THINGS ARE SUNNY AT THE 'ZOU

Sunny Joe White, the nationally known programmer who's credited with putting KISS 108 FM (WXKS)-Boston on the map, has been promoted to Program Director at crosstown WZOU. Since April of this year, White has been Creative Services Director at the station. He replaces Steve Perun, who exited unexpectedly last week.

White spent 12 years at KISS 108, bringing it to prominence as one of the country's best Top 40/Urban Contemporary stations. During his tenure, KISS 108 was a Gavin Top 40 Station of the Year. White, who left the outlet earlier this year, still has equity interest in **Pyramid Broadcasting** and reportedly has a non-compete clause in effect.

Pyramid owner Rich Balsbaugh said White has "forfeited" his interest in the company, which the two started from scratch and built into an empire. White was quoted in the Boston Herald as saying, "If they haven't done anything yet, screw 'em. And that's what I intend to do to them."

"With Sunny Joe White as Program Director, WZOU takes a giant step forward for Boston

radio listeners," said Alan Chartrand, General Manager. "Sunny is regarded as being 'Mr. Boston' and with him at the program helm, WZOU will have an inside beat on this, the sixth largest city in the country. 'Exciting' is an understatement. Sunny as

PD is an opportunity to make huge strides to keep WZOU as the station for the nineties."

First up for White is finding a replacement Music Director for Cadillac Jack, who left the station shortly after Perun's departure.

THE POE-KAT CELEBRATES THE BIG 2-0

A record high 800 attendees helped the legendary **Bobby Poe** celebrate the 20th year of his yearly Top 40-only convention, held last weekend in Tyson's Corner, Virginia.

Among the topics hit on during the various sessions:

•Demos. Programmers agreed that if you target young, you can pull in those 12-24s and the young end of 25-34. Thirty-year-olds aren't ready for the rocking chair, and to be strong 18-34 you need fun, spontaneity and wackiness. Don't be stale, boring and predictable with ten in a row of the same sounding songs. Program Director Guy Zapoleon from Mix 96.5-Houston observed that Top 40 seems to be coming out of its Dance cycle and moving in a more mainstream direction.

Joel Salkowitz, program director at Hot 97-New York wondered aloud what mass appeal is in the age of specialization.

Jay Stevens, WPGC-Washington, D.C. PD asked for labels to make sure there are instrumental intros on tracks—the better to identify a record. He also recommended that programmers don't play just a single—dig deeper into the album for hot cuts that might be appropriate for your station.

Power 99 (WAPW)-Atlanta program director Rick Stacy emphasized the non-musical elements of Top 40, such as attitude: what statements can stations make outside of music??

During the Medium Market session "Hitman" McKay from

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

Power 99.9KHI-Ocean City, Maryland reminded programmers to play new music nownot tomorrow or next week; Clarke Ingram from Hot 99.9 (WHXT)-Allentown, Pennsylvania said Top 40 needs more format-exclusive records—records A/C can't play. Steve Chase from KOYE-Laredo, Texas addressed the myth about what songs will or won't work at night and WAPE-Jacksonville's Jeff McCartney said that "True Top 40s have to be number one 18-34."

• New product glut. There are so many labels, and Reprise Vice President Marc Ratner remarked that sheer mathematics will tell you it'll be hard to get adds. If there are forty new labels, but only 35-song lists, someone's going to be frustrated. A Hot Box session addressed the "promotion for an add syndrome"labels jockeying for adds by pitching attractive supporting promotions have gotten out of hand.

Other subjects touched on included BDS and Soundscan; the 16-week diary, which programmers say could be a plus for Top 40; and the possibility that Top 40 has evolved into a niche for-

INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin


Concerned about the state of the format, but upbeat and positive in the light of a slow economy and frontal attacks by narrowly focused competitors, Top 40 programmers and record executives searched for answers at last week's Bobby Poe Convention. A lot has changed in music and station presentation since 1971 when the Poe Kat held his first convention. One constant, however, is the weekly challenge of evaluating which new records are the best additions to a station's playlist. During the closing "Hot Box" panel at the convention, representatives of both records and radio faced off about the key issues surrounding the format. Andy Szulinski, National Director Pop Promotion at Mercury Records, echoed the feelings expressed in this column last week by agreeing that due to the number of labels and amount of product released, more time is now required to develop projects. Andy also emphasized the need for set up time in order to properly build a success story. The lingering question of course is do genuine hit records get lost in this incredibly competitive arena? It's just about impossible to argue that no real hits ever get lost in the system because the odds are pretty good someone will discover them and word of their acceptance will spread. Scores of independent labels flourished in the '50s, '60s and '70s, when there were fewer radio outlets available. Now, the dial is much more crowded, offering a diverse array of Pop music choices and hopefully increasing the opportunity for new music getting exposed. More than once during several sessions people pointed to the success of Timmy T.'s "One More Try" as proof that a true hit does eventually rise to the top. It was heartening to hear Pam Grund, MD at WIOQ/FM Philadelphia and Dana Lundon, MD of HOT 102 (WLUM) Milwaukee make it plain they are not concerned about an artist's track record or what label they happen to be on because the bottom line is if the song sounds good and fits the sound of their station. There are countless "ears" out there each week, people who are intensely passionate about music and spend a great deal of time listening to new product. They are the leaders of the industry who help make their stations winners by providing the audience with the best possible songs available. The commitment of dedicated professionals helps insure that quality music by deserving artists won't be denied airplay.

There's a very good explanation for how BRYAN ADAMS debuted in the top twentyfive—it's easily the hottest new entry of the summer. WCIL Carbondale, IL debuts it at #7 after only one week with OM Tony Waitekus reporting it number two on the phones. Lots of comments like that—at WHSB Alpena, MI it debuts at #25 and they say, "It can't get played enough." Already racking up a 14% HIT FACTOR with top twenty activity at B104, Y100, WAPE, WNNJ, KBKB, KKCK/ FM, WWKF, KBQ, WIZM/FM, KPAT, KSRR, KVRY, SLY96, WILI/FM, KYYA and KDWB.

Z104.5 Tulsa was first to take SCORPIONS to #1 and now this former RECORD TO WATCH hits the top of the chart at CKOI/ FM Montreal, KZZT Moberly, MO and KEWB Redding, CA. HIT FACTOR increases 23% to 32% with healthy gains at KMOK 23-19, WIET 19-14, KIXR 17-13, WIXX 17-12, KKRL/FM 13-8, CK105 27-22, WIQQ 14-9, KSND 25-22, WAPE 10-7, WQGN 26-16, G105 25-21, KJLS 11-4, WSNX 24-19, etc. ADDed last week at KIIS Los Angeles, it debuts this week at #29. CORINA holds onto #1 for a second week

at HOT 97 New York with Top Ten stats crosstown at Z100 8-6 and MOJO Radio 8-7. Also Top Ten at EAGLE 106 and WIOQ/FM Philadelphia, B96 Chicago, Q96 Imperial Valley, CA, B95 Fresno, POWER 95 Dallas, Y95 Phoenix and WNVZ Norfolk. New on Z104, WZPL, POWER 99.9KHI, KGGG, KPXR, KSTN, ZFUN, KRQ, OK95, KKXL, WGOR, KFMI, etc.

One of the most talked about records at the POE had to be SEAL, who shows up in the



MOST ADDED category again this week. KQKY Kearney, NE jumps it 34-27 with MD Mark Reid noting, "lots of initial calls asking about it and generating requests from adults 18-34." Other strong gains at WZWZ 40-28, KWOD 24-16, ENERGY 99 22-15, WIXX 3329, WJLQ/FM 36-29, WCGQ 22-16, WPST 37-27, CKOI/FM 11-6 and CKOC 30-13. ADDs include: WAOA, WZPL, WFMF, KDWB, FM104, KLUC, WQGN, KMGZ "early reaction from women is strong—callout 98% positive," YES97 and WTIC/FM.

It didn't take long for BLACK CROWES to close in on the Top Ten at Z100 New York moving 19-11! Hot at B94 Pittsburgh 30-22, Q102 Cincinnati 32-27, MOJO Radio 21-19, WZPL Indianapolis 25-22, WVVY New Bern, NC 29-26 "initial phone response from young women is good," Z104.5 15-11, KBQ St. Louis 27-21, etc.

A Top Ten track at POWER 99 Atlanta, WBBQ Augusta, Y108 (#1-for three consecutive weeks!) and KS104 Denver, B95, KSTN Stockton, CA, FM102 Sacramento, KIMN Ft. Collins and KMEL San Francisco, AFTER 7 has come a long way since becoming RECORD TO WATCH one month ago. Airplay is spreading with ADDs at Q104, HOT 97, WCIL, KC101, WSGM, WYKS, WQID, WAAL/FM, KRQU, KEEP, KJBR, etc.


A whopping 59% HIT FACTOR for STEELHEART does kind of tell the story of this entry. Dave Evan, PD/MD at WILI/FM Willimantic, CT charts it 30-20 and reports number one phones "all demos. Good retail action even at outlets that sell more Dance product." Impressive numbers at Z102 5-3, WJMX 5-4, Y94 3-1, KKXL 1-1, KYYA 2-2, KGOT 3-2, KPXR 15-13, OK95 3-2, Z100 New York 14-12, WCGQ 5-4, Q104 13-10, WAPE 7-6, etc. New on KSND, KC101, KXKT, KKEZ, KWTX and HOT 95.9.

B95 Fresno tracks number one cassingle sales for D.J. JAZZY JEFF AND THE FRESH PRINCE, which helps take it 32-28. Exploding in Detroit at WHYT 16-9 and WDFX 21-12 with gains at WNVZ 21-16, HOT 97 30-21, WTIC/FM 32-18, KMEL 14-8, KKFR 23-19, B96 23-21, POWER 95 24-22, KSTN 33-24 "teen and young adult phones starting, with twelve-inch sales growing," Q105 22-10, etc.

The last time "Unforgettable" was on Top 40 radio, it was 1959 and the version was by DINAH WASHINGTON. This time around, it's NATALIE COLE, whose Father, NAT "KING" COLE first popularized this classic. Together again through the magic of technology, it's been the hottest track at A/C Radio from the moment it was released. Now check out the Top 40 activity this week—high debut at Y100 #16 and POWER 96 Miami at #20, plus ADDs at KIIS, WHYT, WCKZ, KFQX, WKXJ, WKNE/FM and KZOZ.

ARBITRON:

The Spring Survey Is Dead!

ou know that Spring Arbitron survey those of you in over 260 markets just completed? Treasure it. Why? Because if Arbitron has their way, the Spring survey—the one time a year virtually every market is measured—is an endangered species.

You may recall that several weeks ago we wrote about the proposed changes the ratings giant is considering making in the way it surveys radio listening. Now we have more concrete details. There's still time (though not too much) for the General Managers of subscriber stations to return the ballot regarding these changes, so read on—and decide how you want your GM to vote.

WINTER REPLACES SPRING

Under pressure from aspects of the Arbitron Radio Advisory Council (ARAC), Arbitron is considering moving to 16-week long surveys, rather than the current 12-week system (implemented in 1978 during my tenure with Arbitron). When we last wrote about this, and presented the pros/cons of the discussion, the suggested dates for the new survey cycle had not been released. They now have. And they are *very different* from what you've been used to.

Many of you work in markets surveyed only during the Spring survey cycle—normally a late March-late June period. However, if the change proposals are adopted only one month of the current Spring sweep would still be included in the one survey a year everyone gets. What happened?

In effect, the Spring book became the Winter book. The *new* survey dates for the *one* book *every* market received would, effective in early 1993, be January 7-April 28. If you are in a market surveyed twice annually you'd also see diaries in the field August 26-December 15, *not* very different from the current Fall sweeps. The larger Continuous Measurement markets would have an April 29-August 18 sweep sandwiched in the middle.

The most curious aspect of this suggested brave new world is that of all the surveys, usually broadcasters and advertisers agree the Spring sweep is most vital. With results out in July, and with every rated market measured, the data from that survey was used to spend most fourth quarter monies—monies that are often the base of a station's profit potential for the entire year. However, instead of "protecting" the Spring timing and adjusting the other sweeps to fit around it, now the Fall book is the one that was apparently fiddled with least. Go figure.

PROGRAMMING, MARKETING IMPLICATIONS

The results of the poll of Arbitron subscribers will be presented at the August meeting between Arbitron and ARAC. Stay tuned for those results (we sure will). If these changes are voted (a result that is looking doubtful at this stage based on what we're hearing) yours truly will offer a series of columns with suggestions on what you can do to prepare to cope with the new reality.

Let's say these proposals *are* voted in. Here are some thinking points for you to ponder:

•What do we call this survey? When you combine Winter and Spring, what do you get? Wing? Sprinter? Who knows??

•What's the weather like in your market in January, February and early March? If it's, shall we say, brisk, then that's a whole new environment for you to keep in mind as you schedule programming and promotion events-and marketing too. Maybe sponsoring snowmobiling or dog sled races would be wise. Or perhaps a trip to some warm locale, with your morning team acting as hosts, on a cruise, or other vacations would be a hit. Maybe you want to sponsor a "beach party" at a local hotel, complete with shipped-in sand, bright lights and scantily clad members of each sex. The point is that when planning for past Spring surveys you may not have had to consider such events or activities. You may have to beginning next year, as you prep for January '93.

•Don't forget Christmas. It will be an important time for the new survey. Why? Because Arbitron places diaries approximately one month prior to the person's actually keep-

ing their listening log. Thus, those who'll be keeping diaries in the early January-early February phase will be recruited by Arbitron during the height of the holiday season. As a result you might want to make sure your programming is right on—and promotions too—so that people contacted in December will think well of you and write you in when they actually get their booklets a month or so later For example, this may put an end to playing lots of Christmas music on your air during the holidays. Not very representative of your everyday format, eh?

•Find a way to console your sales staff. Why? Because they may have been relying on the "Spring" book's results in July to pitch lucrative fourth quarter business. Now, with results of the Wing/Sprinter book out in late May—based on data from January, etc.—the sales team may have a harder time getting the advertisers to buy September-December ad schedules when the ratings data will be at least nine and almost 12 months old.

Why should you care about the travails of the sales slime? Because they pay your salary! And if they are going to be having a tougher time, think about what that might mean in terms of your raise or bonus, that new staffer you wanted to hire, or the bigger TV and cash giveaway budget you were going to ask for. May not be there amigo.

PLEASE VOTE

No matter how you feel on the issue of the proposed changes Arbitron is considering it's vital that you or your General Manager vote. Revolutionary changes are not discussed every day, so be sure to cast your ballot.

And hurry! If your station is an Arbitron subscriber and your vote has not yet been sent in you have 'til July 5 to get it to Arbitron. You snooze, you lose.

We'll see what the August announcement brings in terms of changes, if any, in the Arbitron system. Rest assured, if these proposals pass, we'll be here to help you make the best of them.

When listeners call the Rude Awakening morning show for their free "T" they are instructed to say the phrase that pays, "Hey, Rude Boys, just blow me!" The contest has stirred up more than a little excitement. Especially after one listener mis-dialed, and one reached a local mortuary who had him on the speaker phone when he delivered the "phrase that pays."

The men and women of WSNX-Muskegon, Michigan don't just pull off shameless, dumb, publicity grabbing stunts—they pull them off with pride. JOJO GERARD says his listeners have: given a cat a tongue bath, shaved the station logo into their heads, mud wrestled in Spam (Spam wrestled), and exchanged underwear with a member of the opposite sex in a phone booth. TANK SHERMAN from Jammin' 92 in Cleveland wrote in to say, "We haven't done any dumb stunts but I am a professional wrestler." I think that may be the '90s equivalent to, "I'm not a doctor, but I play one on TV"

KPLZ-Seattle's KENT and ALAN are no strangers to wacky stunts. They coerced the all night personality, MARK ALLEN into bungee jumping 140 feet, live on their show. I guess they figured, "He won't mind. He's been up all night. He can nap on the way down." When they're not pushing fellow staffers off tall things, Kent and Alan enjoy a good round of "Horse Puckey Bingo." They go down to the racetrack and place listener names all over the floor of a horse's stall. The first name to get ca ca-ed upon wins the big money. And for his participation the horse gets nothing but (reader fills in blank).

And the big promotion of the year at KPLZ was the Mondo Super Bowl Party. Listeners entered to win a party at their home, complete with a brand new big screen TV and 175 piece band that marched down the winner's street at halftime. You'll recall that CBS made

a half-assed attempt to top KPLZ's halftime show with war coverage and 10,000 intricately choreographed children from every state in the union united in patriotic song. Yawn.

So what have we learned? We've learned that wacky radio stunts can be, a) exciting, b) attention grabbing, c) innovative and d) often loud and/or smell. Leading us to conclude that sure, it's wonderful to use our nation's airwaves for the purposes of education and enlightenment but damn it, when you're in the right mood, there's nothing like a great belching contest.



"It was funny," he recalls. "I could never develop any intensity toward guitar. I had

"It was funny," he recalls. "I could never develop any intensity toward guitar. I had lessons. I wouldn't practice enough. The teacher would say, 'Look, you have to pay attention.' Then when I got the banjo, I went berserk. I couldn't put it down. My progress was amazingly fast. There was no stopping me."

Even in the early days Bela experimented. He would transcribe famous saxophone and guitar solos for banjo.

"Even the most complex banjo players

He Ca VVith

approach the banjo with a folk process," he said. 'They find licks that way. I have a different approach. I learn my scales, transcribe things and listen to classical music. I try to develop a 'reading music' approach to banjo. That enables me to utilize guitar ideas. I listen to Al DiMeola or Joe Pass and try to play that way on the banjo."

He continues, "I'm always inspired by musicians who mix it up—like Chick Corea who went from 'out' Jazz to very acceptable Return To Forever stuff. He had sort of a pop audience digging that band. We're children of the fusion era of John McLaughlin, Miles Davis and Frank Zappa. We grew up thinking that was cool stuff. I see what Pat

Metheny has tried to do, bringing together all these disparate elements to create his own kind of music that isn't exactly Jazz anymore."

Eventually Bela migrated south from New York and joined the elite team of Bluegrass pickers in Nashville. He put in nine years with New Grass Revival, touted by many as the top act in Bluegrass music. Eventually, though, his days as a Bluegrass picker were numbered. He appeared on Strength In Numbers, an all-star release on MCA featuring the top Nashville acoustic players. But Bela's thoughts drifted toward his lifelong dream of creating his own band

in Country music," he remembers. "Then I get a call from this TV station in Kentucky that does a show called the Lonesome Pine Series. It's syndicated all over the country on PBS. They asked me to do my own show. But they didn't want me to do it with the guys I was playing with normally-the cream of the acoustic music crop out of Nashville-guys like Mark O'Connor, Jerry Douglas, Edgar Meyer and Sam Bush.

"This was a cutting edge TV show and they wanted a unique banjo show. Great! I had a piece for string quartet and banjo that I had written. I was also working with computers

straddles the Folk/Jazz world in his own bizarre way. We had hit it off and I thought he was a phenomenal musician. He could play Jazz on the harmonica, plus piano and harmonica at the same time. He's a guy with two brains. Since we were looking for something to do together, I got him for the show."

Next it was time to find the killer rhythm section. Oddly enough, the telephone rang again. It was as if a simple twist of fate was creating the band. Bela re"fleck"s:

"I got a phone call. This guy says he's a friend of a friend of mine and he plays the bass. His name was Victor Wooten and say, 'He's pretty good. But you should hear my brother.' We'd hear another guy. Then he'd say, 'He's good. But you gotta hear my brother.'

"We were listening to records and I asked Victor: 'Does your brother play drums tight like Steve Gadd?'

" 'Yeah, he can do that.'

" 'Can your brother play loose like Danny Gottlieb?'

" 'Yeah, he can do

"Then he started telling me about this instrument his brother is playing. It's like a drum

record quite a while ago on Arista."

Roy, known as "Future Man," was flown in, plugged in and things were set. Bela taped his Lonesome Pine segment in August of 1988 to enthusiastic response. Still with New Grass Revival, Fleck decided to do a few club gigs with his new band on the side. By 1989 Bela had to decide whether or not to cut the Flecktones loose and go back to his regular gig. He stalled the inevitable by rehearsing the band for five straight

and sound, even if it meant abandoning the security of a working band and a session career.

"New Grass Revival was an incredible band," he said. "I was winning all the awards in all the magazines for Best Banjo Player. But we had been on top for so long that it was getting boring. We were an Alternative group that Alternative music did not embrace. They figured we were just a Bluegrass band. We couldn't seem to break through. Then we got trapped in Country."

One day in 1988, Bela's musical fate changed.

"I was in a financially secure band and doing better with every record

and sampling, so I decided to put together a little Jazz combo. I would feature classical music, computer music and Jazz banjo."

The Jazz portion of that show signaled the birth of Bela Fleck & The Flecktones.

A SIMPLE TWIST OF FATE

"I started thinking about who to get for the Jazz combo. I had met Howard Levy at the Winnipeg Folk Festival in 1988. Howard had toured with John Prine, Steve Goodman, Paquito d'Rivera and Tito Puente. He's played Jazz, Salsa and Latin music. He


he started playing bass over the telephone to me. Wow! He sounded like a banjo player. He was doing this Stanley Jordan, two handed stuff. He actually learned a lot of my fast banjo rolls on the electric bass. He came over to the house and we played that afternoon. I asked him if he wanted to do the TV show. So by that time I had Howard and Victor for the band."

It was crunch time. Bela now had to face the difficult task of finding a capable drummer who could fit in with his zany concept.

"Victor and I started hanging out in Nashville. We were going to shows, hearing people play around town. I'd ask him what he thought of certain drummers. He'd

on a guitar. This thing sounded visually interesting. I had the show happening with the computer music and the classical music. I could afford to take a little risk on the Jazz segment, I figured we could come up with something great with banjo, bass, and harmonica/piano-even if this guy just played rudimentary kick and snare. So I hired Roy Wooten on the basis of one phone call. It was a total risk. But he was talking about such complex music things that I knew he was good.

"Roy did some overdubs on Whitney Houston's first record. He had some association with Kenny G. Victor and Roy had a brother band. There are five Wooten brothers and they had a



days and going into the studio to cut eleven quick tunes.

SLEEP-LESS NIGHTS

"I spent my own money and ended up getting a deal with Warner Bros. with that album. It was going to be a side album while I was in New Grass Revival. But the thing was so strong, it became clear to me that my heart was in it. It was always what I wanted to do.

"I remember a lot of sleepless nights when I was torn between my loyalty for the New Grass Revival and the realization that musicians like the Flecktones only come along once in a lifetime. I made a decision to leave the New Grass Revival and start this group. I gave New Grass eight months notice."

The last show for New Grass Revival was opening for the Grateful Dead on New Year's Eve 1989. Day one of 1990 began a new era. The Flecktones cruised through a busy schedule of club gigs, appearing on TV with Johnny Carson and Arsenio Hall, touring the country with Chicago and Take 6 and landing their video into heavy rotation on VH-1. Their self-titled debut on Warner Bros. gained momentum, including a Grammy nomination for Best Jazz Performance.

Future Man has since spent time perfecting the drumitar. A cornerstone of the Flecktone sound, the drumitar is a welcome break from the annoying drum machine programs present on many pop songs.

"It's critical for people to understand that Future Man is playing. He's not sequencing," Bela points out. "The fact that the sounds are electronic is just like a great keyboard player on a synthesizer who can really play. The phenomenal thing is the way he has things layered. Keep in mind when you listen to the new record that he did it all live! There's no doubling. It's all in the instrument and he's playing it all with the dexterity of his ten fingers."

BOMBS OVER IRAQ AND THE ROCKETS' RED GLARE

"The second record is more us than the first one. A lot of people expected us to imitate the "Sinister Minister" track, since that was the most successful cut on the last record. But

one of the Flecktones' special talents is the ability to redefine and rediscover the melodic strengths of tunes we've all heard thousands of times before. This time they perform a lilting version of the Beatles' "Michelle." Also included is a reworked version of

of that tune anyway. I taught it to the guys and it started getting pretty interesting.

"We actually recorded 'The Star Spangled Banner" the day America bombed Iraq. We were in the studio watching TV in between takes when it happened. I suggested we play it to see if we could get anything out of it."

Finally there was the matter of recreating the offbeat magic of "Sinister Minister." So Bela composed a quirky, little melody that conjures up silly images of Max Fleisher cartoon characters. They played the nameless song live in its early stages.

"It has a goofy sadness to it. We kept trying to figure out a title. Finally I started to ask audiences for titles. Somebody sent up a card that said 'Call it Flight Of The Codeine Hippo.' I could imagine this hippo with a beret and sunglasses flying slowly through the sky. Then we cleaned up the title for public consumption. Cosmic Hippo became the theme for the record."

With the band working steadily, Bela has backed off a bit from Nashville session work. Aside from appearing on Bruce Hornsby's last record, Fleck devotes his spare time to writing new tunes. Through it all, Bela strives for simple goals.

"We figure if we challenge ourselves and have a great time, the excitement will come across to the audience—a lot more than how tough or easy the music is."

TOMORROW'S

BROADCASTERS

n my first seven years of programming in Monterey, California and in Los An geles—I never once considered hiring someone without prior experience. I guess that's because during that time I never got a tape from a brand new broadcaster that was even close enough to consider. It came as quite a surprise to me, upon moving to Portland, Oregon, in 1975, to find that "beginners" in the Pacific Northwest tend to be considerably better than the ones I'd encountered in California. Indeed, by the time Heft the PD chair at 50,000 watt, Class L clear channel KEX in Portland in 1979, about half the air staff of this major-market station was only in their first or second job! Since then I have tilted more and more toward hiring beginners who show all the necessary skills and talent, and developing them on the air myself. That's because, sad to say, I find they frequently seem to turn out better than the experienced people whose talent has been compromised by years of reading liner cards without much ad libbing, and segueing records-and can't change.

Before I left Southern California, I had gotten into helping develop new broadcasters through teaching in what I found to be an excellent job-oriented radio training program at Rio Hondo Junior College in Whittier; and later I thought part-time in the excellent program at Mt. Hood Community College in Gresham, near Portland, and in the thenoutstanding program at Portland Community College. When the P.C.C. program was terminated in 1981, its originator, Keith Allen, bought the studio equipment at auction from P.C.C. and set up his own trade schoolsurely one of the very best in the nation, and far better than I am personally familiar with— Broadcast Professionals in Portland. I've

taught there on and off for the past decade, and have, in this column, repeatedly urged PDs to get involved in worthwhile broadcast training programs in colleges or other schools in their area. You'll make a few bucks, and more importantly, you'll help train the broadcasters of tomorrow!

With that preamble, I want to discuss some abuses by trade schools I shall not name, but whose practices I think you should be aware of. You may already know that for decades there has been such a thing as a mail-order broadcast training available, and I have never regarded it as an effective way to learn the necessary entry-level skills. The many tapes I have heard from graduates of this sort of program tend to bear out my opinion; these schools seem to teach a "lowest common denominator, anybody-can-master-it" singsongy announcing style that can be taught by tape, and that enables the schools to graduate all enrollees who finish the course, but often seems to destroy any natural talent the student may already have had.

In the late 1980s, I had the interesting experience of being on a "school evaluation team" put together by the National Association of Trade and Technical Schools (NATTS) to look into their operation and practices of a certain "chain broadcast school" about which the accrediting organization had received many complaints, and over whose course of study a class-action lawsuit had been filed. Although the school seemed to be living up to the letter of the accrediting rules, it seemed to provide skimpy and inadequate curricula for its parttime-broadcaster teaching staff, and despite its opulent and impressive offices it seemed not to be providing many working facilities for its graduates, and graduates who had obtained a job seemed to have lost them quickly. I found the experience disturbing.

Subsequently I was made aware of another chain broadcast trade school, now in operation in a number of cities, in which the curriculum is broken down into 6 one-month selfcontained "modules," apparently for the convenience of the school in admitting new students at the first of any month. Since the school only meets two days a week, each month's "module" is only eight days of instruction, with no development of skills possible as the course progresses from month to month due to the policy of admitting new students at the start of each month. The school relies heavily on "internships" with stations, counted as class time, to provide much, if not most, of the practical broadcast education; and of course, since station staffs are unwilling to train "interns" from scratch, little is learned. I understand that lately some stations have refused to take any more interns from this school.

These experiences not only lead me to worry about the quality of future broadcasters, but also cause me to be concerned that many students in such schools are spending large amounts-often going into debt-in order to buy education that is pretty useless. I wonder if some sort of council of broadcasters might be formed to independently approve the practical value of broadcast schools and courses? I should add that my criticism is not limited to trade schools; I'm aware of major universities whose broadcast-major graduates students may have learned how to teach broadcasting, but who never seem to find their way into it. Four universities on the West Coast who do seem to do a good job of training future radio people are UCLA, the University of San Francisco, San Francisco State University and Washington State University; and from my own experience I'd recommend Mt. Hood Community College and Rio Hondo Junior College. I'm aware of excellent high school programs at Benson Polytechnic High School in Portland, Oregon and at Peninsula High School in Gig Harbor, Washington, near Tacoma.

I'd appreciate your input on this subject, and I'd be more than happy to print positive information about what you know to be worthwhile, effective radio training programs in your area!

But now, I want to close with a warning. I recently received a flyer from a radio trade school that has come up with what seems to me to be a diabolical plan to evade educating its students-and get away with it by collusion with broadcasters! Their pitch, to broadcasters, is that if a station accepts a student and assists in his or her training, the school will pay a substantial amount of money to the station. Some stations may regard that as a neat source of revenue, and disregard the ethics of the offer. For them, I point out that students can and do sue a school that fails to deliver what it promised; and stations paid to provide education for the school in this manner can get sued as well (by the student, or as a defensive action by the school itself).

Not only that, but since an accredited school is farming out education to an unaccredited institution for pay, it occurs to me a *fraud* charge could be pressed against the school—and the station, as co-conspirator. Instead of *making* you money, participating in such a scheme runs the risk, in *my* opinion, of *costing* you plenty instead, and I would suggest you hold your nose and steer well clear of it! A word to the wise.





KEEP THIS LOVE ALIVE - TOM SCOTT

Big positioning statement made here. The opening cut is a vocal duet between Brenda Russell and Bill Champlin, two singers (Champlin known as a former "Son" who joined Chicago) notorious for mixing pop with taste. Is Tom hungry for a pop hit? By track two, he's back having instrumental fun, carrying the head on his own "Miz Thang." It's a funky piece that will surely please those AA folks who like a funky edge, while leaving Jazzers scratching their heads in waiting. The title track, "Keep This Love Alive," reveals yet another mystery voice. This time it's David Pack, ex-Ambrosia leader, who writes and performs yet another viable adult vocal entry. No less than five of nine songs feature a vocal, giving creedence to the fact that Keep This Love Alive is an experiment in mixing high gloss fusion-playing with sophisticated vocal fare. And yes, that's Deedles, aka Diane Schuur, on the concluding track, "Whenever You Dream Of Me."

A MOMENT'S NOTICE - HILTON RUIZ (NOVUS/RCA)

Alongside Michel Camilo, Hilton Ruiz is the foremost mixer of Latin soul and acoustic keyboard. In fact, that was Ruiz on keys covering Camillo's "Caribe" on the CTI Rhythmstick project. Unlike Camilo, who follows his own ethnic Euro-American beat, Ruiz splits his expertise right down the middle, interpreting key jazz pieces (like the world class Coltrane composition "A Moment's Notice" off Blue Train), skillfully adding the right Salsa ingredients. A Moment's Notice is an example of how skillfully Hilton Ruiz uses Spanish rhythms to show how Jazz, the American classical music, can be closely akin to Latin rhythms. Whether it's Coltrane ("A Moment's Notice" or Giant Step's "Naima") or Kenny Dorham ("Una Mas"), Ruiz shows us that hot Spanish counterpoint melody and percussion indeed mixes well with the fondest of Jazz tradition. Daniel Ponce joins in for more hot fun on "Mambo Inn." That's flautist Dave Valentin trading licks on "Look Again."

WIND AND SEA - DON RANDI AND QUEST (HEADFIRST/K-TEL)

Don Randi, as a session man or fancy pianist, enters his fourth decade as a staple on the Los Angeles scene. Wind And Sea is more proof that, with his sextet, Don has continued to update and modernize his sound. Wind And Sea delivers a mass-appeal sound with gentle rock overtones. To get to the strength of this disc, Jazz/AA should stay with the water themes: "River Of Dreams," the classically sentimental "Wind And Sea" and the best track of the set, "River Of Dreams." On "River," Randi moves predominantly over to synths and lets

Quest navigate the musical currents with a strong percussive base, smooth LA-style sax croons and Strat-styled electric guitar rhythms.

¡DESPIERTA! - BONGO LOGIC (RHYTHM SAFARI)

When the summer sun comes beating down many Jazz/AA radio folks start wonderin' what kind of Latin sounds they can plug in to complement the sunny skies and beach mentality. Tracks like Bongo Logic's "Feel This Beat" is oiled with frenzied Salsa percussion and catchy Spanish vocals. "Modern Art" and "Concon Con Conga" feature some scintillating flute playing packed alongside unison dueling violin lines to keep a modern edge on the arrangements. "Maraquero" is a sparkling traditional merenque vocal piece that shouldn't be overlooked.;Despierta! has tangy helpings of graceful yet modern synth programming, a stalwart and masculine percussion base plus some tasty cameos throughout. The more you listen, the more logical it is that Bongo Logic is pretty groovin' stuff.

ROAD OF THE HEART - ANN REED (WINDSOR)

We love surprises. After gathering a few key station reports and gazing at Ann Reed's pensive cover portrait, what pops out of the speakers but an easy-rolling brand of acoustic blues and folk. Emphasize acoustic. Reed's back-up band knows how to lay in the weeds, highlighting her lowish voice which is slightly reminiscent of another Ann-Canadian Anne Murray at her best. Her approach isn't unlike another Canadian, Gordon Lightfoot. So far Reed's Minneapolis music seems to be well traveled, not ironic, since hers is a kind of road music "to go" anyway. After the bluesy and bouncey "Told You So," there's a lot more to discover depending on your particular mood. One of my favorite parts of the disc is "Ann loves letters: PO Box 13251, Dinkytown Station, Minneapolis, MN, 55414." Dinkytown Station?

LANDMARKS - JOE LOVANO (SOMETHING ELSE/BLUE NOTE)

Joe Lovano is one of my desert isle tenor players. He's added spice and edge to many a bandleader's disc, and it's high goddamn time he's had a vehicle of his own to slice and dice. Being just about the same age (by a matter of months), I know that Joe came from a golden era of Jazz, when young record-buying rock listeners and Jazz players came into contact with progressive players like Rahsaan Roland Kirk and Gary Burton—the kind of players that mixed Jazz with the progressive spirit of rock. Eventually Joe learned the hard way, mincing notes with Woody Herman and Jack McDuff, becoming the young lion of his day and making it to Carnegie Hall playing "Au-

tumn Leaves" next to the late, great Stan Getz. On Landmarks, Lovano plays with a few old friends of his and ours—guitarist John Abercrombie, Kenny Werner, bassist Mark Stewart and drummer Bill Stewart. Co-produced by John Scofield (who plays nary a note), Landmarks is summed up well on track seven, "I Love Music." As a balladeer, Lovano indeed loves music. As an egg scrambler, he cooks on trax like ""The Owl And The Fox" and "Primal Dance."

HALFWAYHOME-PRESTON REED (CAPITOL NASHVILLE MASTERS SERIES)

Halfway Home is an introspective collection of Nashvillian sound bites roughly based on the feeling you get when you're traveling and you're finally halfway home. On his third album, Preston Reed paints a series of tone poems that blend well into the Adult Alternative landscape. The sax work of David Eiland helps shove Halfway Home halfway into the city limits. Songs like "You Are Always With Me" typify that groove—one that is virtually drumless and serene. "Baroque" is a quiet, classically-trained entry. My favorite is the perpetual motioned "Pattern Picker."

<u>PLAY THE RIGHT THING - LOU</u> DONALDSON (MILESTONE/FANTASY)

Spike Lee says Do The Right Thing. Lou Donaldson says Play The Right Thing. Big difference between saying and doing. Even though there's a wealth of Blue Note Lou preceeding his work in the late sixties, early seventies, I'll always associate Lou Donaldson's brand of—can you call this strictly Jazz?—with the music coming out of New Orleans right about the time Allen Toussaint cut the now out-of-print classic, From A Whisper To A Scream most prominently issued on the Scepter vinyl label. Lee Dorsey cut the original "Yes We Can" (later resurrected by the Pointers and Lou released Everything I Do's Gonna Be Funky, if I remember things right. Cut to the present. All of the intensity of hard Jazz today has brought Sweet Lou from the sidelines back into the studio. Play The Right Thing is a classic snapshot of Lou, past, present and probably future, too. His music is still a discreet mixture of blues, Jazz and Soul, with a capital S. PTRT was produced by Bob Porter, New York's crown prince historian of Soul music. Just for this occassion, Lou's whipped up a skin tight and wicked band. You gotta love drummer Bernard Purdie on skins as well as the ever-present organ work of Dr. Lonnie Smith. Just in case you may think this is simply twelve-bar stuff, note that Lou brings us an updated digital-is remake of Charlie Parker's "Marmaduke." New to Lou's sound is a guitarist, Peter Bernstein.



INTO THE GREAT WIDE **OPEN - TOM PETTY &** THE HEARTBREAKERS (MCA)

Call the infield fly rule on this one, otherwise it's an easy catch. There's no earthly reason why this new album can't follow in the sonic footsteps of it's number one predesessor, Full Moon Fever. Lots of whimsy and humorous characters to get to know. Two gunslingers are sick of fighting out out on the streets. A boy meets a girl "with a tattoo, too." Mystery doors are opened and closed. Guitars and harmonies are mixed jauntily with superior melodies. Into The Great Wide Open is kinda sorta the story of one guy's view of rock n roll, how he got in and why he stays in. Is the boy in the basement on "Makin' Some Noise" T.P. himself? Howzabout Eddie buried inside the title track? Most of ITGWO is about humble beginnings and dealing with it all once the fans hit the shit. What's even better, there's no snivelling or political correctness. At the risk of looking like a complete track listing, here are some starting points, "Learning To Fly," "Kings Highway," "The Dark Of the Sun," "You And I Will Meet Again" and "Makin' Some Noise" and more!



HOUSE OF HOPE -TONI CHILDS (A&M)

cover. It's statement time, as coincidentally the movie prominently features the title track. Beyond women power, though, this is righteously atomic stuff. In fact, if House Of Hope were recorded by Peter Gabriel or U2...well, let's just say it's that good. Toni and coproducer David Ricketts (of David + David) create jumbo landscapes that rip and tear holes in any canvas that dare to try to contain them. "I've Got To Go" is the dramatic intro, six minutes of domestic unrest blazing a trail thru a sonic ozone layer. Unfortunately Toni's "Thelma" is defeated and confused. "Next To You" and "House Of Hope" kept my jaw in suspended disbelief as the magnificent mixes reveal a state-ofthe-art understanding broadstroke, sweeping audio drama. I'm saving room on my best-of list for this one. It's one of those total artistic statements that toe the line between grand and grandiose. Besides the aforementioned trax." I Want To Walk With You," "Heaven's Gate" and "Daddy's Song" are splendid as

"RUSH" -**BIG AUDIO DYNAMITE II** (COLUMBIA)

Mick mixes it up with a new Mick Jones BAD frontline. While it's back to a Clash-like four piece, Jones is still misbehaving with his tape loops, records and sampling machine. "Rush" careens instantaneously from measure to measure from funk to rock to samba, not above swiping sequenced licks from "Baba O'Reilly" by the Who. Give the longer album version a crank, otherwise you're cheating yourself out of eighty percent of the fun.


"END OF THE LINE" -**ALLMAN BROTHERS BAND** (EPIC)

Magazine's Thelma & Louise Allman, who I 'spect is gonna sound better the older he gets. That smokey voice (last heard on an amazing song from Ridley Scott's Black Rain movie) bends and cries. The band gets their licks and kicks in too as this song puts chills on the back of all nostalgics. This is a song about dead ends. Somedays you just get down and wanna quit. This one's so sad, it'll push you way past the brink.



"C'MON" -**SCREAMING JETS** (rooArt/MERCURY)

Yes! As the Allmans put you down with the blues, this one brings you right back up with that wicked backbeat. As the Screaming lets themselves proclaim on the inside comic cover..."But this was no sky picnic!!!" This is solid Aussie rock n roll played in tight formation, music straight from the cockpit. Fresh from a tour Downunder where they were kicked off for leading nasty chants about the headliner.



"LIVING WITH THE LAW" -CHRIS WHITLEY (COLUMBIA)

I guess it's all in how it's packaged and produced. Take some of Chris Whitley's folk-oriented solo music, spice it up with a lot of New Orleans mysticism from the Daniel Lanois/Malcolm Burn camp and you've something a little different. "Living With The Law" relies heavily on the treatments that Lanois and Burn brought to the party—a deviation that makes this music suitable for Alternative ears as well as songwriter-oriented adult programmers.

KEYS OF THE KINGDOM - THE MOODY BLUES (THRESHOLD/ POLYDOR)

I'm always surprised that Album Radio still goes for the Moodies. Then I hear the timelessness of Justin Hayward's voice and begin to understand. As always, the Moody Blues have the ingredients that round out a radio sound, which accounts for their most recent chart successes. Translate that into adult females. I go for it through the early part of the disc, including "Say It With Love" and the untarnished Alan Tarney production, "Bless the Wings (That Bring You Back)."

HELLACIOUS ACRES -DANGEROUS TOYS (COLUMBIA)

Dangerous Toys have a harsh sound that's earmarked for the active buying public that consumes bands like Cinderella and Skid Row in droves. I hear a lot of influences besides the usual **Zep** overtones. Dangerous Toys take the rigid backbeat of AC/ DC and the anarchy of the Stooges (circa Raw Power) and really let things rip. Hellacious Acres was produced by Rov Thomas Baker who has been known to pin a few VU meters in his day. Hard rock as popular as this seldom gets this out of hand. On top of a ragged opener like "Gunfighter," there's a nice interpretation of Bad Company's "Feel Like Makin' Love" no doubt left over from the Toys' barroom daze.

While he was enjoying a beautiful, sunny day in Los Angeles a couple of weeks ago, a very UP **Steve Whiteman** called me to



talk about Kix—the band not the cereal. Their new one, Hot Wire, headin' your way on EastWest America Records really kicks. A favorite of mine for years, the band has really matured, yet kept their playfulness on this, their fifth album. Whiteman, Kix's vocalist, was excited about the touring experience they've had with Great White, Tesla, Cinderella, Whitesnake and Ratt, and he's looking forward to more gigs. The first single and video will be "Girl Money," however, "Hot Wire" will be sent out as teaser. Veteran producer Tom Werman worked with the band in 1988 and is back with Taylor Rhodes, a longtime Kix co-writer catching the best of this band. Whiteman has an amazing vocal range, plays one helluva harmonica and really helped put this band on the map with their last album, Blow My Fuse, which has probably passed platinum by now. "We've been playing clubs for twelve years. This time we're going to showcase the premiere clubs—probably starting in Baltimore. We'll then head for Europe by July, a new territory we've just decided to tap into, then Canada we've never played there. We'll go back to Japan too." Kix was offered the AC/DC tour but had to turn down "our dream tour" to finish up the album. Expect a tour of the U.S. in August. Words from Whitman in closing: "We're really proud of this album and it's definitely an extension of Blow My Fuse and it's really a high energy record. It's gonna get my motor moving when I get out on the road and start playing it. We're ready!"

Immediate Records is back with their great motto: "Happy To Be A Part Of The Industry Of Human Happiness." A lot of things have changed since the legendary 1960s English Pop label recorded the best music England could offer. Sony Music Special Products' new Immediate Records reissue series in-

cludes music from Fleetwood Mac, Rod Stewart, Small Faces, The Nice and Humble Pie. The great blues scene of that era is not overlooked with such greats as Eric Clapton, Jimmy Page, John Mayall and Jeff Beck. There will also be rare early recordings by members of Led Zeppelin, the Velvet Underground, Emerson, Lake & Palmer, Badfinger and 10cc. Did you know that Fleetwood Mac recorded à parody of rockabilly for Immediate under the name Earl Vince & The Valients? The label has obtained the rights to the "lost" Faithless al-



bum from Marianne Faithfull and will release it in this series. "Stroll On" is a definite hit from the Yardbirds, featuring Page and Beck on guitar. For more info call producers Doug Wygal at (212) 445-8532 and/or Barry Feldman at (212) 445-7847...

Bits & Pieces: Toad The Wet Sprocket is set to release their third album, fear, in July. It will be their first full-fledged studio recording for Columbia Records, with Gavin MacKillop of P.I.L., Simple Minds, Shriekback fame, producing...Those Damn Yankees are at it again. Now they're going to lower ticket prices for the final leg of their tour with Bad Company and Tattoo Rodeo...Night Ranger is coming back with original member and guitarist Brad Gillis, drummer Kelly Keagy and new member, bassist Gary Moon from The Pack. They're calling themselves a power trio. Plans are to begin recording then look for a label...One tour not to miss is the one featuring the U.K.based Metal Blade Records band Ignorance who's paired up with Warner Bros.' Fear Of God. Both fall into the hard rock category, but stand out as something way different...The popular English Alternative pop band The

Stone Roses has signed with Geffen Records. Expect the next album by the end of 1991...Robbie Nevil will release his new EMI Day 1 in July. It's an eclectic collection of pop masterworks that's heavy on the guitar, funk and dance grooves. "Temptation," features

the vocals of original Sly and the Family Stone members Rose Stone and Larry Graham. It's HOT!...Jody Watley wants to get into acting. She's working on some film ideas and at the same time finishing up her new album. Watley turned down an early offer to play the female lead in the current movie, "Rage In Harlem." Robin Givens got the part because, "There was a scene in there that was too steamy for my liking," said Watley. Jody also confides that she would've been happy to dramatize the life story of Josephine Baker...

Look out—here comes a new supergroup. The Daily Insider has just printed that Joe Walsh, Jeff Baxter, John Entwhistle and Keith Emerson are about to sign up Mickey Thomas to be their lead singer. We'll keep you posted...Can't wait to hear the new Epic album from the Allman Brothers Band, Shades Of Two Worlds. The July 2 release will feature seven new ABB originals plus an acoustic rendition of the Robert Johnson blues classic "Come On In My Kitchen." 



G.W. McLENNAN "EASY COME EASY GO" (B.BANQUET/RCA)

As one of the main songwriters for the severely underrated Go-Betweens, Grant McLennan, was responsible for penning the band's catchiest songs. Titles like "Right Here" and "Streets Of Your Town" should jog your memory a bit. "Easy Come Easy Go" is a gentle-but-firm Pop song, awash with guitars and spun sugar. That, coupled with the fact that McLennan is a colorful and detailed lyricist who makes his songs come alive as you hear them, makes an unbeatable combination. If there's any justice in this world, McLennan will fare better in the '90s than The Go-Betweens did in the '80s. LR

INTO PARADISE -BURNS MY SKIN EP (ENSIGN/CHRYSALIS)

Awesome opening bass line. "Burns My Skin" is a searing (no pun intended) foray into the psyche of a killer, sung in the first

person for a chilling effect. David Long's growling, snapping vocals are filled with enough frustration and angst to make the story believable and complete. And while "On And On" might be a bit easier to digest on the first listen, "Shot By Both Sides" goes down as my favorite track. Into Paradise seem to have a soft spot for the dark side of human nature—the result of many years of painful neglect and frustration. GOLDEN THROATS 2 -MORE CELEBRITY ROCK ODDITIES (RHINO)

Following in the footsteps of Golden Throats 1 (what took so long for volume two?!), this compilation finds celebrities singing your favorite songs from the late '60s and early '70s—like "John Shaft" (the theme from the movie Shaft), "Hev Jude" and "Sunshine Superman." Some tracks (Sammy Davis Jr. donig "John Shaft," Mel Torme's version of "Sunshine Superman" and Cassius Clay's --his name then--"Stand By Me") actually sort of work, while others (Bing Crosby's version of "Hey Jude" and Phyllis Diller's version of "Satisfaction") fall short of the mark. Still others (Leonard Nimoy's "Put A Little Love In Your Heart" and Sebastian Cabot's "All I Really Want To Do) probably shouldn't ever have been made! Actually, there are plenty of those on this album. And that's o.k. because one thing compliations like these prove-some celebs are singers but most are not! LR



The vinyllongplay may be getting scarce, but independant seveninch singles continue to thrive, and there seems to have been a slew of good ones lately. New York's

Sleepyhead (on an Illinois-based label serviced by Hoboken's Bar/None) may fill the void left by the demise of Donner Party with "Play" b/w "Too Much Fun," two rattling, muddy, cute-but-not-wimpy pop songs featuring childish harmonies, kiddie subject matter, flat little drums and (on "Play") an enthusiastic tambourine. Yum! And speaking of Bar/None, they've also released the new Yo La Tengo, "Walking Away From You" backed with a cover of Beat Happening's "Cast A Shadow." The A-side should please lovers of either of the band's last two albums. "Walking" begins with a hesitant, ringing melody (a la Fakebook), but is eventually overcome by creeping, screaming feedback (a la President). On the flip, Yo La offer a beautiful, full-bodied rendition of "Cast A Shadow" that's made even lovlier by Georgia Hubley's warm-but-wavering vocal (she's always kind of reminded me of Beat Happening's Heather, anyway)

The best band from Iowa, House Of Large Sizes, shares a single with Vancouver's Treepeople on Toxic Shock. "Bankrupt In Hoven," the HOLS track, is more of the tight-knit, jerk-and-breathe, Minutemenand-Pixies-via-Seattle stuff that can be found on either of their previous albums, but this one takes a few listens to come across entirely. Also on Toxic Shock is "S&P 69" b/w "D.A. Pop" from Datura Seeds. The A-side, an interracial love story of sorts, is accompanied by snappy, two-guitar bubblegum—

busy and fun. "D.A. Pop" boasts a punchy hook that's not quite carried through with the vocal melody, but it's a near miss from the band that should play your next



party. Mudhoney joins Halo Of Flies for a new mod explosion on a battle-of-the-bands double A-side 7". The victory here might belong to Mudhoney (oops, there goes my Amphetamine Reptile service), whose

Milkshakes cover features tinny guitar and muffled drums for a more clean-cut, appealing, and, uh, mod sound than the psychedelic, distortion-clouded Halo Of Flies effort.

The new **Pooh Sticks** single (Sympathy For The Record Industry) comes complete with a blatant marketing ploy that's explained on the single's sleeve for your enlightenment. "Who Loves You," a kicky pop tune from



their forthcoming disc, doesn't grab you as quickly as the non-LPB-side, "The World Is Turning On," a full-blown, hooky gem with a sing-along chorus and sweeeet break. And fi-

nally, **Puff Tube**, on a double seven-inch, *Emergency Penut*, that's included in the new *Scat Records Quarterly*, have released an album's worth of material. Some of it is bassand-cymbal-and-growl-and-whine garbling, some of it recalls the Laughing Hyenas, but with a sixties TV-theme background and a sense of humor, and some of it doesn't sound like any of that at all. The band (?) does almost unrecognizable Bob Seger and Bar-Kays covers as well as a slew of unpredictable and utterly cool originals. The Puff Tube slogan: "New Highs In Low Fidelity." SEANA BARUTH

THINKIN' FELLERS LOCAL 282 -LOVELYVILLE (Matador, 611 Broadway Ste. 712, New York, NY 10012)

Mindustrial, palatial, and even some post nasal sounds can be heard coming out of Lovelyville, the second feature-length effort from the Bay Area's Thinkin' Fellers. Their cover of Sugarloaf's "Green Eyed Lady" is disfigured and stretched above and beyond reproach. Collarbones begin crunching on side two when "Big Hands" make an appearance. The metal clang of shopping-cart drums colliding with dill-spear guitars will leave unsuspecting shoppers aghast. "Sinking Boats" is a frenzied track that tugs everything down in its wake of hummingbird-fluttering guitars and plowing drums. The penultimate tune "2X4's" boasts background piano and lugubrious horn accompaniment, revealing

the full range the Fellers matter-of-factly draw from. The amazing thing is that their strong suit is playing live. Onstage, there's a lot of smiling, and it's no secret that they're enjoying themselves. If they grace your town treat yourself to the Bay Area's best. DAVID BERAN

THE YOUNG GODS-THE YOUNG GODS PLAY KURT WEILL (Caroline, 114 W. 26th, 11th Floor, New Yory, NY 10016)

Crafted like the soundtrack to a German Rock Opera about the Christmastime industrialization of Europe, The Young Gods Play Kurt Weill—given a physical form—would be white-faced and gaunt, walking the listener into dark, fetid corners. The Nick Caveish delivery of in-German vocals creates an ambiance that shapes the whole but particularly highlights the bands' tasteful forays into industrial sounds. But the grinding and gnashing dear to many industrialists has a friendly feel because the Young Gods choose traditionally gentle instuments—such as a calliope—and mutate them into sinister shapes. Each song's theatrical atmosphere conveys its own set of emotions and introduces the neurosis of each imaginary character. The Tom Waits-style "Alabama Song," is rife with delicate mechanical humming and crowded with the moustachioed tuba players in Lederhosen that seem to lurk somewhere in every song on this disc. Taut sitars on "Ouverture" lead the listener toward the the melting movement of ocean waves on the final piece, a beautifully sedate lament, "September Song." This is the only Englishlanguage tune as striking as its German counterparts. But in the final analysis, a tangle of superfluous words doesn't have as much to do with the Young Gods' overall intensity as does the primal quality of their sound. KIRSTEN VORIS


