

FORMAT CHANGE COMING?

LANDER'S NUT HUT SPLITS, PHILLIPS EXITS WEGX

Amidst howls of protest from his faithful listeners and rumors of a format change, morning man John Lander has decided to leave his popular Eagle 106 morning show, The Nut Hut, Friday (2/26) after contract talks broke down. Following Lander out the door on Friday is Brian Phillips, who tendered his resignation right after Lander did.

According to an article in the *Philadelphia Inquirer*, Phillips told management he'd rather resign "than work for a station so short-sighted it would not renew its highest rated jock."

Meanwhile, speculation on why WEGX is changing centers on parent company Malrite's reluctance to spend any money on Eagle 106 and rumors that it's being sold to Shamrock Radio. Apparently, The Nut Hut costs \$1 million a year to produce.

A source inside the station told *The Gavin Report* that irate Nut Hut fans have sent over 1,000 letters to the station. Reaction ranges from "We are really going to miss every one of you" to "[we] would find it difficult to start the day

without them" to "no one can replace their excellent talent" to "we heard of your 'dismissal' and were outraged."

Everything from modern rock to country to a satellite format has been mentioned as Eagle 106's next step. General Manager Dave Noll did not return phone calls, but in the *Inquirer* article he said "no comment" when asked about the station's future. As for Lander, nothing is definite, but Philadelphia is buzzing that he, his sidekicks (minus Danny Bonaduce who's now overnighter at WLUP/AM-Chicago) and a built-in audience could land at Star 104.5

Clinton's \$4 Billion Radio Shock

In looking for a way to cut the outof-control federal budget deficit, **Leon Panetta**, director of the Office of Management and Budget and other Administration officials have proposed selling off the nation's airwaves to broadcasters, satellite operators and other private users.

According to an article in the Saturday, 2/20, issue of the Los Angeles Times, President Clinton believes that \$4.1 billion can be raised by auctioning off frequencies during the next four years.

The selling of the nation's air-

waves would be fairly easy, considering that as a result of deregulation, the FCC charges only a nominal application fee for licenses, but who would be able to buy them and if non-commercial users—the police, etc.—would be able to raise the money easily available to those with commercial interests.

It's too early to speculate if this proposal will get very far, but it's sure to face opposition from public interest groups.

Country Top 40?

Kansas City Top 40 giant KBEQ/FM switched to a "Young Country" format at 5 p.m. Friday, February 19. Out as a result of the change is Gavin Large Market Top 40 Nominee Erik Bradley, who was MD. Bradley has opted to return to WCKZ-Charlotte, NC in a similar capacity. Returning to the station is popular morning personality Randy Miller, who left the station in 1991.

"We see this adjustment to young country music as a natural evolution for KBEQ," said **Kathy Stinehour**, station Vice President/

General Manager. "Our station has always played the city's most popular music, and today Kansas City's and the nation's most popular music is young country."

Stinehour told *The Gavin Report* that KBEQ would be "Country with a Top 40 attitude." "Our target is 18-34 adults," she said, "and we hope to skew sixty-forty female versus male. Between the records we'll give the information music freaks are looking for. This music has gotten so popular that it's transcended its former image."

GRP Branches Out



WEA PUSHES DOLBY S

Analog cassettes are taking an "if you can't beat 'em, imitate 'em" approach to the recent torrent of digital offerings such as the digital compact cassette (DCC) and mini disc (MD). WEA Manufacturing has announced that it will implement Dolby S-type noise reduction on its analog cassettes in an attempt to offer consumers digital quality sound.

Dolby Sincreases dynamic range via an advanced signal processing system when tapes are played on a unit possessing the decoding circuitry. WEA eventually intends to encode Dolby S on all releases by Warner Bros., Elektra Entertainment, and the Atlantic Recording Group.

Dennis Staats, software licensing manager for Dolby Laboratories, told the *Gavin Report* that "Dolby S is a lot more than Dolby B, and we made it more robust for real world conditions. Dolby S gives consumers digital-like performance at an analog price."

The process was originally introduced in 1989 and only **BMG** Classics has made an effort to offer Dolby S enhanced cassettes. WEA has indicated that the newly equipped cassettes will be identically priced to non-Dolby S tapes, and **Sony** has introduced a whole new line of Dolby S equipped tape decks. Dubbing decks have a list price of \$249 and 3-head units are available for \$329. DAVID BERAN

Former KRQR-San Francisco APD/MD/personality John McCrae has returned to the station after a three-year absence, replacing Larry Snider, who exited the outlet two weeks ago. KRQR has also abandoned its short-lived identifier "The Bay's Best Rock 'n' Roll" and has gone back to calling itself "The Rocker."





FORMATS FIND THEIR WAY IN SAN FRANCISCO

This year's Gavin Seminar dealt with the basics and got down to the nitty-gritty detail as more than 2,000 attendees converged on the St. Francis Hotel. Formats showed evidence of splintering more than ever before but delegates also had many chances to explore the common ground bringing them together.

The intention is always to break new ground when staging the Gavin Seminar. The organizers take their cue from the late Bill Gavin, who once brought in Buckminster Fuller to address a surprized early-seventies radio and music crowd, and make Gavin Seminars events that each attendee can absorb on several levels. Since the Seminar format was reintroduced in 1986, there have been eight very different annual "keynote events." There were

media stars Charles Osgood, Linda Ellerbee and Larry King in '86, '87 and '88; There was business guru Tom Peters in '89, and fantasist Harlan Ellison in '90; in 1991, Russian journalist Vladimir Pozner predicted the fall of the Soviet Union, and in 1992 Rick Reynolds presented his humanoid theatrics. This year's offering was a stimulating work-inprogress by monologuist Spalding Gray.

During those eight years, format fragmentation has steered the event more toward customized format-intensive agendas. The challenge has been to innovate inside each individual format, bringing the Gavin spirit to a crammed, smaller room instead of to a crowded ballroom. Of course, that is not to overlook the gala Celebrity Cocktail Party which, as ever, was packed with food, drink and friendship.

Here is a blow-by-blow account of some of the panel action.

TOP 40 REALITY

Concern for the bottom line was evident during Top 40's small/medium market session on Thursday, February 11. Programmers joining in the discussion included Y93's (KYYY) Bob Beck; KC101's (WKCI) New Haven's Pete Cosenza; Z104 (WZEE)

Madison's "Mr. Ed" Lambert and KDON Monterey/Salinas' Michael Newman.

All panelists (except Cosenza) pull airshifts and were in agreement that it's vital that there be ongoing communication with the station's sales department. Bob Beck pointed out the value of taking time to educate the staff commenting that, "Your future is in their hands when they're on the street."



104 KRBE-Houston's Steve Wyrostok moderated Friday morning's Top 40 breakfast meeting.

The focus on the issue of revenue began when Joe Dawson, PD at KLYV Dubuque, Iowa stood up to

tell of his experience at WBXX, Battle Creek. The station went from worst to first and yet because BXX's staff "couldn't sell the numbers" the station flipped to oldies. Joe's advice was to try to build as many salable promotions.

Pete Cosenza cautioned that while belt tightening is a fact of life these days, one shouldn't lose sight that "people are your number one commodity. Find other items that can be cut—a satellite can't go to a promo-

tion and a station can't survive without people."

Addressing the programmer/consultant relationship, the panel asked everyone remember who's paying who. Michael Newman's feeling that "consultants are very experienced and it's important to have them" had everyone in agreement. Cosenza added, "The relationship is

key—use these guys as a sounding board. They're another set of ears for you and are there to help you."

A member of the audience at Friday morning's

rap session gave the audience something to

"Mr. Ed" Lambert emphasized the need to "feel the beat of the street." He recalled that when he arrived in Madison from Minneapolis to take up Z104's PD slot he was getting all kinds of input about what the city was like musically. To get a better read, he worked at a record store his first three months to find out for himself. Lambert stressed the need for music directors to "find out what's happening in the clubs and stores."

Friday morning (2/12) it was Stacy Cantrell, formerly of KS104 (KQKS) Denver, Tracy Johnson of Q106 (KKLQ) San Diego and Steve Wyrostok of 104 KRBE Houston who talked about Top 40's concerns, on and off air attitude and posturing in the '90s.

Tracy Johnson noted the "approach to reaching listeners has changed. Every element needs to be focused in this highly competitive era."

With so many entertainment choices, Stacy Cantrell said, "You've got to give listeners a reason to tune-in. Radio is a disposable utility, especially to the 25-plus crowd, which tends to be more passive."

While Johnson touched on top-of-mind awareness and the difficulty of "cutting through the clutter," Wyrostok explained that one way he's accomplishing that in Houston is by presenting the music with energy, yet doing it with a subtle approach. As Wyro put it, "We play the hits and don't bullshit you." Everyone agreed that that position can be reinforced by making an effort to get behind the concerns and needs of the community. Instead of

having jocks read boring PSAs about flea markets or car washes, short produced promos on issues like violence, sexual harassment, AIDS, make a stronger statement to the audience.

One of the more telling comments during this session came from Cantrell, who acknowledged that although we are in a business that's cyclical, this cycle is not like previous ones. It's a cycle that's "not about good programming. It's about who is making the decisions. In the age of LMAs and duopolys, great music isn't enough to turn this

cycle around. It's the GMs and owners who need to do that."

Those preparing for the brave new world need to be versatile. Wyro suggested "reading about and understanding the new technology while always keeping your ears and eyes open."

Johnson warned, "If your station isn't projecting a mood, you're not going to occupy limited shelf space in the listener's mind."

On Saturday morning, it didn't take long for Paul Drew to get everyone's attention. Starting with a classic Top 40 jock show open, Paul tossed out streamers at the same time and made things sizzle for the next sixty minutes.

Recalling that the music business came before the radio business, he traced the evolution of dance bands in the 1920s and sheet music sales through the next several decades that saw the rise of records. "In the thirties," he noted, "30,000 in sales was a big hit. They actually believed airplay would boost sales."

The majority of Paul's presentation was on Top 40 radio's birth in the '50s, Boss Radio and Bill Drake in the '60s, and he gave special credit to Ron Jacobs, who he cited as the format's real creative genius.

Through his entire talk there were examples of some of the best and worst of the format over the years, including some examples of how to get fired double-quick.

Top 40, according to Drew, can come back strong, but he also claimed that the Top 40 radio of the early years "is simply dead." He said, "It's about that 'pizzazz and frivolity' and 'localization,' which Top Forty is sorely lacking right now."

Music took the spotlight on Saturday afternoon for "Music Director 101," which brought together WPGC's Albie D., KMEL's Hosh Gureli, WTIC/FM's Dana Lundon, former KKFR MDDena Yasner, KPLZ's Randy Irwin and B96's Todd Cavanah. eastwest's Executive Vice President Craig Lambert, slated to moderate, was grounded by snow (what else?) in New York City and labelmate Kevin Carroll, along with MCA's Bruce Tenenbaum did a first

class job as replacements.

There was a total agreement that roles are changing and that affects the information music directors require to do their jobs. Information about other stations must require more than just chart moves

and all felt the local promotion people need to listen to the stations they're servicing in order to understand what they're all about.

KMEL's Hosh Gureli questioned the long-established system of "add dates," pointing out, "good records don't need an add date," to which Dana Lundonagreed, "listeners don't wait for an add date, why should we?"

But if one word were to describe this session, it was "reality." In a business where smoke

and mirrors are still part of the early development of a record, eventually what all the pros look for is real information that confirms their belief that listeners want to hear it on their station. Adding records to get promotions makes no sense, but Dana allowed that if "we go out on something early, there's nothing wrong with asking for artist or label support later on."

SPARKLING GRAY

Keynoter Spalding Gray entertained a Theatre On

The Square-full of people to his work in progress, "Gray's Anatomy," an often hilarious, often poignant recounting of the writer/performer's international search for a natural cure for macula pucker

which, translated, means he had loose tissue on his retina.

The people Gray met in his quest to find a natural cure for his dilemma became almost 3-D characters through his descriptions. Gray had close encounters with a Brazilian magician, a number of apparent shamens and Richard Nixon. Even Elvis Presley was conjured up.

Throughout the monologue

was a serious underlying reason why Gray sought alternative forms of medicine. Raised a Christian Scientist, he admitted he'd "try anything to stay out of the hospital."

Gray's Anatomy was a breathtaking walk through the brilliant mind of the man who created Swimming To Cambodia.

RAP FORUM REVIEW

In the past two years, the Rap portion of Gavin Seminar has grown into one of the most highly anticipated events within the Hip-hop community. The caliber of acts that have come through include Arrested Development, Das EFX, EPMD, House Of Pain, Kris Kross, Gang Starr, 3rd Bass and Sir Mix-ALot, and this year was far from being a let down. Acts such as Apache, Brand Nubian, Kool G. Rap and DJ

Polo, Onyx, Pharcyde, KAM, Black Moon, Ali Dee, Masta Ace and Run-D.M.C., to name just a few, were in the house

Why is Gavin such a big deal for Rap heads? The Gavin Seminar serves as one of the biggest networking platforms for the music industry and our panels have always been insightful and informative. With this successful track record, a full, one-day intensive forum for Rap, Gavin

New artists Shonen Knife were part of the audience

at the Alternative Artists session, moderated by

WDRE's Tom Calderone.

Rap Forum '93, was put

together with more sessions than was previously accommodated across the three days.

Attendees were greeted by Gavin's new CEO, David Dalton. Dalton's words included the assurance of the magazine's commitment to the format and confirmation of Kelly Wooas Rap Editor for the Gavin Report.

The first panel was the third annual Rap Jukebox Jury, moderated by Jeffrey Sledge of Jive

Records. Panelists such as King Tech of KMEL's Wake Up Show and Will Strickland of KTRU-Houston had to critique snippets of unreleased projects from established artists like Main Source, Jungle Bros. and BDP as well as unsigned acts. One of the acts that received high marks this year was Leaders Of The New School who did well two years ago at our first Jukebox Jury with their debut single "Case Of The P.T.A." L.O.N.S. took high honors this year with their cut "Classic Material."

The second panel was The Power Of The Pools,

hosted by Bobbito, formerly of RAL/Def Jam, who won two Gavin Awards this year. The audience listened as panelists, who included record pool director Bobby G of Soul Disco Record Pool and

Eddie Santiago of Mercury Records, discussed the relevance of record pools and the problems they face, such as the possible elimination of vinyl.

Attendees were treated to a luncheon and performance sponsored by MCA Records and Bust It Records. Bust It recording artists, D.B.G.'s, took command of the

audience's attention first by pleasantly surprising them with a hardcore sound that the label is not well known for. Next up was Gasoline Alley/MCA recording artists EYC featuring the BooYAA T.R.I.B.E. who all took center stage with their tight stage show. The last act to perform was Primate/MCA recording artists Capital Tax. Their dancers came out in ski masks and neon orange vests as TMD tore the room up.

The third panel dealt with the problem of The Overcrowded Rap Market. Moderator Eric Brooks of Priority Records asked his guests to explain how they have dealt with the saturation of talent and the dwindling avenues of promotions. Bruce Negrin of Wild Pitch Records and Richelle Davis of Class and Sass Video clashed on the impact of national video shows versus regional video shows, but Brooks,

with his cool and calm presence, kept things under control.

Next came Davey D of KMEL/BAM and regional representatives, including Al Eaton who had worked with Too Short, to discuss the country's varied tastes. The regional sound phenomenon baffles most of us but those lucky enough to be there have a better grasp of what divides our nation's musical preferences, and why.

Finally, Dan Charnas of Def American Recordings hosted an

open forum that began with discussion about MTV's cutting back Yo! MTV Raps, and the network's Traci Jordan fielded questions regarding the move. Sincere of PolyGram and Harry Fobbs of EMI were both in agreement that label reps must find different and more creative means of promoting their artists, regardless of whether video channels give them support. Switching over to the topic of female rappers and why haven't they been able to achieve the success male rappers have, most of the panelists agreed that most female rappers that have emerged lately, with the exception of a few, simply aren't up to par. King Tech of KMEL-San Francisco says that he will play a record if it's good, regardless of the rapper's gender.

URBAN/CROSSOVER COMMITMENT

Moderated by RCA Records' Michelle Santosuosso and PLG's Iris Dillon, panelists included: KMEL-San Francisco's Keith Naftaly; WPGC-Washington, D.C.'s Albie D.; HOT 97.7-San Jose's John Christian; WOWI-Norfolk's

Steve Crumbley; FM102-Sacramento's Dr. Dave Ferguson; KUBE-Seattle's Bob Case and KJMZ-Dallas' Tom Casey.

MARSALIS MAGIC

Looking like he's at the crossroads of young lion and elder statesman, Jazz keynoter Wynton Marsalis delivered the very first Jazz/AA keynote address.

His hour-plus talk systematically traced Jazz origins back to New Orleans master Buddy Bolden, and sprinkling his narrative with endearing home-spun reminiscences, Wynton discussed an evolutionary process that began with ritual and eventually became reenactment. He followed his talk with a robust Q&A session.

Never one to shun controversy, Wynton stood by his belief that history

will treat Rap as a fad and defended his right not to like it. "Why is knowledge and achievement being devalued and vulgarity being celebrated," he challenged.

As much as he's against rap, Marsalis is very much for the age group that loves it. He spends a considerable amount of time and energy speaking in schools across the nation, and his joy in being able to do so was evident. "We have to re-invest in our beliefs," he said of his crusade.

A/C: SONG-DRIVEN

Gavin A/C editor Ron Fell and Columbia Records

Vice President of A/C Jerry Lembo co-moderated two consecutive Saturday morning Adult Contemporary panels. The first, consisting of Warner Bros. VP Dino Barbis, KMXV-Kansas City P.D. Tom Land, WBMX-Boston Operations Director Greg Strassell, RCA V.P. of A/C Bonnie Goldner and EMIRG V.P. of A/C Laura Kuntz focused on the elements of change within Adult music radio.

Lembo focused on FCC rules that have recently eliminated radio's three-year "holding period" before profitable resale, the loosening of duopoly rules

allowing multiple stations to be owned in common in many markets and LMA's-Local Marketing Agreements-which permit limited affiliations between sepa-

> rately-owned stations in the same market. Strassell and Land related their own experiences in these areas and admitted to finding them to be—so far—positive.

On the record side, Barbis Out Ya Cranium. noted that a decade ago A/

C was regarded as a fragmented and weak offshoot of Top 40, but today it has grown to be a significant force in establishing artists and selling records. Both Goldner and Kuntz cited similar individual successes within their com-

Negrin and Island Record's Marthe Reynolds were The programmers agreed on the importance of music research but, as Strassell said, "It still comes down to a gut call." Mike Smith, PD from WNYR in Central New York state indicated he played

records for listener panels similar to the Gavin A/C Juke Box Jury impanelled each year at the Seminar. Vince Garcia of Y92 (KGBY) Sacramento, CA recalled that when he programmed KYOS in Merced, CA, he tested music for a theatre full of listeners each month for no out-of-pocket cost, as part of station-sponsored movie premieres.

A second panel was composed of Nancy Newcomer, Music Director of KMGQ-Santa Barbara, Alex

O'Neal, Music Director of KVIL-Dallas, Shannon West, M.D. of WIVY-Jacksonville, FL, Bob Brooks, M.D. of KLSY-Seattle and Lynn Murray of The Point (WPNT-Chicago). During the group discussion on adult artist and music development the panel and most of the audience felt that listeners are song-driven while programmers and record people tend to be artist-driven. This is seen as interfering with the breaking of new, unproven artists. Programmers encouraged labels to provide more sampler CDs and cassettes to permit reviewing of new music while driving or working. Michael Rogers of KFQD-Anchorage, Alaska re-

ported that he listens to new releases at home to encourage himself to evaluate music outside of the normal "radio context," as listeners do.

The final hour of the morning marathon was devoted to the annual Juke Box Jury, conducted by Gavin's Diane Rufer, where in sixteen un-released tracks were subject to first-impression evaluations from six fresh music decision makers at A/C radio. Jurists included Paul Mitchell of KRNO/FM-Reno, Michael Rogers of KFQD-Anchorage, David Lee of KAYL-Storm Lake, Christine Sellai of KHTT-Santa Rosa, Amy Maliga of KESZ-Phoenix and Angela Perrelli of K-101-San Francisco. Tracks that received

the most positive acclaim were IN WALKED LOVE by Expose, SLEEPING SATELLITE by Tasmin Archer, I'M OVER YOU by Kurt Howell and BY THE TIME THIS NIGHT IS OVER by Kenny G featuring Peabo Bryson.

CALHOON CHARISMA

PolyGram's Sincere added his opinion at Spill

Charismatic Motivational speaker Joe Calhoon coaxed enthusiastic response from those who attended his Jeff McClusky and Associates-sponsored session "The Seven Habits of Highly Success-

ful People."

Calhoon stressed the importance of habit #1, "Be Proactive," which he translated as each person's taking responsibility for his/her actions and making decisions based on correct values, not moods or conditions. Calhoon re-iterated that being proactive is a prerequisite to acquiring the six other habits.

Habit #2, Begin With The End In Mind, Calhoon translated as "get a vision for your life," and he encouraged each audience member to decide what he/she wanted to do, be and have. Through audience interaction, he demonstrated that being or having character forms the root system that allows a personal tree to do (grow branches) and have (bear fruit).

Put First Things First, or habit #3, Calhoon equated to each person's living his/her re-vamped vision. With time running out, Calhoon could only briefly synthesize habits 4 through 8, which are: #4, Think Win-Win, or work with a communal victory in mind, not a personal win at the expense of someone else's loss; #5, the self-explanatory, Seek First To Understand, Then Be Understood. #6, or Synergize is an exhortation to maximize benefits reaped from adopting habit #5. #7, Sharpen The Saw, recommends pinpointing and then seeking out what makes for fulfillment in what Calhoon defined as the Mental, Physical, Social/Emotional and Spiritual areas of life.

By the session's end, Calhoon had involved a

The fun started with the annual Thursday night Country Kick-Off Cocktail Bash, where the format's finest filled the St. Francis room with exuberance and were joined by artists John Michael Montgomery, Larry Stewart, The Brothers Phelp, David Frizzell and The Marcy Brothers. Friday night's Country Banquet, co-sponsored by Arista, Asylum, Atlantic, BNA Entertainment, Cabin Fever, Columbia, Curb, Epic, Liberty,

MCA, Mercury, RCA, and Step One offered attendees the opportunity to chat, mingle and enjoy a candlelight dinner.

The meat and potatoes came the next day, as attendees focused "On The Competition" at Saturday morning's Country Session. Co-moderated by



Competition" at Gavin's Kent Zimmerman introduced the Higher Saturday morning's Octave contingent at Saturday morning's Jazz/
Country Session.

Gavin's Country Ćrew and Entertainment Marketing Group's Don Langford, the session featured diverse speakers who covered different aspects of the Country music industry. Back by overwhelming popular demand, Dr. Ören Harari once again held the audience's complete attention. Harari decided not to touch on the management concerns that he usually covers when speaking to organizations; instead he spoke about "Your Next Job Up The Ladder Of Management." His advice to continually strive to shake things up and try new methods struck a chord with the crowd and his words were especially timely as the Country community strives to keep the format's momentum

building. Harari related a tip a nun gave him recently when he consulted a Jesuit hospital: "Remember, it's always easier to ask for forgiveness than permission."

KSAN/KNEW-San Francisco Promotion Director Marlene Augustine followed Harari with a talk on something that both of her stations excel at—maximum community involvement on a limited budget. A Train Management's



Wynton Marsalis wowed the crowd with his homespun stories, a history of Jazz and his unabashed bashing of rap's "vulgarity."

Melanie Jordin then imparted some of her publicity secrets, specifically focusing on the national press generated by last year's Country In The City festival held in San Francisco at Golden Gate Park. For the second year in a row, RCA's Carson Schreiber enthralled the Country attendees with a fabulous audio presentation, this year on "The History Of Jingles In Country Radio." Schreiber played examples that showed how they have involved, starting with one used by WHDH-Boston in 1954. Cassette copies of the presentation were made available to the audience, courtesy of BP Programming's Jay Albright, and a plea was made to programmers to become guardians of this part of Country music's history by preserving the master tapes.

Fair West Direct's Reg Johns was next with a presentation on a new Radio Advertising Bureau

report called "The New Retailing: What We Don't Know Is Killing Us. He stressed the use of "mass media to create awareness, promotions to induce sampling and database marketing to build usage and loyalty." Lawyer/talent agent Bob Eatman gave some insight on how to negotiate a contract, from both the

employee and employer standpoint. C.C. McCartney led a lively discussion on Music Research, and Doug and Ricky Lee Phelps, better known as the Brothers Phelp, closed the session with some amusing stories about life on the road as members of The Kentucky Headhunters and how they're hitting the road again as a new duo.

The session was followed by a buffet lunch, and then the audience —which included Martina McBride and Wylie from Wylie And

The Wild West Show—were treated to this year's New Artist Luncheon featuring John Berry, Rick Vincent, Corbin Hanner, Tim Ryan and the

Brothers Phelp.

WOMEN AND POWER

The first of two sessions addressing women's issues took place on Friday and the Women in Black Music & Media panel gave some of the industry's experienced professionals a chance to share their wisdom and philosophies. Confidence, parenting and networking were discussed by host Suzanne Baptiste and her guests Toni McFlow-Cranberry. Transition of the project of the state of the st

and her guests Toni McElroy-Granberry, Tracy Jordan, Vanessa Levy, Karen Mason and Dominique DiPrima.

The intimate crowd was not shy to jump in during the lively discussion, which became heated when the issue of juggling home with work came up. Said DiPrima, "The whole biological clock, lonely executive image is part of the propaganda to make women fear power." Mason agreed: "If men can have it all,

the return of the AA Jukebox Jury.



The big question remains: What were the likes of WXRT's Norm Winer, KBCO's Dennis Constantine and KZON's Jim Trapp as well as a host of music, retail and marketing minds doing in a crowded double meeting room full of pioneers? Only the Gavin Shadow knows.

RATINGS RELATIONSHIPS

Gavin research analyst Rhody Bosley took programmers on a step-by-step tour of how Arbitron comes up with the numbers that make or break a station.

Using colorful graphics and easy-to-understand language, Bosley gave his audience the ins-and-outs of how Arbitron comes up with their information, and how to use it. Sprinkled throughout his conversation were tips on how to put what comes out of the diary to practical use, "make sure to get your listeners to tune in tomorrow," and how to help a sales department work with the numbers.

ALTERNATIVE'S GROWING PAINS

Alternative events started on Thursday with a closed door session for College radio attendees only. What was expected to be a gripe session turned out to be an informative discussion that concentrated, for the

most part, on the relationship between faculty, other campus groups and/or the study body and the radio station.

Ex-KCMU Music Director Kathy Fenessey gave a first-hand account of the "horror" story that is currently happening at the station. It seems that the

station's faculty advisor hired professional deejays to host drive-time positions, putting a number of volunteers out of "work." In addition, the advisor has taken on syndicated shows (like The World Cafe) which has not only cut down the amount of free-form radio time the station can engage in, it's also cut the staff of the station tremendously.

In these tough economic times many stations are

looking for "surefire" ways to make money, so it's very likely something like this will happen to another station in the future. Fennessey suggested looking over each station's constitution to make sure the integrity of the station is protected.

Hosted by the irreverent Tom Calderone, the Alternative artist panel

was full of laughs as he asked guests, John S. Hall (King Missile), Tommy Stinson (Bash And Pop), Gerald (Best Kissers In The World), Jay Aston (Gene Loves Jezebel), Michie Nakatami (Shonen Knife), Andy Sturmer (Jellyfish) and Mike D (The Beastie Boys/Grand Royal Records) about making it the '90s and the particulars touring, while the "veterans" on

the panel spoke of how the business has changed over the years. When welcomed to the session, Mike D clued the audience in on why he really came, "I'm just here pimping my shit," he cracked, and put in a plug for his new label, Grand Royal. Not to be outdone, Calderone made a funny remark when he asked Gene Loves

Jezebel's Jay Ashton what it was like to be "battling it out on the charts with Duran Duran again."

Friday began off with what's been dubbed the "Owners Panel." WFNX's Max Tolkoff hosted this session which featured owners, general managers and program directors from some well-respected Commercial Alternative outlets—91X (John Lynch and Kevin Stapleford), WDRE (Ron Morey and Tom Calderone), WFNX (Stephen Mindich and Tolkoff) and Live 105 (Pat McNally and Richard Sands).

The panelists pointed to factors such as innovative

radio management, unique selling approaches and tapping into listener's lifestyles as as areas for Alternativestations to key into. After coming up with the criteria for an Alternativestation, it's up to the program director to implement a creative formula that would effectively draw listeners to the station

by exposing them to new and exciting music.

Panelists first tackled the lack of racial diversity in college radio's staffs and on its airwaves, which Monty Luke pointed out "mirrors a lack of diversity at colleges in general." The panel then focused on sexism, sharing experiences and thoughts on how to get more women in individual stations, and grappling with how women

on both ends of the phone can deal

with sexist remarks and encounters.

A low-key, working atmosphere allowed for optimal exchange of information and a minimal amount of whining and name-calling, enabling most observers and participants to leave with some ideas to implement at home.

At the same time on Saturday, commercial radio and national alternative promotion people met in separate rooms, with PLG's Steve Leeds hosting

the record side and KUKQ's Jonathan L the radio. After both sides made their adgendas, they met back in one room to address these areas of concern.

The crux of the session was focused on how record companies could better serve their stations and

how relationships between the two could be better facilitated. Ideas on time buys and keying into retail outlets were exchanged, but a most heated discussion unfolded as the subject of co-promotes was brought up.

Both sides acknowledged that with all the new Alternative and Alternative-leaning Album or Top 40 stations cropping up, it's going to be a serious battle for record company dollars—and that's dollars in the literal "time buy" sense, as well as for dollars in the "absorbing the cost for a radio station to present a free show" sense. Needless to say, in some instances it's going to take a lot more than simply being the first on a record in order for your station to get the co-promote. It's also going to be a lot harder to get your station's call letters on shows coming through your area. Many record reps, Capitol's Brian McDonald in particular, expressed the thought that, in places where two (or more) stations are battling it out for the co-promote on shows, neutral shows might be the only answer.

Although Brian's idea was acknowledged, many of those in the room echoed WXRT program director Norm Winer's sentiment when he said, "A neutral show is a victory for the other station."

The success of this format has brought some pretty sharp growing pains. It was well acknowledged that this was only the beginning and that things could get worse before they get better.



INSIDE TOP 40 By Dave Sholin

It comes as no surprise that the industry was abuzz with news of **KBEQ's** switch to "Young Country." Compounding that story was the departure of **EAGLE 106's** PD **Brian Phillips** and **John Lander**, who hosted the highly-rated "Nut Hut" morning show. But it's important to note that the changes in Philly were precipitated by internal maneuvering within the corporate structure and not a reflection of format viability.

Indeed, with Phillips at the helm, WEGX-Philadelphia had one of the brightest programmers in the country. Nevertheless, the situation gives many of us reason to pause and consider what the future holds. While programmers spend hours working on the perfect music mix and trying to concoct the next major promotion, is it possible some have lost sight of who the competition is? Getting people to listen to your station is one thing, but it's another thing just getting them to simply spend more time listening to radio.

Stacy Cantrell, Tracy Johnson and Steve Wyrostok addressed that issue at the recent Gavin Seminar. Tracy warned about the danger of programming to friends in the business because in the process, you miss the mark when trying to relate to the audience. But he also said management must allow for an environment that stimulates and promotes creativity. As Stacy put it, "Being allowed to go outside the lines" is something that doesn't always happen. "That," she said, "leaves us with the question—do you have to stay inside those boundaries? No. But do you want a job? The probable answer is yes."

Wyro suggested that communication between programming and management can go a long way toward clearing the air. He pointed out the danger of "letting feelings stew inside instead of asking about specific goals, because one must be armed with this information to do the job properly."

What everyone is faced with, however, is what Stacy Cantrell mentioned again and

again—"the ultimate decisions on format direction is out of the hands of people who feel most passionate about radio in general and the format in particular." She added, "It wasn't long ago that GMs and PDs walked hand-in-hand with similar goals and agendas." But as has often been said, the future is in the hands of the young, and that is something that strikes at the core of the problem.

"It's ironic," points out Cantrell, "that while MTV is now more current-based, so many

Top Fortys are taking on a Hot A/C approach." By definition, Top 40 has to serve the young active audience because she says, "It's a lifestyle format, period. So much time is spent focusing on baby boomers instead of baby busters and teens that we'll totally drive young listeners away."

That brings us full circle to the issue of all the other options available to the public. They don't have to listen to radio to hear the music they want. Technology has given everyone lots of other choices. To make radio, and specifically Top 40 radio, compelling and something worth spending as much time as possible listening to, is a challenge programmers can meet head on. But to succeed, they need the support of the folks who hired them to do the job.







May would only want Queen to continue as long as there are remaining Mercury vocals. He has no intention of Queen carrying on with any other lead singer.



DEPARTURE - BOB MINTZER BIG BAND (DMP)

Bob Mintzer is wearing two hats these days as he races up the charts in a pair of separate projects—one being the latest Yellowjackets' (of which he is a member) release and this, his DMP Big Band project entitled Departure. The latest Bob Mintzer Big Band is a surfeit of graceful crescendoes and Ellington and Basiestyled pows, roars and tempo shifts. But the key here is flexibility. A track like "Big Show" will display all the boxed in discipline of Big Band, but beyond that there's a cozy quartet feel that keeps popping in and out. He savors the orchestral, tone-poem elements of charted arrangements, but the solos are a little more "out" and abstract to be a full-fledged BB tribute. In other words, Departure has room to move and a few more air pockets than most large band sessions. Check out the lovely Michael Franks vocal on "Foolish Heart." "Freedomland" is a Russell Ferrante Yellowjackets piece that sounds every bit as intimate as the way YJ burn as a quartet. "Joshua" is a smooth Miles make-over, but wait 'til you hear Joe Henderson's upcoming version. "Dialogue" is Mintzer doing some serious blowing to the undertow of dueling waves of rich percussion.

THE SOTO KOTO BAND (HIGHER OCTAVE)

Here's a suave international offering bound to excite Adult Alternative. The Soto Koto Band play a Gambian African blend of music called Gumbay (pronounced goom bay). The more energetic tunes are abound with hopping horn passages and swimming in generous undercurrents of synthesized and natural percussion rhythms. African bands, starting with King Sunny Ade, have always had a knack for mixing advanced technology with traditional beats and melodies that don't come off as too askew or anachronistic. The Soto Koto Band is another shining example. While tracks like "Tang Bang Kuto," "Banjulo," "African Sunrise" and "Rainbeat" are drum and conga vehicles, there's enough biting layers of keyboards and horns to supply ample melodic substance. On the more relaxed tracks like "Kilimanjaro," TSKB carries the main themes via Moorish Spanish guitar parts. Soto Koto is so seamless it almost borders on African progressive pop.

DANCE OF PASSION - JOHNNY GRIFFIN QUARTET + 3 (ANTILLES/POLYGRAM)

Since Johnny Griffin made his big comeback from Southern France with last year's release, The Cat, he managed to offset his basic quartet sound with vibes and trombone. On Dance Of Passion, Griffin maintains his stark soloing



and naked balladry. He's still writing practically all the tunes, this time going seven out of eight. In addition, Griffin has augmented his quartet with three brass pieces, a tuba, a French horn and Steve Turre on trombone. Pianist Michael Weiss' tuck-and-roll brass arrangements on "The Way It Is," teamed with Griffin's super tasty solo jabs, make for the disc's high point, if not for its downright funkiness. The scuttlebutt continues on the playful, romping cover of Cole Porter's "All Through The Night," the only non-original. If it's notes and flash you want, look no further. The title cut is cloaked in moody Middle Eastern exotica. Turre adds some wah-wah mute charm, offsetting Griffin's grimaced film noire delivery.

KEEPIN' THE FAITH - STEVE LAURY (DENON)

One of two monster guitar releases this week! It's indeed a talented musician who is still able to combine the very best strains of both Jazz and AA and make them work together effortlessly. God knows we need more of that. By combining intuitive technology with silky (yet fierce) octave licks, Steve Laury has made an absolutely remarkable record that could conceivably please two audiences that inhabit the polar extremes of the adult music world. Those of us who like electric power will revel in trax like "Steppin' In" and "Keepin' The Faith." Those on the more traditional side will have to admit that Steve Laury has taken his art to a high, rarified plane. As guitarists like Metheny and Benson already understand, there's a way to emulate the genius of a guitarist like, for instance, Wes Montgomery, without merely aping his licks. Like Metheny, Steve Laury grasps, searches and soars by playing a cascade of beautiful notes that are seemingly spirit-driven. There's plenty of inner light at work here, the kind of guitar love usually emitted by Carlos Santana and the late Emily Remler. With Keepin' The Faith, Steve Laury joins the ranks of the guitar elite. If we gave out stars, I'd score this one six on a scale of five.

SOLEIL - RALF ILLENBERGER (NARADA EOUINOX)

Whichever artist plans on releasing the Guitar Album Of 1993 has to get by this one first. Soleil is a stone cold monster. With his brilliant, chiming open tunings, Ralf Illenberg gets the very best out of both a chordal and single-note feel. The opening "First Beam" is a spacey set-up for "Dancing Kachinas" (nicknamed "Dancing Cahonas" by WNUA's Mike Fischer) which begins the disc on an awesomely high standard that never seems to let up. Melodically, texturally and methodically, Illenberg's on fire throughout. Whether he's toying with a cool groove with wonderful chord work on the title track or just playing skyward, here's proof of how powerful instrumental acoustic/electric music can be. For even more "solar" power, check out Susan Osborn's vocal on "You And I." For Weather Reportish fury, try "Dark Glow." Other musicians who shine are pianist Joerg Reiter and multi-instrumentalist Budi Siebert, both of whom worked with Andreas Vollenweider who's no slouch when it comes to selecting musicians. For the record, Illenberger has played 1000 gigs all over 40 countries. While he's been off the recording trail the last few years, he's obviously been sharpening his skills, as this is truly one of 1993's masterworks. As for the concept of Soleil (French for "sun"), Illenberger looks at man as "the first creature that must teach itself to turn away from the power of sunlight...to maintain a world where the sun is our ally." That's no new age mumbo jumbo jive, because the energy on this record alone could heat up a hemisphere.

TRUEST HEART - NELSON RANGELL (GRP)

Here's an eleven-song set that's done some traveling. Recorded in Colorado, New York and Hollywood, Truest Heart is an aural travelogue in which each geographical subset of songs has their own distinct feel. Whether it's the Rocky Mountain high of "Western Vogue" and the ballad "Ajla (I-La)" or the New York street feel of "Livin' The Life," Nelson Rangell's Junior Walkerish soul tones manage to adapt to each strain of saxual communication. When you listen loud (as I do, and believe me, this one will heat up your amps with massive output), you begin to understand that this is no mere exercise in mellow mantronics. Rather, Nelson is an aggressive performer, wailing away with dexterity and gale force. My favorite track (right now, anyway) is "I Can't Make You Love Me," which in its way brings as much to the table for me as Bonnie Raitt's vocal version on Luck Of The Draw. While movers like "World Traveler" and "Truest Heart" scorch, "I Can't Make You Love Me" is a powerful and poetic interpretation.





SISTER SWEETLY -BIG HEAD TODD AND THE MONSTERS (GIANT/REPRISE)

Here's my favorite kind of new release—something special that's hard to pigeon-hole and the more you listen, the better it gets. I hope nobody's in a hot hurry to artificially chart-tour-break this band, because sometimes good things come in due time. It would be a shame to see this fine album take on a twelve-week shelf-life mentality. Like Big Head Todd and the Monsters' sound, this is music that takes its time as it simmers slowly into your psyche. Examples: Songs like "It's Alright" or "Tomorrow Never Comes"—slow strolls that rock you with a lazy reggae style while melodic Clapton-like guitar bursts streak across the mixes. Like a lot of the radio that originates in the Rocky Mountain region, Colorado's Big Head Todd shuffles to their own drummer, never risking groove for tempo, lulling the listener into a mediative state of rock appreciation. Let's face it, life is too damn fast sometimes. Slow down. Here's the perfect soundtrack. While my favorites change from day to day, here's the latest line-up-"It's Alright," "Broken Hearted Savior," "Groove Thing," "Tomorrow Never Comes," "Bittersweet" and "Circle."

TRIAGE - DAVID BAERWALD (A&M)

Triage is a French word derived from the word "sift" and it pertains to a system of assigning medical treatment priorities in emergency situations. It's also David Baerwald's Fear and Loathing of the unelected powers-that-be that actually run the United States of America. And you thought Bill Clinton was running the show? Don't get the guy started. Anyway, in such a wicked state of paranoia the risk involved here was that Triage could have become ten songs of acrid bitterness, designed to make the helpless feel more helpless. While, yes, Baerwald is a working class Roger Waters (since both deal with the insanity of dis-information), Triage is a collection of extremes. The rock songs are wacked, amelodic sound collages. However, once you penetrate the harder exteriors, things get softer towards the center. Songs like "China Lake," "A Bitter Tree," "The Postman" and even "A Brand New Morning" show tenderness amid seething anger and disappointment.



"PRIDE AND JOY" COVERDALE • PAGE (GEFFEN)

Word on the street is that Jimmy Page teamed with David Coverdale to get Robert Plant's goat after an ill-fated reunion attempt. The only thing that could have gotten Plant more riled was for Pagey to enlist the entire Kingdom Come band. If "Pride And Joy's" aim and purpose is to provoke a response, it's indeed a controversial one as Page shreds Coverdale's vocal chords until. damn, he does sound like Plant. This is either one of rock n roll's most expensive pranks or Page's most unmitigated return to the houses of the holy. Predictably, while Plant is moaning, Page is probably snickering.

SUNRISE ON THE SUFFERBUS - MASTERS OF REALITY (CHRYSALIS/ERG)

One of this year's most unlikely and intriguing collaborations. During the eighties, Masters Of Reality kicked around as a renegade upstate New York hard rock band. Ginger Baker re-entered the rock arena after a PiL session and several bouts of African music, polo and olive farming. What you get here is a seemingly pure, ego-less musical experience. Yes, it's tempting to compare MOR with another power trio in Baker's not-so-recent past. Occasionally you do hear wispy traces of Jack Bruce's vocalics. More often, though, you hear a sense of melody uncharacteristic to both the band and Baker's pasts. Thanks to Baker's flammy sense of swing, Masters Of Reality (named after the famous Sabs song) stays agile and spry. Also thanks to the odd mellotron and obscure short poems, SOTS escapes metal pigeonhole hell by remaining unpredictable. Don't second guess this one until you've heard it all the way through. Trax like "She Got Me," the acoustic "Jody Sings" or "The Moon In The Water" show the diversity. "T.U.S.A." is Baker's mad return to the "Pressed Rat And Wharthog" spoken work rostrum.

"THING OF BEAUTY" -HOTHOUSE FLOWERS (LONDON/PLG)

"A thing of beauty is a hard thing to ignore." Dublin's **Hothouse Flowers** dub another all-out band effort. After a long layout (interrupted by a spontaneous appearance with **Michelle Shocked**), Hothouse sounds inspired and fired-up as heard here and at their recent Gavin Seminar gig (mysteriously bootlegged on a DCC tape).

DURAN DURAN (CAPITOL)

In extraordinary True Confession

style, Duran Duran own up to contributing to the video information glut on "Too Much Information." In condemning MTV, ABC, Ultra-Brite toothpaste and, hence, themselves, Duran Duran have recorded a thoroughly brilliant tribute to the hollow eve of the twenty-first century. Recorded and conceived in a techno class by itself (love those interstellar beats!), here's a set of songs that careens around radio formats as if they were pylons on a test track. Machine-driven, the songs are aerodynamically constructed and laced with humor and occasional anger. Written and recorded around the world, Duran Duran (their first self-titled effort) is the end result of a life of jet-setting and hard knocks. Real stuff, real good! Trax: "Too Much Information" and lots more including a fatal cover of the Velvet Underground's "Femme Fatale."



TUESDAYS ARE FOREVER - D.D. WOOD (HOLLYWOOD)

D.D. Wood is neither a disco singer nor a Madonna clone. Far from it! Rather, she's a helluva songwriter who performs her music American style with reality-based strains of Patsy Cline, 10,000 Maniacs (well, remotely) and other "citybilly" influences. A former wild child, D.D. Wood took to music and English lit to chronicle and purge her woebegone runaway past. Since then, she's taken to the written word, combining acoustic and electric strumming with honest, downto-earth roots rocking. I stone love "Tuesdays Are Forever." Ten songs strong and just as many tales. Ever see Terrance Malick's Badlands, starring Martin Sheen and Sissy Spacek? Same general white trash feel.





GUMBALL -"ACCELERATOR" (COLUMBIA)

Ex-Dinosaur Jr./B.A.L.L. member Don Fleming is back and he's brought the new "road-trip anthem of the '90s" with him. Gumball's "Accelerator," with its "no sleep 'til fill-in-the-blank with-the-next-city-on-theband's-tour-itinerary" vibe, makes for a humorous three-anda-half minutes of garagey pop. The production, which is kept bottom-heavy and revving, lends a kind of "road kill" element to the music, neatly side-stepping possible Redd Kross comparisons in the process. Made in America. THE AUTEURS - NEW WAVE (HUT/CAROLINE)

The Auteurs is a London-based trio whose career blossomed after touring with red-hot Suede. They kept the momentum at a

fever-pitch with their first single, "Show Girl," which is how many of you first found out about them. Their bright, sixties-rooted pop (a la The Kinks) has a sarcastic wit that's masked by a wide-eyed charm-characteristics found in many things English. Frontman Luke Haines devotes a rather large amount of time on lyrics having to do with stardom ("Show Girl," "Bailed Out," "American Guitars," "Don't Trust The Stars," etc.) and all the related trappings. There's plenty to choose from, but I'd still start with the dreamy "Show Girl." LR

THE FAMILY CAT -STEAMROLLER EP (DEDICATED/RCA)

The Family Cat have been paying their dues in England for about five years now and finally, a handful of releases later, they've secured, uh, a domestic deal. Although not part of any trendy scene (which explains the band's relatively low profile), The Family Cat steadily built their following show by incredible show, single-of-the-week by single-ofthe-week. The Steamroller EP features the guitar-driven epic (seven-plus minutes!) "Steamroller," along with some revamped tracks previously available on import. 700 MILES - "WATERSHED" (RCA)

Here's a nice bit of rawk n' roll for you, in the Led Zep/Pearl Jam vein. 700 Miles is a New Yorkbased three-piece that named themselves after the long-distance drive (do I have to spell it out?) they undertook to get to their recording session in Detroit. The threesome-Justin Guip, John Carlin and Tom Clapp—have a New York-garage-meets-Seattlegrunge sort of sound and kick out the kind of no-holds-barred rock and roll that legends are made of. Honest. Check out the stellar epic, "Watershed" and the Hendrix Bside, "Are You Experienced?". That will have to tide you over until the album comes out toward the end of March. LR

SWELL - ROOM TO THINK (PSYCHO-SPECIFIC/ DEF AMERICAN)

San Francisco's Swell have parlayed their European notoriety into a major-label debut. ...Well, the full length you received, is a re-release that previously appeared on the Psycho-Specific/ Spirit labels. The EP, Room To Think, however, is mostly new material with the exception of the first track, "At Long Last." The source of Swell's moody warmth is difficult to pinpoint. The band sounds as if they're playing from the comfort of a womb, but aside from an infrequent outright burst of distortion (as on "Life's Great"),

their drugged aura stems from a subtler source that I don't really have a line on yet. All tracks here (and on ...Well for that matter) are worthwhile, although I prefer the aforementioned "Life's Great" and "Give." It'll be nice to see this excellent, underrated outfit find a following in this country. SEANA BARUTH

SPRINGHOUSE POSTCARDS FROM THE ARCTIC (CAROLINE)

Mitch Friedland is a guitarist's guitarist, lauding praise from the likes of Bob Mould for "doing new stuff with the guitar." This Big Apple band's follow up effort showcases Friedland's ear-battering axe in its various incarnations. The single "All About Me" forges along like a sled complete with bells jingling and a lethal dose of guitar that will deaden high ends. My preference is for the faster tracks like "Enslave Me," which smacks of immediacy. A climbing bass and snug drums provide the backdrop for plaintive vocals that "long to be enslaved." The instrumental "Blue Snow" shimmers with surreal strumming and the epic "Worthless" features worthwhile singing. "Shattering Cold's" songwriter displays a keen ear for pure sound in poetic lines like "spasm gladness, chasm sadness," and one leaves with the feeling that these are postcards worth keeping. Don't be afraid to mosh wildly if you see these guys live—Friedland also works as an NYC paramedic and he'd be glad to lend a hand to injuries incurred. **DAVID BERAN**

ZIRCUS - "MY ASTORIA" (Borscht Tunes, 2235 Market St., San Francisco, CA 94114)

When you write about music, you see it again and again in band bios-every new band is "indescribable" and "unique," much more than the sum of their influences. Usually, that's a crock. Usually, every band sounds like the Velvet Underground or Syd Barrett or the Beatles or Gram Parsons or Sabbath. Or, in the case of San Francisco's Zircus, like the Beach Boys, Public Enemy and XTC. However, what makes Zircus "indescribable," "unique" and "much more than the sum of their influences" is the way they assemble their songs from those influences using a stand-up bass, three-piece horn section, a snare, violin and one lone guitar. For instance, this single's A-side, "My Astoria," a fiddle-introed popstomper, lapses intermittantly into a breathy ballad, swells to Beach Boys-copped five-part harmony, intensifies into a rap attack and then, neatly, is back to pop and stomp. That they combine so many disparate elements is less surprizing than the ease with which they do so-"My Astoria's" transitions aren't forced or particularly self-conscious. The B-side features a less hyper offering, "Harm's Way" and "I'm Not Going Camping," a pseudo-ragtime ditty written on and lifted directly from a band member's answering machine. This single, Zircus' first vinyl, was produced by Scott Matthews who's worked with the likes of John Hiatt and Trip Shakespeare (and a host of others), and it sounds damn good-for a band with horns. POND - (Sub Pop, 1932 First Ave., Suite #1103, Seattle, WA 98101)

I saw the tag line before I ever heard 'em: Sub Pop's first haircut band. And I thought, "it's a nifty little blurb, real memorable, but we all know Soundgarden's Matt Cameron has, off and on, sported a switchy little do. They must mean haircut-sounding band. They must mean 'Love Plus One." Pond. I assumed, were Sub Pop's farthest foray into purile pop territory. I was, as usual, wrong. Pond perversely purloin pieces of (mostly) post-Seattle alternative rock to propagate a hybrid. Portland's Pond know how to hitch a groove like Smashing Pumpkins, assault with a ceaseless barrage of flying guitar slabs a la Superchunk and harmonize in that flat, drawn-out fashion made famous (?) by the Meat Puppets. In fact, the only thing particularly "haircut" about this three-piece is an infrequent, infintesimal tendency toward pretension—they can get carried away by one guitar wave or groove, and sometimes those harmonies cross the fine line between kinda cool and kinda prog. Of the ten songs here (eight of which have titles as concise as the band's name), my favorites are "Tree' and "Gone." Pond, Sub Pop's first haircut band, are heavy on classic layers—for lots of added fullness and texture. SB

ALTON ELLIS - CRY TOUGH (Heartbeat Records, One Camp St., Cambridge, MA 02140)

Alton Ellis is a crooner in the true sense of the word (move over, Bing Crosby!). Although I usually approach re-issues and remakes with cynicism, I try to put that feeling aside when it comes to reggae because so much has been either ignored or lost that aside from the production quality, all of the material is seems so new it almost smells like clothes drying on the line. This twenty-

song sampler is a good introduction to many Jamaicans' favorite singer, recorded during his "rock steady" period. To tell the truth, I wasn't crazy about the re-makes of Neil Sedaka's "Breaking Up" (Is Hard To Do), Blood, Sweat & Tears' "You Make Me So Very Happy," and Jr. Walker's "What Does It Take," but I admit to swooning (just a little) over tracks like "Why Birds Follow Spring," "Ain't That Loving You" and "Why Did You Leave Me To Cry" (featuring Phyllis Dillon). If you've got room for a totally apolitical Jamaican smoothie, try Cry Tough. BEVERLY MIRE



THE HANSON BROTHERS - GROSS MISCONDUCT (Alternative Tentacles, P.O. Box 424756, San Francisco, CA 94142)

Setting: a mid-seventies movie about a minor-league hockey team, the Charleston Chiefs, notorious for three foiled-knuckled rabid brothers named the Hansons. The brotherly bass 'n drum team from NOMEANSNO make up one-half of this musical approximation, only NMN drummer (now Johnny Hanson) takes the position of vocal sculptor. Added to Robbie Hanson (Bass, Scythe Wielding Psycho) are Tommy Hanson (Guitar, Repugnant Odor) and Kenny Hanson (Drums, poi ingestor), and they take up where the movie left off. At the rink: 4:34 HANSON, T (HOOKING); 4:35 HANSON, J (INSTIGATOR, FIGHTING); 4:36 HANSON, R (HIGHSTICKING); 4:37 HANSON, K (SLASHING). Not even five minutes into the game and the Hansons have

chalked up enough penalty minutes to give their Northeastern opponents a power play. As Johnny, Joev and D.D. look on from the stands, the Hansons put on a pathetic display of random violence. There's no Eddie Shore "old time hockey" played here. Instead we're beaten by stick-carrying NOMEANSNO on skates. With all late '70s three-chord punks huddled behind the net. Coach Mercer's Hanson Brothers skate with bone crushing intent to send their fans home covered in the blood of the Ramones and the Dickies.



STUART MOXHAM & THE ORIGINAL ARTISTS -SIGNAL PATH (Feel Good All Over, P.O. Box 148428 Chicago, IL 60614)

Artists who dabble in different styles are rightfully respected, but it's rare when someone so fully explores various sounds. Country twangs, synthesized beats and reggae rhythms are all given equal time on Signal Path. "Her Shoes (Are Right)" is an easy listen that grooves with perfectly cadent acoustic guitar licks and the smooth tonic of Moxham's vocals. It was tempting to put this one on repeat and marvel at it. but I pressed on. The choppy beat of "Broken Heart Blues" recalls VU's bite and the noise guitar break is an unabashed homage to the Underground. "Mutual Gaze" rolls on a reggae wave, injecting organ and soulful singing into a tale of love gone sour, and the strung out shuffle of "Yea x 3" is punctuated by a loopy bass and a cartoony guitar. Though they may initially seem unspectacular, these fourteen tracks grow on you in a subtle, unseen way. DAVID **BERAN**



P.D. NOTEBOOK

ountry Music's smashing success in the last couple of years has perplexed some programmers in other formats. The format has switched from a "mostly recurrent" to a "current-intensive" approach. They not only play new records, but the right new records.

For years, the conventional wisdom has been that the adult listener prefers familiar music. Indeed, for some years, some formats, such as A/C, have tended to be mostly "recurrent," based on this premise. Are Country listeners different from other adults, or is there something to be learned from this development?

It seems obvious to me that adults do like new things and always have. If not, why would the word "new" be such a potent marketing tool in the supermarket, in the automobile showroom, and everywhere else? Adults have more "depth of experience" than kids and teenagers—a point often overlooked. Something a year old is ancient to a child and out-of-date to a teenager; but to an adult, a hit record five years old may seem essentially "current." And when a person of any age gets familiar with a song they like, they can "sing along" with it literally or mentally, and that tends to be enjoyable. Thus "familiar" records should be part of any format; but in a Top 40 format, familiar records may go back no more than last year! (The more recent they are, the more familiar they are to more people; and it's interesting to note that many Country stations today are not going back much more than five years, not only to keep the station relevant to the "today" sound of the format, but to be "familiar" to their new listeners as well as their old ones.)

I think that the lesson to be drawn from all this is that new music keeps a station fresh and inter-

esting for people of all ages, in all formats, provided the *right* new music is played; and that new music effectively *enhances* the power of the familiar music that's part of the mix by keeping the station enjoyable without getting boring.

There's an important warning that goes with this, though. If you play new music, you had better announce it for the listener—and identify new songs as being new! Unidentified new songs are by definition unfamiliar songs, and when they are played without comment, the listener is left to wonder why this unidentifiable record was broadcast. And I'd go further and urge that new records be identified not only by title and artist but as "new!" Don't be afraid of what has proven to be a potent marketing word in every other field! Spotlighting a record as "new" not only explains to the listener why you're playing it, but makes the station appear to be fresh and more appealing!

Of course, this comment is coming to you from a columnist who has always urged you to announce all records, and I still think you should—but if you don't, at *least* announce all the new ones!

To explain why I believe *all* records should be identified, here are three points that I've never

had a programmer attempt to refute. (If you reject them, write or fax me c/o *The Gavin Report*—I'd love to do a column presenting another point of view on this subject.

- 1. Listener research usually shows the desire to have songs identified at the top of "unfulfilled listener desires."
- 2. Not announcing the titles and artists suggests to the listener that the music doesn't matter to the station, and that it's just using the music as wallpaper between the commercials.
- 3. To the best of my knowledge, there has never been even a hint of a single listener *ever* tuning out of a station in disgust over hearing the songs being identified, even if the listener does know all the titles and artists (which is less often than you may think).

Programmers I discuss these points with usually say "Yes, that's all true, and I probably should do it, but nobody does it, and I'm kind of afraid of it." The only concrete objection I've ever heard about identifying the records applies to backannouncing them-that it would somehow destroy the "forward motion" of the station. This is nuts. Listeners are more apt to want to know what the songs were once they've heard them then before they've heard them—although new records should arguably be identified as such first, so the listener hears them in some understandable context. "Forward motion" should be defined in listener terms, not broadcaster terms, and listeners hear the station in an ongoing, stream-ofconsciousness manner. When the songs are ended, the next forward-motion thing they are most likely to want to know is what they have been listening to!!!

focus on the "good times" rather than feel sorry for what might have been.


