

# Stanley Crouch

Stanley Crouch will speak at the Gavin Seminar on Thursday afternoon. February 8. He's the author of The All-American Skin Game, or, the Decoy of Race, a collection of his essays published by Pantheon. His sharp commentary has run in many top periodicals including the Village Voice, Esquire, The New Republic, and the Sunday New York Daily News. He is also a frequent guest on television talk shows like Nightline, the Oprah Winfrey Show, and Charlie Rose. "Mr. Crouch, "the New York Times urrote on December 11, 1995, "loves the steuof American democracy, the ferment of nationalities; what he calls the 'gumbo' of our culture and 'our miscengenated identity as Americans.

e find ourselves in a time where categories are more important than individuality. A good number of people have been sold the idea that they should believe more in categories than their own individuality, which plays itself in unusual ways. You become a representative of some sort of condition.

For instance, a black person might be talking to a white person, and the white person may say in the middle of the conversation, "Well vou know, as a white person, I can't understand that." That kind of a statement is at the far end of the objectives of the civil rights movement. The civil rights movement was founded on the idea that there was a human commonality that could speak across these categories.

You constantly hear people talking about being African. I saw these people on C-Span the other night speaking at Howard University. You have some guy in the psychology department talk-

ing about creating a new African culture. What does the history of psychology have to do with Africa? It's nutty stuff based on accepting an alienated relationship to American society and American history. It's unrealistic.

It's not only unrealistic, it's not true. Black Americans have been in the center of the development of America from the time they arrived. They became Americans whether they liked it or not. They fought in the French and Indian Wars, the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, the Alamo, the Civil War. They were involved in the winning of the West, riding in on wagon trains. They fought in the Spanish-American War and on and on. To throw all of that out in the interest of some romantic attachment to a foreign continent is bizarre.

In fact, that's what I ought to talk about in Atlanta. Maybe I'll talk about the "American-ness" of the issue and one of my favorite subjects, the challenge of civilization under capitalism-morality, ethics and the profit motive. That's the issue. We already

know what barbarism under capitalism will get you—the slave trade, child exploitation, etcetera.

I use the term "Negro" because it is about the epic tales that stretch from the Atlantic to the Pacific, to the Canadian to the Mexican border. That's what I'm talking about. I'm not talking about African, the Caribbean, South American. I'm talking about the U.S.A.

How do we get to the point where we suddenly have rules on what you can call people in major publications? What is that? I won't publish in a magazine if they choose to try and change that. I don't submit to that. That's not the same as calling someone an insulting name. What if somebody decides you cannot use the term "Hebrew" in this paper or you cannot use "Japanese-American"? It sounds totalitarian to me, especially since it is not officially conceived as a term of insult.

I think those radio guys, starting [with KACE and WBLS], who decided they were not going to play [gangsta rapl were good. Sometimes we have to wean people from the worst sides of their own tastes, if we can, by providing them with something better.

We know that there was an appetite in America [in previous decades] for the Negro buffoon. The way people began to get away from that was by writing roles for people like Sidney Poitier and others. It wasn't like they suddenly told people like Mantan Moreland that they could no longer be comedians. They just made it so that every time a black person came on the screen, he had to be another kind of black person. That's how you wean the public from the lower side of its taste. GAVIN



# NY Times Report Tells of SoundScan Loopholes

For SoundScan, it's not anywhere near a SoundScandal. But the recent report in the *New York Times*, about how some record companies and retailers are manipulating what appeared to be a foolproof method of tracking record sales, could not have been good news.

In the article, the *Times* told how SoundScan, based in Hartsdale, N.Y., revolutionized chart methodology in 1991 by using a point-of-sale computer system that scanned the bar codes of records at thousands of stores, adding a "legitimacy and authority to the charts."

But, writer Neil Strauss noted, last year, four singles debuted at Number One, and, he added, it wasn't because more people were buying singles. It was because labels had found loopholes in the system.

One method is the sending, by a marketing company on behalf of a label, of free copies of singles the label is trying to push to an immediate top position on the charts. Stores that report

to SoundScan have reportedly received four singles for the price of one. In the case of Mariah Carey's "One Sweet Day," which has been on top of the *Billboard* 



charts for nine weeks, some stores could offer the single for as low as 49 cents, thereby boosting unit sales.

Others take advantage of the status of independent record stores. Because SoundScan concentrates on major chains and is in far fewer independent shops, records sold at the smaller stores are weighted to account for those that do not report to SoundScan. A single record sold at a rap music store in Brooklyn is tallied as three singles sold by SoundScan.

Said a sales executive at a label: "It's common practice to tweak your sales by giving free singles to mom-and-pop stores in quantity—from 60 to 90 cassettes—to put on sale."

Michael Shalett, founder of the company that developed SoundScan, did not appear surprised to hear of the manipulations.

"One of the things that we've learned is, you build a better mousetrap and all of a sudden the mouse starts finding ways around your trap." Still, said Shalett, SoundScan is virtually foolproof. "We're talking about campfire and nuclear power when it comes to where we were five or six years ago and where we are now in terms of...accuracy," he said.

As with reports of payola, industry figures agreed that manipulation can only go so far. "Ultimately," said one record executive, "if the record doesn't work with people, no matter how much you pervert the figures, it doesn't matter. What these things can only do is help expose a record...it's up to the public to decide."

# Outpost Records Is Instantly 'In'

Outpost Recordings, a new record label formed by a producer, a manager, and an A&R exec with cutting-edge credentials, has catapulted into industry prominence.

With backing by Geffen, which will distribute its products, Outpost is the brainchild of Andy Gershon, former manager of the Smashing Pumpkins and Bryan Ferry; Scott Litt, Grammy-winning producer of such seminal works as R.E.M.'s

Out Of Time and Nirvana's MTV Unplugged, and Mark Williams, who was responsible for signing such acts as R.E.M. and The Smashing Pumpkins.

The question on everyone's mind is whether Outpost will be the new home for R.E.M., given the band's longstanding relationship with both Litt and Williams, and the fact that they only owe Warner Bros. one more album.

"We have a relationship that's been there over the years," Williams said with caution. "If it feels right for them and us, then of course we'll talk to them, but we by no means expect anything to happen. They have to do

what's right for them."

Whatever happens, Litt expects to still produce the band. He told us that he does not plan to sever all his connections with bands that aren't on his label. "I think it's important that everybody recognizes that I still need to stay active in the producers community outside our situation."

Although the Outpost principals have all made their mark in alternative music, they are quick to point out that they aren't limiting themselves to alternative. "We're not just looking for one particular kind of music," said Williams. "We want to sign artists who make music that we love."

Gershon said that the trio aren't in any rush to release a record just for the sake of making a mark on the industry." I wouldn't even be upset if we were just releasing our first record this time next year. We subscribe to the three S's— slow, steady and smart." But it looks like their first release will debut early this fall with Veruca Salt, who are moving from Geffen to Outpost.

# It's Official: Lambert Lopes to Epic

Confirming what the industry seemed to have known for weeks, Epic Records announced last Monday that Craig Lambert, the popular Executive Vice President of Elektra Records, has joined Epic as Senior Vice President.

Lambert will oversee Epic's promotion activities. At Elektra, he worked with artists including Natalie Merchant, Better Than Ezra, and Adina Howard. Before Elektra, he was with eastwest

Records, where his artists included En Vogue and



Simply Red.
Thomas D. Mottola, Presi-

dent and CEO of Sony Music Entertainment, called Lambert "a resourceful and well-respected executive" who "played an important role in the success" of his previous labels.

Added David Glew, Epic Records Group Chairman: "Craig's abilities and strengths complement our long-term goals."

Lambert, said Epic Records President Richard Griffiths, "joins Epic at a new stage in our development, and I'm delighted to welcome him to Epic's senior management ranks."

Lambert returned the compliments, adding: "Another compelling reason for moving to Sony Music was the opportunity to work with Tommy Mottola and Michele Anthony."

It was the first time in several years that Mottola had been referred to as "Tommy." But, as we went to press, Lambert still had his job.

# It's All News to Rupert Murdoch

On the eve of his scheduled appearance at the Gavin Seminar in Atlanta, Rupert Murdoch is all over the news. Literally.

The Chairman of the News Corporation and Fox Inc., in part-

nership with MCI Communications, won the last unclaimed orbital slot for a television satellite, with a bid of \$682.5 million.

Murdoch then announced plans for an all-news channel to compete with CNN and with similar projects announced by NBC and ABC.

Unlike his rivals, Murdoch would have to build a network news operation. He has tapped Roger Ailes, former president of CNBC, to be chairman of the new channel, which Murdoch promised would be something "not like" the others.

On the satellite front, MCI and News Corporation said they plan to invest another \$1 billion into the system, which will be called American Sky Broadcasting and be in competition with DirecTV. Within two years, he said, it will beam 200 channels of television pro-

gramming and a range of business communications services straight to homes and offices across the country, and should grow to offer some 400 channels.

Last year, MCI paid \$2 billion for a 13.5 percent stake in Murdoch's company. Under their joint venture, MCI is expected to be primarily responsible for developing business-oriented services, while the News Corporation would focus on consumer services.

# American Music Awards: Garth Takes Two of Three

The 23rd American Music Awards have managed to make the Grammys appear cutting-edge.

The awards, voted by the record-buying public, leaned heavily towards veteran acts like Alabama, Reba McEntire, the Eagles, and Garth Brooks.

Brooks, who, along with the Eagles, won three awards, thought his Favorite Artist of the Year honor was so wrong that he refused it, stunning the audience.

"I cannot agree with this," said Brooks, who also won for Favorite Male Country Artist and Favorite Country Album (Hits), and who stirred the audience with "The Change," accompanied by video of the aftermath of the Oklahoma City bombing.

Music, he said, "is made up of a lot of people," and "without disrespect for the American Music Awards and....for the people who voted, for all the people who should be honored, I'm gonna leave it right here." He then strode off stage.

Backstage, Brooks, who did not tour issued an album

of new material only late last year, said that the award should have gone to Hootie & the Blowfish, for their impact on the record industry in 1995.

The Atlantic act had more nominations than any other artist, but out of five cate-

gories, won only for favorite pop-rock new artist.

The Eagles beat Hootie and others for favorite poprock album, A/C artist, and pop-rock group.

Boyz II Men took home two awards: Favorite R&B album and R&B group. They were up for the artist of the year award and praised Brooks for his refusal of the honor.

Mariah Carey (Favorite female soul-R&B artist and pop-rock artist) and Pearl Jam (heavy metal-hard rock group and alternative group) were the other double-winners

Michael Jackson won for male Pop-Rock artist, but was a no-show, as were Pearl Jam.

Alabama won its 19th American Music Award, for favorite country group. Reba McEntire won as favorite female country artist, and Shania Twain was named favorite new country artist.

Coolio won favorite rap/hip-hop artist and presented an award with "Weird Al" Yankovic, who styled his hair to simulate Coolio's every-which-way-but-loose do.

Rapper LL Cool J performed, but censors clipped big chunks of his medley of "Mama Said Knock You Out/Hey Lover." Other performers included Brandy, who won for favorite new soul/R&B artist, and Luther Vandross, favorite male soul-R&B artist.

Tammy Wynette received the Award of Merit, while other veterans, including Neil Diamond, Kenny Rogers, and Lionel Richie, also made appearances.

Hosts were comics Sinbad and Jeff Foxworthy, who appeared about as compatible as O.J. Simpson and Fred Goldman.

During the Seminar, visitors to the page will find schedules and instructions regarding real-time audio broadcast of various sessions, including "The Internet: What's In it For Radio and the Music

Business," moderated by RealAudio's Rob Glaser.

The 24-hour, real-time audio and video cybercast is presented by GAVIN, in association with Musictown Online, which plans to provide free World Wide Web sites to the first 200 radio station to stop by their exhibit at the Seminar.

"As far as radio is concerned, video is one of the most powerful parts of the Web," says Jeff Gold, president of Musictown Online. "Ten to 12 stations are already broadcasting live audio on the Web, but video offers true potential

for a station. If a station had an in-studio guest, they could tell people to go to their Web Site and view the person in the studio."

Musictown will unveil its system by featuring audio/video cybercasts of Alex Bennett's Show on LIVE 105 (KITS) in San Francisco and Atlanta's alternative rock station 99X. Gold urges radio stations to bring VHS recorded tours of their stations, interviews, or anything else they'd like to include on their sites. Stations interested should call 1-800-800-2786.

Rachtman, former host of MTV's *Headbanger's Ball*, was one of three hosts of *Loveline*, a call-in show set to splinter off into a late-night TV version later this year.

Beginning last Monday (January 29), he has his own show, on KLSX, from 2 to 4 p.m., replacing actor/O.J. Simpson house guest Kato Kaelin, who left the station ostensibly to pursue his acting career.

KLSX, said Rachtman, "has been looking for somebody like me...As much as I loved doing *Loveline*...the administrative people made me feel like anybody could do the show." Rachtman shared *Loveline* with comic Adam Corrolla and Dr. Drew Pinsky.





## Paul Stewart: Making Power Moves

It is often said that inside of every dark cloud there's a silver lining. This maxim recently proved true for manager extraordinaire Paul Stewart. Just over 30 years old, Stewart founded Powermove Productions nine years ago when he found himself out of a job due to restructuring at Island Records. His dark cloud of unemployment revealed a platinum path to starmaking as his own boss.

His is no overnight success story, however. His career began early, when he was just 22. Stewart did short stints in staff positions at Arista and Delicious Vinyl. He served as A&R executive for both Ice Cube's Street Knowledge Productions and John Singleton's New Deal Records. The Baldwin Hills native became the nation's hip-hop tour guide of Los Angeles as a regional columnist for The Source. Known informally as DJP, he was the guy that was, as he recalls, "just happy to be spinning" in LA's hottest clubs. Wearing all these hats was priceless practice for Stewart. Once he turned his attention to promotion, PMP (Powermove Productions) became instrumental in breaking supergroups Naughty by Nature and Cypress Hill with its special brand of street-intensive indie promotion.

Soon, labels that wouldn't hire him initially came to depend on him as their "man in L.A." Stewart was constantly in the streets, from the ghetto to Hollywood Boulevard. His fierce love for hip-hop and R&B kept him looking ahead for the next musical breath of fresh air. He recalls "Even when there wasn't a check in it for me, it was about being' down and reaping the intangibles down the line—never knowing how they'd pay off."

By 1990, artists were approaching Stewart for management. With his easygoing manner, unspoiled ear, and street savvy, trusting DJ P seemed more realistic to hungry

rappers than turning to those whom Stewart calls "cigar-chomping clowns with their 'Yeah, kid, we'll make ya a stahhhr!' crap." I was more like the artists, plus I had a little juice," he jokes. His first management client was House Of Pain, followed by The Pharcyde, whom he met at Gavin Seminar '90 when they were the dance crew Two For Two. He got both groups their deals, but it was the non-Irish foursome that garnered national props for Stewart as a guv with an eagle's eye for the kind of talent that could pull in acclaim and high sales.

Teamwork, above all, is the main ingredient to Stewart's success. "we run our company as a family business," he says. "I love developing young executive talent as much as I enjoy finding new creative talent. Our philosophy is to understand the music, offer constructive criticism, and contribute to the project. PMP does the A&R that labels don't do anymore."

Teamwork means bringing great artists to record companies with a clear success strategy and a positive attitude toward the label. It is this formula that has taken clients Coolio and Warren G. to multi-platinum heights. Stewart advises avoiding adversarial label relationships whenever possible, saying "I'm continually frustrated with labels because of the stupid battles we wage with record people who don't understand hip-hop culture. Still, I maintain a friendly attitude until we have the leverage to make decisions."

As a key player in getting Def Jam its first Number One pop hit, with client Montell Jordan's "This Is How We Do It", it is apparent that Stewart's approach is getting him the leverage he seeks. While believing firmly in the uniqueness of his clients, Stewart nonetheless believes that hats of psychologist, accoun-


tant, and dealmaker have served him well. "Management is incredible training for this business," says Stewart. "Everyone who's big were or still are great managers: Freddy DeMann. Irving Azoff, David Geffen. I plan to be


around 20 years from now as a leader in hip-hop and street-oriented R&B, which is as fresh now as hip-hop was ten years ago."

Having weathered the storms, including being broke with The Pharcyde as roommates and 60-hour weeks as an Arista intern, Paul Stewart and PMP have sunshine on the horizon. Stewart has redirected PMP Records from Def Jam to Loud,

where he will work closely with one-time indie promotion rival Steve Rifkind, Arguably the boldest pairing of hip-hop moguls since Russel Simmons and Rick Rubin decided to create Def Jam in 1985, Stewart's label will now be distributed through RCA/BMG with the debut of alternahip-hop trio Delinquent Habits, scheduled to be the first release to benefit from the

new arrangement. In addition to Coolio, PMP Management steers the careers of urban crooner L.V., Brooklyn-based duo Ill Al Skratch, and soul quartet Universal Nubian Voices. Powermove Productions houses songwriters, producers, and a recording facility. Stewart's "Fantastic Voyage" is poised to reach a well-deserved zenith in 1996. —Thembisa S. Mshaka ●








Pharcyde: Paul's breakthrough management client.



If you're worried about missing your down home cooking, don't. Once you've eaten in Atlanta a city which may have the largest list of African American restaurants in the country. you will think you've died and gone to heaven. Take your pick from places like The Beautiful, opened 24 hours, or try the gournet soulfood menu at Shantrelle's-it's all good.

### SEMINAR NOTES

Before I give you the final rundown of the Urban events, I want to mention a few other attractions that you shouldn't miss. On Thursday at 4 p.m. don't sleep Stanley Crouch, the controversial essayist/author. Crouch will give the Jazz/A2 Keynote address about culture, race, and jazz. If you're unfamiliar with this talented brother, do yourself a favor and attend his speech. It's sure to have conventioneers talking about it for the rest of the weekend.

Herbie Hancock's band will be playing on Friday at 2 p.m. His group's performance will be videotaped, and Hancock will be interviewed about the state of American music prior to the performance.

URBAN EVENTS LINEUP: FOR THE LAST TIME I'm thrilled to have Terri Rossi, BMG VP of Marketing, as the Keynote Speaker for the Urban Landzcape. Terri Rossi's extensive career in the business started at Philadelphia International in 1979. She served as Billhoard Magazine's, R&B and Jazz editor for several years. Her experience and dedication make her one of the most loved, trusted, and treasured individuals in the music industry. Her speech is entitled The Music, and The Business, a Reality Check. Come and learn from a true

# Jrban Workshop Black History and More

Il Urban formatted stations should do some form of Black history programming throughout the year. This is an essential ingredient in becoming a community leader in your market, Let's face it, the month of February is much to short to do a decent job of educating people about their history, no matter how concentrated your promotional plan. Your listenership perceives this once a year promotion s mere lip service to a subject that is contral to their identity and character.

The following are samples of some institutional concepts you can apply to your pr mming to make Black history a part of your routine programming and give your audience a real sense of commitment from your station.

Be innovative, develop your own profiles, and dare to be different. Make your features longer and as cinematic as possible. Include sound, sound effects, and music. Use your air-personalities to voice these features, and integrate them into your promo packages. Run them year round, These profiles will serve the dual purpose of connecting you to the community and jock cross-promotion.

It is very simple to set up a scholarship fund for deserving students in the name of your station. Many corporations and businesses are interested in co-sponsoring this type of promotion. A lot of stations use their scholarship program to encourage record companies to supply a tists for concerts that benefit the fund O-PROMOTION

Work with your sales department and vour local newspaper or television station to exchange promotional time in a joint giveaway. For example, you could do a Black history crossword puzzle with a newspaper; a major contest like this should run the entire month and the grand prize should be substantial. —Q

BLACK HISTORY PROFILE



ROOTS: James Langston Hughes was born in Joplin, Missouri, Feburary 1, 1902.


EDUCATION: Hughes graduated from Lincoln University, in Philadelphia in 1926.

ACHIEVEMENTS: Hughes was a multifacted artist, but his greatest impact was in bringing the black experience to American literature as a poet. He was known as "the Poet Laureate of the Negro Race." Examples of his protest poetry can be seen in his books, *The Weary Blues* (1926), One Way Ticket (1949), Montage of a Dream Deferred (1951), and his last volume *The Panther and* the Lash (1967).

Hughes will always be remembered as the leading voice of the Harlem Renaissance of the 20's and 30's. He encouraged other black writers to use black culture as a weapon in the struggle against racism and discrimination. As a writer of both fiction and non-fiction, a playwright, columnist, and poet, he symbolized the values of the ordinary black people in his work. Hughes believed, "There are certain practical things American Negro writers can do, and must do. There's a song that says, 'the time ain't long,' that song is right; something has got to change in America—and change soon. We must help that change come." —Q


### THE MUSIC





### DEBORAH COX "Who Do U Love?" (Arista)

Until now, Deborah Cox has been exclusively embraced by the Urban and dance-leaning pop stations, but this new single has plenty of mainstream appeal, and it's sure to get significant play from A/C radio. It's an all-hook-all-the-time song.

# BUDDY HOLLY & THE HOLLIES "Peggy Sue Got Married" (Decca/MCA)

Yes, Buddy Holly sings with the band that named themselves after him. Thanks to modern technology, the late Mr. Holly can be accompanied by Graham Nash and his old mates in the Hollies. The real Peggy Sue, by the way, was married to Cricket Jerry Allison.

### k.d. lang "Sexuality" (Warner Bros.)

Ms. lang's bold, non-gender specific love song recalls the pleas and sentiments of Marvin Gaye's "Sexual Healing." Lang's character is now less the ingenue and more the seductor.

# DIANA ROSS "Voice of the Heart" (Motown)

The queen of Motown has this year's musical Valentine. It's from her recent *Take Me Higher* album and was written by Bruce Roberts, John Bettis, and J.T. Stanley. The Nick Martinelli production is right down A/C's alley and should renew her longstanding relationship with the format.

# ALANNAH MYLES "You Love Who You Love" (TVT Records)

Alannah showcases her ballad style for this attractive cut, which is written by Carole Bayer Sager and featured in the soundtrack of Sandra Bullock's *Two If By Sea*. Myles' textured vocals give the song depth, while producer Guy Roche (of Celine Dion fame) provides a rich environment of strings that compliment the package.

### JIM BRICKMAN featuring LAURA CREAMER "By Heart'

The results are a surprisingly fresh approach to many of Nelson's tunes, which also serve to emphasize some of the alternative acts' country roots or leanings.

Kidnapping **Johnny Cash** out of his "House of Cash" and transplanting him into a Seattle grunge-supergroup environment gives "Time of the Preacher" a bend that will either thrill you or mortify you, depending on your taste.

That's where this work really leaves its mark. Naturally, if you're unfamiliar with bands like L7 or Gas Huffer, you will be shocked at first. But with continued listens, these works take on a life of their own, and can clearly win you over, as they have me. The Supersuckers tear up "Bloody Mary Morning" with some help from Willie, and Alice In Chains' Jerry Cantrell gives a spectacularly haunting read on "I've Seen All This World I Care to See." The Reverend Horton Heat's take on "Hello Walls" gives clear indica-

tion of the Rev's roots, and the Presidents of the United States of America pay homage to Willie and Junior Brown on "Devil in a Sleepin' Bag."

Willie Nelson has always been a boundary breaker, and now this un-tribute record continues that tradition, as only Willie would have it.

### From Chairman Crouch



Stanley Crouch

I've always respected Stanley Crouch as a tough-minded intellectual, so, naturally, a little nervousness set in prior to my conversation with him. But thankfully, all went well. We spoke for nearly an hour, with topics ranging from jazz to the Simpson trial.

### WRINGING OUR HANDS AFTER THE O.J. TRIAL

"We can look at all of those people who were involved in the trial and realize that 30 years ago, if a famous black athlete had been on trial, it would have been him, a white lawyer, a white jury and a white judge. That's the way it was, but it's not like that now.

I was really amazed at all the things going on, and how certain people in the media couldn't get it together. They couldn't see (the whole scenario) and acted hysterically. You had a Jewish female prosecutor, a black prosecutor, all kinds of experts who were male and female, Asian, black, white, etcetera. The judge was a Japanese-American, the son of two people interned in relocation centers during World War II. All these people were in the courtroom, central to the case. The press didn't see jit.

The Simpson trial wasn't so much entertainment, it was just an American drama of enormous importance. People were tied up

in it, just as they were the Anita Hill or Watergate hearings. Murder trials have a magnetic charisma whether anybody likes it or not."

### SUPPOSE A FAMOUS WHITE MAN WAS ACCUSED OF MURDERING HIS BLACK EX-WIFE. DOES THE O.J. TRIAL SURVIVE THE FLIP TEST?

"Probably. Especially if the Geraldo Rivera-types were able to whip up the same kind of hysteria about this white guy murdering a black woman and they had a tape of her calling the police. They would have gone on about another example of how black women have been mistreated. Suppose the guy had been essentially convicted by the media. Suppose there had been a police officer who found a piece of evidence that was central to the case, and was found to be a member of the Nation of Islam? Suppose he believed all white people were devils and it was okay to fabricate evidence? The prosecution would lose.

"Part of the problem was the media did not do its job. It was a true example of media irresponsibility. You can talk to every lawyer and judge that you know, and they will all tell you that nine out of ten times, juries acquit when a star prosecution witness—especially a cop—is found lying on the witness stand. That has nothing to do with race. The media didn't make that clear. They went into something else.

"Can you imagine some black cop taking the defendant's blood and driving around for 25 miles with it in his pocket instead of turning in the evidence immediately? Or some EDTA is found on the socks and on the gate? That's enough to raise a reasonable doubt on the part of any jury."

### TOUGH ON YOUTH CULTURE?

"As long as pop music and youth culture stays in what I consider its real arena, it's fine. 'Hey girl, I saw you. You sure do look good.





"That's fine. Adolescent versions of the romantic songs. Wonderful. It doesn't have to be heavy. We're talking about kids.

"But when it gets into the stuff Madonna does, like freelance sluttishness, or when people are bragging about shooting somebody for doing this or that, or insane fantasies about shooting police officers, I just think it's irresponsible.

"Further, as I've pointed out many times, if Rick Rubin had gotten a bunch of white guys together and they had written the lyrics and directed the videos to all these songs like what the Geto Boys and Niggas With Attitude did, that stuff would have been out of here over ten years ago. The civil rights organizations and the responsible white people in the media would have come out of the walls on these things. 'How dare you depict Afro-American youths as essentially a bunch of anarchic monsters?'

"They wouldn't have let them get away with it. That's the problem I have. I just think it's irresponsible, because it objectifies the reasons why Afro-American communities are presently oppressed. They're oppressed, not in an overt sense by so-called white society, but by these marauding criminals in their own community.

"Street gangs have killed over 7,000 people in the last 25 years. Can you imagine a police department allowed to kill that many people? "The homicides committed by police departments are under 20 people every year in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. If they got up to 50, the police chief would be gone, along with the mayor.

"I don't care about kids having their sentimental music that they can dance to and fall into puppy love with. That's just part of twentieth century adolescent evolution. But celebrating anarchy and irresponsible sexual behavior and contempt for authority—and I'm not talking about nose-thumbing authority, but rather serious criminal contempt—is bad. You may be advocating something that has terrible repercussions socially."

### DOLORES TUCKER, WILLIAM BENNETT, AND THE INTERSCOPE UPHEAVAL

"I think it's good, because they're making people think. When you get to a point where you come into a meeting with the lyrics of a so-called song, and the president of the company will not read those lyrics aloud, that says a lot.

"I know those same words are in *Ulysses* and they've been used by

major writers. That's not what we're talking about. It's about a body of material that largely advocates anarchic behavior. I don't think it's very good for the society, and I don't think it should be censored either. I remember the kind of pressure put on Warner Bros. over Ice Tea's' 'Cop Killer.' Take the word 'cop' out and put in 'black' or 'Jew' or 'woman.' See how you react to it then.

"Our society is driven by the ambition to become wealthy. You have people who have learned how to regenerate garbage. In other words, you can always sell garbage. The thing that is basically different in American society now than it was in 1940, is now people will buy garbage from anybody. In the old days, ethnic minorities couldn't really sell garbage, because white people didn't buy garbage from them. They only bought garbage from themselves. A guy like Russell Simmons wouldn't make any money in 1940. White America wouldn't buy his product.

### HOW JAZZ MEASURES UP

"A lot of good things are happening. More and more young people are coming out to play [jazz]. There's a little piece in my new book called "True Blue Rebel." I talk about the fact that these young musicians, who are actually trying to learn how to play, are the real rebels in contemporary music, and not somebody who walks out there with his pants falling down and his finger up in the air, or some woman who comes out looking like she should be working on Times Square or in a burlesque house, like Madonna doing pornography with a back-beat. All these other people are playing along with conventions of today's media.

"I'm glad young jazz musicians have that kind of individuality today, and the willingness to try something outside of the ordinary. The vulgar, the heavy-handed, the obnoxious, the anarchic is what's conventional today.

"You don't see young women playing jazz going on the bandstand looking like prostitutes. They come out and get respect for being able to play. When you have made a decision to play like that—which is not what is advocated by mass media—you are the real rebel."

We were saddened by a phone call from PD Darrell Brogdon informing us that KANU-Lawrence music director and evening radio personality Bob Hammond passed away at 10:30 p.m. on Sunday, January 28. According to Brogdon, Hammond had been battling ill health for the past several months. He had finished his usual 8 o'clock to midnight airshift on Friday night, and we even spoke to him the day before

when he phoned in his report, as he did religiously every week. Bob had been with the University of Kansas station for 22 years, dating back to when he was a student. Bob was a real jazz beaux and a GAVIN jazz reporter from Day One. We loved him as a friend and we'll miss him.



### ACE OF BASE "Lucky Love" (Arista)

Proving their particular style of music comes in all shapes and colors, Jenny, Linn, Buddha, and Joker roll into '96 with a song that people like B96-Chicago MD Erik Bradley were testifying about long before the end of last year. "Lucky Love" was released as their first single in the U.K., where it became an instant smash-a fact that should come as no big surprise to anyone who's heard the song. More than a few programmers predict Number One, and you'll get no argument here. NO DOUBT

### "Just a Girl" (Trauma/Interscope)

Matthew Wilder produced this hook-filled entry that's been building a solid Alternative base since well before the holiday break. It's one of the most played tracks at KROQ-Los Angeles, and although the band hails from SoCal, it's doubtful that's what's earned them all the exposure. Top 40 is starting to get behind it in a big way, and early reports point to a major hit in the making.



### LENNY KRAVITZ "Can't Get You Off My Mind" (Virgin)

Don't even try to second guess the creative genius of Lenny Kravitz. Whether rockin', gettin' funky, or taking a pure mainstream approach, he is sure to compose words and music designed to leave a lasting impact. Not since "I Believe" has he accomplished that task so thoroughly for pop radio.

### "Santa Monica (Watch the World Die)" (Capitol)

Got exposed to this track while channel surfing late one night and accidentally seeing the video. Alternative play has already generated phones and a potent sales story. It's difficult to imagine this not crossing quickly.

This varietal blend of moods, packaged for the current Sandra Bullock/ Dennis Leary film, includes Alannah Myles doing a Carole Bayer Sager song, Myles usual producer orchestrating a track from unknown Amanda Marshall, Sinead O'Connor back working with a Pope or two, the Pointer Sisters reviving Sam & Dave's "You Got Me Humin'," a new Belinda Carlisle song, two Shelby Lynne tracks, a bluesy guitar solo from Colin James, and Troy Newman's excellent debut, "Don't Make Me Ask," which for two weeks running has been an A/C Most Added. --- RON FELL

# AVENUE BLUE featuring JEFF GOLUB Naked City (Bluemoon)



Jeff Golub was happily playing lead guitar with Rod Stewart and doing sessions in New York when the solo bug bit him in 1994. The result was Avenue Blue, a solo guitar debut that did very well with commercial smooth jazz stations. His follow-up is called Naked City, and the grooves are as economic as the previous record, but this time Golub steps up the funk a little more. The mid-tempo title song will draw early airplay attention, but spirited tunes like "Nitpickin" and "Funky Is As Funky Does" will draw clean comparisons

to Booker T. & the MGs in the feelin' good department. Rick Braun returns to co-produce and sit in, while Golub explores his soul and jazzrock influences. Pianist Bob James jams on the breezy "Conversation," and Phoebe Snow sings on he standard, "Baby I'm Yours".

### PATRA (with AARON HALL) "Scent of Attraction" (550 Music/Sony)

This song is exactly what you would expect from a duet between Patra and Aaron Hall-a slow, funky, sexy sound that produces a lot of sparks. Patra is at her enticing best with a comeon rap full of sexual tension, and Aaron Hall supplies a smooth soulful vocal that adds bottom and a pulsating beat full of heat. Urban A/Cs and Quiet Storm shows should try the Characters remix; it's full of instrumental flavor. —Quincy McCoy

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
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
