

Gary LeMel On Why Everybody Wants a Soundtrack

Gary LeMel is firmly entrenched in the world of movie music. As President of Music at Warner Bros Pictures, and CEO of the new Warner/Sunset soundtrack label, he's responsible for the music in all Warner Bros. films. LeMel is the man behind some of the best-selling soundtracks of this era, including The Big Chill, The Bodyguard, and Batman. Last year, he recorded his own album of movie standards, Romancing the Screen (on Blue Note), and he's experienced the film and music industries from various angles. LeMel's most recent project: a little something called Twister.

t's evolved to where almost everybody wants a soundtrack, whether it's called for or not. The trend is that most directors, because they've seen a lot of successes, feel that it can help them hedge their bet.

In the first meeting, usually after we've read the script and internally decided that if it's not an integral part of the fabric of the movie, and it's at best a score soundtrack, we try to talk the director out of just creating a soundtrack to create a soundtrack.

What I don't want to do is just jam songs into a movie in order to create a soundtrack. When it's well done, it's fantastic, but when it doesn't work, it's really bad, and it draws attention to something that it shouldn't.

In the case of *The Bodyguard*, where the main character is a singer, that's your dream come true. When you're trying to comment on a scene, and the score may have

been better, then it's not so good. The object of end title songs is to get a record and a video out four to six weeks in front of a movie. If you can pull it off, and the video's on MTV and the record's into good rotation, then you have, in effect, created a marketing device that didn't cost you a whole lot of money. Sometimes it works, but more often than not, it doesn't work. Every time something like the Coolio's "Gangsta's Paradise" thing works, then you have more producers and directors who want to do that for their movie.

On *Dangerous Minds*, it was just a great piece of music that was perfect for that film, and it told the audience that this is an urban movie. Prior to that, they were confused as to whether this was a movie about a white school teacher, or a movie about urban kids. The minute you put that music to it, it became a movie about urban kids. I don't know how much the Celine Dion song "Because You Loved Me" did for the movie *Up Close &* Personal, even though the song went to number one. The movie didn't do very well. Dangerous Minds did because it just felt right, and it's an unexplainable thing.


All the major studios that have sister record companies have formed soundtrack divisions. Sony has Epic Soundtrax; there's Columbia Soundtracks; MCA has Universal. Disney has Hollywood Records and Buena Vista. The only ones that haven't are the ones that don't have labels, like Paramount and Fox.

Warner Bros. is fortunate because we have three huge labels. If you have one label, ultimately you're going to wear it out. There's only so many artists, and after awhile it gets to be a drag because you're pulling from the same talent pool. The good thing with us is that besides the main labels, we have a lot of subsidiary labels. We can wear it out, too, but it will take longer.

The Warner/Sunset label's first album was the *Twister* soundtrack, which was distributed by Warner Records. All the soundtracks are on Warner/Sunset, and distributed by Elektra, Atlantic or Warner Bros., depending on the roster, the enthusiasm, and all those things. The new Atlantic Classics handles our score albums.

The philosophy of Warner/Sunset is to control our own destiny. It's the same work that we've always done. Before, we'd basically create a soundtrack album and then we'd turn it over to a label, and we'd lose a lot of control. Now that it's on our label, we have much more control. Controlling our own destiny is definitely the reason for it. **GAVIN**

He brings people together and tries to make sure everybody has a good time. I've never met you, Bobby, but here's to you.

For Anti-Drug Album

While industry leaders, under the aegis of NARAS, prepared to meet to discuss drug abuse last week in Los Angeles, another gathering has been taking place-on-line.



On America On Line's music industry chat room, called the Velvet Rope, employees of various record labels, along with other interested parties, have proposed that musicians address drugs themselves, by way of a compilation album.

"We're pulling together," said Lisa Derrick, cohost of Velvet Rope and an employee at Atlantic Records, "because getting something done is more important than any individual's agenda. We just hope there are people bold and brave enough in the industry to say, 'Profits be damned.'

The proposed album, first suggested by Alec Peters, formerly with Mercury Records' A&R department, would consist of new versions of songs about drug use, and profits would go to drug education and rehabilitation programs.

Ropers kicked off the online discussion with such song suggestions as Neil Young's "The Needle and the Damage Done" and Dead Kennedys' "Too Drunk to Fuck." Then they began compiling a list of potential artists, including the Fugees, Aerosmith, Everclear, Catherine Wheel, Red Hot Chili Peppers, KISS, Dr. Dre, Steve Earle, Bonnie Raitt, Tony Bennett, George Jones, Johnny Cash, Slash, George Benson, Marianne Faithfull, Warren G, Hootie & the Blowfish, U2, the Butthole Surfers, and Three Dog Night.

The diversity of the list has given rise to the idea of separate albums representing genres of music, including country and jazz.

World Chart Show Counts Down the Hits-Everywhere

First, Casey Kasem. Now, the world.

Ron Jacobs and Tom Rounds, the Top 40 program directors and entrepreneurs who launched Kasem's countdown show in 1970, are the brains behind the World Chart Show, a weekly survey of the hits of most of the world.

But, Jacobs is quick to point out, it's not what's been called world or world beat music. It's the records-most of them in the English language-that are charting at radio stations and networks in 200 cities in Europe, Asia, and the Americas.

So it's Pato Banton and Boyzone, but it's more likely to be Celine Dion, Coolio, and Smashing Pumpkins.

World Chart is anchored by a pair of Caseys-Joe Cipriano and Adrienne "Ace" Walker-who broadcast from Los Angeles' KIIS/FM and KOST/FM, respectively, and work out of studios in Hollywood. But there are 90 additional hosts and correspondents, speaking a total of 27 languages, who do the announcing on many of the 400 stations in 60 countries.

Launched early last year. World Chart is on only "a handful" of U.S. stations so far, says Jacobs. The show, whose music seems best suited for Hot A/C and Top 40 stations, is on WPNT/FM-Chicago and on outlets in New York, L.A., and a few other cities



Some programmers, Jacobs says, are uncertain about the concept.

"Because of the name of the show," he told GAVIN, "people might think it's world music-until they take the time to get into it. If you listen to the music, you realize, 'Wow, this is good,' and it'll show up on radio here later, because it's working its way from Europe to America, or vice versa."

The program, he says, reflects the way of the world. "As predicted by Marshall McLuhan and Ted Turner, the world is shrinking."

American stations should find the show appealing, with its fast pace, professional production, special features (like guest

announcers from various countries and regular reports on environmental issues), and mostly familiar music-all part of the plan from Rounds' company, Radio Express.

"The bulk of our charts is English language hits," says Jacobs. "We chose this arbitrary procedure, and set this condition that unless something's happening in two of the three regions in which we get reports from stations, we won't play it unless it's in English."



Beastie Boys Willing Tibet

'Tis the season of the Weenie Roasts and Summer Jams and all the radio station day-long rock and rap fests.

But this year, there are signs that music gatherings may be returning to the days of political consciousness.

And we're not talking about KISS or Sex Pistols reunion tours.

We're talking the Tibetan Freedom Concert, which drew 100,000 people over two days to Golden Gate Park in San Francisco, where they saw hot sets by the Smashing Pumpkins, Red Hot Chili Peppers, Sonic Yourh, Fugees, Rage Against the Machine, Beck, De La Soul, and the Beastie Boys.

The Beasties were the masterminds of the benefit for the Milarepa Fund, of which Beastie Boy Adam Yauch is a co-founder. The nonprofit group is dedicated to raising awareness about Tibet, whose people have suffered human rights abuses by its Chinese occupants since 1950.

And so, besides the bands that drew mostly young rock fans to the weekend event, there were such Woodstock era figures as Richie Havens, John Lee Hooker, and Yoko Ono, who joined Tibetan monks in addressing concertgoers about the plight of

Tibet.

Monks from Southern India joined the Beastie Boys in a rap, and Havens reprised a song he sang at Woodstock, "Freedom."

And they got their message across to at least some of the 100,000 in attendance. As one 15 year-old, Chris Erickson, said: "I came for the Beastie Boys and Smashing Pumpkins, but I'm learning about Tibet."

Said Yauch: "Seeing films of Tibetan monks and nuns being beaten in a public square was what got me...Helping these people is just as important for our own survival and that of the whole human race."

The concerts were staged by Bill Graham Presents.

U.S., China Agree To Avert Trade War

The recording industry, along with other proprietors of creative and intellectual property, has won another round in the battle with China's pirates and bootleggers.

A last-minute agreement, struck in Beijing last Monday (June 17) has averted a trade war between the United States and China, in which the White House had planned on enacting \$2 billion of tariffs on Chinese exports, to which China had promised to retaliate with at least the same amount in sanctions.

According to sources, the Chinese agreed to close down 15 plants known to be producing copies of American music recordings, films and computer software product.

U.S. investigations have shown that at least two dozen factories, some sanctioned by the Chinese government, have been cranking out illegal product.

The Chinese have reportedly agreed to intensify their crackdowns on illegal piracy, work to halt exports of illegal product—especially in areas near Hong Kong, the site of reportedly rampant sales of pirated goods—and allow greater access for the sales of U.S. music, film and software product in China.

The U.S. had placed pressure on China after concluding that the Chinese had failed to comply with an agreement struck in March, 1995, for the Chinese to eliminate piracy.

The Radio Business

There are two ways to get rich in the radio industry: Own a station or be a morning-drive star and get syndicated.

Other ways include being in the sales department or a stockholder. But those aren't exactly the sexiest gigs in the hiz

One way not to attain wealth in radio is to be a straightahead, not-bad, not-great announcer. Despite the glamor attended to broadcasting, and despite a public deceived by the occasional reports of the millions being raked in by Rush Limbaugh or Howard Stern, the truth is that, if you're a jock,

you're getting by-and not much more.

That's what NAB surveys of DI salaries tell us. While mornings can bring \$1 million and more, the average wake-up salary is \$84,398, while for other dayparts it's about \$37,000 (midday), \$48,000 (afternoon drive). \$29,000 (evening), and \$23,000 (late night).

"Radio stations have become like a sports team," John Haves, the veteran

programmer, GM and station owner, has said. "You have a few highly paid guys."

And, as personal experience attests, you have the rest. My first radio gig, 'way back in 1967, was at KFOG/FM-San Francisco. For a six-hour overnight shift that included typing program logs and writing ad copy, I got \$400 a month-and I felt like the luckiest guy in the world. Three years later, while at a certain rock magazine, I got a weekend shift at KSAN/FM, doing free-form radio Sunday afternoons for just under \$50 a shot. The hourly rate never changed through eight years of Sundays there-and I knew I was the luckiest guy in the world.

Fifteen years later, things haven't changed that much, and I know why: Many people in radio think they're lucky to be playing music, four or six hours at a time, and getting paid for it

But for those who stop to think about it, that's not enough. Take Heather Hamann, a talented young woman who's served time as a board op and a traffic reporter, as a parttimer and a full-timer, on weekends and in morning drive. She's still in radio, but is looking for work off the air-preferably in the music business, because she lives for music. But, she says, "this job...this career...has broken my heart so many times." She has worked for \$7 an hour as a flying traffic reporter. When she became a DJ at a San Francisco FM station, she had to keep the traffic gig on weekends to make ends meet, since the jock shift paid only \$26,000 a year. She couldn't even afford the clothes she needed to appear on television news shows as part of her traffic reporting position.

"I get calls at KOME(/FM-San Jose) about how I got my job," she says. "But I warn them, very few people make Howard Stern money. Way, way more are like me, working horrible hours, with no social life, making ten bucks an hour working from 1 to 6 a.m.'

Or, as Turi Ryder, the well-traveled DJ and talk show host, once told me, "None of us do it for the money. If you're doing it for the money, give up. You just love it.

Someone-maybe it was in a movie-once said that you can have love or money, but not both. On radio, that seems to be the truth.

How to Get Rich in Ella, the First Lady Of Song, Dies at 78

Ella Fitzgerald, one of the finest and most influential voices in popular music, died June 15 at age 78. Death came two weeks after she suffered a massive stroke.

To the end, she was surrounded by friends and by music. During her last days, a jazz trio performed downstairs at her house in Beverly Hills.

She had just observed her 78th birthday on April 25. Despite debilitating health, "Ella was always in good spirits," said Bea Wain, a radio singer from the '30s and a long-time friend and neighbor.

Wain told Phil Elwood of Francisco the San Examiner. "We took a ride together in her car after the birthday celebration. A radio station was honoring her and we listened as we drove around. Ella identified all the accompanists...and snapped her fingers as she sang along.'

Born in Newport News,

Va., Ms. Fitzgerald was discovered after winning a Harlem Amateur Hour competition in 1934, at age 16. She soon joined Chick Webb's band and clicked with "A-Tisket, A-Tasket,"

which topped the Your Hit Parade chart of that era for ten weeks.

During World War II, Ms. Fitzgerald left the Webb orchestra and struck out on her own. Occasionally teaming with the Inkspots, Louis Armstrong, and Louis Jordan, she had a dozen top

ten songs in the '40s and was dubbed "The First Lady of Song."

Carrying herself regally, but capable at any moment of breaking into wild, but utterly controlled scatting, Ella Fitzgerald breezed easily among various musical forms, from bebop to pop ballads, and issued a string of masterful "songbook" albums covering great songwriters. Winner of Downbeat magazine's poll as the top female vocalist for 20 years, and with 13 Grammy awards ranging from 1958 to 1990. Ms. Fitzgerald is easily the most celebrated female jazz singer of all time.

As her bassist of 24 years, Keter Betts, said: "She was up on the top, the queen of the mountain, and all the rest were trying to climb up to her level. None ever did.

Ms. Fitzgerald's family has asked that, in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the Society of Singers, 8242 W. 3rd St., Suite 250, Los Angeles CA 90043.



Inside Top 40 BY DAVE SHOLIN It's About Time... TREND Or Is It? 0 7440 .04

Here's a question most everyone hears at least once or twice a day: "Got a few minutes?" Today's PDs often get stretched in so many different directions that by the end of the day they feel like Gumby.

Since moving up the corporate ladder to GM, former WNCI-Columbus PD Dave Robbins is more concerned than ever about putting every second of every day to good use. Dave is of the opinion that "time is our most precious resource. We take in water and air, but in the case of time, it's a situation of output. I have the same 24 hours a day the guy across the street does. I want to make sure I don't squander any. You don't need to be smarter or more creative, you just need to be in the game when the game is going on."

In his quest for making the most of each day, Robbins signed on for a 12-week course (two hours of training each week) that began by making him aware of every daily task, right down to trips to the restroom. He kept a diary of start and finish times of everything he did each day, which would fill about three pages. After a week, he discovered "how much time I wasted on stupid stuff. It taught me a lesson and I began working on ways to streamline all the things I do.



To help him accomplish all this, Robbins enlisted the help of Richmond, Virginia- based Achieve-Max. What makes this doubly interesting is that the firm is the brainchild of a former jock and radio programmer. AchieveMax President Tad Griffin was a Top 40 air talent in Memphis and Minneapolis, did


production and was PD for Top 40 and A/C stations in Texas, Virginia, and Charlotte.

Griffin is all too familiar with situations such as "being called into a meeting with the GM who has three big projects that require your time right now! [Add to that] hearing that hot new promo the production director just finished, putting together a new package for a client the sales manager is pitching tomorrow, or the label rep who has their boss in town and 'just needs about 20 minutes, please?" Tad argues, "These are not time management problems. They're really priority problems. If you don't have a written, prioritized plan of action for the day [week, month, yearl, all these situations result in stress.

Assuming that's been done, Tad recommends asking the question, "Where does everything fit in the big picture of station goals" when deciding one's priorities. His fourstep plan is: 1) Ask questions. The person asking the questions is always in charge of the conversation. Find out why someone wants you to do something and what your options may be. 2) Assume you intend to be helpful. Starting with that assumption makes it simply a question of how, when, and how much help is needed. 3) Can you delegate something else on your list-just this once? Use this as an opportunity to give someone on your staff a chance to grow. 4) Say "no" diplomatically. Never promise what you can't or don't intend to deliver.

One area many might find particularly interesting is what Griffin terms "Avoiding Technology Hell." When it comes to retrieving voice mail, here's his advice: 1) When leaving a message, think of the recipient. Keep it short and to the

point, just like a good liner. 2) Train those calling you to leave short messages (make the request politely, but clearly on your greeting). 3) Return calls twice a day. Unreturned calls paint a poor picture of you and your organization. You'll probably continue to get more (and longer!) messages until you do. Plan an hour, twice a day (11 a.m. and 4 p.m. are good times), to return calls. Have someone call back for you if you can't do it. As for the phone, schedule "phone meetings" to avoid "tag" and unnecessary in-person meetings. For example, "Oh hi, Linda. I'm in a meeting. Can we do this quickly, or should I call you back?" Most people will give you the abbreviated version and ask for what they want.

What about e-mail and faxes? 1) Schedule time to deal with each daily. 2) Use the "subject" line, even if your (online) system doesn't require it. 3) Keep the message short. Leave out adjectives. 4) Give the recipient optional responses, if you can. 5) If possible, ask for what's needed on the fax cover sheet. Remove some of the ceremony from faxing. Rule of thumb here is, be efficient with things. Be effective with people. People need communication. Things need to be done.

Rock Picks

BORN NAKED Born Naked (Potato King)

Surfacing from San Francisco's struggling hard rock scene are the stirring melodies and crisscrossing rhythms of Born Naked. Hovering somewhere between aggressive Alternative and psychedelic hard rock, Born Naked deliver a slew of sardonic guitar-oriented tunes on their debut self-titled release. Far from sounding like your average garage band, Born Naked encompasses everything from tribal drum beats to low-end bass thumping to straight-ahead rock & roll to bizarre guitar tweaking riffs. Guitarist Saleem Azam's elastic vocals, which incorporate high and low pitches apparently influenced by Middle-Eastern chants, is probably the most striking aspect of the band. Bassist James Olson, who occasionally bleeds on stage, and drummer Jay Michaelis create an intricate rhythm section that stimulates Azam's mesmerizing hooks. Hard rock/metal radio should focus on creeping licks of "Man Kills," while "Reality" will satisfy your Alternative listeners.

THE HUNGER Devil Thumbs a Ride (Universal)

It's been three years since we last heard from Houston's The Hunger. Their last full-length, Grip, was released in the spring of '93 and was enthusiastically received by southern rock radio. Devil Thumbs a Ride is the Hunger's third release and their Universal Records debut, It leans a little more to the Alternative side of radio than hard rock and metal, but there are a few tracks, like "Further," "Undone," "Hell Bent," and "Terminal Infection," that will appeal to your combative listeners. The band has always possessed an addictive sound, but their latest effort reveals an additional dose of intensity by incorporating heavier guitars, icy vocals, and more abrasive techno keyboards and sampling. For those of you who only play "kick ass" rock & roll, I suggest you check out the slippery grinds of "Sonic Wasteland." This tune rocks harder than an epileptic on a vibrating bed. Overall, the Hunger exudes a flexible industrial rock wave that twists around meaty guitars, solid skin pounding, and commanding vocals.

ENORMOUS Busman's Holiday (A&M)

It's extremely rare for me to go head over heels for a band after a first listen, but that's what happened after spinning Enormous. Native Bostonians who moved to San Francisco and then to Baltimore, where they recorded their debut release, Greetings, Enormous are difficult not to like. Before throwing this on, please bear in mind that this is not in any way a metal band. They do deliver a healthy taste of steely licks and a bus load of guttural rhythms, but overall Enormous is a rock band that Alternative and Active rock should be all over. "My My Mine," "Lifeline," and "St. Paddy's Snake Bite Remedy" contain enough harsh elements to merit hard rock airplay, while "Can't Be Bothered" really moves out and is saturated with classic scratchy punk guitars. 





SEPULTURA Roots (Roadrunner)

Sepultura? You've got to be kidding, right? Sure, these Brazilian metallurgists are masters of unbridled thermonuclear lava flow, but hell, White Zombie, Metallica, and Prong have all successfully bashed down the walls of the Alternative soundscape, so why not be adventurous? Nestled among all the scratch-scream vocalistiks and speed-chug rage is "Ratamahatta," a whirling dervish wallop of bristling, adrenaline-soaked soniferance. Wrapped in tribal-derived Brazilian rhythms and surrounded in a mad power surge of guitar, this infectious rumble-buzz gyrates with cryptic chants and shimmering bursts of metalo-funk. Wah-wah guitar mixes with thick globs of bass and kinetic drums to create a dense, swirling aural melee. Call it rage-encrusted tribal funk slathered with catchy guitar fury. Oh yeah, call Sean Knight @ Roadrunner and make his day while you're at it.

KOSTARS Klassics with a K (Grand Roval)

This is one of those tasty gems that seems to have slipped by the aural receptors of the collective Alternativeness. But it's not too late to catch the Kostars vibe. Comprised of Vivian and fill from Luscious Jackson, the Kostars specialize in sticky sweet acoustic pop-funk. Mixing gentle bits of Moog, Casio, accordion, and piano in with the acoustic guitars, the ambience becomes one of quirky musicality. The key track here is "Red Umbrella," a haunting acoustic ditty carried by Jill and Vivian's soft-yet-commanding vocal harmonies. The rest of the album is loaded with equally captivating bits of melodica, like the unplugged, grassroots, hip-hop feel of "One Sunny Day" and the countrified lounge style of "Don't Know Why," which features the enigmatic Dean and Gene Ween. There's plenty of choice material buried on this disc, so dig up a copy and give it a whirl.

FISHBONE **Chim Chim's Badass Revenge** (Rowdy)

Summer is the perfect time to put a little extra ummpbb/ in your playlist, and what better way to up the ante than with a little bit of Speed Racer freakswing. These L.A.-based big bandstyled funkateers have never gotten their just due. While their fellow funk stud pals, the Chili Peppers, have been elevated to the top of the heap, Fishbone is still pretty much an underground SoCal phenom, despite having more than 8 albums under their belt. Fishbone mixes up metal flail, funk juice, reggae/ska beats, and mosh mangle into an infectious miasma of nonending groove and twang, "Alcoholic," the single serviced to Alternative, is a rowdy blast of ska tweaked punk-funk energy. But don't sleep on the retrofit feel of "Psychologically Overcast" or the twisted monkey thunder of the title track. As Fishbone says at the onset of the album: "If you try you will catch on " Rowdy is the label to ring, and De'Shawn is the man with the music (404) 521-3277. PERFECT

When Squirrels Play Chicken (Restless)



1996 is shaping up to be a Replacements kind of year. First there was Westerberg, now it's time for Tommy Stinson. Perfect is the new four-piece fronted by the former Mats' guitarist, and rockin' is the name of their game. While this debut is only a 5-song EP, it packs a mean punch. "Makes Me Happy" is a rollicking, crunch-o-matic blast of guitar-driven power pop. Stinson and company instill the jam with a catchy, garage band-styled earnestness that makes it a powerful little ditty. And "Miss Self-Esteem" is the midtempo, introspective gem that has all the right elements to make it a hit. But don't pass by the hi-speed pop rush of "Don't Need to Know Where," 'cause it's one of those "gets-under-your-skin" rockers. When Squirrels Play Chicken may be short, but it's sweet and powerful. -Spence D








College Picks

NDEGEOCELLO Peace Beyond Passion (Maverick)

Me'shell Ndegeocello unquestionably is the high priestess of low-end, theory-based raw, refined funk. Her command of the BOOM! stick (bass to the lay person) is unparalleled; her skills range from the laid-back, slo-mo groove style to the hyperkinetic slapperistik slam. As such, it should come as no great surprise that on every song here, whammy skittle rubber bass burble runs underneath, in-between, and over the diva's deep, sultry vocals. Ndegeocello casts the album's neo-religious spell by combining messages from the Old Testament books of Deuteronomy, Leviticus, and Ecclesiastes with bits of New World homosexual lifestyle philosophy. "Deuteronomy: Niggerman" takes a pointed look at the phenomenom of absent black fathers, while "Leviticus: Faggot" slams the F-word down your throat in a forced re-examination of terminology accompanied by slinky wah-wah ambiance and globule bass slither. "God Shiva" is a liquidy transcendental swirl of shuffle rhythm, static noise, and fractured, wailing guitar.

Ndegeocello's upfront, no-holdsbarred lyricism and bottom-rich polysonic ruminations have melded to unleash a new world view, where funky socio-political groove is the order of the day. —SPENCE D.

KMFDM Xtort (Wax Trax!/TVT)

All the world's brutality and hysteria thrusts forth from KMFDM's "industrial soundtrack to the holy wars," a.k.a Xtort, the band's newest effort. The disc's first track, "Power," kicks off with an adrenaline-charged flashback to last year's "Juke-Joint Jezebel"; then, Xtort segues into "Apathy" to peer briefly into the face of madness. The excitement grows with guest Chris Connelly's (Ministry/RevCo) contributing vocals on four songs, including the apocalyptic "Craze." William Rieflin (Ministry/RevCo) and F.M. Einheit (Einsturzende Neubauten) deliver furious percussion on "Dogma," as spoken-word artist Nicole Blackman gives us a wake-up call. Guitarist Günter Schulz whips his strings into action with unrelenting industrial strength and Sascha Konietzko lets the samples fly on "Son of a Gun." Stick around for the end of "Wrath" (about 5:40 into the track), where you'll hear a twisted fairy tale just in time for the summer solstice.

Oh yeah, most importantly, as the press kit states, "[Xtort] doesn't feature the stinky British guy from -SANDRA DERIAN last year.

VARIOUS ARTISTS **Nu Yorica! Experiments in Latin** Music (N.Y.C. 1970-77) (Soul Jazz) For the collector of mambo and salsa,

finding original recordings of the classics is almost impossible. Either these disc's first consumers won't let go of their prized vinyl, or they have partied so hard with 'em that they are thrashed beyond playability. At last, however, a wise overseas label has assembled a collection of some of the sweetest Latin gems from the early and mid-seventies. I'd say that Soul Jazz Records is doing God's work.

Included on this fine compilation are cuts by underground legends Ocho and Harlem River Drive, as well as masters like Cachao and Eddie Palmieri. The title's inclusion of the word 'experiment' holds true, as the tracks differ greatly: Brazilian, free Latin jazz, mambo, Latin funk, and various others are among those styles that make an appearance. Overall, this is an awesome introduction to the various types of Latin music that came out of the New York community during salsa's hevday. This is an import, of course, so you may have to do some research to get it. Available on both CD and double vinyl. ----VINNIE ESPARZA

THE PERFUME TREE **A Lifetime Away** (World Domination)

Perfume Tree's wispy female vocals simultaneously seduce lounge lizards with an affection for the cool kitsch of an Yma Sumac (or a mutant 4-AD band), and the baggy-clothed,

punked-out, trip-hopped, or addicted-to-the-beat types, those infatuated with divas-say, the woman from Portishead-or fans of Tricky and the like. Somehow, Perfume Tree manages to reference all of the above icons yet follow their own malleable, understated, trip-to-the-beat-of-another-world program. Check out the jams on track three, "Contact," which offers an ambient other-worldliness offset by a slow, grinding bass-boom that's straight out of a Jah-worshipping Dubbite's serenade to his master. "Blue Stars" introduces hip-hop beats, slows and distorts them, then adds the ethereal vocals that are so essential to the disc's sensual appeal. -Walt Reed A stunning release.

BETTER DAZE **One Street Over (Ubiquity)**

To call Andrew Jarvis a man of good timing would be a bit of an understatement. Over the years the UK native has established himself as one of the San Francisco Bay Area's top rare groove/Latin DJs by spinning at the legendary club Nickie's and over the KUSF airwaves. Also, at the time when SF's acid jazz scene was in full swing, he founded On the One magazine, which serves America's jazz, funk and groove community. Now, he has branched out even further to create his own music with fellow funkster and sax-

man Paul Seriver; the duo records as Better Daze. This project is a mindbending blend of various genres, including funk, jungle, Middle Eastern, and others. And, while the pair borrows liberally from various traditions, they interweave the pieces with a style all their own. The standout cuts are "New Moon Mamba," which comes off like El Chicano on ecstacy, "Sons of Batra," which is reminiscent of Bill Laswell's (semi) recent work with Material, and the dub-flavored "Piece the Process of Elevation," which breaks into a wicked drum and bass groove. Better Daze is the perfect option for today's dancefloor junkie, because the duo satisfies the dance fan's growing appetite for diversity. -VINNIE ESPARZA

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COLLEGE RADIO ΗI

recent Playboy magazine article offered an assessment of the health of college radio. The article, "The Rise of Radio U.," was neither a manufactured fluff piece nor an excuse for a layout of attractively airbrushed, pouting, big-haired coeds; rather, the author, Mark Jannot, took an unforgiving snapshot of the format and the aspects of the music industry that have arown up around it in the last decade. In doing his research, Jannot talked to music directors at a few stations, WRAS-Atlanta, WSOU-Orange, N.J., and KFJC-Los Altos Hills, Calif; he also interviewed an assortment of industry types. many of whom are no longer involved with college promotion.

In "The Rise of Radio U." Jannot concludes that college radio is a "defiled virgin princess," and he focuses on the contradictionshypocrisies, even—that exist in the format.

"Format," in fact, is a misleading term. Those of us who work in or with college radio might use it for lack of a better word, but we realize that "format" connotes a certain homogenousness that does not at all reflect the spirit of college radio. However, because of the degree of diversity that exists in college radio—in the content of a single station's playlist, in comparing one station's playlist to another, in the styles of promotion implemented to work" different stations—Playboy's presentation of college radio cannot be dismissed as "wrong."

Self-righteousness, hypocrisy, ignorance and snobbery exist in the realm of college radio, as do passion, integrity and a whole lot of other things. With the hope of better representing the subtleties of the format (and because we can be such a defensive bunch) GAVIN asked some college radio music directors and promotion people to offer their perceptions of Jannot's article, forecast college radio's future, and appraise the format's health.



"I think [Mark Jannet] understood more than a lot of people give him credit for He left some ironies in the article that led me to believe he had a clue...College

radio has fallen prey to the same practices being used in publicity, commercial radio promotion, sales, video, etc. Of

course, I'm overgeneralizing; there are plenty of excellent college radio stations out there. Wait, did I say plenty?... College radio will probably be as brilliant, stupid, adventurous, and trendy as it ever was, in spite of the industry. It all depends on the town and the frequency. -KRIS GILLESPIE, MATADOR



"[The Playboy article wast just another story designed to stir up controversy...l don't think [the author] gave a shit [about college radio], but it fit the times and was close enough to accuracy."

Labels will continue to pour money into college radio for a couple more years, until declining sales force them to tighten their belts.

The format has never existed like a reverse-blowing vacuum-unaffected by outside influences but a breeding ground for future stars."





A Positive View of Radio Consolidation From KMTT's G. Michael Donovan

When President Clinton signed the latest Telecommunications Act into law earlier this year, knee-jerk reaction across radioland seemed negative and fearful. While the national press dwelled mainly on the ramifications of the cable industry and sex on the Internet, few foresaw revolutionary change on the radio landscape.

Like the Reagan deregulation period of the '80s, many assumed that giant conglomerates would be swallowing up entire bandwidths in major metropolitan areas, which, indeed, is sorta happening. Radio into real estate. Stand-alone extinction. Panic befalling owners, general managers, and program directors. Acquisitions

moving fast and furiously. Yet in talking to G. Michael Donovan, VP and General Manager of Entercom's KMTT in Seattle, there's another side to all of the fear and phobia. What are the immediate changes now taking place, and are they all necessarily bad?

"I think there are benefits for those of us in the radio, record, and concert business, as



well as the listener. I see tremendous opportunity ahead," says Donovan. "Anytime there's fundamental

bound to be scrapes and bumps as a new paradigm emerges.

After a complicated three-way group swap, former Seattle stand-alone KMTT, owned by Entercom, has recently acquired a trio of new sister stations that now puts Entercom in an enviable position when it comes to obtaining Northwest rock demo advertising dollars. Locking arms with KMTT are Alternative rocker KNDD and golden oldies KBSG (formerly owned by Viacom) and rocker KISW (formerly owned by Nationwide), the latter pending July FCC approval. Under separate ownership, three of those four stations might typically be Continued on page 34

at each other's throats competing for concert co-presents, ad buys, and promotions. Under the same tent, there's solidarity and a bigger picture to consider.

"Dialogue is emerging. When two stations were lined up against each other—for instance KNDD and KISW —there was wasted energy and resources fighting for position within the industry."

Enter an era of common goals, where stations inside the same group are no longer fighting for turf among themselves, possibly eliminating the need for making concerts neutral, a move that removes radio from bonding with artists and listeners.

"We'll have to see if the promoters, managers, and the labels like this newfound [radio] cooperation or not. In some ways, neutrality neatly solved the problem." According to Dovovan, what the Telecommunications Act does is correct the de-regulation snafus of the early '80s, which challenged the airline and savings & loan industries. More FM signals were dumped onto the marketplace. Thirty years ago in Seattle, for instance, there were 15 signals, now there are 30. Sixty percent of the stations were operating at a loss. Allowing duopolies helped a bit, cutting operating expenses, but until the new Telecomm Act, radio was a tough biz for even the big groups.

With this latest act of Congress, frenzied buying and trading of radio properties erupted. Station price tags soared. Partly for tax reasons, groups began swapping properties in order to bolster their holdings regionally, at times concentrating on formats and music genres that fell within their expertise. As opposed to the greedy '80s, it has now become radio buying radio as opposed to rabid investment bankers making a killing in global communications.

"[During the '80s] Wall Street discovered us, and a bunch of private money got all hot and bothered about radio. The only problem with that was the private money came with a ticking clock. Deals were put together for a seven year period. Everything was rosy for the first couple. Then the lending requirements and covenants started kicking in. You saw desperation. To the detriment of the industry, a lot of stations went after the same sure-fire formats. In Seattle, we had three Country stations going at it hammer-and-tong.

"With this new de-reg, the number one Country station was able to buy up their competitors, keep the second Young Country while flipping the third to a Hot Urban A/C."

What resulted was more formats with more time to nurture. The con-

sumer got more choice.

"It really is a win/win deal. Radio gets a chance to get closer footing with the media we compete with. For instance, if I want to market in Seattle with any other media like cable, newspaper, billboard, transit, I talk to one person per medium. With television, maybe two. With radio, you'd have to talk to thirty people ready to slit each other's throat.

"With a maximum [ownership] of eight stations per market [per group], no one group is going to control the market. Three to five groups is a better foundation than thirty independents going at each other."

In Seattle, where Entercom is now the biggest group locally, there is still, according to Donovan, "plenty of formatic competition." While it's still hard for a stand-alone to either operate or start up, there still exists a **Continued on page 36**





freeform competitive arena. True, competing for the groups just got easier, when, for instance, spiraling research costs can now be consolidated. But what of the average **GAVIN**

radio reader? According to Donovan, maybe

another aspect is the upgrading of the radio profession in general. Typically a turbulent profession, promotion within the ranks of programming, sales, engineering, and administration might get potentially better inside a group with more properties. Salaries could increase.

So, can consolidation help niche formats, create longer time windows for format nurturing, supply more dough, job opportunity and advancement for radio people, allow joint-research projects that could cut research costs, spawn inter-station cooperation, result in more sympathetic ownership in the form of radio groups rather than venture capitalists, or eventually find imaging and production handled centrally by the most qualified and creative? Is all of that now on radio's new horizon?

I find Donovan's scenario interesting and encouraging for niche format radio. How about you? Too rosy? Right on? Wait and see? Fax me your reaction and I'd be glad to print the most literate responses.

A3 Picks Excellent Reasons to Open Your Mail PATTI SMITH

PATTI SMITH Gone Again (Arista)

Surely the darkest of Patti Smith's output, but certainly not the strangest. Furiously recorded by her band (and a few guests like Tom Verlaine and Jeff Buckley), co-production by Malcolm Burn and guitarist Lenny Kaye is both electric and organic. And the longer you live with it, the more you begin to realize that, as a writer, Patti Smith is untouchable. Her slim but outstanding output on the Arista label is probably the closest thing to a perfect legacy. Gone Again is a colossal addition. ME'SHELL NDEGEOCELLO Peace Beyond Passion (Maverick)



First Gigs: Part II

Last week we began a series on first jobs in radio for some of our programming celebrities. We continue with the following contributions, which just go to show that it's all uphill from there.

Linda Silver, APD/MD at WMXV-New York City, started at WPVR-Roanoke, a beautiful music station (live-assist automation). This was Silver's first and only experience with automation and that included machinery that insisted that there were 63 minutes in every hour.

John Patrick, PD at WBBQ-Augusta, Georgia, started in 1978 doing afternoons in Collinsville, Va. at Top 40 daytimer WFIC for the lofty sum of \$108 a week. "The station traded out my housing in a boarding house until I could find decent housing on my own," he recalls.

Bill Minckler, PD at K103-Portland, Ore. started as a weekend jock at KLZ-Denver in the summer of '68

Alex O'Neal, M.D. of KVIL-Dallas, Tex. started at WATT/AM in Cadillac, Mich. doing afternoons and handling production director duties. "Everyone had to work 40 hours a week and punch a time clock," recalls O'Neal. "My air shift was 20 hours a week and I had to look busy the other 20 hours just in case the owners (the McDonalds) wandered into the station.

Michael Rogers, PD at KAKQ-Anchorage, Alaska, began at WNAR-Philadelphia, Penn. a big band music station where he was a news announcer and hosted a weekly interview program.

Donna Miller, GAVIN awardwinning MD at KOSO-Modesto, Calif., started at KKMG-Pueblo, Colo. where she temped as a receptionist and worked in traffic.

Bill Wertz, WQLR-Kalamazoo, Mich., began at Susquehanna's

Homeruns like the Waiting to Exhale soundtrack or Dead Man Walking are nice, but singles can also drive in sales.

SOUNDTRACK SINGLES: BEING SEEN AND HEARD

Soundtrack singles are on a roll. They've always been the red carpets that roll out a film soundtrack to radio well before a film opens, but today they're being increasingly used to directly connect audiences to movies.

Witness the success of Coolio's "Gangsta's Paradise" single/video/film trailer that, in the public's mind, became virtually synonymous with last summer's Dangerous Minds. Recently, clips from Celine Dion's video for "Because You Loved Me" were featured in television spots and theater trailers to generate interest in the romantic film Up Close & Personal. The movie opened with a robust take of over \$30 million in its first three weeks.

After working on the soundtracks to Pocahontas and Toy Story, Carolyn Beug, Senior Vice President of Disney Records, knows the importance of releasing singles to radio prior to a film's opening to help build awareness.

"Singles are unquestionably a driving force behind the success of a soundtrack," she says. "Coolio's 'Gangsta's Paradise' is a prime example of how radio can draw consumers to retail, and it's also a good example of how some singles have the capacity to actually fill seats at the theater.

"Anticipation of a film can certainly lend a hand in moving soundtracks, as seen with Pocahontas, which debuted in the top ten nearly a month before the film opened," says Beug. This summer, Disney is counting on All-4-One's "Someday" to propel The Hunchback of Notre Dame soundtrack to the top of the charts.

Kathy Nelson, former head of MCA's soundtrack department, and current President of Music for the Walt Disney motion picture group, oversees

music for labels under the Disney umbrella, including Hollywood, Touchstone, and Caravan. She's the person who coordinated the Coolios "Gangsta's Paradise," and Celine Dions "Because You Loved Me" singles.

"Opening weekends are completely critical for films," says Nelson. "Radio airplay before a film opens contributes to exposure, and the ideal is to have a first single and video three to six weeks in front of a movie."

Nelson is executive producer, with Hiriam Hicks, for the Island/Hollywood soundtrack to Eddie, and worked as music supervisor with executive producer Robbie Robertson on Reprise's Phenomenon set.

"After Dangerous Minds, I was having lunch with Coolio and mentioned that I was looking for an upbeat summer song for Eddie, and he said he would do it," she says. The result is the album's first single "(It's) All the Way Live (Now)."

Nelson's story of the Babyface-produced Eric Clapton single "Change the World" from Phenomenon, is more serendipitous. "The writers [Tommy Sims, Wayne Kirkpatrick, and Gordon Kennedy] sent the song to me, and I sent it to Babyface, knowing that he would love it. Robbie Robertson sent the song to Eric Clapton, who, it turned out, had expressed an interest in working with Babyface two years ago."

High profile singles from prominent artists can be the centerpieces of mainly score music soundtracks. Stevie Wonder recorded the songs "Hold on to Your Dream" and "Kiss Lonely Good-Bye" with symphonic backing for the upcoming film The Adventures of Pinocchio. The London Records soundtrack will feature contemporary renditions of the songs as bonus tracks, and Motown will work the modern version of "Kiss Lonely Good-Bye." Sarah McLachlan's single "Full of Grace," from London's Moll Flanders set, is featured with the Mark Mancina score.

Singles that have or will be on artists albums can also be theme songs to films without soundtracks. Vanessa Williams' single "Where Do We Go From Here" is the theme song to the latest Arnold Schwarzenegger action offering, Eraser. Williams appears in the film, and the song will be included on her September-released album. Kimmie Rhodes' Justice Records single "I'm Not an Angel," from the film Mrs. Winterbourne, was culled from her April-released album West Texas Heaven.

Tim Burruss, Vice President of Promotion at Hollywood Records, was involved with soundtracks such as Above the Rim and Murder Was the Case during his days at Interscope, and recently promoted the Oscar-winning Vanessa Williams' Pocahontas soundtrack single "Colors of the Wind." "We usually go for adds six to eight weeks before a movie opens to get momentum going at radio," he says. "Then when the film comes out, everything's in place. Burruss is confident that Hollywood's upcoming soundtrack to The Crow: City of Angels, not only has a major first single in Hole's Ric Ocasek-produced cover of Fleetwood Mac's "Gold Dust Woman," but that it has depth as well. 'Filter's 'Jurassitol' will more than likely be the second single because they're very big in active rock, but White Zombie's industrial take on 'I'm Your Boogie Man' is probably as strong as the Hole or Filter songs," says Burruss.

A string of soundtrack single releases can create awareness at radio that reinforces a film in the public's mind, both before and after the movie's been released. Arista's Whitney Houston projects The Bodyguard and Waiting to Exhale both benefitted by releasing multiple singles throughout their promotional campaigns.

"Radio play is the driving force of album sales, and that's true for soundtracks as well," says Maureen Crowe, Arista's Vice President of A&R/Soundtracks, and the music supervisor for *The* Bodyguard single "I Will Always Love You." "I Will Always Love You' played on the audience anticipation and made their initial 'want to see' into a 'must see.""

While acting as soundtrack executive at Columbia Records, Crowe worked on Diana King's "Shy Guy" single from Bad Boys, and Ini Kamoze's "Here Comes the Hot Stepper" from Ready to

Wear. "You want a single on the radio before the major marketing blitz of the movie, usually four to six weeks up front," she says. Crowe believes that if music is used well, it can become a character in the film; she cites Sleepless in Seattle and Forrest Gump as good examples.

TVT Soundtrax figures to be a major player on the summer's soundtrack scene, and the label's releases include More Mortal Kombat, Phat Beach, and Heavy. "If you have multiple singles released, it can spur on sales, because you get that groundswell going," says Patricia Joseph, head of TVT Soundtrax

and head of A&R at TVT Records. Joseph worked on the Sister Machine Gun and KMFDM singles from last year's Mortal Kombat soundtrack, and Gravity Kill's single "Guilty" from Seven.

"Television advertising is very MTV-like now," she says, "and the idea of putting in film clips with the video is a good one." Joseph views the "Gangsta's

Paradise" phenomenon as a special case. "It has to be the right song, and timing has a lot to do with it. It's not often that you have that opportunity, because advertising can be closed up. Melody' was the only song in the movie Ghost, and it was a potent use of the song in the romantic scene. Polygram released the single and the Righteous Brothers also re-recorded it

Milan Entertainment doesn't often have the opportunity to do singles, which are usually associated with music-driven albums, but Chief Operating Officer Toby Pieniek nonetheless acknowledges, "Singles have a major influence on our sound track sales

"We did a radio promotion single for the Froclaimers' 'I'm Gonna Be (500 Miles)" from Benny & Joon," says Pieniek. "Then Chrysalis re-released their single after it had radio airplay, and it went on to sell over half a million units." Pieniek believes that it's hard to work a single unless there's a major connection to the film. "Unchained

as a single for Curb. Both singles charted.

Composer Michael Kamen has had amazing success collaborating with Bryan Adams on the soundtrack singles "Everything | Do (| Do For You)," (from Robin Hood) "All For Love" (from The Three Musketeers), and "Have You Ever Really Loved a Woman" (from Don Juan De Marco), but it doesn't stop him from championing the artistic side of composing music for film.

"A mad dash to put all the music in ignores the actual fabric of the film's music," says Kamen. "A song can do as much to disturb the feel of a story as it does to help." Despite the success of his singles, Kamen asserts that Hollywood needs to have a finger wagged at it from time to time. "There's

increasing call for predictability, but pop music should be unpredictable and exciting. I'm against using commerce relentlessly when you can use artistic means



and get your same point across," he says.

Kamen is currently working with Francis Ford Coppola on the music for the upcoming Robin Williams film Jack, that will include the Bryan Adams written/sung song "Star." He's also composing music for the Olympics Closing Ceremonies, and will score Disney's upcoming 101 Dalmations.

Radio, videos, and television are the places for soundtrack singles to be seen and heard. With 103 feature films, and approximately 40 soundtracks being released between May 10 and the end of August, singles will be working synergistically with Hollywood this summer.


A few years ago, WJLB-Detroit Program Director Michael Saunders made a career move that was so daring, it belongs in a book or seminar by Tom Peters. In 1986, Saunders was just 22 years old and PD of WPEG-Charlotte, when he asked his GM to replace him with a new PD. "I was hired at WPEG when I was 18 to do overnights. A year later I was doing afternoon drive. Then I became Music Director, then Program Director, but I really didn't understand what I knew," remembers Saunders. " I was going basically on gut, so when I found out we had a serious competitor coming into the market. I asked the GM to let me remain as APD and Music Director and to bring in someone I could learn from and who would help me grow."

Not many people are smart enough to realize that sometimes you have to give up something to reach your goal. Ten months later, Saunders was back promoted again to PD and was involved in an incredible ratings war with KISS 102, then consulted by Jerry Clifton. "By this time Barry Mayo's company BPI bought the station and gave me all the necessary research tools and direction," says Saunders. "From Clifton I learned how to make contests bigger than life and the art of strategic stealing. Battling Clifton is how I learned how to compete effectively." After the war was over, Saunders ended up running both stations and an additional AM.

In October of 1994, Saunders resigned WPEG and went to work for Left Bank Management in Los Angeles, as an artist manager and Head of Research. This new job kept him in touch with radio, and eight months later, he was back as PD of WJLB-Detroit. "This station is such a natural fit for me, I feel like I've known these people for a long time," says Saunders. "T've inherited a great group of talented people."

Q: It's been said that a radio station's sound is often an extension of the PD's personality. If so, what parts of your personality have been applied to your station?

MS: Probably the outgoing part of my personality. I create a party atmosphere in the station. I play music loud in my office. Everybody knows when I'm in the station. I have an open door policy, and anyone can walk in and say whatever, whenever. On the air, I think my people sound relaxed, natural, and like they're having fun. This is a fun business; it's entertainment. I want my people to do their very best, and I don't think they can do that with their buttholes tight—

as individual as possible. Show me your talent and I will help you grow it. Show me the direction you want to go in and I'll take you there.

concerned with every break they do. We all make mistakes—so relax and have a good time.

How do you tailor the individual personalities of your air talent? You obviously prefer individuality than a set consistent style.

Yeah, that's true. When I first came to WJLB, I listened to what the staff sounded like, instead of coming in and telling them how I wanted them to sound. I wanted to hear how they sounded so I could make them better at who they were, not who I am. That's the biggest mistake a PD or coach can make. Once you see what talent is in the person, then it's your job to develop it. Everybody is different, and you have to manage and coach them individually.

What is your coaching style?

I try to let people be as individual as possible. Show me your talent and I will help you grow it. Show me the direction you want to go in and I'll take you there. This makes the talent feel good, because things are still moving in the direction they want to go, it's helping them grow the way they want to grow. Then, at the same time, they're getting a professional, experienced spin, which make them grow faster. Some PDs think because Detroit is a major market you don't have to have performance discussions or critique sessions. That's nonsense, because everyone needs their pulse checked and nurtured.

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You work for a great coach, your GM, Verna Green. What do you like about her style of coaching?

She makes me feel like she not even teaching, because it's always so much fun. You remember having a high school or college professor who was so much fun you didn't realize how much you were learning in their class? That's what it's like with Verna. Everyday I can't wait to go into her office to see what's going on. It's never just radio; it's politics, computers, physiology, sociology, black history, anything and everything. She has such a breadth of knowledge, she makes running a station fun.

What are the demographic realities of your marketplace?

The population of Detroit is 78 percent black. We have a lot of stations targeting 25-54 year old black folks. WJLB is a mainstream Urban, our sister station WMXD is a black A/C, WGPR is black A/C that just picked up the *Tom Joyner Show* a couple of months ago.

We also have two jazz stations, WJZZ and WVMV(V98.7) that play predominately black jazz. V-98.7 also plays R&B songs mixed in with their jazz cuts. It's incredible, but we're still number one 25-54. All the talk in our business about black A/C stations taking over the 25-54 demo is just talk. Look at the mainstream black stations around the country that are well programmed; they're all doing tremendous. I believe mainstream Urban is the strongest format in this business.

What do you think about the chances for an alternate black music format?

I don't know how many black people would really go for that. It's not really the true essence of what the people in Detroit would want to hear. Yes, there are people out there who would like that because there are some alternative black people, but is it enough to make up a large share of the ratings? I don't think so. It still the mainstream Urban stations that play everything from Rap to R&B oldies that are performing well.

Do you think nationally syndicated shows like Tom Joyner's can work in major markets?

No. Absolutely not. I think the *Tom Joyner Show* is best in small to medium markets, against stations that aren't programmed well. Stations with no research, no marketing, no talent, and no direction. Those are the stations he will compete effectively against. Plus, this syndication thing is putting people out of work.

What do you think of the state of Urban radio?

With deregulation, only the cream will rise to the top. Only the PDs that are at the top of the class will benefit. The economics of deregulation will eliminate all the others. If you're good at what you do, understand computers, have people skills, realize that marketing and managing people are key, you'll survive. I think black radio can excel in the

face of deregulation. Whenever barriers are put in front of black folks, we find a way to either climb over or tear them down. These new barriers are extremely tough, but we'll get through and will be stronger for it in the end. But right now we must be smarter and stronger than ever before.



In the ensuing interview, Nelson offered not only to drop by when in the area, but also suggested premiering his upcoming album live on their airwaves. "Nothing like this has ever happened here before," says Donohue. "We tried to keep things low-key, but still had a parking lot full of fans eager to meet Willie. People here love him and relate to him. He is the common man."

With *Spirit* winning raves all around, the live radio approach apparently works well for Willie, too, as he will also be doing a *Spirit* performance on Austin's **KGSR** on July 2. JONELL MOSSER Around Townes (Winter Harvest)

An interesting concept to say the least, taking one of Nashville's more soulful belters and having her record an album of Townes Van Zandt songs. Known for his melancholic and heart-wrenchingly poetic songwriting, Van Zandt's work is here exposed in a new light, courtesy of Ms. Mosser's powerful vocals.

What began as demos to get Van Zandt some cuts by female artists evolved into a fine work—spotlighting both singer and writer. While production is on the rock and blues side, the pull of "Be Here to Love Me" and "You Are Not Needed Now" is irresistible. Other tracks of note are "Saint John the Gambler," "Flying Shoes," and a duet with Delbert McClinton on "If I Needed You." She sings, he writes, it lives.

RAY CONDO AND HIS RICOCHETS Swing Brother Swing! (Joaquin)

Rocketing out of Vancouver, B.C., comes the riveting and jumpin' swing beats of Ray Condo and his seasoned group. Leaning more on the steel licks supplied by Jimmy Roy, Condo's swing sides more with a jazzy, western feel than a straightahead rockabilly approach. "Loud Mouth" is a spicy wake-up call. Their take on Count Basie's title track gives us a good taste of K.C., while the closing "Sunset Blues" is 'fryin' eggs' hot. *Swing Brother Swing!* is a perfect dose of Summer spice.

While cognizant of current music trends, he's not above poking fun at them, and Odelay forever squelches one-hit-wonder speculation. "Devil's Haircut" starts right on the runway, combining Motown-like sensibilities with a sawtooth distorted guitar and lines like "Discount orgies on the dropout buses." First single, "Where It's At" features a righteous Fender Rhodes keyboard, and "Lord Only Knows" is drawling bluegrass in the Stones' "Dead Flowers" vein.
