

MCA Opens for Warner Bounces Morgado, Business in Asia Taps HBO s Michael Fuchs

MCA Music Entertainment Group is making its move into Asia—finally.

The last of the six major music companies to do so, MCA has opened a headquarters office in Hong Kong and will have seven more in operation by year's end, in Thailand, New Zealand, Singapore, Malaysia, South Korea, Taiwan, and Australia. (MCA has had a presence in Japan since 1990.)

The Asian invasion completes MCA's international expansion begun last year, when MCA had announced plans to open affiliate labels in France, Italy, Spain, Sweden, Belgium and Holland, joining existing MCA labels in Germany and London.

While MCA is the last of the majors to enter the Asian market, chairman Al Teller says the company is still moving with caution, having researched the market carefully.

Mindful, for example, that Hong Kong music fans prefer home-grown acts over imports, MCA will concentrate on grassroots A&R



efforts rather than attempt to sign established artists from other labels.

Teller also plans to watch developments in Chinawhich has butted heads with the U.S. over bootleg and infringement copyright issues-before plunging into the mainland. "I think I'll let (other companies) pave the way and see what kind of experience they're having," he said. "At the appropriate moment, I'm sure we'll have an operation in the mainland in one fashion or another.

It seems only right.

To cap almost a year of turmoil at the world's largest record company, a year that saw the departure of three valued veterans of the music biz, followed by a palace revolt and the threat that a slew of pop stars might flee their label-a drama, in short, that would make a perfect HBO movie-Time Warner has dismissed Robert Morgado as chairman of the Warner Music Group and replaced him with the chairman of Home Box Office.

The shakeup drew immediate second-guessing around the industry.

Gerald Levin, the Time Warner chairman, may have acted too late, some said, noting that the problems at Warner Music began long before Mo Ostin, the beloved Warner Bros. Records chairman, announced his plans to leave the company last August (see story below) and hinting that Ostin's departure could have been prevented. Warner also lost Elektra Records chairman Bob Krasnow and Ostin's right hand man, label president Lenny Waronker.

There was also talk that Doug Morris, chairman and CEO of Warner Music U.S., who led a much-publicized revolt against Morgado last fall, was unhappy about

being passed over for the Group chairmanship, but he and Fuchs issued mutually supportive statements, with Fuchs saying he would be relying heavily on Morris' expertise, while Morris called Fuchs "a man of accomplishment."

Outside the company,

some wondered about Fuchs' ability to slide from TV to music. But overall, Levin's move was perceived as solving several major problems that were burden-



ing Time Warner on the eve of a shareholders' meeting later this month in New York. By forcing M o r g a d o's departure, he eliminated a man who, while credited with

streamlining Warner's global machine and boosting revenues, failed to get along with most of the company's major music executives, creating a sense of instability. And he kept Fuchs, rumored to be a candidate for a top position at the recently sold MCA, in the Warner fold.

Where Will Mo Go?

The sudden exit of Robert Morgado from Warner Music opens the doors for the grand return of Mo Ostin, right? Not necessarily.

Time Warner chairman Gerald Levin is reported to have spoken with Ostin, who left his job as chairman and CEO



of Warner Bros. Records January 1 after refusing a restructuring that would require the 68 year-old Ostin, a 30-year veteran at the company, to report to Morgado, who came to Warner as a fiscal manager, but with no music business experience.

Levin reportedly offered Ostin and Lenny Waronker, the label president who left after declining an offer to replace Ostin, a joint

venture label deal. One newspaper guessed that the two could be back by summer.


But a top executive of a competing company said Levin's overture was "too little...too late," as Ostin and Waronker have been wooed by all five of Warner Music's major competitors, along with DreamWorks, Viacom, Disney and Rupert Murdoch's News Corporation and Fox.

Cancel those tickets to Beltsville.

Radio programmers who want to look at an Arbitron diary's opinion/commentary page can now do so without going all the way to Maryland. A Diary Comments Report is available thanks to a computer-based imaging system that captures, scans and stores a diary page. The pages are sorted by county. "Since about 40 percent of the diaries that come back to Arbitron have comments in them," says the company's general manager, radio, Pierre Bouvard, "a radio station can get an enormous amount of insight as to how its personalities, morning shows, programming and promotions are performing."

Arbitron will be charging between \$200 and \$500 for the service, which is available in all rated markets.

LIKE A ROLLING STONE He Kicked Me, and It Felt Like a Kiss

They had a fight in Fresno, Calif. the other night, and a concert broke out.

The battle—essentially a turf war over a George Strait concert—involved two country stations—KNAX/FM (New Country 98) and KSKS/FM (Kiss Country)—and resulted in one PD getting a knee to the groin and a rock through his window.

How's that for your station-promo overkill?

The two stations, who are slugging it out (along with two other country outlets) in this Number 64 market, had preconcert parties across the street from each other. KNAX was set up at Selland Arena, the concert site, where the station had rented an adjacent exhibition hall and paid for permits



to display its banners. KSKS had their bash at a hotel.

The trouble began when KSKS sent a pair of "Kiss Girls," wearing Dallas Cowboys cheerleader-type outfits and bearing a sign proclaiming that KSKS was hosting the "real" party, toward the KNAX party. At the parking lot outside the arena, Greg Edwards, PD of KNAX, told the women KNAX had exclusivity to the site, seized the sign and tossed it into a trash can.

The Kiss Girls ran to KSKS GM Al Smith. "They said they'd been yanked around a bit," Smith told me. He took another sign—and the women—and marched back across the street. Smith argued to Edwards that KSKS had a right to be in the arena's parking lot, which was public property. "I said don't touch my people and don't touch my sign," says Smith. He says Edwards reached at the women, who were holding the sign, and went to their defense. Edwards says Smith "grabbed my shoulders, turned me around and kneed me in the groin. He later called it a 'body check.'" Police escorted Smith from the arena.

Later that evening, Edwards says, someone threw a rock, emblazoned "Kiss This" in red letters, through his office window.

"We know who the rock came from, and it wasn't their air staff," says Edwards, hinting that the rock came from higher up.

"I don't know anything about that," says Smith, who said he checked with his staff and believes the rock did not come from anyone at his station.

Edwards doesn't plan to press charges. "If I sued, the way things go these days, I'd wind up being the bad guy."

Edwards may be feeling generous because, in the latest ratings, KNAX knocked off the Kisser for the first time in three years. Smith admits that KNAX won out in 25-54s and TSL. But, he adds, "we won 18-34s, and our cume is bigger." *Nyab-nyab-nyab!*

Now, here's the *weird* part: These two stations have locked horns before. A couple of years ago, a staffer of one was passing out station flyers at a concert being promoted by the other, and before the dust settled, the sales manager of KSKS had head-butted KNAX's PD, bloodying up his nose.

And the star of that concert? George Strait.

Forget the right-wing talk shows. It's *George* who's inciting people to violence! Stop that man before he sings again!

BEV'S BOOKSHELF **Robin Quivers Book: In The Shill of the Night...** *Ouivers*

Robin Quivers, ReganBooks, \$22.

On a recent *Tonight* show, Linda Ronstadt accused Howard Stern's sidekick Robin Quivers of being a shill for Stern. Quivers put up a loud defense, but the first seven and a half pages of her book, *Quivers*, do little to refute Ronstadt's charge.

"For the record, Howard is a very sweet man," she coos by page six, "and there's no way that sweetness doesn't underlie every outrageous joke."

But as you read further, it becomes clear that if Quivers is a shill, it's because she wants to be. Of Stern's notoriously offensive racial comments she says, "Why would I care about what he thinks of black people? What's important is *my* opinion of black people."

If the reader makes it past that page, they'll find that as a treatise on making it big in radio, Quivers is almost a classic. Anyone who ever hated their boss will love the vignettes, and even recognize some names. Especially hilarious are the accounts of a PD Quivers and Stern called "Pig Virus," who had a thing for throwing phones. Her vivid description of Don Imus makes him seem more pathetic than one of the most admired air personlities of his generation.

Her dealings with a news director who made Quivers' life a living hell are entertaining because the reader has the luxury of knowing that, despite the bad times, Quivers will end up on top of the world.

What's upsetting about *Quivers* is the account of her personal life. Eavesdropping on her childhood sexual abuse, the anger that followed, and her years of therapy provoke both admiration and revulsion. And

though it provides insight into what drives Quivers, it's hard to read without becoming queasy.



Unfortunately, Quivers doesn't delve deeply into too many of Stern's most provocative escapades or

his trouble with the FCC. We don't get as many colorful quotes from the man who made her famous as we'd like. One, however, is very telling about their relationship. One night at dinner, Quivers tells Stern that two women he had been flirting with over the air would be "unexpected company" later that night. Stern fumed, "Robin, you tell those b*****s I'll rip their t*ts off if they come near me." They didn't.

Robin Quivers may be a shill for Howard Stern, but, as she proves in *Quivers*, that's her job. And she's good at it.

A Party for Tom Donahue

It's coincidental that it's taking place while musicians and industry people are gathered in San Francisco for SFO2, but May 21 is a significant anniversary date in the history of the late Tom Donahue, a pioneer of free-form FM rock radio, and it's cause for a party.

"It's for family and friends of Tom, including all those whose lives he touched," says Bob McClay, who worked with Donahue at Top 40 KYA, where Donahue was "Big Daddy," at KMPX, the groundbreaking underground station led by Donahue, and KSAN, where most of the KMPX crew moved after a labor strike in 1968.

Donahue, McClay noted, was born on May 21, 1929, opened KMPX on May 21, 1967, and took over KSAN May 21, 1968.

Donahue died April 28, 1975, so the gathering will observe the 20th anniversary of his death.

The party, a no-admission, no-host affair, will be at what McClay called "Tom's favorite haunt," Enrico's, the North Beach restaurant that hosted dozens, if not hundreds of DJs and radio execs from the '50s on, and where KSFO legend Don Sherwood had his "offices" on a stool at the end of the bar.

Sony's CD Future is Both Crystal-Clear—and Cloudy

It didn't take a psychic to see the future of entertainment during Sony's recent demonstration of its new digital MultiMedia CD.

Bob Sherwood, Sony's vice president of sound technology, marketing, was in San Francisco with a pro-

totype that intends to make its mark on the movie, music, computer, interactive and game industries.

The Sony/Philips MultiMedia CD (MMCD), devel-

oped in cooperation with the 3M company, holds up to ten times as much data as existing discs—enough for a four and a half hour movie— and the crystal-clear image resolution eclipses that of the two strongest formats: VHS and laserdisc.

"We've achieved video playback from a dual layer disc," announced Sony Software's David Kawakami. Consumers have become accustomed to the advantages of digital sound with CDs, but digital video has run into configuration and compression snags.

MMCD is based on the infrastructure of the CD, and current audio CDs, CD-ROMs and other multimedia applications will be compatible with the new system. "We don't think it's time to

reinvent the wheel, so we want to build on existing technology," says Kawakami. The players necessary for MMCD will be available to consumers mid to late next year, but a rival disc may slow down its

Bernie Taupin Joins New Interactive Record Label

It's been rough sledding in recent months for the CD-ROM software industry, but that's not scaring several music-biz veterans, including Bernie Taupin.

The songwriting partner of Elton John has joined Norm Bastin, a founder of Compton's New Media, in a new company, Nu Millenia (originally "nu.millennia") to produce multimedia titles, with a focus on music.

Bastin calls the new venture an interactive record label and distribution company.

Other partners include manager Michael Lippman, record exec Paul Atkinson, and two of Bastin's fellow former Compton's executives.

Bastin says his new company will feature wellknown musical artists along with new artists.

Product will be released in a format Nu Millennia calls Audio ROM, which, like CD Plus, contains audio and multimedia tracks. Audio ROM is playable on both regular CD as well as CD-ROM players. The company also plans to issue CD Plus releases under license from major labels, and expects to distribute product through both record and computer stores.

Bastin says he left Compton's because of differences with fellow executives on company strategy. Best known for its CD-ROM encyclopedia, Compton's also produced the successful *Prince Interactive*. But Compton's reportedly lost \$11 million in the third quarter of 1994. While a number of CD-ROM companies have downsized, Bastin thinks he and his partners have a good shot at success.

"I don't look at Nu Millennia as CD-ROM," he says. "There's a glut of CD-ROM titles on the market...a lot of junk and a tremendous amount of quality difference between the titles." The lack of consistent quality, he says, has hurt the industry.



SMALL MARKET SUCCESS

his week's "Small Market Success" heads in a different direction as **Jim Johnson** of **KHTR**-Pullman, Wash. trumpets small markets across the country. Jim is one of the most savvy and educated programmers in small market radio and what he has to say reflects what his colleagues seem to feel are the most important issues facing them.

Please share what you think are the biggest hurdles small markets face. I'd have to say that, overall, recognition in the industry is at an all-time low. As small market stations, we must constantly try to remain visible to labels in particular as much as possible. Here at KHTR we face the same problems as most other small markets. It seems that no matter how hard we strive to get attention, we will never reach the same level of recognition as a parallel station. Being considered a second class station is an extremely difficult barrier to overcome, regardless of how much noise you make. Don't get me wrong because there are certain labels who go to bat for us at certain times, but the inconsistencies in support make it impossible to compete. The most that any secondary will ask for is to at least be taken care of in a timely manner, which seems to be a difficult task for a lot of local reps to handle. We are more than eager to support any artist or label, but the relationship should be reciprocated regardless of market size.

KHTR is located in a major college demographic area, with the majority of the population falling between 19 and 26. This, by the way, is the country's most prominent musicbuying demo. As our advertisers recognize, this is not a group to be ignored.

In what way do trades and retail fit into the success of KHTR and other

small market stations?

Reporting to any trade does not automatically translate into consistent industry attention, as we have painfully learned over time. I believe that trades could use their influence more than they have in the past by rallying behind the stations who report. The basic reason for reporting is because what we do is important and what we contribute is considered significant. If this is not the case, then we are doing nothing more than "padding the stats" by adding records to build a story. I cannot tell you the last time I was asked to maintain spins on any given record. Spins sell records, not adds.

What type of evolution do you see occurring with small markets and radio in general?

The ongoing trend is for labels to continue to cut back support of secondaries, KHTR included. Most of us at this level will be the major market PDs and VPs of tomorrow, and this certainly isn't painting a very pretty picture. The relationships have not been established, and overall dissent of labels is at an all-time high. When our day comes, however, we will be expected to play the game and that may be difficult.

The future of KHTR and secondaries around the country is questionable. If the trend towards duopolies and going satellite continues, it will shave away the bottom level (i.e. us), and there will be a serious lack of real estate for the labels to develop bands with. Music people tend to forget that a majority of artists need to be nurtured at some point in order to hedge against burnout. Just as alternative acts need the college level to develop, Top 40 acts need secondary radio. The circulation of new artists is much too high and I think you'll see a drastic reduction in the near future.

As far as KHTR is concerned, we will continue to cume more than anyone in our market with or without support, but it will be difficult. Retail and servicing both need a major overhaul. We certainly cannot be expected to sell records in Pullman if our retail outlets are out of product. The record companies should tighten up the smaller market retail and be aware of where product is selling and make sure the product is there. Cooperation at all levels will help new artists in every market large or small. We definitely do not want the GMs last words to be, "Can you say 'satellite'?"





Inside Top 40

In both 1989 and 1990, **98PXY** (WPXY) PD Clarke Ingram was honored as PD of the Year at the GAVIN Seminar, but for much of the '90s he found himself out of dayto-day programming. He did, however, continue to study and evaluate what was happening to Top 40. Ingram's experience gave him the opportunity to view the format's ever shifting trends. In part two of his first in-depth interview since 1992, Ingram touches on numerous issues, both professional and personal

You've always been one of the most outspoken defenders of mainstream Top 40's approach. Is that still true and why?

There's no question that doing mass-appeal Top 40 is tougher now than it's been in awhile. There are a couple of reasons: Arbitron, and the cultural shift toward alternative music. However, I still believe in mainstream Top 40, and it still works. We have an eight share to prove it. On this question I have to side with Mike Joseph: There will always be an audience that wants to hear the hits. The presentation may change, and the hits may be different, but the concept is still valid. In this industry, we tend to niche ourselves out of this format every chance we get.

Is there an overreaction to alternative at many Top 40s right now, or is it really the new Top 40?

I've done several 180-degree turns on this issue. I started out at Z100 (WHTZ) being very skeptical, eventually warmed up to it, moved to Pittsburgh and got another perspective and then came to Rochester where it has yet to be a factor. Since then, my opinions have swung back in the other direction. Is alternative mass appeal? I find it appeals to a very narrow band of the population, usually 16 to 22-year olds, and as far as Top 40 is concerned, I call them the "lost" people. Younger teens like Top 40 and so do women 22 to 30, but these "lost"

What's GOing On

"Flock Of Seagulls' track is still burnin' up the phones. We're testing Corona's "Baby Baby."" BOBBY NOVOSAD, PD, KSMB-LAFATETTE, LA. "We've been playing Hootie & people are college types, and they can't stand it. At least in Rochester, I've found I can't make them happy. They want alternative and only alternative, and they hate the things that make Top 40 successful—hype, repetition and **Real McCoy** singles. If alternative is the new Top 40, then I'll be cloing oldies before too long!

Talk about working in major versus medium markets. What are the pluses of being in a market like Rochester?

I much prefer medium markets. The quality of life is better and the people are nicer, not to mention that there is a better chance for some kind of overachievement. You can't get a 23 share in the majors.

What do you do when you take over at a station as successful as 98PXY?

Former PD **John Ivey** left this station in great shape. My job is to take it to the next level while having respect for its heritage. I respect the fact that 98PXY has an eight share, but I don't want to let that stand in the way of getting a nine or ten share.

Looking back, do you have any regrets?

There's a young lady in the Midwest who is possibly the greatest regret of my life. If I had just one thing to do over, I'd go back in time and make that relationship work. I was too involved with my career to give her the attention she deserved. By the time I was ready, it was too late. She became an object lesson to me about taking the things you love for granted. I don't think I'll make that mistake again.

Any final thoughts, or advice for those on the street right now looking for that next gig?

Stay the course. Remember, although you may not hold a position of importance right now, you're still talented. You probably know who your friends are. Stay in touch with them, and ask for their help if you need it. Sooner or later, they're going to need yours!







VARIOUS ARTISTS Johnny Mnemonic Soundtrack (Columbia)

Since techno and industrial music have hit their stride, finding music to match the mood of this futuristic thriller must have been fun. The movie is based on a William Gibson story, and many of these bands epitomize and explore the author's recurring man/machine themes. Cop Shoot Cop's "3 AM Incident" drones and lurches into murky depths of guitar and drum noise as Todd A. insists that "It only takes one spark." The techno-laced epic "Sad But True" sounds like Yellow Magic Orchestra on designer drugs, and Orbital's singer enhances the track's synthetic feel. As he sings in a high, echoed voice, the song repeatedly morphs into nether worlds of ravedout bliss. KMFDM's "Virus" combines a drum machine with clenching guitar, and Rollins Band's "I See Through" snarls in more conventional hard rock fashion. God Lives Underwater's accessible "No More Love" may find friendly climes on radio, and Bono And The Edge's "Alex Descends into Hell for a Bottle of Milk/Korova 1" harks back to the deconstructionalist experiments U2 did on singles between the albums October and War. This is a solid soundtrack that hard rock and alternative radio will welcome, and hopefully the film will keep up its end of the bargain.

TERENCE TRENT D'ARBY. IS HE WHITE OR BLACK? Rock or Soul? Fish or Flesh? Symphony or Damn? Tension or Sweetness? On his fourth album, "Terence Trent D'Arby's Vibrator," he proves he's all that and more. The multi-talented singer/songwriter/ musician/performer can croon like Sam Cooke, bear witness like Otis Redding, and dance like James Brown, not to mention play an assortment of instruments in a dazzling one-man display of virtuosity.

"Terence Trent D'Arby's Vibrator" continues D'Arby's struggle with the sacred vs. the profane and the body vs. the spirit. The album's double entendre title, according to Terence, refers to the "vibrations which exists within all matter." The title track quickly fuses sensuality and spirituality with fuzz-toned, wah-wah guitars cranking out some finger-lickin' good southernfried funkadelia.

On "Terence Trent D'Arby's Vibrator," D'Arby's amazingly textured voice shines. Whether it's his gospel-tinged testifying on Holding On To You, the lascivious falsetto on C.Y.F.M.L.A.Y?, the "Super Fly" seduction of Read My Lips (I Dig Your Scene) or the stark croon of If You Go Before Me, D'Arby's vocal range is at its most versatile.

Recorded in D'Arby's own LA-based home studio, Monasteryo, "Terence Trent D'Arby's Vibrator" offers a garden of earthly musical delights. The African chants and ethereal harmonies of Read My Lips suggest the sky above, while the driving guitars and gnarled rhythm are firmly planted in the libido below. Adversely, C.Y.EM.L.A.Y? employs industrial strength power chords to emulate the old in-out/in-out.

"Terence Trent D'Arby's Vibrator," is a return to albums which offered bold statements along with a musical head trip to places you'd never imagined existed. In its variety of settings and moods, the record's like an old-fashioned wide-screen movie, "Around the World in 60 Minutes."

New Releases TRICKY MAXINQUAYE (ISLAND)

"There is no unifying force to my album, except confusion."—sonic auteur Tricky

Tricky belongs to an elite British conclave of musical conjurers that includes the Stereo MC's. Portishead and Massive Attack. Like his compatriots, Tricky draws heavily on the legacies of jazz, hip-hop, dance, reggae and psychedelia-but then adds a healthy dose of confusion. That is not to say, however, that Tricky is confused. Rather, he confuses and confounds his listeners with a myriad of unique sounds and rich, moody ambient textures; a listener making his or her way through Maxinquaye's 12 tracks never knows exactly where the path will terminate.

Along with the nymph-like chanteuse Martina, on *Maxinquaye* Tricky twists the aural spectrum into a hallucinatory polysonic chasm where anything is permitted: On "Ponderosa," Martina's voice twists and veers between Robert Smith's slippery whine and Bjork's bubbly playfulness, while Tricky tosses in weird spoken words, honky-tonk piano fills and static noise. However, the album's piece de resistance is Martina's belting rendition of Public Enemy's classic rap rant "Black Steel In The Hour Of Chaos." The singer brings a whole new slant to the song's para-milatary lyrics by drawing a parallel between women's suffrage and black opression. And Tricky's haunting musical soundscape-complete with rolling-surf drums, echo effecs and surge guitar-enshrouds the lyrics in an appropriate aura of (harmonic) revolution. Another stand out is "Brand New Your Retro," a mechanical, fuzz-enhanced romp in which Martina proves herself to be a quite competent rapping femme fatale. The additional scratch blips, plus Tricky's smooth Bristol patter make this the closest thing to actual hip-hop on the disc-but it's still way out in the telephonic multiuniverse. Check your mind and rewind three times (at least). Maxinguave is superb sonic sublimity through and through. -Spencedookey

BOREDOMS CHOCOLATE SYNTHESIER (REPRISE)

It's been two years since The Boredoms' *Pop Tatari* graced the airwaves and inspired counTless noise/punk groups with their full-on raging sonic assault. The Boredoms are back with their third release, and *Chocolate Synthesizer* is a sonic treat of wide-ranging production values and percussive, mantric, heaven. This ain't no retro—The Boredoms contin-

ue to be the hardest of hardcore, essential listening for those who admire where music's going rather than where it was ten years ago. This album chronicles the band's continued fascination with studio techniques and effects. Check out the backward dub on "Synthesizer Guide Book on Fire," the building effect on "Mama Brain," (their answer to George Clinton's "Maggot Brain") and the cheerleaderesque chorus of "B is for Boredoms." Eye Yamatsuka and company continue to refuse to differentiate between noise and music and so remain the royalty of noise culture; full-throttle maniac genius rules again on Chocolate Synthesizer.-WALT REED


THE MERMEN A GLORIOUS LETHAL EUPHORIA (TOADOPHILE RECORDS, 135 BLUXOME ST. SAN FRANCISCO, CA 94107)

Over 70 minutes of surf music swims and glitters on this trio's first true studio effort. "The Drowning Man Knows His God" plunges into currents of guitar distortion as the drums sculpt shrines to honor it. Feedback a la Hendrix's "Third Stone from the Sun" courses through "Pulpin' Line," and "With No Definite Future and No Purpose other than to Prevail Somehow..." floats in relaxing eddies of delay. Surf bands often have trouble sustaining original melodies, but "Scalp Salad" proves that the Mermen can develop a memorable melody and dissect it at will. Dig the bass drum and pimpin' bass line on the manic "Drub." and the delicate guitar that molts into a monster on the epic "And The Flowers They'll Bloom." The closing number, "Brahms 3rd Movement 3rd Symphony," is a successful experiment. The exquisite interplay between bass and guitar echoes Brahm's bass part and the added flourishes work. A Glorious is the result of The Mermen playing live with Dick Dale, and the belief in stretching surf to its outer rim. —David Beran

THE DANDY WARHOLS (TIM KERR RECORDS)

If-back when Saturday morning cartoons were worth waking up for-The Dandy Warhols had had their own Saturday morning show, they would have jumped channels, beat the stuffing out of the Banana Splitz, stolen their instruments, shot smack and conquered the world with their rock 'n' roll pop-danger. In case you've been under an indie rock lately, be informed that the Warhols' dangerpop is currently is exciting hysteria on two continents, as the group have arrived from outer-space to terrorize Earth's children with polyurethane-smooth harmonies and diamond-edged hooks.

The first outstanding single from the



band's self-titled debut on Tim Kerr Records is "The Dandy Warhol's T.V. Theme Song," a sonic pop joyride in Stereolab's car-jacked Pacer-X. "Lou Weed," a purposely deriviative Velvet-y offering, comes complete with way-gone vibey flutes, bouncy harmonies and frontman Courtney Taylor's best imitation of a younger Mr. Reed. Taylor's physical resemblance to Keith Reld is musically manifested in "Grunge Betty," which throws the same kind of chops, kicks and punches as the Yardbirds' live rendition of "Train Kept a Rollin'." The Dandy Warhols are not in the least afraid to hegemonically wear their influences on their chelsea boots. When you've been inspired by the best of 1960's freak-beat and 1990's indie Brit-pop, there's only one way to go: Straight to the top. -ERIC SHEA

PELL MELL INTERSTATE (DGC)

The two lane blacktop: endless, rolling expanses of asphalt melting into the horizon, waves of heat hovering over its faded surface. The open road has long been haven, literary inspiration and stomping ground for such legendary nomadic icons as Steinbeck, Kerouac and Hunter S. Thompson. The also-legendary, somewhatnomadic Pell Mell have resurfaced after a several-year abscence to beckon a new generation of mobile laureates, enticing them to hit the road with this made-for-driving-across-America sonic journey. Interstate hits the freeway full throttle, burning high octane and running the supercharger into the red. The ghosts of Link Wray and Dick Dale haunt these tracks, while six strings, meaty organ and driving rhythms leave nothing behind but loose, flying gravel and the faint stench of smouldering rubber. "Nothing Lies Still Long" is full of road-rash twang and and tarmacencrusted rhythms-inland surf music at its glorious best. "Revival," propelled by chugging bass, hearty organ fills, shuffling drums and crystalline twang, is one damn fine, extremely infectious tune. Logged in the middle of the album, "Blacktop" is the symbolic seventh track, a magnum opus that becomes a celebration of life. Filled with noize-enchanced voices and superior guitar licks, it conjures up bitters veet images from films like Easy Rider and Fandango. Pell Mell have crafted a minor masterpiece. Interstate 's 12 tracks of pure instrumental finesse provide quintessential accompaniment for your next existential long-haul through the heartland. -SPENCEDOOKEY


VARIOUS ARTISTS MUSIC FOR A BACHELOR'S DEN (DCC COMPACT CLASSICS, 8300 TAMPA AVENUE, NORTHRIDGE, CA 91324)

The cover boasts "15 seductive selections," and Combustible Edison and Esquivel fans will gobble this up like

fondue. Setting has always played an important role in music. The blues makes you think of the Mississippi delta, rap, of pulsing inner city streets, and '50s and '60s popular music brings the image of suburban bachelor dens. Terry Snyder's "Once in a While" entwines cha cha percussion, a muted xylophone and blustery horns to shift from leisurely to takecharge mode. Morris Stoloff's "Moonglow and Love Theme from Picnic" features an amazing bass/piano combo walking over shuffling rhythm, and George Shearing's "Medley: As Long as I Live/Let's Live Again" follows the same trail while adding strings. One of the two vocal tracks is Linda Lawson's sultry "Like Young." Her husky voice transforms the words "Love, soft as April snow/Love, warm as candle glow" into jewels of ardor. Check out the Esquivelian organ on the John Buzon Trio's rendition of "Ill Wind," Arthur Lyman's soothing "Yellow Bird" and the wondrous sweep of Victor Young's Studio Orchestra's "Around The World." If you take refuge in space age instrumentals, this is not to be missed. —DAVID BERAN

GUO YE AND JOJI HIROTA RED RIBBON (SHANACHIE, 37 E. CLINTON ST., NEWTON, NJ 07860)

Flute + percussion = Discovery. Working with this principle, Hirota and Ye have created the emotional equivalent of a time tunnel, an instrumental vehicle to explore that strange dimension where awareness surrenders to vulnerability and uncomprehension. Big subjects and big ideas are the focus of Red Ribbon-seasons passing, friends leaving, the earth orbiting, birds soaring-and the duo's language is beautiful, wild and intoxicating. Ye and Hirota provide a musical free zone where our reactions are limitless; our senses alternately experience the record bit by bit, try to grapple with the whole piece, or just hang. Audio yoga...very peaceful, but I was always kinda questioning and alert. Ye's ultra subtle manipulations of breath, armbriature, and fingering coax just about everything out of the Chinese flute you could hope forlow, somber notes for meditative states, shrill icy notes, and thousands of tricks in between. Hirota, (a Japanese William Hooker if there ever was one) calls up a mighty muse of his own to produce complex symphonies of whispery bells and cymbals that develop into propulsive, mongol drum-horde thrills. Each man perfectly senses the other's destination. Put Ribbon on, man, and a magic carpet of tones and moods sweeps you away to fog-enshrouded ancient temples on piny mountain slopes where clouds smile and the rivers laugh...very very OUT THERE. —ALAN LOWE



COLLEGE/ALTERNATIVE SPECIAL ISSUE



College radio's music programming varies widely from station to station. Accordingly, different stations' music departments decide what records to program using quite divergent methods. To help clear up some of the confusion, we've asked each GAVIN college music director to outline his/her station's programming policies. Following are the responses—some earnest, some facetious, all somewhat informative:

WUJC-Cleveland, Russell Moenich, MD

"Jimmy and I get together in the Sound Lounge every Sunday night with some lemonade and listen to all the new records and figure what's objectively the coolest. Those cool records are put into a pushbox and then the kids play them. It's an amazing process if you think about it—so efficient and economical."

KCWR-Santa Monica, Tricia Halloran, MD

"At KCRW the MD reviews every record him/herself and decides whether or not it should become part of the library. Every new recording stays in the 'new adds' section for six weeks. DJs are responsible for reviewing the new adds, and they tend to play those frequently. There is no controlled rotation; DJs can play whatever they choose. Weekly playlists are created by tallying the plays library records have received."

KJHK-Lawrence, Jenn Ruf, MD "This semester we started a legitimate music review staff (six jocks, the PD and MD, who meet at a set time once a week). Each one of them reviews four to five CDs each week. We listen to the music and vote as a group which ones we think are worthy of adding. If there is a tie, the MD's vote weighs more. I generally do not have to wait for the group's approval to add something, so the most 'important' releases can be added as soon as possible. [Rotation] logs are based on a tempo system. Each track on each release we add is categorized into one of three tempos. DJs can choose any track on any CD that's the tempo the log requires. Some of the releases we don't add are put into the library, while others are not."

WCBN-Ann Arbor, Brendan M. Gillen, MD

"Here at WCBN, Home of the Hits™, the music director and his assistant open and listen to all received music. We also instantaneously recycle all bios and deface all glossy pictures included in said packages. From there, our patented 'Bull Shit Alert System©' helps us do a basic add/not add sort. From there all adds (up to 150) are brought to our Monday Night Record Review Party. About 15-25 DJs and staffers attend. They take the music home for a week, write up a brief critique that alerts DJs to FCC violations and tricky things about tracks like false endings, etc. The notadded records get looked over by our review staff and are generally mocked once a month. When the record is brought back from review it is processed, genrefied and placed in our new bin where it stays for about eight weeks. I post 'good new stuff' lists and DJs program their own shows. I try to point out good records to people and steer people toward records I know they would like." WXYC-Chapel Hill, Franz Kunst and Spott Philpott, MDs

"A lot of the crap we receive gets weeded out ('ka-ching') early on in the process by the music staff. All DJs are encouraged to review CDs, but a big chunk of the burden falls on our central music staff. We also make a strong effort to buy artists that don't send promos. About 130 things are in rotation at one time (a lot more new stuff in 'new vinyl,' as dubbed by Glenn Booth, though most of it is not vinyl anymore). Heavy gets played about seven to 23 times a week, Medium five to 13, Light three to ten, Singles three to ten. The MD makes the initial decision on where the CD is placed with further adjustments possible with DJ input. The DJ has a large amount of choice [about what to play, but there are] strange and mysterious built-in catches to make sure that the good stuff people wouldn't normally gravitate to isn't overlooked. I could go on, but the system isn't all that simple. Our musical philosophy, however, is: We play music that is good. we don't limit ourselves or our listeners to what some might call 'alternative' music '

KVRX-Austin, Andrew Magilow, MD "All music that is sent to the station is opened and logged into the database. Every record goes through the reviewing process whereby our special agent record review volunteers go undercover, check out materials for seven



to ten days, and listen for good stuff and naughty words. Upon return, the music directors are debriefed and listen to all records (briefly) and decide whether

the album goes into rotation or directly into the library. Those records in rotation have the ability to chart."

WUSC-Columbia, Eric Greenwood, MD

"The music director at WUSC reviews most of the records with a small percentage of the staff helping out. The music director decides what goes into rotation but welcomes the staff's input. Records in the A bin get played more than records in the B bin, which get played more than records in the C bin. There is no D bin. New music = 50 percent of a show: eight A's, seven B's, five C's."

KFJC-Los Altos Hill, Acerbic Alan Lowe, MD

"At KFJC, the music director (and sometimes the assistant MD) listens to all music serviced to the station. Acceptable music/sound/noise/spoken word is then passed on to suitable members of the review staff who have a week to prepare comments for the station. Air staff who can't stand a particular release can 'talk to me about it' and we know how THAT goes. Records are tracked for eight weeks. [Jocks abide by a] simple requirement of 35 percent current (material added in the last eight weeks) per airshift. Aside from this stipulation there is NO rotation. Our programming philosophy: call in sick, phone off the hook, tune TV to test pattern, forget everything you ever knew about 'melody' or 'hooks' and just lose yourself in a holographic maelstrom of 14/3 jazz times, detuned feedback dulcimers, 60 minute drone freakouts...we never close, we can't, movin' too fast, man..

WDCR-Hanover, Jenn Sekelsky and Jacob Waldman, MDs

"The MDs review all music (although we may not both listen to everything). Questionable releases are played for the DJs who come to our 'listening sessions,' where they get to vote. Anything added to new music gets put on a special shelf. DJs

must play five new songs an hour." KDVS-Davis, Aaron Tassano and Kevin Rafter, MDs

"Either Kevin or I listen to a release and decides 'yes' or 'no.' If yes, then the record goes into the current stacks for three months. If no, we add them to the ceiling mirror above my bed. Because we are a freeform station, we tabulate the current records' plays for the week and make our chart from that tabulation. We have approximately 250 CDs, 150 7"s and 75 LPs in current rotation."

WFMU-East Orange, Robin Edgerton, MD

"We receive thousands and thousands of recordings. The MD decides what goes into the new bin with the assistance of a few DJs and the assistant MD. If a DJ asks for a recording, it automatically goes in. New bin CDs are available to DJs for a month, then they go into the library." **WVXU-Cincinnatti, Mike Boberg,**

MD

"At WVXU, I generally review 90 percent of all CDs that come in for A3 and Alternative. The other 10 percent are reviewed by a handful of trustworthy volunteer jocks that are into music. Generally, I review the entire CD and target all songs on the disc that work for our rotation. CDs are them split into two categories: Light, which is comprised mostly of advance singles, 7"s and weaker material, and Heavy, which is comprised of strong releases with at least three to five cuts targeted for airplay. Jocks are required to choose and play seven Heavy and two Light cuts per hour. They then fill up the hour with material they choose from the library. Heavies get spun five to seven times a week, mediums three and lights one to two. Records usually stay in rotation for two to four months. Material that has never been added goes into the library or is filed in garbage stuff. This stuff is used during fund-drive, for giveaways or is put in storage. We do not play anything with foul language or questionable content. Our license is held by Jesuits, so we not only answer to the FCC, we answer to God."

WPRK-Winter Park, Lisa Blanning, MD

"We add almost everything. The MD chooses CDs for a special section called



rotation, and new DJs must choose from rotation for new release requirements. [All experienced DJs have full freedom of choice of new material]. DJs must play eight new releases an

hour, six indie releases an hour and two local band cuts per show."

WVFS-Tallahassee, Rhea Patton, Czarina

"Dictatorship! What I say goes! No, really, the music staff and the MD decide what CDs go into rotation. The MD does have final say (and the music staffers buy me lots of gifts). A rotation is 20 to 26 spins a week; B is ten to 17 spins a week."

KUSF-San Francisco, Jim Heffernan, MD

"At KUSF the MD reviews every record. [Whether or not a record is added] depends on his own subjective and selfcentered opinion. Music meetings are held weekly to give the staff the illusion of having input. All new adds are placed in a currents section where they remain for two months or until stolen. DJs must play seven current an hour (or two currents followed by a long-winded rant on how worthless the MD is)."

WUSB-Stony Brook, Erika Tooker, MD

"Basically, if a record is received by us, we put it out for play. As far as reviewing-that is a shared task. After that, DJs pretty much pick out what they want to play. We keep a review book in the control booth where DJs pretty much battle egos over whether a record does or does not suck."

WRAS-Atlanta, Dusty and Anni, MDs

"At WRAS, two music directors review CDs all week and allow the DJs in the music department to review them too. We all meet at our weekly music meetings and show 'n' tell what makes our ears flap, ya know? Then, Dusty and Anni narrow 'em down to approximately the ten best and decide what rotation to put 'em in. We desperately like great bands that no one knows about yet! Heavy = 30 spins, Medium = 15, Light = 9.

WWVU-Morgantown, Christy Stevenson, MD

"We log everything we receive in the mail, file it in order into the music desk, then distribute three to five CDs to each of our three assistants at the beginning and the end of each week. The MD listens to the remainder and makes any final decision in the event of [departmental] indecisiveness. We do have a strict rotation that jocks follow in this manner: choose from the first three to five records in the Hots, the first five to seven in the Mediums, the first seven to 12 in Lite, and 12 to 17 deep in recurrent and golden recurrent. We spin four Hots, three Mediums, two Lite, two recurrent, two golden recurrent and two DJ choices in one hour. We do not play songs that...we think maybe offensive to our audience. We only play advance singles of highly-anticipated releases. We now also play 7"s and keep them in Lite for about four weeks. If a release is extremely noisy, loud or bizarre, our audience doesn't always receive it well so we may test it or give it to a specialty show. The PD has no say into music and all questions should be directed to Christy Stevenson MWF 2:30 to 4:00 p.m."

WVKR-Poughkeepsie, Ben Goldberg, MD

"At WVKR we have a listening session

with DJs on Wednesday afternoon. Whatever people like-provided it's not being played to death somewhere elsewe put on our playlist (everyone chooses five an hour to play). There are a few simple guidelines: 1) No funky bass, 2) No breasts on the cover (AmRep releases excluded), 3) No Big Star influence, 4) No 'it sounds like Rage Against the Machine meets ____ (see number one),' 5) Frown on fancy mailing packages."

KWBU-Waco, Brooks Grigson, MD "The MD decides on all the music. Rotation is based on this system: There are three types of currents, Blue (lots of different bands), Black (very popular bands—Pearl Jam, etc.), and Red (really cool new stuff). Blues number about 35 to 55, Black about 20+, and Red includes five to seven records. All music is screened for lyrics because we're the largest Baptist university in the world." **KTRU-Houston, Jeff S., MD** "KTRU is pretty egalitarian when it comes to deciding what gets played. Incoming records—after a quick review by the MDs-are available for the DJs to check out and review. They look over them, review them, give their opinion on what should happen to the record, and return them. The music department takes that opinion into consideration and makes the decision. Usually, if anybody likes something, it goes into rotation. The MDsbeing DJs as well—also review, usually more than the regular DJs because they get first pick of incoming releases. Once in rotation (called playlist), DJs are able to choose from approximately 200 things to play for the playlist requirement (about one-third of their shift). This system insures that what we play isn't just the MDs' favorites but reflects staff's taste as a whole."

KSJS-San Jose, Sharon Jennings, MD

"At KSJS the MD previews every CD herself and decides whether or not it should go out for review by her music staff. The CDs usually have a one week turn-around for an informed review. The MD then listens to the CD, taking into account the recommendation of the reviewer, then decides whether or not it should go into rotation. Heavy rotation records typically get about two plays a day, Medium rotation gets at least one play a day, and light gets two to three plays per week." WMSV-Mississippi State, James Martin, MD

"I have a staff of eight, and we review everything that comes in. Anything questionable is handled by committee. I personally review all adds and most debut releases. Everything passes through the new music bin first, then gets a tryout in Medium rotation-where it's sink or swim time. Everything then gets spins based on DJ-play and audience response—the releases have got to make it on their own merit. [Whether a record gets a] Light, Medium or Heavy (report) isn't chosen by

anyone—the spins decide." WDBM-East Lansing, Chris Brunt, MD


"WDBM follows a strict rotation system for its daily 18 hours of alternative music programming. CDs in Heavy rotation spin consistently four times a day, Medium two times and light one time. We play about 60 percent current, 20 percent recurrent, 10 percent gold and 10 percent requests per hour. We follow a tight rotation to keep continuity through airshifts—a difficult task at a station with 45 jocks with diverse backgrounds on the air weekly. Where a CD is placed is decided on a case-by-case basis. The music department determines whether an artist can stand on its own or whether it must be nurtured through rotation. A Pearl Jam automatically goes into Heavy, a Melissa Ferrick starts in Light and builds, perhaps over a three to four month period. If WDBM is going to play a new artist, we are determined to develop and nurture that artist." KUNV-Las Vegas, Ian Scott, MD "The MD listens to all records and then decides on the rotation of each record. If a staff member or the PD disagrees, then that staff member can appeal at the music meeting. All records in A rotation get two to three plays per day, all records in B get one to two plays per day. Some records go directly into the library."

WSMU-North Dartmouth, Lee Berman, MD

"The MD reviews the music-and consults staff members/DJs if the MD thinks it sucks or somebody will play it-and puts it into rotation for three months. Then it hits the library."

WTUL-New Orleans, Anthony DelRosario, MD

"WTUL has four people overseeing different genres of music. Lenny Bertrand takes care of jazz, Jeff B is head of rap/hiphop. The specialty music director, Brian Hart, oversees world, blues, folk, classical and country. Shepard Samuels has been doing the reggae show for more than 15



of 'new,' 'alternative' whatever music. I review about 70 percent of the CDs and about 95 percent of the 7"s. A handful of DJs also review. About 30 or 40 percent of what comes into the sta-

tion actually gets put into rotation or into the library. As far as rotation goes, every Sunday night I gather the previous week's playlist and count the number of plays for the new releases ('merits'). I determine Heavy/Medium. Light by the number of plays the release received during the previous week. We have 80+ hours of 'new' music (non-specialty shows) during which DJs must play four merits per hour. Releases stay in rotation at least ten weeks."

KCOU-Columbia, Lisa Morgan, MD

"When material arrives, the music directors review as much as possible. KCOU puts all records deemed interesting into an eight-week format. This includes-but is not limited to-college alternative, international, hip-hop, jazz, country, etc. The first four weeks a record is B (for Brand New). The last four weeks a record is A (for Almost New). DJs are required to play three records an hour from each category. Although KCOU does support and add vinyl 7"s into format, we DO NOT add CD singles. All records not added to format are labeled and shelved." KUGS-Bellingham, Bryan Ritter MD

"Every record that comes into KUGS is listened to by Bryan Ritter, our music



Ddrector. Sometimes very nice people help me out; they ask for free crap for their time. Nothing stays on my desk for more than two weeks. KUGS is proud to program good music, regardless of major/indie status. DJ input is encouraged and welcomed. Rotation is as follows: Top twenty records

receive three plays per hour (i.e. jocks must choose three of these records during each hour on the air). Heavy records receive one play per hour (there are 20 of those as well). Jocks must play one medium rotation disc per hour (there are 40 of these), and Adventure Picks are eligible for one play per hour (out of 40 such albums). Gold section = really cool albums that are five years and older. Core section = the 'core' sound of the station. These records are cool albums that are older than recurrent status but younger than gold status."

WUVT-Blacksburg, Wes Lang, MD

"Here at WUVT we have a large staff to sort through a lot of the muck. The MD has final say about what goes into rotation. Things stay in for about two months."

KXLU-Los Angeles, Jimmy Tamborello, MD

"At KXLU the MD listens to everything, and the releases considered good enough are put in a special new adds sectionwhere they stay for four weeks. A DJ can play anything he/she wants, but they usually stress the new adds. After four weeks the albums are filed in the normal library."

KFSR-Fresno, Melinda Hsu, MD

"I listen to everything. Sporadically, someone will assist me, but mainly I do it. I like recommendations, but most DJs don't give me any. A DJ is required to play ten cuts from the playlist per hour-one local band, one new vinyl, one 'massive' (out of ten) and seven others from the 150 CDs on the playlist." •

Doubting Thomases beware: Radiohead are real. Put your hands in their wounds and feel a band struggling with success in a world that sees them as "Creeps" and one-hit-wonders. Frontman Thom Yorke struggles to explain the band's persecution, crucifixion and their emotional resurrection to Gavin's Linda Ryan.

The one thing that becomes eminently clear during my conversation with Radiohead's singer and frontman Thom Yorke, is his mistrust of the media. And who could blame him? In Britain, the music press have lumped him in with emotionally unstable musicians like Nirvana's Kurt Cobain and Richey from The Manic Street Preachers—a pigeonhole that Yorke clearly finds offensive.

"They're like, 'Oh, that poor Thom geezer. He's troubled and fucked up and obviously going down the same road.' They're talking about these depressed pop stars, and my name keeps coming up. And it's like, 'Uh, hold on. I write this stuff to actually deal with it.' And what really bothers me, is that you can go through a whole article without once reading anything about the music."

America hasn't been much kinder to the band either. After initially spurring on Radiohead's phenomenal success, radio programmers looking for a follow-up single quickly labeled them one-hit-wonders.

" 'Creep' wasn't dying, was it?" Yorke muses. "It didn't matter what song we came out with next 'cos they weren't going to play it."

And everywhere, Radiohead was so strongly identified with "Creep," it made Thom and the rest of Radiohead—brothers Colin and Johnny Greenwood, Ed O'Brien and Phil Selway—re-evaluate their standing as a band.

"Everything that I'd understood to be all the trappings of fame were presented to us because of that one little song," he says. "At one point, we felt like we were a jukebox, existing only for it. But I think more than anything else, the biggest problem I had with the success of 'Creep' was that it forevermore defined how people were going to see me, the most famous creep ever. It was hilariously funny, and at the same time, quite embarrassing.

"It was a real head-fuck," he continues, "Because up until that point, I was just a guy who wrote songs in his bedroom. I was aware that something else might happen but I thought, 'Right. I'll be able to deal with it.' And then you sort of panic when you realize that you can't control it anymore. It made me realize that to be a star—or whatever—you basically just have to fulfill the role that the media has chosen for you.

"And if you just feed that myth, you can exist forever on that one song. We couldn't do that," he insists, "and I couldn't



write that song again even if I wanted to. It made us extremely cynical and not want to make another record for a long time."

Which helps explain the long gap between Pablo Honey and the band's latest, The Bends—a darker, more mature effort than its predecessor.


Yorke agrees that this album is darker and more troubled than *Pablo Honey*, and says that making it was a "finding yourself" sort of journey.

"There was a long period of time

where we, as a band, had to figure out who we were and what we wanted to do with all this malarkey," he explains. "In Britain, you either appear with an agenda or you disappear very quickly. It's very difficult to exist and be open about the fact that you're learning. To say the album is more mature...let's just say it's a start to what we're doing. It showed us how prepared we were to go all out for each song, which was a real revelation to us."

He continues, "We feel like we're pretty much starting from scratch with this album. We have no idea whether the people who bought *Pablo Honey* are going to be there for us this time out, but we're quite proud of this album. After we finished recording it, that sense of panic—that I couldn't control my life anymore—lifted. I knew I was going to be the person I was before it all started—that guy writing songs in his bedroom."

And with songs like the achingly bittersweet beauty "High And Dry" and the moody "Planet Telex," as well as rockers like "The Bends," "Bones" and "Just,"—all of which could be singles—Radiohead have redefined, and in fact, rejuvenated themselves. Certainly, they have proven to all doubting Thomas' that they are a true force to be reckoned with. Perhaps Thom Yorke sums it up best: "If you ignore us now, you're going to feel bloody stupid later." •

With their third album out shortly and a scorching single currently burning up the airwaves, things are looking rosey for Catherine Wheel. Singer/frontman Rob Dickinson puts his best foot forward, and stops to smell the roses with Gavin's Linda Ryan.

It could be argued that Catherine Wheel like to do things the hard way. In 1991, the band did the unheard of: As an unknown band with a debut album (Ferment), they released the blistering epic "Black Metallic" as a single-all seven-minutes of it. Programmers couldn't resist the song, and alternative radio got its very first "Stairway To Heaven." 1993 saw the release of the band's follow-up album, Chrome. And when many English bands were running for cover in the wake of Nirvana's Nevermind. Catherine Wheel toured America not once, but twice-and held their own, thank you very much.

With the release of the band's third album, *Happy Days*, one can't help but

wonder how much longer Catherine Wheel can push its luck. After a brief listen to the album, however, there's only one conclusion to be reached: Luck isn't going to have anything to do with the success that is sure to follow. *Happy Days* is a more cohesive, confident album. It's first

single, "Waydown," rocks!

Frontman Rob Dickinson laughs when I tell him I thought I was given a copy of his cousin's tape—former Iron Maiden singer Bruce Dickinson—by mistake.

"A lot of how this record is comes from my confi-

dence and my willingness to be the singer, which certainly wasn't the case with the first album," says the drummerturned-frontman. "Every time we make an album we tour, and by the time that tour is over, we're a different band. The main goal with this album was to capture how the band is live—our harder, more aggressive side.

"There's a lot less obscurity on Happy Days. The songs are very direct; they say a certain thing and get straight to the point. I felt there was a need for the band to sort of nail its colors to the wall; to stand up and be counted."

And the band—Dickinson, guitarist

Brian Futter, drummer Neil Sims and bassist Dave Hawes truly have, as Dickinson suggests, nailed their colors to the wall. There's no doubt that with this release, they will have come through the English music backlash remarkably



unscathed. Not too shabby for a band that, back in 1991, was labeled 'shoegazers.'

"I think Rock And Roll should represent the people making it. It should change. If you don't change as a person, you're pretty strange. I don't want to use the word 'maturing,' " he laughs, " 'Cos I don't know whether we're maturing or digressing. But we are changing."

Dickinson feels, and rightly so, that Happy Days is the band's finest effort to date. He even calls it their "first great record." There are, he believes, five or six songs on the album that could easily be singles. "If we're lucky," he says knowing from experience how difficult it is to get a follow-up single played on commercial alternative radio, "we'll get to release two or three."

The first single to hit radio is the blistering, "Waydown." It's a markedly different sound for the band, and perhaps an odd choice for the first single.

"There was some pressure to release 'Judy Staring At The Sun' (his duet with Belly's Tanya Donnelly) first," he concedes, "but personal pride wanted to get a song out that reflected the more current side of the band. 'Waydown' sums up the more extreme sound of the band succinctly—it's the most succinct song on the album.

"I think we're making reasonably contemporary music," he offers without a hint of sarcasm. "I don't know where we fit into things at the moment—we're not Blur or The Stone Roses or grunge. But I've never been so confident with a record we've made, and nothing's going to deflect us."

Dickinson and company have every right to feel confident with the material on Happy Days; with songs like "Little Muscle," "Shocking," and the epic "Eat My Dust You Insensitive Fuck" as well as "Waydown" and the sure-to-be second single, "Judy Staring At The Sun," Catherine Wheel have delivered the album of their career. ●



The other new hat trick belongs to **Boyz II Men**'s "Water Runs Dry" which, by nature of its debut in A/C at #35, has 341 players, including 170 Top 40s.



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



JAZZ/ADULT ALTERNATIVE

DAN SIEGEL HEMISPHERES (PLAYFUL/SUNSET BLVD.)

Smooth, meditative or atmospheric, keyboardist Dan Siegel's latest, appropriately entitled Hemispheres, is a worldly collection well worth A2's attention. Whether it be the pastoral "Sanctuary" or the light, tropical "Savanna," Siegel's rolling melodies and tempos will pacify the most stressed-out listener. Designed to include several musical influences from around the globe (Japanese, Brazilian, Latin, Western pop and jazz), Siegel's strength this time around is as a bandleader, and he utilizes some intriguing talent combinations. Rick Braun and Boney James perform a tight duet on "Savanna." Guitarists Richard Smith and Ottmar Liebert handle the electric and acoustic guitar parts respectively on "El Nino" while another respected guitarist, Peter White, fills in on accordion. "Homeland" highlights Andy Narell and Bela Fleck and Braun appears on two other tunes, one with John Tesh's violinist Charlie Bisharat. Hemispheres. featuring a virtual A2 who's-who, should get plenty of airplay coverage as it moves up the GAVIN A2 chart.

ERNIE WATTS UNITY (JVC)

There's a singularity of purpose, feeling and passion intrinsic to Ernie Watts' tenor sax. It could be described as an honest confidence that inflects his tonally rich, melodically sincere approach to improvisation. He's also willing to walk the edge with faith that his chops will deliver him to a higher plane. Watts brings together an all-star cast featuring Geri Allen, Jack DeJohnette, Eddie Gomez and Steve Swallow for Unity, a CD that steps it up a notch from last year's Reaching Up. In "unity," Watts and company light up an eleven-song batch of hearty swing, lovely ballads and muscular modal workouts. Some highlights include "You Say You Care," "In Your Own Sweet Way," the bouncy "Tricotism" and "Joyous Reunion." Tender ballads like "Lonely Hearts" and "Soul Eves" reflect Watts' musical and personal idealism: creating harmony, unification and peace through music.—JASON OLAINE

NATIVE COLOURS ONE WORLD (CONCORD JAZZ)

Native Colours caught our eye immediately. Pianist Renee Rosnes made three fine records for Blue Note, and plays with force and sophistication. Ralph Moore's efforts on Denon and Milestone earned him enough respect to grab the coveted sax slot with the current *Tonight Show* band. Billy Drummond plays elegant swing patterns, and bassist Larry Genadier, who we used to see gigging around the Bay Area, has done well since moving to New York in 1991. Prior to cutting One World, this leaderless group finished one week at the Sweet Basil in New York City and have been together on and off since 1993. Native Colour's concept is handy; the group performs altruistically and creatively. "Freedom" is an introspective, often lingering, solo vehicle for Moore. Rosnes embellishes the composition by adding a driving piano bridge. We especially like "One World," a worldly, uptempo piece filled with ambitious melody lines played in unison by Moore and Rosnes, with plenty of jamming and mature rhythmic reinforcement.



HERBIE HANCOCK "BUTTERFLY" (MERCURY)

Ordinarily we'd wait a couple more weeks and review the whole album, but hey, Herbie Hancock hasn't put out a solo thing in over eight years. Dis Is Da Drum, in pre-release sampler form and in the tradition of the early Headhunters records, is over two years in the making. After living with the cassette for weeks, we find the more mellow tunes stand up well against the slamming jams, and "Butterfly" is just one example. Adult alternative radio is going to be competing with urban in grabbing the coolest stuff. Besides, this sampler is already charting, Herbie's back and he's hot.

VINCENT HERRING DON'T LET IT GO (MUSICMASTERS)

How long will this ironclad collaboration between Vincent Herring, Cyrus Chestnut and Carl Allen last? You'll have to tune in later to find out whether Chestnut and Allen's solo obligations will allow for future gigs with saxophonist Vincent Herring, but in the meantime, *Don't Let It Go* is Herring's most mature, seasoned release yet. The band comes out roasting on the title track and "Into The Midnight," as Herring graciously shares the spotlight with a young, talented trumpet player named Scott Wendholt. As much as one hates to roll out the early Coltrane lineups comparison, this group emits the same kind of youthful electricity and radiant confidence. Herring wrote some deep compositions, like "In The Shadow Of John Galt" and the searing title cut. For maximum swing appeal, jazz radio can rely on the swaying bass lines of "Big Bertha." Herring has a gigantic, charismatic sound and chooses his notes thoughtfully without sacrificing speed and force. Allen contributes powerful drumming (Elvin) and Chestnut some tasty chord clusters (McCoy). If you crave that fresh presentation of Trane's Village Vanguard sides, don't let Don't Let It Go go.

LENNY WHITE PRESENT TENSE (HIP BOP)

Here's a current favorite around the GAVIN compound. As a producer, Lenny White has become a jazz staple with his spontaneous Acoustic Masters sessions on Atlantic. Now A2 and maybe jazz radio can break bread with the old fusion style without having to fret over too much over edge. White's latest, Present Tense, has a bunch of great special guests. "Thick" packs some powerful solos from Michael Brecker on tenor sax. Other stars include Chick Corea, Kenny Garrett, Mulgrew Miller and Gil Goldstein. But wait. Before the smooth set heads for the door in terror, try punching up Chaka Khan's suave cameo on "Who Do You Love." White's bumping rhythms, with Marcus Miller on bass, is a fine backdrop to Chaka's ultra-soulful presence. White also sneaks in a fluid violin solo from Michal Urbaniak. If that's too in-your-face, try Sting's "Tea In The Sahara," another viable vocal performance. If you're looking for something to create a spike in your music flow, give Present Tense, with its redux '70s sounds, a fair shot. SLIM MAN

END OF THE RAINBOW (GES)

Slim Man, a one man studio band in the form of bass, keyboards and percussion, puts out an independent release and gets airplay from all the major A2 stations. The format is starved for quality male vocals, and with the Slim Man's Sade/late-Marvin Gaye/"Sexual Healing" ambiance fits right in the pocket. Saxophonist David Rhen adds a romantic afterglow to tracks like "Let's Start Over," "Shelter From A Storm" and "Should've Been Me." In fact, we love those little James Bond theme chord changes in "Faith In Us." The Slim Man could make all the female listeners go wild with his smoldering, vulnerable approach. File under non-Quiet Storm pillow talk. If we were a major label, we'd be checking this dude out.

I still listen to Top 40 radio. In fact, I try to utilize (pop song structures) in all my music—a typical four-, eightbar intro, a verse, a bridge and some kind of hook. My second love is Latin jazz, so I tried to include that too."

OTHER INSTRUMENTS:

"I've been playing some Latin jazz bass lately. It's really been fun. I guess every musician wants to play another instrument other than their own. I still have a drum set in my home. I don't care what gig it is, if anyone needs a drummer, I'd just do it to play. The drums were my first love."

WRITING TUNES: "I base my compositions off the first rhythm I throw down on my computer or drum box. I hear the drum, then I play to it. Even though I'm a guitar player, I write from the keyboard. I'm able to visualize the music a lot easier—left hand bass, chords and melody on the right."

There's lots of good music out their but if you're into the extremely heavy stuff look out for Phantasm on Monsterdisc Records, it's very cool... Keep it hard until next week and remember that if you see a blind guy swinging his seeing eye dog over his head don't panic, he's just having a look around.

New Releases Gwen mars Magnosheen (Hollywood)

I've always been a sucker for rockin' bands with a psychedelic edge. The second I heard "Cosmic Dick," the first single from Gwen Mars' magnificent debut album, I was completely hooked. The Los Angeles-based trio deliver a blistering array of tantalizing tunes that generously showcase dripping guitar hooks, dominant bass lines, crashing drums and crystallized vocals that lure you into a state of bliss. If "Cosmic Dick" accommodates your playlist, then I suggest you explore deeper into the realms of Magnosheen where you'll be teased by terminal licks from "Control," "Ruined" and "Heal Me." Gwen Mars (Mike Thrasher, guitars/vocals; John Boutin, drums; Matt Westfield) have an alternative slant but they offer such an infectious sound that it would be unjust not to give your listeners a taste. Other tracks that I found myself completely attached to include "Fisher King," "Ticket To Mars," "Play Dead," "Stick B." and "Stuck To The Sun."

THE NIXONS Foma (MCA)

Bare bones rock n' roll comes to you in the form of The Nixons, courtesy of MCA Records. Foma is heavy, hip and so harmoniously addictive that it will burst through crossover checkpoints and hold the alternative and rock formats hostage. I've been secretly listening to the advanced copy of Foma since February and have a strong attraction to all 13. Call me a rock slut but the vigorous guitar hooks and hip rhythm section call to me like a fabled siren. The first track, "Foma," is the focus track for rock radio (it's also the title of the album) but the street date for the full-length is due May 23. The Nixons (Zac Malov, vocals/guitar; Jesse Davis, guitar; Ricky Brooks, bass; John Humphrey, drums) will impress those who are into contemporary rock n' roll. Before you metal directors dismiss this as another soft release being thrown at metal radio check out "Head," "Smile," "Sweet Beyond," "Fellowship" and "Blind." Just for the record, "Sister" will be the next huge alternative/rock hit.

PHANTASM The Abominable (Monster Drive/Death Trap/Monster Disc)

Some of my favorite dinner topics are dismemberment, necrophilia, cannibalism and the occult, so it's no wonder I'm completely enthralled with Phantasm. These imaginative musicians hail from Milwaukee and deliver a coarse lesson on the art of expressing your demented desires through piercing guitar grinds, howling vocal yells, haunting bass lines and careening drums. If you pride yourself on playing the ultimate in evil death music you'd be crazy to pass this one up, especially if you're broadcasting from a Catholic school. The Abominable contains eight mind numbing tracks that will send chills through the most ardent death metal listeners. From the blistering, nightmarish slams of "Breeders Of Hatred" to the lower than low hooks of "Sewed Back To Life," Phantasm offers truly aggressive death metalbe it speedy or just crunchy hooks. The tracks average out to be about seven minutes long with the exception of their Yarbirds cover, "For Your Love," which is only three minutes long (definitely check this out, it's total laughs), so you might have time to make crank calls between tracks. I'm not the biggest fan of death metal, but I'm now an official fan of Phantasm.

GREEN APPLE QUICK STEP Reloaded Sampler

(Medicine/Giant)

Great rock 'n' roll loaded with hip swaying licks is what you'll find on Green Apple Quick Step's 3-song teaser. It's cruel but until the fulllength, Reloaded, is available, this is all you're gonna get. The single blasts off with the groove-riddled guitar hooks of "Los Vargos," which features upbeat rhythmic slams that seem to last longer than Trident. Also included are "Ed #5" which contains quality riffage and the melodic, slow-paced chords of "Underwater." This is another release that straddles the fence between alternative and hard rock, but if you're into good music and it fits your show's style don't be chincy with the spins.

CATHERINE WHEEL "Waydown"

(Mercury)

Armed with crunchy guitars, fullblown bass lines, crashing drums and volatile vocals are Catherine Wheel with their latest single, "Waydown." In the past, this band has been billed as alternative, but they've turned the aggressive meter up just enough to merit spins at rock radio. "Waydown" is taken from their upcoming full-length, Happy Days, which is going for adds on June 5/6. The lines between alternative and rock formats are blurred by Catherine Wheel's aggressive approach to pop music but it shouldn't prevent anyone from playing it. If it works play it. Don't be marred by what is and what isn't metal.

The Lund Letter

P. D. RESPONSIBILITIES

Part 8

oday's Program Director has many responsibilities, from overseeing program basics to helping the sales department. John Lund offers these areas that concern the P.D. And you thought you had enough to do!

Station Formatics The Program Director:

Implements formatics present at great stations with regard to the "Stationality" — that which makes

the station unique.
Creates and manages the format and all pertinent programming elements including formatics,

"basics", music, talent, special and syndicated programs, image and marketing, on-air and off-air promotions, information, etc.

* Designs and fine-tunes programming using available research, competitive marketing fluctuations, and revenue goals of management and ownership.

Helps talent utilize the station's established "basics" and rules.
 When mistakes occur, the P.D. notifies talents personally and takes responsibility that all problems are eliminated.

Writes numerous "listener usage liners" for talent delivery that teach listeners how to better "use" the station at work, in the car, over the weekend, etc.

* Schedules specific formatic positioning liners at certain times in the hour.

* Keeps the station fresh-sounding; live liners and recorded promos should be updated at least twice a week.

Monitors programming every day on the station, including full time and part time talents, syndicated and network programming.
Helps all talents sound "up" and pumped for their air shifts, including hitting the call letters/station name, reading liner cards & positioning statements, back-selling, front-selling and recycling when called for on the clock.

* Keeps a close ear on the burn factor which involves everything including liners/promos, music, and talent bits, and thus maintains a fresh sound.

Management Responsibilities for Programming

* Know your station goals. The purpose of great programming is to get the largest audience that can be sold at the highest rate for the greatest profit to provide the company a return on its investment.

Make sales calls. Go out with an account executive at least once a week to meet with clients and get a "real world" perspective on programming. Contribute to the service orientation of station.

* Offer creative ideas to enhance sales. Remember that "Value Added" does not necessarily mean free spots or a sales promotion. It means the client attains an extra value for the ad investment, and that could mean a personal appearance, merchandising, special signage, a contest giveaway at a remote, free mention in station advertising, a talent endorsement,




etc.

At the moment the group can only claim two megasmash ballads, but that's about to change

ROD STEWART Leave Virginia Alone

(Warner Bros.) It's pretty tough to miss the mark when Tom Petty's writing combines with Rod Stewart's vocalizing. Top 40, A/C and A3 stations guarantee it'll reach a wide audience, allowing Rod to slam his first home run of '95. EAGLES

Learn To Be Still (Geffen)

Even in a week filled with a lot of new releases, this third single from Hell Freezes Over doesn't haven't to take a back seat. Airplay has been steadily building for the past month. Immediate audience response has been reported. JORDAN HILL **Remember Me This Way**

(MCA) Here's another David

Foster production. This one comes from the soundtrack of the new Spielberg film, Casper, which opens later this month. Families will flock to see the picture, and they'll be touched by this tender ballad. NELSON

(You Got Me) All Shook Up (DGC)

Overdue is an understatement, as Matthew and Gunnar issue their first piece of new music in four years. Aiming straight down the middle with their totally pop sound, Nelson should get a warm welcome back from mainstream Top 40 programmers.

CROSSOVER PICK CLETD ESCOBEDO If You Had A Clue (Virgin)

This song is getting thirty spins at KRRG-Laredo, Texas, plus significant play at KOIZ-Amarillo and Hot 97.7 (KHQT)-San Jose. Don't be surprised to hear the buzz get louder on this very cool entry by Escobedo, who is also Paula Abdul's saxophonist.

Albums

M PEOPLE Bizarre Fruit (Epic)

Powerful, passionate and fun are just some of the adjectives that describe M People's latest album, Bizarre Fruit. Lead singer Heather Small's vocals pack a one-two punch-they're crisp and compelling. Bandmates Mike Pickering, Paul Heard and Shovel provide the music that brings M People to life. The uplifting "Open Your Heart" is now out at Top 40. The gem on this project is the midtempo and introspective "Search For the Hero," a song that might eventually help introduce the group to A/C audiences. Also check out "Sight For Sore Eves," "Sugar Town, "Walk Away" and "Padlock." — ANNETTE M. LAI **KENNY GARRETT**

Triology (Warner Bros.)

Alto saxophonist Kenny Garrett dedicates this trio recording session, peppered with hard bop and free jazz, to the mighty living legends of the tenor sax, Sonny Rollins and Joe Henderson. Triology, laced with modal minimalism, has its ballad breathing spaces, "A Time For Love" and Cole Porter's "What Is This Thing Called Love?," but otherwise it's angular as hell, and swings hard and swings high. The sparseness allows each player to reveal themselves, especially drummer Brian Blade, whose star has shown bright with Josh Redman's latest recordings. -Keith Zimmerman

FREDDIE JACKSON Private Party (Street Life/Scotti Bros.)

Private Party is clearly one of Freddie Jackson's better albums. This album is full of good tracks, something that's rare today. The current single, "(I want to) Thank You" is one of this week's most added records



and is typical of the wellthought out songs that this album holds. Cuts like "Your Lovin' (Is a good Thang)," "I tried My Best" "Lay your love on me." will keep Private Party on the charts and selling at retail. It's right in the urban adult comtemporary pocket.

BILL SPEED MAE MOORE Dragonfly (TriStar)

Not many artists would let the engineers move all the equipment into the living room and make a record, but that's what Mae Moore did. Dragonfly (named after a tenacious insect that wouldn't leave the studio) is an amalgam of everything that worked on Bohemia, Mae's domestic debut. New additions to this colorful team include Gavin MacKillop (Toad The Wet Sprocket) who produced, recorded and mixed the album and newly enlisted Scottish guitarist, Neil Clarke. Start with "Genuine.

-Kent Zimmerman ECTOMORPH (Interdimensional Transmissions, fax: (313) 747-3885)

This four-song smoked-glass EP is born of the Kraftwerkian legacy and revels in symphonic synthesizer surrealism. The A-side

serves up "Subsonic Vibrations," a space-age shuffle comprised of electronic rubber-band throngs bouncing off underwater pong-styled squiggles. The second track, "Parallax View," boasts surging, deep washes of ominous tonality which saturate the piece in a mysterious sonic haze. (Imagine, if you will, a twisted variation of the Dr. Who theme music made by musicians grooving derangedly on a concoction of crystal meth and nitrous oxide.) The B-Side unleashes two more trippyotik pieces. The first, "Skin," is a lightningflash of tingling synth screams and boing-boingboom. The finale, "The Last Days of Skylab," is filled with chugging gurgles of synth bass that burble and ooze over a programmed drum clap while slinky spectrazoidal noize volleys back and forth. It's the type of groove that would blast at one of Elrov Jetson's aprespaceball dance parties. Sandwiched between these two main tracks is an unnamed groove filler that flows like futuro low-rider bass music geared for astral cruisin'. Ectomorph luminescently hover in the arena of post-industrial electronic music, joyously creating a new genre-retro-techno.
