EMI/SBK/Chrysalis Begin Cutbacks

As we went to press, full-scale layoffs were taking place at the newly-formed EMI Records Group North America, the official name of the recently-merged EMI, SBK and Chrysalis Records.

Our understanding is that EMI promotion chief Jack Satter has left the company, while Chrysa-

lis promotion head **Tom Gorman** will remain. **Greg Thompson** will move to Chicago, and **Ken Lane** will work directly with **Daniel Glass**.

The layoffs were expected to be finished by Wednesday (4), with new appointments being announced on Thursday (5).

Stay tuned.

Cafaro to Exec VP for PolyGram Holding

A&M president and CEO Al Cafaro has been given the additional title of executive vice president, PolyGram Holding Inc.

(PHI) He will remain based in Los Angeles.

Cafaro's priority will remain the running of A&M, but he will also work closely with newlyappointed solo Mercury president Ed Eckstine.

"Al...has been extremely successful at bringing an exceptional team spirit to A&M, where the results speak for themselves," said PHI CEO Alain Levy.

"In the last few years at A&M I have seen great frustration turn into extraordinary success and in the process have come to understand the value of a tight knit, highly motivated team," said Cafaro. "Alain has put together a great group of music people. I'm proud to be part of this team and I look forward to working more closely with Ed Eckstine at Mercury, although it is clear that my primary responsibility will be running A&M Records."



1991 Capsule


A year that began with such promise is now closing on a down note. Not only are record company personnel experiencing layoffs, radio stations are selling for less money and scaling back staffwise, and the concert business is extremely slow. We've selected some of the high and low points of 1991 for our year-end review.

- 1/11: Sunny Joe White exited KISS 108 (WXKS)-Boston after ten successful years as program director. Steve Rivers, who was at crosstown WZOU took his place. In an ironic move, later in the year White became PD at WZOU. That same week, Todd Fisher left Eagle 106 (WEGX)-Philadelphia.
- 1/18: Ed Eckstine and Mike Bone were named co-presidents at Mercury Records. In November, Bone would resign his position and Eckstine would become solo president.
 - 1/25: Impact Records debuts.
- 2/8: Steve Perun left B104 (WBSB)-Baltimore for a short-lived reign as PD at WZOU-Boston.
- 2/15: Davitt Sigerson was appointed president at Polydor and Scott Shannon jumps the Pirate ship in Los Angeles amid rumors he was returning to New York (he was, to Mojo Radio, now known by its calls WPLJ).
- 3/1: Frank Miniaci left KKBT "The Beat" in Los Angeles where he was APD, to become PD at Y95 (KHYI)-Dallas. Unfortunately for Frank, later in the year Y95 changed format and he opted to leave.
 - 3/8: Todd Fisher surfaced as PD at B104 (WBSB)-Baltimore.
- 3/29: After over ten years at A&M, Charlie Minor left the label for the presidency of Giant Records.
- 5/3: Thorn/EMI bought the 50% of SBK Records they didn't already own. In November, SBK, EMI and Chrysalis would merge, with SBK chief Charles Koppelman taking charge of the new triumvirate. At the same time, Elektra announced the debut of the Ruben Rodriguez-led Pendulum Records, a label that would specialize in Black/Urban product.
- 5/10: Clive Davis re-signed as Arista major domo. Capitol Nashville artist Garth Brooks, who became the Country superstar of the year, saw his video "The Thunder Rolls" banned from video networks. Its graphic depiction of sexual abuse left executives squeamish.
- 5/17: Motown, clearly unhappy with its contract with MCA, sued to terminate the relationship. Later in the year, even though the dispute was not settled, Motown signed a distribution agreement with PolyGram. Currently the labels are in a three-way tangle, with no one backing down.
- 5/24: Another label opened—or in this case, restarted. Capricorn Records shook off the mothballs and began staffing. As of this writing, they haven't had any significant releases.
- 6/14: BNA Records, a Country subsidiary of RCA, debuted in Nashville.
- 6/28: Mark Driscoll was out as Q102 (WIOQ)-Philadelphia PD.
- 7/26: The concert business showed a 30% dip in attendance from last year. Many artists either canceled shows or scaled back productions.
- 8/16: Chameleon Records, which shut down earlier in the year, signed a joint deal with Elektra Entertainment.
- 8/23: After a year at Pyramid Broadcasting's WSNI-Philadelphia, Gerry deFrancesco returned to the station he left, KIIS-

- 9/1: As Emmis Broadcasting trimmed executive salaries, Jeff Wyatt left his PD slot at Power 106 (KPWR)-Los Angeles. He'd later surface as afternoon drive personality at crosstown competition KIIS.
- 9/20: In what (really) is a rare occurrence, the *Gavin Report* lost one of our staffers when Ern Llamado took a college promotion position at Priority Records.
- 10/4: Atco and EastWest Records America consolidated, leaving 30 people jobless. Some, however, were able to pick up positions within the WEA corporation. Producer James Stroud went to Giant Records Nashville as label chief.
- 10/25: Alan Goodman resigned as the president of Ackerley Communications after only six months on the job.
- 11/1: In what has become a trend, Top 40 WYTZ-Chicago changed format. It is now WLS/FM and simulcasts a Talk format with its AM sister.
- 11/15: Beginning an alarming trend, both Atlantic and Mercury trimmed their staffs, with some longtime employees being given pink slips. Also, Ackerley sold WBOS and at the same time restructured their debt.

official word as we go to press, but inside scuttlebutt has WHVE switching to a Top 40-A/C blend. PD Jim Robinson remains but MD Don Berkshire has exited. Phone Don about his future plans at (813) 577-4846...It seems that a week doesn't go by without one of our stations dropping their Top 40 stance. This time it's K106 (WAKH)-McComb, MS, which has gone Country...The same situation, format and all, holds true for 92KOR (WKOR)-Starkville, MS...WLYY-Lansing APD George McIntyre is leaving the station to do PM Drive at CARS 108-Flint, Michigan...Bob (Radio Torpedo) Martinez, formerly at Q92/FM-Redding, CA. is now Marketing and Programming Consultant at KXGO-Eureka, CA...In Lafayette, LA Barbara Byrd is the new PD/MD at KFXZ-Lafayette...At KKYS-Bryan/College Station, TX Ryan O'Brien exits as PD and Ron Eliott steps in in the interim. Former interim MD Brent Warner takes over the slot on a permanent basis, and Todd Turlington is AMD...It's official—Beverly Farmer is upped to PD at WMDM-Lexington Park, MD. She retains the MD position. Beverly replaces John Price, who exited several months ago... Seventeenyear radio vet Russ Wristen is now PD at 93-5(KBHT)-Crockett, TX. Hewas PDat KLSN-

Brownwood, TX. Also in the news at 93-5, Butch Case takes over the afternoon drive slot. Butch was PD at KCYL-Lampasas, TX...New MD at WIXX-Green Bay, WI is Kevin Ross, who also holds down the 12M-5:30AM shift...Jerry Bobo has been named President/ General Manager at Oldies 94.9 (KODZ)-Irving, TX...Things are heating up in Chicago where WGCI/FM overnighter Irene Mojica is alleging racial and sexual discrimination. Looks like the station's entire air staff will be witnesses. Mojica's charges stem from the fact that she's been doing the same shift for 12 years and only making \$30,000, while male stars in better time slots are reportedly bringing home as much as \$600,000.

We've been waiting on the official announcement for what seems like months now, but it's safe to say that former Gavin Report Alternative Editor Peter Standish, who was until recently Modern Music Promotion/Marketing Manager at Reprise, is now a product manager for the label. Steve Tipp, who has officially left Columbia, will be stepping into Peter's vacant position, with added responsibilities drawn into the job description...Colin Cornish has been appointed president and Lionel Conway chairman of the PolyGram/ Island Music Group USA...A couple of labels have changed their phone #s: Elektra's New York number is (212) 275-4000 and Atco/ EastWest's New York dial is (212) 275-2500. while Atlantic's is (212) 275-2000. The mailing addresses are unchanged...With all the consolidations and layoffs, eyes are now on Hollywood Records, since the disclosure of label chief Peter Paterno's memo to Disney officials asking them not to abolish the label. The company has lost \$25 million...At London Records, Jeffrey Peterson has been named Product Manager...New to the newly-created position Director of Dance Club Department at Pyramid Entertainment Group is Michael Schweiger, formerly the owner of MLS Entertainment...



Matt Pierson has been named Director of A&R/Staff Producer for Jazz and Progressive Music for Warner Bros. Records.

have a letter from a radio station in the midwest that brings up a subject that was of great concern to the late Bill Gavin, remains of concern to the Gavin Report staff today, and is certainly worth addressing again in this column. It concerns where the line should be drawn between good promotion and undue pressure from record promotion people on radio people. There is no hard and fast rule here, and there are some abuses in radio at least as troublesome as any that might come from records. The purpose in printing this letter is not to generate the familiar finger-pointing and griping, but to bring up an issue that is relevant to our two industries. The author wrote to me intending to appear under his own signature, but after signing the letter he asked me to withhold his name if I felt printing it could "hurt me or our radio station in any way." It could, so I will. Here's the letter.

"While the production piles up, I must stop and write you for the first time. As Music Director at a small market station, it's obvious how important being a Gavin Reporter is. We have access to all the music we need to survive. Each week I look forward to talking to record promoters around the country to find out what's new for us to play. It's also a good chance to learn more about artists and the music business.

"While there are many advantages to being a Gavin Reporter, unfortunately we have uncovered a few disadvantages. Recently I received a phone call from a representative of a record company asking me to listen to a song he was promoting. I listened to the song, made some notes, and decided the song wasn't right for our station. That was the end of it, right? Wrong!

"I must have received close to fifteen more calls from the same representative, as well as his boss (I

think), asking me to add the song because so and so up the road, across the street or across the country did. First of all, we don't add music to our playlist just because another station did; each station is unique in its own way; and secondly, if a song is that good, I don't think I would have to be hit over the head with it a thousand times before adding it. If a Music Director is dong his job, he'll know his target audience, and know what music is right for the station.

"I really got angered when the representative went to the next step and told me about a promotion that was part of the adding of this song. A prize would be awarded to a listener and to the Music Director at the station playing the song (or something to that effect). It was just another way to entice me into playing this song that wasn't right for our station. Finally, the calls ceased (after chart action stopped), and I haven't heard from this company again. I don't see what they gained by badgering me with this song; it wasn't right for our station, so I wasn't going to play it, but in the future they may have a great song to promote and they're going to want to talk to me again. I wonder how they'll handle that situation!

"As Music Director, it's not my duty to decide if a song is good or bad, but whether or not the song is right or wrong for our radio station. I would appreciate input from other Music and Program Directors."

I thank the writer for his letter. The issue is a legitimate one, and I invite input from record people too. I see nothing wrong in persistence by record promotion people; it's part of the game. Stonewalling promotion people by failing to take

calls, or lying about one's intentions, is unprofessional behavior by radio people, and I condemn it. Music and Program Directors, by the nature of the relationship with the record industry which provides music of the programming content are, in my opinion, obligated to take calls and listen even to repetitious promotion people. And to tell them the truth, too, even if it isn't as easy as telling them what they want to hear. Believe me, in the long run, people of integrity are remembered by people of integrity, and those who will lie are simply used by those who lack ethics themselves.

I must admit I expected this letter to mention threats, such as loss of record service or even loss of reporter status, because such inexcusable behavior occasionally occurs. Years ago, in my first programming assignment, I was threatened in this manner by a promotion man; considerably disturbed, I called Bill Gavin and told him about it, and he said he would take care of it, and indeed I never heard from that promotion man again, and none of the threatened consequences materialized. However, in the letter-writer's situation, to my surprise, the promotion effort came dangerously close to classic "payola." That is, offering to give the music/program director something of value in exchange for record airplay. This too is despicable, and it is entirely illegal, unless the station acknowledges on the air that "consideration was received from--" in exchange for airplay ("payola" is a violation of the FCC's "sponsor identification rule").

There's the letter; what do you think? I welcome your input on this or any radio-related subject! Write me c/o the Gavin Report. We'll wrap up the year and step into the threshold of the next one, in this space next week.

INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

In one of the most accurate period films ever made, "American Graffiti" Director George Lucas recalled his high school days in California's San Joaquin Valley. He portrayed a group of teens who cruised around a small town at night, glued to the radio listening to Wolfman Jack. The movie was set in 1962, but as 1992 approaches it's highly unlikely the 12-24 crowd has the same commitment to radio listening their counterparts had in previous generations.

As president of her own research firm, the New York-based Xtreme, Inc., Erma Zandel has made it her business to gauge teen tastes and changing lifestyles. In her estimation, radio isn't the priority it once was or, as she told me, "it's not top-of-mind." Kids will say things like, "at night I listen to some station to mellow out with, but in general, they want to be in charge of what they're listening to."

Utilizing a panel of two thousand young people around the country from age 8 to 24, Erma's found a clear distinction between male and female listening habits. "In the work we've done with teens," she concludes, "girls are more involved with radio than boys. Boys seem to be much more interested in having control over what they're listening to so they're more likely to have CD players or tape decks in their cars, while girls are more inclined to listen to the radio."

That doesn't surprise Erma, who feels "it's consistent with the sexes" finding "the guys to be a lot more aggressive, caring about being in charge, and we don't find that nearly as much with girls. We find that in every aspect of questions we ask about favorite possessions or hobbies." She chuckles, but emphasizes, "the testosterone level really does have something to do with it. The number of girls who say Guns N' Roses is their favorite band is nearly zero."

Xtreme's client list naturally includes ad agencies, but also folks like The American Food School Service Association, who are all the people who feed kids in school, putting Erma on campuses all over the nation. While her clients have wanted to know about television, magazines and music, she says she has never had anyone who wanted to know about radio usage. When asked what she would say to those who don't feel that tapes and CDs are as important as radio listening Erma's blunt response is, "If people think that, they better think again."

Though the sun is quickly setting on 1991, **GEORGE MICHAEL and ELTON JOHN are** wasting no time building a chart profile in order to kick off 1992 with one of the first big hits of the New Year. Top thirty at EAGLE 106, KISS 108, WDJX, WJLQ, WKXJ, WIAL,

Shaking his head and smiling ever so slightly, he continues, "This tour...it's all been absolutely mad—a Yeager Meister haze. But our gigs virtually have all been sold-out."

display in our meeting room.

Well, in England we're bigger proportionally. We're in a much stronger position so we have more control of things," Damon said. "But really, our label invests a lot of money in you when you come over here and I think the way the American psyche operates is that they (the record company) have to feel that they're in control of the situation—which is fair enough. Hopefully, by us being reasonable and reliable that will change," he laughs, "because we don't function very well being told what to do.

"We're very receptive to what's around us," he continues. "If the atmosphere is good, then we're usually quite good live. If it's something dull we're usually pissed off and annoyed. The ethic of 'C'mon guys, we're gonna do a good show tonight' doesn't always happen for us.

But we've managed to get all sides of the band on an even keel here. When we go back to England, everything will be there. We've got lots of new experiences and we're confident as well. It's all put together now, as opposed to before, when we were incredibly confident and very unsuccessful!" he laughs.

Blut is confident and successful as well. And, it has to be said, a contributing factor to both states of being are their mugs—which adorn both serious music papers and teeny-bopper mags alike. But is Blur just another bunch of pretty faces?

Damon explains, "I think it can happen—that people might not take us seriously because we look good—but I think that's our ace card. As they say in Yorkshire, 'The proof isn't in the pudding, it's in the eating of the pudding.'"


He shrugs and continues, "It really doesn't

matter what people say because if you're good, it will outweigh the superficiality of the business. We can't help it if we take good pictures. That's not our problem—it's other people's problem.

"In a way," he reasons, "it's not surprising that people feel there's a stigma attached to looking good, because there's many crappy things which are sold purely on the that fact people look good. Ithink it's an asset. It's certainly not a pretext to not being taken seriously. We know that the people who come to see us are there because they want to bebecause they love the music. And that's all that really matters.

Before I can interject a thought, Damon vents another passionate tirade.

Whatwe're doing is so f—king great and it's such a great thing



In their native England, mention Blur and girls swoon involuntarily. Tagged by the English press as "the most shaggable" band of the year, Blur has rocketed from out of nowhere to the top of the British charts, where they've spent a good deal of time in 1991.

Their first single, a grinding, spacey, Syd Barrett-like ode to an unattainable love titled "She's So High," got as, um, high as number forty-eight in Britain's Gallup Poll and an incredible number two on the Indie Charts.

Blur became the buzz-word for people in the know, and when the band released their second single, "There's No Other Way," that buzz grew louder. Magazine covers followed. So did appearances on Top Of The Pops and the Reading Festival. Almost a year later, with the release of their debut album, Leisure, the buzz could be heard as far away as America.

Their three-week tour of The States has given Blur a crash-course in America—American culture, American women, American beer and American radio.

"After visiting this enormous place, I really see



to do! There's just too many people who commit themselves to a life sentence of worrying about whether things are serious or credible. Things either are or they're not. It's not something that needs a debate every week. We want to be a credible band and we are because we're doing it for the right reasons.

It works when you see the whole thing," he continues. "It's an entire lifestyle, Blur, it's not just a record. We're not a rock and roll band. There are elements of us which have been taken from that, but we're much more."

Damon hesitates and then looks up and across the table at Alex, the soft spoken bassist, who hasn't had an opportunity to say anything yet. He smiles brightly and animatedly announces, "We're a multi-media fun machine!"

Blur, with their unique blend of '60s pop and '90s sensibilities, is very much a product of their time and place. I wonder aloud if Americans will relate to some of the British aspects of this "fun machine."

"We do a lot of things because on a certain level, we find them incredibly great. It's for

those in the know to appreciate and relate to.

For example," he begins, "at the Kilburn National gig (in England), there were kids there wearing bathing caps (like on the cover of the Leisure album) and waving Walls' ice-cream flags of their own accord. They were being a bit—naughty. Do you know what I mean, 'cos that's what we're about."

So, Blur is about being naughty?

Alex speaks up in an effort to clarify. "We're not naughty in a bad way," he says in a near-whisper. "We're naughty in a good way—a kill dull bores sort of way." He is a man of very few words, but when Alex opens his mouth, look look out!

Damon explains, "There is the danger that a lot of Americans won't get what we're on about, but I think once we get a chance to be on television and be naughty...we love miming on television, we think it's brilliant! In front of millions of people you can just be really naughty—push the limits of tolerance."

He continues with a wicked grin, "It's important for us to tickle Mr. Doo-da on the bum when he's watching the telly in the evening. It's just brilliant when you can go on television and people go, 'They're being bloody stupid! Bloody hell, change the channel.' You don't get much chance to do that these days because there's so much at stake with each program. So, it's quite an achievement if you can do that."

No television appearances were scheduled for Blur this time around but the band hopes that their next trip will offer a different outcome. For now, their only television exposure is in the form of their videos.

"We had to change our video for 'There's No Other Way' for America," Damon offers. "It was quite cheeky, really, because it was just us eating dinner. It actually was a big hit."

We managed to get it on at dinner time." Alex interjects.

"I think," Damon says slowly, "that we'll only really make sense in ten years time, when you look back and say, 'Blur had the spirit of the nineties.' I mean, it's quite a sixties thing—we're quite hedonistic people, but we don't make an issue out of it. I mean, we're vegetarians and are loving people. That's already in our vocabulary. Right now, we're just trying to stay human.

We're quite enthusiastic about life and if that's our crime then so be it. At the end of the day, we're actually quite happy people—we love our mums!"

recent feature story in the Richmond (Virginia) Times Dispatch discussed satellite systems being used by local radio stations as their total music and programming source. The article went on to infer that your local radio station may no longer be a "local" radio station, as it may now be programmed by a service originating from Chicago, Dallas or some other major city.

So much for the theory that listeners outside the industry circle can't detect satellite from local programming. The station I program is in a market that includes several stations that use satellite services. Many times in the last several years, listeners would call to ask why the other station didn't have their own announcers.

It's 1991 and we all know a lot of radio stations are hurting. The list of stations that have gone dark grows every week. Everyone quoted in the article agreed that satellite services were not an evil force. They could be very useful as long as there's a combination of local programming to supplement your-satellite format. The programmers and personalities all said they were using satellite formats for financial reasons—as a way to save money yet still be a good sounding station. Yet, the managers all contend that using satellite formats had nothing to do with finances. So—now that the teams are lined up, let us proceed.

Satellite Music Network (SMN), one of the leaders among satellite format companies, boasts over 1,000 clients for their various programs, ranging from heavy metal to traditional Country. The mainstream Country format is called "Country Coast to Coast," and has about 280 affiliates. Their traditional format, "Real Country," programmed by Buck Owens' production company, has about 50 affiliates. Marty Raab, vice president of marketing for SMN believes satellite programming is a wonderful supplemental tool, but encourages clients to pick up the complete service. "We have a terrific programming staff and we encourage stations to stay within our programming," he said. "We believe that the talent we supply is going to be better than those that can be hired in a small to medium market."

For those stations who want to take a

satellite service but retain a "live" morning show, Raab advises against it. "We really like to have stations take the complete package (and) with the local breaks allowed the station, you can add customized liners, PSAs and promos." Although Raab admits that SMN has some pretty big goals, he does not see SMN or satellite programming in general taking over the world and driving the local personality into extinction. "Our goals at SMN are sizeable but there are a lot of stations. I don't think there's cause to worry that local programming will come to a complete halt."

Some people believe that even in a small or medium market, satellite services don't provide the level of broadcasting that live programming does. Longtime programming veteran Bob Grayson of WCHK/FM-Canton, Georgia felt that live programming would achieve better results from him. "In our situation just outside of Atlanta, one of the best radio markets in the country, we had to have people on the air that were comparable, and what we were getting from SMN just didn't cut it," he said. "Their jocks didn't measure up, and I felt the music had to be adjusted for us to compete."

But even a live radio believer like Bob Grayson understands that satellite formats have a place. "They absolutely do," he admitted. "I understand that stations in rural areas...have to cut back, and satellite programming can be great for them. Use it as a supplemental service, though, and retain a morning show. You've got to be local

if you're going to survive."

Programming consultant Moon Mullins agrees that you really should keep some kind of live context. "If anyone tells me they're entertaining the idea of going to a satellite service I urge them to at least have a morning show," he said. Moon goes on to say he believes one of the big reasons satellite stations have become successful is the increasing erosion of "home towns." "You'll find that more and more people don't live where their relatives do," he said. "There's less of a home town feel and less concern for local issues. Folks may be commuting many miles for their job, and they just don't have time to be that concerned with things that are happening in the town in which they live."

Mullins adds the future of "live" radio will get worse before it gets better, especially in small markets and on the AM band. "The realistic picture is that there will be more and more stations going satellite until the financial picture brightens," he said. "During the eighties a lot of stations were sold at over-inflated prices."

Where does all of this leave the AM broadcaster, many of whom were having big problems even before the nation's financial picture began to darken? KYKK/AM is located in Hobbs, New Mexico, a city of approximately 30,000. Program Director Harry Harlan believes there are both pros and cons for his SMN country-formatted station. "We have an FM that is thriving. As supplemental programming for our AM, I think satellite services are positive and useful," he said. "You can save a lot of money, the music is consistent, the air talent is good, and you get major market promotions even if you're in a smaller market."

On the negative side, Harlan believes satellite programming will not stand up to a well-programmed live station. "A live station done well will beat a satellite format every time," he advises. "The other thing is that when they're selling you their product, a satellite company will tell you the ordinary listener can't tell the difference. The truth is they can."



JAZZ NEW RELEASES

STOLEN MOMENTS - STANLEY JORDAN (BLUE NOTE)

On Stolen Moments, Stanley Jordan steals away a few old melodies in the form of "Autumn Leaves" and "Impressions." But rather than just breath new life into old pages, Jordan uses these live Tokyo dates as a sanctuary from those Urban-flavored studio tunes he's recorded lately on EMI. Stolen Moments is his second live Blue Note disc—the previous one originated in New York with an expanded band and some studio tracks thrown in. This time Jordan slims down to a deadly power trio with magnificent drum/bass support. If anybody can hang with a wiz like guitarist Stanley Jordan in a trio configuration, it's Charnett Moffett. He plays with full blown, ambidextrous fury—much like the Jordan man himself. Drummer Kenwood Dennard is no slouch either, pounding with rock-like authority. The opener, "Stairway To Heaven," has been done to death, and we moved on to the stretched out Oliver Nelson-penned title track. Jordan noodles on a synthesized guitar gizmo that resembles droplets of electronic keyboard. The dominant performance is truly Coltrane's "Impressions." Jordan's electric leads are laser thin but razor sharp; Dennard and Moffett are downright explosive. Jordan's goes ape with a plucking style and some skillful simultaneous chording that could lead one to wonder if some overdubbing was used. But those hip to Jordan's magic, and those who have seen him live, know better.

KISS MY AXE - THE AL DIMEOLA PROJECT (TOMATO/MESA/BLUEMOON)

As happy as we were several weeks ago with super guitarist Al DiMeola's comeback disc, World Sinfonia (with its masterful fling with Astor Piazzolla's authentic Argentinean acoustic tangos), Kiss My Axe is the other shoe falling. One of the most dynamic and imaginative electric Jazz guitarists is finally back among us. Check out "The Embrace," with its pulverizing drum accents and unpredictable twists and changes between high-charged Latin licks, fluid and rounded melodic breaks and jarringly exotic percussion passages. It's almost worth the ten year wait for the return of DiMeola's Edison magic. A lot has transpired in that time and Al makes amends by adding new sonic dimension to his stinging, electric, humbucking Gibson/Les Paul sound. The title cut has tremendous edge, so the weak of heart should be forewarned and journey on to the more ethereally acoustic "Morocco." The synthesized keyboards on each track maintain a forceful theatric presence that meshes nicely with DiMeola's attacking style. Jazz/AA should not be thrown off by the eight-minute tag on "One Night Last June." It's one of the more flowing glissando and polished tracks from the set, with only a minimum of stirring Latin breaks. DiMeola's fiery, romantic virtuosity will leave his fans howling for the chance to see it all live. Kiss My Axe is satisfying all the way through. Blow your speakers out with this one.

DREAM SPIRAL - HILARY STAGG (MUSIC WEST)

Electronic harp recorded digitally can be a very tricky operation, so Hilary Stagg does us a favor by recording and mixing Dream Spiral in the warmth of analog. You won't hear the impersonal strains of cold steel—one of digital's rare pitfalls—that could have easily marred this fragile yet beautiful session. We like the cavernous ambience of Stagg's sound. There's plenty of depth and a swelling reverb that gives the music a full bouquet. "Heaven On Earth" is satisfyingly celestial and friendly. "Island Sweets" has an exotic south-of-the-border, magic realist aura about it. "Dream Spiral," with its syntho rhythm section and keyboard textures, is the most commercial sounding AA track, and it doesn't betray the grandeur of the other tracks.


HE IS CHRISTMAS - TAKE 6 (REPRISE)

Take this one out of your hold pile and dust it off. 'Tis the season for **Take 6** to pull out the stops with the slickest seamless sextet vocal harmonies going. Their version of "Silent Night" promises to be the wildest you'll ever hear. Take 6 encompass vocal Jazz swing, funk, pop, classical and gospel and performs each with the highest imaginative flair. They sneak in some synth percussion with their polished acappella antics. Count us

HYMNS, CAROLS, AND SONGS ABOUT SNOW-TUCK ANDRESS (WINDHAM HILL IAZZ)

Super guitarist Tuck Andress goes from Baba lover to Santa lover in one session. Love the plucky countrified licks on "Jingle Bells." The snow sloshing left hand sounds on the fretboard are cute on "Little Drummer Boy." On the whole, HCASAS is pretty subdued Tuck stuff—not as jumpin' as his last solo romp.

THE BELLS OF DUBLIN - THE CHIEFTAINS (RCA)

As Dublin finishes her 1991 reign as European City of Culture, we merry Zimmermen will be there the day after Boxing Day, samplin' the choice Joycean pub spots. Think of us as you peruse this roguish holiday release. Unusual cameos by the McGarrigles, Jackson Browne and Marianne Faithful. Betcha didn't know Marianne was Irish, did ya? Jackson sings the leftish "The Rebel Jesus." Nanci Griffith and the Chieftains deliver a Barry Lyndon-ized "Wexford Carol." We like the cheery title track and "Skyline Jig."

PRAYER FOR PEACE - MARCUS ROBERTS (NOVUS/RCA)

Last year we had a taste of this collection in the form of an EP CD. Here Marcus Roberts connects with the most passionately introspective and serious songs of the season. The longish title cut sets the tone for some serious thinking we all must do by the end of the millennium to make this world a whole lot better. On an upper note, "Let It Snow" is playfully Monkish. The majesty of the blues is vibrant on the spiritual "Go Tell It On The Mountain."

"THE CHRISTMAS SONG (CHESTNUTS ROASTING ON AN OPEN FIRE)" - AL JARREAU (REPRISE)

Al Jarreau breaks his silence on this sweet little soulful ditty ballad. Sugary strings and some Toots-style harmonica accent this satiny, well loved, sophisticated standard.

CHRISTMAS SONG BOOK - HELEN MERRILL (IVC)

Speaking of sophisticated, the reorganized JVC label gives us this Helen Merrill songbook. We like the lush orchestral tone poem titled "Snowfall" Her version of "The Christmas Song" is a surprise duet with Mel Torme. Although the arrangements are sterling, the exacting recording and vocal performances are melancholy and unabashedly gritty. No attempt is made to hide the vocal rough spots or mask the imprecisions. "Away In A Manger" tugs on a few personal memories. Hard core Jazzers should check out the scat "If I Were A Bell." Merrill's smoky treatments prevail in the end.

BEAUTIFUL FOR NO ONE TO SEE - JEANNE NEWHALL (MARZIPAN MUSIC)

Synthesist Jeanne Newhall's winter collection is this year's top syntho entry. Sixth century Gregorian chant, Bartok adaptations, Scottish bagpipe, Mexican and Appalachian carols, plus Polish and Russian Iullabies makes this set the most worldly collection by far. It's unusual and ear-pleasing with some nice astral syntho programming that mixes and coexists nicely with the wooden acoustic instruments abound. AA stations shouldn't pass this one up. Newhall does an outstanding job of being a musical Zelig by absorbing each cultural nuance from the several geographically diverse selections. Beautiful For No One To See makes us want to go back and check out the previous Newhall releases we've passed over.

A MERRY JAZZMAS - VARIOUS ARTISTS (NOVUS/RCA)


The crew at **Novus** has given us some bright stars to top our charts over the last couple years including **Marcus Roberts**, **Roy Hargrove**, **Antonio Hart** and **Christopher Hollyday**, plus seasoned vets like **Carmen McRae**, **Hilton Ruiz** and **John Hicks**. Folks like Hargrove, Hart and Hollyday use the familiar carol chords to do some high fire boppin'. Get those eight or twelve bar solos out of the way and get smokin'! The headiest Yuletidecarol goes to soprano sax player **Steve Lacy**. Even through the season to be jolly, Lacy never lets up on his passion for Monk's music and **Irene Aebi**'s arty vocals. What a hoot!

GRP CHRISTMAS COLLECTION VOL. II - VARIOUS ARTISTS (GRP)

With over two seasons to chew on GRP Christmas Collection Vol. 1, the sequel should gather a ton of double format airplay in the next three weeks. Serious Jazz ears should venture straight to Arturo Sandoval's "O Come All Ye Faithful," with its Jekyll/Hyde split between precise classical trumpet on the main theme and ballistic Bop improv. Spyro Gyra's offering, "I'll Be Home For Christmas" is straightforward acoustic Jazz as well. For Adult Alternative, we like George Howard's sweet musings on "The First Noel," Acoustic Alchemy's medieval recital of "Earl Of Salisbury's Pavane" and Nelson Rangell's minty version of "Let It Snow!"

THE SEASON - PETER KATER (SILVER WAVE)

It's hard to say why Jazz/AA beats out even Country this year for the most Christmas product released. In this case, Alternative Adult gets the nod as pianist **Peter Kater** launches into a flowery collection of piano recitals tinged with Holiday feelgood. "Amazing Grace" and "Joy To The World" cut through to the point best, without going overboard.

KEITH RICHARDS AND THE X-PENSIVE WINOS (VIRGIN)

This was originally recorded three years ago as an expensive addition to Keith Richards home audio/visual scrapbook, but soon bootlegs began surfacing, he decided to give this live package a proper release. The challenge was to release the project in the spirit in which it was created, that is, documented and filmed at the spur of the moment and roughly performed for the sheer fun of it. In many ways, this live video and CD puts Keef's Winos in better perspective than does Richard's own woven piecemeal solo debut of 1988. True, there are times when the vocals sound like Robert Palmer on a bender, but that happens when sacrifices are made in favor of feel, rather than precision. "Take It So Hard," "How I Wish," "Whip It Up" and "Struggle" (my fave) are the best snapshots of the bunch. Two lesser Stones covers include Exile's "Happy" and Between The Button's "Connection."

THE MISSING YEARS -**JOHN PRINE** (OH BOY)

Not one to wait for biggies to come to him, John Prine has stayed active on the road and at home with his own label Oh Boy. This is the first Prine collection in too damn long, so he makes this one extra, extra special. Before we get into the idol-induced blather, check out the guest list-Tom Petty, Bruce Springsteen, Bonnie Raitt, Divinyl Christina Amphlett, Phil Everly, David Lindley, John Jorgenson, Benmont Tench and Albert Lee,





Howie Epstein. So much for the shameless namedropping. While album's title is based on one of Prine's storytelling pieces, "Jesus The Missing Years," this album recounts his own missing years, melding together all the great populist Prine qualities that span the last two decades. Beautifully recorded, Prine makes it all sound so easy, you're tempted to turn off the damn disc, grab a pencil and write your own songs. Of course, it's not so easy. You need a lot of interesting friends to write about. You need a flowing sense of warmth and humor. You need a goofy voice that can convincingly rhyme "hula hoops" "therapy groups." All said and done, I'd have to pry Prine into my all-time Songwriter Top Five. In our business, you're only as good as your last one. So, if The Missing Years is a flawless masterpiece (as it certainly is), I guess that puts John Prine's stature in dues-paid good standing. A true American treasure. They oughta name a drink after him.

BLUES CRUISE -DENNY FREEMAN (AMAZING RECORDS)

At the time the aforementioned Keith Richards was touring solo, Texas guitar statesman Denny Freeman had already released two albums of his own. Both have been repackaged onto one CD. My advice is to first set your CD machine on repeat and start with track 10, which begins with the more recent of the two albums, Out Of The Blue. Like Eric Johnson, all produced by Heartbreaker Denny Freeman is hailed by fellow Texas stars, in this case both Vaughan brothers. In Jimmie's words, Freeman is "an elegant wildman stylist who taught me how to play rhythm." The prime difference between Johnson and Freeman, for instance, is the difference between Austin and the rest of Texas. Freeman, like Danny Gatton, favors the brittle, biting Fender attack, mixing styles like rock, blues, twang, shuffle, slide, grit and even, fellow hodads, a little surf and turf. Guests include all kinds of players like Jimmie Vaughan, T-Birds Kim Wilson and Fran Christina, Angela Strehli and Stevie Ray's drummer, Chris Layton. BLUE...not BLUES -EARL THOMAS (BIZARRE/STRAIGHT)

When the holidaze come round, I get blue. Who doesn't? After all, as Earl Thomas sings here, there is a distinction between "blue" and "blues." Thomas, who comes to us via the newly revived Straight/Bizarre label, sings a wicked collection of modern stand-up blues compositions. Like a Cray or a Robert Palmer, Earl approaches his brand of "blue" with a classy, rock/soul-launched sophistication. His approach is far from silky. Instead, the voice dictates the needs of the back-up playing, which is sort of a cross between MG's Stax and New York/ Jersey/Philly Atlantic soul. Thomas has the spark of a newcomer as opposed to the reputation of an old-timer. Throughout, he swerves from rocky territory on the opening gem, "I Sing The

Blues" to the mid-point "Your Love" to an Otis-esque "I'll Be Here" (recently covered by Solomon Burke) to the uptown "The Way She Shakes That Thing" back to the Chicago/ Wolfish "Nothing Left To Lose." I like the way Earl Thomas does the do. Hotcha!

JELLYFISH COMES ALIVE - JELLY FISH (CHARISMA)

A direct path to sainthood around here is to cut a reverent cover of a Badfinger classic. In Jellyfish's case, the band goes all out, cutting No Dice's "No Matter What" that apes the Apple sound right down to Leslie-guitar detail. This is a vibrant tweener EP that hints that Jellyfish will be capable of big things next time they record the grand sophomore follow-up. A little live ditty to munch on until that day comes.

PORTRAIT OF THE BLUES -**BOBBY "BLUE" BLAND** (MALACO)

On precisely the same blue subject, Bobby "Blue" Bland is back with ten songs hatched during a commute between Muscle Shoals, Alabama and Jackson, Mississippi. Produced by Wolf Stephenson and Tommy Couch, the Malaco brothers who bring us those great records by Latimore, this sounds like a letter from an old friend. Of course, Bland is the absolute master of fronting a blues orchestra. He probably sees more of America than any touring musician this side of B.B. King. Portrait Of The Blues is given reverent treatment on both sides of the glass, especially on a song like "Hurtin' Love," which fits Triple B like a glove. It's the kind of happy/ sad song Bland eats for breakfast with one hand tied to the chair. The good news is that after that, there's nine more. Ouite







It seems like we never quite catch up, but space is limited, so if you sent something and it didn't get any attention, maybe we didn't have room. Then again—maybe it s**ked. You might notice that a couple of the releases on this page have been out for a few months. These are records that took awhilethat slowly grew on their respective reviewers, and we humbly submit them (albeit lately) for your consideration. Maybe, like us, you missed them the first time around. Then again, maybe we s**k. I really hate year-end Top Ten lists, so I'll just mention a few of the things that made me really happy in 1991: Unrest - "Yes She Is My Skinhead Girl" 7" (single of the year!), WEEN, Nirvana, Barbara Manning - One Perfect Green Blanket, Yo La Tengo - That Is Yo La Tengo, Smashing Pumpkins, Toiling Midgets "Golden Frog" 7", American Music Club, Pavement, Sleepyhead, Love Child, Uncle Tupelo - "Still Be Around" from the disc Still Feel Gone, John S. Hall And Kramer -"The Birds," Texas Instuments - "Crammed Into Infinity" (the song more so than the album), Matthew Sweet - "Girlfriend" (ditto), Pouch-"Mr. Rabbit," Scrawl, Fugazi, the Soul Asylum demos, the 3-Ds and Drunken Boat, Beat Happening, the Finger and Metal Flake Mother singles, Les Thugs, The Picketts - "Should I Stay Or Should I Go," X-Tal (recent shows indicate that their next record should be godlike), the lyrics to Thin White Rope's "Dinosaur," Buffalo Tom, and local unsigned acts Little My, The Billy Nayer Show and Starpimp. And, Ice-T and Chuck D. were downright inspirational at their press conference (and not at all inspiring at the Artist Encounter) at CMJ. I'm sure there's more, but most of it's white, most of it's American, and quite probably it's pop. No diversity. No apologies. Happy Holidays. SEANA BARUTH



SUPERCHUNK - NO POCKY FOR KITTY (Matador Records, 611 Broadway, Suite 712, New York, NY 10012, (212) 995-5882)

Peering out from under youthful guitar verve, endlessly cascading cymbol crash and feedback is a sound not unlike Dinosaur Jr. high on No-Doz. Although considerably more alert than the aforementioned group, Superchunk is nonetheless nearly lost inside a storm of instrumentation. Meanwhile,



harmonies on songs such as "Sprung a Leak" mesh spontaneously, reinforcing the unrehearsed-yet-intense sound the band wears like a pair of worn-through-in-the-butt jeans. On their latest album, No Pocky for Kitty, Superchunk ends up with a sound as completely realized as a pop band can manage on an indie-level production budget. Exploiting their fullness of sound, the band nearly sinks into a kind of Nikki Sudden bog on the song "Seed Toss," only to find their way back into a conclusion that disposes of all ambiguity and speaks from a position of power. The good-time, sing-along feeling generated by the first track, "Skip Steps 1&3," shows that despite occasionally jarring guitar tricks, the upbeat would prevail even if the lyricscould we discern them without spraining something—proved to be as life-affirming as a poisoned well. MY DAD IS DEAD - CHOPPING DOWN THE FAMILY TREE (Scat Records, P.O. Box 141161, Cleveland, OH 44114, (216) 341-4843) Some things are worth waiting for. While the rest of the world was holding out for the new U2 or the new MJ, I was pining for the new My Pops Is Dead, and it doesn't disappoint. "Deliver Me Home" cuts straight to the chase with desperate guitars and a puncturing bass drum. The elephantine cry of Mark Edwards' guitar kicks off "Journey," and the chorus vocals swim and glitter. Beginning with 'Come To Me" the guitar becomes docile and it's hard to recall its earlier fury. "Come To Me's" background organ chords and "Without A Doubt's" backing vocals are details that add a lot to these songs. While Edwards' introspective lyrics can get preachy at times, there are silver linings of a carefree "it doesn't matter what happens next" attitude that shine through. The music maintains this freshness throughout and renders Chopping Down The Family Tree not a chore, but a pleasure. DAVÍD BERAN

SOMA HOLIDAY - (Tapestry Records, 2269 Chestnut St., #143, San Francisco, CA 94123, (415) 771-5290)

The Gammas and Epsilons of Aldous Huxley's Brave New World ingest the drug soma recreationally and embark on soma holidays, raising an impenetrable wall between their minds and reality. Soma Holiday's sound explores this in-between terrain—the shadows, doors and twilights that fall between things. "Hegemony" embosses a chanting

guitar onto prodding drums and reveals Michelle McTamaney's brimming vocal spectrum. The most fetching of these dozen tracks is "Mary" in which endearingly melodic guitar combines with the hypnotizing bass to spirit us into another realm. Ethereal vocals disclose that "Mary's not breathing anymore" and complement the instuments perfectly. Straightforward simplicity and jubilant keyboards make an appearance on the churning instrumental "NRF," and the guitar's simple progression in "Looking Away's" refrain leaves a memorable impression. Treat yourself to a soma holiday, for hearing this has the effect of disarming reality and exalting what really counts in life-the mystery. DAVID BERAN

EAST ASH - ELLIE (C'est La Mort, P.O. Box 91, Baker, LA 70714, (504) 774-8286)

From demented minds come demented sounds. Witness the odd collaboratory effort known as East Ash. On their second release, this four piece takes on subject matter that is, at times, downright frightening. Here's a cheery bit from "Push!": "My mother's only daughter/Fishin' for her bleeding baby in the water/I think I'd better go now/'Coz I'm the one who shot her." The eerie "Break Your Back" is the standout track on this release. With slow and building fury, it creates an atmosphere not unlike the notoriously offcenter The Mission. By glancing through the lyrics, it is evident that singer and songwriter Jeff Rogers likes the dark side of things, and the odd "Green Chevy" and the chilling "North Pole Butterfly" only add to the mad nature of this out-of-control Ellie. 



A hit during the spring and early summer of 1974, the song just seems to fit even better into the winter mood. Women loved the original and they're bound to appreciate this nineties' rendition by a remarkable vocalist who was riding high on the chart alongside The Stylistics, who made it a hit nearly eighteen years ago.



LUTHER VANDROSS - The Rush (Epic)

As he's done so often the last few years, it didn't take long for this Luther effort to rush into the Top Ten at Urban Contemporary stations around the country. Those crystal clear vocals simply glisten on top of this classy mid-tempo production destined to please a wide spectrum of the audience.


