Industry Greets New Prez With Optimism

The euphoria with which some greeted Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton's election to the presidency last week was shared by the entertainment industry which, after 12 years of Republican influence, is hopeful of, among other things, less government interference in artistic content.

And while many, especially those in Hollywood, are looking for visible changes, spokespeople are coming forward to caution that movement will not come about quickly.

"The president-elect has big issues on the plate," said National Association of Broadcasters' (NAB) spokesperson Lynn McReynolds when asked what effects a Democratic presidency will have on the industry in general and radio specifically. "He has the economy to think about. It's too early to tell what's going to happen."

The most immediate change is likely to be the makeup of the FCC. Current chairman Al Sikes, a Republican appointee, is suffering from cancer and therefore on sick leave, and Republican Sherrie Marshall has been working on the commission despite the fact that her term expired in June. Both are expected to be gone before Clinton's inauguration. Democrat Jim Quello is currently acting as chairman, a post he inherited on the basis of seniority.

Speculation that FCC policies may change, however, may be premature according to Andrew Schwartzman, who is executive director of the Washington-based Media Access Project."

The two Democrats on the commission are 'hawks,' " he said. "I would not look for them to take a drastically different approach."

The two issues repeatedly addressed are regulation, which has loosened drastically in the past twelve years, and freedom of expression. "I don't see the likelihood of roll-

backs of things that the FCC has adopted," said Schwartzman of regulation, which includes the new ownership rules. "I don't think people are looking for that kind of a fight. But I do see-at the very least-a slowdown."

Washington attorney James Fitzpatrick, who is a champion of freedom of expression was elated by Clinton's victory. "Overall, this is a very happy day for creativity in this country," hesaid. "Clinton has made it very clear, in his own words, that he will 'support and defend freedom



WKBQ STAFF BLOWN **OUT, FORMAT CHANGES**

Former WKBO-St. Louis PD Mark Todd's release last week was apparently only the tip of the iceberg. At presstime we learned that the entire staff of 'KBQ has been let go-from support staff to upper management. The only staff that remains is morning team Steve & D.C., who, oddly enough, aired the bit for which Todd took the heat for and was eventually fired over.

According to now-former music director Jim Atkinson, who has been with the station since 1979, employees were given their pink slips a few days after the station's owners Chase Communications finalized the station's sale to Evergreen Broadcasting. Apparently, Evergreen plans to LMA the station with crosstown Legendowned KHTK, whose staff moved into the WKBQ headquarters as of midnight Wednesday (11/11). Speculation about a rhythm/dance Top 40 format seems to be off base. Programming continues to be mainstream, but possibly with a Hot A/C slant.

KHTK/FM will program an urban oldies format a la its AM sister, using the handle Mix 97.

Taking over programming at WKBQ is recently-named KHTK PD Rick Upton.

Media Access' Schwartzman spoke of the FCC's continuing battle with issues such as the controversy surrounding personalities such as Howard Stern, someone Schwartzman says is difficult to shield from attack.

"I don't think [the new commission's] approach will be as vindictive as Sikes' has been," he said. "[but] he [Stern] doesn't make the job of those of us trying to protect broadcasters from regulatory excesses easy. He has soured the waters considerably. But, let me make it plain, I don't challenge his First Amendment rights, I challenge his judgment."

Folger In As Consultant KDGE Has New Edge

Former Sandusky general manager Ed Wodka bought controlling interest in "The Edge" (KDGE) this week, and has brought in former Top 40 programmer Joel Folger to consult the Dallas alternative outlet. Folger, who becomes station manager, previously programmed, and worked with Wodka at, crosstown KEGL.

Though Folger and Wodka both have Top 40 backgrounds, Wodka indicated that the station won't be heading more mainstream. "We don't anticipate any changes," he said. "We're getting feedback from the air staff and the community, and we're doing some perceptual research."

KDGE's ownership is still listed as Allison Broadcast Group, but with the departure of principal owner Steve Allison look for that to change soon. Wendy Naylor will be staying on as program director, and Wodka said they don't anticipate any staff changes. "We feel that Wendy Naylor has done a great job," he said. "We recently had a very strong book. Joel and Wendy are going to be working together to make the station better."

TAKING TIME OUT FOR AIDS

What does HIV stand for? How long can people who are HIV positive be unaware of their condition? Could basketball players have contracted AIDS from "Magic" Johnson? These are some of the questions the AIDS educational home video "Time Out: The Truth About HIV, AIDS, and YOU," and a new rap song "Temporary Passion" are addressing.

A street-oriented campaign to reach youths and inform them about AIDS features star personalities, a premiere record label, and a burgeoning number of radio stations. Magic Johnson and Arsenio Hall host Paramount Home Video's "Time Out," which is available at nationwide video outlets. Tommy Boy Records has released "Temporary Passion," a rap by Arsenio Hall and video director Malcolm-Jamal Warner, and participating radio stations are getting behind the song.

Lyrics directed at youths urge "Don't be stupid/Take your time/Make a plan." Los Angeles' KPWR, San Francisco's KMEL, Chattanooga's WJTT, and Washington D.C.'s WKYS are among the stations involved in "Temporary Passion" airplay and "Time Out" promotional activities.

Much of the song's radio promotion centers around contests conducted by morning drive teams, and prizes have been donated by associations including Casio Electronics, Cross Colours, and Continental Airlines. WJTT/ Chattanooga disc jockey Doctor Boogie told the *Gavin Report* "We are playing 'Temporary Passion' like crazy and running a promotional package where people name who appeared in Arsenio's dog pound the night before and win prizes."

Participating stations were targeted because of their cutting edge reputations and ability to take the knowledge to the streets. More stations are expected to be added in upcoming weeks. All proceeds from video sales will be donated to Magic's Foundation For AIDS Research.







INSIDE TOP 40 by Dave Sholin

All things being equal (music on target, talented street-smart air staff), it's often those all-important production elements that differentiate stations and become important contributing factors in winning or losing.

Certainly anyone who's heard the words, "Oh, he (or she) is in production," will agree PDs either make production a priority or use it as an excuse to avoid being disturbed. But nowadays, production duties are likely to be expanded.

Jeff Left is the creative director at KVOX/ AM and K100/FM in Moorhead, MN, and he also runs his own production firm. Jeff foresees new ownership rules and the current wave of LMAs as ways for stations to increase profitability, and in the process, impacting those in his position.

While Jeff feels "programming isn't really affected" in an LMA situation, he says, "the production director is now selling two stations, two sales teams and two formats. Also, he or she is writing and producing two philosophies. It's the production director who now has to cut a Top Forty and A/C ad for the client."

Jeff correctly points out that, "Each format brings its own unique sound and personality to the station, and the client could not get away from that. Ads have to be fashioned for the format and the audience—just like before the LMA." He fears things, "could get worse if my station has a good production department and the LMA'd station doesn't." Translation: "Work load increases."

However, Jeff offers a solution you may want to file away for future use. He suggests "keeping the stations' production departments separate, or pay the production team what it's really worth. If these changes are so good for profitability, share the wealth with the people who have the extra work load. This new, better, stronger, more effective way to maximize profit increases the work load of the production department. Ratings are great, but I see too many stations go from worst to first and first to worst!"

As for the production rules of thumb Jeff says, "1) A marketing scheme beats a single idea 2) Creative production beats rip and read 3) Your station should be perceived as *the* production source in the market! 4) You're only as good as your last spot."

At a time when the bottom line has taken on new meaning, Left points out "ratings come and go, but the client will always remember that great spot or campaign you came up with." In the midst of all these changes Jeff asks station owners "to remember how important the production department is to keeping a listener listening longer, a client busy with store traffic and how closely we are tied into the station's profit." 

wo years after Hi-Five debuted with their certified gold album, Just Can't Handle It, the quintet has returned by making a statement with the title of their follow-up project, Keep It Goin' On.

Plenty of artists will agree that doing just that is always a challenge. The group members are still in their teens, and it's evident by talking to the group's Marcus "MAC" Sanders that this time around, the process, was a lot different.

Mac admits, "The record company gave us a little more leverage. We got to choose most of the songs and worked with the producers on what we wanted them to sound like." Mac also says he's a lot happier because "we did it, rather than somebody handpicking the music for us."

All friends (with the exception of newcomer Treston Irby) since their school days in Waco, Texas, Hi-Five's relationship has gotten stronger over the past few years and Mac thinks their small town values have been a real plus. Each of the guys looks out for the other and Mac is thankful they live as a family because "out here on the road there are so many snakes you never know who to trust. The only people we can rely on is each other because we're definitely not going to hurt each other."

Hi-Five enlisted the help of fellow Jive recording artist R. Kelly on their new project, and he delivered four songs. One of those, "A Little Bit Older Now" spells out that on a personal level there's been a change. Mac credits Kelly for the idea and explains it has a lot to do with "how we've matured and what we've learned about the business."

Mac's quick to point out that the group is well aware that all too often people don't get recognized for their roles in the overall scheme of things. He makes it a point to thank "radio, management and the people behind the closed doors that don't ever really get the credit that they should." Mac says that at this stage in their career, "We definitely want people to think of us as being a little older."

As for Hi-Five's new single, "Quality Time," "It could mean anything from your relationship with anyone from your girlfriend to your Mom. We learned about quality time from being on the road. When you're out there by yourself with the guys, you miss your family and friends. You appreciate the little time you get to be with them."

In a year when it seems that real singing has replaced those magic tricks in the studio, Hi-Five is simply "trying our best. We don't just try to please one certain audience—we do a variety of things and we really like to sing."

For the thousands of other young singers, Mac offers this advice: "Really think about what you want in life because this business is NOT for everyone. You can think you're a singer and even be good and make it, but I think you should talk to people who really know about it. Get a lot of advice, because it's not what it's hyped up to be." Topping Mac's list however is putting "God first, because without him, no one's going to make it."

Hearing the group on the radio was an experience Mac will never forget. It was, as he recalls, "this feeling I can't even explain. It was just a dream come true. I was listening and they said, 'We've got this new group out of Waco, Texas—Hi-Five.' I got all excited and called people. So it's definitely a good feeling. And every time I hear us now, it's even better."

All expectations are the Hi-Five sound is one that's destined to be on the radio for a long time.



Number two in HEAVY rotation and #2 in total stations puts **ELTON JOHN's** "The Last Song" in position to become the next #1.

HOTTEST two-week move is the #35 to #9 leap for GENESIS' "Never A Time." In four weeks it has averaged 51 ADDs a week. Among the newest are WBDX/FM, WFRO, WEIM, KCMJ/FM, KWAV/FM, KFOR, KSTT and KBOI.

RESTLESS HEART's "When She Cries" is destined to be their biggest A/C record to date. Seventy-seven percent of its 177 players report quality rotations and that doesn't include the 23 ADDs this week like WKGW, CKFM, Y92, WKWK/FM, KELO/FM, KLTA, Q104 and WJTW/FM.



In just two chart weeks **GOWEST's** "Faithful" has moved to #16 with 155 players including KTID, WMJQ, WRQX, WTSX, KXLK and KLWN.

A big ten-point chart gain (#27 to #17) from **10,000 MANIACS'** "These Are Days" as 72% of all players report quality rotations including WZNY, WMXB, WFFX/FM, KMXX, KKLD, WHSY, WAHR, KEYW/FM and WSKY.

JAMES INGRAM's "One More Time" will probably still be a popular play well into 1993 as his solid ballads never seem to die. Currently it's at #21 and on its way up. With 129 players and two-thirds HIT FACTORing, we expect great things in the weeks and months ahead.

Grammy-winner SHAWN COLVIN's second album has begun on a solid note with "Round Of Blues" at #24 after just two chart weeks. The newest players include K103, KIDX/FM, WMTZ, KKRB, KLOG, KFOR and KLCY.

Last week's TOP TIP, the theme from "NORTHERN EXPOSURE," debuts way up at #27 with 109 stations and 29 new including WAFL, B100, KBOL, KGLE, WTPI, KMJC, JOY99 and KIDX/FM. When this record is over, will it go into recurrents or re-runs?

On the heels of a 24% HIT FACTOR increase, LINDSEY BUCKINGHAM's "Soul Drifter" debuts at #31. It clears the 100-station mark in its first three weeks with 27 new this issue including WQLH/FM, WOBM/FM, WAHR, KSDN, WLET and WVMX.

SONIA DADA's debut single, "You Ain't Thinking," moves into CHARTBOUND with 61 total stations and a 29% HIT FACTOR. Last week's RECORD TO WATCH gathered 17 ADDs with WBEC/FM, WMTZ, WNMX, WSKY, WSSY, KSDN, WLDR, WQRL, KBOL among those. Rotations at WGMT, WFFX,





ver since Billy Ray Cyrus exploded onto the scene, bumping and grinding his way through "Achy Breaky Heart," critics have had a field day. Cyrus became the target of more name-calling and gossip than any Country star in recent memory. We've heard rumors about everything from his supposed past as an exotic dancer to his alleged hair transplant, from his sexuality to his dental hygiene. Everyone got into the act, claiming the muscle-bound Cyrus was just a pretty boy who couldn't sing and couldn't really dance. Billy Ray Cyrus became the Vanilla Ice of Country

And yet, the "Cyrus virus" keeps spreading, and every day Billy Ray is proving his critics wrong. After the phenomenal success of "Achy Breaky Heart," the million-selling single that broke records all over, and whose prophetic video showed an arena full of hormone-charged women clawing at the gyrating Cyrus, everyone called him a one-hit wonder. Then came "Could've Been Me," a compelling song that also topped the charts. Didn't you hear critics mumble that it would be his last hit? Cyrus came right back with his current smash, "Wher'm | Gonna Live When | Get Home?"

Cyrus's stage show just keeps getting better, and he's becoming more and more at ease with his role of Top Country Hunk. And the truth is, Cyrus isn't cynical enough to have orchestrated this all on his own. He didn't major in marketing or spend years plotting the trends in Country music. You've already heard it many by Cyndi Hoelzle —

times, but darn it, Billy Ray really *is* just a simple guy from Flatwoods, Kentucky.

"I'm just a man who makes music, and who had a dream and followed his dream," Cyrus says, with as much conviction as if this were the first time he's had to explain it.

You'd think that right about now Cyrus would be ready to thumb his nose at the critics and maybe gloat a little bit. No way. He sincerely—and a little wearily repeats, "I don't concentrate on the critics. I just keep doing what I've been doing for a decade—making my music, I do believe that what is good for me is good for Country music. People can say what they want, but it's opened a lot of doors."

Originally, Billy Ray thought he would be a professional baseball player. He set his sights on catching in the major leagues and it wasn't until he was 20 years old that he gave up that dream. "I just felt that (baseball) wasn't what I was supposed to do," Cyrus admits. "For about eight months or so, I was just lost in life. My intuition was saying that there was something else right around the corner, something that was the whole reason I was put on this earth. At twenty years old you can get pretty lost. I was wondering if I was going crazy. Then suddenly everything kicked in and my intuition said, 'buy a guitar, buy a guitar.' And then I really did think I was going crazy!"

Cyrus' inner voice just kept at him until he finally gave in and bought that guitar. He formed a band that same night and three months later he and the band, Sly Dog, were supporting themselves playing music.

Cyrus said that the final revelation came to him at a Neil Diamond concert. "I saw Diamond captivate the audience and he said, 'I don't care if you're rich or poor, white or black. Believe in God and believe in your dreams and believe in miracles.' It was at that moment that I realized my purpose was to play music, and to use my music to do something very positive."

Cyrus was so sure he had found his calling that he never doubted the huge impact his music would make. He recalls the day before the debut of "Achy Breaky Heart." "I remember the day before the video came out very well. I could feel that something was about to change. That night I stopped to put gas in my '89 Baretta, the car that I had driven the tires off of, driving back and forth to Nashville. I remember thinking, 'This is the last night you'll ever feel like this when you pump your gas.'

"The next day I felt the teeter go to totter."

The liner notes to Billy's debut album seem very prophetic. "What the mind of man can conceive and believe...it can achieve," they read. "Many years ago, back before I ever owned a guitar or sang for a living, I had a dream that someday I would have an album on a major label and my music would be

P.D. NOTEBOOK

o my surprise, most articles in the trade press this year that addressed the need for an alternative to Arbitron have ignored or overlooked the only established, accepted "second ratings service," which is Willhight Research, Inc. of Seattle, about which I've written periodically for over ten years. This is despite the fact that this year the service is in the process of extending into 37 states—including some markets already served by Arbitron.

Jim Willhight, like Tom Birch before him, was a program director who developed his own ratings, found the competition wanted to buy them from him, and left radio to develop his own company. Both realized their service had to have credibility at the ad agency level, and Willhight Research has painstakingly gained considerable agency acceptance, particularly in the Pacific Northwest.

I recently received a letter from Jim with more information about his sampling and data-preparation procedures:

"Since 1982, we have utilized the same minimum reporting requirements that Arbitron does. There are two criteria: (a) a station must have 10 in-tab weekly cume credits to qualify for "full reporting," and (b) must have an average quarter hour rating of 0.1 percent."

Unlike Arbitron, however, Willhight Research includes a table in the front of the book showing share (in percent and in persons), and weekly cume, for "stations below full reporting requirements"—an addition that most programmers will find useful.

Jim, while recognizing the limitations of sample size, has been committed to the greatest possible accuracy and, among other things, has by Eric Norberg RATINGS ACCURACY

decried the common practice of "intermediate number-rounding," and has been able to produce estimates rounded to the nearest ten, rather than hundred, persons as a result of avoiding this tactic. His letter continues:

"On a related front, I have spent considerable time and resources in writing a software program that will convert Willhight data to the ARB R-SALE and A-SALE formats. The conversion program has been completed for months, so we can now match our data byte-by-byte to Arbitron's archaic format, to support our data to TAPSCAN, STRATA, and MRP for their MMP program. However, one big hitch with the data coming from these vendors is that the R-SALE format is rounded to 'persons times one hundred' at each of the 16 demographic cell levels (for example, 18-24 males will be rounded to the nearest one hundred, and so forth). When the third-party software vendor takes the data from Willhight Research, from an R-SALE disk, and prints it out, it differs from our printed reports, since we do all calculations at the sixteendigit floating point (double precision) level until the final print using command.

"In really small markets (Kodiak, Alaska for example, where the radio universe is only about 1,000 persons total), to round each station's data to the nearest hundred for each of the 16 demographic cells is ludicrous. At this pint in time, one of the software vendors has indicated that they will modify their crunch programs to accept Willhight Research's more accurate data, but we are meeting resistance from other vendors. This is a case where a higher accuracy level is hurting our acceptance, since we need access to the third-party software vendors. The biggest headache has been Marketing Resources Plus, with their Media Management Plus program, which is big at the agency level. We have many agency clients 'screaming' to MRP to get Willhight data on line (Gerber Advertising in Portland, Oregon, is a good example), and MRP has been slow to respond. Three years ago we got the go-ahead to provide data through their system; we invested hundreds and hundreds of hours writing software to meet their needs—and to this day we are not on-line with MRP (the word now is 'by the end of the year').

"You can probably tell by the tone of the last couple of paragraphs that we at Willhight are frustrated with the lack of understanding of how inaccurate some of Arbitron's techniques are, and frustrated with some of the hoops we have to go through in order to be able to meet the needs of clients. Perhaps you have some feedback on how we can address this 'industry standard' rounding of the demographic cells to 100 persons, thus adding more error to an already error-prone system of measurement (error-prone with poor response rate, cluster sampling [surveying entire households]. Inadequate demographic and geographic weighting controls, small sample size, and incorrect station crediting)."

Thanks, Jim. Well, perhaps *you* would like to provide Jim Willhight some feedback on these points—and perhaps ask for a sample of his work. The broadcast industry is asking for a second ratings service, but it already has one. 



heard around the world...Over a decade later...there is a moral to the story. And you hold it in your hand. For if I can reach my dream, you too can reach yours."

"I'd been trying to write my liner notes for two months," Cyrus says. "The record company was after me to get them out, music a chance, it would be very (widely accepted)," he says. "The reason I believed that is for ten years everytime I played a bar throughout Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia, the place would be packed, and the age group would range from 18 to 80. I always felt that if it worked in those places, it would work like that around the world."

Billy was emphatic about using his own band in the studio during the recording of his debut album. "I said, 'I've worked



but I kept saying, "No, it's just not right.' One night I was sound asleep and I was dreaming the liner notes. I woke up, grabbed my little tape recorder and I just spoke those words. All my songs come to me like that. I call it the incubator. The liner notes were in the incubator for two months. I could feel them inside there, but you just can't force something like that out."

When he was dreaming those liner notes, did Cyrus somehow know that his debut album was going to be a multiplatinum smash? "I always believed that if a record company would just give my for many years to get this chance. It's my chance, and I want it to be *my* music, not me combined with five other Nashville musicians who I've never played with before.' I kept saying, 'Give my band a chance. If it doesn't work then we'll do something else, but please give them a chance.' Harold Shedd, being the creative genius that he is, explored that avenue. Once he heard my band record the first song, 'Some Gave All,' he said, 'Let's let the boy make his music.'"

Cyrus's ex-wife Cindy's name appears on the songwriting credits to his salute to veterans, "Some Gave All." Cyrus explains how that came to be. "In 1989, when I wrote the song, I could feel our marriage collapsing and I knew that someday, inevitably, it would end. I wanted her to have something that no one could ever take away from her something that would last forever. 'Some Gave All' was all I had to give, and I knew it was my most precious gift, because I knew that it would live forever. So the day after I wrote the song I put her name on the copyright. I didn't tell her she was the co-writer until 1991 when we were dividing up our stuff."

Cindy also gets writing credits on Billy Ray's current single "Wher'm I Gonna Live." "Now that's a different story," he says playfully. "One night I got home and found all my stuff out in the yard. I kept saying to myself 'wher'm I gonna live? wher'm I gonna live when I go home—hey, that's a hit!' So I ran in and wrote that song. Cindy was madder than hell that she had thrown my stuff out and instead of me being all distraught over it, I was writing this song! I wrote the chorus and then I said, 'I knew our road was getting kind of rocky.' She said, 'I think you're getting too damn cocky." said, 'great line!' So I gave her halfwriting credit."

Cyrus really seems to be enjoying this roller coaster ride. Despite the grueling schedule-every hour he's not on stage is taken up by interviews, autograph sessions, appearances and more interviews-he's still devoted to giving 110% to live out his dream. And he's not at all surprised by his frothing female following; you see, he's been getting the same reaction for years. "It was always just like it is now," Cyrus says matter-offactly. "And you gotta keep in mind that where there's women there's men. That's why these bars would hire me for such a long time, because I always brought in lots of women, and they would bring in the men. So every night was ladies night."

As we were saying our goodbyes, Cyrus blurted out excitedly that "Achy Breaky Heart" had just gone to number one in New Zealand, in a record four weeks. "They said they've never seen a record go up the charts that fast," he said, proud as a kid whose just taken off his training wheels. "In November I'll be going to ten countries in nine days," he pauses, and then laughs, "It wasn't that long ago that I would have thought----'wow, if I could just go to ten *counties* in nine days!' "

PRIDE OF LIONS - VARIOUS ARTISTS (SONY MASTERWORKS)

Under the tutelage of Chicago conductor/ composer James Mack, young jazz credibles like Roy Hargrove, Billy Childs, Bobby Watson and more get a chance to venture past the hardened bop genre into bolder, classical orchestral settings. The Pride Of Lions set features a trio of Mack originals, another trio of classical adaptations awash in jazz chordings, plus a couple of standards old and new. Mack's "Edge Of The Wedge" is the coziest of the eight tracks. Electric guitarist Darryl Thompson, Watson, Hargrove and Childs loosen up with some gusto improv cameos. Classical guitarist Fareed Haque returns with Hargrove and Watson to engage in a flurried classical repartee on Debussy's "The Girl From M. Parnassus." It's clearly the disc's most ambitious hybrid experiment. "Chopin In Brazil" exploits Jazz radio's dalliance with Samba rhythms and reminds us of the subtle, yet satiny string arrangements Doc Severinsen dabbled with a few years ago when he combined small ensembles with concert orchestra on his Facets album. While not as biting as the latest Hargrove or Watson solo efforts, POL compensates with a more grandiose approach.

STANDARDS (AND OTHER SONGS) - MIKE STERN (ATLANTIC)

Super guitarist Mike Stern continues to hit his stride with each new release. Standards (And Other Songs) is clearly drawing the biggest chart gains of any of Stern's previous records. It's also his most disciplined effort in the sense that he stays closer to the rigors of the classic melodies he covers, like John Coltrane's "Moment's Notice" and Monk's "Straight No Chaser." This is Stern's jazziest offering in memory. The backup group is entirely acoustic. Producer Gil Goldstein's keyboard support, when present, is purposely minimal. While Stern adapts a more rounded, reverberated electric guitar sound and is clearly not as edgy as in previous sessions, he still has the tenacity to throttle each composition to within an inch of its life. Such is the case with "There Is No Greater Love" and the soaring Miles tune, "Nardis." Versed in rock and blues, Stern is not about to relinquish his killer instinct, even though Standards is unarguably a more tempered effort—for Stern, that is. Bob Berg sits in on the set's most picturesque duet, Stern's own "Lost Time."

CALLING YOU - TED ROSENTHAL (CTI) Having won the Thelonious Monk Jazz Piano Competition in 1988, Ted Rosenthal has been brought to the forefront as another Creed Taylor discovery. Calling You, Ted's second record as a leader, is primarily filled with uptempo grooves that bounce between jazz funk and Latin. The band size generally swells from six to ten players and engulfs Rosenthal's flawless technique. On "Sea Song," "Bijou" and "Para Los Papines," Rosenthal, producer Taylor and arranger Jim Pugh fan the flames with some exotic rhythms and explosive drumming by Dave Weckl. Bobby Hutcherson's spirited vibes are punctuated by Rosenthal's nice pastel chords. Donald Harrison also maintains a dominant presence by supplying alto, soprano and tenor sax shadings. Calling You will satisfy the most hardcore Bop fans as well as the more mass appeal sounding playlists. Like David Benoit, Rosenthal prefers a clean, polished touch on the keys.

YOUNGBLOOD - ELVIN JONES (ENJA)

Elvin Jones feeds the momentum of his recording comeback by picking the hottest young up-and-coming players to fill out his quintet. When most folks hit age 65, they eye retirement. Jones took a much bolder approach and enlisted the incendiary talents of a young nineteen-year-old trumpet player from New Orleans named **Nicholas Payton**. Payton, like Philip Harper, has a scrappy horn style in the mode of, say, Lee Morgan.

And if that's not enough, Elvin employed a dangerous double tenor sax frontline featuring Javon Jackson and Joshua Redman. These two are truly contenders. Redman, another Thelonious Monk Jazz Competition winner, is a graduate of Harvard University and plays with scholarly authority on the streetwise "Angel Eyes." Javon Jackson has a breathier tone than Redman, but his creditials are just as scary. After a stint in the final version of Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers, Javon saw active duty with the Harper Brothers, Charlie Haden's Liberation Music Orchestra and on Freddie Hubbard's latest Music Master live release. Ruling the roost from his omnipresent throne, Elvin called all the shots and set the tone, be it on the acrobatic "Biscuit Man," torchy afterhour ballads like "Angel Eyes" and "Body And Soul" or the gutsy "Not Yet." Most importantly, Youngblood bonds EJ's penchant for dense drum textures, and voluminous and complex waves of polyrhythmic sheets of intensity. Nobody, except perhaps Ed Thigpen, has developed such an inimitable individual style.

RUSSELL MALONE (COLUMBIA)

Russell Malone has an impeccable guitar style in the grand tradition of Wes, Herb and Kenny. But generally, Malone adopts a genre closer to Charlie Christian's era. While he spans several decades of jazz lineage with his choice of material—"St. Louis Blues" and "When I Take My Sugar To Tea"—there's still a youthfulness that bolsters Malone's mature technique. He has a superb feel for chords and likes to keep his arrangements ultra-quaint and basic. Like Mark Whitfield, Malone has taken a shine to the laidback acoustic Southern blues-jazz style of the thirties. "I Don't Know Enough About You" is a brothelstyled vocal and guitar duet with Harry Connick, Jr. on piano. "Close Your Eyes" encroaches on the flailing turf of Django and Tiny Grimes. On his version of "Moonlight Serenade," Malone sparingly utilizes the electric pickups of his guitar, relying instead on the ambience of a semi-acoustic axe. Malone's debut is tinted with some special piano stylings by Donald Brown. Milt Hinton's bass work is deep in the pocket and crucial to maintaining the feeling of eras past.

PRAISE (GIANT)

Looking for something completely different to break up Adult Alternative's predictability? **Praise** is a curious trio who rely on a bevy of worldly samplings to produce a sound that's nearly indescribable. "Brand New Day" is powered by what sounds like fields of sampled African drums and choirs, environmental sounds and nocturnal synth tones. On "Easy Way Out," singer **Miriam Stockley** multitracks her voice in a way that has her sounding like a cross between **Kate Bush** and the **McGarrigle Sisters**. Synth atmospherics orbit around organic instruments like accordions, cellos, squeeze boxes and acoustic guitars. The music by Praise is more horizontal than vertical and operates decidedly on planes and layers rather than on your traditional peaks, valleys and grooves. Give Praise a few careful listens and see what fits.

VISIONS - LEO GANDELMAN (ONE GLOBE)

Visions, the third Stateside record by Leo Gandelman, is a polished vehicle packed with some mighty sumptuous sax magic—tailor-made for Wave-styled playlists. Most of the tracks simmer at a low boil and Gandelman's tenor stylings glide fairly close to the ground. Like Stan Getz, Leo (pronounced Lay-O) resembles a vocalist in his phrasing, especially on the moody Brazilian standard, "Molambo." The title cut is an energetic opener that includes some blended acoustic and electric guitar fills by Ricardo Silveira. Another soulful upper is "Sideways," a brazen funk piece that strays away from the seductive Brazilian tempos that characterize most of Vision. On another uptempo piece entitled "Pirates," Leo switches over to alto and mixes it up with some Argentinian-flavored accordion accents. For scenic ballad appeal with a South American flavor, try "Forever" and "Spirits Of The Forest."

JERRY SHELFER - slipaway (Heyday Records, 2325 Third Street #339, San Francisco, CA 94107)

"Why isn't this guy a star yet?" That's a phrase you can bet Jerry Shelfer has heard all too often. Although he's still a secret to the rest of the world, Shelfer is well known in San Francisco-known for his memerizing shows, well crafted songs and amazingly powerful voice that can cut through the noise of any drunk honky tonk crowd. Oh, there've been some close calls in the past few years, when locals were sure the rest of the country was about to catch on, but with the release of Slipaway, Shelfer's first full length album, it's only a matter of time. Slipaway showcases the diversity of Shelfer's music-a mix of country, soul and rhythm & blues. It all makes perfect sense, especially when you consider Shelfer's upbringing as the son of an Ozark, Alabama Pentecostal preacher who joined the Marines right out of high school and spent time singing in Paris, Calcutta and Geneva whenever he could get off the base. Jerry also did his time in Nashville, as a staff songwriter for Famous music; he wrote all the offerings on Slipaway, except for the cover of William Bell's "You Don't Miss Your Water" (an ambitious song for any white boy to attempt, but Shelfer soaks it with lots of Alabama soul). For the moment, Jerry is still San Francisco's own. In fact, I think we take him a little for granted. So listen to Slipaway and see if you can keep from saying, "Why isn't this guy a star yet?" **CYNDI HOELZLE**

THINKING FELLERS UNION LOCAL 282 - MOTHER OF ALL SAINTS (Matador Records, 676 Broadway, New York, NY 10012) Time is a relative thing for the Bay Area's Thinking Fellers. Despite the perpetual motion/blurring velocity of their grindustrial twang, there are moments on Mother Of All Saints that become frozen in clarity. Call it the "Hummingbird In A Cube Of Ice" (one

of the songs) phenomenon or the musical realization of Einstein's Theory Of Relativity, but whatever you call it, it's a magical thing that occurs and recurs throughout this Bay Area outfit's third long-player. "Star Trek," an ec-



static instrumental, hurls us through other worlds on a ship propelled by guitars, banjo, and splintering drums. Again, in the midst of warp speed, sonic glimpses become frozen and timeless. Anne's "Tell Me" rantings sound great in a car wash, and the tail end's accelerated guitars are the evidence that clinches a conviction: TFUL282 definitely concocts the most glorious din around. Those who didn't go for Lovelyville's far out deconstructionalist pieces may balk at some of the latter tracks here, but the first nine nearly eclipse Tangle's dingy glitter. Other highlights include "Hive's" disembowled bass and poetic phrases ("immersed in buzz and honey dripping down"), and "Wide Forehead's" mutant sounds and images ("a nipple fills the stoma gill"). It's not that they can stop or start on a dime, or that hearing them live is the only way we'll experience the sound of dinosaurs consummating; the most basic appeal of the Thinking Fellers is that they can still/always make you smile. SPLAFTER TRIO ANAGRAMS

SPLATTER TRIO-ANAGRAM (Rastascan Records, P.O. Box 3073 San Leandro, CA 94578-3073)

Like the soundtrack to an insect's thoughts before, during and after it hits the windshield, Splatter Trio's Anagram is alternately distracted and concentrated. When my housemate heard this album playing one morning, he suggested that the musicians were all drunk. I suppose, however, that Splatter Trio's music reflects the everyday chaos we're inured to. We're the ones splitting open like broken machinery. They're simply playing to the natural arhythmic ambience of our lives. Using horns, percussion, guitars, radios and found objects to capture the atonal textures of frenetic living, the musicians of Splatter Trio, who are at the center of the Bay Area's improvisational music scene (we call it "improvcore"), find their nearest point of reference in the John Zorn/Knitting Factory contingent in New York City. But Splatter Trio's material, possibly even less grounded by structure than that of their New York compatriots, drifts even further into the atmosphere. There it sits and floats for a moment. Splat. Again the windshield hits. MORGAN NEVILLE

HEAVENLY - LE JARDIN DE HEAVENLY (K Records, P.O. Box 7154, Olympia, WA 98507) Move over Garden of Eden, here comes something even more Heavenly. No more talking snakes or bogus fruit-throw out the itchy fig leaves and go for a barebottom stroll in Le Jardin de Heavenly. This is fertile growing ground for plushie young love-stuff-romance thrives on jangle-pop guitars and day-dreamy harmonies. "Starshy" is floaty. "Smile" sports a jaunty swing. "And the Birds Aren't Singing" sprinkles in a few layers of rainy sorrow. One listen to "C is the Heavenly Option," a smooch-promoting, up-beat, very cool duet with none other than Calvin Johnson of Beat Happening, and you'll be running, lips puckered, after the nearest cutiepie. Those who still appreciate a good, heart-twisting crush every now and again should plant themselves happily in Le Jardin de Heavenly. BLANE M. MALL

The late Stevie Ray Vaughan put it best, saying Jeff Healey had the potential to "revolutionize the way a guitar can be played." Jeff Healey debuted in America amid a roar of curiosity. Here was a sightless young guitarist who had the meat to back up his unique playing style. As an added bonus, his debut, See The Light scored a Top 40 hit largely because of his singing. Jeff's follow-up album, Hell To **Pay**, showcased the band as a unit. Feel This balances both Jeff's strengths, a strong band and super-strong material. Two of the best vocal trax come from the Heartbreakers files, Tom Petty's "Lost In Your Eyes" and Heartbreakers drummer Stan Lynch's "Leave The Light On." Feel This is also a parade of blues rockers. "Baby's Lookin' Hot," "House That Love Built," "My Kinda Lover" and "Evil And Here To Stay" maintain a solid rock foundation that will carry the band around the world through 1993. Most interesting is the experimental mix of rap and rock on "If You Can't Feel Anything Else." Healey's hottest licks can be heard here. This was an important album for the Healey Band. Since the musicianship was already set, the material selection had to be spot-on. What you get here is an hour's worth of strong stuff and smart A&Ring. Frankly, I had trouble isolating trax. They all cook.

Both blues fans and rockers will appreciate the deluxe playing. Here's a quick rundown. Fast stuff: "She Likes To Boogie Real Low" and "You Must Have A Twin." Real blues: "You Keep Savin' That You're Leavin'." The single already taking off is the opening "Johnny Guitar"

BOATS TO BUILD -GUY CLARK (AMERICAN EXPLORER/ASYLUM)

Years from now when the spacemen are digging up our nuclear







Included on this disc are acoustic offerings from STING (his first time solo!), **BOB GELDOF**, and **JEFF BECK** and **ERIC CLAPTON** dueting on the **ROBERT JOHNSON** tune, "Crossroads." A bit of pop music history.



NED'S ATOMIC DUSTBIN -ARE YOU NORMAL? (CHAOS) If you read the Ned's Atomic Dustbin cover story two issues ago, you know that the

members of Ned's don't especially like being poked and prodded at. Taking that into consideration, I'm going to try not to over-analyze the songs on Are You Normal?, the band's follow-up to their storming debut, God Fodder. According to frontman Jonn Penney, the band chose Andy Wallace to produce the album because they felt he could "organize what we do a bit better, so it's more dynamic and powerful." I'd say Wallace scored a direct hit. The songs, most of which revolve around strained or waning relationships, are a bit more pop-oriented than I expected-and I admit to being pleasantly surprised with Penney's turn of a phrase. (Did he always have such a way with words or is this some new sophomore-ablum-growth thing?) My immediate favorite is "Who Goes First," with nods also going to "Legoland," "Spring," "You Don't Want To Do That," and "Leg End In His Own Boots." Bullseye. LINDA RYAN



BLACK 47 (SBK/ERG)

As you might expect from their name (which incidentally was taken from the Irish Potato Famine of 1847), Black 47's sound is steeped in Celtic tradition, musically as well as lyrically. Their debut five-song EP flaunts this to telling effect. I mean, how could you sit still through the Celtic rave-up-okay, ceilithat's thrown at you in the lead track, "Funky Ceili." And it's not just the tin whistles, pipes, bodhran and other traditional Irish instruments, either. The subjects within these songs, and the humor in which these subjects are dealt with, are also the product of an Irish upbringing-and the combination of the two is as deadly as whiskey and beer chasers. And just as tasty. You'll have fun with this one! LR

DAVID J -"SPACE COWBOY"(MCA)

Many radio people thought that "Space Cow-

boy" should've been the lead track from David J's album, Urban Urbane. Well, better late than never, I always say. And it's no wonder radio fell for this one early—"Space Cowboy" is one helluva hypnotic beauty! With crisp production that enhances the sharp drums and acoustic guitars—not to mention David J's whispery vocals—"Space Cowboy" sounds like a radio-friendly winner. This is the one you asked for. You want it, you got it. David J. On tour now with PJ Harvey! LR

WEEN - PURE GUAVA (ELEKTRA)

On the liner notes of their newest release, Pure Guava, WEEN advise their fans, "When WEEN comes to your town, bring us hot meals. No more junk food, thanks." That's kind of incongruous, though-kinda out of sync with WEEN's presentation-'cause Pure Guava's nineteen tracks, while ultimately nonnutritious, are tasty, habit-forming treats that Mom probably won't approve of. Gene and Dean Ween's last record (for Shimmy-Disc), The Pod, indicated that the duo were taking their schitzo-tech, quasi-spiritual rantings in a more Ziggy Stardust/Oueen direction, but there's only one song ("Don't Get Too Close To My Fantasy") on Pure Guava with that obvious bent. The rest of the material seems a bit closer to their debut GodWEENSatan (but rendered in a toned-down fashion), or it's off on another tangent, toward sonic dissemblance. Fave tracks here include "Push Th'Little Daisies," "Pumpin' The Man," "I Saw Gener Cryin' In His Sleep," "Touch My Tooter," "Hey Fat Boy (Asshole)," and the aforementioned "Don't Get 2 Close (2 My Fantasy)." BIG MOUNTAIN -WAKE UP (QUALITY RECORDS)

This album answers the musical question, "What do you get when you fuse reggae, rock and jazz?" The answer is a surprisingly fertile hybrid album from a band from-of all places-San Diego. Formerly known as Shiloh, Big Mountain has apparently been knocking them dead on the club circuit for some time now. And since reggae is finally getting long-overdue acceptance on the radio level, a set like this is just what we need to counter the argument, "It all sounds the same." Big Mountain disputes that lie with a vengeance. There are lots of head-nodding, heartpumping moments on Wake Up, but when forced to choose my favorites were the uplifting "Light'n Up" and the joyous "Reggae Inna Summertime." Don't miss the jazzy sax on "Touch My Light." In addition to the standout performances of groupmembers Quino, Jerome Cruze, Manfred Reinke, Gregory T. Blakney and Mike Luallin, the sax work from John Rekevics propels this stellar effort. I'm not big on comparisons, but this one reminds me of the great British two-tone bands. Don't miss it. THE SKELETONS -WAITING (ALIAS)

This Springfield, MO oufit ditches the body piercings, gender bendings, and feedback frenzies for wholesome, no frills rock. But beneath this tree, seemingly disparate roots of country, R&B, surf, and pure pop intertwine. "Things We Need" employs a swirling Dream Syndicate style piano and streamlined vocals. A funk element surfaces on "Only Daddy (That'll Walk The Line)" when a horn section collides with keyboards. The point that made Waiting worth it was "Rain, Snow, And Sleet's" Feeliesque percussion, warbling slide guitar, and frond-swaying vocals. Though I can't attest to it, the 'Tons have a reputation as a must-see live band, and they appeared on Jonathan Richman's country album. For straightforward snapping, clapping, and pop these guys are alive and licking. DAVID BERAN

THE GOATS (RUFFHOUSE/COLUMBIA)

Rap, as we know of it today, is roughly 15 years old and in that time has evolved into different areas. Often labeled as "Alternative," the "live" Hip-hop sound may simply be ahead of it's time. The Goats, a 10-piece band, may have put together the right combination that even skeptics may nod their heads to. Politically motivated and written from experience, this debut effort attacks and challenges society's ills and the powers that be. With snide, satirical and sometimes goofy skits injected in between cuts, this album should have a little something for everyone. SINGLES by Dave Sholin

JUDE COLE - Tell The Truth (Reprise) Jude continues to prove himself a master at crafting a Pop song. Success at Top 40, Album and A/ C clearly demonstrates the versatility of this always exciting singer/songwriter. From the rocker "Start The Car," he steers back to music's center lane, making a powerful case for honesty in a relationship. The song's intensity builds steadily, adding even more meaning to its very relatable theme.

PRINCE AND THE NEW POWER GEN-ERATION - 7 (Paisley Park/Warner Bros.)

Each generation has their creative forces. When history recalls the musical contributions Prince has made so far, not to mention what he'll do in the future, it's a certainty he'll be listed right alongside the greats. Once again creating a distinct mood, he offers a spiritual message by tastefully sampling Lowell Fulsom's and Jimmy McCrackin's R&B classic, "Tramp."

DEL AMITRI - Be My Downfall (A&M) Since this Scottish band's two biggest hits to-date, "Kiss This Thing Goodbye" and "Always The Last To Know" were bouncy, uptempo efforts, here's an opportunity for audiences to experience the group as balladeers. Written by the group's Justin Currie, he provides his partners with fresh means of expression not only lyrically, but instrumentally as well.

HI-FIVE - Quality Time (live) As Marcus "Mac" Sanders correctly points out in this week's Hi-Five profile (see page 15), "Quality Time" refers to more than one type of relationship. In a romantic context, the quintet defines the meaning of QT, propelled by that vibe supplied by none other than the song's writer and producer, R. Kelly.

BAD COMPANY - This Could Be The One (Atco/EastWest America) It's all about staying in touch with the changing needs and tastes of the audience. So far, the '90s track record for Steve Howe and Bad Company indicates they are real clear on that concept. Superb musicianship, brilliant harmonies and a melody that should spell continued success.

THE S.O.U.L. S.Y.S.T.E.M. - It's Gonna Be A Lovely Day (Arista) That C + C brain trust has done it again! David Cole and Robert Clivilles rejuvenate this Bill Withers' song, one of their personal favorites, with help from the powerful vocals of a new foursome that includes former Seduction member Michelle Visage. Got to love this updated version featured on the soundtrack of "The Bodyguard." Already on fire at HOT 97 New York 14-8 (49 plays) and KMEL San Francisco 27-23.

MAIA AMADA - Love Never Fails (Word/ Epic) An exceptional new voice has arrived on

NEIL YOUNG - Harvest Moon (Reprise)

Twenty years after his classic Harvest album and its most famous single, HEART OF GOLD, Neil Young and many of the same musicians have recreated the original's acoustic elegance and simplicity. The re-formed Stray Gators, along with James Taylor, Linda Ronstadt and Nicolette Larson, contribute to the harmonic ambiance that distinguishes some of Neil Young's most compelling compositions in a decade. These are all songs of morality-aged experience. A song like FROM HANK TO HENDRIX recalls the power music once had and how we might still frame our experiences in the context of popular themes, while UNKNOWN LEGEND speaks of the surrender of youthful innocence and wanderlust to the burdens of an Alicedoesn't-live-here-anymore existence. The title track, HARVEST MOON, is a cute romantic play sung from the heart of an old harvester. And only the heartless won't hear the devotional commitment of songs like SUCH A WOMAN. Over the past five years, Young has been seeking his sonic youth muse while casually gathering such sentimental thoughts as these for what he's admitted before would be the eventual second Harvest. It's about time, literally and figuratively.
