

FCC, New York Times Michael and Sony Weigh In on Stern Run Head For D-Day

Hey, this Howard-Stern-for-Governor stuff is getting serious

The FCC has weighed in with a warning about equaltime requirements.

An even bigger sign of the credibility of Stern's candidacy for the New York governorship, which he announced on his morning show March

25, is a front page story in the New York Times Sunday, April 3, which treated his campaign as a serious matter, with a headline reading: "Howard Stern as Governor? Some Fail to See the Humor.

The Times summarized Stern's three campaign promises (Gavin, March 22), including a fourth—that he would give up his office the moment the three pledges had been fulfilled; a discussion of the Libertarian Party's interest in him, and sober

opinions from politicos about Stern's chances. Time magazine, the paper said, had already speculated that current Governor Mario Cuomo might bene-

> fit from the Stern run, which could split the pro-death penalty vote with the Republicans. Other speculation involved Stern as a factor if Republicans and Conservatives end their internal squabbling and put up a strong candidate against Mr. Cuomo." "Most experts," the paper said, "believe (Stern) would peel support from the right."

> "He's much more serious than at least nine of the ten Republican candidates," Hank Morris, a Democratic consultant was quoted. "It is

a real wild card, and with politics being unhinged...who knows what can happen."

The Times also addressed the equal-time dilem-

> Under FCC rules, broadcast facilities providing time for one candidate is required to pro-

vide an equal amount of time for all opponents. Since Stern's show, in the New York state area alone, airs on four stations and runs between four and five hours five days a week, Infinity Broadcasting and New York carriers would have to give sitting Gov. Mario Cuomo and others a prohibitive amount of equal time.

"I don't know what's going to happen," said Tom Chiusano, general manager at WXRK/FM-New York, Stern's home base. He said he did not expect to receive an exemption of the rule from the FCC, which has piled on some \$1.67 million in fines against Stern, Infinity, and various affiliated stations, charging them with violating FCC indecency laws.

The Times noted that because Stern is not running in a primary, it was possible that the equal-time rule might not take effect until early October, when he would, following a successful convention of the Libertarian Party, qualify for the ballot.

Said the paper: "By that point, some of his supporters suggest, Mr. Stern may be so hot that his bosses might let him take a month's sabbatical to campaign."

And why not? What's a month when you've got a chance to have a governor for your morning jock?

It's gotten down to the lawyers.

George Michael's restraint of trade suit against Sony Music in London ground to a halt last week as the British High Court took a break for Easter and to give Michael's counsel, Mark Cran, time to amend his case. According to Gavin's U.K. sources, the feeling in the courtroom is that the case may be swinging toward Sony, as Michael lost out on several complicated procedural points.

Michael is seeking to be released from his contract with Sony, which runs until 2003. Just before the court went into recess, the judge asked why Michael didn't challenge the 1984 contract he signed as a part of Wham! instead of the deal he signed with Sony in 1988. "How can the effect of the 1988 agreement have been to take (Michael) off the market ifand it's a big if-he was already taken off by the 1984 agreement?" he said. Sony counsel Gordon Pollock also wants the issue cleared up. "The case could collapse at this point," he said. "We would like to go to the Court of Appeal before the case goes any further."

A decision is not expected until May.

Mancow Has No Beef With New Sister Station

(KSOL)-San Francisco morning personality who was pilloried throughout the Bay Area less than a year ago, is having the last laugh.

His station's parent company, Crescent Communications, has acquired Star FM (KSRI)-San Jose, and the stations began simulcasting on Thursday (March 31), putting Wild 107 on the air from as far north as Sonoma and as far south as Carmel

"The popularity of Wild 107 has definitely spilled over into the South Bay," Mancow says. "Unfortunately, lots of our fans down there had trouble getting our signal. All that will change...

Last May, Mancow's sidekicks blocked rush hour traffic on the Bay Bridge for over two hours while one got a haircut. The stunt created a media uproar, and Mancow wound up paying

Mancow, the Wild 107 a fine and doing 100 hours of community service. Since then, Wild 107's ratings have tied with top Top 40

> As part of the new deal, Crescent City also acquired KSRY-San Francisco, which had simulcast as Star FM, with a bright A/C sound. Credible sources say veteran programmer Larry Berger (WPLJ-New York/K-101-San Francisco) has been hired and the station will switch to Urban A/C. Berger declined to comment. Wild 107 general manager Scott Fey told GAVIN: "The acquisitions were strategic. Wild 107's across-the-board appeal and high ratings made the simulcast decision a natural. We've got exciting changes in store for KSRY/FM as well."

> And what about those rush hour stunts? "I don't think we're going to be anywhere near a bridge for the rest our lives," Fey says.

Harding Fools Around at KKRZ

It was April Fool's Day, but that was Tonya Harding, the disgraced figure skater, on the air on KKRZ/FM-Portland, sharing the mic with the station's "Morning Zoo" crew.

Harding, who plea-bargained her way out of criminal charges in connection with the January attack on rival skater Nancy Kerrigan, showed up at KKRZ in her hometown and proceeded to try a string a crank calls, challenge David Letterman, Dan Rather, and Andy Rooney to wrestle her. She scored zero.

Instead, she answered calls from listeners, but revealed next to nothing about her role in the Kerrigan attack. "When my movie comes out, or my book or my documentary, then people will know the whole story," she said.

By no means was she about to spill her guts on KKRZ, which had earlier offered her \$10,000 for a whole month of on-air appearances. She rejected that proposition, but agreed to show up for April Fool's Day. PD Ken Benson declined to say what the station paid Harding, who expressed an interest in finding a job in broadcasting.

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Reno A³ Folds as News Takes Over

It sounded good, and it was selling advertising. But these days in radio, that's often not enough, especially in the face of new ownership.

And so it is that KTHX/FM-Reno, an A³ success story whose saga included being saved once before by listeners and the local press (GAVIN, February 18), is going the way of manual slot machines.

Station owners, Olympic Broadcasting of Sacramento, sold "The X" to Sunbelt Broadcasting of Las Vegas, which expects to take over May 1 and switch to an all-news format, combining resources with Sunbelt's TV property in Reno, KRNV.

The decision leaves KTHX staffers and listeners hoping to find another position on the dial for "The X's" eclectic format. "It's our annual crisis," said program director Bruce Van Dyke.

The station adopted the format in late 1990. When owners shut it down nine months later, claiming low ratings, the local commu-

nity rallied and changed management's minds. In recent books, KTHX was doing well in its target demo (25-54 adults), ranking fifth in a 23-station market. Revenues were "fairly steady," Van Dyke told GAVIN, admitting that the owners lost money last year. "But we were combo with a big news/talk station. If we were a standalone FM, we could get expenses down."

"A station is needed to take its format in this area," said Tim Schaefer, owner of Soundwave CD's, which advertises on KTHX. "There's a demand for it. It can make money."

Van Dyke says he's solicited and received numerous letters of support, which he will use as he searches for a new station. "There are a couple of frequencies fraught with problems. We can make a great argument for having The X on there. I'm guardedly optimistic. With so much support, something will break."

'Red Hot + Country' Adds Cash + Gill + Mavs + More

Red Hot + Country, the allstar compilation album being produced to benefit AIDS organizations, has gotten even hotter.

Organized by Kathy Mattea, the project has added Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, Vince Gill, Nanci Griffith, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Sammy Kershaw, Patty Loveless, Ricky Skaggs, Randy Scruggs, Earl Scruggs, Carl Perkins, Duane Eddy, Doc Watson, and the Mavericks to the lineup.

They join Mattea, Mary-Chapin Carpenter, Dolly Parton, Marty Stuart, Brooks and Dunn, Billy Ray Cyrus, Mark Chesnutt, Radney Foster, and Tammy Wynette and Jerry Sullivan in the album.

"We have fringe people and mainstream people," says Mattea, "older artists and baby artists." All will pay tribute to an individual who has influenced their music, and in some cases, the honorees will be on the recording.

"In doing that," Mattea told GAVIN, "we have this very wide-ranging record



that really makes quite a statement about where modern country music has come from."

Mercury Nashville is producing the album for the Red Hot Organization, which raises AIDS funds and awareness through popular culture, with such releases as Red Hot + Blue and Red Hot + Dance accounting for some \$5 million to fight AIDS and fund research and relief.

"I had lost some friends and was looking to get

more involved, trying to figure out what I could do," says Mattea. The complexities of the project may cause a delay in the scheduled release date of July.

Among issues producers had to work out was a decision not to go with catalog songs, which had fueled the other Red Hot albums.

"At one point," Mattea says, "Yoko Ono came up and said, 'You can use John Lennon's catalog.' We were like, 'Well, that's really wonderful, but that's not going to work for country music."

Mattea herself will perform a Jackson Browne song, "Rock Me on the Water." "There's this whole side of what I grew up playing and singing that I've never really had a chance to explore," she explains. "Part of that is the singer-song-writer tradition of the '70s. I just went through some songs and felt like 'Rock Me On the Water' went with the subject matter."

Eagles-Mania At Box Offices

The Eagles, the brilliant but volatile country-rock band that broke up in the late '70s, after a long run of hit albums and singles, appear to be flying higher than ever.

In a year dominated by news about instant sellouts for Barbra Streisand shows, the reunited Eagles have soared past Streisand at several box offices.

In the Bay Area, Bill Graham Presents reports, in the same amount of time—less than 30 minutes—it took to sell 23,000 Streisand tickets (at the San Jose Arena), the promoter sold some 40,000 Eagles tickets priced at \$35 and \$75. Streisand's feat, however, was extraordinary in its own right, as fans formed lines two days before box offices opened for the chance to buy tickets priced at \$50, \$125 and \$350.

Since the initial Eagles sellout, three more shows were added—and are very nearly sold out. Meantime, Streisand tickets are being scalped for \$1,500 and more for each of her 18 scheduled concerts next month. In Detroit, brokers are circumventing laws against ticket-scalping by, for example, selling a pen to a buyer for the agreed-upon price of the ticket, and then throwing in the ticket. One concert promoter called the scalpers "nothing but parasites."

Madonna P—d Off At That F—in' Dave

Well, Dave, it looks like you and Madonna won't be sharing the same, ah, studio for awhile.

Last week, in what has been characterized as a desperate attempt to make headlines, Madonna played a 30-minute long Stupid Human Trick.

If you haven't heard, Madonna took Dave's cigar, gave him a pair of panties, talked about basketball players' anatomy, urination, nose-picking, and let loose a string of profanities that melted down censors' scissors and had some audience members in obvious shock.

Whether she was being herself and was, as some

have suggested, angry at Letterman for his jokes about her alleged sexual promiscuity, or she was being her usual, mediamanipulative self, Madonna was trashed by the press.

"Madonna sounded forced talking dirty, like a low-IQ Howard Stern, with none of the obscene grace of Lenny Bruce," said *San Francisco Examiner* columnist Rob Morse. "She's fast becoming irrelevant and craved attention," said television columnist John Carman. "But she overestimated her own wit and probably underestimated public taste."

Although a few radio stations have said they were

dropping Madonna from their playlists, it's too early to say whether the appearance will harm her career. It certainly didn't hurt Letterman, who countered her obscenities with zingers, and whose ratings that night were the 10th best his program has received on CBS.

So what are the chances of Madonna, whose head-line-grabbing stint came on the eve of her newest single, "I'll Remember" (the theme from *With Honors*), returning to the *Late Show*?

"I'd be willing to talk about that," said the show's co-executive producer Robert Morton.

Why 'Poorman' Is Putting Radio on TV

It was an unusual wake-up call for former ERG promotion executive Jeff Laufer. Instead of an alarm clock, it was an unsigned band ripping him out of his sleep.

And who would orchestrate such a stunt? Surely a morning personality from a rock station.

Wrong. The waker-upper was Jim (Poorman) Trenton, longtime KROQ air personality whose last radio gig was dispensing advice on the station's popular *Loveline* show.

"I knew I could do it to Jeff because he's a zany guy," Trenton told GAVIN about the prank. "He loved it because he got on camera. But," he continued thoughtfully, "I wouldn't try it with David Geffen..."

Pranks are what Trenton excelled in—and a stunt is the official reason the popular former disc jockey isn't on KROQ anymore. After he gathered up a group of listeners who ended up outside one of the station's personalities' houses in the wee hours of the morning, Trenton was suspended indefinitely.

Trenton looks at his suspension pragmatically. "I'd reached my peak with radio," he says. I had a hot, hot radio show—it was

So with Fox TV's blessing, Trenton has brought to television what he does best radio. Or, more specifically, simulcasting his pranks on

number one. I accomplished what I wanted to."

At the time of his suspension, Trenton was already a reporter for KTTV/TV-Los Angeles' *Good Day L.A.*, and when he left radio, he decided to bring that medium to television.

"It (the idea) came to me when Power (KPWR) did their annual turkey drop," he says. "Good Day covered it and I was a reporter. I began to think about how so many amazing things are done on radio that nobody ever sees."

local radio. So far, he's orchestrated spoofs with morning personalities on four different stations, KRLA, KPWR, KKBT and KNAC. "It's fun putting radio people on TV," says Trenton, "because they're so quick. They're used to being live, so it works well." "Having been a radio guy, he understands how the imagination works," says Kim Paul Friedman, Good Day L.A.'s executive producer. "What Poorman adds is that he's everyman...people can relate to him. I think he really is a breath of fresh air on the program, away from the cosmetic stuffiness we're used to seeing. Most newspeople wouldn't do what he does for fear of ruining their manicures or their hair."

And you could definitely ruin your manicure gorging on hotcakes-an event Trenton staged with KRLA's Mucho Morales. "We had a hotcake eating contest—eat as many hotcakes as you can in 111 seconds," Trenton says. "We picked the contestants. I picked out the fattest guy and Mucho picked out the thinnest woman. She won." He laughs. "We'll be accepting our Emmy for that one."

Trenton steered away from questions about KROQ, which he joined in 1981 when Rick Carroll, the late programmer who is credited with bringing modern rock to the mainstream, put him on the air. He stumbled into radio after graduating law school and had a brief career as the author of *The Poor Man's*

Guide To Gourmet Dining. Neither career appealed to Trenton, and when it was suggested law would be a good profession to fall back on, he said, "I never want to go into law!"

For the record, Trenton's suing KROQ and its parent company, Infinity Broadcasting, alleging breach of contract, copyright infringement and slander. He has said he wants to establish ownership of *Loveline*, which went on the air in 1983.

But while that drama plays out, Trenton will continue finding people who wave at cars wearing boxing gloves and shark divers, and putting them on radio. "This reminds me of the early days," he said. "We do tons of behind the scenes stuff. I'm doing this for the love of it. My heart's in it."

Oh, yeah—what ever happened to the band that woke Jeff Laufer?

"They're still unsigned," laughs Trenton. "Will you mention their name?"

Sure. Mercury Stoneswitch.

Elvis Biographer Albert Goldman Dies; Few Mourn His Passing

In Rock and Roll Heaven, or wherever rockers go in the afterlife, here's a sure bet: Don't invite newcomer Albert Goldman and *any* of the musicians to the same party.

Goldman, who wrote scathing biographies of Elvis Presley and John Lennon, infuriating thousands of fans, died of a heart attack March 28, while he was enroute from Miami to London. He was 66.

The writer received his first acclaim in 1974 with his biography of the comedian Lenny Bruce, which earned him the enmity of the Bruce family. But it was his postmortem dissections of Presley and Lennon than drew the wrath of critics.

In Elvis, published in 1981, Goldman depicted the king of rock and roll as a perverted, drug-addled performer of questionable talent. The book inspired the late comedian, Andy Kaufman, to savage it in the middle of a Saturday Night Live sketch. Goldman's The Lives of John Lennon, published in 1988, portrayed the most articulate and political of the Beatles as a drug-addicted, anorexic, bisexual, near-psychotic man who may-just mayhave committed a murder in his youth, and "whom success had puffed up into a fat clown." That book drew a major counter-attack from Rolling Stone magazine, which ran a report called

"Character Assassination: Inside Goldman's Sleazy Attack on John Lennon."

As Phil Rosenthal of the Los Angeles Daily News noted, after Goldman's death: "(His) modus operandi relied heavily on unnamed or biased sources and sometimes suggested more than it could support."

Goldman was a native of Dormont, Penn., who wrote for *Life* magazine in the early '70s before venturing into books. At the time of his death, he was working on a biography of yet another deceased rock star, Jim Morrison. Or, as Rosenthal put it: "He was picking over Jim Morrison's bones for yet another

Inside Top 40

Has **Mike Joseph** been talking to the folks at *Business Week* magazine? A little over a month after "Mr. Hot Hits" did everything but get on his knees to plead with Top 40 programmers at the Gavin Seminar not to turn their backs on teen listeners, comes a seven-page cover story in *Business Week's* April 11 edition titled, "They're Back! Teens."

The article supports Joseph's contention that there are millions of dollars in ad revenue being directed toward other media—a lot of dollars that used to be and still should be budgeted for Top 40 radio. But, as Mike keeps reminding us, "What many Top 40 stations told teens was, 'Go away, we don't want you.' And that's exactly what they did."

But so much for the past. This report sheds light on the future and the numbers are. to put it mildly, astonishing. According to U.S. Census Bureau stats, "Teen population should hit nearly 25 million this year" and "will grow at close to twice the rate of the overall population" during

the next decade.

What we're talking about here is a demographic bubble that doesn't simply echo the baby boom explosion our parents heard in the '60s and '70s, but packs more of a punch in actual numbers.

How about this? Each year between now and 2010 will see more and more kids turn into teenagers, something I'll be witnessing firsthand, as my oldest will be 13 in 1996. It only makes sense. The decline in the teen population was simply due to baby boomers waiting longer to start their families. Look for 2006 to be the peak year, the year that Census Bureau demographer Jennifer Cheeseman Day tells Business Week readers the "teen wave will crest at 30.8 million." By comparison, that's 900,000 more than at the peak year of 1976.

So much for numbers. What about spending power? Disposable income? Well, here's the part you may want to underline for your GM or owner. Teens, says **Peter Zollo** who BW

calls a "teen-marketing guru," will spend \$89 billion in 1994. But more importantly they will, as **KKRO** GM **Don Nordine** pointed out last week, influence somewhere in the neighborhood of \$200 billion in purchases.

Something else to make note of while reading the *Business Week* story are the products now being marketed to teens. Sure the soft drinks, fast foods and jeans are there but so are credit cards, contact lenses and phone services like

MCI's 1-800-COLLECT, which is targeting teens in a big way.

All this should be good news for Top 40 radio. But sadly, nowhere among the the seven full pages of text in the *Business Week* story is

there one mention of radio. Television ves. print ves, but radio is invisible. Not that many years ago, it would have been impossible to do a feature such as this and leave radio out. Again in the words of Mike Joseph: "Teens and Top 40 once went hand in hand and we let them get away." Even some stations who are

rated Number One in teens downplay that ranking, choosing instead to spotlight their adult numbers.

Are attitudes changing as advertisers learn more about the teen consumer of the '90s and beyond? No one really knows yet. But when a magazine like *Business Week*, hardly one that can be considered as radical or alternative, devotes this kind of space to a segment of the buying public, it will most likely get the attention of those who run our biggest corporations. If they're interested, maybe some decision-makers in radio might start to believe in the value of programming to teens once again.

Quoting the final two sentences of the article offers food for thought. "Right now, we're looking out from the vantage point of Year Three of this 19-year demographic wave. Considering the impact of the last teen boom, we're in for another hell of a ride."

It was full of people kicking it, and some of the people I saw and chatted with included Hal Jackson and Percy Sutton of Inner city broadcasting. I saw and spoke with **Doug Daniels** of Arista; Sharon Heyward, Shiela Coates, and Don Eason of Perspective Records: Buddy Dee of Atlantic Records and had a brief conversation with Leon Huff of Gamble-Huff fame. Since I lived and worked in the Washington area during my tenure with B.E.T. it was great to see many of the faces who makes that market a great place to work-people like George Wilson, who now works for the U.S. Senate and David "Oggie" Ogburn who photographs all the big events in the area. Zeke Zanders formerly of RCA was also in attendance. At the NABOB dinner, entertainment was provided by Patti Austin and The Sounds Of Blackness. Stevie Wonder, who owns (KJLH-Los Angeles) was given the Lifetime Achievement award. Don Cornelius was given the Pioneer in Broadcasting award and NABOB's Mickey Leland Public Service Award for Outstanding leadership in Government award went to former WEBB-Baltimore broadcaster and now Chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus representative, Kwesi Mfume, who in his speech said that if a former actor can become president perhaps some day a radio broadcaster will be in the whitehouse. The hit writing/producing team of Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis were honored as Pioneers in Music. Whitney Houston was also given an Lifetime achievement award but did not appear because of illness. 

"Killin' Ya Softly" flows along at mid-tempo. Mo' Bounce has drenched the track in a thick bassline augmented by mild keyboard strains and treated voice samples. 



WHY RADIO LOVES
RHINO RECORDS, AND
WHY RHINO'S NOT SO
SURE ABOUT RADIO

here is a cartoonish quality to Rhino Records. To begin with, there is the name of the company, which co-founder and president Richard Foos explains by saying: "I always liked the image of a rhino charging through things." Visit one of their record stores—which is how Rhino got started, in the early '70s—or the company's cool new offices in Westwood—and you're likely to see a rhino charging through a wall.

There's the company mascot, Rocky the Rhino. There's Rhino's penchant for offbeat, risky, and sometimes downright goofy choices in the area for which it's famous—reissues: *Golden Throats*, featuring Jack Webb reciting "Try a Little Tenderness" and Leonard Nimoy dispatching "Proud Mary;" *Best of Louie Louie*, with everyone from the Sandpipers to Ike and Tina Turner doing the Richard Berry classic; and *Have a Nice Day: Super Hits of the '70s*, a 15-volume collection of some of the cheesest music ever foisted on human ears.

"This," says Rhino's national press and editorial manager, John Hagelston, sitting in a lobby decorated in '50s mod pastels, with overhead TV monitors playing a video tape loop of a Monkees documentary, "is not a normal place to work."

But perhaps the most unreal thing about Rhino is its founding and lasting principle. It goes something like this: Rhino is populated with passionate, knowledgeable devourers of music. Holly George-Warren, editor of Rolling Stone Press, has called on Rhino for help with

various reference books, and marvels not only at the music, but at the people behind it. "I've never met anyone at any label with more enthusiasm about music in general," she says. "They're all walking encyclopedias of music, and they put their heart and soul into everything they do."

When Rhino does a reissue, it's never simply a matter of licensing an artist's greatest hits, slapping them together and shipping them out. They make some acquisitions and do some packages for amusement—Bummed Out Christmas and the beer-spilling Frat Rock series come to mind—or to satisfy a personal musical mission. But all choices are informed. Too many artists—say, the Coasters, Lou Christie, Dusty Springfield, or Graham Parker—cut far more interesting tracks than became hits. If Rhino finds them deserving, they'll be issued, in grand

style, for other music lovers to find.

Here's how Gary Stewart, head of the seven-person A&R staff, puts it: "I'm very excited by the records we put out by people like the Turtles, the Four Seasons and the Neville Brothers, but to me, what really makes it click are the records that maybe didn't make money but really did justice to an artist-if we

think it's something of extreme artistic merit, then it deserves to come out." Stewart's personal fave project at Rhino is the nine-volume DIY anthology of the worldwide punk music scene of the '70s. "It wouldn't have come out that way on any other label," he says, "or contained a lot of artists that didn't dent the charts and maybe didn't even prick the highest levels of Alternative music

consciousnessness back then."

When this reporter expressed gratitude that Rhino had resurrected some of Dusty Springfield's finest work, Stewart smiled. "As long as I can get away with it, I don't care if Dusty Springfield sells one copy or 100,000. A Brand New Me is an amazing piece of music, and it should come out."

Jim Neill, Rhino Records' National Director of Promotion, uses radio as a way

to define what Rhino does. "Radio," he says, "offers a jukebox service. You won't hear anything that's not familiar to you. And in a sense, that's what Rhino is in the business of doing—providing people with repackaged memories, in a way, but repackaged lovingly and with more insight than maybe was originally put into it."

Neill used the word "business," and, whatever its mission statement, that's what Rhino is. Last year, its that's what Rhino is. Last year, its business surpassed \$55 million, and, to accomodate its growing staff of more than 100, it moved from a crowded Santa Monica office/warehouse into new, 33,000 square-foot offices, with a separate warehouse in Pennsylvania.

For all its success, Rhino appears to look at its bottom line in a way no

major could. "Large volumes for us is a completley different figure than other companies," says Neill. A top seller for Rhino rounds out at about 300,000 units; half that amount is cause for celebration. "We sometimes do projects that we know at best will break even," says Neill, "because we're in love with them and we have to feel good about what we do during the day."

So. A label that chooses product the way the old free-form FM stations used to program shows; a label that markets nostalgia—albeit with a twist or three. Where does that leave it in relationship with contemporary radio?

Given radio's own fixation on Oldies—from '50s R&B chestnuts to Classic Rock of the '60s and '70s to the more recently fragmented takes on music of the '70s—Hello, Arrow—Rhino is working with radio, if not exactly charging through its walls.

"Our relationship with radio," says Jim Neill, "is complicated, in that people do tend to perceive us as a reissue label."

Oh, yes. Through the years, Rhino has made attempts at recording new albums, with both established and new artists. (Its one and only Number One hit, Billy Vera's 1987 smash, "At This Moment," had been sitting around five years when it got its moment of glory.) Now, Rhino has a label called Forward, issuing albums by NRBQ (Message for the Mess Age), Richie Havens (Cuts to the Chase), Willy De Ville (Back Streets of Desire), Buster Poindexter, and others—"artists," Neill says, "who still have something to say but may not be in a situation to be a good risk for a major label." Rhino also has a children's division (Kid Rhino), a funfilled video catalog, and is about to launch a film catalog.

While radio may not know much about Forward and the video and film divisions, programmers and DJs are well aware of Rhino's rich archives, and make requests, Neill says with some chagrin, "for 200 albums at a time."

"We can also be perceived as a radio service," he continues. "Like the Arrow station that went on the air in Dallas; we pretty much provided them with their

entire format on CD; they went on the air with our stuff. We did some tradeout for some advertising, and we have a banner in record stores with our logo next to Arrow's."

Other stations switching to '70s-intensive formats may not have enough time to bargain. In San Francisco, KABL/FM became "Big 98.1," zeroing in on music of the '70s, and its program director raided the local Tower for a stack of Rhino records to get the station on the air. (See GAVIN'S YELLOW PAGES OF RADIO for the Big 98.1 story.)

Neill sees both good and bad in the Arrow format. "For hard core music fans it's just about the lowest common denominator," he says. "It's like what Top 40 was in the early '70s."

So what's the good news? "It'll really help the core of Rhino's catalog stay alive on the radio," says Neill. "But the trouble there is, the songs are ingrained in

people's minds; it might not occur to them that Rhino has them out. So it's our job to make sure that if there is an ongoing nostalgia trip for this stuff and that when people go into the stores, the Rhino stuff is well positioned enough that we're associated it automatically."

Before Arrow, Classic Rock stations often hooked up with Rhino.

"We do a lot of promotions with Classic Rock stations," says Neill. "We have a Burton Cummings best-of album coming out, and with KLSX here in LA we're going to do a living room concert. We'll give Burton Cummings away to a listener. he'll go their house and perform."

For the recent Let There Be Drums series, compiled by Max Weinberg (ex- of Bruce Springsteen's E Street Band; current musical director with Conan O'Brien) and featuring drum-driven rock classics, Weinberg did numerous morning-show interviews on Album and Classic Rock stations.

Rhino appears to be less actively involved with Oldies stations that range between the birth of rock and roll and the mid-'60s. Some of those stations, Neill says pointedly, "do a disservice to their listeners. They're just as tight as Top 40. We're always encouraging stations and giving them product to go deeper, if only on weekend specialty shows. But a lot of those programmers might as well be doing anything other than music."

Neill, who adds that smaller stations tend to have programmers with more open ears, says he fears that "oldies radio may be a stagnant format for locating potential customers." Business is fine, he says, but it may have less to do with radio than with Rhino's efforts at building a label identity. "We have a core fan base that keeps us in business," he says. But he wants more. "I dream of turning a lot of people onto the label. If you had no place to go but Rhino, you wouldn't be that bad off. There're a lot of holes, but it's so thorough in many ways that it's like the hip Library of Congress."

Where radio is more vital to Rhino is in its releases of new product on the Forward label.

"We pursue artists," says Gary Stewart, "who don't really belong on a major label. They're not going for platinum, but they want to sell more than a handful of records. They have a base. There's a middle ground, there's a way to reach it, and to be profitable. And that's what we've decided to focus on for the time being."





As a small wing, issuing no more than one or two projects at a time, Forward can offer full attention to a new release. Rhino's radio staff numbers four, says Neill (the same number as its team of attorneys who work out licensing for reissues). "We try to figure out what the stronger radio project are. NRBQ is our Number One priority at radio, and it's doing well in A³. We're also setting up our new Buster Poindexter album (Buster's Happy Hour), a traditional jump blues record. It goes along with a VH1 talk-variety show he has coming up. We're taking it to A3 and some album stations that are a little more open minded.

"Our job," says Neill, "is to find the places for these things to go. We have to search and destroy on our own. We niche-market. Our radio database is broken

down into so many categories that we can pull up a list like 'Soul shows on AOR stations.""

For all its interest in specialty shows. Rhino considers A3 to be their "start format." It's the reality of a small label. "To cross things over into the arena where the majors play and are competing for airplay becomes a bloody battle," Neill acknowledges.

"A3 is great news for singersongwriters, but also for labels that have grown frustrated with trying to get their music heard on radio," Neill continues. "It still has flexibility; it's open to trying out new artists. It's not set in its ways enough to have done a whole lot of research."

Holly George-Warren But, Neill added, "I predict it'll be corrupted within the next five years." He pointed to a new chart at a major trade publication, a tight variant on A3, and called it "the beginning of the end" for the loosest format since free-form.

"Radio is real estate," says Neill. "Most radio is not music right now. But we find the one percent that is musical, and beyond that we talk to select stores—and not just record stores—and nightclubs and make sure they have our music in their jukeboxes. With only four people it's difficult to get a whole lot done, but we're fighting the fight."

Rhino must also contend with major record companies who've stepped up their own reissue activity. While one company-Atlantic, which distributes Rhinohas entrusted the smaller company with handling all its archival releases, the others make up new competition. "It was sort of like your best friend asking you to take care of their kids," says the label's co-founder and managing director, Harold Bronson. "They knew we wouldn't let them down."

"I'm very much a fan of some of the work of the catalog divisions at other labels," says Stewart. Not that the A&R head's competitive side can be totally contained. While he withheld comment about one major new would-be competitor—"We live with the good graces of the monoliths," he rationalizes—he sees a common trait among the majors: "They're a bit crazy. They think everything is worth coming out. They think it's a gold mine, but it's more like a coal mine. You can get something out of it, but you have to work your butt off. It's not a sure thing. Just because you own something doesn't mean it doesn't cost money to produce and market it."

While, with such projects as Forward and their video and film divisions, Rhino won't get stuck in the past, it sees no end to the nostalgia market that first fueled

"I don't think the pipeline will ever dry up," says Neill. "Time is still passing." He quotes the late Frank Zappa saying the period of time between an event and the time you become nostalgic for it becoming shorter and shorter. "He says eventually you'll be nostalgic for a step you've just taken, and time will cease.


"I don't think that moment's coming any time real soon."

And even if it did, it would be unlikely to stop the hard-charging Rhino. "I'm amazed," says Neill, "at the fact that we do continue to come up with projects. Even if all the catalogs available come out, there are theme compilations that haven't come yet, and events that have yet to be evaluated—or yet to occur."

When they do, Rocky and the gang are likely to be the first to look back on them.

Heart's "The Woman In Me" ties for third MOST ADDED with 29 new and it debuts smartly at #27. Among "When it comes to matters of the heart, there is nothing a fool won't get used to."







Inside Connections

This week's GAVIN Connections chart is composed from the playlists of 234 A/C stations, 247 Top 40 stations and 54 Urban stations.



Babyface's (above) new single, "And Our Feelings," is likely to join Tevin Campbell's "I'm Ready" and Toni Braxton's "You Mean The World To Me" as a triple-format chart item. What makes it so special is that two, (Babyface and Braxton) are products of the LaFace music machine out of Atlanta.

The three formats' MOST ADDED stats are rather



understated this week as only the new Sheryl Crow, (above) "Leaving Las Vegas," has anything resembling a blow-out week with 77 ADDs in Top 40. Phil Collins' 52 first-week ADDs

at Top 40 and Toni Braxton's 64 ADDs from all three formats combined lead the also-rans.

It might be worth noting that as much as A/C and Top 40 may have in common these days, including most of their top ten singles. One glaring

discrepancy is Counting Crows' (below) "Mr. Jones" which is currently capping the Top 40 chart with 210 players and has a 95% HIT FACTOR, but it's tapping only 17 A/C stations out of a possible 234.

Congratulations to Rosco Martinez on his GO chart top ten for "Neon Moonlight." Other GO chart standouts include Heart's "Woman In Me" at #26, a full 11 ranks ahead of its #37 on the main and the aforementioned Sheryl Crow single which is already debuting at #34 on the GO.

UNEMPLOYMENT CAN BE BEARABLE

ecently I received a thoughtful letter from a programmer who was recently let go in a corporate downsizing effort, and who would like to remain anonymous. Here's what they had to say:

"Welcome to the '90s...guess who got budget cut... My position was eliminated and the corporate procedure for handling all terminated employees, whether they were let go for budgetary reasons or for committing major infractions, was the same: Turn in your keys and never darken our door again. Which brings up an issue: Are the traditional methods for handling terminated employees in radio viable anymore? With duopolies leading to budget cuts and "continuous measurement," where your numbers can rollercoaster so inconsistently that you couldn't latch on to any programming related reasons for highs and lows if you tried, but your station suffers big swings in income, people are being let go for reasons that have nothing to do with performance.


"Two points: One, nobody who wants to say in the business can afford to do anything unprofessional, because it is increasingly likely that you will end up working with the same people—or people who know them—in the future.

"And two: Other businesses have begun to facilitate outplacement resources for good people they have to let go. Why not radio? If someone has been with a company for a decent amount of time, their supervisor can probably predict who is going to react vindictively to a layoff And who isn't. These things are rarely abrupt; why not give them some advance notice so they can get organized.

It will also lessen the blow. And even after the axe falls, they could have access to the facility to duplicate tapes and read the trades; if there's a part time air shift open, why not let them have it so they can keep their air work polished and have a current aircheck.

"Some would argue that it is bad for morale to keep someone around when they have taken such a big step down... But which is worse: To show employees that your organization will try to support someone who did good work but had to be cut-or to show them that no matter how hard they work or how good they are, they will end up being treated the same way as someone who was totally incompetent. If a laid-off person does a 'behavioral reverse" and starts behaving in a way that undermines morale, it can be nipped in the bud by asking them to leave the building then; but in most cases I think those let go for business reasons recognize that things are different now—and people are beginning to adapt. It's no fun, but it's life."

Thanks to the writer for some provocative and valuable thoughts. I've handled layoffs, as the person required to make the cuts, and have done so in the matter suggested in the letter. And indeed it does preserve staff morale in a way the "here's the check, there's the door": approach cannot. As I write this, I know of a station about to automate which has given notice to all but three air personalities. All the others were given notice, but are still on the air, and are being treated like human beings. Nothing negative has happened on the air, and even those on their way out understand the reasons. It certainly is the way to do

LONDON, NEW YORK & LOS ANGELES: NEW DIRECTIONS IN JAZZ/A²

GROOVE COLLECTIVE (REPRISE)

While radio argues the merit of various Jazz/street permutations, the freedom train is alright up and left, chugging through international whistle stops. First stop is Giant Step, a niteclub/state of mind in Manhattan that's home to Jazz, rappers and rhythmists of like and unlike minds who joyfully mix Jazz genres of the '40s, '70s and '90s. As demonstrated at their appearance this year's Gavin Seminar (where industry hardcores actually danced!!). Groove Collective make a living at being all-inclusive rather than demographically exclusive. It's unfair to call this rap music. Rather, it's an ensemble of ten musicians from various jazz backgrounds who fuse rhythm, air and electricity in an indescribable way. To me, especially in light of all the interest in the wonderful 70's Blue Note reissues, there isn't a reason in the world this music shouldn't be seasoning jazz radio. Start with a track like "Rentstrike," "Nerd," "Balimka" or "El Golpe Avisa" and see where it takes you.

INCOGNITO POSITIVIST (VERVE FORECAST)

In England, Jazz radio mixes jazz with elements of soul, blues, dance, even reggae and world beat. The same thing happens in America, except different elements surface in different cities-Chicago, New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Dallas and elsewhere, all mixing different ingredients with different philosophies. Still, we can hear Incognito working at a lot of A2 influential American markets. Vocal pieces like "Step Into My Life" fit right into the vocal mix happening in the multi-kulti urban centers. The music is pocket-driven and mixed with a warm tightness rather than an expansive cold roomy reverb. Instead of using a lot of modern synths, the songs are broken up by horn solos and funcy basslines. All the songs here are up front and personal!

THE SOLSONICS JAZZ IN THE PRESENT TENSE (CHRYSALIS/ERG)

Dateline: Los Angeles. "Tracked" in L.A., The Solsonics open their spectacular album with the title track featuring Norman Brown doing the "guitar/scat." Jazz In The Present Tense is just that, an example of how enriched (or torn, depending on your outlook) by the forces of urban life jazz music has become Like Us3, the Solsonics surf close to pop's fringe with a bassy catchiness that could snare young listeners. "Keep The Rhythm Strong" is an example of pop repetition mixed with a dangerous groove line. Listen and you'll hear bits of jazz, funk and Afro-Cuban roots innocently dumped into the same pot

BRAND NEW HEAVIES BROTHER SISTER (DELICIOUS VINYL/EASTWEST AMERICA)

What an Alternative station may call progressive could just be inthe-pocket soul music for a vocaldriven A2 radio or '70s retro to a club deejay. Brother Sister is London's Brand New Heavies' third album, and like Incognito, the music is tight-knit, tight-mixed and funky; a possible reference being AWB in their prime. The playing & vicious and the singing is sweet as Brand New Heavies float like a butterfly and sting like a bee. If you can stand still during "Ten Ton Take," you're more stoic than I. Other tracks include "Have A Good Time" and "Dream On Dreamer."

Jazz/Adult Alternative New Releases LAST TANGO IN BIG BAND MARIA SCHNEIDER

MARIA SCHNEIDER JAZZ ORCHESTRA EVANESCENCE (ENJA)

It's true. Sometimes big band recordings sound dry and dull. Some even feel that it was in the early '50s, with the rise of Stan Kenton and the decline of Swing, that the genre lost its dance-ability and sparkle. Then there were the economic factors that made big bands more of a studio entity. With their leftist chord progressions, Carla Bley and Charlie Haden (liter-



ally) revolutionized big band in the '70s and '80s, while Joe Roccisano delivered some fresh combinations last year with *The Shape I'm In*. Well, enough history. Maria Schneider has surfaced with per-

BILL CUNLIFFE A RARE CONNECTION (DISCOVERY)

Pianist Bill Cunliffe surprised many of us by quickly jumping on the heels of his *Paul Simon Songbook* with *A Rare Connection*, a more straightforward set of original tunes,

along with a couple of standards (like "Stella By Starlight") thrown in. Cunliffe is a studied traditional jazz pianist who likes to drop in the odd contemporary influences into the bop mold. "Jamaican Lounge Lizards' features some stalwart soloing from Bob Sheppard on sax as Bill and the rhythm section feast on an upbeat reggae-charged tempo. As heard on "Cityscape's" brisk horn arrangements, trumpet player Clay Jenkins and trombonist Bruce Paulson adopt the tandem role of a horn section as opposed to being the third- or fourth-string soloists. All ten songs were cut in a single session. Sheppard stands out on sax, as does the drumming of Peter Erskine. A Rare Connection expresses a well-constructed jazz ensemble side ("The Big Slide"), as well as a '90s sensitivity with the tuneful, sentimental title cut.

THE CROW SOUNDTRACK Various Artists (Atlantic)

This week's highest debut is the soundtrack from upcoming movie The Crow and deservedly so, since it offers a variety of tunes that covers the alternative, rock and metal formats. There are 14 different artists featured, each of whom offer an unreleased track. Twenty GAVIN Rocks stations are already on it, with more following next week. Album radio is giving the Stone Temple Pilots' "Big Empty" and Helmet's "Milktoast" plenty of spins. The latter will appeal to hard rock metal radio as will Pantera's "The Badge," Rollins Band "Ghostrider," Rage Against The Machine's "Darkness," and For Love Not Lisa's "Slip Slide Melting." If you're looking for something with an industrial edge check out My Life With The Thrill Kill Kult's "After The Flesh" and Nine Inch Nails' rendition of Joy Division's "Dead Souls." Also included are songs by Jane Siberry, The Cure, Medicine, Violent Femmes, Machines Of Loving Grace and The Jesus Mary Chain.

DEEP SIX Various Artists (A&M)

This compilation is a melting pot of bands who

now



make up what is referred to as "The Seattle Sound." Before grunge became a household word and flannel shirts were selling for hundreds of dollars in department stores, there was a handful of bands in the Northwest who were writing songs, exchanging ideas and members, and looking for that big break. They weren't exposed to a lot of new music because during the early '80s big bands didn't consider Seattle a major stop. Being neglected by the touring circuit was probably the best thing to happen to the Seattle bands, because this caused the local musicians to form a community amongst themselves in which they created what is now the most sought after sound, and it's so popular that it's almost cliché. Included on this CD are the first tracks recorded (except U-Men), by Soundgarden, Skin Yard, Malfunkshun, Melvins and the significant Green River (above), who spawned such bands as Mudhoney, Pear Jam, Monkey-wrench, and Love Battery. For original grunge and Seattle's true rock 'n' roll sound, check out Deep Six.

PETER KLETT TALKS ABOUT:

THE RUSH TOUR: "We were all influenced by Rush, so we were really nervous, but it's matured us quite a bit because we're playing bigger venues. The audience, being a Rush crowd, has really accepted us. We do a 35 minute set. We hit 'em with the strong stuff and then leave. We're back with them now for another leg of their tour. We'll do the first, third and fourth leg with them."

ACOUSTIC AND ELECTRIC MIXES:

"That's 'Cover Me.' Live I can't really do that song, but I can simulate it pretty well. 'Rain' was a jam we had going that we wrote into a song. 'Cover Me' has a really great acoustic opening too."

SIGNING WITH MAVERICK: "It

was definitely our lucky break.

There were several labels looking at us, but the fact that Maverick was a new label and needed to stablize the company was a big factor in our decision. They're really pushing us in order to make the label successful. That's a good point in our favor."

PRODUCER/FRIEND KELLY

GRAY: "We were really lucky. It took a month and a half to record. We figured we could just go in and rip it on out. I've known Kelly personally for several years, cleaned houses with him and we talked about music a lot. Our drummer Scotty has known Kelly since high school. His greatest contribution was allowing us to record an album that we were gratified with, helping us get what we needed and wanted out of the record. Not to mention he's easy to work with "


RADIO SUCCESS: "We were really pleased at how responsive radio has been. We were confident that the songs would be strong enough to get airplay. The fact that it actually happened is a real treat."

BAND'S NAME: "The song is Midnight Oil's 'Ten Minds And Ten Legs.' The actual line is 'boxed in like candles.' We just changed it around. I was never a fan although Kevin is a big fan of Peter Garrett."

GUITAR INFLUENCES: "I've been playing for 13 years and I like the old '70s rock, Pink Floyd and the Doors. I saw a lot of heavy metal bands. It's more a feeling than it is technology. I play with more emotion than technical skill."

SURPRISES: "The Rush tour and how fast it's happened for us was a surprise; however, I was pretty confident."

THE FUTURE: "We're working on making the album platinum. We're half way there now. We've been really blessed."

ROLLINS BAND Weight

(Imago)

If there's any serenity in your playlist, it'll be violently interrupted when you add the latest from the Rollins Band, Weight which is appropriately titled since the album is saturated with viciously heavy guitars thrashing, bass thumps, drum atrocities and, of course, Henry's crushing vocals. The single, Liar, which was last week's focus track, contains a soft jazzy rhythm that explodes into raging guitar riffs and overwhelming vocal snarls, giving listeners a taste of what's to come. Produced by Theo Van Rock, Weight comes across like the aftermath of a swift uppercut to the nose: gushing twisted guitar chords laying strewn around slightly funky melodies and piercing lyrics that would make anyone think twice before challenging Mr. Rollins to a debate on morality. Several thumbs up to guitarist Chris Haskett, who grinds through several different styles of guitar mania, metal, thrash and funk, without missing a beat. So smooth are the transitions that it sounds like several guitars instead of just one. Joining Rollins and Haskett are bassist Melvin Gibbs (new addition to the band) and skin basher Sim Cains who combine their specialized talents to help create the Rollins Band's storm. The Weight's theme, like most of Henry's projects is life is what you make it and if your life sucks, don't ruin mine. "Step Back" rocks hard around lyrics about Henry confronting a typically screwed up person. He screams, "Do you really want to confront me? Do you really want to deal with me?" It's safe to say this offer won't have any takers unless of course the person is totally insane. "Shine" tells us that even though we think there's plenty of time to do all the things we planned, we'd better start sooner than later because time is running out. Other hard tracks include "Disconnect," "Divine," "Object Of Hatred," "Fool," "Icon" and "Civilized." "Tired," with its eerie guitar swirls and whispering

vocals, could have been the sound-

track in the scene from *Apocalypse Now* where Colonel Kurts confronts his demons. The Rollins Band's latest not only rocks, but includes messages that carry some weight.

GWAR This Toilet Earth (Metal Blade)

Lock the doors, hide the kids, and get out those old paint smocks, Gwar is back with *This Toilet Earth*. If you don't have a sense of humor

or the stomach for acid rock's careening sound, stick with romper room and don't listen to this. Here's a band that's so twisted that aliens wouldn't think of abducting them; besides, the band would go with them willingly. From

"Saddam A Go-Go,"
(this jazzy tid bit pokes fun at that lovable leader in the Mideast), to "Bad Bad Men," which has a hint of spaghetti western

guitar riffs, to "The Obliteration Of Flab Quarv 7," Gwar takes funk, metal, hard rock and thrash mixes it in a power blender, rapes it, then vomits a burly array of disconfigured rock 'n' roll. "The Insidious Soliloquy Of Skulhedface" is pure circus rock with a ringleader-like

opening monologue that starts the jazz, classical, and just plain weird rock rhythms that circulate through this dizzying track. It's definitely not some-

thing you'd want to listen to repeatedly if you were on a bad trip.
Looking for fast tunes? Check *This Toilet Earth* and you'll find that "B.D.F.," "Eat Steel," "Fight," "Filthy Flow," and the focus track "Jack The World" contain heavy doses of spas-

tic energy. Revel in the insane and give your listeners a taste of the truly twisted brought to you by Gwar, the misfits of rock.

SMALL MARKET SUCCESS

elcome to our bi-weekly feature "Small Market Success." In the spotlight this week is Burlington, Iowa's most powerful radio station, KGRS-

100,000 watts strong. Did you know



Burlington was the hometown of actor William Frawley, who endeared himself to us with his portrayal of Fred Mertz on I Love Lucy?

Providing us with some insight on KGRS IS PROGRAM DIRECTOR COSMO LEONE.

What do you feel is unique about

Creativity. We need to be creative because of the size of our market. I like to say that we get Rolls Royce ratings on a K-Mart budget. But with our creativity and budget (or lack of) we continue to be the Number One station in our demo-a 33-share, both male and female. What is it about your market that makes you concentrate so much on creativity?

Not only do we have competition within our market from other signals, but we also have Top 40 competition right up the road in Ft. Madison, and we have major market competition from Davenport and the Quad cities. We need to continue to give our listening audience something they will not be able to get anywhere else. We need to serve our market.

Can you give us some examples? Staying involved in the community.

FACT FILE

Communicating topics that are topof-mind, getting involved with local charities or groups or creating interest in topics that will keep our audience listening all day. It may be



are not Camo Pointo involved with a specific community topic, your listeners think you are. Perception is reality.

How about the record industry?

even if you

They have been very responsive to us. We keep them up-to-date on our playlist and what we're doing in the market. Any time I have solicited the record companies for assistance on a promotion, they have come through for me. If it's a good idea and it benefits all, they love it. But it also means keeping that flow of communication and information going with the record companies. Remember, it is a two-way street.

How about local retail?

We have a good relationship with

local retail (four stores). We get weekly sales information from them and if something is hot for us, we call them to let them know. That way, it gets stocked and we help sell some records.

We also go after that major market sound, not Abii because of our About a month ago we Rue had one of our last major

snowfalls. We got seven inches of snow. I asked myself what we could do with seven inches of snow. We challenged our listeners to build the tallest snowman that featured our call letters. The winner would receive over \$400 in music giveaways. Our night guy, K.C. Fleming, was out judging snowmen all day. He ended up judging over 120 snowmen! We received local media coverage, both newspaper and television, just because of a little snow. That's what we define as "something out of nothing."

What would you like to see in the industry's future?

On the radio side, we need to back up our talk about training the personalities of tomorrow. We may get in a tape that we feel could use some improvement, but we never respond or give them any assistance. You don't need to put the person on the air, but a few pointers may make their on-air presentation a little better. We need to give them something to grow on. On the record side, I'd like to see a more open mind in regard to what we, as small markets, can do for artist development and record sales. We can be a good gauge regarding a record's performance.

What can you give back to the indus-

I can give integrity to the music we play. When KGRS commits to a

record, we give it our total support. We keep you informed of its performance and we sell it!

Who do you network with and why? Steve McKay, program director at WSBG-Stroudsburg, Penn., Mark Reid, assistant program director at KOKY-Kearney, Neb. and Alex Tear, formerly of WKHQ-Charlevoix, Mich., who's currently looking for a new gig. These are people in markets that are similar to mine and they share similar programming philosophies. I suggest finding some stations in your own region, maybe around a major market, and share some ideas with each other. You don't have to give away any secrets, but share what works for

Any final comments?

There are a lot of great opportunities in small markets. Some people use them as a stepping stone, but others of us can make it a career. Just because we are in small markets doesn't mean that we have a small market mentality. It just happens to be where we choose to live our



A³ New Releases

BOZ SCAGGS Some Change (Virgin)

Boz's homecoming is already big news at A3, briskly debuting a few cuts deep at #26 without breaking a sweat. Stitched together on various television soundstages around our town, Boz Scaggs collaborated with drummer Ricky Fataar, the same guy who pops a mean snare with Bonnie Raitt. Some Change is a welcome switch back to Boz the musician/guitarist as opposed to silky frontman. Tempo-wise the album starts out stark and bouncy, saving the silk degrees for later down the line. The up stuff is "You Got My Letter" and "Some Change," the first two trax. "Fly Like A Bird" is a nice pop zydeco. "Sierra" and "Illusion" will add some of that signature Scaggs velvet suave to your sound.

OTIS RUSH Ain't Enough Comin' In (Mercury)

Prediction time. Otis Rush's latest gem will be one of 1994's best records Not to take anything



away from Mr. Cray, but Otis Rush, like Buddy Guy, is the latest and greatest to bring blues into rock respectability thanks to English producer John Porter. An erratic recorder. Otis Rush releases a masterpiece every other decade or so. His seminal sides on Cobra Records are what charged a young Eric Clapton to play blues. An aborted '70s effort on Capitol (later reissued on Bulldog and Hightone) is definitely one to seek out. But if you're only as good as your last one, Otis is in fine shape. Start with "Homework" and proceed to "She's A Good 'Un" or better yet, the title track with it's smokin' "Billie Jean" bassline. Don't take our word for it. Ask the pros. Last time I saw Otis, Santana was at the front table, weeping. The consensus is that Otis Rush is right up there with Buddy and B, an amazing blues warrior.

FRANCIS DUNNERY (Atlantic)

Get thee to a Dunnery and crank this one. It's the birth of a new A3 True Star True Wizard. Francis Dunnery is a mischievous guitar technician who has tread the boards with Robert Plant's band. On his own, this British player is non-dominational and a-national. It's hard to decide what's more clever, the guitar

Live Through This (DGC)

Many of my Hole impressions were tainted by press hype and holemics that seemed to take precedence over the music. Guitarist Eric Erlanderson calls Live Through This a pop record, and if it is, every band should make one. Producer Scott Litt put Nirvana's In Utero over the top, and he deserves credit for Live's accessible throb. All I kept thinking as "Violet" bloomed through my speakers was how did this band get so good? A guitar begins innocently, then launches into a distorted fist of rage as Courtney snarls, "Go on, take everything, take everything, I want you to." First single "Miss World" chugs with both acoustic and distorted guitar and cymbalpocked drums, and "Plump" plunges into a riotous din of gargantuan guitar. Love explores fetishism on the meditative "Doll Parts," and "Credit In The Straight World" whirls with a ripe bass line. Check out "She Walk's On Me's" obliterating Cobainy vocals and hardcore feel, and soak in "Rock Star's" cynical thrash. Those who underestimated Hole's musical depth will be pleasantly surprised. - DAVID BERAN

DENZIL "Useless" (Giant)

Denzil's "Useless" gets the Nice Surprise Of The Week award, as it came out of nowhere and completely took over my CD player. And why not? This acoustic-based pop song is a warm and inviting, and guaranteed to pull on your heartstrings. I mean, who hasn't felt "all fingers and thumbs" around the person they have a monster crush on? 

Magnetic F.elds are inspiring a bit of confusion these days with two current releases, one on Chapel Hill's Merge imprirt, and this one, Holiday, from Chicago's Feel Good Al. Over. Both recordings reflect vocalist Suzan Anway's departure from Magnetic Fields; she has left Stephin Merritt on his lonesome to become an auteur in the fashion of Fil Callahan (Smog) or Mark Edwards (My Dad is Dead/MDID).

Merritt's music relies heavily on synth toys and programmed rhythm tracks, and much of Holiday seems to bleep from the tinny throat of a Casio keyboard. However, Merritt immediately squashes the threat of cheesiness with his incredibly warm vocals (Susan who?), unabashedly homoerotic romanticism and brilliant, lyrical sentiments. A sample: "In Las Vegas where the electric bills are staggering/The decor Hog Wild and the entertainment saccharin/What a Golden Age, what a time of right and reason/ The consumer's king and unhappiness is treason." That's from the pop treat and personal fave "Strange Powers." Also recommended: "Deep Sea Diving Suit," the cello and harpsichord of "Sad Little Moon" and "Sugar World," which bears a certain resemblance to the Jesus and Mary Chain's "Just Like Honey." Radio folks beware of a brief intro snippet that throws the CD's tracking off by one and keep an ear out for Holiday and the Merge offering, The Charm Of The Highway Strip. — SEANA BARUTH

INSPIRAL CARPETS Devil Hopping (Mute/Elektra)

Now that the '80s are tail lights, few bands can get away with keyboards that sound good, and the Carpets are one of them. This fourth feature-lengther starts off with a burst of wistful energy. The radio friendly "I Want You" combines determined drums with a churning guitar, and Tom Hingley sings as if his life depended on it. Hingley's deep, distinctive vocals have always been this band's ace in the hole, and they carry the weight of "Uniform." Clint Boon's forlorn keyboards punctuate the story of a son leaving for war. Dig the groovy bass line in "Half Way There" that combines perfectly with a chirping guitar and intimate Hingley vocals. "Cobra" is an unabashed rocker with Strangler-like keyboards and a memorable chorus, and "I Don't Want To Go Blind" closes things out with bongo-like drums and a gui-

tar iced in distortion. There



seem to be countless influences at work here (the Doors, Stranglers, Talking Heads), but ultimately this outfit ends up sounding more like themselves than derivative retreaders.

TERENCE BLANCHARD The Billie Holiday Songbook (Columbia)

It's the year of Lady Day. Counting Miki Howard and Etta James, Terence Blanchard's is the third jazz salute to Billie Holiday in three months. In addition to his quartet, Blanchard employs a full orchestra and guest singer Jeanie Bryson, whose even-handed resonance serves primarily as a vocal point of reference. It's Blanchard who captures Holiday's telltale inflections in his trumpet solos. Songbook is a symphonic chronicle, as opposed to a strict bebop presentation.

VAGGEU FRONT **Action Packed Adventure** (Mercury)

Imagine renting Shaft of Black Caesar on video and instead of watching the screen, you close your eyes and just listen to dialogue and music. That's the feel that Yaggfu Front have captured on their debut. Action Packed Adventure is the neo-soundtrack to a "soon to be released," twisted, underground blaxploitation flick. The album starts off with "Fanfare and Previews," a multi-leveled song beginning with the voice of a female usher who leads you into the aural theatre of Yaggfu. "Trooper" incorporates a bugged interpretation of the classic tongue twister "How Much Wood Would A Woodchuck Chuck" into the rhyme scheme before getting lost in swirling piano, bass and strange echoing animal noises. "Black Liquid" is an eerie comic bookinspired ditty augmented by blaring trumpet. "Slappin' Suckas Silly" revolves around a melancholy, Shaolin-styled piano loop and rapid cuts provided by D'ranged&Damaged. "Frontline" begins with a spoken lounge club intro and drops into a smooth Roy Ayers groove complemented by Spin 4th's turntable technique. In short, Yaggfu Front have created a record filled with innovative samples, live instrumentation, and bizarre but extremely diverse lyrical delivery. -- SPENCEDOOKEY

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
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
