is known for his generosity toward the black community. He's donated time and money to the homeless and AIDS projects.

Berger Smells The KOFY

When **Viacom** takes over **KOFY/FM**-San Francisco later this summer, veteran programmer **Larry Berger** will be moving in as Station Manager.

Berger, who finalized his deal with Viacom on Thursday, June 7 said that he will initially be responsible for Programming and Operations. He's currently working out of his home, talking to people and formulating plans for the "new" station.

For close to two years, the Pacific FM-owned KOFY has been beset with problems. Soon-to-be former owner Jim Gabbert faced personnel and ratings troubles that started, literally, the moment he walked in the door, and never let up.

Berger moved to San Francisco last year and spent seven months as Program Director at A/C outlet **K-101**. Before that he spent 14 years at WPLJ-New York as PD and OM. He declined to comment on formatic changes for KOFY.

BENNETT'S BACK LIVE

Longtime San Francisco Morning Personality Alex Bennett has returned to the city and to mornings on Modern Rock Live 105, the station he left last year.

"As the Blues Brothers once said, 'we're putting the old band back together,' said station GM Pat McNally.

Bennett brings with him his patented "audience" style program, with listeners sitting in on the show, and daily drop-ins from local and nationally-known musicians, comedians and celebrities. His reunion with Newscaster and co-host Lori Thompson completes the picture.

Former Live 105 GM Ed Krampf opted not to renew Bennett's contract when it expired last July. Bennett then went to WIOD-Miami, but the San Francisco native has returned to his home airwayes.

"What a long strange trip this has been," said PD Richard Sands. "I feel as if this past year has been like one of those TV sitcoms where the star wakes up and says, 'what a wild dream I just had!"

Bennett started on Monday, June 11.

Fan Fair was conceived in 1972 as a way to take some of the crowds away from the CMA-sponsored Country Music DJ convention. It was to be an event strictly for the fans, where they could meet and shake hands with their favorite stars. Eighteen years later it has retained that feeling. It is a gathering unlike any in the world and one cherished by the Country music industry, even as they grit their teeth and hope to get through it one more year. Throughout all the sweat and dust and polyester, the devotion of the fans is heartening. One woman, after waiting in line for hours to get her photo taken with Randy Travis, collapsed in the heat. When medics came and suggested she go to the hospital, she quietly refused. "I

Cross promoting through each daypart is a given at successful radio stations. But outside of buying television time or newspaper space, radio literally has to fight for a little coverage. Nothing's more frustrating than to be referred to as "a local radio station" rather than by your specific call letters. During American Bandstand's heyday, Dick Clark would plug various top name radio personalities as they would mention something like the hottest song in their area. In turn, of course, the jocks would talk up the fact that they would be on "Bandstand." The wild staff of crazies on WKRP In Cincinnati exaggerated the stereotype of managers, talent and salespeople we've all come in contact with. But it raised the public's radio awareness level, and at the same time allowed the characters to show the medium's human side. With networks battling cable for viewers, cross promoting with other modes of communication can help boost audience levels for, in this case, radio and television. Enter Anything For Laughs, a pilot produced by Film House, featuring the antics of radio talent from around the country. The one program that aired on a recent Sunday night following America's Funniest Home Videos (not a bad lead-in) received very positive response according to Tony Quinn, Executive Producer of the show, President of Film House and Executive VP of Film House, Inc. Tony says the show's 15 rating and 24 share tied it with the ultra-hot Simpsons. Yet even with those impressive numbers, ABC chose not to include the program in its Fall schedule. Though that's unfortunate, all is not lost. "Keep your fingers crossed," says Quinn who is eyeing the possibility of a mid-season pickup, with a final decision due by December 1st. He told me, "Film House is dedicated to the radio industry. We'll do everything we can to broaden the understanding that radio is an entertainment medium. We do that in our marketing and also for the general consumer." As I see it, a show like Anything For Laughs' primary benefits to radio are twofold: promoting stations and their personalites and raising its top of mind awareness. But it also gets more young people turned on to radio as a profession. Creating a larger pool of potential talent is vital to a healthy future. Anything that might stimulate that interest has to be a positive.

Programmers unhappy about a perceived music "drought" had no complaints this week—just check out the MOST ADDED titles. All the heavyweights made it especially tough competing for those new music slots, but it sets the stage for what hopefully will be a hot summer of music.

Does it appear it's the right season for a

y first encounter with Jane Child came last December at an informal dinner in San Francisco. Ever since taking home her remarkable album I had looked forward to meeting the architect who put it all together single-handedly. This indeed was one especially innovative and talented individual.

pending time with Jane was a delight. She's soft-spoken, but not the least bit hesitant to share her views on a wide variety of topics. Several short months after that evening she had accomplished the next to impossible feat—taking a song from a debut release all the way to number one!

orn and raised in Toronto, Jane grew up in anything but a Rock N' Roll environment. Her Father, a Classical violinist and her Mother, a singer/pianist were teaching her to play and sing by the time she was in kindergarten. Since music was an integral part of Jane's life, it was inevitable that Pop music would infiltrate the Child household. When it did there was no turning back, and her background, including hours of study and practice, put her on course toward a professional career as musician, writer and performer. In the following interview Jane reveals more about the real world of her past, present and future.

DAVE SHOLIN: I've got to begin with the most obvious: the Jane Child image as reflected by your appearance, especially the nose ring?

JANE CHILD: Well, let me first say it's secondary to what I do. I'm a musician first. The way I look is really not that important, but I understand that people want to know about it. I've been walking around looking like this for years. This isn't something that suddenly happened when I got a record deal and I feel very comfortable with it. I suppose I've not been inhibited to take different pieces of cultures that I like and just make them my own. Obviously, the cornrows are African. The nose ring and the chains between my nose and ear are a very old East Indian women's custom. When wamen there get married, they get the left side of their nose pierced. On their wedding day and every time their husband goes away, they wear the chain between their nose and ear. They've been doing this since the time of Mosesapparently Moses' wife had one. It's a very old custom. I'm on the right side because I'm not married, but I think the way it got into Western culture was through the huge Indian population in England where the punk movement started. I think the first introduction into Western culture was when the punks adopted it in the seventies. I've always had an affinity for Eastern culture due in part to growing up in Toronto where there is a huge Indian population. I'm very attracted to the culture and their music, but it's just not something I think about—it's something that's evolved. It feels like me and I'm an individualist. This is just

DS: Now we've got that out of the way (JC: Good) and we can move on to the music. What was your first big break?

JC: It was so gradual. There was a studio in Hamilton, Ontario where I was singing jingles and an engineer there ended up buying the studio. He believed in me, I played him sketches of some of my songs and he promised that if he bought the studio he'd let me record some demos. I cut five songs and from that point on things started moving.

DS: How did growing up in Canada affect your music and listening habits?

JC: I think that Canada—well, Toronto anyway has been and still is to a certain extent a hard rock town. We didn't then and I think they still don't have a station dedicated to Black music. There just wasn't much Stevie Wonder and Earth, Wind and Fire that I remember being played in Canada. I got it from the R&B stations coming out of Buffalo, but there was a funk community in Toronto. I've never really belonged to any kind of a scene or a clique because I've always been pretty much on my own. The closest I could say I've ever been in something like that was this club in Toronto that I used to sing at where a small number of R&B enthusiasts used to sing and hang out. I think there's definitely an audience for it up there. I understand they're trying to get an Urban station

DS: So you just gravitated to this kind of music? JC: There's so much music that I liked—to put it into formats isn't right. I mean, I love Randy Travis as much as I love Stevie Wonder as much as I love the Sex Pistols and Led Zeppelin. I think the common denominator is these people have soul

and it comes through their soul outside of Soul music. I think that Black music really hit me between the eyes because there was something about the groove and the bassline and it was unashamedly sexual. It seemed so real and not out of touch to a normal human being. Much the same way as Country music—it's really very personal and unashamed of emotion and feeling. DS: In fact, with Country and Soul, the biggest difference probably is the instrumentation.

JC: Absolutely. I think Country is white people's funk. It's the lyrics, the sentiments of the songs that are personal in both Country and Black music. DS: It seems your affection for people with soul or feeling extends beyond music. Your influences extend to people like Ayn Rand and John Steinbeck and other diverse personalities.

JC: There are many people that I really love and I don't feel like I have to like just one type of music either. I never have. I didn't know there was supposed to be formats for somebody's tastes. I grew up listening to Classical music and that's still a big part of my life and it's definitely a big influence. I just never knew that there were certain types of music that I wasn't supposed to like.

DS: Is there a "Jane Child sound?"

JC: Not that I'm aware of. I really hate any label being slapped on me because I don't think I fall into any category. I would be the worst person to answer that question because I don't know how objective I could be—I hear all the different things in it and I think that it's really natural that all those influences come out because they all went in.

DS: You've said there is "a light and a dark side to your music." Is that an extension of the Eastern cultural influence?

JC: I think that's more an extension of my personality because I tend to be somewhat of a manic depressive, so I think I'm pretty extreme and the songs were just written at those times when I was feeling extreme feelings. Obviously, "Don't Wanna Fall In Love" and "Mister Jones" weren't written the same day. They were just my songs but when I listened to the whole album, I discovered how different sounding some of the songs were.

DS: So this album is an expression of your varied moods?

JC: I don't feel apathetic very often—I'm passionate about something that I feel is important enough to write about. I don't know what it's like for other people. For me, I'm either ecstatic out of my mind or I want to blow my head off! It's one of the two. DS: Do you think not being allowed to listen to Rock 'n Roll as a youngster made you want it that much more?

JC: I guess the "Forbidden Fruit" theory kicked in. That rule didn't really last that long. I have two brothers so the Led Zeppelin albums found their way into the house. It wasn't really a moral dilemma that my parents had about the music, it was more about listening to barbaric playing—they thought it would infiltrate my playing and I'd lose my subtle approach to people like Mozart. But it really didn't last that long. It's pretty impossible to avoid that music—it's everywhere.

DS: Parents and teachers will often tell kids to learn the Classics. Has your Classical music background helped you?

JC: I believe that any knowledge pertaining to

FAST BREAK TO BIG BREAK

Queen Latifah's Royal Debut

he Queen of Rap, the princess of the posse, your royal badness and Mama Zulu are all names attributed to one person-Queen Latifah. Her real name is Dana Owens, "but Latifah was given to me by my cousin when I was about eight; it's Arabic and means delicate and sensitive." As far as the royal title, La (as she prefers to be called) stresses it has nothing to do with rank. "It's basically in honor of our ancestors," she explains. "We all came from a long line of Kings and Queens from Africa." As inspired on the track "A King and Queen Creation," La traces her bloodlines back to the Egyptian Queen Nefertiti, all the while affirming that the Afro American culture was cut short. "Who knows who's remainin' to who? I consider all of us Kings and Queens." Her stately attire speaks proud as well. "The clothes I wear relate to the rhymes I write and the music I perform," she says. "Everything is related culturally. My style and music are one."

Not only is she a woman of many names, she's a woman of many talents. Her music incorporates clever wordplay and a myriad of styles including Reggae, Jazz, House and Hip Hop. It's no wonder her music encompasses a wide spectrum of musical influences considering that growing up she listened to "everyone and everything. My favorites were Elton John, The Jackson Five, The Whispers, Phyllis Hyman, Patti LaBelle, plenty of Reggae and whatever else my mom played, including Jazz. She played a lot of music and bought a lot of records, but my brother bought the

Hip Hop," muses La.

Her attitude exudes unity and a strong understanding of her cultural roots. She prides herself on being a genuine person—no phoniness about her. For example on the rap "Latifah's Law," she recites, "BMWs and gold rope chains don't impress me/won't get you closer to the point you could undress me." Rapping went hand-in-hand with playing basketball with her posse in high school and La says she "always wanted to play basketball 'cause I really enjoy the

team spirit and going to games."

As depicted by her musical style and def fresh lyrics, La is definitely a team player on and off the court. She's concerned about the human race and her cultural roots; she's not into putting other people down to make herself look better. She's proud of her heritage and feels it's easier to sit down and talk to someone about how she feels about a subject than to try to rhyme it. "Usually the records I make aren't directed at political issues per say, or social issues—they just sometimes involve those topics," she says. "The way for me to get a message across is to make it an entire record, but usually I just write whatever comes

off the top of my head during the course of writing a verse. If it's me talking about me and then suddenly a line about South Africa pops in, it's 'cause that's how I think. I have fun, but I have a serious side also, and thats how the messages and the records usually come across." She continues, "except for 'The Evil That Men Do,'that one I made specifically for the purpose of letting people know just how I feel. For example homelessness, crack, drug dealers, the government, South Africa...'Someone's living the good life taxfree/'cause some poor girl can't find a way to be crack-free." This rap in particular reflects La's serious side—"strictly business," she says.

Queen Latifah assembles a most powerful posse of producers and guest rappers on her debut album. "All Hail The Queen" reads like a rap who's who, sporting such superior names as KRS-One, Louis "Louie Louie" Vega, Prince Paul, Daddy'O of Stetsasonic, De La Soul, British rapper Monie Love and of course DJ Mark the 45 King— and we can't forget the Flavor Unit. "We're just a bunch of friends who like to

rap," she says, "we're like a support group in a sense. We all push each other toward success, and urge each other to work harder to perfect our craft." The Flavor Unit, all of whom La considers an extended family, gave their stamp of approval to all songs on the album.

How did La hook up with so many top performers and producers on a debut album? "Monie and I met in England, when I was on tour with the Jungle Brothers and we just became pretty cool friends," she remembers, "Monie came into my dressing room before one of my shows and started to rap. She had a single out in England, but she wasn't known at all in the United States, so I asked her if she wanted to rap." La continues, "the De La Soul and Monie Love tracks were just for fun, since we all knew each other, we wanted to do that. The track that KRS produced was a trade because I did something for him on \$Iy and Robbie's album, which he produced. So in return he did 'The Evil That Men Do,' for me and 'The Pros' which was with Daddy O and Stetsasonic. We recorded it as a Warner Bros. album called Funky Reggae and Tommy Boy worked out a deal so we could put it on my album as well." But the list of collaborations doesn't stop there. Add yet another artist—David Bowie. "EMI asked Mark the 45 King to do a remix on his big seventies hit, 'Fame', and they wanted me to rap of it, so I obliged and the result was 'Fame '90'."

How did the Queen and King DJ Mark hook up? "We met in high school. My mother introduced us 'cause she taught at the high school I went to, and we became friends," La recalls. "He started producing, and rapping with me and the entire Flavor Unit Posse. We just brought each other up, boosted each other and worked together so we would all come out on top and rise to fame and fortune. At least that was our plan at the time."

Sounds like the plan worked. With a debut album selling over 200,000 records, Latifah comfortably positions herself as "The Queen of Rap."



n about one month many of you will have, or will soon be getting, your Spring Arbitron report card. That's the good news.

Some of you, in markets where there are Arbitrends, may think you already have a pretty good idea of what your final Spring estimates will be. And that's the bad news.

Why?

Because we're hearing from a number of you who are very confused about what the trends mean. You have reason to be confused.

If your station is in a market with year-round measurement—or if you aspire to work in a market that has four 12-week sweeps annually—the following may be, should be, of vital interest to you.

MORE SURVEYS, MORE MARKETS

There is an inescapable movement in more and more markets toward year-round survey measurement. Think your market is too small to have to worry about 48 sweep weeks yearly? Think again.

Starting in January, 1991, 21 more markets will go from two or three sweeps to the complete 48-week survey cycle. And we're not talking about huge markets here either. For example, Huntsville/Decatur is the #169 ranked metro, according to SRDS. Yet, effective next January, that market will jump from two surveys (Spring/Fall) to the continuous 48-week cycle. Think about how that affects budgeting and planning!

In addition to the move to continuous measurement, another batch of 15 markets that were formerly Spring-sweep-only will soon have a Fall sweep (starting this September). And, as you see in the Huntsville case, once your market gets to the two-survey-per-year level it's not impossible that you'll be in the year-round survey rhythm before too long.

Bottom line? More and more surveys in more and more markets. The metro with just one sweep a year, the Spring book, will soon be an endangered species.

ARBITRENDS IS COMING TOO

As you contemplate the joy (?) of 48 weeks of diary surveys (or if you're already in that stew) one aspect of the equation you'll become aware of is Arbitrends. Unfortunately, Arbitrends will likely be viewed by most programmers as the research equivalent of the visit by your mother-in-law. You probably didn't want it in the first place—and now you can't get ride of the darned thing.

Why do we sound the alarm on these trends? And how do they work? And how do you use them (if at all)? Here's the scoop.

On the surface you'd think trends would be welcomed. Any mid-term report on how your 12-week sweep is going would be helpful, right? Not necessarily.

TREND TROUBLES

TRENDS THEN, TRENDS NOW

When continuous measurement was debuted in Seattle and New Orleans in the Spring '78 survey there was internal discussion at Arbitron about whether or not to publish interim reports, as the survey progressed. Ideally these would offer stations intelligence on how well or poorly the sweep was going, with time left in the survey to perhaps make adjustments to improve your station's showing. They were to be programming-oriented, not for sales use.

So, in the March-April-May '78 cycle the first monthly report was based on the March estimates. This monthly data would be avail-

able toward the end of April.

For a number of years the monthly trend reports, each based on just one month's data, were the standard. However, there were problems. First, stations complained that given the delivery of the data (the first report would be sent near the end of the second month of the sweep, while the second month's data wasn't available until about two weeks before the entire book came out-too late to make any changes during the sweep) the monthlies had little programming use. Another concern was that data-based on just one month's diaries was too unstable-that the numbers could and would wobble dramatically. This again would lead to gripes about lack of creditability or utility of the monthly reports.

Voila! Arbitron, after input from clients (and seeing how well Birch's two month rolling trend reports were accepted by the stations) decided to offer Arbitrends. This would be trend reports based on three month's information, updated monthly on a rolling basis. Thus, if your Spring book was an April-May-June sweep your first trend thereafter as you began a Summer survey would be May-June-July(drop off the oldest month, plug in the

new one).

Wonderful! More stable information (three months versus one month's diaries), hopefully leading to better decision making by programmers. Just one catch. You had to pay extra for the trends—about 6% more over your regular Arbitron subscription fee. Being in a continuous measurement market did not automatically entitle you to the trend data. No pay, no trends (although they leaked like the proverbial sieve the day they were downloaded to clients). However, all was not happy ever after.

A WEIGHTY PROBLEM

Several years Arbitron decided to change to rules. We could write a book about the details here but suffice it to say that the stastistical techniques used to produce the *trends became different from* the weighting calculations used to produce *the quarterly books*.

We've seen, for example, where diaries in a trend report were worth 4,000 cume people each—but when the same demos' diaries were compiled into the 12-week quarterly report card, and weighted for *that* book, the diaries could be worth much less, perhaps only a

1,000 persons.

Bottom line for programmers was that after a while they began to find the rolling three month data was not a very good predictor of what the final book was going to be. In some cases stations has great trends, then dropped when the book came out—while in other cases the trends looked doomed but the book was a pleasant surprise. There's now so much frustration that some top programmers and consultants, such as Fred Jacobs, Rick Cummings of Emmis and Steve Goldstein of Saga have formed an organization to express to Arbitron their frustrations. The goal? To have Arbitron use the same calculation schemes for both the trends and the quarterly books. Maybe that will get us away from the ratings apples and oranges we now face.

How dramatic can the frustrations be? In a major market we were recently talking to management about the Winter '90 results. Analysis of a mechanical diary printout from Arbitron showed the station garnered about 40% of its diaries and QHs during March. Yet, extrapolation of Arbitrends showed just the reverse—that January was the station's big month. Different weighting (trends vs. Winter book) was the key. Aribtron's response? "Trends and monthly extrapolations are not meant to be used except on a long-term basis, to gauge a station's movement over six months or more." Little comfort to the PD engaged in the radio equivalent of the gunfight at the OK

corral.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Sooner or later you may be facing these trends. We see two steps you can take concerning how to cope with the devil:

• Until the weighting for the book and trends is the same, do *not* place much value in the rolling trends (or extrapolations of the trends).

•Make your opinion known to Arbitron that you want a better relationship between trends and the quarterly reports.

Above all, don't make radical changes based on what you see in the rolling trend data. Do market research, use your gut, whatever—just don't let these trend troubles lead you astray



fter the April 6 column, in which I reported on the A/C session at the Gavin Seminar For Media Professionals in February, I got a call from Bobby Cole. He's the Vice President of Programming for Fairmont Communications, based in San Francisco, where the company's property is K-101.

The various record promotion executives on the panel had discussed at some length the number of weeks A/C stations should commit to playing a new record in order to give it sufficient exposure to establish it with the audience. "One play a day is not going to make an audience aware of an artist or record," commented Steve Zap, then with Virgin Records and now with Warner Bros. Mary Conroy of Atlantic suggested an 8-week airplay minimum; Dino Barbis of Warner Bros. amended that to 16 weeks in some cases! Mike Martucci, then of Columbia, correctly pointed out that the length of time necessary to break a record is affected by its rotationhow many times a day it's exposed.

Bobby Cole's observation was that record people could gauge whether a record has received enough days, or weeks, of airplay for a fair chance to generate audience response (thus enabling them to judge whether it is stiffing or is just underexposed) if they gain access to the ratings for a given market, and are able to learn how many times per day the song is being exposed by a station there.

The method would be the same one used by radio salespeople to determine the exposure level of a commercial: The "turnover" ratio. Essentially, this is the ratio of the "average quarter hour persons" for the station to its "cume," in a designated time period (in this case, probably Monday through Sunday, 6AM to 12Midnight). The figures used should be those for the station's target demographic usually 25-49 or 25-54. For the 18-hour day, 7day week, a typical station turnover ratio might be 1/14; when used for spot-buying, this ratio is inverted to show that 14 spots are needed in this 18-hour period each day to reach half the station's cume, according to an accepted industry rule. Records are seldom played that often by any station in a day (although it was done for "pick hits" in the early days of Top 40, and this showcase proved to be a positive program element, and of course it was a powerful way to launch a new record!). But fewer plays will reach fewer listeners, and since "frequency" (repetitive hearings by the same listener) is what makes spots-or records sell, and recognizing another industry rule of thumb, that a spot must be heard by the same listener at least three times to start to gain attention—it's clear that quite a few playings of the song over a period of time are necessary to attain useful exposure. I'd be interested in having opinions from radio people on what sort of daily airplay would be necessary to receive a "frequency" of "3" for the average listener, given an average daily turnover radio of 14. would be of potential value both to the radio and record industries! Then it would be a simple matter of doing ratios from rating books, and comparing with average daily airplay of a record on a station, to see if a song really was getting a chance to "break"!

By the way, Cole also commented that he's passionate on the subject of "showcasing"

new records both to give them proper exposure, and to make them a positive programming element even though they are unfamiliar to the listener. In order to showcase them, he feels

mandatory to *frontsell* them. A backsell can tell the listener what he or she has heard, but a frontsell can get them interested in the record as they hear it for the first time! (Of course, a station can frontsell *and* backsell, and that is hardly likely to antagonize any listener either.) Certainly, if a record is *never* identified on the air, all the airplay in the world would fail to sell it well at retail!)

On an entirely different subject, for those stations frustrated by the vulnerability to breakdown of the slide-out drawers in CD players, and which are unable to afford the very expensive "professional" machines, I have come across a possible solution. A regional chain of furniture stores in my area has been selling a CD machine for sale prices ranging from \$50 to \$80 and I bought one to try it out. It has few features, but it delivers excellent sound, and so far has proven to be exceptionally easy to use and has given me no trouble. It's the Yorx model #D8500 and it solves the drawer problem by having none! Instead, when the "open" button is pushed, a bottom-hinged, damped door opens out, as in a cassette machine. The CD is placed in the door, vertically, and the door is closed. Unlike some CD machines, the disk is not placed in motion until the "play" button is pushed. This slow start is actually an advantage, since if the "play" button is pushed twice at the start, the machine goes on "pause," precisely cued, before the disk is started up. If you want to play the first cut, all you do is push "play" again and it starts instantly; if you want any other cut, you touch the "skip/ search" buttons after going into "pause" until you cue the right track number (the track to be played is displayed on the front of the unit, although there are no timer or telemetry function), and then touch "play," and it plays instantly. A very simple machine—and at a price that makes multiple studio CD players easily affordable. If the units should not hold up well, at this price they would be practically disposable! But since they are made in Japan, one would suspect the engineering

should be pretty good.

It struck me that lack of features, which accounts for the cheap price, eliminates standard but uneccessary "bells whistles," uncomplicating the machine, and actually making it better for



broadcast use! I found it fun to use.

REJOICE - BOB BALDWIN (ATLANTIC)

Who would have guessed several months ago that a musician could dedicate the title track of an album to the fall of the Berlin Wall and the release of Nelson Mandela? Times sure have a way of moving along in an unpredictable blur. So in the spirit of changing times, keyboardist Bob Baldwin has taken the eclectic, fleeting influences of Pop, Jazz and Blues and created something pulsating and driving. The upbeat pop attack of Baldwin's "Rejoice," with thirty-second pepperings of the main theme throughout the rest of the disc sets a joyful and rousing tone. Throughout the entire set Baldwin gears up for one musical celebration after another. For polished Jazz tastes, Baldwin's Rejoice rises to a rolling boil at midpoint with a blistering funk version of "Mercy, Mercy, Mercy." And if that suits your sound, proceed directly to a special tribute to the ultimate master of Pop/Jazz/Blues blend, "The Marvin (Gaye) Medley." What's going on? Baldwin's catchy piano tricks! Now there's two piano connections to the Baldwin name.



HEALING THE PAIN - BUNKY GREEN (DELOS)

Healing The Pain is a release heralded by serious Jazz programmers. Green's collection of ballads, each intensified with layers of staggering improvisational changes, is forcefully driven by raw and reedy outcries. Dedicated to the memory of his recently deceased parents, each number was chosen for the sincerity and emotional relevance of their lyrics, with Green extracting sentimentality from each tune while bringing his own gut-wrenching pathos to the surface. Green understands that such a process is a key to

being the essential musician. Each song is a journey that searches out, shares and accentuates inner pain. Hence the title. Healing The Pain realizes Green's aspirations, particularly with the inclusion of his bittersweet performance of Anthony Newley's "Who Can I Turn To" which segues into a free-spirited version of Cole Porter's "I Concentrate On You." True, some of these songs are chestnuts, but Bunky takes liberties with each selection. Techniques like Coltrane's stellar modal pondering and Bird's ultimate blues sketching are expanded on as Green redefines and modifies each theme for the good of added emotional dimension. On the slower moments of "Goodbye" and "Everything I Have Is Yours" Green's stretches each painful note to cathartic extremes.



LIFE COLORS - CHUCK LOEB (DMP)

Listeners only had a short breather between Chuck Loeb's collaboration with Andy LaVerne before CL again recaptured the bandleader spotlight with eleven more live-to-two-track performances. Life Colors is packed with strong Jazz and Adult Alternative possi-

bilities. As you may recall, before working successfully as a studio and television musician and doing jingles, guitarist Loeb was best known for his world travels as a member of Stan Getz's band. First, check out "Gravity," which puts the spotlight on the stocky tenor sax, something we've lately been missing from Michael Brecker. On "Crayons," (on which Loeb drew inspiration from Keith Jarrett's My Song album) if you auditioning past the minute and a half intro you'll be rewarded with a trio performance that's disarmingly charming and fragile. "Snow Song" is a bouncy number with gliding and fluid electric guitar and a hint of scat vocal from Loeb's wife, singer Carmen Cuesta. Upon repeated listening, Life Colors is a simmering as well as relaxing offering for Jazz/AA.



THEM CHANGES - TOM SCOTT (GRP)


Perhaps what we have here is a new Jazz genre: spiced instrumental sounds—Talk Show Band Ensemble Music. Over the years Letterman and Arsenio have successfully courted legions of young viewers to a television medium previously geared towards older insomniacs. No doubt those scintillating fusion bands, with their up-sounding ambience have done their part in shoving the proverbial hot poker up the Nielsen ratings. Tom Scott, who just finished his role as music director for the recently cancelled Pat Sajak show, brings a little of the late night TV sound with him to Them Changes. Don't take our word for it. Check out guitarist Pat Kelley's driving, gritty solo on "Chester And Bruce." Or how about some punchy versions of Buddy Miles' "Them Changes," EWF's "Serpentine Fire" or AWB's "Pick Up The Pieces?" Like his previous Flashpoint, Tom stays with an edgy and energetic approach. For more brooding Jazz moments try "Desire." It may remind you a bit of Tom's more soulful side. Remember his legendary theme from the film "Taxi Driver?'

NY INTERNATIONAL - TONY CIMOROSI (EPOCH RECORDS)

Four and six string bassist Tony Cimorosi has visited heavy rotation on many of our stations for the past several weeks. With selec-



tions like "Blue Samba" and "Tasia," the disc takes on a amiable World Beat perspective. Cimorosi's bass line takes center stage amid a flurry of percussive activity, yet he pulls off a number of tasty solos without being distracted or needlessly stepping out of his rhythmic element. While the exotic groove jams prevail, a couple of standout solo cameos appear when Randy Brecker takes the melodic low road his fluegelhorn on the sultry, yet speedy "Aquamarine." On Wayne Shorter's "Fall" violinist Michal Urbaniak navigates the band to calmer waters while bassist Cimorosi steps inside the pocket for a breather.



BAREFOOT (GLOBAL PACIFIC)

As violinist Steve Kindler climbs the charts with his latest, the red-hot Across A Rainbow Sea, along comes Barefoot, a side project laced with Latin, Caribbean and African rhythms. Here, Kindler takes leave of his classical and Japanese influences for more earthy tropical distractions. In addition to Kindler's abundant contributions, acoustic bassist David Friesen and flautist Sulubika provide the other, more vibrant moments. By far the most vigorous workout is "Shooz Off," which is well stocked with Kindler's trademark blazing, high speed soloing. Each track is generously oiled with an ethnic percussion groundswell, featuring as many as a half dozen players. David Friesen thumps along masterfully on "Street Strut" and harpist Carlos Reyes

triumphs on "Gitano De Paraguay" which showcases Sulubika's and Kindler's awesome playing. "Gobi Wind," "Barefoot" and "Arica," with Kindler on ukulele, also shine.

MARIAN McPARTLAND PLAYS THE BENNY CARTER SONGBOOK

(CONCORD JAZZ)

Along with Courtney Pine and Cleveland Watkiss comes an effort from English Jazz pioneer Marian McPartland. During the '80s McPartland, long hailed for teaching Jazz to schoolchildren, dabbled in classical and orchestral performances. Benny Green's musical achievements more than merit McPartland's stunning tribute. It was he who developed and defined much of the alto sax's role in Jazz. Also, Green's 1930 work with Fletcher Henderson helped spark the worldwide big band swing hysteria. Having the honoree taking part in this tribute most likely made for some extra-careful musicianship, insuring maximum quality.

LAND OF THE BOTTOM LINE -JOHN GORKA (WINDHAM HILL)

With Shawn Colvin and Mark Knopfler's success on the Adult Alternative chart, it seems as if programmers have stumbled onto something profound. Over the years folk artists like Don McLean, Bob Dylan and the Mamas and the Papas have achieved amazing mass appeal. But upon examination we learn that they all were disciples of Pete Seeger, Woody Guthrie, the Weavers and the Kingston Trio. Windham Hill's recognition of today's thriving and revitalized Greenwich Village folk scene came alive on the Legacy compilation released last year. One of those in the spotlight was John Gorka. Gorka has the strong, communicative voice necessary to rise above the noisy nightclub ambience. On hand lending support are Colvin, electric guitarist Chuck Loeb and cellist Eugene Friesen. Try "Italian Girls," "Dream Street," the title cut and a sweet Colvin/Gorka duet titled "The One that Got Away." While not as revolutionary as in decades past, modern folk is alive and


GREEN CHIMNEYS - CLEVELAND WATKISS (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

The British Jazz scene is getting downright interesting with folks like Courtney Pine, Steve Williamson and Cleveland Watkiss around. Inspired by singers like Betty Carter, Watkiss developed into a gifted vocalist and moved toward scat and improvisation. After the guiding influences of Pine's Coltrane leanings set in, Watkiss' voice became an instrument as opposed to just a singing front-person. "Puss In Boots," "New Born," and the title cut provide some uncompromising, searing, yet provocatively historical highlights. For a good lead-in to the chart-topping Carmen McRae stuff, try the free-association, wordy scat on "Song For You."



BLAZING AWAY -

MARIANNE FAITHFULL (ISLAND)

Here's a live retrospective that explains why Marianne Faithfull is one of modern music's leading female stylists. She made the transition from songstress to interpreter of the mad female mind with one simple move—the notorious Broken English album which I remember being released the same day as Steve Winwood's gummy and optimistic Arc Of A Diver. Gnashing away with fury and an occasional obscenity, Faithfull has since cut a catalogue of albums that are as sensitive as they are wondrous. Blazing Away is an overview of her art captured in performance at St. Ann's Cathedral in Brooklyn. It consists of pre- and post-Broken English material, with such live-in-concert landscapes as "Guilt," an extended reworking of Lennon's "Working Class Heroes" (which sounds custom-written for Marianne), "Sister Morphine" (which was custom-written for her), "As Tears Go By," updated after lots of wasted water under the bridge and more. Blazing Away celebrates Marianne's stylistic honesty. The band includes Dr. John, Fernando Saunders, Garth Hudson, Barry Reynolds and more. Since Broken English, Marianne's approach as always been gloves-off and with a newfound sobriety, she's at a new crossroads. Instead of writing a tacky tell-all, she gives us her life in a series of songs. I look forward to her next batch of new works.



"JEALOUS" - GENE LOVES JEZEBEL (GEFFEN)

After sorting out sibling misgivings, Gene Loves Jezebel, leaders in the arena of three-named bands, is back on wax with Mission producer Tim Palmer co-producing. The glamorous half of the Aston Brothers circus is still in business. To these ears, "Jealous" could be the "Suspicious Minds" of Alternative radio. Don't be surprised if some brave mainstream rockers jump aboard, as happened with the last GLJ. The band has already laid a thick Alternative base that seems destined to spread. I'm talking spread as in Cure, as in

REM, B-52's, Love & Rockets—you get the picture.

SOUNDTRACK OF MY LIFE - KIMM ROGERS (ISLAND)

As the old rock axiom goes, "you got all your life to write that first sound track of your life." In her handwritten bio (a nice touch), Kimm Rogers tells us about her birth in Cleveland, the trek to LA, her start strumming the family guitar, moving to Nashville, getting her reckons" and "fixin's" straight until it was back to SoCal where she made the rent waiting tables in Venice Beach. Enter producer/ writer Steven Soles and the folks at Island who have released a fine, reflective collection of songs. Kimm's a great singer. She sorta sounds vaguely (how's that for committing yourself, 'sorta vaguely') like Sandy Denny with a twang. Her songs are, at times, artsy craftsy slices of life—like about making the rent and the pure American luxury of home, considering so many Americans don't even have that. Without trotting out the Melissa word, I'd rather harp on the acoustic-ness that Soles brought to the party—uh, I mean the sessions. I'm glad this Island/PolyGram deal finally started because I've been listening to Kimm's record for a long time. Now that it's legitimate, it should be fun watching radio and the world at large reacting to such an honest debut. Trax: ""Walk On Water" (nice cello), "My Dear Mama" and my current fave, "Right By You" just for starters.

"CLOSE TO YOU" - MAXI PRIEST (CHARISMA)

A fantastic drum program capped with a counter-percussive rap/vocal laid down soulfully by the Priest man. Maxi Priest mixes an English pop appeal with Jamaican "sound system" bass. Look out for this one. It's a sweet soul song that should become a summer standard.

SEVEN SOULS - MATERIAL (VIRGIN)

One of this year's unique, most intense releases. The Material mafia (whose Bill Laswell brings us the world's lowest notes) use Beat pioneer/experimental writer William S. Burroughs as the centerpiece for a brilliant musical/mystical/literary collage. For instance, on "Seven Souls" Burroughs lists the seven planes of spiritual psyche, ending with Satan. Musically, there seems to be a fist fight between modern electronics and Eastern intrigue. Burroughs is genuinely fascinating, out-of-place and detached, which makes Seven Souls all the more intriguing.

WHERE THERE'S SMOKE THERE'S FIRE -BUCKWHEAT ZYDECO (ISLAND)


Los Lobo David Hildalgo knows a thing or two about accordion—he's been known to squeeze a mean box. But Buckwheat Zydeco is still heads above the rest of the universe when it comes to squeezing so much soul out of a traditionally ruthless adolescent nightmare machine. WTSTF is a continutation of Buckwheat's last great one, spot checked (a fancy way of saying "produced") by writer Ted Fox. Besides bringing his tremendous band, Buck is helped along by Dwight Yoakam on Hank's "Hey, Good Looking." If "Buck's Hot Rod" is too hot, too cajun for you, if you're rough enough, maybe the novelty of Jagger/Richard's "Beast Of Burden" will do.

JUST CAME BACK - COLIN JAMES (VIRGIN)

There are two edits of "Just Came Back." Which ever one you choose to play, it's important you audition the album version first. That way you hear the time travel at the beginning, which clues you in to what Colin James is all about. Here's a hint. Blues can be high tech and compete. That's all I'm gonna say. Just get ready for a real live wire blue power, daddy-o.

"HAUNTED HEART" - ALIAS (EMI)

Alias has indeed performed under a series of alias. You've seen these guys not on the post office wall but on the charts, starting with Roger Fisher, Steve Fossen and Michael Derosier. They were former members of the matriarchal band Heart during the Dreamboat Annie heydaze. Singer Freddy Curci was the lead vocalist on "When I'm With You," that cryptic record by Sheriff that was a hit five years after the fact. The "AOR Mix" is two seconds longer and has quite a different snare and guitar sound. Ya got two seconds? Go for it. KZ

NEW RELEASES

<u>BILLY BRAGG - THE INTERNATIONALE</u> (ELEKTRA)

With all the changes taking place in Europe, the time is ripe for Bragg's updated folk/ protest songs. According to Bragg in a recent Melody Maker interview, "There was no way any of this was going to fit into what I have in mind for the next Billy Bragg album, which is looking to be more personal than political. I wanted to put it out because of all the things happening on the political front." The title track is a composition that dates back to the French 1880s (also the Russian national anthem until 1943), and upon Pete Seger's suggestion Bragg updated it for the '90s. Fellow protest singer Phil Ochs is immortalized in "I Dreamed I Saw Phil Ochs Last Night," a reworking of an old trade union classic "I Dreamed I Saw Joe Hill Last Night." Taken in the context of an inspired period piece, The Internationale holds its own. A clever pit stop-but I'm a-waitin' his next release. LINDA RYAN

JUNIOR REID - ONE BLOOD (BIG LIFE/MERCURY)

Many of you are already familiar with Junior Reid through his involvement with Black Uhuru—the mere mention of which brings to mind the recognition some serious reggae. Junior Reid takes what he's learned from, and contributed to, Black Uhuru and turns it into a personalized reflection. What I like best is the way he manages to stay positive and concentrates on the unifying aspects of merely being human. Start with the hard-hitting "Searching For Better," which has a rap groove to it, "One Blood," "Married Life" and a unique version of The Beatles' "Eleanor Rigby." The summer's here and the time is right for dancin' in the streets. LR

BULLET LAVOLTA - GIMME DANGER (METAL BLADE/RCA)

Bullet's third, like their first, is an EP. Gimme Danger showcases a somewhat more mature and slightly more metallic Boston outfit. But more mature doesn't necessarily mean more polished. In fact, without the accompanying applause the live tracks here would be indistinguishable from the studiocuts. These "new" versions of "X-Fire" and "Blind To You" will please fans and frequenters of those electrifying La Volta gigs, who'll also eagerly embrace the band's perenially-performed cover of Kiss' "Detroit Rock City," which is finally committed to vinyl here. World Cup fever has hit England! NEW ORDER (albeit coupled with the England squad) has finally hit the top of the charts as the nation goes football crazy. Away from the national sport, still faves on the Gavin UK turntable are THE CHARLATANS and KITCHENS OF DISTINCTION. But you've heard about them already. Try some of this:

A new, exciting release on the hip-hop tip comes from MONIE LOVE, a British ex-patriot now residing in New York. A stalwart of the British hip-hop scene for many years, Monie has since relocated stateside, making her name working with DE LA SOUL, JUNGLE BROTHERS, and most notably, QUEEN LATIFAH—on whose "Ladies First" single she debuted. Monie's album Down To Earth, is imminent for release, and features a wide array of styles, producers and guest appearances.

The most interesting production credit is Monie's continued working relationship with David Steele and Andy Cox, the musical two-thirds of FINE YOUNG CANNIBALS. Having worked with Monie on a re-mix of "She Drives Me Crazy," Cox and Steele were keen to further produce the dynamic girl rapper.

"She has it all," explains Andy Cox, "the snap articulate and a unique point of view. Hip-hop is about being different and she is different every time."

The fruits of the coupling can be heard on the album's first single, "Monie In The Middle." Keep an ear out for the excellent "I Do As I Please," heavily tipped to be the follow-up. Aside from being produced by Cox and Steele, both tracks feature guest guitars by funk legend BOOTSY COLLINS. Now that's something to hear!

The saddest news of the fortnight is that SPACEMEN 3 have suffered an acrimonious split. While wily old SONIC BOOM pursued his own angels and devils on his solo effort, Spectrum (Silvertone), the others have formed their own offshoot SPIRITUALIZED—billed on tour posters as "Spacemen 3 without Sonic." Sonic was miffed to say the least, and in a terse press statement has pulled the plug and formed a new band, SUN, reputedly heavily influenced by "Smile-era Beach Boys."

The good news for fans is that the Spacemen 3 have an album in the can due for September release. The single, "Big City" (Fire) will be released any day now while Spiritualized themselves have a fab new single "Anyway You Want Me" (Dedicated) in the shops now. Also look out for two singles from SIL-VER CHAPTER and SMC on Sonic's own Bop-A-Sonic label.

Going totally underground with our A&R tip, here are some names to look out for in the coming year. HONEYCHILD play funky, sweet soul music and have a singer who sounds every bit as tortured as Roland Gift. They look like they might be major label bound, with Virgin Records leading the chasing pack.

With their immaculately pleasant guitar appeal and unbearably addictive pop tunes, SMALL TOWN PARADE are another band currently causing a few whispers around the nation's capital. Rated highly by the notable English radio DJ and TV presenter Gary Crowley, Small Town Parade succeeded in winning the Demo Challenge on Crowley's GLR Sunday afternoon radio show for five consecutive weeks, thus entering his Hall Of Fame alongside last year's tipped contenders, THE KATYDIDS. Small Town Parade look likely to have an independent single "Sunday Way Of Life," released on Deltic Records later this summer

The man behind Deltic Records is none

other than CAPTAIN SENSIBLE of the DAMNED. His interest in melodic, jangly guitar pop has often been noted and he was quick to chase down Small Town Parade, signing them to a one-off deal.



Another act on the Deltic label, the much touted **BROTHERHOOD OF LIZARDS**, achieved a blitz of TV and press coverage earlier in the year following their nation wide tour—by bicycle! Packing all their environmentally-sound equipment into a trailer and hitching it to their bikes, they cycled from town to town promoting their Lizardland album. Have guitar, will travel!

Look our for a most intriguing solo effort ex-STUMP bassist, KEV HOPPER. The Sound Of Gyroscopes (Ghetto) is as quirky as one might expect from this Beefheart-obsessive. It's the sample-heavy tale of a Scottish technician's attempts to devise a gyroscope that can transport man to Mars in 34 hours. Off the map!

If it's hard-driving, insistent rock you're after, get your paws on "Everything Flows" (Paperhouse) by the exceptional TEENAGE FAN CLUB. Only in seven-inch vinyl at the moment—a medium still thankfully preserved in the U.K.—this Glascow four-piece kick ass in a divine way. If you can't get their single, watch for their imminent album, "A Catholic Education," to be released on Matador in the US.

Dance-wise, Manchester is still the place to be. Ex-Factory stalwarts A CERTAIN RATIO's new single "I Won't Stop Loving You" (A&M) is a laidback chart certainty—a feat their best rapper and all around smoothie MC BUZZ B can hopefully repeat with "The Last Tree," his first, slightly housey effort for Polydor.

A former NIGHTINGALE creeps out of the closet as former leader turned crooner (and natty dresser) ROBERT LLOYD unleashes his first solo album, Me And My Mouth (Virgin). It's a cautious offering that wins hands down, the rhyme of the month competition by rhyming "Paul Anka," "Sri Lanka" and "Wanker" to telling effect in the song "Port Of Anchor."

Distinctly un-dancey is "She Comes From The Fall," (Mute) by Oldham neighbors INSPIRAL CARPETS. The best track from their Top Ten album, Life, even with this downbeat anthem Manc-mania shows no signs of ceasing. The kids wanna rock!



something you want to do is going to help you. I don't know how I'd be writing—I have no way of being objective and to know how I'd be if I didn't have that background. I've spoken to singers who have no knowledge of their art—they don't know any of the theory of it and they tell me they feel lost. They feel like they're flying by the seat of their pants. For some people that's great—it would drive me crazy. I'd have to know. So, I think it depends on the person. Certainly, there are great people who've never had a moment of theory so it definitely isn't a pre-requisite. If you have it in you it comes out.

DS: Your family's reaction since going to number one with your first record must have been something...

JC: They were pretty happy. They're proud of me. I think my parents, being in the Classical end of it, had some inkling of just how ruthless a business this might be and I think they're just glad I managed to get through relatively unscathed and unhurt to make the record I wanted to make. The fact that it went to number one is just icing on the cake. They're happy that I'm happy.

DS: That's really nice. Now, you write, perform and play all the instruments on this project. Do

you see that continuing?

JC: I don't have a band at this point. I didn't have a band going into this record. I think there's a common mistake that happened for awhile where you take an artist who has a certain sound, throw them in a studio with a bunch of slick studio cats and out comes this homogenized version—one percent of the essence of what was initially original and interesting about the artist. I had no intention of that happening to me. It was unnatural for me to do it any other way than I did it. I really felt that introducing a studio musician would just diffuse anything original or unique that I could possibly do because I'm not playing on a zillion different records everyday. So, unless I find a band and people that I feel are representative and part of my sound, I'll continue to do it this way. But because I'm so interested and immersed in Indian music, you could see players of those instruments on the next record.

DS: Do you remember where you were or what you were doing when you wrote "Don't Wanna Fall In Love?"

JC: I wrote it in L.A. I had just moved there from New York and I wrote it the way I wrote everything. I was playing bass with one hand and pads with the other and I was singing. I had a groove going and I just came up with it and the lyrics followed very closely. I wrote everything but the second verse, which I think was the last thing I did. People are taking it at face value, which is cool. It's really not a happy love song, though, and you may or may not interpret it being directed at a person. If you so desire and go elsewhere with it, you have my blessing, but "white boy" has a completely different connotation in Compton. I'm cool with it because if it's making somebody feel good, which I know it is, that's all I care about. That's better than any chart position or any amount of money—better than anything.

DS: Well, it certainly does that.

JC: What else is there? There's nothing else.

DS: Now, the line that a lot of people mention to me and question is, "You make the knife feel

good...

JC: A lot of people think it's "night." Yeah, it's "knife." It's the old Jane radical dichotomy—it's the pleasure/pain principle that's so much a part of my life! I'm ecstatic that it became such a big hit.

DS: On "Welcome To The Real World" there's a political statement, "no way to run a universe." What thoughts do you have about sending messages like that in your music?

JC: I tend to be really careful about it. First of all, I don't know how qualified I am to make political statements—I'm a high school dropout. I tend to try and make them as non-preachy as possible, to make them observations and leave the final conclusion to the listener who is probably better qualified than I am. The eighties were so excessive and the nineties seem to be, so far, a lot of

accusations and fingerpointing and there are so many things wrong in the world. There are so many people taking up so many causes that I think you tend to be inundated and music is a wonderful means of communication. There are a lot of artists doing that successfully; I tend to be afraid sometimes that it gets "artless." I don't know how poetic you can be when you say "ozone

when you say "ozone layer" in a melody. There are some artists who are great at it, but I still think that music is a form of escape and that's important, too.

DS: So, "Welcome To The Real World" is...

JC: ...a naive observation of a high school dropout.

DS: Can you tell us why you dropped out?

JC: I went on the road when I was fifteen. I joined a Rock 'n Roll band and left home. Once you've been "off the farm" and lived in the adult world and done something you love and discover that this is what you want to do for your life, it's really hard to go sit with a bunch of kids in school again. As much as I loved school when I was in it (I really was a good student) once I had been on the road for the Summer, there was no possible way I could go back, but to this day I continue to read a lot. DS: You don't feel that you missed anything out of that experience?

JC: Well, I'm sure I did. If ever trigonometry comes into everyday life and I need it, I'm fucked.

DS: Hopefully that won't happen.

JC: Yes, hopefully. Now I have a business manager so I don't need it.

DS: When it comes to your age, you just say that you "missed the sixties completely?"

JC: ...well, actually I was born in the sixties. The other members of the first band I was in were a lot older than me and they were Deadheads. I felt like I had missed the greatest era that had ever happened. The line was kind of a joke—and actually wasn't meant to get to as many places as it did—it was kind of tongue-in-cheek.

DS: So did you really miss missing the sixties and not being part of that era?

JC: Well, I went back. I've connected with Janis Joplin and Jimi Hendrix. The first record I ever had was a Beatles record and I got it by default because my Dad had to do an arrangement of "Michelle," so "Rubber Soul" was in the house and I found it. It's funny because I know all the words to these Janis Joplin songs and people go, "Well, that's way before your time." I laugh because you know, Mozart was before my time, too, but I found him! It's funny—there's a lot of great music.

DS: I don't know whether or not you've heard this, but a lot of people have tagged you "the female Prince." Does that comparison surprise

JC: Well, I don't know if I can be compared to anyone, but if I'm going to be, Prince is a very flattering comparison, absolutely. I guess it's because we're both kind of control freaks, maybe (laughs). I can say that there's a pretty strong sex-

> ual message on my record. I can think of a lot worse comparisons.

> DS: Is writing what you enjoy most?

JC: It is now, but it wasn't always that way. I started writing because I wanted to sing. All I cared about was singing. I've always been able to play—but I wanted to sing. Nobody was handing me songs so I figured I should probably write some. So that's why

I started writing. Now, writing—that's my main thing

DS: Is it because it's an outlet for expression?

JC: It's such a powerful tool. I mean, you can play a certain thing and alter somebody's mood—that's powerful AND then you have the lyrics, you

can say things. It's amazing.

DS: When you get set to head out on the road, you'll have a band right?

JC: Yes, there will be and again, it won't be a collection of hot, studio musicians—it will be MY band. I guess I'm looking for my "Revolution." When I find them and when it's right, I'll be out there because the best part of this is performing IIVF

DS: Are you in the process of looking for these people?

JC: I had planned to make another album before I went out on the road. I really thought that there were just nine songs on this album that anyone knew or cared about, but the demand has been getting pretty intense, so—since the record has been out, people have been sending me information on themselves and there are a couple of musicians that I have in the back of my mind, who I think would be right. I need some great keyboard players—lots of them!

DS: Maybe this will get a few people to start calling. It sounds like you were really surprised by the success of this project?

JC: It takes so much effort to even get signed by a label—it's a lot of work. Making the record was a lot of hard work for me. It changed my life. It was validation and I'm happy. I'm more comfortable than I've ever been in my life. I feel more like I've found a place that I should be in or at than I ever have before.

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
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
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






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
