### **Arbitron's Summertime News: KLAX Clicks in LA; Z100 Zooms**

The first wave of Summer Arbitron numbers hit on Tuesday afternoon (October 5) and outside of WRKS' lock on number one, the big story in New York is WHTZ's (Z100) 3.8-4.7 vault into the #2 slot. Urban WBLS dropped from 4.7-4.1 and both Top 40 WPLJ/FM (4.0) and Dance/Top 40 WQHT (HOT 97) (3.6) didn't budge.

KLAX/FM-Los Angeles continues to defy detractors who called it a "one book phenomenon." A year later the station is not only holding on to #1, it does so with a resounding 5.7-6.6 exclamation point. "We think we're successful because we play Mexican music," says KLAX music director Juan Carlos Hidalgo. "The majority of Los Angeles is Hispanic, and ninety percent of the Hispanics are Mexican." Hidalgo says the station's success is also due to their ability to grab the younger market. "When you get the kids you get everybody in the house." KLAX's closest competition is Dance/Top 40 KPWR (POWER 106) which slipped 4.0-4.9. Perennial

A/C winner KOST dipped 5.1-4.7, so did Alternative KROO, 4.3-3.9. Urban KKBT edged up to 3.3 from 3.1.

In San Diego #1 station, Country KSON/A&F stayed steady at 7.7 while Top 40 KKLQ/A&F jumped an impressive 6.0-6.6. An even bigger story is Dance/Top 40 XHTZ/F (Z90) which jumped over 2 full points, 4.0-6.1. Adult Alternative KIFM enjoyed a 3.3-4.0 hop and A/C KFMB dropped big, 3.6-2.6.

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#### Record Biz's Hot New Number: 550

Epic Records' new baby, Sony 550 Music, made its official debut this week, with Polly Anthony as general manager.

Already sporting releases from Clive Griffin, flop and Eve's Plum, 550's diverse roster also has a proven winner in Celine Dion,

and includes R&B

act Funky Poets and the dance-oriented Culture Beat. Griffin and Dion teamed on the #1 single "When I Fall In Love," from the soundtrack to Sleepless In Seattle.

According to Epic president Dave Glew, 550 is the result of Epic's success over the past couple of years. "Epic's mounting success has led us to a new label with which to accommodate the needs and development of each artist," says Glew. "As part of the Epic team, Polly Anthony's contribution to

our success in introducing new artists to a wide public marked her as well-suited to head the new label."

Anthony joined the company in 1978, and worked in

the west coast promotion department of Portrait Records. She has held various positions at Epic Records, and most recently

senior vice president, promotion. "Sony 550 Music will echo Epic in its focus on a wide variety of music united by its quality and passion," she says. "That means breaking boundaries, overcoming limitations and expectations, and balancing great patience and belief in our artists with the relentless effort necessary to bring their talent the atten-

tion it merits. We are build-

#### Alain Levy to Industry: 'Reach Out' and Care

PolyGram chief Alain Levy used the City of Hope dinner as a platform to call for a more caring music industry. The PolyGram president and Alain Levy CEO was receiving

the 1993 "Spirit of Life" Award at the Beverly Hills black tie event which raised \$3.7 million.

"Maybe because we're supposed to feel the pulse of things to come, we have to reach out," Levy told his industry peers.

"We have a responsibility to future generations and

we should be conscious of it. We have to devote money and. more importantly, time to these problems. They're called education,

they're called training, they're called care."

Helping to fulfill that goal, the \$3.7 million will establish the Alain Levy Research Fellowship at the City of Hope National Medical Center and Beckman Research Institute.

After the award ceremony. Levy spoke with the Los Angeles Times about PolyGram's recent purchase of Motown.

"I am and continue to be a great believer in urban music as a source of creativity," he said. With a company roster including Billy Ray Cyrus, U2, and John Mellancamp, he said, "We have all the elements of the puzzle now to succeed in the U.S."

As for PolyGram's involvement in film—the company has not entered the fray for Paramount, but has a number of joint and other ventures—Levy has committed \$1 billion to build a studio operation over the next ten years.

#### **Rob Edwards Exits KBIG**

Rob Edwards, one of the first programmers to switch a station from Easy Listening to A/C, is leaving KBIG-Los Angeles, where he was vice president, programming and operations.

Edwards, who joined the Bonneville station in 1980, said that he has "decided to move on to other projects," but said he would not have an announcement for another few weeks.

He told GAVIN that his announcement was forced by a contract clause requirhim to inform Bonneville's management about his plans for 1994.

"I've had some great years here and some wonderful moments," said Edwards, who was vice president of Bonneville's California division (KBIG and KOIT-San Francisco) from 1981 to 1985. "It's tough to walk away from it, but that's part of the radio business."

Peak moments, Edwards said, included the switch to A/C in 1986. "It was my call, and we were one of the first major stations to go in that direction." KBIG won GAVIN'S A/C Station of the Year award in 1992, and in the winter book, it beat rival KOST in adults 25-54. "That was one of my biggest and best experiences," said Edwards, who was PD at KOST for seven years before joining KBIG.

## Garth Brooks Can't Follow His Agent

When a Davidson County (Nashville) judge ruled that Garth Brooks can't follow his booking agent to his new company, Joseph E. Harris watched approximately \$2 million in commissions fly out the door.

Harris, who also represented Trisha Yearwood, was hoping to bring his famous clients with him, but the Nashville-based Buddy Lee Attractions filed suit on September 16 to make sure Harris honored a non-compete agreement he signed when he joined that agency When Brooks joined Buddy Lee in 1991 he demanded that Harris got half of the 10% concert booking fee he paid the agency. Harris has been Brooks' agent since before he had a record contract.

It is not certain whether Brooks has left Buddy Lee for William Morris; Yearwood has already announced her intention to move with Harris to his new agency.

Harris, who resigned on August 18, said that while he was still at Buddy Lee Attractions, "unknown persons...began playing malicious pranks on me." Apparently Harris found live mice in his lunch cooler. "I began to fear for my health," he said.

Attorney Jay Bowen, who represents William and Morris, says has the option of asking for the decision to be reversed by the Tennesee Court of Appeals. Otherwise, the case could go to trial in several months.

Brooks is expected to gross more than \$9 million in concert receipts for a five-month outing he began in July, coinciding with the release of his current chart-topper *In Pieces*.

### Tom Donahue Awards Honor Eclectic Radio

KFOG, KSAN, KQED, and college station KFJC were among the winners of the Tom Donahue Radio Awards presented October 1 by the San Franciscobased Coalition for Eclectic Radio

The winners of the award, named after the late pioneer of free-form FM rock radio, were as diverse as the programming the Coalition # supports. KFOG's Dave > Morey, who won the Best DJ award, is a mild-mannered veteran at the A3 station who handles both the morning shift and the acclaimed time-warp feature, Ten at Ten. KSAN won for Best Program (commercial station) for Sully Roddy's All Kinds of Country, a quirky roots show on Sunday nights. Roddy is an alumnus of

free-form radio stations KFAT-Gilroy, Calif. and KKCY-San Francisco (the station whose demise gave birth to the Coalition). KQED, an NPR station, carries West Coast Weekend, a live variety show hosted by Sedge Thompson, which won Best Program (noncommercial station) and Fresh Air, the talk show hosted by Terry Gross out of WHYY-Philadelphia, which was named Best Public Affairs Program.

But the biggest winner in

the balloting, which drew some 1,500 votes, was KFJC-Los Altos Hills, based at Foothill lunior College, which took two of the six awards, winning for Station of the Year and for Best Program (small station) for its Norman Memorial Soundtrack Show, produced by Robert Emmett and featuring a wild mix of rock, roots and reggae music.

GAVIN managing editor Ben Fong-Torres hosted the proceedings, which took place at the

Sweetwater, a popular nightclub in Mill Valley, and which included music by blues singer Angela Strehli, who has a new album, Blonde and Blue, out on Rounder; "vintage jazz" ensemble Cats and Jammers (Tuxedo Records), singer-guitarist Stephen Bruton (of Dos Records), pianist Johnny Johnson, whose credits range from Chuck Berry to the Kentucky Headhunters, and a house band, the Eclectic Electrics.

## ARISTA TEXAS SETS UP SHOP

Arista Texas opened its doors in Austin this week, with the goal of finding and marketing the best of the region's music. Arista Texas, a division of Arista Nashville, will be the first major label based in Austin, a city known for its thriving music scene.

Cameron Randle has been named the label's vice president and general manager. A former artist manager, Randle was instrumental in forming the Texas Tornados, and has worked with Lou-Ann Barton, the Desert Rose Band, Flaco Jimenez and others. "Cameron's charter is to find, develop, and evangelize on behalf of Texas talent in several genres," says Arista Nashville head Tim DuBois, Arista Texas will initially focus on Tejano music, with other formats to follow. "I'd love to eventually build a full-blown roster, to include blues, alternative, pop, country, Tejano and hispanic," says Randle.

"Right now, we bring to the Texas market one of the greatest creative staffs in the business and one of the greatest artist development teams-plus a lot of knowledge about promotion and marketing," says DuBois. "But we've still got a lot to learn. We're not going in with trumpets blaring and saying, 'Watch us. Here's what we're going to do in the first couple of years.' Because we don't know. We're going to let the music lead the way.

"We're really starting from scratch," agrees Randle. "We're adding water.

"It's a bit of a bargain with the devil," Randle continues. "For so many years Austin has lobbied for a major label to come in, and at the same time everyone is very protective. I'm very anxious to roll up the sleeves and get to work, and demonstrate by the records that we make that we are going to make a positive contribution. We're not looking to recreate Nashville, nor are we trying to recreate Los Angeles or New York. This is a unique venture, and it will be more regional in character."

DuBois, who hatched the idea for Arista Texas, says, "I believe it's time for the Texas music community to have a music industry and I want to play a part in helping bring the music industry to Texas instead of just walking away with all their artists. Our positioning statement, is that we are here, and we are here to stay."

No acts have yet been announced. Arista Texas is projecting their first release in mid-94.

The 27th Annual Country Music Association Awards opened with an aerial view of Nashville's downtown skyline, driving home the point that Country music has gone uptown. The focus this year was on music, signaled by the opening duet between hosts Clint Black and Vince Gill. There was no fancy stage set, no dancing girls...just two first-rate musicians, doing what they do best.

It was Gill's night. He took home five awards including Entertainer Of The Year, which he accepted with modesty and candor. "I know Garth hadn't toured this year, but he played in front of more people in one weekend than I think I did all year long," Gill said, referring to Brooks' four sold out shows



## **Inside Top 40**


Much like a frequency fighting to cut through the clutter on a crowded dial, small market stations struggle to get noticed. GAVIN'S GO Chart has demonstrated the collective power of smaller markets in creating a buzz on certain releases. One standout on our GO panel is KQKY-Kearney, Nebraska. At last year's GAVIN Seminar, KQKY (HITS 106) APD/MD Mark Reid kept hearing discussion involving Broadcast Data Systems (BDS) and using the number of plays as a gauge when compiling the weekly chart.

HITS 106 PD **Mitch Cooley** credits Reid with spearheading and developing a system that calls for the air staff to simply mark down every current they play. Cooley said that KQKY doesn't enjoy the luxury of having a computer to schedule their music and uses the familiar card system in the studio. The only way he could accurately track airplay was by printing out sheets for the staff, putting them on a clipboard and having them filled out as the songs were played.

A tune in power rotation averages five to six spins a day, and Cooley says that although the system isn't foolproof, patterns are easy to spot. "In a rare case, human error might cause a personality to miss something, but even BDS has problems with fake images once in awhile. That's not going to happen here. We double check just to make sure, and our syndicated programming isn't included in the weekly tally. We even have a disclaimer that points out, if anything, this is a conservative estimate rather than an exaggeration of actual airplay.



Instead of throwing up his hands and saying we can't do this because we don't have a computer, Reid made a concerted effort to be "ahead of the game." He says the entire process takes him about two hours a week, and he often does it at home on his small Brother computer.

Each current is listed in order, from most played to least played, with this week's total plays, last week's total and a column for a plus or minus difference between the two. After typing it out, he checks for any errors. "It's time-consuming, but also well worth it," says Reid. It's important to mention that while some stations have done away with a traditional chart in favor of reporting airplay ranking, KQKY does both. Cooley says, "It doesn't have to be a replacement for a traditional chart and in fact, this additional information makes it stronger. Airplay only doesn't take into consideration all the other factors that go into our regular chart."

He adds, "This is not a situation where we were trying to eliminate

work; we were actually making work. We are trying to be even more accurate, to stay on the cutting edge and at the same time build our credibility within the industry."

Both Mitch and Mark maintain the record community has taken notice. "We are a good lesson for stations who want to be recognized. The catch is that it requires doing something to earn that attention and recognition. It doesn't come automatically."

In addition to his charts, for the past six weeks Reid has been developing a tracking system that will help labels by providing them a complete history of a song's airplay. It lists a record's number of spins from the moment it gets on the air to the time it becomes a recurrent. Once in the system, Reid merely adds in each week's total. At present only powers are being tracked, but he'd like that to expand. Reid says,

"In some cases this system has enticed several reps we don't usually hear from to call." Cooley gives his statistical data high marks for educating and enlightening them. "It's surprising, sometimes, to see the results and say, 'Gee, we played a song this much!' or 'We only played it this much?""

By the way, don't try telling Reid you don't have time for a project like his. Besides holding down the APD/MD gig, he's on the air five hours a day and hosts a Sunday night alternative show on sister station **KOKO-Omaha**.





The LP version revolves around an acoustic bassline very reminiscent of the one employed on "Don't Sweat The Technique." The Wiz Mix is snareladen with a lite horn injection while the One For The Bronx Remix takes snares, and bass drums, and mixes them up with chimes and a snatch of warbled keyboard. The noise-apella is essentially the One For The Bronx remix minus the drum track. 

n August 27, 1993, Rick Rubin, founder and president of Def American Recordings, held an elaborated funeral for the word "def" and changed the name of his company to American Recordings. "Def" was the adjective used the hip-hop community to epitomize the new, the fresh and the cutting edge. When "def" appeared in the tenth edition of Webster's Collegiate Dictionary, the word was no longer an underground term.

"Rap," on the other hand, is not easily defined. Technically within the context of music, "rap" can be defined as a form of oral expression, but many purists place boundaries on what is, real rap and what isn't. Ced Gee of UltraMagnetic MC's sat in front of a room full of people at this year's Jack The Rapper Family Affair and said, "Arrested Development's music is great, but if should not be mislabeled as rap." Some of the audience clapped,

#### What is real rap?

The best place to start looking for a definition is hip-hop's beginnings. Richard Colon, aka Crazy Legs, has devoted the last 17 years of his life to hip-hop, and is one of the original members of the Rock Steady Crew, a world famous breakdance troop. Legs has been in movies and documentaries, and is a counsel member of the Universal Zulu Nation (an organization that serves as keepers of the hip-hop culture among other community programs). According to Crazy Legs, rap is one of four key elements that make up hip-hop; the other three are graffiti, deejaying and B-boying (dancing).

"Graffiti has been around for a long time," says Legs. "Actually, if you think about it, ancient Egyptians wrote hieroglyphics on the walls!"

Legs says that Kool DJ Herc and Afrika Bambaataa are the founding fathers of hiphop culture. "When Kool Herc started deejaying back in the early '70s, he was inspired by the toasting they were doing in Jamaica, but there were no MCs or rappers back then," he says. "Kool Herc was deejaying for the B-boys. He had a crew called The Nigga Twins, and he would call out, 'B-boys, are you ready?' That was right before he threw the break of a record on for people who used to go down on the floor. That's how the term B-boy (Break-boy) came about. If someone

asked you 'Do you B-boy?' They're asking you if you breakdanced."

The term hip-hop was coined by Lovebug Starski when he was up at a club called The Fever. "He used to say 'C'mon yall, now hip hop hibbit da hibbity hip hip hop and you don't stop.' Afrika Bambaataa took that phrase in the early '80s and named the culture hip-hop culture," Legs explained.

Rap, according to Legs, is a form of verbal expression. As far as the difference between what's real and what's not, he says, "Real rappers flow from the heart, and there's a feeling or a flavor that comes across as more genuine. When I listen to someone like KRS-ONE, it's more about me feeling it. It would be like, 'Oh, word! I can relate to what he's saying. Homeboy's kickin' the flow, and he's speaking about the things that are important to me.' And at the same time, someone like KRS-ONE will educate you through entertainment. Commercial rappers rap for economical reasons. They're making music with mass appeal."

The recent "Whoot, There It Is" phenomenon has a lot of serious rap heads screaming foul, but not Legs. "All that shit is cool to me. It's just some fun music, and it all comes from Planet Patrol, Soul Sonic Force and all those types of groups we were partying to back in the

day. When Bam used to DJ, he would play rock, calypso, reggae and all other styles of music," says Legs. "There are a lot of valid things with hip-hop that the average person that thinks he's a hip-hopper wouldn't agree with because they weren't there at the beginning."

GAVIN Award winner, Bobbito Garcia of Hoppoh Recordings/Hit-U-

Off Management, couldn't agree more. "There's an age gap, so what's hip-hop for kids 16 years old may not be the same thing for someone who's 27," he says.

"If you're going to define rap, the definition has to be loose. As long as someone is rhythmically saying words over a beat and not singing it, then it can be considered rap. The difference between rapping and reading poetry over music is the delivery. When you read poetry over a beat, you're not necessarily following the music's pace.



When you rap, there is the cadence factor, and certain rappers are able to manipulate their cadence—such as intentionally flowing offbeat or injecting pauses to design their own rhyme style."

"By this definition, Vanilla Ice would be considered a rapper just as UltraMagnetic MC's are, but the difference between the two is that the UltraMagnetic MC's are derived from hip-hop culture. Hip-hop culture," according to Bob, "can be defined as a religion, as it is spiritual, of the essence and of the heart." He continues, "I would consider Arrested Development rap, but you'd have to argue whether it was hip-hop or not."

Although hip-hop originally emerged from the ghettos of the Bronx, its evolution and expansion into other parts of the country, and around the world for that matter, may have blurred its definition. "Rap and hip-hop have become regional," says Bob. "What's rap for people in Oakland might be very different from what it is for people in New York. A lot of the rap you hear right now is far removed from its original characteristics."

According to Kris Parker, aka KRS-ONE, "You can be from Cali, South

Carolina, Atlanta, etc., etc., and still represent hip-hop, but the original hiphop will always remain in the Bronx...Arrested Development is comg from a hip-hop perspective, but

ot from the erspective of lew York City hip-hop. They are com-

ing from a form that could be called Creole and original slave trade hip-hop. I see the music that Arrested Development does as the first hip-hop form of African expression from the perspective of Africans in American that have not totally conformed to America yet; they are trying to hold on to their African ancestry.'

Rap, to KRS-ONE, has two levels. The first is more commercially based: How many records you sell? Did you get your video played? How often do you hear your record played on the radio? "The music (at this level) has some sort of inner-city theme to it, but it's not necessarily total representation of inner-city thought," says Kris. "As a rap artist gets closer to inner-city thought, he or she gets closer into hip-hop culture," meaning when a rapper raps from the hip-hop culture's point of view, commercial success is no longer important. The idea of "I don't care if I'm on the radio or not. I'm gonna kick these lyrics like this, and if you liked it, cool, if you didn't, that was cool too" is the attitude that represents rap's next level, according to Kris.

Kris elaborates, "You have to be under a certain en be a part of the hip-hop

world. And then to do rap music from the hiphop perspective, there's pressure, there's stress.

It's a complete outcry of 'x' amount of issues, but you have to be pressured, abused, degraded to have an outcry. If you never see anything wrong, you never cry. Hip-hop sees the wrong and cries about it."

According to Barry Benson of Hollywood BASIC and KUCR-Riverside, California, part of the stress that pushed rap music's evolution is best described by Nelson George in The Death of

Rhythm and Blues. "With nothing but disco back in 1978-79, the street kids needed something for themselves," Benson says. "What came out of that was hip-hop, which was a rebellion. What you had was a form of music

that was accompanied by a whole culture," says Benson.

"The whole hip-hop culture evolved from the streets of the ghettos of our nation," says Benson. "Hip-hop is a black aesthetic, a celebration of Black culture through art, music, dress and vernacular. But that's not to take anything away from Latinos who were also very much involved in hip-hop from the beginning."

Benson admits that he didn't grow up with groups like Cold Crush Brothers and the Fantastic Five, who are often referred to as pioneers of rap. "My earliest memory of rap, for the most part, is Run-D.M.C.'s 'Its Like That.' Basically, I'm a victim of my environment," says Benson. Having grown up in a California suburb, he couldn't relate to a lot of things that were coming out of New York, but that's not to say he's not down with real rap. What talked to him were acts like Ice-T, N.W.A., King Tee and Eazy E., who rapped about what Benson saw in his surrounding neighborhoods. This was reality for Barry.

"I think too often you see a lot of kids on the West Coast claim they were down from back in the day, but most of them are just historians who have caught up with the whole New York scene," Barry says. "My record collection goes way back, but everything pre-1984 I picked up late. I can appreciate these records, but I'm not going to say I was down with these records when they came out," explains Benson. "Ice-T's 'Six In The Morning' and

> Eazy E's 'Boys In The Hood' are records that fit into my definition of old school rap for

Bill Stephney's definition of old school is completely different from Barry Benson's. Stephney hosted the first rap show at WBAU-Long Island, New York and now owns his own label, StepSun Music Entertainment. Most

importantly he has been a fan and follower of hip-hop from the beginning.

"If you go back to the battles in the parks, in the youth centers and even on the tapes, the idea was you had two MCs who had to excite the crowd. Bill says. "The one

who won the battle had to excite the most people, so in many respects, that meant that you had to be as commercial as you possibly could be, and you had to be inventive. A couple years ago you had people saying, 'Hammer ain't rap.' It sounded like he was rhyming to me. Hammer might have been a bad rapper, but he's still a rapper. We got into a thing where we thought anything bad was not hip-hop, and that can never be. Actually Hammer was just as hip-hop as anybody, because hip-hop's initial theory was, 'How can

I move the crowd and how can I get as many people as I can to be into me?' and ten million people were into Hammer!"

Stephney feels that we have pushed the self-destruct button ourselves saying, "We're pigeonholing ourselves to the point where we're killing the genre." He blames part of this tunnel vision on the commercialization of the music and the lack of legitimate institutions in hip-hop such as radio stations and cable networks that have a solid grasp on the beginnings of rap, where this music truly came from and how it developed. "It went from being the most sincere form of music to being the most insincere music. Everything is just about people frontin' now, and the money has made us lost," As he puts it: "Hip-hop is about open minds, not closed ones." O





ontinuing our efforts to familiarize you with our cohorts,
we've selected three key figures. Some of you may deal
with them on a regular basis, but may not know their
backgrounds. We did a little digging, and also asked them for the scoop on

breaking records in their respective fields. Here's what they had to say.

#### Mel Smith, senior vice president of Rap-A-Lot Records and director of Sing-A-Lot Records

How many promoters can tag a list of credits that read 15 platinum albums, 9 gold albums and numerous gold singles behind their names before they reach the age of 30? Mel Smith can.

Born and raised in Brooklyn, Smith's first job was carrying records for Mel Rock Well, one of Brooklyn's better known DJs. It was 1981 and he was only 16, but Smith instinctively knew this was a way "in." Next he became a DJ. going by the name of DJ Prince Melie Mel, and became very popular in Brooklyn's Bushwick section. After graduating from high school, Smith worked as a stock clerk at The Wiz and Sam Goody. "I loved the music so much that I had to be around it in some form, and those were the only jobs I could get," Smith says. His hard work led to a position as head of special events and stock manager at Sam Goody. "It helped me broadened my music base because this was an \$8 million-a-year store. I learned about rock, country, heavy metal, and, of course, R&B and rap."

During an in-store visit by Patrick Swayze in 1988 Smith met Ron Stricker, who was head of east coast sales for RCA. Smith impressed Stricker so much that a year later he recommended Smith for a job as sales coordinator at RCA. "He called me one day out of the blue and asked if I was interested," says Smith. "This is a person that I met one time!"

"When I came to RCA my main responsibility was the Jive catalog. I was in close contact with the Jive staff, and that's how I met Barry Weiss," says Smith. In August of 1989, Weiss hired Smith as Jive's national R&B promotion manager. He spent the next two years under Weiss' tutelage. "Barry Weiss is a true genius. He gave me the hunger and drive. I learned how to concentrate on the real hits as oppose to the fluff. Barry taught me how to hone in and chase the hits," says Smith.

But, as with all good students, Smith eventually had to leave his teacher.

"It was very difficult for me to leave Jive because everyone there was really good to me. We were like a family, but I felt it was time for me to go and grow on my own," Smith says.

After a short stint at Virgin Records, Smith hooked up with Rap-A-Lot Records and took on The Geto Boys and their single, "Mind Playing Tricks On Me," as his first project there. After having success with The Geto Boys, however, Rap-A-Lot went through some changes Smith didn't agree with which led to him taking a job at Uptown Entertainment. It didn't take long for James Smith, Rap-A-Lot's owner, to see what he had let go. James turned around and offered Mel the title senior vice president of Rap-A-Lot Records, overseeing all record operations, and make him director of his own label, Sing-A-Lot Records—an offer Mel couldn't refuse.

Mel's first project with The Geto Boys was their smash single, "Mind Playing Tricks On Me." This was a song by three straight up hard-core rappers rapping about being over-paranoid for living life in the fast lane of gangs and drugs. Because of The Geto Boys' image, Mel had a hard time taking this record to radio and convincing them to play it. "This was a difficult record to work in the beginning because a lot of the DJs didn't like it the first time they heard it," he says. "The first region to support it was Houston and Dallas, but it took a long time for it to work its way across the

nation. This record dropped in May, 1991, but it didn't hit in L.A. until December! I was lucky because the record's longevity was incredible. If a record can move from one city to another, say, from Houston to Dallas, and not miss a beat, you know it's not just a hometown favorite. You then take it from Dallas and spread it to Pittsburgh. If it hits in Pittsburgh, you know it's not a regional record. The thing to do is to get as many people at the same time as possible."

As the interview went on, Mel showed intimate and compassionate sides of a promoter that rarely surface, but by the end of the interview, Mel blurts out, "You gotta hear my first Sing-A-Lot group, Another Level. You're gonna love it." A promoter's job is never done.

#### Alexander Mejia, street research coordinator, KMEL-San Francisco & owner and creator of The Remix Shop

When it comes to aggressive, cutting-edge radio programming, KMEL in San Francisco is at the top of the list. Although the key figures who put the station on top, Keith Naftaly, Hosh Gureli and Harold Austin, have moved on, one other person who has been instrumental in KMEL's success still calls it home, and that's Alexander Mejia, II.

A native of Oakland, California, Mejia was an avid music fan and collector. As his record collection multiplied, Mejia, who considered himself a musician and songwriter at the time, began making party tapes.

Around 1983, Mejia decided to take DJing more seriously and started spinning at weddings and other functions. He was still writing songs, but relied on DJing as a main source of income. The more he did it, the more serious it got. "Some of my friends started renting out big halls and had me come in and spin," he says. "As I started to do more gigs, a gentleman by the name of Bill McGoughlin taught me the business aspect of DJing. He used to say, 'You can do these parties but make sure you're professional and represent yourself well so that you can get the really big-paying gigs.' "Knowing the business aspect paid off because Mejia began to realize he could make a lot more money if he promoted his own parties.

Mejia kept a day job to get a steady paycheck until, "One day something just snapped, and decided to quit my day job. I knew I was good enough, and I believed in myself. And after talking with a few friends who helped inspire me, I walked out the door and never came back."

His first experience with radio was not a pleasant one. "I called up KMEL the day after I quit my day job and told them I wanted to become a DJ," he says. "They used to have guest DJs in the morning, and so they asked me to announce a record. I couldn't hear it, and started fumbling so bad that they said I was so terrible that I would never make it in this business and hung up on me. I got dissed bad, but it was hilarious."

Mejia had no choice but to hustle for club gigs, and he joined the B.A.D.D.A. Record Pool. Pool director, Nick Lygizos, liked what he saw and heard, and hooked Mejia up with radio station KSOL around January of '86.

Marcos Gutierrez, then a KSOL air personality, gave Mejia his first break. At the same time, KMEL was changing formats, and Lee Michaels, who was the PD at KMEL, approached Lygizos as to how he could get a hold of Cameron Paul to do a mixshow because he was really popular at the time. Lygizos, instead, recommended Mejia for the job. Alex submitted his tape, and the next thing he knew, he was in.

As KMEL's street research coordinator, Mejia oversees all of the station's mixshows as well as other duties such as coordinating club presence with the station and staying in contact with retail outlets. This position allows Alex to test his gut feeling on a record. In the case of 2 Pac's "I Get Around," Mejia says, "The minute I got it, I dumped it into my mixshow. Some of the mixshow DJs happen to be walking by the studio, and they all came in asked, What record is that?" "Mejia then took the record to a club and played it during prime time. Within a short period of time, his gut feeling was validated by serious retail action.

Mejia feels strongly about mixshows and clubs. According to Alex, "They are a record's proving ground," he says. "If you can start a small retail buzz going, a radio station will see this and give it a shot. Once you get the support of a major radio station like KMEL ways in there?"

like KMEL, you in there!"

Marc Asbury- Rainbow Records, Atlantic City, N.J. & WLFR/Pomona, N.J.

Everyone involved in the rap music industry has at least one situation they consider as pivotal in their respective careers. Marc Asbury reminisces, "I can remember when I first started at Stockton, I was riding my bike on campus one day and I sort of stumbled upon the radio station." Call it fate but because of that seemingly meaningless bike ride, he is now directly involved with the music he loves, in not one but in two different capacities.

As DJ Doctor Rockson at Stockton State College in Pomona, New Jersey, Marc Asbury has been a fixture on WLFR's Friday evening hip-hop show for the past five years. But it was because he had an "ear for music" that he was also hired as the rap buyer at Rainbow Records in Atlantic City. Marc says, "I got my reputation from my radio gig, but also from DJing at niteclubs and selling mixtapes. The guy who I currently work for heard my name, and respected how well I knew my music so he wanted me to work for him. I've worked here since I graduated from Stockton in 1992." He continues, "I got my radio broadcasters license three weeks after I signed up to work at the station, and I did my first show in October of '86. It was a jazz show, and it allowed me to gain an invaluable amount of experience."

During that time, Asbury got to know some of the station's other disc jockeys who were popular. After hooking up with legendary DJ Cosmic Kev, Asbury soon developed his own hip-hop program. "Sitting there

watching Kev really got me interested in hip-hop again, and not too long after that I got my own hip-hop show," he says. Asbury brought in Sure Rock Holmes as his co-host and after finishing his college career, Marc gave Holmes complete control of the show, while he continued to do the mixing. Marc says, "I still go up to the show to do the mixes, and we collaborate on the choosing the music that's played."

Asbury's position at WLFR over the years is directly responsible for his second career. As the rap buyer for Rainbow Records, he is the person who brings product into the store for customers to buy, and complete control of what is purchased. "The manager questions a lot of the my picks, but that means is he's paying attention to what I'm doing," Asbury says. "When I travel to other cities, I notice quite a few store owners who give their buyers full control, but don't know where their money is being spent. As far as they know, they could be buying a bunch of garbage records. My manager questions me, and if I'm wrong about a record, I'll admit it. But he also knows when I'm right, because the record moves. If there's a record that I'm having a problem moving, but it's a good record, I'll push it until it's out of print. That's what he appreciates the most about me."

It's quite obvious that the decisions Marc Asbury makes both as a radio DJ and as a retail buyer influence the music the people in and around the Atlantic City area hear and buy. He breaks records via radio airplay, and also exposes new music via in-store exposure. "For radio, I try to create a buzz on a new record by playing it as part of the mixshow. When I put a record in the mix, and people respond to it, I'll tell them what it is and to pick it up at the store. As for those who don't pick up my show, I'll do lots of in-store play, especially on a record that I like a lot. Even if I'm not

high on a record but I have a feeling it will sell,
I'll push it anyways."

Marc is adamant about the fact that he is indeed interested in furthering his career in the music industry. And what position does he feel his background has best prepared him for? A&R of course!


"I'm probably more critical of records than some of the big name A&R people."

As for his words of wisdom, Marc says, "We've got to keep the vinyl alive. My bosses are forever saying we should stop selling vinyl, but I always tell them that there is a need for it, especially since we're the only store in the area that has the balls to keep it around. There are a lot of kids who are trying to get started as DJs and they need the tools to start with. I think all music formats should keep pressing wax, because when you come right down to it, the bottom line is that it all comes back to vinyl."O

ip-hop has always been heavily influenced by its surrounding pop culture(s). Over the years, MCs and DJs have drawn inspiration from kung fu films, video games and slasher movies. One area of pop culture in particular to the par

lar has left an indelible mark on rap: the comic book. The artwork and characters of comic books have manifested themselves in graffiti art, on album covers and in the lyrical content of many a gifted MC

Comic books' influence started back in the Old School days of the late '70s. DJs and MCs often took their stage names from popular characters featured in the pages of Marvel or DC comics. In his book *The Rap Attack*, David Toop ruminates on the origins of Grandmaster Flash's name:

"In the barren setting of a school gymnasium the fantasy level of the music invoked a mythical battle between the DC Comics hero Flash, the fastest man alive, and the Shaolin grandmasters with their Mantis Fists, Drunken swordplay and Hawk's Paw Kung Fu. A crazy cast of one-armed boxers, deaf and mute heroines and white-eyebrow monks merged

with the strangely costumed alter ego of police scientist Barry Allen. The Flash. When the smoke cleared a new hero emerged — Grandmaster Flash!"

Hip-hop's most visually noticeable representation comes with the use of cartoons and comic art on album covers. Hip-hop musical guru, George Clinton, and his Parliament/Funkadelic aggregation used Overton Lloyd's comic art on several of their LP covers throughout the 70s. More than a





scientist Barry Allen, The Organized Konfusion a


Underground crew followed suit with P-Funk inspired comic strips on their 1991 LP, Sons of The P. Afrika Bambaataa's "Renegades of Soul" 12-inch featured a comic book-styled cover as did the 1989 Masters of Rhythms album by DJ Chuck Chillout & Cool Chip. In the '90s, two popular crews, EPMD and Boogie Down Productions commissioned covers by well known comic book artists. EPMD's 1991 release, Business As Usual, featured a Bill Sienkiewicz cover, which depicted the group standing in a swamp. As for BDP, frontman KRS-1 has used a couple of different artists for album work. Kyle Baker, author/illustrator of the

decade later. The Digital

critically acclaimed Why I Hate Saturn graphic novel (Piranha Press, 1991), supplied the artwork for the H.E.A.L. project. "Kyle Baker's his

art, to me, represents the inner city vibe," says Parker. "I just like the way he draws characters, the way he makes characters available to you. I hired him to do the cover to the H.E.A.L. album because I like how his art repre-

sented thinking." KRS also featured the artwork of acclaimed underground illustrator Robert Williams on BDP's *Sex and Violence* LP. Williams rose to fame in the late '60s as a psychedelic poster artist and later was a frequent contribuor to the legendary San Francisco underground comic, *ZAP!* "T've never met Williams, but I was a student of his art for a long time and when I was developing the concept of *Sex and Violence*, Williams came to my mind," says Parker. "I think his art represents sex and it represents violence."



Organized Konfusion and UltraMagnetic MC's regularly make mention of comic book characters, and are themselves avid collectors.

On his track "Ahonetwo, Ahonetwo," (from his 1991 debut album, *I Wish My Brother George Was Here*), Del (Tha Funkee Homosapien) makes reference to one of Superman's nemesis: "I laid in the shade and I greeted Mxyzptlk/with a rhythm and a rhyme/and he said there is a twist..."

Likewise, Organized Konfusion revealed their comic book knowledge on

their self-titled debut back in 1991. In "Hypnotical Gases" they cryptically referred to many comic book heroes: "....rampage of light/ A rocklike figure (1) out the night/tap the sphere/I swing/my wrist holds my trigger(2)/darkness can't overshadow me, cause I have radar(3)/smashin' you/ then trashin' you/after I'm bashin' you / with my hammer(4)....my profile is low key/gamma rays brainwash to transform me(5)/but I still withhold my hammer to lift me up....night approaches/so I precede and fly back to the Hall of Justice(6)..... I stretch like Reed Richards(7) across the land..... "



When asked about the comic book references, Monch of Organized Konfusion says, "Yeah, we still read comics, we still collect. Basically I'm into X-Men, Daredevil, y'know that whole X-Factor/X-Force thing, and Hulk."

UltraMagnetic MC's are another crew whose members are deep into comic book lore. In the past, DJ Moe Love has spiced up many Ultra raps by sampling various superhero records ranging from Superman to Spiderman. On their latest release, *The Four Horsemen*, Ultra leader, Kool Keith assumes the role of a modern day caped crusader when he drops the lyrics: "I got a white mask/a black cape/two pair of silver gloves/and nobody know who I am/I will not take my mask off to reveal..." (excerpted from "Man On The

Corner"). In the same song he also refers to Ghost Rider, a popular Marvel Comics "anti-hero": "Back to hell/to the graveyard/walking the street you see Ghostrider..."

Keith's partner in rhyme, Ced Gee also kicks the crazy comic book verse, making reference to the Fantastic Four character The Thing (a.k.a. Ben Grimm) on "2 Brothers With Checks": "...let's see Ben Grimm in his exo-skeleton/he's pitchin' a fastball..." "We Are The Horsemen" makes nods to the X-Men, their nemesis The Great Magneto, and the Silver Surfer, as well. Kool Keith kicks the X-Men verse: "...you, Wolverine/I'm down

with Cyclops/Rhythm X..



while Ced Gee mentions the Silver Surfer: "...when they're reachin' their peak/I'm a call Silver Surfer/return to the galaxy..."

The members of Ultra have been down with comic books since way back. "I read comic books like *X-Men, Fantastic Four.* I still collect, the new Image (comics), that shit is awesome, *Shadowhawk, Brigade, Spawn...*" says beat manipulator TR Love.


Comic books, their art and characters have obviously had an impact on rap. KRS-ONE offers up an explanation why, "The things we grow up with are the only things we can attack, or use for help. Comic books are what we've all grown up with. If you didn't read a comic book, there was always some kid you knew that read one."

Money B of Digital Underground and Raw Fusion fame says the fascination with comic books is a throwback to our upbringings. "Rappers want to draw a picture in somebody's head. You know everybody played video games, everybody watched cartoons and everybody watched karate movies, so everybody can relate to it."

As for the continued impact of comic books on the world of hip-hop, who knows? With Public Enemy, Kid-N-Play and Hammer already immortalized in 4-color newsprint, and if the emergence of Gold Mountain Entertainment's Rock-It Comix (with Pharcyde and PM Dawn comics already in the works) is any indication, these two areas of pop culture should be rubbing off of one another for some time. O



#### PROJECT G-7 A TRIBUTE TO WES MONTGOMERY (EVIDENCE)

In the spring of 1992, a handful of premier guitarists gathered together to record a tribute to their idol, mentor, and, for some, contemporary, Wes Montgomery, and in the process laid down two volumes of some of the most heartfelt music heard in some time. The simultaneous release of volumes one and two on Evidence feature guitarists Kenny Burrell, Gene Bertoncini, Ted Dunbar, Kevin Eubanks, Rodney Jones, Jack Wilkins, and newcomer William Ash, with Rufus Reid on bass and Akira Tana on drums. G-7, with such pensive beauties as Burrell's "Remembering Wes," "Polka Dots And Moonbeams" and Iones' emotional "Serena," takes on an almost meditative mood; similarly, those medium to up tunes reflect an earnest emotional attachment. The whole project is lovingly guided by Reid's unassuming but earstwhile presence and Tana's tasteful interactions. The one drawback from this set is that we are left wondering if volumes three and four will come out together or separately.

Bebop trombone godfather J.J. Johnson makes his Verve debut in style with a diverse songbook ranging from a solo 'bone ballad, to a Silveresque funk, from straight bop to a pseudo rock beat (with just enough swinging in the bridge). Since his reemergence onto the touring and recording scene in '87 after a 17 year film/televison scoring hiatus, I.J. has once again been able to influence many a young would-be trombonist. With a recording history and bio as deep as the jazz encycolpedia, J.J. has nothing to prove to the critics or his fans, but for those unaware of his previous legacy, "Let's Hang Out" is a beautiful introduction to both his unmistakable tone and phrasing as well as his largely unnoticed writing. Joined by a steller group like Jimmy Heath, Rufus Reid, Rene Rosnes, Terence Blanchard, Ralph Moore, Victor Lewis, Lewis Nash, and Stanley Cowell, this is a great disc to listen to when busy or just hangin' out. Favorites include: stretch-out vehicle "Kenya," poetic "Ode to G.T.," groove machine "May I Have Dis Dance?" and the lovely "I Got It Bad (And That Ain't Good).'

#### LMAS LIVE ON

number of people in radio, including the FCC Commissioners, thought that Limited Marketing Agreements (LMAs) between separatelyowned stations would disappear as the new duopoly rules became effective. After all, why rent another station when you can buy it? As it turns out LMAs are still very much alive, for several

If your company is in the process of buying a station, LMA is a way to take it over early. In some cases, on a monthly cash-flow basis

marriage-and quite a few LMAs have disintegrated after such a trial period. And it can be a way of controlling stations totaling more than 25% of the listening of a market, which the new duopoly rules make it impossible to buy

But there are hazards, and some broadcasters may not be fully aware of them.

The actual licensee of a station that is being operated by another ownership (for programming, sales or both) must remain in control of their own station, to avoid an FCC sanction for "illegal transfer of control." This can be a pretty difficult thing to prove when somebody else is staffing and programming your station. To help establish that no violation has occurred, stations being LMA'd by another must meet several FCC rules.

First, the LMA'd station—and the station LMAing it-must maintain

their own main studio facilities inside the region in which it is legal to have a main studio and "at least one management-level individual" must be in charge of it. Further, that person must use the main studio as a "base office," and "be present during normal business hours on a regular basis.

Clearly, a station being LMA'd can't completely dispose of people on its payroll if it wants to avoid fines and keep its license! And that's not all: When the management-level person isn't there, other staff must be at the main studio, although it appears the FCC will accept employment of the same staff by both the LMAing organization and the LMAing station as meeting this requirement. But the management-level people cannot be "dual employed" in this manner. And each licensee must employ its own chief operator, or chief engi-

Second, the same main studio may serve both stations as long as the previously-mentioned regulations are met, but of course this studio would have to be within both station's primary service contour, as defined by the FCC, to be legal.

The FCC has imposed substantial fines on stations whose "main marketing" was located outside this contour for reasons of marketing or convenience. It wasn't all that long ago the main studio had to be located within the limits of the city of license, or at the transmitter period. The new rules offers much more flexibility, but the FCC won't tolerate violations.

And third, the time broker establishing the LMA can control the transmitter of the LMA'd station via a legal remote control setup "part of the time." Since the FCC permits the National Supervisory Network to operate any station's transmitter full time by satellite from Colorado, it could be that the LMAing organization might be able to do this full time. Check with your Washington communications attorney on this one.

Of course, no station is permitted to have an unlicensed operator in charge of the transmitter at any time. Check the wall near the transmitter or remote control unit of your station to make sure every operator has a valid FCC restricted radiotelephone operator permit posted.





### BUILDING CUME

rogram directors have concentrated on building time spent listening over the last ten years. That's a necessary goal, but it comes as no surprise that unless there's cume there's no audience with which to build time spent listening.

Last fall, while doing a PD PRO-FILE analysis for an A/C station, I remarked in the Executive Summary, "This is the finest job of maximizing the station's TSL that I had found.3

The program director promptly called me up and said, "Thank you for the compliment, but my station's ratings have gone down."

Imagine my embarrassment. I quickly mustered the

excuse that I had only been provided with a single survey's Station Mechanical.

He said, "Not to worry! The report did exactly as 1

intended."

"How so?" I asked. "I took the report to my manager and explained that I'd done all I could to get the TSL up, now I need the funding to build the audience," he replied.

The ratings game is one of quarter hours. Whoever gets the most quarter hours wins. The easiest way to get more quarter hours, of course, is to get listeners who already are tuned to your station to listen longer, but there is a limit. The more difficult way to get quarter hours is to add listeners to the station. That is, build the cume.

In order for the station to get credit for a listener, the diarykeeper must indicate listening to a station five minutes or more during the daypart being studied. Hence, if the listener listens five minutes to the 7 a.m. newscast (7:00A-7:05A) on Tuesday, they are counted in the cume for the Monday-Friday 6A-10A cume for the week. This diarykeeper counts for one quarter hour and one for the cume. If this same person listens each weekday to that same

newscast for the same duration of five minutes, they still only count once in the cume column, but now have five quarter hours of listening to the station. A little quick math will tell radio gets credit for one hour and 15 minutes for 25 minutes. Advantage, radio!

The more cume the station has, the greater the likelihood the ratings will be more stable and consistent. The reason for this is simple. Every broadcaster knows that more sample yields more reliable results from the survey. The same formula applies to the station. The greater the percentage of the sample that mentions a station, the

for five minutes or more during a quarter-hour period, so long as the event was memorable enough for them to remember to write it down in their Arbitron diary or to remember to tell the telephone interviewer from AccuRatings.

Cume building is brought about by getting radio listeners to try your station through advertising and promotion. The Arbitron data states that 95% of Americans listen to the radio at least one quarter hour in a week. The RADAR, Birch, AccuRatings and other radio listening behavior surveys generally agree on that figure.

There is no subtlety here. If you want more cume

it has to be generated by stealing the listener away from other stations.

Think about your mass advertising campaigns. Is your outdoor advertising directed at sampling the radio station or increasing the visibility of your call letters to existing listeners? Does the televi-

sion advertising give reasons for a listener to tune in to your radio station, or does it just set an image or awareness of the station? Does the direct mail campaign that you are planning invite the listener to tune your station in and give them an incentive to sample the station? Does your telemarketing campaign give listeners reasons to sample your station?

If you're going to win in the ratings, building cume is every bit as important as maximizing the time spent listening.

A note of warning: If you conduct a major cume building campaign, expect to see your time spent listening average drop, since you will be adding the First Preference listeners of other stations to yours. The idea is to get more quarter hours in total than any other station. This is why the battle for ratings is called the Ratings War.

better the reliability; therefore, the more consistent the rating should be-all other things being equal.

#### WHAT ACTIVITIES BUILD CUME?

Most of the cume-building activity by definition must be off the station's air because you're trying to promote sampling of the radio station by non-listeners. One cume-building activity that might work on your station's air is to ask your listeners to "tell a friend to listen." You might provide an incentive for the person's friend to listen to your station.

Some stations use special programming to build cume. A major sports franchise can draw listeners to your station. A major personality, such as Rush Limbaugh, Howard Stern or Paul Harvey can draw listeners to your station. Yes, even the music, news, or talk can cause people to stop on your station





#### ROBERT CRAY BAND Shame + a Sin (Mercury)



On his eighth album, Robert Cray has emerged as producer of his own musical destiny. Having shed a disgruntled second guitarist, a longtime producer/partner and changed his horn section a from Memphis one to a Miami-based one, Cray is running the show and the lyrics show it. With two of the world's most universal themes—taxes and love—Cray reflects the recessionary '90s with a wicked Howlin' Wolfish reading of "1040 Blues"—Cray's rowdiest foray into

the Chicago Chess sound. "Some Pain, Some Shame" has the bumping and grinding F-beat while "I Shiver" is Cray at his most somber. *Shame + a Sin* is Cray's darkest set yet, a revealing look at the underbelly of modern blues.

# COCTEAU TWINS "Evangeline" + 2 additional tracks (Capitol)

The Cocteau Twins started up over a decade, practically as an ambient whisper. Their decade-plus evolution culminated in their leaving 4AD's fold, joining Capitol USA and Fontana UK, and releasing one of their most melodic and boldest songs yet. You needn't necessarily lean "Alternative" to incorporated the Twins' music. All three tracks are elegant in the way they straddle darkness and melody.

# LAURA NYRO walk the dog & light the light (Columbia)

Twenty years ago, pairing Laura Nyro with Steely producer Gary Katz twenty years ago would have been unlikely, but here's to changing times. Throughout a sometimes dark andsporadic career, Nyro has always had a stubborn soul streak in her music, not unlike artists like Todd Rundgren and Hall & Oates, who came after her. On walk the dog, Nyro and Katz extract just that from the Nyro sound, to the point of resurrecting some of the nowfashionable soul sidemen like drummer Bernard "Pretty" Purdie and bassist Gerald Jemmott (!). On her Columbia homecoming, Laura sounds a little perkier, but she's still one of the masters of tar beach rooftop city songwriting. Tracks like "Art Of Love," "Oh yeah Maybe baby (the heebie jeebies)" and the title track might work best in a very proper, historical "then and now" context. "To a Child" is our favorite.

# 10,000 MANIACS "Because The Night" (Elektra/MTV Unplugged)



Most Added by a mile, 10,000 Maniacs' latest is an "unplugged" cover—Bruce Springsteen's "Because The Night"—a song with nine lives that keep on giving. Although this is technically "unplugged," "Because The Night" typifies the stature of Unplugged's production—big!. In next week's GAVIN we explore the booming Unplugged concept in depth.

# ALBERT COLLINS Collins Mix (The Best Of) (Point Blank/Virgin)

Along with Buddy Guy, Albert Collins is one of the true nice guys of blues. But a guitar in his hands and he's as mean and ruthless as the best of them. After a lifetime on the road and with a solid legacy to look back on. Albert takes time to re-introduce some of his classics which are floating around on some elaborate, hot-selling CD compilations. Like B.B. King's last A3 success, Collins Mix is part of the current bumper crop that includes screaming efforts by Robert Cray, Larry Carlton and Robben Ford. Mixing it up on Collins Mix are B.B., Gary Moore and Kim Wilson with Albert's patented "mastercaster" tone. Track include the blatantly sad "If Trouble Was Money,' a nineminute duel with Gary Moore. On an infinitely more up note, there are instrumentals like "Don't Lose Your Cool" with typical Collins frostbitten licks while B.B. trades notes on Albert's 1962 signature tune, "Frosty."


#### **MONSTERLAND Destroy What You Love (Seed** Records)

"We're going to tour, and we're planning to destroy our lives and disappoint our parents," he says. This Monster attitude lays a drawbridge between nihilism and humor in a refreshing way. But what do they sound like? The recommended daily allowance of rocking out is here-drums are like hopped-up windshield wipers peppered by a constant sheet of guitar hail, and the vocals perfectly complement the din. The punchy "Insulation" sounds like Cheap Trick discovering distortion and running with it. "Rid Of You" thumps with impressive drumming that alternates between bass, cymbal and snare with disarming alacrity, as guitars thresh. "Nobody Loves You" is a raucous mix of grating guitar and singing that is by turns accusatory and reassuring. Hard core leanings surface on the manic "Car On Fire," and "At One With Time's" guitars escalate in a delirious crescendo. If you're looking for slow songs you came to the wrong place; if you want to tear yourself a new earhole give this one a spin and tip up the —DAVID BERAN treble.

#### HENDRICKS TRIO (Fiasco, P.O. Box 34416, Los Angeles, CA 90034)



I've always found the three-piece to be the most satisfying rock and roll configuration. In a trio, the songs have to be there; as a trio, a band can render those songs in the most sincere fashion possible. No filler, Just meat, (and yes, the Juliana Hatfield 3 is the exception that proves the rule). Pittsburgh's Karl Hendricks Trio is dominated by the guitar of songwriter Karl Hendricks (duh), whose drone-y riffs and Moore and Mascis styles of distortion aren't noise enough to bury his buoyant melodies. As a complement to the band's three-piece simplicity, Misery And Women, KHT's second fulllength, offers a certain thematic unity. Not surprisingly, Karl's main concerns are misery, women, and the link between the two, and his geekiness, sensitivity and longing are enough to restore my ever-fading faith in men. Hey, Ivana (B. Adored, not Trump), maybe you should date one of these guys. Fave tracks include the kick-off, "Get Out Your Hankies For This One," the Unrest-ish "Flowers Avenue, "I Don't Need Your Shit" and "I Didn't Believe In Gravity. -SEANA BARUTH

#### JOE HENRY **Kindness Of The World** (Mammoth, Carr Mill, 2nd Floor, Carroboro, NC 27510)

\*Even if we've got no more than this to show/Well, it'll be just us and who would know?" Joe Henry show-n-tells the sweet country-rock road in the small town, the backroom and the bar room with a twist. Although he mixes in country mainstays like pedal steel guitar and piano, Joe Henry's music strays a little from the well-worn country path. He

warbles with a cigarette edge of gruffness about present days of longing and futures stretched by hope. The tales that work best pair Henry's vocals with harmonies from The Jayhawks' Gary Louris and Victoria Williams. "This Close To You" starts slow and builds to a full-tilt rock out. "Fireman's Wedding" is waltzy sans cheese, while "One Day When the Weather is Warm" supplies the aforementioned and a smokey bar room. Other musts include "Third Reel." "Who Would Know," and "Dead to the. World." "But any chance at all is one we owe/And it'll be just us and who would know?"

#### **THORNUCOPIA** Dry July (Lather Records, P.O. Box 4877 Davis, CA 95617)



This Davis, Calif. quintet makes its full-length debut with a dozen originals and a cover of Robyn Hitchcock's obtuse "Superman" thrown in for good measure. Grafting Johanna Galos sometimes soothing vocals onto lethal doses of brittle distorted guitar makes a nice a la mode. "The Peacock Killer" is a hoedown spiked with clanging guitars conjuring visions of a roomful of reeling recalcitrants. As Galos sings "Take your partner by the hand" and "everybody promenade," the bass plunges and then lunges up the scale. "B-Side" finds Johanna's vocals moulting into a silky coat as guitars spool loops of otherworldly melody. Hitchcock would probably give Thorn's version of "Superman" high marks for its Byrdsy guitar, and "Teena" is an all-out blizzard of percussion and potent, dungeony bass. The slower, hypnotic "Ouiero Fuego" and the near Gregorian chant feel of "Thorn Cafe Orchestra" display the band's strong suit: sliding from fast to slow songs seamlessly.

#### **New Releases**

#### **BIG COUNTRY** The Buffalo Skinners (Fox/RCA)

Last week I checked out Big Country at a last minute large club booking put together in tandem with a free concert they did in conjunction with San Francisco Alternative Rocker Live 105. That night a whole new generation was on hand to see the original band's lineup solidly in synch. Mark Brzezicki's drums pounded like cannon fire over Moscow; guitarist Stuart Adamson's Glaswegian wit was as cheeky as ever. On less than a week's notice, the band nearly packed the place with an odd mixture of haircuts and headbangers. Their latest release, The Buffalo Skinners, has also landed stateside, and it's as unrelenting as their stage show. Self-produced (the band now trusts nobody to mess with their sound), Big Country don't sound as much revived as clarified. Never has the gap between stage and studio been so slim. Tony Butler's thudding bass tests the lower thresholds as Mark B bashes away. Adamson's vocals aim at their proper level-not obscured in echo or unnaturally pushed up front as on the band's previous American release. As album radio winds down on "The One I Love." maybe a little acerbic social commentary is in order with "We're Not In Kansas" and "The Selling Of America." With amps blazing at 11, Big Country is poised to recapture the U.S.A., proving you can go back.

#### MR. BIG **Bump Ahead (Atlantic)**



Mr. Big continues to straddle both sides of the hard rock genre. They can melt the girls' hearts with lovely ballads or pull the necessary stops out for the Beavis and Butt-head crowd. The balladry of "Ain't Seen Love Like That" and "Wild World's" decidedly wooden, unplugged flavor will satisfy the former, as tracks like "What's It Gonna Be" and "Colorado Bulldog" will keep the bother boys at bay with vicious, jazz fusionstyled breaks and frenzied licks. Paul Gilbert's buzz-saw guitar shards stand off admirably against Billy Sheehan and Pat Torpey's furious rhythmic axis. Vocalist Eric Martin puts on his best Jekyll and Hyde to suit the sweetness and rowdiness of each musical selection.

RECORDING: "We were in Stockholm wondering if we would alienate everyone with our new album. When we did our previous albums we stripped down to a four piece. We didn't have to put any restraints on this one: we just went balls out; and did the best album we could. The setting definitely contributed to the process. We worked for three months. The prepration time wasn't as long as you might think. We went over there-to Stockholm with rudimentary ideas about what the songs were going to be like then we tried to find an angle. It was spontaneous. We'd sit down and listen to a piece of music until we got an idea, then we'd put the idea on tape and decide later if we wanted to keep it.

CYBERSANK: "I ran across Cybersank in Sweden when I was there for Christmas last year. We wanted to make this album and every time we've done stuff Relativity has always been around to put their influences on it. Cybersank had no desire to come to the States, so we holed up in a dark, cold apartment in a dark, cold country with dark, cold TV. Nothing comes easy to us. You can give in or you can fight back. We're still fighting back. I think it's fortunate that we didn't have a big hit with the old lineups. On this album we get to come to terms with ourselves and establish our identity."

"It was scary a few months ago when we were still recording. We

knew we were doing what we wanted to be doing, but if this big change in the industry hadn't come along at the same time, we could have been cutting out throats. We were always aware of that and it shows in our music. It has that go-for-broke feeling. The power of creative control is scary."

#### DIAMOND HEAD Death and Progress (SOB)

After an eight year hiatus, British heavy metal legends Diamond Head have returned. Guitarist Brian Tatler and vocalist Sean Harris have reunited and along with new members Karl Wilcox on drums and Pete Vuckovic swinging the bass. Picking up where they left off, Diamond Head offers straight-ahead guitardriven heavy metal tunes that are head-banging and ass-swinging. How can you go wrong playing a band that has influenced the likes of Metallica and Megadeth? From the quick paced "Starcrossed" to the flowing echos of "Run," Diamond Head captures the sing along metal sound of the early '80s and delivers it to the '90s. Death and Progress should get Album radio airplay because they take a classic rock approach and appeal to both younger and older demos. 
