

Said Anderson, "These reputations and caliber of man that we have representing the label are truly awesome. Not only are each of our Regional Directors excellent promotion men, they are true record people."

THEATRES CARRYING TUNES

It's been said that what's between the lines is every bit as important as what's written on them. A new promotional audio/visual service called **MovieTunes** hopes to apply this to moviegoing so that people will pay attention to what goes on between movies.

What goes on is a thirty-minute stretch of Top 40 and A/C songs accompanied by slides featuring music artists, concert dates, movie trivia, and film and home video information. Currently, 1,500 AMC Theatres across the country carry the service (500 are audio only) and Movie Tunes is talking to the General Cinema and Mann chains.

Robert G. Kardashian, founder and president of Movie Tunes, told the Gavin Report that "all feedback has been extremely positive and we're boosting sound levels so that the music's coming more to the forefront." Kardashian related that they're sticking toward older demographics and playing mostly power ballads from artists such as Mr. Big, Del Amitri, and Sass Jordan.

The eight-song, thirty-minutelong sets play continuously in theatre lobbies, concession areas and restrooms, and it's estimated that each track will be played 110,000 times over a two-week period. Movie Tunes has signed agreements with A&M, MCA, Mercury and Arista to promote artists on these labels. As Kardashian notes, "Seventy-seven percent of people that go to the movies frequently are likely to buy music. We also believe the service is ideal for the home video and soundtrack market, and new product that people may not be aware of.

"I don't perceive it as overly commercial and I think this is music you're going to enjoy," he continues. "Music videos and commercials have not done well in between movie screenings, but Movie Tunes believes that their audio/visual service is not as blatant and intrusive." The eight songs are accompanied by intros and outros by Kris Erik Stevens and selections will change every two weeks. Two weeks of play costs a label \$16,500, and a six-month package is \$195,000.

Gina Rich, manager at San Francisco's AMC Kabuki Theatre said that the service has met with mostly positive response after one week. "It's music that we think our patrons want to hear," she said.

There were a few negative comments in the theatre's suggestion box, "If however. they had a choice," Rich continued, "people would rather not hear speaking in between the songs."



Ice Cube Forms Own Label

In September controversial rapper Ice Cube will be starting up his own label, Street Knowledge, which will be distributed by Atco/EastWest Records. The company is an offshoot of the Street Knowledge management firm, will be overseen by Ice Cube and his partner/manager Pat Charbonnet. The two plan to hire eight staffers. The first album on Street Knowledge, due September 22, is **Da Lench Mob**'s *Guerilla's In The Mist*. Ice Cube has indicated that he will run a very versatile company with a diverse roster.

INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

It's common to hear managers and programmers describe their stations as "music intensive," which is interpreted to mean a minimum of talk/commercials and as much music as possible. But how about GMs and PDs at contemporary music stations who require MDs to be music intensive? Is there a lack of commitment to uncovering hits, instead waiting for them to surface? Or are they content with simply playing what's being "worked?" Aggressively searching out hit music takes time, effort and that overused but all-too-true element passion.

During his many years in radio, RCA's Lou Simon took great pains to ensure that his audience was on the receiving end of the hottest music, regardless of configuration or priority. Currently RCA's Director Market Analysis and Planning, Lou continues to listen to everything he can get his hands on, and feels strongly that PDs need to make the music director a "key cog in the wheel" not just "a librarian, a typist or a computer operator." Acknowledging the many departments program directors oversee, Lou says, only serves to support his belief that the "value of a good, active, streetwise MD can't be overstated."

From experience, Lou has found the following to be helpful: 1) "Listenin' to every album makes it possible to find some real secret weapons, many that eventually wind up becoming singles. It's always frustrating to hear programmers say 'did you hear the new Wilson Philips?' when it's the fourth single from the album. It can be played anytime. At the very least, be aware of it. 2) Spend time at clubs networking with club jocks finding out what is and isn't generating response. 3) Develop relationships at retail, especially with clerks. Getting them concert tickets or helping them get backstage when possible never hurts, but the point is to make them feel like they're part of the station family. Clerks are the ones on the floor who can really give you the pulse of the store. The early buzz comes from a group of active buyers at the mom and pops and alternative outlets, as opposed to coming out of chain or mall stores. 4) If possible, find European contacts who can score imports-work out an exchange arrangement."

When in radio, Lou also organized weekly music meetings and invited his entire air staff into the production studio for some pizza and an opportunity to hear new music, to talk about records that are burning, to get reaction, etc. By the time they went on the air, the jocks not only knew the music (intros, tempos, false ends, where to fade), they were excited about it. By encouraging them to bring in music too, Lou involved his jocks in the music selection process. His final recommendation: "Get input from as many sources as you can."

And then there's Arrested Development. Straight from the outskirts of Atlanta, A.D. put together a new sound that has not only opened the eyes of the Hip-Hop community, but also the entire contemporary music audience.

Led by Speech (Todd Thomas), producer and lead vocalist for the group, A.D. was able to step beyond the "normal" boundaries of rap and win over hard-to-please fans who are often quick to diss those who dare to venture and stray. According to Speech, the group's music is best described as "cultural/southern/Hip-Hop/ folk/ethnic/funk." Gangsters or roughnecks they're not, but neither are they soft or pop.

Arrested Development's debut album "3 Years, 5 Months and 2 Days in the LIFE of..." so named for the time it took them to get signed to a major label, tackles serious issues.


Recently, while on a promotional tour, Arrested Development, aka Speech, Headliner (Tim Barnwell), Aerle Tarre (Early Ta-Ree), Montsho Eshee Ee-She), Rasa Don, Dionne Farris and Baba Oje (O.J.), stopped by our offices to enlighten us with their thoughts.

Interview By Brian Alan Samson Introduction by Kelly Woo **BRIAN ALAN SAMSON: Explain the** whole concept behind your album, "life music" and Arrested Development? SPEECH: Arrested Development, as a unit, started four years ago. I grew up in Milwaukee, but moved to Atlanta in 1987 to pursue an education in music. Like most Hip-Hop producers, I had been deejaying parties and clubs around the area. I got my first pair of turntables when I was ten. After a while, local groups asked me to produce beats for them. Soon I started writing songs and raps, and I found that to be more exciting and creative so I became a full time lyricist and put the turntables aside. In 1988, I needed a DJ to back me up so I picked up Headliner, and that was the beginning of Arrested Development. **BAS:** Talent has consistently been pouring out of Atlanta, the so-called "new Hip-Hop melting pot."

SPEECH: Atlanta really doesn't have a true Hip-Hop scene. The dominant sound in the region is straight-up Miami Bass. As far as Rap music is concerned, bass still rules the South, There are small pools of people in Atlanta who appreciate the spiritual knowledge of Rap music, such as the college stations and the publication One Time Nation Hip-Hop. We also have our hardcore gangsta artists and dance groups, but Arrested Development is the first group to come out of Atlanta with "life music"-music that uplifts the mind. Something else that makes the Atlanta's Rap community so unique and innovative is that we have people from all over the world moving here because we have some of the most prestigious Black Universities in the nation. The mix of taste and creativity gives Atlanta's recording industry a different edge.

BAS: Arrested Development seems to be one of the first groups to incorporate live music with singing and a message of self-awareness. Was A.D. always about Black History and the validity of the church?

SPEECH: No. When I was a solo artist I used to brag about myself and how I could mack all the bitches and hoes. But studying Black History changed my way



of life as a Black man. My biggest influences were Public Enemy and Sly & The Family Stone. When P.E. hit the scene I became more aware of my culture and the struggles my people endured. Chuck got so deep into issues of racism and civil rights that it gave me the incentive to research Black history and I just began to put my thoughts into lyrics. **BAS: I understand that most of the A.D. members have active careers in creative arts.**

AERLE TAREE: Before hooking up with A.D. I sang part-time. My forte is fashion design. I design layouts not only for the band, but for different African American cultural organizations around Atlanta. RASA DON: I've been drumming for quite awhile. I used to play for various bands around Atlanta but I never thought of pursuing music as a profession. I do a lot of painting and graphic design—as a matter of fact, I drafted some of the art work for the A.D. album and for some of our merchandise.

DIONNE FARRIS: I've done background singing for a lot of bands and studio groups around Atlanta. Speech found out about me through some mutual friends and asked me to come into the studio. What got me so interested about A.D. is that it's more than just another celebrity group. All of us are concerned about Africanism. I feel that we have an opportunity to condemn the stereotypes and sexist attacks against women associated with Rap music."

BAS: "Tennessee" is about personal experiences that have affected you within the last couple of years. From what I understand, it was result of the passing of your grandmother and your brother.

SPEECH: The song contains some intimate thoughts about my family. My brother and I used to spend our summers in Tennessee with my aunts, uncles, and grandparents. My Grandmother and brother passed away one week apart, and that made me realize that many of us take things for granted—we don't think about the future and what we need to do to preserve it. "Tennessee" isn't about how beautiful the state is, it's a personal testament to people to wake up and inspire unity instead of degeneration in Black society.

BAS: Why has Hip-Hop become so segregated in the last couple of years, as on songs like Shante's "Big Mama," which disses Queen Latifah, YoYo, and Lyte. Shouldn't the Rap community as a whole support each other despite

differences in musical styles?

SPEECH: We don't agree with Shante's song, but that doesn't mean we don't support the sister. The reason there is so much separation among Rap artists and people is that everyone has something in common but we each have different interpretations because of our lifestyles. People within the Hip-Hop community have to educate themselves before making judgements and at least make an effort to understand where others come from and why they have different views. That's another reason Rap music is so heavily censored and oppressed. People outside of the Rap industry are only believing what they see instead of learning what makes up the essentials. BAS: Why did it take three years, five months, and two days for Arrested Development to be accepted by a major record label?

SPEECH: I think it was the marketing concept that the labels couldn't grasp. Our music was looked at as being borderline Alternative-Hip-Hop, and at the time we were shopping our demo, the biggest hits were either straight up, explicit Rap or the New York-flavored tribal sound. Labels had a hard time trying to figure out what type of audience would accept our abstract sound. A&R reps were really confused and scared to touch us. The one person who put aside all of the positioning was Ed Strickland.



He didn't quite understand us but told felt something there, so he took the chance and gave us a budget for our first single and an option for an album. I think one of the problems with the music industry is that people are always looking for something with a story instead of going with what they feel inside. If the lyrics say something to you and the music moves you, go with your instincts.

BAS: Where do you think Arrested Development will be in three years? SPEECH: I intend to keep Arrested Development's message directed toward the environment and social status of African-Americans. We don't want to limit our beliefs and experiences by catering to critics. The members of A.D. will never shove our message down your throat; we believe that if we want to uplift people's consciousness, our message has got to come from the spirit and soul of each of us. We want to treat people like family rather than an audience.



ere's a letter from Pat Linton, program and music director at KRDI (Music 101) in Decorah, Iowa:

"I've got a rather simple question on a rather complex, yet basic issue, concerning on-air use of licensed audio from various media.

"As a Program Director at a new station, I have been required several times by my new employer to reexamine things I took for granted as a Music Director and morning show host at my last station. The one that has puzzled me the most is something I never worried about when I did mornings. What is the legality of using 'drops' of audio as comedy bits, etc.?

"If it's legal, why are there so many of those 'rebroadcast without written consent' clauses? And if it's not legal, why do so many of us get away with doing it?

"And to make my question even more complicated than it needs to be, are there different things to consider when skimming audio from different types of media, such as videotape vs. television vs. cable?"

In my response to Pat, I wrote that his question is interesting, one that I haven't had presented to me before, and one that is rather difficult to answer right now because of apparently conflicting court rulings. The issue of using for broadcast excerpted fragments from other media seems to fall under the "Dickie Goodman" ruling.

The late master of the "novelty dialogue record" was sued many years ago for using bits taken from other records in his first release, 1956's "The Flying Saucer." Goodman continued to release such records and the matter crept through the courts. Eventually a ruling came down that Goodman didn't need permission,

The event is a benefit for the American Indian College Fund, a non-profit organization that raises funds to support 26 American Indian colleges across America. The three-day show is also being taped for a two-hour television special airing sometime early in 1992...

Summer In Paradise, the first entirely new studio album from **The Beach Boys** in seven years, has been released. The album features their trademark harmonies and the first single and current hit, "Hot Fun In The Summertime," is one of the new compositions co-written by **Mike Love** and album producer **Terry Melcher**. The ecological spirit of The Beach Boys, who recently participated in the Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, extends to the album cover. The artwork was painted by acclaimed artist **Robert Lyn Nelson**, and a poster of the cover artwork will be included in the ECO-Pak CD being released by **Brother Entertainment**, the Beach Boys own



nor pay any royalties, to borrow a line from a record to use as a response in a comic dialogue. He had a couple of dozen hits in the same genre for two decades; Dickie Goodman's biggest hit, "Mr. Jaws," came in 1975.

For the past third of a century, radio stations have made use of lines drawn from comedy records. The late Bob Crane ("Hogan's Heroes") was renowned for his ability to do this direct from records by using a cueing system manipulated by his feet. He could do it on the spur of the moment while conducting on-air interviews during his morning show on KNX-Los Angeles. In more recent years, air talent has lifted lines from TV shows and video tapes. All such use seemed to be protected under this ruling until very recently.

Now, in the past few months, a court has ruled that rap performers "sampling" other records must obtain permission first, and pay royalties. Apparently, this includes the use of very short segments (often repeated over and over, which could be the key to the distinction when a court eventually reconciles the conflict). However, since these rulings seem to conflict in the area in which radio use of recorded excerpts from other media are concerned, currently there seems to be no clear answer to Pat's question.

Since what is released on record often comes to national attention but what a radio station does may *not* come to national attention, most

label, and distributed in the U.S. by the Minneapolis-based **Navarre Corporation**. Heading up the label is industry veteran **Ron Alexenburg**, who is currently acting as consultant to the band.

Further details about Mondo Bizarro, the forthcoming album, are due any day. Their upcoming fall schedule will include a sixstations will *probably* continue to get away with such use indefinitely. But I am not a lawyer, and I am certainly not the final authority.

I did point out to Pat that stations using excerpts from TV or other media to make satirical, political or other pointed comments should avoid putting them in a context where the person excerpted could feel libeled or defamed. Not only would that be actionable, but a listener in your market might be so upset that he or she might notify the person involved—which would bring the legal light on you even if your are in Podunk.

One last related point. It's a common practice to use pieces of music in station commercial production. The assumption at radio has been that their ASCAP or BMI license permits the use of *portions* of records as well as all of them. I am informed, though, that the license does *not* cover such use in radio station. So far I haven't heard of a station being called on the carpet for that, and certainly in many cases it could be hard to establish that the music in a spot came from a particular recording, but as long as we're talking about legalities, I felt I should make you aware of that!

"LAYLA UPLUGGED" -**ERIC CLAPTON (REPRISE)**

When the alien archeologists dig up our remains, they will decipher that 1992 was not the year of Bill Clinton, the Olympic Dream Team or Ross Perot. Rather, they'll find it was spree. As a sanctuary for band members who threatening to release the superb Eric Clapton MTV Unplugged appearance even amidst a bumper crop that includes 24 Nights, Rush Soundtrack, Lethal Weapon and the live Elton and Eric show. Here is the first taste-obviously one of the few opportunities to freshen up "Layla," a song Clapton can probably play with his toes, while half-asleep.

"HOW ABOUT THAT"-**BAD COMPANY (ATCO)**

A kickin', crisp piece of rock work, custommade for nineties radio. The production is high tech enough to warrant special attention. It's rockin' enough to contribute to the continuing Bad Company legacy. "How About That" epitomizes the times—personality taking a back seat to the basics of good songwriting.

"SEEN THE DOCTOR" -MICHAEL PENN (RCA)

A sneak peak at what we're going to hear from the upcoming Michael Penn album entitled Free-For-All. "Seen The Doctor" is an arresting, electric piece, featuring a free-swinging electric band. "Seen The Doctor" is quite an arrangement. It takes quite a few twists and melodic essence of psychedelia, no matter turns, and in the last fifteen seconds evolves how far into a cloud of smoke they choose to Not unlike a three-minute car chase.

"DONNA EVERYWHERE" -**TOO MUCH JOY** (GIANT/WARNER BROS.)

Looks like a new slice of tomfoolery from the ever clever, Too Much Joy. Doesn't every city have a "Donna Everywhere?" "White teeth/ red hair/she hated underwear." Too Much Joy had a field day with their rhyming dictionary on this one. God help us when the video comes along.


DON'T TREAD - DAMN YANKEES (WARNER BROS.)

Check out the cover. Is that confidence or what? The front photo looks more like Willie Nelson after a bad day at the IRS than a follow-up to Damn Yankee's platinum debut. Tall Ted Nugent and his elfin compatriots (Jack Blades, Tommy Shaw and Michael Cartelonne) were given the green light by radio and retail when their debut record exploded on a year-long, multiple-track selling the year of Eric Clapton. Reprise has been spent much of the eighties on the road, Damn Yankees' informality stemmed from the band having fun together on ex-Night Ranger Blades' ranch in Sonoma County. With three prolific songwriters (especially the "Mighty Nuge"), material doesn't seem to be a problem, as Don't Tread is brimming with an hour of hard rock, ballads and radio-friendly rock anthems. A few all-star support men like producer Ron Nevison, mixer Chris Lord-Alge and string arranger Paul Buckmaster propelled this project into big-league proportions.

BABE RAINBOW -THE HOUSE OF LOVE (FONTANA/MERCURY)

Babe Rainbow takes its name, presumably, from a painting that hung at the Who's Eel Pie Studios. In many ways, the music included here takes on the same psychedelic colors of a bygone era. Producer Warne Livesey (Midnight Oil) takes House Of Love's surrealistic bent and guides them handily into the upper echeleons poulated by bands experimenting with dreamy techniques. With an early-Pink Floyd feel as well, The House Of Love are more melodic than counterparts like Blur and Ride. As if the band better understands the into a Beatlesque "She's So Heavy" ending. float, somebody-whether it's leader Guy Chadwick or Livesey-thought enough to

keep an eye on the kettle. Babe Rainbow never boils over with chaos and unchecked energy or distortion. Lots of favorites including "Feel," "Cruel" and especially "Crush Me." The opening single, "You Don't Understand" still reminds me of the Spencer Davis Group's "I'm A Man" to the point where I swear I hear the original rhythm track in there somewhere. Sampled perhaps?



HEARTBEAT -**RYUICHI SAKAMOTO (VIRGIN)**

In light of the term World Music, Ryuichi Sakamoto makes Cosmopolitan World Music. By nature of his curiosity and partly his expertise with technology dating back to his earlier work in Japan with YMO and especially on solo discs like the extraordinary Music Encyclopedia, Sakamoto has never felt alligence to any set format. Usually (the lukewarm Beauty being an exeception), his work is a vibrant pastiche of what's on the horizon of style and culture. In the case of Heartbeat, he's still mixing soul singing with outrageous sampling (Hendrix's "Third Stone From The Sun") and Russian rap (!?). At this point of his career, Sakamoto seems more settled, prospering as a soundtrack composer. And while his records aren't as wildly avant-garde and unpredictable as before, Heartbeat is progressively ecclectic. As is usually the case with Sakamoto's records, the technology spirals to a tranquil conclusion. Heartbeat is no exception. It ends with a melancholy "Epilogue" into "Heartbeat" which features longtime friend, David Sylvian. It is the album's most poignant moment, a testimony to Sakamoto's sensitivity and artistry.

SONGS FOR A DYING PLANET -JOE WALSH (EPIC ASSOC./PYRAMID)

No other rocker gets away with as many synth sprays, fart noises and drum machines as Joe Walsh. Maybe that's because his use of technology is always tongue-in-cheek, more like a video game or an amusement park ride than a serious, bold statement. The whole album has Walsh mostly goofing around with meaty guitar tones and catchy lyrics. "Fairbanks Alaska" is a clever collage of Walsh's experiences from catching the flu to meeting Muhammed Ali. Already well on his way towards the Album Top 10, Walsh is in the midst of his umpteenth second wind as a format favorite. Serious moments include "The Friend Song" and the concluding "Song For A Dying Planet."

"BLOOD MAKES NOISE" -SUZANNE VEGA (A&M)

Female singers are known for being introspective, but this one takes the cake. **Suzanne Vega** can hear her own blood. You can't even remotely hear her folk roots here, as she's taken on experimental patches of samples and loops. Produced by **Mitchell Froom**, who most recently led **Los Lobos** down the path of industrial self-realization.

"MACHINE GUN" -WARRANT (COLUMBIA)

Using a machine gun arsenal of guitars, **Warrant**'s "Machine Gun" is a lusty tale. All of **Jani Lane**'s senses are working—sight, smell and taste—as his erotic dream comes true in high-decibeled living color. Nice guitar solo at the 2:35 mark. What for that drop out at 3:32. If that's intentional, I can see jocks spilling their coffee all across the country.

DRY - P J HARVEY (INDIGO/TOO PURE/ISLAND/PLG)

Okay, so Patty Smith is the ultimate comparison point. P J Harvey uses her band much the same way Patty used hers when she worked with John Cale on Horses. As the title implies, it doesn't get any more "dry" that this. Since Harvey's guitar talents are—well, let's just call them basic, bassist Stephen Vaughan and drummer Robert Ellis carry a lot of the oomph. But then again, Dry isn't about one hundred guitars. (Patty didn't start quadruple overdubbing guitars until Radio Ethiopia.) It seems to be about retaining the original creative home spark. In this case, some of the songs start out like they were record at home. As heard on trax like "O Stella" and "Happy And Bleeding," the songs tend to kick into high gear, swelling into much bigger productions, though never too much to overshadow Harvey's stark poetry. Cool listening for those who crave a little under-production. Favorite trax includes "Sheela-Na-Gig" which borrows a line from **South Pacific**, "I'm gonna wash that man right outta my hair."



ROCK JUICE - FLAMIN' GROOVIES (NATIONAL RECORDS)

If **Iggy Pop** is the Godfather of Punk, does that make the Flamin' Groovies the Great Uncles of Alternative? Starting on their third decade of rockin' together, the Groovies have been through lots of incarnations and plateaus, as chronicled last year on the exceptional Sire anthology. Rock Juice is more akin to the Shake Some Action era than, maybe, the Teenage Head material on Buddah, in that the guitars are airy and chimey rather than tough. Rock Juice is centered around founders Cyril Jordan and George Alexander. Things get going with "Way Over My Head" into a chiming cover of Bryan Hyland's gooey "Sealed With A Kiss." Don't worry, though. The Groovies rough it up enough as they do throughout the rest of this credible comeback. Call 415-252-5599 if you can't find your copy. Meanwhile, here's where lots of bands started, whether or not they know or admit it.

Triple Ooops! In reviewing Moodswing's "State Of Independence" I foolishly neglected to mention that it was originally written and cut by Jon Anderson and Vangelis. As to why I chose to remember Donna Summer's cover version so vividly may have to do with my nutritional habits of late. Fruit Loops and milk in front of the TV at 11pm watching Thirtysomething reruns. Sentence me to solitary confinement inside Jon Anderson's meditation tent.

OVERWHELMING COLORFAST -OVERWHELMING COLORFAST (RELATIVITY)

"We hear so many different bands who obviously are influenced by many of the same things we are-you know, bands who love everything from The Buzzcocks to Sonic Youth to the Velvet Underground. But most of these bands seem so intent on half-heartedly interpreting their heroes. What we try to do is take the sweetest things about these bands and turn it into a two-and-a-half minute blast. We figure, why f*ck around," explains Bob Reed, lead singer of Overwhelming Colorfast. His description pretty much hits the nail on the head. One listen to the band's epyonmous debut and you know Reed's speaking from the heart-as well as from his record collection! Overwhelming Colorfasts's first long player crackles with melodic energy, and such tireless enthusiasm that it evokes shades of Husker Du. Grunge-guru Butch Vig produced this album so you know the guitars are fat and loud, but the band's sharp, sparkling pop shines through beautifully. There are plenty of great tracks to choose from, so don't be shy. My favorites include "Arrows," "Try," "Totally Gorgeous Foreign Babe," an awesome version of The Beatles' "She Said, She Said," "My Trip" and the lead track, "It's Tomorrow." Absolutely love it! LUNA -LUNAPARK (ELEKTRA)

Former Galaxie 500 vocalist/guitarist Dean Wareham teams up with Stanley Demeski (drummer of the now-defunct Feelies) and ex-Chills bassist Justin Harwood, to rise from the ashes of these bands. The first single, "Anesthesia," melodically lays Luna's crads out on the table, but "Slash Your Tires" is the track that completely integrates this imposing arsenal into a cohesive whole. The crisp guitar progression combines with precision drumming and wispy vocals to hatch a winner that should have radio legs. "Smile" is a psychedelic sojourn guided by a bouncing tumbleweed bass and Wareham's ba ba Beach Boy vocals. Demeski pulls out the percusive stops on the manic, Feeliesesque "I Can't Wait," but the real surprise is that Luna rarely sounds like any of the great bands they migrated from. DAVID BERAN

TOO MUCH JOY - "DONNA EVERYWHERE" (GIANT/WARNER BROS.)

You gotta love these guys! New York's Too Much Joy return to radio with a cheeky lovegone-wrong pop song that's guaranteed to put a smile on your face. In typical Too Much Joy fashion, "Donna Everywhere" is a funny, warped, pathetic slice of time in a going nowhere relationship, that is backdropped by a chunky guitar power-riffing throughout the story. Augmenting the band's sense of humor is a killer video directed by Teller, of Penn And Teller notoriety. Criminally ignored in the past, once again greatness beckons. LR



MICHAEL PENN -"SEEN THE DOCTOR" (RCA)

After an extremely successful run with his album March, Michael Penn returns with the single from the follow-up album, Free For All. Like his first single, "No Myth," his latest, "Seen The Doctor," flaunts Penn's amazing songwriting/storytelling talent and introduces us to a tougher, less-produced sound. The punchy bassline weaves through the song's storyline succinctly, as the guitars (electric and acoustic) come in and out of the mix. I might be missing this one completely, but for some reason, "Seen The Doctor" "reads" like a Raymond Chandler story to me. I love that. Give it a listen. LR

JOHN WESLEY HARDING- "KILL THE MESSENGER" (SIRE/REPRISE)

With every release, John Wesley Harding's songwriting becomes more poignant. His new single, "Kill The Messenger," features a socio-political storyline set to a rollickin' musical backdrop that will have you slapping your desk in time with the drums instantly. Since moving to San Francisco about a year ago, Harding has taken advantage of all the West Coast music scene has to offer, enlisting the production savvy of Steve Berlin (Los Lobos, The Blasters) as well as the musicianship of (ex-Green On Red) Chris Cacavas. Harding, who perhaps is best known for his humorous musical anecdotes, plays this one relatively straight. And radio is responding-"Kill The Messenger" is among this week's Most Added! LR



SCREAMING TREES - "NEARLY LOST YOU" (EPIC)

The first single from the Screaming Trees' newest, Sweet Oblivion, also happens to be on the successful Singles soundtrack, and "Nearly Lost You" is definitely strong enough to stand up to double exposure. Once again, Mark Lanegan's smoke and gravel vocal intertwines seductively with the groovy, melodic drone of Lee Connor's grinding guitar-Lanegan provides the subtle, insidious hook, Connor the piercing riff. Stellar! This 3song EP contains two non-LP tracks, and if "E.S.K." is a throwaway, Sweet Oblivion promises to be overflowing with amazing tunes. 1991 belonged to Aberdeen, WA. SWALLOW -BLOW (4-AD)



SINGLES by Dave Sholin

SWING OUT SISTER - Am 1 The Same Girl (Fontana/Mercury) Twenty years after she first fell in love with the song, Corinne Drewery gets to swing it her way backed by partner Andy Connell. There's nothing like a melody, and this one propelled Young Holt Unlimited's 1969 instrumental hit "Soulful Strut" the same year Barbara Acklin first sang the song. Can you say "automatic?"

ANNIE LENNOX - Walking On Broken Glass (Arista) Musically adventuresome at all times, Annie Lennox seems to enjoy exploring new directions on the first solo project of her career. A far cry from the moody "Why," this uptempo pop production allows this amazing singer to let loose with all the heart and soul that's her trademark

COLOR ME BADD - Forever Love (Giant/Reprise) Given the opportunity to work with this talented quartet, producers Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis decided to go straight for the heart with a love song from the soundtrack to "Mo' Money." It'll also be one of the remixes due out for Christmas that may include one other new tune. One listen is all it takes, but if you need some convincing, check Inside Top 40 for the stats on this week's Record To Watch.

VOICES - Yeah, Yeah, Yeah (Zoo) Following an exhaustive talent search by a Los Angeles management/production team, the latest in pre-teen acts was born. The result is not merely a cute concept as this foursome, ranging in age from ten to thirteen, perform like pros and they're supported by one catchy pop hook after another. Lots of eary interest by programmers and it's easy to hear why. But what about touring after school starts next month?

RHYTHM SYNDICATE - I Wanna Make Love To You (Impact) Every project writers/producers Carl Sturken and Evan Rogers are involved in demonstrates their P.A.S.S.I.O.N. for giving their brand of pop music just the right rythmic feel. Put these two in seclusion for a few days and they return with a year's supply of hot material. Whatever the process, it works, with proof provided by the opening shot fired from their newest album, "Sex, Life & Love."

ARRESTED DEVELOPMENT - People Everyday (Chrysalis/ERG) This week's Gavin cover story gives the 411 on one amazing act who've packaged a truly fresh sound. Odd coincidence: It's the second pick this week that reaches back to 1969, in this case a track inspired by Sly's number one hit "Everyday People." It bears little resemblence to the original, though. Already blowin' out at KMEL, POWER 106 and PGC, with adds rollin' in fast.

CHARLES CHRISTOPHER - Think About It (Charisma) Though he's a newname debuting with his album's title track, Charles Christopher doesn't arrive without an impressive background-one that includes writing Linear's recent hit, "TLC." His first song, however, was written by Simon Climie (of Climie Fisher fame) and Graham Lyle, and offers an instantly likeable blend of R&B and pop. Most importantly we both have something in common-we're major Jerry Seinfeld fans!

JEANNETTE KATT - Girl Noise (A&M) Sexual honesty and frankness is a hang-up for some folks, but not for this bright southern Californiabred talent. Listeners can decipher the message in this first release, but at first they're more likely to get caught up in the track's happy, carefree arrangement and melody. Hey, as Cyndi Lauper told us nearly ten years ago—"Girls Just Want To Have Fun!

ALBUMS by Ron Fell

BEACH BOYS - Summer In Paradise (Brother Entertainment)

If only a symbol of durability, the Beach Boys would be celebrated as inventors and practitioners of a musical genre that has survived decades of fashion and trend. With Carl Wilson, Mike Love and Al Jardine surviving from the earliest version of the band (1961), The Beach Boys, with Bruce Johnston, Terry Melcher and company mix the stylistically modern with the reverentially retro in this, the Boys' first complete album of the decade. Quartet vocal harmony, the constant of Beach Boy legacy, is once again studio-perfect from the first wave of nostalgia, represented by a cover of Sly Stone's HOT FUN IN THE SUMMER TIME, to its successor, a re-do of the Boys' first hit, SURFIN', from the fall of '61. The set hangs a figurative twelve. The change of pace comes late in the project, as the lads wax poetic and environmental on the facetiously-titled SUMMER IN PARADISE, a song complete with lyrical symbols warning that we must concern ourselves with our environment before it's too late. They're a band that has had its FUN, FUN, FUN in the SUMMERTIME and they cleverly weave old BB titles into the verse to novel effect.
