Chong and Ness Take FCC Seats

With Senate confirmation coming as quickly as expected (GAVIN, May 20, 1994), the FCC is up to full-strength with Rachelle Chong and Susan Ness taking their seats last Monday (May 23).

Chong, formerly a communications lawyer in San Francisco, and Ness, a Washington, D.C.-based attorney specializing in finance, respectively fill the GOP and Democratic seats available. Chong replaces Sherrie Marshall through Marshall's term, ending June 30, 1997, while Ness fills the seat vacated by Ervin Duggan when he left to head PBS. Duggan's term ends next month; Ness will continue for another five-year term.

The FCC is now at full, five-Commissioner strength for the first time since chairman Alfred C. Sikes resigned shortly after President Clinton took

FCC and Infinity: It's Deja Vu All Over Again

In a big case of good news/bad news, Infinity Broadcast Corporation, home of Howard Stern, won approval from the FCC to purchase Cook Inlet's Washington, D.C. area stations WPGC AM/FM.

But the OK, which came May 20, was accompanied by yet another fine for alleged indecency on the Stern show. This time, the FCC levied a matched set of \$50,000 fines on four Infinity-owned stations: WJFK/AM-Baltimore, WXRK/FM-New York. WRSP/FM-Philadelphia, and WJFK/FM-Manassas, Va.

The new fines bring to \$1.8 million the total amount of penalties the Commission has slapped at Infinity and its various stations. The

practicing censorship in the way it administers indecency

The latest actions against Infinity, an FCC spokesperson said, are the results of comments from Stern shows January this year. They apparently caused a listener in Buffalo to file a complaint with the Commission.

On the December show, Stern, news-sidekick Robin Quivers and a caller reportedly talk about masturbation, the discussion including a Dixie cup, a sock, and vomiting during oral sex.

Although the FCC's definition of indecency has been struck down by a federal appeals court as unconstitutional, the Commission used language from its definition in reference to the latest decision on Stern's material, which it said included language describing "sexual activities and organs in patently offensive terms."

If all this sounds like deja vu, it is. In February, the FCC slapped Infinity with

> And here's more deja vu: Stern has, again, announced plans for a movie. This time, however, it's the film adaptation of his autobio, Private Parts, which will be proby duced Rysher Entertainment, a Los Angeles-based TV producer and syndicator, with a \$14 million budget. In an appearance on The Tonight Show, Stern said he would play himself.

> Keith Samples, head of Rysher, said he hopes to begin filming in November in New York. And while no scriptwriter has been set, he expects Private Parts, the film, to have an actual story line, and not be the series of anecdotes and opinions that make up the book.

The registration area on the opening day of SFO1-GAVIN'S new seminar and showcase for musiciansresembled a family reunion as the "who's who" of the San Francisco music scene gathered at the downtown Press Club last weekend (May 19-22) and got acquainted with high-powered out-of-towners looking for a much-needed shot of good, new music. The 700 who got badged-along with the general public-got

weather is iffy at any time of year, there wasn't a wisp of fog in sight, and the temperature was perfect for a jog around the clubs.

Bonnie Simmons, who with Queenie Taylor served as coordinators of SFO1, reported record crowds at such clubs as Paradise Lounge and Bottom of the Hill. "And Brave New World and Boomerang were packed, too. The biggest thing about SFO1 was the number of younger musicians there. And we had 40 A&R people making the

While nightlife was SF01's draw, good crowds attended the daily sessions at the Press Club, starting with Friday morning's welcome from GAVIN CEO David Dalton, followed by the keynote speech given by 29year-old Gerard Cosloy, coowner of indie label Matador

Cosloy's cynicism, sardonic wit and "bite-the-handthat-feeds" style meshed well with the weekend's cutting-edge tone.


Heralded as one of the hottest of the indie labels, Matador has a connection with the "establishment" in the form of a joint venture with Atlantic Recordssomething Cosloy looks on with equal parts grudging respect and disdain. "They

give us money," he said. "Atlantic essentially uses us for A&R. But when you sign artists like Roger Clinton and Stuttering John you don't need help.'

Among Cosloy's targets were culture-"Our culture is as artistically bankrupt as it was when we were in high school"; indie labels-"We're not miserable pimps, we are good pimps"; and trades— "Outside of fanzines, there's not much

Despite his Elvis Costellolike demeanor, Coslov has a nuts and bolts view of his company and an eve trained on the bottom line. He

acknowledged that the unexpected success his company is now enjoying with Liz Phair was helped along by Atlantic. "They gave us a line of credit," he said. "Being able to pay our bills helped."

Throughout the rest of the weekend, attendees casually dropped into meetings that gave insights into management, marketing, producing, A&R, merchandising and press relations, as well as a light-hearted session of "Music Jeopardy Trivia" and a Sunday morning "Rock Walk" of historic rock sites, including the Fillmore, Winterland, and the Haight-Ashbury home of the Grateful Dead.

During the session "The Rest of the Enchilada: Publishing, Merchandising, International Deals and Touring," the late Gene Clark's (The Byrds) son sought advice from panelists about what route to take with the rights to his father's songs, which were bequeathed to him.

SFO1 did its part to demystify the information superhighway at the Multimedia Information and Update, as participants explored new interactive CD-ROMs such as "JUMP: Bowie The David Interactive CD-ROM." Host Dennis Erokan guided panelists through two and a half hours of the multimedia blitz that's taking over the industry, touching on popular aspects of music delivery systems.

Panelists Rob Lord and Jeff Patterson clued attendees in on the Internet Underground Music Archive (I.U.M.A.), the Internet's first free hi-fi music archive that uses music, text and pictures from unsigned and independent artists which offers public feedback in return and includes artists from four independent labels

All through the weekend the Press Club bar was a meeting point for attendees with legal questions, who were curious about the Internet or who wanted their songs critiqued. During the question and answer segments of each session, 90 percent of the queries began with, "I belong to a new band," or "I'm starting to send out articles..." Each time an

The big draw of the weekend were Counting Crows, who played four sold-out nights at the recently-reopened Fillmore, drawing rave reviews and predictions of superstardom for lead singer Adam Duritz. On Thursday, their opening

The crew's revised sound mixed tight rare grooves with gritty hip-hop beats, producing an infectious rhythmic vibe which reached out to the swaying audience packed tightly onto the dance floor.

The Mommyheads mixed up the chemistry for a crowd-pleasing show at the funky Hotel Utah, where droves of the Mommyheads fans and SFO1 attendees danced in all the nooks of the tiny venue to music most often linked to XTC. Considering guitarist Adam's favorite album is XTC's Drums & Wires, The Mommyheads/XTC connection is obvious. The keyboardist's knack for weird calliope sounds might cause auditory indigestion, but a steady rhythm holds down the poppy structure and grabs the listeners.

Even at the peak of their amazing dissonance jams, The Mommyheads manage to include the listeners in the chaos.



Lollapalooza Heats Up Summer

It's the summer's hottest ticket.

Lollapalooza '94, a yearly multi-media circus featuring popular bands and popular causes, kicks off in Las Vegas on July 6. The notorious Perry Farrell, former for Jane's frontman Addiction and current leader of Porno for Pyros, has reassembled the organizers of Lollapalooza '90 and 91, and the group has signed up twice as many acts as last year. Appearing on the main stage will be

Smashing Pumpkins, Beastie Boys, George Clinton and the P-Funk All Stars, The Breeders, A Tribe Called Quest, Nick Cave & the Bad Seeds, and L7. The Japanese punk band the Boredoms opens the first half of the tour and the Bay Area's Green Day opens the second half.

When they're not performing, bands backstage will chat with the crowd via the Lollapalooza Superhighway.

Lollapalooza's sideshow is

as exciting as the bands, and this year special interest groups represented will include women's rights, human rights, AIDS activists and gun control advocates. While not grooving or politicizing, fans will be able to experiment with virtual technology and interactive television.

"We're going to have the feel of a neighborhood swap meet, and we guarantee the unexpected," says organizer Farrell.

How to Engineer a High-Tech Education

Ask the nearest multimedia maven about a high tech education, and chances are they'll say, "Get a computer and teach yourself" or, "Go straight to Florida."

Winter Park, Florida is turning out technical experts who've been responsible for the sound of George Lucas' Fantastic Adventure, The Crow, and other big productions.

Full Sail boasts ten video and audio studios, with 48 tracks of digital and analog recording, and numerous hard disk recording systems. The studios are capable of "talking" with each other, i.e., tracks communicate, and can result in 200 tracks for one work.

Not only has Full Sail attracted the professional sector for its superior facilities, but top entertainment companies send staffers to school at Full Sail. Recently the Film Editors Guild sent some of its members to learn new editing systems. "You'd be hard pressed to find another training program that offers as much hands-on time," says Gary Platt, who runs Full Sail's educational sector. "We put a lot of money back into the school and it really pays off."

The payoff is a good reputation and a high graduate employment rate. More than 80% of last year's graduates got work in the entertainment industry. One example is Keith Cohen, who has engineered sound for Prince and Paula Abdul. Another alumnus, Randy Birch, tours as an engineer with Paul McCartney, ZZ Top, and Phil Collins.

Henry Morgan, Radio Pioneer, Dies at 79

Henry Morgan, a radio fixture of the '40s and '50s who paved the way for irreverent broadcast comedy, died of lung cancer May 19 in New York. He was 79.

In his New York-based radio show in the '40s, and later on a radio network show, Morgan insulted sponsors and station owners as well as friends and politicians.

His stunts—and his penchant for losing advertisers and upsetting station management—presaged by half a centur

ry the antics of today's morning DJs.



In a 1947 broadcast, he asked parents to leave the room, then told children to run away and become smugglers. "It's exciting...a wonderful life," he said. "Get out now before it's too late."

He complained that the holes in Life Savers cheated the pub-

lic and suggested selling the fill-ins as "Morgan's Mint Middles"—decades before Life Savers got the idea to market holes of their own.

And, long before stupid pet tricks, Morgan, on a 1951 TV takeoff of talent contests, showcased talking dogs and dancers who played various instruments while they pranced about.

Morgan was such an iconoclast that he was thought to be a Communist, and he was caught in the McCarthy blacklisting of entertainers accused of having Communist ties. But Morgan fought back and maintained his career on such shows as *What's My Line* and *I've Got a Secret*.





Inside Top 40

A funny thing happened to WAPE-Jacksonville PD Jeff McCartney once he studied his latest perceptual study and music test. After nearly a year of "dealing" with what Jeff

himself describes as "Adult Top 40 bullshit," The Big Ape has altered their approach. The research confirmed what McCartney suspected for Jeff Mc months: the



legendary Top 40 was not serving their core audience

While the station's presentation is much the same, albeit "a little more in your face," there's still a promise of "no rap and no hard rock." The biggest change was more in the station's oldies library. Gone are songs by Peter Cetera, Bill Medley and Jennifer Warnes, Patrick Swayze and others with a similar style. In fact, 400 titles have dropped to 300 and also gone, says McCartney, is "The '80s A/C stuff' our P-1 listeners told us they didn't care about.

The older selections that WAPE now concentrates on are songs like Duran Duran's "Rio" or the Pet Shop Boys' "Opportunities." In addition, McCartney has opened up dayparts on tunes such as "Relax" by Frankie Goes

To Hollywood, which had been restricted to night play only. "It's now on 24

hours a day, 365 days a year," he says. "At this stage," McCartney asks rhetorically, "how many people around the country are playing Don Henley? Everyone knows about stuff like that, but how about T'Pau? I got it! How about Frankie Goes To Hollywood? I got it! How about Pet Shop Boys? I got it!"

McCartney sees a trend. Stations like his are going the same direction and pulls no punches in advising outlets in similar situations to either change calls and spend a fortune on marketing a totally new product or do what he chose to do. "Let it be what it is. That doesn't mean you have to play the extremes. There's an awful lot inbetween."

WNCI-Columbus, Ohio PD Dave Robbins agrees with McCartney. "Our audience told us they wanted 'NCI to be 'NCI," he says. Robbins says what they found is that the WNCI call letters themselves are a position. "What they mean to the listener," Robbins says, is that station that played the biggest songs, the new music and keeps people up-to-date with culture.

Like McCartney, Robbins sees a trend developing as stations find that they can only succeed when they deliver on expectations. Citing the old analogy you can't put ketchup in a mustard bottle, no one will buy it, Robbins admits, "It's a lesson we as broadcasters continually learn. We can't change these things so instead we have to maintain our position, be proud of it and move ahead. All of this doesn't surprise me.

Jimmy Steal at Q102 (WKRQ)-Cincinnati, sees a tendency on the part of Top 40 programmers to

look for the next big thing: Rap, Hot A/C, the Mix format. etc. 'Everyone

is looking for the answer," he says. Steal feels that regardless of a

station's particular slant, the answer is balance! "You can take Mariah Carey's ten best songs, but if that's all you play you're not going to have the best ratings," he says. Comparing Top 40 to "McDonald's and People magazine," Jimmy maintains what he terms a firm belief in whatever works.

Airolav Analysis

WCIL-Carbondale, Ill. OM/PD Tony Waitekus says the sensational retail story behind Pink Floyd week after week made him look for a song he could play off the album. It appears "Take It Back" is the track that's working for him right now, as it's pulling Top Ten requests. Tony moves it 22-18 and says, "It's accessible to everyone." Forty-one plays is good for a 26-11



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



mitments she was not able to perform them. So, we had Toni Braxton, who sang the demo and was newly-signed to LaFace Records, perform the tunes. You must feel good about these early discoveries; they've turned into platinum-plus artists. There's nothing better than a movie to debut your music. You're dealing with what, in a sense, is anywhere from an eight to 40 million dollar music video that plays in some 2000 theaters. Add to that the commercials, trailers and marketing that automatically goes with putting out a film. Imagine the exposure and the number of impressions you get by debuting your artists with



a fantastic song on a soundtrack. You've stayed away from profanity in your soundtracks. Is that a personal statement?

The problem we face right now is that we've re-interpreted violent degenerate culture as legitimate Black culture. There are some of us who don't believe in that sort of stuff. Some of us come from parents who had jobs, went to church and went to college. That is not our experience. Why should I be involved in something that doesn't represent me? I'm lucky because

I can pick projects that at least I feel some kinship to. That doesn't mean I don't like some of the harder stuff, because I do. I lived with the Above The Rim and the Juice soundtracks. My own taste tends to be a little more conservative but I'd like to do some other things. I don't think I'm as good at doing the harder-edged stuff as someone else might be.

What's your most successful soundtrack to date?

Boomerang. That was a multiplatinum project. Once during the production I was sitting in a

Boomerang. That was a multiplatinum project. Once during the production I was sitting in a trailer on the set with L.A. Reid, BabyFace, the Hudlin brothers and attorney Stephen Barnes talking about how great it was to have all these relatively young and somewhat successful

African-American males showing that we could work together.
Think about it—we were sitting

in this trailer working on the soundtrack to an Eddie Murphy movie. I think that made a statement: whatever our differences may be, whatever different backgrounds we may have, we're all

able to put them aside for one common goal, which is to make a great film and a great soundtrack. I think we did both.

How do you think we can best celebrate Black music month? We can best celebrate Black music by not limiting the thought or the focus to one month; by understanding that this is a process of 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year; that

we are approaching the year 2000 and we should be able to establish the fact that our objective should be nothing less than total control of our culture and of our art. That doesn't mean forcing large multi-national corporations to have more Black departments and all that other nonsense: I'm talking about setting up businesses, institutions and corporations so at the end of the day we control the bottom line of this culture. African-Americans, Latinos and other people of color have got to become producers in this society if we're going to succeed in it. We have to control what we have and what we do-to be producers, not consumers. One of our greatest resources in this society is music; we have to control

Black Entertainment Television

Exploring Brave New Worlds

When Black Entertainment Television (BET) began beaming its programs across the United States over 14 years ago, many people thought it would never fly. But today, BET delivers

Urban-oriented programming to more households than any other outlet in the U.S., and it's a major factor in the success of many new recording artists. The network has also helped define the new Black generation.

One of the people responsible for the network's success is Jeff Lee, executive vice president of BET's network operations, who has been with the network since its inception. We spoke recently about BET's the expansion and development, and its new venture into radio.

Bill Speed: Are the company's new ventures part of the original plan?

Jeff Lee: The plan from the beginning was to create a dominant medium in which advertisers could reach the Black consumer. BET Holdings now encompasses the BET cable network, YSB (Young Sisters and Brothers) and Emerge magazines, and now BET on Jazz, which is

coming this fall, and BET radio network.

Why radio?

Radio is a natural extension. Through BET's doors walk more of the top black talent in the

country than anywhere else in the world. We utilize them and distribute their product through our television shows. In some cases, these artists don't reach all segments of the country, therefore we can access them through radio. We

have the capability of packaging these programs for local radio without the added expense that local stations would have to absorb. It will expand our identi-

Will it be a radio version of BET TV?

lt's more along the lines of the syndicated radio format. Currently we provide Urban radio

with vignettes, in exchange for advertising time. We also offer national promotions and that lets them cross-promote their station through

local drop-ins. We've even thought of having some affiliate DJs guest host on shows like Video Soul or Rap City. Will the new networks showcase

original programming?
We want our stations to acknowl-

edge their local identity. Radio is best effective as a local tool. We don't want to change their identity but to enhance it and we don't see BET radio taking

away from that. Black radio over the years have taken a lot of hits and we feel that by combining forces with them we can make it better. We understand the problems and the restraints Black radio is under because we had some of the same problems being Black TV, especially when it comes to national advertising dollars. It's the same fight. We've tried to strengthen our brand awareness too. What's next for BET? Right now we're fighting to slow down. There's nothing new coming. We've done two film deals with BET Pictures and BET Films for our action pay-per-view channel. We've got a full plate right now, and we're going to concentrate on expanding those businesses and making them run and be successful. When we move

into our new offices—which we're building—we're going to

consolidate everything we have. We're also constructing new head-quarters, which we'll move into in November of this year. The building directly behind us

will have soundstages, so we'll be able to enlarge our production capacity and do more as we move into the launch of the jazz channel, and continue producing other BET shows. Now's the time to buckle down and make it shine.

Is it as much fun as it was in the early days?

early days?
I have a different definition of fun these days. It's the same things that brought me here in the beginning, and it's those things that keep me here. There are no real boundaries except the ones we put on ourselves. There's no road map to follow; we're trail blazing as we go along and that's exciting to me. The company keeps re-inventing itself each year as we grow. Now I just want to sit back and watch it for awhile. *

Making His Mark On History

You can't talk about American Black music success without mentioning Alvertis Bell. Bell is the former chairman of Stax records and ex-president of

Motown records group, and now he chairs his own company, Bellmark records.

Al Bell is one of the few African-Americans who has headed a major independent record company. He is a spiritual, driven man with the mannerisms and

speech of a church minister. He's one of those rare individuals who is on a mission and nobody short of God will deter him.

One of the reasons Al Bell is a success is that he hasn't stopped to look back—except during this

interview. We start at the beginning:

Bill Speed: How did you get started?



Memphis. While there I formed my first record company, DeVoice Records. I began to release and distribute my product independently. I realized early on, when promotion people from all over the country started coming to ask me to play their

records, that somebody, somewhere was making money because I was playing them. So I set out to learn the economics of this business. By the time I got to WLOK I had a reasonable handle on how record companies made money.

Around that time I met Jim Stewart, Estelle Axton, Steve Cropper, David Porter and some of the other people working at Stax Records, which was distributed by Atlantic records. I went by the studio a couple of times because I was in love with their music. I met Otis Redding, ended up promoting many of his concerts, and we became close friends.

I left Memphis for WUST in Washington, D.C. where I played records by artists such as Otis Redding, Carla Thomas, Rufus

Thomas and William
Bell. While I was in
D.C. I formed my
second label,
SAFICE Records,
and signed Eddie
Floyd who
became a coowner, as did
Chester Simons

who sang with the

Moonglows when
Harvey Fuqua and Marvin
Gaye were part of the group. The
name SAFICE were the names of
the owners S-Simmons; AAlvertis; F-Floyd; I-Isbell; CChester: E-Eddie.

Eventually I was offered a position at Stax as head of national promotion. I took the job and eventually became vice president of promotion for the label. Since you're independent, how do you attract larger acts to your roster?

I have a track record out here that's been reestablished recently with hits like "Dazzey Dukes" and "Whoomp! (There It Is)" by Duice and Tag Team respectively. We're able to go into the market-place and compete with the majors. The name of the game is hit product, hit radio promotion and hit sales.

Who is your inspiration and why? God inspires me constantly, and it is the spirit that's in me at all times. Probably the greatest inspiration in my life has been my father. To me he epitomizes the word entrepreneur, and he came through a difficult period in American history as far as being Black and being in business. He overcame segregation, and all of

that goes along with it, to go on and build a established landscape business

How can we best celebrate Black Music Month?

By constantly reminding ourselves of the importance of Black music to us as a people. By continuing to re-evaluate what we're doing as a people in protecting, preserving and perpetrating that music.

During your last days at Stax, you were beginning to work with movies, such as Shaft and Wattstax. Are there plans for Bellmark to do soundtracks? That's part of our agenda. It's a natural evolution. Our mission is to build the best, most comprehensive, God-inspired recorded music, video, cinema and communications complex that the

world has ever seen. Cinema and communications is

where we're headed.
What do you see as

business. How do
you keep a positive
outlook?

What keeps me positive is the spirit of God in me, and that's a positive spirit that's full of love. If we are to do anything in life, we are to do it diligently and be assertive. I move like I move. How is radio different from when you were a disc jockey? It doesn't have as much personality. Plus, there isn't as much freedom. The rules are different because the formats are tighter, and there are consultants, so it's more difficult to break records than it was years ago. But by and large it's all the same; if you have hit product and you understand what radio promotion is all about, you should be able to crack through.

What's the legacy of Al Bell? I'd like to be remembered as the guy who cared about the music for the sake of the art. I would also like to be remembered as the



guy who gave his all to preserve and perpetuate African-American music, or Black music, in all its facets. **

Programmers Look to The Future

We asked some prominent radio programmers to tell us what's coming up. Here's what they said.

QUINCY MCCOY PROGRAM DIRECTOR WBLS/FM-NEW YORK

How has Black music changed in the past couple of years?

Black music has been reinventing itself over the years, but at the same time it seems go back into a cycle. Rap is what we are into now, and that dates back to Gil Scott-Heron or the Last Poets. Rap is just another natural extension of the African-American experience.

Black music has become very popular because the media has taken to the gangsta part of it, and the record companies have been able to manipulate it and make a lot of money. They are able to sell it to 15-year-old white kids in the suburbs who wonder what it's really like to have someone drive by and shoot up your neighborhood. That's an interesting twist.

Black music itself is one of the most creative areas, but it's still one of the most discriminated against. As much money as Black music brings to the music business, the music business still tends to not hire black people in key areas like marketing and product management. Record companies will have a lot of "national director of this" or "vice president of that," but when it comes down to the jobs that really make a difference, there's still a big hole.

Where do you see Black music going?

Rap is going to become more and more interesting because instrumentation is starting to come in and we're actually going back to where we use to be. I hope we get back to the days of big studio session with violins and real instruments, I would like to hear real drums and all that stuff again. I hope we get back to lots of voices and back-up groups. Going back to real music; real sound—that's what I hope we'll see in the future.

STEVE CRUMBLEY PROGRAM DIRECTOR WOWI-NORFOLK

How has Black music changed in the past couple of vears?

It's always been great, but recently I think it's gotten better than great. The producers are taking more time and giving us better product. We can see that by its acceptance, and if you look at the Top 40 chart, you'll see half of the records are Urban. So I think Black music is getting much, much better and everyone is getting into it. I don't see a decline. Look at the awards at the Grammys—Black artists are winning awards left and right. So I think it's getting better. Just like fine wine.

Where do you see Black music going?

It'll continue to get better. I just hope that the negativity—calling women "whores" and "bitches" will decrease and we'll think of more positive things to help kids relate to and understand when




How has Black music changed in the past couple of years?

I think that urban music has changed *dramatically* in the last few years as the result of rap music. At first, I think Urban radio seriously underestimated hip-hop as a genre. They thought it would never last, and it has done just the opposite: completely exploded. Urban radio was forced to embrace hip-hop as mass-appeal music.

Where do you see Black music going?

Being more socially conscious. The "gangsta rap" trip is over. The audience would rather roll to something positive, from what we're seeing here in Los Angeles. I think we'll see more music on the old-school production tip and just straight sampling. We'll hear a lot of dope production that's got that back-in-the-day flava. And personally, I'd *like* to see a few more female artists like Aaliyah, SWV, and Zhane drop with some solid, funky, *uptempo* material.






To The Death (Select/Elektra)

EBO GUIDELINES: ANOTHER OPINION

he FCC's new guidelines on Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) were addressed in an article that ran in Forbes magazine's April 25 issue. It said, "...put bluntly, stations might be in trouble if more than one in three of their new hires were non-minority males." It added, "...do you remember being asked to vote on giving the government the power to impose hiring quotas?"

The potential for being in violation of the EEO rules seems to have increased enormously, and you should keep detailed and meticulous records, not only of your efforts to publicize job openings, but of all interviews with job applicants.

Tony Coles, program director and EEO administrator for WFWI/FM-Ft. Wayne, is putting a positive face on the new FCC regulations.

"I hear a great deal of discussion regarding the difficulty of finding

female and minority job candidates," he says in a letter. "However, I have not heard many broadcasters offering solutions...

"In order for the industry to meet and/or exceed the levels expected by the EEO and the FCC, we need to develop a long-range strategic plan that will not only find and promote women and minorities currently in the industry, but a plan that will build and strengthen the future applicant pool. Radio and television have long been dominated by white males in programming, sales, engineering and talent. This has limited the number of strong minority leaders and role models. It has also created an assumed standard for placing women and minorities on the air overnight...

"Some simple steps, if taken now, will help to ensure the quality of future applicants. Owners and managers should attend career expos for high school and college

students to find women and minorities interested in the industry. Many companies outside of radio offer college/trade school scholarships in order to attract new employees. Perhaps broadcasters should offer scholarships to attract talent (of all races) to the industry. Women and minorities who are currently succeeding need to get involved with the recruiting process. Even if you aren't involved in recruiting, chances are you have networked over the years and know of qualified applicants and can provide referrals.

"Solving the issue or parity in the broadcasting industry will not be easy, nor will it occur overnight. The first step is for broadcasters to look outside of traditional circles during the hiring process, and for minorities to get more involved with our own success in all aspects of the industry. Black or white, male or female, the future of radio is based upon creating and developing strong broadcasters.

Thanks to Tony for his letter. It's my belief that there are a great many people of goodwill in radio who earnestly try to give equal opportunity when filling new jobs. What concerns me about the FCC's new thrust is that it seems to focus more on the job-renewal procedure rather than the actual outcome, and it seems that a station can have a very desirable ethnic and gender balance, even in management, and still be fined a substantial amount because of perceived deficiencies in the job interview process. However, as Forbes notes, if 2/3 of all new hires are female and/or minority, there maybe less stringent examination of station procedures.

It's time to consult with your communications attorney and set up clear job-filling procedures that all management personnel at your station will be familiar with.

BHEKI MSELEKU **TIMELESSNESS** (VERVE POLYGRAM)

Bheki Mseleku. Learn how to pronounce it: Bekky M-sell-eh-koo. They will soon be very popular words. To Abbey Lincoln it means "brilliant," "multi-faceted," and "master musician." To us it means spirtual, honest, soulful music. Mseleku is a 39-year-old South African pianist/composer/ singer/ saxophonist living in London who has taken European festivals and Ronnie Scott's club in Soho by storm. A lyrical pianist whose cascading pentatonics conjur McCoy while his breathy, sometimes angular horn lines evoke a mix of Joe Henderson and David Murry, Mseleku is nonetheless an original. Timelessness, his Verve debut and follow-up release to last year's moving Celebration on World Circuit, features such heavyweights as Lincoln, Henderson, Pharoah Sanders, Elvin Jones, Kent Jordan, Rodney Kendrick and Mseleku's rhythm section of drummer "Smitty" Smith and bassist Michael Bowie. From the opening bars of the chugging title track with Henderson's burnished phraseology dancing over the swinging bop, to the trancelike, uplifting "Vukani (Wake Up)"; from the funky swing of "Homeboyz" and Abbey's personal trip "Through The Years," to Jordan's floating acrobatics on "Ntudil Street," and everything in between, Timelessness truly is... Bheki Mseleku.—Jason Olaine

CAETANO VELOSO and GILBERTO GIL TROPICALIA 2

(ELEKTRA NONESUCH)

It's difficult to explain to today's younger music fans, especially when their own genres have fallen under media and congressional criticism, that there was a time when your musical stance actually offended society to the point of violence or exile. Witness the physical attacks heaped on the Sex Pistols in London for their speaking out against the Queen. Take also the case of Brazilians Caetano Veloso and Gilberto Gil who, during the '60s, spearheaded Tropicalism, an ecelectic arts movement that "diluted" sacred Samba with pop culture influences from without (Beatles, reggae, etc.). At the same time Veloso and Gil were speaking out against political oppression and eventually they were literally run out of the country for a few years by the

ruling military dictatorship. Topicalia 2 is a scintillating reunion of Veloso and Gil. They magically combine modern Western influences with indigenious Bahian acoustic sounds and sweet duets. Thumping Brazilian hand drums and jungle percussion frame Jimi Hendrix's "Wait Until Tomorrow." Lyrics dealing with such thorny issues as Haiti, poverty, politics and dada frame ironically smooth, traditional Samba performances. These contrasts account for the Tropicalia 2's utter brillance. Not since Veloso's stunning Estrangiero have we been treated to such biting Brazilian artistry. Jazz/A2 must find a way to play something from this superb sequel.

NORMAN BROWN AFTER THE STORM (MOJAZZ)

Norman Brown made quick work of becoming much more than your basic A2 staple. In just two albums, Brown has accomplished what has taken most bands five years to establish: A strong A2 base with overflowing into the subconscious psyches of Urban and A/C. After The Storm is an interesting title, It seems to suggest the vast potential that lies past Quiet Storm horizons of radio and video. While many A2 and Jazz artists only dream of reaching a mainstream audience, Brown is an artist capable of achieving that goal with only a minimum of musical compromise. Brown is fulfilling many of the "Bensonesque" prophesies ruthlessly heaped upon him, and A2 now has a certified guitar hero who best frames Jazz chops with exquisite pop production. As for tracks, it's almost a "pick 'em." Personal Zimmermen faves include "Lydian" and the sweeter "That's The Way Love Goes."

JOSE NETO NETO (B&W MUSIC)

As a young player, Brazilian guitarist Jose Neto was raised on a steady diet of Hendrix's Electric Ladyland, whose imprint manifests itself squarely on his solo debut simply titled Neto. Scanning the rock-ish cover artwork, Neto pictures a Fender Strat leaning up against a Marshall amp, casting uncertainty as to where Jose is going musically. Punching to the third track, a jam called "Arrow," the riddle continues. Neto's lucid notes wobble and bend like anything off Ladyland, complete with Steve Winwood-style Hammond organ fills. If you're looking for some safe Samba grooves, try elsewhere. This is a disc filled with free-form, eclectic jams dabbling in rock ("Arrow"), Middle East ("Waiting For Zakir"), acoustic balARTIST PROFILE

Sometimes rambling, always experimental, tracks like "Flower Child" start off pastoral and textured then invariably pick up steam to unveil some pretty atypical A² performances. Jose Neto brings a few different styles and sounds to A²'s table. Listen and see if his brand of spice is for you.

KEN NAVARRO PRIDE & JOY (POSITIVE MUSIC)

Between spearheading his Positive Music label and releasing five solo albums in four years, Washington D.C. guitarist Ken Navarro takes the DIY (Do It Yourself) ethic to greater heights. His latest, Pride & Joy, has all the melodic and ambient earmarks to merit out-of-the-box A2 success. Navarro and Dan Revnolds. his keyboard sidekick, maintain a very spare arrangement and converse in an economic, amiable patter. "A Friend Of Mine" has Navarro alternating solos at will, between electric and nylon-string guitar, with a few keyboard and alto sax accents thrown into the mix for freshness. The title cut sounds like a tribute to Pat Metheny and Lyle Mays, right down its whistling synths, Brazilian vocal seasoning and strumming acoustic and treated electric guitar mosaics. Navarro makes the best of his self-imposed tight melodic constraints by doubling and tripling most of his guitar parts. However, our pick is the more expressive ballad, "Stand Your Ground." Buried near the bottom, Navarro drops his guard and goes for the heart.

JULIAN JOSEPH REALITY (ATLANTIC)

Three long years have lapsed between Julian Joseph's first and second Atlantic recordings, but momentum continues for this talented British pianist. Julian is punchy as well as lyrical and, to tell the truth, we're not sure whether we prefer Julian Joseph in trio or in ensemble. Either way, the rhythm team of Charnett Moffett and Mark Mondesir on bass and drums respectively is one drivin' machine, a complement to Joseph's own forceful presence. After repeated listening, the telltale composition for us is clearly "Swingstone." While Peter King delivers some angular alto saxophone bites throughout Reality, Joseph and King do a masterful job of volleying some unison melody lines in the opening minutes. Joseph sports a quirky, Monkish flair in the early going, and the more improvised space Joseph gives himself, the grander he sounds. You get the impression that each of these tunes have been fleshed out thoroughly prior to rolling tape, as Joseph leaves none of Reality's dynamics to chance.







ELEVEN "Heavy" (Hollywood)

They won't be leaving any time soon now that the single, from their self-titled album "Heavy," has been shipped to rock radio. The low-end guitar riffs mixed with organ chords, tribal drumming, and Alain Johanne's slicing vocals will undoubtedly generate more spins. Look for Eleven touring with Soundgarden and Tad this summer.

SOUNGARDEN "Black Hole Sun" (A&M)

The mighty Soundgarden has dominated the number one spot on the chart for the last several weeks and shows no signs of going down especially with the release of the band's latest single, "Black Hole Sun." You've probably given this tune plenty of spins, since it was on their album, Superunkown, but check out the rest of this single because it has a trippy re-mix of "Spoonman" and a live track, "Beyond The Wheel," which was recorded last August in Toronto. Soundgarden is shattering commercial rock's barriers with the number of spins they're receiving on Album radio, but still have unwavering support from college radio. We're not worthy.

STONE TEMPLE PILOTS "Vasoline" (Atlantic)

Prepare to sink your teeth into the latest single from Stone Temple Pilots, a slippery, guitar-choppin' track called "Vasoline" from the upcoming album, Purple. The graphic will be a Chinese character so don't get confused if you don't see the word Purple anywhere on the album. The rock-heavy guitar grooves, smooth bass lines, boppin' drum beats and infectious vocals will appeal to both college and commercial radio. "Vasoline" will keep your request line eternally lit and cause listeners to ache until the full album is released in June.

HELMET "Milktoast" (Interscope)

The crunchy guitar slams of Helmet's "Milktoast," which was featured on the soundtrack for The Crow, has been getting a lot of airplay on Rock radio. Now you can check out "Milguetoast," a slightly different version of the song which is on the single "Milktoast" from the band's upcoming album, Betty. Heavy enough for metal radio to jump on and alternative enough for Album. How can you go wrong with?

NAILBOMB: "We started talking about this project in 1992 after the last show Sepultura did with Ministry in San Diego. I just didn't want to sit around and do nothing so Alex and I decided to get together and work on some tunes. Originally we called it the Hate Project, then we changed it to Sickman, then Nailbomb, which was Alex's idea."

SEPULTURA TOURING: "These days we're doing it in a real honest way. We're bringing the music everywhere. That's why we're playing the most crazy redneck cities on this tour. It's great to play before people who have never seen anything like us. Probably the hardest thing they ever saw was Ozzy Osbourne or Judas Priest. The whole hardcore/metal/punk scene changed my life. Hopefully, the band's in that scene today will give kids a positive movement to fit into. We talk about how screwed up the world is but we're trying to bring in positive attitudes. You have to make people feel good about themselves."

THE WRITING: It wasn't our intention to sit down and write about all the fucked up things in the

world. The song "24 Hour Bullshit" is about television and was written in about two minutes. Max and I were watching TVand it just all came up about the brainwashing and what it does to people's senses."



Hard Rock Releases

DEAD ORCHESTRA Sounds Like Time Tastes (Choke Hit)



Hovering between death metal and hard rock is Dead Orchestra with their second release, Sounds Like Time Tastes. The band's multi-guitar symphonics of (Grant smith, drums; Greg Lyerla, bass; Joel Hesser, guitar/vocals; Miles Pehde, guitar/vocals; Justin Crumbliss, vocals/percussion) follow the extreme hard rock route, sometimes veering off the trail to explore the depths of death metal only to come back and cross over to the other side of the chord, experimenting with a little alternative/psychedelic thrash. It doesn't matter which direction Dead Orchestra takes, they always return with a hard-hitting, guitar domineering blast that'll heal any case of metal depravation. Blazing guitars, heavy bass lines, scrupulous drumming and elastic vocal assaults forge the band's own intense style. Songs like "Praise Hell Fun," "Time To Kill," "More To Life," "Pull" and "Satan Love Me" come to you undisguised and full-throttle scarring the naked ear with metal licks. "Brainspatter" showcases a roaming guitar solo that runs free until it's sucked back into quick metallic riffs, keeping things tight and fast. The title track begins with airy guitar chords and vaporized vocals that eventually intensify into a ferocious groove with a lurking guitar solo that follows along like a loyal dog. "Cosmic Dinosaur" showcases the bands diversity by creating a hip-hop drum beat that directs the high-pitched guitar spuzz and vocal chants. Other interesting tunes include "Attack Of The 500 Foot Hippie," "Forward Motion," "Buckey," "Prohibited" and "Five Young Vikings."

DEPRESSIVE AGELying In Wait (CMC International)

Formerly known as Blackout, the

mold for Depressive Age was shaped behind the iron curtain in East Berlin where the band was influenced by Metallica, Judas Priest, Black Sabbath and other metal records smuggled in from the West at exorbitant prices. The oppressive government set strict guidelines on the band's creativity, dictating lyrics and their heavy sardonic sound. These restrictions, along with the lure of playing outside the iron curtain forced the band to escape to the West. Lead guitarist Jochen Klemp, guitarist Ingo Grigoleit and bassist Tim Schallenberg were successful but drummer and later lead singer Jan Lubitzki was caught by the East German border patrol and then deported to the West Berlin after spending 14-months in jail. Upon Lubitzki's release, the band hooked up with drummer Norbert Drescher and changed their name to Depressive Age and began gathering their modest following. Sinister vocals, morbid harmonies and angry metalized guitar rock flows through the twisted songs of Lying In Wait. Adventurous rock radio will enjoy exploring the shaded realms of Lying In Wait. "Eternal Twins" and "Where" are a must listen.

FACEPULLER Auditory Surgical Technicians (BangOn/Car)

This Vancover-based band has been floating around on some metal radio stations for quite a while and is just now beginning to generate a buzz. Part hard rock, part thrash and part alternative metal, Facepuller (Brent Facepuller, bass/vocals; Brad Facepuller, drums; Ian David Lee Facepuller, guitar) delivers an array of swirling upbeat tunes that will appeal to listeners who have an appetite for moshing music. The first track "1-900" offers a glimpse of the band's aggressive tempo while "Nuhr" and "Coin Toss' pulls you under lan's gritty guitar trance, blowing out chords with the intensity of hot nails while Brent's synthesized vocals penetrate undiscovered realms of weirdness. "Away From The Middle" has an addictive groove that listeners will undoubtedly be attracted to. The same is true for "Coin Toss" which features more of Brent's an unusual gurgled vocals. It's difficult to even begin to guess who or what influences this band. Maybe that's what so intriguing about them.

PETE DROGENecktie Second (American Recordings)

This one took me completely by surprise and has held my CD player hostage for about two weeks now. Pete Droge (pronounced Droj, with a long O) has made a warm, acoustic-based (but not wimpy) album, sprinkled with his sly winking sense of humor and a gutwrenching poignancy that just kills me. It's not what I expected from a guy who cut his teeth in the band March Of Crimes, okay? And the fact that Pearl Jam's Mike McCready gave a demo to American Recordings' Brendan O'Brien—who then signed him—doesn't impress me as much as listening to "Northern Bound Train" or "If You Don't Love Me (I'll Kill Myself)." I know there's plenty of music just sitting in a big pile on your desk right now, some by names that are more familiar than Pete Droge, but it doesn't mean their music's better. Take a listen to the two tracks already mentioned plus "Two Steppin' Monkey," "Straylin Street" and "Fourth Of July," and see if you aren't held captive too. Nicest surprise of the week. —Linda Ryan


BEASTIE BOYS III Communication (G.Royal/Capitol)

The Beastie Boys are cool—there's no better word for it and no way around the fact-so deal with it. Since Check Your Head was released, Adrock and Mike D have gotten married and MCA has found spirituality in the Buddhist path. They let out all these facts and more on Ill Communication. Less a grand style jump than its predecessors, I.C. raps patented B-boy angst and mellow, jazzier sounds together in a rump shaking bundle, "Sabotage" the grinding alternative single, is marked by Adrock's familiar screetchy vocals. For hardcore angst, sample the punkpunkpunk "Heart Attack Man" (H.A.M.?) and its specially designated "mosh part." The boys strut their music prowess on the instrumental "Futterman's Rule" with a tight low sound. There are three insta-love tracks here: "Root Down," the funky dance number with a wakka-wakka; "Get It Together," a lyrical showpiece costarring Q-Tip from T.C.Q.; and "Bboys Makin' With the Freak Freak," with MCA on the upright bass Flutes make it happen on "Alright Hear This" and, duh, "Flute Loop." Check the fast rapping on the former and the Sesame St. skipping quality of the latter. MCA dedicates two songs to his Buddist beliefs: "Bodhisattva Vow" and "The Update" - check the lyrics. Guaranteed to be truly "mackado--BLANE M. MALL cious."

So far, the College Chart has proved to be a somewhat schitzophrenic entity. Currently, it seems there are "solid" records and "flash" records. The "solid" records debut, move up a bit, and then settle in and linger around a certain number. "Flash" records have a fantastic debut week and behave somewhat erratically thereafter. In all probability, that behavior is a direct result of the dichotomy in programming styles that this College Chart attempts to integrate. You've got your all-overthe-map stations and your more continuitous ones. "Solid" records have a firm base at the continuitous stations and do alright at the AOTM stations. "Flash" records primarily do well at AOTM stations, and, as you might guess, they don't do well consistently. This phenonenon is somewhat exacerbated by the beginning-of-summer comfusion at some stations. Hopefully, as the new correspondents adjust to the reporting "groove" and summer staffs get settled, the chart will calm down a bit. Either that or we'll go spins-perweek and suffer this adjustment process all over again.

Speaking of spins-per-week, I received one written response to last week's pros/cons of spins-per-week column. It's sardonic, it's insightful, it's from **Doug Schoemer**, A&R guy at Blue Gorilla. Doug writes: "I have decided to take you up on your generous offer to provide a 'short, thoughtful, written response' to your new section. I find the college section informative and much more representative of the (gag) college-radio-friendly music currently forced upon the public by majors and indies alike. I believe wholeheartedly in the 'spins-per-week' concept, feeling the 'pros' outweigh the 'cons' in your oh-so-eloquent discussion (see Gavin #2005). Any change which will expose the fallacies (and phalluses) in this industryspoon-fed college radio chart system is o.k. by me. (But who am I? After all. MERCY RULE God Protects Fools (Relativity)

Mercy Rule takes its name from little league baseball's ten run rule which ends a game once a team establishes a ten run lead. This Lincoln. Nebraska trio's aggressive sound pushes boundaries, and brings to mind the rule's vengeance factor. The nature of revenge stories is that the avenger eventually becomes as violent as the assailant, and bassist Heidi Ore's vocals seem bent on exacting sonic and psychic vengeance. They clench around lines like "If there's something wrong with me, just tell me" on the opening "My Mouth." The track is a high-octane blitz of pulverizing guitar and grimey bass, reminiscent of the Pretenders' early aural torpedos. Ore snarls with barbed fury on "I Am I Said," and delivers a sizzling rant on the rocker "Summer." Check out the lunging, firehosey "Dare Me," and the slower "God Protects Fools." Someone said seeing these guys is like putting it to the tenth power; this disc is pure power. You do the math. RERAN

DAVID BYRNE (Luaka Bop/Sire/Warner Bros.)

Like the bizarre microbe that changes physical form seven times during its existence, David Byrne sheds another skin. The radiofriendly "Angels" nods back to the Talking Head's days of complex polyrhythms and convulsive bass lines, and "Self-Made Man" combines a sleepwalking xylophone and kettle percussion. Dig the funky throb of "Back in the Box," and the groovy tumble of "You And Eye." ELASTIC PUREJOY Elastic Pureiov

(WORLD DOMINATION, 3575 CAHUENGA **BLVD. WEST #450, LOS ANGELES, CA** 90068)

The Elastic Purejoy's debut kicks off with "If Samuel Beckett Had Met Lenny Bruce," a tune that does its part—it intrigues you with its title-but it isn't really all that representative of the band. "If Samuel Beckett..." combines a menacing bass groove, shards of fuzzed and scraping guitar and a mostly-spoken vocal. But Elastic Purejoy's mission is hinted at more accurately by the second track, a cover of Sebadoh's "Soul And Fire." A careful listen to this debut reveals that at least one of the writers in the group truly reveres songwriting; besides the respectful version of Lou Barlow's brilliant "Soul And Fire" they offer a rollicking, melodic "Unchain My Sister" and an acoustic, plucky tune, "Suburban Yoke." Be warned, however, that Elastic Purejoy is a fairly diverse ensemble and you have to listen to the whole thing to get the full picture. Recommended, particularly, are the two tracks mentioned above and, in fact, most of the album's first side. —SEANA BARUTH

SLEEPYHEAD Starduster (HOMESTEAD, P.O. BOX 800, ROCKVILLE CENTER, NY 11571-0800)

When I saw Sleepyhead at a CMJ years ago, I was transported. At that time, the band was knocky and unformed, an ensemble patched together with rubber bands and charm. While on their (second) full-length, Starduster, Sleepyhead are exhibiting a fullblown maturity, they're not so polished that they've lost their allimportant engaging edge. Like the swarm of cuddle-core bands that so regularly appear in this column,

Sleepyhead play unassuming, embraceable and approachable rock and roll that's part bubble, part zip and a healthy dose of jangle. And, under their disarming mask of childishness and adolescent awkwardness, they make slyly smart observations and the occasional slicing insight. This fulllength is Sleepyhead's best realized project to date. —SEANA BARUTH

AIN'T THIS BLISS WITH YOU AND THIS

Various Artists (SPIN THE BOTTLE, 915 COLE STREET, #330. SAN FRANCISCO, CA 94117)

Fledgling label Spin The Bottle, spawned from the loins of San Francisco scenesters Seana Baruth (Gavin's own College Editor) and Cathy Elton, is right on the cusp of a strange shift in San Francisco music. (All these bands, except Ohio's Ass Ponys, hail from the Golden Gates). The double-7" compilation called Ain't This Bliss With You And This documents a somewhat incestuous gene pool: Dieselhed, Tamation, The Buckets, Ass Ponys and The Doubters all share a dominant trait referred to facetiously by fans as "country core." Dieselhed, whose track "Greyhound" is featured on one single, boasts diesel-driven rhythm and story-telling lyrics that goad their devoted crowds of fans into frenzied hilarity show after they'relike manic Zappa with a mad fiddle player. The Buckets' "The Dog" is a perfect ditty to set off the day in a tongue-in-cheek king of way. Fiddle player Wanda Taters, who is also with Ed's Redeeming Qualities and who's currently touring with the Breeders, is so impressive that even if you think you hate country, you'll be tapping something before you know it. This brilliant little comp is subliminally commanding you to dance a jig. Get movin'.



The Marxman's lyrical approach attcks a wide variety of socio-political terrain ranging from abusive relationships ("All About Eve") to the British invasion of the Emerald Isle ("Sad Affair"). Marxman's diverse blend of musical stylistix should appeal to both Rap Radio and College/Commercial Alternative, and could conceiveably float over

into A3 and Top 40.

Kaper/RCA teased radio early with Blackgirl's debut single "Krazy," creating a loud buzz for Treat U Right... The title track along with "Where Did We Go Wrong," "'90s Girl," the Curtis

Mayfield cover, "Let's Do It Again," and "Things We Used To Do" are among the highlights.

world, Kathy Troccoli makes a strong and convincing sequel that shows she can build an equally successful career in the pop world. Michael Omartian. Bunetta & Chudacoff, Ric Wake and Keith Thomas produced KTs various tracks with a constant sense of airplay, particularly for A/C radio. The set is frontend loaded with tracks like the first single, "Tell Me Where It Hurts" and the brilliant opener, "Just You." which is just bursting with possibilities. -RON FELL

DAVID SANBORN Hearsay (Elektra)

When David Sanborn released his first two Elektra recordings, in July, 1991 and May, 1992 respectively, he seemed eager to move away from the "feel

good" Adult Alternative sound he and Kenny G helped pioneer. As a result, those albums were hardline jazz efforts. Hearsay, Sanborn's third on Elektra, is a drift back toward a more commercialized stance, yet it retains an East Coast nocturnal temperament, as opposed to a rolling Southern California breeziness. *Hearsay* is cinematic soul augmented with plenty of organ, percussion and blues guitar. -KEITH ZIMMERMAN

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


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
