





To Start Up Own Label

RODRIGUEZTOELEKTRA

As expected, Elektra Entertainment this week formally announced that Ruben Rodriguez will be joining the label as Senior Vice-President, Urban Music. As part of the deal, Rodriguez will be president and CEO of a new music label yet to be named.



No stranger to the music industry, Rodriguez recently left CBS, where he was Senior Vice President of Black Music. At one time he worked with the late Neil Bogart at both Casablanca and Boardwalk Records. Before joining CBS in 1986, Rodriguez was Vice President of Urban Music at Island Records.

"I'm very excited about working with the Elektra family," said Rodriguez. I've always had the greatest respect for **Bob** (**Krasnow**) and his staff...I'm

looking forward to increasing the success of Elektra's established artists and developing careers for the stars of tomorrow."

"It's both a pleasure and a privilege to welcome Ruben aboard," said Elektra Chairman Krasnow. "His years in the field and extraordinary track record at CBS have given him unique insightinto the ever-widening world of Urban music...Ruben has helped shape the public's awareness of the many forms of Black music. I believe his far-sighted vision will mesh happily with Elektra's musical philosophy and ongoing commitment to Urban music."

ANDERSON EXITS KIIS

KIIS/FM-Los Angeles President/GM Lynn Anderson has left the Gannett-owned Top 40. "Lynn was suspended last week and continues on that status," said Group President Jay Cook. "Others have reported her departure from the station but we do not have any such information from Lynn. We will provide more information at a future time." Cook is handling Anderson's duties in the interim.

ENIGMA STAFF LAYOFFS

On Thursday, November 15, thirty members of the Enigma staff were laid off in what has been called a "streamlining measure."

The company's distribution agreement with Capitol/EMI Music will end on December 31, and company CEO William Hein is currently being courted by two unnamed major labels.

Surviving the axe are upper echelon executives including Hein, Top 40 VP/Promotion Mike Krum, the recently-hired Rich Schmidt and some support staff. According to Publicity chief Carey Baker, this core will be in place when Hein seals his next deal.

TANNER, GOLDNER PROMOTED AT RCA

Two upper echelon promotions were made at RCA Records this week: Geary Tanner to Vice President, National Promotion and Bonnie Goldner to Vice President, Promotion/Trade Relations.

Tanner, most recently Senior Director, Pop Promotion has been with the label for over four years. "My family agreed to move to New York almost two years ago





BOBB GOES EAST WEST

The staffing of Atlantic Record's newest division, East West America, continued this week with the naming of Merlin Bobb to the post of Senior Vice President of A&R.


FOUR TO NEW POSTS AT WARNER BROS. BLACK MUSIC

"Of equal importance is the attention he gives to artists through every stage of their projects as he reinforces the team effort we strive for at Capitol."

Devine says, "Having been a part of the turnaround team here, I look forward to an expanding role in the future growth of this exciting company."

MCA/BMG DISTRIBUTE MCA, GEFFEN, GRP ON WORLD MARKET

The MCA Music Group and Bertelsmann Music Group have entered into a licensing agreement to distribute and license MCA, Geffen and GRP outside of North America. Countries not covered in the pact are the United Kingdom, Germany and Japan.

The unique agreement calls for the two to develop new artists and propel the careers of established ones. MCA Chairman Al Teller also sees this as one step closer to opening an arm of MCA in Germany pointing out that it has been one of the largest selling territories for his product.

"The partnership was made with an emphasis on building and developing new talent on a worldwide basis," said BMG International President and CEO Rudi Gassner. "We look forward to our new association with these labels, which will enable us to enhance our repertoire around the world." Gassner noted that two out of three of all record sales take place outside of the U.S.

KROY TURNS OFF TOP 40, KSEG TURNS ON CLASSIC ROCK

Saying that Sacramento's (CA) Top 40 pool is "not big enough," KROY General Manager Tom Schurr pulled the plug on the format and the station emerged with a new sound and a new set of calls. KSEG, "Sacramento's Eagle" began playing classic rock on Monday, November 12.

The former KROY shared the Top 40 pie with FM102 and KWOD. According to Schurr, "If we kept on, we'd all split a 4-1/2, 5 share of the audience, and all be in big trouble. We looked at the research and saw that we could fill a niche, and grab some adult listeners."

Schurr's new competition will be rockers KZAP and KRXQ, but, interestingly, he feels he'll be able to grab some adults listening to Country stations in the Sacramento area. "The beauty of the format is because it's an adult format you have the ability to draw from virtually any station that is targeting the middle demos—25-49."

With the exception of PD Jeff McCartney, who left last week to join WAPE-Jacksonville, Fla. last week, Schurr reports no staff changes in light of the change. "We'll be evaluating everything in the next couple of weeks," he said.



Stations take years to build goodwill and credibility that can be shattered overnight by new ownership and management who don't fully comprehend the importance of this fragile bond. Insisting on high standards of quality and delivering on promises is something that needs to be done consistently day after day, year after year. Imagine how viewers felt last week when our local Fox Television affiliate promo'd the fact that "In Living Color" would be seen after Sunday night's 49ers-Cowboys game. However, they neglected to tell everyone that the show would be joined "in progress." So instead of seeing the popular show in its entirety, we saw the last ten minutes. Delivering on a promise? Legally, yes, but so much for believability. In the current budget-conscious environment PDs have to make sure that if cost cutting is necessary it doesn't impact prizes and promotions promised to listeners. There's nothing more disappointing than showing up at a stationsponsored event, supposedly star studded, only to find no stars, a couple of bowls of chips, a few decorations and not much else. The cost in credibility among listeners, not to mention morale inside the station, is much higher than the expense of doing it right. Working within the limits of what a budget will allow beats having to cut corners so much that everything gets spread thin. Those who consider their staff as family and listeners as friends find a natural reluctance to offer them more than they can really deliver.



RATE THE RATINGS!

Arbitron and Birch are always rating *you*. Now it's your turn to rate *them*.

Yes, radio rowdies, it's time for the long-suffering subscribers to radio ratings to sound off about how good—or poor—a job you feel the ratings firms are doing. We'll also give you a chance to offer some suggestions to the powers that be in terms of what you'd like to see—or see dropped—in the ratings scorecards. So hang on and let's have some fun

RECENT RATINGS RUCKUS

Unless you've been in a cave, you may have noticed there have been some strong statements lately regarding dissatisfaction with the numbers gnomes. Top programming consultants such as Dwight Douglas and Jeff Pollack have sounded off, and offered suggestions for what could be done to improve the quality of the ratings so many live and die by.

Among the ideas floated by the programming pair are:

•Starting the survey week on Monday (for Arbitron) rather than Thursday. Hopefully, this would give better recording of the weekday listening before diary entries drop like a rock, as they do on weekends.

•Sampling enough folks to make sure a demographic group is not underrepresented, such as ethnics or young adult males 18-24. Thus, if 10% of a metro population was comprised of men 18-24, enough sampling should be done to make sure that 10% of the final tally was from that group. This is called quota sampling, and differs from the random sampling done by the ratings companies.

• Have fewer surveys. The thought here being that costs for ratings research goes only one way—UP. This, if this escalator goes only one way, perhaps a step to slow down the rate of the rise is to have fewer surveys, especially in markets that are under the gun of 48-week continuous measurement..

•Have Arbitron reduce its rates 50% (just kidding, but that's one idea all broadcasters who worry about ratings could get behind).

THE SHORT STORY
Interview by Brian Alan Samson

rom the heart of the ghetto to the pulse of an ever fickle rap world comes the sound and rhythm of Too Short. The bass is heavy. The beat is funky. The end product is slow and sinister. Without apology, the man who dares deem himself Too Short has infiltrated the minds and bodies of a youth nation in dire need of a good beat beating. It is the new album, "Short Dog's in the House," that is hitting the streets with an impressive and important impact—the portrait of an artist as a hungry man. Direct from the streets and uncompromising in his amazing acquisition of power and fame, Too Short (a.k.a. Todd Shaw) has vividly documented the hard reality of ghetto life on vinyl.

his is the story of one man's struggle in the ghetto, and the consequential battle to keep street smart in the fast-paced world of big business bullshit and banter. Too Short has kept both the integrity of ghetto survival and the money of mainstream success.

t all began innocently enough—he played drums in the school marching band. As Shaw advanced into the up-and-coming world of rap, he acquired a large local following. Then Too Short released his first two independent tapes. "Freaky Tales," a 12 minute X-rated song that Shaw self-produced, was a product that, at the time, was scarcely available anywhere except from the trunk of his car. Even so, it managed to sell 14,000 copies.

he rise from independent success to mainstream crossover acceptance is the result of an intense devotion to the art of persistence. Having signed on with RCA/Jive, the success was fast and frequent. The first two major label efforts sold a combined 1.5 million copies.

his gritty representation of street life and lingo has not gone without opposition. Critical attack has fallen upon Shaw for his often X-rated lyrics and, in particular, his repeated reference to the female species as "biiiiitch." It was only last year, in fact, when the group found itself in a "2 Live"-like situation. The conflict occurred after a Cincinnati performance when a judge fined Shaw and fellow rappers N.W.A., citing disorderly conduct in reference to a "lewd and disgusting" performance.

urrently, Too Short is tearing up the streets and airwaves with a powerful reworking of the Donny Hathaway classic, "The Ghetto." In an interview with the Gavin Report's Brian Samson, Shaw discusses what life is like for Too Short.

BRIAN ALAN SAMSON: I know the Short Dog lifestyle has definitely changed since the "Freaky Tales" days. How have you adjusted with the transition?

TOO SHORT: The biggest change in my life is that I moved to San Ramon from Oakland. I still enjoy hanging out with the homies and cruising the streets. It's not like since Short's become a recording artist you can't find me anymore. For example, like right now I'm just kickin' it rappin' with you in between serves while I'm bowling with some friends.

BAS; For those unacquainted with the musical career of Too Short, give us a brief bio.

TS: I started writing back in 1980. I began recording simply because there was a demand on the streets for my material. People would ask me to record a rap about them or something I would do it for five or ten bucks. There's some classic material out there from 1980-84 that I never even duplicated. It was really crude; I just wrote and rapped about anything I saw or experienced on the streets. Since there was such a demand my partners and I decided to mass produce my tapes, so we released a series called "The Games 1-4." They were extended raps that were about everything and anything on the streets of Oakland.

BAS: And this was all happening before the recordings of "75 Girls" and "Freaky Tales?"

TS: Right. At that point I was just rolling through Oakland selling tapes out of the trunk of my car—selling volume. After I broke from a local independent label that I was affiliated with, a couple of partners

and I started our own label and recorded our first twelve-inch, "Freaky Tales," which sold a little under 15,000 copies in the Bay Area. Then I decided to an put album together, an album called "Born To Mack." The sales were out of control and we couldn't handle it because we didn't have an established distribution system. We just couldn't handle the overall manufacturing, we couldn't handle the demand for records to be sold and the demand for records to be pressed. We eventually sought a label deal and Jive came along at the right time

BAS: Explain the concept behind the Too Short albums?

TS: We try to offer language on each side of the album that caters and communicates with two different audiences—the one that enjoys the story of

the streets depicted in the language of the streets, and the one that likes to party Too Short style. Back in '87, on the Born To Mack album, I was a true to the heart dirty rapper, which launched my career because it was the best material I ever put out. Production-wise it wasn't my best effort—I put it together in three days. I never ever wanted to cross the line to be commercial, but I realized that by being distributed by someone like RCA I was being exposed to an even larger audience. So I decided to keep doing what I had been doing and maybe just broadening things a bit. So that's what's taken place on the last couple of albums. I've been trying to grow while staying loyal to my audience at the same time. I've been trying to break the stereotype of being your typical dirty rapper.

BAS: How much did you know about the music business before you signed with Jive?

TS: From a legal standpoint I really didn't know what exactly what to do. I was young and rolling the streets, so I really never knew anything about promotion and marketing. The only musical knowledge I had came from my experience on the streets.

BAS: Did you ever think you'd succeed? TS: I never dreamed I'd have a platinum record. I just wanted to be accepted nationally.

BAS: What are the differences between the Too Short of yesterday and the Too Short of today?

TS: Time has been a major factor. In 1987 I left a label and had no money. I scraped up a few thousand bucks to get some sessions and in three days came up with my first album, Born To Mack. If you listen closely you can tell it was made in just three days. On the next album, Life Is...Too Short, I actually had a budget and some time to work creatively. What you heard on that album was pain, anger, frustration and the vulnerability of the street life experience. The streets tell the story. On Short Dog's In The House I wanted to create the best material ever. So I went in the studio for six months and

told myself, "I'm not coming out until my production staff is fully satisfied with each song."

BAS: I see you brought in additional producers and engineers.

TS: The producer I brought in is Al Eaton. He did a slammin' job on three of the songs he produced; he's primarily responsible for arranging and engineering my current hit "The Ghetto." The other producers are Pierre James and Keenan Foster. Between the four of us we're "Short Dog's In The House."

BAS: Billy Jam at KALX in Berkeley describes "The Ghetto" as the 1990 equivalent to Grand Master Flash's 1982 hit "The Message."

TS: Al Eaton came up with the concept—he's the one who suggested the use of Donny Hathaway and The Last Poets. The approach I took on the track was instead of just telling everybody my version of how hard it is to survive in the ghetto, I described it the way I see it without exaggerating the experience. I presented it so everyone would be able to understand the lyrics. Al and I just flowed along and came up with an easy to relate to message from the Ghetto.

BAS: A couple of songs on the album have an interesting storyline—"Dead or Alive," and "Short But Funky."

TS: "Dead Or Alive" is about all the rumors that went around that I had been killed shortly after "Life is...Too Short" was released. The rumor went through various stories: I died from a drug overdose or in a gun fight or I had been murdered. Around the time of the (1989) Loma Prieta) earthquake someone said Too Short was accidentally killed during the 'quake. How that stuff started, I couldn't tell you. "Short But Funky" is a song that was written by Dangerous Dane, who released "I Call Your Name." He wrote the song to break the stereotypes people had because of the content of my material. He said people were taking the lyrics as if it were the person I am. And that's not true at all. To clear the air, I don't walk around callin' every woman a bijijitch!

BAS: Explain "Paula And Janet."

TS: It's not what everyone believes it to be. It's just a song about some women who actually act like the way I've described. The names are meaningless.

BAS: What's your opinion of the violence at some Rap-related events?

TS: It's built a misconception in the minds of the city officials and the community. The coolest wannabes want to be at the Rap shows. The big mistake promoters and security make is that they let a group or gang of fifteen or twenty guys wearing emblems into the show. They're there to beat everybody up—that's all there is to it. You can't let any suspicious gang members in the show—if you do you're asking for it.

BAS: Do you feel that any attempts to ban Rap events at concert and club venues are racially motivated?

TS: At this point I don't. Three or four years ago I'd probably have suspected it. But today I'd probably have to agree with some of the cities' actions. Society has changed and a lot of people have gotten hurt—innocent bystanders have gotten injured for paying to see a Rap show. I'm not going to speak out against some kind of control on Rap events. It's up to us, the Rap artists, to help prevent any kind of incidents.

BAS: What's your outlook on the Afrocentric awareness incorporated into today's Hip Hop music?

TS: I love it. I personally don't take that approach in my music because I don't feel it's happening in my home base.

Realistically, it ain't the atmosphere here on the streets. Some Rappers—especially the New York Rappers—don't realize that not everyone is meant to promote and dictate this Black awareness movement. The way I perceive their attitude is, "If you ain't going to stop what you're doing and support the movement then you ain't down." They have to realize that not everyone can be like them.





In an extremely rare occurrance, the top five remain in ranked order from last week to this. The two biggest stat movements were WILSON PHILLIPS' increase of 20 HEAVY reports and HALL & OATES' increase of 30 HEAVY

The DON HENLEY, up from 27 to 7 in the past two weeks, is getting hard to ignore. Its HIT FACTOR has gone through the roof in that time (34% to 85%), and only five records are being played by more stations.

ELTON JOHN's "You Gotta Love Somebody" wins this week's PLUS FACTOR, moving 26% upward in HIT FACTOR and the 28 new ADDS almost put it in the MOST ADDED box again this week. Latest to join Elton's army are WCAS, WMT/AM, WIHN and KSBL.



Now top twenty with her first English language single released in the States, CELINE DION is now HIT FACTORed by three fourths of her 132 players. The newest players include WKYE, KLSS, KIXK and KCMX.

Who says unknown acts and labels can't get a fair shake with Gavin A/Cs? The most current evidence to the contrary is the latest from 4PM's SLYCE, and the song "Isn't It All A Lie." Ninety-nine A/Cs are on it including WFFX/FM, KXLK, WFRO, KKOR, KBLQ, KPTL, KTID and KKRB.





JAZZ NEW RELEASES



IN A SENTIMENTAL MOOD. MATHIS SINGS ELLINGTON - JOHNNY MATHIS (COLUMBIA)

Here's a gem not to be overlooked. Say the name Ellington and we think of the man who injected compositional brilliance into big band lazz, and who played his orchestras like his own personal instrument. Say the word Mathis and we think of the only pop vocalist whose lineage rivals that of Sinatra. Johnny Mathis, on In A Sentimental Mood, creates a fascinating tribute Duke's genius. But make no mistake; this isn't a transparent tribute to Duke's Cotton Club days. It's much more comprehensive and researched. The choice of material and the song order is superb, and includes instrumental interludes Mathis feels have been done to death—but should be represented on any Duke tribute. Mathis stretches the boundaries of his own style, turning in faithful renditions of the medley "Don't You Know I Care/I Didn't Know About You," the title cut and "Something To Live For." Maneuvering some of Ellington's symphonic changes must be the vocal equivalent of driving along winding roads. The characteristic uptempo tunes like "Do Nothin' Till You Hear From Me" and "Don't Get Around Much Anymore" are slowed down for maximum poetic impact because Mathis realizes his prowess with ballads. Yet the two uptempo pieces, "In A Mellow Tone" and particularly "What Am I Here For" (our personal fave), get a booming big band workout. Traditional Jazz programmers take note—this is one of the year's best.

PLAYING WITH FIRE - SAM RINEY (SPINDLETOP)

This CD represents a personal triumph for Jazz/Adult Alternative's sweetest alto sax player. With a couple of number ones under his belt, Sam Riney comes roaring back with majesty and confidence that's apparent right from the opening track, a passionate tribute to sucking face entitled "Everytime We Kiss." Each melody rings with renewed fire and urgency—a departure from the breezy Southern California ambience of Riney's previous work. Check out the acoustic guitar solo from Grant Geissman on the title track. The mood simmers when Riney switches over to soprano sax on the retiring "Our Love," yet the gentle bump-and-run funk of "Dreamland" has a churning underbelly Riney playfully dances around with his ambidextrous tonalities. Still, it's Riney on alto that ices the cake. Another don't miss: the menthol soul piece "Why Don't We." So now the musical question for commercial Jazz and Alternative Adult is: Why pine for the next Sanborn when Riney is back so soon, Playing With Fire?

DANCING WITH TIGERS - TOM BORTON (BLUEMOON)

Luckily for players like Tom Borton, there's a lot of sax appeal in Adult Alternative. Otherwise how could the airwaves accommodate all these fine reedsmen? Many programmers theorize that the sax most resembles the human voice, which perhaps explains its power and draw. Tom Borton is a forceful, prodding player—choosing to lay intricate double-triple overdubs on the main riff or brawling one-onone with an edgy, fusion-fueled electric guitar. He also turns up the intensity and tempo, best evidenced on the aerobic "Photoland" into the rousing "One Look." While in the same mode, punch over to "Guanoolu," which is tinged with congas and timbales plus a boxy, richer sounding electric guitar.

I WONDER - SUZANNE DEAN (NOVA) Pianist Suzanne Dean covers a hell of a lot of idiomatic ground on I Wonder. If you never venture past the first two tracks, "Dr. Ostinato" and "Ship's Bell Road" you'd categorize her as a purveyor of Adult Alternative keyboard atmospherics. Yet take a musical cab up to "85th & 2nd" and listen to her taunt and challenge her veteran rhythm section of John Patitucci and Peter Erskine, and reedman Bob Sheppard, with some scintillating Bop. Then if that's not diverse enough, Dean, a poet who discovered her Jazz vision when she first heard a Bill Evans record, performs a selfpenned vocal, "I Still Care," with a 32 piece orchestra. If Jazz/AA gets the message, Suzanne Dean could be the most singularly talented individual on the Jazz/AA charts. It makes you wonder.

TANGERINE DREAM MELROSE -(PRIVATE MUSIC)

In 1970 this legendary German electronic trio released their first album, Electronic Meditation. That also marked the year that leader Edgar Froese's son was born. Now, two decades and 7,000,000 units later, Edgar's son Jerome joins the band. Recorded in two cities steeped in profound artistry, Vienna and Berlin, Melrose recaptures the pulsating, filmier thrust of Thief and Risky Business

with tracks like "Dolls In The Shadow," "Rolling Down Cahuenga," the effervescent "Art Of Vision" and the title track.

BILLY HIGHSTREET SAMBA - STAN **GETZ** (EMARCY/POLYGRAM)

Here's a 1981 recording Stan Getz made in Paris while touring the globe with guitarist Chuck Loeb as part of his sextet. Unlike the smoky and afterhours Anniversary—his last Emarcy release—Billy Highstreet Samba is more rhythmic and, as the title implies, more samba-esque and snappy. Tracks like the title cut and "Anytime Tomorrow" are timeless as ever.

PLURAL - GAL COSTA (RCA LATINA) Those who have the luxury of playing vo-

cals with World Beat dynamics, a la Salif Keita or Youssou N'Dour, and feel comfortable with non-English lyrics, should give strong consideration to this album by gifted Brazilian singer Gal Costa. The set opens with the wildly infectious "Holofotes." On one slapping percussive duet, "Salvador Nao Inerte," fellow countryman Caetano Veloso guest stars. But, like the entire set, the track is percussive without being overpowering. Two other Veloso contributions (this time as songwriter), the simmering "Nua Ideia" and the more traditional "Å Verdadeira Baiana," embellish this superb collection with wit, sass and cool. In celebration of Jazz/AA radio-from Wave stations to hard core Jazz--it's special that this effort's mood and texture could fit in so well. Rescue Plural from your stack of un-

REFUGEES OF THE HEART - STEVE WINWOOD (VIRGIN)

Sometimes only smart AA programmers recognize when a major mainstream artist is reaching out to the adult audience. Such is the case with Steve Winwood, too hip an artist to wallow in a mundane pop pattern. On Refugees Of The Heart he makes a strong statement by opening the album with "You'll Keep On Searching," a song dominated not by guitar, organ or soul vocals, but by a soaring soprano saxophone. We're strong believers in seasoning AA with familiar voices searching for identity beyond music television. At first, in reviewing the record for the rock side, I found this collection a little tentative. Yet listening to it beside next albums from Stan Getz and Johnny Mathis, I've reevaluated Winwood's approach. Last time around he drilled a simple rock approach into the ground. This time he sonically graduates, utilizing some of the familiar tones and approaches AA is using. Without copping out, we defer the track selection to you, the issue being how much edge you're willing to incorporate into your air sound. Listen



NEW RELEASES BY KENTZIMMERMAN



DON'T EXPLAIN -ROBERT PALMER (EMI)

Covers even more ground than Gavin At A Glance. Don't Explain wraps up many loose ends for Robert Palmer. Even before the Rip Tide album, Palmer had a desire to juxtapose torch songs with hard rockers. In fact, if you've ever seen the live Palmer show. you know he can go from "Addicted To Love" to "Every Kinda People" in less than a chord change. Robert Palmer is like a lot of us; he understands the restrictions and constraints that come with sticking to the program, keeping to a format. But his love of diversity outweighs his horse sense. On Don't Explain you can go from riff rock ("Your Mother Should Have Told You" and "You're Amazing") to Otis ("Dreams To Remember") to Marvin ("Mercy Mercy Me") to Brazilian ("Not A Word") to Country ("You're So Desirable") to a capella African ("History") to Calypso ("Housework") to Reggae ("I'll Be Your Baby Tonight" with UB40) to Prince (the original "Mess Around") to Jazz, Swing, Standards and beyond. Don't Explain is a trip around the world in sixty-six minutes. Amazing.

"HANDS ACROSS THE OCEAN" - THE MISSION (MERCURY)

At least it looked good on paper—that is the matching up of XTC's Andy Partridge with psychebadboys Mission. After those sessions, Wayne Hussey went back into the studio with his bulk eraser, recut the tune from the bassnotes up, leaving only the rhythm track. This current single comes from the upcoming Grains Of Sand collection, a helping of odds, ends and B-sides meant to keep us satisfied while Hussey

determines the fate of the band. Stay tuned.



VISION THING -SISTERS OF MERCY (ELEKTRA)

Two bands split in half. As the Mission's thing crumbles, the Sisters Of Mercy are smokin' out of the chute, back as a band mixing robotics with dark vision. With the exception of the "More" single, Vision Thing was cut in Denmark. Bright acoustic guitars still brush busily over gruff horror vocals. The opening track beautifully sets the stage and mood ("I'm looking for . . . colors I ain't seen before"). If they ever force bands to put warning stickers on their discs because of dangerous instrumental tracks, this could be the first. Andrew Eldritch and The Sisters take no prisoners as far as big backbeat and intensity is concerned. The lyrics jump from the track as well. My favorite is, "everybody shouts on 'I Love Lucy' / Pee Wee reads the evening news/ a pre-owned song or a secondhand uzi/here come the golden oldies/here come the Hizbollah/ businessmen from South Miami/ humming AOR." Fans of darkness, your worst nightmares are realized. Trax: "Vision Thing," "Ribbons," "More" and the only brightspot, the concluding "I Was Wrong.

FIVE MAN ACOUSTICAL JAM - TESLA (GEFFEN)

David Crosby used to call it wooden music and it's one test you can put to many rock n roll bands. Pull the plug and what's left? The idea for Five Man



Acoustical Jam was born about nine blocks down the road from here at a super SF club called Slim's. When Queenie Taylor challenged Tesla to play sans amps, the idea blossomed into a mini-tour (between dates with Motley Crue) and this album. After just a few listens I'm convinced that this is the work of a mad genius. A tremendously long work (over sixty-eight minutes), Spiritual Love 90 escapes easy appreciation or, for that matter, quick airplay. Here's a mind that moves in strange directions. Interestingly enough, a religious sect recently released an anti-rock video attacking rock n roll as Satanic. At the top of the list were many of Stewart's works with the Eurythmics. After just one listen it's easy to compare the two band's mood, although sonically they are at polar extremes. Four young, serious faces to be reckoned with.

INVISIBLE MEANS -FRENCH, FRITH, KAISER, & THOMPSON (WINDHAM HILL)

The CSNY of the avant garde set. Richard Thompson moves left as guitarists John French, Fred Frith and Henry Kaisermoveright. This is the common ground, a daffy men's club of twangin' experimentation. You want strange? Check out Thompson's "March Of The Cosmetic Surgeons" with the chorus "and we nip and tuck, we liposuc all day." Something weird to whet that appetite you might have for the odd time signature.

BLOWN AWAY—THE ROLLING STONES AND THE DEATH OF THE SIXTIES

A MURDER THEORY AND THE DEMISE OF THE PEACE AND LOVE ERA

By Keith Zimmerman

hen Simon and Shuster approached journeyman biographer, novelist and playwright A. E. "Hotch" Hotchner to write a book about Rolling Stones, he became intrigued with the erosion of the sixties, and the peculiar antics and suspicious death of Stones founder Brian Iones. The result became Hotchner's latest book, **BLOWN AWAY The** Rolling Stones And The Death Of The Sixties.

Hotchner, whose past biographies include Doris Day and Sophia Loren and a best selling memoir of Ernest Hemingway, first experienced sixties British pop culture when he lived off Kings Road for a spell in 1966 and witnessed the youthful fashion explosion of the Carnaby Street hip set. Hotch reflects:

"Why England?
Stodgy, tradition ridden.
Of all places for this to
happen. But once I began
thinking about the
sixties, I realized that
music was really the fuel
of the engine. Although
the Beatles had opened
Pandora's box, they
never persisted very
long. They weren't a
performing group by
1966. I was more
intrigued with the whole

personality of the Stones. So when I began to talk to these people, I thought I would concentrate on Jagger. But, to my surprise, the figure that interested me was Brian Jones."


Hotchner conducted over 250 interviews with those who sat ringside during the Stones' rise to rock n roll dominance. He spoke with their original manager Andrew Loog Oldham, the late "sixth Stone" Ian Stewart and Jagger's former girlfriend, singer Marianne Faithfull.

"I never felt out of my element with these rock people. I was frustrated at having to deal with them. When I wrote the Doris Day book and I wanted to see Jimmy Cagney, Cagney would say 'Come at three o'clock.' He's there, answers the door, sits down, talks for two hours and you go home. But people like Marianne would say she'd be there by three o'clock and turn up at eleven o'clock that night or not at all. Then for a week you didn't know where Marianne was. Then one day she'd call. That was weirdand the constant searching for these people." But Hotch's pursuit paid off. Marianne delivers

remarkable insight.

Hotchner's decision to interview witnesses (casualties?) of the Stones' single-minded march towards three decades of rock n roll dominance meant sifting

but I don't know what he's saying. You have to keep at it because he is a good source. He invented the Stones in a lot of ways, but you get him on good days and bad days."



through conflicting information and deciding whose memory to rely on. At times the burnout element proved trying.

"Oldham sat down and started smoking hash. He's saying words, Blown Away is written in a digestible and fluid testimony/interview style, with transitional flows of narration from Hotchner. As expected, none of the Stones chose to cooperate.

"Not to talk to Jagger was okay. Jagger was trying to do his own million pound autobiography for British publisher George Weidenfeld. George published my book Papa Hemingway in Britainso I knew him. Jagger eventually gave the money back because he can't remember enough. They signed two writers and Mick just couldn't come through with the book.

"I went back and read all of Jagger's interviews over the years. The BBC gave me all their audio tapes and video of all the Stones' interviews. But in talking to his live-in girlfriend for four years-Marianne Faithfull, or his brother Chris, his business manager, Oldham, the banker and everybody that made his life up, I got a much more accurate picture. Jagger's not going to sit around for days like Sophia Loren or Doris Day did. I spent fourteen years with Hemingway. You'd go out with him everywhere. Jagger would give you a quick hour then he'd be gone."

Hotch's biggest coup was tracking down Anita Pallenberg, Keith Richards' ex-wife, the drop dead beautiful German model who also had a tempestuous relationship with Brian Jones. Hotchner met up with her in England.

"We had dinner in London in 1987. Anita showed up with a handsome young guy about half her age—her boyfriend at the moment. I'd seen pictures of her in which she looked very bad and bloated. But she







Without a doubt The Mission's most accessible single to date, this should further the inroads at Commercial radio Carved In Sand made earlier this year. A genuine pop song and bonafide hit, "Hands..." finds Hussey at romantic odds with himself. Since the band's been on the road for the better part of a year, it's easy to imagine the scenario. And sure, my heart skips a little when he sings "Every time I think of you it's like the last beat of my heart." Sigh. LR

IGGY POP -BUTT TOWN EP (VIRGIN)

The best thing about second or third singles taken from the same album are the extra tracks that usually keep the single company on the disc. Case in point is this new Butt Town EP, featuring the title track plus nine other songs—in their demo form! This affords listeners an intimate, inside "look" at the artist and the musical process. It's also a chance for Iggy to show off his "quiet" side,

while you get a chance to pick up the words! I like "The Wind," Starry Night" and "Brick By Brick." LR



DANIELLE DAX - BLAST THE HUMAN FLOWER (SIRE/WARNER BROS.)

Can't say that I've been a rabid Danielle Dax fan in the past, but I find myself liking her new release, Blast The Human Flower, a great deal. Here are my thoughts: Danielle Dax is a terrific actress, and her songs are the mini-dramas in which she works. When she needs to be strong and assertive, she can; when she needs to be wistful or naive, she is—she can howl like a banshee if need be. Her dramas are engrossing and backdropped by driving, rhythmic settings. Directed by Stephen Street. Starring Danielle Dax. Coming soon to a radio station near you. LR

KILLING JOKE EXTREMITIES, DIRT AND VARIOUS REPRESSED EMOTIONS (NOISE INTERNATIONAL)

Killing Joke returns not with a whimper, but with a bang. This record is loud, rough and raw—a total return to the less commercial Killing Joke that was seemingly gone for good. Hardcore fans will rejoice in the plentiful offerings here—"Money Is Not Our "Slipstream" God." "Kaliyuga/Struggle"—stand out as noteworthy tracks. Anger abounds, there's a heavy dose of emotional input. Though eleven years have passed since the birth of Killing Joke, the band that once heralded the onslaught of the "eighties" is far from finished. Onward through the nineties! BRETT D. ATWOOD

THINK TREE -EIGHT THIRTEEN (SINEAPPLE RECORDS)

To say that Think Tree is a strange creation is an understatement. The sound and style are a bit difficult to pinpoint—the formula being that there is no formula. A mishmash of styles are blended, processed and reassambled into a sonic assortment of aesthetic and artistic life statements. The harmonies are free-flowing and without restraint. looked pretty good. She was completely dried out—no drugs or drink. She was going to a school of design.

"It wasn't clear how she was making her living. She went to school every day and was working hard. She was a little mixed up about things. But there were areas she was totally lucid about. I told her, 'You'd been accused of being a black witch. You're the one who started all the black magic. Ossie Clark (a costume designer for the Stones) really thinks you have some witchery in you.' She just laughed and said, 'I'm not a witch. A couple of things happened that made people think that.' She told me the incident about a spell and Brian Iones writhing around in pain. She thought it was

a coincidence.

"She has a kind of a dark side to her. Every once and a while her eyes would go off. I got a little uneasy about her. Maybe you read it into her because you know this stuff. But I don't pass any judgement on her in the book. I try not to pass any judgement on anybody, but by the time you spend five years talking to all these people, you have some feelings. From all the evidence, Mick doesn't come off very well as a caring human being."

"Certainly with Brian, the excesses were just beyond his being able to handle. The only thing I wonder about is: Here's a guy that's as close as any brother. You see him getting into a lot of trouble. Brian's drinking too much, doing acid. At that point, doesn't

anybody step in and straighten him out? 'Why don't you hang around with me and I'll be your big brother.' Nobody gives a shit for him. They just let him go right into the hopper. I guess that's the nature of the time, but I just find that a little tough to take."

In all fairness, how do you handle a person who is simultaneously egotistical, insecure and paranoid without sacrificing the goals of the whole group?

"I don't know what you do. But you try to do something. They didn't do anything. They just tossed him on the slag heap. I think it was probably quite hopeless. But at least you make an attempt. They didn't make an attempt to help Oldham either. (Former manager) Allen Klein came along. 'You're

gone, man. That's it.' It seems so hard."

In an investigative book like Blown Away, juicy tidbits are bound to surface. Take for example the existence of an Xrated film Hotchner saw that was essentially outtakes of the Nicholas Roeg film, Performance. Evidently the film depicts the film's stars, Jagger and Pallenberg, having sex. According to the author, the clips even won a prize at an Amsterdam erotic film festival. Hotchner also documents the finale of Jagger's stormy relationship with Marianne Faithful.

"Marianne was insensible with drugs. But what I find amusing—there she is, self-destructive as you can get. She runs off with this romantic Italian. But Mick follows her and

drags her back. She again tries to go off and he again drags her back. He writes 'Wild Horses' and it breaks her heart. Again she makes an attempt. She goes to her mother while he's on tour. As soon as Mick gets back, she knows he's going to come. And she does the ultimate woman thing. She eats herself fat! When Mick looks at her and she's fat, that's truly the end. Not that she's a heroin addict. Not that she's out of her skull with booze or out with a wild Italian. He can accept all that. But fat!"

ROZLYNE CLARKE - Eddy Steady Go (Atlantic)

From Aussie Rock to Aussie Dance. Anyone who has a weak spot for Pop/Dance hooks will have no trouble getting into this offering by a young newcomer from Down Under. KISS 108-Boston began playing it in mid-July when MD Jerry McKenna first heard it during the New Music Seminar. ATOOZI - Calling Out Your Name (EMI)

ALBUMS by Ron Fell

<u>VAN MORRISON</u> - Enlightenment (Mercury/PolyGram)

Mr. Morrison remains so unique that his work is more often compared to other works of his than to other artists. Yet he would be the first to admit that his sound is influenced by Soul and Blues legends. He has had his own profound influence on multiple generations of aspiring musical artists. He's never been one to compromise, and that alone has given him the admiration of peers. His best efforts over the decades have been the albums and selected songs that combine his gorgeous lyrical landscapes with chillingly passion-perfect

phrasing. The new album captures all the contemporary essence of The Man, making an album of contrasting musical concepts—from the furious meter of its first single, REAL REAL GONE to its successors, the heavenly patience of the title track, ENLIGHTENMENT, to the refuge of SO QUIET IN HERE, to the curiously nostalgic IN THE DAYS BEFORE ROCK 'N' ROLL and the twilight reflection of MEMORIES. This album has wonderful moments of reflection and might read like an epilogue to some, but I'd hope it's just a prologue to a renewed career.
