On How Rising Tide is Breaking

It's too early to talk of cresting waves for Rising Tide Entertainment, but the company started by Doug Morris, with Daniel Glass, and with backing by MCA Entertainment, is already causing ripples.

In Executive Vice President Glass, Morris has an industry veteran who's beaded the U.S. operations of Chrysalis and served as President of EMI

Here, Glass lets us in on some of the core philosophy hebind Rising Tide, which, while developing its own acts, has also hegun setting up alliances with other promising young labels and talents.

Last month, Rising Tide and New York-based Zero Hour Records signed an agreement that will provide the indie with UNI distribution, as well as marketing, promotion, and sales assistance.

e really want to be in business with entrepreneurial people.

I think if you look at what Doug did with the Atlantic Group, in the last six years, you could look at that as a model for what a record company needs to be in the '90s, where you have a great label and a great team of people working the music in various forms, but, also, you're not afraid to go into business with amazing artists or producer/entrepreneur types.

Doug loves to be in business with people who live their life for what they do. [Zero Hour's] Ray McKenzie is clearly one of those people. He gave up very lucrative situations in his own life to go and live and die for Zero Hour. We like being in business with people like

that, because they have such a vested interest in their life. This is what their life is all about. It's obvious that the Interscope success is because it's their life.

The lifestyle of Ted Field and Jimmy Iovine permeate everything about the company. I always look at that as a great role model; the vibe there is great. Doug and I want to be in business with people who have that same vested interest.

People today at the major labels cannibalize or cherry-pick artists from these wonderful independent labels, and then wonder why, in two years, they haven't gotten their investment back. Why don't these acts get nurtured? Because that's why they were at the independent label. Why don't you help the independent label grow?

We need to let Zero Hour continue to stay Zero Hour, to let them be an independent label. What they need is more muscle in the market-place. They need a little more promotion help, some sales help, some payment help, a little more tour

support—things like that. As we told Ray, "We don't want to change anything about your company. We just want to help you grow."

I'm not impressed today with these what they call "weasel wars"—flying around and signing bands. What's come of it? I really don't see anything that's come of it. We're not breaking any long-term artists. It's still the same acts playing Madison Square Garden; it's still Elton John and R.E.M. I don't see any acts coming out of these bidding wars that are going that way.

Part of the uniqueness of this company is that we're signing the music and developing the music first. We don't want to develop a big promotion and sales team and then fit music into it that these people would like to work. It's not really their choice. We're looking for a certain type of employee and team members that want to be around music like Zero Hour and the other ventures that we're going into.

The majority of artists on Rising Tide will be rock and R&B. The other branching out will be good music. It will be good music and good opportunities. The other Rising Tide label will be Rising Tide Nashville, headed by Ken Levitan, which will have its own staff.

I'm not going to hire the head of promotion before we do that. I want to make sure that that person, or these people, can work with this music. Whether it's [Zero Hour's] 22 Brides or the next Grover record or the next Spaceneedle record, we are going to be supporting that all the way. It doesn't have to happen overnight, but it's going to happen. GAVIN

Shortened Books

A mistake in the mailing of Arbitron diaries to several High Density Areas around the country has resulted in Phase 1 being pulled from Fresno's Fall Book, Less dramatic allocation mistakes occurred in six other markets: Buffalo-Niagara Falls, Albuquerque, Milwaukee-Racine, Dallas-Ft. Worth, New York, and Philadelphia.

The error resulted in the number of allotted diaries being switched between zip codes specially targeted because of their dense ethnic population (HDAs) and balancing zip codes from surrounding areas. In the Fresno market, 10 HDA zip codes were dropped altogether, resulting in 39.8 percent of the Fresno metro not being sampled during the first four weeks of the survey.

Because of the error, there

will be no Phase 1 Arbitrends for Fresno, Phase 2 will consist of only September and November, and Phase 3 will include just November and December. Arbitron is beefing up its sample for the last eight weeks of the Fresno survey to meet its full target sample for fall. In the other affected markets, Arbitron is placing additional sample into the underrepresented portions of those markets for Phase 2 and 3 as well.

Many affected stations are not happy with these makegood attempts, because listener response to certain promotions and high-profile programming (like the O.I. Simpson trial and the World Series) cannot be counted. These complaints seem to bear out, as just-released Phase I Arbitrends for New York show Urban formatted WRKS down 6.1 to 5.3.

Arbitron Error Means 'Monitor' Magazine Slings 'Dogg Food'

Appearing to be talking out of both sides of its mouth. Entertainment Monitor, the new magazine that examines song lyrics, has lashed out at former education czar William Bennett and his anti-gangsta rap forces—and slammed the new Dogg Food album from Tha Dogg Pound. The record, the magazine says, violates all its monitoring categories: sex. drugs, violence, potentially offensive language and potentially offensive slang.

Monitor studies lyrics of popular songs in all genres and reports on entertainment media beyond music. It is designed, said publisher Charlie Gilreath, not to be a censor, but to be a guide for parents and guardians.

The magazine took an activist position last week when it confronted Bennett and Sen. Joe Lieberman and disputed their claims of "success in the war against obscene music lyrics" and in their battle with Time Warner, which recently sev-



ered its relationship with Interscope. (Dogg Food is being distributed Priority.)

Monitor editor David Baiz reportedly told Bennett and company, "Time Warner is still putting out hard-core rap product through its subsidiary labels

Gilreath gave lawmakers records and copies of the magazine. "If they're going to attack the music," he said, "I wanted them to know what they are attacking."

Meantime, Monitor attacked Dogg Food on all fronts. While Baiz noted that Tha Dogg Pound are "a symbol and reflection of their era's vouth," Gilreath decried the album's "convoluted moral messages," with lyrics "that endlessly glorify gun toting, gang raping, killing, drug using and 'ho slappin'...' Liner notes, Gilreath observed, give thanks to God and insult the anti-rap

"In a mocking tribute to their adversaries...the two rappers bring into focus the reality of the situationthey're still in business, alive and doing well!"

Shakur Settles Death **S**uit

Tupac Shakur has settled a wrongful death suit, as a record company has reportedly agreed to pay between \$300,000 and \$500,000 to the parents of a six year-old boy killed in 1992 by a stray bullet from a gun registered to Shakur.

Lawyers reached the settlement on November 7, after opening arguments and before any witness testimony.

Before the trial began, there were reports that the family had rejected an offer of some \$300,000.

Although attorneys would not disclose the identity of the record company making the payment, Shakur has recorded for Interscope, and his next album will be on Death Row.

Shakur was signing autographs at a festival in Marin City, California, when a fight broke out between members of Shakur's entourage and a group of local residents. Shots rang out, and the boy, riding his tricycle nearby, was struck by a bullet.

Shakur's half-brother was arrested for the shooting; so was Shakur, to whom the gun was registered, but, for lack of evidence, no one was ever charged with the killing.

Shakur did not appear for the trial. He recently posted \$1.4 million bail for release from a New York state prison, where he served eight months of a longer sentence for sexually abusing a woman in a hotel room.

Jackson in Giant Publishing Deal

Michael Jackson's music publishing interests have gotten even more interesting, as he announced a joint venture with Sony Music Publishing.

Iackson made the announcement November 7 with Sony Corporation President and CEO Michael P. Schulhof, and Sony Music Entertainment President and COO Thomas D. Mottola,

new Sony/ATV Music Publishing, becomes the world's third largest music publishing company, as it combines the two groups' current and future catalogs.

The Sony Music Publishing

Catalog contains material from, among others, Bob Dylan, Neil Diamond, Willie Nelson, and Pearl Jam, while ATV includes most of the Beatles' material, as well as songs made popular by the likes of Elvis Presley, Little

Richard, the Pretenders, Lloyd Price, and the Pointer Sisters.

Jackson's MIJAC, which houses his own songs, is a separate publishing entity, and will continue to be administered by Warner Chappell.

LIKE A ROLLING STONE

Rock's Hall of Fame

It's a more than worthy field of inductees entering the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame next January: David Bowie, Gladys Knight and all her Pips, Jefferson Airplane (who, I hear, is likely to reunite for the ceremonies in New York), Pink Floyd (who may not) the Shirelles, Little Willie John, and the Velvet Underground. But the Hall also hailed in Pete Seeger. the social activist/folksinger/songwriter, and, in the non-performing category, the late Tom Donahue, whom the New York Times described as "a San Francisco disc jockey of the """WORLD'S BIGGEST

That's like labeling David Geffen "an entertainment agent of the '70s."

Donahue hit San Francisco in the early 60s, at Top 40 power KYA, and became a major player on the music scene. He had a record label, and one of his young producers was a fellow DI, Sly Stone. He produced concerts, including the Rolling Stones at the Cow Palace and

what turned out to be the Beatles' last public stand, at the park formerly known as Candlestick. He opened the first psychedelic nightclub in the mid-'60s. By then, he'd tired of being on Top 40, discovered new ways of getting high, and helped create what became known as free-form, under-

Yes, he was a disc jockey, but he was also a father figure, a guru, a ringleader of the first alternative radio scene. He formed the first crew at funky KMPX, which, after the firstknown hippie labor strike, moved to Metromedia-owned KSAN in 1968. There, and with sister station KMET-Los Angeles, Donahue, as DJ, PD, and, briefly, GM, helped set the standard for what would later become Album Radio, or AOR. He inspired radio freaks all over the country, and, in great part, he's why, when our Friends of Radio are asked what they'd do if they owned their own station, they so often express a longing to return to the days of freer radio—to the days of Tom Donahue.

Memo to the R&R Hall of Fame (Jann Wenner, Ahmet Ertegan, et al): If you're wondering who should make the presentation, and if vou're not wedded to a performer (say, Mick Jagger, Sly Stone, or Tom Smothers), how about Joe Smith? He's a fellow former DJ; an exec at Warner Bros. who took Donahue's advice and signed the Grateful Dead; a friend and a helluva raconteur—the industry's toastmaster. Book 'im, Janno...

The Donahue nomination set off a buzz at the Coalition for Eclectic Radio, the Bay Area group that tries to keep the spark of progressive radio alive, and whose annual awards are named after Donahue.

BASEBALL IS BACK: Not. Despite some great moments, the post-season failed to bring back the majority of fans disillusioned with baseball. It didn't help when Albert Belle verbally attacked NBC's Hannah Storm, and David Justice put down his own team's fans. And when every other shot of ballplayers in the dugout showed them spitting. (What do these guys do at HOME?) Broadcasts of the game confirmed that we are doomed to incomplete sentences, sentences with no verbs, and an inability on the part of announcers to begin a sentence without "I tell you what" or "I mean." On the National Anthem front. Chrissie Hynde did all she could with that unsingable song, while Joe Walsh-well, let's just say he inspired a new legion of fans to say, "Say it ain't so, Joe"...

A Disc Jockey Enters A Mini-Anthology of Beatles News

With none of the surviving Beatles doing fresh interviews (save Paul McCartney

with ABC Radio's Dick Bartley), the news surrounding The Beatles *Anthology*—the threenight documentary from ABC-TV and the CD series from Capitol/EMI—comes down to the unveiling of the cover art for the recordings-and the following items:

• Julian Lennon, the son John had with first wife Cynthia, has embarked on a venture as a nightclub

He revealed plans last week for a club, "The Revolution," that he hopes to open in San Francisco. Lennon, 32, says the restaurant-club will showcase bands and exhibit artworkand some memorabilia from his father and the Beatles.

said on a recent visit from his home in Los Angeles.

• Yoko Ono will appear on television exactly a week before the first installment of The Beatles Anthology—on a sitcom. On the November 12 Mad About You on NBC, she will play herself, trying to persuade Paul Reiser's character to make a film based on an idea of hers.

(The Beatles Anthology, if you don't already know, airs two hours each night

November 19, 22, and 23 on ABC, and the first of three CD sets will be issued November 20.)

• Sony Signatures, the licensing arm of Sony Corporation, announced an exclusive, world-wide licensing and merchandising agreement with the Beatles' company, Apple Corps. Based in San Francisco and run by former Bill Graham merchandising chief Dell Furano,

Sony Signatures said it expects to sell \$200 million of Beatles paraphernalia over the next two years.

Lou Levy, Publisher, Dead at 84

Lou Levy, founder and head of the publishing company, Leeds Music, died October 31 at the age of 84.

Levy began his music career while working as a dancer at the Apollo Theater. In 1935, he convinced Jimmy Lunceford to hire lyricist Sammy Cahn and composer Saul Chaplin to provide material for the Lunceford Orchestra. After scoring a hit in 1939 with "Bei Mir Bist Du Schön," Levy, Cahn and Chaplin formed Leeds Music and provided songs for several generations of stars.

Leeds published songs by Dizzy Gillespie and Louis Armstrong. The company also published Bob Dylan's first songbook, as well as the Beatles' first U.S. hit, "I Wanna Hold Your Hand."

In 1987, Levy received the Abe Olman Award for Excellence in Music Publishing by the Songwriters Hall of Fame.

Greenberg, Pioneer **Label Prez, Dies**

Florence Greenberg, one of the first women ever to run a record company,

died November 1. She was 82.

Greenberg left her life as a N.J., Passaic. homemaker in the late '50s and the entered music industry in part because

she loved the singing of a group of her daughter's classmates, known as the Shirelles. The group, which has just been inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, recorded their first single, "I Met Him on a Sunday," for Greenberg's Tiara Records in 1959; Greenberg also produced that recording.


After forming the Scepter label, she released a string of Shirelles hits, including

Shirelles member Doris Kerner Jackson remembered Greenberg as "our Jewish mother. She encompassed us with love and looked at us as her children."

Infinity and Jacor Jack Up Income

Beyond Howard Stern, Infinity Broadcasting Corp. is rocking and rolling. The New York-based radio group, the largest in the country, announced a 37% increase in net income for the third quarter of 1995, to \$15.9 million, compared with \$11.6 million in the same quarter last year. Revenue leapt to \$95.8 million from \$85.5 million.

It is, the company said, the 16th consecutive quarter of record financial results since it went public in January of 1992.

Infinity's performance (given an assist by its acquisition of KLUV/FM-Dallas in April) reflected general boosts in radio revenue.

Communications Cincinnati's net income leapt 35% for the quarter to \$3.5 million, from \$2.6 million in the third quarter of 1994. Revenue shot up 13%, from \$2.6 to \$3.5 million.

Another radio group reporting a jump was Multi-Market Radio Inc. of New York, which reported a nifty 159% jump in net revenue to \$5.2 million.

On the flip side, SFX Broadcasting of New York posted a \$731,000 loss, a drop from last year's third-quarter net income of \$902,000. SFX said recent acquisitions should improve its performance in the last quarter.



Inside Top 40 BY DAVE SHOLIN

Radio Crossfire Round One

Try pouring too much salt on your next order of fries or spreading a huge slab of butter on a piece of a toast; you'll get a quick lesson on proper balance. That's of course if your heart doesn't give out first. Joe Dawson, PD of WWKX (KIX **106)**-Providence, maintains that a growing number of Top 40 outlets are in danger of going overboard musically by playing more Alternative titles than is healthy. 99X (WNNX)-Atlanta PD Brian Philips, himself a veteran of the format, took his Top 40 credentials into the Alternative arena and the numbers climb higher book after book. Philips, by the way, continues to consult mainstream Top 40s. Addressing concerns voiced by programmers and the music industry, Joe and Brian agreed to face off for a few friendly rounds, which will hopefully clear up some misconceptions and set the record straight.

Joe Dawson: Is Alternative the college music of the '90s? Is it real or being pushed on the mainstream?

Brian Philips: It's not being pushed on anybody. I wanted to stop doing Top 40 in Philadelphia at then-Eagle 106 (formerly WEGX). I didn't feel good about going into full-bore Top 40 back then, because I felt the lower end of Top 40, at the time, was about nothing but urbannothing but records that were completely incongruous to anyone over the age of 20. It didn't feel like where an adult-based Top 40 needed to be, so I didn't want to mess

with it. But I'm telling you it was a reality; me wishing it wasn't there didn't make it so. By the same token, mainstream Top 40 PDs won't be able to make Alternative go away by calling it College music. It isn't College music. When R.E.M. were playing to college audiences, they were not on a major label; they were a minor player. Their last two albums sold 17 million records—that ain't college kids! There are always times when the winds change a little bit. We're back into a guitar-driven, rockoriented period. Most observers agree that, in general, these are the most palatable pop songs being written, and they're going to dominate the charts. And when people stop writing palatable songs in that genre, something else will come in. As for the music taking over? What about TLC walking off with MTV Awards? Hootie & the Blowfish isn't exactly cutting edge Alternative, but they're at nine million now. Songs come from all over the place.

JD: I disagree with your comment that urban music serves a low end demo. In my market, and others I look at, the only constant over the last ten years has been the success of urban and dance records. They've always worked.

BP: They've always worked if you have a pretty good chunk of ethnicity in your audience, or if you have a dance culture. Philly is a city with a dance culture.

JD: Providence is four percent Black with a pretty significant Italian and Portuguese population, and there's only one Alternative title in the top 20 singles. And though I'll admit the format releases fewer singles, out of the top 20 albums only eight are Alternative and the rest are Urban. Could it be that PDs and sales departments in smaller markets are feeling the heat, saying "We can't play this because it features a

Black man who talks. That's a Rap record, and if I play it, some major client won't buy time. I have to go out and find something with a guitar and some white kids playing in a garage band so I can be more palatable to my sales department." In many smaller markets, PDs wind up playing music the public isn't buying to some extent because of an element of racism.

BP: I'm in Atlanta, so I can't address small market racism, because Lhaven't seen it. However, I do consult WKSS-Hartford Conn. which ranks third 25-54 and is probably the highest rated rhythmic Top 40 that doesn't consider itself pure crossover in a competitive market. Joe, you just made the perfect argument for playing to your market. If you're in a place where your chart is dominated by Urban records, then you're absolutely right. I'm telling you there are two great Urban stations in Atlanta, and I think there's one great new Rock station. We both dominate the album charts. We have half and they have half, and all three of us win. I don't understand why anyone in any market would make a decision to go where the audience isn't.

Postscript to last week's column on how much time to spend monitoring your competition. Hot 97 (WQHT)/WRKS-New York Director of Programming Steve Smith adds the following: "We're all human. Whether we admit it or not, we overreact [when] listening to our competition, and we lose our focus on the audience." As to John Lund's suggestion that air staffs check out competing talent, "That's dangerous," says Smith. "The last thing a PD needs is his air staff overreacting to a competitor. You can always tell when a jock is in a head games battle with another radio station because his or her focus is not on the audience. It's just playing over their heads." Continued next week.

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Is American rock radio once again opening its playlists to the UK music monster? And is it a monster this time?

Gee, with all the hoopla lately you'd think the Psychic Friends Network had just predicted that a giant comet was going to hit the Earth a week from Tuesday. While the general public may still be blissfully absorbing 120db of Green Day through its collective Walkman stereos, unaware of the impending attack, the U.S. music industry (at this point, mainly in the form of hysterical trade publications) seems ready to declare "Invasion!" Actually, a number of seemingly unconnected events have combined to transport us to our current location at the crest of this-potentiallatest wave. Amazing coincidence or psychic phenomenon? You be the judge.

the UK music industry has been getting louder in the last few months. The basic message being, "Why aren't more of our bands breaking in the U.S.?" Apparently, they don't understand our fascination with Hole and Pearl Jam. This frustration has only been compounded by event number two: the feud between UK bands Oasis and Blur. This is the British equivalent of the O.J. trial, and everyone over there is amazed that we've barely heard of this little ruckus over here. (This is probably because the Brits haven't realized that we lost interest in professional wrestling about eight years ago.)

This sort of leads to event number three. The big kahuna of UK trade magazines, *Music Week* (GAVIN's sister publication), decided to hold a one day seminar for the UK music industry, "U.S. Radio Workshop: Breaking Records in America," October 10 in London. The idea was to bring together American music professionals to explain how U.S. pop radio works, and why we're not playing more UK bands in the U.S. The GAVIN brought over, yours truly, Max Tolkoff, GAVIN CEO David Dalton, Commercial Director Bob Galliani, and A3 kingpin Kent Zimmerman. We were joined by Pyramid Broadcasting VP/Programming Steve Rivers, 91X-San Diego PD Mike Halloran, 99X-Atlanta PD Brian Philips, Wall Media President (a consultant to 91X, KBCO, and others) Gary Wall; VP/GM of Rising Tide Entertainment Daniel Glass, and other U.S. music industry luminaries. In attendance were most of the heads of the UK labels, as well as band managers, publicists, promoters, and radio industry executives.

You'll find a more detailed breakout of the seminar on page 17, but the big bottom-line message the UK got from the U.S. radio experts was that American radio doesn't really care where the hits come from, as long as we can keep feeding the great and perpetually hungry hit monster. We are not purposely ignoring British music. Brian Philips from 99X was quite eloquent in pointing out that his station will take a good song from anywhere, but perhaps if UK bands understood the American marketplace as it exists in 1995 many UK acts would find greater acceptance over here. In other words, bring us more Bush, dammit! Of course, the UK music industry doesn't even consider Bush a British export—but that's another story.

Look, an American renaissance of rock just blossomed about five years ago, and is still going strong. But that doesn't mean a few British imports haven't slipped past customs in the last few years. There's Seal, PJ Harvey, Des'ree, Take That, Suede, Ride, the aforementioned Oasis and Blur, Elastica...you get the picture.

The problem, as I see it, is that the British seem to want to *dominate* U.S. radio. Which leads us to event number four. A scant two weeks after the *Music Week* seminar (and completely unrelated to it), KROQ in Los Angeles added Blur, Oasis, and Menswe@r in the same week. They then ran a very creative image sweeper on the air calling attention to their new crop of adds. Well, since half the music industry resides in L.A., voila! Let's stick some electrodes into a frog's leg and see what happens.

On the radio side, programmers seem almost oblivious to all the

hype. Again,

they're just looking for good songs. In talking to Kevin Weatherly about KROQ's trio of adds that week, he was very careful and very considerate in his response to the British invasion query. "Is there another British invasion? Maybe not yet, but we certainly want to make sure that if there's anything happening at all, we're there on the edge." Kevin also explained what they were trying to do with the Oasis, Blur, and Menswear adds:

"It was definitely a planned move to add all three in the same week. We didn't want to just put on Blur, or put on Oasis, and pretend that they were just like normal bands that didn't have anything going on. We wanted to create part of the excitement. Position it; package it; that's the only way to make people give a shit. 'The next British Invasion: Is it real?' Is it not real?' It doesn't matter. It's radio and it's entertainment. And it's part of setting something up."

But there *is* something more. Kevin *does* feel that Alternative radio, in general, is in danger of becoming homogenized. Is the American renaissance peaking? "I don't know if it is or it isn't. But I do think that there is definitely a sameness of sound from a lot of the songs that are being released. We certainly hear from our listeners that they don't want another Pearl Jam sound-a-like. People are looking for something that's a little different, that's fresh. At least, that's what we're seeing. I think the fact that Oasis is a top 50 album with limited airplay says that maybe the listeners are feeling that as well. I think that part of what we do as programmers is to try to strike the balance between leading the audience, and reflecting it."

So, are the barbarians at the gate, so to speak? What have we to look forward to in the coming months from our former colonial masters? We at GAVIN feel that the following ten bands (plus eight more mini-profiles as a special bonus) should be kept at the forefront of your brain (mainly so we can look back next year and say "We told you so!"). Some of the names are familiar now, some of these bands you will be hearing more about soon. Enjoy.

BLACK GRAPE (radioactive)

Shaun Ryder, the man who led the Happy Mondays into the eye of the Manchester tornado, which turned British music on its head at the end of the 80s, has been missing in action for two and a half years. While others got mileage out of stories of drugs, decadence, and record company dissolution, Ryder stayed away from the headlines that dissected his probable fate. He was too busy laying plans for a new band, built around the nucleus of himself, rappers Kermit and Jed from the Ruthless Rap Assassins, guitarist Wags from Paris Angels, and the immortal Bez. Black Grape is the band he envisioned. It's almost like Happy Mondays never left—only it's 1995. "In the Name of the Father" is the lead track Lisa Cristiano from

Radioactive would like you to take to heart. Over 45 alternative stations are now on the case, including 91X, WFNX, WHYT, KEDJ, KEDG, and WDRE. There's a steady growth pattern here, so don't take your eye off the ball.

OASIS (Epic)

The ability of a band to explode out of nothingness in the UK is a mystery to most Americans, but remember England is a smaller country, with a faster reaction time—bands rarely get huge overnight here in the colonies. Oasis is a classic example of good American organic growth, with Epic supplying the Miracle Gro. Forget that Oasis has sold over three million units in the UK since April 1994. Oasis have never done things the obvious way; They never sent a demo tape to a record company, and never doubted their own ability to make classic music. Two years ago, with no manager, no agent, and



no money, they hitched a ride to a club gig in Glasgow and told the promoter that if he didn't let them play, that night they would burn the building down. He let them play, and Creation Records president Alan McGee, who happened to be in the audience, was blown away. Realizing that they were special, he signed them then and there.



PORTISHEAD (London)
You want the bottom line? "Sour Times," from their debut album Dummy, was the left-field-outtanowhere alternative quirky hit of the year. I have a very strong feeling we haven't heard the last of Portishead this century. Here are some official bio notes:

"Portishead is a unique musical collective based in Bristol,

England, possessing a singularly compelling musical approach that combines cinematic soundscapes and bracing dub-style hip-hop beats, overseen by 22-year-old sonic mastermind Geoff Barrow, with the torchy, blues-infected vocals and deeply personal lyrics of Beth Gibbons."

Wow. what a mouthful!

There's five of them. Menswe@r was born last year from a burgeoning pop club scene, as the members hung out together at various nighteries and watering holes planning how to take over the world. They told everyone they knew about their band, made wild promises and thought about how they'd deal with fame. Then they thought of a name and got some gigs. A little later they decided to write some songs. Finally they got around to rehearsing. So far, the



U.S. reaction has been pretty good. KROQ and about twelve other stations are leading the way with airplay on "Daydreamer."



BLUR (Virgin)

If you believe the British press, Blur is Oasis' worst nightmare. There's an (apparent) blood feud going on between the two groups over in the UK, but it smells more like sport to me. However, Blur, along with Oasis, are starting to break big-time here in the states. *The Great Escape*, their first LP for Virgin, comes after having laid some important groundwork a few years ago at EMI ("There's No Other Way" is still

in the libraries of quite a few of our alternative brethren). Virgin is justifiably pushing hard on this record. "Country Home" is being very well received, and the band will back this effort with a full-scale North American tour in early 1996. Make Dawn Hood a happy woman, will ya?

ELASTICA (DGC)

The three femme fatales and lone male who make-up Elastica (formed in London in 1992) took the British music scene by storm when they released their indie single, "Stutter," in late '93. The success of that song garnered the group a slot at the presti-



gious Reading Festival. The band's next single, "Connection," got them signed stateside to DGC. When the group released their eponymously titled debut, the American alternative scene was introduced to all of their Brit hits. The result? A headline slot on the 1995 Lollapalooza tour. And with the group's latest single, "Car Song," revving up the charts with all the venom of a super-charged V-8, Elastica appear to have the American alterna-market tacked out.



RADIOHEAD (Capitol)

Back in 1993, Radiohead's melan-cholic, lyrically self-deprecating guitar-charged assault made their single, "Creep," a bona-fide alterna-hit. Unfortunately, the success of that song pigeon-holed the band as nothing more than moody, demure rockers; (the sad part of all this is that their debut album, *Pablo Honey*, was chock full of many upbeat songs which few stations took the chance to explore). The group's 1995 sophomore effort, *The Bends*, unleashed a grander, more

dynamic sound, proving that the band was anything but morose. "Fake Plastic Trees," the initial single off that album, garnered mild airplay stateside, but their current single, "Just," is making a much larger impact on radio and *could* just be the break this Oxford band is looking for.

SUPERGRASS (Capitol)

This Oxford power trio's catchy guitar driven pop songs are filled to the brim with familiar-yet-unfamiliar hooks and choruses. The three lads who are Supergrass (Gaz Coombes, Danny Goffey, and Mickey Quinn) follow the classic British rock & roll ethos: lotsa guitars and lotsa booze, bringing to mind such classic combos as the Faces and Mott the Hoople (with a bit of good ole Cheap Trick thrown in for good measure). Furthermore, the group's



youthful make-up (Gaz is a mere 19, while Danny is only 21) insures that they potentially have many more years of rockin' ahead of them.



CATHERINE WHEEL

(Mercury) While many a band opts to retread familiar sonic turf album after album, Catherine Wheel (who hail from the English seaside town of Yarmouth) make a bold move

on Happy Days, the group's third, and most recent album. The group upped the ante by turning up the guitar, thus giving their output a more hard rockin' edge. As a result, they distanced themselves from their initial "shoe gazer" followers, while in turn opening themselves up to a whole new audience: thrashing, moshed-out rocker kids. And, as if to further make a dent in the U.S. alterna-market, they released a duet with Belly front woman Tanya Donelly, which has had mild impact at commercial alternative radio. Catherine Wheel's readiness to change could ultimately be their saving grace.

WHIPPING BOY (Columbia UK)

Just so you don't think there's only England, please make sure you remember that Whipping Boy is Irish. And Columbia's gonna be all over you next year with this. "We started off as My Bloody Valentine wannabees," laughs guitarist Paul Page, "but the band soon totally took on a life of its own." Their debut album for Columbia, Heartworm, was recorded at the end of 1994 with producer Warren Livesey (House of Love. The The). The first two singles lifted from it, "Twinkle" and "We Don't Need Nobody Else," were both voted Singles of the Week in Melody Maker. Whipping Boy may be from Dublin but they could just as easily be from Durban or Detroit, and they don't have a lot of time for the petty, parochial attitudes of their hometown. "Being Irish hasn't influenced our music," says frontman Ferghal McKee, "so why be marketed on that basis?" Let's see what happens when they hit the

ASH Young Northern Irish three-piece. Hard guitar pop.
Their label says the next 12 months will be devoted to touring the length and breadth of the U.S.

STEREO MCs Established Island act have been absent from the scene for about three years, but there are great expectations for their new album, due next year.

GOLDIE Jungle remains a minority taste, even in the UK, but Goldie's debut album *Timeless* can be regarded as the *Dark Side of the Moon* for the jungle generation. And if you think the sound is inaccessible, check this: a UK TV advertising campaign for BHS—a down market Macy's—is currently using a jungle-style backing track.

CHARLATANS Their latest album went straight in the UK charts at Number One. They have had their problems, but have returned to form and could go further.

SLEEPER Sometimes dismissed as also-rans by the fickle UK music press, Sleeper and their outspoken lead singer Louise Wener have apparently won the support of Arista's Clive Davis who is issuing the record in the U.S.

DUBSTAR The latest act on EMI's Food label home of Jesus Jones and Blur—is an electro-pop three piece who have been described as Kirsty MacColl meets Ace of Base and Propaganda. The critics are raving about it, though they have yet to play their first full-scale tour.

CAST The former bass player from The Las strikes out on his own with a band whose sound owes a lot to the northwest England guitar pop sound. Album just out.

Oasis won a unanimous seal of approval from some of America's most prominent radio programmers at Music Week's U.S. Radio Workshop last

Eight top program directors and industry executives gave the thumbs up during an informal "On the Griddle" listening session, as the event drew to a close at London's Hurlingham Club.

More than 150 representatives of the British music industry participated

in the whirlwind, one day, ten-event workshop, subtitled, "Breaking Records in America."

The "Griddle" panel played tracks by the cream of UK talent, including Blur, Supergrass, Pulp, and Black Grape, with the title track of Oasis's album, (What's the Story) Morning Glory, voted best, with 64 out of a maximum 80 points.

Brian Philips of 99X in Atlanta gave the track 9 out of 10. "This isn't even the best track on the album," he said. "If this doesn't work, then I give up.'

The second most popular track was "Kelly's Heroes," by Radioactive's Black Grape, which received 60 points. Jeff McClusky said it was excellent, predicting, "They will break in the U.S. this coming year."

In third place was Ash's "Girl from Mars." which notched 54 points. Arista Records Senior Vice President Rick Bisceglia commented, "This sounds the most like a hit record."

A/C Still the One

With all the Spring Arbitrons now tabulated and published, Adult Contemporary radio is still, far and away, the most listened to music radio format. In some demographics, like 12+, the format leads its closest rival, Country, by more than 20 percent in share points. An even more dramatic statistic I've seen shows A/C with 50 percent more share than Top 40. Although these numbers are a dramatic affirmation of A/C's stature with the public, there remain problems in format definition that both help and hurt A/C radio. A/C is second in overall radio service, because it's once again behind News/Talk in total share. The problem, as I see it, is that News and Talk are often clustered as one format. Some of us would never be caught dead listening to Talk radio, but can find value in News radio. They are two distinct formats, in my humble opinion, and shouldn't benefit by this convenient union. It's the same clustering mentality, however, that gives A/C its edge in the ARBs. I'm sure Hot A/C and Lite A/C and 90 percent



oldies A/C are all treated as Adult Contemporary by the analysts even though the three sub-formats have little in common.

For want of a better ranking among music formats, I'll take it the way it is, but don't tell anybody. It's our little 15 percent secret share.

Be sure to check out "Cheap Red Wine" and "Nice Girls Finish Last."

JOHN HIATT Walk On (Capitol)

In a nutshell, it doesn't get any more Americana than John Hiatt. He's not country, he's more than rock, and he's probably one of the greatest songwriters walking the planet. But most of you probably know that already. Walk On, his debut for

Capitol, finds Hiatt in a great space. With production elements geared more towards efforts like Stolen Moments and Bring the Family, Hiatt has assembled a band that brings his songs to full fruition. San Francisco musician David Immergluck's multiinstrumental input accents this album perfectly, especially his driving mandolin on "Cry Love." Hiatt has given us some chestnuts on this work that evoke his country soul. "Dust Down a Country Road" puts you smack-dab in the country's heartland. "The River Knows Your Name" is his most tender work since "Have a Little Faith in Me," and the Jayhawks make a vocal contribution to "You Must Go." Walk On has Hiatt walking tall once again.



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

It's a Gumbo



Lebron Joseph: Program Director WYLD/FM-New Orleans

this radio thing begin for you? Joseph: I grew up here in New Orleans, I was a communications major at Loyola University, and in my freshmen year I started working at the college radio station. WLDC. Brute Bailey, who was program director at WYLD, taught a class on radio production on Saturday mornings. Out of

that experience, I got a part time job at WYLD/AM. Next, I worked at WXOK in Baton Rouge, doing production and clubs for a couple of years. I came back to New Orleans, to WYLD, and from there I did clubs for five years and didn't do radio. I was never completely out, because I did spots and production, so my voice was always on the air. I was offered an overnight/weekend job at WQUE and have been with Clear Channel Broadcasting ever since.

How did you get into management?

About two years ago, Gerod Stevens [PD of WQUE/FM] asked staff members to apply for the APD job at Q-93. I submitted my stuff, and I got the gig. And just this last February, when Skip Dillard left WYLD to go to WMXD in Detroit, the same thing happened. I submitted my stuff and got the PD job. Plus I do the 9 a.m.-noon airshift.

Since you grew up in New Orleans, you must have a good feel for the city?

I'm really partial to New Orleans. It's a southern city, however it has a European flavor that makes it very diverse. This is not to say cities like Mobile or Baton Rouge are bland, because they're not. But there are so many flavors here, like Creole, Indian, soul, French, not to mention Cajun. These combinations make the surroundings so unique and different, that New Orleans is truly like no other place in the world.

There's always something happening here, the place is so alive. It's a very friendly atmosphere.

But isn't New Orleans suffering a large crime problem right now?

We have a tremendous crime problem right now. Most folks think it's due to the drug problem that permeates the country, but my take is that it's an educational matter. The level of education here for the fortunate few is very good, but for the majority it's unfortunate.

What does your radio station do to help with this problem?

We're very issue oriented down here. It's a tradition for WYLD to be community oriented. We are the heritage station in the marketplace, and accept the responsibilities that come with that. Also, most of the jocks on WYLD/FM and our sister station WQUE/FM grew up—right here in New Orleans. Most of them are

raising kids and have a vested interest in the community

On the Urban A/C side, we gear our public affairs and promotions toward parents and family oriented issues. For example, we're very involved with the U.S. Attorney, another homegrown brother named Eddie Jordan, who has established a guns hotline. The mayor, Mark Morial, also uses the radio station in a big way. On the flipside, WQUE/FM has a teen summit program that they're very committed to.

What is the vibe of your station? Our target demo is 25-54 female.

Are you concentrating on the 25-34 part of that demo?

I like to think we're very healthy 25-34, but at the same time we do as much as we can not to leave out the other end of the dumbbell. The majority of the music released for Urban A/C, in my opinion, is for the younger end of the 25-54 demo. We try to combat that by going deeper than most Urban A/Cs around the country. Yes we have a '60s category, and we have '70s category. Since New Orleans is the cradle of jazz, we also have a jazz category that's in 24 hour rotation. It's a gumbo.

I think one of the things we've brought to the party is making Urban A/C radio fun. Our approach is not the *serious* adult station. Just because someone is 35 or 55 doesn't mean they don't want to have a good time. [It] doesn't mean they don't listen to the radio to escape. We're bringing fun to this format.

If you could pick the artists to release music during the spring and fall books who would they be?

Anita, Luther, Brian McKnight, Patti LaBelle, Gladys Knight—the adult artists.

What is the New Orleans sound?

On an uptempo or mid-tempo tip, the New Orleans sound is a real funky sort of flavor. Certainly not dance or house stuff; that doesn't work here. Funky music with a groove is in there! Plus, New Orleans is a ballad crazy city.

What is your opinion on the state of Urban Radio?

Right off the bat, I'll rell you we don't do enough networking. Maybe I'm greedy, [but] I need the networking, because I want to continue to grow. I think we need to share information with each other. We can help each other and respect each other more

We're under the constant attack of stations that call themselves "Churban" or "Rhythmic CHR," and on the A/C side, stations called "Smooth Jazz," who play the same music as Urban A/Cs. But the positive side of the game is, it's a more diverse playing field today. Ten years ago, it was straight Urban or you didn't do black radio. This means more opportunities for black people to have careers and choices on the dial.

Any final comments?

Our success doesn't happen here without a strong GM, and a hella staff giving me their heart and their ass every day. When I say staff. I'm talking everyone, even my sister station across the hall. Our success is not a one man show.

Urban Picks

QUINCY JONES Q'S JOOK JOINT WARNER BROTHERS



It all started as a small recording session, a going-away present for his old friend Mo Ostin. But when Quincy Jones

throws a party, everybody comes to play, and the results are the most interesting, compelling, and innovative album of the year, especially after you realize this is basically an album of remakes.

"In deciding on the songs to put on this album, I started to think about the recordings that I really loved, that were due for a brand new 'do,' says, Jones. That's a very modest assessment. What he produced is an ambitious album complete with new songs and the restoration of classic material ranging from "Let The Good Times Roll" and "Moody'z Mood for Love" to modern classics like "Killer Joe" and "Rock With You." Ouincy Jones and his who's who of singers and musicians have produced an album rich in history, an excellent marriage of genres that stand out as an example of Urban music diversity.

For Jones, Q's Jook Joint is mythological; it's a place where the whole gamut of African American music is performed. Real "jook" joints were run-down shacks in the South, where black folks went to escape the hardships of the day and, principally, to dance, eat, or drink. Jook joints date back before the Civil War. During slavery they were the place to go for "free" time. Later, under Jim Crow laws, when blacks where not allowed in theaters or nightclubs, they could still turn to the jook joint for good times. The jook joint was the center of black social life and became more than a place for entertainment. It was the place where African Americans began to shape and develop their fight for freedom and identity.

Q's Jook Joint is damn near perfect. Quincy Jones has proven again that he is a master producer, arranger and orchestrator of American music, from blues and jazz to pop and hip-hop-and beyond. —Quincy McCoy

The new wave of British bands must be prepared to work if they are to succeed in America, U.S. radio programmers made plain at the Workshop.

On the panel "The Money Formats—The Inside Story," chaired by GAVIN Alternative Editor Max Tolkoff, three program directors discussed the chances of UK bands getting on to the playlists of U.S. Alternative and Top 40 stations.

They stressed that bands and their managers should be prepared to play



"Good radio is made up of 50% science and 50% voodoo," said U.S. Radio Workshop keynoter Garry Wall. Pyramid Broadcasting Vice President of Programming Operations Steve Rivers later confirmed that testing audience reaction is the main way of deciding on adds to the playlists at the 12 stations in his group.

the game in the U.S., playing live shows in cities or states where there is a groundswell of support, backing radio stations with personal appearances, and learning to understand the different priorities and strategies in the U.S.

The most important factor of all in the U.S. is touring, said the panelists.

"If you want more than one million sales, you have to tour," said former EMI and Chrysalis President Daniel Glass, now Executive Vice President of Rising Tide Entertainment.

Panelists pointed out that some of the most successful bands in the U.S., such as R.E.M. and U2, paid their dues with promotional tours and radio station visits. There are many American bands prepared to put in the time if British bands are not, they said.

All three program directors on the panel admitted that radio stations are less likely to play bands that do not visit their state. Mike Halloran, Program Director of San Diego's 91X said, "If you want to be a long-term act, you've got to do it."

The biggest obstacle facing British bands aiming to break through in the U.S. is the massive gulf between the music scenes in the two countries, said Halloran.

Many problems encountered by UK bands and their labels trying to get

tracks aired in the States occur because the U.S. scene is so far behind Britain.


"Our audience is 13 years behind the UK public," said Halloran. "We've only just embraced punk, so bands like Blur are years off being accepted."

Halloran said America's widespread reluctance to air current and new UK acts is, in many cases, also due to the overt "Englishness" of bands such as Blur, Pulp, and Suede. But, he said, there is plenty of talent coming through that could produce a breakthrough, highlighting the talents of S*M*A*S*H, Oasis, and Cast.

Brian Philips, Program Director for Atlanta's 99X added, "The Britpop sound is missing from the spectrum of U.S. music right now—we need it on the radio."



TWO EXTRAORDINARY WOMEN

MELISSA ETHERIDGE Your Little Secret (Island)

The first knock-down, drag-out blockbuster of the Christmas season is Your Little Secret, Melissa's first post-superstar album since the A3-fueled Yes I Am. Your Little Secret is a voyeuristic view of love and war with songs

unafraid to stretch out into the four or five minute range if need be. Back with producer Hugh Padgham (whose best recent work has been with Melissa and Sting), YLS is mood-intensive, refusing to take itself too seriously from a production standpoint, and playing things straight-forward with a populist guitar/bass/drums line-up. At this stage in her career, Melissa could have easily thrown in the pricey, emotional kitchen sink and gotten away with it, but as a well-traveled performer, she's way too smart, opting to stick with what's easily stage-adaptable. With the exception of tracks with Mellencamp snare-master Kenny Aronoff, most of the music is made by Melissa and her road-weary partners. While rockers will enjoy "I Really Like You" alongside "Your Little Secret," we lean toward epics like "I Want to Come Over" and "Nowhere to Go." "Change" is also good advice.

CAROLINE LAVELLE Spirit (N-Gram/Discovery)

Okay, it's dream time. Imagine Enva backed by William Orbit. Better yet, imagine William Orbit with vocals. Now open your eyes; to peg Caroline Lavelle as an Enva is a little unfair, as she's definitely talented in her own right. Lavelle has toured with classical genius Nigel Kennedy playing Hendrix and Miles, and she's worked recently with Peter Gabriel, the Waterboys, the Cranberries, Siouxsie, the Fall, Boy George, and 'oh, loads, really. I've forgotten about most of them." Featured on Orbit's new label, N-Gram, Spirit is an avvesome drift into all kinds of musical realms, most of it A3-adaptable. As with Orbit, who contributes

funky grooves throughout, you'll probably get calls when your listeners hear the beauty of songs like "Turning Ground" or the slightly-Doorsish "Dream of Picasso" and "Moorlough Shore." "Lagan Love" into Joni Mitchell's "A Case of You" is excellent fare as well. Treat yourself royally.



George Jinda and the Thin Blue Line

It would be hard to find another radio format that has a closer, we'reall-in-this-together relationship with its artists than adult alternative/ smooth jazz. And few A2 musicians are as radio astute and opinionated as Special EFX's George Jinda when it comes to discussing airplay trends.



We checked in with George before a recent S'EFX gig in Washington D.C. After two weeks as top Most Added, their new CD, Body

George Jinda Language, is blasting its way up the A2 chart, and is an odds-on favorite to go number one by year's end.

Jinda finds today's musical landscape minimal compared to yesterday's big drum sounds and layers of horns

"You remember those gigantic tom-tom sounds Phil Collins used to use with Genesis? That's all gone," says Jinda. "Nobody does big tomtom grooves and deep snare drums. Listen to the high-pitched, tiny snare drum sound everybody is usingthere's so much space happening. The arrangements are very open.

"In the old days people used to put two or three horn parts on top of each other. The soprano was up front and the tenor was backing it up. Now it's soprano sax or alto sax all the way through. Tenor saxophone is not as commercial any more. [Generally speaking], tenor is a jazz horn and is not in vogue now with smooth jazz. The only guys who are successful [today] are Boney James and Richard Elliot. I saw Boney live and he was playing tenor almost all night. But the other guys don't play much tenor. Najee plays maybe one or two tunes in his show. He plays soprano, alto and flute all the time

Jinda, like other musicians we've spoken to (Rick Braun, Joe Sample, and Jeff Lorber), sees a clear trend towards retro '70s funk.

"Guys are trying to sound like Wah-Wah Watson, using old echoplexes and wah-wah pedals, observes George. "They're bringing out all these old instruments. Look at the importance of the Fender Rhodes [electric piano] with today's grooves. I'm know I'm getting technical, but programmers are now subconsciously listening for this."

Jinda thinks today's hip-hop grooves and loops are still making a tremendous impact on smooth jazz.

"I'm happy today's so-called 'contemporary jazz' artists have adopted those hip-hop rhythms. They're using cool sounding loops. With Special EFX, we combine the hip-hop grooves with African elements. I'm also using African shakers, a talking drum, and the clay pot udu drum on top of the loops.

"Look at Pat Metheny. He had to go with the flow on his last album, We Live Here. The group was using loops and hip-hop grooves, in addition to the Brazilian stuff they usually do.

Jinda understands A2 radio's need to thrive and attract more new listeners, but he wonders about stations who call themselves "Today's Smooth Jazz" as they segue out of Boyz II Men or Michael Bolton. Is it confusing core audiences? One way to avoid misunderstanding, Jinda feels, is to use station IDs that specify "smooth jazz and soft vocals."

As an A2 radio aficionado, Jinda sees an increased importance in rhythm over melody, and he also notices a preponderance on the part of radio to play more midtempo songs, at the expense of faster-paced tunes.

While many record industry insiders fret about some smooth jazz stations focusing on only one track per artist, others feel stressing one song at a time keeps artists on playlists longer. Jinda would prefer more variety.

"Why do they pick only one song off an instrumental album? On Special EFX's new album, Body

Language, they play 'Seduction.' That's the only tune they play all over the whole country. It makes no sense. If you play instrumental music, why not play a variation of two or three songs?"

"The artist and the station would be better off if they played more than one song." theorizes Jinda. "This is not a pop radio format where you pick a Mariah Carey single, play it to death, then pick another single when people are sick of it. For this format a Isingle tunel dies out faster than a pop record. A Boyz II Men song can still sound like a single eight months after its release. That will not happen with a contemporary jazz artist."

While artists like Special EFX are obviously more sophisticated listeners than the average Arbitron diary-keeper, sometimes they are the thin blue line between the listening/buying public and the programmers themselves.

MY OWN VICTIM Burning Inside (Century Media)



Louisville, Kentucky is home to My Own Victim; a lethal, four-piece, guitar-wielding band with a masters degree in hardcore. My Own Victim have several demos, an EP, and about five years of touring experience, but *Burning Inside*, produced by E.J. Rose (Stick, Hostility), is the band's first full-length. "My Standpoint" starts off the CD, and is an introduction to band's knac for violent melodies and abrasive rhythms. The title track boasts a giant hook that weaves an eccentric web of jagged chords and furious

vocals. This is probably the strongest of the 15 tracks, but the fingering licks of "Under the Gun" and the metallic romps of "Identity" deserve a listen; "Break the System Down" and "Nothing left To Gain" are also worth checking out. My Own Victim's vigorous hard rock schemes and rage-infested vocals will keep your hard rock/metal listeners' ears ringing and your show intense.

JOLLY MON Nobody Knows Who You Are (Elemental)

Jolly Mon are not only veterans of this year's North By Northwest music conference, they are also one of Portland's most prominent upand-coming bands. The selfdescribed "alien psychedelic outer space party in the jungle," definitely has a psychedelic lean, which will appeal to modern rock and alternative stations. The focus track "Green on the Ground," contains gelled rhythms that flow down an intricate path of exotic melodic riffs and tribal drum beats. "The Pilot" showcases Jolly Mon's aggressive side, as do the careening vocals of "East." Metal radio may not find Jolly Mon's unwonted musical style compatible with their current playlist, but "Is My Name" does have enough abrasive energy and crunchy guitars to merit a few spins.

FEAR Have Another Beer with Fear (Fear/Sector 2)



The pillaging vocals of Lee Ving and the turbulent blasts of Fear helped shape the jaded punk rock scene of the early '80s. Fifteen years later, as punk rock continues to lose

its f*ck you attitude, Ving has returned to put the middle-finger back in punk rock. Have Another Beer with Fear, is the band's latest release, features Ving's new bandmates former Frank Zappa bassist Scott Thunes, former jazz drummer Andrew Jaimez., and guitarist Sean Cruse, who Ving claims is the only guitar player other than Jimi Hendrix to ever play with the Jimi Hendrix Experience, Fear never beat around the bush; they always told it like it was, and Have Another Beer with Fear continues that tradition of honesty, making no bones about the band's priorities. "I Believe I'll Have Another Beer," "Legalize Drugs," "Beerfight," "Free Beer," and "Drink Some Beer" are just a few tracks that will appeal to your more outgoing listeners. "U.S.A.," "Honor and Obey," and "Bad Dav" are classic punk tunes that capture the anger and the attitude of punk rock's past glory days. Turn up the volume, and Have Another Beer with Fear.

ALICE IN CHAINS Alice in Chains (Columbia)

Alice in Chains is back with another full-length that will propel them further into the arms of commercial rock radio. While the self-titled LP contains tracks with commercial appeal like the bluesy chords and melodic rhythms of "Brush Away," "Heaven Inside You," "Over Now," and "Shame In You," Alice in Chains also delivers more of a raw, crunchgroove on tracks including "Again," "Head Creeps," "So Close," and "Sludge Factory." It's refreshing to hear Alice In Chains go back to their grungy roots by delivering rugged guitar chords, deep bass lines, and aggressive drum pounding that are topped by Lavne Staley's mesmerizing vocals. Overall. the album is infected with dark overtones and is superbly co-written by the band. Alice in Chains has conjured up another gem that rock radio will dig.

'Garage Country'



"Wow." That was pretty much the reaction Tuesday morning as I quizzed pro-

grammers on what they thought of the new Garth Brooks single. "The Fever," Listener reaction to the Aerosmith cover has been mixed; by next week we should have a better idea of what John and Jane Q. Public think of Garth's latest genre-bending experiment, a style he calls "Garage Country."

Last week on the Friday Fax, I asked if anyone could sing me the song. A few of you tried, but I was still driven to seek it the original from Aerosmith's 1993 Get a Gripalbum. Like most of you, I was pretty sure that Aerosmith had never written an ode to rodeo and had heard that some of the lyrics had been re-written. However, it wasn't until I heard the band's version that I realized that only the chorus and a few other lines from the original song remain. Apparently, Brooks loved the song, and asked the writers of "Rodeo," Bryan Kennedy and Dan Roberts to re-write the lyrics (Apparently Garth didn't want to sing, "the booze don't work, 'cause the drugs ran out of gas").

Garth has obviously studied Steven Tyler's vocal stylings. One station I spoke to (who asked to remain nameless) enlisted the help of their sister classic rocker and lifted Tyler's "YAAYAHYAHAYAH" part from "Dude Looks Like a Lady," and are playing it over Garth's similar howl.

In case you're wondering, Brooks recorded the song with the band's blessing. When I called their management office Tuesday, Steven Tyler had just heard Garth's version and said, "That was the last song I ever expected to hear a

fiddle on!" 'Course the boys are more than happy to collect the rovalties that should soon be coming their way.



BRIAN ENO/JAH WOBBLE Spinner (All Saints/Gyroscope)

As a child, I was taught that God is at once everywhere and nowhere; as a teenager, I saw graffiti on a New York subway car declaiming, "Eno is God." Certainly his influence is very present, but ephemeral. Since departing Roxy Music in 1973, Eno's work has been marked by a systematic layering of textures which, in the aggregate, become transparent.

Spinner, released last month on All Saints, sees Eno giving his work to someone else for "treatments"specifically, sonic adventurer Jah Wobble. Eno had recorded these pieces solo to serve as the soundtrack for his friend Derek Jarman's last film, Glitterbug. After Jarman's tragic death of AIDS last year, Enofound these pieces lacking without the context of a film, so he submitted them to Jah Wobble for his input.


Wobble's contributions run the gamut: some pieces are unaltered, some radically reinvented. Each treatment is considered and appropriate. In fact, the songs are so carefully wrought that it's hard to see where Eno leaves off and Wobble begins.

While this is an instrumental album, it doesn't entirely fit into Eno's ambient oeuvre. Spinner has an emotional charge that rewards active listening. Wobble's manipulations are often playful, while Eno still dazzles with his mastery of nuance. On repeated listenings, gossamer-thin layers of sound coalesce imperceptibly into lustrous oceans rich in texture and feeling. To paraphrase Logan Pearsall Smith: It's best to judge Eno not by what he says but by what he whispers. —Anthony Boner

THIRTY OUGHT SIX Hag Seed (Mute America)

Ever ruined a mix tape by putting an incredible song right at the beginning so you end up rewinding the damn thing over and over to hear your new favorite tune? Thirty Ought Six so hijacked one of my mix tapes back in late '93 with their amazing 7", "Huck." Now, the band's 12-track Mute America debut, Hag Seed, has appeared, chock full of cuts capable of similar distraction. From the explosive album opener, "Tike" to the whisper-to-scream intensity of "Wheeler," 30-06 prove that their incredible debut album, Bosozoku, was neither fluke nor beginner's luck. Furthermore, the band deftly avoids the sophomore curse with Hag Seed, whereon bassist/vocalist Sean Roberts, guitarist David Blunk and drummer Ryan Paravecchio

MOTHER EARTH The People Tree (Acid Jazz/Hollywood)

The People Tree, Mother Earth's second full-length release for the U.K.-based Acid Jazz label, was originally released in February 1994. Although the disc may be new to our shores (via Hollywood Records), it is already an established classic for fans of British '70s-influenced soul. Mother Earth, a quartet from North London, pays homage to the foreparents of the Acid Jazz movement and covers the entire soul spectrum, nodding to legends like Curtis Mavfield, the Jackson Five. Funkadelic, and Sly Stone. From thick wah-wah guitar funk to mellow laidback grooves, from disco to rock and even blues, Mother Earth delivers the goods. Nowadays, when too many bands are fronting on the '70s (and doing a poor job of it), Mother Earth is

as close to the real sound as you're going to get. Somehow, though, these mothers still manage to sound fresh enough for the dance floors of the '90s. MENSWE@R Nuisance (London/Laurel)

Menswe@r's members once claimed that they were the best-dressed band in Britain, and that they were going to be "larger than God's knob." They proceeded to release three juvenile singles and make everyone chuckle at all the empty hype that surrounded what was to be the "Next Brit Thing." But after all the hype died and the laughter subsided, something strange happened. These boys went to work on making an album so strong that it would kick square in the teeth everyone who had laughed at their previous freshman antics. From beginning to end, Menswe@r's full-length debut will baste you in the thick, rich sauce of succulent pop glory. "Sleeping In's" strong Kinks-like harmonies meld with its catchy "Last Train to Clarksville" guitars, and on the addictingly catchy "Around You Again," Menswe@r pick up the plot where Nine Nine Nine once lost it.

The real hit, however, is a master-

piece of a song called "The One." Armed with a string section, hyper hooks, aggression, and synth that would make Gary Numan drool, this song will kick your ass into Camden town. Remember not ever wanting to take the Replacements off your turntable? Or being scared to tell your friends that you really like the first Duran Duran album? Well, say hello to *Nuisance*, pop worth falling for.—Eric Shea

CORNERSHOP Woman's Gotta Have It (Luaka Bop / Warner Bros.)

"This Western Oriental's goin' full circle..." is the chorus of the day as East meets West in this unique permutation that proves once and for all that London (and parts thereof) is the ultimate global-melting-pot burg. With Woman's Gotta Have It, Cornershop has combined a rollicking mish-mash of garage-styled rockers and quirky neo-dance pop ditties to create a most enjoyable polyphonic experience. "6 alm. Jullander Shere (Archway)" sucks you in with a lo-fi sonic amalgamation that mixes Indian lyrics, sitar, and spaceage keyboard gurgles into a gyrating hypnotic mantra. Best song title honors are bestowed upon "Hong Kong Book of Kung Fu," which is a straight ahead rocker, not unlike early BOC put through a sonic food processor and augmented by tabla

drumming and screeching keyboard wail. In fact, this method quickly becomes the identifiable modus operandi of Cornershop; they flipflop between twisted takes on straight-ahead rockers and a mutated musical world vision. "My Dancing Days Are Done" is radio ga-ga Middle Eastern stylee with a twist of Français lounge lizard ambiance. "Call All Destrover" is the Kinks run amok in the late '90s, and "Camp Orange" percolates to a hip-hop rhythm and organic chanting which sounds like a cross between a ceremonial chant and childlike mimicking of a commercial jingle. The album closes with mantric "7:20 a.m. Jullandar Shere," a reprise of the opening sitar-fuzz-swirl-enhanced tune. Groovy. — Spence D.



Weezer's Matt Sharp and five other very talented friends have created one of the freshest sounds to come along this year. Bitchin' single and album, dude.

"Don't Cry" (Ztt/Warner Bros.)

KUBE-Seattle MD Shellie Hart demanded I check out this track several months back, and it didn't take long to enter power rotation in my den and car. In contention for the biggest song of the year, Seal appeal is set to carry over into 1996.

BIG MOUNTAIN "Get Together" (Giant)

First released shortly after 1967's "Summer Of Love," the song's original version, by the Youngbloods, actually became a bigger hit in 1969. A quarter century later, the country in many ways seems more divided. Could be the right time for this message, which is served with a splash

of reggae pop. THE ROLLING STONES "Like a Rolling Stone" (Virgin)



Bob Dylan shook up the folk music establishment when he went electric in 1965. Dylan battled for Number One honors that summer with a song titled "(I Can't Get No) Satisfaction." Ironically, the Stones take what could, for them, be considered a more bare bones approach to this true classic.

QUINCY JONES INTRODUCING TAMIA "You Put a Move on My Heart" (Owest/Warner Bros.)

Name an artist and the odds are strong Quincy Jones has worked with them. Jones can also take credit for discovering talents such as Tevin Campbell and Siedah Garrett. His newest find is Tamia, who possesses a strikingly powerful voice. She makes the most of it, too, on this first single from Jones' new masterpiece *Q's Jook Joint*, which GAVIN'S Q, Quincy McCoy, reviews in Urban Landzcape.

ALICE IN CHAINS Alice in Chains (Columbia/CRG)

Let's see, a three-legged dog on the front cover, a three-legged man on the back cover, and no title other than *Alice in Chains*. I'm sorry, but I think there *is* a title here. I obviously haven't consumed enough Zima to get the message yet, but this dark and brooding masterpiece they've released *does* scare me. It's heavy, but that's the way we've always liked them.

Also, their sound this time is



much more refined, more focused-like sending the sun through a magnifying glass. Is there diversity here? Of course. "Sludge Factory" segues perfectly into "Heaven Beside You." One represents the classic AIC wall-o-sound, the other demonstrates a welcome understanding of "dynamics." My other faves are "Grind" and "Nothin' Song." Radio has done right by these guys, and that will probably continue well into the new millennium.

DWIGHT YOAKAM Gone (Reprise)

As he was previewing this album to a rather stunned radio crowd last month, Dwight admitted that Gone "has a lot of twists and turns." We should know by now that Dwight Yoakam is not going to follow the rules, but even if you expect the unexpected, this album will still blow your mind. Like a jazz singer, Dwight treats his voice like another instrument, changing his singing style to match the song and at times just experimenting with word sounds, like on the hilarious "Baby Why Not." He employs so many styles and songseverything from '60s soul to Tex-Mex to doo-wop—yet makes everything absolutely, distinctly his own. Guests include the Rembrandts ("Near You," "Never Hold You") and Joy Lynn White ("Baby Why Not"). The first single is the wild "Nothing." complete with spoken recitation and B-3 organ to spare.

Once again the buddha masters descend from The Hill to deliver

their blunted sonic sermon. For their third effort, Cypress Hill have conjured up an extremely dense, eerie funk vibe, laced with an ethereal ambiance of the most Stygian nature. B Real's blaring nasal is still at the forefront of the rhyme assault, and Sen backs him up with the sinister baritone while DJ Muggs creates the mystical meltdown. Tracks like "Stoned Raiders" swirl amidst wailing ghost voices, while "Illusions" is awash with sitar. There's even a tinge of Shaolin, thanks to the RZA's Wu-Tang dominated production on "Killa Hill." Overall the album is a supersensual journey into a smoky nether realm. So sit back, relax, and meditate in the sanctity of the Temple of Boom. —Spence D.

GUILT Bardstown Ugly Box (Victory)

Surfacing from Louisville, Kentucky's underground scene is Guilt, a four-piece rock band that has been terrorizing hard rock/metal radio with its debut LP, Bardstown Ugly Box. Guilt combines the intensity of early punk with current metallic hooks and angstridden vocals. This is not for the easy listener, but rather for those who lust after abrasive rhythms and taunt melodic punches. From the frenzied drum slams of "Chi" to the layered grinds of "Theta" to the stomping melodic licks of "Phi," Guilt displays an aggressive rock style that will appeal to hard rock listeners. —ROB FIEND

Capitol Records Set to Release "Free As A Bird"
