Hot on the heels of Al Coury's retirement comes the announcement that the promotion staffs of Geffen and DGC Records have been combined and will be headed up by Bill Bennett, who will be general manager of the combined staff. Bennett was previously head of promotion for DGC.

Labels chief **Ed Rosenblatt** told the *Gavin Report*, "We started working on this Thursday afternoon (10). With Al's leaving, we had to keep everything from going nuts. We had to move fast because we didn't want our artists to be hurt."

Rosenblatt also said the change came about because the labels have had only 14 new releases so-far this year, and the company doesn't expect that to change next year. "Presented with the opportunity to rethink our methods, we felt our release schedule didn't warrant maintaining two separate promotion departments."

The combined national promotion staff will include **Steve Leavitt** and **George Cappelini**, who'll handle Top 40; **Alan Oreman** and **Warren Christensen** will handle Album Radio; **Claire West** will handle A/C; **Mark Kates** and **John Rosenfelder** will handle Alternative and Metal; **Michelle Shore** and **Rochelle Fox** will handle metal.

According to Rosenblatt, the na-

tional promotion staff was meeting Tuesday (9/15) to finalize a field staff. "The DGC staff was always smaller than the Geffen staff," he said. "We will be adding to those markets. So, in a couple of cases where we have two good people in one market, we'll ask one to move, hopefully to a contiguous market."

"These changes in our promotion

MCA Records executive Louil Silas Jr. has announced the formation of his own label, SILAS Records. Product on the new label will be distributed by MCA, where Silas has been Executive Vice President, A&R/Artist Development, Black Music Division.


To-date, Silas has been instrumental in the success of some of MCA's biggest acts, including Pebbles, Patti Labelle, Jody Watley, New Edition and its offshoots.

Originally attracted to stardom, Silas decided while still in college to work behind the scenes. He has been with MCA since 1983, when he joined as West Coast Regional Black Music Promotion rep. Prior to working with MCA, he was a club jock and a promotion rep for Atlantic Records.

"It has been my dream to have my own label and to be able to see the artist development process through from start to finish," Silas said. "This progression is even more meaningful because I will still be part of MCA Records, which has been my home for nearly a decade."



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

Until this recent appointment, Crump was Vice President of Black Music for Epic, a position he's held since 1991. During the eighties, he worked at Warner Bros. Records, starting as a regional promotion manager and eventually being named Co-National Director of Promotion. His music industry career began in radio.

Dina Davis most recently held a similar position at Epic Records.

MAYNE-LINE

Four year Warner/Reprise Records Nashville vet Bill Mayne has been promoted to Vice President of Promotion at the label.

HURRICANE WHIPS UP RADIO

"We're going to blow the competition right off the map" is a familiar radio battlecry that took on a whole new meaning on Friday, September 11, in the wake of Hawaii's Hurricane Iniki. The island of Kauai's devastation includes 10,000 badly damaged homes, ruined crops and a powerless water system. On Tuesday the 15th, Kauai's phone service was still out, but we made calls to surrounding islands and got firsthand accounts of Iniki's force and aftermath, and how radio dealt with the emergency.

A/C Station KSSK/FM's newsroom worker Tom Brower told the *Gavin Report* that "We're an island away, forty minutes by plane, and our station wasn't damaged. Most of the damage was to Kauai." Brower added that "this is the station people tune in to for natural disasters and last Friday our morning show went into overdrive and Michael W. Perry and Larry Price turned their attention to public service."

Kimo Akane, Program Director at Honolulu's KQMQ said, "We're quite a ways away, but we saw a lot of wind damage. We were very prepared and dropped all music and commercials by 9 a.m. Friday morning to focus on hurricane news."

In the aftermath of Hurricane Iniki, the island of Kauai is seeking supplies for 7,000-8,000 homeless. The city of Lihue's entire infrastructure has been destroyed. Akane disclosed that "the biggest problem is that there is no phone service on Kauai, so we've set up a bulletin board (information center) for communications." A call to the local Red Cross revealed that Lihue's KONG is fielding inquiries regarding the hurricane. Damage is estimated at one billion dollars on Kauai alone.

INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

In the past two issues, **Garry Wall** made a strong case for reevaluating the importance of teens in today's programming strategy, and shed new light on long-held beliefs about teen lifestyles, income and population growth.

This week, another longtime Top 40 programmer, Gary DeMaroney, PD at FM104



(KHOP) in Modesto/Stockton, CA, offers some of his opinions on the dangers of targeting the 12-24 audience.

For starters, Gary points out, "Any station must be realistic in understanding economic goals, programming goals and the facility itself in order to produce results." As for targeting the teen listener, Gary feels that, "Few stations outside the top twenty markets can generate sales that justify the time and money" such an effort requires.

Besides the difficulty of turning teen ratings into profit, Gary cites another problem he's faced over the last several years. He claims, "The teen count has been used against us. Even if you happen to be the leading station 25-54 or 18-49, if your audience composition is a certain percentage of teens, it's used as a negative by buyers. At that point it comes down to the skill of your sales people to counter this argument. Hopefully, the salesperson/ buyer relationship is strong enough to overcome that thinking, and they buy you anyway because they're fully aware of your strength in key adult demos. In addition, you can identify teen strength in a certain daypart which exaggerates their overall importance."

Nevertheless, Gary knows of buys that "won't be made if a station exceeds a 25-30% cap on teen audience composition—whether or not you're number one 25-54."

As for radio not aggressively selling the power of the teen demo, Gary again sees a problem for "smaller or umbrella markets where the cost per point is so much higher than a network or Top Ten/top fifteen market." Once more Gary stresses that so often, "Your teen count is used against you in the contemporary arena to get the price down on your spots or keep the spots off the air in order to buy around you with a combination of other adult formats. The objective, of course, is lowering cost using the teen count as an excuse."

Both Garry and Gary are in agreement, however, when it comes to any sales staff "ashamed" of having a substantial teen audience. "If the sales staff is intimidated or embarrassed," DeMaroney says, "by a particular demo they view as a failure, you've got a problem."

More than ever now, according to Gary De Maroney, the emphasis must be on a "clear cut economic and programming strategy dictated by signal strength and the market."

As for future generations of Top 40 listeners, it's the reality that "Most stations are looking for instant success. Where are the dollars RIGHT NOW and let's capture as much as we can. Looking ahead three to five years is a luxury few can afford. Oh and one more thing—who ever proclaimed Top 40 a teen format?"

DeMaroney concludes that two areas are of critical importance today. "Focus on your facility and know the type of people living within your coverage area and what type of formats are viable within that listening range. Then you can be a leader regardless of the power of your facility, because you're maximizing all the audience available to you and the format."

HIT FACTOR climbs to 41% for **SAIGON KICK** as they move into the #1 spot at Q102 2-1, WMDM 3-1 and B96.9 7-1. Plus they've been #1 for three weeks at WLFX Winchester, KY. P.D. NOTEBOOK

received more mail in response to my July column, "Playing CDs On The Radio."

John A. Davlin, manager and music director of Hartford Community College's WHFC/ FM writes: "We've been a 'CD station' for three years now, and play CDs live on the air. It took a while to learn a few tricks to avoid on-air problems, but there's nothing like the sound of CDs live. Unlike most of my better-financed colleagues in broadcasting, we find that commercial consumer CD players work just fine. After much searching and some trial and error, we've settled on the Pioneer brand. Excellent results and very few technical problems. The cost is great as well—only about \$200 a unit [each of which we replace] every two years.

"CDs do skip. This can be avoided by routine daily vacuuming maintenance: Open the CD drawer and vacuum the dust away. All jocks here are instructed to hand wipe the disks, both sides, prior to putting them into the machine—and we use diapers for this. Remember the old cloth diapers? Not all CDs are the same quality, and we've found the pop CDs are the most likely to be pressed poorly. Good high-quality players that sample well will eliminate the poor press problems.

"I'm just stupified by the convert-to-cart mentality that continues to dominate the minds of so many MDs. Good Lord, folks, do you have ears??? Dubbing to cart, no matter how modern or high quality, is a dub to analog, and it is discernable to the listener, if not the management."

Thanks to John Davlin for sharing those thoughts—although I should make the point, perhaps, for what it's worth, that all sound has to be converted to analog at *some* point for us to hear it! Both Neil Young and Mr. Davlin agree that digital and analog sounds different to them



hile waiting to hear whether or not Atco would be paying for a video for "Dying To Be

Loved" from their second album, Groovus Maximus, Electric Boys took matters into their own hands. They spent \$18.95 plus tax and got rolling. Turns out they came across Sound Tracks Music Video on the Universal lot in Los Angeles three years ago while on the big Universal tour. "I feel that it's really mind blowing that we made a video for so little money and the difference in quality is not nearly as vast in the difference in budget from other videos that are created," vocalist Conny Bloom elaborated. "As a band we have always taken things into our own hands. We produced Groovus Maximus ourselves, now we've produced our own video as well. When we do it ourselves there is a lot less bullshit involved." The results of the clip is a strikingly psychedelic visual reminiscent of the music films from the late '60s and early '70s and more like T-Rex and Jimi Hendrix than modern-day MTV

As many as 12 former **Doobie Brothers** are coming together again. [see last week's column], although, clearly, they disagree on the result!

On now to a letter from a smaller-market program director who asked not to be identified:

"We're a mainstream 100 kw Top 40 FM station and have been a Gavin reporter for 2-1/2 years. We bought the Denon 'CD cart' players you spoke of in your article, and have had three on-air in the control room and one in production with little or no problems. We play all our music direct from CDs. It's really amazing to me how rugged these Denon units have proven to be. We've lost only 5 shells in the three years we've used them! [These units play CDs mounted in protective shells, allowing them to be handled like tape cartridges.] We repair the occasional broken or slipped spring, but, in general, they have really taken daily abuse and kept on going. The air people love 'em! Some stations, like ours, don't have the budget for things like carted music. It would not be practical or affordable for us to dub everything down to cart. We have ITC Delta cart decks, and we use Scotch carts for commercials, promos and liners, and you know how expensive Scotch Carts are! In fact, there's not a station in our locality that's not either playing all their music from CD, or at least a big part of it—even the AMs!

"I have found a way to almost always ensure that the correct cut on a CD is played. It's logged for the DJ with the correct cut number indicated, and 1

Thanks to the writer for these ideas. It seems that the trend I commented on in that CD column—of returning to the use of carts for control of cuts played and reliability—is more a largemarket phenomenon that a small-market one, for the reasons just cited—budget and the high cost of carts, although the CD shells are not inexpensive! Next week, a detailed and helpful letter from the chief engineer of a well-known major market station dealing with this subject from his point of view.

The reason the writer of the last letter wished to remain anonymous was included in the P.S., which addressed another subject that I'll cover in a future column.

"I find it difficult and frustrating to work for an owner who will make some pretty major changes on the FM side, but won't or can't understand that our AM station, like many in small markets, is continuing to slide in the ratings. Our FM station has had three 'up' books, coming from an absolute zero to a tie with our major competitor, while our AM sister, a news/talk outlet, has gone from a 7 share to a 1.7. Now, guess what happens! My GM, the owner's son, writes a 6-page diatribe on why he thinks we didn't 'win the book.' Let's not play any more rap or metal: pull all those titles, and let's target our upper demos both day and night. Can anyone give me some direction with this problem?"

verybody knows what a slogan is, right? Maybe not. Arbitron doesn't know what a slogan is. Radio broadcasters are confused about what Arbitron asks for on the Station Information Package sent each survey period. Now, I'm going to go out on the proverbial limb and try to define what you need to know about slogans in the radio ratings game.

Of course, you all know that a slogan is the battle cry used by Scottish Highlanders, and that it's also what political parties use to win elections. Mr. Webster says that a slogan is also "a catch phrase to advertise a product." Arbitron isn't looking for your catch phrase to advertise your station. What they are really

has precise rules about the use of a slogan. On the Station Information Package, a radio station may submit a slogan of up to 25 characters. More than one slogan can be listed if separated by a slash (/). Not, however, that the slogan must be used as a primary identifier. This means the station must use this identifier at least once per hour during the entire survey period. Otherwise a competing radio station can submit evidence that the other station is not using the identifier. A radio station can lose considerable credit for failure to use the slogan every hour from 6AM to Midnight. Arbitron will delete the slogan



tion of a slogan is the station's "nickname." Think of it this way. The station's name is its call letters. The nickname is what you call it for short. The frequency is the address and the "positioners/liners" are the occupation.

The analogy would be a man named James. We call him Jim. He lives at 12 FM Street, Apartment5, and he's a plumber. James is the call letter. Jim is the slogan. That's what everybody calls him. We know he lives at 12.5, but sometimes we just say he lives at 12. In Arbitron methodology, the 12.5 is the exact frequency/street address. If, on the other hand, we just say 12 FM Street, it becomes a slogan also. James is a plumber. A radio station in Top 40. The format is the occupation. Arbitron doesn't care abut a radio station's occupation other than a way to better clarify identification. That's just in case there are two James at the same address.

Just why are slogans so important? Arbitron

Slogan's aren't protected by Arbitron. More than one station can claim the same slogan. Only call letters are exclusive. A station at 97.9 claims 98 as a slogan. Another station at 98.5 also claims 98 as a slogan. When the Arbitron Radio Special Edit Department looks up the slogan for a specific county (not market—individual county), all stations that have the same slogan become eligible for the entry. Ascription is the method to determine who gets the credit. We'll talk about ascription in a future article. There are as many as four stations that file for the same slogan in the same county.

Some slogans show up in diaries and some do not. What's the difference? Nicknames show up in diaries. Positioners don't. Ries and Trout, in their book *Positioning: The Battle for Your Mind*, define positioning as what the prospect (audience) has in mind about the product. The concept is far from new. Aristotle called it "ethos." It's the way the audience thinks of the speaker. Great politicians throughout history have been the ones who knew how the audience felt about them, and then sought to fulfill their perception. So, we have "I like Ike" right along with "Seven Up: the uncola" and "the real thing."

Coca-Cola provides a good example of what would show in a diary and what would likely not show. Coca-Cola is the full registered name of the product. However, the public abbreviated it to "Coke" which is now a registered trademark. In a diary we would see Coke or Coca-Cola, not the "slogan" ("the real thing"). Similarly, we would expect to find "Avis," not "we try harder" in a diary, if indeed it was a radio station.

The reason is probably simple. The diary asks "call letter or station name—Don't know? Use program name or dial setting." People are not asked to provide a slogan or positioner. They are really being asked to provide the name or nickname of the station. Would I change the wording? No way! I believe that radio broadcasters need to understand what the Arbitron Company is looking for as well as what the listener perceives the station's name to be.

There are really three categories of station slogans: Dial position, format identifier and use of call letters for name recognition.

The dial position slogan is the "truncated" address. The station's exact frequency is 95.7, but it identifies itself as 95, FM95 or 95FM. Some markets use a lot of frequency identifiers and others do not. Remember that every slogan entry requires Arbitron people to make a clerk-level decision based on information provided by radio stations. Other stations have used such identifiers of Q104, B105, 13Q and so on. These identifiers you will find in great abundance in diaries, and Arbitron has little difficulty in making the correct edit decision. There are, of course, the exceptions when more than one station in a county submits the same slogan.

The format or product slogan can also be used—Newsradio, Home of Rock and Roll, Country Favorites, Mix, Best Variety, etc. These slogans rarely show up in diaries.

A third type of slogan is a result of the use of the call letters as a mnemonic device. KRTH (K-Earth), KIIS(Kiss), WLLZ (Wheels), WPCH (Peach), WEAZ (Easy). The slogan is the way somebody might better remember the call letters.

Here is the game-winning strategy: Call your radio station a name people will remember clearly. This can be the call letters, a mnemonic of the call letters, a truncated frequency identifier, or just plain heavy advertising to create brand awareness. The key to it all is to have somebody write down your station's name or nickname in the diary.



BUILDING THE BUSINESS By Rod Edwards

About five years ago, back in the days when rap music was still searching for an identity, and played only at clubs, in the streets, and on radio mixshows, a duo hailing from Brentwood, Long Island arrived upon the scene with little notoriety. This soon changed, as Erick Sermon and Parrish Smith, with their thick accents and, most importantly, their funk-laden music, beame household names in the hip-hop community.

From their very first singles, "You're A Customer" and "You Gots To Chill," to the three, count em' three, gold-selling albums they have produced, EPMD has garnered the success that most other groups can only hope for. Now, with the release of their fourth album, "Business...Never Personal," their expectations are as high as ever for the album they consider to be their best yet.

With their "funk, not front" motto, Erick and Parrish have always made records that appeal to the "street listener." As other acts hopped on the "crossover" bandwagon hoping to reap the benefits, EPMD has remained true to themselves and their fans, as they continue to produce tracks and write lyrics in the uncompromising style that got them where they are today. Add to this the fact that under their management are four other acts (Das Efx, K-Solo, Redman and The Knuckleheads) they call the shots for, and you have the makings of an all-around successful operation, appropriately named The Hit Squad.

In conversation, Sermon and Smith make no bones about the fact they want to always be in total control of their careers and the music they make.



ROD EDWARDS: the r It is well known that you have always made music that has a street appeal, time and have been imag quite successful

doing so. What is the key to your success? EPMD: One of our biggest secrets is staying focused. It's a matter of looking

at the whole picture and always being aware of the environment we work in. When we came into the industry, we had to ask ourselves

what we wanted to accomplish. There was a pointwhere we had to say, "Okay, we have the fly cars and the fly gear are we gonna sit on it, or do we want to conquer more ground?" We're at a point where we're comfortable, and not worried about the fame and the prestige, but about the music the fans want to hear.

RE: Prior to the switch, both your albums went gold. What impact has changing from a smaller label (Sleeping Bag) to a major label (RAL/Def Jam) had on your careers?

EPMD: The whole concept behind the switch was progress. In other words, more than just signing a contract and not knowing what you're entitled to, or not having control of what happens in our careers. As we were growing, we learned that we were going to have to take more control of our group if EPMD was going to build. Def Jam allowed us to gain more control, and now we're able to move our material to fans in the streets. **RE: So at Def Jam, Russell Simmons (CEO, Def Jam Recordings) gives you**

complete control? EPMD: Yeah, but we listen very closely to what he has to say if he disagrees with what we present to him, because he has so much experience in the rap industry, and most of the time he is right.

RE: How do you take the new acts that are under your management through

the record-making process, and what do your try to teach them about the industry?

EPMD: First of all, we try to get them to think about growing over a period of time. We try to help them develop an image that will work for them, and then help them maintain that image. On the other hand, we tell them not to let that image destroy them by getting themselves into financial or media problems. There are brothers out there who bring us fat tapes asking us to hook them up, but if they aren't willing to build themselves then we don't mess with them. It's all about having a strong mind and wanting to learn.

RE: So have Das Efx, as they approach platinum sales, been schooled about what to expect?

EPMD: Oh yeah—and they're prepared. They know that there are people out there that will step to them in a foul



way, but they also know not to trip off them. They have goals just like we do, and they want to build. That's the difference between us and other management companies. We want to help our acts build, but we're not so worried about getting paid off what they do because we're in the rap game just like them. **RE: Rumor has it that there's supposed**

to be a Hit Squad world tour.


EPMD: We're supposed to start a tour at the end of September and it'll feature the whole Hit Squad posse. This is something we have to do now because the time is right. We have too much experience in the rap game to front on fans and not come with a fly show. We want to present a show where the fans can get the same feeling they get when they play our records and tapes. We're not worried about lights and special effects because all that cosmetic crap is dead. Besides, it doesn't help you if your performance isn't fat.

RE: The new album definitely keeps the same hardcore style that EPMD is known for, but I've heard it said that because you guys dropped a song like "Crossover," you're getting soft. What do you have to say to your critics?

EPMD: Check out the album, and then make your decision. We have enough confidence in our material that we can release a song like "Crossover," which will be played in radio rotation, and not be worried about what people say. The rap covers those acts who tried to cross over because hardcore rap wasn't making any money, but should have stayed true to the underground, because now the timing is right for the underground to get its due.

RE: Over the past year or so, more true hip-hop/hardcore acts have come to the forefront of rap music, and a lot of the commercial acts have died out. What do your think is the cause of this? EPMD: The world is changing, and people are starting to see it. The things that underground rappers talk about on their tapes are actually going down, but its been like that for years. Kids from both sides, black and white, are involved and it's affecting them. Parents can be prejudiced, but the kids are in the streets and they see what's going on as far as hardcore rap music goes, and they want to hear it. So for the networks, record stores and radio stations to make money, they have to go with what the consumer wants. So while the brothers who crossed over are about to lose out, the time is perfect for us because this is what we've been doing for years. Rap is making millions, and it's gonna go into billions. RE: What about plans for the future? Would you consider owning you own record company?

EPMD: No, because that side of the industry gets too technical. We want to stay in contact with the original fans, and keep selling our records. Also, we want to make sure that all the boys in The Hit Squad get theirs. The recording industry may be hard work, and you have to pay your dues, but it can't be all that bad if you're doing what you want in life. Right?

Warmed up and ready, Springfield slow jams us with a sensitive ballad about a pressureless yet supportive relationship. Larry Springfield co-wrote and produced this ear-pleaser with Christopher Troy and Zac Harmon.

SCHREAMING

he Screaming Trees pre-date the Seattle "scene." They pre-date the mainstream alternative explosion, Sub Pop, and Nirvana. So discussing the Trees' development with guitarist Gary Lee Conner (just call him Lee) is like listening to a centenarian's life story---the details are framed by and intertwined with one of the most eventful periods in recent history. Mark Lanegan, Van Conner, Lee Conner and an assortment of drummers have been the Screaming Trees since 1985, and the seven years of their existence have been pretty action-packed ones for both the band and its backdrop, the Pacific Northwest.

ou could say the Screaming Trees did it the right way, signing to Epic in 1990 after paying their dues with seven independent label releases and a lot of hard touring. However, when you look down the timeline of the band's career, what's most striking isn't the Trees' plodding work ethic, it's their amazing luck. After recording their first tape, Other Worlds, and releasing debut vinyl, Clairvoyance, on Steve Fisk's Velvetone label in 1986, the Trees were picked up by SST, whose roster had included the legendary likes of Husker Du, the Minutemen, Black Flag and the Meat Puppets. SST's reputation started to wane in the late '80s, and in 1990 the band put out a double 7" single on the massively hip Sub Pop. That well-timed effort, Changes Come, cinched their Epic contract. Now, the band is poised to unleash their second Epic disc, Sweet Oblivion, in prime atmosphere as the post-Nirvana Northwest is the center of national attention. Sweet Oblivion seems to be, for the Trees, something of a goalpost. Lee explains, "After Uncle Anesthesia (their first Epic offering), I was pretty sure the band was going to break up. Our drummer, Mark Pickerel, was in the middle of

quitting the band at the time. As far as I can reckon, hating touring was the main reason for his quitting."

ut Pickerel's leaving didn't precipitate the final dissolution of the always tension-fraught Screaming Trees (bassist Van has also left the band on a couple of occasions, only to rejoin later). Instead, things started looking pretty damn rosy: the remaining Trees found new permanent drummer Barrett Martin, unified in the face of corporate pressure, and recorded the stunning Sweet Oblivion. "Barrett really revitalized us in a lot of ways, especially musically," the guitarist opines. "Now I think we are really into being able to play as a band and not be completely sloppy. Van and Barrett play together really well." And, he adds, the inter-band friction is at an all-time low, "The more you get into the business, the more people want to control you, tell you what to do or whatever. And I think that basically we just found that we are really the main people we can trust. So now it comes down to the four of us sitting in a room talking about something rather than two of us calling the manager and saying 'do this' and taking sides against each other. That kind of stuff really sucks, we've been through a lot of that. Now we're definitely a band again, and there was a time a few years ago when we weren't."

According to Lee, Sweet Oblivion, produced by Don Fleming (Teenage Fanclub), "captures the way we've always wanted to sound---really in-your-face and crunchy. I don't know how we accomplished it...it was almost a certain luck, I guess, getting the right people together."

The record is loud, alright, but if you haven't heard the band before, don't assume it's that generic Northwestern grunge. And if you're already a fan, please don't presuppose psychedelia, because *Sweet Oblivion* is beyond both, a rock record boasting distortion-washed, biting guitar grooves and melody rendered mesmerizing by the limited-but-thoroughly-unique vocal talents of Mark Lanegan. In a way, the Screaming Trees' *Sweet Oblivion* builds a bridge between British oceanic shoegazers,

American indie-rock hardhats and devotees of classic album radio.

he disc's first single, "Nearly Lost You," can also be found on the soundtrack to Cameron Crowe's latest movie, Singles. The soundtrack, heavily weighted with Seattle-area grunge/metal bands, perpetuates common stereotypes about the the Northwest "scene." As Connor observes, the roots of the Pacific Northwest explosion have little to do with the grunge that is now its trademark. Rather, Lee credits a small label, K Records, run by Beat Happening's Calvin Johnson, with laying the groundwork for what's been happening in the region for the past five years. "I like to think that Calvin had a lot more to do with it," he muses, "and people have forgotten all about that stuff." K distributed (and still distributes) cassettes recorded by local bands from Wash-

ington and Oregon. The first Screaming Trees tape, Other Worlds, was handled by K, and Lee says Calvin was responsible for getting his band some of their earliest shows. Connor elaborates, "I think you could definitely attribute a lot of the (Pacific Northwest) thing to K, because that was when a lot of different kids in Ellensburg and Eugene and Portland and Seattle and Aberdeen and Olympia suddenly began to feel like they were part of something, a make-yourown-scene or whatever. Nirvana was part of that-they weren't part of the Seattle thing at all, really-they were from the coast. That's where the Melvins are from, too."

Although they now reside in the Emerald City, the Screaming Trees are from the backwater of Ellensburg, where there seems to be little to do when you're a bit of a loser, except maybe find some other losers and form a band. When Lee, Van, and Mark Pickerel first started playing together in 1982 or so, they did new wave and punk rock covers until Van and Pickerel decided to quit. "They apparently didn't like me or something," Lee sighs, "and instead of just kicking me out of their band, they quit got run over by a combine or truck or something and totally smashed up his legs. He didn't break them, but he just totally screwed 'em up, and he was out of it for a few weeks. Right after he recovered, he was listening to some of the four-tracks I'd been doing and said 'hey, we should try and do some of these songs,' and we suddenly decided to start doing originals. Then in order to invest their descriptions with the power to elicit the proper awe (let's give them the benefit of the doubt), often dwell on the Conners' large size. Lee observes, "For years, people never said anything about it, but I've noticed that recently, especially in the English press, they've been talking about it a lot. In the Northwest, you've got us, you've got

and left me to go off by myself and start recording four-tracks. Then they met Lanegan at a party and they were, like, 'hey, let's start a band.' So of course they came over to me and Van's room to practice because that was the only place they had. And they didn't have a bass player. Basically, my mom had to tell Van to let me play bass for them because he didn't want me to. It was kinda sad. He only decided to let me after our mom made him."

ostly, the sapling Trees knocked out Black Flag covers until a strange accident seemed to change their focus. Although he says he "doesn't really know how the two incidents are related," Conner notes that "in the middle of the summer (of '85), Mark Lanegan was working for this pea-harvesting company, and he there was this article in *Spin* magazine about this guy Geza X, about how to make your own record. And we read it and I thought, 'wow, we can do this.' So I went down to the studios, to Velvetone, like right from our parents' video store and talked to Steve Fisk and booked some time."

t was at least a year later that the Screaming Trees did their debut show--at a group home for the mentally retarded—but it was their second show that was the first setting for their now-standard on-stage mania. Live, Lanegan stands stock-still at center, flanked by the brothers Conner, and Lee flails away like a madman, rolling around and whipping his hair in some sort of guitar-induced ecstacy.

Tad, and a lot of people don't know about Napalm Beach, but Chris Newman's a really big guy, too. And + I have this fantasy band with Tad playing drums, and I could play one guitar, and Chris Newman would play guitar and sing, and Van could play bass, and it'd be all these huge guys playing. (The press' insistance on mentioning) our size doesn't really bother me. Although I remember years ago one of the first things Bruce Pavitt ever wrote about us was like, 'Screaming Trees: they're fat and they sweat like pigs.' He meant it in a nice way, I guess. And then there was this show in England where this reviewer made all these terribly derogatory references to us being big, but they seem to like this. Whatever."



JAZZ NEW RELEASES

I HEARD YOU TWICE THE FIRST TIME - BRANFORD MARSALIS (COLUMBIA)

So many threaten to do it. So few actually have the balls to carry it off. After a pre-listen read-through Delfeavo M's treatise on blues and Jazz, and a listen to the opening track, "Brother Trying To Catch A Cab", I was unsure whether this experiment was going to combine the two strains of American classical music. After the next twenty minutes, a stinging B.B. King/Branford Marsalis rave followed by an acoustic blues romp-and I mean blues as in the real Patton, Johnson, House variety-I realized this set is too freaking good to be true. On I Heard You Twice The First Time (a title inspired by my wife?), the magic styles of Jazz and the under-appreciated art of the blues truly butt heads. Besides the aforementioned forays, "Mabel" features a rare appearance by John Lee Hooker. Following that are some wicked bayou blues with brother Wynton leading the charge. Next comes a field-hollering work song from August Wilson's play, The Piano Lesson. Further on down the road, Branford collaborates with splendid Bay Area guitarist Joe Louis Walker and the divine Miss Linda Hopkins, who was among the first to bring contemporary blues and gospel to the Broadway stage. I gotta hand it to Branford. With his high visibility as Tonight Show bandleader, releasing a tish-tish, boomboom album would have made more sense. However, instead of a "commercial" album, we get a joyous experiment run amok. I think I finally understand that opening track. Trying to catch a cab to Brooklyn. Branford's own 1992 version of Modern Jazz blues, right?

BLACK HOPE - KENNY GARRETT (WARNER BROS.)

One of the last saxophone players to capture the ears of Miles Davis captures ours. The music of Black Hope, the title based on Kenny Garrett's short, prayer-length gatefold message, is an optimistic extension of hope and dreams in the wake of our nation's current perilbecoming the Disunited State of America. The compositions included represent what many of us have expected of Kenny Garrett all alongcolossal acoustic moods. There's a familiar team at bat here. A clear majority of the tracks features Kenny Kirkland's last touring band (minus drummer Tain Watts) with which Kenny Garrett played a support role. As leader and composer, Garrett shows why many in America view him as one of Jazz's premier alto-slingers. On the opening "Tacit Dance," Garrett's first solo is a staccato encounter of the best kind. Throughout most of Black Hope, Garrett maintains that standard as opposed to merely blowing standards, save on his speedy rave-up version of "Bye Bye Blackbird." Jazzbeaux will have no trouble wading through this one. Among my favorite moments: Garrett trading eights with Joe Henderson on "Computer G."

GOTCHA!! - TOM COSTER (JVC)

Anyone remember the shaving commercial, Gotcha? Well, Tom, you "got" us again. We've been big Tom Coster fans since his classic days with Carlos Santana, on through his solo daze on Fantasy when TC was the first guy on the block with a Linn Drum machine. Amid the cheap chips, brittle bits and primitive pad keys, Tom showed a couple of road-green Gavin guys what it meant to be playing live on some lonely Tuesday nights. Gotcha!! is a big breakthrough for Tom the band leader. With all of his digital ducks lined up, he's able to perform music that draws from his wit, sentiment and chops. Of course Coster excels as an electric musician (in both senses of the word) and he assembled a crack band that includes saxman Marc Russo and bassist Alfonso Johnson. What you get here is some of Coster's best work ever including "Dreams Can Come True" into "Don't Look Back." What it sounds like is a busy player has finally taken his eye off the clock and calendar, and has settled down to compose some of his swinging-est stuff yet. Dig the title track (my fave) and see if you don't agree

JAZZ NEW RELEASES

SUMMERHILL - DIETER ILG (LIPSTICK)

Even as recently as last week, folks were commenting on the sensational live show Bob Berg and Mike Stern put on at the Gavin Seminar '91. Well, this disc comes close to catching the aura of that gig. Summerhill is bassist Dieter Ilg's solo outing, but he's joined not only by Berg and Stern, but also by Peter Erskine, Randy Brecker (who used him with great results on some Eliane Elias gigs) and Jim Beard—all journeyed solo compadres in their own right. It doesn't take a bio-chemist to realize that with such a powerful lineup we're talking about a nuclear sonic concoction. The band blasts their way through each set of gymnastic riffs and howitzer solos. Tunes like "Somersault," the spikey, swinging "It's Getting Better," "Spring Fever" and the high-wire, sinister title track are not the kind of music you'd want to meet in a dark alley. As a bandleader, Ilg doesn't play a heavy-handed role nor does he foolishly attempt to steal the spotlight. The band hits musical accents hard and sparks fly when solos erupt. Bop, fusion, edge-no punches pulled here. Superb.

DON'T YOU KNOW I CARE - ANTONIO HART (NOVUS/RCA)

Antonio Hart continues his solo quest by boppin' and poppin' on Don't You Know I Care. With his successful, charttopping debut, titled (appropriately) For The First Time, tucked safely away, here Hart took even tighter control as he composed seven out of the nine new titles. Dueling alto saxes at warp Bebop speed continue on "At The Closet Inn" featuring guest honker Gary Bartz. "Zero Grade Reliance" surges with confident swing appeal reminiscent of the energy exuded on the mighty Coltrane's Impulse! sessions. Drummer Greg Hutchinson and bassist Rodney Whitaker, with whom

Antonio shared the bandstand when they all were in Roy Hargrove's combo, sparkle on "Mandela Freed." Hart supplements their solid rhythm with congas and percussion without sacrificing the fertile message. Hart blows strong and dominant. On "Don't You Know I care, Hart dons a more assertive tenor styled stance as opposed to a frantic, reedy one.

IT'S NOT ABOUT THE MELODY - BETTY CARTER (VERVE/ **POLYGRAM**)

Betty Carter's outgoing personality translates perfectly on her newest, It's Not About The Melody. As a teen, Betty sang with Charlie Parker and was dubbed Betty Bebop by Lionel Hampton. On the opening track, Betty superimposes lyrics over John Hicks' Jazz radio fave "Naima's Love Song." At times Betty shares the spotlight, scatting and flirting with the other instruments-particularly the acoustic bass. She toys with and engages the bass riffs, sometimes commandeering them note for note. A gifted stylist, Betty has the rare ability of being able to approach each song on several levels simultaneously. She can take the lead, step back and burrow into the rhythmic grooves, or she can assume the guise of a horn soloist. She's a Jazz chameleon. And with veteran players like Hicks, Mulgrew Miller, Lewis Nash and "Tain" Watts, it's an amicable collaboration. While Shirley Horn's last album had her approaching each song head on, Betty dances around her melodies, almost teasing the compositions and stretching their potential. Hence the title? We like the textural "Stay As Sweet As You Are," the uptempo "In The Still Of The Night," and the bouncy but torchy "I Should Care." BC isn't afraid to extrapolate, but many of the tunes are available as edits.

"DRIVE" - R.E.M. (WARNER BROS.)

"Drive" swerves a little into Bsidedom until drums and strings kick in past the two minute mark. That may be a long wait for Top 40 clock-watchers, but "Drive" is the kind of thing rock n rollers expect from **R.E.M.** After this, it'll probably be safe to say that R.E.M. has tested every tempo possible to mankind. Categorize this one as a grower.

"I LOVE YOU PERIOD." DAN BAIRD (DEF AMERICAN)

Hey, didn't I already write this up? Sure did and it's soooo good I just had to do it again. **Dan Baird**'s back with his **Faces** guitar, **Rod Stewart** mischief and his microphone-cracked front teefers. I still say, if anybody's heard a more clever chorus, bring me the head of the writer who wrote it. In my book, nothing beats "I love you period/Do you love me question mark/Please please exclamation point/I wanna hold you in parentheses." Did wemention the **Georgia Satellites**? Didn't think so.



"SONG INSTEAD OF A KISS" ALANNAH MYLES (ATLANTIC)

One of the prettiest songs I've heard all year. "Song Instead Of A



Kiss," coincidentally, has a "Stairway To Heaven" type flavor at the beginning. Then it takes its own stairway, as strings and acoustic guitars dominate as the song climaxes into a beautiful performance. Outstanding. First class. From Alannah Myles' long awaited album Rockinghorse, which will no doubt feature harder rock reinforcements. Meanwhile, enjoy this one.



SONIA DADA (CHAMELEON)

The story goes something like this. Songwriter Daniel Laszlo spotted Paris Delane, Sam Hogan and Michael Scott singing "Jesus On The Mainline" inside a Chicago subway station. What resulted was a rock n roll collision between a three-man gospel front and a rock n roll band, a sort of Was (Not Was) minus the zany insanity. With their gospel feel, Sonia Dada break a lot of rules, which means a better chance at success if you look closely at the top of the charts. To hear the voices live is the ticket. Until then, check out "You Ain't Thinking (About Me)" and "You Don't Treat Me No Good."

SWEET OBLIVION SCREAMING TREES (EPIC)

Up thar in Seattle, besides testmarketing movies, deodorant and rain gear, they have bands. No solo artists giving prissy interviews about creative differences just bands, either together or busted up. Screaming Trees have been making their records from nearby Ellensburg long before there were so many record guys in town the city had to open up a combination A&R soup kitchen/ tent city. Sweet Oblivion is the band's second major label record, and it's powered by guitars, hiking boots and flannel shirts. Not since the tragically derailed Mother Love Bone has a Northwest band sounded this good on first listen. Singer Mark Lanegan has a husky Jim Morrison baritone range that gives songs like "Dollar Bill" a righteous launch from acoustic beginnings to electric gonzo heights. It sounds a teensy-weensy bit like the outro of Traffic's "Feelin' Alright." Either way the result is the same. You feel alright, especially after more songs like "Nearly Lost You" and "Butterfly." "More Or Less" has a Crazy Horse beat-and-strum roughness that's probably intentional. Most of the music here is enough to make you forget about the Seahawks, yearn for some Starbucks Coffee and mourn the untimely departure of the Super Sonic X Man. Powerful stuff. Pass me my umbrella.



"THEM BONES" ALICE IN CHAINS (COLUMBIA)

This band has been on the road so long they've lost their Seattle resident status. They've been on the road so long, we thought they changed their name to Alice In Chains Currently On Tour With. They've been out there so long, they're consulting Greyhound. Had enough? You can hear little bits of tar and asphalt on the grooves here. Producer **Dave Jerden** is back with the **Alice** In **Chains**-gang, laying it on thick when it comes to rhythm guitars. Two quick minutes of chain saw plunder. From the upcoming album, **Dirt**, as in road.



FLOWN THIS ACID WORLD - PETER HIMMELMAN (EPIC)

lsn't it nice when one of your favorite writers is so prolific? If we're lucky, we can get about fifty recorded songs out of Peter Himmelman per three year period-the time it takes most artists to decide to record an album. Flown This Acid World strikes a balance between Himmelman's electric and acoustic experiences. Lots of the songs included here have the power of electricity with the personal warmth of acoustic. Throughout most of the lyrics, Himmelman is still addicted to the truth as he sees it. His songs are transparent, lacking even the thinnest veneer of pretense. One listen is like gazing through a picture window in his head. As seen throughout the liner photography, all the songs are linked with a golden thread of practical spirituality. My favorite line? "There is an orange peel/beneath a piece of steel/you know I've felt that way at times." Your assignment is to find this and many other lyrical jewels hidden inside a dozen cozy tunes.

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


Having read a bit of press about Sinead's forthcoming album of "classic standards," I admit to approaching Am I Not Your Girl? with some apprehension. Stupid





THE BELLTOWER -POPDROPPER (EASTWEST)



SINGLES by Dave Sholin

THE HEIGHTS - How Do You Talk To An Angel (Capitol) Fox Televison's belief in this new series should be evident by its Thursday night slot on the schedule. Credit EAGLE 106 Philadelphia's Brian Phillips and Chuck Tisa for uncovering this ultra-commercial entry. RECORD TO WATCH last week-as in, watch it explode!

ROXETTE - How Do You Do (EMI/ERG) Fans sure won't be disappointed by this first single from Per Gessle and Marie Fredriksson's newest album, Tourism, a compilation of new material and live versions of their hits, all recorded in various spots around the world. By now, the name Roxette has come to stand for excellence in modern-day Pop music and here's yet another convincing reason why.

DAMN YANKEES - Where You Goin' Now (Warner Bros.) Under the guidance of producer Ron Nevison, the artistry of these rock notables does nothing less than shine on a gutsy ballad featuring an absolutely stunning chorus. Finding a balance between satisfying the expectations of a core rock following and capturing the taste of mainstream Pop audiences is always tricky, but Ted Nugent, Jack Blades, Tommy Shaw and Michael Cortellone have done it once again.

ALANNAH MYLES - Song Instead Of A Kiss (Atlantic) Alannah's name will forever be linked to her awesome #1 smash, "Black Velvet," from a few years ago. But while the wait between albums seemed long, this effort proves it was worth it. Ballads have staying power, and when adult listeners get a hold of this they won't want to let go. Spectacular says it best.

TOM COCHRANE - Washed Away (Capitol) When we look back on 1992, the phrase "life is a highway, I want to ride it all night long," will

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stand out as one of the year's most memorable. After more than a decade of searching for his place on the American music scene, Canadian Tom Cochrane has finally rocked his way to the top of playlists at Top 40 and Album Radio this past summer. He writes with unquestioned sensitivity, uttering each line with that same soulful quality.

NENEH CHERRY - Money Love (Virgin) Far from taking a "Buffalo Stance," Neneh makes an artistic leap on her first release since debuting in 1990. Grappling with the age-old dilemma of money vs. love is made all the more compelling set to a funky, rockin' beat.

ALBUMS by Ron Fell

CATHY DENNIS - Into The Skyline (Polydor) Cathy Dennis is much more than a studiocreated dancing diva. She's neither a hood ornament nor is she some sort of laboratorial Ms. Frankenstein, the creation of a diabolic producer. The majority of Cathy's past success, admittedly, came from swirling beatsper-minute brews and YOU LIED TO ME, her lead single from this second solo venture, carries on the tradition. Yet, even the most danceable stuff is too worthy to be limited to dancefloors and dance/pop radio. Aided by crafty mixmaster Shep Pettibone and her old

CROSSOVER PICK

SMART E'S - Sesame's Treet (Atlantic) Undoubtedly one of the most familiar melodies of all time goes hip-hoppin' into the '90s. Any parents with young children hear this at least once a day (I'll testify to that), but never quite like this. D-Mob partner Dancin' Danny Sonset, Cathy provides fire to go with the smoke, brings friction to the mix and puts hot musical condiments on the table. High-heeled dance tracks like WHY and FALLING create a thousand points of danceable light from their own spheric radiance, but moderation sets in for maturing moments where a ballad like MOMENTS OF LOVE shines brightly before yielding to more ballistic, bass-heavy monster mixes capped by an extended (nine minute) Pettibone treatment of YOU LIED TO ME. A consistently entertaining set.


