BMG FORMS NEW DISTRIBUTION NET

BMG Distribution has started up an independent network to cover sales and distribution of what the company calls "nonmainstream genres" that include alternative, world, street and dance music from BMG-owned / ventured labels.

"The independent distribution network allows BMG to get exposure for new non-mainstream music through independent distribution channels that work with the smaller retail establishments," said Pete Iones, president of BMG Distribution. "Many of the artists we will distribute through this system are new, unproven talent that can benefit from the kind of handling independent distributors can provide."

According to Jones, the new network will concentrate on smaller retailers, who, the company believes, are the starting point for new product. "The relationship we'll share with the independent distributors will be a reciprocal one-the independents will enjoy the credibility and stability of working closely with a major like BMG," said

Rick Bleiweiss, Sr. Vice President, Marketing, who was instrumental in developing the new network. "In turn, BMG will greatly benefit from the extended reach these independent distributors have into the smaller retail establishments that often prove integral to breaking young, 'baby' acts."

Heading up the new network is Candace Masengale, currently Director of Mainstream Marketing for BMG Distribution. Her title will be Director of Independent Distribution.

Peterson to KDWB

Kevin Peterson, formerly program director at KKXL (XL93)-Grand Forks, ND has been named music director/midday personality at KDWB-Minneapolis. He replaces "Mr. Ed" Lambert, who transferred to KDWB's Midcontinent Media sister station, Z104 (WZEE)-Madison, WI.

"This is the culmination of an extensive search," said KDWB program director Mark Bolke. "Kevin's knowledge of and experience in all facets of programming, along with his strong desire to return to KDWB and the Twin Cities area, made him the logical choice."

Broadcast Job Market Shrinking

According to an FCC Report, the number of people working in radio and television in 1991 dropped 20,000 from 1989—175, 599 to 155,311. The position that suffered the most cutbacks was "Office/Clerical," which went from 24,090 in 1989 to 19,336 in 1991. "Officials and Managers" dropped to 31,537 from 37,236, and "professional" which includes air personalities and newscasters went down to 48,117 from 54,272.

Despite that pessimistic report, the FCC says women and minorities made gains in the industry despite the recession. One-third of all "officials and managers" are now women and one in eight "officials and managers" are minorities. A little more than half of all "sales workers" (51.3%) are women, the commission says.

The one segment of the business that's hiring is cable, which went from 84,163 employees in 1987 to 106,771 in 1991.





THE LOSER SYNDROME

wo of my recent columns have dealt with the problems and opportunities in AM radio, particularly for music formats. In going through my file of past columns looking for something, I came across a column called "The Loser Syndrome" in the issue of August 17, 1984, which seemed to me to be as pertinent today as it was then. With your indulgence, let me reprint it here:

I recently had an interesting conversation with a programmer whose manager is unintentionally making his station a loser. I thought perhaps it might be useful to print the steps by which this can be done, since there are stations in every market that have used these rules, and proven they really work.

1) When the ratings come in, begin to fret and worry when the station slips from #1 to #3 or so. Ignore the fact that more sophisticated and selective programming by more and more of the competing stations make it difficult to dominate the market, as before; *ignore the fact that such changes are within the*

The day Reid showed up to do his guitaring, the elevator was broken in the facility and he had to walk up 10 flights of stairs with the guitar-but held a great attitude and finished in three takes. The album is due in September. Living Colour is currently working on their new album with their new bassist, Doug Wimbish.

Frank Zappa's live anthology You Can't Do That On Stage Anymore is perhaps one of the most ambitious live retrospectives ever released on compact disc. The twelve-CD set (being released in six two-disc volumes) docu*margin of error of the rating service*. Fail to notice that the station's position is still strong, and concentrate only on the slippage.

2) Pay no attention to the cume performance as the share slips; don't concern yourself that the cume is the station's *circulation* (in newspaper terms), and the share simply depicts the *efficiency* of the station in reaching that cume. Refuse to understand that efficiency problems can be fixed, but that circulation, once lost by intemperate programming changes, is extremely hard to regain. In fact, become a standout in this category by not even knowing what your cume is.

3) Decide to "blow off the teens" by eliminating teen appeal. Accept the reasoning that somehow alienating teens will make the station more acceptable to adults. Sneer at the idea that simply making the station more appealing to adults would attract adults, and would not necessarily diminish the appeal of the station to other age groups already in the cume. In fact, believe completely the rationale that adults naturally prefer radio stations that teens don't; that adults are magically transformed into beings who like radio best when it's boring or talky or out of date.

4) If it's an AM station, go to a talk format, no matter how many other talk formats there may be in the market, and ignore the fact that no more than 15% to 20% of the audience in *any* market will accept talk programming. Then top yourself by concluding that just *any* talk will do, no matter how irrelevant, and overlook the fact that talk is generally the most expensive format of all (that includes news/talk and all-news).

5) When the ratings then drop sharply, fail to realize that the changes you made were what brought it about, and make more of them.

6) Out of desperation, change to a specialty format that offers short term prospects of a share increase, but that don't generally last, and sometimes result in a cume reduction (oldies...and nostalgia/big band...or two such).

Reacting to ratings declines by making kneejerk changes is a pretty surefire way for any station to slide into oblivion. Intelligent *evolution* is necessary; *reacting* is fatal.

DJ QUIK - Jus Lyke Compton (Profile) Coming off a phat gold debut, Quik continues to drop the dope funk with the new single from his second album, Way 2 Fonky. Teaming up on the drum machine with Rob "Fonksta" Bacon, the Fonk Mobb production crew provides the propa musical to certify a platinum follow up. While College Radio jocks and Northeast Mixshow producers slept on Quik throughout '91, he racked up enormous sales. "Jus Lyke Compton" is definitely a West Coast street recipe spiced with a cool bassline and bells, and it's far from wack on the plot tip as Quik reminisces about the evolution of his career and the gangsta hood resistance he experienced while touring. Album cuts are making a comeback! Up & Coming is shorter in length than during a normal week and album cuts continue to grow. Currently the two biggest sound tracks are "Mo' Money" and "Boomerang," but as our album cut section shows below, many programmers are pulling cuts from albums prior to their release. A problem that retail, as well as record companies, face are the growing number of mixes vs. the actual album cut. The consumer buys the album thinking they are going to get the version they hear on the radio that sent them there in the first place. Costee McNair, WBIL-Tuskegee, likes BOYZ II MEN's "End Of The Road" saying, "Getting good requests from this cut as well as others from the 'Boomerang' soundtrack." Rocky Love, KYEA-Monroe, agrees with him saying, "I've been here since December and I haven't had this kind of a reaction since I've been here. It's phenomenal-that record's going to be number one!" Ron Davis, WQIS-

Laurel, agrees saying, "Reaction has been great." Andre Marcel, **WDKX**-Rochester, says "Two of the hottest records I have are on soundtracks: Boyz II Men's'End Of The Road' is a smoker. 12 to 52-year-olds are calling for it. The other cut getting great reaction is **JOHNNY GILL's** 'Let's Just Run Away' from the "Mo' Money" soundtrack. Listeners can't get enough of either one." Curtis Waller, **WBLS**-New York, likes **THE RUDE BOYS'** "My Kinda Girl" saying, "It's kickin'—I just loveit!" and says about **MILES DAVIS**' "The Doo-Bop Song," that "This is a great summer song and a great tribute." 

Ending A Self-Imposed Exile

From Main Street

Q: Who is Buffy Sainte-Marie?

A: A folk legend of the sixties and seventies; a mixed blood Cree Indian from Maine who's championed the American Indian Movement (AIM); a co-writer of UP WHERE WE BELONG, an Academy Award-winning song; a semi-regular on Sesame Street; an honors graduate in Oriental philosophy and holder of a Ph.D. in Fine Arts; a devotee of the Macintosh computer, specializing in making all forms of art—from music to graphics. She does this all from her island paradise home on Kauai in Hawaii, where she's lived since the seventies.

For the first time in many years Buffy Sainte-Marie has made a new music album, using her vast life-experiences and her desktop computer. I talked with her about absence and her comeback, just before the release of the album and its first single.

RON FELL: I can't think of another artist who has been away from recording as long as you—fifteen years—who has come back as relevant. You obviously haven't been "away," you've just been in a different place.

BUFFY SAINTE-MARIE: Right. I quit recording in 1976 when my son was born. I already had enough money—I'd done fourteen albums. Although I backed off from the music business, I did it in order to remain an artist and a mommy—that's different than being in show business. I made upscale choices. **RF: How do you define your art?**

BSM: Across-the-board. Besides singing and songwriting I use my Macintosh for writing essays, stories, kids' books and creating graphic art. I do about as much graphic art as I do music, and I do it all in my Mac so I don't have to clean up. The Mac is as sophisticated in graphics as it is in musical art. When I'm doing graphics, it doesn't do the work for me, but it remembers which color I've selected, what my line was like and how hard I was pressing on my tablet with my pen.

RF: Were you able to send studio-quality material via telephone, from your home in Hawaii to your record company London?

BSM: Yes. Ensign Records is a very small company—they only have six artists: Sinead O'Connor, me and four other writers. They heard a cassette tape that I had made at home and they said, "We would like

you to make this kind of record. at home. Can you do that?" I didn't have the money to buy a twenty-four track board, and basically I didn't need it. I have a tech named Roger Jacobs and he keeps me up-to-date and keeps my studio running. Also, he acts as a facilitator for me to get the music from my studio onto tape in London. Here's how we do it: I play my keyboards, my strings and my drums on my MIDI keyboard and the Mac remembers what I play. When I get it just the way I want-when all the volume levels are nice and when I have a satisfying background track, I pick up the telephone, which is attached to my Macintosh via modem, and the music goes down the phone lines, bounces off the satellite and goes on tape in London in the studio of Chris Birkett, my co-producer. I sing the same way as always, except that my microphone, instead of being plugged into a tape recorder is plugged in my Macintosh-we make digital recordings of my human voice. If I want to do any editing, I can do it within the Mac. It's the same type of editing that recording studios would do if they were splicing parts together except it's easier in a Macintosh because I can actually see pictures of my voicewhere I'm loud, where I'm soft, where I'm not singing and where I am. It's very beautiful to see music depicted graphically. Unfortunately, we don't yet have a wide enough bandwidth to send

my voice down the phone lines the same way that I can the music. So what we do is add a click track to my vocal and that's how my co-producer in London knows how to line my vocals up with the MIDI music that I send him.

RF: Besides making music, you've stayed current with the North American Indian movement.

BSM: I have not dropped out from that scene. When I quit singing I decided to do exactly what I wanted to do. I wanted to be a mommy, I wanted to be an artist, and when people would call me up and ask me to do concerts, I would do the ones I wanted to and didn't even think about the rest. I continued to do two kinds of concerts, which were the extreme ends of the rainbow. I did big, fancy international galas for UNICEF, where they'd fly me on the Concorde, they'd put me up at the Ritz Paris, and everybody gets \$35 a day. I'd be working with dance troups from Africa and Bali, and flamenco troups, and Marlon Brando and Peter Ustinov, I kind of fit in between the ethnic and the mainstream. I love doing it. It doesn't make any money, but it's an incredible experience to be singing for such wealthy people in wealthy countries who are sending money to the poor countries. The other thing that I continued to do is concerts on reservations. I've done almost no mainstream concerts in the U.S. dur-



RATINGS AND RESEARCH

n the last article we talked about how to begin breaking apart the printed Arbitron Report in order to give meaning to the data. We looked at the 12+ level to see how people were using the radio station. Now we turn toward the target audience, which is more than the Target Audience section. The sales manager will probably look there first, since that is where the money is.

TARGET AUDIENCE SECTION


The Target Audience section is loaded with data from which we need to glean some information. There are four estimates for the metro and two estimates for the TSA for each demographic target. The estimates are for average Quarter Hour Persons, and Cumulative Audience for both the metro and TSA. For the metro, Average Quarter Hour Rating and Share are added. Trivia quiz: Why not have the rating and share for the TSA as well? The reason is that in most markets the population in the TSA is much larger, but the radio listening to metro stations tends to be less than in the metro; therefore, the ratings and shares would be lower than the metro. Second trivia question: Why are these the target demos? The target audiences that are published were selected because advertisers and their advertising agencies have decided that they are the most important ones for placing advertising buvs.

Ahead of time, prepare an analysis sheet that will give you the last year's data for the

metro. See the Table. Leave room to enter this book's data. You will want to do this analysis for each key daypart. You will want to calculate the average for the year for the Average Quarter Hour and Cume estimates. Do not average the Rating and Share estimates, but do calculate and add to the chart the time spent listening by quarter hours. Frankly, it's easier to use quarter hours than it is hours and minutes. Compare this book both to the average and the previous report. Look for a trend. The trend is from book to book, for each of the estimates is measured against the average.

Also, calculate what percentage the TSA



adds over the Metro audience. This is substantial in some markets, and relatively insignificant in others. This could be the sales department's "bonus" audience. It will give the programmer some indication of the importance of serving audiences beyond the metro.

How are you doing by daypart? There are fifteen dayparts listed in the Target Audience Section that require analysis. Are there any dayparts that have been significantly affected? Was this expected? What are your best dayparts for Average Quarter Hour? What are the best dayparts for Cume? Is there an outstanding Share by daypart?

This is the section of the report where your sales manager will be spending much of his time. Be sure to share anything that you learn here that might help the sales department.

ETHNIC COMPOSITION

If the ethnic market is critical to your station, examine the Metro Ethnic Composition section to determine the percentage of the station's audience that is composed of Black and/or Hispanic audience. Some Top 40 stations are finding that a substantial portion of their audience is composed of ethnic audiences. Hispanic does not mean that the survey respondents are Spanish speaking, rather that they are of Hispanic heritage. Some News/Talk stations also find that they have substantial ethnic audiences during certain parts of the day. This subset of the station's audience must be considered part of the target audience analysis.

SPECIFIC AUDIENCE SECTION

The Specific Audience Section is extremely

important to a program director, because this section shows estimates for each age/sex cell and for each daypart. The first thing you are going to notice is that these numbers "bounce" because the sample is relatively small. However, look for patterns. The pattern is the relationship between age/sex cells within the daypart and estimate you are examining. Although there are seven estimates on this page for analysis, one more should be added. That is, Time Spent Listening for the metro. Examine each age/sex cell in your target demo and one cell on either side of the target to see if the station is shifting / skewing in ages. How do the Men estimates compare to Women estimates? Is your station skewing as desired or as appropriate for the format? How does it compare to last book or last year?

You should track not only for your station, but also for your direct competitors and the Metro Total at the bottom of the page. The Metro Totals will help you understand some share shifts that might not otherwise be noted. For example, if your station's Average Quarter Hour stayed the same from the last book but the Metro Totals dropped, your share would increase and this can happen in the reverse as well, of course.

EXCLUSIVE AUDIENCE

The Exclusive Audience section provides a percentage of the cumulative audience that is exclusive for five prime demographic targets in five major dayparts. Exclusive listeners are a subset of the First Preference listeners, hence it will provide a hint as to your station's success at getting listeners to choose your station more often than all others.


HOUR BY HOUR

The hour-by-hour section provides both an Average Quarter Hour Persons and average Quarter Hour Rating for five target age groups, and for both Men and Women. Just lav a ruler down on the page and let your eye glance across it, and you're seeing audience flow. Reading across the page, you can follow the audience flow by hour from 5AM to 1AM by demographic group as well as 12+. You can compare the cell to the 12+ share for that hour. You can also add men and women together to achieve a Persons estimate. Are there hours that are less than expected? Is your target audience consistent with the 12+? If there is something unexpected you may want to compare to the previous book or the same book last year?

This completes the first phase of Target Audience analysis—what is learned in the book. In an upcoming article I'll show you some analyses beyond the book.



LIVE AT FAT TUESDAY'S -

FREDDIE HUBBARD (MUSIC MASTERS) Only Freddie Hubbard knows if this band-Javon Jackson on tenor sax, Christian McBride on bass, Tony Reedus on drums and Benny Green on piano-will continue as his live band. For all we know, the ambitious trumpet/fluegelhorn vet has already moved onto other projects and ideas. Recorded live at New York's finest shoe box showcase, Live At Fat Tuesday's is a piercing double CD set dedicated to showcasing a thriving young Bop band made up of tomorrow's torchbear-

ers. This was recorded in memory of Art Blakey, and appropriately, Hubbard adopted Art's strategy of hiring young sidemen who will use the experience to become tomorrow's influential band leaders. Hubbard himself was the first Blakey make-good, and both Green and former Harper Brother Jackson gigged as Jazz Messengers during Art's final laps. During the actual recording, Hubbard's spiky, stratospheric, high register trill must have cracked a few glasses in that East Side cubbyhole. As tightly knit as the band sounded that night, Hubbard's leading presence rises


to the apex on a seamless samba by Green titled "Phoebe's Samba." The final two tracks on disc two, "Destiny's Children" and "First Light," pay homage to Hubbard's CTI days, when the only thing that kept him from total Downbeat Poll domination was the presence of Miles, the king himself.

DOO-BOP - MILES DAVIS (WARNER BROS.)

And speaking of the king, here comes the boffo/bass/hip-hop sounds of Miles Davis'

final recording, done just before he entered the hospital last September. Doo-Bop turned out to be Miles' last chance to expand past Jazz ears toward young urban listeners entrenched in Rap. The never-look-back attitude that made Miles the top musical visionary turned many young rock n rollers into total music fans. Whatever Miles hopes-as he looks down from Jazz heaven-will happen to Rap folks after one listen to Doo-Bop, happened to many rockers when In A Silent Way and Bitches Brew invaded their unsuspecting ears. Will rappers feel the same buzz we felt when we heard the seminal chord changes of "Spanish Keys?" Producer Easy Mo Bee provided Miles with sampled musical undercurrents to play over. The solos and trumpet conversation is authentic-stellar Miles all right. Will rappers respond? The sparring "Blow" and the set's melodic jewel, "Sonya," could be the Miles Davis 101 course that will hook them. Rap opinion leaders like Paris long ago predicted Jazz would some day infuse Rap consciousness. It's somewhat immaterial whether or not Jazz radio will play Doo-Bop, even though it should make room. Miles didn't know he had only a few months left when he decided to explore Hiphop. It would be a fitting legacy to the late champ if Urban and Rap ran with Doo-Bop. I'm sure other Jazz players would gladly help pick up the slack and expand on Miles' last musical crusade if it kicks in.

BALLAD AND BLUES MASTER -JOE WILLIAMS (VERVE/POLYGRAM)

Just the other day, Spin Magazine publisher Bob Guccione, Ir. interviewed the legendary Tony Bennett. Bennett eloquently recalled how he borrowed not from the singers of the day, but from Jazz players. Drawing from soloists like Stan Getz, Art Tatum and Ben Webster, vocalists like Bennett and Joe Williams developed an impeccable sense of dramatic phrasing. In fact, Bennett specifically cited Williams as a major influence because he helped develop Pop/Jazz. Williams' groundbreaking continues with the 1987 live Ballad And Blues Master. Whether it be the bop scat of "You Can Depend On Me," the jumping of "Who She Do" or the majestic blues of "Ain't No Use," Williams' economic delivery helped rewrite Jazz vocal history. This belated live disc punctuates that fact.

SMILE - MARILYN SCOTT (SIN-DROME)

Marilyn Scott, with her technical vocal wizardry, has many fans. I remember Warner Bro' Ricky Schultz telling us what a fantastic singer she is. It seems fitting that Scott's latest appears on Sin-Drome, the home of another artist's artist, Bobby Caldwell. Unlike AA staples like Enya and Basia, Marilyn uses a straight-ahead, more conventional pop approach. Like Caldwell, she transforms a potentially mundane, sugary pop message into high-caliber vocal material. Scott challenges, pokes and prods each tune. We like Caldwell's "Giving Up On Love," the churning opening title track and "Walkin' My Way To You." For expanding Adult Alternatives, break format with the rounded explosive funk of "That Man On My Mind" (featuring Brenda Russell). Commercial Jazz radio could do the same with Marilyn's smoldering version of the Eddy Arnold chestnut, "You Don't Know Me."

THE LABOR OF LOVE - KEN NAVARRO (POSITIVE MUSIC)

From the nation's capital comes guitarist Ken Navarro, who hits his stride with some swirling solos and super melodic compositions. Pianist Stef Scaggiari, who has his own recording on the Concord Jazz label, glides along with some virtuoso keyboard support. "Hands On The Wheel" is a sweet, spiraling cut with Navarro on electric guitar. Even when Navarro plugs in, he executes in an acoustic style. "From Now On" features Scaggiari's acoustic piano accents, and they mix eloquently with Navarro's ambidextrous brew of acoustic melody bursts, electric counter-leads and keyboard synth pows. The Labor Of Love is getting serious Most Added attention these days.

JUST AN ILLUSION - NAJEE (ORPHEUS/EMI/ERG)

After wowing the crowd as a headliner at the KIFM listener's concert fest, Najee takes his place as a mass appeal Jazz charmer alongside Kenny G, Grover Washington and David Sanborn. Just An Illusion, Najee's fourth album, is brimming with those magic, undulating Urban vocal and rhythm beds that give his music its velvety, full-bodied bouquet. His bevy of woodwinds (soprano, tenor, alto and flute) usually take on an ultra-serene feel—and they're most at home countering off background or primary vocal tracks, as portrayed by the rolling, gospel-flavored title cut. Like Kenny G, Najee responds to his audience's sentimentality with lush cascades of notes articulated with a floating, rounded attack. For those who prefer a more direct approach that's away from they Quiet Storm mode try "Loving Every Moment," where Najee takes his most unbridled, ambitious solo stance. Also check out the multi-track flute fest entitled "Skyline" if you're looking for a vehicle that showcases Najee's more basic improvising instincts.

<u>RE-BIRTH OF THE COOL -</u> <u>GERRY MULLIGAN (GRP)</u>

On Gerry Mulligan's early Cool recordings, be they with Chet, Miles or Gil, or on his own as leader, there was always a thriving spirit of experimentation. Arriving in Post WWII New York as an arranger, Mulligan was attracted to Bop's panoramic possibilities. As an experimentor, he flirted with pianoless small combos and baritone sax solos. Re-Birth Of The Cool is an impressive, timeless revival of Mulligan's major contributions: the intimate feel of large ensembles; supplying Bop with its intricate Big Band identity on a decidedly low key dynamic range; his implementation of instruments like french horn, tuba and baritone sax to broaden the sound scope. Mulligan helped Bop maintain its fierce independence while allowing it to progress without resorting to revisionist tactics. Mulligan hits the road with this hittin' tentet in time for GRP to celebrate their tenth (here's that magic number again) anniversary. This smokin' update reminds us that Mulligan still has the flair for creating ultimate Cool sounds.



NNENNA FREELON (COLUMBIA)

It's gratifying to see newcomer Nnenna Freelon get the same burst of enthusiastic label attention as Mariah Carey, Harry Connick, Jr., Anita Baker or Whitney Houston. Nnenna has the pipes to pull off such bold comparisons. Jazz radio has the chance to hop aboard first here. Nnenna has outstanding articulate powers and her grip of the material is robust and flawless. The almost operatic opening strains of "Skylark" will no doubt bring out comparisons to Ella Fitzgerald. Her control and vibrant delivery shines on the boppin', uptempo "This Little Light." Whether accompanied by the intimate, assured rhythms of Grady Tate and Ron Carter on "Future News Blues" or expanded orchestral nuances on "The Island" and "Stella By Starlight," Freelon adjusts her timbre and projection with stunning ease and confidence. Be it smoky jazz, sophisticated ballads or classical orchestral tones, Nnenna grasps the necessary intimacy or staginess on her debut record's diverse songbook.

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ing this period, but I have done lots of reservation concerts in both Canada and the U.S. Some of them were real funky, and others were in big fancy halls, given by Indian groups in urban areas.

RF: Do you find points of common interest between native Americans and native Hawaiians?

BSM: Absolutely-in protecting the land, which until very recently has not been understood but is now beginning to be. There are great similarities, and a very warm feeling between Hawaiians and Indians. Daniel Inouve, the senator from Hawaii, is the head of the Senate Subcommittee on Indian Affairs. Native Hawaiians are considered to be Native Americans. They face many of the same problems. There's a strong identification and yet, just like Indian nations are individual and don't have a whole lot on common except for our mutual oppression, native Hawaiians are very proudly aware of what's unique about their culture. For several years I've been part of something called the Native American/Hawaiian Cultural Exchange where we bring about 30 people at a time to Hawaii for dance and music and food and conversation. Linvolve schools and museums. I have a collection of bead work and Indian art and writings that I donate to the Indians at this time. I'm a teacher, so I still do teaching from time to time. RF: Has your son Cody picked up

things from the Hawaiian culture? BSM: He's grown up more in Hawaiian culture than he has in his own culture. His dad is a Sioux and I'm a Cree, but Cody did a lot of traveling during the time that we were doing Sesame Street and before he was in school. I would bring him on tour with me. When he was really little I used to make a bed out of my open guitar case and he'd sleep there. By the time it was time for us to quit Sesame Street and for Cody to go to school, he liked staying home. He loves Hawaii. It's very multi-ethnic. He's going to school with kids from mixed-blood families who've been in Hawaii for generations, and also people that are half-Japanese and half-Californian, part Tahitian or part Dutch, from Samoa or China or blonde surfers from San Francisco. It's so multi-ethnic and that's part of the reason both he and I like to live here. It's really exciting, we all celebrate each other's holidays and it's a very fresh atmosphere. He's very much part of the Aloha spirit of Hawaii and he's proud of his own heritage but he's not an AIMster (American Indian Movement). He's very much interested in working for better ways for everybody as opposed to just centering on his

own heritage. RF: What do you think of "Dances With Wolves," and Robert Redford's documentary, "Incident at Oglala"? BSM: I'm very glad they were done. I haven't seen "Incident" yet, but I've been aware that Robert Redford had the rights to it for some time. For years we've been waiting for this thing to be made. He's spent a lot of years around this project and I expect it will be good. I thought "Dances With



Wolves" was wonderful for its type of movie. I can't fault it. When I was watching it, I was thrilled that non-Indian people would finally get to go inside a teepee and see an alternative form of government—called democracy—at work.

RF: In the past, you've talked before about Native Americans inventing democracy.

BSM: Yes. George Washington and Benjamin Franklin were among a small group of white people who were outnumbered by native people. They had some wonderful diplomatic dealings with the Iroquois Confederacy on the Canadian border in upstate New York. Washington and Franklin were men of letters and they wrote back to their friends in England and Europe that they had found a true working democracy 1,100 years old. They were thrilled about it. Greece was not a democracy, and they did not invent democracy. Greece was society of slave holders and writers. They wrote about the idea of democracy but they didn't really do it. So the first time European people had ever come across a democracy was in their contact with the Iroquois Confederacy. They took the idea of a confederacy of sovereign states that would come together for the common good without giving up their sovereignty. It was called the Great Law of The Iroquois Confederacy, and it was a brand new idea to Europe. Of course it's what the U.S. government and the United Nations are both based on. There were other ideas that came from the Iroquois Confederacy that are very important to modern life. One of them is the idea that only one diplomat speaks at a time, which of course has been adopted by the U.S. Congress and the U.N., but not Canada or England.

A third idea which had never ever been thought of, and probably wouldn't have been tolerated in Europe which had thousands of years of warlords, was the idea that an official could be impeached by the people. That came directly from the Great Law of the Iroquois Confederacy, and Washington, Franklin and Thomas Paine were very excited by this and they adopted those three and many other ideas into the forming of the United States, which had a lot to do with the forming of the United Nations. There are still lots of ideas available in the Western Hemisphere that I think the United Nations ought to study.

RF: Is there documentation of these things?

BSM: The Great Law was documented by a system of historic records, involving shells that are woven together. If it's typed up in pamphlet form it's about thirty pages long. You can read it if you get in touch with the Mohawks or any of the people of the Iroquois Confederacy.

RF: One of the strong points of pride on the album, "Starwalker," is a song you've done before. What kind of singing is that on the intro and outro?

BSM: We call that powwow singing. It's me singing, multi-tracked. In addition to that, the first ten seconds is a sample from this cheesy old tape recording that I made on my own reservation in Canada of people walking around at a powwow. I taped it between songs. You can hear bells on people's ankles, and you can hear people laughing. I included the ambiance of the powwow to start the song out. I think it gives a feeling of warmth. It's like actually being there, and I think it makes the song more real. Kind of like giving a gift to the audience and actually bringing them someplace. And then, on the verse where it says, "Holy Light, God of the Night, Pray up your medicine song," that's Ben Blackbear, a traditional men's singer who was a very famous singer and teacher of traditional music. He

died recently. He was the lead singer for the Ironwood singers. They really ought to be a national treasure along with many other traditional Indian artists. That is a sample off an old tape that I had around, and it is used by permission and everybody got paid. A lot of artists will go forward and rip off samples of ethnic musicians when they wouldn't do that with Aretha Franklin. I really enjoy paying Indian singers. I've had a scholarship foundation for years, and I think philanthropy is the greatest. What a luxury to have enough to be able to spread that kind of joy around!

RF: Was there some specific incident that inspired you to write the single?

BSM: Yes, there was. "Disinformation," "The Big Ones Get Away" and "Fallen Angel" are all about the same man from the point of view of the woman who loved him. I think of him as Contemporary Man, even though he's actually someone I know. He's not a political figure, but he did get caught by politicians. This is a guy who competes with the rest of the boys, working very gladly for a perverse country or a perverse company. He works for his bosses and he gets off on it. Maybe they build substandard bricks, maybe they pollute the environment, or maybe he just kills people when our elected people tell him to like they do in the military. In these three songs, he's decided to blow the whistle on the big boys. What is surprising about the songs is that they are from the point of view of the woman who loves him, so we see this person through compassionate eyes. His woman watches him stand up and tell the truth in court and get utterly destroyed in public for having been honest while his bosses profit. So in "The Big Ones Get Away" he's James Bond, he's a hired gun or a general and he's working for Mr. Big and he's very proud of it. But his woman knows his obsession, and she sees him tell the truth to Congress, she sees his superiors lie, she sees him sell him out to protect their own careers. She'd love to free him from his obsession. but she can't. He's like an addict. He is who we've trained him to be, and that's how we train men in the Western world. RF: The intrigue of that song is in its obliqueness-that it can be taken in so many different ways.

BSM: If love junkies want to change the world, it stays the same. Money junkies hire all the smart ones, power junkies run the game. The man is in an unfair situation. We train our guys to fall into this trap. We dazzle them with the fact that maybe someday they'll be able to pee farther than the big guys. It's very much a European male syndrome. There are alternatives to being that way, but that's for the next record!

LIVE IN JAPAN SAMPLER - GEORGE HARRISON (DARK HORSE/W.B.)

George Harrison resurfaces for Album Radio with some preliminary tracks from a Live In Japan package due soon. Eric Clapton's band provides crisp accompaniment for what was a very rare onstage collaboration. One can only guess that the gig happened in Japan in order to create a less pressurized environment in which to roll tape. Then again, why do Mickey Rourke, Sly Stallone and Woody Allen choose to appear on TV commercials in Japan and not here? Without benefit of a personnel scorecard, "Something" and "While My Guitar Gently Weeps" sound like the tracks that best typify Harrison and Clapton's legendary coziness as a guitar duo. As a long time fan of both, I've always had difficulty telling the difference between their rhythm and slide guitar styles; they seem to mesh very well here too. Also included on this pre-release is "Cheer Down," the lyrically cheeky ditty Harry Georgeson contributed to Lethal Weapon II. A nice segue to the current LW3 soundtrack?



"SUMMER SONG" - JOE SATRIANI (RELATIVITY)

It's been quite awhile since Joe Satriani's last release—1989's Flying In A Blue Dream, but the superguitarist finally has a record ready for the nineties. It took quite a while for Joe to finish his up-



coming release, The Extremist, because of a expressed need to capture the perfect live-in-the-studio sound. After bringing in Stones/Van Halen producer Andy Johns, Satriani slowly realized his goal of intense musical interaction between the bandmembers. "Summer Song" promises to be the rock anthem of the set. Satriani rocks, rolls, squawks, screams and raves. "Summer Song" is the catchy, hooky fare that will sizzle on Album airwaves. This and other tracks should thin the gap between Satriani's platinum album capability and his burning, jaw-dropping live show.

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"NONSTOP TO NO-WHERE" - FASTER PUSSYCAT (ELEKTRA)

When you see videos of Guns N' Roses and Aerosmith, their rock n roll image is so ingrained that you couldn't picture them doing anything else. Faster Pussycat definitely fall into that category. Their almost caricature delivery smacks a little of the New York Dolls-the glitter mump band who introduced colored leather jackets and trans vamp camp to the Seventies rock scene. The Pussycats primp and paw, hem and haw through the clever chorus: "I'm on the late train /I got a first class ticket/On a nonstop to nowhere/ Where it takes me I don't know."

"CRIMINALS" - T BONE BURNETT (COLUMBIA)

"Henry" T Bone Burnett probes the criminal mind, the scourge of deviant behavior and how it exists in all of us. Are we all just walking time bombs, no different than the alien-like criminal dregs we incarcerate after we parade their remorseless faces in front of national TV news mini-cams? Is the dark side of what's in our hearts as evil as acting on it in the name of social revenge? The snaking, early **Tom Verlaine/Television**-styled guitar work digs and claws out a desperate reply.

"HUNGER STRIKE" -TEMPLE OF THE DOG (A&M)

A little re-release action from Temple Of The Dog, the band brought to you by former members of Soundgarden and Mother Love Bone/Pearl Jam. The band has that wide, bending sludge that characterizes the Northwest Alternative drone that seems pursed on the lips of every informed hipster these days. Yet like Nirvana's songs, "Hunger Strike" isn't so much outer thrash to Album ears as it is reliable, wooden guitar layers with gutsy appeal. The double vocal exchange bodes nicely with those lead-coated, malleable guitar lines.



NIGHT CALLS - JOE COCKER (CAPITOL)

Nobody has the quintessential, indestructible set of pipes Joe Cocker has. The gravel hasn't cleared from his voice in two dozen years. Night Calls was produced by three different people, but there's no evidence of major sound fragmentation or split personality repertoire here. Stylistically, Jeff Lynne's "Night Calls"

breaks away from the pack. While resembling a basement recording, Lynne's ELO-styled compressed background vocals give the track a rustic feel. As has been the custom from his very first record, Cocker has a great ear for covering unlikely oldies. In addition to applying his own personal stamp, Cocker will discover hidden nuances that may not have been picked up on the original. On Blind Faith's "Can't Find My Way Home," Joe sheds the original folkiness in favor of a tour de force, gospel approach. The Beatles' "You've Got To Hide Your Love Away," is also an out and out salute to Cocker's first hit and Beatle cover, "With A Little Help From My Friends." Pianist Chris Stainton from the original Grease Band sits in. It's all there-the swelling soul choir, the dramatic pauses, elongated lyrical delivery, gospel piano accents and crawling tempo. Quite a production.

SINGLES - ORIGINAL SOUNDTRACK (EPIC)

We'll see if Cameron Crowe's film Singles is as hip and visceral as the soundtrack collection. Represented on disc is a Seattle slew of the top Northwest bands including Alice In Chains, Pearl Jam, Soundgarden and Mudhoney. Even a limi Hendrix track is thoughtfully dropped in. Early Album Radio consensus rests with the Paul Westerberg tracks "Dyslexic Heart" and the more Replacements-sounding "Waiting For Somebody." Another favored track is the Lovemongers' live cover of Zeppelin's "Battle Of Evermore." The arrangements are stunningly similar to the original-even down to a Robert Plant and Sandy Denny sound-alike duet done with a Pagey mandolin backdrop. More Alternative-inclined ears could gravitate towards Pearl Jam's chaotic, smash up "State Of Love And Trust" or "Overblown," Mudhoney's barking satirical reaction to the scene's elite status.

SHRIMPBOAT-SMALLWON-DER (Ajax, P.O. Box 805293, Chicago, IL 60680-4114)

As a concillatory gesture for stealing my best friend, Ajax Records sent a free copy of the latest Shrimp Boat EP, Small Wonder, along with my last order. Could beit was a fair trade (sorry, Giana), 'cause this is hands-down my favorite release so far this year. Forgive my excessively nauseating analogy, but this Chicago outfit's guitar, like a sunbeam through a wind-rustled tree, is dappling, warm, shifting, elusive and soothing. In "Free Love Overdrive," as in all the songs on this four-track single, horns, usually a no-no in my book, are so tastefully incorporated that they never even threaten to dominate with a shrill or heavy hand, "Here Comes Your Ride," a lazy and rollicking offering, is tinged with bluegrass twang, and "Dollar Bill" seems quietly groovy, then smacks you with spastic brass in the break. The melancholy "Small Wonder," my favorite here, has the effect and charm of a chiming lullabye. The last record to elicit this sort of "gee-my-guts-are-swelling-up" reaction was American Music Club's Engine. That's good comp'ny. SĚANA BARUTH

7" SPOTLIGHT - VARIOUS ARTISTS, VARIOUS LABELS While we're on the subject, let's backtrack a little and consider some singles that may have been around a month or two but seem to have been pretty much over-



looked. Masters Of The Obvious released two chirpy pop gems on 7" vinyl (from Feel Good All

Over) this spring. "I Am The Cheese" is a cheesy (ahem!) bubblegum tune driven by tinnybut-grinding guitar, snare, and cymbals. It might not mean anything to you ('cause their output has been limited to two singles), but "I Am The Cheese" sounds like San Francisco's Icky Boyfriends. "I Can't Stop It," the flip, could have been a huge hit for the Monkees-a nasal-ish vocal and sparse instrumentation sap nothing from this dead-on hook built around the lyric: "And if you

wanna find love in the grocery store/You're gonna have to shop a little more." The Overwhelming Colorfast's recent single for Sympathy For The Record Industry may be your introduction to this four-piece, but they'll soon



be releasing a full-length on Relativity. "It's Tommorow," the A-side, i s n t Colorfast's catchiest tune

(guess they're saving up for the album), but it's a fine representation of this amazing live band's powerhouse combination of melody and distortion a la Husker Du. Colorfast frontman Bob Reed is, in fact, the man Bob Mould used to be, so check out the flips, "Toss Up" and "Roll The Ocean" as well. Velocity Girl's "My Forgotten Favorite" is a bounty of crashing jangle, a tapestry of sound. The hypnotic cadence of Sarah Shannon's breathy-but-nottoo-annoyingly-childish vocals (take that, Juliana Hatfield) somewhat diffuses the song's rather reckless energy. Choice. "Why Should I Be Nice To You" cops part of its central riff from R.E.M.'s 'Talk About The Passion," but since that's my favorite R.E.M. song, l'm not complainin'. "My Forgotten Favorite" is, however, the better track, and this single will be Velocity Girl's last vinyl for Slumberland, as they've been signed to Sub Pop. Those fine Seattle-dwelling folks would like you to know that they love the band so much that they'll be rushreleasing a CD-pro that'll include the aforementioned single, "Tales Of Brave Aphrodite" (VG's cut on Fortune Cookie Prize), and Velocity Girl's tracks from their Sup Pop Singles Club 7", "Warm" and "Crawl." San Francisco's Flophouse have been around for ages, but they have, in the past year or so, evolved from a folky J.C. Hopkins-guided vehicle to a

rockin' mod trio. There's something—I can't quite put my finger on it-about "Right Now," the Aside to their new-ish 7" on Harp Records, that makes it fairly inescapable. I mean, the bass line is so very dull and the chorus so commonplace ("I wasn't born yesterday/I don't believe a word that you say") that the song could very easily end up nowhere; the hook could easily fall flat. But drummer Farl (now on tour with some New Zealand band) throws in these little rolls unexpectedly, jolting things and adding edge, and Kim Osterwalder (now playing in Barbara Manning's SF Seals) harmonizes at select moments to draw you in. Also of note is "Ground," one of the two B-sides



tambourine break. Let's wind this up with some new stuff from a couple of oft-mentioned Import/Indie favorites. House Of Large Sizes' new 7" release on Westworld reinforces my conviction that this three-piece is capable of the smoothest tempo/ rhythm change-ups/segues in indie-rock. Both of these cuts, "I'm My Own Grandpa" and "Two Liter Man," have a few too many blatant metal references for my taste, but HOLS is still the best band from Iowa. And finally, local boys the Meices have a new single on Seattle's Empty Records. The A-side, "Don't Let The Soap Run Out," a testimony to the poverty of Mat Stahl, guitarist in Oakland's stellar Little My, is more of the Meices' appealingly kindergarten-y garage rock and well worth picking up. The band will record a full length disc for Empty while touring this August; check 'em out when they come to your town. SEANA BARUTH



"Dry Bones" unravels into a blisteringly loud mesh of guitar and drums and flows right into "Hate's" methodical study in abhorrance that's backed by a groovy surf beat. "10,000's" hypnotic percussion and gravy-thick bass provide the backbone for a guitar to binge, and the bizarre phone sex ending defies explanation. With screeching high ends and distortion galore, The Grifters are sort of what an amplified seance seeking Steve Albini's ghost would sound like. DAVID BERAN






THE MELVINS have found a new home at ATLANTIC records.

MINISTRY - "N.W.O." (SIRE/WARNER BROS.)

Ministry's latest (out just in time for the start of Lollapolooza!) is a

hard-hitting, industrial melee of noise and rhythm. It's relentless and unforgiving, wild and exciting, and of course, political. Just what you'd expect from Ministry—and then some. Watch out this one burns! LR

VARIOUS ARTISTS -SINGLES SOUNDTRACK (EPIC)

There's no shortage of singles on this soundtrack from the film of the same name. I guess this movie, by Cameron Crowe, concerns twentysomethings on the make, but the soundtrack is mostly about Seattle-besides lots of current big names, there's a Hendrix track included here as well. (Nonnorthwesterners Smashing Pumpkins and Paul Westerberg and enigmas the Lovemongers also provide a couple cuts.) There's a lot to consider on Singles, but we'll start with my long-time hero: if you are still in need of proof that the last Replacements record was really a Paul Westerberg solo disc, his two songs on this soundtrack should convince you. "Dyslexic Heart" sounds just like "Attitude" from All Shook Down, and the track's producer (Scott Litt) suggests it might be an outtake from those sessions. I prefer the Westerbergproduced "Waiting For Somebody" because it's a livelier little song. Other highlights include the Screaming Trees' beautiful "Nearly



P e a r l Jam's surprizing "State Of Love And Trust," Soundgarden's crunching "Birth Ritual," and Mudhoney's ironic and biting "Overblown," about the state of their hometown scene. I have my doubts about the movie (sounds like a Fox sitcom to me), but the soundtrack rules. SEANA BARUTH

BOYZ II MEN - *End Of The Road* (Motown) Sure it's in Eddie Murphy's new picture "Boomerang," but this L.A. Reid/Babyface masterpiece doesn't need Eddie's help to get exposure. Doo-Wop for the '90s in full effect. Easily qualifies as this week's RECORD TO WATCH candidate—as in watch it E-X-P-L-O-D-E!


<u>GENESIS - Jesus He Knows Me (Atlantic)</u> Hard to imagine this was a group once considered strictly the property of Album radio. Changes in personnel and musical direction, of course, made them a staple at Top 40 and A/C over the past decade. Now comes this obvious winner which has generated lots of talk since the album's release many months ago. Audiences love it in concert and they'll love it on-the-air.

<u>CELINE DION - Nothing But My Broken Heart</u> (<u>Epic</u>) Celine surpassed all expectations on her follow-up album, a release knee-deep in potential hit singles. Like she did on "If You Asked Me To," songwriter Diane Warren supplies the material and of course it's A+.

HOWARD JONES - *Tears To Tell* (Elektra) Recording in his home studio with his children nearby certainly seems to work for this highly inventive singer/songwriter. Very hip, loaded with adult appeal and produced to be Pop radio-friendly.

MACHINE IN MOTION - World In Fascination (SBK/ERG) Accomplished on just about every instrument imaginable, Robin Stefan, one half of this duo from Houston, describes their sound as romance meets dance. Robin, who's responsible for the music and his vocalist/lyricist partner, Robert Powers, played their first live gig at a "Battle Of The Bands," competing against 40 groups from across Texas and took 1st Place honors. Concern about the environment is a top priority for this pair and on this debut they send a positive message of change and human bonding to make the world a better place.

SAIGON KICK - Love Is On The Way (Third Stone/Atlantic) Those who got a kick out of acoustic-flavored Rock ballads from groups like Mr. Big and Extreme should warm up to this tune right away. In addition to some very tasty guitar work, this Florida foursome also nails it down in the vocal department.

Other fabulous moments include Johnny Gill's THERE U GO, Aaron Hall & Charlie Wilson's IT'S GONNA BE ALRIGHT and Boyz II Men's END OF THE ROAD. Also included is the matinee idol Keith Washington, the blissmeisters of P.M. Dawn, the statuesque Grace Jones and the petite Shanice. Sounds like a can't miss, comin' atcha set.
