programming a station with eclectic music today, we'd love to be able to listen to such a station For us, the

closest thing to musical freedom is on A3 stations and, in the last year. on stations that could be called Americana. That's the format GAVIN identified a year ago. and we are happy to report. on this anniversary, that an increasing number of stations are choosing to call themselves Americana. As with all formats, there are



definitions and restrictions. But, as Americana editor Rob Bleetstein (top) notes, there is good reason to

believe that the format will continue to grow, both in the number of stations playing the music and in the parameters of the music itself. It isn't just leftof-mainstream country. It's all kinds of roots music, and, at age one, Americana has already made an impact on radio, record labels (such as Sugar Hill, headed by



AS TOLD TO ROB BLEETSTEIN

Ed Benson **On Giving Country Listeners What They Want**

As Executive Director and chief staff executive of the Country Music Association, Ed Benson directs the ongoing operations of CMA, the first trade organization formed to promote a type of music. Overseeing programs and activities which include marketing, public relations, international development and special events, Benson, a native Nashvillian and Vanderbilt University graduate, joined the CMA as its first Associate Executive Director in 1979 and has held his current title since 1992.

e're at an interesting time in country music right now. After a five-year growth surge that has tripled the size of the country music industry since 1990, making it the largest radio format, we must look for what's going to influence our ability to continue to be successful. Along with data from record sales and radio ratings, the CMA undertakes periodic consumer attitude studies, looking for what the consumer wants in their music

As country music has evolved, its audience has broadened significantly. The scope of its audience includes many exclusive listeners, but there is now a larger body of shared listeners. It's interesting how a large number of country radio programmers have reacted to the broadening of the format and its popularity. One of the unfortunate things going on in our business right now is that, from an artistic perspective, some of the artists whose musical interpretation and lyrical genius could transcend several formats at radio, like Americana, A3

and A/C, as well as being perfectly on-the-mark for country, are reluctant to have their music positioned into other formats because of the growing territorialism that country programmers have exhibited in reaction to artists whose music is being adopted and played in other formats. This is counterproductive to the overall growth of country music and is in contravention to the way the CMA has always promoted country music.

The essence of the idea of Americana has been the fact that there are certain artists who are song-driven. serious poetic artists, whose musical content and/or personal appearance did not fit within a parameter of what country music is, as defined by country radio. Therefore, they had difficulty finding a place to get played.

If you look at the growth surges that country music has experienced in the last three decades, you'll find it plateaus when it fails to remain fresh

and unique in its approach. The neotraditionalist movement of the '80s was about making music with integrity and believability, not trying to chase a crossover record as the previous Urban Cowboy boom had done. Today's criticism is that too many artists are sounding alike chasing the success the huge audience that's embodied in the country radio format can offer

What we have to do as an industry is be smart enough to realize that we have to adapt to where the consumer wants the music to go. In music, people will eventually tire of the same thing repeatedly. While there's a compelling need to stay fresh, you don't have to completely abandon the traditional values of the music.


The music industry as a whole has created these rigid format designations, yet the consumer is more eclectic than they've ever been, and that's a trend I don't think is going to go away. Americana is a demonstrated example of the fact that today's consumers have a broader taste range. I think you're going to see some type of evolution of musical presentation from radio and the media to address this. Exclusive format buying and listening is on a decreasing trend.

There will always be leaders and followers. We just have to be careful of the mix of what we do musically. We can't eliminate the opportunity for the innovator to come along, and for the artist who is already there to evolve and be innovative with their music. Country music needs to provide its consumer a greater diversity rather than a narrower one. GAVIN



sultants. There is a bucket load of great live music and there's always that surprise-filled cocktail party, so people will have lots of fun. But in reviewing this year's Seminar agenda, there are so many learning opportunities at all levels. I challenge anyone coming to Atlanta to leave without picking up a wealth of insight and practical information.

ARBS: The Big Picture

By popular demand, we're running an extended list of Fall Arbitron numbers this time around, including not only smaller markets, but also complete numbers for all. We hope this expanded roster puts things into better perspective.

The big news is that programmers continue to simmer over the leap in Spanish station numbers, blaming Arbitron's use of bi-lingual interviewers for the disproportionate rise. Arbitron GM Pierre Bouvard stands by the new methodology, which should make for an exciting exchange when Bouvard takes the hot seat at the GAVIN Seminar in Atlanta (see story, previous page).

Meanwhile, Arbitron is boasting its highest numbers ever for responses from males 18-24, with a whopping 39 markets now hitting perfect target percentages (more than quadruple the number from Fall of '94). In addition, all markets reporting so far have had significant increases in representation of these listeners

To us, the Quick Time Live phenomenon is just like the CNN truck pulling up to a site and reporting live. Instead of using cable lines, we post it on the Internet, and the difference is, it's interactive."

"Webcasting these things will fold into the entertainment experi-

ence," adds Lovester Law, VP of Marketing at BGP. "People will always want the live experience, but it can be heightened through the interactivity of the Internet. As we get into hundreds of TV channels and so many different entertainment opportunities for spending leisure time, it becomes more important to reach people's hearts, and that's what music does," says Law.

The marriage of digital and musical might realize the fantasies of cyber fiction, or it could be as fleeting as CB radios and the pet rock. At the very least, in any case, webcasting will produce a party fit to usher in the year 2000.

"Four years from now we'll be able to accomplish much more, if only because bandwidth will be broader," says Holtzman. "We believe that through Internet technology and where it will be in four years, that we could do something very spectacular and world wide."

"If you could be here now, you would hear the buzz all over this office about what we'll be doing for the year 1999," Law says gleefully.



Serving client stations, who target teen and young adult listeners, NGR's mission is to get back lost revenue and find new sources as well. In the initial six months, while the organization was raising funds, Esayian did some research, and found out that the industry has a marketing problem on its hands-not a sales problem. Instead of TV selling against radio, as many believe, she found that "some of the biggest supporters of radio are competitors like Fox, MTV, and the Box. MTV, for instance, spends most of their money on radio. If you visit them, the first thing out of their mouths is, 'Use radio if you're targeting teens.' And as for the talk about network radio 'stealing' money [budgeted for local stations], market-by-market analysis of affiliates shows how weak network radio is as a teen and young adult option."

Esayian argues that 'teen and young adult radio is a reach vehicle; spending the same amount of money, but getting more reach is an idea that's very compelling to a marketing manager."

Esayian explains one common problem facing radio, taking from her own experience: "In the entire seven years I worked as a product manager, I had interaction with radio twice. My research tells me that is not extraordinary; it's the norm." In addition, "Marketing managers typically have very poor backgrounds in media, so instead, they rely heavily on agencies for that information. If the agency isn't recommending radio, and the brand manager doesn't know enough about teen and young adult media habits, it's unlikely they'll push back and ask for it. So a negative cycle begins."

Since companies are the ones that determine which audiences they want to target for specific brands, it's Esayian's experience that radio makes one major marketing error: "A lot of marketing materials out there at local stations focus on why teens and young adults are such a good audience to target. I question why a radio station would ever have the right to walk in to a marketer and make that suggestion. We're suppliers of a medium that targets a certain demographic. It is the marketer's job, not a vendor's, to determine that teens and young adults are a good demo.

Since NGR's lobbying efforts began, the table has started to turn. From mid-'94 to mid-'95, the organization's first year of operation, the board of directors has more than exceeded expectations, in part because NGR has a strict rule: "Business must come from advertisers we haven't seen in at least two years or never before.

The idea is not to take direct business national, but to bring in *new* dollars. Our goal of \$2 million the first year turned out to be more like \$5.4 million and we're shooting for seven and a half in '96."

Last week, I reported on the tragic fate of Steady B and Cool C, who are currently in custody for the alleged murder of a Philadelphia police officer and attempted robberv. My item questioned what might drive anyone-rapping or not-to resort to bank robbery. Moreover, it saddens me that entertainers who are so envied by the public for their fame and perceived wealth can all too easily become victims of their own pursuit of the wealth they feel entitled to (not to mention the money to pay the bills, something we all deserve).

The very next day, I received an email from media assasin Harry Allen. It is such a great example of how important it is for us industry folk to monitor what is written and disseminated about our artists and music, I'm reprinting it here. It not only points out how critical it is for public figures to think before they act, it also points to a double standard held by media towards rap that must be dismantled. Allen responds to an article witten on Radioscope's Electronic Urban Report which read:

"The image of rap music just got slammed again with the arrest of Warren "Steady B" McGlone and Christopher "Cool C" Roney. The pair were arrested last Friday for the murder of Philadelphia police officer Lauretha Vaird, who responded to a silent alarm at a PNC bank branch. Vaird, a mother of two, was shot once in the chest." Allen responded:

Dear Electronic Urban Report: Regarding the 1/8/96 piece on McGlone and Roney.

To characterize this incident as, centrally, an issue of "rap Music" or one of "the image of rap music" is both irresponsible and incorrect when

a. The mother of two children bas been killed;

b. A law enforcement official

bas been struck down in the line of duty.

c. No other form of practice, popular or otherwise, gets regularly, similarly, wholly scrutinized and condemned on the basis of alleged misconduct by its practitioners (for example, nothing that Luciano Pavorotti, James Brown, Madonna, a consciruction worker, or a pediatrician does wrong is made to represent their chosen field, or "the image" of their chosen field);

d. The incident has, on the face of it, nothing to do with hip-hop music or hip-hop culture;

e. So many people, some of whom are cc'd on this letter, are able to make the straightforward distinction between the alleged conduct of persons and the mores of an art form.

Americana Picks

The year's off to a tasteful start with a bevy of new releases from many corners of the Americana sky.



FREAKWATER Old Paint (Thrill Jockey)

These are the women of country music. Add me to the growing list of folks who are just discovering Freakwater and are instantly blown away. Catherine Irwin and Janet Beveridge Bean sing with chilling honesty and pure clarity. Their plaintive country vocals are hillbilly to the core, swaying along with fiddle, pedal steel, and acoustic guitars. The opening "Gravity" will pull you right in. Irwin and Bean are in their thirteenth year of vocal partnership. They don't sound like anyone else, and songs like "Little Black Train" and "White Rose" show the results of their longtime vocal union. "Smoking Daddy" reeks of life in tobacco country, where Freakwater's roots are.

Old Paint, with its sparse, yet deep production, takes you on a journey with 12 of the kind of country songs that either shoot straight to your heart or smack a smile across your face. "Out of This World" may have a trace of Cowboy Junkies influence, while "Waitress" brings good times ala the Knitters. But that's about as far as comparisons should be thrown. Freakwater has not only sufficient musical talent, complimented beautifully by Bob Egan on steel, but also the songwriting skills to go any distance they choose.

TERRY ALLEN Human Remains (Sugar Hill)

legendary from Lubbock, Texas, Allen's a writer-playwright-singer-artist-teacher and probably a whole lot more, too. But the best news is, we now have his first new album in many years. A man who minces no words, Allen drawls us into the West Texas lifestyle from the git-go of "Gone to Texas," with background help from Joe Ely, Lucinda Williams, and David Byrne. Williams kicks in splendidly as the out-on-the-town woman on "Room to Room."

Allen serves up plenty of country ditties that could only come from his unique universe. From the dark world of "Back to Black," again with Williams' pure vocal backing, to the prissiness of "That Kind of Girl," Allen's wits are sharper than ever. Read the lyrics before you air "Crisis Site 13," a real slice-of-lifer. Other winners include "Peggy Legg," a potential new amputee anthem that is a duet with Jo Carol Pierce, and David Byrne's "Buck Naked." There's plenty of life on *Human Remains* to keep it around for a long time.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Dead Man Walking (Columbia/CRG)

An incredible mix of extraordinary artists from all over the map help tell the universal story of the film *Dead Man Walking* by



Tim Robbins. I've always been a fan of writer/director/actor Robbins' work, especially after he showed us he could twang with the best of 'em in *Bob Roberts*, where he sang country duets with Kelly Willis.

Robbins has been inspired in his work by many of today's best American songwriters, including Bruce Springsteen, Steve Earle, Tom Waits, Lyle Lovett, Mary Chapin Carpenter, and Johnny Cash, all of whom appear on the disc. Springsteen's title track is in sync with his current Tom Joad mode, Earle gives a spectacularly haunting reading of "Ellis Unit One," and Cash's soul-saving "In Your Mind" features backup by the gospel harmony of the Nashville Bluegrass Band. Ry Cooder produced and plavs guitar on that track, as well the tracks pairing Eddie Vedder with Pakistani singer Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan, which are world music at its finest

A complete honest package from great talents in both the music and film worlds, this is no ordinary soundtrack.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Not Fade Away (Remembering Buddy Holly) (Decca)

In compilation-land, sometimes when it rains, it pours. Now looks like one of those times. What *Dead Man Walking* is doing for soundtracks, *Not Fade Away* is doing for tribute records—which is making them so good that you can't help but forget you were tired of tribute records.

While I'm admittedly not a fan of these computerized-singing-with-deadpeople deals which opens the disc, I'm fairly compensated from there on. After many listens, I can groove on

every track. But what are the real stand-outs you ask? Nanci Griffith with the Crickets' "Well..All Right" is way more than that. Of course, Joe Ely and Todd Snider doing "Oh Boy!" is a natural, as are Marty Stuart and Steve Earle on "Crying, Waiting, Hoping." Suzy Bogguss with Dave Edmunds make "It Doesn't Matter Anymore" sound like a brand new song, and it's great to hear Levon Helm rockin' with his Band-mates on "Not Fade Away." But the real sleeper on this disc is Mary Chapin Carpenter and Kevin Montgomerv's take on "Wishing." This could really blow the doors open for Montgomery, who's released one album so far, and really shows incredible signs of artistic and vocal growth on this track.

This one sure does Buddy Holly right and should score radio play across many formats.

DAVID NELSON BAND Limited Edition (DNB)

I'll just be right up front with this: David Nelson is my original guitar hero, dating back to the earliest releases of his former band, New Riders of the Purple Sage. Nelson's dexterity for country pickin' is as genuine as you're gonna find. With his new band, he comes out swinging with this seven-song EP comprised of studio and live tracks.

"Yvonne" is an uptempo run-around, and "Freight Train Boogie" showcases

Nelson's acoustic playing, but the real gem here is "John Hardy's Wedding," which Nelson co-wrote with longtime cronie, Grateful Dead lvricist Robert Hunter. This track, which also showcases band member Barry Sless' tremendous guitar talent, is American songwriting at its finest, giving you that old west feeling throughout. Expand your limits with this Editon.

DAR WILLIAMS Mortal City (Razor & Tie)

Stepping high and far from the image of "girl with acoustic guitar," Dar Williams is already showing great maturity and

musical growth with this, her second album. The opening pop of "As Cool As 1 Am" utilizes the funk of a digeridoo to compliment Williams' knack for catchy songwriting. "Iowa (Traveling III)" emphasizes the sometimes barren life of the Midwest, and is helped along by Cliff Eberhardt's vocals and Larry Campbell's dobro. You're probably familiar with the holiday spark of "The Christians and The Pagans," which transcends beyond just a holiday song. You'll find real beauty in "The Ocean," which pits Williams' higher octave vocals with none other than John Prine, and if you're looking for something radical, check out "The Point-less, Yet Poignant, Crisis of a Co-ed.

So here we are, a full year down the Americana trail. Aside from Elvis and very few others, musical history is not made in a day, let alone a year. But the initial strides of this grassroots undertaking to highlight a certain corner of the musical spectrum, and enlighten radio and its audience have indeed begun to take hold, and the implementation of this format has attained several achievements in one short year.

For starters, the coining of the term "Americana" has been met with very favorable results. It's a likable linkage for a vast array of artists who never knew what to call their particular brand of music. Radio stations are slowly but surely beginning to pick up on the term, and in the world outside of radio, Americana is really catching on. From cable radio systems to retail music outlets, from live concert events to a new category at the Bay Area Music Awards, Americana is becoming the new standard.

Another favorable response, and the most important one, has been from the radio-listening and record-buying public. From the never ending stream of phone calls from the thrilled and curious, to the online conferences and ongoing press coverage, Joe and June Public are ecstatic to find out that there is a place where they can find, listen to, and ultimately buy the music they knew they always loved. They just didn't know where it was or what to even call it. And that's where radio needs to get more involved.

So we've broken in the new wheels. It's time to shift out of first gear and let 'er rip. It's not an easy road by any means, and the fight for a greater Americana presence on the radio nationally will rage on. But take heart; whether you're an Americana programmer, artist, promoter, or an everyday fan, you are not alone. We are everywhere and we shall prevail.

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For some time, the main question was "What exactly *is* Americana?" We can now say it is music that is rooted in the country and folk idioms, while leaning heavily on the aspects of country music that Top 40 Country radio no longer seems to recognize. But it also ventures a bit further than that, depending on the station's region and attitude. Is Americana open to blues, Cajun, or other forms of roots music? The answer is yes, but that is up to the stations and what they play. There are blues musicians and Cajun and zydeco artists who are rooted in country, and it's making that distinction that will ultimately lead to their inclusion.

So where are we headed in 1996? Significant growth with previously non-reporting country stations in competitive market situations is on the agenda. Small and medium market stations reflect the heritage of country music as a rural, roots-based genre. Americana stations are present in five of the Top 10 country ADI markets. But the scope is greater than just country. Americana stations will continue to reflect a musical diversity that has a qualitative depth to it, where the music stands on its own merits. Americana will continue to help bring the upper demo radio listener in to stations that choose to take this course.

The seeds have been planted, the roots are in the ground, and Americana will grow and expand in 1996. This growth will happen with time, patience, and diligence, and will have many benefactors in the long run, including radio stations, record labels, and especially, the artists.

Fans of the writing of Kinky Friedman will groove on "iWiWAL" (also known as "I Wish I Was a Lesbian") an example of Wainwright's rapier wit: "I wish a lesbian/Td like to be dyke/Td hang with k.d. lang/Mel Gibson, take a hike." But you'll probably have to lose that spoken intro. As for the opening "The Birthday Present," yes, it was recorded in the shower. We also like "1994."

MOJAVE 3 Ask Me Tomorrow (4AD/Warner Bros.)

By comparison, Mojave 3 are out to make the Cowboy Junkies seem like screaming lunatics. True to the vision of their label, 4AD's Mojave 3 perform a slow-burning and circular yet intimately somber brand of electric strum. Clean electric guitars, slight brush work, parlor piano, and sedate vocals make for midnight music—something you might hear on a Wim Wenders film. "Love Songs on the Radio" is the starter.

LEVELLERS Zeitgeist (Elektra)





Therapy? is rockin' in the new year with the release of their latest full-length, Infernal Love. Looking for hard rock/metal adds on January 15, Infernal Love marks the band's fourth album and another huge step up the ladder of success. Therapy?'s unrelenting rock sound is a mixture of spirited guitar hooks, broad bass lines, anxious drum slams, and Andrew Cairns' infectious vocals. And the resulting songs, such as "Ill-Fated," "Pecan Pie," "Radio King," and "Williamton Angel." often equal, or even eclipse, each's efforts with his "real" band. Tremendous.
