
Urban Landzcape is in the midst of a renaissance. New talent is reshaping the world of rhythm & blues...singersongwriters are

Kashif

On Why Urban Music Needs the Singer-Songwriter

Kashif is a Renaissance man—a singer, producer, publisher, and songwriter whose credits include Whitney Houston's "You Give Good Love," Evelyn "Champagne" King's "I'm in Love" and "Love Come Down," and songs for Kenny G. Dionne Warwick, and George Benson. The five-time Grammy nominee is also an author, of Everything You'd Better Know About the Record Industry (GAVIN, January 5, 1996) and CEO of Brooklyn Boy, his own label. The company, he says, will focus on young talent and, specifically, on singer-songwriters, whose return to the Urban Landzcape has re-energized the music and given hope to musicians like Kashif.

n the '80s, I guess I was one of the songwriter-producers who started the whole trend that led to a producer-driven business. Before then, it was a record company-driven business, and the artists were very much at the whim of several different people who made up a team that was responsible for producing a record. That team would include a producer, an arranger, sometimes a songwriter, and the record company A&R people. In the early '80s, the trend turned to onestop shopping, where it was the producer-songwriter-artist all in one, and sometimes, if it was just a producer-songwriter, he'd also be the arranger and the person who played all the instruments on the record.

Now, you're starting to see folks emerging back on the scene-Babyface is a singer-songwriter. On the R&B side there's also R. Kelly,



and then you have Tracy Chapman. There is the re-emergence of the artist who's also a songwriter.

That's due to a couple of things. It's due to record companies wanting to have one-stop shopping. What's happened with the whole producer-driven industry is that radio has become so homogenized, especially on the black side, You have producers who tend not to be able to custom-make songs, but rather, they write in their own style and fit people into those songs. Radio's become so homogenized, and I think the public wants more variety. You can afford more variety when you're dealing with artists who are also songwriters, because they have a tendency to be a little more personal about the material that they write for themselves, and also there're probably a lot more out there willing to take a shot at doing what it is they really want to do rather than following a trend.

There's also a backlash to hiphop, because when you turn on the

radio. For one full hour, however long you listen, you're going to hear, basically, one beat. One beat. All this angry language, subject matter-it's bragging, or talking about killing or shooting. There's no virtue to any of the lyrics out there. I think when there's an emergence of an artist who has a style, both melodically, lyrically, and maybe even rhythmically, that steps out of that, it sounds incredible.

I think record companies and radio people have short-changed the public by not playing variations of different kinds of music. It's just hip-hop, and one kind of hip-hop. That gets old, and it has gotten old.

But hip-hop is not to blame for this. I think it's A&R people who don't have vision; record companies that only want what's already on the radio, and artists who are willing to follow rather than lead Those are the culprits.

Because radio is so bland and one-dimensional, now, when you sample the old school stuff, it puts the respect back in having musical talent. That's why you see old school tours; old school artists getting popular and back in the studio again. That's the result of there having been a vast wasteland.

Urban radio is fragmented. Radio is both the villain and savior. That's a hard one to carry. Out of one side of my mouth I'll say, "Hey, guys, there's a whole lot of music out here, why are you only playing one kind of music?" On the other side, I'm saying, "Radio's going to be the vehicle by which the new talent emerges. And it is. You complain and bless out of the same voice. GAVIN

First Words

While self-appointed moralists are ralling, once again, about offensive lyrics—citing, incidentally, some songs that almost qualify as oldies—the evidence is that R&B music has made a turn back to the traditions of soul, and to the kind of artistry that comes from the all-in-one musician, the singer-songwriter. The "return to soul singing," as Andre Harrell calls it, is not happening because of C. DeLores Tucker or Bob Dole, but because music is an art form, a strange and wondrous thing created by strange and wondrous people. Sometimes, it reflects society. Frustration and anger lead to rock & roll, to folk, punk, to heavy-metal, to so-called "gangsta rap."

But, as in all art, there is balance, usually struck by the artists themselves. Tired of a sameness they hear—in their own or others' work, they turn what's become formula inside out. Maturing as craftspeople, they learn from masters like Smokey, Marvin, and Stevie: Sam Cooke, Ray Charles, Al Green, Aretha Franklin. and Otis Redding. Whether they sam ple them or echo them with their own voices and compositions.

they're paying tribute to what's worked before. It works today, and you can be sure it'll work tomorrow.


No Bull: Capitol Teams With Matador Records

Capitol Records has emerged victorious in a five-month bidding war for a partnership with Matador Records.

The New York label, a free agent since leaving the Atlantic Group in January, has agreed to a five-year joint venture with Capitol. While neither side disclosed details, sources have said that Chris Lombardi and Gerard Cosloy,

Matador's owners, are receiving between \$8 million and \$12 million to sign the deal, which includes an \$8 million line of credit.

Since it was formed in 1989, Matador has developed a strong stable of artists, including Liz Phair, Bettie Serveert, Yo La Tengo, Pavement, and the Jon Spencer Blues Explosion.



Gary Gersh, Chief Executive of Capitol Records, said that "Matador is a perfect fit for us as we continue to grow in new directions. Chris and Gerard have exquisite taste and bring an astonishing array of talent into the mix."

The pair's A&R skills were spotted in 1993 by Danny Goldberg, then-President of Atlantic Records. After Goldberg was dismissed at Time Warner last year, new Atlantic chief Val Azzoli, saying the company was cutting back on joint ventures, turned Matador loose.

Goldberg, now President/CEO of Mercury Records, and Geffen Records also made strong bids for Matador.

ANTI-RAPPERS:

They're Back and They're Loud

For those who thought that anti-rap crusaders C. DeLores Tucker and William Bennett had gone away—they had. But, it turns out, they were only regrouping.

And, while they were away, attacking other aspects of American entertainment, they were making a hit list and checking it twice.

At a press conference last week, Tucker, the head of the National Political Congress of Black Women, and Bennett, former Reagan Cabinet member, announced "Round Two" of their battle against what they call "gangsta rap."

This time, instead of targeting Time Warner for its connections with Interscope, they called on five of the Big Six recording companies to drop 20 specific artists they say are produc-

ing offensive records. Among artists named were Wu-Tang Clan, Geto Boys, Tupac Shakur, Bone Thugs-N-Harmony, and Ol' Dirty Bastard, along with heavy metal bands Cannibal



Corpse and Lords of Acid.

Ironically, the one major left off their attack list was MCA, which purchased half of Interscope after Time Warner severed its relationship with the label, and which is headed by Doug Morris, a champion of rap while at the helm of the Warner Music Group.

While MCA is "far from

perfect," in Bennett's words, MCA was left off the hit list because its deal with Interscope gives MCA the option to decline to distribute albums they deem offensive.

The new campaign includes a series of radio spots, most of which will be aired on conservative talk shows. The \$25,000 ad campaign encourages listeners to join a petition drive that will be brought to the attention of the named labels.

Industry spokespeople, by and large, didn't think the campaign would have much impact on the labels, artists, or music. Except for Time Warner, all the majors are foreign-owned and are unaccountable to American stockholders.

Besides, noted Hilary Rosen of the RIAA, the albums cited by Bennett and Tucker already carry "Explicit Lyrics" advisories.

Capricorn is a Good Sign for Mercury

Capricorn, the spunky Southern label that see-saws between independent and corporate, has found a happy medium: a joint venture with Mercury Records, who will now manufacture, distribute, market, and promote its records.

According to Danny Goldberg, President/CEO of Mercury and Phil Walden, President of Capricom, the Nashville-based Capricorn will retain its autonomy and its staff of 28 employees, while Mercury provides promotion, publicity, and marketing support.

"Phil Walden and his team have done a brilliant job of signing and developing new artists," said Goldberg, "and everyone at Mercury is thrilled to be working with them."

The first Capricorn releases through PolyGram Group Distribution are Syd Straw, the Fiji Mariners (featuring Col. Bruce Hampton), and Ugly Americans.

Founded in 1969, Capricorn scored with the Allman Brothers, the Marshall Tucker Band, and others credited with pioneering "Southern Rock." After more than a decade of quiet, the label returned in 1991 with Warner Bros. as a partner, then reverted to independent status with distribution through RED.

Radio Does the Driving

Ford-Mercury has taken to heart CBS commentator Charles Osgood's signature signoff: "I'll see you on the radio."

The company has become the first of Detroit's Big Three auto makers to use radio—and no television—to introduce a new model.

Ford-Mercury's campaign for the re-designed 1997 Mercury Tracer was conceived by Young & Rubicam. An agency spokesperson said Y&R chose radio because people "don't see the exteriors of small cars as being highly differentiated," while radio allows listeners to visualize specific features that are important to them.


Even supporting print ads feature a headline, "AS SEEN ON RADIO," over comic-



strip panels depicting the radio spots. A typical commercial has an announcer, strapped to the roof of his Tracer, doing play-by-play while the driver descends from the top of the Parthenon, listening to "Zorba the Greek" on the car's CD player on the

bumpy way down the land-mark's 537 steps. "Zorba," the announcer says, "barely misses a beat."

Ford-Mercury, who spent \$13 million on its Tracer television campaign last year, expects to spend at least that amount between radio and print for the new campaign.

All the Facts That Fit, and Then Some

ALL ABOUT US: For a concise and breezy overview of the music scene, you won't be able to do much better than The U.S. Report, a special issue of our sister publication, MBI, the London-based international music journal.

Just scanning it, I found an exhiliarating mix of facts, figures (them Brits seem to love charts) and opinions covering

radio, records (retail, major labels, MUSIC BUSINESS INT independents), A&R (new talent), publishing, marketing, music video channels, and music/media focuses Urban, Rap, Country, Alternative, Smooth Jazz, and A3. Plus an overview on radio by consultant Gary Wall. And short pieces on music towns, music Web Sites, and even a primer on how SoundScan works.



All of that in 44 pages, and that's

not mentioning a look at ASCAP, BMI, and SESAC, withyep—a chart comparing the three royalties collecting agencies. Or some biting sound bites, like Allen Kovac of the Left Bank Organization: "The American record industry is messed up because everyone is chasing Alternative. No one wants to sign a pop act because of snobbery-but look what happened with Celine Dion when you have the right record and a good campaign." Or Virgin Records' Phil Quartararo: "Radio, like records, is 90 percent sheep and ten percent shepherds.

And then there are those fab charts: "How \$ Sales Divide By Retail Outlets." "Dollar Sales By (Music) Genre." "How High Tech Americans Really Are." "Five Year Piracy Trends." "Top 10 Agencies 1995." "Total Gross From Top 50 Tours."

The package is a marvel of illumination and insights, springing info that may even surprise those of us who are mired in the biz and think we know most everything.

Here's Gary Wall's opening salvo:

"The odds of winning big at the racetrack are about five timers greater than the odds of releasing a record that will sell 250,000 units in one year in the U.S.

"In any given year, less than 2 percent of the 17,000 new releases ever reach the 200,000 mark. Historically only about 250 a year reach 250,000 units, and just 80 go on to exceed

Elsewhere, we learn that some 21 percent of all albums shipped are eventually returned. We are reminded that, for all the attention to the Big Six record companies, that the inclies' collective share of sthe market is at 20 percent—an all-time high and second place, overall, to Warner Music.

Produced by Deputy Editor Ajax Scott, who camped out in MBI's Manhattan offices for eight months, the U.S. Report was written largely by Kevin Zimmerman of New York (a regular contributor to various trades, including GAVIN), along with our own Keith Zimmerman, Quincy McCoy, Max Tolkoff, and Thembisa S. Mshaka, and solid articles from Robert K. Oermann, Larry Leventhal, Kate Siegler, and Steven Stolder.

It's an awesome achievement (Cheers, too, to MBI Editor Steve Redmon). And it's a rush of a read.

Most disc jockeys who've worked at KJAZ, the legendary jazz station, wound up unemployed, especially when the station, born in Berkeley and relocated to Alameda, Calif., went belly up a couple of years ago.

Not Audrey Wells.

Wells, who did overnights

at KJAZ in the early '80s, can say things like, "We almost kicked Twister's butt: we were only off by about \$40 million."

That's because Wells, 35, wrote and executiveproduced The

Truth About Cats & Dogs, a film starring Uma Thurman and Janeane Garofalo that, in its first four weeks of release, hit number two twice and stayed in the top five its first five weeks out. Costing \$16 million to make, it's already made back twice that amount.

In short, it's a hit, and a long way from overnights at KJAZ.

Actually, Wells, a Bay Area

wanted to be a jockey." From KALX, she got an internship

at KNBR/AM-San Francisco. An engineer there did fill-in work at KJAZ.

"He said if I wanted to do on-air work, try KJAZ, because the owner (Pat Henry) didn't care if you had any on-air experience; he only cared whether or not vou knew about jazz."

At KJAZ, Henry asked her to jot down her 100 favorite jazz tunes. Wells, who liked primarily contemporary jazz, along with R&B, was stumped. Thinking quickly, she visited the record library. where favored album cuts had been circled by DIs. She made up a list, and Henry told her: "You know a hell of a lot about jazz. You're hired."

Besides her shift, she produced a weekly interview series, "Women in Jazz," which is now part of the Smithsonian Jazz History Program.

After nearly two years, Wells decided to enroll at the film school at UCLA

"I wanted to be creative myself and feel that high of making something beautiful," she says, "and being a disc jockey is definitely creative, but it has limitations. I wanted the next challenge."

In Los Angeles, she

became (and is still) a consultant to public radio networks, teaching radio skills to Native Americans, A project in Alaska inspired a first

screenplay, Radio Alaska, which sold to Paramount.

She wrote Cats and Dogs in 1994. Again, radio was a natural setting.

The charming romantic comedy centers on Garofalo, who hosts a pet-advice radio show. Perceiving herself as being more witty than pretty. she panics when a caller (Ben Chaplin) pursues her, and pulls a switch with a beautiful neighbor and model (Thurman).

Radio, says Wells, "worked well to kick off the mistaken-identity plot. I needed to come up with a way for him to be interested in her without having seen her.

"I don't think there's anybody who's on the air who hasn't had the experience of being perceived by an audience as looking different from how they actually look." The story, she says, is based "on me, my friends, what people go through. I don't know any woman who doesn't have to go through getting judged by the way they look.'

As for herself: Wells, who possesses a lovely, late-night kind of a voice, recalls her KIAZ audience. "Everybody out there all got whatever they wanted to think, and I rarely bothered to correct them, because, why not let people enjoy their fantasies?"

Seattle Station Axes Talk Host

KVI/AM-Seattle has fired Mike Siegel, the talk show host who aired unsubstantiated damaging rumors about the city's Mayor, Norm Rice. (GAVIN, May 24)

Siegel had been suspended with pay after Mayor Rice criticized the station for broadcasting rumors that he was homosexual and had once been shot by his wife.

Siegel, who apologized for his broadcast, said that "We left on good terms" and is looking at various possible new jobs.

How Rocket Records Boosts New Talent

The new Rocket Records, a revival of Elton John's 1970's vanity label, which serves as an imprint A&R source for Island Records, has proven that it can find arresting new talent. The label's premier (non-

John) release is *The Hypocrite* from singersongwriter Ryan Downe, who blends his lyrics with unique vocals and a strong visual image to dramatic effect.

Stacy Negas, Director of Marketing for Island Records, is in charge of developing and executing a plan to bring Downe

to the public, and she faces a challenge. Downe is a new artist on a label that's been inactive for over a decade.

Negas' initial strategy is to micromarket Downe to a few key markets (first up are Boston and San Francisco) before attempting a nationwide campaign. A full-page article in this month's *Interview* and MTV's decision to air Downe's first video, "Scratch," on 120 Minutes

have gotten the publicity ball rolling; the next priority is radio.

"Scratch" is being targeted to Alternative, Active Rock, and College stations, where Negas hopes to convince programmers to spend some time with the record. "People need to listen to it more than once

to get it," she admits, "but once you get it, you can't stop listening. That's a good sign, but it also presents a challenge as far as getting radio to the second and third listen."

Negas will also rely on direct outreach to potential fans via the Internet, through a Web Site linked to Island's home page,

and Music Marketing Network.

MMN's resources include its Alanis Morissette fan-base. They will receive Ryan Downe samplers, coupons, and goodies. "It's amazing the difference between trying to get someone to buy a record cold versus getting a sample into their house first." says Negas. "It's a great way to differentiate your new artist from all the other new artists coming along at the same time."

Leary, Five Artists Die

Death was a frequent visitor to the world of pop culture and music last week.

Timothy Leary, the Harvard professor who became an icon of '60s culture as well as a refrain in a Moody Blues song, died on May 31 at age 75 of prostate cancer.

Leary, whose incantation, "turn on, tune in, drop out" drew a gener-



ation of followers to experiment with LSD and other psychedelics, had planned on having his death broadcast on his Web Site. Instead, he died in his Beverly Hills home.

On May 30, John Kahn, a bassist


who played with the Paul Butterfield Blues Band and the Jerry Garcia Band, died at his home in Mill Valley, Calif. Kahn was 48.

On May 28, Jimmy Rowles, a pianist who accompanied Billie Holiday, Ella Fitzgerald, and Sarah Vaughan, died in Burbank, Calif. at age 77. Rowles' career ranged from big bands in the '40s to an album with daughter and jazz trumpeter Stacy Rowles and the 1991 album, *Trio*.

On May 25, in San Francisco, Bradley Nowell, lead singer of Sublime, a skapunk band, died of a suspected heroin overdose. He was 28.

Also on May 25, Barney Wilen, a French saxophonist known as the pioneer of "free jazz" in the '60s, died of cancer at his home in Paris. He was 59.

On May 18, death claimed Kevin Gilbert, a singer and songwriter who had seven songs on Sheryl Crow's *Tuesday Night Music Club*. Gilbert, 28, died at his home in Eagle Rock, Calif., reportedly of accidental causes.



Leone began his stint in early January 1981, when then-PD Steve Hexom (now just down the hall programming sister station KBUR) hired him for nights. After about four months, Cosmo was offered mornings and quickly accepted. Five years later, he slid into the PD chair and never looked back.

Raised just outside New York City in America's first suburb. Levittown, Leone would have to be considered an unlikely candidate to establish roots in the rural Midwest. No stranger to major market radio, he was working as a producer and music researcher for Larry Berger at then-Album rocker WPLJ when he received the offer in Burlington. He was packing his bags in preparation to fly out for the interview when he heard on the radio that John Lennon had been shot.

Of the change in lifestyle, Cos recalls, "I was used to five movie theaters within a two block radius All of a sudden I had to adjust to two theaters in the entire town, and one had been showing Dolly Parton's Nine to Five for ten weeks! Times have changed though and things are quite a bit

different around here now." The transition wasn't always easy though, and Cosmo admits, "I'd be lying if I said I never had aspirations of moving to a bigger market,

but that was early on. Eventually I got married, started a family, and my wife and I discussed what we wanted for our future. What we were searching for was all right here. I continue to learn and feel

> challenged by keeping the station on top. The latest survey results show us continuing to be Number

One in every cell up to 40 and older, with dominance in our primary demo, women 18-34."

Though Leone has 15 years under his belt at the Iowa Top 40, he's by no means the only employee who's stuck around. "Hardly a revolving door here," he points out, "it's not unusual to find staffers who've been here 20 years. In fact, that's about the average."

So what has made KGRS such a consistent winner? According to Leone, it's "our talent, commitment to the community, promotions, and, of course, the music." Shortly after taking over as PD, he began shifting the focus of the station 25plus, but as the numbers show, "teens still love us. It's always great whenever we play an older gold title and teens call to ask for the name of the song.

Of the station's community involvement, Cosmo is most proud of the job done during the devastating 1993 flood. "About 20 stations around the country played our special mix of Steve Miller's 'Wide River,' and it helped raise a lot of money. Not long ago, KGRS started a letter writing campaign called Remember the Vet, so sol-





sound that has made Lyle a constant crowd pleaser, and that's good news from this side of the fence.

Out of a first-rate batch of songs that bring Lovett's quirky spin to a wide range of topics, the ones that work best are the ones dealing with love and relationships. "Her First Mistake," "Fiona," "Private Conversation," and "I Can't Love You Anymore," are standouts, the latter featuring harmony vocals from Chris Hillman and Herb Pedersen. If you've seen Lovett in concert over the past few years, you'll be familiar with the instant classic, "That's Right (You're Not From Texas)." This track

is a hands-down winner that swings with the best of 'em. If this doesn't generate an immediate response, you may want to check your listeners' pulse. Throw in a duet with Randy Newman ("Long Tall Texan"), the

somber ballad "Christmas Morning," and the mellow pace of the title track, and you've got Lovett's best work since Pontiac.




SCOTT JOSS Souvenirs (Little Dog)

Little Dog svengali Pete Anderson tipped me off to Scott Joss many, many years ago, so to finally get a finished work is a long-awaited treat. Joss, the talented fiddler in Dwight Yoakam's band, gets to spread his wings and let his talent fly on this debut disc. With vocals and phrasing along the lines of Merle Haggard, and a true sense of country's traditions, including one mean pompadour, Joss has rounded up songs by the likes of Jim Lauderdale, Kostas, Kevin Welch, Tom Russell, Ron Hynes,

and Freddy Powers to showcase his singing.

The lead off "Doin' Time in Bakersfield" sets the tone for Souvenirs. This is real country music, boosted by the production of Anderson and Dusty Wakeman, and the backing of the likes of Tom Brumley on steel, Skip Edwards on keyboards, and harmonies from Anthony Crawford, Beth Andersen, Astrid Young, and Lauderdale. Other strong tracks include "Stay Out of My Arms," "Home Before Dark," and "Country King of the Blues," complete with Freebo's tuba. What more could one ask from a debut?

Clearing the Air

Yes, we are making changes here at Gavin. In the coming weeks, the entire panel will be reviewed. Gavin has traditionally been known for breaking new artists and for representing stations that expose new music to their listeners. The criteria for reporting is being reformulated, so that we get the best possible representation of Country radio stations. We'll be sending out surveys soon that will aid us in our decision making process. Many factors will be taken into consideration, including playlist decisions, local sales impact, active promotion within the market, station ratings and market population. In the meantime, there has been some confusion about rotation changes after Gavin receives a station's playlist. Let me be clear: There are no rotation changes allowed. Once a radio playlist has been input, that is how it will stand for the week. The only exceptions to this are the following situations:

*If a song is erroneously dropped, the song may be added back into the rotation in the same position it occupied the previous week.

*Stations may call in a late add, but No additions or changes will be taken after the chart closes at 3p.m. PT.

*NO late drops. Period! The above changes may only be accepted by me or Jeff House here in Nashville or by Consulting Editor Lisa Smith, who may be reached at (415) 495-1990 ext 629. Please make sure your playlists are concise and legible. If there are multiple current songs by an artist, please list part of the song title to insure accuracy. Drops should always be listed with partial song titles. GO reporters must have

their playlists faxed or called into our San Francisco office by 3p.m. PT on Fridays. Dual reporters' playlists must be in by 3p.m. PT on Mondays. Our chart closes promptly at 3p.m. PT, and any station's list not yet received will be frozen. To keep our chart information current, stations are allowed only six frozen playlists a year. There has been a grace period during my transition, but starting now we will, again be monitoring station's frozen reports. If you know you are going to freeze, please call me or Jeff House at (615) 255-5010. Recently, some playlists have fallen through the fax crevices. It would be extremely helpful if you leave a copy of your playlist with the receptionist in case we don't receive your list. Feel free to call me with any questions or comments. 



Wow! There's a whole bunch of great new A3 music coming at you in the next few months. It's all just in time for our upcoming A3 Summit, so you know there will be some fine artists invading Boulder this year. We can't name names yet—wink, wink, nod, nod, say no more, say no more—but official faxed invitations will be coming at you in the next week or so. Meanwhile, here's some hot new titles to help ignite a cool summer.

A3 Picks & Swinging Singles

LYLE LOVETT "Private Conversation" (Curb/MCA)

The opening blast from Lyle Lovett's forthcoming CD, *The Road to Ensenada*, is an uptempo, vocally rich piece called "Private



Conversation." After the first few listens, the snappy tempo and slapping back-beat takes precedent over Lovett's usual spellbinding lyrics. We haven't heard from Lovett since September 1994's *I Love Everybody*, and he sounds like he's in fantastic form to recapture the Number One slot on the A3 chart. I know it's way too early to tell, but it sounds like Lovett has injected equal parts energy and eccentricity into his latest music.

PATTI SMITH GROUP "Summer Cannibals" (Arista)

Patti Smith's long-awaited June 18, full CD release is Gone Again. The title is a cryptic reference to the death of Smith's husband, former MC5 guitarist, Fred Smith. Shaking such a devastating loss, the Patti Smith Group is back with the same urgency found on Patti's first release. Horses: just wait until vou hear the whole record. But, meanwhile, "Summer Cannibals" is powered by churning electric guitar chords and a confident and raw vocal performance. This opening song can be easily shared with Alternative radio, but when the full CD comes out. A3 will have the luxury of reintroducing two or three lost generations (between the 1970s and the 1990s) to an important rock visionary.

ME'SHELL NDEGEOCELLO "Leviticus: Faggot" (Maverick/Reprise)

We realize the subject matter and title is highly provocative and controversial, but bassist and bandleader Me'shell Ndegeocello is an amazing talent ripe for the hijacking by adventurous A3 radio programmers. Is she too hip for Urban and Smooth Jazz? Too ethnic and funky for Alternative? Not dancey enough for Top 40? Too melodic for Hip-Hop? We say no, but Ndegeocello is experimenting with funk rhythms and delivery pioneered by such rich crossover heritage acts as Sly and the Family Stone and Curtis Mayfield.

HARRY CONNICK, JR. "Hear Me in the Harmony" (Columbia/CRG)

When Harry Connick, Jr. departed from his usual jazz recording style in Continued on page 29 July of 1994 with the rocking New Orleans effort, *She*, he assured jazz executives at Columbia that he'll be back crooning in front of a big band as soon as possible. Well, judging from "Hear Me in the Harmony," Connick wants to continue his exploration of Meters-styled tasty licks for at least one more record. Connick uses his fine jazz vocal phrasings to soulfully wrap himself around this well-crafted blues-pop vehicle. The full whack, titled *Star Turtle*, hits radio and the stores on July 2.

KEB' MO' "That's Not Love" (Okeh/Epic Records Group)

When Keb' Mo's first record, Every Morning, came out in June of 1994, we were captivated with his bluesy vocal stance, and especially impressed with the strong influence that the first three magical releases by Taj Mahal from the late 1960s had on his style. With "That's Not Love," from the upcoming Just Like You, the rhythm section and instrumentation is more sophisticated, without sacrificing an inch of Keb's universal blues flavor. Dobro pickings, slide guitar fills, harmonica, and grounded 4/4 drums complement a robust vocal performance, with a few background "ooh-oohs" thrown in for sweetening:


BECK "Where It's At" (DGC)

Beck caught our imagination a couple of years ago with a catchy little tune called "Loser." Now he's back with a hallucinogenic, slacker ditty called "Where It's At." It's littered with mild strains of hip-hop rhymes, canned loops, cheesy organ, retro electric piano fills, and Cyber croons. "Where It's At" is Fire One from the upcoming *Odelay*.

ERIC CLAPTON "Change the World" (Reprise)

While A3 radio grooves on his fine mid-1970s retropspective box set on PolyGram, Eric Clapton is back in the current stash with a brand new movie soundtrack selection. His own successful soundtrack composing projects include Rush and a couple of Lethal Weapon films, but this time Ol' Slowhand guests on one song from the Phenomenon soundtrack, whose music is overseen by Robbie Robertson. "Change the World" is a Babyface production, and it's as soulful and satiny as anything Eric has sung in quite a while. Babyface righteously preserves Clapton's delta acoustic guitar licks, as well as his comforting country blues drawl, but by the first chorus, the arrangements travel uptown with a sweet Booker T & the MGs feel.



The good news is they're hip enough to feature the Little Feat anthem, "Oh Atlanta," which sounds fresh enough to be from their upcoming double-CD live set, Live From Neon Park. Guitarist/ singer Paul Barrere, keyboardist Bill Payne, drummer Richie Hayward, bassist Kenny Gradney, guitarist Fred Tackett, and vocalist Shaun Murphy round out the current lineup, and deliver past gems like "Long Distance Love," and "Oh Atlanta" with a bluespowered, revitalized workout.

CAROL NOONAN BAND Noonan Building & Wrecking (Philo/Rounder)

After two weeks camped in our Top Most Added category, the Carol Noonan Band, who already enjoys a fine following in the Northeast, is ready to spread out nationally. The opening tune, "Love You Till the End," is a hypnotically impressive adult rock selection. Noonan has a belting voice with the restraint of Rosanne Cash and the English folk introspection of Sandy Denny. 

College Picks

SQUIRREL NUT ZIPPERS Hot (Mammoth)

Those who retain an affection for old-timey sounds, yet disdain the tired "lounge revival" as cheesy, novel, cheap or easy, will celebrate the release of the Squirrel Nut Zippers' second, aptly-named full-length, *Hot.* The Zippers, who sound here as if they've never heard the term "sophomore slump," enthusiastically ply an amazing array of instruments—including banjo, piano, clarinet, violin, ukulele, gong, and chandelier (!)— on *Hot's* twelve blistering ragtime-and-dixieland tracks.

Unlike other musical revivalists, Jimbo Mathus, Tom Maxwell, and crew play as if they are fashioning—rather than aping—a genre. Indeed, in one sense, the Zippers are creators, for the record's crystalline, sharp production effectively updates an era, and the band lovingly re-introduces the twin gems of musicianship and arrangement to an audience who, weaned on lo-fi and cranked up, distorted guitars, might regard them suspiciously as unknowns.

All of *Hot's* tracks are stellar, particularly those that offer the pinchednez-but-pretty vocals of Katherine Whalen, a.k.a Mrs. Jimbo Mathus.

MAIN Hz (Beggar's Banquet)

In 1975 Brian Eno released *Discreet Music*, an album which became the blueprint for modern-day ambient music. Eno created layer-upon-layer of multi-tonal sound, resulting in a dense, almost singular, soothing, hypnotic tone. Yet his output was merely an extension of the minimalist workings of Steven Reich. Phillip Glass, the found sound collages of John Cage, the electro pulse of Kraftwerk, and the intricate Euro-prog of Can.

In the past 21 years, several outfits have emerged bent on systematically retrofitting the ambient soundscape. At the forefront of this movement is Main, who have chosen to reexamine the roots of the genre and take it back to a decidedly more organic focal point. Main rose from the ashes of Loop (the seminal late '80s Brit trance-rockers-cum-shoe gazers); they (guitarists Robert Hampson and Scott Dawson, together with bassist Benny Green) have switched the sonic focus of ambient from the synthesizer to the guitar. Furthermore, they do not rely on the rhythmic skeleton of the drum.

Thus, Hz becomes a two disc, 120minute sonic opus praising the fluid nature of "drumless space." Main submerge themselves into the realm of ethereal toneology to create rich, engulfing layers of buzzing noize, eerie distorted voices, metallic chasms, and narcoleptic bass grooves. The cumulative effect is one of dense, moving sound surrounded by whisperous "empty" space. On Hz, Main become the first explorers to chart the vast emptiness lying at the very core of ambient. Main have successfully engaged in redefining, reconstructing, and retrofitting the ambient soundscape. -SPENCE D.

SINCOLA Crash Landing in Teen Heaven (Caroline)

For girls about to rock—we salute you! Sincola floors the gas and doesn't let up for a dozen straight songs. Wavering somewhere betwixt scorned Pretenders and seething Breeders, this Austin five-piece weaves minimalist distorted guitar through a Marshall stack and effect-laden, flanged licks through a twin amp. The tom-tom drums of "Rundown" pulse alongside Rebecca Cannon's spitfire rants while guitars span the spectrum of wailing, warbling, and crunching. "OneHit-Wonder" blindsides with blurring speed, although Cannon's voice softens for the refrain. "Star '79" exudes an irresistible pop flair. It features a host of female singing throughout the chorus, and the agile guitars exhibit the ability to stop on a dime or spiral into distortoheaven. A Minutemenlike scratch guitar paces the frenetic "Start/Stop," and "Red Danube" plunges into a flurry of feedback. Pausing on a stage near you this summer. —David Beran

The Beatles Live? Call 'Em Bone Thugs Live...

Talk about phenomenon! Bone Thugs 'N' Harmony headlined KMEL-San Francisco's Soundblast at Paramount's Great America in Santa Clara, Calif. After failing to appear at the station's Summer Jam this past summer, Bone Thugs made it up to 10,000 hungry Bay Area fans. Teenagers were screaming wildly, even parents were swaying to the group's hypnotic singles-it was just how I would imagine a Beatles concert must have been thirty years ago. The Thugs were on point with every rapid-fire word; though Wish Bone was undergoing knee surgery in Cleveland, Flesh 'N' Bone was the perfect understudy. (Flesh will be on the solo tip very soon, so don't blink). The show was one of three concerts the group has done since Eazy passed, and I'm grateful that I got a chance to see them. 

Singer Songwriters: Radio Says...

My look into the resurgence of singer-songwriters in the Urban Landzcape wouldn't be complete without talking to some of our best programmers and aksing them, whether they feel black radio has played a part in this new trend.



ERIC FAISON, PROGRAM DIRECTOR, WBLK/FM BUFFALO

I don't know where this change has come from, but it's a trend we've been looking forward to. There are a lot of records out here that should be a lot bigger than they are. Everybody is saying they're looking for instrumentation,

singer-songwriters, and bands. The door's been opened a crack, but not nearly as wide as it should be, because there's still too much resistance from black radio.



KEN JOHNSON, PROGRAM DIRECTOR. WILD-BOSTON

Yes, I think radio was the voice of the people that helped initiate the change. As a PD, my selection of music is based on what my listeners are looking for and telling me they want to hear. I get people

telling me. "I'm tired of remakes and these nasty lyrics." I think radio, if we're doing our job right, has influenced the movement, because we are the voice for what people are feeling and thinking.

SAM WEAVER, PROGRAM DIRECTOR, **KPRS/FM-KANSAS CITY**

Everything goes around in cycles, and I think the music has come full circle back to the singer-songwriters. Black music is a vast area, and their is room for all types of music, but radio will help reflect the current trends of the day in what it plays. I think these trends start with artist development at the record and independent production companies. The people in the development area are very important to this whole process. That's where it starts. The rest is a chain reaction all the way down to the consumers.



CLIFF WINSTON PROGRAM DIRECTOR, **KJLH/FM-LOS ANGELES**

Absolutely! The emergence of black Adult Contemporary stations is fostering the playing of great songs from back in the day, and this is influencing a whole generation of artists who are being exposed to this

music for the first time. With listeners becoming bored and dissatisfied with sampling and with artists doing track dates who really couldn't sing, singing is in vogue again. Once we influence them, they influence us-that's how the cycle continues.



MONICA STARR. PROGRAM DIRECTOR, WEJM-FM-CHICAGO

I think radio plays a part, because we play the records that have the same samples. For example, the group 112 on Bad Boy/Arista, their song 'Only You" and Montell Jordan's new Def Jam release "I Like" are two tracks with

the same sample. Artists are recognizing that there are only so many samples that can be used, and listeners get burned out. We're finally getting to a place where we're hearing more original music and instrumentation. It's a breath of fresh of air for everyone.

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

Marie and Mack Johnson knew their little girl was special and set out to give her all the guidance, support, and inspiration necessary to cultivate her talent. "I was 13 years old when I was offered my first record deal," says Johnson. "But I knew I wasn't focused enough to do it right, because I wanted to ride skateboards and go to the beach. My parents never pushed me, they actually encouraged a slower, more mature approach."

Johnson continued to develop her craft at the prestigious High School for the Arts in Los Angeles. "I was also singing in the church choir, doing session work on demos, and studying composition, which is very important to me," says Johnson. "I learned a lot from Kashif

on how to structure a song, and I'll always remember what Burt Bacharach once said, 'Songwrting is one of those jobs where you can make money while you sleep.' But, like I said, that too will come later."

Later is now. After years of preparing herself for this moment and four years of working patiently on her debut album, Miracle (Work/Columbia), Puff Johnson has burst into the upper ranks of the hierarchy of female singers. She co-wrote seven tunes and co-produced five tracks on the 12-song disc, which features the cream of the crop of today's producers. "Donnie lenner asked me who I wanted to work with," says Johnson. "I've studied the work of Narada Michael Walden, Jermaine Dupri, Diane Warren, Walter Afanasieff, Keith Thomas, and I knew they were great vocal producers and would make me work my tail off." The result is a remarkable album that showcases various parts of Puff's musical personality. Songs that offer hope, give inspiration, encourage reflection, and stimulate love.

"t haven't fallen in love yet," says Johnson. "All these love songs are from books I've read, movies I've seen, and other people's lives."

One night, in the not too distant future, Puff Johnson will fall in love. And just imagine how compelling her music will be then. We have a lot to look forward to—first the miracle, then the revelation.

The Return of the Singer-Songwriter

The Urban Landzcape Rediscovers Its Soul


The urban landzcape is n the midst of a renaissance. New talent is reshaping the world of rhythm and blues in a revisionist fashion. Returning to their connection to the church, the blues, and live instrumentation, singer-songwriters are back with a creative passion.

Andre Harrell, President and CEO of Motown, calls it "a return to soul singing." Harrell is conducting a nationwide talent search for singers, songwriters, and producers in an effort to

transform his label. Historically, Motown Records has been the home for artists like Marvin Gaye and Stevie Wonder. These legends are now role models for emerging new talent.

Producer and singer-songwriter Kenny Babyface" Edmonds, has recently captured the crown as today's most influential stylist. In the past year alone, Babyface has won two Grammys and dominated the charts with Boyz II Men (IIII Make Love to You"), Madonna ("Take a Bow"), and TLC ("Red Light Special"). Now his latest, the soundtrack for the film Waiting to Exhale, is setting industry



Babyface, but operate in that same neighborhood."

Matty James, Senior Director of A&R for Columbia Records, says the movement isn't fully a return to the past. He feels that while the music may have one foot in the past, the other is firmly in the future. "New kids/like Kenny Lattimore are stepping up to battern hitting their own grand slams," he says.

"Babyface and Teddy Reily started heating things up around 1987." James continues. "They really opened up the market for R&B as we know it today. Mary J. Blige is a descendent of all that change, which helped her become today's queen

of hip-hop soul. At the same time, hip-hop has helped fuel this return. With the heavy cost of sampling, hip-hop crtists were forced to learn to play instruments and reach down deeper to create something new, like the Fugees mixing live music with hip-hop. That's a step forward."

"To their benefit, the hip-hop community has helped bring people back to the music," says VP of A&R for Columbia Records, Randy Jackson. "There's a generation of k-ds that have never heard this music, and without hip-hop[sampling], they never would have been exposed to it. It's funny, but hip-hop artists have made advances by bringing folks back to the old stuff."

There are other, not-so-positive factors that may have also helped this resurgence in R&B music. Many industry folks believe a strong backlash against the violent and misogynistic lyrics in hard core rap pushed mainstream black radio to either "classic" or "adult contemporary" formats.

Politicians and cultural conservatives—both black and white—have campaigned hard against rap music and its use of overtly sexual images in video.



"I don't think these artists have sat down and made a concerted effort to say, 'This is what radio is playing, and we should be making music that radio is going to play,' says Tom Bracamontes, VP Promotion for 550/Sony Music.

"I think everything goes in cycles, and music is no different. A number of artists today, D'Angelo, Tony Rich, or my new group, Men of Vizion, are all recycling the music that influenced them."

The cycle is nearing it's completion with the emergence of notable divas like Faith Evans and Puff Johnson, who are rejuvenating the singer-songwriter genre, bringing a woman's point of view to





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



PRO-PAIN Contents Under Pressure (Energy Records)

CORE Revival (Atlantic)



By now, Core should be no secret; their EP Kiss the Sun has been in our top ten for a few weeks, and with the

release of their full length, *Revival*, there isn't any reason for your audience not to fire up a fat one and let this CD spin. This band is the musical equivalent of Jurassic Park, but, you won't mind these guys walking the planet, because they do justice to the dreamy, stony, hard rock scene that came with the '60s— not to mention

its later re-introduction in the '90s by bands like Kyuss, Monster Magnet, and Fu Manchu. Six of the ten songs on *Revival* are well over three minutes, but that's the major part of the appeal. If you want to ease your audience in to the groove in under four minutes, throw on "Liquid" or "Kiss the Sun," but I highly suggest tunes like "Earth" or "Cleargod." —GUY HAMELIN

VERTEXVertex (Blue Dolphin/Trycle)

It's always a pleasant surprise to see rockers of the past creating something that's modern and avoiding the comfortable pit falls of previous projects. Vertex consists of former Ratt frontman Stephen Pearcy, veteran guitarist Al Pitrelli (Alice Cooper, Asia, Savatage, Great White), and electronic visionary Hiro Kuretani. Together, these three passionate music pioneers deliver a hard rockin' sound that's loaded with a crusty industrial filling. Pearcy's raspy vocals couldn't be a better match for Kuretani's digital programming wizardry, and Pitrelli's vivid guitar strokes treat us to an array of high and low-end riffs that form the band's melodic core. Vertex's debut album offers ten tracks, but be sure to check out "Follow," "Synthetic Flesh," "Core," and "One Like a Son." After every listen it becomes more and more apparent that, if given the proper

support, Vertex has an excellent shot at becoming extremely popular at Alternative and hard rock/metal radio.

Having been a long-time fan of KMFDM, it's difficult for me to objectively review any of their releases, so please excuse the lack of negative comments about the band's latest gem, XTORT. KMFDM is more of an ongoing project than an actual band. It incorporates the ideas and musical provess of any number of artists, but always has founder Sascha Konietzko at the helm directing various grinds, danceable rhythms, and hip-swaying hooks. KMFDM's collaborators this time around include former Ministry/Revolting Cocks members Chris Connelly and William Reiflin, and Einstruzende Neubauten's F.M. Einheit. "Power" is a massive dance tune that'll keep your Alternativeleaning listeners bouncing off the walls, but "Apathy" and "Blame" contain enough hard hitting guitars to satisfy any metal head. "Wrath" starts off slow before exploding into a fit of raging hysteria, while "Son of a Gun," "Craze," and "Dogma" dish up harrowing helpings of abrasiveness. KMFDM's latest effort is more proof that they are the masters of techno manipulation. -ROB FIEND

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

With lyrics from Dead lyri-





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


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
