Politicians OK \$7b Airwave Auction

The controversial Licensing ment to the FCC for assign-Improvement Act of 1993, which the Clinton Administration hopes will bring \$7 billion to the country's ailing coffers, took a step closer to passage when on Tuesday proposed legislation was adopted unanimously by the House Energy and Commerce Committee. The administration likes auctioning as opposed to the current application system as it will bring money in faster.

Part of the bill, known as the "Emerging Telecommunications Technologies Act," would reallocate 200MHz of frequency from the govern-

ment to the private sector. As of last week it was hoped that an experimental auction of only 30 MHz would take place over three years, and only if the move proved satisfactory would the other 170 MHz be released. Commerce Secretary Ron Brown was on record as wanting the entire spectrum sold off right away.

The bill is co-sponsored by Rep. Edward J. Markey (D-According to Mass.). Markey's office, auctioning "represents a reform of the current lottery assignment process that in recent years was plagued by rampant

spectrum speculators who won lotteries and then often sold the rights to frequencies at huge profit."

The legislation will require the FCC to build in special mechanisms so that entrepreneurs and innovators without deep financial resources can participate in auction.

Broadcasters and the NAB have both been objecting to opening up the airwaves to

hurt what they see as radio's current re-bound into financial health. Pyramid Broadcasting chief Richie Balsbaugh was particularly incensed at the idea. "Radio is rebounding and he (Clinton) wants to put it in a tailspin," he said.

Though it hasn't yet issued a statement regarding the current development, the NAB has been intensely lob-

auction, fearful that it would bying to have radio and television be exempt from spectrum auction.

Supporters of the bill are hoping the space will be used for new technologies such as wireless computers, cellular phones, high-definition television and digital satellite radio.

Similar legislation has previously died in Congress. It now has to go before the House Budget Committee.

Gavin to unveil

A new, as-yet unnamed section, edited by Kent Zimmerman and Keith Gavin next week.

According to the editors, the format will be an extension of Album, Adult Alternative and Jazz in that it will zero in on adult listeners, the premise being that adults are hip and still want to hear new things-i.e. life after after Stairway To Heaven

The Zimmermen found 45 radio stations that are banking on the concept that adult tastes in true album radio range from rock n roll to alternative to instrumental to country to an appreciation of songwriters.

The idea for the new section was technically conceived four years ago-at Zimmerman, will debut in the time the Adult Alternative chart was instituted. With a definite rock slant, this current endeavor was born out of a "closed door" meeting at this year's Gavin Seminar, which was attended by key programmers, record company executives, retailers and consultants. The design will be unique to any Gavin format, past or present.

"Our purpose is to keep true album radio alive," says co-editor Kent Zimmerman. "We at Gavin are in a change mode. As for the current Album section, we'll be re-vamping that as well.

Industry vet Jerry Greenberg, most recently president of Sony Music subsidiary WTG

Records, has been tapped by the glove of Michael Jackson to head Jackson's newlyformed label, MJJ.

Greenberg has been a record company executive for just over 25 years. During his career-to-date he has signed many of the biggest names in music, including Genesis, Foreigner, ABBA and the Spinners. For MJJ he will oversee the operations of the label, which is based in Sony's new Santa Monica headquar-

"This is a tremendous opportunity— to work with Michael Jackson in developing a brand new label and discover new talent, as well as having the advantage of the superior distribution skills of Sony Music," said Greenberg. "This is a particularly healthy time for the record business with all the different kinds of good music and new artists being exposed before the public. MII intends to be a major

player on today's scene."

Jackson's label is part of the long-term, record-setting deal he signed with Sony last year. No artists have been signed to the label.

"We are very excited about working with Jerry," said MJJ Enterprises chief executive officer Steve Chabre. "Michael has met many gifted people who are looking for the opportunity to express their talents. Now, with Jerry, MJJ can help provide that opportunity."

Gersh To Run Capitol?

The word around Hollywood town these days is that Geffen Records exec Gary Gersh is one step away from becoming president of Capitol Records. An obvious stumbling block is the position of current Capitol president Hale Milgrim who has a secure long-term contract. It's said Milgrim has been offered a boutique label within the Capitol framework.

Sources inside Capitol say emphatically, "the company does not respond to rumor," but wagging tongues say that Gersh, credited for bringing Nirvana and Sonic Youth to Geffen, has been having intense meetings with EMI Records Group chairman Charles Koppelman.

Clinton Political Ad Bills Bashed

A number of bills are being introduced to the United States House of Representatives, in an effort to reform the campaign process. Last year, then-president George Bush vetoed proposed changes that regulate political advertising on radio and television, but the Clinton Administration is re-introducing some bills that won't sit well with broadcasters.

S.3, which has already been approved by the Senate Rules Committee, brought an immediate protest from the NAB on behalf of broadcasters. The bill, re-introduced by Senator David Boren (D-

Oklahoma) would provide candidates with fixed time at lowest preemptible rates, and would provide an additional 50% discount to senate candidates who agree with overall campaign spending limits.

"This is a Washington classic—politicians using a perceived public concern to guarantee themselves additional benefits," said NAB executive vice president/government relations James C. May. "In the name of campaign reform, Congress and the Administration are creating 'political food stamps' that will be financed through taxpayers' dollars and result in a new

federal bureaucracy to administer the program."

Another bill pending would require free time to any candidate who has been attacked in an ad paid for by a political action committee.

"The House's requirement that broadcasters pay for candidates' time to respond to third-party ads deemed 'negative' can only be described as punitive toward broadcasters," May said

It's not clear how far the bills will get, but consensus is, the closer they get to Clinton's desk, the more likely they are to be passed.

CD Prices Under Attack in Britain

At a time when U.K. CD album and singles sales are booming, the British Phonographic Industry (BPI) is embroiled in a pricing controversy that has been simmering since CDs debuted, and is now being brought to the front burner by a noisy National Heritage Select Committee investigation.

CD prices in Britain are comparable to those in here the states, but as the price of CD players themselves have gone down, some parties feel that the cost of CDs should go down as well. People who include Simply managers Eliot Rashman and Andy Dodd and Dire Straits manager Ed Bicknell are calling for British CD prices to be lowered by what translates to approximately three American dollars.

In a letter to Gavin's British sister-publication *Music Week*, Rashman said, "I believe that a two pound drop in CD prices will show exactly the right attitude to

the customer in recognizing the difficulties they have had to bear throughout the recession. Anyone that believes that this will cripple the music business is as daft as a brush."

On the other side are record company executives and retailers, who fear that lower pricing will not only bring revenue down, it will force labels to overlook some bands, especially esoteric groups or those produced by independent companies. Indie labels, who say their views are being ignored, worry that lower prices will banish their product from the shelves. "Once my distributor has taken its commission I'm left with a fiver per disc at best," said indie owner Steven Pittis. "If the dealer price was cut any more, I would simply have no choice but to pack it in." Because the volatile issue is

being excerpted on television, shopkeepers say consumers are hitting them with

questions such as "How do labels work out the prices of CDs, and when are prices coming down?" Both sides are becoming concerned about the rowdiness of the hearings, and the extent of the accusations, because no matter what the outcome the public is beginning to look at labels and retailers as greedy. "We are in danger of missing out on recovery because of the damage to the public's perception of our business," said Ken Sockolov who is head of European operations for Tower.

Currently, figures show that, in the U.K., sales of CD albums have jumped 32% and sales of CD singles have soared 60% compared to last year. At present, what the outcome will be is anyone's guess, but as *Music Week* editor Steve Redmond said, "Let's get it absolutely straight: the worst that could be said of the record industry is that it is guilty of being successful."

Music Row Gets New Blueprint

The second annual Music Row Industry Summit. held May 6-8 at the Regal Maxwell House Hotel in Nashville, attracted a crowd of 412 (an increase of over 41% over last year's attendance) who came to find out about the inner workings of Nashville's famed Music Row. The subject matter was quite varied, ranging from "Blueprints For A New Publishing Company" to "Organizing The Fan Club To Produce Income," from "Dance Club Marketing" to "New Christian Music Frontiers."

While such a wide range of subjects was covered, two themes seemed to be brought up over and over again. One was the (perceived) renewed difficulty in breaking new artists on Country radio. Arista's Tim DuBois pointed out, "In 1990, radio became new artist conscious. There was a flushing of the system. Now those new artists are core artists, and we're not seeing the breakthrough of the brand new artist." Atlantic's Rick Blackburn concurred, saying, "I hope we don't forget that this new blood is the reason we've had our success the last few years." The other theme that ran throughout the convention was the kinds of alternative marketing that can be used to break a new artist. Cited most frequently were Ricky Lynn Gregg's level of success at the country dance clubs, Tracy Byrd's sales success after his "Trax Tour" at clubs across the country, and the possible use of the infomercial to bring Country music to a wider audience. But, says Warner Bros. Bob Saporiti, when all is said and done, "Country radio is still absolutely our most important marketing tool. We could not afford to pay for the exposure on radio that a song gets when it's played in heavy rotation."

Robert K. Oermann opened the seminar with a terrific presentation on "How Nashville Became Music City." (Oermann also scripted last week's excellent television special "Women In Country Music). Everyone was abuzz over Charlie Cook's popular Radio Research: Listening To The Listeners Roundtable.

evening's Music Row awards included Vince Gill (Artist of the Year & Performance Video), Wynonna (Performance Video, Breakthrough Artist Newcomer & Album Cut Award), Alison Krauss (Independent Artist and Independent Video); songwriter Victoria Shaw (Breakthrough Songwriter for Garth Brooks' "The River"); "Walkaway Joe" (Song of the Year); Kathy Mattea (Concept Video of the Year): Deborah Allen (Breakthrough Artist Video); Billy Dean (Long Form Video); Lorianne Crook and Charlie Chase (Electronic Media Personality); Mercury Records (Marketing Achievement for their Billy Ray Cyrus "Achy Breaky Heart" Dance Club Promotion) and Country Music Foundation Director Bill Ivey (Founders' Award).

Kudos to Music Row Industry Summit founders Jeff Walker (Aristo Media) and David Ross (Music Row Magazine) for a job well done.

Make your own CD

IBM and Blockbuster Entertainment have gotten together to make available to record stores the technology to dial up an instant database that would, literally, draw music onto a blank CD. The companies hope to debut the equipment in a year, and if put into regular use, drawing music would make stock rooms obsolete.

Initial use would be to make available out-of-stock titles. A color printer would spit out liner notes.

It's hard to say whether record companies will embrace the idea. Although it could, in the long run, eliminate returns and bring down transportation fees, copyright procedures would have to be changed.

Initial response from Sony was negative. "Sony Music supports its retailers," said the label's press and public affairs department, "however, since commercial copying is illegal and it's not clear to Sony Music what benefit the consumers would derive from in-store copying, we are not supporting this system."

The company tempered its comment by saying, "We are confident that IBM and Blockbuster would not engage in commercial piracy. Sony Music has not been contacted by either company."

RIAA president Jay Berman said the new technology would mean that individual companies would have to license their own repertoire. "It would violate our reproduction and distribution rights if someone would go ahead and do this without the authority of the copy-

right owner," he said, Blockbuster and IBM plan to confront the copyright issue with a plan that would send information about albums purchased back to a record company immediately.

Berman also foresaw the new technology changing

consumers buying habits. "Someone goes into a store thinking they want to buy Bruce Springsteen might also buy a Madonna or a Prince album because they're walking around and they see it. If all you do is go to a machine and press

your number, wait five minutes and get your CD, the impulse-buy is gone."

All parties agree the idea is mind-boggling. "This is an incredible technology," said Berman. "Very, very interesting."

MCA International expands, Larsen named president



Well-known international music industry executive Jorgen Larsen has been appointed to the newly-created position of president of MCA Music Entertainment International. Larsen will oversee the company's existing operations in the U.K., Japan, Germany and

Canada. MCA plans to broaden their international operations, and Larsen's appointment is a reflection of that planned growth.

"We have begun the expansion of our international record operations during the past three years, and we have experienced local growth," said MCA chairman Al Teller. "Now, with Jorgen a part of the MCA team, we are ready to realize our goal of opening and operating our own record companies in every major territory in the world."

Larsen has been managing partner of the independent German record company Deutsche Schallplatten Berlin since 1991. He has also served as senior vice president, CBS Record International, Europe and president of CBS Records, France and CBS Records, Germany.

MCA's international arm will be responsible for distributing MCA Records, Geffen/DGC Records, GRP Records and their affiliated labels. It will be based in London.

"MCA has a full range of music and is poised to capture a much larger share of the international record market," said Larsen. "It is an exciting opportunity to drive MCA's worldwide expansion, particularly when the global consumer has such a thirst for music."

ACADEMY OF COUNTRY MUSIC AWARDS

Garth Brooks was awarded his third straight Entertainer Of The Year award Tuesday (5/11) at The Academy of Country Music awards, held in Los Angeles' Universal Amphitheatre. Other big winners were Brooks and Dunn, who picked up three awards, including Single of The Year, Album Of The Year and Best Vocal Duet Of The Year. Ronnie Dunn grinned "we're having so much fun with this we feel guilty coming up here," as he and Kix Brooks picked up their trophies. The show started off with Vince Gill's "One More Last Chance" which contains a line inspired by the time George Jones, (after then-wife Tammy Wynette had locked up the car keys) rode a riding lawnmower ten miles down the road to the nearest bar. After Vince sang "she may have taken my car keys but she forgot about my old John Deere," he called down "How 'bout it George?" as Jones laughed. Sony Music is taking the "if you build it, they will come" approach toward a newly-constructed, multiuse recording complex. The enormous, five floor building, located in Manhattan's infamous "Hell's Kitchen," officially opened for business on the eve of May 10.

The 25-room, former film studio features a state-of-theart recording studio, songwriting and rehearsal rooms, full video facilities and a 65,000 square foot sound stage for live concerts. Sony Music president Thomas D. Mottola describes the center as "the first creative complex of its kind anywhere in the world. It provides our artists with the opportunity to create in an environment that nurtures the artistic process."



The center reflects record companies' growing trend of developing artists from within instead of expending energy and resources to lure them away from other labels. "The facility is looking to be available to name artists and young artists as well," explains vice president of Sony Music Al Smith. "It's geared toward the full range of needs of all our artists."

The building was owned by Fox Film Corp. during the golden years of sound stages, and classics such as Miracle On 34th Street and On The Waterfront were shot at the site. "It's unique to the music business and reminiscent of what the movie studio system was like," Smith points out. Experts estimate that the project's price tag was a cool \$40 million, and Sony is hoping their efforts will bear fruit well into the -DAVID BERAN

After 10 years with the label, **EMIRG's** vice president of album promotion, **Norm Osborne** exits. He can be reached at (908) 613-6550.





Determining when to pull the plug on a new song can only come when the public gives it a definitive thumbs down. Last week, **A&M's Scot D.J. Finck** and **Elektra's Tracy Leshay** shared perspectives from their vantage point as record industry professionals.

This time around, two respected

programmers offer opinions on the subject. Experience has taught WCIL Carbondale, Ill. OM Tony Waitekus that the networking process sometimes "causes people to repeat something just because one person said it. That allows someone else to do their thinking." He underscores the point that, "Every market is different and every person has to evaluate things for themselves. Networking is for finding ideas, discovering something new or getting additional information" but he warns, "don't

Something which truly bothers Tony is that "some stations don't regard music as important as perhaps it ought to be." For

instance, "adding records for promotions while forgetting that all music is not created equal. Since it's 95 percent of the product, it's of paramount importance and shouldn't be taken lightly. It's all about

discovering what the true blue hits are instead of adding records for flimsy reasons and then moving on to another record."

Tony's advice to programmers, especially young programmers, is that "they need to realize records have different types of appeal. That appeal determines the kind of response they get.

Since he's in a smaller market and recognizable to many people in town. Tony has the luxury of hearing what his audience likes and doesn't like. For example, he says, "If I play a Ray Charles record and it's not burning up the phones, but the album is selling well, or I hear people on the street tell me they like that tune, it means a lot because it's very unusual for people to go out of their way to make a comment like that. Generally, people over 24 are simply not going to call the request line.

For those who don't do callout or what Waitekus sarcastically calls, "other scientific forms of research" he advises, "using your own gut feel. It has to come from withinknowledge of the market, the audience. A lot of this is intuition." He chooses to go out and talk to people, something he feels is "more important than sitting behind a desk judging callout results done by interns who would probably rather be outside at the beach than in an office doing callout."

As for those who use other stations' research, Tony throws up a danger sign again, pointing to market differences, not knowing what the competition is like or songs they may be playing. He likes networking to "discover a potential hit, not for having someone predetermine for me that a particular record doesn't work "

As to the amount of exposure, Tony feels a new release "deserves four plays a day for a minimum of five weeks. The only exception is for records getting an unusual amount of negative calls," which he says is rare and indicates a dayparting problem more than anything else.

He reminds PDs or MDs not to be intimidated by pressure from labels to add records. "It's not a reason to add a record to take away a chance from one that's developing. Label promotion staffs are only trying to do their job, but the programmers have to do their job, too.

Jimmy Steal, PD at Q102 Cinncinati, firmly believes that, "there can't be too much information." Jimmy thinks somewhere between four to sixweeks is fair exposure. When he hears a negative, it only means something if it comes from a programmer he respects. "I take a hard look at that point and I'd be a fool not to."

ARBITRON ADVISORY COUNCIL PROPOSES SWEEPING CHANGES

methodology have been proposed by the Arbitron Radio Advisory Council in response to ongoing industry concerns about sample size, reliability and utility of the data. Various options to increase sample size have been under discussion within the Council since 1989. To date, only one of the proposals has been acceptable to a majority of subscribers. The current proposal was agreed upon in a special meeting of the Council in Chicago on April 13 and it calls for: Increasing sample target by 70% through reconfiguring the current 12-week survey periods into eigh-

weeping changes to the Arbitron

- Increasing sample target by 70% through reconfiguring the current 12-week survey periods into eighteen-week rolling average reports and distributing a portion of the ADI and TSA sample into the metro.
- Delivering an eighteen-week rolling average report every six weeks via electronic download.
- Block coding the diary database for easier cross-tabulations with other consumer product and lifestyle databases.
- Allowing for access to each sixweek phase of respondent level data through Maximi\$er, Arbitron's previously announced "AID-on-adesktop" PC application slated for introduction in October, 1993.

Here's my seven point assessment of the proposal based on fifteen years of radio management experience, seven years of Arbitron experience and two years of consulting radio stations on audience research. 1) More sample is motherhood and apple pie. More is better by definition. The plan is designed to give more sample without increased cost in Continuous Measurement markets. Jay Guyther, Arbitron's Radio Stations Services vice president, says that "the one and two report markets will be considered after the Continuous Measurement market decision has been made." More sample is better. It will help stabilize the data.

2) Block coding the database was an idea proposed in 1987 but Arbitron did not want to invest in the additional data and software required. This change of heart may be more important to radio broadcasters than the increased sample. Being able to cross tab the diary database at the block group level

with geo-demographic systems such as PRIZM, Clusterplus or Acorn promises a superior qualitative audience analysis. The current Zip level cross tabbing is too broad in a fragmented environment like radio.

3) Having 8 six-week periods year is a brilliant compromise. Six weeks is long enough to get a picture of the audience, but not so long as to fail to detect market changes.

4) Arbitrends is currently delivered with limited

demos except for the quarterly. The plan is to include all demos and dayparts in the every six weeks delivery schedule. Welcome to the eight-books-of-the-year club if this plan is accepted.

5) Buried in the plan is a very dangerous phrase: "rolling average." This idea is retrogressive, ill-conceived and will find broadcasters using six weeks of sample rather than the 18 weeks intended. At the present time, an Arbitrends report contains 12 weeks of sample, and in the new system it will include 18 weeks of sample. However, now the broadcaster must "extrapolate" each four-week period. The advertising agency has no access to a discrete phase of the report. Under the new plan, each six weeks will be processed as a total report and the six-week period available on Maximi\$er (which agencies have or can get). There may be no need for Arbitrends in this scenario. Then, for Arbitrends, the three six-week phases will be added together and

divided by three to generate a "rolling average." In 1986, the Advisory Council and the RAB GOALS committee studied the effect of rolling average and agreed that for a scheme of delivery that has overlapping periods, a rolling average was placing more weighting in the system than desired. This is a very technical argument that has major business and quality of service issues connected to it. Beware of accepting rolling aver-

ages! The program director will like the ease of getting a discrete six-week period, but the concern already is too little sample. The sales manager will probably hate the six-week data because the sales environment will be changing based on the ratings every six weeks instead of 12 weeks. 6) TSA and ADI sample will be reduced by about 15%. According to Guyther, the non-metro TSA and ADI sample now is about 40,000. Under the proposed plan this would drop to 33,750. At least the plan doesn't eliminate the TSA and ADI, which many stations find helpful in their sales

efforts. Stations with large coverage areas would not want to see the TSA and ADI numbers disappear.

7) A printed report will be produced, but the form of it hasn't been developed. Guyther reveals that discussions have pointed toward a "Buyer's Guide" to include rankers of top demos, Reach and Frequency tables, First Preference listening estimates and multi-book averages.

Arbitron is doing a "road show" to the NAB COLRAM Committee, RAB Board meeting, and the American Association of Advertising Agencies, as well as having the Arbitron sales staff visit with subscribers. The proposed plan makes sweeping changes to the way radio stations do business. Ask questions and give feedback now. It is important!

Arbitron wants to have a final decision at the August Arbitron Radio Advisory Council meeting. Implementation of the plan is estimated to begin in July of 1994 at the earliest. ●

Our young friends in Alternative can take pride in their recent trailblazing for singles now happening in

Top 40 like the Tasmin Archer, Stereo MC's, 4 Non Blondes, New Order, Belly and Spin Doctors. Our Alternative editor Linda Ryan is particularly proud to note the 4 Non Blondes as having ruled her chart months ago,

thus setting a pace for eventual Top-40 play.

I asked Ms. Ryan to predict some future Pop hits based on early Alternative action and she's willing to project **Darden Smith**'s *Place In The Sun*, **Radiohead**'s *Creep* and **The Waterboys**' *The Return Of Pan* as probable winners.



THE ALLURE OF A/C

his week I want to share a letter with you that I received from one of the people I saw at this year's Gavin Seminar, Shannon West, who's the music director at WIVY/Coast 102.9 FM in Jacksonville, Florida. If you attended the A/C session this year, you'll remember Shannon - she also works at a music store and was able to share relevant retail experiences. She notes that one of my recent comments (that A/C is song-driven rather than artist-driven) reminded her of something she intended to bring up at that session just as time ran out. She says:

"There is also the fact that some artists just seem to find great songs to record. Some of these are name artists, but they became name artists because they broke with a strong song, and continued to consistently deliver quality material. Some

the technology...then a pretty person (of either gender) gets tossed into the

"The technology can compensate for lack of voice, and a good beat and some shouts and effects can fill in for lyrics. This stuff definitely has its place; it's great to dance to, fun to work out to and the videos are cool to watch. But how much of that is applicable to an A/C audience—who are generally older, have other concerns than fashion and fun, and are listening-not watching and dancing!

"The Allure article also brought up an interesting point: A lot of female artists are selected to appeal to MTV viewers who skew male and are selected because they appeal to industry executives, who are also primarily male. But most A/Cs target female listeners!

"There are some very beautiful

because they are good writers; some because they found good writers. With some lucky ones, it's both.

"Michael Bolton had a track record as a writer before he got recognition as a singer. Jon Secada, Celine Dion and Michael W. Smith were not originally name artists, but got that way with great songs, and there are several developing artists who bave a great future if they continue to record the kind of material they

"I think a lot of the frustration that promotion people express is a result of not getting response to 'priority' product' that was not tailored for our audience, especially some Top 40 or Alternative material they want to cross over: Lyrically insubstantial, beat-driven ballads by young artists and trendy sixties spinoffs by cute progressive acts.

"Dionne Warwick nailed it in ber recent Gavin interview, and there was a great article on artist development in the 'video age' in the January, 1993 issue of Allure (one of those clothes-and-makeup mags fashion slaves like me read). They report that the look comes first...then women who are very talented, and we play them—but the extremely young, pouty ones with the highpitched voices just don't stand up to Gloria Estefan and Vanessa Williams, and offer little that adult women can relate to. Also, grownups tend to be a little deeper than teenagers, even if we often don't act it, and puppy love lyrics, or songs that repeat one or two lines over and over, just don't hold an adult listener's attention.

Thanks to Shannon West for her comments. I'll add that in my observation of A/C programming practices, there's a strong tendency for artists with male appeal to get added and get higher rotationsprobably because the majority of A/C programmers are men, and whether they are men or women, they often have come from a rock or Top 40 background, where maleappeal music succeeds better than

Sometimes these songs rise to the top of the A/C charts, which are based on airplay and rotations! Comments on all this, anyone? Write or fax me c/o Gavin!




With the chart-topping success of both Charles Fambrough releases, CF extends the rope ladder to pianist Bill O'Connell by producing his new solo project. The result is O'Connell's first solo record in several years. It comes after playing steadily for years, first with two-year stints each playing behind Mongo Santamaria and Astrud Gilberto, and spending ten years with Dave Valentin. O'Connell eschews

the dreaded "contemporary" and "mainstream" labels as much as we do, so Signature's musical menu covers everything from blistering acoustic trio (Alfalfa Sez) to picture postcard tunes bursting with melody (Dina and Main Street) to sheer rhythmic vehicles (St. Croix). Whenever the track calls for bass, Fambrough is present and accounted for, and he even tossed in two of his own songs. O'Connell is one of those unsung heros who, having spent years backing others, relishes this spotlight release. Signature is embellished throughout with Afro-Cuban percussion by Pablo Batista. As a bonus, Grover Washington, Jr. joins on soprano on Angels At Play and Main Street. Like O'Connell, Grover's music speaks any dialect, format or genre. Both Jazz and Adult Alternative need apply here.

RYAN KISOR - On The One (Columbia)

It's kinda scary. On his cover poses holding his trumpet, young Ryan Kisor resembles a young Chet Baker. Like Baker (who came from Oklahoma), Kisor hails from Iowa, a state not known for producing jazz talent. Barely twenty, he was the winner of the 1990 Thelonious Monk Institute's Louis Armstrong competition. After a few contests, honor bands, jazz camp and even

appearances on the The New Mickey Mouse Club Show, Kisor sparked the necessary hype to bust his way out of Sioux City, hardly a springboard to jazz employment bliss. Supporting Ryan on his second record, On The One, are top names currently charting high on the Gavin Jazz fifty—Mulgrew Miller, Lewis Nash and, as producer, Bobby Watson. OTO sports



a broad ensemble sound. Kisor's main themes are reinforced by a refined alto and tenor sax tandem, who cling to his licks like the Secret Service. On alto is his mate Chris Potter. Tenor player Mark Turner—also in his early twenties—comes from the New Orleans circuit. Together they're punchy but smooth and emit a seasoned blend. We like the dreamy but warmly sentimental reading of Thinking Of You. It brings back those cherished comparisons to, yeah, you guessed it—Chet Baker.

LEWIS NASH - Rhythm Is My Business (Evidence)

The cool thing about the current jazz recording scene is how the top fifty airplay titles stylistically intersect and interlock. At the same time he's unveiling his own big band effort, Bobby Watson is producing some ensemble sessions for Ryan Kisor's latest, which happen to also feature drummer Lewis Nash. Now Nash's latest on Evidence, appropriately titled Rhythm Is My Business, features both vibist Steve Nelson and pianist Mulgrew Miller-who are currently burning up the top five with Miller's steaming Novus release, Hand In Hand, Still with us on this? Never one to even consider the prospect of overplaying, bandleader Nash is generous and accommodating. His power is evident in the once-around swing exercise of 106 Nix. Be it brushes, mallets or sticks, Nash is drum professor and the laureate of swing. On one track Nash asked the band to imagine the frenzied tempo of an ace tap dancer, and the result is the snappiest piece of the set, My Shining Hour. Nash's speeding brush work alone is worth the price of admission. The brightest moments of RIMB is clearly the bouncy, swing bits like the aforementioned Nix and Hour or the high speed bossa nova feel on Sabaku.



New Releases

DONALD FAGEN Tomorrow's Girls (Reprise)

The official rap on the street is that if you combine Donald Fagen's new solo album with Walter Becker's upcoming (he's recording right now) one, it equals Steely Dan back together on tour. Even Fagen and Becker probably wish it was that easy as they continue to tease the musical taste buds of the audiophile elite. The Donald is putting the final trimming on his latest once-a-decade offering, and Tomorrow's Girls is the first track, a snazzy finger-popper. It's uptown, bluesy and maybe even a bit uppity. Mainly, though, it's Donald Fagen and it's sure great to have him back.

COL. BRUCE HAMPTON & THE AQUARIUM RESCUE UNIT Mirrors Of Embarrassment (Capricorn/Warner Bros.)

Eccentric in a cracker Captain Beefheart sort of way, Col. Bruce Hampton and his ARU crank out rock n roll with fusionary efficiency. Not too polished—in fact, the band seems to thrive on their funkiness—this time the Rescue unit is augmented by such luminary guest pickers as Bela Fleck, and some harp blowing by Blues Traveler's John Popper. So, exactly, how strange is this band? Well, one of the members is named Apt. Q258 and he's responsible for the band's "Harmonorbital Trans-Atmospheric Suspended Circular Vibrational Membrane Systems." Start with the ripping No Ego's Under Water.

THE PROCLAIMERS I'm Gonna Be (500 Miles) (Milan/BMG)

The other magnetic aspect of the movie Benny & Joon (second to the irrepressible Johnny Depp) is the unearthing of the Proclaimers' I'm Gonna Be (500 Miles). Grafted onto the top of the orchestral soundtrack, the song first appeared on the band's second Chrysalis album. Film music buff Alan Mason (who selected music for such films as Rain Man) and actress Mary Stuart Masterson rescued the song by giving it valuable and poignant exposure during the opening credits.

GIN BLOSSOMS New Miserable Experience (A&M)

Just for the sake of update, here's the Gin Blossoms, a band named after W.C. Fields' complexion. Eight months and 150,000 units later, the band has new cover art and will be making new rounds at radio. If, like me, you came in a little bit toward the middle of the movie, a revitalized listen to NME (with brand new tour van snapshots by singer Robin Wilson) will give you a thrill. The folksy, chimey Gin Blossoms sounds—Hey Jealousy, Lost Horizons, Mrs. Rita—are even better the second time through. Awesome!

Wise Words And Good Advice From The Real World

The end of the school year means the start of a career...at least for the lucky ones in today's uncertain economic climate. The even luckier ones manage to find a job in their chosen field of interest.

Many prominent radio and music industry professionals got their early start in college radio—often seen as the spawning ground for new generations of talent and an indicator of future music trends. In this special focus, Gavin polled a range of college radio graduates on the stepping stones in their careers and their perceptions of how college radio is evolving.

These shared experiences provide a fascinating insight into the (sometimes unconventional) routes into the commercial environment.

MIKE MENA, Vice president of A&R, SBK Records

FORMER STATION: WNYT, Long Island, New York

STATUS: Music director for two years.

Mike got his start with an internship working for Steve Backer and Barry Levine at Columbia Records. That was where Mike did most of his "grunt work," taking care of mailings, newsletters and ordering more product for college reps. This eventually led to a position at A&M working with Karen Glauber. It was here that Mike was allowed more freedom to develop his skills as a promotion person. As Mike says, "I got to feel like I was part of the success of a project. I felt like I was making an impact."

BIG BREAK: "I think my big break really came when I left A&M to come to SBK. The company was brand new and there were no footsteps to follow. We got to create everything from scratch and that was exciting."



passion. My pet peeve is when I meet people who are more in love with the music business than they are with music! I think it takes a real effort to keep it pure, especially as time goes on.

When I feel that happening to me, I usually go home and and put something on the stereo to remind me why I love music.

"Another thing is never give up trying to change the world. We all want to make a difference and we all can make a difference. Or we'll die trying!

KEVIN STAPLEFORD, Vice president and operations manager, Noble Broadcasting.

FORMER STATION: KDST, San Diego; KLA, Los Angeles

Kevin Stapleford's story is a bit unusual in that ten years ago he started as a phone op at 91X. A quick glance at the job title above illustrates how far he's come. Kevin literally worked his way up the corporate ladder doing jobs at 91X that, aside from phone op, included copywriting, deejay and creative services director.



"I think the fact that I was willing to try anything helped me," speculates Kevin. "And I tried a lot of things! Ten years later, I feel I know this station inside

Kevin is quick to cite other examples of 91X employees who started out as phone interns, including the newly-hired PM drive time deejay, Tom Perry and marketing director, Dawn Gallagher. Also taken from the 91X farm system are The End's music director, Marco Collins and CIMX's music director, Vince Canoga. Quite an impressive array of talent!

Stapleford agrees. "This company firmly believes in hiring from within. I was lucky, because both Max (Tolkoff, now at WFNX) and Trip (Reeb, now at KROQ) knew how to pick people. Both could spot talent and work with it. I learned a lot from working with them."

It doesn't take a genius to figure out Stapleford's advice to college students is to start at the ground level and get an internship. And for those wanting to make radio their career, he offers, "Take the time to become a good jock. You can play whatever music you want—be as outrageous as you want—but try to be the best air personality you can. Tape every show and really listen to those air-checks because chances are your station's PD isn't going to be able to critique your performance and tell you how to get better. It's going to be up to you."

TODD BISSION, National alternative promotion director, Columbia Records

FORMER STATION: WUNH, University Of New Hampshire

STATUS: Music director for three years

Graduates from a small town will take heart from Todd's story. The University of New Hampshire is located about an hour and a half outside of Boston, limiting the opportunities for internships. Todd, who wasn't even pursuing a job in the music industry, is the first to acknowledge that he lucked into it. "I was very lucky," he laughs. "Usually you have to start somewhere and work your way up. I was able to side-step that."

BIG BREAK: "I knew someone who knew someone at Virgin Records, which was starting up their American division just as I was graduating. I got an interview and they liked me, but I wasn't their first choice. I guess my big break came when (I.R.S.'s) Lori Blumenthal turned the job down."

ADVICE: "Even though I didn't do it this way, I tell

people to get an internship. Sony and EMI have huge programs with college reps all over the country, even in small places where you would never have the opportunity to work at a record company."

HOW HAS COLLEGE RADIO CHANGED?: "I see college radio going in two separate directions. One segment has gotten very reactionary in that they're taking cues from 120 Minutes, Buzz Bin and Spin Magazine, which helps a band like Alice In Chains, whose first record did nothing on college radio. The latest record, which did very well at college, was all over MTV, on the Singles Soundtrack and generally in all the right places.

"Another group of stations, and a lot of them are Gavin stations, have actually gotten more left of center. KUSF. WUNH, WTSR and WUSB are a few that are much more alternative now than when I started. If you look at CMJ, you might mistakeningly get the impression that college radio is getting more commercial, but looking at Gavin's subchart, this shift to the left is much more pronounced. You see, very tellingly, that the panel is getting more adventurous."

MARCO COLLINS, Music director, The End (KNDD)

FORMER STATION: KCR, San Diego

STATUS: Music director, almost three years.

Marco got his start as a phone intern for 91X, and eventually worked his way up to an on-air shift. He stayed at the station for six years until a promotion position at Relativity Records opened up.

"I left 91X to go to Relativity," he explains, "because I was going through a time where I just wanted out of radio and needed to find something else. Sara Haynes, who's now the vice president of promotion at Relativity, also worked at 91X and she hired me at the label. I was there about eight months when Kevin (Stapleford) called about the job in Seattle."

BIG BREAK: "I consider this my big break, but I don't think I would've been hired if I didn't leave the station and start something else. A lot of times you need to step back and go out and prove yourself."

HOW HAS COLLEGE RADIO CHANGED?: "When I was in College Radio, it seemed to be a very democratic process. I realized when I was working records that it's not that way everywhere. There are so many closedminded people out there. I think it flipped me out that I was talking to people so young and already so closed-minded and jaded. It was frustrating. College radio is supposed to be about learning and experimenting."

GRANT FITCH, Guitarist/Vocalist, Paw

FORMER STATION: KJHK, Lawrence, KS

STATUS: Music director for six months, on staff for a year.

Grant's involvement with college radio, albeit brief,

was at least partially responsible for his inspiration to start his own band. Although Grant joined the station solely for the love of music, he discovered that machiavellian station politics often interfered with his passion, and so he quit and formed Paw. "That's exactly what happened," he says. "I dropped out of college, quit the radio station and started the band—I swear to you in the same twenty-four hours."

Paw has just released their A&M debut, Dragline, and Grant concedes that his involvement in college radio gives him something of an advantage when it comes to dealing with his label. "I learned a lot in college radio about the ways of promotion which gave me some insight that I've used with my band."

Advice: "Follow your instincts. Don't be concerned with trivial aspects—who's in what band or whatever. Just stay excited about good music.


TODD SIEVERS, Radio Promotion, Def American Records

FORMER STATION: KUCI, Irvine, Calif.

STATUS: Music director for two years, marketing director for one.

While at KUCI, Todd interned at Island Records with Howie Miura for about a year. When Howie moved to PolyGram, Todd moved as well to continue working with Howie and Kyle Wong. After graduation, Todd practically created a position for himself at Def American.

"When I talked to Def American originally, it was for an internship. I explained that I was flattered they wanted me to intern, but I asked for a job, point blank. They didn't think they could do anything for me, but I knew they had all these alternative releases coming out. I called them on a regular basis and gave them proposals on what I would do with the artists. I eventually got a job offer from another label, and let Def American know. Then I got an interview with the Mark diDia, the GM of Def American." And the label created Todd's position.



ADVICE: "I had the opportunity to meet and make relationships with people in powerful positions, and when you get right down to it they don't look at your resume, they look at who you know. So I'd say that you need to be able to communicate while you're at the station. If you've presented yourself as a good person who believes in what you're doing, you're already better off than the average slime. Interning is important because college radio can make you feel just like you did in high school—like you know everything. And then you take that step into the label world, and you realize you don't know anything.

Interning helps solidify all the pieces."

FAITH HENSCHEL, Marketing Director, Elektra Records

FORMER STATION: KCMU, Seattle

STATUS: Music director for three years.

Faith's career began while at KCMU. At different times during her tenure, she was concurrently at WEA, Sub Pop, a club and a record store. After she finished school, Faith went to CEMA as manager of alternative marketing, moved to Capitol as the director of alternative promotion, and finally wended her way to Elektra as director of marketing.

BIG BREAK: "My big break was just knowing the right people—people who liked the station and supported me when I was graduating and helped me find a job."



Advice: Like Todd, Faith thinks contacts made during a music director- ship are key in landing an industry job, although she stresses, "It's not really contacts as in schmoozy contacts; it's more like friendships. If people like you they'll help you succeed, and if they hear of any openings they'll tell you about them. That's part of

the reason internships are important—not only because of what you learn, but because of the people you meet."

KAREN SCHOMER, Freelance music journalist

FORMER STATION: WCWM, College of William and Mary

STATUS: Station Manager

While still in college, Karen was an intern at Rolling Stone and did a lot of writing for fanzines like the The Bob, Boston Rock, Jersey Beat, Jet Lag and Option. Being in radio did, in fact, make it easier for Karen to get published in 'zines and such, because "When I was reviewing records for fanzines, most of them were coming into the station. So I could take them home to review for the station and for a fanzine at the same time. Editors love that because it meant they didn't have to send me the record.' When she got out of school, Karen got a job as an editorial assistant at Us, and later moved to Spin as reviews editor.

BIO BREAK: "When I was working for Spin I got a call from the New York Times and started freelancing for them. I was only 24 and they were letting me review really cool stuff. I think they wanted somebody to be covering college radio-type artists. That was a turning point because after I dug my feet in there I went freelance."

Advice: "The great thing about college radio is it's such a total free-form workshop. You get all the cool records and can have such a great idea of what's out there. You write reviews and interview bands, and that's basically what you do as a writer. It's really good training in a not-so-professional environment. Make the most of that training, and have what amounts to a glorious opportunity to fuck up.

"I don't think internships are important like 'Oh you need an internship on your resume' as much as I would say it's a really great way to get in and see how things work. Magazines tend to be understaffed and they're always dying to have people work for free. As an intern you really get to observe and learn."

LEAH MILLER, KUKQ, Phoenix

FORMER STATION: WQBR, Eastern Michigan; KASR, Phoenix

STATUS: Music director, WQBR; Program director/station manager, KASR

Leah got her start at KUKQ when the station's format was Country. The station manager at KASR, Leah said she thought "KUPD was the

coolest station in the world," and jumped at the chance when a part-time opening came up at sister-station KUKQ.

Leah recalls, "I interviewed for the position and got hired the same day. That was in November and the station switched to an Alternative format in March, so I only had to do a few months of country."

Because Leah knew that radio was want she wanted to do, it was difficult for her to stay motivated enough to finish school. "The classroom experience did nothing for me. It was so hard to finish school because I already had a job doing

what I wanted to do, and that was what I was going to school for."

Advice: "College radio has done everything for me," she enthuses. "I learned to talk to the reps, to do rotations and such, in a small but very helpful way. My biggest concern is that many in college radio don't want to do radio-they all want to go into record promotion. I wish that I could go to every college station and say, 'Look at me. It's possible to change the face of radio. We need more people to come from college and go into commercial radio and keep that young attitude.' You only get out of college radio what you put into it."

journalism and Commercial radio.

Of his tenure at WRUV, Marshall reflects, "I think I've continued and reinforced a process that Caroline Wolfe started. She was happy to talk to the industry and get smaller or foreign labels to send us their stuff. I've been here so long, that my relationships with the labels are really strong. I've also spent quite a lot of my time persuing labels to send us everything. I've worked hard at making a good name for WRUV within the industry and within our community.'




As mentioned, Marshall's in a band called Chalk, and it's this direction he'll persue directly after college. "Playing in a band has been a dream of mine ever since I can remember. I finally found two people that I can deal with! The best-case scenario is that we get signed and have fun for a few years."

Marshall has solid experience in synthesizer programming and says that Chalk's sound is crossed between Depeche Mode and Sugar. A&R people get ready because the band's demo will be ready in about a month!

Giving The Real World The Old College Try

Here it is: the Class Of '93. Or, at least, a sample of the college radio music and/or program directors putting exams behind them for that toughest test of all—the real world.

in an effort to illuminate that difficult transition, Gavin is profiling soon-tobe graduates who have figured prominently on record company mailing lists in recent years. Not surprisingly, the majority express a desire to work in some aspect of the music business. We wish them luck.



JENN KARSON, WRUV

Jenn's been at WRUV for about a year and has been co-music director since October of last year. When Jenn started at the University of Vermont, she was very involved with political organizations on campus, so when she joined the radio station what struck her first was "the amount of mail the station got. Coming from an environmentalist back-

ground, I was really sensitive to that."

Eventually Jenn found a way to bridge the gap between politics and radio. "I brought a lot of organizational skills-skills I developed doing political work-to the station," she says, "and a lot of creative ideas. I like being involved at the station because it became a place to have fun instead of being angry and political all the time. Since the music industry attracts open-minded. creative people, they allow you the space to sort of work things out, which I really like."

What you may not know about Jenn is that she's studied voice for eight years, and she and WRUV's comusic director, Marshall Pierce, are in a band called Chalk. "This band is really fun," she says. "It's nice to be creative and have an outlet for it. And it's nice to be graduating with a direction. For me, the band has been a place where I can develop my talents and then do funky things with them. If I do go into this industry, I'd like to do so as an artist."

Jenn will continue on at WRUV as music director until the fall.

MARSHALL PIERCE, WRUV

Marshall has been in radio for seven years, and he's spent four of those at WRUV where he's been co-music director for two-and-a-half years. Throughout his years in school, Marshall has acquired experience in a myriad of areas, including

CHRIS BALDWIN, KSJS

Chris has been at KSJS for almost three years, one-anda-half of which has been in the capacity of music director. According to Chris, the first few months on the job meant repairing the damage done by his predecessor. "When I took over, we had no long distance lines because he racked up such huge bills. He made certain aspects of my job even more difficult, and I felt I was spending all my time mopping up after him."

Chris says he's proud of the time he's been in charge at KSJS and feels he particularly excelled in bringing the station together. "It was obviously time for us to go into the school and start recruiting for the station. I've worked hard to involve the staff more and make them feel as though they have some creative control over the programming. I ask them constantly what they want more of (in terms of music) at the station, what their listeners are calling in for, etc. Before, it was like an elitest clique and I wanted to erase that idea.



"It's been nice to find something that I'm good at and that I like. In the past, I've been able to find things I was good at, but I knew I couldn't do those things for the rest of my life because they didn't make me very happy-or worse, made me unhappy. I was an engineering and computer-science major but that never meant anything to me. Music is what means the most to me, so I want to find something that involves it."

Although Chris hasn't found a use for his mathematics or computer science minor at his current major-label intership, he's making sure the job he moves onto next will maximize the skills he has to offer.

MATT SAUNDERS, WUNH

Matt has been at WUNH for four years and has been music director for a year. Much of his time at the station has been spent developing industry relationships—both here and abroad.

"We buy a lot of imports," Matt explains, "and I think it's important to send those companies copies of our playlists. We've gotten really good overseas service by just writing to the bands.

"I think I've spent more time on the phone talking to the record reps than any previous music director," he adds. "And mostly it's just because I like most of the people I talk to. That's actually been one of the best things about this job. I was so nervous about having to be on the phone with people when I first started! I think I've done a good job developing a relationship between the station and the industry."

Matt's do-it-yourself approach to the foreign music industry, and especially to the English indie labels, may pay off as he plans to take a trip to England this summer to see how the industry works over there. Of course he's got an eye on a job, but he's not ready to pigeonhole himself into any particular field.

"I just want to see what it's like," he explains. "I want to see if it's something worth persuing and just have some fun while I'm there." Always the import junkie, for Matt "having some fun" means buying some records!

CHRIS WHITE, WVFS

Gavin College Music
Director of the Year for
1992, Chris White, has spent
close to four years as Music
Director of WVFS, but he'll
wind up his tenure "sometime this summer" because,
"I want to leave it while I
still love it. And besides,
there are people behind me
who have fresher and better
ideas than I do."

Of his immediate plans, Chris claims to be preparing to market "indie rock action figures. You should see," he chortles. "I've got some Mac and Lara dolls. They're great, but they're not anatomically correct, unfortunately. The Gerard Cosloy doll is, though."

Long-term, Chris definitely wants to find a job working with music "a lot more intensely" than he's working with it now. Although he's currently got his own label that's mining Tallahasee talent, Chris would like to

"experience the hells of promotion and the hells of retail distribution" to better run his own enterprise.

Looking back at his tenure with WVFS, Chris feels his biggest accomplishment at the station was changing its format. "When I took over, we had a format that was half 'new' AOR and half mainstream alternative. When I started, with the help of a few other people, I decided to go for what I wanted to do. And I definitely think we have more of an identity now."

"The whole overall experience of WVFS," Chris summarizes, "has been probably the most motivating and self-actualizing experience that I've had in my life. It's made me realize what I want to do and focus my energy in that direction."

MONTY LUKE, KCSB

Monty has spent three years at KCSB and acted as music director for two. Although he intends to stick around Santa Barbara at least until the end of the summer, he plans to move back home to Los Angeles thereafter and try to find a gig. "If something else came up I would do it, but I wouldn't mind getting an industry job.

"I don't exactly know what I want to do, although I know what I don't want to do. I think I'd like to work with developing artists—stuff like that—but I really don't want to do radio promotion. I've been on the other end of the phone for two years, and I just can't deal!"

During the last leg of his involvement with KCSB, Monty turned over alternative music duties to Ted Perez and concentrated on strengthening the station's hip-hop and rap connections. Since most of the industry's rap and alternative departments function separately, has Monty given any thought to which avenue he would choose? "If I was to idealize, I'd make it so I could do both, you know, but I don't have a particular preference."

"Diversifing the station's perspective on what Alternative

music means" is what Monty feels is his biggest contribution to KCSB during his music directorship. "That's the main thing. And I'd like to think that in the past couple of years I've helped raise KCSB's profile—so now people know who we are, where we are and where we stand."

Monty points out that being at the station and being a music director has taught him about the industry. "I've learned what it's really all about. And with the knowledge of how things are done and why things are done I think I'll be able to tiptoe through whatever it is I do without being naive."

NEAL LOSEY, KCPR

After four years at KCPR and two years as one of the station's music directors, Neal Losey is about to graduate and take a fearless leap into the "real world." In August, Neal will marry his college sweetheart, but he would like to stay involved in music as well. "I've enjoyed being music director so much," he says, "and it would be neat to try and get into the promotion end of things. I think the face of promotion has been changing. Contrary to how it used to be, during the past couple of years people tha tstill love the music have been getting hired in alternative, and I'd like to continue that budding tradition. I'm so confused, though, because I really don't want to live in LA. But music's been my life since junior high, and I really can't imagine doing anything else."

Of his accomplishments at KCPR, Neal's proudest of "broadening and diversifing the format, so that now I'll see our deejays take a Jazz record into the top ten. I've been able to open people's minds a little bit and then watch them open wider on their own."

Neal notes that facing the challenges of being music director at KCPR has been rewarding on many levels. "I have more confidence," he says, "because it's the first thing in my life that I've really been good at. And I've

gotten the satisfaction of hearing all this great music and watching people get into it. I've made a lot of good friends here, and I met my fiance through the station. They're gonna have to fight to get me out of the office on June first."

TED PEREZ, KCSB

He's been at KCSB for two and a half years and has served as music director for one year, but as he's soon to leave the station, Ted Perez is cautiously looking toward the business. "The oppportunities are so limited," he sighs. "I really wouldn't shoot for a radio position, but working for a label would be nice, although because of the lack of opportunity, I don't really see it happening right away. So an internship or something like that could be kinda cool." Ideally, though, Ted could deal with "an A&R job at a big label." Couldn't we all?

Ted thinks that his effort to establish a review committee at the station might be his most noteworthy accomplishment. "The review process around here never really worked, and then I became hardcore about it. Now deejays (and listeners) realize that on-air shows get reviewed, and that something will happen if it's not good. And also, I feel like our audience has expanded with our programming so that we're reaching more listeners. And I think I had a major part in that programming, as far as new shows and what's getting put on the air is concerned.

"I know I'm really lucky to have had this position and it made me realize really fastlike in a couple of weekshow this chunk of the industry works, how slimy it can be and how much fun it can be at the same time. In this job you hear all the best music and you find out about how it all really works. Radio is your best way to start if you want to get into the music industry. That's what I think, anyway."

GAVIN ALTERNATIVE





New Releases

THE FALL Infotainment Scan (Matador/Atlantic)

There's a reason why The Fall has remained the favorite band of legendary British deejay John Peel since their inception in 1976-and when I figure it out, I'll let you know (rim shot). Obviously, my devotion to the band isn't as steadfast as Peel's; from my perspective, The Fall's twenty-plus album track record has been slightly hit and miss. Accordingly, Infotainment Scan scores a bullseye. Honestly, this is the best offering from Mark E. Smith and Co. in quite some time. Musically, there's a helluva lot going on on these often chaotic and frenzied tracks, yet they don't sound cluttered or sloppy. Favorites include It's A Curse, Glam-Racket, The League Of Bald-Headed Men, the acoustic-tinged I'm Going To Spain and the house-flavored A Past Gone Mad. Also check out The Fall's version the Sister Sledge "classic," Lost In Music.

DRAMARAMA Will Work For Food (Chameleon/Elektra)

Dramarama's latest, Will Work For Food, will strike a chord with listeners because of the song's subject matter, which deals with singer John Easdale's nightmare of becoming a homeless person—a scary thought that's passes through my mind everyday on my way to work, and unfortunately, I'm not alone on this one. On the CD single there are two versions of Will Work For Food, a no holds barred rocker that recalls the spirit and energy of the band's classic, Anything Anything, and a poignant, acoustic version that dramatically carries the song to another level. Alternative rockers will probably opt for the former and A3 stations the latter. Either way, Dramarama sounds better than ever!





DEACON BLUE YOUR TOWN (Chaos)

I remember seeing these guys at England's Town & Country back in 1987, thinking the girl singer had an absolutely amazing voice and the guy singer had a Springsteen fixation that he needed to get over fast! Listening to Deacon Blue's latest, Your Town, it's obvious that he did. Warm acoustics are mixed with a bit of modern technology (very un-Bosslike) and set to a beat that's not exactly dance—although there are plenty of remixes on the CD5 that are decidedly so, including a few by Curve's Tony Garcia. If dancing and/or mixing is your bag, try the Barrio mix (radio edit), otherwise I vote for the original.

DILLON FENCE OUTSIDE IN (MAMMOTH)

Dillon Fence regularly draw upwards of on thousand at their frequent gigs in Southeastern clubs and on Southeastern campuses. On their Lou Giordano-produced sophomore effort, Outside In, the source of the band's appeal becomes evident: while Dillon Fence work within a recognizable basic framework that's part shoegazing, part Style Council and a dash of Mitch Easter/Don Dixon Southern tradition, they incorporate a range

One Bad Habit is spiced with some Dinosaur Jr.-ish wailing, Any Other Way is downright soulful, Waking Up boasts some hairy metallic guitar, and Union Grove showcases the band's lovely acoustic capabilities. Also check out Black-Eyed Susan, Lisa Marie and Hold Me Down.

(Alternative Tentacles, P.O. Box 419092, San Francisco)


What Grotus have done (for me, 1 should say), is make industrial music palatable—enjoyable even-by delivering a variety of socio-political, feminist, humanist and ecologically sound messages with passion and conviction, sans the overweening anger that can be so alienating in conjunction with industrial's usually cold, machinery-bred aestheic. Unlike San Francisco compadres Consolidated, whose similarly thought-provoking rants and techno-type accompaniment lend them a preachy, distant persona, Grotus, by virtue of Lars Fox's gutteral-but-not-satanic vocals, the band's diverse sampling, and their knack for knowing when to take a breather, seem almost approachable and definitely human-attributes that well serve those who want to do more than rail their opinions to the already converted. Critical evolution epic Up The Mountain counts among the stand-outs here, as do the ironic Good Evening and the Beauty Myth-inspired Hourglass. Grotus' records rarely rival their live shows, but, as the band's tour plans are on temporarily on hold, you'll have to console (?) yourself with Slow Motion Apocalypse.

VARIOUS ARTISTS MAKING LOSERS HAPPY

(Drag City, P.O. Box 476867, Chigago)

In the eyes of most Americans, New Zealand is Australia's little brother who's been getting beat up and kicked around for years while big brothers like INXS and Midnight Oil hog the attention. College radio sometimes knows better, and this assemblage of fourteen Xpressway singles should finally make it clear that lesserknown artists such as the Dead C. and Plagal Grind are worlds cooler than their more mainstream neighbors. Subverting notions of pleasant melody, the Dead C. reverts to glaring vocals pasted over girders of feedback on Bad Politics. Do The Void captures the Terminal's varied guitars that alternately cop a frenzied itch and immolate in the VU/Heroin vein. Bask in the pure thrust of Plagal Grind's instrumental Blackout, which makes use of excessive feedback and stark, raving drums. Not to be missed are David Mitchell's surreal, Svd Barret-onspeedish companion pieces Dead Dog In Port Chalmers and Dogs. If bands like Sonic Youth, the Swell Maps and the Fall hold a special place in your heart, make room for these New Zealand upstarts.

ADORABLE

Indie Pop As A Contact Sport

t's a sunny afternoon in Coventry. England and Piotr Fijalkowski, Adorable's frontman and resident motormouth, is in an exceptionally good mood. It seems nice weather has that effect on him. It's early in the morning here, I haven't had coffee yet and it's pouring down rain, so I'm a bit taken aback by his enthusiasm, not only because of my circumstance, but because the British press paints a rather self-important portrait of Adorable. In any case, I'm pleasantly surprised by Piotr's spirit, which extends to his love for film, American commercial jingles and spy/adventure shows from the sixties

Oddly enough, when it comes to the band-which includes drummer Kevin Gritton, bassist Will (just Will, thank you) and guitarist Robert Dillam-Piotr seems to consciously rein in his enthusiasm, which seems strange coming from someone who's been tagged "ambitious" and "cocky" in print. "People seem to like humbleness," he says by way of explanation, "which isn't an attribute that comes easy to me. We're very proud of this record," he adds. "We always had confidence in this band, and we knew we had the songs. We knew that, in our judgement it'd be brilliant '

Well, if Piotr needs prodding to gush about just how brilliant *Against Perfection* is, I certainly don't! The dozen songs on this album underscore Adorable's talent for writing soaring, jagged pop songs—where irony rules with a mighty fist and art and religion are incorporated on command. The album's opening track, the stunning *Sunshine Smile*, is the band's first single in the States. Not surprisingly, the label has crossover plans for it, which suits Piotr just fine.

"I don't think you should aim to be elitist," he spits. "Surely, you've got to aim higher than being a cult band! We sat in on the editing (for the Top 40 version), so it's been done with our blessing and involvement. We chopped quite a bit out, but it still remains true to the song. It was scary though. It was like editing a film and cutting out an entire scene.

"My mom asks, 'What do you do after you're a pop star?' If I worked in a bank or something she could see that progression. It's harder (to notice it) when you're in a band."



Suddenly you realize you've chopped a out full minute and the song still stands on its own!

"We're going to re-shoot the video for Sunshine Smile," he says, switching gears, "because we didn't really like the original. We write our own video scripts. I studied film for three years—it's my second love."

Trying to avoid the obvious subjects—film, art and religion—which crop up in just about every song and interview, I ask about Piotr's family, which includes his Polish-born parents and brother Krzysztof, who plays guitar in the band, The Bardots. Between music and his love for film, there seems to be plenty of creativity within the Fajalkowski offspring.

"My mom's really upset that both

her children are in bands," he laughs. "She's convinced that she must've done something wrong—fed us the wrong food or something. She doesn't really understand it, though. She came here after the war, and making a living and learning the language were her priorities—not English pop culture."

Underscoring his point, Piotr continues, "Whenever we're on television my mom calls up all the relatives to tell them. We don't have a VCR so she gets her camera and takes pictures of the screen!

"My parents have this idea that you're always supposed to be pro-

gressing, so my mom always asks, 'What do you do after you're a pop star?' If I worked in a bank or something she could see that progression. It's harder (to notice it) when you're in a band."

For someone who's been quoted in print saying, rather larger-than-lifely, "I see large aspects of religion in pop music. The deification of people who stand up on a podium and wanna be your saint, and the fact that you've got a Polish Catholic wearing white onstage is not unlike the Pope, one feels, although I'm playing to a slightly smaller venues at the moment," talking about his family seems to bring Piotr down-to-earth.

"We do exist outside the band," he offers. "I really enjoy films, collecting cult novels from the sixties, like *Man From U.N.C.L.E.* and *The Prisoner*—I'm a huge *Prisoner* fan. Once we had a gig in Wales and just dropped the equipment off at the club and had our roadies set it up. We (the band) went onto Port Marion where *The Prisoner* was filmed just to walk around the village. It was great replaying the scenes in my mind."

Another subject close to his heart is touring America. "I can't wait to come to the States and start gigging," he confides. "We're not the same band live that we are on record. We're more confrontational and extroverted. We don't stand still. The past couple of years saw a lot of

shoe-gazing bands that never looked at their audience—like they were embarrassed or something. We entertain and confront our audience. You see a completely different side of us."

Adorable is scheduled to play the States this summer. See for yourself why the press has called their live shows, "Indie-pop as a contact sport."

JANET JACKSON ianet (Virgin)

Making her Virgin Records debut, Janet Jackson once again teams up with comrades and mega-producers Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis to create over 75 minutes of music filled with multi-format potential. Aside from the hit That's The Way Love Goes, other possible singles could be: You Want This, This Time (with operatic solo by Kathleen Battle), the rockin' What'll I Do, the message-filled New Agenda, with rap courtesy of Public Enemy's Chuck D, the everromantic Because Of Love and the wistful Where Are You Now. Then of course. there's the surprise, unlisted track. What surprise track? Well, guess you'll just have to listen to the album again-vour listeners certainly will.

The title of the album says it all when describing the style and personality of hip hop's angriest group. PENNY FORD Penny Ford (Columbia)

Records. Leading off is Penny's current single, Daydreaming, which is an update of the Aretha Franklin classic. Penny displays her soulful versatility with tracks like the gospelpowered I'll Be There, the ballad Wherever You Are Tonight or the jazzy Father Time. If you're looking for a pop-dance track, check out I Lose Control, co-written by Mariah Carev and Narada Michael Walden. Other highlights include the "Power-esque" dance-oriented Under Pressure, featuring Penny's late sister Sharon Redd and the new jack flavored duet with labelmate Tashan, Insane.

PATTY LOVELESS Only What I Feel (Epic)

The marketing wizards who came up with "Patty-As You've Never Heard Her!" to publicize this project nailed it-Patty sounds energized and revitalized on her Epic debut. Always one of the top neo-traditionalist female singers, Patty's voice sounds even stronger since her recent vocal cord surgery. The set, produced by Patty's husband Emory Gordy, Jr., features her usual excellent choice of material. You can't find a bad 'un on here, but check out: You Will, How About You, Nothing But The Wheel, All I Need, and the current single Blame It On Your Heart.

MILT JACKSON Reverence And Compassion (Owest/Reprise)

Milt Jackson claims this is the best CD he's ever made. Judging from his ambitious solo career and spirited tenure with The Modern Jazz Quartet, that's saying volumes. The basic quartet is reminiscent of the miniaturist, classical perfection of MJQ. Pianist Cedar Walton matches Jackson's fastidious harmonic perfection. Reverence And Compassion's extra dimension comes courtesy of a twentyseven piece orchestra and a brass/woodwind septet. Start with Leon Russell's classic, Masquerade, and fan out from there.

Pearl Jam focal point Stone Gossard has a new vehicle in Brad. Moody in an early-Free way, Brad experiments with old and new rock forms, never straying from the no-nonsense guitar, bass, drums, vocal way of doing things. After all, doesn't that guitar on Good News does sound a bit Kossoff-ish? So as not to compete with Pearl Jam's next batch, Brad's songs are group efforts, giving the music an individual luster. I love the percussive quirkiness of Raise Love and the moaning opener, Buttercup. It doesn't bother me one iota that Brad is nowhere near Pearl Jam.

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


