



Stroud Presides Over Giant Records Nashville



Veteran producer and record company executive James Stroud has been tapped to head up Giant Records' Nashville division.

Stroud first became famous for producing Dorothy Moore's '70s classic "Misty Blue." He's also worked with hitmakers Clint Black, Charlie Daniels and Hank Williams Jr., among others. He served as a record company executive at both MCA and Capitol.

"I'm excited to be working with Irving Azoff, and to be part of Giant, one of the most exciting new labels in the business," said Stroud of his appointment. "I'm also delighted about being with Jim Ed Norman and the Warner Bros. family."

New Atlantic Division

ATCO/EastWest Consolidate

In what took the industry somewhat by surprise, the Atlantic Group has consolidated ATCO and EastWest America into one division to be called ATCO/EastWest Records.

Heading up the new division will be Chairman and CEO Sylvia Rhone, who, along with Vince Faraci, was co-President of EastWest. Faraci now is co-President of the new company along with ATCO President Harry Palmer. Rounding out the executive structure is Executive Vice President Craig Lambert, who was ATCO's Senior Vice President/National Promotion and Senior Vice President Merlin Bobb, who was Senior Vice President/A&R for EastWest.

According to Rhone, neither label has dropped any artists, nor are there any plans to. All artists will retain their separate label identifications, and product will be worked by the joint staff.

The staff is made up of both ATCO and EastWest employees; the black division remained untouched. In all, approximately 30 staffers were laid off but, according to Rhone, the company has effectively placed 80% of those

who lost their jobs. Among those laid off are EastWest promotion vice presidents Charley Lake and Kevin Sutter.

"In forging this new alliance, we are creating what is undoubtedly one of the most powerful music operations in the world," said Atlantic Group Co-Chairman/Co-CEO Doug Morris. "This move is an integral part of an overall, long-term plan to continually strengthen our presence." continued next page

We have an exceptional talent pool and an artist roster of remarkable depth and diversity. ATCO/EastWest has the promotional and marketing muscle to be uniquely responsive to the marketplace while at the same time fostering an ideal creative environment for the nurturing of both established and new talent."

Missing in the new equation is former ATCO chief Derek Shulman who said from Moscow: "Six months ago, I made the decision to concentrate my energies on artists and the development of their musical careers...Now that this new division has been formed, I am confident that it is an extremely strong operation."

Bennett Takes High-Level Post At DGC




Former MCA Records Senior Vice President, Rock Promotion and Artist Development Bill Bennett has been named Director of Promotion for DGC Records.

Plen has been with Virgin since the label's U.S. debut, joining as Vice-President, Field Promotion. He has worked with such hit artists as Paula Abdul, UB40 and Lenny Kravitz. Before joining Virgin he worked at I.R.S. as Vice-

President of Promotion.

Said Plen to the *Gavin Report*, "I'm thrilled that Virgin believes in my ability as a promotion man, and we'll continue to break the records that the industry deems unbreakable."

Station Sales Dollars Drop; Records Stable

A report released by the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) this week showed that the dollar volume of radio station sales is continuing to decline.

In the first six months of 1990, announced sales of radio properties totaled \$765 million; this year the figure was \$498 million. For the same period in 1989 the figure was \$944 million, so this is the third first-half decline in a row, and this year's dollar number is almost half what it was in 1989. The amount of radio station transactions remain basically the same.

At the same time, the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) reports that although unit shipments dipped 11.08% in the first six months of 1991, dollar sales remained stable. During that time, cassette, vinyl and music video shipments dropped, while CD shipments increased 16.49%.

"Given the economic environ-

ment, in which people are buying less of everything, the music business held its own," said **Jason Berman**, president of the RIAA. "Consumers are spending the same amount of money as they did last year on music. This fact underscores the commitment of consumers to prerecorded music as the best buy for the entertainment dollar."

Cummings' Got The Power

As has been rumored for the past few weeks, Emmis programming chief Rick Cummings will be remaining in Los Angeles as program director of Power106FM (KPWR).

"I'm pleased with Rick's decision to assume programming duties at Power106FM," said station General Manager Doyle Rose. "Rick is the perfect combination of programming, creativity and business acumen."

Said Cummings, "Power-106FM is the single biggest thing with Emmis Broadcasting that I'm involved with and has been since 1986. I'm thrilled to be part of a tremendous group of people...besides, I interviewed myself and liked what I had to say!"

ABC To Offer SoundScan

SoundScan has signed a long-term agreement with ABC Radio, giving ABC the distribution rights for SoundScan's point-of-sale data.

Starting later this month, ABC Radio will provide record sales information to its affiliated stations, and will offer it to non-affiliates via subscription fax newsletter.

SoundScan receives its data from 7,500 record retail outlets. ABC will distribute local sales information for the top fifty selling singles and albums, offering stations access to sales in their local areas.

The move was greeted with mixed emotions from a sample of *Gavin Report* Top 40 programmers.

I think sales information should be made available to us to help us make decisions. If it's going to turn into a device to make money for other people, it's not going to be useful to us, and thus will hurt the record companies in the long run."


KS104 (KQKS)-Denver's Dave Van Stone was more receptive. "I'm in favor of using it as long as I can get local input. A national SoundScan report doesn't do us a whole lot of good unless it pertains to Denver. That would be useful." Neither Van Stone or KXXR-Kansas City's Ben Jammin' would comment on whether they'd be willing to pay for the information.

SoundScan's Michael Fine and Michael Shalett see their data as a boon to programmers. "The radio industry will now be able to utilize the unexpurgated and accurate sales data in determining which record a station may add to its playlist," they said. "SoundScan will be an integral tool for radio in initiating local artist development programs, compiling tour support and depicting and tracking local sales trends."







how day began early for Marconi Award Show producer TONY QUIN and volunteer staffers like American Comedy Network's MAGGIE DUGAN and Premiere Comedy Network's yours truly. INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

Think of a radio station and its target audience, and then try to picture their typical listener. This is an exercise many stations have their air staff go through from time to time. Some PDs even place composite drawings in the control room to remind talent who they are talking to. But are the generalizations about demographic groups which we've all clung to for so long still accurate?

Much is yet to be written about the attitudes and interests of today's older adults, but consider these statistics—aging baby baby boomers represent a full third of the population (in 1988 seventy-six million people were 45 or older) and in 1989 more than 10,000 runners (42%) in the New York Marathon were over 40. The figures are part of a new book by Faith Popcorn titled, "The Popcorn Report—Faith Popcorn On The Future of Your Company, Your World, Your Life," published by Doubleday.

In it, the author explores a new trend called Down-aging, "this refusal to be bound by traditional age limitations," or put another way, "redefining DOWN what appropriate age behavior is for your age."

Popcorn considers it a "profound new phenomenon in the culture, it's the result of more than an unprecedented concern with health and longevity—and even more than a courage born of numbers" (the population stats mentioned earlier). "We see it as a truly collective psycho-sentimental response, fueled in part by a certain New Age Arrogance." Simply put, Down-aging holds that baby boomers are nostalgic for their carefree childhood and are finding comfort in the familiar pursuits and products of those formative years.

Applied to our industry, this theory, while on one hand supporting the belief that the music of our youth unleashes a flood of wonderful memories, can at the same time argue that millions of baby boomers striving to look young also want to think young. Translation: be aware of current tastes and trends

The traditional youthful slant of Top 40, offering fresh and contemporary entertainment, remains one of the format's most valuable assets. Beyond a reliance on playing the most popular current hit songs, Faith Popcorn might well be describing some of the virtues of the Top 40 format when she writes, "Opportunity is to be found in almost anything that makes you feel better, makes you laugh, makes you have fun, makes you feel like a kid. The sure thing for marketers is this: This generation will grow old with a stylish vengeance, putting in more energy against growing old, and the way growing old makes

us feel, than any generation that came before."

If one had to select a standard bearer for baby boomers the world over, CHER de-



serves to rank at the top of the list. Known for her predilection for pushing the envelope, the eye-opening photo by Herb Ritts that graces these pages confirms a youthful vitality in body and spirit. Tattoos notwithstanding, her real trademark is expressing a genuine honesty that's irresistible, refreshing and endearing.

Few releases kick in as quickly as PRINCE AND THE N.P.G., exploding in HIT FAC-TOR from 8% to 27%. 

This year has been the best of times and the worst of times for Reba McEntire. The best includes a terrific marriage to her manager Narvel Blackstock, first time motherhood with son Shelby and a fabulously successful career. Some of the year's highlights have been her second platinum album, Rumor Has It, the continued success of Narvel and Reba's talent firm Starstruck Entertainment, her film debut in the movie "Tremors" and once again winning the Female Vocalist of the Year award at this year's Academy of Country Music Awards.

The worst was March 16, when an airplane carrying her band crashed near San Diego, killing all on board. Among them were Reba's tour manager Jim Hammon, bandleader/keyboardist Kirk Cappello, vocalist Paula Kaye Evans, guitarists Michael Thomas and Terry Jackson, keyboardist Joey Cigainero, drummer Tony Saputo and fiddle player/acoustic guitarist/vocalist Chris Austin. Reba's entire organization was, of course, devastated and Reba herself wasn't sure when or if she'd work again. But, with the help and support of family, friends, and the families of the band, Reba has slowly but surely put the pieces of her professional life back together.

She impressed the entire entertainment industry when she performed at the Academy Award Show shortly after the tragedy, and as the year progressed she formed a new band and got back out on the road. She has a new album out titled For My Broken Heart, co-stars in the upcoming

career if you didn't have that support? RM: It's the only thing I can do halfway decent-singing and being in music, so I would love to think that destiny would have taken over anyway. I know that

doors have been opened for me and I know it was meant to be. So I'd have to say yes, I think I would have been in this business anyway. God just had a plan all my life, and I'm just kind of flowing with it.

LS: Didn't you want to live the rodeo life at one point?

I hear you're going to be in "The Gambler IV" with Kenny Rogers.

RM: Yes. It'll be on NBC on November third and fourth. I'll act whenever the opportunity strikes. Timing is everything, and if our schedule is okay and the project is right, I'll make it work. Getting to work in "The Gambler" was a miracle. I told Narvel one day, "I'm ready for something different. I need a project. I'm getting bored with just performing." When I'm just doing shows, I get bored and am ready to do television or a new album or something. I did some dates on the weekends too, and

then there was Fan Fair. On Monday I had to work on the movie and then on Tuesday I had to fly back in for Fan Fair. We had our Fan Club



which is a Western Day. After all my special guests came up and sang with me, I went down and signed autographs and took pictures with the fans until about 1:30 in the morning. LS: Who were your special guests? RM: Garth Brooks. Pam Tillis and Aaron Tippin. Only people in the fan club can come and it's all free. I've done for this the last two or three years. LS: Your new album is just wonderful. Did you enjoy recording it?

RM: Oh yes. We finished filming "Gambler IV" on a Thursday, I flew home on a Friday and met with my co-producer Tony Brown. We went over all the songs, and on Saturday we were

in the studio. It was in the middle of July. LS: Did you already have the songs picked out before you started this process? RM: We were sup-

posed to record this album in June, but because of the movie we postponed it until July. I'd been listening to songs since last August and really got serious in the spring. LS: How was performing at the Oscars?
RM: It was tough in every way because I had never performed in front of folks like that. I'm a big movie fan, and Sophia Loren and Gregory Peck were sitting right up front—so was Kevin

Costner! So I was in awe all night long. I was just in heaven. And then Madonna went on right before I did. I was really feeling a lot better when I saw her shaking while she was doing her number. I thought, "All right. She's nervous too. That's great." It really helped me get through my number. LS: I think we were all amazed at how well

LS: I think we were all amazed at how well you performed that night, especially since it was so soon after the accident.
RM: I really thought I wouldn't be able to do

it. Right after the tragedy I told Narvel, "Cancel it. I can't do it. I probably won't be able to work again until July, if I can ever work again." Then, the next morning I woke up and thought, "No, Jim, Paula Kay, Michael and all of them would kick my butt if I don't do this. I'm gonna go do it." Narvel called and asked they could work me in, and they said, "We never took her name off." So I guess they knew me better than I knew myself. I called all the families (of the band members who had been in the plane accident) and asked them if it was all right with them if I went on, and they were very supportive. So I had the love and the strength and the support from everybody. That's why I did

LS: What do you wish for Shelby?
RM: Total health and happiness. Good health and to be happy all of his life. Just like

his mama and daddy have been.

P.D. NOTEBOOK

NEW FROM THE F.C.C.

f there's one body of FCC regulations I usually stay away from in my column, it's the political rules. That's because not only do they keep changing, not only are they confusing and contradictory, and not only are the penalties severe for even inadvertent violations—but also because part of the rules result from acts of Congress, over which the FCC has no control.

A few months ago, the Commission did a sweep in a number of markets to inspect "political files" of various broadcast operations (mostly TV stations) to see if the various political broadcast rules had been observed. Apparently, the major emphasis was on whether candidates who appeared on their own ads were, in fact, granted the "lowest unit rate" on the station. The FCC reported uncovering a number of violations, which I gather had to do with the use of different rates in different time periods. As I understand the rules, the "lowest unit rate" relocates to the lowest rates any advertiser, on any volume discount, receives in any time period on the station-period. Reports in the trade press suggest that perhaps TV stations have been granting only the lowest rate any advertiser receives in each given time period, and if so, I can understand why violations were found. But all this is hearsay, since to date, as far as I am aware, the Commission has not been explicit about what they found and why what they found were considered violations.

Prodded by the U.S. Court of Appeals, which was considering a 1987 FCC ruling, the Com-

mission has now done something fairly explicit which will be of help to those stations wanting to stage (or broadcast) candidate debates, or something similar. Specifically, they have voted to consider the broadcast of back-to-back interviews and speeches by "major party" candidates to be "news"—and thus exempt from the "equal time" law, which otherwise would have required that all legally-qualified candidates for an office, no matter how apparently insignificant, get an equal opportunity to participate. This reverses a previous ruling, and should promote public debate by major candidates. (News programming is exempt from the equal time rule, under the First Amendment.)

As with all political broadcasting rules there is a catch, but in this case it's a fairly clear one: Broadcasters must provide equal time to additional candidates for an office if the candidates can show, through political opinion polls or other means, that they can be considered "major" candidates. Since the burden of proof in this case is on the candidate rather than the broadcasters, it will be far less easy for the broadcaster to be second-guessed (and fined) by the Commission.

By the way, simply for your information, as program director or general manager, I personally have always enforced the requirements of the "lowest unit rate" rule rather rigorously. The rule requires that the candidate appear recognizably in their own ad! I have made it a practice not to grant the "lowest unit rate" if the anonymous voice is not introduced by name. The first reaction I get to this is that "all the other stations don't

require that"; the second reaction is to have the candidate or a representative come to the station to cut an introductory line, "now here is [the candidate]" to insert ahead of the sponsor tag. (Note that you cannot so edit a "use" spot of this sort, even if told to by the candidate or his/her organization; they have to be there and personally supervise.) The exceptions to this policy of mine are (1) if the candidate's voice is recognizable by itself to the local electorateand (2), if any candidate for that office has a recognizable voice, then (since you have to treat all candidates the same way) all must be assumed to be recognizable by voice. To date, I have never gotten into any trouble over my strict interpretation of this rule.

Now, the disclaimers. I have told you that, simply for your information—I am not a lawyer or an FCC Commissioner, and I am not in a position to advocate this policy. Furthermore, I cannot assure you that you would not be the target of a complaint, even if this approach were ultimately upheld. I cannot guarantee that the FCC would uphold this interpretation of the rules. I cannot even assure you that I have a firm grasp of the current interpretations of the political rules regarding broadcasting—nor can I certify that even the FCC personnel do.

But, nonetheless, there is some satisfaction in showing a little spine in dealing with politicians who are smug in the belief that they have full control in their dealings with you, while still sticking to the rules as they (apparently) stand!

If you're tired of the music business and want to start your own related company, there's a book out that'll tell you how. All You Need To Know About The Music Business (Prentice Hall) is the brainchild of Donald Passman, a top-notch music industry lawyer who practices with the Los Angeles firm of Gang, Tyre, Ramer & Brown, Inc. One of Passman's recent coups was the record-setting contract his client, Janet Jackson, signed with Virgin Records. The book is easy to read and makes the business easy to understand. "The purpose of the book," according to Passman, is "to give you a map through the jungle and show you where the mines are." In our conversation, the subject of tour cancellations came up. Passman thinks a little bit of discomfort will be healthy for the industry, and that maybe on all levels we can get back to basics. He also had some harsh words for the one group of "experts" that probably wish his book hadn't been written. "I'm talking about the sleazeballs who take naive young people and sign them up to long-term agreements where they're guaranteed virtually nothing," Passman fumed. "And if the artist is successful, they have to pay a lot of money to get rid of the sleaze. Unfortunately, this happens more often than you might expect." Soundgarden is back after what just might be

one of the shortest recording sessions on record. The whole process with producer Terry Date took four months. Super guitarist Kim Thayil took some time out to chat about the new A&M album, Badmotorfinger. It marks Thayil's debut as a lyricist. Drummer Matt Cameron's tune "Room A Thousand Years Wide" sparked his creative juices. Thayil's foremost interest is guitar riffs, grooves and ambiences. You can hear the influence of the new bassist Hunter "Ben" Shepherd, who originally auditioned over two years ago and, in fact, played on their last tour. "Jesus Christ Pose" is only one of the wonderfully crafted songs they played at the Foundations Forum '91 when they appeared with Ozzy Osbourne. This new project will kick these Seattle boys right over the rainbow.

Bits & Pieces: Lita Ford is about to launch her new RCA album, *Dangerous Curves*. "Shot Of Poison," the first single, will be released in early October with the album arriving by mid-November. Ford no doubt picked the name in honor of her new, shapely body which comes thanks to five mile jogs and bike riding...Atlantic Records

has a new band called Shadow King, who's ready to unleash its debut self-titled album. The band line-up is former Foreigner lead singer Lou Gramm; long-time Gramm writing partner Bruce Turgon; former Whitesnake/Dio guitarist Vivian Campbell; and Los Angeles studio drummer Kevin Valentine. The Keith Olsen-produced album leads with "I Want You." Was this band the world's best kept secret or what?...

One group that should have played the Foundations Forum this year is Overkill, but they're headlining a tour. This is another Terry Dateproduced band and they've put together an "Infectious" album for Megaforce/Atlantic called Horroscove. This is their fifth album and by far the hottest, thanks to the infusion of new guitarists-Merritt Gant from Philly's Faith Or Fear and Overkill roadie Rob Cannavino. Vocalist Bobby "Blitz" Ellsworth called up recently and reported (laughingly) he was hoping they could get a "Terry Date Tour" together with Soundgarden and Pantera. Date was able to produce this band in the same four-month time frame he set for Soundgarden because they just went in prepared and ran the tape. Blitz said that they recorded live as much as they could. More than half of the vocals were done right along with the drum tracks. Children's verses are certainly in this year, with the "Now I lay me down to sleep" rhyme on Metallica and Megadeth's new albums. Check out the "Coma" and get the Overkill treatment...







miles davis in the sky

Just a couple weeks back, we killed a morning at the Warners offices in Burblank with Ricky, Chris and Randall. We talked Jazz and stuff. You know, the usual guys goofing around, having a good time. On the way out the door, Ricky Shultz interjected—almost like an afterthought—that Miles Davis was in the hospital in Santa Monica and, well, he'd heard that he'd taken a left turn into the ICU.

The next night we were safely back home and Mike Stern and Bob Berg blew into town. In between sets, we snagged Mike Stern at his dressing room door. After exchanging pleasantries, knowing the Stern/Berg band was roaring their way to LA, we mentioned Miles in the hospital. Mike smiled at the concern.

"Heck," Stern laughed, "Iused to hear concern about Miles being in the hospital all the time from the folks at CBS. I assure you. Miles is going to be around a long, long time. He's got too many years left inside."

We left the gig feeling better. A couple weeks later, with the sound down, Miles was shown playing trumpet on CNN. Odd. Then came the radio with its teaser, "Jazz loses a giant." We knew an important era had ended.

We "grew up" in music as Bitches Brew Babies. Actually, more accurately, nurtured on In A Silent Way from underground radio. Since those early years, we've met a lot of Bitches Brew Babies. Bobby McFerrin, Sex Pistol John "Johnny Rotten" Lydon, Prince saxman Eric Leeds—innocents who walked into record stores and purchased this queer double pocket LP (priced as one) because it was

wasn't quite rock and it didn't look like Jazz. Side long songs. Vicious playing. Bitches Brew to this day remains a marketing experiment which, oddly, hasn't really made the CD transition because frankly, "Spanish Key" sounds so much better on a vinyl-eating hifi.

Maybe the reason most disenfranchised rock/Jazz fans became so attracted to Miles Davis was because he was anti-nostalgia. He pissed off Jazz people. He

orchestra made up of George Gruntz' and Gil Evans' big bands. Two featured soloists include saxman Kenny Garrett and Wallace Roney (who, eerily enough, resembles a young Miles). Repertoire includes extended medleys from Miles Ahead, Porgy & Bess and Sketches Of Spain.

Additionally Miles nearly completed a funk record that includes contributions by Prince and assorted rappers. Just like Miles, coming to grips with the past through the future.

Miles Davis ranks as one of an elite who changed the sound of their particular instrument. It's hard to list them. Bluesman Robert Johnson. John Coltrane and Charlie Parker. Art Pepper. Jaco

Pastorious. Thelonious Monk. Keith Richards. And that's a scary trend because in this age of sampling, all the originators seem to be fading away. That's the mark of a master. In a second you can name the signature. Only Miles Davis had a whole slew of signatures, from tender love notes to spray paint on the wall. One blast of cold air into the pipeworks and you knew it was Miles.

 $\mathcal{A}t$ 1991's Gavin Convention, Miles biographer Quincy Troupe read a beautiful poem about the night Duke Ellington died. Here was Ellington, a man who transcended even the laws of nature. When he died, the sky shriveled up into a storm and cried. Not so with Miles. It is our contention that Miles' spirit has burst through the ozone layer straight up into space. Can you see it now? A giant ball of Jazz fire, a raspy voice breathing down Halley's Comet's neck, saying something like, "Hey m'fucker. Lead or follow." The comet moves out of the way.

flirted with rock people. He made outrageous race-conscious comments while habitually hiring musicians as if he were color blind. Pre-Public Enemy. Pre-Jazz fusion. Pre-all the damn labels

Just as Miles checked out, he was in the midst of projects that were bound to please and outrage his friends and fans. What's in the future? Expect a soundtrack from the movie Dingo, an Australian film in which Miles virtually plays "himself" to the music of Miles and Michel LeGrand and a 32 piece orchestra. Coming in late winter or early spring are the Montreux recordings of July, 1991, in which Miles recorded an hour of music with a 57 piece

7" SPOTLIGHT - VARIOUS ARTISTS, VARIOUS LABELS

On roughly the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Beatles' last concert, the Parasites have released a tribute to the fab four on seveninch vinyl. "Love Me Too," the only noncover on this disc, could pass as one, although the boppy melody, tambourine, sweet harmonies and up-front vocals are rather balanced by extra-fuzzy guitars, making for a derivative, but not blatantly borrowed, song. With "I Feel Fine," the Parasites give a straight reading of the Beatles' classic, but they render it with a tad more anxiety and feedback than the optimistic, jaunty and clean original. Also included are "Paperback Writer" and a radio spot advertising the final concert at Candlestick Park. Tix were five. six, and seven dollars! The Parasites EP is available on Shredder Records... The Bags' new single on Stanton Park features a way heavy cut, "L. Frank Baum," about The Wizard Of Oz. This almost six-minute epic boasts a from-the-bowels intro, acoustic break and a hardcore spasm. Crispin Wood and Iim Janota share vocals in the little spaces between hammer-ons, but it's Jim's deep growl I prefer; Crispin's voice has a tendency to edge toward metallicyipping. The flip, "Max Roach," is a wah-wah marathon, an instrumental in which the rhythm section challenges the guitar to a fast-paced (but overlong) race to the finish line... Metal Mike covers Sweet on a Sympathy For The Record Industry 7" disc. "Wig Wam Bam," probably one of Sweet's more frou-frou bubblegum efforts, was made to be mocked, but I'm not quite sure that's Metal Mike's intention. He gives the tune a sweet-ish male vocal treatment and tempers it with a bit of distortion. An oddity, "Letter To Lou." is the B-side of this disc, and it's premise seems to be Nikki Sixx's receiving a phone call from a label bigwig regarding Motley Crue vocalist Vince Neil's and the death of Hanoi Rocks drummer Razzle. Musically, "Letter To Lou" doesn't consist of much, just guitar and effects and backward guitar and effects, much like the Flaming Lips' "Ode To C.C. Part II"... Matador has finally released vinyl from San Francisco's Toiling Midgets, and the two tracks, "Golden Frog" and "Mr. Foster's Shoes" are among the finest I've heard this year. The Midgets, who've been around for aeons, have been joined by Mark Eitzel of American Music Club. In fact, The Toiling Midgets include former AMC bass player Lisa Davis, current AMC drummer Tim Mooney, and were produced by ex-AMC producer, bass player and drummer Tom Mallon. "Golden Frog" is textural, distorted, rhythmic and hypnotic, but more muscular



and physical than the music of Eitzel's primary committment. "Mr. Foster's Shoes" rather resembles a ballet score with its minimal, strings-only instrumentation...Also of note right now: new singles from the Mono Men and Pavement, and the not-so-new 7" from Velvet Crush (sweet!), but more on that next time. 
DON'T MEAN MAYBE-REAL GOOD LIFE (Doctor Dream Records, 841 Collins, Orange, CA 92667)

For those who find the classically-based punk guitar artistry of the Meat Puppets too challenging, Don't Mean Maybe offer an introductory version of that pioneering melodic hardcore band. On their second album, Real Good Life, they administer the guitar virtuosity of singer/song writer Mark Andrea in small doses as the bass ambles up and down the scale to boppy, distantly country interludes a la Scruffy The Cat. The entertainingly-cliched Zepplinesque cover, "Hot Smoke And Sassafras," and asthmatic harmonizing on the rapid, nonsensical "Lung Butter" mark Don't Mean Maybe as a band proud of their humor. But Don't Mean Maybe turn the joke inward and acknowledge their own derivative tendencies on the instrumental "Paul Simon, Artist Or Thief." The band employs a loose bass and relentlessly sunny South African dance melodies like those pilfered and popularized by Simon on Graceland, but they cut the sweetness with a heavy and reflective sound that constitutes the best of what Real Good Life has to offer. These slow-strumming tunes bring the subtle lyrics to the forefront, as in "Bliss": "I went out walking down seventeenth street/ and saw this big old tree still standing/and I hope it stays that way." While Real Good Life stresses the band's decidedly upbeat mixture of prancing and staccato guitars, Don't Mean Maybe temper the record artfully with the more pensive numbers, rising above their Paul Simon tendencies. HOLE-PRETTY ON THE INSIDE (Caroline Records, 114 West 26th St., New York, N.Y. 10001)

Sonic Youth's Kim Gordon had a hand in the production of *Pretty On The Inside*, and judging by lyrical content many have had a hand in the Hole. All of the d's are well represented

here—disgrace, depravity and debasement. "Babydoll's" breathy vocals rant as grinding power chords drill home with sonic brutality. "Berry" turns the tables by pounding frenetically all the way up until the chorus when things slow to a snail's crawl. A hypnotic bass drum ushers in "Loaded," while a distorted guitar strokes and pokes its way around. At first glance/listen Hole can come off as juvenile, but the bottom line is women's empowerment. Machines, knives, crowns and udders are some of the objects that embody this power, but the real force is in the fury of their fierce ear-piercing sound. DAVID BERAN



FUDGE TUNNEL - HATE SONGS IN E MINOR (Relativity/Earache, 187-07 Henderson Ave., Hollis, NY 11423)

Via hell and the dark crevaces of Nottingham Forest, Fudge Tunnel arrives, wielding guitars that spew terrifing grunge and disenchanting those who seek stability or comfort in the realm of music. Hey, lets take a walk with Satan and see who's suffering today—is just one example of the visions triggered by this band's garbled masses of mayhem. Another vision: heavy bass lines slithering through layers of guitar spuzz then succombing, screaming, to spit-out, powerful vocal chunks. If your listening repetoire includes the likes of Helios Creed, Silverfish and Big Black, then Fudge Tunnel is a must. Songs like "Bed Crum," "Kitchen Belt," "Boston Baby," and "Gut Rot," will satisfy your daily psycho-grunge needs. My fave is Fudge Tunnel's evil version of Cream's "Sunshine Of Your Love," and a completely outrageous hard-rockin cover of Ted Nugent's "Cat Scratch Fever." 

WHENEVER WE WANTED -JOHN MELLENCAMP (MERCURY)

The last time John Mellencamp pulled a stunt like this it was with the album Uh-Huh. Back then he was a lad lighter of heart and seemingly less frazzled by the pressures of love and art. With a slightly adjusted line-up (Joe Ely guitarist John Grissom replacing Larry Crane), Whenever We Wanted is definitely back to the band. Red hot and live-sounding, Mellencamp does pull off some surprises. Most notable is what?—a trumpet solo on the opening "Love And Happiness."
"Now More Than Ever" is my favorite, with a catchy call and response riff toward the end. "They're So Tough" is tough and rowdy. "Melting Pot" is almost as funky and dirty as Booker T and the MG's song of the same name (no relation, though). Gone are the dobros and violins. This 1991 Mellencamp model is sleek and stripped down.

24 NIGHTS -ERIC CLAPTON (REPRISE/DUCK)

Over the period of two years, culminating in twenty-four nights at the Royal Albert Hall, Eric Clapton performed a retrospective of his moods and music using a variety of ensembles and



formats. Of the four-piece, ninepiece, blues and orchestra sessions, perhaps the most interesting and newsworthy are the four trax featuring blues players like Buddy Guy, Robert Cray, Jimmie Vaughan, pianist Johnnie Johnson and Erichimselfin blues drag. The remainder of the formats feature Eric's "Reprise/Warner" era band performing classic rock renditions of "Badge," "White Room," "Sunshine Of Your Love" veering into more recent favorites like "Wonderful Tonight" and "Bell Bottom Blues." In the latest issue of Rolling Stone, Clapton himself seemed ambivalent about some of the performances. Yet as a fan, I found that you have to sometimes move beyond the obvious crowd pleasers (for instance, dig "Running On Faith") to get to the real goods.

"MOVIN' ON UP" -PRIMAL SCREAM (SIRE/WARNER BROS.)

The opening "Magic Bus" chords are followed by congas, a long bass note and harmonies that end up a gospelized hand clapper. I guess what I like most about "Movin On Up" is primitive

Stones/Beggars Banquet feel. Funny enough, you'll hear a couple of Banquet trax dancing in the shadows of the melody. In fact, Primal Scream producer Jimmy Miller was there with Keith and Mick at the original crime scene. Wuu-wuu!

- VAN MORRISON (POLYDOR)

Van Morrison joins Wynton Marsalis and Guns N' Roses as those artists prolific enough, despite the expanded CD format, to require multiple discs to cage their aggressive output. Hymns To The Silence uses a variety of happy upbeats, medium tempos and somber moods to address a few recurring themes—specifically the spiritual side of art and success vs. tradition. Specifically on the traditional "Just A Closer Walk To Thee," like a mad music evangelist Van sings the praises of God and life alongside Hank Williams and Sidney Bechet on almost the same astral plane—and certainly in the same breath. It's hard to tell which Van is the more devout about—religion or music? Same thing, you say? Lots and lots of starting points, mainly on discone. "I'm Not Feeling It Anymore,"
"So Complicated," "Professional Jealousy," "Why Must I Always Explain" and "On Hyndford Street." A beautiful package featuring some fine sax work by the young Candy Dulfer and some fitting keyboards by veteran Georgie Fame.

BLOOD SUGAR SEX MAGIK -RED HOT CHILI PEPPERS (WARNER BROS.)

At a pivotal point in their career Red Hot Chili Peppers take aim with a shockingly low tech effort. Just as a track like "Funky Monks" embody that rap/rock/funk universe the Peppers nearly invented, a track like "I Could Have Lied" barely rears above demo status. Blood Sugar Sex Magik is going to be a perplexing undertaking for radio. Written and recorded inside a haunted Hollywood mansion and clocking in at seventy


minutes, the band seems to have left the editing process to their fans. The Peppers still pick their pickled influences with uncompromising zeal—a little Sly Bootsie Hendrix, a little gangsta rap, some sex talk here, some daring acoustic guitars there. Producer Rick Rubin is uncharacteristically loose here, so what you get is a learn-as-you-go experience. An added visual contribution is film director Gus Van Zant's photographic rogue's gallery of RHCP tattoos. Here's an effort drowning in blue ink.

ONE BELIEVER -JOHN CAMPBELL (ELEKTRA)

Live and on record, John Campbell cuts a strange profile in the dark. A long-faced acoustic player, Campbell combines the forces of an electric band with Halloween blues spells straight out of Screaming Jay Hawkins' trick bag. Listening is a little like whistling through a graveyard at night. The songs are a little scary, a little gris-gris. The uptempo "Couldn't Do Nothin'" served as John's set opener, yet it's a song like "Voodoo Edge" that epitomizes the mystery of Campbell's approach. If Bela Lugosi had played and strummed American blues and rock, he just might've sounded like this. Produced by Dennis Walker and Peter Lubin, formerly part of Robert Cray's early

A VIOLENT IMPRESSION - THIS PICTURE (RCA)

Picture this...a young band embraced heavily by our commercial Alternative contingent. Calls like KDGE, Live 105, WDRE, KROQ, WFNX, WOXY, 91X, KJQN, KTCL, WDST and more may be essentially grooming the next U2. While there are similarities in the vocals and the passion quotient, This Picture (who aren't Irish but hail from Bath) are very much an individual band. Singer Symon Bye (a vague play on Bryan Ferry?) fronts the customary drums/guitar/bass assault. On trax like "Breathe Deeply Now" and the super-charged "Naked Rain," This Picture sing very action-oriented lyrics to a convincing bed of guitarisms. What a find.



ALTERNATIVE NEW RELEASES

PRIMAL SCREAM - SCREAMADELICA (SIRE/WARNER BROS.)

Here's one that will, without a doubt, end up on many people's Year End "Best Of..." lists—mine included. And why not? Screamadelica is comprised primarily of the singles that have been released throughout the year—"Come Together," (love this mix!) "Loaded," "Trip Inside This House" (a different version than the one found on The Rocky Erickson tribute album), two versions of "Higher Than The Sun," the current U.K. single, "Don't Fight It Feel It" as well as the American single, "Movin' On Up." Hey—it's the closest thing to a "greatest hits album without actually being one. It certainly doesn't leave room for much else, which is my only complaint—if you can call that a complaint. (Hey, the record is too good—how 'bout some filler?) I assume you've heard the singles by now, so concentrate on the songs that aren't singles yet. The bitter-sweet "Damaged" stands as my favorite album track and along with "Movin' On Up," highlights Gillespie's real talent while giving a nod to the early Stones. "I'm Coming Down" features a bluesy sax, and a lean, languid vibe, while "Shine Like Stars," with its tinkling piano-like sounds, is not only an end-of-the-rave lullabye but the perfect ending to a near-perfect album. You'll probably hear this a lot in reference to Screamadelica, but with it's warm-up, peak and come down quality, it really is most instense when played start to finish. LINDA RYAN

THIS PICTURE - A VIOLENT IMPRESSION (DEDICATED/RCA)

I saw this band play live when I was in London and was immediately struck (as in awe struck) by the band's intensity—particularly that of frontman Simon Bye, who's like a black hole on stage, drawing energy out of his audience person-by-person. The band's album, A Violent Impression, reflects these qualities and magnifies them, creating a tension that makes musical sparks fly—and burn. And as dark and ominous as that may sound, there is also a gentleness to This Picture, and it's this dichotomy that lies at the heart of their music. And speaking of the music, check out the Celtic lilt on "Naked Rain" and "The Great Tree." And while you're at it, turn your attention to the suffocating tearjerker "Deep As This One," "Step Up" and my favorite track, "Breathe Deeply Now." This one will creep up on you quietly and then take over your CD player. LR

CURVE - "FROZEN" (CHARISMA)

I have to admit, I wasn't a huge fan of Curve's Blindfold EP, so it was with some hesitation I put the Frozen EP into my CD player. Surprise, surprise! "Frozen"—with it's uninhibited moodiness, won me over on first listen. Toni Halliday's vocals float somewhere between angel and Banshee, innocent and wanton siren—seducing and destroying all within ear-shot. Also check out the opaque "Coast Is Clear." LR

SWERVEDRIVER - RAISE (A&M)

Much to the surprise of the Alternative higher-ups (read: Linda), I'm diggin' on a British band. A bit out of character, I know, but Swervedriver, rather than board the groovy train that's recently steamed so many U.K. bands into Hitsville, have been inspired by their American indie-rock forefathers. With Swervedriver, guitar is god, and they weave a molasses-thick atmosphere of wah-wah snarl and distortion that, while not entirely U.S.-referential (Ride, My Bloody Valentine), is instead a successful attempt to "break down the barriers like Sonic Youth," and "pedal-hop like Dinosaur, Jr." This Oxford-based four-piece has garnered a bit of American airplay with their two previous import EPs, but Raise is their first domestic release for A&M. Check out: "Pile Up," "Rave Down," "Feel So Real," and my fave "Deep Seat." SEANA BARUTH

SINGLES by Dave Sholin


SMOKEY ROBINSON - Double Good Everything (SBK)

Responsible for writing, producing and singing countless hit songs in a career that has spanned four decades, Smokey enters the nineties on a new label with the voice that is instantly recognizable. Impossible not to love everything about this production—melody, hook, lyric—it's got it all! What else would you expect from the number one Miracle who continues to work musical wonders?

CHER - Save Up All Your Tears (Geffen)

Ahh—here's the Cher we all know and love, clearly comfortable in a musical environment that offers her every opportunity to shine. Guided by producers Bob Rock and Ritchie Zito, she gives a stellar rendering of this sensational Diane Warren/Desmond Child composition. A timeless talent who refuses to be frozen in time.

ROD STEWART - Broken Arrow (Warner Bros.) Some may recall hearing Robbie Robertson's version of this song awhile back. "Broken Arrows" was written by Robertson, but The Rodster reassembles this unique and tender mid-tempo ballad with his own one-of-a-kind interpretation. He can't help but score another Top 40 and A/C bullseye with a song so on target for this time of year.



PAULA ABDUL - Blowing Kisses In The Wind (Captive/Virgin)

By the time she appears before expected sold-out crowds on her first-ever tour, this third single from Spellbound should be firmly established as a staple on hit music radio. A haunting melody that offers yet another dimension to this wonderfully gifted performer.

MARC COHN - True Companion (Atlantic)

Having just attended the wedding of a close friend last week, this song pushed all the emotional buttons that much more. A singer/songwriter who deserves consideration as one of the top newcomers of 1991, Marc's newest entry could well become a song couples play to each other for years to come. By the way, as the story goes, Marcsang this to his girlfriend as a marriage proposal—and it worked!

KENNY LOGGINS - Conviction Of The Heart (Columbia)

Re-emerging from an absence that's lasted much too long, Loggins is someone who has always sung with honesty and total conviction. No surprise, he told Ron Fell in last month's cover story, that his best work is born out of personal experience. Those upper demos Top 40s are looking to capture should relate and warm up to this first single very easily.

HAMMER - 2 Legit 2 Quit (Bust-It/Capitol) Coming off the biggest selling Rap album of all time, Hammer meets the challenge of pounding out a follow-up that leaves no doubt he's been busy coming up with new twists to his trademark style. Official add date isn't until next week (10/ 14), but homeboy Hammer is just too hot to put on hold!

ROBYN HITCHCOCK AND THE EGYPTIANS


- So You Think You're In Love (A&M)

Described as an "English eccentric," those familiar with Hitchcock's previous work can attest that this effort is his most commercial to-date. Currently, Number Two on our Alternative chart, it enjoyed the #1 spot for five consecutive weeks. Great energy and a track worth checking out. Final note, guitar work on this track provided by R.E.M.'s Peter Buck.

ALBUMS by Ron Fell

PRINCE AND THE N.P.G. - Diamonds and Pearls (Paisley Park/Warner Bros.)

As its title humbly implies, this is a brilliant string of gems, among them smooth and cool orbs, and jagged yet precisely cut sparklers. This set finds Mr. Prince without the recent distractions of a film, and playing comfortably with a band rather than carrying the instrumental load on his petite and seemingly fragile shoulders. The concept behind the "Graffiti Bridge" soundtrack was to give others like The Time and Tevin Campbell their own tracks to supplement Prince and his brand New Power Generation's tracks. "Diamonds and Pearls" is the N.P.G.'s second and solidifying try, and The Purple One's confidence in them and himself is evident. The femme fatale role is now played by Rosie Gaines, and she comes to life on the set's second track, DADDY POP. The opener, THUNDER, a sort of twenty-first century Gospel number, gets to the hook at the very beginning and never quite returns to its peak. As a matter of fact, the most general shortcoming of an otherwise brilliant collection is that most tracks would have been even more attractive in slightly shorter lengths. My faves include the aforementioned tracks, the new single CREAM, a Paul Simon-like rhythm to an insatiable WILLING AND ABLE, the loopy WALK DON'T WALK and the trip to (Stevie) Wonderland, MONEY DON'T MAT-TER 2 NIGHT.
