

# KTAO Goes Solar

In what is a first for the radio industry, Adult Alternative station KTAO in Taos, New Mexico is installing a 50,000 Watt solar transmitter.

The start-up, scheduled for October, will increase the station's signal input by 16 times while using only one-fifth the wattage its current traditional transmitter uses. Taos' electric supplier, the Paradise Power Company, is so excited about the project that they are providing the system at cost. In keeping with the spirit of saving energy, the transmitter's housing unit is being designed by nationally-known Taos architect Mike Reynolds, who's famous for his use of recycled materials.

"Taos is the perfect place for beginning the changeover to solar for radio," said station owner **Brad Hockmeyer**. "We're an alternative community making hard decisions about the future. As a mirror of our rather unusual community, and as the only FM station in the area, KTAO has to meet the needs of our listeners...KTAO is an alternative

radio station, playing alternative music, powered by alternative energy."

When the proud KTAO staff flips on the switch in October, they'll celebrate with celebrity concerts and press conferences.

# Atlantic's Got The Beat

An association has been forged between Atlantic Records and the New York-based Big Beat Records, home of the up-and-coming group Jomanda.

"Atlantic is very pleased to be joining forces with this aggressive, street-wise label," said label Co-Chairman/Co-CEO Doug Morris. It is exciting to be entering into this new venture, and I look forward to a long and fruitful partnership."

"Our desire to bring many Big Beat artists to a larger audience dictated that we join forces with a major label at this juncture," said Craig Callman, president of the company. "...The relationship between our two companies is destined for great success."

# KMEL "SUMMER JAM" WEEKEND IS TOO HYPE

What began five years ago as a gesture of listener appreciation has swelled to a full-fledged Bay Area tradition. This year's KMEL "Summer Jam" rocked record crowds as 40,000+ fans attended a two-day, star-studded event held at the Shoreline Amphitheatre in Mountain View.

Thousands of listeners who weren't able to nab tickets to the event were able to hear the 38 acts that included a diversity ranging from rappers Paris and Too Short to Lisa Fischer and Keith Washington to headliners Digital Underground and C + C Music Fac-

tory, via live backstage broadcast. Vanessa Williams made her third appearance as guest emcee, and highlights included visits from Bell Biv DeVoe and M.C. Hammer, plus show-stealing performances from Boyz II Men, Queen Latifah, Color Me Badd, Hi-Five and Jasmine Guy.

All of the artists who participated in the two-day benefit donated their time, and net proceeds will benefit a variety of local organizations who fight drug abuse and street violence.

# ROCK/RAP THE VOTE DRIVE FAILS

The massive effort put forth by musicians such as R.E.M. and Madonna to get the Senate to pass the so-called "Motor Voter" bill was squashed when the legislative body failed to push it through.

Sponsored by Senator Wendell Ford (D-Kentucky) and Mark O. Hatfield (R-Oregon), the bill would permit those 18 or older to register to vote when they apply for or renew their driver's license, and would also allow for mail-in registration nationwide.

During the drive, thousands of postcards were collected on campuses and through record stores. As many as 50,000 cards were delivered to the Senate in the middle of May. Other bands

Hey, I just wanted to say how great it's been discussing music with you every week...The AIR Competition for Gavin programmers, has not only brought much needed attention to those GAVIN stations truly playing the hits first, but it's become an invaluable tool in my weekly listening sessions.

As we've discussed, there's been a whole lot of discussion lately about Top 40 being in trouble as a format. I've been reading and thinking about this a lot as have many Pd's. I just wanted to express to you my thoughts as to why our station is successful with Top 40 and why the format might be in trouble in other markets.

These thoughts and opinions are mine and are not intended to be anything except an observation. One reason I feel Power-102 is successful as a mainstream, Top 40 station is that we are extremely aggressive with new music. We feel that a large percentage of our audience wants to hear what's new and available in the marketplace. We also feel our audience is sharp enough to want to hear more than the "power rotators" and a couple hundred "proven" oldies. Yes, Top 40 must play the hits old and new to survive, but doesn't it make sense to stay on top of what's happening with new releases? Doesn't it make sense to air a new Harry Connick Jr. or a new Natalie Cole because you know in your gut that the elusive upper demo wants to hear that kind of music on the Top 40 station they listen to? We certainly feel this way and we've seen the results of our efforts.

We've had clerks and managers at all the retail stores in our market call our station to get label or artist information concerning a NEW release that only we are on so that a customer might buy or order it. This kind of response can't be denied in any size market!

The bottom line, I think, is that we as Top 40 programmers have a responsibility and duty to offer our audience the chance to hear what's new.

Thanks for letting me bend your ear, and I look forward to talking to you about next week's AIR Priorities.

# INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

Well rested after a week's vacation in Lake Tahoe, and secure in the knowledge that everything was left under the capable hands, eyes and ears of Annette M. Lai, who did a superb job in my absence. I returned to open a letter from Kurt Johnson, PD of New York A/C outlet WLTW. Kurt sent along a wellresearched, albeit disturbing article that appeared in the "Arts & Leisure" section of the New York Times on Sunday, July 28th. Headlined "Pop Radio Suffers A Midlife Crisis," columnist David Browne went into agonizing detail on the reasons why times are tough for contemporary music stations.

Citing the ratings of New York stations, Browne explains the loss of some of Top 40's audience is due to a "fragmented audience, the role of MTV and the aging of the baby boomers." However, he was quick to point out that, "It's not just Top 40, but Pop radio as a whole that's having a midlife crisis.

Unsure of whether to grab teenagers or baby boomers, station owners have switched formats faster than listeners can switch stations with 1,050 stations, roughly one-tenth of all commercial stations" doing the format flip last year. Browne's premice, which he backs up with demographic information, opinions of programmers and statistics from the Radio Advertising Bureau, is that "the very idea of a mass-appeal station—one that would attract a wide class and age range with something for everyone—has been lost. Given the cultural fragmentation of the country itself, maybe it was inevitable."

Closing with what he terms a "forecast", Browne admits, "There is no denying the continued appeal of Top 40 radio, nor the exhilarating feeling of hearing a favorite oldie or a compelling new single boom over the airwaves," and thinks Pop radio "still has a few tricks up its sleeve." But for now he concludes, "Lost in a morass of generation gaps and market research, Pop radio's power and signal grows a little dimmer every day." Reality? It possibly might be if we let it.

Top 40 relies on aggressive, adventurous programmers who encourage air talent to use their imagination to entertain, while searching for music that, like author Browne says is, "something other than the thump-thump of a drum machine."

The hope for the format is that there are owners and PDs who know from experience that Top 40 radio executed properly and tailored to the tastes of the market will always be







# WONDER STUFF

The funny thing about reputations is that once made, they're hard to shake. It's hard to say when The Wonder Stuff's reputation for being cantankerous started, or even if that reputation was grounded in fact—I mean, some journalists will do anything to sell a few copies. Unfortunately for me, Wonder Stuff frontman Miles Hunt—the voice on the other end of the phone—is the first to admit that if you catch him on an off day, he can be a "miserable, self-centered bastard." Gulp.

When the boys from Stourbridge, England started out, they said to their managers, "We want loads of club gigs and we want to split up after five years because we don't think anyone's any good after five years." Five years and three albums filled with pop gems later, The Wonder Stuff are still together (although with a slightly different line-up), happily laying to waste their own theory.

1988 saw the release of The Eight Legged Groove Machine, an explosive album of guitar-driven power pop songs—many of which had already been released as singles on the band's own Far Out label. Their second album, Hup, which contained radio-friendly classics like "Radio Ass Kiss," "Can't Shape Up," "Cartoon Boy-

friend" and "Don't Let Me Down Gently"—showed the band reaching out for something more. As Miles explains, the band outgrew its flirtation with the three-minute power pop formula.

"When we started out, we were all unemployed and all we could afford was a cheap electric guitar and combo amp. We would only rehearse once a week and we'd be real excited because for those three hours, we were in a band. A product of our excitement was coming up with exciting, three minute songs."

to Hup, we knew instinctively that we didn't want to make another Eight Legged Groove Machine—if we did, we'd have turned into The Ramones or something. I mean, we learned new things, travelled a bit and met new people. I think Hup shows us looking around for something, but not really knowing what it. And (the new album) Never Loved Elvis is us almost finding our way."

Never Loved Elvis also marks a new beginning for the band. When their original bass player quit the band, the remaining members had a big decision to make—would they carry on or put The Wonder Stuff to rest? For a

band that's acutely uncomfortable with the industry that pays them, deciding to stay together-must've been just as difficult as the possibility of breaking up.

Miles explains, "When we started off in 1986 we were really happy, but by 1988 we weren't anymore. 1989 was a terrible year for us. When Rob (the original bass player) quit, we could see the reasons why he didn't want to stay-we all felt like that at some point. We thought about it for a while and our friends in The Mission said, 'You need to get yourselves out of the doldrums and be a band again."

"I think that was the best advice we got at the time. Our managers and friends were telling us that as well, but when it comes from a band that has gone through similar problems—it just seemed like a good cure. So that's what we did."

"The Stuffies" also took some time off to break in new bass player Paul Clifford and fully explore their musical possibilities with multi-instrumentalist Martin "Fiddley" Bell. Consequently, 1990 was a quiet year for The Wonder Stuff.

"We were busy," asserts Miles. "We just didn't do a great deal of promoting ourselveswhich suited us just fine. We wanted to get the new nucleus of the band tight. We needed to become a good working, happy, family unit again—a feeling that hadn't been there for the past year."

Summing it up succinctly, he sighs, "We just wanted to keep ourselves to ourselves for a while and rediscover what we'd lost. We kept out of the public eye and concentrated on whaf a band should do-write songs and do some gigs."

Needless to say, when Never Loved Elvis was released in Britain, it was met with high praises, loads of press and much ballyhoo. The band, previously quite adamant about not doing stadium gigs, finally gave in and did their first about a month ago.

"Ithink we've reached our ceiling in Britain," Miles states. "We're really happy with what we've got there and don't really want to take it-further. If it goes further on the strength of our singles, then that's fine, but we kind of think our reason for getting out of bed in the

morning is because we're planning to go to different countries—America is the main one, but-also Australia and Japan where we've never been."

**Instead** of dreading the thought of starting over and reconnecting with an audience in new territory, Miles and the rest of the band look forward to it. "I like the fact that it takes a while and that we're not quite as popular in countries other than our own because it gives me something to fuckin' do for a few years! I'm in no rush-none of us are."

"We had a brilliant time our first year out," he reminisces. "We had to scrounge gigs off any indie. bands we could. We were lucky because-there wasn't the pressure

Some might argue it made them a bit too tough and far too cynical. But Never Loved Elvis is a highly personal and introspective album, with Miles' sharp tongue and clever wit at the forefront—proving that Miles can turn his acerbic tongue on himself just as easily as the music business or any other topic of choice.

Much of the album could easily be interpreted as Hunt's lamenting his past. Songs like "The Size Of A Cow," "Caught In My Shadow" and "Maybe" develop the diary-like quality of Never Loved Elvis.

On this subject, Miles was elusive. "When people try to get out of me what it's all about...l mean, I don't know. I must've known what they (the lyrics) were about when I wrote them, but I that's on bands now to perform can't remember what on earth

they're about now."

When pressed, Miles will concede just a bit. "Birmingham is a funny place to come from. There are some funny people there, and I've had some funny reactions to the fact that I'm in a successful band, England's very different from America in that American culture appreciates someone else's success. In England, there's this (working class) snobbery that exists still, pathetically enough.

"ILLD had done really well," he continues in a rush, "and we'd been all around the world. Suddenly the people who were running the indie shops and clubs that used to go, 'Alright—how ya goin', mate,' were standing back from me. That's when I moved to London and found a new set of friends."

All unspoken "end of story" hangs sharply in the air, and although Miles hates that he's got to explain himself, I appreciate his opening up.

"Besides," he defends, "I think it's up to the public or the listener to make up his or her mind and take what they want out of the music. That's what music's foryou interpret it as you want it and you do what you want with it.

"I think all the tracks are The Wonder Stuff. We wrote 'em and we like 'em. Misunderstood, understood-I don't really care, but I'm not going to clear any details up."

With a final parting shot, Miles manages to lighten the atmosphere. "What I like being in a band for is playing and writing songs. That's exactly what we're doing. I've been home for a year and a half now, and I'm ready to pack my bags for a couple of months and go and find a few new friends."



# CENSORSHIP

t's been a year since Louisiana Governor Buddy
Roemer vetoed legislation that would have made it manclatory for records sold in his state to be labeled if they contained "objectionable" lyrics. But even though Roemer turned back the legislation, and even though labels are voluntarily stickering all releases with "questionable" lyrics, Louisiana Representative Ted Haik of New Iberia (who introduced last year's bill) reintroduced the bill.

In fact, in addition to Louisiana, mandatory labeling bills have been introduced in New York, Texas and New Jersey. The issue is far from dead.

Maybe because it seems that this is an issue that doesn't affect Country radio. Country broadcasters, for the most part, have been quiet on the issue. Most Country programmers believe that this is something that only concerns heavy metal and rap. Their attitude is, "Let the guys playing Guns N' Roses and 2 Live Crew deal with it. "This year, the Country Radio Seminar had a session devoted to censorship, and only a few people attended. But, when prolabeling advocates on the panel said that yes, Country would be a target for stickering, the message started to hit home.

Merlin Littlefield, the associate director at ASCAP, is one of Nashville's leading voices against mandatory stickering. Like many in the music industry, Littlefield believes that volunteer stickering is the answer and mandatory stickering would be disastrous. Littlefield agrees that if there were laws enforcing mandatory labeling, Country would be included. "The way these bills are written, anything can be stickered that's the least bit questionable," he said. It's worth noting here that subject matter forbidden by the bills are adultery, bestiality, ethnic intimidation, incest, morbid violence, murder, nudity, rape, satanism, suicide, use of alcohol or illegal drugs, sexual conduct in a violent context and sado-masochism.

Littlefield, who was asked by the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) to get involved in the fight, agrees that these are trying times, and that parents may need help screening their children's music. "I believe that volunteer stickering will work, and is working," he said. "It's a guideline for parents to use, and anything with strong lyric content is being stickered. The problem with mandatory stickering is who is going to decide what is objectionable. What offends one person might not be offensive to the next."

According to Littlefield, broadcasters should get involved in their own markets now. "Broadcasters are very powerful and can do great things. In Pennsylvania, the broadcasters got together and got a bill stopped." He cautioned, however, that broadcasters avoid taking this issue to the

listeners, and instead go straight to politicians.

"If somebody approached me with a bill like this and I was a parent, it might sound great," he continued. "It's what's underlying that we have to be concerned about. If one of these bills passes, then anything from Gospel to Opera—can be stickered."

Michael Cover is the Director of State Relations for the RIAA. They have been part of the force committed to getting labels to comply with volunteer stickering. "We are one hundred per cent in favor of volunteer stickering as a guideline, but are encouraging the fight against any kind of mandatory stickering," he said.

Like Littlefield, Cover believes that the biggest problem would be who is doing the labeling and why. Also, there's tricky First Amendment issues. "People always say that we're very quick to use the First Amendment as a defense," Cover said. "But you really have to when dealing with people as right wing as this."

Cover believes that radio in general has been very supportive in the fight against stickering, and that Country broadcasters are starting to

arrive at the party. "They're realizing that it's affecting them too," he said. "Already there have been cases involving Country lyrics. Broadcasters must remember that if they are not targeted now they will be later."

Cover pointed to a case in Texas where the lyrics to Willie Nelson's "Ten With a Two," were classified as obscene, and if the labeling bill goes through it could not be sold to a minor. He also pointed to the banning of Garth Brooks' video for "The Thunder Rolls," by Country Music Television and TNN as a sign for Country radio to get involved. He, unlike Littlefield, suggests that you go right to the listeners, encouraging them to vote and get involved with the issues that shape their lives.

The Garth Brooks incident has gotten many radio stations to rally 'round the cause. Both TNN and CMT decided that the spousal abuse depicted in the video would be too much for their viewers. The controversial ending shows the abused wife shooting her husband. While the message is thought-provoking, the images are tame compared to some of the stuff seen regularly on MTV. Radio immediately turned it into a positive by showing the video at special events and creating fund-raising promotions to assist groups that counsel victims of domestic violence.

Sam Cerami, National Director of Promotion at Capitol Nashville, Brooks' label, did not feel any resentment toward the video channels. "Hey, it's their store and they make their own decisions," he said. "It's really been great because this is the first video actually touted by radio. And because it's only been played a bit on VH-1, the folks in radio have done some great things with the video. In many markets, they've held private showings accompanied by discussions about domestic violence. Radio has helped show abuse victims they need to discuss their situations; they can't keep sweeping their problems under the rug. Garth and his production people did a great job coming up with a true life drama, and it really took guts to see it through. A lot of artists wouldn't have taken the chance."

When the video was yanked from sister stations TNN/CMT, it was already in heavy rotation on CMT, and getting up to six plays a day. Paul Corbin, the program director for TNN,

called the move an internal decision. "We have a committee that looks at the videos, and we decided Garth's video needed something to clarify the content," he said. "Garth agreed to cut an intro stating that if you need help in this area, call this 800 number. He then changed his mind and decided not to do the disclaimer, so we changed too and decided not to run the video."

Censorship? The folks at TNN/CMT don't believe so. "We received a total of about 100 calls, all of them coming from groups working with domestic violence," said Corbin. "Just because a video is about a certain issue doesn't mean we have to play it. This video happens to concern itself with domestic violence. If one comes out about cancer, must we air that too?"

Corbin said that results from TNN's research has all been positive from both viewers and the music industry. "We pride ourselves on being available to both young and old, so we base all of our decisions with that in mind," he said.

If you'd like to get involved with the battle against mandatory stickering, contact your state legislators. Program Directors should discuss the possibilities with their General Managers and decide whether to go public with the cause or keep it between you and the politicians. Ed. Note: Since this article was written, two significant issues arose. The Louisiana Senate shot down the censorship bill, and singer Holly Dunn requested that programmers stop playing her single "Maybe I Mean Yes" when it was criticized for its content.

To the uninitiated, BeBe & CeCe pass for a young Luther and a wise Whitney. Do yourself a favor—if you've yet to hear them testify, check 'em out. They don't bite.

MICHAEL LEARNS TO ROCK - Min bla Engel (My Blue Angel) (Impact)

It only takes about thirty seconds to learn that these Danish music makers are masters at the art of creating a perfect Pop melody with a Rock edge. It didn't take long for the foursome to get the attention of their fellow countrymen, and this debut single stands to win them a warm reception in the U.S.A.

BOB SEGER AND THE SILVER BULLET BAND - The Real Love (Capitol)

Real music by a real singer/songwriter and performer! In all the years of going to concerts, seeing Seger and company at the Pine Knob in Detroit in the mid-seventies was an experience I'llalways treasure. Rockin' hard or gettin' mellow, his music never fails to touch the soul. Bob reignites that magical spark with producer Don Was.

STEELHEART - She's Gone (Lady) (MCA)

Momentum builds to an awesome crescendo on a power ballad that's highlighted by a dramatic display of vocal prowess from Mike Matijevic, who also wrote this track. Ask anyone who played their last release, "I'll Never Let You Go," and they'll testify to its hit power. Expect this one to take 'em over the top.

DAVID HALLYDAY - Tears Of The Earth (Scotti Bros.)

Environmental concerns are top of mind with most everyone on the planet these days. It requires genuine feeling to put those thoughts to music with a believability that people can get behind. They shouldn't have any problem rallying around this sincere entry.

LISA FISCHER - Save Me (Elektra)

A true artist in every sense, Lisa wasted no time in making her presence felt with the emotionally-charged ballad, "How Can I Ease The Pain." The intensity level gets turned up a few notches on this uptempo production that she co-wrote with producer Narada Michael Walden.

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

# No More Talk On KGW

Portland, Oregon News-Talker KGW/AM has become history, as its format has been changed to simulcast the music/news/community programming that's been so successful for its FM sister KINK.

Forty KGW staffers gathered in an early morning meeting and were handed pink slips that went into effect Friday, August 2. Parent company King Broadcasting will give displaced employees severance pay and promised to "assist in the transition to other job and career opportunities."

KGW, beleaguered by low ratings (2.5 compared to KINK's 12.3) and beset by poor profits, is on the block along with most of the other stations in the King chain.

Station general manager Kenn Brown said he "held his decision back as long as possible to be able to make the strongest effort to sell KINK and KGW as they were. The reality is that there is no buyer for KGW in its current format."

The stations will be managed by current KINK general manager Paul Clithero and his staff of 35. "Our combination of adult album-oriented music, award winning news and community involvement is consistent with the stature KGW has earned in this region after many, many years of broadcasting," he said.

Station broker Frank Kalil has been quoted as saying he's "down to the wire" on the sale of the stations. The TV outlet, also called KGW, was sold earlier this year to The Providence Journal Company.

# Ten Years Later, MTV Plans Expansion

MTV Networks has announced plans to expand to three separate 24-hour feeds starting in mid-1993. MTV in its current incarnation will remain as is. No information has been released regarding the new feeds' format.

Nashville Network (TNN).

"I stand by our original intent 100%," said Dunn in a letter to the media, "and believe the misunderstanding may stem from the recent focus in the press on the subject of rape and date rape, and the raised awareness of the public to this issue."

Warner Bros. supports Dunn's decision. "We always feel that our job is to support our artists and their creative endeavors," said Nashville Division president Jim Ed Brown. "This support remains true both at the time of the project's release, and, as in this more unusual circumstance, a project's destiny."



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# P.D. NOTEBOOK

# Subject: Remotes

letter from Rick O' Shea, Music Director of KGRC FM in Hannibal, Missouri: "I enjoyed your articles earlier this year regarding the FCC regulations. I am personally in favor of license applicants being required to pass a test. I was not required to do so, and I must admit my knowledge of FCC and EBS regulations has been lacking. Thanks to your articles and the pop quiz, I am attempting to rectify this situation.

"As a small-market jock who is celebrating his second anniversary in full-time radio, I have been uneasy about doing remote broadcasts. I enjoy meeting listeners and interacting with local merchants, but I wonder if you have any advice for making remotes more effective for the client, and more interesting for the listener who might not intend to show up for the 'grand opening,' or whatever. Our station schedules most remotes on Saturday, and usually between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., which is a very heavy listening period. I believe most remotes tend to annoy listeners, and any advice or information would certainly be appreciated! Perhaps this might be an interesting article!"

My response to Rick went like this:

"As I see it, the major problem with commercial remotes is that salespeople invariably sell them as 'traffic builders,' and yet that is not what they accomplish for the sponsor! The real effect of a commercial remote is to build a phenomenal awareness of a business and what it does in a very short period of time; the 'fallout' response for the sponsor often occurs over a period of years. Any store traffic generated during the remote is pure bonus. But since clients are sold on the basis of store traffic, they usually are disappointed by the listener turnout they got for their (often considerable) money. If salespeople would just sell them for what they are, clients would be much happier, and DJ's would feel far more comfortable doing them (since they usually are the ones who must bear the brunt of the client's disappointment).

"In the abstract, as a P.D., the only kind of remote I really like is the one done from, or concerning, a significant news or civic event. Such remotes can carry participating sponsors, but they are the only kinds of remote which have an obvious 'reason for being there' to the listener. But since commercial remotes are so profitable, they are unlikely to disappear—so at least, I call on salesfolk to sell them for what they actualy accomplish!"

I thank Rick for his letter and the note received in response to my letter to him: "My general manager's response to your comment about the true value of remotes was' I never thought of it that way,' and she sends her thanks also!"

In terms of remotes which appeal to me from a programming point of view, I can think of two in which I participated, which were amazingly effective.

The first one was when Barney Keep, the Morning Man of 35 years on KEX in Portland, Oregon retired about 12 years ago. G.M. Richard Kale and I decided to make it an event, and booked a theater in Portland so that he could broadcast his last show from the stage. We had many noted guests in person and on the phone, and the listeners were invited to come to the theater for the show. We thought this broadcast would be memorable, but never in my career have I seen anything like it. The activity pattern of the whole town changed; nobody went to work until the broadcast ended at 10 a.m. and the only traffic problem that morning was a gridlock of cars in the vicinity of the theater! I have always regretted the fact that I didn't order a special rating for that show, because it must have gotten at least a 75 share!

The other broadcast occurred at KWIP, Salem-Dallas, Oregon when I was both G.M. and P.D. there several years ago. An infestation of the destructive Gypsy Moth—an insect which can devistate agriculture—was detected in the Salem area. The moth had never appeared in Oregon before so the

residents of the state's capitol city did not realize the enormity of a potential infestation. When the state agriculture department announced it's plan to spray the infested areas with a relatively benign insecticide, Sevin, there was a wellorchestrated public outcry over the presumed health hazzard.

There was, in fact, no danger to people or animals and I was irritated by the lies and half-truths being spread by the probably well-meaning opponents to spraying. My first thought was to do an editorial to set the record straight, but then it struck me that a "grand gesture" might make the point more clearly. After obtaining permission from the agriculture department, I announced that the station would do the morning show from " spray headquarters" in South Salem the day of the spraying. I put out press releases, lined up guests and on the day itself did the DJ parts of the music show via Marti transmitter from the spray command site. It was good radioparticularly when I had the mike open as the spray helicopter passed overhead, spraying me!

Not only did the broadcast difuse fears and put an end to general opposition to this and subsequent sprayings (which were also successful), the station received a lot of publicity and the aircheck of the show won an award from the Oregon Association of Broadcasters. Although that sort of remote is not the kind which salespeople sell to a sponsor, there is no reason why the spots in the show might not have been sold to a variety of sponsors, and at a premium rate.

Those are some of my thoughts on radio remotes. How about your thoughts and experiences? We're all stuck with remotes; let's share ideas on how to make them more of a programming plus—and more effective for the sponsors as well. Write me c/o The Gavin Report.





anagement rolls out a new business priority and everyone groans "Oh no, not another program of the month." The priority in question might be customer service, quality, responsiveness, partnerships, cost-efficiency, self-managed teams, empowerment, communication, speed, innovation, you name it—but after some pretty speeches and balloons in the atrium, nothing significant happens and everything goes back to normal. Until, of course, the manager reads another book or goes to another seminar. Then everyone knows he or she will roar into the office like a tornado with yet the next "priority." Of course, everyone also knows that the half-life of the priority is indeed about a month-and that if they wait it out, the manager will soon lose interest and things will go back to the way they've always been.

The problem is that the way things have always been is often not the way they ought to be. For most organizations, there is indeed a need for change, and often dramatic change. Moreover, the change that's needed can in fact be summarized in terms of service, quality, responsiveness, partnerships and so on. Unfortunately, many organizations' attempts at change often degenerate into a "program of the month," a phenomenon that is much more effective in generating cynicism than tangible results.

The antidote to this problem is to approach change as a *process*, not as a program. Let's see if we can illustrate the difference between the two approaches:

#### **PROGRAM**

- 1. Tools, techniques, timetables, skills and/or activities
- 2. Beginning and an end; piecemeal
- 3. Fine tine the system
- 4. Alteration
- 5. Deal with it at your discretion
- 6. Delegate it
- 7. Relatively safe, painless
- 8. Piecemeal
- 9. Support, endorsement
- 10. Little Risk

#### **PROCESS**

- 1. Defines how we do business; underlies all business decisions
- 2. Evolutionary; never ending;
- 3. Overhaul the system
- 4. Transformation
- 5. Must devote significant quantity of time
- 6. Everyone must own it and do it
- 7. Threatening, painful
- 8. Continuous, ongoing
- 9. Commitment; living it
- 10. Risky

A process is a transformation. Think, for example, about what's necessary to turn a

company into a flexible, customer-responsive, high-quality organization. It requires not a program but a process, one that is ongoing, probably threatening to many people whose turf, power and habits are being challenged, and one that is admittedly difficult and painful to go through. In order to be successful, the process must underlie all business decisions, including planning, budgeting, marketing and personnel. It requires a strong time commitment by all hands, including management; it can't be "delegated." Neither can it simply be "supported" or "endorsed" by management; it must be lived. By virtue of challenging the traditional ways of doing things, and by virtue of threatening short-term financials until the learning curve is complete, it is risky. A process demands "business as un-usual" and a long-term commitment. In fact, one could argue that the process, like any process, will never be com-

A program, on the other hand, focuses on discrete activities, tools, skills and timetables. Regardless of what it's reputed to do in the promotional brochures, on its own it works on improving the existing system rather than overhauling it. Accordingly, it is less threatening and painful than a process is. Managers can delegate programs to others; they don't need to devote a significant amount of their time in "doing it." While they may not encourage such an outcome, programs allow "business as usual."

This is not to suggest that programs are not useful, pardon the double negative. Quite the contrary. People need to be exposed to tools and techniques. People need to be continually developed in terms of skills and abilities. Programs can reinforce a process. The problems occur when managers believe that programs are the same as process, or can replace process. In one company, for example, the President insisted that everyone go through Total Quality Management (TQM), a set of workshops, structured activities and statistical tools. Quality didn't improve. In another company, the Division General Manager, with great hooplah, rolled out the fact that the people on the factory floor would thereafter be comprised of self-managed teams. Productivity didn't improve. In another company, the Vice President personally introduced a series of negotiation and conflict-resolution workshops to his middle managers. Pernicious rivalries and backstabbing continued.

In the first case, the President failed to understand that quality requires a total company commitment and transformation. A TQM program can be part of that, but does not in and of itself create the kind of results the President was looking for. In this case, the stand-alone TQM program simply tried to improve the status quo, but the status quo (especially engineering and manufacturing activity) was fundamentally weak. It needed a drastic overhaul in terms of management and capital improvement. Besides, by virtue of being a program, TQM was perceived as its own separate entity with its own selfappointed champions; consequently, it didn't permeate the entire organization and management's decision-making. In the second case, the General Manager was enamored by a fad; he was hoping for a quick fix. He failed to understand that self-managed teams can only flower in an organization where freely-flowing information and shared power are the norm, and to get to that place, a total transformation of his organization culture would be necessary. In the third case, the Vice President wasn't aware that the source of the communication problems lay in the organization itself: The information system that kept important information from many individuals, the personnel system that promoted turf-gatherers and back-stabbers, the overly centralized staff system that hoarded power and the multi-layered hierarchy that stifled free expression of ideas. In this context, a negotiation and conflict skills workshop—which in another firm could have been very useful—was instead just a band aid solution to a deeper set of organizational problems.

Programs can and should be part of a total organizational process. For example, one firm successfully introduced a TQM program as one segment of a quality process (which had begun one year prior) where managers continually examined (and challenged) all rules, policies and decisions so as to determine the extent to which they facilitated the firm's ability to deliver top quality products and services. In contrast, imposing programs before process is in place (or in lieu of process) can facilitate some change, some improvement, but with a relatively poor return on investment. At worst, such an approach can be counterproductive since it can easily create confusion, inaction, inappropriate behavior and cynicism.

In short, there is no quick fix. There is no painless fix. Managers who look for either will eagerly subscribe to the program of the month. It doesn't work.

### **JAZZ NEW RELEASES**

#### QUICKSTEP - KENNY BARRON QUINTET (ENJA)

It seems like it's Kenny Barron's turn to pick up the gauntlet of multi-releases that John Hicks left behind after his creatively hyperactive stint. With a Maybeck recital disc also at hand, Quickstep is the full-blown five piece blowout. Some have compared Barron's style to Tommy Flanagan's, in the sense that both are such superb accompanists it sometimes overshadows their authoritative soloing prowess. On "I Wanted To Say," Barron grabs control with catchy, rhythmic improvising on the heels of Eddie Henderson's assertive muted trumpet on the head. The title track is an energized Barron vehicle all the way. Kenny's patchy chord work is performed with short staccato bursts over John Stubblefield's anxious skyward tenor sax blasts. Drummer

Victor Lewis is especially ambidextrous on this track. The temperature rises, but suddenly Barron ejects and leaves the tune suspended by its own impetus. "Here And There" is some nice walkin' bop, penned by tenor man Stubblefield.

#### **THOUGHTS - ERIC ESSIX (NOVA)**

Electric guitarist Eric Essix has a plucky style of play and is not afraid to throw in some stinging overdubs to heat things up. "First Out" is a bouncy, well intentioned number. Essix pings out a simple song against an easygoing bed of syntho rhythms. "Just Like You" is an informal, dreamy Brazilian piece featuring some breathy vocals by Take 6's Claude V. McKnight III. "Mixed Emotions" is more ready-aim-fire. Essix stretches out and boosts the energy with some jagged elec-


tric riffs and some diabolically skillful double leads. Essix alternates between some rumbling Ovation acoustic solos, but it's the electric leads that take command.

#### GREAT BIG BOY - LEO KOTTKE (PRIVATE MUSIC)

Finally! We thought it was just us. Leo Kottke has finally decided to return to the more acoustic "aw shucks" folksiness that gained him so many fans during his Takoma and Capitol heydays. Does anybody remember "Pamela Brown?" Does anyone recall the days when Leo Kottke and Ry Cooder were stylistic soulmates? If you've longed for more traditional Kottke like we have, Great Big Boy is for you. Dig in. Oh yes, for serious AA airplay possibilities, punch in the soothing opener, "Running Up The Stairs."

Aaron Neville isn't the easiest man in the world to interview because he's clearly uncomfortable talking

about himself. There's no elaboration, no small talk. His personal presence is like his stage presence: no fancy moves, but his voice holds an undercurrent of static electricity that, when lit, sends off showers not unlike a fourth of July sparkler.

He was in Buffalo when we spoke. As we go to press The Neville Brothers are in the midst of a European tour that will take them around Europe through the middle of August. After that they come home to swing through the Pacific Northwest until 31, and then it's on to Japan, Australia and New Zealand. And though you can't think of Aaron as separate from his brothers Art, Charles and Cyril, at the moment he's the one on whom the spotlight is shining brightest.

Almost seven years ago, Linda Ronstadt was working with Nelson Riddle at the 1984 New Orleans Worlds Fair. "After her gig was over, she and some of her band members came over to see me and my brothers," Aaron recalls. "Somebody told me she was in the audience, so I dedicated a song to her and then called her up on the stage to sing doowop."

**That** night, Aaron and Linda sang a medley that included the classic, "A Thousand Miles Away," and gave the international audience a preview of what would become one of the music's most romantic boygirl duos. After their show-stopping set was over, Aaron asked Linda for her autograph.

"It said, 'To Aaron, love, I'll sing with you anytime, anyplace, anywhere," he said. That slip of paper was the beginning of an association that produced the 1989 Grammy Award winning hit "Don't Know Much" and has culminated in the release of the critically acclaimed Aaron Neville solo album "Warm Your Heart," produced by Ronstadt and George Massenburg.

Only in New Orleans would a housing project be named "Calliope," and somehow it figures the Neville Brothers grew up there. While older brother Art was sitting on a park bench singing a capella doowops, accompanying himself by beating on hubcaps, Aaron was learning that his voice could open doors for him.

"When I was young, I used to sing my way into the

them-it came natural."

As Aaron perfected what has become his trademark style, Art and Charles began singing in groups with colorful names like Turquoise and The Hawkettes. When Aaron reached junior high school, he outgrew singing his way into movies and basketball games, and sang with a group of friends who called themselves The Avalons. Soon Art went into the navy, and his little brother replaced him as a Hawkette.

After marrying his wife Joel at 17 (a relationship that still endures), Aaron got into trouble, reportedly for stealing a car, and spent some time in jail and slid into drug abuse. As reluctant as he is to talk about his career, double that and you know how hard it is to get him to talk about his late teens and early twenties. But with the help of his mother and his strength of character, Aaron crawled out of the hole. "I had responsibilities and I grew up," he says honestly. "My mother turned me on to St. Jude, the saint of the impossible. I had gone to Catholic school so I turned to prayers—I had faith. I just prayed a lot."

Through all of the rough times, Aaron's voice stayed sweet and pure. In between singing in New Orleans honky-tonks, he worked as a longshoreman and a truck driver, among other things, to feed his family. But as hot as they were, separately and together, Aaron and his brothers didn't catch on. Even after the phenomenal success of the 1966 slow dance classic "Tell It Like It Is," Aaron had to return to work on the New Orleans docks because he saw minimal royalties. The Neville Brothers were known throughout Europe, but at the same time weren't bringing in much money. Bad business acquaintances led them to believe they were only known locally, but Keith Richards once told Aaron, "I've been listening to you since the sixties."

**The** brothers kept steaming up clubs and selling records to music lovers who somehow found out about them—Art and Cyril in the celebrated outfit the Meters, and Charles in New York.

In 1976 their uncle, known as "Big Chief Jolly" (the name is self-explanatory), called his nephews together to record an album for Island Records with

#### **MUDHONEY** -**EVERY GOOD BOY DESERVES FUDGE** (SUB POP)

A band that managed to gain worshipful reverence on the basis of relatively few recordings, Mudhoney mined the melodic possibilities of feedback while glamorizing bad hygiene with their infamous 1987 debut, the "Touch Me I'm Sick" 7" (Sub Pop). "Every Good Boy Deserves Fudge" is only their sec-

ond LP, but Mudhoney takes a chance and climbs out from under that image, producing a series of stylistically independent tunes united by the mumbling yowl of Mark Arm's vocals. Recalling the technology of previous decades, insistant harmonica and organ riffs worthy of the Animals are spliced with reallife samples of answering machine messages and gentle, huminoid snoring, to create an album that's as comforting and familiar as the first glimpse of your pet dog in the morning. With any luck "EGBDF" will help dispel the constraining and stagnant notion of a "Seattle Sound" and bury the term "grunge" before its rock critic definition ends in the dictionary. KIRSTEN VORIS


